FIRST DAY

Morning Session—Wednesday, June 10, 1953

Opening: The 1953 session of the Florida Annual Conference of the Methodist Church convened in the College Heights Methodist Church, Lakeland, Florida, June 10, 1953, at 10:00 A.M. with Bishop John W. Branscomb Presiding.

Memorial Service: Bishop Branscomb presented W. A. Myres, who led in the Memorial Service. Following the singing of Hymn No. 73, "Be Still My Soul", John Stradley led the Responsive Reading and Smith Hardin led in prayer. Following a solo by Edgar Tolle, the report of the Committee on Memoirs was read by C. W. Alford, and adopted by the Conference. (See Reports). The Secretary, Don A. Cooke, called the Roll of the Deceased, and Bishop Branscomb gave the Memorial Address.

Holy Communion: Bishop Branscomb, assisted by the District Superintendents, administered Holy Communion, and the session adjourned with the Benediction.

Wednesday Afternoon—June 10, 1953

Opening: The Conference was called to order at 2:30 P.M. by Bishop John W. Branscomb. After the singing of the Hymn, "God of Grace and God of Glory", P. A. Fletcher led in prayer. The Conference sang the Hymn, "Saviour, More Than Life To Me."

Welcome: Mayor Norman Kent of Lakeland was presented and welcomed the delegates to Lakeland. Dr. Charles T. Thrift, Vice-President of Florida Southern College was presented and welcomed the Conference to the College.

Bar of the Conference: On motion of Charles T. Thrift, the Bar of the Conference was set as the lower floor of the auditorium.

Time of Meeting and Order of Business: On motion of Charles T. Thrift, it was voted that the printed program be adopted as the official order of business of the Conference.

Presentation: E. J. Pendergrass, H. W. Blackburn, Milburn McLeod assisted John G. Stradley in presenting Mrs. John W. Branscomb to the Conference. Mrs. R. C. Holmes, on behalf of the Cabinet and their wives, gave Mrs. Branscomb an orchid.

Privilege: Milburn McLeod presented the pages to the Conference, and announced the Golden Wedding Anniversary of Dr. and Mrs. S. A. Clark. The Conference voted to request Mrs. Branscomb to convey congratulations to the Clarks. On motion of Milburn McLeod, Robert L. Allen was instructed to convey the sympathy and good wishes of the Conference to Dr. Ludd M. Spivey, who is confined to his room due to illness.

Roll Call: Bishop Branscomb requested Don A. Cooke, Secretary of the Conference, to take charge of the roll call. Registration cards

Maurice Felton, Durward McDonnell Alfred Hedberg, Walter Cross, and O'Neal Jacobs. The following were announced as assistants to the Statistician: Harris DeWese, T. W. Jennings, F. B. McClure, W. E. Rowell, Mrs. W. E. Rowell, Fred Rumsey, C. M. Sappington, M. A. Shaw, Sidney White.

Greetings: On motion of E. J. Pendergrass, the conference voted to send greetings to the South Georgia Conference and any other Conference now in session.

Question 6: "What are the reports of the District Superintendents?" was called. The District Superintendents made their reports in the following order: John G. Report of Lay Leader: R. H. Berg gave the report of the Conference Lay Leader.

Presentation of Gavel: Bruce F. Gannaway presented Bishop Branscomb a gavel made of wood from the mission fields of Africa and Cuba. The handle is of Cuban mahogany sent by Victor Rankin from Cuba, the head is of lignum vitum sent by Dr. William Hughlett from Africa.

Expression of Sympathy: The Conference voted to instruct the Secretary to send an expression of sympathy to D. W. Ferrell who is seriously ill. Bishop Branscomb led in prayer.

Question 48: "What is the report of the Conference Statistician?" M. E. Myer presented the report and spoke briefly.

Adjournment: Following the necessary announcements, Dr. Luis Dias De'Arce, of Cienfuegos, Cuba, was presented and pronounced the benediction.

Recommendation of the Conference Committee on Student Work: George A. Foster read the report of the Conference Committee on Student Work and moved its adoption. An amendment by R. C. Holmes was accepted by the Committee, and after discussion the recommendation was adopted as follows:

**Report and Recommendations of the
Conference Committee on Student Work**

The Conference Committee on Student Work has reviewed the status of Methodist student work throughout the conference and has taken special note of the uncompleted Wesley Foundation building at the University of Miami and of the greatly outmoded and outgrown facilities at the University of Florida Wesley Foundation. Believing

that it is our responsibility as an annual conference to provide adequate building facilities for our student work, we make the following recommendations:

1. That a Wesley Foundation Commission made up of not less than 25 nor more than 40 persons, clerical and lay, be organized and established by the Conference.
2. That this Wesley Foundation Commission be charged with the responsibility of setting up and carrying out among our churches and people a campaign for cash and pledges payable within two years to secure funds for these building purposes.
3. That the goal of this campaign be a minimum of \$150,000.00.
4. That this \$150,000.00 be divided on the basis of \$110,000.00 to the University of Florida Wesley Foundation and \$40,000.00 to the University of Miami Wesley Foundation, provided that the Miami project be allocated the first \$25,000.00 realized in cash and the last \$15,000.00 provided further that in case the amount realized in cash is greater or less than the goal, the Conference Board of Education shall be empowered to make adjustments between the projects.
5. That the Wesley Foundation Commission shall work under the joint supervision of the Bishop and Cabinet and the Conference Board of Education.
6. That all district superintendents, pastors and official boards of local churches be requested by the conference to cooperate with the commission in setting up the campaign and realizing these building funds.

Question 16: "Are the ministerial members of the Conference blameless in their life and official administration?" Bishop Branscomb called the roll of the Conference by Districts and special appointments, and the character of each member was passed. Vernon Rudy led in prayer, and the Conference joined in singing "Blest Be The Tie That Binds".

Resolution: George Hutchinson read the following resolutions, which, upon motion, duly seconded, were adopted:

RESOLUTION

To: The Members of the Florida Annual Conference:

WHEREAS, in certain actions pending in the United States District Court (for the District) of Pennsylvania, known as Civil Action No. 10263—Tract S/1521, and Civil Action No. 10264, Tract S/1529, the "Conference Board of Stewards of St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church" was made a party and two checks, one for \$200.00 and another for \$1430.70 have been issued by the Treasurer of the United States, payable to the said Conference Board of Stewards of the St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church; and

WHEREAS, by reason of the merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Methodist Episcopal Church South, and Methodist Protestant Church, made effective in 1939, the St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Florida Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, were merged under the name of "Florida Conference of the Methodist Church", and the said Florida Conference of the Methodist Church has succeeded to all

the rights, title, interest and properties whatsoever of Conference Board of Stewards of the St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and this Conference is the proper body to receive the said checks of \$200.00 and \$1430.79, respectively:

NOW, BE IT RESOLVED, that Cora Fields, as Treasurer of the Florida Conference of the Methodist Church, or her successor or successors, be, and she and they are, authorized to receive the said checks and to execute the necessary stipulations regarding the above mentioned proceedings and to do any and all other things reasonably necessary or required in order that the said checks may be received by this Conference.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the proceeds of the said checks, when received, shall be disposed of as this Conference may direct.

RESOLUTION

To: Bishop John W. Branscomb and Members of the Florida Annual Conference:

Whereas, The Official Board of the First Methodist Church, Zephyrhills, Florida, at their meeting of May 12, 1953, agreed to present a Resolution to the Florida Annual Conference in session during the month of June, 1953, in Lakeland, Florida, and duly appointed a committee consisting of the Chairman of the Trustees, Lay Member and the Pastor, to draw the Resolution; and

Whereas, during the lifetime of Mr. James Nixon Stephens, he was a resident of Zephyrhills, Florida, and a member of the Methodist Church of that place, he, having seen the great need for an educational building for the church, gave money to erect such a building, and not long after the building was completed, Mr. Stephens died and the hall was named in his memory; and

Whereas, the said Mr. Stephens in his will left 25% of two tracts of land in Pennsylvania, which have later been condemned by the Federal Government and that the Conference Board of Stewards of the St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Zephyrhills, Florida, was made a party to the said suit, along with the heirs of Mr. Stephens, and that a check for \$1,430.79 has been made payable to the Conference Board of Stewards of the St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Zephyrhills, Florida, and a check for \$200.00 has been made payable to the Conference Board of Stewards of St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church; and

Whereas, the surviving heirs of the late Mr. Stephens, in signing the necessary papers during the process of litigation, expressed the belief that the bequest was to the Trustees of the Methodist Church of Zephyrhills, Florida, and as Zephyrhills was not the seat of the former St. Johns River Conference, the Official Board of the First Methodist Church, Zephyrhills, Florida, believes that was the intention of the late Mr. Stephens to leave the bequest in

order that the Stephens Memorial Hall could be kept in good condition and perpetuate his memory;

Now, therefore be it resolved, that these checks in the amount of \$1630.79, by the direction of this Florida Annual Conference, be turned over to the Trustees of the First Methodist Church of Zephyrhills, Florida, for the purpose of remodeling Stephens Hall and making it adequate to meet the needs of the educational program of the Church.

Board of Hospitals and Homes: Fred L. Martin read the report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, which was adopted. (See Reports).

Introductions: Bishop Branscomb presented Chaplains Harvey Hardin and John Rice to the Conference, and they spoke briefly. All former Chaplains were recognized. Dr. D. Stewart Patterson, Executive Secretary of the Commission on Chaplains was presented, and spoke.

Resolution: B. F. Gannaway moved the adoption of the following resolution, which was duly seconded and carried:

"I move that we ask Dr. Patterson to carry our greetings and love to our brothers in the Chaplaincy and express to them our sincere appreciation for the service they are rendering."

R. A. Blackburn led in prayer.

Report of the Special Committee on Episcopal Residence: B. F. Gannaway read the report of the Special Committee on Episcopal Residence, and moved its adoption. Bishop Branscomb expressed appreciation to the Committee and the conference, and the report was adopted as follows:

Report of the Special Committee on the Episcopal Residence

Submitted to the Florida Annual Conference, June 11, 1953

Following the instructions of the Annual Conference in 1952, your committee studied a number of properties in the city of Jacksonville, finally deciding on a beautiful home located at 1296 Avondale Ave. An offer of \$30,000 was made, which was considerably less than the price asked. However, the offer was finally accepted. This lovely home stands out very prominently on the prettiest lot in the neighborhood, around which is built an attractive iron fence. In order to make our Bishop take better care of himself, the time may come when we shall have to lock him in, so we are happy to have the fence.

Some repairs and remodeling were necessary, which cost approximately \$2,000. The furnishings were purchased, for the most part, at wholesale cost (50% of list price), at a cost of \$3,500.

In the final picture, the cost, including all these items, is \$35,500. The Conference authorized an expenditure of \$35,000, but some of these items would not normally be included in this figure. The extra \$500 has been taken from the \$1,000 maintenance fund for the Episcopal Residence, a continuing annual item in our Conference budget.

Your committee was unanimous in the opinion that we had made an excellent purchase, and Bishop and Mrs. Branscomb are more

than pleased with the beauty and comfort of their home.

