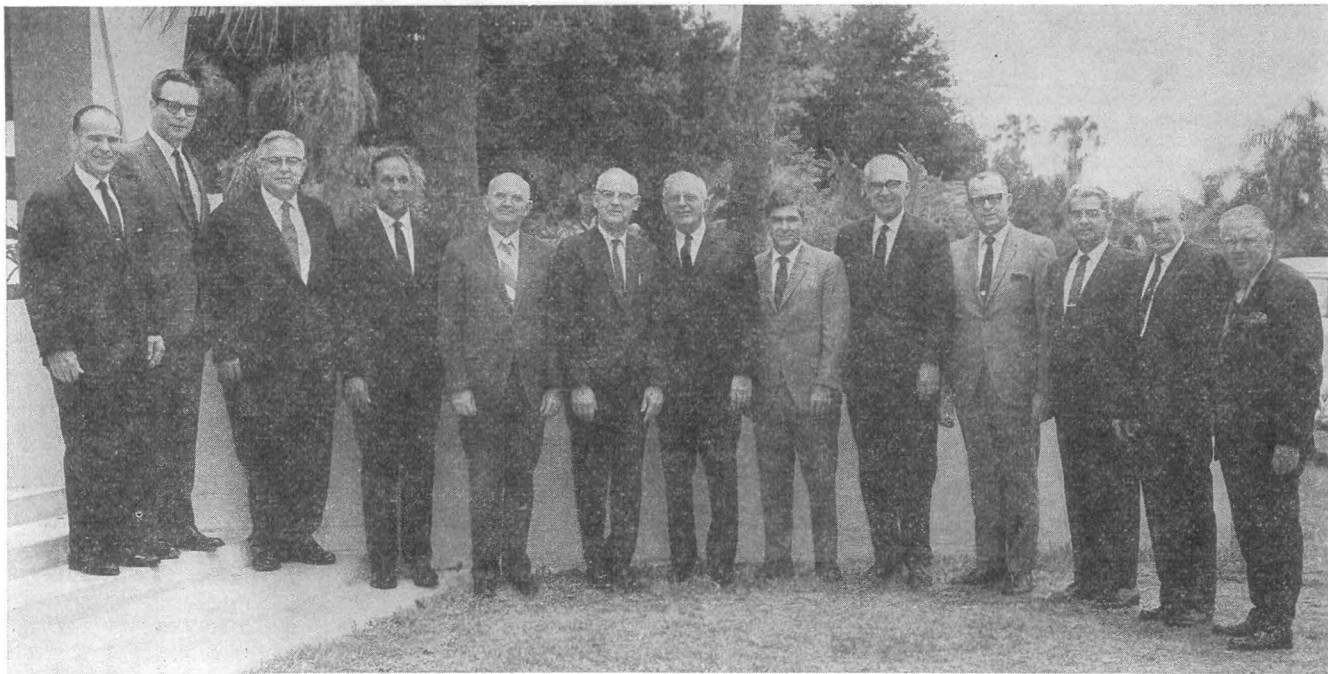
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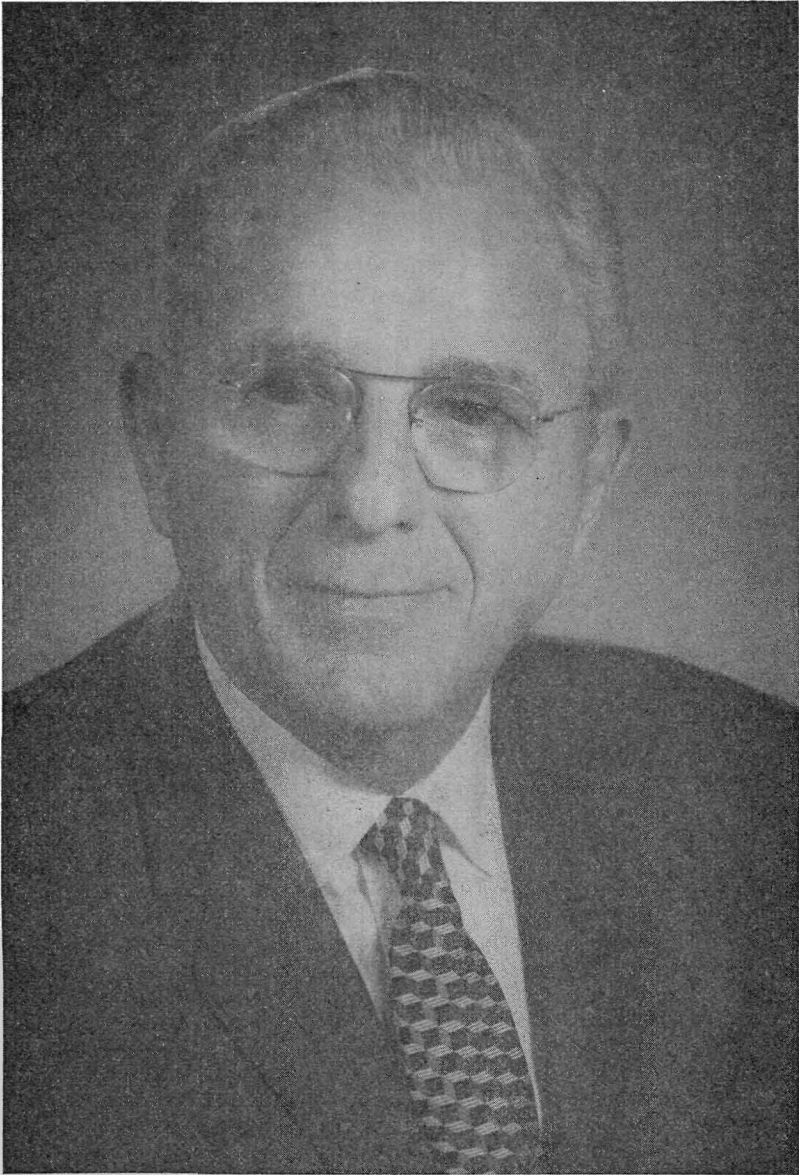



Florida Conference, formerly The Methodist Church (SEJ)
September 5, 1968**

A Special Service, uniting the Florida Conference, formerly Evangelical United Brethren and the Florida Conference, formerly The Methodist Church (SEJ), was held in the First United Methodist Church, Lakeland, Florida, September 5, 1968, at 7:30 p.m., with Bishop James W. Henley, presiding. Following the Call to Worship and the Prayer (in unison), the hymn "Ye Servants of God" was sung. Bishop Henley made an introductory statement, after which the Cathedral Choir sang the anthem: "How Lovely Is Thy Dwelling-Place," and Ross M. Geiger read the Scripture. "O Love Divine, What Hast Thou Done" was sung. Bishop Henley, assisted by Ross M. Geiger, William R. Obaugh, John J. Rooks, Walter B. Rutland, and the District Superintendents, administered the the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Following the singing of "Jesus, United By Thy Grace," William G. Hawk and John M. Sikes, in that order, spoke on "We Bring to This Union." Bishop Henley spoke on "The Significance of This Hour," after which William G. Hawk, John M. Sikes, William A. Meadows, Jr., and John Grant, Jr. with Bishop Henley, participated in the Ceremony of Union, with the members present joining in the declaration of unity. The service concluded with the singing of the Doxology.

MINUTES

SPECIAL SESSION

THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, SEJ (FORMERLY CJ)

UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

**Called into Session on Saturday, September 21, 1968
Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Florida**

A special Session of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ (formerly CJ), The United Methodist Church, was held in the Gertrude Hotchkiss Heyn Memorial Chapel, Bethune-Cookman College, Saturday, September 21, 1968, for the specific purpose of acting on a RESOLUTION for the MERGER of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ, and the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ (formerly CJ), of The United Methodist Church.

Bishop James W. Henley of the Florida Area called the Conference to order at 10:05 A.M. The congregation of more than three hundred delegates and visitors joined in the singing of "How Great Thou Art." The Reverend William Ferguson, Superintendent of the North Florida District, brought the invocation.

The Service of Holy Communion was celebrated by James W. Henley, Presiding Bishop, the Florida Area; Reverend Cubell A. Johnson, Superintendent, the South Florida District; Reverend William Ferguson, Superintendent, the North Florida District; Reverend Arthur R. Crowell, Superintendent, the Central Florida District, and Reverend Rogers P. Fair, minister of Stewart Memorial Church and Chaplain at Bethune-Cookman College. The Bethune-Cookman College Concert Choir, under the direction of Mr. Thomas D. Demps, furnished music for the occasion. Bishop Henley's Communion Meditation was brief, but particularly inspiring in its message on the nature of our witness for Christ. A total of 351 persons came to the altar to partake of the elements of the Lord's Supper. The Service closed with the singing of "The King of Heaven His Table Spreads."

Following the benediction the Conference was declared in recess for ten minutes by Bishop Henley.

The Conference was reconvened at 11:20 A.M. with a brief song service led by Reverend Eddie J. Rivers, Jr. Bishop Henley expressed his delight at the large attendance to the Special Session, and stated the need to establish the bar of the Conference for the purpose of voting on "a most important document." On a motion by Reverend William Ferguson, the Conference voted to include the first seven rows of seats to the front of the chapel as the bar of the conference. All persons, other than full ministerial members of the Conference, and duly elected lay delegates, were withdrawn from within the bar of the conference.

Bishop Henley called upon the Conference Secretary to read the rolls of ministerial and lay members of the Conference. With four reserve delegates being properly certified by their respective District Superintendents, a total of ninety-four (94) Conference members were eligible to vote on the RESOLUTION for MERGER. Bishop Henley then explained fully the intent of the RESOLUTION, and the method by which the Special Session was authorized, explaining that the Cabinet of the Florida Conference (formerly CJ), over which he

presided, met and voted unanimously to call the Conference into session. Bishop Henley then spoke to the Resolution, emphasizing its provisions in terms of representation by members of the Florida Conference (formerly CJ) on all major Boards, Commissions, Committees and other agencies of the merged Conference, the full acceptance of its ministry in terms of minimum salary, pension, appointment, etc.

Bishop Henley then explained that although a Negro District Superintendent would not be appointed immediately, that at no time would the Cabinet of the merged Conference fail to have a representative of the former Florida Conference, CJ, in consultation in the Cabinet. He then promised that a Negro would be appointed as District Superintendent in the merged Conference before the end of the quadrennium. Bishop Henley answered several questions with regard to Cabinet representation, and asked the Conference to have the same faith in him that he had in the Conference.

Preceding the reading of the RESOLUTION the Conference voted a rule limiting the discussion of the Resolution to three (3) minutes by any one delegate. Reverend J. B. F. Williams, chairman of the Inter-Jurisdictional Committee, came forward and spoke briefly on the history and work of the committee, and then presented its members.

It was brought to the attention of the Conference that two names had been omitted from the membership of the Inter-Jurisdictional Committee: Reverend S. S. Robinson, Jr. and Mrs. Sylvia Portier. Bishop Henley then instructed the secretary to add these names to the committee.

Reverend J. B. F. Williams then presented Dr. Richard V. Moore for the reading of the RESOLUTION, with copies distributed to the Conference. Following the reading of same, Dr. Moore moved its adoption, seconded by Reverend J. B. F. Williams. Bishop Henley then called for the discussion of the RESOLUTION. Concern was expressed over the fact that the RESOLUTION was not distributed for study in advance of the session by Mr. James Gardner. Reverend S. S. Robinson, Jr. expressed a similar concern for this, and also for the fact that the Negro Methodists should have representation in the Cabinet of the merged Conference. Mr. William Jennings asked for clarity on the Bishop's promise to appoint a Negro District Superintendent in the near future. Mr. John Burges spoke toward the fact that we must not labor under the assumption that there are no Negro ministers qualified to serve as District Superintendents. He stated that there are plenty qualified Negroes. Dr. Richard V. Moore stated that it was his hope that in the future persons will be appointed to all positions on the basis of their qualification and character, and without regard to race.

Mr. Herbert Coleman expressed faith in the good faith of Bishop Henley in his promise to appoint a Negro District Superintendent, but thought that such a promise should be placed in writing, since "we are all subject to death or some other reason for removal." Several delegates questioned the nature of the positions that our Cabinet representatives would hold short of being District Superintendents. Bishop Henley stated that the use of the title of Counseling Elders was used for the lack of a better designation, only, and restated that at all times a representative of the former Florida Conference, CJ, would sit with the Cabinet during the appointment of ministers formerly affiliated with that Conference.

Reverend Rogers P. Fair called for the previous question, which was unanimously voted by the Conference, clearing the way for a vote on the RESOLUTION.

A move to require a secret ballot on the RESOLUTION failed for the lack of a second. Bishop Henley then called for a standing vote on the adoption of the RESOLUTION.

The vote was as follows:

Eligible to Vote	94
Voting on RESOLUTION	86
Voting Adoption of RESOLUTION	71—82.5%
Voting Against Adoption of RESOLUTION	15—17.5

Thus the RESOLUTION was adopted.

Reverend William Higgins was extended the privilege of the floor for the presentation of an additional Resolution with regard to Negro representation in the Cabinet of the merged Conference. With minor changes in wording, the Resolution was unanimously adopted on a motion by the writer. The Resolution—

September 21, 1968

Due to the prevailing feeling of members of the Florida Annual Conference (formerly CJ) that immediate representation by one of its members in the Cabinet of merged Conference is of vital importance, and because such a stipulation was not a part of the Resolution for Merger passed by this body;

We the members of the Florida Annual Conference (formerly CJ) respectfully request that the Bishop, with all due deliberation, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, seek and appoint at least one member of the former Florida Conference, CJ, as a District Superintendent, with all the rights, privileges, and authority of any other District Superintendent in the merged Conference.

The Special Session was adjourned with the understanding that two important reports on the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference would be read during lunch, making the afternoon session unnecessary. Bishop James W. Henley pronounced the benediction.

RESOLUTION

To Bishop James W. Henley, members of the Cabinet, ministerial and lay members of the Florida Annual Conference, The United Methodist Church; it is with a sense of history that we, the members of THE INTER-JURISDICTIONAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE, present this RESOLUTION to this Special Session of our Conference, touching upon what we hope will be the final hurdle in the direction of an Inclusive Church; and realizing that such an accomplishment will have historic significance unsurpassed by any single event in the long history of Methodism in Florida.

Be it therefore known that this Resolution represents the Joint Action of the Inter-Jurisdictional Committees of the Florida Conference, SEJ, and the Florida Conference, formally CJ; and that this Resolution has received the unanimous approval of the former:

WHEREAS, it is the earnest hope of the membership of the Annual Conferences referred to herein that The United Methodist Church shall become truly racially inclusive; and

Whereas, it is the desire of the membership of the Annual Conference referred to herein to eliminate all forms of discrimination based upon race in The United Methodist Church; and

Whereas, The General Conference of The United Methodist Church has urged that action be taken to bring about mergers of the Annual Conferences of the former Central Jurisdiction with those of the Annual Con-

ferences of the regional Jurisdictions of The United Methodist Church; and

Whereas, we believe the time has come when the churches and membership of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ, and the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ (formerly CJ), can be merged into one; and

Whereas, it is the desire of Annual Conference involved to adopt same on the recommendation of the Joint Committees:

Be It Therefore Resolved That:

1. The Florida Annual Conference, SEJ, and the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ (formerly CJ), shall merge at a Uniting Session to be held in the Branscomb Memorial Auditorium, Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Florida, in June 1969, as the first Order of Business of that Annual Conference. And that an appropriate committee under the direction of the Bishop shall be responsible for the Uniting Service.

2. In the spirit of Christian Brotherhood, the merged Annual Conferences will accept into its membership with all the same rights, privileges and status, all ministerial members of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ (formerly CJ), whether on trial, full connection or retired, and that all ministerial members under special appointment will be properly related to the merged Annual Conference, with membership in their respective Charge Conferences.

3. The pension plan of the merged Annual Conference shall be that of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ, with retired ministers of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ (formerly CJ), being paid the annuity rate of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ.

4. All ministerial members of the merged Annual Conference will be included under the minimum salary provision of the merged Annual Conference.

5. Two members, ministerial and lay, of the Florida Annual Conference, SEJ (formerly CJ), will be given representation on the Conference Council and the Major Boards of the merged Annual Conference for the immediate quadrennium; and that, thereafter, membership on all such Boards, Commissions, Committees and other agencies, shall be open to all Annual Conference members, both lay and clerical, on the basis of qualification and service only.

6. All Approved Lay Pastors from the two Annual Conferences shall be similarly considered by the Board of the Ministry and the Cabinet as their services may be required, and by the District Superintendents of the merged Annual Conferences.

7. A Committee on Conference Union, successor to the Committee on Inter-Conference Relations, shall be appointed by the Bishop of the Florida Area at the Annual Conference, June 1969, to function for a period of four years. Membership of the Committee shall be composed of at least seven members, either lay or ministerial, two of whom shall be members of the former Florida Conference, CJ, and one of whom shall be a member of the Florida Evangelical United Brethren Conference (formerly). The responsibility of the Committee shall be to insure compliance with the provisions of the merger, and to assist in the interpretation, programs and activities that will help to insure, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, the wedding of the Annual Conferences involved in merger into ONE in the Fellowship and Spirit of Jesus Christ.

CERTIFICATE OF VOTE TO MERGE

This is to certify that the Florida Conference, historically SEJ, received a resolution for merger during its annual sessions June 5-8, 1968, which had been drawn by the Joint Committee on Inter-Conference Relations from the Florida Conference, historically SEJ, and the Florida Conference, historically CJ. The sessions were held in Branscomb Memorial Auditorium, Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Florida. The resolution for merger was passed by a margin of seven hundred forty-eight (748) favoring to two (2) opposing.

A called session of the Florida Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction (historically CJ), was authorized by the unanimous vote of the three district superintendents and the bishop for September 21, 1968, at Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Florida. This conference considered the identical resolution for merger and the same was passed by a margin of seventy-one (71) favoring to fifteen (15) opposing.

The above merger will be effected at ceremonies in June 1969. A copy of the joint resolution thus approved is attached.

Opening: The Ninety-Eighth and final Session of the Florida Annual Conference (formerly CJ) of The United Methodist Church was convened in the Pfeiffer Chapel, Florida Southern College, Monday, June 2, at 11:10 A.M., with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. An audience of approximately 250 delegates and visitors joined in the singing of Wesley's "O For A Thousand Tongues . . ." following which George E. H. Harper brought the invocation, and J. W. Woods read from the Holy Scripture.

Bishop Henley introduced President Charles T. Thrift, Jr., president of Florida Southern College, who brought greetings to the delegation. H. Maurice Felton, secretary of the Florida Conference (SEJ), brought comments on the registration procedure and greetings to the Conference.

Following the singing of "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" Bishop Henley presented William Ferguson, Superintendent of the North Florida District, who brought the sermon, Combining the scriptural texts from John 13:7, and 1 Corinthians 13:12, Brother Ferguson lifted the audience as he spoke of the limited knowledge of man, compared to the infinite knowledge and love of God. He described the merger as an "act of faith," and exalted the Conference not to be hasty in judgment, or make the mistake of judging the merits of "a play at intermission." "We must see the whole play," he stated. He further compared our venture in faith to looking through windows into a house. "We must secure the key and get into the house to see its completeness." He ended on the theme of Faith in God's purpose and power.

Afternoon: The afternoon session began promptly at 1:45 P.M., with a brief devotional session led by Roosevelt Dell, Jr. and Aaron D. Hall.

Roll Call: The Conference Secretary called the several rolls of the Conference, revealing a total of 34 ministerial and 33 lay members present. The roll call also revealed that two retired men passed during the year: James Banks and Lonnie J. Zimmerman. Bishop Henley asked the Conference to stand as Cubell A. Johnson brought the memorial prayer. Mrs. Ida J. Rivers, wife of Eddie J. Rivers, Jr., passed away in December, 1968.

Reports: The following reports were adopted by vote of the Conference (see Section on Reports): The Composite Report of the District Superintendents was read by Cubell A. Johnson; William Ferguson read the Report of the Board of the Ministry; Aaron D. Hall read the Report of the Treasurer (he was given a standing ovation for his long years of service); E. H. Johnson read the Report of the Statistician (see Table No. I); Dr. Richard V. Moore read the Report of the Board of the Laity; and Mrs. Willie L. Pinesett read the Report of the Women's Society of Christian Service.

The Conference acted upon Questions 20-45, pertaining to the Ministry (see Condensed Minutes), presented by William Ferguson. Following a brief recess, the Conference reconvened at 4:00 P.M., with the devotional period led by Joshua Reddick.

Bishop Henley called upon the Conference Secretary to read the Composite Reports of the following Boards and Agencies, which were adopted, subject to amendments (see Section on Reports): The Board of Missions; Bethune-Cookman College; Commission on Town and Country Work; the Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home; the Board of Education; and the Historical Society and Archives. Two Resolutions were read by Cubell A. Johnson, proposing the sale of abandoned properties in Cocoa, Fla., for

which bids in the amounts of \$8,000 and \$15,000 respectively, had been received from interested buyers. The Conference voted authority for the sales (see Section on Resolutions). A Resolution (verbally stated) by William Ferguson granted the sale of the property of the Mt. Carmel Church at LaCrosse, Fla., with the proceeds to be invested with the merged congregations, once this is determined.

Evening Session: The Evening Session began at 7:00 P.M. in the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church. Mrs. E. H. Johnson, president of the Ministers' Wives and Daughters Alliance, introduced a most interesting program, centered around "The Asphalt Jungle." The Financial Report, to be turned over to the Permanent Fund for Retired Ministers, revealed the South. Fla. District as having raised the highest amount. Bishop Henley then placed the crown upon the head of Mrs. Aaron D. Hall, and spoke briefly of his great admiration for these women who have labored over the years.

The Women's Society of Christian Service presented what could be described as the Grand Finale to a long and glorious history of Black Methodism in Florida. Led by Mrs. Willie L. Pinesett and Dr. Florence Roane, the audience was silent as this history was unfolded in song, words, and slides. Miss Capitola Williams, herself a child of a deceased Methodist minister and a student at Bethune-Cookman College, sang songs that brought memories of yesterday. Bishop James W. Henley was visibly moved by the dramatic presentation, and spoke with measured words of the New Church and its vast opportunities. He thanked the women for the presentation.

