

Sympathy: On motion of J. A. Tolle, duly seconded and passed, the Conference Secretary was instructed to send a telegram to E. J. Rees.

Presentation: Bishop Henley presented Dr. D. Trigg James, Executive Secretary of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council, who spoke briefly.

Adjournment: Following the necessary announcements, and the singing of the Doxology, Bishop Henley pronounced the benediction.

Evening Session—Monday, June 4, 1962

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:30 P.M. with W. A. Myres presiding for the Memorial Service. "Abide with me" was sung, followed by a Responsive Reading, led by George Wiseman. T. C. O'Steen read the Scripture lesson and led in prayer. With Mrs. Donald Hemstreet at the organ, and under the direction of Mrs. J. Birney Gross, the Choir of the First Methodist Church sang the anthem. Quartet: A quartet of ministers sang "Let the Lower Lights Be Burning." Question 34: "Who are readmitted?" a) as deacons: James Howard Grant; Theodore Nicholas. b) as elders: Grady E. Moates.

Presentation: Bishop Henley presented Rev. Henry Koestline of Scarritt College, who spoke briefly.

Privilege: Bishop Henley recognized Ben Rider, who asked James Crook to usher Dr. and Mrs. Henry W. Blackburn to the pulpit. Mrs. Blackburn was presented an orchid, honoring the anniversary of their wedding. Gifts were presented on the occasion of their completing their regular term as District Superintendent of the West Palm Beach District. Madison Pacetti, West Palm Beach District Lay Leader presented a gift on behalf of the ministers and laymen of his District. Walter Edwards and Henry Galloway presented a replica map of the District organized under the superintendency of Dr. Blackburn.

Therefore Be It Resolved (1) That the Florida Conference Planning Commission be, and is hereby, authorized and instructed to prepare and present to the Annual Conference of 1963 a plan for a conference-wide fund raising program for capital expenditures, and

(2) That this program include funds for Wesley Foundation buildings and expansion, for Church Extension, for Florida Southern College endowment and capital funds, for the purchase of camp sites, and for such other causes and institutions as the Commission may deem to have a proper claim upon the Conference.

THE EPISCOPAL MESSAGE

BISHOP JAMES W. HENLEY

The early Christians saluted each other with the words, "The Lord is risen!" And with the reply, Blessed be the name of the Lord!" In something of the exhileration and exaltation of this proclamation we gather today. If Christ be not risen from the dead, we are of all men most miserable.

Moreover, it is our steadfast confidence that Christ is here—in this room. There is no escaping Him. He pursues us. We cannot evade Him. Neither can we find our peace without Him.

Despite the facts of Good Friday, Easter, the Ascension, and Pentecost, the world about us seeks to discover its security through false and outworn creeds.

The images of the great god Mammon were destroyed three thousand years ago, but whole societies of men are swayed by materialism. Their faith is in *things*—and their energies are expended in the pursuit of wealth. This has never brought peace. In it there is no security.

Then there is Hedonism—the plain love of pleasure. This cult prospers with those who avidly subscribe to the ancient doctrine of "Eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we die." Again, there is the religion of Nationalism. Tiny colonies of people

Again, there is the religion of Nationalism. Tiny colonies of people become obsessed with the dream of independence. Nations, small and great, are committed to the proposition that the one supreme loyalty must be to the State. We see before us a world in revolt. To the god of Nationalism multiplied thousands each year are being offered in human sacrifice. Thirty-five killed today in Algeria! Sixty-eight destroyed in Laos!

And there is Agnosticism. Being unable to ferret out the ultimate answer to the riddle of the universe, and being stupefied on the one hand by the discoveries of science and on the other by the confusion and impermanence of all human relations, men despair and surrender hope.

In the midst of a society swept hither and yon by conflicting ideologies, the Church stands beneath a simple cross, declaring to every passerby that it has discovered the true answer to all the yearnings of the human heart. Thus the Church becomes indispensible. We who gather here believe it to be the hope of the future. We have discovered in our own experiences that it provides the only redemptive power available for the life of man.

As a group, we are committed to The Methodist Church. We steadfastly believe that it was called into being for such a time as this. We love its fellowship. We gladly bow before its altar. And we subscribe to the assurance that it has severe responsibilities laid upon it for the redemption of this age and generation.

In a particular sense, we are concerned today with The Methodist Church in the state of Florida. Here is where we live and worship. It is in this area that we come to grips with the conflicting tides which threaten to engulf the earth. So, for a little while, let us give our undivided attention to the nature, the responsibilities, and the divine privileges of Methodist people in the Florida Conference.

The Itineracy

The Methodist minister is a member of his Annual Conference. He is subject to appointment by the Bishop and the Cabinet to serve as the Conference deems best for the glory of Christ and the building of the Kingdom. This system of itineracy developed under the leadership of Mr. Wesley in England. He assumed and successfully retained the absolute right of the administration of the church. All appointments were made by him, and him alone. No American bishop has ever begun to approximate the authority of this Evangel of the Warm Heart. In our land the bishop has been supported by a cabinet of advisors who are his associates in the administration of the program of the conference. No church in Protestantism has been so purposefully designed as a mighty army. And the itinerant system of men under appointment has been both the glory and the strength of Methodism. We are a connectional church. As such, both ministers and congregation are committed to the proposition that personal preferences must often be set aside for the general good. Every minister is ordained with the commitment that he will go wherever it is judged he can best serve for the building of the Kingdom of Christ. He places his life in the service of the church. In it he asks only the privilege of contributing all that he is and has to the glory of the Lord.

By the same token, each congregation acknowledges itself to be a part of the total purpose and concern of the united church in bringing in the Kingdom of Christ. We work together as a unit with one compelling intention, to perform the will of God and to lead others to do so. Whenever any minister or congregation seeks the privilege of preferential treatment, the minister becoming possessive of the church he serves, or visa versa—the fundamental philosophy of The Methodist Church is undermined. The Methodist preacher is dedicated as a willing itinerant subject to the appointment of the church. The local Methodist congregation recognizes itself to be a part of the connectional fellowship. The philosophy of church government to which The Methodist Church has been committed from the beginning must be accepted by us all, or it is not satisfactory for any.

Those who have served as itinerant ministers through many years will testify with astonishing unanimity that the itinerant system constitutes one of the most wonderful fraternities on earth. It has its weaknesses, but they are far more than counter balanced by its virtues. Few ministers, very few, fail to discover the widest range of opportunities for the expression of their talents. Those whose dedication is to service, and whose purpose is to preach the unsearchable riches of God, rejoice in the open doors through which the Holy Spirit leads them into new experiences and are made contrite by the thought that they are spokesmen of the Son of God.

Class Meetings

Methodism had its origin in the class meeting. Zealous Christians afire with the discovery of new life in Christ gathered in small groups to study the Holy Scriptures, to discuss informally the doctrines of the faith, and to engage in prayer for the further outreach of the redeeming grace of the Holy Spirit. Through the fellowship of the intimate cells they introduced friends and neighbors to the riches they had discovered in Christ Jesus. Through the class meetings, the church within the church, spiritual fires were kept aglow. Through mutual participation the church was continually revitalized. New insights were gained into the significance of and the implications of following in the footsteps of Jesus.

Christians in every generation need the equivalent of the class meeting. Churches soon become too large to provide the intimate, soul searching experiences to be found in the prayer and study of the small group. For this reason neighborhool fellowships of Methodist Christians are being established in many sections of the country. Entire congregations are thus feeling the impact of spiritual awakening. The responsibility of initiating these classes, Bible study fellowships, or prayer groups (however they are called), devolves upon the minister and his Commission on Membership and Evangelism. Surely it is clearly evident that the preaching service in which the sermon is delivered to the people without discussion or analysis is not enough. If the merchant, the farmer, the doctor, the lawyer, the teacher and the housewife are to appropriate for themselves and for their daily lives the truths presented from the pulpit there must be opportunities for their participation. Let us, therefore, recommend that churches, big and little, review the possibilities of small ongoing groups within neighborhoods or communities where the tenets of our Chirstian faith can be personalized and undergirded in the comradeship of prayer.

Stewardship

We are all deeply grateful for the leadership of the Board of Lay Activities in its effort to awaken the churches of the Conference in the area of Stewardship. The evangelization of the pocketbook is a difficult mission. Still, conversion has not taken place until the Holy Spirit has been given charge of what we have as well as what we are. There is much talk of proportionate giving. In a sense, all giving is proportionate giving. Some determine what proportion they have given at the end of the year. Others dedicate what portion they will give at the beginning of the year. There is no question, the minimum Scriptural standard is the tithe. When Christians tithe they grow in grace and spiritual resources themselves. When Christians tithe the resources of the church will be amply adequate for the work of the Kingdom.

Let us not rest on the small progress we have made. The Methodist people of Florida have not begun to match their potential as stewards of their material wealth. The symbol of our faith is the cross—upon that cross the Heavenly Father made the gift which opened to us the doors of new life.

When the blessed significance of the Gift of God in Christ Jesus takes hold upon our hearts—our response becomes—"here Lord take me, take mine. Let me—oh God—become, by thy Grace, a part of the redemptive process through which the world is saved."

We have only begun to learn the lessons and to discover the benefits of stewardship.

Church Extension

During the past two decades the population of Florida has increased by 144%. Methodist growth lagged behind the state's population growth alarmingly. During the past four years (excluding the statistics for the year just ending) the population of Florida increased by 23%, but Methodist Church membership increased by 26%. That is, during the past four years (and we trust during the year now ending) we have overtaken the state's population growth after 15 years during which we failed to keep up. In order for the increase in Methodist church membership to keep pace with the anticipated population increase between 1963 and 1970 we must have a net membership increase of 14,570 each year. This is the equivalent of approximately 73 additional churches per year with memberships of 200.

This by no means indicates that we need 73 new congregations per year. Many of our existing churches can minister to larger numbers. But we must be awake to the fact that we must have 18 to 25 new congregations every year if we will accommodate the people we should receive. This means that churches already established must encourage and assist in the location of new sites and the organization of new churches. Time is of the essence. There is no place for selfishness anywhere along the line. We are engaged in a crusade for Christ. And let us remember that the calculations given above envision only a static relationship of Methodist Church membership to the population of the state. We must do this much to stand still.

We are reminded of the classic experience of Alice in Wonderland, where the Red Queen held Alice's hand and whisked her away as fast as ever they could run. At long last, when Alice was very tired, they stopped and she observed that they were in the same spot where they began. "In our country," said Alice, "you generally get to somewhere else—if you ran very fast for a long time." "That's a slow sort of country," said the queen. "Now, here, you see, it takes all the running you can do to keep in the same place. If you want to get somewhere else you must run at least twice as fast as that!" And Alice replied, "I'd rather not try, please!"

But this is not the case with us. We are not called to stand still. We are called to make disciples of all men. By the grace of God we will re-dedicate ourselves to the mission assigned us by the Master. When we grow faint through our reliance upon our own limited energies, we become invigorated by the ancient promise "not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, said the Lord of Hosts." Ingenuity and zeal are not enough for a challenge of such heroic proportions. We advance under the leadership, are sustained by the power, and impelled by the love of the Lord Jesus Christ, whose we are and whom we serve.

Sunday School

The experience of American Protestantism over the past seventyfive years has been that church membership rises and falls in proportion to the health of the program of Christian Education on the local scene. Our most productive instrument of evangelism has been the Sunday School. Variously estimated, from 60 to 80% of those seeking membership on profession of faith have come from this source. Here, indeed, is evidence of the power of lay evangelism, for the Sunday School itself is by and large a lay movement, staffed by volunteer teachers, and administered by volunteer superintendents.

How has the Sunday School fared in Florida Methodism during the past two decades? From 1942 to 1952 the Sunday School grew 69%, or 23% faster than the population of the state. From 1952 to 1957 our Sunday Schools grew 19%, or 3% faster than the population of the state. But, while church membership grew faster, Sunday School membership failed by 8% of keeping up with the population growth between 1957 and 1961. We may engage in all kinds of rationalization

in our effort to explain this unfortunate decline. For instance, there are scores of thousands of retired people who have migrated to our section. They have no small children. Many of them have united with and become active in our Methodist Churches, but have failed to show any interest in the Sunday School. So, church membership grows, Sunday School membership lags. Whatever explanations we employ, the stern fact remains that the "median age" of Florida was 31.1 and for the United States as a whole 31.5. Furthermore, 34% of our population is under 18 years of age. The inescapable fact is that we have not measured up to our responsibility with regard to the Sunday School.

This downward trend in Sunday School enrollment does not augur well for the continuing growth of the church. Its further implications with regard to the understanding of the Holy Scriptures and the general concept of the Christian ethic by our people are most alarming. Realizing the gravity of our situation, our Conference Board of Education confronted us in June, 1961, with the urgent necessity of marshalling our forces for a crusade to strengthen and expand our Sunday Schools throughout the Conference. This emphasis must continue with increasing vigor and determination. During the ensuing year, we must make a dramatic advance in Sunday School enrollment and average attendance. Coupled with this is the task in training adequate leadership in the areas of teaching and administration. If we falter here, we will soon find ourselves in retreat all along the line.

Higher Education

Florida Methodists have been dedicated to the proposition that the church can best prepare its leadership, both lay and clerical, through its own institution of higher education. Prior to the organization of the Florida Conference the Methodists of this state aided in the establishing of colleges in Georgia and sent their children there for education. In 1852 the East Florida Seminary was founded at Micanopy. In 1883 the Jacksonville District sponsored the establishment of the Southern Florida Seminary at Orlando. Out of this latter institution evolved Florida Southern College. The Methodists of this Conference are proud of this institution. However, the simple fact is that we have never really given adequate support to our Conference college. At the same time the life of our local churches has been enriched by the graduates of this church school. 172 active ministers now serving in the Florida Conference were graduated from Florida Southern. At the present time 43 ministerial students are receiving their pre-seminary education there. 35 students are preparing for full time Christian service in some other church related capacity. We are now determined to make it possible for Florida Southern to render its full measure of service to the church. This will require three things—(A.) The homes of Florida Methodists must send their youth to the Conference college. There is no magic by which the school can serve young people who are not of its student body. Florida Southern was established by the Methodists of this conference and exists primarily for their children. (B.) We must radically change our pattern of financial support. A Christian college is not an extravagance. It is an investment, and one of the finest investments the church can make. We are now dedicating ourselves to reach with all speed the level of one dollar per church member per year for the operational budget of the college. This is only a temporary goal, but we must reach it before going further. (C.) Each local church must publicize the Conference college until every home is familiar with its program and every layman is proud of its achievements.

During the college year just closed 7,000 Methodist students have been enrolled in other state and private colleges within the bounds of our Conference. Of these, 5,600 were in the University of Florida, Florida State University, and the University of Miami. We have a definite responsibility to provide religious leadership for these young people away from home. This means an expansion of our Wesley Foundation programs—more adequate housing, more personnel, more program support. Our Conference Board of Education will bring recommendations in this field. There are urgent needs that cannot be indefinitely postponed. Just as this Conference has girded itself for great tasks and has won great victories, we must meet the challenges of the present moment with resolution and dedication in the field of higher education.

Social Concerns

Our Lord Jesus Christ was a determined foe of everything that warped or oppressed the lives of men. He looked about Him and saw boys and girls and men and women who were called to be the children of God, but who were cursed by injustice, prejudice, disease, hunger, sin and despair. He was the champion of the disinherited. He was the foe of every form of social evil.

The church, as the representative of the Lord Christ, is confronted with the live issues of every generation. Whatever has to do with mercy, justice, or compassion is sacred—not secular. On all such subjects the church must be articulate.

Communism stalks the earth, tyranical and atheistic. The church is its determined foe. Our people need to understand the soil out of which Communism springs, the methods of its operation, the doctrines it declares, and the results which inevitably follow in its train. We have had too much rabble rousing, too much name calling by self styled super patriots, too much hysteria. A number of districts and churches within our area have been doing sane and constructive educational work in this field. The series of addresses at Bryan Memorial Church in Miami, lectures and studies sponsored by Palma Ceia Methodist Church in Tampa, and the laymen's retreat in the West Palm Beach District are all commendable in this regard. Similar projects on a district or sub-district basis should be contemplated throughout the conference.

The gambling and liquor interests are feeding upon the growing economic strength of our state. Our citizens are going to have to decide what kind of state they want. Legalized gambling totals over \$375,000,-000 annually in Florida. Last year \$450,000,000, was spent in the purchase of alcoholic beverages. Christian citizens can be amazingly effective against any and all kinds of organized vice. The kind of people who will gravitate to this state, and, the kind of children who will grow to adulthood in a society where commercialized gambling and intoxicating liquors are so much a part of both the social and economic structure, is not pleasant to contemplate. The church must make its influence felt in every town, city, and county within the state. Christian laymen and ministers can have a mighty impact upon the social structure and it is high time that drastic measures be undertaken to curb these forces which prey upon the moral and spiritual structure of our commonwealth.

The subject of human rights is inescapable in contemporary society. Nations whose people have been hungry, depressed, ignorant, and diseased, have become alive to the fact that this condition is not inevitable. They are determined to stand on their own feet and be counted. They are dedicated to the purpose of providing a better opportunity for their children and they will risk their lives to do it. One aspect of this development which is conspicuous to the peoples of the world is the relationship of the races within our own country. The three out of four people in the world who constitute the colored races have heard about Little Rock, Freedom Riders, Citizens Councils. They are inclined to believe that democracy is for the white man. The rising tide of humanity with colored skin questions whether Democracy as practiced in America would work in their favor on the international level. What are man's rights in a free society? Most of us know that the teachings of Jesus are far ahead of our social practice. Pride and prejudice are not Christian virtues. Both ministry and laity must examine their own consciences. We are part of one world. Let us not seek to evade issues which cannot be evaded. They will not be settled by refusing to discuss them or by turning our backs on them. There are great Christian social concerns which should command the attention of the ministry and the laity in a united effort to discover and to bring to pass the will of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Evangelism

Every minister is called to be an evangelist. He is to declare the good tidings, summoning men to come and hear of the unsearchable riches of God in Christ Jesus. As they draw near the cross they inevitably leave behind the corruptive powers of evil habits and affections. All such are expelled by the matchless purity of the Son of God. The minister is thus commissioned to introduce the community to the Living Christ, to define the Way in which the Lord would have us walk, and to decry all evil which robs men of their birthright—to the end that souls shall come alive in Christ.

Now the need for evangelism in the local church is far greater than the energies or capacities of the minister. He must have like minded men and women who will engage with him in this all important task. Indeed, every follower of Christ is called to be an evangelist. Still, even the most devout may need some instruction and some guidance. This the church must provide.

First, the concern for others must be kindled in the heart. Then, willing workers must be instructed and directed to those for whom they will become the ambassadors of the faith. We Methodists still believe implicitly in the heart-warming experience. We testify to the glory of the new birth. Let us not be ashamed of that which gave first century Christianity its winsomeness and its power, and which became the keynote of the English revival under Mr. Wesley and of pioneer Methodism on this continent.

The year 1962-63 has been set aside in Methodism for the commemoration of the 225th Anniversary of John Wesley's Aldersgate Experience. During this year earnest Christians in local churches throughout the land will be seeking so to accommodate themselves to the Holy Spirit that they and the church shall arise to meet the issues of this day with new power, new insight, and redemptive grace. When this occurs the man on the street will both hear and take heed. Indeed, the size of the church can be described through statistics, but the power of the church is determined by the extent to which the Holy Spirit has been given freedom to perform its perfect work. The Good News is "new life in Christ."

No Methodist Conference in America is charged with such awesome responsibilities as those facing the Florida Conference during the forseeable future. Our evangelism must be motivated from within. We are laying the foundations upon which the structure of a new and evolving Florida will be built. There is no preventing the inevitable change. But, by the grace of God, the future can be claimed in the name of Christ. Here is our new frontier.

As we memorialize the 225th Anniversary of Wesley's conversion in Aldersgate, we consecrate ourselves anew in evangelistic fervor. I am told that approximately 200,000 people will be added to Florida's population during 1963. This is 16,000 per month, or more than 500 per day. To all these we will witness that Jesus Christ is Lord and that His Kingdom ruleth over all.

Missions

That morning when Jesus stood before His disciples on a hilltop in the Holy Land preparatory to His departure into Heaven they listened in breathless ecstasy at every word He spoke. "Go now into all the world, beginning with Jerusalem and Samaria and Judea—and make disciples of all nations; baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit; and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." They began in Jerusalem and worked out in all directions. This was the method. Wesley had simply caught the spirit of first century Christianity when he said, "The world is my parish."

Now the truth of the matter is that, by and large, Christians have done a rather shabby job in the field of missions across these nearly 20 centuries. More progress was made in world evangelism between 1850 and 1930 than had been made in five centuries before. It was all due to the fact that some great missionary statesman of towering mind and personality and spirit captured the eye and the ear and the heart of the church and reawakened it to its global responsibilities.

Of course, there are those who think that this upsurge of missionary zeal was only a case of too little and too late. And, alas, somewhat of a case can be made at this point. However, the fact remains that cells of Christianity have been planted on every continent and in every nation on the globe. There are faithful believers among those of every race and political ideology. Now is no time to desert our posts, or to default upon those ambassadors of the faith who stand holding the cross high on the frontiers of a chaotic world. The cross of Jesus Christ is the only hope of unity, concord, brotherhood, and spiritual redemption without which the world cannot survive.

Dr. J. Wallace Hamilton told the women of Florida Methodism recently that "Support of church missions programs is the answer for Americans who ask 'What can I do in this time of world-wide tensions?' One of the most persistent complaints is that Americans are asleep—apathetic or unaware of the issues and the enormous national perils confronting us. I believe that in the missionary outreach of our Christian churches everyone of us may find at least one small and important handle to hold."

Florida Methodism has, during the past two decades, been blessed with leaders of great missionary insight and concern. Because of this our people have beheld new vistas of promise for a benighted world. Through the use of missionaries on furlough, through missionary institutes, through the Chain of Missions, through the Junaluska Missionary Conference—in every possible way the opportunities for Christian witness opened by Christian missions have been brought home to the local church.

Consequently, we have in Florida one of the great missionary conferences. But we are only beginning to rise to the full stature of our possibilities. The time should come—indeed the time will come—when it is the goal of every congregation within the Florida Conference to give as much for others as it spends upon itself.

Every minister must work with his Commission on Missions, his Woman's Society, his Wesleyan Service Guild, and his Methodist Men to cultivate missionary zeal and consecration within his church.

The needs of Cuba are still at our doorstep. The Lands of Decision, ARGENTINA, PAKISTAN, SOUTHERN RHODESIA, and THE CHI-NESE IN DISPERSION, call for our special attention. At the very beginning of the year we must determine our Advance Specials for the Conference, for the nation, and for the world. And, let us rededicate ourselves and our people to an ever expanding outreach in prayer, in gifts, and in the encouragement of fellowship that the great commission may be fulfilled through us.

In Summary

It is a great experience to look back over twelve months and find so many satisfying achievements which have come to pass because of the devotion of Christian lay people and preachers to the service and the glory of Christ. But the most inspiring aspect of an annual conference is the fact that it is a time of beginning again. We pause, calculate the progress we have made, regroup our forces, seek refreshment from the Bread of Life and strike our tents to move out into the uncharted future, declaring to all men who may wonder at our faith and mission that Jesus Christ is Lord.

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Bishop Henley, Members of the Conference and Visitors. I consider it an honor to have been selected by my colleagues of the Cabinet to make this report. This is the report of several thousand faithful Methodist lay persons, several hundred faithful pastors, eleven faithful District Superintendents, under the leadership of a good and faithful Bishop, who because of the Grace and Mercy of our Heavenly Father have been privileged to join together in the onward march of Christianity through the channels of our great Church.

I am not unmindful as I begin this report that during the year we have suffered the loss of very fine and dedicated leadership, because of death, among our lay people and our Ministers, what seems to be an unusually large number of our Ministers have gone to the Father's House. We thank God for them and we are better because they lived.

For the report of our work I rather think that I shall mention each District, so I begin with the:

DELAND DISTRICT, Brother Joe A. Tolle, Superintendent. As we know this is the second time on the District for Brother Tolle, and as we also know the DeLand District was formed at the last session of our Conference (1961) so an experienced man has been the leader, and he reports that they have done the usual in getting the District organized and operational with ONE new church organized (Riverview at Ormond Beach), TWO new societies for the Woman's Society of Christian Service, FOUR new clubs of Methodist Men, FIVE new Parsonages acquired or built, ONE new Church building, and ONE new Educational building. A house and lot was purchased for the Wesley Foundation at Stetson University.

The report is a good year for the DeLand District, where many people have found the Churches ready and willing to serve their spiritual needs, for many have united with the Churches and the Church schools have experienced an increase in membership and attendance. GAINESVILLE DISTRICT: And some pertinent facts there are: TWO new parsonages in the making, Belleview and Columbia City; TWO new Church sites purchased, Wesley Memorial, Lake City and Fort McCoy.

Trinity Gainesville will move into their new Church plant, that is the first unit, about June 15. This unit will cost \$55,000.00. Lake City First Church recently completed a beautiful new Children's Educational Building at a cost of \$80,000.00. Interlachen had an anonymous gift of a new electronic organ. Florahome will soon complete an educational addition to their Church. Bishop Henley dedicated the new Educational building at Wellborn, April 1. Brother J. E. McKinley, the District Superintendent, reports another good year, and in some respects the best of his five on this important District.

JACKSONVILLE: Some of the outstanding events in this great city District will be headlined by a Fall Revival with a great Mass Rally of 8,000 persons in the Jacksonville Coliseum with Dr. Roy L. Smith preaching, and Revival services in every Methodist Church for the week.

Most of the Churches became concerned about Stewardship and carried out a program with proper emphasis on this great concern in November. One of the highlights of the year is the Greater Jacksonville District Christian Workers Training School with an enrollment of 976, with more than 1,200 attending and 799 credits issued.