We submit this report, expressing our sincere appreciation to all who have in any way helped to make possible the acquisition of and furnishing of this Episcopal Residence for our beloved Bishop and his family.

Whereas, the City of Miami has the most adequate facilities in the South to meet the needs of this great gathering of the Methodist Church,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Florida Annual Conference, in session on this 13th day of June, 1953, does hereby join with the city of Miami in extending an invitation to the General Conference of the Methodist Church to hold its 1956 Conference in the beautiful city of Miami.

Be it further resolved, that, in the event this invitation cannot be accepted by the General Conference that we invite the Southeastern Jurisdiction to hold its 1956 Conference in Miami.

Introduction: Bishop Branscomb presented Dr. Jack E. Anderson, pastor of the Wesley Monumental Methodist Church, Savannah, Georgia, to the Conference, and he spoke briefly.

Report of Children's Home: H. H. Waller read the report of the Trustees of the Florida Methodist Children's Home, which was adopted. (See Reports). R. C. Holmes paid tribute to Charles A. Thompson, retiring Superintendent of the Florida Methodist Children's Home and also introduced Bascom W. Carlton, the newly selected superintendent of the Home, both of whom spoke briefly.

The Florida Methodist: H. H. Waller presented the report of the "Florida Methodist" which was adopted. (See Reports). Lionel W. Nelson, the newly appointed Editor of the "Florida Methodist" was presented to the Conference and spoke briefly. Bishop Branscomb

presented C. A. Thompson and R. C. Holmes each a gift in the nature of a book, for their fine services rendered our Children's Home.

Stewardship Program: Joe A. Tolle presented the program of the Stewardship emphasis for Methodism this quadrennium. George A. Foster and Laurie G. Ray spoke to the program, after which the conference sang "A Charge To Keep I Have." R. H. Berg, Conference Lay Leader, presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, The General Conference of 1952 provided for a highly significant "church-wide program of stewardship education, with special emphasis upon stewardship of possessions, which shall be closely related to giving to the benevolence causes which Methodists will be called upon to support. Stewardship of possessions shall be interpreted to mean that the tithe is the minimum standard of giving for Methodist people, and shall be promoted by these agencies (the General Board of Education, the General Board of Lay Activities, and the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation) by providing appropriate literature for the use of churches and pastors in enlisting Methodist people as tithers" (§ 753-3, 1952 Discipline);

And Whereas, These agencies have provided for the implementation of this church-wide program of stewardship education in a carefully wrought plan;

And Whereas, the Council of Bishops assembled at Omaha, Nebraska, in May, 1953, enthusiastically approved the plan with helpful suggestions for its most effective use;

And Whereas, this the Florida Annual Conference has listened sympathetically to the presentation of the plan;

Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That we now fervently endorse the plan and put it into action early in the year 1954, and that we launch this program with a Conference-wide Christian Stewardship meeting on January 7, 1954, district meetings during the period of January 18-30, and local church emphasis on stewardship during entire month of February;
2. That we recognize the positive necessity of exemplary leadership on the part of all members of this the Florida Annual Conference to lead out in this effort if we are to encourage all of our people to follow in accordance with our example;
3. That we covenant with God here in His Presence and in the presence of each other to tithe our own incomes regularly.

Richard Blanchard, accompanied by George Gibson at the piano, sang the solo: "He Lifted Me."

Adjournment: Bishop Branscomb announced that the Sunday Morning Love Feast would be at 8:15 A.M., and that all the Sunday Services would be held in the Mayhall Auditorium. Following the other necessary announcements Clare Cotton pronounced the benediction.

Saturday Afternoon—June 13, 1953

Opening: The Conference convened at 2:30 P.M. with Bishop John W. Branscomb, presiding, with the singing of the hymn "I Love To Tell The Story."

Presentation: Paul N. Jewett, who is transferring to the Newark Conference and Claude Haynes who is transferring to the North Georgia Conference were presented to the Conference, and each spoke briefly.

Question 36: "Who are received by transfer?" was called. Bishop Branscomb announced the following: Samuel Paris Bell, Elder from the West Virginia Conference; Wilson A. Bugden, Elder from the Troy Conference; J. Donelson Jones, Elder from the Louisville Conference; J. A. Keiper, Elder from the Newark Conference; Fred Sanders, Elder from the Louisville Conference; Jack E. Anderson, Elder from the South Georgia Conference.

Presentation: C. B. Peeler presented the file of the Daily Christian Advocate of the 1952 General Conference, and the Jurisdictional Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction recording the election of Bishop Branscomb, to the Bishop to be filed in the permanent records of the Secretary of the Conference.

Resolution: D. B. Sargent presented the following resolution to the Conference, which was adopted unanimously:

Whereas, John Warren Branscomb did for twenty-four years dedicate his life and his talents to **Florida Methodism** as an active member of **The Florida Conference**; and

Whereas, his election as a Bishop of **The Methodist Church** on June 27, 1952, did operate to remove his name from the rolls of **The Florida Conference**; and

Whereas, The Florida Conference, in sober and deep appreciation for this recognition and honor bestowed upon one of its members for the first time, desires to perpetuate the name and spirit of John Warren Branscomb on its rolls as well as in the hearts and lives of Florida Methodism;

Now therefore, be it resolved that the name of John Warren Branscomb, a bishop of The Methodist Church, be listed at an appropriate place in the **alphabetical roll** of the Florida Conference, as published in the annual journal, as an Honorary Life Member of The Florida Conference of The Methodist Church, together with appropriate biographical data of his life and service.

We recommend the following rules and regulations governing minimum salaries as required by Paragraph 826 of the Discipline:

1. That the scale of minimum salaries be fixed as follows: Effective members of the Conference and those on trial, married: \$2,400.00; single \$2,200.00; approved full-time supplies, married, \$2,200.00; single, \$2,000.00. Part time and retired supplies shall not be claimants on minimum salary funds.

2. That an apportionment of 1½% be levied on the pastoral salaries in every charge to secure minimum salary funds.

3. That minimum salary funds be administered by the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.

4. That the cabinet be charged with the responsibility of determining who are claimants on this fund and the amount due each.

5. That payments be made to the beneficiaries of this fund quarterly, provided funds are available.

The Episcopal Fund apportionment is 2% of the total cash salaries paid to the pastors and associate pastors serving charges under episcopal appointment or as supply pastors as reported at the last session of the Annual Conference.

The apportionment recommended for the District Superintendents Fund is an amount equal to 6% of the pastoral salaries. We recommend further that the salary of the district superintendents shall be \$7,000.00 and the expense account \$1,200.00.

We recommend an apportionment of an amount equal to 13½% of the pastor salaries for the support of our Conference Claimants.

We recommend a gift of a maximum of \$1,800.00 for Conference entertainment from the Conference Reserve Fund to be used

on the deficit incurred by Florida Southern College in the entertainment of this 1953 session of the Annual Conference.

REPORT No. 1

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Dear Brethren:

Your Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension wishes to express appreciation for the fine support given the missionary

cause by our Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors and churches during the past twelve months. In many ways 1952-1953 has been the greatest missionary year in the history of Florida Methodism. More new churches have been built, more preaching places have been established and more Sunday Schools have been organized. Only through loyalty, cooperation and sympathetic helpfulness could such achievements be realized.

Many thought a year ago that our Advance program would taper off and that interest in missionary giving would diminish. The report of our treasurer indicates that more money has been contributed during the last Conference year for Advance Specials—both home and abroad, than any year before. This has been accomplished in spite of increased askings and payments on General and Conference benevolences. More than \$230,000 in Advance Specials passed through the hands of our treasurer, The Rev. A. A. Almand, to whom we owe a debt of gratitude for efficient and able service.

Since we met here last June Dr. John W. Branscomb, who had served as Conference Missionary Secretary for some fifteen years, has been elected to the Episcopacy and stationed as resident Bishop of the Jacksonville area, which embraces Florida and Cuba. We are not only honored to have this recognition come to our Conference and to one of our able ministers, but to the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension as well. The Rev. Melton Ware has been selected as our new Conference Missionary Secretary. He has assumed his responsibility with intelligence, insight and enthusiasm. We respectfully request his reappointment to this position.

Mr. Tom Alexander, after more than thirty years of service with our Board continues to lead us in the department of Church Extension. We are grateful for this good and faithful layman.

The following suggestions are made as a general outline for our Conference Missionary program during the coming year:

1. That every Pastor give special attention to the cause of missions through study courses, preaching program and the use of missionaries speaking in our churches.
2. That the Commission on Missions be organized according to the disciplinary requirements and that literature be provided on a convenient table or rack where our people may be supplied with missionary information. Also, that this committee cooperate with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in securing subscriptions to the "World Outlook."
3. That "Christian Stewardship" with emphasis on tithing be promoted in every charge as a means of enabling our people to properly visualize their responsibilities to the Kingdom of God and provide adequate support for missions at home and abroad.
4. That Pastors and officials encourage the youth of each church to inform themselves regarding missionary needs around the world and challenge both young men and young women to offer themselves to the church for full-time missionary service.

REPORT No. 1

BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education is happy to report progress in every area of its responsibility. Credit for this is due in a large measure to the untiring labors of our Conference Staff: Dr. W. V. Meredith, Executive Secretary, Reverend Lionel Nelson, Director of Adult Work; Reverend Warren Willis, Director of Youth Work; Miss Mary Calhoun, Director of Children's Work; and Miss Janet Hardin, Office Secretary. We are glad to report that the new office building for the Board of Education has been completed on the lot donated by Florida Southern College, 904 S. Ingraham Avenue, Lakeland. It is now conservatively valued at \$26,500.

Our Conference has maintained its high standard in the area of Leadership Training. It now stands fifth in the number of Second Series Schools, sixth in enrollment, and six in the number of credits given. Outstanding schools during the year have been held in Jacksonville, Miami, Tampa, St. Petersburg, Clearwater, Lakeland, and Lake County. We have participated in four interdenominational Lab Schools with 138 Methodist workers receiving credit. There were 197 Vacation Church Schools held during the year with an enrollment of 15,036 pupils and 3,381 workers. A young adult convocation was held at Florida Southern College over Labor Day weekend with over 400 in attendance. An older adult conference was held at the Youth Camp in the Spring.

The Conference Youth program continues its fine progress. Every phase of our summer program advanced. There was an increase of 364 over the summer of 1951 and an increase of 1,279 over the first year in the camp in 1948. So great has been the increase that last year nearly 200 young people could not be accommodated for the camps and assemblies because of lack of space. There were eight weeks of Christian Adventure Camps, three weeks of Assemblies, one week of MYF and MSM Convocation, and one week of Evangelism Work Camp. During the camps and assemblies more than 600 young people registered a first commitment to Christ and His way. Thirteen youth enlistment rallies were conducted and 42 young people registered first decisions for full time Christian vocational service. Among the outstanding improvements of the Youth Camp is the beautiful new Graham-Sapp Youth Chapel contributed by Mr. and Mrs. J. Hilbert Sapp of Orlando.

Under the leadership of Reverend Thaxton Springfield at the University of Florida, Reverend Francis L. Luce at Florida Southern College, Miss Eulalie Ginn at the University of Miami, and Miss Bette Barnes at Florida State University the student work program has been greatly expanded. We recognize the tremendous needs for adequate facilities and commend and endorse the proposed campaign to raise \$150,000 for this work. We pledge our whole-hearted cooperation in this endeavor.