With this presentation the Old Florida Conference passed into history.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S COMPOSITE REPORT FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION

Bishop Henley, Officers, Members and Friends of the Florida Annual Conference:

There is no instrument available, to my knowledge, that can justifiably computerize my feelings of gratitude and humility to Almighty God for the privilege of making this report. It represents the combined efforts of the three District Superintendents of the Florida Conference, the dedicated ministers and the laymen from almost every area of the state of Florida.

Basic Program Calendar Used

The Basic Program Calendar for the Florida Conference was used as the guideline for the implementation of the work that has been done.

After the District Stewards and Pastors' meeting was held on each District where each Charge received its Budget for the conference year, the work of the conference was launched, as we prayed God's richest blessings for its success. Three District Conferences were convened and the required number of Charge Conferences were held on each Charge. Personal guidance was extended to every Pastor and Church where there was a need. Each District Superintendent encouraged every church to conduct an Every Member Canvass, and to prepare and present an organized budget to every member. All Special Days were observed and offerings were lifted and remitted to the proper authorities. The groundwork for the Bishops' Fund of Reconciliation has been done in all districts and the pledges should begin coming in very soon.

District Workshop Held

There were 18 workshops held throughout the Conference this year. In these workshops, efforts were made to create wider and better understandings of the total Program of the Church, and to develop more efficient and effectual leaders. The Quadrennial Theme was stressed and its ultimate goal "A New Church for a New World" was emphasized. Throughout the state, we were invited by the brethren of the Florida Conference S.E.J., to participate in workshops that explored the *Legislature for the Local Church* to enable us to apply with understanding in a more meaningful way. There also came out of the workshops, an underlying apprehensiveness that was easily detected in the clergy as well as laity; it seems that all they could see was a forboding dark cloud of uncertainty. The future is un-

known; but have you given any thought to this fact? The same God who holds you in his hand, holds the future too. So wherever you go, go there with God.

Church Membership

Every local church has accepted the mandate coming from our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, to be a witness for all unto the world, and as a result of our evangelistic zeal, we report that there is a net gain of new members added to the church, which the statistical report will show. However, we shall continue striving to increase the church membership. Our Church School Enrollment has passed the last year figure of 255, the baptisms have doubled. All indications show a definite increase over the last year's membership achievements.

Youth Work

Much emphasis has been stressed on Youth Work throughout the Conference. Whenever or wherever there was an enterprise for United Methodist Youth within our state, or a National meeting elsewhere, we had representation there.

At this time, we wish to thank the Conference Youth Director, Miss G. L. Styles and her Counseling Staff; the Conference President, Miss Rita Tyson, and the District Directors, for a job well done, with a very minimum amount of working capital.

W.S.C.S.

The Women's Society of Christian Service is a group of ladies who are pathfinders in making the church inclusive. These dedicated women have broadened their scope of activities to include male high school students in their scholarships to the school of missions. Their joint meeting in St. Petersburg recently was a glorious sight to behold. It was a tremendous success.

The Pastors

The pastors across the Conference have performed their duties to the best of their abilities. Some of them have churches that are numerically strong, spiritually aglow, and are truly witnessing for our risen Savior the Christ. They have stood up and have been counted for what they thought was right; even though confronted by formidable opposition.

Many of them have renovated and repaired parsonages. Today they are here having made already, reports that are 100% as far as their budget is concerned.

We are thankful to God for such men as these, who are dedicated and consecrated to the task of redemption through the living Christ.

REPORT BOARD OF THE LAITY

Bishop Henley, ministerial and lay members of this historic session of the Florida Annual Conference, we have been drawn to this day and to this place as if by a giant magnet, to witness the closing hours of a dying system of separation, and to behold the birth of a new Methodist posture of unity. This one day will hold memories for many of us who have nostalgic attachments to the years gone by; while yet in our lifetime we can rejoice that we did witness the miracle of man's faith in God, that at last we have opened our ears to Him who said so long ago: "That they all may be one; as thou, father, art in me, and I in thee . . ."

The Board of the Laity has moved with a deeper sense of purpose in the year that is ended. We have seen the need for creating broader basis for understanding both in the structure of our New Church, and the need for a ministry of reconciliation for the months and years that lie ahead.

Our work in the past year has included the following programs:

Emphasis Upon the Structure of The United Methodist Church

Our program of orientation to the new structure of our united witness has been primary in our thrust during the year. We hold to the belief that "To know is to do," and our laymen have moved into the study of the new structure with zeal. We have been fortunate in securing much literature from the General Church that undergirded us until the publication of the 1968 Book of Discipline. We are proud of our accomplishment in this area of service.

The Observance of Laymen's Day

The Board of the Laity of the Florida Conference has always placed great emphasis upon the witness of the laymen in their congregations. Therefore, the occasion of Laymen's Day has provided us with rather unique experiences. In the pulpits across our Conference these laymen have placed stress upon the fact that our New Church calls for New Leadership, and greater emphasis upon the role of the layman in making our venture of faith both real and effective.

The Bishop's Convocation

The Florida Annual Conference (formerly CJ) discontinued its Bishop's Annual Laymen's Convocation during the past year in order to join with the Florida Annual Conference (SEJ) in promoting the Bishop's Convocation for Laymen. This convocation was held in three sections of the state giving opportunity for attendance by laymen and ministers from every part of the state. As Lay Leader of the Florida Conference (formerly CJ), I was most fortunate in serving on the team, and we are proud to report that our Conference was well represented at all three centers: Miami, Lakeland and Jacksonville. Bishop James W. Henley and Judge William A. Meadows are to be congratulated for providing us with Christian witnesses that led us in the gospel of reconciliation. We shall never forget this rich experience. It pointed to our opportunities for service under a United Methodism.

Recommendations

1. That a united thrust be launched throughout the State of Florida to bring all Methodist Laymen to a Period of Reconciliation as we enter a fellowship that must be inclusive and vital in outreach.
2. That a Day of Prayer will be set aside when all Florida Methodists will be asked to pray in concert that God's Spirit will guide us in making our United Witness effective in every life.

It is always a pleasure to report to our Annual Conference about our work and to make plans for better ways to serve boys and girls who need a home away from their families.

Since our last meeting, the Home has been represented at the Houseparents' Workshop at Stetson University, the Florida Group Child Care Association, Daytona Beach (Plaza Hotel) and the Annual Convention of the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries of The United Methodist Church in New Orleans, Louisiana. The administrators have had the pleasure of visiting and presenting the Sarah Hunt Story to several churches throughout Florida with slides, pictures and brochures.

Our population at the Home is eleven. We have served this year, 14 children. Two children have been discharged from the Home since their completion or partial completion of their studies in the Job Corp Centers and are now taking care of themselves. The other child who was in Foster Home Program is no longer with us or under the supervision as of March 15. Our attention is on the eleven (11) children directly in our care here on the campus. Since our last meeting we lost the wife of the Administrator, Mrs. Ida Rivers, who served as assistant. She passed away on December 2, 1968. We also mourn the passing of Mrs. Violet Carlton, the wife of my co-worker and friend, the Reverend Bascom W. Carlton. She was not a member of our staff but a lover of children.

Recommendation

That the Sarah Hunt Home be merged with the Florida Methodist Children's Home maintaining the founder's name (Sarah Hunt Campus) under the one name. One institution, but two campuses for the benefit of all children who need this service so badly.

1968-69**

Bethune-Cookman College is proud of its historic relationship with the Board of Education of The United Methodist Church and especially its support received from the Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church, formerly of the Central Jurisdiction. We are delighted to report to the 1969 session of the Conference that the College is concluding another successful year of service.

Bethune-Cookman College is proud of its faculty. They are well trained and dedicated to the search for truth. Our physical facilities are constantly being improved. We look forward to dedicating the Julia E. Robinson Music Building during the October 1969 meeting of the Board of Trustees. During the past six years, seven new buildings have been constructed on the campus and five of them are debt free. Enrollment at the College during the 1968-69 year has been 1,062 students; 85% are from the State of Florida. In 1968-69, more than one-half million dollars was given in financial aid to 70% of the students enrolled at Bethune-Cookman College.

In spite of these significant accomplishments, our needs are great. With rising costs and decrease in operating income, we are greatly challenged financially. But with your increased support, we face the future unafraid.

THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Women of Methodism have a task on a greater scale today than during pre-Methodist history; and more particularly as we engage the theme of the new quadrennium, **The Word at Work in the World**. We are indeed proud of the record of women across the Florida Conference who raised 85% of the pledged \$2,400 for 1968-69.

New Changes: The year 1968 saw many changes take place in the life and witness of the Church. We are grateful, also, for the opportunity that Mrs. Bruce Gray and myself have had in cementing relationship between the two Florida Conferences.

Meetings and Opportunities for Learning and Working: Too numerous to recount in this brief report, let me extend thanks to the women of our Conference for the opportunities I have had to attend many regional and Conference meetings during the past year. Our School of Christian Missions at Florida Southern College has been inspiring from summer to summer, and at this time I should like to remind you of the 1969 School of Christian Missions that will be held from July 25 to August 1. Mrs. John W. Wilson and Mrs. Agnes M. Fair, Dean and Assistant Dean, respectively, join in making you welcome. The theme for this year is, “Awake, Awake to Love and Work.”

If the Word is to be at work in the world today, these four words must be in action: Commission, Compassion, Community and Continuity.

There are seven former CJ churches in the DeLand District; thirty-nine in the Gainesville District; nine in the Jacksonville District; two in the Lakeland District; three in the Melbourne District, and five in the Miami District. Also there are three in the Orlando District; one in the St. Petersburg District; three in the Sarasota District; four in the Tampa District, and five in the West Palm Beach District. Tallahassee stands alone with 0.

The Central Florida District

This district is composed of twelve local societies, with one active guild. There are 212 active women, with most of the churches being small.

The North Florida District

This district has enjoyed a revival of life under the leadership of Mrs. E. M. Hurley. They pledged \$1,000 to missions. Attendance has improved almost 100%, and we point to this district with a great deal of pride.

South Florida District

The district has seventeen active societies out of the twenty within its boundaries. There are four active Service Guilds, with two having been organized this year at Kelly's Chapel and Simpson Mem. Mrs. Panchetta Levarity is doing a good job as District Guild Chairman. Twenty-two women and five youths attended the School of Christian Missions for the week, and three WSG for the weekend, 1968. In passing let me say that this was the only district graced with the presence of Miss Eulalia Cook, a Missionary to Latin America; and Mrs. Samuel D. Bankston, who toured Europe and the Holy Land.

Delegates to the Florida Conference Women's Society of Christian Service in the First United Methodist Church of St. Petersburg witnessed a "first" in the great fellowship. It was the first time that women from the former EUB and the Methodists had met together since union. The program was timely.

If the word is to be at work in the world we must be people of the way. We must go out and seek to know why our neighbor suffers; we must find new dimensions that will allow us to respond. As for me—

Let me but do my work from day to day, in field or forest,

At the desk or loom, in roaring market place or tranquil room;

A Special Service, merging The Florida Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) and The Florida Conference (Central Jurisdiction), was held in Branscomb Memorial Auditorium, Lakeland, Florida, June 3, 1969, at 10:30 a.m., with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. Following the Prelude and Call to Worship, the hymn "The Church's One Foundation" was sung. Following the reading of the Psalter, Bishop Henley made an introductory statement, then the congregation joined in a unison prayer. The Conference NaFOMM Choir sang the Anthem, "Behold the Lamb of God," and William Ferguson read the Scripture. "At Length There Dawns the Glorious Day" was sung. Arthur Crowell and John Sikes, in that order, spoke on "We Bring to This Merger." Bishop Henley, assisted by Arthur Crowell, John Sikes, W. G. Hawk, William Meadows, Jr., John Grant, Jr., and Richard V. Moore, led in the Ceremony of Merger, in which the congregation and participants joined in unison for the closing words of merger. The Doxology was sung, followed by the hymn, "Let Us Break Bread Together." Bishop Henley then led in the Celebration of The Lord's Supper, assisted by representative ministers of the two merging groups, after which "Jesus, United by Thy Grace" was sung. The Bishop announced the death of Horace L. Boyd and made appropriate remarks. The Episcopal Address was delivered by Bishop Henley. The Service was concluded with the Doxology, the Benediction and Postlude.

SECOND DAY

Morning Session—Wednesday, June 4, 1969

Opening: The conference was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Bishop James W. Henley. Bishop Henley presented E. W. Newman of Jacksonville, who led in the morning devotions. The hymn "Rise Up, O Men of God" was sung, after which E. W. Newman gave the devotional message.

Journal: Robert J. Gisler reported the Committee had examined the Minutes and found them to be correct.

Privilege: Bishop Henley announced that the Mississippi Conference is meeting this weekend, with Bishop Ed Pendergrass presiding, and instructed the Conference Secretary to send greetings.

Appointments: Bishop Henley announced the appointments of the District Superintendents. Changes involved include transfer of William Roughton to the Gainesville District and the assignment of two new Superintendents, Robert Chapman to the Tallahassee District and Eugene Zimmerman to the Orlando District.

Conference Program Committee: Ralph Huston presented the Program of the Conference and made announcements. He moved, and the Conference approved, the adoption of the printed program as the official agenda, with necessary adaptations. Huston moved, and the Conference adopted, the rules on page 14 of the Reports booklet as the standard operating rules of the Conference.

Privilege: Bishop Henley reviewed the speakers to be presented in the Conference program.

Personal Privilege: R. C. Boggs made a statement of appreciation to the new Conference Secretary, Maurice Felton.

Standing Rules: R. C. Boggs presented the report of the Committee on Standing Rules, with corrections and amendments, which was adopted. (See Standing Rules.)

Amendment: Walter Cross moved to amend the Standing Rules (Title III, Rule 10) to read: "Beginning in 1970, no man shall serve longer than 4 years as chairman of the same Quadrennial Board, Commission, or Committee." It was seconded and adopted.

Question 20: "Are all the ministers blameless in life and official administration?" Bishop Henley read the names of the District Superintendents and the character of each and of each minister in his District was passed, including the ministers under special appointment, student and retired ministers.

Recognition: Bishop Henley recognized the members who have been in the Conference 25 years.

Credit Union: Eugene West presented the recommendations of the Committee to study the Credit Union and moved their adoption. It was approved. (See Reports.)

Conference Council: H. Melton Ware, Vice-Chairman of the Conference Council, presented the Report and recommendations and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports.)

Recognition: Bishop Henley recognized Dr. T. A. Mosley, in attendance at his 62nd Conference since his admission on trial.

Recognition: Bishop Henley had the District Superintendents present the ministers who were coming into their respective Districts by transfer. The Bishop also recognized Dr. Alex Porteus of the General Program Council of the United Methodist Church, and announced the transfer in, in retirement, of Dr. Hugh Stuntz.

Credit Union Committee: Bishop Henley appointed the Credit Union Committee as follows: C. E. West, Dr. Richard Pearce, Robert Fannin, C. M. Hardin, Jr., and William Obaugh.

Board of Evangelism: Donald Mackay, chairman of the Board of Evangelism, introduced the Board. He recognized Conference Evangelist, Herbert L. Bowdoin, and James E. Ridgway, a new Conference Evangelist; also O. Dean Martin of the General Board of Evangelism's Staff of Evangelists. Don Mackay recognized Lewis Head, who serves as a member of the General Board, and announced the retirement of Clayton S. Luce from the Conference Evangelist relationship. He presented and moved the adoption of Report No. 1, and it was adopted. (See Reports.)

W. L. Joyner, Secretary of the Board of Evangelism, recognized P. E. Blow, new treasurer of the Lay Renewal movement, and William F. Robertson, chairman of the Advisory Committee on Lay Renewal, who made remarks about the Lay Renewal program. W. L. Joyner presented and moved the adoption of Report No. 2, and it was adopted. (See Reports.)

Don Mackay, chairman of the Board of Evangelism, presented Clarence Yates, chairman of the "Day Away" for Ministers and Wives, who spoke briefly.

Greetings: Bishop Henley read telegrams of greetings from Bishop Paul V. Galloway of the Southwest Arkansas Conference, and the Paul Haines family, Missionaries in Seoul, Korea.

Committee on Inter-Conference Relations: John M. Sikes gave the report of the Committee on Inter-Conference Relations, stating that the committee had done its work, the union is completed, and the committee is ready to be disbanded. He expressed appreciation of the committee for the spirit of cooperation and concern of the conferences involved. It was requested by the Conference that the committee make available copies of the addresses by John Sikes and Arthur Crowell delivered at the Merger Service, "We Bring to This Merger."

Constitutional Amendments: John J. Rooks, speaking for the General Conference delegation, presented and explained the Proposed Constitutional Amendments. Following discussion the written ballot was taken on the four proposed constitutional amendments.

Service of Recognition of Retired Ministers: Bishop Henley invited

the new retirees and their wives to the Chancel and addressed them appropriately on behalf of the Conference. Each retiree spoke briefly. Bishop Henley presented a pin and a parchment to each retiree and a pin and a orchid to each wife. The Bishop offered prayer and gave the Benediction.

Afternoon Session—Wednesday, June 4, 1969

Opening: The Conference was called to order by Bishop James W. Henley. The hymn "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" was sung. Bishop Henley led in prayer.

Cabinet: Bishop Henley announced a Cabinet meeting for Thursday upon adjournment, on the stage.

Clarification of Balloting: Bishop Henley made a statement of clarification on the procedure of balloting on the constitutional amendments and asked whether the Conference had any desire to re-vote. An overwhelming vote sustained the original balloting procedure.

Conference Historical Society: W. E. Brooks, chairman of the Conference Historical Society, spoke on the observance of the 125th anniversary of the Florida Conference. The Commission on Archives and History were recognized. Don Richardson, Secretary of the Society, presented the report and gift copies of the new book on the history of Florida Methodism, "From Saddlebags to Satellites," to Bishop Henley and Charles T. Thrift, Jr., speaker of the afternoon. Robert Carr presented certificates on behalf of the Commission to churches which had observed significant anniversaries during the year: First, Key West, 125th anniversary; Fleming Street, Key West, 100th anniversary; Ft. Meade, 100th anniversary; Salem, Havana, 100th anniversary; Venice-Nokomis, 100th anniversary; First, Bradenton, 75th anniversary; Lake Magdalen, Tampa, 75th anniversary. The 75th anniversary of the former E.U.B. Conference in Florida was commented on. Charles T. Thrift, Jr., President of Florida Southern College and historian, was presented and he addressed the Conference. Bishop Henley commended W. E. Brooks and commended the book "From Saddlebags to Satellites" to the Conference.

Privilege: John Sikes of the Cabinet recognized Mrs. Nina Nailing, Secretary to Bishop Henley, and presented her an orchid with warm response from the Conference.

Recognition: Bishop Henley asked William Echols of the Secretarial Staff to recognize the Military Chaplains present. The Bishop greeted them and each spoke briefly. They were: James C. Charnley, U.S.N., Camp LeJeune, N. C.; Richard K. Titley, U.S.N., Cherry Point, N. C.; Ezra Everett, U.S.A., Ft. Benning, Ga.; James V. Harvester, U.S.A., Ft. Hamilton, N. Y.; C. Thomas Howes, Jr., U.S.A.F., Homestead A.F.B.; William L. Rhoads, U.S.A.F. (not pretest, but registered), Dover A.F.B., Delaware; and George C. Norsworthy, U.S.A.F., Kelly A.F.B., Tex.

Women's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Bruce Gray, President of the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service presented and supplemented the W.S.C.S. Report. (See Reports.) Mrs. Gray recognized the Conference Executive Committee members present and the (CJ) Conference Executive Committee members present. Her report was enthusiastically received.

Presiding: John Sikes was asked to take the Chair while Bishop Henley excused himself to meet with a committee.

Conference Center: Howren Norton, Chairman of the Conference Center Building Committee, recognized the Committee present and made a progress report on the Conference Center now 33% completed, with completion scheduled October 1, 1969.

Committee on Lay Workers: M. C. Cleveland presented the report of the Committee on Lay Workers with an addendum and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports.)

Special Privilege: Howren Norton, District Superintendent, announced the birth of a daughter, Amy, to Roy and Jackie Harris, one of the young

ministers Ordained last night. Jackie had attended the Ordination Service accompanied by her doctor and his wife.

Conference Trustees: Hoyt Tatum presented the Trustees Report for Phil Haddock, in the form of the following Resolutions which were moved and adopted individually:

WHEREAS, the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church on Wednesday, June 4th, 1969, in Lakeland, Florida, authorized the Conference Council to install a sewage disposal plant at Leesburg, Florida, not to cost over \$100,000.00, the construction to begin as soon as possible, and,

Whereas, financial details require authorization and execution, therefore, be it

Nominations: Hoyt Tatum made nominations of members to the Trustees of the Florida Methodist Children's Home and to the Trustees of the Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home, and they were elected. (See Boards, Committees, Commissions.)

Correction and Information Dissemination: Bishop Henley had the Tellers distribute to each person present copies of a Correction and Information statement correcting misinformation on The United Methodist Church Board of Missions' response to the *Black Manifesto* of James Forman.

Forman—"Black Manifesto" Issue: Bishop Henley presented the following statement, which was enthusiastically received:

Correction and Information

Recent erroneous reports in some newspapers indicate a need for clarifying the facts with regard to the recent meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Methodist Board of Missions in New York. The implications in these articles were to the fact that The United Methodist Church subscribed to the *Black Manifesto* issued by Mr. James Forman on behalf of the Economic Liberation Committee. In fact, the Executive Committee of the United Methodist Board of Missions categorically turned down the demands as "non-negotiable." Prior to the meeting of the Executive Committee a group of students from Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University had "occupied" the offices of the Board.

Mr. James Forman and the Reverend Cain Felder, chairman of the Economic Liberation Committee, spoke for the demands. The *Manifesto* included threats of continuing harassment of churches and government.

The proposal of the General Board of Missions, which was unacceptable to the Forman group, was that \$300,000 of the Board's funds be set aside immediately for the economic assistance and advancement of black people, to be administered by black members of the Council of Bishops and of the Board of Missions of The United Methodist Church. The proposal further expressed the hope of raising an additional million dollars for the continuation of the same purpose. These monies were not to be placed into the hands of the National Black Economic Development Conference or of Mr. Forman.