The men of this District were active. They had an outstanding Men's Retreat at the Naval Air Station, Dr. Charles R. Goff, Speaker.

The relocation of Wesley Memorial Church is now in process, and the merger of Livingston Memorial and Anderson Memorial to be known as the Livingston-Anderson Methodist Church. TWO new parsonages have been secured. TWO new sanctuaries have been opened. New Fellowship Halls and Educational units opened at six places. The sanctuary at Garden City and the Fellowship Hall at Woodstock Park were dedicated. TWO churches are now in process of building Educational and Fellowship Hall units.

In every area of Advance giving, this District is well ahead of last year. The District will show an increase in Church School enrollment, attendance and Church participation due to the United Witness Program. Brother J. Milburn McLeod has given excellent leadership as the Superintendent in all areas of the work.

LAKELAND DISTRICT: This District has been under the leadership this year of a new Superintendent, Brother John James Rooks, who dubbed himself recently as "Rooks the Rookie" and this is his report: Emphasis has been placed this year upon the continuation of the District Ministry already in process.

The old District parsonage was sold and the proceeds applied on

the indebtedness on the new District Parsonage reducing the indebtedness to \$19,000.00. In addition, about \$2,000.00 was paid on furnishings. Emphasis was given to Advance Educational Specials, and this resulted in significant contributions to Florida Southern College. The District has increased its support of Church Extension through Builders Clubs; the membership in these clubs are now large enough to bring in almost \$6,000.00 a call. Two calls have been made during the year for new Church sites.

A four acre building site has been purchased for a new Church to be organized soon in the Crystal Lake section of Lakeland. A new congregation was organized April 29, with over 60 members in Winter Haven.

All phases of the work have had emphasis under the leadership of a fine Superintendent, so the Lakeland District writes another good chapter to its very fine history.

MIAMI DISTRICT: This District has been served also by a brand new District Superintendent, Brother George A. Foster, and this is his report for this great District, and it begins with this statement, "Perhaps our work with Cuban people should be highlighted in your report."

During the year this District established six additional points of general religious work with Cuban people, bringing the number to eight where Cuban Pastors or former Missionaries are appointed as Associate Pastors to other Churches. The Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief continues its operation here and they have sent in a man to be its director. The Woman's Division is also cooperating especially in the care of Cuban Children and Young People.

In the field of Church Extension, ONE new Church was established during the year, located in West Hollywood, and they now have about one hundred members.

Several new buildings have been completed during the year, additional facilities constructed, and the Churches mentioned in the District report are as follows: North Hialeah, Palm Springs, Hollywood Hills, Rudy Memorial, Norland, and Ley Memorial. Plans are under way at Wesley and Miramar—and so the report goes on for this District.

ORLANDO DISTRICT: Brother Bruce F. Gannaway, Superintendent, and by no means a brand new Superintendent but now well along in his post-graduate course. Reduced from 62 to 42 Churches a year ago (this reduction because of the formation of the DeLand District) has had a very fine year, moving ahead in all endeavors, and will show about 3,300 new members being added to the rolls, with every Church in the District sharing in this growth.

Before November 1, 1961, every Church in the District had given something in each of the "Four Lanes" of the Advance. The District has increased its giving to World and National Missions, and has shown great interest in supporting Central Florida Goodwill Industries. It is likely that the total Advance giving will exceed that of last year.

The District has taken on a project in Higher Education which is note-worthy. More than \$10,000.00 will be contributed this year to underwrite the Branscomb Chair of Religion at Florida Southern College, and nearly \$14,000.00 of the \$15,000.00 goal has been committed for next year.

ONE new Church has been organized with more than one hundred members now and a budget that has been oversubscribed. It is ex-

pected that a new Church at Indian River City will be organized in the near future. Several Churches have constructed or purchased parsonages, and also new units for Educational purposes have been constructed. Land has been purchased in several locations where new Churches will be erected in the future. First Church Orlando is now under way with the erection or construction of a beautiful Church plant or sanctuary.

SAINT PETERSBURG DISTRICT: Under the leadership of Brother Hoyt Tatum, Superintendent; is progressing and this in brief is their report; and it begins "The Saint Petersburg District has done it again!" Concern for others has been in many hearts, and God has used that concern to bring 3,883 people into membership in the Churches. with 1,291 of this number making their first Confession of Faith in Chirst. The net increase of 2,029 brings the total membership to 33,395. The total Church School enrollment is 18,534; up 252 over last year. The average attendance is also above last year.

Lay Activities, the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Youth Work have not been neglected and progress is indicated in this area of the work. About two-thirds of the payment of the total amount in the Conference Loan Fund and Branscomb Memorial is now paid, and it is certainly the desire of the Superintendent that a year from now it will be possible to report "Goal Attained." The property entrusted to the Methodist of this great District is valued in excess of \$11.000,000.00, and the total indebtedness is now less than \$1,500,000.00. This District with 47 Churches manned by 52 faithful, devoted ministers, with more than 33,000 members have given abundant cause for rejoicing in the heart of a faithful Superintendent, who through this reporter would say, "Thank You."

SARASOTA DISTRICT: The conference year has been a period of continuing advance for the Sarasota District. The reports will reveal a record number of accessions to the membership with a large number coming by Profession of Faith, all of this because Ministers and Laymen have recognized the need for an evangelistic emphasis and endeavor.

Three Christian Workers' Schools were held during the year with an encouraging enrollment. The Laymen are very active; two retreats have been held during the year with more than 200 men attending. The laymen received the trophy for the largest attendance on a percentage basis at the Conference Retreats last fall held at the Youth Camp.

Here is noted another Educational Special for Florida Southern College. The Churches of the District have undertaken to underwrite the salary of a Professor at the college.

ONE church was organized during the year. Property has been purchased at nine places for new Church sites. New parsonages have been acquired at FOUR Churches. New sanctuaries have been erected at FIVE places, and a number of Educational units or buildings. Several young men have presented themselves as candidates for the ministry, while a much larger number of young people are planning for full time service in one of the Christian vocations. Brother Harry H. Waller, the Superintendent, has given excellent leadership to all phases of the work in this District.

TAMPA DISTRICT: Brother Melton Ware, Superintendent, a man who stands tall of statue, has stood tall in this District.

In February, the entire District joined in a United Evangelistic

effort with Bishop Arthur J. Moore as the evangelist. Morning services were held at Hyde Park Church, and the evening services in the municipal auditorium. The united effort made a significant impact and lifted the evangelistic zeal of all the Churches.

World Service and Advance Special giving are at an all time high. A district-wide project worthy of note is the purchase of a fully equipped bus for use by the Kenneth Traxlers in Brazil. ONE new Church (St. Pauls), a suburban Church, was organized

ONE new Church (St. Pauls), a suburban Church, was organized during the year, and they now have 130 members with a budget to match this number and a Building Fund of \$16,000.00, and the first unit is under construction. They have a new parsonage.

THREE new Church buildings have been occupied, and FOUR new Educational units are in use. TWO new parsonages have been constructed. According to the report some kind of a record must have been established at Hyde Park. The purchase of a lot and the construction of a parsonage was authorized by a Quarterly Conference on October 8, the new home was occupied by the Pastor and family on February 1, and formally dedicated on February 11.

The year also saw the institution of a unique ministry. The Reverend George Hill became the Minister of World Affairs at Palma Ceia. It is believed that his is the only such ministry in the Christian Church. Thus this District writes another good chapter to its history. WEST PALM BEACH DISTRICT: Brother Henry W. Blackburn, Superintendent, the most experienced man as Superintendent of any man in the cabinet, for this is his sixteenth report, and a great report it is.

Five persons were licensed to preach during the year. Three thousand six hundred and five new members were received, which shows an increase in all areas of membership, which of course includes the Methodist Men's Clubs, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Church School. The District now has a Church membership of 28,692.

FOUR new Church sites were purchased during the year; also a site for the Wesley Foundation at the new Florida Atlantic University at Boca Raton. TEN new parsonages have been built or purchased. SEVEN new Churches and SIX new Educational buildings have been erected. World Service and Ten-In-One overpaid, with a marked increase in giving to Educational Specials, and Advance Specials. Salaries have increased. Property values are up well above any previous year. And a significant amount raised for "One Percent for Ministerial Education." So I could go on and recite figures, but since this is the sixth year for the Superintendent, let me briefly lift up some pertinent facts for the six years-20 new Churches have been organized, 20 new Church Schools, 20 Woman's Society of Christian Service organizations, 15 Methodist Men's Clubs, 26 new Church buildings erected, 31 new Educational buildings, and 40 new parsonages. There are 3,543 members in new Churches; the increase in value of all Church property is well above \$5,000,000.00.

The Superintendent closed his report to this writer with this statement. "Please make it clear that I feel that from a human standpoint the credit should go to our fine pastors. District and local Church leaders and members."

TALLAHASSEE DISTRICT: And I count it a very high privilege to have served this District for the past six years, and like each Superintendent, I am reporting for faithful and dedicated ministers and lay persons, without whom these reports would be impossible.

This District is somewhat smaller than perhaps any other time in past years, and certainly the last 25 or 30 years. This came about because of the creation of the new DeLand District last year, so our figures cannot be compared to previous years.

In the field of evangelism, we have received persons by Profession of Faith, from other Denominations, and from other Methodist Churches. We have worked at the task of making our witness clear and united, because we have participated in the "United Witness" in a very fine way and the results will show in our Church Schools perhaps more so than in additions to Church membership.

We had more young people attending our District Rallies than in previous years, and the same can be said about the men, for we have found that our men respond very well to Sunday afternoon Rallies. Lay Activities are on the increase in our District.

A number of parsonages have been renovated during the year; also a number of our Church buildings, and some additional Educational units have been constructed. World Service, Ten-In-One and other financial items are paid in full, and one significant fact for which this Superintendent is very thankful, 48 of the 56 Churches have paid in full their obligation to the Church Extension Loan Fund and Branscomb Memorial.

This I must mention before I close. A beautiful new District Parsonage was completed in July and it has been a joy to live there.

Over the six-year period, we organized four new Churches, one of which is now in the Gainesville District, but the three in our Tallahassee District are showing growth and progress—Forest Hills in Quincy, Grace in Perry, and John Wesley in Tallahassee.

Now what does all of these reports add up to? Well, only the report of our Conference Statistician will reveal all facts, but let me refer again to our Evangelistic efforts and report that for our Conference, we have received into the membership of our Churches, by Profession of Faith 10,464; from other denominations 4,093; by transfer from other Methodist Churches 13,941. We will show a net gain of 11,820, and a total membership of 258,323—so we say in closing, "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow!"

REPORT NO. 2

We recommend the following Rules and Regulations governing minimum salaries as required by Paragraph 826 of the Discipline.

1. That the scale of minimum salaries be fixed as follows: Effective members of the Conference and those on trial, Married, \$4,000.00; Single, \$3,700.00; Approved full-time Supplies, Married, \$3,700.00; Single, \$3,400.00. Part time and Retired Supplies shall not be claimants on minimum Salary funds.

2. That an apportionment of an amount equal to $2\frac{1}{2}$ % of the Pastoral Salary be levied on the Pastoral Charges to secure minimum salary funds.

3. That minimum salary funds be administered by the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.

4. That the cabinet be charged with the responsibility of determin-

ing who are claimants on this fund and amount due each.

5. That payments be made quarterly, provided funds are available.

REPORT NO. 3

The Episcopal Fund Apportionment is 2% of the current total cash salaries paid to pastors and associate pastors, serving charges under Episcopal Appointment or as supply pastors.

We recommend an apportionment of an amount equal to $13\frac{1}{2}\%$ of the Pastors' Salaries for the support of our Conference Claimants.

REPORT NO. 4

We recommend that an apportionment equal to $5\frac{1}{2}\%$ of the Pastoral Salaries be levied against the pastoral charges for the District Superintendent's Fund. We recommend further that the salary of the District Superintendent shall be \$10,000.00 and the expense account \$2,000.00.

REPORT NO. 5

We recommend the continuance of a Bishop's Contingency Fund. This fund shall be limited to \$2,000.00 and shall be provided from the surplus from Conference Benevolence Funds in the following manner:

When all Conference Benevolence items have been paid in full, the surplus shall be directed to provide a maximum of \$2,000.00, to be used for emergency needs of the Bishop in connection with his administrative duties. It is understood that this Fund is to be provided from the 1961-62 income, to be used for the 1962-63 years' needs.

REPORT NO. 6

Since a Central Treasurer for the Florida Conference has been established at The Methodist Building, 800 Palmetto Street, Lakeland, Florida, we recommend the following:

1. That an invitation be extended to all other boards and commissions to avail themselves of the Central Treasurer, upon application to the World Service and Finance Commission.

2. That we express our sincere appreciation to Mr. Alton H. Kindred for his valuable services as Conference Treasurer for the past year.

3. That we approve Mr. Vance K. Jenkins as Acting Treasurer of the Florida Annual Conference.

REPORT NO. 7

We recommend that each church adopt the 1% Plan for Ministerial Education, by placing in their budgets an amount equal to 1% of their operating budget, exclusive of capital funds outlays, for this cause annually.

REPORT NO. 8

We recommend that the car travel allowance for members of committees and commissions where it is allowed, be set at six cents per mile.

REPORT NO. 9

We recommend that every Conference Board, Commission and Committee file annual reports of monies received and disbursed, showing balance on hand, in accordance with paragraph 2, Standing Rule V. These reports must be in the hands of the World Service and Finance Commission Chairman by May 1st to permit intelligent budgeting for the upcoming year.

REPORT NO. 10

We have already paid in full the \$60,000.00 apportioned our Conference for the Bishop's Building at Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia. However, through error we were not advised that the University borrowed against our commitment, and that the interest now due is \$7,530.00.

We recommend that this amount be paid by the Florida Annual Conference on or before June 10, 1962, and that funds for this payment be drawn one-half from our Conference Reserve Fund, and one-half from our Ten-in-One Reserve Fund.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

1962

During the week of April 23rd, the Florida Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild held its Annual Meeting in Christ Church, St. Petersburg, with a registration of more than 1,550. We met together to look at ourselves; to examine our hearts to know if JESUS CHRIST IS LORD of our lives; to determine if we are carrying out OUR MISSION TODAY, within the channels of the purpose for which we are organized.

Final figures and reports of the work done throughout the Conference will not be available until after the first of June, but all officers, secretaries of lines of work, and District presidents report that progress has been made in all phases of work.

When we think of the women of the Conference, we think first of the Spiritual Life, for as we undertake to do the work we would be completely dedicated. If we are to stand up to the stress of these days, our faith must constantly be strengthened and deepened. Retreats and days apart for study, meditation and prayer have been held in every District—several Districts report more than one of these services. Many local societies, too, have had these times of spiritual renewal. As the Conference president travelled through the Districts recently, she was happy to hear "active prayer groups" reported more than any other one thing by local presidents. The Secretary of Spiritual Life says "there is evidence of growth in Spiritual interest and desire. The women seem to be recognizing a need for things of the spirit and trying to do something about it. Interest is focussed on needs for a fuller prayer life and a greater need for prayer groups."

All eleven Districts have been stressing membership. The operation "Crusade for Other Members Eagerly (C.O.M.E.)" has been most successful over the Conference, bringing many new members into the societies and guilds. A concerted program of visitation was carried on, touching thousands of women members of our church. A special effort has been made to enlist the young women, and we have tried to challenge them with our plan of study and service. However, there are still many to be reached and we need all the women in this enormous job of ours. We will continue to crusade for new members; we don't want just new names on our rolls, but women, united, and helping to develop and support Christian work among women and children around the world.

Women of the Conference are studying the needs of the world. Attendance at the School of Missions and Christian Service last summer was the largest we have had, and already, we are planning for an even larger school this year. Study courses, monthly programs, officer training days, seminars, Christian workers schools—all of these, together with the School of Missions, give our women wide horizons. They are well informed on all matters that touch the lives of people today. Christian action has not followed study as well as it should, and this we are striving to correct. Great interest is evidenced in the World Federation of Methodist Women. The Florida women are joining with the other Methodist women of the world in work that has as its theme "To Know Christ and Make Him Known."

The amount of literature sales has risen greatly over that of the previous year. Subscriptions to our publications have increased also. An all-out effort made during the April drive for subscriptions last year was successful, and the Florida Conference was awarded the National banner for new combination subscriptions to the *Methodist Woman* and *The World Outlook*. The same effort has been made this year—we are hoping that the banner has come to Florida to stay.

Several new services have been opened within the Conference during this year. A Methodist Community Center is operating in the Negro section of Jacksonville—the main emphasis at this center is leadership training, training Negro youth to lead and teach others. Just a few weeks ago a new, modern building was dedicated to the ministry of healing the sick at Brewster Hospital, also in Jacksonville.

In Miami a Protestant Temporary Group Home for Cuban children and youth, has been approved by Woman's Division, and is in the process of being established. These children and youth come to Florida, unaccompanied by their parents, to escape being put into camps for training in Communism. This foster home will give temporary care and guidance until regular foster homes are found. The Executive Director and Staff of the Children's Service Bureau of Miami recommended this as the greatest possible contribution for a Protestant group to assume at this time. This is just a part of the Emergency Relief program for Cuban refugees.

With the help of the District Superintendents, a complete survey was made of the needs of the Conference for Church and Community Work (this used to be called Rural Work). An Advisory Committee for Church and Community Work was organized, and we immediately asked Woman's Division for six workers. We know that workers are few, but we are assured of three this year—the Deland, Gainesville and Tallahassee Districts will have help, beginning in June and September. Great things are happening all over the Conference!

The need for recruiting ministers, missionaries and deaconesses is one of ever increasing concern and must have the attention of the entire church. We start missionary education with the children, in extra sessions, and try to keep up the work during the years of youth and student age. These departments must work in cooperation with the Board of Education of the Conference. This work is one of great importance, yet, often, we find it difficult to get women to accept the responsibility and the challenge to work with children and youth. Dedicated, adult leadership is needed, especially on the local level. Conference secretaries of these lines of work are stressing this need. At the School of Missions in Lakeland this summer we will have a class for senior MYF girls. Many more are wanting to enroll than we can accommodate; these young girls seem anxious to learn more about the mission program of their church. Wouldn't it be wonderful if one of these should become interested in Christian work as a result of attending the school? Pray with us that it may be so!

At the Assembly of Woman's Division in Atlantic City, two from Florida will be commissioned for service. Miss Margaret Fields, the Conference Chairman of Spiritual Life for the Guild, will be commissioned a deaconess, and will be re-assigned to Brewster Hospital in Jacksonville. Miss Bethany Routh, of Vero Beach, will be dedicated to the life of a missionary and will serve in South America.

The pledge of the Woman's Society and Guild is for the giving of ourselves, our prayers, service and our material possessions. Our women give all of these. The cost of maintaining the work of Woman's Division is spiraling upward; Florida women see the need for funds and meet that need. The report sent out by the treasurer of Woman's Division for the first six months of this fiscal year, showed that Florida was third in total giving—Southern California-Arizona Conference was first; Virginia Conference was second. Our pledge for 1962-63 has been raised to \$186,000.00. The pledges of the Districts, given at the meeting in St. Petersburg, totaled \$270,500.00.

More than \$25,000.00, over and above our pledge this year, has been sent to Division for Special Memberships; this money goes into appropriations, undesignated as to use. \$5,000.00 is sent annually in supplementary giving for the Branscomb Memorial Literature and Literacy program in Latin America. For a second year, \$10,000.00 is being sent for the girl's dormitory at Paine College in Augusta, Ga.

Another program that is unique in the Florida Conference is that of giving college scholarships to Negro girls. Each District, with some financial help from the Conference, sends a girl to one of the colleges maintained by Woman's Division.

The Love Offering brought to Annual Meeting was designated for equipment for Memorial Hospital, Kolar, India (in honor of Dr. Vela Cleveland, one of our missionaries serving there), and for Cuban Refugee Relief in Florida. The amount of the offering was more than \$16,000.00, and will be divided equally between these two fields of work.

Supply giving is called "second mile giving"; through it, supplies and equipment, not included in regular appropriations, are made available to projects of Division. Askings for this year will be overpaid. The assignments for 1963 have been received and accepted. We have been asked to give \$33,998.46 to home and foreign projects.

The Woman's Society and Guild of Florida is attempting to carry out Our Mission Today, gladly and joyously, as we unite in a program of service. The factors are many and varied; the frontiers are all around us, but we have a faith tremendous that compels us to "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Our deep appreciation goes to our Bishop, the District Superintendents, the pastors and all others who have cooperated with us this past year as we have tried to do our part in the on-going program of the Methodist Church in Florida. Please continue to remember us in your prayers that we might be led by the Holy Spirit in all that we do.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

The purpose of the Board of Lay Activities, as stated in the *Discipline*, is to deepen the spiritual life of the lay members of the church and to establish among them an increasing loyalty and interest that they may become an active working force in each local church.

This purpose motivates the Conference Board of Lay Activities in developing a strong lay movement among Florida Methodists.

I am happy to report that laymen, in rapidly increasing numbers, are becoming active in this Conference. The records of progress in all phases of activity reflect the growing interest of Methodist Men.

The Conference Board of Lay Activities this year consists of 91 men. The 11 District Lay Leaders are devoted Christian men who are measuring up to their responsibilities. They devote much of their time, talent and effort to promoting the lay program. They are developing dependable lay leadership. Assisting them are carefullychosen Associate District Lay Leaders, each with responsibility for lay activities in his sub-district. When called upon to act this team of 91 men respond. Their loyalty, dependability, devotion and enthusiastic cooperation is producing many achievements. These men are making things happen.

What are they doing?

Since my report last year 19 new men's clubs have been chartered and this Conference now has a total of 357 chartered groups of Methodist Men. If we had 13 more clubs we would be in first place among the 100 conferences of Methodism. We can attain this top place if pastors and lay leaders in 38% of our churches where no men's clubs exist, make a special effort during the coming year to organize their men into a working force. Our goal is 400 clubs by June 1, 1963.

To have strong and effective men's groups the presidents of men's clubs must be well-informed of their duties and given instruction on procedures.

To have church lay leaders who will provide capable leadership it is essential that they know what is expected of them.

To have church secretaries of stewardship who know what their jobs are, the program of stewardship must be explained to them.

So starting at 3 p.m. Friday, following adjournment of this Annual Conference, a training session will take place at Florida Southern College for the presidents of Methodist Men, for church lay leaders and for secretaries of stewardship. It will end at noon Saturday. Coming from out of the state to help in this training school will be Vernon L. Sidler and Wm. McPherson of the General Board staff and Art Cooper, secretary of stewardship in the Alabama-West Florida Conference. The Leesburg Laymen's Conferences each Fall continue to grow in size, enthusiasm and spiritual enrichment for Florida laymen. Last year's attendance reached 1,753. The Youth Camp was filled to capacity and a large number of men stayed in nearby motels. The Sarasota District won the trophy for the largest attendance, based on membership of the District, with 204 men present. The Tampa District had 197, West Palm Beach 227, Miami 274, Orlando 153, DeLand 94, Gainesville 64, Jacksonville 156, St. Petersburg 172, Lakeland 114 and Tallahassee 69. The Saturday night offerings, in cash and pledges, totaled \$11,805.62. The Communion offering was \$968.52.

A second trophy will be awarded this Fall to the District with the largest number of churches represented. Reservations are beginning to come in fast although the conference is still five months off. As of May 1 the advance registration was 204.

We are preparing for 2,000 men this year. Theme of this conference will be "Our Task—New Churches" with special emphasis upon church extension. Speakers will include Bishop James W. Henley, Bishop Eugene Frank of St. Louis, Bishop Eugene Slater of Topeka, Kansas, Bishop W. Vernon Middleton of Pittsburgh, Dr. Thomas A. Carruth of Atlanta, Mr. Walter R. Anderson of Raleigh, N.C., Dr. Clare N. Pettit of Parlier, California and Mr. H. Owen DeWeese of Elwood, Indiana.

Most of the 11 Districts have conducted District Retreats this year. Attendance has been good.

We are hoping Florida will have a large delegation at the Jurisdictional Laymen's Conference to be held July 26-29 at Lake Junaluska, N.C.

Laymen's Sunday was widely observed in this Conference last October. Only a few pastors failed to cooperate. This Fall we ask 100% observance.

District Lay Leaders met in January at Melbourne to report on activities for the first half of the year, to plan for the balance of the year's work and to exchange ideas and experiences. Bishop Henley, District Superintendents Blackburn and Foster and Dr. Robert C. Holmes met with us.

Our Florida Board entertained members of the Executive Committee of the General Board in April at Miami Beach. About 200 persons, mostly from the Miami area, attended a dinner at the diLido Hotel in connection with this meeting.

About 1,000 copies of *The Methodist Layman*, published by the General Board of Lay Activities, are being read monthly by men of the Florida Conference. We would like to see this number doubled during the coming year as we urge men of Florida to subscribe to this layman's publication.

Our Board obligated itself three years ago to raise \$65,000 for the purchase of 78 acres of land, adjacent to the Youth Camp at Leesburg, title to be held by the Board of Education. So far about \$35,000 has been raised and it is hoped the remaining \$30,000 can be secured within the next two years. Men's clubs are contributing generously to this fund which also receives the major part of the offerings at the Leesburg Laymen's Conferences.

We recognize the splendid leadership Bishop Henley is giving to the Florida Conference and the cooperation he is extending to our Board. Our thanks go also to the District Superintendents and pastors for the wonderful way in which they work with us in the promotion of our program.

I want to especially thank Glenn W. Gold, Associate Conference Lay Leader, for his assistance to me and the tireless service he gives this conference. Edd W. Gentry, treasurer of our Board, Norman Pounds, Jr., registrar for the Leesburg Conference and many others deserve special mention.