We are grateful to the churches of the Conference for their generous response to Rally Day, Race Relations Sunday and College Day.

REPORT No. 2

BOARD OF EDUCATION GEORGIA SEAGLE TRUST AND COOPERATIVE

During the year material improvements have been made to the physical properties of the Georgia Seagle Trust in Gainesville, which is administered by the Board of Education. A 20-foot addition was built onto the building at 313 W. University Avenue, occupied by Long's Cafeteria, and an old two-story dwelling on S. W. 6th Street was razed and a new concrete block warehouse 40x50 feet was erected on the site.

Income from rental properties held by the Trust has been increased more than 50 percent since the Board took over the Trust in 1948. Annual income to the Trust is now slightly more than \$18,000.

Seagle Hall and Annex were maintained and made available to Georgia Seagle Cooperative without charge, as in the past. They have a rental value of at least \$6,000 a year. In addition, the Trust spent \$2,629.69 for various services to the Cooperative, including a scholarship for Wai Yun Syn, a foreign student.

The Trust employs a house mother, Mrs. Marguerite Tye, for the Cooperative, and she has proven of material assistance. Thaxton Springfield serves as Secretary of Admissions and J. Francis Cooper manages the Trust properties.

The Cooperative has been filled to its capacity of approximately 80 students during the school year just closing. Of this total membership, 38 are Methodists, 23 Baptist, 8 Presbyterian, 5 Episcopal, 3 Christian, 2 Catholic and 1 Society of Friends.

Members of the Cooperative have participated in practically all phases of University of Florida life and activities, social, athletic and other. Terrell Sessums, a member of the Cooperative, was president of the University of Florida student body during the past year. Other members have served on the student executive council, student religious association, swimming and track teams. One member of the Cooperative was secretary of religious affairs, another was undersecretary of labor.

The fact that 13 members of the Cooperative have been elected to various scholastic and honor societies and fraternities, many of them to offices, in these organizations, is indicative of the way the members of the Cooperative are fitting into and becoming leaders of campus activities. One member, Homer A. Bain, was elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi, the two highest scholastic honor societies, and Florida Blue Key, the highest leadership fraternity.

The membership as a body has attended church services at First Presbyterian (twice), First Baptist, First Methodist and Holy Trinity Episcopal churches in Gainesville.

Applications for membership each May and December far exceed available openings. The Board of Directors, established under the will of the late Mrs. Georgia Seagle Holland, aids the Secretary of Admissions in selecting probationary new members.

Affairs of the Cooperative are conducted by the members themselves, and full membership in the Cooperative comes only by vote of the Cooperative.

REPORT No. 3

BOARD OF EDUCATION METHODIST STUDENT WORK

" . . . If I be lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." The Methodist Student Movement, our church at work on the college campus, has one supreme and all inspiring purpose and that is to exalt Christ. To lift Him up that He might be seen and known and draw unto Himself students, faculty and all who are a part of the college community. The whole student program is designed toward this end. That the members of this campus community may not be conformed to the secularisms and materialisms that campus life and the "Knowledge process" too often emphasize, but that they may be transformed by the renewal of the mind which was in Christ Jesus. This is the challenge, this is the task of the student worker. Everything else is secondary.

The vocation of being a Christian student is one of the emphases undergirding all of the activities of our student work. It stresses that college is not a four year leave of absence from religious interests and services that may be resumed after one is out of school and established, but that it is a time for special disciplines; the discipline of study—the study of the Bible—, the discipline of thinking, the discipline of prayer, and the discipline of service. Everything that is done is within the framework and context of the church, adapted necessarily to the campus experience, but with aim of training students to become mature, responsible adult churchmen as they go out from college life.

To accomplish this, the student is called upon to commit himself, his possessions and services in a conscious growing experience of stewardship while he is in school.

Student service projects that are a result of Christian stewardship practices among our students on our Florida campuses are worth observing. The Florida MSM continues to support with students and money the Cuban Work Camp which it helped launch along with the Georgia MSM some ten years ago. Each summer cooperating MSM groups send 12 to 16 students who give their whole summer in work on the island. Our State MSM established a scholarship to Scarritt College for a Negro student last year which is now supported by the MYF-MSM Convocation. Other Methodist Student Fellowship Fund projects include Leonard Theological Seminary in India, the Alpenblick project in Switzerland, and the World Student Christian Federation. Over and above these, each local student group has several other projects of its own, for example, the support of a Korean student at the University of Florida by their Wesley Foundation, the support of two 3-J's by the Florida State University group, the support of a Bible and Agricultural College in

Japan by the University of Miami Wesley Foundation and a new Cuban Work Camp started this summer by the Florida Southern Methodist Student Organization.

In addition to these projects approximately 125 of our Florida students are giving their entire summer to Caravans, to Workcamps, to settlement house work, and to our own youth program at Leesburg. These and other community and world service projects represent many man hours and thousands of dollars given readily and enthusiastically by our students.

"The Campus Community continues one of the crucial battle-fields for the Christian cause. . ." and one of the largest missionary opportunities open to us. The church, through its MSM, stands at the center of the campus to challenge secularism and champion the cause of Christianity, to reorient knowledge to God and to live up the high calling of Christ Jesus. May God bless His Kingdom and all who labor faithfully to bring it in.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Florida Conference participated in the Southeastern Jurisdictional United Evangelistic Mission wholeheartedly as a part of its observance of Methodism's Year of World Evangelism. Under the impetus and impact of this Mission we have made significant gains, even though we had a similar Mission just last year. From the Mission we had a total of 5,588 commitments, with 2,923 of them on Profession of Faith and by Vows. Timed to follow the Easter ingathering these results are truly encouraging, for we had already received a goodly number of accessions. Our total for the conference year is 19,361, which gives us a record of approximately one for eight. The leadership in the campaign was of a high order and inspired cooperation all along the line. The exchange of preachers with the South Georgia Conference worked out quite well and made for brotherhood among us.

The leadership an dorganization achieved under the United Evangelistic Mission the past two years has established records which it will not be easy to maintain, and yet the experiences should fit us to do even more effective work. The methods tried and proven should now become the normal pattern for a continuous program of evangelism. A constructive criticism heard during this past mission was voiced in the question: "Why do you do this just by spurts and in spells?" Surely we ought to work at it in season and out of season.

For this conference year we challenge every pastor, on his own initiative, to plan his own program of evangelism, choosing his own time, selecting his own preacher, making financial arrangements to his own liking, but to come up at the end of the year with a report as good as this year, or better. We do suggest a minimum of one week of preaching and one week of visitation. We cannot afford to do less; we ought to attempt more. The general goal for the quadrennium is one for every ten members over all. In our conference let us not only equal the record of this year, but surpass it.

As a part of our observance of the Year of Evangelism a World Convocation of Evangelism will be held in Philadelphia, June 26, 27, 28. This meeting will also commemorate the 250th Anniversary of the Birth of John Wesley. Methodist leaders from various parts of the world will take part on the program. The chairman of this Board and the executive secretary will both be in attendance. Financial help is being provided whereby each district secretary can go. We hope many others will go on their own initiative.

We call attention also to the Warren A. Candler Camp Meeting at Lake Junaluska, July 5-12. This revival occasion is attracting ever increasing numbers to our summer assembly grounds. Arrange to make it a part of your summer program.

Another successful Evangelistic Workshop was held last September in Tampa. We are proud to have a part in this work with our young people. This year it will be held earlier, July 13-20 and in the city of Miami. It is now to be known as a Christian Witness Workshop and will offer an improved program and procedure.

This Board has requested the same appropriation from the World Service Commission, namely \$1,800.

We recommend the appointment again of Dr. E. J. Pendergrass to be the Conference Secretary of Evangelism. We commend the work of W. B. Mundy and Forrest Church as Approved Evangelists this past year. Brother Church has returned to the pastorate and Brother Mundy is doing special work for our College this next year.

Now that each charge is due to have set up its Commission on Membership and Evangelism, we urge every pastor to make the fullest possible use of it. Meet monthly and plan and promote each phase of the work committed to your responsibility. We suggest that your church make Shepherds magazine available to each member of the commission. It will go far toward indoctrinating them into the work and spirit of Evangelism; its methods and its urgency. If you will get this Commission to functioning and going strong, it will do more to put new life into your church than any other organization you can have.

We urge continued and increased use of all Tidings literature and pamphlets. Every vital, regenerating movement must have and circulate its ideas and ideals. The world of tomorrow belongs to the movement which today gets to and captures the mind of the masses.

We desire to express our very great appreciation to Dr. Paul Hardin for his fine, forceful, and forthright messages to us during the Hours of Evangelism, and also to those who have led us in the gospel singing.

Finally, and most urgent of all, we wish to lay upon the conscience and heart of each pastor the responsibility for revitalizing the spiritual life of our church. If we are to prevail over our foes of secularism and sin in this generation and bring the world nearer to the ideal of Christ's kingdom on earth, then we must remobilize and use the moral and spiritual forces at our command. To that end, let us return to the original Christian pattern and to the practice of early Methodism and create within every Methodist church dynamic Christian cell groups, wherein prayer is want to be made and power generated. Let us organize into small groups, stay together and pray together until we are one with Christ in purpose and in spirit. Then let us burn with His flame, to the saving of our world.

The Approved Supply Fellowship met in the downstairs dining room in the Commons of Florida Southern College, Saturday, June 13th, at 12:45 P.M. for a Luncheon and Business meeting.

After the Luncheon our President, Lewis Minter, welcomed all of us to this meeting and asked that Rev. W. L. Windsor lead us in prayer. After the prayer the Rev. H. T. Foley offered a motion to change the order of business to allow the speaker to come before the general business of the Fellowship. This motion was seconded and carried. Dr. David Cathcart was presented as one of the dignitaries in attendance and a motion was made by the Rev. Mr. Foley that he be asked to be our speaker for the next year and that he be made an honorary member of the Fellowship. This motion was seconded and carried. Another motion was introduced that our speaker of the day, the Rev. Forrest Church also be made a member of our Fellowship. This motion was duly seconded and carried. The

Rev. L. E. Denslow brought greetings from our good friend Rev. Berry D. Bourn expressing his great regret at not being able to be with us, due to the fact that he had to return home because of illness in the family. A motion was offered that the Secretary be instructed to send greetings to the Rev. B. D. Bourn. The Rev. F. C. Smelt brought greetings from Dr. Waller, who expressed his regrets at being unable to be present because of having to return home to perform a wedding. Our President, the Rev. Lewis Minter recognized Dr. David Cathcart who spoke to the group about the problems of the supply pastor, stressing especially the need of sending full records to the registrar.

The Rev. Lewis Minter introduced our speaker, the Rev. Forrest Church who thanked us very graciously for the honor of being made a member of our Fellowship. Then he spoke to us on the subject "I Am Disturbed and What Shall We Do About It?" He used as a text, Luke 16:11, "If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon who will commit to your trust the true riches?" He called to our attention the fact that there are over 9,000,000 Methodists; that we could expect at our Sunday morning services, about 6,000,000 of them, and at the Sunday evening services about 4,000,000. The mid-week meeting would have an attendance of about 500,000. The burden of his talk was that we have to have a whole-hearted allegiance to God. His message was very timely and struck deeply into our hearts.