Speaking with regard to the *Black Manifesto* issued by Mr. Forman and enunciated through interruption of the service in Riverside Church, New York, Bishop Roy C. Nichols, speaking in Pasadena, California, is reported to have said, "Negro leader, James Forman, is encouraging radicals indiscriminately to seize, destroy, and disrupt the churches in America. Forman's ultimate solution of placing responsibility for the life of the nation completely in the hands of the State, which carries radical socialist connotations, indicate a confidence in a totalitarianism which I simply do not share." Bishop Nichols is the resident bishop of the Pittsburgh Area of The United Methodist Church, and is highly esteemed both for his Christian commitment and his able administrative ability.

Cubel Johnson, Negro United Methodist, was presented and made remarks to the Conference supporting Bishop Henley's statement and in strong opposition to James Forman's tactics and position. C. Don Steger, Negro United Methodist, was presented and made remarks to the Conference contending that Forman's "Black Manifesto" was in categorical opposition to the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

He strongly supported the statement of Bishop Henley and asked that, if anything, it should be even stronger. Both speakers were strongly applauded, as was the Bishop's printed statement.

Public Relations and Methodist Information: William Echols, Chairman of the Conference Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information, presented the Report of the Commission and moved its adoption. It was approved.

Board of Christian Social Concerns: Judge P. B. Revels, chairman of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns, made an opening statement introducing the Report of the Board. John Fletcher presented Section II, Division on General Welfare, and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports.) James S. Jones presented Section III, Division on Peace and World Order, Lloyd Knox asked why no reference was made to the war in Viet Nam in this section of the Report and moved that it be referred back to the Board for this inclusion. P. M. Boyd was recognized by Bishop Henley and he spoke regarding the efforts of Bishop James Armstrong and an Ad Hoc Committee presently working creatively with religious forces in the interest of peace in Viet Nam. Knox's motion to refer this section of the Report back to the Board for inclusion of some statement on Viet Nam was approved. It was referred. Stewart Austin presented Section IV, Division on Human Relations, and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports.) Judge P. B. Revels presented the portion of the Report concerning the Community Service Volunteer Program in Florida under the Florida Probation and Parole Commission and moved its adoption, which was approved. (See Reports.) Judge Revels presented Section VI of the Report concerning referred Resolutions, Petitions, and Protests submitted in opposition to Section 3, of the Rule of Law and Right of Dissent, adopted by the 1968 General Conference of The United Methodist Church, pertaining to the matter of "civil disobedience." A re-statement and recommendations were moved for adoption. (See Reports.)

Motion to Amend: William Strack, Lay Delegate from First United Methodist Church, Clearwater, moved to amend the report concerning Section VI. After discussion, the motion to amend was defeated, and Section VI was approved. (See Reports.)

Motion to Amend: Arthur Charlesworth moved to amend the Report for the inclusion of a statement on Viet Nam. He was apprised that a referral of the section on World Peace had already been referred to the Board for the inclusion of a statement on Viet Nam and was instructed to meet with the Board.

Motion: Judge P. B. Revels moved, and it was approved, that the Report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns be adopted, with the exception of Section III referred back for inclusion of a Viet Nam statement. He introduced the members of the Conference Commission on Christian Social Concerns present, who received an ovation.

Adjournment: The afternoon session of the Conference was adjourned by Bishop Henley.

Wednesday Evening, June 4, 1969

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:45 P.M. with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. "Soldiers of Christ, Arise," and "Heralds of Christ" were sung, after which Bishop Henley led the Responsive Reading and received the offering. George Foster gave the prayer. "Fairest Lord Jesus" was sung and Dr. John A. Redhead, Jr., pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Greensboro, N. C., delivered the sermon. Following the singing of "The Voice of God Is Calling," Bishop Henley gave the Benediction.

THIRD DAY

Thursday Morning—June 5, 1969

Opening: The Conference was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Bishop James W. Henley. John Winters led the devotions. The hymn "O Zion,

Haste" was sung and John Winters delivered the morning meditation.

Journal: Tom Sofge reported the Committee had examined the Minutes and found them to be correct and up to date. Approved.

Announcement: H. Maurice Felton, Conference Secretary, reminded all late delegates to the Conference to register properly.

Motion: H. Maurice Felton, Secretary, moved and it was adopted that the Secretary be authorized to accept Resolutions to be considered by the Conference only through noon on Thursday.

Privilege: Bishop Henley recognized Don Cooke, former Treasurer of the General Council on World Service and Finance, and presented him to the Conference.

Privilege: Bishop Henley recognized and presented to the Conference Vernon Sidler, of the General Council on World Service and Finance.

Privilege: Dr. and Mrs. Earl Strickland, President of Wesleyan College, were recognized by Bishop Henley, who presented an orchid to Mrs. Strickland. Dr. Strickland spoke briefly.

Greetings: Bishop Henley read a telegram of greeting from the South Georgia Conference.

World Service and Finance Commission: McCoy Gibbs, chairman of the Conference World Service and Finance Commission, presented the members of the Conference Treasurer's office and the Report of the Commission. He moved the recommendation that beginning January, 1970, the Conference fiscal year be the calendar year and that two Budgets, one for 7 months, the other for 12 months beginning January, 1970, be used to accomplish the change of fiscal year. It was approved. Gene West presented Report No. 1 containing two proposed Budgets and moved their adoption. M. C. Cleveland issued a word of caution concerning Pension provisions in the Budgets. Following discussion, the Pension provisions were excluded from the Budget proposals in order to be referred back to World Service and Finance and for coordination with the Board of Pensions. The proposed Budgets were approved (Report No. 1) with this one exclusion. (See Reports.)

McCoy Gibbs presented Report No. 2 and moved its adoption.

Motion to Amend: David Woerner moved to amend the motion and Report No. 2, to provide for an additional \$400 across-the-board increase on all proposed minimum salaries. It was seconded and discussion followed.

Motion to Amend the Amendment: Charles Penney moved to amend the amendment to the effect that the additional \$400 increase in the proposed minimum salaries would become effective January 1, 1970, rather than immediately. It was seconded and discussion followed.

Question: Following lengthy discussion, Richard Albury moved the previous question, and it carried, closing debate.

Vote: The Amendment to the Amendment, providing that the additional \$400 across-the-board increases in proposed minimum salaries become effective January, 1970, was voted on and it carried (408 FOR, 338 AGAINST). Report No. 2 was approved as amended.

Reports No. 3 through 10 were presented by McCoy Gibbs, who moved their adoption, and they were approved.

Announcement: W. S. Bozeman, Chairman of the Board of Ministry, announced that the Board's Committee on the Study of Recruitment and Attrition, already authorized, will be studying the matter of all salaries and minimum salaries in its report and recommendations to the Annual Conference next year.

Appreciation: Bishop Henley expressed appreciation to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for its work in this difficult transitional year.

Board of Missions: Al Hedberg, Chairman of the Board of Missions, assisted by Henry W. Blackburn and Robert Fox, presented the report of

the Board, which was adopted. (See Reports.) Robert Fox presented a series of color slides depicting Florida Conference missionaries and their work around the world.

Quadrennial Emphasis Committee: Ed Dinkins, Secretary of the Quadrennial Emphasis Committee, gave the report of the Committee. C. Don Steger spoke concerning the work of the Tampa Tutorial Project, after which the Report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Florida Southern College: Charles T. Thrift, Jr., President of Florida Southern College, presented the Report of the College, which was received. Charles Thrift introduced members of the staff and faculty. Mead Rogers, Director of Development, spoke concerning the future development of the College. Charles Thrift presented Mrs. J. Wallace Hamilton to the Conference, which stood in tribute to her and her late husband. Mrs. Hamilton addressed the Conference concerning the J. Wallace Hamilton Scholarship Fund at Florida Southern College, and the book "Where Now Is Thy God," by J. Wallace Hamilton. Bishop Henley pinned an orchid on Mrs. Hamilton.

Board of Education: R. Eugene Rutland, Jr., Vice Chairman of the Board of Education, presented the report of the Board, which was adopted. Ray Harrison, Secretary, nominated for election and continuing the Directors and Ministers of Education and the Directors and Ministers of Music, and they were approved by the Conference. (See Part I.)

Consecration of Directors of Christian Education and Directors of Music: Bishop Henley called those to be Consecrated Directors of Christian Education and Directors of Music to join him at the Chancel, and they were consecrated. (See Part I.)

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference with prayer.

Afternoon Session—June 5, 1969

Opening: The Conference was convened at 2:30 p.m. by Bishop Henley. The hymns "Come, Thou Almighty King" and "Come, O Thou God of Grace" were sung, and Bishop Henley led in prayer.

Privilege: Bishop Henley recognized and presented John Tindell, Alaska, who spoke briefly.

Privilege: Bishop Henley presented Dr. E. Clayton Calhoun, President of Paine College, and he spoke briefly.

Privilege: Bishop Henley presented the Carl Shafer family, leaving for missionary assignment to Uruguay, and he spoke to the Conference. Bishop Henley offered prayer for the family.

Motion: Roy Smith, Lay Delegate from Palm Springs Church, Miami, moved that the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns or the Board of Missions make a study of recent charges that monies are being channeled through our National Board of Missions to some disruptive groups whose goals are not in keeping with the goals and the spirit of The United Methodist Church and give the Conference some clear-cut answers as soon as possible, with a full report at the next Conference. It was seconded and approved for referral to the Committee on Reference.

Presentation: William D. Gosey, Methodist Publishing House, was presented and he spoke briefly. He presented a check for \$12,601.04 for retired ministers and widows. Bishop Henley also announced receipt of a check for \$1,647 from The Methodist Publishing House of the former E.U.B. Church for retired ministers and widows.

Privilege: Orlando District ministers and laymen presented a gift to the Howren Norton family on the occasion of their leaving the Superintendency of the Orlando District.

Privilege: Ralph Huston presented Leslie and Grace Shirley, transferring into the Conference after 25 years in Africa with the E.U.B. Church.

Privilege: Bishop Henley presented Dr. Norman Duncan, Philippines, who spoke briefly.

Announcement: Bishop Henley announced that Dr. A. R. Charlesworth's father, 98 years of age, is soon to be remarried.

Privilege: Lewis Head introduced to the Conference Mrs. Donald Crocker, widow of one of the deceased ministers who was to have been received into the Conference by transfer; also he recognized Jim Tripp, being received into the Conference by transfer.

Announcement: Bishop Henley announced the passing of W. C. Fountain and the time of funeral services.

Vote Announcement: Bishop Henley announced the results of the voting on Constitutional Amendments. 844 duly seated delegates cast the following ballots:

Board of Education: Eugene Rutland, Chairman of the Board of Education, presented a Board request for a slight revision of terminology in the Board's Report approved earlier. The revision of language was approved. A visual aids program was presented, featuring color slides and a student monologue by Angelo Fuster.

Privilege: Bishop Henley introduced to the Conference Dr. Laney, Dean of the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia, who addressed the Conference.

Publishing Interest: David Denslow, Chairman of the Committee on Publishing Interest, assisted by Walter Edwards, gave the report of the Committee, which was adopted. (See Reports.)

Commission on Worship: DeWitt Farabee, Chairman of the Commission on Worship, and Roosevelt Dell, Jr., Director of the Wolff United Methodist Center, Tampa, gave the report of the Committee, which was adopted. (See Reports.)

Council of Churches: Jack A. Davis, Executive Secretary of the Florida Council of Churches, addressed the Conference and reminded the Conference that the president of the Florida Council of Churches was Bishop Henley. Jack Davis introduced Edward Pacha, Director of the Department of Communications, Florida Council of Churches, who spoke briefly.

Television-Radio-Film Commission: H. Trall Heitzenrater, Chairman of the Television-Radio-Film Commission, presented the report of the Committee. John M. Sikes moved that we amend the report as follows: Item 8, paragraph 4, to read "Telephone numbers of all churches and parsonages be filed for record, to be mimeographed and available for those who wish copies, at the Conference offices." The amendment was seconded and passed. The report was adopted as amended. (See Reports.)

Personal Privilege: John T. Pennington, assisted by ministers and laymen of the Gainesville District honored the Rev. and Mrs. John M. Sikes and presented them with a gift on the occasion of their leaving the Superintendency of the Gainesville District.

Christian Enlistment: Larry Henize, Chairman of the Commission on Christian Enlistment, gave the report of the Commission which was adopted. (see Reports.)

Town and Country: John N. Bennion, Chairman of the Commission on Town and Country, presented the report of the Commission which was adopted. (See Reports.) Bishop Henley presented the following Church of the Year awards: Gainesville District—Class A, Branford United Methodist Church, Class B, Belleview United Methodist Church; Jacksonville District—Class A, Calvary United Methodist Church; Lakeland District—Class A, Lake Alfred United Methodist Church, Class B, First United Methodist Church of Auburndale; Melbourne District—Class A, White City-Lakewood Park United Methodist Churches (2), Class B, Okeechobee United Methodist Church; Miami District—Class A, Marathon United Methodist Church, Class B, Florida City United Methodist Church; Or-

Adjournment: The Conference was adjourned with prayer by Lewis M. Head.

Evening Session—Thursday, June 5, 1969

Worship Service: The Conference Worship Service began at 7:45 p.m. with Bishop James W. Henley leading. The hymns "Let All The World In Every Corner Sing" and "O God, Our Help" were sung. The Responsive Scripture was "Whither Shall I Go From Thy Spirit?" and was followed by The Gloria Patri and The Affirmation of Faith. An Offering was received. Robert Blackburn led in prayer. The hymn "Breathe On Me, Breath of God" was sung. Dr. Earnest A. Smith, Associate General Secretary of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, was introduced by Bishop Henley, and he preached the Conference Sermon on the theme, "The Word of God: Our Continuing Heritage." Dr. Smith led in prayer, after which the hymn "The Voice of God Is Calling" was sung and Bishop Henley closed the Service with prayer.

FOURTH DAY

Morning Session—Friday, June 6, 1969

Opening: The Conference was convened at 9:00 a.m. by Bishop Henley, with Howren Norton presiding. The hymn "Ask Ye What Great Things I Know" was sung. After a period of silent prayer, Donald W. Jones offered the morning devotional message and then led in prayer.

Journal: Walter Edwards reported that the Committee had examined the minutes and found them to be correct and up to date.

Order of the Day: H. Maurice Felton, Conference Secretary, moved that the Committee on Reference be scheduled as an Order of the Day at 3:15 p.m. today and that the schedule be adjusted accordingly. It was approved.

Committee on Journal Publication: H. Maurice Felton nominated and the Conference elected a Committee on the Publishing of the Journal composed of E. L. Dinkins, Dennis R. DeLacure, and O. H. Hudgins.

Announcement: H. Maurice Felton, Secretary, urged final registration before noon Friday.

Board of Pensions: M. C. Cleveland recognized the members of the Board of Pensions present and presented the Report, which was discussed and then adopted. (See Reports.)

Health Insurance: M. C. Cleveland presented Report No. 2 of the Board of Pensions, concerning Health Insurance, and it was adopted.

Privilege: R. A. Alley moved and the Conference approved instructing the Conference Secretary to send telegrams of love and sympathy to the widows of W. C. Fountain and Bishop Walter C. Gum.

Preachers Relief Board: Eldon Simmons, Secretary of the Board of

Pensions, submitted the report of the Preachers Relief Board and it was approved.

Privilege: William Roughton moved and the Conference approved a message of sympathy from the Conference to the widow of Mrs. Horace Boyd through the Conference Secretary.

Group Insurance: Bruce Gannaway, Treasurer of Conference Group Insurance, submitted a verbal report recommending continuation of the present Group Insurance plan for another year and other pertinent matters. (See Reports.) His report was approved, with an expression of appreciation for his service in this area by Bishop Henley.

World Service and Finance and Pensions: McCoy Gibbs, chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance presented the following motion, which was approved by the Conference: "In view of the Conference action taken on June 5, relating to the increase in Minimum Salary for 1970, I move that the World Service and Finance Commission and the Cabinet, after consultation with the Committee on Minimum Salaries, be allowed to adjust and finalize the 1970 Budget."

Christian Social Concerns: Jimmy Jones moved to approve inclusion of a statement formulated by the Board of Christian Social Concerns in regard to Viet Nam, as earlier required by the Conference. The addition to Section III of the Board Report was read and approved. (See Reports.)

Nominations: R. A. Alley made additional Cabinet nominations to various Conference Boards, Commissions, and agencies, which were approved. (See Quadrennial Boards, Committees, etc.).

Motion: R. A. Alley moved that the Chairmen of the four Boards of Trustees of the former SEJ, St. Johns, Central Jurisdiction, and E.U.B. Conferences be requested to meet during the year and work out a plan looking forward to the formation of one Board of Trustees for the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church to become effective as soon as feasible, hopefully by 1970. The motion was adopted.

Moving Day: R. A. Alley, representing the Cabinet, moved that Moving Day be Thursday, June 12, 1969, and it was approved.

Moving Expenses: R. A. Alley, for the Cabinet, reemphasized the recommendation passed by the 1968 Florida Annual Conference regarding the moving expenses of pastors transferred, and stressed the fact that it was a recommendation not a requirement.

Personal Privilege: Mrs. Guy Thomas, District President of the Women's Society of the Tallahassee District, made a statement of love and appreciation to Superintendent William Roughton being transferred to the Superintendency of the Gainesville District and presented him with a gift from the laymen and ministers present from the Tallahassee District.

Conference Brotherhood: C. H. Rasmussen, President of the Florida Conference Brotherhood, presented the report, recognized the District representatives of the Brotherhood, announced the list of the deceased for the past year, and had members of the Conference Brotherhood stand. The Report was approved. (See Reports.)

Privilege: Jesse Waller recognized Ronal Mudd, being received into the Conference by transfer, and he spoke briefly.

Recognition: Bishop Henley recognized two new churches, Crocker Memorial United Methodist Church and Pine Island United Methodist Church. He presented certificates to Mrs. Donald R. Crocker, widow of the minister for whom Crocker Memorial was named, and to Charles Hamilton, District Superintendent of the Pine Island church.

Statistical Report: Bishop Henley made a statement concerning delay of the statistical report, being done this year by computer, and introduced Harris Dewese, Conference Statistician, for a tentative verbal summary. A motion for the final computerized report to be published in the Journal was approved.

Motion: William S. Echols, chairman of the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information, presented the following motion: "In the

interest of public relations, and in order to project a more accurate report to the public, I move that the Statistician be permitted and directed to announce to news media the fact that these statistics are tentative and that the actual and accurate report will be released in full when finally computed." The motion was approved.

Motion: Amos Boren expressed appreciation to Statistician Harris Dewese on behalf of the Conference and moved that the complete statistical report be sent to all churches when correct and as soon as possible. It was approved.

Motion: Samuel D. Lewis moved "that the Conference request the Program Council to include in their survey of the problem of declining membership and attendance a study of our reporting system with the aim of coordinating our reports to the Administrative Boards, District Conferences, Annual Charge Conferences, and the Florida Annual Conference and the further aim of eliminating the ambiguities which presently exist." The motion carried.

Privilege: Bishop Henley recognized and made a statement of appreciation to Mrs. James Wood, wife of Rev. James Wood of the former Central Jurisdiction, and presented her an orchid.

Florida Methodist Foundation: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference to hold the meeting of the Florida Methodist Foundation. W. S. Bozeman, one of the Directors, acting for Foundation President J. Carlisle Rogers, presented the Audit and the Report. (See Reports.) Minutes of last year's meetings were approved. Executive Director, Dr. R. C. Holmes, explained the Audit and presented the original to the Conference Secretary. Conference Treasurer, Leroy Northrup, explained detailed items. The Report and Audit were approved. W. S. Bozeman presented Cabinet nominations to the Board of Directors of the Foundation to R. C. Holmes, who read them, and they were approved. (See Part I.)

Don Cooke, Associate Secretary of the Foundation, was introduced and spoke briefly, after which Foundation Directors were introduced. Jesse Waller expressed the Conference's gratitude to R. C. Holmes, Executive Secretary, who was applauded. Charles Hamilton moved, and the Conference approved, that the Directors of the Florida Methodist Foundation be authorized to transact all necessary matters of business until the next meeting of the Corporation. Mrs. John Handley, secretary to the Foundation, was recognized and presented an orchid. The meeting of the Foundation was declared adjourned by W. S. Bozeman.

Question 52: "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" On invitation of Charles T. Thrift, Jr., the Conference voted to meet at Florida Southern College for the next session. Bishop Henley presented an orchid to Mrs. Thrift.

Announcement: J. M. McLeod announced the 25th anniversary of the Normandy Invasion of W. W. II and expressed gratitude for the Conference for the sacrifice of the many involved in that great sacrificial conflict.

Committee on Study of the Ministry: Bishop Henley announced the appointment of the Committee on the Study of the Ministry, with Al Hedberg as Convenor. (See Part I.)

Asbury College: Bishop Henley introduced Dr. Dennis Kinlaw, President of Asbury College, who addressed the Conference.

Introduction: Bishop Henley presented James E. Bartlett, representing the United Methodist Board of Missions, National Division, Department of Finance and Field Service, now assigned for work in the Florida Conference, who spoke briefly.

Health and Welfare Ministries: Robert M. Blackburn, Chairman of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, presented the report of the Board, which was adopted. (See Reports.) John H. Hires, Jr., spoke concerning SEMAR, Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded, and Marcus Drewa, Administrator of Methodist Hospital, Jacksonville, also addressed the Conference.

Children's Homes: Jesse Waller, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Florida Methodist Children's Home, and assisted by Bascom W. Carlton, Superintendent of the Children's Home, and Eddie Rivers, Superintendent of the Children's Home, Sara Hunt Campus, gave the report of the Children's Home. Jesse Waller was recognized as the retiring Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Committee on Housing: Robert M. Blackburn, Chairman of the Committee on Housing, gave the report of the Committee. Considerable discussion followed, and Hoyt Tatum moved the following amendment: "I move the adoption of the report, and that the corporation to be formed make this a year of study, with no action, and to report back to the 1970 Annual Conference for further direction." The Order of the Day for adjournment was pointed out by Bishop Henley and Robert M. Blackburn moved the extension of time 10 minutes, which was seconded and passed. Jack Bratton offered the amendment to the amendment that the new corporation be allowed to accept property and benevolences. The amendment was seconded but failed. The Previous Question on all matters before the Conference was called and passed. Bishop Henley stated the Order of the Day had arrived, after which John Sikes moved the extension of time in order to receive the vote, and it was adopted. Hoyt Tatum stated the intent of his amendment was to prohibit the new corporation from receiving any property or gifts that would commit the Conference in any way. The original amendment made by Hoyt Tatum was adopted, after which the Conference adopted the report of the Committee.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference.