We have an unbeatable team of laymen and ministers. Working together, our great Conference will continue to grow greater as we move forward in Florida.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the call of the hour, as it has been the call of every hour when Jesus has been taken seriously. Sometimes world events spell out that call, while at other times the call comes through some person who has been in Communion with God. But at all times, when the call does come, it comes as a challenge and a compulsion.

The very times through which we are passing are forcing Christians to reconsider afresh the meaning and implication of evangelism. There is an urgency and a driving compulsion in the call to Christian evangelism. At the heart of the Christian Gospel is the call of the Master, "Come follow me." Evangelism is the living of life in response to that call. Dr. D. T. Niles defines evangelism as the act of one beggar telling another beggar where to get food. The goal of Christian evangelism is the full consecration of the entire self.

Your Conference Board of Evangelism reports its work in three sections this year.

I. One of the major thrusts of this past year has been evangelism through the Church School. We feel that the joint efforts of the Board of Evangelism and Education in the "Our United Witness" program has made an impact on the local church which should have lasting effects. We strongly urge the continuation of evangelism through the Church School in cooperation with the program of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. (See joint report of "Our United Witness" made by the two Boards.)

Our goal for this year was 1 new Methodist for every 14 members, a net gain of 15,000 in membership. During the 1961-1962 Annual Conference year we have received by Profession of Faith 10,464, from other Denominations 4,093, Transfer from other Methodist Churches 13,941, net increase 11,820.

We have cooperated with the Jurisdictional Program of "A Mission To the People." Many of our churches have organized groups of The Twelve, Lay Visitation Teams and Preaching Missions. We express our appreciation to the Bishop and the Cabinet for their leadership in this program.

The program of evangelism is a local church program. Folks are not won to Christ by Conference Boards or District Committees. We would like to express our thanks to the folks in the local church who have gone from house to house telling the story of the good news of God. We urge each Local Church Commission on Membership and Evangelism to continue to be diligent in their work so that we might be effective witnesses for Christ and His Church. The Pastors of our Conference are to be commended for being faithful in presenting Christ and challenging people to Christian discipleship. Let us continue to seek the full commitment of every possible person—both in the church and outside the church.

II. Proposed Program for 1962-1963.

This year is the 225th anniversary of John Wesley's Aldersgate Experience. We therefore declare that the emphasis of this Conference year be on John Wesley's heart warming experience at Aldersgate.

The purpose of the observance shall be to call Methodists, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to personally seek new life in Christ and the Church, and to witness out of a personal heart warming experience that Jesus Christ is Lord.

To implement this Aldersgate Year Observance, we offer the following program for this year:

- Summer—Conference on Spiritual Life, June 25-29 and the Candler Camp Meeting and Conference on Evangelism, August 12-17 at the Lake Junaluska Assembly in Lake Junaluska, North Carolina. One of our Conference evangelists, Dr. Allen W. Moore, will be one of the speakers at the Camp Meeting.
- 2. Fall—
 - A. Period of Preparation for Pastors and Laymen through Pastor's School and the Laymen's Conference held at the Methodist Youth Camp in Leesburg and District Spiritual Life Retreats for Preachers and Laymen.
 - B. We strongly urge each church to have membership training classes to be received on Thanksgiving Sunday.
- 3. Winter—Jan., Feb., March 15, 1963—Emphasis of Observance in LOCAL CHURCH. Purpose—To call Methodists, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, to seek new life in Christ and the church.
 - A. Series of Sermons on Book of Romans by the Pastor.
 - B. Bible Study of Book of Romans.
 - C. District-Wide "New Life Meetings"
 - 1. Dates selected by each District for "New Life Meetings."
 - Feb. 3 —Tallahassee District.
 - Feb. 10 —Orlando District.
 - Feb. 10 —West Palm Beach.
 - Feb. 10 —Sarasota.
 - Feb. 17 Deland.
 - Feb. 24 ---St. Petersburg District.
 - Feb. 24 Tampa District.

March 3-Gainesville District.

March 10—Jacksonville.

March 10—Lakeland.

March 10—Miami.

2. Guest Preachers for NEW LIFE MEETINGS.

A. Each Pastor has the privilege of selecting his own preacher for the NEW LIFE MEETINGS. This is to be done not later than Pastor's School in October of this year. Any church not having a guest preacher by this date will receive the assistance of the District Superintendent in the selection and securing of a preacher.

- B. Realizing the size of such an endeavor as we are undertaking, there may be some difficulty in meeting the need of all our churches for guest ministers. Feel free to call upon your District Superintendent, District Secretary of Evangelism and the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Evangelism to help you secure a guest minister to insure that every church will have a preacher for our NEW LIFE MEETINGS.
- C. As soon as you have selected and secured your guest minister, please notify your District Superintendent and District Secretary of Evangelism.
- D. Each local church is expected to take care of the travel and entertainment expenses of the guest minister and provide an honorarium.
- E. We recommend that District-Wide publicity be used in any possible way such as radio, T.V. and newspapers. Mr. O. B. Fanning, Director of Florida Methodist Information, will make available to all Districts and Local Churches, through the District Secretary of Evangelism, news releases and advertising copy specifically designed for our Aldersgate NEW LIFE MEETINGS.
- 4. Spring-March 15, April and May, 1963.

Purpose—To witness out of a heart warming experience that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Following the New Life Meetings, it is hoped that the second part of our purpose—"To witness out of a heart warming experience that Jesus Christ is Lord"—will be realized through one or more of the following suggestions:

- 1. One week of Visitation Evangelism.
- 2. Four nights for God.
- 3. Come and See Program.
- 4. Membership Classes to be received on Palm Sunday or Easter Sunday.

Aldersgate Sunday—May 19—or Special Aldersgate Service on Friday, May 24, 1963 calling attention to the historical significance of this Aldersgate "Heart Warming experience" in the life of John Wesley and The Methodist Church. Making as our prayers, the words of the visitor to the historic room in Aldersgate Street, "Lord, Do It Again."

III. Recommendation:

- 1. We recommend Dr. Allen W. Moore and Rev. E. C. Chastain as approved Conference Evangelists for next year.
- 2. We recommend M. McCoy Gibbs be appointed Executive Secretary of Conference Board of Evangelism for another year.
- 3. We request an appropriation of \$3,600 from the World Service and Finance Commission for the work of this Board for next year.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

The Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information assumed responsibility on June 1, 1961, for the publication of the FLORIDA METHODIST, in addition to its oversight of the Methodist Information office.

Mr. Jack Detweiler was elected Editor of the FLORIDA METHOD-IST and Mr. O. B. Fanning was named Editorial Director. The basic subscription rate of the FLORIDA METHODIST has been increased to \$2.

The following items are taken from the Editor's annual report:

"The FLORIDA METHODIST has undergone many changes during its first year under the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information. I am, of course, one of them.

"I was employed by the Commission on August 1, 1961, to edit the FLORIDA METHODIST. The first two issues of the Conference Year were edited by Mr. O. B. Fanning, our Editorial Director. Mr. Fanning was responsible for the very attractive restyling of the FLORIDA METHODIST into its present editorial format. While I have added several new features and introduced my own news judgment and writing style, the basic format remains essentially the same. I consider it ideally suited for the publication—considering our size, our budget, the facilities of our printer, and our objectives as a new magazine for the Florida Conference.

"Before going further into the events of this year, I feel I would be remiss if I did not pay tribute to my predecessor, the Reverend Charles Thompson. My own experience indicates that Mr. Thompson and his wife performed a herculean task in putting out the FLORIDA METHODIST while at the same time serving a large church. Halfway through the year I found it necessary to augment the volunteer services of my own wife with the work of a full-time secretary. Thus, the Thompsons have been replaced by two full-time workers.

"The FLORIDA METHODIST reached an all-time circulation peak of 12,750 during January. This is traditionally the high month for our circulation. It is immediately following our circulation drive but prior to the time to dropping those subscribers gained in the previous year's drive who do not renew. At present we have 10,400 subscribers, approximately 2,000 more than a year ago, which should be our low point for the year. Our circulation is characterized as follows:

4,400 new subscriptions

5,100 renewals

600 pending renewals

300 covered by advance payments during the year, or sent free on an exchange basis

10,400

"The gain of 4,400 new subscriptions was offset to some degree by the loss of 2,300 previous subscribers who did not renew. Reduction of this loss will be one of our chief challenges in the years ahead. It is heartening to know, however, that the renewal rate has remained the same under the \$2 subscription price as it was for the \$1 price.

"At present we have less than one subscriber for every 20 Florida Methodists. This is quite low when compared to other conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction or with our own early history. Handwritten district minutes for the Tampa District recently turned over to the Florida Southern College archives by the Reverend Melton Ware show that in 1896 there was concern expressed when the FLORIDA ADVOCATE was going to only one of every six members in the district.

"Only 55 churches in the Conference, most of them quite small, have subscriptions equal to one-tenth of their membership. Despite our recent circulation gains, a majority of our churches do not have subscriptions equal to one-fifth of their membership.

"It was pleasing to note during the year that more and more churches submitted news to the FLORIDA METHODIST with each succeeding month and that we now have active District Reporters in most of the districts. Our future success will depend as much upon the quality and variety of news that we get as it will the subscription lists. We have been pleased that our three new editorial features, "Cross-currents," "Extra Mile Award," and the "Me and My Bible" column by Mrs. Ed Ferrell have met with general approval, judging by our mail and comments we hear in traveling about the state."

The Director of Methodist Information, Mr. O. B. Fanning, also serves as Editorial Director of the FLORIDA METHODIST. The Florida Methodist Information office is rendering a service equalled by few if any other similar offices. Officers and members of all Conference organizations are loud in their praise of the services of the office of Florida Methodist Information.

The following paragraphs are from the report of the Director of the Florida Methodist Information Office:

"The operation of our news bureau and public relations office as a part-time responsibility is based on the resolution adopted by the 1960 Annual Conference: 'In order to coordinate and facilitate the gathering of news of public interest concerning activities of the Florida Conference of The Methodist Church, and especially of its boards and agencies, for dissemination through the secular press, the religious press, radio and television and other legitimate media of public information, be it resolved that we hereby establish a Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information . . .

"News Coverage: During the year the major portion of our work has been devoted to news coverage along these lines:

Annual Conference Sessions

Activities of the Bishop

Annual meetings of boards and agencies

Special meetings, programs and projects

Conference-wide campaigns and special events

Pastoral changes

Church extension projects

Human interest features, etc.

"Since the job of the director is a part-time responsibility, it is necessary to restrict news coverage to matters of general interest usually at the Conference level—rather than try to include district and local church news. During the year we have prepared and disseminated 137 news releases. Of these, 64 were accompanied by photographs. In addition, the director handled press relations in working with reporters at the Annual Conference and the annual meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

"Religious Press: In addition to news stories of regional interest sent to Methodist conference and area publications, several special stories and features—mainly on church extension and the Cuban refugees—have appeared under the directors' by-line in the following national Methodist periodicals: WORLD OUTLOOK, TO-GETHER, CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, METHODIST STORY, METHODIST LAYMAN. Some of these stories also were reprinted in non-Methodist church periodicals via Religious News Service of New York.

"FLORIDA METHODIST: The 1961 Annual Conference elected the writer editorial director of the FLORIDA METHODIST, and at the request of the Commission I served as temporary editor last summer and initiated the revamping of the publication. Special thanks are due Dr. Thrift and Mr. Sims for their time and guidance during the transition. Dr. Thrift handled the business side of the publication, and even enlisted the services of his daughters to keep the mailing list and advertising schedule up to date. Therefore, it was a great relief to all of us when Mr. Jack Detweiler was engaged as editor of the FLORIDA METHODIST. He has done an outstanding job in continuing the improvements and making the publication a splendid news and information service to Florida Methodists. It is a pleasure to be associated with him and to coordinate our efforts at many points.

"Florida Southern College: My responsibility as director of the college news bureau has made it fairly simple to operate two offices as one. This is possible not only because the college is a Methodist institution, but because the college has been exceedingly generous in providing office space, secretarial help, supplies, telephone, mailing service, etc. Since our Methodist Information budget is rather limited, the college has not charged us a fair share of these expenses. We are indeed indebted to the college for these services.

"Conclusion: It is indeed a pleasure to work with the lay and ministerial leaders of the Florida Conference. A part-time job has its frustrating moments from the standpoint of being unable to devote as much time and effort as one would like to telling the Methodist story. Even so, the present arrangement has worked out rather well, I think, and it is our hope to increase the news coverage of both the College and the Conference during the coming year."

The Florida Methodist Information Office operates on a very limited budget, the smallest of any area Methodist Information office. The fact that Florida Southern College provides office space, secretarial services, and many supplies enables the office to function on its limited budget. The financial report on Methodist Information for 1962 is as follows:

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE DEACONESS BOARD

Chief among the concerns of the Deaconess Board are the recruitment of more deaconesses and the creation of a new and favorable image of the deaconess in the eyes of the Church.

At present there are just over 400 deaconesses serving in The Methodist Church, of whom seven are in the Florida Conference. One thousand more could immediately be placed, if they were available. It must be remembered that "deaconess work" is not a particular job or type of employment, but is a relationship to the Church. The deaconess offers herself to the Church, and upon meeting the high standards, is commissioned and consecrated. The deaconess may serve as parish worker, director of Christian education, community center worker, nurse or hospital administrator, rural worker, teacher, church secretary, or in other types of church-related work.

The Church must change its stereotyped image of the deaconess. To too many churchmen, the deaconess is a little old lady dressed in a long black dress with a bonnet on her head and a little bow under her chin, a sort of Protestant nun or Salvation Army lassie. I submit that the Methodist deaconesses do not fit this image, but that they are attractively dressed, intelligent, normal Methodist women. The image of the spinster deaconess resigned to a life of celibacy must be revised in favor of the dedicated deaconess who is eligible for, and interested in, marriage, should the right opportunity present itself. When Mary Lou Barnwell, Executive Secretary of the Commission on Deaconess Work, was asked if deaconesses can marry, her answer was, "Some can and some can't." My point is that deaconesses are eligible for matrimony and may continue to serve, even though married.

The 75th Anniversary of the beginning of deaconess work in America will be observed in 1963. A goal of 75 new deaconesses has been set for the nation. The Florida Conference Deaconess Board urges the following steps and suggestions as our part in the recruitment program:

1. Each district in the Florida Conference should recruit at least one deaconess candidate in the next year.

2. Young people need to meet Conference deaconesses at work. Tours to various projects would help here.

3. Deaconesses should be used as resource persons, teachers, and counselors in the Conference summer youth program.

4. We need to "dignify and regularize" deaconess service as part of the church.

5. There needs to be wider use of the filmstrip, "Make All Things New," portraying deaconess work.

6. The Florida Conference "slides" on deaconess work in our Conference, now being revised, need wider distribution and use.

7. We suggest wider use of the deaconess place mats, picturing the deaconess work.

8. We commend "The Florida Methodist" for its publication of a series of articles on "Why I Am a Deaconess," and recommend completion of the series. The articles are being incorporated into a brochure for wide distribution.

9. The itinerating of a typical, attractive "glamour girl" deaconess at district youth enlistment rallies is proposed.

We commend the following Florida Conference deaconesses for their effective work during the past Conference year: Cleo Barber, Helen Fennema, Lillian Kelly, Inez Martin, Ruth Mayhall, Helen Wolfarth, and Blanche Yeager. Especially do we express appreciation to Blanche Yeager upon her retirement as a deaconess and as Florida Conference Director of Children's Work. We welcome Margaret Fields, commissioned recently as a deaconess at Atlantic City, and serving presently at the Brewster Hospital in Jacksonville, and request her consecration at this session of the Annual Conference by Bishop Henley.

We particularly recommend to the Annual Conference that the Program Committee for the Annual Conference session of 1963 provide for a special program recognizing the Church-wide 75th Anniversary of Methodist Deaconess work.

ANNUAL REPORT CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS

A world of chaos and crisis, anxiety, and restless change demands that Christians not only take the label from Christ but also live the life of compassionate concern. Henry Burton gives Christ's challenge:

> He is breaking down the barriers, He is casting up the way, He is calling for His angels To build up the gates of day: But His angels here are human, Not the shining hosts above; For the drum-beats of His army Are the heart-beats of our love.

How wonderful it is to be a part of a day like this! The only alternative to despair and disillusionment is the complete commitment to Jesus Christ and His Gospel.

The continuing missionary zeal of the churches of the Florida Conference is a high tribute to the dedicated men, women, young people, and children who have given of tithes and sacrificial monies to the call of World Service and Advance Specials. The consecrated leadership of every pastor is evidenced in the goal of \$1,500,000 for Advance Specials and the support of four lanes of Advance for every church. The Florida Conference is sounding a note of challenge in Advance and World Service giving for which the Conference Board of Missions is grateful. We express our deep appreciation to the District Superintendents and Dr. R. C. Holmes for their devotion and leadership in so many areas of missionary responsibilities. We urge wide use of the Gift Annuities pamphlet through the office of the Secretary of Church Extension as a helpful aid.

Several matters have brought a challenge to the Conference and to the Board of Missions during the year. Dr. Ernest V. May and many others have given excellent leadership and consecrated study in the matter of our Latin Centers in Tampa and Miami. Some strengthening projects will be forthcoming in these areas.

The New Church Pastor's Conference at the Youth Camp March 26-27, 1962 was a very wonderful undertaking. This was a pilot project for Methodism. The approximately ninety new churches which have been started in the Florida Conference since about 1955 were much in evidence and their thrilling story is a graphic presentation. The Conference Board of Missions is so grateful for the presence and participation of many of the officials from the National Division of the Board of Missions, Philadelphia, is this pilot endeavor. Our gratitude is expressed to Bishop James W. Henley, the District Superintendents, and Dr. R. C. Holmes for their fine support and leadership in this enterprise. Our able Secretary of Church Extension gave his usual careful attention to the many details which were connected with setting up this project.

Bishop James W. Henley called a meeting during the year regarding the Cuban situation in Miami. The Woman's Society of Christian Service had been working on this needy and pressing problem also. On June 1, 1962, National Missions is to take up the responsibility for the salaries of the Cuban pastors at work in this country. There will be Conference and General Advance support on this responsibility for the Cuban situation. The Woman's Society of Christian Service took on the "unaccompanied minors" project. A local committee, under Dr. George Foster, was to represent the ministerial side. The MCOR is working on welfare and resettlement and the Miami Latin Center serves as headquarters. A warehouse is provided and the Woman's Society of Christian Service is doing further social work and child placement. The Cuban situation will further involve our continued National, World, and Advance Special support.

We urge the continued support of Lands of Decision for the quadrennium: Pakistan, Argentina, Southern Rhodesia, and Chinese in Dispersion. Progress has been manifested and merits our continued support in the old Lands of Decision: Congo, Bolivia, Korea, and Sarawak.

We would further stress the continued presentation of our missionary literature as an opportunity for information, and periodicals such as the World Outlook, Together, and the like are to be encouraged among our people. The World Service literature and fourth Sunday emphasis each month in the Church School are fine things and we encourage every church to participate. We encourage the continued use of audiovisuals and other missionary materials where possible and available. Our missionaries on furlough can be used to fine advantage. We encourage an annual School of Missions in every local church.

We express the deepest gratitude of the Conference Board of Missions to Dr. H. L. Johns, Director of Church Extension, Division of National Missions, Board of Missions, Philadelphia. Dr. Johns has continually inspired us by his courtesy, understanding, tremendous zeal, and able guidance of the many intricate and varied matters which have been handled by the Division of National Missions in such a fine spirit of cooperation with us. We are humbly conscious of his dedicated efforts and his skilled contributions on behalf of his Lord and Church in a rapidly expanding program of church extension here in the Florida Conference.

We express to Alton Kindred, who has served so well as Conference Treasurer, our deepest appreciation as he takes up new work. We want to join with the Commission on World Service and Finance in thanking him and the excellent staff in the office of the Central Treasurer for their many fine efforts on our behalf during the year.

We extend our deep appreciation to Dr. R. C. Holmes, our roving Conference Church Extension Secretary, in the work which he has loved so dearly and has done so superbly. Our Board will be very happy, if, in the wisdom of the Bishop and the Cabinet, they can see their way clear to return Dr. R. C. Holmes to our Board in the capacity of Conference Secretary of Extension.

Our thanks go also to Dr. Clare Cotton for his able leadership as Conference Missionary Secretary amid a busy pastorate. The many officers of the Conference Board have rendered hours of

The many officers of the Conference Board have rendered hours of dedicated and talented service during the year and we are grateful. We encourage the continued support of the Branscomb Memorial

We encourage the continued support of the Branscomb Memorial and the Church Extension Campaign. Faithful support is evidenced in the new churches springing up which are helped by the Loan Fund and in the proposed ground-breaking for the Branscomb Memorial Auditorium which will be scheduled soon. Let us persevere and faithfully complete our undertaking of the \$2,400,000 on schedule.

Our Mission Today Study

Florida is moving along in the Church-wide study of OUR MISSION TODAY according to schedule for this Quadrennium. Meeting in three Regional Study Conferences in February, 1961 the Annual Conference Teams launched this Study to:

- Clarify our thinking as to the Biblical and theological bases for missions.
- Make clearer our understanding of contemporary conditions and factors that face us.
- Develop new appreciation of Christian obligations to the world.
- Become aware of the urgency of the Christian Mission.
- Develop a more sensitive response to the guidance of God in this Mission.

Returning to present this program to 1961 Annual Conferences, the teams have continued preparations for church-wide participation in the Study. During the past year your Florida Conference Team continued its own Study and extended the program in the Conference as follows:

- Presented the Study at each district Conference.
- Each team member conducted pilot studies in his area of the state.
- Team members served as resource persons to districts and local churches.
- The State Student Conference, February 1962, was devoted to the Study, under the general theme, "The Mission of The Church in a Dangerously Divided World."
- The Annual Conference of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was devoted to the Study under the theme, "The Faith That Compels Us."
- Prepared a full evening program on OUR MISSION TODAY to be presented jointly with the Board of Missions at our 1962 Annual Conference.
- Prepared for distribution at Annual Conference leaflet outlining detail plans for implementation of the Study for the remaining two years.

Attention of the Conference is called to the projected time-table for the continued study of OUR MISSION TODAY during 1962-63 and 1963-64 and to the plans for its implementation:

- The Conference Study Team invites ALL Boards and Agencies to assist in guiding them to a cooperative study which will reach every local church.
- Regular channels of the church are to be used for carrying out this study.
- The Conference Secretary of the Board of Missions will promote the program through District Missionary Secretaries and through local Commissions on Missions, in consultation with other commissions and groups.
- Cooperative study groups are recommended for all local churches through the resources of adult classes, circles, men's groups, women's groups, prayer groups, young people and young adults.
- Studies to be conducted in the Methodist Student Organization of each of our colleges and universities campuses.
- Filmstrips, study books and Bible study materials recommended for use according to the schedule in the Conference Leaflet on OUR MISSION TODAY. The Bible Study materials will be distributed at the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference and each district soon thereafter so that local studies can begin in the fall of 1962. Tracy Jones' book, "OUR MISSION TODAY" will be available in January, 1963 and is recommended for thorough study by every local church involving all groups.
- Local churches are encouraged to make reports of studies conducted to district missionary secretaries who in turn will report to the Conference Secretary.

We are convinced that this study on *OUR MISSION TODAY* offers our church one of the most strategic opportunities for a clear, incisive examination of our mission and the task to which we are called. At that point where our faith compels us to action, in honest examination of the factors confronting the Christian church, as we move into the frontiers that challenge us, our church is reborn again with the power of the Holy Spirit. Anything less is unworthy stewardship.

We take pride in the fact that the Florida Conference leads the Nation in the number of New Congregations started in the last three years. Fifty-four Methodist congregations of the Florida Conference are worshiping now which were not in existance three years ago. Also every Church in the Conference has contributed something to a New Church. Dr. H. L. Johns, Director of Church Extension in the Southeastern Jurisdiction, reports that we have a larger Loan Fund than any other Conference. Under his supervision our Conference was the first to have a group meeting of Pastors of New Churches.

These are worthy achievements but we sincerely desire to do more for the Extension of the Kingdom. This success has been due to the efficient leadership given by our Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors, Conference and National Boards of Missions, the Livingston Mission Fund and our faithful, loyal laymen who have so generously worked and given of their means.

If we keep pace with the population trend in our State, we should start at least fifteen new congregations each year for the next five years.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

REPORT NO. 1

Perhaps no other Board of an Annual Conference is charged with a heavier responsibility nor enjoys the privilege of a greater service than the one which directs the training and evaluates the qualifications of our ministers of tomorrow. This awareness has become the atmosphere in which this Board does its work.

Functions of the Board

Look for a moment at the scope of our assignment. It is our responsibility:

- 1. To help each candidate examine his call to the ministry and the gifts, graces and usefulness which accompany that call.
- 2. To see that each candidate meets the requirements of our Church for Admission on Trial or Full Connection.
- **3**. To see that each candidate is properly qualified for ordination as Deacon or Elder and to help arrange for his ordination.
- 4. To inquire of each candidate concerning his physical health, his financial condition, his wife's attitude toward his calling, and, in co-operation with the Department of Ministerial Education, determine his academic status.
- 5. To properly classify and administer the training of Approved Supplies.
- 6. To so relate each candidate to his Draft Board under Selective Service that he may complete his preparation for the ministry without interruption; and to relate to the Chaplaincy those who choose to serve the nation in this trained capacity.
- 7. To conduct annually the Pastor's School for the Annual Conference.
- 8. To co-operate with the Bishop and the Commission on Christian Vocations in recruiting for the ministry, in observing ministry Sunday, and staging Preachers of Tomorrow Conferences.
- 9. To administer the scholarships and grants-in-aid provided by the One Per Cent Plan (See Report No. 2).
- 10. To formulate and administer when adopted, in co-operation with the Bishop and Cabinet, such Standing Rules as relate to procedures of admittance to the Conference.