The Rev. Uel Dixon spoke briefly, regarding the supply Fellowship at Emory University asking each of us to support the Southeastern Supply Fellowship, mentioning that they are carrying on a commendable work in assisting with the Scholarship Funds at Emory.

The President next asked for the Secretary to call the roll. This was done and those present answered to their names and some corrections and some additions were made to the roll. The Secretary then read the minutes of last year's meeting which were accepted as read. The President next called for unfinished business and general business. The Rev. Ray Hitchcock spoke regarding the amount of the dues suggesting that the amount be increased. An explanation of the present dues and the needs of the Fellowship determined that an increase in the dues was not necessary at this time. The President next called for the Treasurer's report and this report showed a balance in the treasury of \$60.70. The Rev. E. F. Mayton spoke briefly concerning the Rev. David Ferrell who is seriously ill. He offered a motion that the Secretary be instructed to send to the Rev. Mr. Ferrell a get-well card from our Fellowship. This motion carried.

The current bills were presented and authorized to be paid.

Motion for adjournment was made and the meeting was closed with prayer by the Rev. D. H. Carr.

REPORT OF THE WORLD PEACE BOARD

We rejoice that a truce in Korea seems imminent, and that an end to the fearful carnage is in sight. It is our prayer that the truce may be a step toward a just and lasting peace. We urge the Methodist people to encourage their Church and government to take ef-

factive steps toward the physical, mental, moral and spiritual reconstruction of Korea.

We are largely agreed that war presents one of the greatest detriments to the welfare of mankind. It hinders and impairs the best that has been presented by God to the soul of man. Modern warfare has come to stagger the imagination of us all. Its possibilities of destruction cannot be calculated. However, it is not enough merely to be frightened by war or to protest its shortcomings. The great problems of man are not solved by wishful thinking or mere verbiage.

Practical steps must be sought to cope with the backlog of hatred, poverty and loss of spiritual progress that past wars have wrought. A workable means must be sought to subdue the desire for warfare and bring peace to us and our posterity.

We believe the first step towards a just and lasting peace, simple as it may seem, is ourselves. We must first "repent of our sins and desire to live in love and charity with our neighbors," before we can ask others to do the same.

This is a fit time to reaffirm our conviction that war is not inevitable. We do not feel that we are mere automata, being pushed about by a heartless higher power, but we feel that we are free moral agents with choices to make and decisions to carry out. We deny the fatalism that is expressed in the notion that war is inevitable.

We would like to emphasize that we are no longer in a position physically or morally to be isolationists. We cannot strike out on our own. With the help of God, we must seek to work together for in the United Nations, and would have our people give it their wholehearted common good. We recognize the important role our country has hearted support.

Civil liberties are essential to world peace. The war spirit grows wherever these liberties are suppressed. We, as a people, can do more to work against war if we are free to speak, write and express ourselves publicly. To be sure, we must be on guard lest enemies within our country misuse their freedom to plot against us, and every means consistent with the democratic ideal should be used to discover and restrain such persons. But agencies that do this work must be prevented from persecuting loyal citizens and maligning the characters of those who give voice to unpopular opinions.

We abhor the attempt to identify progressive ideas and minority opinions with communism and subversion. We condemn the McCarthy method of irresponsible accusation and the implication of guilt by association. Especially do we deplore the attack upon G. Bromley Oxnam, Bishop of the Methodist Church, and a Vice-President of the World Council of Churches. We are confident that he is a loyal American and a devout Christian. He exemplifies all that is best in our democratic and Protestant conception of the citizen who assumes his responsibility for vital matters of public interest. He proves his patriotism by his willingness to champion civil liberties and to expose powerful groups who would deny them to us. We glory in his courageous leadership and urge the un-American Activities Committee to devote its time to protecting us from our real enemies who would destroy our American way of life.

If we are really interested in the cause of peace, there are many ways of finding outlets for our interest. The local church provides an excellent home base from which to work. We are doing the basic work of peace-making when we are actively promoting our

World Service program, and strengthening the missionary enterprise through Advance Specials. In addition, each Church needs to have an active Peace Committee that will act as the leaven for peace thought and action in the Church and community. Ignorance of International problems is felt by us all. An alert and vital Peace Committee in the local church will serve to highlight world events and will be a constant aid in reminding us what we might do to serve the cause of peace. We need educating in this realm as well as encouragement.

We recommend the following goals for this Conference year. The realization of some of these goals by each Church will make a tremendous impact for peace.

1. Step up the Local Church Relief Program, by sending food, clothing and other materials to other lands, giving positive proof of our concern for them. We urge that this relief be channeled through Church World Service, MCOR as a part of the Advance Program, and CARE.

2. Observe World Order Sunday (or United Nations Sunday) on October 25, 1953. Materials may be obtained from the Board of World Peace, 740 Rush Street, Chicago, 11, Ill.

3. Organize or Maintain an Active Peace Committee in Every Church. We commend the use of the leaflet "The Local Church Committee on World Peace" by Chas. F. Boss, Jr., as a guide for this Committee. Copies may be obtained from the Board of World Peace, 740 Rush St., Chicago, 11, Ill.

4. Keep Continual Contact with Service Men and Women. This can be done by sending news from home churches, sending devotional materials, and recognizing the service men and women when they are home.

5. Continue to Extend Hospitality to students from other lands who are studying in our colleges and universities.

6. Include Courses on World Peace wherever possible. It is recommended that courses on World Peace be taught in local churches, Youth Assemblies, Young Adult Assemblies, Older Adult Assemblies, the Pastor's School, and Leadership Training Schools.

7. Sponsor World Peace Speaking Contests. These are usually held in the local high schools. These contests are promoted by the University of North Carolina. Information may be obtained by writing the Extension Division, University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, N. C.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA METHODIST

1952-1953

Although we cannot report the publication of **The Florida Methodist** as a profitable financial enterprise, we are pleased that we can bring the Conference a much healthier statement concerning its affairs than has been possible in recent years.

Income last year was as follows: Subscriptions, \$4,362.00; Advertising, \$1,461.00; Conference subsidy, \$1,200.00; total: \$6,963.

Disbursements were as follows:

Charged by the print shop of the Florida Methodist Children's Home for printing the paper: \$5,824; cost of mailing, engraving and other expenses, \$1,329; total, \$7,153. This represents a deficit of less than \$200.00—a sum which seems almost insignificant compared to that of some previous years.

Most of this improvement in the financial status of the paper is due to increased circulation. Much of the increase in circulation is

due to the efforts of our Bishop. Upon his election to the episcopacy and his subsequent assignment to the Jacksonville Area, Bishop Branscomb transferred his widely read and greatly appreciated "Amen Corner" from the public press to the editorial page of **The Florida Methodist**. He has also taken an active interest in securing additional subscribers for the paper and his efforts, supported by the pastors of the Conference, have produced results which are still being felt.

Feeling that the best interests of the paper might be better served by one who possibly could give a little more time to the work, the board of publication, with the cooperation of the Bishop, the cabinet and the Commission on World Service and Finance, has taken steps to secure the services of an editor other than the Superintendent of the Children's Home. Accordingly, we recommend that the Rev. Lionel W. Nelson be appointed editor of **The Florida Methodist** for the new year with the understanding that he shall be required to give the paper only such time as shall be required for the actual editing of the publication.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE FLORIDA METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME

In making this report to the Conference concerning the year's work at your Conference Home for children who cannot live in their natural homes we would like to take into account also something of a review of the work of the last six years.

During the year just closed we have taken care of 129 boys and girls making a total of 283 youngsters served by the Home in the past six years. Most of those who have been dismissed were able to return to normal family situations with relatives. However, one of these, aided by the Home, has graduated from Stetson University, 3 are now attending college and 3 more will be entering college in the fall. Quite a number of the others remained at the Home until they finished high school, many have married and the annual Thanksgiving Homecoming continues to be a thrilling time of reunion and rejoicing. It is this fine company of useful citizens, young and old, living in and making their contributions to their respective communities across the state and nation, that convinces us of the eternal value and significance of the work that is being done at the Home.

Financially, we have enjoyed another good year. Church contributed income amounted to \$113,687.00, the highest it has been in the past six years except when we have received some rather large bequests. Even then, this total was exceeded only once and then by less than \$2,000.

The income from the Home's productive enterprises has been gratifying also with a total of \$22,380 received from these sources. This is almost 3 times the amount of income that was being realized six years ago. For example, cash sales in the print shop in 1948 amounted to \$2,618. This year the print shop produced \$11,531 in cash sales and this figure does not take into account the printing of

the Florida Methodist, the accounts receivable, nor any of the printing done for the Home.

A number of modest bequests increased the endowment fund in the amount of approximately \$11,500 this year bringing the total to \$228,226. This represents an increase of more than \$78,000 in the last six years.

We continue to improve and make more attractive the physical plant of the Home. Outstanding this year has been the complete redecorating and refurnishing of the senior girls' dormitory and of the lobby or reception hall of the Hardin building. Mrs. Thompson worked with a committee of board members on these projects and is due a major share of the credit for the transformations achieved.

The College House, now being used as a dormitory for senior boys, has also been redecorated without and within and some similar work has been done at the superintendent's residence. The drinking water supply has been chlorinated as an added health measure, a new sewing room has been provided and a number of new sewing machines procured and there hardly is a building on the campus but that has seen some improvement this year. All of which has been but a part of a continuous program of improvement that has been going on throughout the entire six years and all of which has been paid for out of general funds without disturbing any reserves or special accounts.

We feel that we have had another good year in the spiritual life of the children. In addition to regular participation in the life of the local church our young people have furnished leadership in many areas for the Sub-District and have promoted a number of benevolent and missionary projects. Daily devotions, morning and evening, are an integral part of the life of the Home.

We request the conference to order the same plan of finance for the Children's Home as in former years, namely, the receiving in every church of the conference the Church School offerings in their entirety and the loose plate Church offerings on each Fifth Sunday and on Christmas Sunday, December 20th.

Since the Reverend Charles A. Thompson, who has served as superintendent for the past six years, has requested the Board to release him at this time so he might return to the pastorate, we record herewith our profound appreciation to both Mr. and Mrs. Thompson for their devoted and productive service. The Children's Home is a much better place because they have lived, loved and labored there. A stronger tie exists between the Conference and the children. May God richly bless them in their new assignment.

The Board recommends to the Bishop and the Cabinet that the Reverend Bascom W. Carlton be appointed as superintendent for the year.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The General Conference of 1952 set forth the task of this commission in Paragraph 643, section 2 as follows: "It shall be the duty of this commission:

- (a) to cooperate with the Interboard Committee on Christian

Vocations and with the Committee on Christian Vocations in every local church;

- (b) to promote among youth and adults a philosophy of Christian vocation that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian life service;
- (c) to organize a program for presenting to youth and adults the opportunities and claims of the pastoral ministry and other church vocations;
- (d) to take into account the basic interests and aptitudes of youth and adults and inform them of the necessary preparation for specific church vocations;
- (e) to keep accurate and useful records of each youth who has indicated an interest in church vocations from the time of his 1st committment until he is appointed to full-time work in the church, or until such time as responsibility for him is accepted by the proper Annual Conference board or commission."