Friday Afternoon, June 6, 1969

Memorial Service: With T. J. Price, Chaplain of Florida Southern College, presiding, the Conference Memorial Service opened with the hymn "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing," after which Harold Thomas led in prayer. The report of the Committee on Memoirs was made by Gary Buhl. The Roll Call of the Honored Dead was presented by Gary Buhl and the Minister's Chorus sang "Faith of Our Fathers." Waldo Farabee read the Scripture Lesson and Walter Rutland delivered the Memorial Address. The Benediction was given by George Carlton.

Christian Social Concerns: Judge P. B. Revels, Chairman of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, made the following resolution: that we waive the Standing Rules of the Conference that a resolution may be considered without waiting 24 hours. The resolution to be considered was read as follows: "It is moved that this Conference direct the conference Board of Missions to immediately obtain and secure full complete and comprehensive information on how the Mission Funds of the United Methodist Church have been spent for this immediate past conference year, including the amounts and to whom given by the General Board of Missions and the General Board of Christian Social Concerns; that this information be circulated to all churches of this conference through the coordinated mailing as quickly as the same has been obtained." The Conference voted to waive the Standing Rules and consider the resolution. Following discussion the resolution was adopted.

Abandoned Property: John M. Sikes, Superintendent of the Gainesville District, presented the following resolution:

Privilege: Milburn McLeod asked all the minister's wives to stand and the Conference applauded in tribute.

Abandoned Property: Milburn McLeod, Superintendent of the DeLand District, presented the following resolution, which was approved.

Whereas title to the property in Tampa, Florida, on which is situated the parsonage of the former San Marcos Church is now held by the Trustees of the Florida Annual Conference, and

Whereas said trustees do not have need for this property nor resources to adequately care for it, therefore,

Be It Resolved that the Trustees of the Florida Annual Conference be directed to dispose of said property in such manner as will, in their estimation, best aid inner-city work in the Tampa Bay area.

Georgia Seagle Trust: Ray Harrison, Secretary of the Board of Education, presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING OPERATION OF THE
GEORGIA SEAGLE TRUST

WHEREAS, as the Trustees for the purpose of administering the property of the Georgia Seagle Trust are presently the Board of Trustees of the Board of Education of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and;

Whereas, said Trustees because of the difficulty in administering said trust property due to the nature of their diversified locations desire that

they be enabled to appoint Trustees, annually, located in the Gainesville District for the purpose of administering the property held under said trust and, said Trustees to be five (5) in number and composed of three (3) ministers and two (2) laymen and;

Whereas, the Trustee so appointed shall be accountable to the Trustees of the Board of Education; and will render an accounting to them annually and said Trustees to have the capacity to act in the same authority as the Trustees of the Board of Education in respect to said trust,

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that the Trustees of the Board of Education of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church be and they are hereby authorized, to appoint, annually, a board of five (5) Trustees to be composed of three (3) ministers and two (2) laymen of the Gainesville District for the purpose of administering the property held by the Georgia Seagle Trust and that said Trustees to have the same powers to deal with the property as the Board of Trustees of the Board of Education of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and to render an accounting, annually, to said Board of Trustees of the Board of Education.

DONE AND ORDERED this 6th day of June, 1969.

Board of Evangelism: W. L. Joyner, Executive Secretary of the Board of Evangelism, reported statistical information regarding the report of the Board. (See Reports.)

Committee on Reference: Donald Mackay, Chairman of the Committee on Reference, reported that the committee proposed referral of the resolution concerning an insurance plan for minister's wives to the Committee on Insurance, and the conference approved.

Announcement: O. B. Fanning, Director of Methodist Information and Public Relations, reported that United Press International had apologized for the inaccurate story released concerning Forman and the "Black Manifesto," as related to a supposedly \$300,000 Methodist donation, stating that difficulty arose by a poor "rewrite" in Miami by UPI representatives.

Special Privilege: Bishop Henley introduced William W. White, Executive Secretary, Commission on Religion and Race, who addressed the Conference.

Journal: Robert J. Gisler reported that the Committee had examined the Minutes and found them to be correct and up to date. He moved that the Committee be authorized to review the final Minutes of closing sessions and approve them in Conference's behalf. The motion and report were approved.

Conference Calendar: H. M. Ware presented the Conference Calendar, with additions, and moved its adoption. After additions, it was approved.

Announcement—June Salaries: Bishop Henley reminded the Conference that June salaries were not to be paid to ministers leaving, but to incoming pastors.

Presentation: The Lay Delegate of Ortega United Methodist Church, Jacksonville, presented a check for \$500.00, to be used at the discretion of Bishop Henley and the Cabinet, for Ministerial Education Scholarships. This is a gift of the Killebrew Class, and in memory of Cliff Lynn, Sam Thompson, and Jasper Jones, and has been given for three years now.

Committee on Resolutions: O. B. Fanning presented his report through Clarence Whitley, and it was adopted. (See Reports.)

Motion: A. D. Hagler moved to suspend the rules to permit a Resolution for a U.P.I. correction and retraction of an inaccurate news story regarding Conference reaction to the James Forman "Black Manifesto." The Rules were suspended by an enthusiastic approval. Hagler then presented the following Resolution: "Be it resolved that the Secretary of the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church express appreciation to the United Press International for its apology for its highly inaccurate report concerning the James Forman item; and that the Secretary convey to the United Press International the respectful request of the Florida An-

nual Conference for a more accurate variety of reporting." The Resolution was enthusiastically adopted.

Announcements: Bishop Henley made several procedural announcements. R. C. Holmes made an announcement concerning interpretation of Legislative laws purportedly involving taxation of church-owned properties.

Greeting: Bishop Henley read a fraternal greeting from the Hong Kong Annual Conference.

Appointment: Bishop Henley announced the appointment of Cubell Johnson and William Ferguson as Area Coordinators to serve through the year.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference until 7:45 p.m. with a Benediction.

Evening Session—Friday, June 6, 1969

Laymen's Night Program: The Conference Laymen's Night Program presided over by Judge William A. Meadows, Conference Lay Leader, was opened at 7:45 p.m. with R. F. Blackburn leading the singing of hymns "O, for a Thousand Tongues to Sing" and "How Great Thou Art." Judge Meadows led the Responsive Reading, followed by The Gloria Patri. William Furr led in prayer. The Offering was received. Charles Babcock presented the first report of the nominating committee, nominating Judge William A. Meadows for re-election as Conference Lay Leader. He was re-elected and given a standing ovation. Judge Meadows presented the other nominations, and they were all elected. (See Part I.) District Lay Leader nominations were announced, and they were elected. (See Part I.) Judge Meadows presented his report. The hymn "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind" was sung.

Judge Meadows introduced Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., who delivered the Conference Sermon. The hymn "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" was sung and the Service concluded.

Appointment: Bishop Henley announced the appointment of the members of the Florida Council of Churches committee to be the Conference Committee on Ecumenical Affairs. (See Committees, Part I.)

Privilege: Bishop Henley made an opening statement about appointments and briefly spoke on goals for the year.

Appointments: The printed list of Appointments were distributed and corrected by Bishop Henley.

Adjournment: The hymn "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" was sung. Bishop Henley pronounced the Benediction and Adjourned the Conference at 9:30 p.m.

EPISCOPAL MESSAGE

BISHOP JAMES W. HENLEY

Today three streams of Methodist tradition converge in one fellowship having the same structure, responding to the same spiritual challenges, and united prayerfully to perform the will of God. It should be a day of rejoicing for us all. It should, by the grace of God, portend a great and glorious era within this area under the banner of the Cross and within the fellowship of The United Methodist Church.

Florida Methodism arose out of the missionary labors of stalwart circuit riders who came to these parts from the South Carolina Conference and initiated the formation of Methodist societies in St. Augustine, Pensacola, Amelia Island and Tallahassee. In 1830 the churches in the Florida Territory were transferred from South Carolina to the Georgia Conference. For the next fifteen years, ministers were assigned by the bishop presiding over that Conference and the church continued to grow in the territory until the General Conference of 1844 granted permission for the organization of a Conference of Methodism in Florida. This was consummated in Tallahassee on February 6, 1845. The arguments given to justify the new conference were that the Florida Conference appointments largely rotated within the same small group of ministers anyway and if Florida had progressed sufficiently to be organized as a State she had advanced sufficiently to deserve a Conference of her own. Furthermore, the difficulty of attending Annual Conference sessions in the Georgia Conference was great for those living as far south as Tallahassee or St. Augustine.

So the Florida Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was founded in Tallahassee and the ministers were deployed for the evangelization of the Territory which was almost simultaneously entering into statehood. The newly organized Conference elected to become a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Among its first acts was the establishment of "The Preachers' Aid Society of the Florida Annual Conference," the organization of the Florida Conference Missionary Society and the organization of an institution of higher education.

In 1873 the Methodist Episcopal Church organized a Florida Conference and for fourteen years it included both negro and white members and clergy. In 1886 the races chose separately by ballot to divide, and the negro churches and members retained the name of the Florida Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The white church became known as the "St. Johns River Conference." The St. Johns River Conference and the Florida Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, along with a few churches in this area belonging to the Congregations representing the Methodist Protestant Church were merged by the General Conferences of 1939 and became the Florida Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The Florida Conference composed predominately of negro ministers and laity was encompassed in the Central Jurisdiction of the newly created Methodist Church.

Meanwhile, the Evangelical United Brethren had established congregations in Florida. The EUB's have a rich and enviable history in this nation of ours. Their origin in the United States was largely among German speaking immigrants and reaches back to the days of Francis Asbury. Indeed, at the time Francis Asbury was ordained Elder and consecrated Bishop, there were very few ordained Methodist clergymen in the colonies. It was at the request of Mr. Asbury that William Otterbein, ordained by the Reformed Church in Germany, participated in his episcopal consecration. These two men were intimate friends and doubtless the two churches they were about to establish would have been united from the beginning if

Mr. Asbury had had any competency in the German language. The Methodist Church in America created a primary constitution for its own government, and this constitution became the guide for the United Brethren in Christ and the Evangelical Association.

Last September the Florida Conference (historically SEJ) and the Florida Conference (historically EUB) were merged in a formal and inspiring service in First United Methodist Church, Lakeland. Today these merged conferences in turn merge with the Florida Conference (historically CJ) and we are all united in one fellowship, out of one tradition, and for one purpose, namely: to glorify God and to extend the kingdom of Christ under the inspiration and power of the Holy Spirit.

There has been a general awakening among us of a disparity between what many of us as Christians profess and by contrast with our daily lives. There is a similar disparity between the proclamation and the teaching which often does and always should take place within the local church and the impression of the life of the church as given by its concern for the poor and the needy and the sinful and the outcast within the local community. Granted that our reach exceeds our grasp. Let us admit that we shall never be able as individuals or as communities of individuals fully to portray the love and the concern of our Master. But, it is still a fact that when we are deeply committed to the demonstration in our own community of what it means to follow the carpenter of Nazareth we will make an impact on that community. They will know that something takes place within that sanctuary that makes men and women different—and that that difference is priceless. It was the Master himself who consorted with the needy and the rejected and the sinful. We must make our concern felt.

CHRISTIANITY BEGINS AT HOME

One thing is sure, we are in a period of change the like of which none of us has ever experienced. In the midst of all this it is required that the church seek new patterns of ministry. Its Gospel came as a message of hope to the last and the least, the lost and the loneliest. The Lord Jesus bespoke the blessings of God upon those who feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the imprisoned, care for the fatherless. The Good Samaritan became the symbol of the sensitivity of Christ to the needs of those about him. The cup of cold water in the Master's name can become a sacrament. The well need no physician. The church is called to minister to the afflicted.

Perhaps our frustration arises from two quarters. First, the magnitude of human need with the complexity of human problems at home and abroad. Second, Christian people have become predominately spectators to the fierce battle royal which is taking place in the arena of humanity. The Christian fervently favors that which is good and benevolent and humanitarian. He wants good to win over evil. He will cheer for it. He will even give for it. But the fact is that what the church does anywhere in the uttermost parts of the earth should only be emblematic of what that same church is endeavoring to do by the grace of God on its own street, in its own community, within its own city. It is not our gospel that is unimpressive. It is most often our lives. There lies the rub. Use whatever words you will, the time is here for revival, renewal, rebirth, pentecost. We never truly discover Christ until we join him. We never really experience the joy of his salvation until we seek to enter into the fulfillment of his purposes and the demonstration of his love. We do not become a great missionary church by giving to the work in foreign lands alone. That we must do. But we must become missionaries in our own backyards. This is a program which every local church—even the smallest—can undertake. It allows for imagination. It renders the rewards of tangible, observable results. It is satisfying in that it gives the congregation at home some appreciation of the depth and the height and the joy and the victory of the missionary abroad.

QUADRENNIAL EMPHASIS

The General Conference of 1968 adopted as its standard for the four years reaching to 1972 the proclamation A New Church for a New World. Business, education, government, social patterns, family life, and every facet of society which you can mention is in a state of dynamic change. The Church must discover those media by which it can apply the ancient gospel of its Lord to contemporary life. The gospel cannot change. It is eternal. But the church must discover new ways of bringing the gospel to bear upon the lives of men.

Appropriately the General Conference turned first to the scriptures. What has our Lord to say to us? What is the meaning of His Sermon on the Mount for the world of 1969? This sermon was both encouraging and discouraging to those who first heard it. When individuals or groups of individuals take it seriously they find themselves confronted with profound admonitions which often strike deep and mercilessly at the core of selfishness, sinfulness and pride.

Every single individual United Methodist Church was urged to plan for Sunday School classes, study group classes, and ministers in their pulpits to give studious attention to the Sermon on the Mount. It is to be hoped that every congregation has set aside an appropriate amount of time in its various departments to give fresh study to the Sermon on the Mount during this past year.

The General Conference proposed that The United Methodist Church in the United States raise through voluntary gifts the sum of twenty million dollars as a Fund for Reconciliation. Twenty million dollars sounds like and truly is a great deal of money. But when this sum is considered in the light of the needs of our moment in history, it is relatively small and woefully inadequate. Half of the money raised is to be kept within the area where it is given. The remaining half is sent to the general treasurer of the church to be administered under the surveillance of the Council of Bishops and through a quadrennial emphasis committee set up for its administration. Definitely approved projects for the general church comprise:

- \$2,000,000—for rehabilitation and reconstruction in Vietnam following cessation of hostilities
- \$1,500,000—for United Methodist volunteer service
- \$ 750,000—for General Commission on Religion and Race

Other general monies, yet to be raised and apportioned may go for the promoting of opportunities and for the assistance of disadvantaged persons, the development of potential skills and talent capacities in these persons, and for the undergirding of work of broad dimensions in some of the most critical areas of the country. These allocations will be made by the Council of Bishops.

How will the money retained in the Florida Area be applied? Your Conference Committee felt free in proposing the distribution of the funds received to date in the following manner:

Only cash already in hand has been allocated.

The Conference Committee regrets that with so many urgent needs and developing possibilities and opportunities, funds are so limited. With increased support we will be able to consider more of the suggested projects. Here are two important recommendations:

- (1) That the first Sunday in Lent this year and each year of the quadrennium be "Fund for Reconciliation Sunday," and that those mak-

ing pledges to the Fund be asked, if possible, to pay their pledges for the year by this Sunday.

- (2) That on the Fund for Reconciliation Sunday (the first Sunday in Lent) the local church program include the opportunity for additional pledges to be made by those who desire to do so.

The total sum of twenty million dollars is relatively small when compared with the needs of the world to which the Church of Jesus Christ may properly give its support and encouragement in these troubled times. Jesus spoke of "the cup of cold water given in my name." We as Christians can participate in this expression of Christian concern in just such a turbulent day as this.

YOKEFELLOW CHURCHES

Our situation with regard to the distribution of our churches clearly shows that we have many localities where we have a strong United Methodist Church with an adjacent or neighboring congregation of relatively few members and sometimes inadequate facilities. If union is impractical, here is an opportunity for the building of bridges and the establishment of Christian fraternity which will be of inestimable worth in the creation of a stronger witness in the community. Let the strong help the weak—financially if possible—in the sharing of leadership where needed—in the outreach of brotherly concern. I would recommend that this not be an occasional gesture of good will, but a deliberately cultivated association through which the two congregations become Yokefellows in the building of the Kingdom and co-laborers as witnesses to the reconciling grace of God in Christ Jesus.

UNITED METHODIST VOLUNTARY SERVICE

Money alone cannot achieve reconciliation. Foremost this year in our Quadrennial Emphasis is the United Methodist Voluntary Service. The first year of United Methodism's quadrennial concern was given to orienting ourselves to the full meaning of Biblically inspired, person-to-person, care and concern for each other. Our study was our Lord's Sermon on the Mount. Our commitment was in our pledges to the Fund for Reconciliation.

The second year calls for a second stage of a far more important stewardship, namely, the giving of self in voluntary service. In the language of the general conference, "We believe that there is a readiness among young people (and others) to render the kind of service that the hour requires." As St. Paul said long ago regarding offerings: "But first they gave themselves!"

Throughout our country, local and regional task forces are already at work, having been initiated and organized at the local and regional level, to begin and carry on this ministry of reconciliation. Volunteers will be trained and guided by these task forces for the many types of programs and projects needed. These include working as representatives of Christ in the areas of poverty, race relations, community service and development. To find the causes underlying the alienation and separation of so many of our people will be the purpose of these groups and having discovered causes, to work to eliminate them.

Who can volunteer? The answer is, "all persons, 18 years of age and older, who can qualify as follows:

1. Has had at least a year away from home, or has had maturing experiences.
2. Can give at least one year of time solely to the United Methodist Voluntary Service.
3. Has some skill to share.
4. Is willing for inevitable change and relates well to people.
5. Is willing to accept discouragement and difficulties as a part of the cost of ministry to people.

The lack of academic achievement is not an eliminating factor as long as the volunteer has initiative, dependability, stability, and determination.

Our conference committee on quadrennial emphasis has a very important sub-committee guiding this program under the chairmanship of David T. Scoates. We hope that many persons in Florida will respond to the call and give a year's time in voluntary service.

THE UNITED METHODIST CENTER

Our new Methodist Building seemed to spring out of the ground from the day the first spade of earth was turned. It bids fair to be one of the most attractive Conference Centers in the Southeast. The decision to build it was made none too soon. Our former facilities, generously made available by Florida Southern College, had become quite inadequate. This new structure will serve the varied needs of the conference most effectively. Our boards and commissions will be able to meet there and our conference staff will be able to function to a high degree of efficiency. The Building Committee had worked tirelessly over a period of two years in an attempt to plan a building which would satisfy the desires of the conference and fulfill the needs of its programs. It is our belief that this will have been accomplished when construction is completed and occupancy has been taken. I wish to join with many of you who have volunteered your praise and congratulations for those who have planned and those who have designed the building.

THE CHILDREN'S CONVOCATION

The Bishop's Convocation for Children in Pastors' Preparatory Classes for Church Membership was held in Branscomb Memorial Auditorium on Saturday, March 22. In the beginning we thought of bringing these boys and girls together for a day during which we would talk about the meaning of Christian discipleship, the significance of church membership, and the nature of our work in the Florida Area as a pilot project to be sponsored perhaps in three districts adjacent to Lakeland. It was later decided that a broad invitation would be extended to any and all who cared to come. Those assisting in planning for the day were amazed at the response. We had 964 boys and girls with many of their pastors and a great number of their church school teachers and parents. I for one was elated at the response and at the spirit of the entire day. Mrs. Margaret Hollis, Brother W. L. Joyner and others gave generously of their time in anticipation of the occasion. Now that we have experimented with it, I think it is eminently worth repeating. Maybe it was because I enjoyed it so much that I felt it was good. However, I really don't believe these boys and girls will forget experiences that come to them at the Children's Convocation. The date proposed for this year is March 7, 1970.

LEESBURG

There is no way to calculate the spiritual blessing that has come from the Leesburg Youth Camp to the life and vigor of the Florida Area. Every now and again I find myself saying a God Bless You to laymen in Leesburg, especially Carlisle Rogers, and to those leaders of the youth program in the Conference, notably Warren Willis, for the establishment of the Youth Camp back in 1947.

Ministers, church school teachers, and a host of dedicated Christian leaders have made possible at Leesburg a program for youth which has strengthened the life of the church and of our society. In later years the laymen have used the facilities for their retreats, the Wesleyan Guild has held its annual conference there, the Women's Society used the Youth Camp for executive committees and seminars, the older adults have held their assemblies, etc., etc. But the simple fact is that our accommodations are becoming outdated. Many of them need renovating and some of them need complete restoration or replacement. It is time for us to begin to look

toward just such a project as this. Otherwise, the very groups whom we seek to serve at Leesburg will be finding other gathering places. All the while let us remember that we have at this camp one of the most beautiful sites in all of Florida and we have there a tradition of inestimable worth. I simply drop this, hoping that it will be picked up by others. Something needs to be done. We cannot improve on the location by going otherwheres. It is central, it has established programs, it is superbly beautiful in location, and we already have installations which would be costly to duplicate otherwheres. It is my feeling that plans should be laid within the relatively near future. If it must be done for the glory of God, it can be done.

FLORIDA UNITED METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

Florida United Methodists are justly proud of the Methodist Children's Home at Enterprise and the Sarah Hunt Home at Daytona. Over the years thousands of children who would have been without appropriate care or wholesome Christian environment have been objects of the devotion of dedicated Christian workers in these institutions. Our United Methodist people are committed to the continuing support of these Christian enterprises.

The new year poses some disturbing calendar coincidences. The circumstances are these regarding the offerings for the children's homes:

June 29—is immediately after those pastors who are involved in moves have gone to those new pulpits.

August 31—every Floridian who can flee to the mountains or is getting ready for school.

November 30—Thanksgiving and budget raising time for many.

December 21—Christmas Sunday—local projects.

March 29—Easter Day!

This simply means that in our local churches we will have to give particular attention to our offerings for the children's homes. Through these gifts we are enabled to render a ministry which most of us would be utterly unable to care for individually. Many adults are giving thanks for what the Methodist Children's Home has meant in their childhood. Let us continue the good work.