To fulfill this impressive list of exacting responsibilities requires that each member serve actively on one of seven sub-committees into which the Board has been grouped. It requires a Registrar deeply devoted to his task and with the capacity to carry an administrative load of gigantic proportions. It requires also the active co-operation of the Bishop, the Cabinet, and the District Committees. All this, without exception, is being gladly done.

See with us now some additional steps the Conference might well take to increase its efficiency in recruiting the highest quality of ministers and in helping those who are recruited to the most effective use of their talents. With this objective before us, we submit three major proposals:

Standing Rules

- 1. ADOPTION of three new Standing Rules:
 - a) That candidates from other denominations may have their Orders recognized as Deacons; provided, however, that in

clearly exceptional cases the Conference may recognize his Orders at the Elder's level by a three-fourths vote of the Board and the Conference; and such candidates shall be On Trial not less than two years.

- b) That beginning June 1964 candidates under thirty years of age be required to complete the B.D., or an equivalent degree, before admission into Full Connection. (Note Standing Rule XIII-1, p. 268, JOURNAL '61.)
- c) That candidates for Admission On Trial from other conferences shall also be recommended by a District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications of the Florida Annual Conference.

Guidance Program

2. AUTHORIZE the Commission on World Service and Finance to allocate \$500.00 to the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications as the initial step toward instituting a program of psychological guidance for candidates for the ministry. Many seminaries and several annual conferences have already found such programs to be very effective in helping the candidate better to understand himself and his role as a minister. Our sub-committee during the past year has studied plans in other conferences and denominations, examined the screening and guidance procedures of our general Board of Missions, and conferred with that Board's professional consultant in our region. We now need professional guidance in formulating a program designed to meet the growing and specific needs of our own Conference.

The proposed program would then be reviewed with our Bishop and the Cabinet and presented to the Annual Conference of 1963 for its approval. Such a program would be diagnostic and interpretative with no responsibility for therapy to be assumed by the Conference. While the screening benefits of such a program could prevent great embarrassments to the Church through early detection of deviations and unacceptable patterns of response to stress, its major contribution would lie in the enhanced selfunderstanding by the candidate of his motives and methods in the ministry. The Board, without a dissenting vote, strongly urges this initial step.

One Per Cent Plan

3. ADOPTION of the Plan of Operation set forth in Report Number 2 for administering scholarships and grants-in-aid monies accruing from the Southeastern Jurisdictional Fund for Ministerial Education (One Per Cent Plan); and authorizing our Board to issue requisitions against the Annual Conference's portion of such funds held by our Conference Treasurer.

Pastor's School

In addition to these major recommendations, we submit two minor requests:

4. That the date for Pastor's School be set for October 8-12, 1962.

Date of Annual Conference

5. That the Bishop and Cabinet reconsider the dates of the Annual Conference in relation to the work of this Board. Members of the Board are quite willing to meet several days including the Sunday prior to the opening of Conference to interview and process candidates. But the candidates are then taking examinations or being graduated from seminaries and they can't be here. The result is that members of this Board simply cannot attend most of the sessions. After a year or so we feel out of touch within our own Conference.

THE BOARD of Ministerial Training and Qualifications wishes most sincerely to express its very real appreciation to Bishop Henley and each member of his Cabinet for helpful guidance and unfailing support in the formulation and administration of our policies. Similarly, we are indebted to the Commission on World Service and Finance for its endorsement of the One Per Cent Plan and courteous co-operation as we have wrestled with inescapable budgetary expenses. We deeply appreciate the way in which the Conference has understood and supported our efforts to uphold a worthy standard for its membership.

REPORT NO. 2

One Per Cent Plan

Ι

Mandate: Discipline 1960: Par. 670 Sec. 2; JOURNAL, 1961, p. 161, 189, Report No. 11, Commission on World Service and Finance.

II

The Plan

- Source of Funds: local church voluntary contributions on suggested basis of one per cent of its general budget exclusive of building funds, remitted to the Annual Conference treasurer.
- Use of Funds: one-half goes to Candler and Duke seminaries on a proportionate basis of enrollment; the other half provides scholar-ships and grants-in-aid for Florida Conference ministerial students.

III

Eligibility

1. Eligibility:

Ministerial students of Florida Conference churches:

- a) Enrolled in Candler or Duke seminaries, or other institutions approved as special cases by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.
- b) Pre-enrolled in Candler or Duke seminaries while attending Florida Southern College or other institution approved as special cases by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.
- c) High School graduates pre-enrolled in colleges as ministerial seminary dean, or his college's director of guidance. students.
- d) License to preach is a prerequisite.

IV

Administration of the Plan

- 1. Applications:
 - a) To be in the hands of the Committee by 15 January of each year. Applications received after 15 January will be given consideration if funds are still available. Awards of funds will be announced by 15 March so that students can make their plans for June or September enrollment.
 - b) Must be accompanied by letters of recommendation from the applicant's District Superintendent and from his pastor or his seminary dean, or his college's director of guidance.
 - c) Must be accompanied, after the applicant's freshman year in college by a transcript of college or seminary credits.
 - d) Must be made each year as aid is granted only on a yearly basis.
- 2. Service Obligation:
 - a) Students receiving scholarships or grants-in-aid are under obligation to serve the Florida Conference in Full Connection for not less than four years, except in cases which the Board may determine extraordinary. Recipients will be asked to sign a note which is automatically cancelled at completion of the term of service.
- 3. Priorities:

Scholarships or grants-in-aid are designed to release students from the necessity of heavy outside responsibilities so that they can devote themselves more fully to their studies. Grants-in-aid funds should not be regarded as salary supplements for students serving pastoral charges. The number and amounts will be determined each year on the basis of funds available.

- To further this purpose, assistance will be provided in the following order of priorities:
 - a) Full Support Scholarships on a basis of demonstrated academic accomplishment to ministerial students who desire to devote full time to their studies. Students receiving such scholarships will agree not to engage in other remunerative employment.
 - b) Supplemental Grants-in-aid:
 - (1) To seminarians (who do not apply for or receive full support scholarships) on a basis of scholarship, need, other financial resources and needs of other applicants; and
 - (2) to pre-theological students on the same bases, and to those participating in approved "on-the-job-training" programs.
 - c) Emergency grants in situations clearly unusual as determined by the Board.

v

Rules of the Committee

- 1. All expenses of the Fund for Ministerial Education will be borne by the Fund.
- 2. A reserve of \$5,000.00 shall be kept each 15 March for emergency cases and operating expenses.
- 3. No grants will be made until the money is available. To assure this

program, funds will accumulate one year to be used the following year.

- 4. All monies, except emergency grants or those directed specifically by the Committee will be sent to the School for application to the student's account or disbursement to him.
- 5. The ratio of distribution of funds between scholarships and grantsin-aid, and between seminarians and pre-theological students shall be determined by the Committee.
- 6. A local church may designate the Annual Conference portion of its giving to the plan to a particular student whose application has been approved by the Committee.
- approved by the Committee.7. The Committee will confer with the seminaries and colleges in determining the amount of scholarship or grant-in-aid needed by the student.
- 8. Membership of the Committee shall be:
 - a) Ex-officio with vote: the Bishop, the Chairman of the Board and the Registrar of the Board of Ministerial Training.
 - b) Two members from the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, one of whom shall be chairman and one of whom shall be secretary of the Committee.
 - c) One member from the Cabinet selected by the Cabinet.
 - d) One member from the Board of Education named by that body.
 - e) Quorum: any four members shall be a quorum.
- 9. The Committee for the Southeastern Jurisdictional Fund for Ministerial Education shall be a standing Committee of the Conference Board of Ministerial Qualifications and Training with power to requisition its funds from the Conference Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

April, 1962

The Florida Conference Historical Society is aware of the tragic losses of archival and other precious material from institutional and historical libraries, annual conference, district conference, and local churches, and we express the following concerns:

- 1. The need for the preservation of the manuscript and printed records of the annual conference, district conferences, and local churches. In particular, as our conference is a growing one, we will need the pictorial and written records of the newly organized churches. There is little in the archives of the Florida Conference Historical Society about churches organized since 1944.
- 2. The need, since there are frequent changes in the membership of the Historical Society, to recognize the contribution of Florida Southern College in providing the Historical Society with a protected depository and the assistance of trained librarians to catalogue and shelve our materials.
- **3.** The need in the Florida Conference for the adequate training of the ministers in their responsibility as custodians of the official records of their churches and the deposit of historical records

(not necessary for the present use of the local churches) in the archives at Florida Southern College. Records kept in the local church should be stored, when possible, in fireproof housing.

We propose to issue a certificate to each church on their 25th, 50th, 75th and 100th anniversaries. These awards are to be presented each year at the Annual Conference. We are giving certificates to the following churches: Davenport, 50 years; Swain Memorial in Jacksonville, 75 years; and Chiefland, 100 years.

We recognize the following for sending in historical material during the year: Wesley Methodist, Miami; Leona Methodist, Live Oak; Plantation, Fort Lauderdale; Tamiami in Miami; Carol City in Miami; Coral Way, Miami; First Methodist, Kissimmee; Miami Methodist Ministerial Association; First Methodist, Plant City; Curlew in Palm Harbor; Davenport; Swain Memorial, Jacksonville; Chiefland; First Methodist, Winter Park; and the following ministers: C. T. Howes, Dr. Ira Barnett, Dr. Garfield Evans, Dr. P. M. Boyd, and Bishop A. J. Moore.

We plan to present a copy of the book "Trail of the Florida Circuit Rider" to each new man being admitted on trial to the Florida Conference at the 1962 session. 24 copies of the book were presented last year.

We plan to continue interviewing retired members of the conference and to make tape recordings of their statements concerning the early history of the conference. We began this program of tape recordings at our annual meeting last year.

The Florida Conference Historical Society was represented by three delegates at the Junaluska Historical meeting last July. They were Robert H. Carr, O. C. Howell, and John A. Briley. We plan to be represented again this year.

We recommend to each local church the practice of observing an annual homecoming celebration as a method of dramatizing the history of the church.

We are asking the District Superintendents to encourage their churches to file with us their histories and pictures. There are 200 churches that have not given us material. We would like to have the District Conference books filed with us. Church histories, writings of pastors, books, photographs and bulletins of historical value should be directed to the Curator of the Society, Gordon N. Craig, 1401 S.W. 8th Street, Miami, Florida.

We are requesting that the Conference approve the sum of \$475 to carry on our work this next year. The proposed budget is: \$200 for filing cabinets to house our collections in the Florida Southern College Library; \$25 for Junaluska expense; \$25 for postage; \$25 for annual meeting; \$25 for purchase of the "Circuit Rider"; \$100 for library services, and \$50 for tapes for recordings, and \$25 for printing.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

This has been the year of "Our United Witness." Each of the following reports will reflect the great contribution this program has made to the Florida Annual Conference.

Adult Work

A forward step has been taken in the field of Adult Work in making provision for a part-time Conference Director of Adult Work for the year, 1962-63. This responsibility is being added to the work of our Conference Director of Student Work, looking toward the time when we can have a full-time conference director in each of these two fields.

A Conference Council on Adult Work has been held this year and the Annual Older Adult Conference took place May 8-11, 1962 at the Youth Camp.

A Coaching Conference on the courses: "Understanding Adults" and "Helping Adults Learn" is being planned for November 12-14 in Lakeland. District Directors of Adult Work and a limited number of others will be selected to participate in this conference, looking toward getting at least two persons in each district certified to teach these courses in Christian Workers' Schools.

Youth Work

It is a pleasure to report that the Florida Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship continues to lead The Methodist Church in youth membership gains, but this is small satisfaction with so many youth outside the church. Our Christian Witness is of utmost importance. Two new conference MYF projects this year were an outstanding success: 1. The Florida MYF UN-Washington Seminar and, 2. The Florida MYF School of Sex Morals.

Youth Rallies were conducted on a new basis, this year, with each district planning and presenting its own Rally and the conference youth office cooperating as requested.

The 1961 summer youth program was outstanding. 4,487 youth and adults participated in the Jr. High Camps and Senior Assemblies, during which 1,019 campers registered a first commitment for Christ, 271 made decisions to join the church and 67 made a first commitment for a church-related vocation.

Plans for new and exciting additions to our summer youth program

will go into effect this summer, when for the first time we will conduct small-group "rustic" camping for a limited number of Jr. Highs. Another first is our Music Workshop for Seniors and Older Youth, which will be held at Florida Southern College, in cooperation with the Florida Chapter of NAFOMM.

Improvements at the Youth Camp include a chain-link fence which completely encloses the main camp area East of the paved road, a new freezing room to facilitate the refrigeration needs of our kitchen, a fine public address system installed in the chapel (a memorial gift), a new piano and several new portable blackboards. During the past eleven months, the camp has registered 11,878 overnight campers, and in our dining halls we have served 114,504 meals. Many youth groups and adult groups continue to help our camp by sending contributions for needed equipment and improvements.

The coming year has been designated the "Year of Churchmanship" in our youth program. Pastors and adult leaders are urged to join with youth in a deeper exploration of the place and meaning of the church in the life of youth today.

Children's Work

Due to the retirement of Miss Blanche Yeager, after eight years of very effective work as Conference Director of Children's Work, Mrs. Margaret Hollis will take over the responsibilities of this position in our Conference. Mrs. Hollis will come to her new task with a fine background of experience and training in the field of Children's Work.

A Children's Workers' Conference was held July 11-13, 1961, with 96 persons registered. The 8th Annual Children's Workers' Conference is scheduled for July 10-12, 1962, at Florida Southern College and First Church, Lakeland.

269 churches reported a total enrollment of 22,431 boys and girls and 5,716 teachers and leaders in Vacation Church Schools in the summer of 1961. Thirty-one Vacation Church School Institutes for training workers were set up for the spring of 1962. In our Christian Workers' Schools this year, 859 enrolled in classes for children's workers with 744 receiving course cards of recognition. 197 enrolled in some type of laboratory class and 154 course cards were given. Within the past year 14 accreditations were issued to people in our Conference to teach **courses in the Children's** Division. Reports from 14 churches conducting some type of camping with Juniors were received with a total of 422 boys and girls and 108 leaders participating.

Family Life

The Conference Board Committee on Family Life has plans under way for a Conference-wide Family Life Conference to be held at the Youth Camp, Leesburg, September 1-3. Attendance at The Fourth National Conference on Family Life, October 19-21, 1962, Chicago, is being promoted. Also, the Committee is looking toward arranging for a Family Life emphasis at the 1963 Annual Conference and the 1963 Pastors' School.

Student Work

Beginning with the new Conference year Miss Eulalie Ginn will be a full-time employee of the Board of Education as Conference Director of Student Work and Adult Work with headquarters in Lakeland. Due to the very rapid developments within our State in the area of higher education and also taking into account the great need for a conference worker in the adult field, your Conference Board feels strongly that just as soon as possible this dual responsibility should be carried by two full-time staff members instead of one.

The Board is happy to report three property purchases that have been made this year. (1) A large dwelling suitable for housing the Wesley Foundation at Stetson; (2) A parsonage for the associate director of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Florida; (3) Jointly with the West Palm Beach District Board of Missions and Church Extension 4.15 acres of land at Boca Raton as a future site for a Wesley Foundation—University Church.

In our plans for the Conference Year, 1962-63, is the employment of a full-time Wesley Foundation Director to serve the University of South Florida and the University of Tampa.

General Church School Work

The annual meeting of the Conference Council and of the Board Committee on General Church School Work was held in Tampa last October. Plans were made for a Conference-wide Conference for Local Church School Administrators to be held at the Youth Camp, Leesburg, October 26-28, 1962.

There are 52 persons working professionally in the field of Christian Education in local churches in our Conference. This fine and valuable group functions as an organization in our Conference through "The Association of Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants."

Our Conference also has a Chapter of the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians. This group sponsors an annual Church Music Workshop on the conference level and one or more music workshops in each of our districts.

Leadership Training

Seventy-four Leadership Education Enterprises have been held this year (45 Second Series Schools, 3 First Series Schools, 25 Laboratory Schools, 1 WSCS Conference School of Missions). A total of 6,055 credits were given in these schools.

The conference visual-aids library has 1,006 bookings and the money received on rentals is used to improve the library and its services. A new visual aids catalogue was gotten out this year and a copy mailed to each church.

Georgia Seagle Trust and Cooperative

All business properties of the Georgia Seagle Trust in Gainesville, for which the Board of Education is trustee, are in good condition. Georgia Seagle Hall, occupied by "worthy young men students at the University of Florida," has been in need of considerable repair. The cost of repairing and renovation was carefully studied and the amount estimated for getting the job done was around \$65,000.00. The trustees of the Board of Education, after much deliberation, voted to sell the present hall, obtain a new location nearer the University and erect a new and more modern structure to house the Georgia Seagle Cooperative. The Trustees also voted to close the cooperative for the 1962-63 school year during which the new building is to be erected.

Recommendations

- 1. We recommend the following with regard to Christian Higher Education:
 - (a) That Education Specials again be continued according to the present pattern, and that the formula of \$1.40 per member be used only in determining the goal of the Annual Conference.
 - (b) That contributions to the Jurisdictional 1% Plan not be included in figuring the conference goal of \$1.40 per member.
 - (c) That \$120,000.00 be set as the minimum goal in 1962-63 for Education Specials to be divided as follows: Florida Southern College \$90,000.00, Wesley Foundations \$25,000.00, and other colleges \$5,000.00 (Wesleyan and Bethune-Cookman), and that the \$120,000.00 be divided among the districts by the Cabinet and every effort be made by the District Superintendents to have this amount raised through local church budgets on the basis of "interest and ability."
 - (d) In considering the conference goal of \$1.40 per member for Christian Higher Education, undesignated Education Specials for Higher Education shall be divided for colleges and student work according to the formula (71.43% for colleges and 28.57% for Wesley Foundations). The Conference Treasurer shall divide the college portion among the three schools according to the specified percentages. The Student Work Committee shall divide the Wesley Foundation funds.
- 2. In view of the fact that two excellent camp sites in most desirable locations have been lost during the past year for lack of authorization and funds to enter into contract for their purchase, we recommend that the Conference authorize the Board of Education to purchase, when suitable sites become available, no more than two camp sites, one to serve the northern part of the Conference, and one to serve the southern part of the Conference. We further petition the Conference to allow the Board of Education to borrow sufficient funds from the Conference Loan Fund to secure such properties when and if they become available.
- 3. We recommend a continuation of the special emphasis on "Evangelism Through the Church School." (See Joint Report of Boards of Education and Evangelism.)
- 4. We recommend that Church School Rally Day be observed Sunday, September 23, and that a special offering be received in accordance with provisions of the *Discipline*, and remittances made to the Conference Treasurer.
- 5. We recommend that September 30 be observed as Church School Sunday and that Church School officers and teachers be given recognition on this day.
- 6. We recommend the observance of the following Special Days and Weeks and urge that the causes represented be presented adequately in each local church regardless of whether or not a special offering is received:

Race Relations Day Children's Day National Family Week

JOINT REPORT, BOARDS OF EDUCATION AND EVANGELISM

"OUR UNITED WITNESS"

- I. Your Boards of Education and Evangelism in evaluating "Our United Witness" program, wish to make the following observations:
 - (1) The Conference School of Evangelism held on January 11, 1962 was well attended with every district adequately represented and an enthusiastic response to the program was in evidence. The representatives from the two General Boards supplied us with outstanding leadership.
 - (2) The Sub-District Schools of Evangelism gave to the program the power and strength to branch out into the local church. The district superintendents did a most excellent job with their District Staffs in presenting the program. There were some 70 sub-district schools held throughout the Conferencereaching every church.
 - (3) We are grateful to our district superintendents for their fine cooperation in the project.
 - (4) The filmstrip was written and produced by Rev. David J. Cathcart—to him goes the credit for the success of this. Also working with him was Rev. Robert Gisler.
 - (5) The necessary mechanics of the program have produced some lasting beneficial results in many of our churches: (a) In putting church school rolls in order, (b) by alerting church schools to their evangelistic potential, (c) by stimulating visitation programs within church school classes, (d) by making church and church school aware of their inter-relatedness (e) in the keeping of the wall charts, church schools were able to see weak spots that needed strengthening.
 - (6) While accurtte figures are not available from the entire conference on the tangible results of the program, incomplete reports are encouraging and in the annual conference report we hope to see some highly satisfying results.

(6) While accurate figures are not available from the entire continuing interest in this program of "Evangelism through the Church School" will help the local church in meeting its main responsibility of winning persons to Christ. With this in mind we feel that the Conference through the leadership of our Bishop and District Superintendents will find value in continuing this program by:

 Encouraging the Commissions on Evangelism and Education to hold a joint meeting in the fall to plan a cooperative program.

- (2) Encouraging each local church school to hold "An Annual School for Evangelistic Teaching" in January or February (or any time that seems best in a local situation).
- (3) Encouraging regular class visitation to follow up absentees, recruit new members, and to visit prospective church members.
- (4) Urging the Conference to cooperate with the 1962-63 (and continuing) Jurisdictional Program of "Emphasis on Evangelism through the Church School."

REPORT OF FLORIDA SOUTHERN COLLEGE

Support for Florida Southern College from the Florida Annual Conference increased from \$48,000 in 1957 to \$129,000 in 1961. If the present rate of income continues approximately \$153,000 will be reported for 1962. This represents an increase in the average annual support from $24\frac{1}{2}\phi$ per member in 1957 to 59 ϕ per member in 1962.

A careful survey in 1957 determined that by 1961 the College would need approximately \$250,000 annually from the Conference. The Conference adopted a program designed to reach this goal. A little over half the goal was reached in 1961.

Failure to reach the goal for church support threatens the continued existence of the College. No college of quality can operate on student income alone. Last year Florida Southern College received 83% of its income from tuition and fees. This is one of the highest figures among all Methodist colleges, where the average is 59.2%. It is generally held that no more than 60% should be realized from student fees and some of our Methodist colleges receive less than 40% from such fees.

An amount equivalent to the income from students should be devoted to *instruction*. Florida Southern College was able to devote only 54% of its income from student fees to instruction and staff benefits.

Faculty salaries have had to lag. The heart of a college is its faculty. Without salaries that are somewhat competitive, no college can retain for very long its best faculty members. The recruiting of suitable replacements is very expensive and time consuming—if, indeed, replacements can be found at all.

Earlier this year when I said in a number of addresses that \$250,000 additional income was needed annually if the College was to survive, I may have been too conservative in my estimate. A total of \$313,330 is needed now for faculty salaries alone. It is urgent that plans be made for securing at least \$250,000 new money annually and immediately, and that the amount be doubled before the end of this quadrennium. If we reach this goal with the Methodists of Florida providing every cent of it, we would still be below what Methodists in some states are *now* doing.

Of the Gifts, Grants, and Endowment approximately \$125,000 came from Church sources. While this represents a substantial increase from \$48,000 in 1957, it leaves the College without sufficient resources to operate the kind of college the Methodist Church expects and demands.

No qualified male student was denied admission for lack of space. However, a number of qualified women were denied admission for lack of space, even though room for about 70 additional women was created by rebuilding residence halls.

We had a total of 47 more applications than last year and accepted 69 more students. This year 73% of those accepted indicated their intention to enroll, while last year the number had been only 70%. A larger percentage than usual of the upper-classmen returned; a higher percentage than usual of those accepted indicated their intention to enroll; and a smaller percentage than usual of those expected to register did not. These changes in percentages accounted for about two-thirds of the increase in the total number of students. Detailed information is given below.

The total number of Florida applicants who indicated Methodist membership or preference declined from 325 to 295. This year 35%of our Florida applicants were Methodists. A total of 86% of the Florida Methodist applicants were accepted in comparison with an overall figure of 74%. The total number of Florida students among the freshmen increased by 38 but the number of Florida Methodists among these students remained exactly the same.

The number of Florida Methodist Churches represented among the applicants decreased from 141 to 127, and of the new students enrolled 96 are affiliated with the Methodist Church in Florida. The following tables give detailed information about applications from Methodists, particularly Florida Methodists.

The full-time student enrollment increased by 91. Boarding students increased by 115 while day students decreased by 24. Last year the decrease in day students was 128. Continued decrease in day students is expected. The number of boarding men increased by 48, while boarding women increased by 67. The number of male day students decreased by 22, while women day students decreased by 2.

The number of students from other countries, other than the United States, continues to decline. We have 15 this year compared with 19 last year and 22 the year before. The enrollment by states reveals that the number of students from each of these states increased: Georgia, Indiana, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Virginia. The number of students from Kentucky, New Jersey, and Illinois declined.

The number of Methodists increased from 632 to 694. The only other major religious groups to make appreciable increases were the Presbyterians, who increased from 219 to 245, and the Episcopalians increased from 140 to 178.

Educational Specials continue to be a valuable source of income. Detailed information below shows that this source produced \$46,277.16 last year. This represents an increase of \$18,024.06 over the preceding year. About one-third of the total raised was for financial assistance to students. A total of 224 churches had Educational Specials for Florida Southern. Previous year was 165. For the first eleven months of the Conference's fiscal year \$54,273.79 has been sent through the Conference Treasurer as Educational Specials, which is an increase of \$23,187.28 over the same period in 1960-61.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

The Board of Christian Social Concerns is continuing its efforts to work as a Conference Board and to make suggestions for the use of local church Commissions. Our interest is to implement the work of our church in the areas of social concerns where the Methodist Church has been traditionally involved.

In doing our work we feel that part of the problems Christians face is due to ignorance—that undesirable situations exist because people are not sufficiently aware of their nature. For this reason we believe that information and education are necessary—and we urge Florida Methodists to study and circulate information from our church and from other responsible sources in dealing with situations in which Christians should be concerned.