These purposes found expression in various types of activity during the past year. Every pastor was urged to organize the Committee on Christian Vocations in the local church and to present frequently the opportunities for Christian service through church related vocations.

We rejoice at being able to report that 617 young people of the Florida Conference have consecrated their lives to full time Christian service in a church-related vocation. A record of these decisions is now on file with the secretary of this Commission. Of this number the fields of chosen work are as follows:

Your commission feels that one of its most important purposes is the providing of a follow-up program of counseling and guidance for these young people. In January we held the fourth annual conference on church-related vocations at the Youth Camp in Leesburg which was attended by 64 of our volunteers. At this session opportunities were afforded our youth to investigate and evaluate under qualified leadership of national repute the possibilities for Christian service in the area which they had chosen at the time of their personal committments.

Among the skilled leadership with whom our youth conseled during these days was our own Bishop John W. Branscomb and the Rev. and Mrs. John Stroud.

Under the leadership of Miss Eualie Ginn, a member of our Commission, a confidential file is being prepared for each of our full time volunteers containing a record of committment, basic personal information, high school and college records, and other in-

formation helpful in a counseling program. This information is kept confidential and is released only to authorized persons or agencies of the church.

In planning for the coming year's work your commission would like to make the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that we promote through our preaching and teaching the "philosophy of Christian Vocations that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian life service."

2. We recommend that Committees on Christian Vocations be organized in every local church according to the plan suggested in the Discipline, Paragraph 264, Section 4. We further recommend that the local church Committees on Christian Vocations be made a part of the work of the local church Commission on Education and that they make reports to the Commission on Education.

3. We recommend the continuation of the District Committees of Christian Vocations which are composed of the District Director of Youth Work as chairman, the District Superintendent, the associate directors of Youth Work, the District Secretary of Missionary Personnel of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the members of the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations residing within the bounds of each district.

4. We recommend that your Commission be authorized to conduct another Conference on Church-related vocations to be held this year the weekend of November 6-8, 1953 at the Youth Camp in Leesburg. We urge our churches to support this conference by securing more of our best trained and consecrated young people to attend this exploratory and informative session.

REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL AND HOMES BOARD

Our Board has rendered one of its best services this year in attaining nearly 100% observance of **GOLDEN CROSS SUNDAY**. We have answered every call for assistance that has come to our Board. We would like to request that each district treasurer of the Golden Cross Fund give us a report of funds expended within their districts, in order that this may be included in our report to the conference. Otherwise we can report only the funds handled for administrative purposes.

Our Homes for the Aged in Lake Worth and Miami are filled with waiting lists and they continue to render much needed and helpful service. Both of these homes function under the supervision of local churches. We are now in the process of securing funds for a new home in St. Petersburg. Not many weeks pass that we do not have calls asking for places for our aging. Our conference must look in the very immediate future to the establishing of several more homes. We recommend this be done on the local or district level. The forward step being taken in St. Petersburg is a splendid example and we will watch the progress with great interest.

We nominate the following trustees for the Florida Methodist Children's Home for a three (3) year period: Clerical: Shuler Peele, J. E. McKinley; Lay: L. P. Hagan, Nathan R. Graham, Mrs. Morton

McDonald. We also nominate for Ex officio Members of the Board the Supt. of the Orlando District and Conference Chairman of Hospitals and Homes. We nominate for the superintendent of the Home, B. W. Carlton. The report of the Florida Methodist Children's Home will appear as a separate report.

We have a balance of \$1,591 in our administrative fund.

We recommend the first Sunday in February as Golden Cross Sunday and place stress on its observance in every church.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

1. We have noted with regret the plans under way for the establishing of the Capitol Hill Republican Club, opposite the House Office Building in Washington, where a bar for the sale of liquor will be provided. The goal is 5,000 members, limited to Republicans. We suggest that written protests be sent to President Eisenhower, or to Hon. James C. Haggerty, Secretary to the President.

2. We rejoice in the prayer life and in the Church loyalty of the President of the United States, and we especially commend him for his recent announcement that no liquor will be served in the White House during his administration.

3. One of the highlights of the past year was the state convention of UNITED FLORIDA DRYS which was held in Deland on May 14. Among the notable addresses were those made by Hon. Walter H. Beckham, of the Dade County Juvenile Court, and Rev. Jack Davis, of the Community Methodist Church, Daytona Beach. Six students from the Deland High School made a valuable contribution through a forum discussion on Youth and Alcohol. Materials for a panel discussion may be secured from the office of UNITED FLORIDA DRYS.

4. We are happy to report the defeat in the Committee on Alcoholic Beverages of House Bill 1308, which sought to make legal the sale of alcoholic beverages to minors in the armed service. Hundreds of letters and telegrams of protest were received from Methodists throughout the state, the influence of which was felt in the Committee.

5. We would urge that strong efforts be made to create a sentiment in favor of total abstinence in the local church, keeping always in mind the action of the General Conference in San Francisco which provided that "Only morally disciplined persons shall be nominated for positions on the Official Board and for offices in the Church school, with special reference to total abstinence from alcoholic beverages."

6. We are happy to report that as a result of the observance of Commitment Day during the Conference Year, there were 2,320 first commitments to total abstinence and 2,876 recommittments. It is our hope that the observance of this day will be universal throughout the state during the coming Conference Year.

7. We urge all District Temperance Secretaries to take steps to see that a Temperance Committee is organized in each local church

in their respective districts, and where practicable, to develop a district-wide program of temperance education.

8. We commend the General Board of Temperance for setting up summer schools for the training of leaders in the field of temperance in the various annual conferences, notably the schools to be held this summer at Bloomington, Illinois, and Mt. Vernon, Iowa. We are planning to have representation at the Mt. Vernon School.

9. Emphasis this coming year will be placed upon the training of young people in temperance work, and we are asking the district superintendents and district temperance secretaries to encourage the members of the Methodist Youth Fellowship to avail themselves of this opportunity for training in this field.

10. We commend the work of Good Citizenship Leagues throughout the state, and would ask pastors and laymen to cooperate with efforts to organize these Leagues in every county of the state.

11. We urge the wider distribution of temperance literature among the members of local churches, such literature to be obtained from the office of UNITED FLORIDA DRYS and also from the Methodist Board of Temperance in Washington, D. C. Four films are now being circulated in the state: Viscious Circle, Liquid Lore, Public Enemy Number One and The Choice Is Yours.

12. We would urge the observance of World Temperance Sunday. We challenge our pastors to preach fearlessly and systematically on temperance, with a special message on World Temperance Sunday.

13. We urge our people to make constant protest against alcoholic beverage advertising over radio and television, on bill-boards, and in newspapers and magazines, and to make their influence felt in behalf of legislation that will ban such advertising, especially those subtle programs that encourage children and young people to drink.

14. Seven regional temperance rallies were held throughout the state last winter, and we solicit the attendance and support of our people in behalf of such rallies as may be held by UNITED FLORIDA DRYS during the new Conference Year.

15. We commend the work of UNITED FLORIDA DRYS, under the leadership of Fred T. Barnett, Executive Secretary, and we especially urge that a larger opportunity be given him to speak in the pulpits of the Conference. His address is 1017 South Boulevard, Lakeland, Florida.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications has earnestly endeavored to discharge the important responsibilities entrusted to it, including the increased demands levied by the 1952 General Conference, in order to present to the 109th Annual Conference of Florida Methodism the largest, and one of the finest classes ever to apply for Admission on Trial in the Conference. The Board has spent approximately 30 hours in actual sessions since last

Monday noon in an effort to give due and careful consideration to every man concerned.

The candidates have been most cooperative in meeting scheduled appointments promptly, and no man has been seriously delayed by the taxed schedule.

The Board has sought to define the province of its responsibilities and is in full accord as to interpretation. It is the unanimous opinion that emphasis must not only be placed on "Training" but also on "Ministerial Qualifications".

Thirty-eight candidates will be presented for Admission on Trial. Seventeen candidates were interviewed concerning their eligibility for Full Membership in the Conference, nine of whom are qualified. Forty-eight have qualified for deacons orders; 14 will be recommended for elders orders; three will be presented for recognition of orders from other denominations; and 85 have cleared as Approved Supplies.

Pastor's School. The Florida Pastor's School will be held October 12-16, 1953 at the Youth Camp at Leesburg. Bishop Gerald Ensley of the Des Moines Area; Bishop John W. Branscomb; Dr. William Warren Sweet, professor of church history, Perkins School of Theology; Dr. A. J. Walton, Duke University (especially requested by the Town and Country Commission); Dr. Walter Towner of the General Board of Education; Dr. Ralph Stoodly, Executive Secretary and director of the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information, will appear on the program. Your Board will begin in the early future making arrangements for the 1954 program, so as to secure the very best men possible in their respective fields.

Recommendations—The Board unanimously recommends the following policies for the quadrennium:

1. That candidates for Admission on Trial and Full Connection shall appear in person before the Board.
2. That candidates for Full Connection shall not be received until ready for full time appointment by the conference.
3. That candidates for Admission on Trial under the Seminary Rule shall be required to have completed 1/3 of the work necessary for seminary graduation.
4. A seminary student who is a candidate for full connection must serve two full years under official appointment of a District Superintendent as pastor in charge of a station or circuit.

We commend the action of the General Conference which makes it possible for unordained pastors to administer the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper providing they make satisfactory progress in the course of study. Many of the Approved Supplies have qualified for the privilege. We congratulate them and urge their persistent effort in the field.

The Bishop and District Superintendents have been most cooperative in every way. Their courteous and gracious helpfulness has greatly expedited the work of the Board.

We would like to record an expression of our genuine gratitude to Dr. Charles T. Thrift, Jr., for making it possible for us to have such a delightful room in which to work. Hours would have seemed much longer in less comfortable quarters.

We shall never cease to be grateful to our tireless and efficient Registrar the Rev. David J. Cathcart for his countless hours and

days of work across the year in keeping in frequent contact with all the men and for having records and files so accurately in hand.

**REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE PREACHERS' RELIEF FUND
 OF THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE
 METHODIST CHURCH TO THE CONFERENCE
 SESSION, JUNE 10, 1953**

We submit herewith our Annual Report which includes the audit of the Treasurer's books by Harland B. Bradford, Certified Public Accountant of Jacksonville, under date of April 30th, 1953.

The assets of your board total \$241,228.24 which is an increase of \$12,714.24. The fidelity bond of our Treasurer, in the amount of \$5,000, is in full force and effect. Liability insurance coverage has been placed on all of our properties, both rented property and the homes in which our conference claimants live.

Repairs and furnishings for homes represent an expenditure of \$11,431.44. Several new housing units are under consideration for the new year. Our Endowment Fund includes mortgages receivable in excess of \$95,000, all gilt-edge investments, the value of real estate owned by the board is \$139,699.

We have received remittances for Veterans' Day this past year totaling \$10,406.91 and we are deeply grateful to our pastors and their congregations for this fine response to this most sacred and essential cause. This will permit further extension of our housing project.