CONVOCATIONS FOR THE LAITY

During January last year more than twelve thousand Florida laymen, laywomen, and youth attended the Lay Convocations in Miami, Lakeland and Jacksonville. The committee planning for the 1970 convocations came upon a new plan. In January 1970 there will be six convocations:

Miami—Friday, January 16

Palm Beach—Saturday, January 17

Jacksonville—Sunday, January 18

Lakeland—Friday, January 30

St. Petersburg—Saturday, January 31

Tallahassee—Sunday, February 1

Plans for the programs of these occasions will be developed within the near future. It is obvious that an attempt is being made to take the convocations into every area of the state. Of course, to do this adequately, we would need still more gatherings, but that is not practical at the present moment. It is our hope that the messages and the fellowship of these occasions will be illuminating and profoundly inspiring. More than ever before we want these convocations to speak to our current needs as followers of Christ.

We must not fail to consider the four Laymen's Retreats in the fall. Judge Meadows announces that the programs are complete. The speakers are all lined up. Registrations will begin soon. The Leesburg Laymen's Retreats are heralded throughout United Methodism in all jurisdictions. The inspiration that has been carried back to the local church from associations in worship at the youth camp are of inestimable value. We

forget the amount of time and planning and the correspondence that goes into setting up a program like this. Congratulations to our Board of the Laity.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

No other area of The United Methodist Church has succeeded so well in keeping its membership informed with regard to the world mission of the church as has the Women's Society of Christian Service. We salute the two continuing conferences of this Society and express to them our admiration for their leadership, our deep support for their cooperation in every aspect of the life of the church, and their manifestation of Christian concern in all things. Many elements of our conference program and much of the spiritual concern of our church life in general would be seriously impoverished without the organized effort and support of the Women's Societies.

CONCLUSION

So the Florida Conference today begins a new chapter in its history. Three bodies within one fellowship become one body in one fellowship. For many of us, I hope all of us, this is a day for rejoicing, a triumphant celebration. 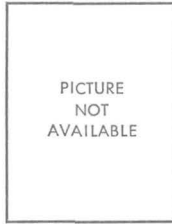

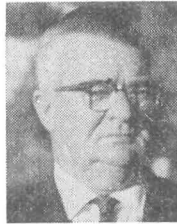

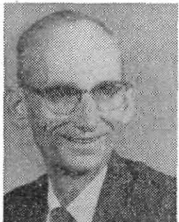

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY**REPORT NO. 2**

The General Conference 1968 set forth many changes in the structure and responsibilities of the Board of the Ministry.

These responsibilities include: Interviewing of candidates, ministerial conference relations, continuing education, supervision of the Annual Conference share of the Ministerial Education Fund, counseling elders, recruiting, counseling resources (psychological testing program), ministerial standards (including disciplinary requirements), and ordination.

We call attention to the report of the Committee at the 1968 session of the Annual Conference concerning parsonage standards and encourage local churches to implement these standards as early as possible (see 1968 Journal, Page 240).

Local churches should be reminded that the ministerial education fund as voted by the General Conference 1968, is to be apportioned by the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. It is on the basis of 2 percent of the total spent for all purposes by the local church in the third year of the previous quadrennium, excluding payments to World Service, Conference Benevolence, Advance Specials, New Buildings, and the servicing of debts. This apportionment of 2 percent will become mandatory on January 1, 1970.

It is noted that the Jurisdictional Conference approved the following voluntary asking to the local Churches:

1. Until December 31, 1969, that an additional one percent be contributed for capital investments for the three seminaries in the Southeast.
2. Add one and one-half percent for the last portion of the quadrennium January 1, 1970-December 31, 1972, for capital investment funds for the seminaries.

Attention is called to par. 355, Book of Discipline, 1968, referring to the continuing education of the ministry. This paragraph should be studied and implemented by each local church Pastor-Parish Relations Committee. Further, we recommend that each local church encourage its ministry to participate in opportunities for continuing education through Pastors Schools, Ministers Weeks, and Summer Schools.

Recommendations

1. The Board of the Ministry is deeply concerned about the increasing number who leave the ministry. Without question this is due to many reasons: Frustration in attempting to fulfill one's sense of mission, inadequate preparation for one's task in the pastoral ministry, insufficient financial undergirding, etc.

Therefore, we recommend that a committee be appointed by the Bishop with representatives from the Board of the Ministry, World Service Commission, Board of Missions, the Board of the Laity, Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations, Board of Pensions and other interested persons for the following purposes:

- (1) To implement the report of the Interboard study of recruitment and attrition found on page 166 of the 1968 Journal.
- (2) To evaluate the financial support of the ministry including minimum salary.
- (3) To develop a philosophy and strategy of recruitment.
- (4) To study the need and feasibility of a convocation on the ministry; and if such would be helpful and constructive, to recommend a definite plan of procedure to the next session of the Annual Conference.

2. Visitation to the various Seminaries has revealed a rather dangerous trend toward our Seminaries becoming graduate schools of religion rather than professional schools for parish ministers. Therefore it is recommended that this Annual Conference authorize your Board of the Ministry to communicate this concern to the proper persons.

3. We request the Bishop to appoint a committee composed of representatives from the Board of Missions, World Service Commission, Board of the

Ministry, and Florida Southern College to study and make recommendations to the Annual Conference, 1970, with reference to the establishing of a counseling center for our ministers and their families.

4. That standing rules, Title 6, Section 12, be amended as follows:

Article 3 changed to March 1st: Application for Probationary and Associate Membership and any other change in Conference Relations.

Article 4 shall read: May 1st: Department's deadline for accepting correspondence work.

Article 6 shall read: May 15th: Application for enrollment for Course of Study, Summer School.

CONFERENCE PROGRAM COMMITTEE

Your Program Committee recommends that the printed program be the program of this session of the Annual Conference, with such alterations as may be necessary in the opinion of the Presiding Officer, the Chairman of the Committee, and the Conference Secretary.

We further recommend that the following rules be observed to expedite the business of the Conference:

1. Any report or resolution presented by a regular Committee or Board of the Conference, in accordance with Standing Rule IV, Paragraph 2, shall be properly before the body of the Conference, when it is presented, without a motion or a second.

2. A member of the Conference who wishes to be recognized by the Chairman for a question, point of order, or discussion of a motion, shall address the Chairman and wait for recognition. When he is recognized by the Chairman, he will give his name, whether he is a lay or clerical member, and if a lay member, he will give the name of his local Church.

3. Debate and discussion of motions will be limited to three minutes per speech, and the speeches will alternate between those for and those against.

4. A member of the Conference will be permitted to speak only one time in behalf of, or in opposition to, any motion before the Conference with the following exception: if no one wishes to speak opposite to the preceding speech, a member who has spoken on the motion may speak one more time. It is understood that this rule shall not be construed to debar the maker of a motion from concluding the debate.

5. A motion to call for the previous question may be made at any time, if no one desires to speak. However, as long as there are those desiring to speak, a motion for the call of the previous question may not be made until there have been two speeches for and two speeches against the pending motion.

COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES

The Committee on Standing Rules has examined the Rules of the Conference, and submits the following revised Rules for the Conference. A great many of the revisions are the direct result of new legislation, enacted by the General Conference, and the inclusion of certain of our rules in the 1968 Book of Discipline. (See Standing Rules.)

CONFERENCE COUNCIL STAFF REPORT

Leadership Training

Much progress has been made by our staff in perfecting our team work, thus making ourselves available for leadership training in the local church, district and conference. The list of planned and approved events covering all program areas and ages in which we participate is a lengthy one. The staff feels a sense of satisfaction, particularly in its participation in the training for the new structure with this beginning year of the Quadrennium. It is our sincere hope that our efforts will reveal their merit with the successful use of the new structure in our local churches.

A few of our staff members have taught in Christian Service Schools in local churches and districts of the conference. However, the staff has restricted its participation in local church and district leadership training as indigenous leadership has been certified. This has freed us for services which could be better rendered in the interests of the whole of our program.

Staff Participation in Local Churches

The second area of our service to the conference has been our participation in the local churches. Our ministerial staff members have preached,

whenever invited, and as the calendar permitted, and lay staff members have also spoken to congregations upon invitation. All of our staff members have consulted with teachers, workers and youth on many subjects, two of which are primarily the printed resources of new curriculum and the new structure of the church. They have also addressed various groups on the several facets of our on-going ministries of the conference. United Methodist Men, women's groups, Official Boards, and other groups within local churches have been addressed on such subjects as annuities, wills and legacies, retirement homes, etc. We are constantly striving to make as many contacts in the local church as possible.

Staff Participaion in Conference Agencies and Boards

Thirdly, the responsibility of contacting, consulting with, and supporting the Annual Conference boards and agencies has been attempted by our staff. In addition to careful attention to our assignments of portfolios, we have related ourselves with the programs and work of the cooperative schools of mission, quadrennial emphasis on reconciliation, and lay renewal.

Staff cooperation with administration at all levels has been carefully attended to. We have realized that without consultation with both conference administration and district councils our efforts would be minimal. Most of our staff members have individually and collectively consulted with the Bishop and Cabinet on numerous occasions during the year. Through workshops on the conference level, district program council staff members have been related to us in consultation, planning and training.

Our staff has been happy that we could serve the Bishop in all of the conferences and convocations which he has sponsored.

In order for us to implement on-going and new program from the church at large it has been necessary for us to participate beyond the bounds of our conference. Among the conferences attended by our staff are: Linkage meetings of the National Division of the Board of Missions; the Board of Publications; the Annual Conference for Executive Secretaries of Boards of Christian Education; general church meeting of Conference Program Directors; National Youth Convocation; St. Simon's Island Workshop for Age Coordinators; Regional Conference of the Board of Missions; meeting of the General Board of Missions; National Conference on Christian Fellowship; Southeastern Recreational and Leisure Lab; the Methodist Conference on Christian Education; National College and University Religious Affairs Conference; the Association of Wesley Foundations; the American Association of Higher Education and National Consultations on Community Colleges.

Inter-Agency Studies and Committees

Upon inventory, there has been more extensive participation of our staff in inter-agency studies and committee work than we had realized. The citing of several examples of this will illustrate. A special committee on housing, involving the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries and the Preacher's Relief Board, conducted a study throughout the conference. This was implemented with real involvement of one of our staff members. The Cooperative School of Mission, sponsored jointly by five program boards, is another. A survey of 19 conferences was made by the Board of Missions of the minimum salary program. This was done in order to determine what levels of support had to be established within our conference this coming year.

Staff Participation in Ecumenical Affairs

Although the program area of ecumenical affairs is new, our staff has given leadership in this area. There has been involvement, particularly in the agencies of the Florida Council of Churches. This includes involvement with the United Christian Youth Movement; the Commission on Church Planning and Strategy; the Commission on Christian Education; the Com-

mission for United Ministries of Higher Education; and the training of church related nursery and kindergarten leaders. We have also participated in the Southern Regional Committee on Day Care; Southern Regional Committee on Work of Churches of Small Membership; and the Southern Committee on Christian Education of Children.

Services in Consultation and Resource Agency to Local Churches

Our staff has been especially concerned that careful attention be given to the requests of local churches for consultation and resource services. Countless calls have been made for consultation by telephone, office calls, and visits to local churches. Countless responses have been made for consultation with local churches by telephone, office calls and visits. When resources have not been available in Lakeland, we have endeavored to secure this help from general agencies.

One of the most remarkable services in this category has been our film library. We have approximately 1000 film strips and about 50 motion pictures. A total of 2044 bookings have been completed this conference year through April 29th.

Special Services in Printing and Assistance to Various Groups of the Conference

All of us share in our pride over the special services in printing and assistance which we have provided. Our printing press and accessory equipment have been engaged to the maximum in order to comply with the requests for materials. We believe that time will reveal the significance of this supportive service, as well as a larger saving on printing costs.

Through Coordinated Mailing, a service largely the product of printing, we have also filled many orders for materials from general boards, thereby facilitating service without undue delay. Hundreds of orders for manuals and materials for the new structure have been filled. Lastly, but not least, we are deeply proud of the service of printed communications—particularly do we speak of the FLORIDA METHODIST. Our constant sensitive ear to the voice of the United Methodism in Florida reveals that this journal of our Council is growing in its acceptability. The Council has requested that this organ be limited to news and information about approved program. This, we have endeavored to do and therefore, have been able to stay within our budget. Next conference year, in order to live within our budget, due to the need of greater circulation and increased costs of production, we are complying with the direction of the Executive Committee of the Program Council to issue FLORIDA METHODIST six times—August, October, December, February, April and June. We plan to issue Coordinated Mailings, September, November, January, March, May and July. The Coordinated Mailing will be designed to provide a single sheet of announcements, enclosures inappropriate for printing in the FLORIDA METHODIST, and miscellaneous items. Hopefully this will make for a smaller package.

In this general presentation of the accounting of our stewardship, we have been limited in reporting all within our hearts. Our efforts have not been free of errors and mistakes. However, we believe in profiting from our mistakes. Many suggestions have come from many sources of the Conference and we are grateful. Appreciation is extended to everyone who has made our efforts possible.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL

Our Conference Council looks forward to its third year of coordinating into oneness the stewardship of the over three hundred thousand United Methodists of Florida. With the foundation of more understanding of our denomination's venture in the involvement of all levels of the church, particularly the Local Church, the future holds much in store for a whole ministry. Certainly the needs of our changing world call for a church current in its efforts to meet these needs with the Good News of Christ.

Your Conference Council in its meeting May 2 in Leesburg makes the following recommendations to the 1969 Session of the Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church:

1. The Council has endeavored to coordinate the many recommendations for Florida United Methodism's ministry in the conference year 1969-70. While these recommendations will appear in the *Journal* in the categories of Boards and Agencies, they have been grouped into a single instrument and given to the District Superintendents for distribution to the members of the 1969 Conference. This will make it possible for perusal and reflection prior to consideration and action at the session of the Annual Conference.

2. We recommend the program year of the Florida Annual Conference

of The United Methodist Church be the calendar year, beginning January 1, 1970.

3. Our third recommendation is concerned with the Conference Camping Program, formerly the responsibility of the Conference Board of Education but now the responsibility of the Conference Program Council. Inasmuch as the camping program is now interboard in function, we recommend that cost for the operation of: 1) The United Methodist Youth Camp at Leesburg, 2) Camp Florida at Brandon, 3) South Florida Camp at LaBelle, and 4) North Florida Camp at Mayo, be included in the budget of the Florida Conference United Methodist Program Council.

We further recommend that all receipts from fees of those using the said camps be applied toward payment of this item of the council budget. We call attention to item No. 44 in the proposed budget recommended by the World Service and Finance Commission as reflecting this request.

In order to completely implement the above recommendation we call attention to the fact that two obligations on the camp properties have to be included in the above. They are:

- a. The swimming pool at the United Methodist Youth Camp in Leesburg with an unpaid balance of \$18,007.40 owed to the Florida Conference Foundation at 6% annual interest rate;
- b. A parcel of land with a house at Camp Florida having a note only obligation of \$25,000.00 owed to the Florida Conference Foundation with an annual interest rate of 6%.

We, therefore, request Conference approval to re-finance both of these acquired obligations with the Florida Conference Foundation to be repaid by ten equal semi-annual payments including 6% annual interest on the unpaid principal beginning with January 1, 1970. The first year's payments of \$4,221.92 principal and interest for the swimming pool and \$5,862.00 principal and interest for Camp Florida is included in item No. 44 of the proposed conference budget.

4. We recommend that the Annual Conference go on record as approving the installation of a sewage disposal plant not to exceed a total cost of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) at the United Methodist Youth Camp in Leesburg. This recommendation is necessitated by the requirement of the State Board of Health as indicated by the letter attached. In the event of approval by you of this recommendation advanced study has been made with the Florida Conference Foundation to borrow money and repay in ten equal semi-annual payments (interest included) of \$11,724.00 beginning with the first payment January 1, 1970. The council has included in its request from the World Service Commission a total of the first two payments for the calendar year of 1970. This figure is included in the proposed budget for World Service and Conference Benevolences by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finances (see item No. 44 World Service proposed budget).

The Council has two items of business it has transacted which it reports to the conference. First, completion of the organization of the Program Council has been made with the formation of three mandatory committees—1) Interpretation, 2) Television, Radio and Film Communication, and 3) Publishing Interest. In addition to this two optional committees were formed—1) Coordination and 2) Research and Planning. The personnel of these committees has been elected by the Council. (See Journal Part I.)

Lastly, one item needs to be reported to the Conference of a proposal made by the Executive Committee and will be considered for confirmation by the Council in its Annual Conference meeting June 7. This is the proposal to issue *Florida Methodist* in 1969-70 year six times—August, October, December, February, April and June. It is further proposed to issue Coordinated mailings September, November, January, March, May and July. The Coordinated Mailing will be reduced in size. The motivation for this proposal is the necessity to live within our budget caused by the need of a greater circulation and increased costs of production.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

REPORT NO. 1

The Florida Conference Board of Evangelism earnestly desires to find ways in which it can serve the churches of United Methodism in carrying out the age-old commission of Jesus to proclaim the "good news." This task is central to our mission and demands faithful employment of old as well as new forms to meet swiftly changing conditions. There are no pat answers or easy methods. No program can be imposed on any church. Only when there springs from the hearts of concerned people can the love of God be successfully communicated. Thus the ultimate evangelism is from person to person and takes place within the life of the local fellowship of believers.

The Conference Board of Evangelism exists only to strengthen that fellowship and enable it to serve the needs of individual persons. These needs we propose to serve by encouraging the following lines of action within the congregation and district:

Spiritual Life Retreats for local church leaders or similar programs; the training of youth and adults in skills of "One to One Evangelism," such as the imaginative new "Daily Game of Loveincern"; training opportunities for laymen under the leadership of the District Secretary; Stimulating compassion for the dispossessed and for inactive members; encouraging the local church to undertake a membership inventory and audit each year during the months of October and November to improve accuracy and to discover and reclaim those who are on the fringe of the fellowship; to channel the compassion of our churches in the observance of a "Day of Prayer for World Peace" on Thanksgiving Day or a near Sunday and encourage the continuance of such prayers for peace for forty days; and to provide local churches with suggestions for a wide variety of special programs for action.

The needs of the minister can be served by district gatherings which can assume the form of a "Day Apart" where the "Position Paper" on evangelism by the General Board is studied. Ministers and wives can find fellowship and refreshment in a "Day-A-Way" which is scheduled for March 31 and April 1, 1970, Robert Meyer Motor Inn, Orlando. Ministers who have served from 7 to 12 years can find stimulation at a Bishop's Convocation on Evangelism to be held in 1969 or 1970.

The training of children and youth for church membership can receive reinforcement from the Bishop's Convocation for Church Membership Classes proposed for March 7, 1970, and to be held at Florida Southern College.

The Board of Evangelism joins the Board of Education in seeking an understanding of downward trends in church school and church attendance such that strategies may be formed to reverse the trend.

The Board is seeking to maintain contact with national leadership in the field of evangelism by promoting attendance by nine delegates at the U.S. Congress on Evangelism, an ecumenical venture, as well as participation by the Executive Committee in the Candler Camp Meeting at Lake Junaluska and related training opportunities.

The vigorous Lay Renewal program now being coordinated by a conference committee receives the encouragement of the board.

Funds to operate these programs in the amount of \$2900 for the seven months remaining in 1969 and \$4350 for the year 1970 are respectfully requested. To serve again as Conference Secretary of Evangelism it is asked that W. L. Joyner be reappointed.

During the past year Florida United Methodism received 8,277 on Profession of Faith, 16,815 from other Denominations and from other Methodist Churches. The total additions have been 25,092, making the total membership of the Annual Conference 301,899 as compared to 299,255 last year. We have removed 22,345 from the rolls during this report year.

REPORT NO. 2

The following is the report of the program carried out through the Office of Lay Renewal under the direction of the Florida Conference Advisory Committee on Lay Renewal established by the 1968 session of the Annual Conference. There were 128 requests for information received from local churches interested in the Lay Witness Mission week-end program and 63 Churches have held Lay Witness Missions under the leadership of 20 different laymen serving effectively as Lay Witness Coordinators. A master list of 348 youth and adult witnesses has been created.

The Office of Lay Renewal has filed no request for funds to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. Local Churches conducting Lay Witness Missions have remitted an offering or designated a contribution to the Lay Renewal. We are also grateful to several laymen who made contributions to the Lay Renewal fund which is handled in an account by the Conference Central Treasurer.

A most effective Lay Renewal Conference was held at Lake Yale Assembly Grounds April 25-27, 1969 with 251 registered. The Florida Conference Advisory Committee on Lay Renewal is constituted as follows: Two Lay Witness Coordinators: Mr. William E. Robertson, Sarasota; Mr. George Ericksen, Tampa; two Representatives of Board of Laity: Mr. John Morris, Ft. Lauderdale, Mr. Charles I. Bobcock, Jr., Coral Gables; two Representatives of the Board of Evangelism: B. Hugh Lake, Jr. Orlando, W. L. Joyner, Lake Wales, and a Program Conference Staff Person Assigned to Lay Renewal.

Recommendations

1. In view of the excellent response by participating local Churches during this first year of the work of the Office of Lay Renewal we the Boards of Laity and Evangelism of the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church recommend the continuance of the Florida Conference Ad-

- visory Committee on Lay Renewal as established by the 1968 Annual Conference as outlined on pages 177-178 of the 1968 Journal.
2. We recommend the continued promotion of the Lay Witness Mission week-end program in the local churches of our Conference.
 3. We encourage local Churches to experience the John Wesley Great Experiment or Ten Brave Christians program as an effective opportunity for disciplined spiritual growth and involvement.
 4. We recommend the Office of Lay Renewal cooperate with the Institute on Church Renewal of Atlanta in conducting in local Churches the depth study and involvement program of the Christian Growth Conference.
 5. We recommend through the Sub-committee on Youth of the Advisory Committee on Lay Renewal that in August or September of 1969 a session of Creative Dialogue be held for the membership of the Florida Conference UMYF Council on Youth Ministries and a like number of Lay Witness Mission youth team members.
 6. We recommend that as the need and interest arises the Advisory Committee assist in the conducting of Renewal Rallies that may be held in geographical locations throughout our state.
 7. We recommend that a Conference-wide Lay Renewal Conference be held May 1-3, 1970 at Lake Yale Assembly Grounds with a desire to bring together for dialogue, sharing and training all the interested persons in the area of the Lay Renewal thrust of our Conference program.
 8. We recommend that the laity of the Florida Conference be made aware of the opportunity of the third annual "Summer Institute for Laymen" to be held at Candler School of Theology, Atlanta July 3-6, 1969.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Section I

We are greatly concerned with the anxiety, mistrust, and division, which prevails among our people. Our society is in a ferment and turmoil. Some of the unrest is based upon high and noble aspirations for a better society, but some is based upon ideals not compatible with democracy or Christianity. We must exercise maturity and Christian wisdom to distinguish the difference, and not accept all protests as an expression of noble ideals. Much of our existing problems can be blamed upon our failure to bring into being a society based upon equality and justice for all of our people. We must act quickly and affirmatively to correct the conditions which give cause for this division and frustration. All of us must make every effort to resolve these difficulties and bring about a reconciliation among our people, now, not something to be projected for the future. We must act promptly to break down the barriers and resolve these problems or there may be a very bleak and dismal future. Our course of action is clearly defined in the 5th Chapter of 2nd Corinthians:

"For if a man is in Christ he becomes a new person altogether, the past

is finished and gone, everything has become fresh, and new. All this is God's doing, for he has reconciled us to himself through Jesus Christ; and he has made us agents of the reconciliation. God was in Christ personally reconciling the world to himself, not counting their sins against them, and has commissioned us with the message of reconciliation."