However, we believe that mere ignorance is not the major part of the problems we confront. The major part of these problems is evil —in men's hearts and in the world—and it is against this evil that we must work. This is why we choose not to regard ourselves primarily as an "information agency" or as a "social action society" but as an arm of the Church of Jesus Christ. Only the Church can deal with the depths of our problems, for here we are dealing with sin and redemption, with the power of God to remake the human soul and to use it in rebuilding the world. It is from this perspective that we seek work, and we need your continued prayers and other support.

Temperance and General Welfare

W. W. Roughton, Vice-Chairman

In acute awareness of the complexity and interrelatedness of the social problems of our day, we submit that it is the personal responsibility of individual Methodist Christians to initiate specific action in particular areas of concern.

The seriousness of the alcohol problem has shown a steady increase in recent years. There is a great need for expanded and improved rehabilitation efforts. Rehabilitation alone is not, however, the answer. There is a critical need for a strong and effective program of prevention. We wholeheartedly endorse the traditional Methodist policy of personal total abstinence. We believe the policy of total abstinence is the most effective and intelligent means currently known for the prevention of alcoholism and other alcohol-related problems. We highly commend active support by the conference, local churches, and individuals, of the work of United Christian Action and Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc., with headquarters at 1705 Gary Road, Lakeland, Florida. We urge local communities to avail themselves of the services of these organizations with particular reference to local schools, churches, and courts. We alert Methodist peoples to urge their state legislators to vote support for the bill, to be introduced again in the next session of the Florida State Legislature, to remove the sale of beer and wine from grocery stores and drug stores. We recommend that all churches participate in the observance of Commitment Sunday.

We cannot expect our people to have a responsible Christian concern about this or any other social welfare problem, unless they are reliably informed about the seriousness of the specific problems confronting us.

We must all feel a very real personal responsibility for the reduction of the more than 1,200 yearly traffic fatalities on Florida highways.

The local church commission on Christian Social Concerns shares with the commission on Education local community concern for the senior citizens in areas of fellowship, recreation, and creative social outlets.

It is estimated that by 1970 every tenth adult will have required professional help for mental illness. The local church has real opportunity and responsibility to provide understanding of therapeutic outlets for the emotionally tense and disturbed.

Continual and unrelenting alertness regarding distribution and sale of pornographic literature is yet required.

Gambling continues as a serious and aberrant social practice, whether legal or illegal. The Methodist Christian is called upon to initiate active effort to control and curb this malignant force.

We urge the use of an excellent unit on "Gambling and the Church" which has been reprinted from "Adult Student," that there may be a wider understanding of the Christian principles related to this problem.

The Pastor and local commission on Christian Social Concerns carry a major responsibility for providing our congregations with reliable information and study opportunities that will stimulate earnest thought and intelligent Christian action. We commend the use of the splendid leaflets, booklets, and visual aids which are available from the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, 100 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington 2, D.C.

Peace and World Order

E. F. Carwithen, Vice-Chairman

WHAT DOES GOD WANT US TO DO ABOUT PEACE AND WORLD ORDER? Shall we build dream castles or shall we start digging to lay foundations? As long ago as Isaiah's day a warless society was envisioned, and men dreamed of beating their swords into plowshares. We challenge the Florida Conference to dream Peace and World Order, to talk Peace and World Order, and to labor together for Peace and World Order. It may be that we will need to work as those who built the Second Temple; a trowel in one hand and a sword in the other; but the Temple was built! We believe God wants Peace and World Order and that He can and will accomplish it through those who surrender to His will.

Suggestions to Local Commissions on Christian Social Concerns

A. PREPARING ATTITUDES

- 1. EXPECTATIONS. Peace and World Order are desirable and attainable. Desirable because the attainment is good and the apparent alternative is annihilation. Attainable as evidenced in the reality of The United States and the existence of regional associations of sovereign nations.
- 2. DEMANDS. Peace and World Order will require the dealing with deep seated convictions and time honored practices. Isolationism, blind nationalism, and arrogant militarism as well as selfishness, greed, and beastiality obstruct fulfillment.
- **3.** FULFILLMENT. Peace and World Order will be obtained as the result of God's guidance accompanied by human dedication and sacrifice.

B. PREPARATION FOR ACTION

- 1. Organize the Committee for Peace and World Order within the Commission on Christian Social Concerns with qualified leaders.
- 2. Use the Manual for the Commission.
- 3. Use The Methodist Story.
- 4. Use Concern-A Copy for each member.
- 5. Use filmstrip "A New King of Building." Rental \$1.00, Box 78, Lakeland.

C. ACCOMPLISH MINIMAL GOALS

- 1. This One Thing—Do! RACE FOR PEACE! The arms race can destroy us without a shot being fired. The alternative must be made known and supported. Therefore each church is asked to
 - a. Participate in a District Preparation Training Institute.
 - b. Initiate the program in the local church by conducting Covenant Sunday at a morning church service when opportunity will be given to each person to pledge to study, witness, work, pray and pay for peace. It is suggested that

World Order Sunday (4th Sunday of October) or World Peace Sunday (November 5th) be used for this purpose.

- c. Conduct a study of "None Shall Make Them Afraid" by Rodney Shaw. This MUST book is a simple and clear analysis of the principles and problems of disarmament from the Christian point of view supporting the stand of the Methodist General Conference and the United States government for safeguarded world disarmament.
- 2. OBSERVE
 - a. Trick or Treat for UNICEF (Oct. 31st)
 - b. Human Rights Day (December 10, 1948)
- 3. Make use of part of the Christmas season as an opportunity to emphasize world brotherhood.
- 4. Disseminate information of the accomplishments of the United Nations.
- 5. Disseminate information regarding the position of the Methodist Church with regard to war, armaments, and military service.

D. EXPAND THE PROGRAM TO INCLUDE

- 1. Sponsor United Nations, Foreign Policy and Overseas Seminars. (Methodist U.N. Office, 345 E. 46th St., N.Y. 17, N.Y.)
- 2. Cooperate in setting up District Workshops and Rallies.
- 3. Write letters to political leaders, newspapers, magazines, and individuals expressing deliberated opinions and sharing pertinent information.
- 4. Arrange conferences with leaders to discuss previously determined specific situations.
- 5. Organize local church or community Peace Research Teams, American Associations for the United Nations, Great Decision Study Groups.
- 6. Circulate timely pamphlets and books such as FREEDOM FROM WAR, The State Department NONE SHALL MAKE THEM AFRAID, Rodney Shaw TOWARD A SCIENCE OF PEACE, Theodore Lentz CAN SCIENCE SAVE US? George Lundberg MAY MAN PREVAIL, Eric Fromm THE PEACE RACE, Seymour Melman
- 7. Cooperate in General Board programs such as the Race for Peace, Disarmament Agency, Methodist Building at the United Nations.
- 8. Use the film "Can Disarmament Work" (13 minutes, Rental \$1.00, Box 78, Lakeland)

In the coming year your committee on Peace and World Order of the Conference Board will endeavor to provide program assistance and qualified leadership and speakers; training conferences, mass meetings, District Directors Meetings, suggestions of available literature, exhibits, and respond to any call for assistance.

It is understood that all these efforts will be attempted in the Spirit of our Master and undergirded by continuous prayer.

Human Relations and Economic Affairs

W. A. WICKER, Vice-Chairman

I. The Challenge of Communism:

Mr. William C. Sullivan, Chief Investigator for the FBI, points out the dangers of Communism in our society when he said, "Communists completely reject a belief in God, in morals derived from religious principles and in the immortality of the soul. They explain religion as merely a mass of age-old superstitions. Religion, Communists claim, is used by 'predatory capitalists' to hold the masses in abject subjugation." Mr. Sullivan continues by saying, "Thus, Communism is the antithesis of religion, being implacably and inevocably opposed to religion on both philosophical and practical grounds. Communist antagonism toward religion is so deep-seated that it manifests itself against all religious beliefs and all forms of worship, whether they be Protestant, Catholic, Jewish or any other.

For tactical reasons, Communists have included American religious leaders and groups among their targets for penetration. They recognize that in the United States Communism must be built with the help of non Communist hands. To gain this support and to extend its influence, the Communist Party, USA, ceaselessly strives to maintain and further its contact with all segments of our society." With such a threat to our society, many of our people find themselves frustrated by the apparent complacency evidenced by a large segment of our Church society. Thus frustrated, they are tempted to ally themselves with extremists groups which often bring a person into basic conflict with his church.

Your Conference Board stands with the General Conference program which urges church groups (1) to engage in basic study of the nature of Communism and its threat to Christian values and democratic institutions, and (2) to study the social imperatives of the Christian faith, the church's approach to social problems, and its efforts to meet the needs of people, and to forestall the spread of Communism.

With this in mind, we again quote from Mr. Sullivan as he says, "The truth of the matter is that the Communist Party, USA, has not achieved any substantial success in exerting domination, control, or influence over America's clergymen or religious institutions on a national scale. There can be no question as to the loyalty of the overwhelming majority of the American clergy to our nation and the fact that they have been among the most consistent and vigorous opponents of Communism."

- II. Your Conference Board has created a standing committee to study the problem of Communism which will help to guide our people into a constructive study program.
- III. We are seeking to implement the stand of our General Conference through the adoption of the following recommendation and program:
 - 1. We recommend that a series of meetings be held on an interjurisdictional basis in Florida, to which selected ministers, laymen and laywomen from the Florida Conferences (SEJ-CJ) shall be invited.

- 2. We recommend that a committee be appointed and charged with the oversight of this project. This committee shall plan, publicize, and conduct these meetings. The lists of those to be invited to the meetings shall be prepared by the committee and the Bishops of the two Conferences. The committee shall be made up of appointees from the Boards of Christian Social Concerns and from the Woman's Society of Christian Service Committees on Christian Social Relations of the two Conferences.
- 3. We recommend the Annual Conference approval of this proposed program be sought by the respective Boards and Committees at the next succeeding meetings of the Conferences.
- 4. We recommend that until they are replaced or added to, the membership of this committee from the Florida Conference (SEJ) be made up of Hoyt Tatum, W. A. Wicker, R. T. Mann, and W. B. Rutland. We also suggest that the Chairman of the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes be included in this membership.
- IV. In light of our historic position concerning Separation of Church and State, we recognize the recommendation of the General Conference in behalf of Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State. As in all areas, we ask our Florida Methodists to study carefully all the issues involved before becoming a part of the program.
- V. We suggest that the Commission on Christian Social Concerns of local churches in Florida use the program guides and recommendations made in the Conference report of 1961, p. 181. We would also recommend that local churches supply copies of CONCERN to all commission members.
- VI. The Migrant Worker. We have adopted the following resolution: WHEREAS The Methodist Church historically has been concerned with the conditions of labor in general and, here with the conditions affecting the migrant labor; and,

WHEREAS, great strides have been made through the efforts of many concerned groups to improve the overall conditions of the workers; and,

WHEREAS, we also recognize that evil conditions still exist, and that conflicting viewpoints reflect on the one hand a description of extreme poverty and neglect of these people, and on the other hand reports of significant improvement in the overall condition of these people; and,

WHEREAS it behooves this Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns to ascertain the facts as nearly as possible and to make a definitive appraisal; now,

THEREFORE, we recommend that a study group be appointed by the Chairman of the Board, consisting of an equal number of ministers and laymen, to make a study during the Conference Year and report its findings to the Board prior to the 1963 session of the Florida Annual Conference.

VII. Your Board has established a committee to make for our Conference an appraisal of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.

- VIII. To keep the channels of communication open wide between Methodists, and to strengthen the bonds of fellowship in Christ which unite us, we recommend to our Bishop and his Cabinet that they invite to all future sessions of the Florida Annual Conference fraternal delegates from the Florida Conference of the Central Jurisdiction, and the C. M. E. Church, and a representative of Bethune-Cookman College.
 - IX. We reaffirm our support of the official position of the Methodist Church with regard to race as set forth in Social Creed, and urge that members of the Florida Conference work, under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, for the elimination of racial prejudice and discrimination in all areas of its influence.

SPECIAL RECOMMENDATIONS:

RESOLUTION ON PAYMENT OF APPORTIONMENT TO CON-FERENCE CLAIMANTS FUND

- WHEREAS there has been short payment of the 13½% apportionment for the Conference Claimants Fund by some churches in the Florida Conference, and
- WHEREAS the Conference Board of Pensions has not been keeping record of the shortages and notifying the ministers by statements in accordance with (Par. 1624.4), our conference cannot file claim for any amount due from ministers leaving the Florida Conference, and
- WHEREAS the minister is responsible to adjust his cash salary and the payment according to the proper ratio in accordance with (Par. 1624.3), which reads as follows:

"The treasurer of the pastoral charge shall be primarily responsible for the application of Section 1 of this paragraph; but in the event of his failure to apply it, the pastor shall adjust his cash salary and the payment according to the proper ratio, as provided above, before he enters the respective amounts in his statistical report to the Annual Conference. And, on retirement, amounts in default shall be deducted from his annuity as provided in 1634.1."

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

We authorize the Conference Board of Pensions to render a statement annually, beginning June 1, 1962, to all ministers of the conference who have failed to observe the provisions of this paragraph, indicating the amounts in default. Copies thereof to be sent to the clearinghouse of the General Board, and the information contained thereon to be recorded upon the service records of the individual ministers concerned.

REPORT OF MINISTER'S RESERVE PENSION FUND SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Pertinent facts with respect to modifications of the Pension Program of the Florida Conference:

- 1. The current income pension program, which includes all present members of the Conference, will probably involve a 50% increase in pension responsibility during the next 30 years
 - a. Increasing from approximately 4,480 service years to 6,680 annuity responsibility years by 1991.
 - b. Continuing the present pension program only will probably continue indefinitely this situation—an upward trend.
- 2. The most feasible modification of the present program appears to be a "New Entrant" Ministers Reserve Pension Fund Program:

- a. Present membership continue under the present program.
- b. Ministers who are received into the conference in the future would have their pensions funded.
- c. A new entrant program would accomplish transition to Ministers Reserve Pension Fund for all active ministers within 35 to 40 years.
- 3. An alternative program, which would make a complete transition to Ministers Reserve Pension Fund immediately, would involve the funding of all accrued pension obligation on account of prior service, This accrued obligation, at \$70.00 per year of service would cost approximately \$7,700,000.
 - a. This could be financed as follows:
 - 1. A down-payment equal to 10% of the total accrued obligation.
 - 2. Amortization of the balance liability over a 30 year period. b. The financing of the pension program would then involve—
 - 1. Payment of the annual amortization cost of unfunded pension liability.
 - 2. Payment of a contribution annually on behalf of each qualified minister equal to 9% of the average salary of the Conference.
- 4. Plan 3 appears to be beyond the financial ability of the Conference presently, we therefore recommend:

New Entrant Program

RECOMMENDATION

That the New Entrants (1643:11) admitted on trial at the Annual Conference session of 1963 and those admitted thereafter, together with new members received by transfer who qualify (1643:3) shall be entered into membership of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of The Methodist Church in accordance with Disciplinary provisions (1642-1655) and General Board rules and regulations of the Fund.

That to establish and maintain such membership, the Annual Conference shall contribute to the Fund annually on behalf of each qualified new entrant a sum equal to 9% of the "average salary" of the conference (1645) and the new entrant shall contribute annually a sum equal to 3% of the "average salary," or "support" if "support" is less (1646:1).

That provisions for the annual contribution by the conference shall be made for the next ten years by an annual apportionment to the churches equal to 4.5% of ministers cash salaries, the money thus received to be deposited with the General Board of Pensions.

It is further understood and made a part of this recommendation:

- 1. That said 4.5% is an estimate of the annual level sum required to provide said Annual Conference contributions computed on the basis of 34 new entrants per year; an "average salary" of \$6,075; total cash salaries of \$2,259,979 and interest credited at 3% on unused balance.
- That said 4.5% apportionment may vary, therefore, in accordance with the variations in the aforementioned factors. (Based on Huggins & Company New Entrant Schedule for Florida Conference under date of March 10, 1961)

We consider the Board to be most fortunate in securing the services of Rev. J. H. Daniel as manager of our properties. We are to have his services in the coming year. He travels throughout the Conference inspecting our properties, taking pictures and visiting the occupants and he renders valuable service to the Board in advising us on sale, purchase and improvement of properties.

Each year we acquire suitable properties through gifts, partial payments, etc., and we dispose of those which no longer serve our needs from a practical standpoint.

Our financial report will show that we have received funds from our annual appropriation from Ten-in-one, from sale of properties, the sale of mortgages and from payments on mortgages and now have more than forty homes and apartments for occupancy by our retired preachers and widows. We request the continuance of the appropriation of \$8,000.00 from the Ten-in-one Offering.

We continue the policy of upgrading our properties. This will be ultimately achieved through a gradual program of disposing of old and inadequate houses as they become vacant and replace them with newer and more modern homes.

We call upon our pastors and lay people to be always alert to the possibility of encouraging Wills which will make our Board beneficiary. We believe that there are many people within the bounds of our Conference who would be glad to leave their homes for the occupancy of our retired preachers and widows.

REPORT OF TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

Our emphasis through the Town and Country Commission continues to be that of our entire Church: "Jesus Christ Is Lord." A delegation of six Florida pastors attended the Southeastern Town and Country Conference at Lake Junaluska, July, 1961. One of the outstanding speakers at that Conference was Dr. Earl D. C. Brewer of Candler School of Theology, Emory University. We are glad that we are able to have Dr. Brewer speak at our Florida Annual Conference Thursday, June 7, 1962.

The Mass Communications and the Church and Community Workshops at Candler School of Theology, Emory University were attended by eleven pastors of our Florida Conference last summer.

The "Church of the Year" Banquet sponsored by the Methodist Rural Fellowship in cooperation with the Town and Country Commission was held at Florida Southern College, The Commons, on Wednesday, June 6 at 5:30 P.M. At this banquet those churches selected for outstanding service were announced. There was two categories for recognition this year. One category was for Town and Country churches with a membership of 249 or less; the other category was for Town and Country Churches with a membership of between 250 and 500. This membership is considered as of the beginning of the Conference year. The area of our responsibility as a Town and Country Commission is for churches in communities of 10,000 or less population. Our goal as the Town and Country Commission is to help all the boards and agencies in our Conference to carry out their programs in our Town and Country churches in the most effective way. We appreciate the fine cooperation that we have received from our Bishop James W. Henley, the District Superintendents, the District Directors of Town and Country Work, and the boards and agencies of our Conference.

The Chairman and the Secretary of the Commission have met with the Committee of the Woman's Society of Christian Service having to do with the need for Church and Community workers in our Conference. Miss Polly Lassiter, our only Church and Community Worker at present, reported at our Commission meeting April 30th that our Woman's Society of Christian Service had requested five Church and Community Workers for the Florida Conference. It now looks as if we will receive three Church and Community workers in our Conference. The Florida Woman's Society of Christian Service will support their work.

Research as to the need for the possibility of a Credit Union in our Florida Conference has been carried on by John Bennion, a member of our commission, with the able assistance of Dr. R. C. Holmes. Our Commission felt that this idea of the Credit Union should be presented to the proper bodies for authorization and then presented at the Annual Conference if it met with their approval.

Work has begun on suggestions for parsonage standards. Copies of these will be available to the District Superintendents and pastors.

The 5th Quadrennial National Methodist Conference on the Church in Town and Country will be held on the University of Minnesota campus, Minneapolis, Minnesota, July 9-12, 1963. It is our aim to have a representative delegation from our Florida Conference attend this important meeting. The recommended delegation should be representative of the following: the Bishop; the District Superintendents; the Chairman and Secretary of the Annual Conference Town and Country Commission; the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service; the Executive Secretary of the following Conference agencies or a representative from each—Board of Christian Social Concerns, Board of Education, Board of Evangelism, Board of Lay Activities, Board of Hospitals and Homes, Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Board of Missions and Church Extension, and Commission on Christian Vocations; the Executive Committee of the Methodist Rural Fellowship; and all Church and Community workers in the Annual Conference.

REPORT OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES BOARD

The members of the Hospitals and Homes Board submit the following report of the year's activities and recommendations for the ensuing year.

We have loaned to the Miami District the sum of \$22,500.00 to assist them in purchasing land on which to build a nursing home at a future date.

We have agreed to loan \$20,000.00 to the Lakeland District for the preliminary work in establishing a home for the aged.

We have agreed to loan \$20,000.00 to the Jacksonville District to assist them until their home, to be known as Wesley Manor, is ready for occupancy.

The Board of Hospitals and Homes recommends that there be a closer tie of the various facilities in our Conference for the care of children and the elderly. We recognize that this Board serves in an advisory capacity only; however, we feel that we can better serve by having a closer relationship with the Homes in various Districts and all activities concerning children and retired persons coordinated.

It is recommended that a corporation be formed to be known as Hospitals and Homes Board of the Florida Methodist Conference, Inc. This Corporation to be authorized to handle all funds and property, both real and personal, that might be deeded or bequeathed to the Hospitals and Homes Board.

It is recommended that the Children's Home in Daytona Beach, known as Mother Hunts Orphanage, be taken over by a corporation, to be formed, consisting of not less than twelve and not more than eighteen Trustees. Half of these Trustees to be named by the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church of the Southeastern Jurisdiction and half by the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church of the Central Jurisdiction. This Children's Home shall be operated by the two Conferences, in the future under rules and regulations as set out by the appointed Trustees.

It is recommended that the pastor of each charge continue to use and continue to urge his Church School Officers to use the materials furnished by the Florida Methodist Children's Home in publicizing the 5th Sunday offerings for the Children's Home.

We recommend that the District Directors in each District study the needs for services in their areas that come under the supervision of this Board. We ask that they inform us of the needs and possibilities of filling such needs so that we might assist in every way possible in promoting this work.

REPORT NO. 2

Whereas: The officials of Mother Hunt's Orphanage of Daytona Beach, several years ago requested the Board of Hospitals and Homes take over the operation of said home and offered to deed us all the property they now own; and

Whereas: The Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Florida Annual Conference has made a thorough study of this institution during the past four years, both by a committee of its own members and representatives of the National Board of Hospitals and Homes: and

Whereas: The Board of Trustees of the Florida Methodist Children's Home has unanimously approved this project; and

Whereas: The Florida Conference of the Central Jurisdiction passed a similar resolution at their last meeting held last year in Ocala, Florida:

Therefore Be It Resolved:

1. That the Florida Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction join with the Florida Conference of the Central Jurisdiction in owning and administering the Mother Hunt's Orphanage, a home for Negro children located in Daytona Beach, Florida.

2. That in order to implement this resolution we establish in cooperation with the Florida Conference of the Central Jurisdiction a corporation, and that each participating Conference elect one half of the trustees of the said corporation; the total number of whom shall be not less than twelve and not more than eighteen.

3. That this Board of Trustees, which shall be amenable to and report annually to both participating conferences, be charged with full administrative responsibility for the holding, maintaining and operation of this institution.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF FLORIDA METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The first two children admitted to our Home in 1908, the year of its beginning, were rowed across Lake Monroe in a small boat by Dr. J. R. Cason. Their parents had come to Lakeland, Florida from Sweden, but had soon died, leaving two orphaned girls. Little did anyone dream that the day would come when in a single year 258 children would be clamoring at our door for admission to the program. Yet in this single year we have been officially requested to receive 258 children. Had it not been well known that we always have a long waiting list, many more children would have been referred to us. With the population of Florida increasing at such an astronomical rate, and with the establishment of so many new Methodist Churches across our state, one cannot imagine or project with any accuracy the vast number of boys and girls who will be looking to us for help in the immediate years ahead.

In 1908 our program was simple and uncluttered. Only full orphans were received into The Home. A farm and dairy provided much

of the food. No one had thought of casework services; of how many cubic feet of air space must be provided for each child; that 30, 40 or even 50 children were too many for one housemother to supervise. Sanitary inspectors did not come with any regularity, if at all. No fire marshall came to look into remote corners and test various sorts of safety equipment. The children were allowed to swim in natural springs, in lakes and rivers, to go barefoot without fear of pollution or intestinal parasites. It never occurred to anyone that a good Christian program in a large group setting was not the very best care for any child who must be away from his own home.

How different is the picture now. Only $\frac{1}{8}$ of 1% of children under 18 years of age are full orphans in the U. S. today. But 11% of all American families with children under 18 are broken families. Sanitary inspectors and engineers, fire marshalls, state consultants, mental health workers, caseworkers, physicians, dentists, specialists of many kinds stand looking across our shoulders to supervise every move. We have extended our program to include group care, foster boarding care, Mother's Aid, Adoptions, Casework and Groupwork Services, and many other types of service which must be given today's homeless child to fit him for living in today's complex society.

Sincere thanks are extended all the Methodist Churches of Florida for the fine financial support given this year. We have received a total from our churches of \$133,664.00. Many have reached or surpassed our goal of \$1.00 per member to be shared with the children of our Home. We are requesting that our Conference adopt the same plan of support used for many years. By this plan each church sends to the Home the entire offering received in The Church School on Fifth Sundays and Christmas, and the loose offering received in morning worship services on the same dates. While it is a low and humble goal for such a forward looking Conference, we are again suggesting the goal for giving of \$1.00 per member of each local church. We would like to point out that the South Carolina Conference gives \$1.50 per church member, and the Virginia Conference gives \$2.00 per church member for the support of their homes.

One might well ask, "Just what does the Conference get for all this money? How are the children served?" During the year just closed, 258 applications for service were received. From this number we were able to admit to the institution 38 additional children. This means that we were able to serve 124 children in the institutional group care program, 6 children through Mother's Aid, 10 children in Foster Boarding Homes, and 1 child through adoption. We thus have a grand total of 141 different children served directly.

What does the Conference get for its money? Besides the obvious services rendered the 141 children, caseworkers alone held 1,412 interviews with children, 206 interviews with children's parents, 276 conferences with houseparents, and 589 conferences with foster parents, teachers and others. There were 286 intake interviews and 68 case conferences held.