We ask you to vote for observance of Retired Ministers Day in our Florida Conference again this year and to name Sunday, November 22nd as the day to be observed in all of our churches in honor of the retired ministers and their wives, and the widows of ministers, and in recognition of the church's obligation for their support (see Section I, Par. 1612 (6) 1952 Discipline). We respectfully ask that you vote a minimum goal of \$10,000 as our offering for this day, this money to be used in the furtherance of our Adequate Housing Program.

**REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE
CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON STUDENT WORK**

The Conference Committee on Student Work has reviewed the status of Methodist student work throughout the conference and has taken special note of the uncompleted Wesley Foundation building at the University of Miami and of the greatly outmoded and outgrown facilities at the University of Florida Wesley Foundation. Believing that it is our responsibility as an annual conference to provide adequate building facilities for our student work, we make the following recommendations:

1. That a Wesley Foundation Commission made up of not less than 25 nor more than 40 persons, clerical and lay, be organized and established by the Conference.
2. That this Wesley Foundation Commission be charged with the responsibility of setting up and carrying out among our churches and people a campaign for cash and pledges within two years to secure funds for these building purposes.
3. That the goal of this campaign be \$150,000.00.
4. That this \$150,000.00 be divided on the basis of \$110,000.00 to the University of Florida Wesley Foundation and \$40,000.00 to the University of Miami Wesley Foundation, provided that the Miami project be allocated the first \$25,000.00 realized in cash and the last \$15,000.00 provided further that in case the amount realized in cash is greater or less than the goal, the Conference Board of Education shall be empowered to make adjustments between the projects.
5. That the Wesley Foundation Commission shall work under the joint supervision of the Bishop and Cabinet and the Conference Board of Education.

6. That all district superintendents, pastors and official boards of local churches be requested by the conference to cooperate with the commission in setting up the campaign and realizing these building funds.

REPORT OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

June 13, 1953

The Town and Country Commission is happy to report that its program for the past year has been successful. Many of our small churches have made remarkable progress.

The Commission has provided six scholarships for Christian Workers' Schools to our rural churches. Each district has the privilege of claiming a scholarship, but may give it to another district. The following six churches received the scholarships: Lee, Waukeenah, Mayo, Pine Grove, New Life, and Shady Grove. All of these are circuit churches. The effort of the Commission has been to use these scholarships in churches where the school would not be possible without the Commission's assistance.

The officers of the Commission—H. L. Boyd, Chairman, R. T. Caldwell, Vice-chairman, and R. E. Rutland, Jr., Secretary—represented the Town and Country Commission and our Conference at the Southeastern Jurisdictional Town and Country Conference at Lake Junaluska last August. The program of this Conference was excellent and provided our officers with needed guidance and information.

As the Commission has in past years, we highly commend the work of Miss Addie Mae Jameson, Rural Worker in the Tallahassee District.

We wish to thank Bishop John W. Branscomb and Dr. Harry Waller for accepting our suggestion of having a special speaker on the work of the rural churches at the Pastors' School. The Reverend Jack Walton will be one of the speakers at this year's Pastors' School.

For the coming year we make the following recommendations:

1. That every rural or small town church have a Christian Workers' School where this is possible. Any Church or charge desiring a scholarship may apply to their District Representative on the Town and Country Commission for the Conference Scholarships, or the District Superintendent may furnish district funds for some schools.
2. That every rural or small town church carry a mission special.
3. That every pastor secure from their district representative on the Town and Country Commission copies of the "Rural Church Scoreboard" by James W. Sells and have their Official Board use these in evaluating the program of their church.
4. That every church be encouraged to participate in the Church Development Program offered by Sears, Roebuck, and Company. Twenty-one churches are already enrolled from our Conference. Application should be made as soon as possible to Dr. Earl Brewer, Emory University, Georgia.
5. That every pastor, who can, attend the Town and Country School at Emory University this summer.

6. That Rural Life Sunday be observed in all our churches.

7. That each District select the "Rural Church of the Year" from their District and that these churches and their ministers be honored at the Rural Fellowship Banquet. This outstanding church should be selected by the District Superintendent, the District Representative on the Town and Country Commission, and the District Secretary of the Board of Education.

**MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING OF ST. JOHNS
RIVER CONFERENCE (Corporate Body)**

The annual meeting of the Trustees of St. Johns River Conference, a corporation, was held in the parlor of the New Florida Hotel in Lakeland, Florida, at 5:00 o'clock P. M. on Friday, June 12th, 1953. Fred B. Noble, President of the corporation presided over the meeting, and F. W. Rivers, Secretary of the corporation, acted as recording officer.

A quorum being present, the meeting was called to order. After some discussion the following motion was offered by W. G. Gray, who moved its adoption:

"WHEREAS; the Circuit Court, in and for Duval County, Florida, in a suit therein pending wherein T. E. Nunn, et al, were the Plaintiffs and First Methodist Church, et al, were the defendants, dated the 5th day of October, 1951, decreed, among

other things, that the condition of the Will of C. O. Livingston, Deceased, in reference to the ownership of Livingston Mission Churches would be fully met and satisfied by the Trustees of Livingston Mission Fund taking a refunding bond and mortgage in the total amount contributed from the said fund in aiding in the construction of any church or in purchasing the land for any such church, and, that in such case, title to the property to be held by the local church; and

WHEREAS; it was further decreed that the St. Johns River Conference be authorized to convey to any particular church the title to the land occupied by any Livingston Mission Church upon its giving to the Trustees of Livingston Mission Fund such mortgage and refunding bond; and,

WHEREAS; certain Livingston Mission churches have given to said Trustees of Livingston Mission Fund the required mortgage and refunding bond and the officers of St. Johns River Conference have conveyed title to such churches by special warranty deed, and it is to be expected that other Livingston Mission churches will qualify to receive deeds from this corporation.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the acts of the officers of this corporation in executing such deeds be ratified, approved and confirmed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President and Secretary of this corporation be authorized to execute and deliver such further deeds to the Trustees of such other Livingston Mission churches as shall comply with the terms of said decree and execute the required mortgage and refunding bond."

This motion was seconded by D. C. Dawkins, and unanimously adopted.

A motion was made, duly seconded and unanimously carried, that the Executive Committee, consisting of the officers of the corporation, be continued, and that said Committee be, and it hereby is, authorized and empowered to transact such business, execute such instruments, deeds and other documents affecting any property standing in the name of the corporation, not covered by the foregoing resolution, as they shall deem meet and proper.

Conforming to the report of the Special Committee appointed at the 1946 Conference to Study Superannuate Endowments, Paragraph 1, which was adopted by the Florida Conference on June 5th, 1947, as outlined and published on pages 65 and 66, of the 1947 Journal of the Florida Annual Conference, the following were elected as Directors of the Society to serve for the ensuing year:

Clerical: R. A. Guy, Paul R. Hortin, A. G. Cox, Clyde C. Frazier, T. C. O'Steen, J. R. Hill, E. L. Holladay.

Lay: R. P. Permenter and F. W. Rivers.

The new Board of Directors immediately came to order and elected the following officers to serve for the ensuing year:

President—R. P. Permenter

Vice President—E. L. Holladay

Secretary-Treasurer—F. W. Rivers

An Executive Committee consisting of R. A. Guy, E. L. Holladay, Clyde C. Frazier, R. P. Permenter and F. W. Rivers, was appointed to serve and act in accordance with Paragraph No. 1 (a) of the report mentioned above.

The Treasurer read the financial report for the year just ended, which was approved. The Treasurer reported that the sum of \$200.00 was available from earnings to be turned over to the Board of Conference Claimants. On motion duly made, seconded and carried, this amount was directed to be transferred.

The Atlantic National Bank of Jacksonville was continued as depository for the funds of the Society, and the said bank was authorized and empowered to pay out funds from this account on checks signed by the President, or signed by the Treasurer, one signature only being required. The Treasurer was authorized to continue the use of the Safe Deposit Box in the Atlantic National Bank of Jacksonville for the safe keeping of the valuable papers of the Society and of the St. Johns River Conference, to pay the annual rent on this box, and access to the box is to be had by the Treasurer.

The Officers of the Society were directed to examine the Charter and By-Laws of the Society to see if there were any changes needed to conform with the requirements and instructions contained in the report adopted on June 5th, as outlined on pages 65 and 66 in the 1947 Journal of the Florida Annual Conference, and to report on same as early as possible. That said Charter and By-Laws be published in the Annual Journal.

The President was directed to fix the compensation of the Treasurer for the ensuing year. The Bond of the Treasurer in the sum of \$10,000.00 was reported to be in force. The Treasurer presented the financial reports for the year ending May 31st, 1953, and was directed to turn one copy over to the Conference Secretary to be filed in the Conference records.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

ASBURY RONK BUHRMAN

Asbury Ronk Buhrman, son of Reverend William Price and Effie Mae Ronk Buhrman, was born at Lenoir City, Tennessee, on September 11th, 1901. He was the son of a parsonage home and grew up while his father was serving at First Methodist Church, West Palm Beach, Riverside Park Methodist Church, Jacksonville, and on the Ocala District.

In 1924 Brother Buhrman was graduated from Florida Southern College. After graduation he taught school for two years, one year at Jonesville, Virginia, and one year at LaBelle, Florida. He was licensed to preach in the Holston Conference, under Dr. E. A. Shurgart, Presiding Elder, and was recommended for admission to the Florida Conference by the Bartow District, his father being Presiding Elder. In 1926 he was admitted on trial into the Florida Annual Conference and appointed to North Orlando. Other early appointments included Angebilt, Angebilt-Farradale, and Bayshore, Tampa. In 1932 he transferred to the North Georgia Conference and served the Ousley Circuit and Searcy Memorial Methodist Church at Griffin, Georgia, while attending the Candler School of Theology at Emory University. Upon completing his theological training he transferred back to the Florida Conference and was appointed to First Church, Palmetto, in 1935.

In 1938 Brother Buhrman was appointed Director of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Florida, and it was during his five and one-half years of service in this capacity that he probably made his greatest contribution to the church in Florida. Under his wise and able leadership the Wesley Foundation grew to such an extent that funds were raised across the Conference and the present buildings were erected.

In 1943 he was appointed to the Salem Methodist Church at Havana, and in subsequent years served at Trinity Church, Arcadia, First Church, St. Augustine, and Trinity Church, DeLand.

On June 26, 1930, he married Miss Doris Johnson of Tampa. This happy marriage was a source of inspiration and encouragement to him throughout the years as he was a man deeply devoted to his family and friends as well as to his Master and the Church.

In the midst of a busy and fruitful pastorate at the Trinity Methodist Church DeLand, he died on November 12, 1952. Funeral services were conducted at Trinity Church by Dr. Henry Blackburn, his long time friend and associate on the Board of Education, assisted by Bishop John W. Branscomb and Rev. J. E. Crawley. Interment was at Oakdale Cemetary in DeLand.