Section II

Division on General Welfare

The alarming problem of drug abuse has become a priority item for thoughtful Christians everywhere. Our Division has consequently focused its energies on this strategic area. The frightening dimensions of the problem are seen in the urban centers of our state, and smaller communities to a lesser extent. The disastrous consequences of dependency and/or addiction are truly alarming. The church is concerned because of the harmful effects of a variety of drugs in use today upon human personality. What ever can be done in the community and in the local church needs to be done.

We especially recommend the careful observance of "Drug and Alcohol Concerns Sunday" November 9th. Settings favorable for discussion are urged. Sixth grade youth and older should be involved.

The changes in the strategy of Methodism in the field of drug and alcohol concerns at the last General Conference has produced, we believe, a climate more favorable to the effective inauguration of preventive and rehabilitative programs in our communities.

There is great optimism, for example, regarding a plan we have developed which calls for a pilot program in the Orlando area. Its purpose is to prevent drug abuse—including alcohol. In cooperation with the medical society and ministerial association a preventive educational program among youth throughout the area is scheduled. The cooperation of the schools has been promised and the help of the area local churches of all denominations is being sought. Plans are well along on this exciting project mainly due to the efforts of Dr. Robert Curry of Orlando a member of our division. Cooperation and interest has been great on this exciting project. We believe that by September this program will be in full operation. Such a program will reach thousands of youth with help in making wise decisions regarding the use of alcohol and other drugs. We believe that this is one approach that is needed but hope that other avenues of redemptive action in this field will spring up due to the concern felt in local churches. More effective means of helping our families and youth face this terrible threat to health and wholeness are desperately needed.

The widespread social acceptance of alcohol consumption continues to be cause for special concern. The United Methodist Church has affirmed its conviction "that the choice to abstain from the use of alcohol beverages is sound . . . witness." This statement from Dallas is commended to all as "one form of personal and social witness to God's liberating love for mankind."

We commend United Christian Action for their contribution in a field far too vast for any one denomination to work effectively. This interdenominational organization has worked diligently in the field of legislative control. They have done much in the areas of drug and alcohol problems, gambling, pornography and related fields.

Section III

Division on Peace and World Order

More than ever, mankind faces the imperative of learning the art of living together in peace and understanding. Building and maintaining

peace are absolutely essential if we are to survive. Therefore, the main thrust of the Division of Peace and World Order is in the assumption that the world can be made safe for man. He can be at peace; he can be free; he can grow. To this end our Methodist Christians are challenged with the responsibility to be actively engaged in seeking peaceful solutions to the many complex problems confronting our world today.

The following are recommended:

1. Study-Action groups in the local church can be vital tools in creating an informed Christian community. Study themes should include: United States Foreign Policy; World Development, Food and Population; Strengthening the United Nations, the Arms Race and the Military Establishment.
2. We favor continued participation in the United Nations, recognizing its accomplishments in the promotion of peace and world order, and in aid to people of the depressed areas of the world.
3. Participation in United Nations Seminars is also recommended for information, inspiration, and "know-how" for action. The Division of Peace and World Order has scheduled a Washington-United Nations Seminar for adults October 18-25, 1969.
4. The Division of Peace and World Order will promote experimentation with some weekly radio programs dealing with international affairs and especially United Nations affairs. This project will be implemented through the District Directors of Christian Social Concerns and the District Secretaries of Radio and TV.
5. We further recommend the use of available personnel qualified to speak on matters of international concern such as: (a) Ben Page, graduate student at Florida State University, recently returned from North Korea, (b) Vilem Schneeberger, Superintendent of the United Methodist Church in Czechoslovakia (available May and June, 1969). Mr. Schneeberger may be scheduled through the New York Office, (c) Dr. T. T. Brumbaugh, Mease Manor, Dunedin, Florida.
6. The Methodist Churches of Florida are urged to observe the following:
 - World Order Sunday—October 19, 1969
 - United Nations Week—October 19-25, 1969
 - Trick or Treat for UNICEF—October 31, 1969
 - World Day of Prayer—March 6, 1970
7. We commend all parties in the Viet Nam War who have agreed to negotiations. We oppose any escalation of the War by any of the parties. We call for Florida United Methodists to pray and work for a speedy conclusion to the War in Viet Nam and to further pray and work for rehabilitation, apart from war, for the people of that country.

Section IV

Division on Human Relations

The Board rejoices and is deeply grateful to God for the coming of full unification of all United Methodists in Florida at this session of the Annual Conference. It is an event of great significance in the lives of all of us. We recognize and emphasize, however, that the union as of this date is chiefly structural rather than spiritually real, and we urge that all efforts possible be made to proceed with the development of true Christian unity among us. We commend our leaders who have guided us thus far, and pledge the support of this Board in seeking to advance the process of integration of the life of our Conference and its people at all levels as personnel and opportunities present themselves.

Recognizing the needs in our nation and world for the reconciling work of Christ, the Board welcomes the promotion of the Bishops' Fund for Reconciliation, and is grateful for the leadership given in this project by our Bishop and the Conference Committee. We stand ready to be of all possible assistance to the Conference in the support of this program, both in the development of reconciling projects within our State as well as in helping to secure the funds to make them possible.

The Board proposes the following action projects for the approval of the Conference, to be carried out within the next year:

1. That there be held, early in the Conference year, a series of District Workshops on Human Relations, to include the following features:
 - a. That their purpose shall be to stimulate study and activity by communities relative to local needs in the area of human relations, and to interpret to local leaders positions and programs recommended by United Methodism, aimed at bringing local churchmen into creative response to Christ in their own communities;
 - b. That the Workshops should be scheduled to include a series of sessions in each district, and at a time convenient to working people, preferably week-ends;
 - c. That there be opportunity for real sharing of personal attitudes and feelings between persons of various racial groups, in small groups.
 - d. That the programs include information on Negro history;
 - e. That they help local churches establish contacts with congregations of different racial background;
 - f. That local churches be stimulated to explore possible joint programs of social action in such areas as: child care; police-community relations; housing; improvement of community services in ghetto areas; migrants.
2. That the Board aid the process of inter-relations between churches from former Jurisdictions by preparing and distributing information on the location of churches, and lists of names of leaders of ability who might be available as speakers, teachers, etc. in other churches.
3. That local communities and churches be urged and assisted in planning for courses in Negro History to be taught in local Christian Workers' Schools.
4. That the Board initiate plans for adequate research, in order that pertinent facts and information on resources may be available on various issues of social concern in our State.
5. That a series of Urban Consultations be held on community problems and that resource persons be made available so that District Action Programs can be instituted in which lay leadership will be utilized to the fullest, and that financial support be provided for these consultations.

Section V

The Florida Probation and Parole Commission has put into operation a Community Service Volunteer Program in Florida. The object of this program is to obtain concerned volunteers a few hours each week to assist in supervision and counseling. Volunteers from all walks of life are eligible. They will counsel, guide, inspire and help a probationer or parolee to become a responsible citizen. It will not cost anything to participate, except love and concern for one who has stumbled into trouble. Those who become volunteers in the Service will be aiding a person to become re-adjusted to the responsibilities of a law-abiding citizen, re-establish broken homes caused by crime, assist one to obtain employment, reduce the potential for crime, and bring one under the influence of the church. Anyone participating as a volunteer will be spiritually rewarded and renewed by being a friend and pal to one who has troubles. The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns unanimously approved this as a conference and local church project.

Section VI

The 1968 Florida Annual Conference referred all resolutions, petitions, and protests submitted in opposition to Section 3, of the Rule of Law and Right of Dissent, adopted by the 1968 General Conference of the United Methodist Church, pertaining to the matter of civil disobedience, to the Conference

Board of Christian Social Concerns for a thorough and complete study, with directions to report its findings and recommendations to this Annual Conference. It is respectfully submitted that this Board has complied with said directive. Thirty-nine resolutions, petitions, and protests were received from churches or church groups. An open hearing was held on January 24th and 25th, 1969, at the Morrison United Methodist Church, Leesburg, Florida, as a part of this study. Notice was given to every church in this conference of the time and place of said hearing. At the appointed time and place, one hundred and ten persons appeared, representing twenty-one churches or church groups, nineteen of which protested the language of said Section 3. One group approved, and one group came to observe.

The Board found that said Section 3 was not a full and complete statement of a person's relationship to the law of God and to the law of man; that there exists a widespread misunderstanding among the churches and many of the members thereof, centered about the meaning of such terms as "the right of civil disobedience" and "laws believed to be unjust"; that some members have withdrawn their membership, and others are withholding their support, financially and otherwise. In the light of these findings, the Board believes a re-statement of said Section would be helpful to the better understanding of all our people, and would contribute greatly to the elimination of confusion and unrest. The Board unanimously approved the following statement.

"We recognize the fundamental freedom of every man, in a democracy, to choose whether to obey or disobey a man-made law; realizing, however, that if he chooses to disobey a law, he must accept the penalty imposed for such violation. In a democracy, no person has a legal right to disobey the law nor the commands of any duly constituted authority; but, a viable option does exist for a person to disobey a law, for the purpose of testing the constitutionality of the law violated, by use of the democratic processes afforded, provided the violation of that law does not directly injure the person or property of another, and provided no violence or threat of violence is used, by the disobedient person and he is willing to accept the penalty imposed for such violation. It is not the intent of the above provisions to condone lawlessness, but merely to say, in a way that can be understood by all,—that it is not considered by this church to be unchristian for any individual to test a law by the above means, or to disobey a law that is a man-made mandate in direct conflict with the teachings of Jesus Christ; in fact, it is the duty of all Christians in a democracy to make sure that all laws of the democracy are just and constitutional; for, unless they are just for all, they shall not be of God, and if they are not constitutional, they will erode that democracy.

We, as Christians, should uphold our duly elected heads of State with our prayers and encouragement, trusting they will courageously defend the inalienable rights and viable opinions of every son and daughter of our great Republic."

Based upon the findings and the content of the above quoted motion, we believe a statement should be promulgated which clearly and correctly states ones relationship to God and country, and we submit the following as an acceptable statement.

We affirm the fundamental freedom of every person, and the inalienable right of life, liberty, pursuit of happiness and equality for all; the right of freedom of speech, and of the press; the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances. In a democracy no one has a legal right to disobey the civil law, for all laws are presumed valid until declared invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, but, a viable option does exist for a person to disobey a law, if that is the only effective way, to test the constitutionality of the specific law involved, provided, the violation of that law does not directly injure the person or property of another, and no violence, or threat of violence, is used. It is not considered lawlessness or unchristian for an individual to test a law by the correct procedure afforded under the constitution and

laws, or disobey a civil law, which is in conflict with the teachings of Jesus Christ. It is the duty of all Christians to make sure that all laws are just and constitutional; for unless laws are just and equal for all, they shall not be of God. We, as Christians, should courageously and vigorously protect and defend the inalienable rights and options of all people.

The Board recommends that the 1969 Florida Annual Conference petition the 1970 Special Session of the General Conference of the United Methodist Church to reconsider, re-phrase, or amend said Section 3, by striking the existing language and adding the above statement in lieu thereof, or, in the alternative, to sponsor a new resolution embracing the foregoing phraseology or language, which embodies the exact principals enunciated therein. It is further recommended that the members of the Florida Annual Conference delegation to the 1970 Special Session of the General Conference be urged to promote and support this recommendation with all laudable means.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

It is appropriate, as we are gathered at this historic merging conference, to celebrate the 125 years that God has given us since the first meeting of the Florida Annual Conference at Tallahassee Feb. 6, 1845. Also this year we observe the 75th anniversary of the E.U.B. work in Florida, since in 1895 the Shilo United Brethren Church which became Lake Magdalene was established in Tampa.

Churches which have observed significant anniversaries during the year are: First, Key West, 125 years; Fleming Street, Key West, 100 years; Ft. Meade, 100 years; Salem, Havana, 100 years; Venice-Nokomis, 100 years; First, Bradenton, 75 years; and Lake Magdalene (former E.U.B.), 75 years. The standing requirement for recognition of a church is "The Church shall have observed a significant anniversary during the year, and shall have submitted to the Curator of the Conference Archives a current history of the church." A significant anniversary marks a multiple of 25 years, and the history must be submitted before April 1st. Other churches which submitted historical data include: Anona—Largo; Centenary—Quincy; Fells-mere; Green Cove Springs; Lake Jackson; Liberty Circuit; Monticello; Pasadena—St. Petersburg; Reeves Memorial—Orlando; Seminole St. Petersburg, Southside—Tallahassee; Wakulla and St. Marks, and Zion Hill (Pisgah). *From Saddlebags to Satellites* has been published by Parthenon Press. Copies can be obtained through the President, Secretary or Curator.

We continue to be grateful to Dr. Thrift and to Florida Southern College for space for the Conference Archives in the Library and to Mrs. Otye Bly for her unique services in the Archives.

We recommend:

1. That each local church celebrate Florida Methodist Heritage Sunday in Feb. 1970 to commemorate the 125 years since the first session of the Florida Annual Conference met Feb. 6, 1845 in Tallahassee.
2. That the pastors continue to encourage Committee on Records and History to prepare histories for the local church and to observe the significant anniversaries, particularly those marking 25 year intervals.
3. That courses on Methodist History be included in Christian Workers Schools with special emphasis on EUB and Central Jurisdiction History.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Unity of spirit and of purpose has been our goal during the activity of this year of uniting former conference societies. In October the members of all three Executive committees in the Florida area met together for a three day

planning session. Out of this meeting came the decision to hold a joint meeting of the two remaining conferences (SEJ & former CJ). This was the first Annual Meeting of the Women's Society and was held in First Church St. Petersburg, April 15-17. A joint committee comprised of members of both Conferences planned and prepared for this meeting which proved to be a time of great rejoicing for all attending. We will continue to work jointly until we become one structurally at the end of this calendar year.

The 12 district meetings were well attended and those present rejoiced as we heard the thrilling story of the work of Alfa Lit as brought to us by Miss Eulalia Cook. This is a continuation of the literacy program begun with a memorial gift given by our women in memory of Bishop Branscomb.

Although we do not have a person specifically responsible for work with youth any more we continue to have a vital interest in the youth. Through money directed to the Conference program we have provided scholarship for 14 young people in the summer worker program. We continue our scholarship program for negro young women who attend colleges related to the Board of Missions. A new scholarship this year has been given to Boylan Haven Mather Academy in honor of Mrs. H. V. Weems.

As a result of our study in new forms of mission we continue to search for and to become involved in projects and programs which help to meet the needs in our local situations. This also gives witness to our Coming to Life as presented in the study of the gospel of John.

As the result of our four years' experience in conducting inter conference schools of Christian Mission we were asked by the Conference to give leadership in planning and preparing for our first cooperative school of Christian Mission. We look forward to this new venture for our Conference.

COMMITTEE ON THE LAY WORKER

The members of the Committee on Lay Workers of the Annual Conference who were able to be present at Youth Camp on May 1, met informally to discuss plans of organization and procedure.

We rejoice in the fact that the General Conference of The United Methodist Church has made provision for the organizing of lay workers of the local churches at an Annual Conference level. We look forward to the development of several plans beneficial to these loyal servants of our Lord and His church.

It was agreed that the organization meeting of the Conference Committee be called for Tuesday noon, June 3, at the College Dining Hall, Florida Southern College, Lakeland.

We recommend that those interested in forming a Conference organization for church secretaries meet at Florida Southern College at such a time as the Conference calendar permits.

Addendum, Report of Committee on the Lay Worker

The committee met in Lakeland on June 3 and completed its organization.

We call the attention of the Conference and of the several local churches to paragraph 507, section I, of the 1968 Book of Discipline which reads, "The employing agency shall include the lay worker in the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund or other appropriate plan as provided by the Board of Pensions or other boards or agencies of The United Methodist Church." In the light of this paragraph, we recommend that multiple staff churches study the suggested plan for their employees.

We request the Insurance Committee of the Board of Pensions to give guidance and suggestion in the matter of a group health insurance program for the lay workers of the churches, agencies, and institutions of the Conference.

We call attention to the fact that the local church Committee on Pastor Parish Relations is related to all employees of the church and urge them to consider conditions and benefits including morale factors in regard to the lay workers of our churches.

We note that the Discipline now provides that the lay worker, when properly certified and consecrated, shall be seated in the sessions of the Annual Conference and be given privileges of the floor without vote. We further note that the educational, music, and business administrative workers have organizations, standards, and procedures for certification in their respective fields of service. We believe clerical employees are moving rapidly in this direction. Our committee stands ready to render any service we can to all of these groups and other similar groups in behalf of the Annual Conference.

REPORT NO. 2

1. Referring to Paragraph 924 in the 1968 Discipline, governing minimum salaries, we recommend the following: Single Lay Pastor \$4,300.00; Married Lay Pastor \$4,600.00; Single Associate Member \$4,500.00; Married Associate Member \$4,800.00; Single Conference Member without Seminary Degree \$4,800.00; Married Conference Member without Seminary Degree \$5,200.00; Single Conference Member with Seminary Degree \$5,100.00; Married Conference Member, with Seminary Degree \$5,600.00.

Effective January 1, 1970, all the above categories of minimum salary are increased \$400.00.

A. Minimum salary funds shall be administered by a Commission on Minimum Salaries.

B. The Commission on Minimum Salaries shall see that the amounts of minimum salaries are collected and disbursed as directed by the Cabinet.

C. Payments shall be made quarterly, providing funds are available.

2. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be \$12,000.00 per year; his expense account be \$2,000.00, plus expenses for pre-conference cabinet meetings.

3. We recommend that Conference ministerial support items, excluding Episcopal Fund, be budgeted by each responsible Board, to meet the needs of the particular ministerial support item.

4. In compliance with Paragraph 885 and approval of the General Conference, the Episcopal Fund shall be 2% of the ministers salaries.

5. We further recommend that the amounts of Ministerial Support be remitted by the treasurer of the local church to the Conference Treasurer as a part of the Fair Share Apportionment to that church. The Conference Treasurer shall distribute to each item of Ministerial Support its pro rata share based on budgeted amounts. We further recommend that these "Ministerial Support" items shall have prior claim on all funds sent to the Conference Treasurer under the Fair Share Apportionment Plan.

REPORT NO. 3

Contingency Fund

We recommend setting up the following Contingency fund from the Conference Reserve Fund:

1. Conference contingency fund of \$5,000.00 to be used by the Commission on World Service and Finance for emergency needs of the Conference Boards and Agencies.

REPORT NO. 4

Travel Allowance

We recommend that the car travel allowance for members of Boards, Commissions, and Committees where allowed, be set at five cents per mile for each member, an additional three cents for one passenger and an additional two cents for two passengers or more, with top mileage of ten cents per car, plus tolls for roads and bridges. Members who choose to travel to Conference meetings by other than automobile will be reimbursed at the above highway mileage rate. In addition, meals and lodging for board members shall be paid at the rate of \$6.40 per diem. We further recommend that the Conference facilities at Lakeland and Leesburg be used for the Boards and Agencies.

REPORT NO. 5

Concerning Conference Boards

1. We appreciate the use of the Conference Treasurer's office by all Conference Boards and Agencies and urge them to make full use of this office for both the collection and disbursement of their funds.

2. We call attention to Paragraph 2 of Standing Rule III which requires all agencies receiving funds through the Commission on World Service and Finance to give an annual report or audit on all monies received and disbursed; and urge more faithful compliance with this rule. We suggest that the reports in question be in the hands of the Commission's Chairman within 60 days after the session of the Annual Conference, or at the end of the fiscal year. Each Board and Agency, not handling funds through the Conference Treasurer, will requisition funds only as needed.

REPORT NO. 6

Ministerial Education Fund

Following the action of the General Conference, we recommend that the Ministerial Education Fund be apportioned to each local church, payment to the Fund to begin with the 1970 fiscal year. The apportionment to each church shall be made by the District Superintendent, over and above SFA. We also recommend the continuation of the one percent plan during the remainder of 1969.

REPORT NO. 7

Christian Education Sunday Offering

We recommend that the Conference Council be authorized to use the Christian Education Sunday Offering for the work of the twelve district councils and that the District Superintendents administer the Funds received from this offering within their districts.

REPORT NO. 8

We commend the Florida Methodist Foundation for its outstanding work. We encourage and urge all agencies of the Conference to make full use of its advantages and help the Foundation attain its maximum potential for the Conference.

REPORT NO. 9

We recommend, with the concurrence of the Cabinet, that one-half the surplus earnings, current and future of the Florida Methodist Foundation be retained as a Conference Reserve Fund, up to and including the amount of \$100,000. The Conference Reserve Fund shall be used to meet Conference emergencies including any emergency of the Florida Methodist Foundation, at the discretion of the World Service and Finance Commission. As the Conference Reserve Fund is less than \$100,000, earnings shall be further retained to bring it up to that amount. At any time the Conference Reserve Fund exceeds \$100,000, the excess shall be available to the Conference.

REPORT NO. 11

The recommendations of the committee were accepted by the committee on Standing Rules and adopted by the Conference.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Years ago our Lord gave us a strong criteria for our discipleship. "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." (John 13:35) An outward expression of our love and concern is our sharing in the realm of missions.