Despite the fact that we were forced to reject 102 applications, and that the names of 83 children were withdrawn from the waiting list, we have 35 children still awaiting service today.

We want to thank First Methodist Church of Sanford, First Methodist and Trinity Methodist Churches of DeLand for providing fine worship experiences for our children and staff. These are now our church homes and a warm hand of welcome is always extended our group as we go to worship.

Trustees who are leaving our Board are Mrs. Morton McDonald, who has rendered nine years of splendid service, and Honorable Paul Rogers, Member of Congress. Appropriate certificates of service will be awarded these.

At the pre-conference meeting of The Board of Trustees it was voted unanimously that the Bishop and Cabinet be requested to reappoint Bascom W. Carlton as Superintendent.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES

The Goodwill Industries in Florida are serving more handicapped people than ever before in their history and are growing more rapidly than in other parts of the country.

In order to make this possible we have had the wonderful support of the people of Florida, and they have furnished us with discarded materials, money, buildings and machinery necessary to do this job.

The big Boy Scout Clothing Collection, in Miami, Orlando, Jacksonville and on the Suncoast gave us a tremendous boost and greatly increased the number of jobs we can give to handicapped people.

The outstanding example of the help we have received from the Methodist Churches has been the generous and enthusiastic support of our Goodwill Industries in Orlando. Through the advance specials of nearly every church in the District, it has been possible to purchase a greatly needed new truck.

Each of the four Goodwill Industries in Florida have plans for either additions to their buildings or for remodeling—some of these are in the dream stage and others are ready for the letting of bids.

The combination of money, for buildings, machinery and equipment, and the discarded materials that give jobs to handicapped people, are the ingredients that the community furnishes for a successful Goodwill Industries.

The product of Goodwill Industries is people, and the story of Goodwill can be told in no other way—

The blind girl from South America, who now operates the switchboard in Miami—

The girl without any arms who operates the switchboard with her toes and feet, in Jacksonville—

The pretty little blond, paralyzed from the hips down, who comes to work in a wheelchair each morning and holds the same very important position at the switchboard in the Suncoast Goodwill—

The man who repairs the small electrical appliances, in the Orlando plant, in a wheelchair, and who is taking a correspondence course in electronics, furnished by the Methodist Men;

These are the folks who are the main product of Goodwill Industries. Almost 500 handicapped people in Florida, are working and earning,

and either partially or wholly supporting themselves through your interest in handicapped people.

In spite of all that has been accomplished, we have barely scratched the surface and with your continued help, we will start more Goodwill Industries and increase the service rendered to this group of people.

We shall not be satisfied, and we know you will not, until every handicapped person in this great State of ours is given an opportunity to work and earn and support himself.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STEWARDSHIP

I.

GENERAL STATEMENT

Christian Stewardship presupposes a man's acceptance to Christ. To accept Christ implies the practice of Christian Stewardship. The practicality of it is seen in man's attitude toward life; man's assignment of priorities; and man's dedication of talents. When this happens the Church will move with increased vigor and exert a more effective influence for Jesus Christ.

The observance of the Quadrennial Stewardship Emphasis: "The Stewardship of Possessions with Special Emphasis on Tithing," was conducted this year. The observance was the fall of 1961 with a training program on Conference and District levels. This reached the local church through preaching, reading, participation or organizations and getting commitments to various practices of the stewardship of possessions including tithing.

Seminars on Stewardship were conducted at the Laymen's Retreat for three week-ends at the Youth Camp.

Literature on Stewardship has been widely distributed.

B. Florida Conference: The giving of the Florida Conference for all causes during the nine years since the Tithing Emphasis was adopted by the General Conference in 1952 has risen from \$7,104,863 to \$16,008,142 in 1960 and \$16,145,619 in 1961.

The per capita giving of The Methodist Church for all purposes in 1960-61 was \$52.80. The per capita giving of the Florida Conference for all purposes for the last two years are as follows:

1959-60—\$68.66 1960-61—\$65.61

Florida has the largest per capita income of any state in the Southeast or Southwest—more than \$2,000 per year. If we were realizing the tithe from 246,000 Methodists in our Conference we should be receiving approximately \$49,000,000 annually instead of the \$16,000,000 received. The amount we are giving to the Church now is approximately 3% of our income. To achieve the tithe may be improbable but not impossible. However, would it not be wonderful to move toward 4% which would be approximately \$19,680,000 or an increase of three and one-half million dollars?

III.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. Strengthening of Stewardship:
 - 1. The observance of the Quadrennial Stewardship Emphasis: "The Stewardship of Possessions with special emphasis on Tithing," by all those churches who were unable to observe the program last year.
 - 2. The observance of an Every Member Visitation Program by each Church for the underwriting of the budget.
 - 3. Active Secretaries of Stewardship in each Church.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

"Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, 'Here I am! Send me!' "-ISAIAH 6:8.

The Quadrennial Emphasis on Recruitment for Christian Vocations has gotten into full swing during this year. The General Conference of 1960 said, "Let us serve Him by recruiting youth and adults to listen for and to heed God's call to the ministries of the Church, including all its agencies and institutions." Then it established the following four aims in the area of Christian Vocations:

- 1. The deepening of the spiritual life of youth and adults.
- 2. The conserving of decisions already made in the local, District and Conference levels of recruitment, with a greater emphasis upon follow-up.

- 3. A continued emphasis on pastoral and parental encouragement of youth and young adult decisions for full time Churchrelated vocations.
- 4. The formation of informative and persuasive literature.

Already major emphasis has been placed on these aims across the Church and within the bounds of our Florida Conference. On October 27-28, 1961 a very successful "Preachers of Tomorrow Conference" was called by Bishop Henley and jointly sponsored by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations. One hundred youth and young adults interested in or in preparation for the Ministry met with Bishop Henley, The Cabinet, their pastors, and members of the sponsoring groups at the Methodist Youth Camp for this highly significant Conference on the Ministry.

On February 1st an annual planning session was conducted by your Conference Commission, which included all of the District Chairmen, outlining and creating the program for the year. Recommendations being presented to this session of the Annual Conference came out of this creative session.

May 20, 1962 designated by General Conference as Aldersgate and Ministry Sunday was again observed in an even larger way across our Conference. Reports indicate many great experiences occurring in the local Churches and also indicating the fact that Ministry Sunday is an increasingly great opportunity for recruitment. A note of thanks is expressed to Dr. Amos L. Boren of Hollywood Hills Methodist Church, Hollywood who prepared the sermonic material for the observance of Ministry Sunday. We would like to further express our appreciation to the Boards and Agencies of our Conference who have so definitely shown an interest in the work of your Commission in the area of recruitment and cultivation of youth and young adults for church-related vocations.

Extensive effort has been made to revise the Conference Commission's file with each person whose name has been received from any source receiving individual mailings and a special mailing requesting the completion of their individual confidential folders. Over 1,200 Basic Information Blanks were sent to individuals and the completely revised list of youth was made available in May. Each local Church and pastor is urged to anticipate and use this listing of all Full-Time Service Volunteers in our Conference as it will appear in the October, 1962 issue of the Florida Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship paper, THE TELLUM.

We call special attention of the entire Conference to the following excellent materials to aid the carrying out of the Quadrennial Emphasis on Christian Vocations:

- 1. A new book has been written entitled THE BIBLE AND GOD'S CALL by Drs. Howard Kee and Montgomery Shroyer. It will be excellent resource for adult discussion groups; for MYF counselors, leadership courses on local, district and conference levels; and also for specific study by the local Church Committee on Christian Vocations.
- 2. A new core unit of study has been prepared for use with Senior High and Older Youth groups entitled, "The Meaning of Discipleship."

- 3. Also a new Senior High Elective Unit which is entitled, "The Call To Life" is to be released June, 1962.
- 4. The Youth Department of the General Board of Education has made available resource material for the Summer of 1962, The Methodist Youth Seminars (formerly called the Youth Activities Weeks Packets). All of these four items are available from Cokesbury.

Your Commission wishes to again bring to the attention of the Conference the annual church-related vocational needs established for our own Florida Conference and to urge the wide usage of these in promotion of Christian vocations in all areas. They are:

- 40 for the Ministry
- 10 for the Missionary enterprise at home and abroad
- 15 for Christian Education in the local churches
- 5 for Directors of Music
- 15 to fill additional needs in other categories

This total of 85 persons challenges our Conference to a vigorous and deeply spiritual program of recruitment and cultivation. We urge every pastor and laymen to consider it a part of their task of Christian witness to work with God's Spirit in the attainment of these Goals. The people called Methodists must face facts, for our needs are tremendous. For example, in the area of the ministry: in 1961 only 958 ministerial candidates were admitted on trial in Methodist Conferences; while only 887 ministers were received into full connection. This is far short of the church-wide annual need of 2,400.

Your Conference Commission on Christian Vocations calls upon the Florida Annual Conference to seriously consider and support the following recommendations:

A. IN THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

- 1. We recommend the book entitled "THE BIBLE AND GOD'S CALL" by Drs. Howard Kee and Montgomery Shroyer be used extensively in the local, sub-district and district programs in the interest of Christian Vocations; also that this book be considered additional resource material for the Florida Conference "Our Mission Today" study programs.
- 2. We recommend that publication of the names of all Full-time Service Volunteers in October 1962 issue of TELLUM be used as a means of recognition and that every pastor review carefully the youth names within his church and report changes to the Conference Commission.
- 3. We recommend that a Conference on Christian Vocations be held at the Methodist Youth Camp in Leesburg, Florida on October 26-28, 1962 with Dr. Richard Bauer, Executive Secretary of the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations as the major resource person.
- 4. We recommend that the emphasis for the remainder of the Quadrennium be as follows: 1962; The Campus and Christian Vocations; 1963; The Home and Christian Vocations; 1964, Missions and Christian Vocations.
- 5. We recommend placing on the Calendar of our Florida Annual Conference, Sunday May 19, 1963, as Ministry Sunday, with the observance of this Sunday to be marked by the presenting

of the claims of Christ and His Church concerning God's call to youth and adults to all church-related vocations.

- 6. We recommend the establishing of a special Personnel Secretary within the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations in an effort to more effectively attain the General Conference aim of "The conserving of decisions made in the local, district, and conference levels."
- **B. IN THE DISTRICT**
 - We recommend that the District Committee on Christian Vocations be continued and further that the District Superintendents during this session of the Annual Conference be requested to name the chairman of their District Committee in consultation with their District Director of Youth Work. This recommendation in no way implies that the District Director of Youth shall or shall not be the chairman of the District Committee, but we do urge that full consideration be given to having a different person for District Chairman wherever possible.
 - 2. We recommend that the District Committee on Christian Vocations be made up of the following persons: The District chairman, the District Superintendent, the Directors and Associate Directors of Youth Work, the District Secretary of Missionary Personnel of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the District Lay Leader, and the members of the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations residing within the bounds of the District.
 - 3. We recommend that the chairman of the District Committee of Christian Vocations be considered a member of the District Staff on Christian Education.
 - 4. We recommend that the District Superintendent with the aid of the District Chairman distribute at the District-set-up meeting, to be held immediately after Annual Conference, the Local Church Committee on Christian Vocations report blank with the purpose of having it completed and presented at the First Quarterly Conferences.
 - 5. We recommend that the District Chairman of Christian Vocations, in consultation with the District Superintendent, call a meeting of the District Committee as early in the Fall as possible to outline its program for the year. (A full presentation of the function of the District Committee on Christian Vocations will be found on pages 222 and 223 of 1961 Florida Conference Journal.)
- C. IN THE LOCAL CHURCH
 - 1. We recommend the continued emphasis upon the establishing of a Committee on Christian Vocations in every local Church according to Paragraph 145, Section 9 of the 1960 Discipline.
 - 2. We recommend that each Local Committee on Christian Vocations be called on to report at the First Quarterly Conference by using the blank prepared by the Florida Conference Commission on Christian Vocations.
 - 3. In recognizing the pastor as the key person in the total program of recruitment and cultivation of youth and adults to churchrelated vocations, we recommend that each pastor continue his

efforts in accordance with his other pastoral duties as stated in paragraph 352.20 (a. and b.) of the 1960 *Discipline*.

4. We recommend that every church, through its local Committee on Christian Vocations, carry out a continuous emphasis on the needs and possibilities of Christian vocations throughout the Church and Church School.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS June 1962

The Committee on Publishing Interests is a new Committee, having been authorized by the 1960 General Conference. The Committee provides a link between the Publishing House and the Annual Conference. This is its first report to the Florida Conference.

In his recent book, *The Beginning of American Methodism*, Dr. John Gross reminds us that The Methodist Publishing House has become one of Christendom's greatest enterprises for the production of Christian literature. Surely The Methodist Church is "throwing ink at the devil by tank loads" and using train loads of paper to do it.

The Board of Publication, doing business as The Methodist Publishing House, appropriates funds annually from its net income for the benefit of the Conference Claimants of the Church. But the primary purpose of the Publishing House is to provide the Church with necessary books, Bibles, periodicals, church and church school supplies and other materials. For 172 years this has been the cause for which the Publishing House has functioned, and in 1961 the publishing interests of the Church reported the most productive twelve months in its history from the standpoint of service to the Church and its people.

Here are some of the highlights of the year's work:

Cokesbury, retail division of the Publishing House, is now operating under a regional plan consisting of six regional service centers for mail order purposes and fifteen retail Cokesbury stores.

A new five-color offset press was installed in the Nashville printing plant, adding to the fine quality of printed materials for the Church. Some of the printing that comes from this press is Church School Literature, color pages of *Together*, catalogs, covers of *The Upper Room* and church bulletins.

More than 143 million pieces of Church School Literature, including material for all ages and sizes of groups, were mailed during the year.

A total of 5,300,000 books was printed and bound in the printing plants of The Methodist Publishing House.

Editorial work was completed on the four volume set of *The Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible*, which will be ready in October of 1962. This highly illustrated work is the first complete English dictionary of the Bible in more than fifty years. Over 7,500 entries are defined in the four volumes.

Abingdon's first regular weekly issue of bulletins in four colors was produced for use in the first quarter of 1962.

Twenty-one new children's books were published, lifting to 193 the number of Abingdon children's books in print.

New literature courses for the Junior High age group were released in October of 1961. These courses, fully field experimented in actual use, have many innovations in art and design.

Some 800 new libraries were registered in the Church library program during the year, bringing the total to more than 8,000. The new *Church Library Manual*, provided free to all registered libraries, received wide acceptance.

Church music is now on display in each of the Cokesbury stores. Both the service centers and stores have wide selections of church music, and examination copies are available to choir directors and ministers of music.

The Methodist Publishing House employs more than 2,200 people in eighteen locations. More than 28 per cent of the employees of the House have ten years or more service.

Together, Methodism's family magazine, showed a circulation

of 908,901 in 1961. *Together* is designed to inform Methodists about The Methodist Church in an interesting and colorful way, and at the same time to bring them closer to the local church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE RELATIONS

The relation of a Methodist minister to his Annual Conference is unique and sacred. Through it the minister is assured life-long acceptance and employment in his Calling; and through it the Conference has a pledge of continuing loyal service. It is a relation to be cherished and maintained with dignity. The *Discipline* charges the Committee on Conference Relations with the responsibility of keeping watch over this relationship for each full clerical member of the Conference.

Desiring to fulfill its duties in a more effective manner, the Committee calls attention to the importance of the cooperation of each minister in maintaining his Conference relation with clarity and dignity. This becomes especially important at the point of keeping the Committee informed about desires of ministers for changes in their Conference relations.

In particular it is important that the Secretary of the Committee, as well as the Bishop and the District Superintendent, be notified by any clerical member of the Conference who wishes to be granted sabbatical leave, retirement, the supernumerary relation, appointment as a student, or voluntary location. This should be done well in advance of Annual Conference in order that full consideration can be given to the merits of the request being made. Failure to furnish this information in time can, and often does, result in embarrassment for the minister and the Annual Conference.

It is well, further, for those holding special types of Conference relations to keep the Committee, as well as the Bishop and District Superintendent, advised each year as to their plans for the next year. Full Conference members, for instance, appointed as students should inform the Committee when their studies will be completed and when they intend to apply for appointment in the effective relation; those on sabbatical leave should notify the Committee what Conference relation they desire at the end of their year of leave; and those in the supernumerary relation should clear with the Committee each year regarding their desires for the next year, remembering the limitations on this type of relation. In every case each minister must assume responsibility for assisting the Committee to keep his Conference relation clear and satisfactory.

The Committee pledges itself to courteous efforts, including interviews with those who desire them, to maintain with becoming dignity the relation of the ministers to the Conference. It requests each minister to cooperate by providing full information on plans affecting Conference relations.

REPORT OF BRANSCOMB MEMORIAL BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Building Committee for the Branscomb Memorial Auditorium is directly amenable to the Board of Trustees of Florida Southern College and has made regular detailed reports to that body as progress has been made. We are pleased now to make a general report to the Conference.

- **1.** *Architecture.* Nils Schweizer and Associates were commissioned as architects for this project and have now completed the plans and specifications.
- 2. Contract. Several reputable and reliable builders have been invited to submit bids, and plans and specifications are now in their hands. Bid openings are scheduled for Tuesday, July 17, 1962.
- 3. Building Schedule. If bids are within the range of our budget, we will award the contract soon after the bid openings, and have

tentatively set the ground breaking ceremony for Monday, September 10, 1962, at 2:00 P.M.

4. Budget. Because of the advantageous arrangement in the Church Extension Campaign, by which we are to receive one half of the first \$800,000.00 paid in on Church Extension Loan Fund, we are now assured of receiving \$400,000.00 from this source and are pleased to report that we have already in hand \$388,000.00 of this amount. In addition we have on hand \$50,000.00 from the original Branscomb Memorial Love Offering made by our churches in the spring of 1959. This gives us a firm budget of \$450,000.00 which we know already will not provide for furnishing and air conditioning the building, and for certain accessories. Our Florida Conference Wom-

an's Society of Christian Service has assumed large responsibility toward furnishing the auditorium, an act of co-operation and generosity which the Committee greatly appreciates. Toward the full completion of the building we earnestly solicit additional individual and group gifts.

FLORIDA CONFERENCE GROUP INSURANCE

On July 1, the Florida Conference Group Insurance Plan will begin its eighth year. During that time our membership has grown from 319 to 465. These brethren are insured for a total of \$2,220,000.

During our first three years we had only one death, the claim being \$5,000. In our fourth year four of our members died, the death claims totaling \$15,000. In the next two years we had one death, the claim

being \$2,500. So, in our first six years we paid out claims of only \$22,500. This very fortunate experience enabled us to build up a good reserve, and to reduce our askings of the Conference from \$10,000. to \$3,000. per year.

The past year has been a tragic one, as we all so well know. I am glad to say to you, however, that nine of our brethren who died were covered by our Group Insurance, and we are paying their beneficiaries a total of \$40,000. These nine brethren had paid into the Plan a total of only \$1,813.50, which should remind us of the great benefit of the Group Plan.

Conference Members and Full-Time Approved Supplies are eligible for this insurance, PROVIDED THAT: They must apply for the insurance within two years from the time they take full-time work in the Conference; and also, that one transferring into the Conference shall not be eligible if he has passed his 55th birthday.

The Policy is for \$5,000. until one reaches his 65th birthday, at which time it is reduced to \$2,500., where it remains as long as he is identified with the Florida Conference (whether active or retired). The cost is \$3.00 per month or \$35. for the year beginning July 1, if paid before Aug. 1. At 65, this cost is cut to one-half. Presently we are not billing one after he reaches his 72nd birthday. Notices are sent out if one gets one month in arrears. If one does not respond to this notice, another is sent at the end of two months. Failure to make payment as noted on this notice causes the policy to be of no value until the payment is caught up.

Sminary Students who have been admitted On Trial, may have the \$5,000. policy for half price. The limit for this consideration is two years, or when one comes out of the Seminary, whichever time is the shorter.

I am glad to report that we have a Reserve of approximately \$50,-000. Of this amount, \$35,000 is loaned to the Conference Board of Missions, and \$10,000 is in the Home Federal Savings Bank of St. Petersburg. The balance is in the Florida National Bank, Orlando. Since we cannot anticipate any dividend this year, we shall likely have to reduce this reserve by about \$7,000.

Your Treasurer is bonded in the amount of \$10,000.

Attached is the audit of my books for the year ending June 30, 1961. Anyone desiring to take out this Insurance during the present session of the Conference, should get an application card from me. When it is returned to me, the policy will be in force, and there will be no charge for the month of June.

We have examined the books and records of the Central Treasury of the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church for the year ended May 23, 1962, and have prepared therefrom the accompanying balance sheet, statement of funds received and their distribution and supporting exhibits and schedules. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included all auditing procedures we considered necessary in the circumstances, except that we have not had an opportunity to confirm with individual churches their remittances to the Central Treasury.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and statement of funds received and their distribution fairly present the financial position of the Central Treasury as of May 23, 1962, and the recorded receipts and disbursements for the year then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices applied on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

REV. J. WALTER AUSTIN

J. Walter Austin, the son of W. T. Austin and Amelia Frances Summers, was born on May 25, 1876, in Turin, Georgia. He married Mary Aquila Overstreet, Feb. 28, 1900, who was his faithful, loyal companion until her death. To them were born two daughters, Evelyn and Onie—Mrs. B. M. Montgomery and Mrs. E. L. Hollady—both wives of Florida Methodist ministers.

Brother Austin served in the Florida Conference from 1899 to 1952. His first pastorate was Single Creek, Kissimmee; he was Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home at Enterprise; he served Bowling Green three different pastorates—a great tribute in itself. He retired in 1941 but continued to serve, serving the Ebenezer Church until 1952. He was always a beloved pastor. Truly I never knew any pastor who loved his people more or who was more beloved by his congregations. He was so gentle and kind, understanding and sympathetic that everyone who knew him was genuinely impressed by these virtues.

Brother Austin devoted his entire life—every thought and act—toward building the Kingdom of God. His one and only purpose in life was to love God and help others to love Him. His life was the sermon that people like most. When he was no longer able to preach, his congregation told the District Superintendent that they would rather have Brother Austin come on Sunday and sit with them than to have another preacher. Indeed, a living sermon.

Life was not easy back in those days when Brother Austin served. Scattered, small churches; meager financial support; epidemics; traveling mostly on horseback or on foot; extended evangelistic preaching; these and many other discomforts and disadvantages all but "shattered my nerves" as he once put it, but with him it was always the joy of serving. And as it has been so well said, "Unavoidable troubles either embitter or ennoble a man." "They produced in Brother Austin the Christlike graces of patience and loving understanding and courageous faith, which endeared him to all who knew him and which glorified God in the hearts of his parishioners."

I do not think Brother Austin ever greeted anyone without a firm handclasp and twinkle in his eye. Many were led to Christ by his kind ministry. There was a warmth about his genial and friendly personality which drew people of all walks of life to him and to his Maker. When he left a community the people not only remembered him but also the Christ which he so well interpreted in his own humble and beautiful life.

One of the greatest tributes I ever heard paid a man was one given by a bus driver about Brother Austin. He and I were on a bus out of Orlando; he was going to Ebenezer to call on his members. The bus stopped and the driver called out, "This is your stop, Brother Austin." As the bus started up again a passenger wanted to know why he stopped to discharge a passenger between the regular stations. The bus driver said, "As long as I am driving this bus it will stop anywhere to pick up that preacher or to let him off because every time he climbs on this bus I feel as if a little of God comes on with him."

ELLIOTT S. RITCH, SR.

Elliott S. Ritch, Sr. was born in Coffee County, Georgia, August 12, 1908. Soon thereafter he moved to Taylor County, Florida. He graduated from the Taylor County High School at Perry and taught several years in the local school system.

During this experience he was converted and felt the Call to preach the Gospel. He entered Florida Southern College at Lakeland in 1934 on a football scholarship. He was a giant of a man in physical stature and proved a rugged opponent on the team. Not only was he active in athletics, but he was a great spirit in all campus and scholastic activities.

While at college he fell in love with and married Lyda Hodnett, the college nurse and a parsonage daughter of our late beloved Rev. and Mrs. R. F. Hodnett.

After graduation from Florida Southern he attended and received his Seminary Degree from Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Georgia.

He became a member of the Florida Conference in 1938 and was Ordained a Deacon in 1940 and an Elder in 1941. He was appointed to the Trilby-Lacoochee Charge in 1938. Following this he served at Seville-Pierson, 1940; Chaplain, Army of the U.S., 1944; Auburndale, First Church, 1947; Brooksville, 1951; Bartow, First Church 1955; and was in his fourth year at the Jacksonville Murray Hill Church at the time of his death on August 30, 1961, just two days after his Mother, Mrs. Ida Ritch, had preceded him into the Father's House.

At the time of his passing he was a member of the Florida Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns, of various District Committees, a Scottish and York Rite Mason and a member of the Egypt Temple of the Shrine. He also was a past President of the Brooksville Rotary Club.

Brother Ritch was one of God's great souls. He was a wonderful son and was very devoted to his mother, whose going greatly quickened his own departure. He looked upon "Dad" Hodnett as his "Spiritual" father and his ideal as a man of God.

He was a good man. His going has left a void in the hearts of his great host of personal friends. He knew how to be a friend and expressed it as very few others have ever learned to do. This spirit permeated his relationships with his family as a husband and as a father. The family's spirit of oneness was evident in all of their work and play together.

of oneness was evident in all of their work and play together. He was a good citizen, interested in all activities as revealed in his fraternal and civic associations. During World War II his service as a Chaplain, which carried him to Europe, was one of distinction. He was never afraid to express himself upon any issue at hand with a keen sense of humor and his unique expressions allowed him this unusual privilege as a minister. His sincerity and common sense approach gave real strength to what he had to say.