Asbury Ronk Buhrman was a man of great depth of character. He was a strong preacher, a faithful and beloved pastor, a scholar who knew and loved great books, a prophet with a passion for righteousness, and altogether a man of high character and saintly life. Though he was big hearted and broad minded, he was a man of mature judgment and strong convictions, and one who dared to speak the truth. He was truly an extraordinary preacher. In the construction of his sermons he showed a rare gift, and in their delivery there was often the play of gentle humor and always the selection of the best word to express his thought.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Doris Johnson Buhrman, and three children, Price, Charles and Lynne; his father and mother, Dr. and Mrs. W. P. Buhrman; a brother, W. Ed Buhrman, and two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth McClary and Mrs. Catherine Hines.

The spirit of Ronk Buhrman will continue to live, not only in the lives of the members of his family, but in the lives of his friends and the people whom he served in the pastorate, at the Wesley Foundation, and at our Youth Camps and Assemblies.

We thank God for the life and ministry of Brother Asbury Ronk Buhrman.

GEORGE WASHINGTON SELLERS

On November 25th, 1952, at Brandon, Florida, the chariot of God swooped down and carried the immortal soul of George Washington Sellers to his Heavenly Home. He left, in addition to his family, a host of friends to mourn his departure. Brother Sellers was born in Cottondale, Alabama, March 10, 1865. He had lived to be four score and seven years old. His mother had died at his birth, his father was killed at war just previous to this, and he was reared by an uncle, James R. Sellers, at Blue Creek, Alabama. His education was at the McAdony Training School and Florida Conference College at Leesburg.

Brother Sellers was married to Miss Alice V. Mountain on July 17, 1887, and to this union was born several children, and at the present he is survived by his widow, three daughters, and six sons, and, in addition, nineteen grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Brother Sellers joined the Conference in 1887 and was received into full connection in 1889. He was ordained a deacon in 1889 and ordained an elder in 1891. He served the following places: Altoona Mission (Paisley) one year; Ft. Ogden Circuit, one year; Arcadia, one year; Brooksville, two years; Dade City, one year; Clearwater and St. Petersburg, one year; Clearwater Station, one year; Manatee and Bradenton, two years. He was then transferred to the North Alabama Conference because of his health, where he served Morris-New Market and Bluntsville. He then returned to Florida where he served Hosford, Webster, Melrose, Palm Harbor and High Springs.

After finishing his work at High Springs Brother Sellers was superannuated, but his superannuation was in name only because he never stopped working. The same year that he was superannuated he went to Wimauma and Ruskin, serving there two years, then one year at Dover and later Wimauma and Parrish. Following that he served at Brandon for nine months, then next year he was sent to Orient Park where he served for two years, and it was from this work that he felt that he was no longer able to keep up with the routine of the Methodist ministry, but even after this he did not stop for he took as a project of activity a Men's Bible Class at Brandon. He had an interesting objective for himself in this class, he determined that he would have a class of 50 and set out each day to secure a new member for the class. When he was taken sick for the last time there were 35 in his class.

One could say that Brother Sellers completed his task just as he wanted to, falling as a Christian soldier in the army of God, which was the way he wanted it to be.

Brother Sellers was a builder of Churches and parsonages. At Fort Ogden he built a Church, secured land for Church Property at Punta Gorda, Fort Ogden and Wauchula. He built a Church at Brooksville and Bradenton where he organized the Church. He built Churches also at Center Hill and High Springs. These are just a few of the things he did with regard to building, but the intangible things he did are far more in evidence in human life.

Brother Sellers was a man of deep and tender sensibilities, full of courtesy and good spirit and was never failing in loyal attachment to his friends. He loved a joke and could tell a humorous story to perfection, but his mind was too clean and his love of purity too high ever to indulge in off-color stories. I knew him, and loved him, and my life is better because I had companionship with so fine a man.

Suitable services were held at the Brandon Methodist Church, which he loved so much and in which community he served and lived, by his minister, the Rev. Raymond L. Hays, assisted by Dr. E. J. Pendergrass. Following the services, with tenderness his friends and colleagues in the ministry in and around the Tampa District laid his body to rest at the Brandon cemetery.

Quietly, but efficiently, she moved about in organizations of the church, tending to the many duties, large and small, which helped further The Kingdom. The Sunday School and The Woman's Society of Christian Service, especially, felt the impact of her able leadership. At the time of her death, a former pupil said, "She was the best Sunday School teacher I ever had".

superintendent of the Louisville City Hospital. For a number of years she engaged in a successful career as a private nurse which she continued up to her marriage.

One year after her marriage she and her husband transferred to the Florida Conference.

A member of the Methodist Church for over sixty years, she served during that time as Sunday School teacher, president of the Missionary Society, organizer of young peoples' work, while filling her place as a minister's wife and mother.

During the First World War, upon urgent call of the United States Government and the American Red Cross, she resumed her role as nurse in the hospitals, administering to the sick and dying, rendering valuable services for which she was cited by Dr. Andrew Anderson, president of the American Red Cross at St. Augustine, Florida, particularly for work done during the influenza epidemic of 1918.

Although tragedy struck at her home a number of times through misfortunes, illness and accidents to her husband, she ever stood faithfully by, giving always her patient, loving unselfish and efficient service to those who needed her most.

During World War II she went with her daughter, an accomplished musician who was called to entertain the Armed Forces through community singing and classical record programs, week after week, assisting by operating a slide projector and helping with the records, sometimes serving as advisor to a number of lonely boys away from home, who affectionately called her "Mother".

She was a member of First Methodist Church, Tampa, for over twenty-nine years and up until her sudden passing was an active member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of that church.

She was possessed with a keen intellect and a persistent curiosity which made her a student even toward the close of her life, although she was nearly blind. Her strength of character and determination carried her through many difficult situations. She was beloved by many who knew her and her cheerful presence will be missed but with the poet we can say:

ESTELLE CARN WILSON

(February 3, 1885 - September 16, 1952)

When Estelle Carn stood before the marriage altar by the side of the young preacher, Shelby A. Wilson, a worthy chapter in the glorious history of Florida Methodism was about to be written. It was in the year 1909, Feb. 18th, in the little church at Parish, Florida, not far from the lovely Ellenton community where she was born on February 3, 1885. Her consecrated Christian parents, D. H. Carn and Mrs. Ida Turner Carn, had taught their lovely daughter the story of Jesus from earliest infancy. And the brave young woman well understood that she was not only pledging her life to a worthy young man, but that she was also making a life-long commitment to the demanding tasks that fall to the hand and heart of the keeper of the Methodist parsonage. These vows she kept faithfully and well. Those obligations she discharged with loyalty to her Lord and His church in a manner that greatly enriched their joint ministry through the more than forty-three years that followed.

Churces were small and support was meager in that day. And the young preacher must have further training, for he was not content to give to his church less than the best possible ministry. Soon they together were knocking at the doors of Florida Southern College, then housed in the deserted hotel among the tall pines at what is now Palm Harbor — then called Sutherland.

Babies were born into the humble little parsonage home. The two growing boys must also be trained for Christian service. Days of self denial must be continued that they, too, should have a college education. Osburn, the elder, is now principal of the Winter Park High School, while Glenn, also an educator is now with the armed forces in the Navy. Both are noble Christian men, well trained at the hands of a loving mother and in the halls of our best educational institutions.

From Kathleen Circuit in 1910 to First Church, Plant City,, in 1952, was a long road. The way was marked with much toil and sacrifice. But it was a lighted way—a way of victory from that first little rural appointment to the great church where her final tasks were done and her labors ended. And through all the years, at every appointment, the humble Christian woman, loyal and devoted

wife of the Parsonage, has left a long chain of devoted friends who sorrow at her going, but who also rejoice that some good day we shall meet at Jesus' blessed feet.

Funeral services were conducted by Dr. John G. Stradley, District Superintendent, Dr. Paul A. Fletcher, life-long friend, and Rev. Luther V. Laite, pastor at Wesley Memorial Church, Lakeland, with a host of Methodist preachers in attendance at the Plant City Church. The body was laid to rest in the Lake Wales cemetery, near the home which had been selected for their retirement in the later years, Rev. George C. Powell conducting the final service.

Shall we say that thus ends the life of a Methodist preacher's wife? It is not so. For life is eternal, and we do not utter empty words when we sing, "We shall meet beyond the river".

REV. A. FRED TURNER

RUFUS E. WICKER

When Dr. Rufus Wicker passed, unexpectedly, to his heavenly inheritance it left a pall of gloom over the community where he served, and as the news spread, people in many sections of the nation felt a stab of sorrow.

"Wick" as he was affectionately known to his friends, was a quiet sort of fellow. He didn't descend on a community with a sound of trumpets and a waving of banners, but he had not been in his place long, before the community waked to the knowledge, "Here is one of God's noblemen—beloved by all".

Dr. Wicker was a "man's man". He loved sports — golf and fishing being his favorites and many a time he has struck a blow for the "good life" as he sat with companions around a fishing camp or walking down a sun-washed fairway. His early training was in a rough school. Joining the United States Army in 1914, he was a Captain at nineteen, and was discharged from the service a Major.

Better still, he was GOD'S man! "Wick" wore the Royal Purple as to the manner born. He "went about doing good" in such an unassuming manner, only a few intimates knew he went in and out of more sick rooms and brought cheer and comfort to more bereaved people than possibly any other minister in the great city where he served.

Dr. Wicker has the capacity for companionship that made co-operation one of its chief by-products. He, more than once, took discordant elements—offended and divided—and moulded them into a brotherhood that put the King's business first on the list of things. When he found it impossible to be his brother's "keeper", he still insisted on being his brother's brother.

Intimates knew his secret. It was told by the great choir of the Druid Hills Methodist Church on the day of his funeral when they sang, "Hail Thou Once Despised Jesus". "Wick" magnified the Master in every phase of his noble life and other people could not rub elbows with "Wick" without feeling the presence of Him who walked the dusty camel trails of the long ago and impressed people in the same simple manner.

Dr. Wicker was born November 16, 1897, at Oxford, Florida. His parents were Rufus Eugene and Lena Wicker. No parents ever had had a finer son. He was received on trial in the Florida Conference in 1924. Admitted into full connection in 1926, and ordained elder

in 1928. His pastorates were Aucilla; Havana; Tarpon Springs, First Community Church, Columbus, Ohio; DeLand; First Church, Tampa; Riverside, Miami; District Superintendent, Orlando District; First Church, Jacksonville; Trinity, Miami; and Druid Hills Church, Atlanta at which great Church he was serving with distinction when he died.

With a theological diploma from the Vanderbilt School of Religion and a Doctor of Divinity degree from Southern College, Dr. Wicker was worthy and well qualified to serve the larger interests of his church. He was a General Conference delegate from Florida in 1940, Jurisdictional conference delegate in 1940, 1944, and 1948. In addition to these activities, he served on the General Board of Pensions; was chairman of his Conference World Service and Finance Commission; president of the Brotherhood Commission; led a movement to raise \$100,000 for the Wesley Foundation at Gainesville, Florida; and served in nameless other places where his talents and consecration were of invaluable service to his brethren and his Master.

Dr. Wicker is survived by his widow, Orrie Sue (McKenzie) and a son "Bill"; now serving in his father's old conference and serving so well, his daddy would be mighty proud. God buries his workmen — but he carries on their work, is illustrated again.