This is a day in which the church has come under the scrutiny of many who believe the church has become self-centered and far more interested in its survival than its serving. It may well be that one of the finest tests of the church's concern is in what it does for "others." It is not unusual to find that local churches are spending three times more for local needs than in benevolences. The days ahead will show whether such churches can long endure.

The Board of Missions of the Florida Conference still believes that Florida Methodism has the capacity to love and share. We have been a pace setter in the past. It was one of the first Conferences to share with all the Lanes of the Advance. It was one of the first Conferences to have the entire Conference take care of all its World Service askings. Our Conference has always been at or near the top in all major thrusts of United Methodism's benevolent program. We are still motivated by the spirit of Christ and we will continue to seek new ways of sharing that love.

The Board of Missions has many diverse facets for which it has responsibilities ranging from Church Extension to Spanish Ministry. More attention is being given our cities. Florida's cities seem to have come to greatness almost overnight. We are facing for the first time problems encountered by northern and western cities many years ago. We believe the cities of our state can become the cities of our God. Never have we been more challenged than at this point.

Since new cities do spring up without much warning, we are also aware of our need in Church Extension. There can be little letup here. The church must go where the people are. This is becoming more and more expensive due to rising costs of property and inflation; however the cost of leaving people without a church is far more expensive.

The Board suffered a great loss in the passing of Dr. Clare Cotton. He not only performed his tasks well as related to the Board of Missions, he also brought to the Board a verve, commitment and humor that will continue to serve us for years to come. We are less with his going but more for his having been with us.

Dr. Henry W. Blackburn has again picked up the reigns of service for the Board of Missions and has continued to give it his magnificent leadership, all the while serving many other needs of our Conference. We do not take-for-granted such dedication and we would express our heartfelt appreciation to him.

We of the Board of Missions believe it is time for us to be careful in our research and imaginative in our creativity as related to missions. Motivated by the love of God and our love for our fellow man we therefore recommend the following:

1. It is recommended that each local church have a goal for gifts to missions. A minimum goal for giving to others should be no less than 25% of the church's budget.
2. Seeing the continued need for the Florida Methodist Spanish Ministry, it is recommended that a goal of \$35,000 be raised at District Conference offerings. We are grateful for the support that the local Spanish churches are giving their ministry, and we are happy to see that each year they are underwriting more and more of the cost of this ministry.
3. The Board of Missions Executive Committee recommends the following

minimum salary schedule as worked out by the Minimum Salary Committee and presented to the World Service Commission:

Single Lay Pastor	\$4,300
Married Lay Pastor	4,600
Single Associate Member	4,500
Married Associate Member	4,800
Single Conference Member, without B.D.	4,800
Married Conference Member, without B.D.	5,200

4. We are asking that Church Builders' Clubs be formed (and where they are now organized, be revitalized), as a means of keeping Church Extension alive.

5. It is recommended that the strengthening and enlarging of the Executive Committee, or Directorate, of the District Board of Church Extension be done. This may be accomplished by adding men and women of dedication and influence who will personally solicit substantial gifts and bequests from Methodists of means. Property that could be bought just a few years ago for \$15,000 or \$20,000 now costs as much as \$40,000 or \$50,000. This consummates a great drain on Conference finances, and it is hoped that much of these resources will be found in the districts where it is needed.

6. It is recommended that salary increase subsidies for capable pastors in critical urban church situations, and new church projects where experience and ability are needed, be declared a Conference Advance Mission Special. The Cabinet will determine the eligibility of men in such special cases.

7. We recommend that \$5,000 of surplus money from the Mission Appropriation Fund be set aside to supplement adequately the salaries of capable men in critical urban church situations. This recommendation also includes subsidization of salary increases from time to time. The determination of eligibility for such subsidies will be made by the Cabinet.

8. We recommend that continued emphasis be given to the program of the Urban Work Committee with the following special projects implemented:

a. At least one Inner-City consultation, preferably held in Jacksonville on February 11-13, 1970.

b. The formation of a "task force" made up of five people of experience and training to move across our Conference and give leadership in Inner-City Consultations, and to conduct "Moral Meetings" with pastors and laymen in "crisis" situations.

c. Annual recognition of an Inner-City Church-of-the-Year from each District, and also of significant Inner-City programs in each District. Recommendations being made by the District Superintendent and District Directors of Urban Work.

d. That some time be given the Urban Work Committee on the 1970 Annual Conference Program to help accentuate the Urban crisis and Urban Ministry in Florida.

e. Annual Dinner for Inner-City pastors and laymen at Annual Conference.

f. It is requested that a Conference Staff person be assigned to give leadership and significant blocks of time to the Urban crisis in Florida Methodism.

9. We are asking that there be some re-paving of the Four Lanes of the Advance. A renewed emphasis needs to be given to World Missions. (Please consult your Advance Brochure for Advance projects).

10. It is urged that Advance Missions Special Gifts be given through the regular channels.

11. It is recommended that a Committee be formed which will create a program of Missionary Education throughout the Conference. Membership of this committee need not be confined to the membership of the Board of Missions.

12. It is recommended that closer contact be maintained with Florida missionaries overseas, particularly lay missionaries.

13. It is requested that a District Missionary Workshop be held in each

District for the purpose of informing, training and motivating pastors, members of the Work Area on Missions, and laymen of local churches.

14. The Board recommends and is open to suggestions for something to be done to personalize or in some way "humanize" the Single Figure Apportionment.

15. The Board of Missions wishes to confirm its involvement in the Annual School of Christian Mission and to emphasize the fact that it is for men, women and youth.

16. The Board is asking that local church leaders in the field of missions, be urged to attend the School of Missions of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference at Lake Junaluska, July 21 through 25, 1969.

17. It is recommended that adequate interpretation of COSMOS (Congress of Structure of Methodism Overseas) be presented to Florida Methodism through the following:

- a. The Annual Christian School of Mission
- b. The Pastors' School

c. A specially organized coaching conference with representatives from each District, in the early fall of 1969. The Board of Missions and the Women's Society of Christian Service will be co-sponsors of this program of interpretation.

18. As an expression of our desire to be good stewards of the church's material possessions and of our concern for the unity of the body of Christ it is recommended that a committee be formed to explore the possibility of sharing church facilities with other denominations whenever possible.

QUADRENNIAL EMPHASIS COMMITTEE

The General Conference of the new United Methodist Church adopted the theme "A New Church For A New World," with emphasis upon "The Church and the Word," "The Church and the Work," and "The Church and the World." In an effort for this new church to take full advantage of opportunities to witness and to serve, and to meet the compelling need for reconciliation between all segments of our people, at home and abroad, a quadrennial emphasis was adopted, calling for (1) a church-wide study of the Sermon on the Mount, (2) the establishment of the Fund for Reconciliation, and (3) a challenge to United Methodist young adults in the program of Methodist Volunteer Service.

The Florida Conference Quadrennial Emphasis Committee was organized in late summer with broad representation from across the Conference. Lengthy discussions were held regarding implementation of the program and areas of urgent need. "Brain storming" was used extensively to encourage committee members to use vision and imagination as to what God could do with a church engaged in "the ministry of reconciliation."

District committees were formed in early fall and met in area meetings in St. Petersburg, Jacksonville, Tallahassee, Orlando, and West Palm Beach to hear reports from "the grass root level" as related to needs and suggestions for program.

The Fund for Reconciliation minimum goal for the quadrennium of \$20,000,000 is to be divided with one-half remaining in the respective annual conference and one-half to be sent to the general treasurer of the Fund, to be used in projects of reconciliation and administered by the Council of Bishops. The Florida Conference Committee determined its share of the \$20,000,000 to be \$533,000.

Reports from the area meetings were heard and each proposal and request was given careful consideration. The major areas of need that would help meet human needs and thus involve the church in the ministry of reconciliation that were selected were:

1. A Pilot Tutorial Training Center
2. A Scholarship Program
3. Day Care Center Projects

4. A Pilot Urban Training Center
5. A Pilot Rural Ministry Project
6. Pilot Inter-Racial Churches
7. Ten percent of Conference Share of the Fund to be divided among respective districts for local projects of reconciliation.

The study of the Sermon on the Mount was held in most Conference churches from January to Easter. The statement of the General Conference was sufficient reason alone for the study when it said "We recommend the Sermon on the Mount as the specific area of study with the hope that this would only be a prelude to a fresh study of all the teachings of Jesus as well as the complete Gospel record. . . . Jesus' words confront us with the irresistible demands of social justice rooted as they are in his intuitive awareness that God's love is all-inclusive. His message, when taken seriously, will lead us to attempt to correct the long-standing attitudes which have brought about the present crises in the nation and around the world. . . ."

Florida United Methodists have taken seriously the study of the Sermon. Reports of new programs of involvement and expressions of concern have been received from across the Conference.

On February 23, and in some churches a date more convenient due to local conditions, the United Methodists of Florida responded to the opportunity to establish the Fund for Reconciliation, and as of May 21 have pledged \$400,000, with \$96,022.15 having been remitted to the Conference treasurer. The attitude of the minister and/or people concerning reconciliation has largely spelled success or failure of this program, as the case may be.

The United Methodist Volunteer Service is one whereby primarily young adults, ages 18-30, volunteer their services for a period of time in special ministries of reconciliation. It is "more a concept of volunteer service which honors local decisions, local judgment, local creativity, innovations, initiative, competency." The Conference Quadrennial Emphasis Committee has launched this program, with cooperation from existing agencies, such as the Conference Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations, and the Regional Committee of the Board of the Ministry. Task forces have also been formed to interpret the program to interested churches, individuals, and organizations.

At its May meeting the Committee allocated the following funds to respective programs:

1. District Fund	\$ 4,800
2. Methodist Volunteer Service	14,000
3. Jacksonville Urban Center Pilot Project	15,000
4. Tampa Tutorial Pilot Project	8,000
5. Gainesville District Rural Ministries	3,600
6. Day Care Seminars	1,000
7. Contingency	2,000

It is understood that funds for these projects will be determined according to income and are subject to reevaluation by the Committee at any time.

Every Florida United Methodist should take heart in knowing that out of the fifty per cent of funds, to be expended by the Council of Bishops, a minimum of \$2,000,000 is to be used for rehabilitation and reconstruction of Vietnam, following cessation of hostilities; and that a minimum of \$1,500,000 will be used to fund the national program of Methodist Volunteer Service. It is anticipated that some of the national funds will be returned for use in the Florida Conference for projects too large in scope for adequate conference financing.

Your Conference Committee regrets that with so many urgent needs and developing possibilities and opportunities that the funds are so limited. With increased support we will be able to consider more of the suggested projects.

Recommendations

1. That the first Sunday in Lent 1970 and each year of the quadrennium be "Fund for Reconciliation Sunday," and that those making pledges to the Fund be asked, if possible, to pay their pledges for the year by this Sunday.

2. That on the Fund for Reconciliation Sunday the local church program include the opportunity for additional pledges to be made by those who so desire.

3. That local churches give other emphasis as deemed wise for the particular church that would present and keep this ministry of reconciliation a matter of concern for all Florida Methodists.

FLORIDA SOUTHERN COLLEGE

The College opened its academic year on Sunday, September 8, 1968, with a worship service in the Branscomb Memorial Auditorium at which Bishop James W. Henley was the preacher. The year was concluded on Monday, May 5, 1969, with the Commencement Service at which the Honorable Robert C. Byrd, U. S. Senator, West Virginia, was the speaker. Chaplain Tom J. Price, Jr., had been the speaker the day before at the Baccalaureate Service.

The College opened with 1,405 full-time students and 290 part-time students (the figures a year ago were 1,434 and 214). A total of 329 students were graduated during the year, 37 on August 2, 1968, and 292 on May 5, 1969. The figures a year ago were 46 and 251.

Dr. Richard W. Pearce has been elected Vice-President of Florida Southern College. Dr. Pearce assumed his responsibilities on August 1, 1968. In addition to the responsibilities he originally assumed, he has also given direction to the Office of the Dean of Academic Affairs since January 1, 1969. This was made necessary because Dean Nelson M. Hoffman, Jr., left to assume responsibilities at West Virginia Wesleyan College.

Under Dr. Pearce's guidance, the College is undertaking to make substantial revisions in its curriculum. The new curricula offerings will be effective for the academic year 1970-71.

Registration for 1969-70. A total of 913 currently enrolled students have pre-registered for 1969-70 (969 last year). As of May 1, 1969, 677 new students have been accepted and 500 have indicated their intention to enroll (last year, 619 were accepted and 424 expected to enroll).

Educational Specials. Educational Specials continue to enable the College to hold some of its outstanding faculty members. The amount received on Educational Specials through April 1, 1969 was \$224,337.95. This represented a substantial increase over the same date last year.

Continuing Needs. The Conference adopted a report of the Board of Education (see 1965 JOURNAL, Page 151) recommending \$500,000 as the amount to be apportioned for current operations by 1967-1968. It was anticipated that at least this amount would be continued in the years following. The Commission on World Service recommended that only \$485,000 be apportioned for 1968-1969. The Board of Trustees has requested that the amount for 1969-70 be set at \$500,000.

Florida Southern College cannot exist without the financial support of the Conference. Spiraling costs make the task of operating the College more difficult each day. The Conference must soon give consideration to increasing substantially its total contribution. Indeed, it will have to increase the amount because of the increased need. We have never reached our per capita goal in giving for higher education.

A few of the sharp increases in costs for the next academic year are:

The College has had in 1968-69 a student financial aid budget of \$553,000. Of this, \$387,787 is financed by the regular budget. As need grows for student financial aid, outside sources are in some instances diminishing. For the next academic year we requested an additional \$20,000 from the National Defense Educational Loan Fund. Instead of securing the requested increase, the amount we had received this year was reduced by \$20,000, thereby leaving us \$40,000 below our need.

We have been unable to increase faculty salaries for 1969-70 comparable to the increase in the cost of living. We have had to make some faculty salaries for next year conditioned upon the College attaining a certain minimum enrollment.

The tentative budget for 1969-70, after every possible economy has been effected, is still out of balance by \$108,592. This is the situation even after an increase of \$250 in student fees. We are continually embarrassed by what we feel to be high student fees, but these charges are still substantially lower than other private colleges of Florida. This tight budget situation prevents the College from developing many programs needed to meet the challenges of contemporary society.

Growth and Expansion. The College has continuing capital needs; therefore, the Board of Trustees has requested that the Conference keep for this purpose \$100,000 annually for the next ten years in the Growth and Expansion budget. The Trustees feel that with this amount from the Conference for capital purposes, they can succeed in raising additional funds to meet the expansion of facilities needed during the coming decade.

The Roux Library was opened in March, 1968. The item included in Growth and Expansion for this purpose produced only \$117,200 during the first two years. If the same annual amount is realized this year, the total will still be only \$177,000. When the originally anticipated amounts were not immediately forthcoming, the Trustees made arrangements to borrow the difference through short term loans.

The Board of Trustees requests that the appropriation for Capital Funds from Growth and Expansion be continued and that the amount for 1970 be set at \$100,000 if possible, but certainly no less than \$70,000, and for seven-twelfths of this amount for the remainder of 1969.

Ludd M. Spivey Fine Arts Center. The Board of Trustees has authorized the construction of the Ludd M. Spivey Fine Arts Center. Construction was started in December, 1968 and completion is scheduled for the spring of 1970.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Committee on General Church School Work

REPORT NO. 1

The Committee on General Church School Work believes that the most important problem confronting the Board of Education and the Florida Annual Conference is the declining attendance at both Sunday worship services and Sunday Schools. Here are some facts.

For the past five years, beginning in 1963-64, Sunday School attendance in the Florida Conference has been declining at an accelerating rate.

The 1968 District Conference reports of the 12 districts in December indicate that at the half-year mark the decline was 6.6% as compared with a 3.6% decline a year earlier.

Sunday School attendance in the Florida Conference reached a peak of 92,136 in 1963 and by 1968 had declined to 80,374, a decrease of 12.7%. A new system of record keeping goes into effect this year which may show an increase but will not afford a true comparison with past years.

On the national level the General Board of Education reports a steady decline in church school enrollment since 1960 and a corresponding decline in the circulation of church school publications.

The Sunday School decline is not peculiar to Methodists. At the end of 1968 the Southern Baptist Convention reported a drop of 33,690 in Sunday School enrollment, the fourth consecutive annual decrease after 22 consecutive years of increase. Vacation Bible School enrollment also fell and the number of such schools in the Southern Baptist Convention declined.

When the Sunday School decline first began in the Florida Conference it was not connected in many minds with a general decline in church attendance because church attendance records were not being kept. However, the available evidence today indicates that the Sunday School decline has gone along with a decline in church attendance. The Florida Conference

Journal shows a decline in church attendance in 1967 and 1968. An increase was reported in 1966, but since the churches started keeping records only one year earlier, this figure may reflect faulty record keeping or simply estimates, rather than a real increase.

The Gallup polls report that church attendance over the country as a whole reached a peak in 1958 (49%) and has been declining ever since. The decline reached 45% in 1967 and by 1968 was down to 42%.

With these facts in mind, and believing that it is supremely urgent that the church should be in mission, faithfully fulfilling its ministry, the Committee on General Church School Work recommends that the Board of Education designate declining church and Sunday school attendance as the single most important problem before us and that the Annual Conference lift up this matter as its most urgent concern. We have consulted Bishop Henley and Dr. John Rooks and they concur in this recommendation. We have also conferred with the Board of Evangelism, thinking that this matter might be made a joint concern of the two Boards.

Specifically, we recommend that the Annual Conference authorize the Program Council to conduct a fact finding survey during 1969-70 with the aim of defining the problem and on the basis of its findings to begin in 1970-71 a conference wide effort to attempt to reverse this trend.

We recommend further that the Program Council be given authority and funds to secure professional assistance in conducting the survey. Such professional assistance might be secured from such sources as Dr. Earl Brewer of Emory, the National Division of the Board of Missions, and the General Board of Education. Or it might be preferred that a commercial firm be engaged.

We call attention to the important study published by the Virginia Conference in 1968, noting, however, that important questions were not dealt with in this study, such as the correlation between declining Sunday School attendance and declining church attendance and the question whether the decline indicates fewer people or less frequent attendance by the same or a larger number.

We suggest the following four questions as samples of the type of inquiries such a survey might direct to the Methodist people of Florida.

- (1) What effect, if any, do our curriculum materials have on attendance and enrollment?
- (2) What effect, if any, does the national image of the United Methodist Church (membership in the National Council, General Conference pronouncements, General Board activities, etc.) have on local attendance?
- (3) Does the lure of leisure time activity affect adversely church and Sunday school attendance?
- (4) What changes, if any, have occurred in the religious convictions of the Methodist people in recent years which affect their attendance at church and Sunday school?

If the Annual Conference should approve this report in principle, we would assume that the procedure would be to turn it over to the Program Council for implementation, and that the Annual Conference would launch an all out effort to gain a better understanding of what ails Christ's church and to reverse the alarming decline that has begun.

The Committee on General Church School Work, believing that Christian Education demands far more knowledge of the Bible than most of our members possess, and noting that in most churches the pastor is the best qualified Bible teacher, recommends that a Pastor's Bible class be established in every United Methodist Church.

"The committee recommends continued support of Christian Education Sunday which this year is designated as September 28, 1969. We urge each local church to observe this day or one nearest to it. We also urge in this observance that not only should a special offering be taken and sent to the Conference Treasurer, as offering for Christian Education Sunday, but also that an appropriate program be held which will be an inspiration and help to our people."

The Adult Work Committee

During this year we have focused on analysis and development in leadership of existing program. We feel this has given us an excellent view of needs. This should aid in effective long-range planning.

1968-1969 Program:

June—Adult Laboratory Seminar

Thirteen persons participated in laboratory. Five completed Seminar requirements and became certified laboratory instructors.

August—Eighty persons attended a Church Music Workshop in Lakeland. Included in this number were Ministers of Music, Choir Directors, and Organists.

Conducted a comprehensive survey of curriculum now being used in adult church school groups. Extensive computer analysis has made this study very valuable. Among the findings was the following breakdown.

Classes using "Foundation Studies"	35%
Classes using "International Lessons"	49%
Classes using other materials	16%

February—Post high school consultation at Camp Florida—27 participants.

April—Senior Adult Workshop

Theme: "Christian Living in a Space Age." The 104 persons in attendance felt the program was very meaningful and will lead to constructive change in the local church. This group has given \$800.00 for hymnals in the Leesburg camp chapel to date.

Recommendations

1. August 30-September 1, 1969—Post High School "Weekend for Singles" (ages 18-30) Methodist Youth Camp, Leesburg. Tuition \$14.00.
2. October 28-29—Senior Adult Conference Planning Meeting, Camp Florida. Expense \$250.00.
3. April 27-30—Senior Adult Conference, Leesburg. Tuition \$15.00.

LONG-RANGE—June 1970 Bible Conference.

This will be conducted in two sections. "Bible Lecture" and "Creative Use of the Bible with Adults." Registrants will be required to take both. We recommend that each district have an adult laboratory at least once in every three years.

Conference for Young Married Couples, Camp Florida, 1970 Labor Day Weekend.

Youth Ministry

I. Leadership Development

- A. Laboratory Enterprises to develop leaders in use of systematic study materials (Sunday School study)
 1. The first Conference wide labs were held June 22-27, 1968, Lakeland with 41 youth teachers attending three sections.
 2. At least seven other youth labs for leaders held in local churches and districts of conference during year.
- B. Informal Group Training (Informal Group is one of the basic settings for Senior Highs)
 1. Three conference teams (from Tampa, Miami and Lakeland) trained in Nashville September 24-October 1, 1968.
 2. Conference wide Informal Group training for 120 senior highs and adult leaders at Leesburg, November 1-3, 1968.
 3. Six district and local church Informal Group trainings during year.
- C. Coaching Seminars to train selected leaders for "The Role of Sex in Christian Living."
 1. 31 adults trained January 10-12, 1969, to be leaders for the sex morals weekends with youth at Leesburg.

2. 15 adults trained May 16, 17, 1969, to be leaders for local church schools involving both youth and their parents in the course, "The Role of Sex in Christian Living."