He was a good Minister of the Gospel and was a superb Preacher in the highest sense of the word. He lived life "on tiptoe" and the thought of not being able to perform at his best carried him out to his "Eternal Appointment" under God's loving and tender care.

This insight of the drive in his life was revealed in a letter written August 9 to his Bishop as follows: "I have known for some months that I was laboring under too great a difficulty. I have not had the 'zip' and 'pep' that have characterized my whole life. I have been dragging, and now, I feel that I have reached the point where my church is beginning to suffer. God knows, I would be the last person to stand in the way of the Kingdom, so I think it is best that I quietly slip out of the work. If some miracle should happen and I improve, then I would want to come back. But I don't think that likely. . . . I have prayed and argued with the Lord about this, and it has come to me clearly that this is the best thing to do."

His heart gave out on August 30 while he was a patient at the Lake City Veteran's Hospital. He had struggled quietly and valiantly for months to overcome this handicap, but to no avail.

Services were conducted from his beloved Murray Hill Church on September 1, with his Bishop, James W. Henley and his warm personal friend, his District Superintendent, Dr. J. Milburn McLeod, and interim pastor, the Rev. T. D. Ryan in charge. It was a victorious and full Service of Worship, complete with a choir, hymns, Scripture and appropriate remarks. The Church was filled to overflowing with his fellow ministers, members of the Official Board and Church, and friends.

His body was taken to Brooksville where it was tenderly laid to rest at the chosen place where he had planned to retire and live with his family among his friends and the hills, lakes and streams of that section of our State.

GEORGE LEON WELLS

If unassuming quietness is a characteristic of many native New Englanders, then G. Leon Wells was no exception to the rule. His quietness, illuminated by a radiant smile, was the characteristic which made him so greatly beloved among the people of Florida with whom he came to work as a shepherd of souls.

G. Leon Wells (few of his friends knew that his first name was George) was born in Hardwick, Vermont on November 29, 1884. His father was a mill operator, and he was one of six children. There were two girls and four boys in the family. Three of the four boys became ministers of Jesus Christ.

In 1907, G. Leon Wells was received into the Vermont Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church. Received into full connection two years later, he served churches in Vermont until 1926, when he transferred to the St. John's River Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church in Florida. At the uniting conference, when the St. John's River Conference was merged with the Florida Conference, he came into full membership with the larger group where he was as greatly loved and admired by members of the former southern churches as he had been by those of the former northern branch of the Church.

Although he retired officially in 1954, after forty-seven years of service, actually he never did retire from active service to the Church and the people called Methodist.

The breadth of his service and the variety of geographical locations within the state are indicative of his love for all people everywhere. He served churches in Welaka, Hialeah, Mt. Dora, St. Cloud, Miami (Tamiami), Key West, St. Petersburg, Miami (Southwest) and Coral Gables, where he was a member of the staff at the time of his death.

He was married to Persis Davis in 1906 in Vermont. To them was born a son, Danforth. They also brought into their family and hearts a daughter, Mable. In 1948 this union was broken with the death of Persis Wells.

On June 3, 1961, Genevra H. Griffith became the devoted wife of G. Leon Wells. They had become acquainted and their relationship deepened to the point of marriage, while he served as a minister of The First Methodist Church of Coral Gables. Their marriage was broken on September 15, 1961 by what the world calls his death. In the heart of his beloved he lives on today, as indeed he does in the hearts and lives of those who were privileged to be touched by his love.

A few minutes after G. Leon Wells united with the Church Triumphant, his wife whispered reverently, "He was a man of God!"

"He was a man of God!" 'Twas said when death had come at last;

A Godly man, whose ministry with goodness seemed to shine.

WAYNE WILBUR PATCH, D.D.

Wayne Wilbur Patch, a good minister of Jesus Christ and a faithful preacher of the Gospel which had been entrusted to him by his Lord, was born July 12, 1906 in Johnstown, Pennsylvania, the son of Evan Lewis and Anna S. Patch.

After graduating from Johnstown High School he studied in Ohio Wesleyan, Asbury College and Theological Seminary, the University of Pittsburgh, Geneva College and Central University.

Being reared in a Christian home and converted at an early age, he was licensed to preach in 1924 at the age of eighteen years, by the Calvary M. E. Church, in Johnstown, Pa. In 1928 he was married in the same church to Ada Roberts, who survives him, along with his mother and a sister and two brothers.

During his summer vacations he worked in grocery and furniture stores. and in the foundry of Bethlehem Steel Co., and upon graduation from Asbury Theological Seminary he entered the pastorate in the Pittsburgh Conference of the M. E. Church. He served Commodore-Starford charge 1928-32; Bolivar-West Fairfield 1932-37; Harmony-Zelienople 1937-51. On all of these charges he had great revivals. He led the people in the purchase of a parsonage at Zelienople and in the merging of the two congregations and the building of a beautiful new church. In 1951 a call came to the Eustis Florida church, which he accepted and where he led in the building of a fine church. He served Florida Conference from 1951 until his death-Eustis 1951-56; Grace Church, St. Augustine 1956-60 and Titusville 1960 until his death.

He was a strong evangelistic preacher and in his earlier years spent much time assisting other pastors in revival meetings. His later ministry was characterized by the building of fine churches in Zelienople, Pa., and Eustis, Fla., and the extensive remodeling of the Grace Church in St. Augustine, Fla. He led two men into the ministry. Brother Patch was a devoted husband and zealous pastor, deeply interested in his work, sincere in his relations with other people, and unwavering in his faith in the fundamentals of the Christian faith. He worked hard fields without complaint and accepted great success with humility. For many years he suffered a severe heart condition but he refused to be handicapped by it or to ease up on his work. He literally burned himself out for his Lord. The evening of his death he made hospital calls. He "fought a good fight"; he "kept the faith.'

On December 9, 1961 this kind, brotherly, sympathetic pastor was called to rest. The funeral was held in First Methodist Church, Titusville, by Dr. Bruce Gannaway, District Supt., assisted by the Rev. J. F. Talton. Interment was at Eustis, Fla. Dec. 12.

OLIVER HATFIELD

The Reverend Oliver Hatfield was born in Huntington, West Virginia on August 22, 1892, and passed to his heavenly reward on January 20, 1962, almost one year to the day after the passing of his faithful com-

He then moved to Canal Point, on the shores of beautiful Lake Okeechobee, and here he made his home. As long as health would permit he was always willing to fill any pulpit when needed. The years of his retirement were made happy because his 3 children and 4 grandchildren were always near to him.

On Monday, January 22, 1962, he slipped out to be with his Lord, after being confined to the hospital bed for many weary weeks. Funeral services were conducted in The Canal Point Methodist Church, a church he had served during his own ministry, and he was laid to rest in Port Mayaca Cemetery in the heart of the Lake Area he had come to love so much.

HOLMES AUGUSTUS SPENCER

The Reverend Holmes Augustus Spencer was born in Parkersburg, West Virginia, the son of Augustus Israel Spencer and Hattie Tavenner Spencer, March 28, 1878. He was married to Mary Greek Baker at Sandyville, W. Va., January 18, 1905. To this union were born two children: Corinne Maxwell Walpole, now of Sarasota and Sherwood Spencer of Hollywood, Florida. Two grandchildren, William Sherwood and Carol Ann Spencer, also shared in his great devotion.

H. A. Spencer joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, one week after his conversion, at the age of thirteen years. Dr. Spencer recorded March 28, 1891 as the date of his conversion. It was a very definite experience of grace that transformed his life and greatly enriched his ministry.

He entered Ohio University in 1897 and was licensed to preach May 23, 1900 at Spencer, W. Va., by Dr. T. S. Wade, Presiding Elder, After preaching one year as a Supply Pastor, he was admitted into the Conference on trial, September 1903 and into Full Connection, September 1906. He was ordained Deacon at Fairmont in 1904 by Bishop A. Coke Smith and Elder in 1908 by Bishop E. R. Hendrix.

After preaching for thirteen years in the Western Virginia Conference, he transferred to the Florida Conference in 1915. He served the following named churches as pastor: New Smyrna; Wesley Memorial, Jacksonville; Springfield; Trinity, Tallahassee; College Heights; First Church, Sarasota; Avondale; Palatka; Fort Pierce; Arcadia; Starke; Dania; Wagg Memorial. He served as Presiding Elder of the Gainesville District for two years. He retired in 1948, and established his home in Sarasota, where he and his wife spent nearly fourteen years in active service at First Church. He was very instrumental in establishing Trinity Church in Sarasota and maintained a keen interest in church extension until the very last.

In 1959 he sent the following greetings to the Annual Conference meeting in Lakeland:

"My eyes are so bad, can't get anything worth publishing on a postcard. My wife and I have lived together 45 years. Retired after preaching 46 years. Saw hundreds of people converted. Sorry I had to quit. Was only 70 years old. Moved over here and thought I would soon be dead. Now we are moving into our own house which has three bedrooms, glass reception room and glass garage. May live 10 years more."

Although Brother Spencer had been in declining health for several years, the Heavenly Father invited him on July 12, 1961, to move out of the rather battered "house of clay" into the Heavenly Home, on a rather short notice. His final illness was for just a few hours, and after more

than a half century of effective service and faithful witness, he went to join the "Redeemed of the Ages." The earth is better because he walked across it.

Funeral services were conducted in Sarasota July 14th, by his pastor, the Reverend Floyd W. Cooper. His earthly remains were laid to rest in the Manasota Cemetery amid the beautiful flowers placed there in tribute to the memory of his saintly life. Mrs. Spencer continues her deep interest in the work of the church and in all of the activities of the Florida Conference. She studies the Conference Journal and is alert to that which happens. In her less active life she is a benediction to her loved ones and friends.

As another Veteran of the Cross has completed his earthly mission, we close ranks and with determined purpose continue our efforts to build God's Kingdom in Florida and the world.

WILLIAM FLETCHER PEELER

With the Christian excitement of his ordination as an elder six weeks earlier yet warm in his heart, William Fletcher Peeler was suddenly called home by God on July 15, 1961. Having entered the ministry relatively late in life, he, nevertheless, found a joy in service to God and man not unlike those who answer the Call in youth.

He was born August 13, 1898, in Gainesville, Florida, the son of Rowan Bascom Peeler and Martha Spivey Peeler, both of pioneer Methodist families and with names that grace the pages of the history of our Church in the State. Both parents were active members of the First Methodist Church in Gainesville, where Rev. Peeler's father served on the Official Board for over 50 years and where he himself first had a Christian experience and united with the Church.

Following his marriage in 1930 to Alice Ostlund, the daughter of a Methodist Minister from North Dakota, Rev. Peeler and family moved to Jacksonville, Florida. To the Peelers were born three children: Mrs. Marion Peeler Bright, Miss Ruth Irene Peeler and Charles Bascom Peeler. As a layman before entering the ministry, Rev. Peeler held a number of responsible supervisory and administrative positions with private firms and governmental agencies for more than two decades. During this time the entire family actively participated as members of the Inman Memorial Methodist Church, where Brother Peeler served in various capacities for twenty-five years until he answered "The Call to Preach."

In 1956 while serving actively as the Chairman of the Commission on Missions and as Superintendent of a Mission Church School, he came to this writer, who was then privileged to be his pastor, and told of his "Call to Preach." At an Evening Church Service subsequent to this, he made a public announcement of this Call and then immediately set himself to the task of preparation for the ministry. At that time, although he was 58 years of age, he was able, through the course of study and with four summers' attendance at Emory University, to complete the work for ordination as elder in the minimum time allowed.

By comparison his ministry was late in its beginning and to us seemed to have been cut short in its duration. It was, nevertheless, rich in content. He often testified of the rich experience he had since accepting the "Call to Preach." For five brief and fleeting years he served among us. His first appointment was in 1956 as pastor of the Marietta Mission near Jacksonville. This was followed by two happy and fruitful years at Hutto Chapel in the same District. Next, he served, beginning in 1959, on the Woodville Circuit near Tallahassee, and in 1960, he began what he had hoped would be a long and fruitful ministry in Bronson, located near his boyhood home in Gainesville. Scarcely more than a month after beginning his second Conference year among these people whom he loved so well, he was suddenly called home to be with God. On July 15, 1961, following a heart attack with complications, he passed on to the Father's House. Two days later, following a Service at Bronson Methodist Church, conducted by this writer, he was laid to rest in the family plot in Edgewood Cemetery in Jacksonville.

Fletcher Peeler was a man with real gifts and a great deal of native ability. He was born in a day when Florida was still virtually a frontier land and reared in a time when little was available to aid in the making of able men. Yet, he came to be an able leader of men, admired, respected and loved by all. His life was a credit to his family, his Church and to the Methodist Ministry. His going is a real loss to the fellowship of those who have answered the Call, as well as a loss to his family and friends. In leaving us, he has heard the Divine salutation, "Well done, Thou good and faithful servant, enter into the joys of the Master."

Pierce, Hendrix Memorial, Jacksonville, Dunedin, High Springs, Concord Park, Orlando, Seminole, Bunnell.

Brother Brantley was interested in Men and was always ready to do anything he could for anybody. He was a 33rd degree Mason and a past member of the Rotary Clubs at Live Oak and Ft. Pierce. He was the charter President of the Rotary Clubs in Winter Garden and High Springs.

It was my privilege to hold several Revivals for Brother Brantley and it was easy to preach when Brother Brantley was sitting close by for I knew he was praying for me. He was a power in Prayer and a strong Gospel Preacher and to hear him preach was to get a message from God. The funeral was in the Arlington Methodist Church conducted by the Pastor, Rev. Maurice Felton, assisted by Dr. J. M. McLeod, District Superintendent and Dr. Shelby A. Wilson, Retired. The body was taken to Bainbridge, Georgia, where the last rites were conducted by Rev. Ray McTier. He was buried by his wife who went home to Heaven a little more than a year ago. Brother Brantley is not dead but alive forevermore. He fought a good fight, he finished his course, and he kept the faith. We'll see you after awhile.

GEORGE BERNARD WARREN

The sudden and tragic death of George Warren in the collision of his automobile with a train early on the morning of January 11, brought sadness to all our hearts. This young servant of our Christ was just beginning his most challenging appointment. Although he had been the pastor of the congregation at Brandon for less than eight months, he had already won the abiding affection of his people, and guided them into beginning the construction of their new church. After graduating from High School he worked in Orlando as a bookkeeper, accountant and Credit Manager. On August 7, 1942, he was married to Emily Ruth Tice and four fine children came to bless their home (George T., 15; Bernard C., 13; John T., 8; and Sarah E., 6). The courage and maturity of this family during their great loss gave visual testimony to George as a husband and father. The deeper qualities of his Christian character were plainly evident in his home and the life of his family.

During the war years George crystallized his decision to answer the call of God to be a minister. In 1945, while still in the service, he was licensed to preach at Sacramento, California. Upon receiving his discharge from the military service he enrolled in Duke University. From that school he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1948, and his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1951.

After finishing his formal education he returned to the Florida Conference. His first appointment was to the Spring Glenn Church in Jacksonville where he served nobly for six years. Then followed four fruitful years at the Child's Park Church in St. Petersburg, and the all too short eight months at Brandon. The fatal accident occurred while he was hurriedly making preparations to attend the "Our United Witness" training conference that was being held that morning in Lakeland. Early in the morning of January 11, Florida Methodism lost a faithful minister and a beloved brother.

On the morning of January 15, a large crowd of earthly friends gathered with the family for the funeral service at the Brandon Methodist Church. The hour was interspersed with tears as we faced our future without him, but it was also characterized by the consciousness of George's triumphant faith. The service came to a fitting close as the choir sang the "Halleluiah Chorus" from the Messiah by Handel. On this note of triumph we bade temporary farewell to husband, father, pastor, friend, and fellow minister. None of us doubted but that in a few short years we would be joyously welcomed to our Father's house with his familiar "welcome podner." Heaven will be a nicer place to go to because George Warren has outrun us there.

Jesse E. Jones was born at Austin, Kentucky, December 13, 1900, the son of the Reverend Jesse J. Jones and Myrtle Bell Jones. He married Venona Ponder at Sanford, Florida, in 1925, who survives him. Brother Jones was a gentle soul, genuine in his Christian life, patient and effective in his ministry, always forward looking in his methods and work. He was devoted to his family. It was a joy to be a guest in his home where the presence of our Lord was so keenly felt—where kindness and consideration for each other so freely expressed. Brother Jones loved his Church and was always the happiest when preaching or visiting the people. Often I have heard people of the churches he served say that everybody loved Brother Jones for he was always going among them with the love, patience, and sympathy of Jesus.

He loved God's good earth too. No one enjoyed a fishing trip more than he. While he fished he kept those around him in a gleeful mood with his humorous stories, for he greatly enjoyed fishing with other people; and a much used saying of his as they were leaving the fishing grounds, "Now, men, it is time we were fishing for souls." The large number of people he reached for Christ is a testimony of his fishing for souls. Everywhere he served he was interested in the church buildings and while

Everywhere he served he was interested in the church buildings and while at Nebraska Avenue, Tampa, he led the people in the erection of the present sanctuary.

His life was so joyous and happy. He bore witness constantly to a great faith and proclaimed a gospel of hope where ever he was.

Funeral services were conducted at the Methodist Church, Citra, on Friday afternoon, November 24th by Rev. Duane Meier, Rev. J. E. McKinley, and Rev. R. C. Holmes. How true the words, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

GLENN CLAWSON JAMES

1894-1962

Glenn Clawson James, son of Alonzo Carleton James and Hester Katherine Clawson, was born April 5, 1894 at Strawn, Kansas. He died suddenly on February 25, 1962 at 8:00 P.M. at Tallahassee, Florida. He is survived by his wife, Gladys E. Bruce, to whom he was married in 1923 at Emporia, Kansas; by two daughters, Donna Jean (Mrs. Alfred B. Vaught, DeLand, Florida) and Caryl Ann (Mrs. William O. Cullom, Tallahassee); by two brothers (Dr. Harry R. James, Ph.D., Hastings, Nebraska, and Max E. James, Cushing, Oklahoma); one sister (Mrs. Rex H. Winget of Cushing); and three granddaughters.

Dr. James was educated in the public schools of Kansas where he taught before enlisting as a private in World War I. He won the Purple Heart in the 89th Division in 1918 at the Battle of St. Mihiel where he was permanently crippled. Under the influence of his mother and his pastor, he was licensed to preach at Topeka in 1922. That year he received his A.B. degree from Baker University and in 1925 received his B.D. from Garrett Biblical Institute. While at Garrett he and Mrs. James served a student appointment at Salem and Wilmot, Wisconsin. Upon graduation, he was appointed to Waterloo, Wisconsin.

In 1928 Dr. James was transferred to Rader Memorial Church in Miami, Florida and served two and a half years. In 1930 he was named District Superintendent of the Miami District in the St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. His term was interrupted in 1932 by appointment to the White Temple in Miami which he served with distinction for the next twenty-one years. There he was greatly beloved, not only by his people, but also throughout the entire greater Miami metropolitan area. The chapel in White Temple was named in his honor as will be the chapel in the new Trinity Church in Tallahassee.

Dr. James' spiritual leadership in the Miami area transcended his denominational affiliations. For many years a member of the Miami Round Table of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, he received its Citation for Community Service in 1948. He also served as president of the Greater Miami Ministerial Association, the Methodist Ministers' Association, the Greater Miami Community Chest, and numerous other civic groups. He was a member of the Lion's Club and his immodest devotion to that organization endeared him to its membership wherever he went.

Dr. James' full life of leadership in his church knew many honors and distinctions. The D.D. degree was conferred on him by Garrett Biblical Institute in 1936; and by Baker University in 1941. He was a delegate to the Uniting Conference of the Methodist Churches in 1939 at Kansas City and to six General Conferences. He served as delegate to the National Convocation on Christian Higher Education, was a member of his denomination's Board of Education, of his Conference's Commission on Christian Higher Education, and Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education of the Conference. He was instrumental in establishing the Biscayne Methodist Home in Miami, now under the supervision of the Miami District of the denomination. In 1951 he and Mrs. James spent three months abroad with the Sherwood Eddy Seminar.

In 1953 Dr. James was appointed senior pastor of Trinity Church, Tallahassee, where he served until his death. His leadership was quickly recognized throughout the capital city of the State, where he was influential in resolving racial unrest. He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce, the Ministerial Association, the Lion's Club and a director of the Y.M.C.A. Dr. James was active in the organization of the St. Paul's and John Wesley Methodist Churches and in the program of the Wesley Foundation at the University.

The esteem and devotion with which Dr. James was held by the people of his city and in the hearts of his colleagues were reflected at his memorial service at Trinity Church on February 28th at 10:00 A.M. The Church could not accommodate the overflow congregation. Dr. Shuler Peele, his District Superintendent, represented Bishop James W. Henley who was out of the country on foreign assignment. Dr. Albert Dale Hagler of First Church, West Palm Beach, conducted the service in association with Dr. James W. Marlin of First Church, Jefferson, Iowa, and Dr. John H. Hanger of First Church, Coral Gables. The Rev. Austin E. Hollady and the Rev. Danny Morris, who had served as Dr. James' associates, participated in the interment. The combined choirs of Trinity and St. Paul sang the "Hallelujah Chorus" to voice the triumph so deeply felt. His casket, covered with a blanket of red Camellias gathered from the gardens of his parishioners, was radiant as the sun broke through the trees and his body was laid to rest in Roselawn Cemetery at Tallahassee in an interment attended by his colleagues and friends from across the State.

To those who knew Glenn James no eulogy is necessary and none could be adequate. The influence of his rich ministry cannot be reduced to tributes of praise. His radiant openness, his refreshing wholesomeness, his delightful sense of humor, the determination with which he addressed himself to the great problems of his time, his unfailing loyalty, and his ability to walk with kings nor lose the common touch—all these endeared him to us all. The most frequently heard appraisal of him while he was yet among us was, "He is a great soul!" While it is our intent to inscribe his name permanently in places of high honor in the Church, it is our deeper desire to incarnate in our own lives those virtues of noble living and graces of soul which he is persuasively preached and more effectively demonstrated while in our midst.

WILLIAM HARRISON CADWELL

William Harrison Cadwell was born June 8, 1885 at Kewansee, Illinois. He received his education at Lafayette, Illinois High School, and Moody Institute.

Brother Cadwell was ordained in Wilkes Barre, Pennsylvania in 1919. He served pastorates at Springville, Courtdale and Auburn in Pennsylvania; Vestal and Bensonhurst, Brooklyn, New York; and in the Florida Conference, Kendall; retired in 1956 and assisted for a time at Alturas.

During one period of his ministry he became song leader and soloist with

Dr. Henry Ostrom, Evangelist. He was also a Director in the Young Men's Christian Association. During World War II he was a U.S.O. Director.

On May 1, 1914 he married Mildred E. Forbes. Three daughters Mrs. Olive Ransay, Miss Helen L. Cadwell and Dorothy E. Cadwell. He would tell you that he has one grandchild and would delight to produce the picture always carried in his wallet. This grandchild is a native African adopted by his daughter Olive who is serving as a missionary in Northern Rhodesia.

There is evidence that he spent his last hours with his companion of the years. These two sons of God, Jesus and Brother Bill talked of the wonders of their Father. He had gone to sunbathe in a secluded spot by the riverside, taking with him the anthem he would sing with the choir the following Sunday, "THE HEAVENS ARE TELLING." This took place on Tuesday, March 13th, 1962.

All who visited Olds Hall where he resided with other retired Christian ministers since 1955 were shown "his" garden and fish pond which he main-tained.

At his funeral conducted by Dr. Franklin Carwithen and Rev. Ralph Todd, who had lovingly cared for him during a prolonged illness, a portion of the 40th Psalm was read. "I delight to do thy will, O my God; yea thy law is within my heart.

I have not hid thy righteousness within my heart; I have declared thy faithfulness and thy salvation: I have not concealed thy loving-kindness and thy truth from the great congregation... Thy truth continually preserve me ... for innumerable evils have compassed me about ... be pleased O Lord to deliver me ... I am goor and needy; yet the Lord thinketh upon me: thou art my help and my deliverer; make no tarrying, O my God....

deliverer; make no tarrying, O my God. . . . At the Halifax Hospital he was known as "The Little Preacher With the Happy Smile." For the past year he had visited the hospital at least three days a week, including the day before his death; calling upon those who had indicated no church preference. He contended it was he who was blessed and helped rather than they. Many confided their burdens had been lifted and they had found Christ as saviour as a result of his ministrations. Only his diary knew, how by dedicated determination he continued his labors of love in spite of weakness and pain.

NELLE WURTS FRAZIER

As a personal friend of the deceased and her family household, I have been asked by the members of the family of Nelle Wurts Frazier to prepare this Memoir and to join them in paying tribute to the memory of this, one of the loveliest ladies of our Church to ever grace a Methodist Parsonage. It is in the spirit of love and humility I write, for my own life has been truly blessed by this gracious handmaiden of our Lord and Saviour.

Nelle Wurts Frazier, the daughter of Judge John Wesley and Martha A. Wurts, was born December 22, 1895 in Ashland, Kentucky. Here she received her schooling which so pre-eminently fitted her for her holy office of the wife of a Methodist preacher. As the First Lady of the Parsonage she presided with a graciousness and winsomeness of spirit, plus a true humility which endeared her to those whose lives she touched in her daily sojourn through life.

She was married to Clyde Charles Frazier on June 26, 1912 at Ashland, Kentucky. They moved to Huntingdon, West Virginia, where her husband was employed as Advertising Manager and Instructor in Salesmanship in a large department store. Several years later they moved to Johnston, Pennsylvania, where Mr. Frazier served in the same capacity. Coming to Ocala, Florida some time later, the young husband and wife faced the call to the Christian ministry which had presented itself for some years. They became members of the Ocala Methodist Church, and under the ministry of Rev. C. W. White, they answered the call to the Christian ministry. Their first appointment was the Methodist Church at Bushnell in Sumter County.