Wick has joined that innumerable multitude of saintly ones who, having "fought the good fight", have entered into the joys of their Lord, but his life and influence among us will live on — a shining thing — and the world is a better place because Rufus Eugene Wicker passed this way.

PART X STANDING RULES OF THE CONFERENCE

I. CONCERNING THE SECRETARY

1. The Secretary shall edit and publish the Conference Minutes.
2. He shall have such assistants as he may desire, to be appointed by the Conference on his nominations.
3. He shall place in the hands of each district superintendent within ten days after Conference adjourns a statement showing all the apportionments laid by the Conference on the District to be distributed by the district stewards provided the Conference fails to adopt its own method of distributing the apportionments directly to the pastoral charges; in the event the Conference adopts such a method, the Secretary shall then place in the hands of each district superintendent a copy of the apportionments distributed to the several charges within his district.
4. He shall be the custodian of the books and archives of the Conference and shall annually report where they are kept.
5. At the beginning of each annual session, upon the nomination of the Secretary, the Conference shall elect a committee of three to examine the daily journal and correct it and report back to the next meeting of the daily sessions, and the adoption of their report shall be the approval or adoption of the minutes.

II. CONCERNING THE STATISTICAL SECRETARY

1. The Statistical Secretary shall annually collect, or cause to be collected, the statistics of the Conference and record the same in such a manner as the Conference may direct.
2. After the close of the second day of the Conference his books shall be closed unless opened again by order of the Conference to receive a delayed report.
3. He shall employ such help as is necessary to do the work accurately and expeditiously, which shall be paid for by the Secretary out of the apportionments for "Minutes and Incidentals".
4. Fractions shall not be used in making statistical reports.
5. At the earliest possible date the district superintendent shall file with Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, with the Conference Treasurer, and with the Statistical Secretary an accurate statement of the amount of apportionments accepted by the various Quarterly Conferences within his district. These accepted apportionments shall be recorded against the respective charges by the Statistical Secretary and shall be the official record on which settlements to the Conference Treasurer shall be made by the charges.
6. He shall see that every report made by a charge or a church exactly agrees with the one it made to the Conference Treasurer.

III. CONCERNING THE CONFERENCE TREASURER

1. The Conference Treasurer shall be elected by the Annual Conference at its first session after the adjournment of the General Conference, on nomination of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. The Treasurer shall serve for a quadrennium, or until his successor shall be elected and qualified.
2. The Treasurer shall receive, receipt for, and disburse as directed by the Conference all moneys collected on apportionments for general work, Conference work, and such other moneys as the Conference may direct.

3. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall have full authority and supervision over the Conference Treasurer, and after consultation with the Bishop in Charge, it shall have the power to remove from office for cause or to fill vacancy ad interim. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall have the books of the Conference Treasurer audited within forty days after the close of the Annual Conference.

4. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall designate depository or depositories for Conference Funds.

5. The Conference Treasurer shall make monthly distributions to the treasurers of the several Annual Conference Boards and causes for all Conference work and to the treasurers of the several General Conference Boards and causes for all general work according to the percentage of the apportionments for general and Conference work adopted by the Annual Conference.

6. The Treasurer shall procure from the Statistical Secretary or from the district superintendents a report of the apportionments accepted by the several charges within the Conference and shall settle with those charges by that report. He shall have no power to waive or change this rule.

7. He shall, on the 25th day of each month, furnish each district superintendent a statement of the amounts of moneys received by him for all causes from each pastoral charge within that district, each such statement to include all moneys received from the closing of the Annual Conference to date issued, and shall publish these reports in the Florida Christian Advocate.

8. He shall cooperate with the Statistical Secretary in seeing that correct financial reports are made to the Conference.

9. All Special Day funds shall be remitted through the Conference Treasurer.

IV. CONCERNING DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

1. The District Superintendents are a standing committee to nominate the boards and committees of the Conference and to nominate persons to fill vacancies thereon, except the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

2. The District Superintendents shall report to the Statistical Secretary the statistics concerning the district parsonages.

3. In the absence of the pastor each district superintendent shall report for the charge in the same manner as the pastor.

4. Appointment to the district superintendency shall vacate membership in any board of the Conference or on any standing committee, except trustees, unless the General Conference provides otherwise.

5. District Superintendents shall report to the chairman of the Conference Board of Education the names and addresses of any candidates for the ministry within their districts.

6. Each District Superintendent shall, at the earliest possible date, file with the Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, with the Conference Treasurer, and with the Statistical Secretary an accurate statement of the amounts of apportionments accepted by the various Quarterly Conferences within his district.

7. Each District Superintendent shall, as early in the year as possible, furnish to the Conference Lay Leader and to the General Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities the names and addresses of all charge and church lay leaders in his district, same to be determined as per paragraphs 1235, 1239, and 1240.

V. CONCERNING BOARDS, STANDING COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

1. Each board or committee of the Conference shall cause to be printed in the Conference Minutes an exact statement of salaries and expenses paid on account of any person employed by the said board or committee.

2. Each board of the Conference shall make an exact annual report to the Conference of the moneys it has received and what disposition has been made of them.

3. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall contract with the Conference Treasurer, subject to the Conference, for his service and the manner in which he shall manage the funds of the Conference; shall take from him an indemnity bond in such amount as shall cover whatever amount may be deposited in the bank, and shall annually have his books and accounts audited by a certified public accountant, and print the report of the same.

4. The Board of Conference Claimants shall cause to be printed in the Minutes of the Conference the name and post-office address of each Conference Claimant together with the amount paid to him annually.

5. At the beginning of each Annual Conference session, any vacancy to be filled shall be reported to the Conference and the district superintendents shall nominate to fill the vacancy, except in the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

6. That membership shall not be held by anybody in more than one of the several organizations of the Conference at the same time, whether that be a quadrennial board, committee, or commission, provided, however, that this rule does not apply to trustees or to members of the Conference Committee of Investigation.

7. Members of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall not be members in or serve upon any other of the standing organizations of the Conference whether board, committee, commission, or trustee, receiving appropriations from the Conference.

8. District Superintendents shall not be members of any quadrennial board, committee, or commission, except trustees, and in those instances wherein the Discipline specifically states that they must be.

9. District Lay Leaders and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents.

10. It shall be the duty of every board or commission holding property to provide the district superintendent with a complete list of its holdings within the district. The list shall include the title under which the property is held, a description of the land, and whether or not the property is exempt from taxes. The secretary of the board or commission shall report any changes in the list promptly.

VI. CONCERNING THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

1. Unless otherwise ordered by the Conference, the Commission on World Service and Finance shall distribute the apportionments to the districts on a basis agreed upon with the cabinet.

2. The Commission shall determine annually what amount shall be necessary to print and publish the minutes and shall assess the same upon the Conference along with other assessments.

VII. CONCERNING REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions shall be typed.
2. No report or resolution shall be acted upon until a duplicate of it is in the hands of the Secretary, except a resolution extending a vote of thanks.

VIII. CONCERNING THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE

1. Lay membership in the District Conference shall consist of those lay members from each pastoral charge named in the Discipline with the addition of the president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the president of the Young People's Department of the local church.

2. In addition to the above, the Quarterly Conference shall have the privilege of electing two additional delegates and two reserve delegates.

IX. CONCERNING ANNUAL CONFERENCE MEMBERSHIP

1. The name and address of every member of the Annual Conference both clerical and lay shall be printed in the Minutes.

2. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall present to the Conference to be filed among its papers a complete biographical sketch of all persons admitted into full connection, and of all persons received by transfer; and of the latter, a sketch of their ministry up to the date when received by transfer.

3. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall require each applicant, including those being admitted from other churches, to present a certificate of good health from a practicing physician and an itemized statement of his financial obligations.

4. Lay delegates to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually rather than quadrennially.

X. CONCERNING THE MINUTES

In addition to the daily journal of Proceedings and the statistics of the Conference, the Minutes shall contain the following:

1. The names and addresses of the officers of the Conference.
2. A chronological list of the clerical members showing when they entered itinerancy and in what order.
3. An alphabetical list of the superannuate, supernumerary, and active members with their post office addresses.
4. A list of the undergraduates, showing the year they are in and their post office addresses.
5. A list of the lay members by districts and their post office addresses.
6. A list of the local preachers by districts, showing whether deacons, elders, or licentiates, with their post office addresses.
7. A list of the Conference claimants and their addresses.
8. A list of the boards and standing committees with the names of their officers and members and post office addresses of the officers and the lay members.
9. A copy of the charter of each incorporated Board of the Conference and of the Legal Conference (to be published the first of each new quadrennium)
10. The Secretary shall furnish the State Librarian two copies of the Minutes of each session of the Conference.

XI. CONCERNING CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

1. The Annual Conference shall meet upon invitation at such places as may be selected by the conference or by the Bishop and his Cabinet, if so directed by the conference.
2. The entertaining church shall be expected to provide room and breakfast for all pastors serving charges paying \$2,500 or less.
3. The entertaining church shall provide full entertainment, out of the Conference entertainment fund, for our Retired Preachers, Missionary Preachers, Supplies, and men applying for Admission on Trial.
4. All other preachers and lay delegates shall provide for their own entertainment, but it is recommended to all churches, where possible, that they make provision for such expense, at least in part.

XII. CONFERENCE CALENDAR

Conference boards, commissions, committees, and other organizations wishing to promote financial campaigns, initiate new institutions, or propose programs or projects involving conference-wide support or service are respectively requested to present their askings, or requests for endorsement, to the Cabinet for study, reference, and/or recommendation not later than thirty days before the opening session of the Conference. When such programs, institutions and campaigns shall have been approved by the appropriate board, commission, or committee, the Cabinet shall be notified promptly, and shall prepare a Conference Calendar which shall include all special days, authorized offerings, and observances that are considered essential to the work of the Kingdom. No other special appeals or observances except those provided for the current Discipline of the Church, shall be required of the pastors and churches which are not included in the annual calendar adopted by the Conference—excepting emergency appeals or programs approved by general officials of the church, or by the Bishop and district superintendents of the Florida Conference.

XIII. AMENDMENTS AND SUSPENSIONS

1. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a majority (counted) of those present and voting.
2. The Stand Rules may be amended or changed at any time by a two-thirds vote (counted) of those present and voting.

INCORPORATION OF LOCAL CHURCHES

The Discipline of The Methodist Church provides that Charges may be incorporated when permitted to do so under local laws. In Florida, the charter must set forth:

(1) The name of the corporation and place where it is to be located.

(2) The general nature of the object of the corporation.

(3) The qualification of members and the manner of their admission.

(4) The term of which it is to exist.

(5) The names and residence of the subscribers

(6) By what officers the affairs of the corporation are to be managed, and the times at which they will be elected or appointed.

(7) The names of the officers who are to manage all the affairs until the first election or appointment under the charter.

(8) By whom the by-laws of the corporation are to be made, altered or rescinded.

(9) The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the corporation may at any time subject itself, which shall never be greater than two-thirds of the value of the property of the corporation.

(10) The amount in value of the real estate which the corporation may hold, subject always to the approval of the circuit judge.

The Discipline (Paragraph 246 of 1948) requires certain other provisions in the charter.

The procedure to obtain a charter is simple, but the aid of a local attorney should be had.