In successive years she graced the parsonage and served faithfully in St. Petersburg: Gulfport and Child's Park, St. Petersburg: Pasadena and Central Church, St. Petersburg; Nebraska Avenue Church, Tampa; Titusville Church; Trinity, Tampa; The Methodist Children's Home, Benson Springs; Broadway, Orlando; Springfield, Jacksonville; Winter Haven; Hollywood; Lake Wales; Tarboux Memorial, Miami; and Brooksville. She held a life membership in the Woman's Society of Christian Service of which she was a charter member. Wherever the Fraziers served, Mrs. Frazier entered graciously into the work of the Kingdom and people loved her. Frequently she was spoken of as "Our Lady of the Parsonage." To many of us who knew her best she was Nelle, or Miss Nellie. She had a keen sense of humor and an exquisite beauty of soul and warmth of heart; truly, the spirit of compassion graced her in her walk through life. She was devoted to her loved ones, and while she worked faithfully with her preacher-husband she never neglected the members of her household. None could surpass her as a wife and mother. Her children called her both Nellie and mother and their love and devotion for her forms a beautiful picture of the Christian Home. Nelle and Clyde were sweethearts from childhood to the last moment of her life on earth—often he referred to her as "My Lady" and marvelled that God had blessed him with a help-mate so gracious and versed in wisdom. Truly, Nelle radiated a beauty that began with the "inner glow." They remained a devoted wife and husband for 49 years and were faithful in their loyal and effective service to the church and community in their work in the active ministry for 40 years.

Four children graced their home—a lovely daugher, who greatly resembled her mother in beauty and character, and three fine sons: Robert Wurts, lawyer of Ft. Lauderdale; Mary Martha, wife of Mr. J. C. Sargeant, Jr., Insurance Executive and orange grower, residing in Lakeland; James Fontaine, Manufacturer of Miami, and Clyde C., Jr., pastor of one of the great churches of New Orleans. Ten fine grandchildren complete the family circle of this charming mother and wife.

Nelle and Clyde retired from active duty in June 1960. They had an attractive new home waiting for them in Fort Lauderdale where they were happily located for 13 months, when they left for a month's vacation in Flat Rock, North Carolina. Clyde tells of a lovely week they spent in that "beauty spot" that, as he termed it, seemed to be "a little bit of heaven." The end came suddenly and there was no illness to mar those last days on earth—"Nelle was vivacious and vibrantly alive until the very end" he tells us. On the morning of July 25, 1961, in Hendersonville, North Carolina, she suffered her first heart attack, lingered briefly and then was gone to the "Land that is fairer than day." The funeral service was conducted in the First Methodist Church of Brooksville by the Rev. Donald Comer of Asbury Methodist Church, Vero Beach, on July 28, 1961 at 10:00 A.M. Her body was laid to rest in Hibiscus Garden of the Lauderdale Gardens of Memory. A brief graveside service was held by the Rev. Henry Galloway, Pastor of Plantation Methodist Church where Mrs. Frazier was a member. The Rev. Henry Blackburn, District Superintendent of the West Palm Beach District, also assisted in the service.

Note: Next also assisted in the service. Nelle Wurts Frazier fellowshipped daily with her Lord and Saviour. It was natural, then, that her daily life would radiate His goodness and tender mercy. These lines of her husband, the Rev. Clyde C. Frazier, bespeak the deathlessness of her vibrant personality and the imperishable nature of her soul.

Surviving also are some nieces and nephews living in Indiana. Two of five children have previously been claimed by death, namely, Captain W. Price Buhrman, Jr., killed in Normandy, World War II, and Rev. A. Ronk Buhrman, at the time of his death, pastor of Trinity Methodist Church, DeLand, Florida.

A short time after the birth of Effie May Ronk her parents moved to New Ross, Indiana where her father became a partner in a store. Effie in her teens, in an evangelistic service, made her declaration of acceptance of our Lord Jesus Christ as her personal Savior, and joined the church, soon becoming an active member. She remained, all her life, very faithful in her belief, continuing quite "old fashioned" concerning the Scriptural declarations of the essentials of salvation. Dr. Buhrman informs us that she made it a habit to look out for any in the congregations who seemed lonesome or unhappy and always gave them a friendly handshake and hearty personal attention. He also says that, in addition to her being an excellent and charming wife and a very wise mother, she was a real comrade with him in all his work as a pastor and presiding elder. Moreover, since it was in those periods of time in which he served on Districts that the children needed the most direction, he feels that it was greatly due to the mother that all five of the children were successfully brought along the line of duty and honor.

Effie May Ronk and W. P. Buhrman met first in Rockwood, Tennessee in the month of March 1900, where she had been spending the winter months with friends. They were married on the 27th of September of that year, attended the sessions of the Holston Conference, meeting in Chattanooga in October, and went at once to the appointment given Brother Buhrman at Lenoir City, Tennessee.

Mrs. Buhrman, although coming from Indiana and not used to Southern churches or Methodist Conferences, nevertheless, promptly came to love the M. E. Church South, and the Southern country. She also became a happy member of her husband's family and kin. Once there was almost an embarrassment created when Brother Buhrman's mother said "Effie, I love you best of all.

In the summer of 1960 Dr. and Mrs. Buhrman took a trip by car to Virginia and Tennessee and revisited the places of their marriage and service. A Golden Sunset Trip-marking 60 years of married life.

In a long illness of nine months she manifested a great deal of courage and determination to live and as she rallied surprisingly often from many "bad spells" someone said, "How can you?" and she answered, "I think I am *vital.*" In the hospital and in the home she expressed thanks for so many kindnesses, often saying, "You are so good to me," also many times indulging in a sly and easy humor.

MRS. T. L. Z. BARR

Mrs. Hattie Clyde Hodges Barr, wife of the late Rev. T. L. Z. Barr, passed to the home of her heavenly Father quietly and without a murmur, from her favorite chair in the living room of her home June 20, 1961.

While sitting in this chair, she penned thousands of letters of sympathy and reassurance. From this spot, there also emanated scores of speeches presented in this area and in distant cities by many friends who requested her assistance for a variety of special occasions.

Hattie Clyde, born in the home of her parents, James Robert and Rhoda Hodges, on the shores of the beautiful Apalachicola Bay, was an active, loyal worker in her local Methodist church. While a very young lady, even before her marriage, she was active as a professional speaker in opposing alcoholic beverages in various counties and cities.

As a pastor's wife, Mrs. Barr was a boon to every congregation served. Her glowing spirit was contageous and her energy boundless. She not only played major roles in a variety of programs, but she organized activities around the talents and personal resources of the parishioners. Much that was necessary in plays and skits by young people had to be created and this pastor's wife was a guiding light. The physical part, in the nature of scenery and other props, was needed hundreds of times in the ongoing, busy, Methodist Churches served, but this was a relatively small part when related to the script, the songs, and the poems composed for hundreds of specialized programs in addition to those needed for the regular worship programs in the sanctuary. The songs, the music, the poetry which abounds now for use in programs such as Fathers' Day was then almost non-existent. This lack would have meant spiritual poverty for certain seasons save for the creativity of Mrs. Barr.

The vast host of friends that knew and loved Mrs. Barr recognized among her leading qualities a constant cheerful spirit and a ready smile. Difficult and adverse situations would not dampen her spirit. It was a major factor of happiness to those who came near her.

Mrs. Barr was steadfast in her faith and loyalty after her husband departed. Never was she in the presence of one or a group that spoke a word of criticism of a Methodist Church or a pastor but that she immediately and courageously came to the defense, and, in fact, took the initiative in praising highly, valuable qualities that could always be found. She worked for her church and prayed for her pastors.

for her church and prayed for her pastors. Mrs. Barr loved and was loved not only by her husband but by the children in this parsonage home: Myra (Mrs. Alex Spencer), Candler Galloway, Orville Asbury, and Coke L. Barr. Before she died, four grandchildren had become sufficiently of age to love and adore their "Gram."

Besides being the wife of a preacher, she did the actual preaching on hundreds of occasions in many nearby churches, as well as in her husband's church in emergencies. Her speaking ability, as well as her spiritual qualities, won such acclaim that requests for her services were frequent.

In addition to serving when needed in the most formal role as a preacher, she was frequently making church visits at the side of her husband, teaching Sunday School classes, singing in the choir, playing the piano, serving as an official in local and state groups, teaching study courses, and organizing special programs.

Perennially much of mankind has lost sight of values. Not so with Mrs. Barr. Her sights were true; her aim was high. Worthwhile and eternal values were crystal clear in her vision.

She was loyal to God, to her family, and to The Methodist Church. She pledged her loyalty to Christ and joined the church at the age of eight. Her life was long and vigorous.

The colorful attire of Mrs. Barr marked her as feminine and individualistic but always in good taste. This reflected her glowing personality—always bright and vivacious. She disliked drabness in physical surroundings and disliked drabness in human lives. Insipid, colorless existence was synonymous with buried talents and thus abhorred.

Mrs. Barr's funeral was conducted in the First Methodist Church, Jacksonville, with Dr. Robert M. Blackburn, Dr. P. M. Boyd, and Dr. Milburn McLeod officiating. Her body was interred in the Evergreen Cemetery, Jacksonville, Florida. Only the best can be said about Mrs. T. L. Z. (Hattie Clyde) Barr. She was loved and is missed. Her influence was profound and will continue to live.

MRS. C. C. TYLER

Mrs. Nora M. Tyler was born in Arkansas of the family of Marley on June 17, 1888. She was the second wife of the Rev. C. C. Tyler and was faithful to him in his chosen call to preach.

He served for years in Texas, where their daughter, Mrs. Lois Tyler Warner, was born, and had tremendous difficulty during those days because salaries were low and the people whom the parsonage family served had nothing with which to pay except their own food. On one of their "poundings" they received ten pounds of black pepper. Mr. Tyler was truly a circuit rider, traveled by horse and buggy and often many miles between his appointments until later he was able to secure an unreliable Model T Ford. When they came to Florida he had a white horse named "Billy" that often took refuge in Lake Tyler which was named for Mr. Tyler.

During all of this time Mrs. Tyler showed courage and determination that you would find in the pioneers of our nation and state and stayed with her husband during many experiences of deprivation and literally almost lived in the churches or between them because there was the Missionary Society, and Sunday School classes to be taught. There came a time when Mrs. Tyler had to teach school to keep the

There came a time when Mrs. Tyler had to teach school to keep the family together because money was not coming in for them. The only station they ever held was Dunnellon, the last year of his life. Mr. Tyler entered the church eternal in 1927, and then Mrs. Tyler had to continue working so that her daughter could receive an education.

BENJAMIN MARVIN MONTGOMERY

The Rev. Benjamin Marvin Montgomery was born in Magnolia, Arkansas, May 8, 1892, and died in the Orlando Air Force Base Hospital, Orlando, Florida, May 26, 1962. He married Evelyn Amelia Austin on June 8, 1927, the ceremony taking place on the lawn at the Methodist Children's Home—an event that brought about one of our finest families. To this union was born Marvin Lewis Montgomery on January 21, 1929; Shirley Anita Montgomery, December 12, 1931; Evelyn Joyce Montgomery Owens, November 15, 1938; and Eugene Neal Montgomery, January 16, 1944. Each of these young people has received his or her degree from Emory University, just as their father before them. Marvin, a Bachelor of Science degree; Shirley and Joyce, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing; and Eugene, a Bachelor of Business Administration.

Brother Montgomery was a man of deep and tender sensibility, full of courtesy and good spirit, and was never failing in loyal attachment to his friends. He loved a good joke and could tell a humorous story to perfection, but his mind was too clean and his love of purity too high ever to indulge in a smutty yarn. I knew him and loved him for all the years since I first met him at Emory University back in 1925. I had hoped that Ben, as I affectionately called him, would be able to help me this year as a part of the staff of our Church.

As indicated above, he just passed on life's highway that point that marks the high goal, three score years and ten, and being weary for a moment laid down into this dreamless sleep that kissed his eyelids still. While yet in love with life and raptured with the world, he passed on into that silence and eternity from whence he came. "A Prince and a great man has fallen in Israel." Albert Alexander Hagler was born December 10, 1878, at Virden, Illinois. He was one of ten children born to Harvey Thomas Hagler and Minerva Eleanor Young Hagler. STANDING RULES OF THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

I. ORGANIZATION OF THE CONFERENCE

1. The Secretary shall be elected at the first session following the General Conference, and shall serve for the quadrennium. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.

a. The Secretary shall have such assistants as he may desire, elected by the Conference on his nomination.

b. The Secretary shall edit and publish the Conference Minutes.

c. Should the Conference, or the World Service and Finance Commission, fail to make distribution of the apportionments to the Districts, the Secretary shall place such apportionments in the hands of the District Superintendents within 10 days of the adjournment of the Conference. d. He shall be the custodian of the books and archives of the Conference and shall annually report where they are kept.

and shall annually report where they are kept. 2. A committee on Journal shall be elected at the beginning of each annual session upon nomination of the Secretary, and shall consist of three members of the conference session. Such committee shall examine the daily journal, make any needed corrections, and report back to the next meeting, and the adoption of their report shall be the approval of the minutes.

3. The Conference Statistician shall be elected at the first session following the General Conference, and shall serve for the quadrennium. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.

a. The Statistical Secretary shall collect the statistics of the Conference, and shall edit the Statistical Tables in the annual Journal.

b. He shall employ such help as is necessary to do the work accurately and expeditiously, any expense to be paid by the Secretary out of the apportionment for "Minutes and Incidentals."

c. The cabinet shall determine the date each year after which the Statistician shall accept no reports.

d. Fractions shall not be used in making statistical reports.

e. The Statistician shall see that every report made by a charge or a church agrees with the record of the Conference Treasurer.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall be elected at the first session following the General Conference, on nomination of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. The Treasurer shall serve for a quadrennium, or until his successor shall be elected and qualified.

a. The Treasurer shall receive, receipt for, and disburse as directed by the Conference all monies collected on apportionments for general work, conference work, and such other monies as the Conference may direct.

b. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall have full authority and supervision over the Conference Treasurer, and after consultation with the Bishop in Charge, it shall have the power to remove from office for cause or to fill vacancy ad interim. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall have the books of the Conference Treasurer audited within forty-five days of the close of the Annual Conference.

c. The Conference Treasurer shall make monthly distributions to the treasurers of the several Annual Conference boards and causes for all Conference work and to the treasurers of the several General Conference Boards and causes for all general work according to the percentage of the apportionments for general and conference work adopted by the Annual Conference. All amounts paid in on all causes beyond the apportioned amounts, other than the percentage for General World Service, shall be placed in the various Conference Reserve Funds at the end of each fiscal year, as stipulated by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

d. The treasurer shall procure from the Statistical Secretary or from the district superintendents a report of the apportionments accepted by the several charges within the Conference and shall settle with those charges by that report. He shall have no power to waive or change this rule.

e. He shall, on the 25th day of each month, with the exception of June, July and August, furnish each district superintendent a statement of the amounts of monies received by him for all causes from each pastoral charge within that district; each such statement to include all monies received from the closing of the Annual Conference to the date issued.

f. He shall cooperate with the Statistical Secretary in seeing that correct financial reports are made to the Conference.

g. All special day funds shall be remitted through the Conference Treasurer.

h. "The Conference Treasurer shall close his books for the year on the Wednesday nearest to 10 days prior to the opening day of the Conference, and all monies received after that date shall be credited in the ensuing Conference year."

II. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

1. The District Superintendents are a standing committee to nominate the officers, boards and committees of the Conference and to nominate persons to fill vacancies thereon, except as otherwise provided by the *Discipline*, or by these rules.

2. The District Superintendents shall report annually to the Statistical Secretary the statistics concerning the district parsonages.

3. In the absence of the pastor, each district superintendent shall report for the charge in the same manner as the pastor.

4. An appointment to the District Superintendency shall vacate membership in any Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee of the Conference, except Trustees, unless the General or Annual Conference provides otherwise.

5. The District Superintendents shall report to the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations the names and addresses of any candidates for Church vocational service.

6. Each District Superintendent shall, at the earliest possible date, file with the Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, with the Conference Treasurer, and with the Statistical Secretary an accurate statement of the amounts of apportionments accepted by the various Quarterly Conferences within his district.

7. Each District Superintendent shall, as early in the year as possible, furnish to the Conference Lay Leader and to the General Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities the names and addresses of all charge and church lay leaders in his district, same to be determined as provided in the *Discipline*.

III. BOARDS, STANDING COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

1. Each board or committee of the Conference shall cause to be printed in the Conference Minutes an exact statement of the salaries and expenses paid on account of any person employed by the said board or committee.

2. Each board, committee or institution of the Conference shall make an exact annual report to the Conference of monies it has received and what disposition has been made of them, and each shall file annually with the Bishop and Cabinet and the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance a complete statement of its financial condition, showing all assets and liabilities.

3. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall contract with the Conference Treasurer, subject to the Conference, for

his service and the manner in which he shall manage the funds of the Conference; shall take from him an indemnity bond in such amount as shall cover whatever amount may be deposited in the bank, and shall annually have his books and accounts audited by a certified public accountant, and print the report of the same.

4. Unless otherwise ordered by the Conference, the Commission on World Service and Finance shall distribute the apportionments to the districts on a basis agreed upon with the cabinet.

5. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine annually what amount shall be necessary to print and publish the Minutes and shall assess the same upon the Conference along with the other apportionments.

6. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall have the responsibility for promoting and administering the Florida Conference Ten-In-One program.

7. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall have the responsibility for the administration of the Methodist Building, 800 E. Palmetto Avenue, Lakeland, Florida.

8. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall designate the depository or depositories for Conference funds.

9. No Board or Agency of the Conference shall be allowed to obligate itself beyond its anticipated annual income, except by $\frac{3}{4}$ vote of both the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the Cabinet; provided this restriction does not apply to Florida Southern College and the Florida Methodist Children's Home.

10. The Board of Pensions shall cause to be printed in the Minutes of the Conference the name and post office address of each Conference Claimant together with the amount paid to him annually.

11. At the beginning of each Annual Conference session, any vacancy to be filled shall be reported to the Conference, and the district superintendents shall nominate persons to fill the vacancy, subject to election by the Conference, except where otherwise specified by the *Discipline*.

12. Membership on a Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee, shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, except trustees of our Conference institutions, who shall not serve for more than nine (9) years consecutively, and shall not be eligible for membership for two (2) years. Membership shall not be held in more than one of the quadrennial boards, committees or commissions, provided, however that this rule does not apply to trustees or to members of the Conference Committee of Investigation, or to ex-officio members, or to others provided by the Discipline.

13. Offices in the Annual Conference and membership on the Boards, Committees or Commissions shall be held only by effective clerical members of the Conference, and by laymen who have not reached their 72nd birthday, except ex-officio members.

14. Members of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall not be members in or serve upon any other of the standing organizations of the conference, whether board, committee, commission or trustees, receiving appropriations from the Conference. 15. District Lay Leaders and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be

15. District Lay Leaders and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendent and the Conference Lay Leader. The Conference Lay Leader and the district superintendent of the district affected shall have authority to fill vacancies in the office of District Lay Leader or Associate District Lay Leader.

16. It shall be the duty of every board or commission holding property to provide the district superintendent with a complete list of its holdings within the district. The list shall include the title under which the property is held, a description of the land, and whether or not the property is exempt from taxes. The secretary of the Board or Commission shall report any changes in the list promptly.

17. The Charter and By Laws of each incorporated Conference Board

or Institution shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, and shall be printed in the Journal of the Annual Conference once in each eight years. The Conference Secretary shall be notified immediately of any proposed changes in said charter or bylaws.

IV. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions shall be typed for submission to the Annual Conference, and shall be submitted to the Secretary in duplicate.

2. No report or resolution shall be acted upon until a duplicate of it is in the hands of the Secretary, except a resolution extending a vote of thanks.

3. The Journal Secretary shall list all calendar dates mentioned in reports and resolutions, and report discovered conflicts to the Conference prior to adjournment of the session.

4. Any resolution not coming from an established board, commission, or committee, shall be referred to the Committee on Reference before discussion on the floor of the Conference.

V. THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE

1. Lay membership in the District Conference shall consist of those lay members from each pastoral charge named in the *Discipline*, with the addition of the president of Methodist Men, and the president of the Youth Council or Senior Methodist Youth Fellowship.

2. In addition to the above, the Quarterly Conference shall have the privilege of electing two additional delegates and two reserve delegates.

VI. BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

1. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall present to the Conference to be filed among its papers a complete biographical sketch of all persons admitted into full connection and of all persons received by transfer; and of the latter, a sketch of the ministry up to date when received by transfer.

2. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall require each applicant, including those being admitted from other churches, to present a certificate of good health from a practicing physician and an itemized statement of his financial obligations.

3. Any graduate of a seminary not approved by the University Senate desiring to enter the Florida Conference on trial under the Seminary Rule, must have completed one additional full academic year of study in a Seminary approved by the University Senate.

4. All candidates for On Trial and Full Connection status shall appear in person before the Board for interviewing.

5. Candidates for Full Connection under the provisions for two years supervised field work in the *Discipline* shall spend one of these years in the Florida Conference.

6. Candidates from other denominations may have their Orders recognized as Deacons; provided, however, that in clearly exceptional cases the Conference may recognize Orders at the Elder's level by a three-fourths vote of the Board and the Conference; and such candidates shall be On Trial not less than two years.

7. Beginning June 1964 candidates under thirty years of age are required to complete the B.D., or an equivalent degree, before admission into Full Connection.

8. Candidates for Admission on Trial from other conferences shall also be recommended by a District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications of the Florida Annual Conference.

VII. THE MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. In addition to the daily Journal of the proceedings and the statistics of the Conference, the Minutes shall contain the following: a. The names and addresses of the officers of the Conference.

b. A chronological list of the clerical members showing when they entered the itinerancy and what order.

c. An alphabetical list of the superannuate, supernumerary, and active members with their post office addresses. All men in special relationships and under special appointments are responsible for keeping the Secretary advised of their addresses.

d. A list of the undergraduates, showing the year they are in and their post office addresses.

e. A list of the lay members by districts and their post office addresses. f. A list of the local preachers by districts, showing whether deacons, elders or licentiates, with the Church in which membership is held.

g. A list of the boards and standing committees with the names of their officers and members and post office addresses of officers and lay members.

2. A copy of the charter of each incorporated Board or Institution of the Conference shall be published once in every eight years, on a schedule to be determined by the secretary, in accordance with Rule III-18.

3. The Secretary shall furnish the State Librarian two copies of the Minutes of each session of the Conference.

4. The expense of the printing and distribution of the Journal shall be provided according to Rule III-5.

VIII. CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

1. The Annual Conference shall meet upon invitation at such places as may be selected by the conference, or by the Bishop and Cabinet, if so directed by the Conference.

2. Entertainment for pastors with minimum income, retired preachers, supplies, and men applying for Admission on Trial shall be provided or supplemented as may from time to time be determined by the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Cabinet, and the host Church or Institution.

3. All other preachers and lay delegates shall provide for their own entertainment, but it is recommended to all churches, where possible, that they make provision for such expenses, at least in part.

IX. FINANCIAL APPEALS

1. No financial appeal or fund-raising effort whatsoever shall be made beyond the local charge unless first authorized by action of the Annual Conference, or if in a District, by the District Conference.

2. Authorization of the Conference shall be secured by presenting, prior to the Annual Conference session, the purpose and plan of the appeal to the Board involved, to the Commission on World Service and Finance, and to the Cabinet.

3. Upon authorization of the Annual Conference, the Cabinet shall assign the appeal to a place on the calendar of the Conference.

4. Emergency appeals between sessions of the Conference may be authorized in clearly unusual circumstances of great emergency, only after the combined approval of the Bishop and Cabinet, the Boards involved, and the Commission on World Service and Finance.

X. YEARS OF SERVICE FOR ANNUITY CREDIT AS AN APPROVED SUPPLY PASTOR

1. In determining eligibility for annuity credit for years of service as an approved supply pastor prior to 1952, applicant must prove full-time service in accordance with disciplinary requirements.

2. No approved supply credit shall be given for years in which the applicant is appointed as a student supply, while preparing for admission on trial.

3. To be eligible for annuity credit as an approved supply, one must be receiving minimum salary support or the equivalent.

4. A Conference committee on service years shall investigate all cases in which the Cabinet, Conference Secretary, Board of Pension, or other authority questions the eligibility of the applicant for claimed years of service. Said committee shall be composed of one member of the Cabinet appointed by the District Superintendents, one member of the Board of Pensions appointed by said board, and the Conference Secretary. All applicants shall have the right of appeal to the floor of the Annual Conference from the decision of said committee, but lacking such appeal, the decision of the committee is considered final.

5. Nothing in this article shall be construed to interfere in any way with the full supervision over the granting of pension claims by the Board of Pensions when a man has entered the retired relationship. Nor shall this article prevent the Cabinet in clearly unusual cases granting a year of annuity credit under the proper disciplinary question.

6. It shall be the business of each approved supply pastor to ascertain that the Secretary's record of his annuity years is properly carried in the Conference Journal, and that he has been given annuity credit year by year under the proper disciplinary question. After June, 1962, an approved supply minister eligible for annuity credit for a year of service, whose name has not been included in answer to the Disciplinary question, shall be responsible for bringing this matter to the attention of the Conference Secretary, and shall secure a statement from the District Superintendent under whom he served, or his successor, that he is entitled to such year. Failure to do so by the next session of the Annual Conference shall negate any future claim for this year.

XI. AMENDMENTS AND SUSPENSIONS

1. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a majority (counted) of those present and voting.

2. The Standing Rules may be amended or changed by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting; provided the proposed amendment or change has been read in open conference and/or circulated in printed form signed by not less than seven members of the Annual Conference at least one day before the vote is taken.