II. Introduction of New Youth Curriculum

- A. District teams trained May 28, 1968 in Lakeland for every district in conference to give basic introduction and orientation of new materials to local churches in their districts.
- B. District teams offered during summer of 1968 sub-district and local church orientation sessions on new materials.
- C. Almost every Christian Service School held in conference offered the course "Using Resources in Youth Ministry," using selected leadership from 41 teachers certified in Coaching Conference on New Youth Ministry Courses, held December 1967.
- D. New Youth Curriculum was also used in the Summer Camping program.

III. Conference Wide Youth Activities

- A. 10 weeks of Christian Adventure Camps and Youth Assemblies in summer of 1968 involved 2,542 youth. Program deans used with great success in recruiting and providing adequate resources for the 122 adults who gave leadership by teaching, preaching, and counseling during the program. In addition, five weeks of small group (rustic camping) involved 40 youth and their adult leaders.
- B. Church Music Workshop for Youth, held July 8-13, 1968 on campus of Florida Southern College involved 97 senior high youth plus their adult leadership.
- C. UN-Washington Seminar on "Peace and World Order," February 1-8, 1969, involved 36 juniors and seniors in high school plus five adult leaders in an in-depth exposure to world and national issues and how the church is attempting to meet the need.
- D. Two Sex Morals Weekends—one for junior highs and one for middle highs—which involved 521 youth and their adult leaders at Leesburg. The purpose was to explore "The Role of Sex in Christian Living."
- E. UCYM Weekend for senior highs under the sponsorship of the Florida Council of Churches with program on "The Role of Sex in Christian Living," under the direction of Florida Conference United Methodist Church's Director of Youth Ministry. It involved 319 youth and adults with 150 being United Methodist.
- F. Bishop's Convocation for Youth, March 8, 1969, on Campus of Florida Southern College, involved over 1700 senior high youth and adult counselors under the theme "Florida United Methodist Youth in Action."
- G. We recommend the promotion of Summer Service Opportunities for Youth and Young Adults to coordinate opportunities which are offered in various areas of conference work. It should be noted that scholarships are provided for such persons with funds provided by various boards, agencies and the Fund for Reconciliation.
- H. It is our recommendation also that provisions be made by the Conference Director of Youth Ministries to meet with the District Directors of Youth Work for training purposes sometime during the conference year.
- I. It is the recommendation of the Youth Committee that a conference committee of three adults be selected by the Director of Youth Ministries to set standards and review qualifications of persons desiring to lead courses of study in the local church in the role of sex and Christian Living.

Children's Work

During the past year 1968-69 the following programs related to children have been implemented:

1. June 23-28 a conference wide laboratory school was held in Lakeland for the purpose of training local church and district leaders.

2. During June and July one hundred and forty (the capacity registration) rising seventh graders from approximately 80 local churches and 32 adults participated in seven weeks of rustic camping. Those who have participated in the program believe that its greatest value is in small group Christian living.

3. In the spring the Bishop's Convocation for church membership classes was well attended. This program was initiated by the Board of Evangelism in consultation with the coordinator of children's ministries. Evaluations indicate that this was a worthwhile venture for the 85 churches that participated.

4. Vacation Church School and Day Camp training have been provided by district and conference leaders upon request from the local church.

5. Special emphasis has been given to training leaders in churches of small membership. An observation laboratory class was held in the Tallahassee District with six churches participating. The children were from kindergarten through sixth grade in one class.

6. Training for church-related weekday kindergarten leaders was done on an interdenominational basis as was a study on Christian Education in Florida during the next decade.

7. A study of day camp as it relates to social concerns of children was done on a regional interagency and interdenominational basis. Emphasis has been put on cooperation with other agencies in providing services for persons of special need.

The Camp Advisory Committee

Leesburg Camp

The greatest need at Leesburg Camp is a Sewerage disposal plant. The County Sanitation Officer now insists that no further development in the way of new buildings can be added at Leesburg until this plant is in operation. Further developments that are impeded are:

1. Family camping needs wash room facilities.
2. Lodge type facilities on the new property.
3. A cottage for handicapped youngsters for which Campers have raised \$12,000.

A further fact that focuses attention on the need is that the WSCS held their last meeting at the Baptist Camp because wash room facilities were available for each cabin. The Leesburg Camp should provide these facilities.

The budget for the next several years should include these items in order that future development can be made. It is hoped, therefore, that Sewerage disposal will be built this year, costing about \$100,000. The payments would begin in 1970 with annual payments for five years thereafter. The needed facilities could then be added in a long range program to make Leesburg as great a camp in facilities as it is in program and inspiration.

The Kitchen is to be updated with stainless steel tables and working facilities this coming year. This is to satisfy a requirement of the County Health Department.

The main lodge, the caretakers home, the infirmary, and the guest cottages were painted this year. To continue the maintenance work there is in the budget for the new year a provision for two (2) additional workers.

We are glad to point out that we had 200 more campers throughout the summer program over last year.

The swimming pool, which cost \$45,000 has an unpaid balance of \$19,000. The dock is in need of repairs which should be done this coming year as a safety measure.

Camp Florida

We have the former E.U.B. camp—Camp Florida—located near Brandon. About the time we merged with the E.U.B. Church they closed negotiations for adding 7 acres making a total of 17 acres. A new roof was put on the dining hall and a canteen has been built. \$2,500 was donated by the Brandon Methodist Church.

May 1st a new superintendent moved into the house located on the new property.

The wiring at the camp has been added to periodically. Jim Yost, Chairman of that Camp Advisory Committee is reworking the electrical service as a donation to the camp.

This camp is in great demand. It is located in the Tampa Bay area and serves a large population.

There is need of painting. The beds need to have new springs and new mattresses.

LaBelle Camp

A house has been built on the property. The \$10,000 for this home was partially donated by the men of Belle Glade Men's Brotherhood. The water supply has been partially solved. Leveling and ditching has been done. A new road has been built that will be passable in all weather. It is now available for Rustic camping.

Mayo Camp

Little has been done at the Mayo Camp. Some fences have been built but there is much more to be built. Rustic camp is carried on there each summer.

Recommendations

1. A Sewerage Disposal plant be built immediately at the Leesburg Camp.
2. An Architect be retained.
3. A monthly report be submitted to the Camp director and to such Advisory Committees as are functioning.
4. Rebuild the Dock at Leesburg.
5. Replace chairs at Leesburg.
6. Improve the Lodge Kitchen.
7. A new Superintendent for Camp Florida.
8. Two new maintenance workers for Leesburg.

Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry Report

Recommendations to the Program Council and Annual Conference:

- (1) The continuation for the remainder of this quadrennium the FLORIDA CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY as presently constituted and authorized in Par. 1181.2 of the Discipline.
- (2) That district superintendents continue appointment of a District Director of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to be responsible for keeping before all churches in the district the concerns of its students, its colleges, its Wesley Foundation campus ministry and seminaries.

- (3) That each local church elect a Director of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to be responsible for these concerns in the local church and to recommend financial support for this work through the work area on Education, work area on Missions and the work area on Stewardship and Finance.
- (4) That the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church set as a minimum goal for the 1968-72 Quadrennium \$2.00 per member for colleges and 50¢ per member for Campus Ministry.
- (5) That the World Service Commission review and reconsider the original askings for this year's budgets based on the above goal and with specific amounts stipulated for the seven (7) month period and the year of 1970 as outlined below:

- (6) That all financial projections be submitted for a 10 year period for all higher education support in time for the fall convocations on higher education.
- (7) That recommendations be submitted to the Program Council that such presentations be requested from other conference agencies for financial needs, based on a 10 year projection.
- (8) That Methodist campus ministry units in the Florida Conference continue their practice of full cooperation with other communions on their campuses in varying combinations of coordinated or unified ministries as far as personnel and facilities indicate that this strengthens the respective ministry; and that ecumenical ministries be entered into only upon written agreements between communions involved.
- (9) That the Student-Young Adult Study and Projects Program be continued through this Quadrennium with a particular focus on strategy for ministry for junior community college young adults.
- (10) That the Conference Board of Education and other boards and agencies of the United Methodist Church continue cooperation, through elected representatives, with the INSTITUTE FOR CONTINUING STUDIES IN RELIGION recently established at Florida State University in conjunction with the Department of Religion.
- (11) That the Conference Board of Education recommend the continuation of the Advisory Council for Florida Southern College and commend the Council for its good work.
- (12) That the Conference and especially district leadership continue cooperation with Florida Southern in reaching its quadrennium goal of 300 new Florida Methodist students per year entering Florida Southern College. This is an average of one student for every two congregations.
- (13) That the Board of Education and Annual Conference approve and support a statewide or a series of regional convocations on Higher Education and Campus ministry between September 1, 1969 and March 31, 1970.
- (14) That the Board of Education seek through proper channels to have one evening of the 1970 Annual Conference program devoted to all interests of higher education and campus ministry.

OTTERBEIN COLLEGE REPORT

I. STUDENTS

Accumulative enrollment for Fall and Winter terms was 1,412. Ninety-nine percent of the students have church affiliation with approximately 60% members of The United Methodist Church.

Freshman Class for 1969-70: Through April 17, 1969, 613 applicants have been approved with 344 of these having made their initial deposit. The class will be limited to 450. Comparing these figures with 1968, we are ahead of last year by 82 students as of the same date. United Methodist applications are 263 out of 344.

The Dean's list comprises of those who are 2 A's and 1 B in three solid courses per term. A total of 113 students made the Dean's list both Fall and Winter terms, 65½% of these were United Methodists. For Winter term only, 138 made the Dean's list with 62% United Methodist.

Admissions policy: Children of E.U.B. members and Otterbein alumni are given special consideration; however, we do not automatically provide a place in the college for these groups, since to do so would violate the best means available to select those who may profit most from the college. In fact, we would do irreparable harm to a young person by admitting him if his ability and motivation were lower than needed to do college work.

Failure to be admitted to a school never becomes a part of the person's permanent record; however, once he is enrolled his records become a part of his portfolio.

Religious Affairs at Otterbein: The programs which concern themselves with religious affairs at the college are designed to assist the student and faculty community in finding answers to formidable questions. Questions like: Who am I? What am I going to do with what I find me to be? To whom shall I tell it and share it? These are religious inquiries involving the interpreting of life and the defining of immediate and ultimate loyalties. The approaches used in confronting these inquiries are many faceted. These approaches involve many of our students in planning and programming.

Vesper services are held weekly under the auspices of five student committees. Each committee uses a different approach toward worship. Provision is made for personal daily devotions in Chapel of the Church of the Master United Methodist.

The Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. coordinated their efforts in two seminars this year dealing particularly with sex and with the use of drugs.

Weekly discussion groups involving a faculty person and six to ten students engage in dialogue on issues of mutual concern. Discussion has centered this year on four topics: "What's Happening in America? Personality Evaluation; Human Values; and The Church's Role in Social Change."

Beginning with the second term, a new Coffee House with a new location was inaugurated. In the following months this has provided expressive opportunities for folk music, ad hoc discussion groups, personal conversations, faculty interpretations of their discipline, and a neutral ground for interpreting what's happening in the total context of academic life.

One of the salient features of religious programming at Otterbein is the occasion for Religion-in-Life Week. As much of the campus community as possible was engaged in discussing the general theme "What Values are Valuable?" Particular implementation was made within fraternities and sororities. Planned dialogue was initiated between faculty members, with administrators from other colleges, and from persons from non-Christian religions and the non-Western world.

Special worship services have been planned for the total college community during Orientation Week, Thanksgiving, and in Memorial to President Eisenhower.

The enterprise of SCOPE (Students Concerned over People Everywhere) has maintained its many projects in Franklin County communities, with considerable evaluation of its social strategies taking place constantly. Over 200 students are involved in this program at various levels of commitment. It takes a concerted effort to maintain this demanding type of extracurricular activity, especially under the schedule of the 3/3 curriculum.

Funds were raised by the students in the fall for Nigeria/Biafra food supplies and to assist in hospital costs for a fellow student injured in an automobile accident.

The organization of Delta Tau Chi meets bi-weekly to discuss facets of the professional Christian life and service. Approximately 54 students have made some degree of commitment to a full-time religious profession.

Last, but certainly not least, are the many personal expressions of religious convictions that are carried on within the confines of personal counseling with faculty and staff people. A brief devotional period begins each Faculty Meeting throughout the year.

In summation, if there is a manner in which any member of the Otterbein community wishes to express his religious concerns, there most probably is a channel available for that expression.—Robert Clarke, Director of Religious Affairs.

Visual Arts Departments: Most exciting is the growth of students, two in particular, who saw themselves as meek, lacking in self-confidence, and even not too bright, become in three years dynamic and exciting people. They draw with strength and conviction, look you in the eye, speak up when they have something to say, and most of all their whole being says,

"I am somebody." This is a refreshing recognition of the wonder of being. This is the advantage of the Liberal Arts concept vs. the "Art School" concept. It challenges the whole person.

The 3/3 plan is giving opportunity for the re-examination of teaching design in terms of relationship to the field of visual communication. We see the need to free students from an unrecognized slavery to the masters of advertising and to make the students more fully aware of the changing character of our visual environment and its effect on our lives.

Ohio Wesleyan, Denison, Capital, and Otterbein are testing a cooperative course in Meso-American art. It is a monitored course using audio-visuals (slides and taped materials).

One teacher from each of the four schools will receive a Kress Grant for study of African art during the coming summer. This will give opportunity for the development of a study program similar to the Meso-American course. This course will be offered in the spring of 1970.

This coming summer slides and films will be made in Mexico to develop multi-media presentations which will immerse the students in each of the cultures being studied, thus giving them a "feel" for the material they study individually.

During a year's leave absence by Mrs. Frank, Joanne Miller, a 1967 Otterbein graduate and a 1969 M.F.A. graduate at OSU, will teach at Otterbein. Joanne is graduating with honors at OSU, as she did at Otterbein.

Two of our rooms have been remodeled—one for a studio, the other for an art history and seminar classroom.—Earl Hassenpflug, Chairman of Visual Arts.

II. FINANCES

Capital Improvements: McFadden Science Hall is being completely renovated, thus giving us practically an all new Science complex. The new science addition will house chemistry and physics with the lecture room being used by the whole college as needed. McFadden basement will house psychology and geology; first floor, mathematics; the top two floors, biology; and the Weitkamp Planetarium and reflecting telescope observatory on the roof.

Operation Survival, A Crusade for a Christian College: Former EUB Annual Conferences gave approval to conduct a Capital Funds Crusade for a new library and an United Methodist Endowed Scholarship Fund with a goal of \$1,600,000.

West Virginia and Florida Conferences have reported results of their portion of the Crusade. Both conferences are placing in their budget an allocated amount for the Crusade.

Tennessee, Ohio East and Ohio Miami Conferences have proceeded with the Crusade on the local church level. Each church determined the procedures best suited to its circumstances. At this writing, mail is bringing in both cash and pledges every day. The basic attitude of the church leaders is good as we entered the commitment phase of the program; however, the dollar commitment is not available at this writing.

A Federal Grant of \$657,000 is contingent upon the college securing 2/3 of the cost of the library. It is hoped we will be ready to break ground in the fall of 1969.

The United Methodist Endowed Scholarship Fund will replace our Dollar-per-Member Program. Procedures for dispensing the earnings for this fund to the United Methodist students will be outlined in the near future.

The total contributed to the Dollar-per-Member Program for 1968 was \$31,937.61. One half of it goes to students and the other half to the Department of Religion.

New 16mm film, "From the Tower." The college has produced a 36-minute color movie depicting the college program at Otterbein. It is available for local church use by sending requests to Chester R. Turner, Director of Church Relations, Otterbein College, Wasterville, Ohio 43081.

The proposal to the Annual Conference by the Board of Education is that the organization be according to the guidelines of the Women's Division of the Board of Missions, which includes a representative from each of the Boards of Missions, Christian Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, the Town and Country Commission, four designated officers of the Women's Society of Christian Service, the Bishop, a District Superintendent, and the Program Director of the Conference Council.

The Committee will continue the work of placing trained, paid leadership to districts having rural community ministries for which the Conference Women's Society will provide from their budget.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

REPORT NO. 1

At its Fall meeting, the Florida Conference Committee on Publishing Interests passed a resolution commending both the idea of having a booklet of reports for the use of delegates to the Annual Conference and the persons who have prepared and published the booklet. We approve and endorse the continuation of the practice.

Subscriptions to *Together* magazine have increased to about 15,000 in Florida, a gain of more than 1,000 since last summer. This is a result of two factors: the successful subscription campaign conducted in the local churches last Fall and the combining of the subscription list of *Church and Home* with *Together* magazine. *Church and Home* was published as a family magazine by the Evangelical United Brethren Church. We need to double the number of subscribers, however, if *Together* magazine is to reach even one Florida Methodist in every ten. We recommend that each pastor and local church cooperate whole-heartedly in the nation-wide *Together* campaign which starts September 28 and runs through November 2.

Methodists are becoming increasingly aware of the many names that relate to the Methodist Publishing House: Cokesbury is the retail sales department; Abingdon Press is the book publishing department; Graded Press is the church-school curriculum materials publishing department.

Reading Fellowship

REPORT NO. 2

With your cooperation, Florida is pioneering in a venture to make it easier for Methodists to buy books recommended by other Methodists. The Florida Conference Reading Fellowship, with Walter Edwards as Chairman, began operations this year. Each quarter a bulletin-insert leaflet is published containing reviews (written by Florida laymen and ministers) of books by many publishers. The leaflet contains an order blank. Any person may complete the order blank, drop it in the offering plate at his church, and the church will forward the orders to Cokesbury, which will make shipment directly to the

purchaser and send an invoice to the purchaser. There is no charge to the church and no charge to the Annual Conference. Thus the individual Methodist is enabled to buy with a minimum of effort books that are recommended to him by his fellow Methodists across the state. Persons who wish to recommend books to others are invited to write very brief reviews of them and send the reviews to the Rev. Walter D. Edwards, P. O. Box 294, Madison 32340. Pastors should let the Conference Office at Lakeland know how many copies of the bulletin-insert they can use.

We recommend the continuation of the Florida Conference Reading Fellowship.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Commission on Worship of the Florida Annual Conference reports the following activities and suggestions:

1. Commission members provided articles and materials for church publications.
2. Promotion of the National Convocation on Worship held in St. Louis on April 21-24 was made, with ten members of our Conference present.
3. The conference Chairman attended the Jurisdictional Conference in Atlanta, and the Conference Workshop held in Melbourne.
4. Three meetings of the Commission and two executive sessions were held during the year for planning and formulating the Commission's Quadrennial program. The Commission will have a Retreat-Workshop in September of 1969 in preparation for two Conference-wide Workshops on Worship to be held in 1970 on April 11 in the St. Petersburg Area and April 25 in the Cocoa Area.
5. We suggest local churches study the currently used orders of worship in hopes of increasing meaningful participation by the congregations in regular acts of worship. For example, receiving the offering of the people after the sermon has good historical precedent and can become a more meaningful act of commitment by the congregation.
6. We encourage local churches to secure the packet "Ventures in Worship" edited by David J. Randolph, as a valuable collection of contemporary worship resources.
7. We encourage continual exploration with new forms of worship and suggest these experiences be written up and sent to the Conference Commission on Worship.
8. Local churches are encouraged to make best use of the annual Church Music Workshops at Florida Southern College sponsored by NaFomm and our Conference.

COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

Our primary responsibilities have been fulfilled through the efforts of Mr. O. B. Fanning, who serves in the dual capacity as Director of Florida Methodist Information, and as Director of the Florida Southern College News Bureau. The Methodist Information office is operated in conjunction with the College News Bureau. For the past two years he has been a part-time member of the Conference Program Council, paid by the Council and assigned to the Conference Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information. We wish to commend Mr. Fanning for his capable and dedicated service to the Church.

One facet of our responsibilities has to do with the strategically located roadside billboards welcoming travellers to Florida in the name of Florida United Methodism. More than one-half of our annual budget goes to make this service to the Church and travelling public possible.

Recommendations

1. We urgently request that a joint study committee or task force be formed including representatives from the Conference Program Council and the Conference Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information for the purpose of studying our present methods of gathering and dissemination of news and program and promotional information, both to Methodist people and to the public. The Council would select its representatives and the Commission would select its representatives. Results of the study with possible recommendations would be brought to the Annual Conference session of 1970 for consideration and possible action.

2. We recommend that each local church consider the value of constituting a local church committee on public relations as referred to in Paragraphs 1397 and 161.4 of the 1968 Book of *Discipline*. Such committees can receive assistance and guidance from Mr. Fanning, Florida Southern College News Bureau, Lakeland. Attention is called to two aids:

a. "Improving Your Church's Public Relations," a brochure, and

b. "As Others See Us," a 16mm color and sound film available from the Conference Audio-Visuals Library.

3. We recommend that a conference-wide workshop for persons who have local church and district responsibilities in public relations be scheduled for the spring of 1971 as calendar time and funds will permit.

A study committee is functioning within this Commission for the purpose of determining ways in which the Commission might best serve Florida United Methodism.

THE COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

The Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations during the past year has reviewed the central record keeping system. We recommend for the next quadrennium that reports on those persons, interested in church related occupations, be received from each local church at District Conference. Each church related professional group in the conference will be sent the list of persons interested in their area of occupations for further cultivation.

An important part of the Quadrennial Emphasis is the provision for voluntary service to help bring about reconciliation. The responsibility of en-

listing persons in the United Methodist Voluntary Service program has been assigned to the Conference Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations and the Conference Committee on Voluntary Service. This responsibility will be our primary work during the coming year. Our specific responsibilities are:

1. To provide adequate interpretative channels for the dissemination of information to all local churches and campuses within the conference. This function will include the distribution of "Lend a Hand" and "Looking for Something to Be."

2. To establish a registrar who will have the responsibility for processing volunteers and provide materials to help the Task Force choose the volunteers desired. This registrar is:

3. To provide procedures for follow-up with volunteers who may be interested in church related vocations.

Our program recommendations for the coming year are:

1. To encourage local churches to recruit persons for United Methodist Voluntary Service.

2. A seminar for the Conference Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations, including District Secretaries of Enlistment, at Lakeland, November 11-14, 1969.

3. To encourage each local church to observe Ministry Sunday on September 21, 1969.

4. To encourage each pastor to follow up commitments made by young people in his church who have attended Youth Camp at Leesburg.

COMMITTEE ON TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMUNICATION

In these times when the form and content of the structures by which our world is organized are changing almost daily, the church faces the most serious confrontations of her life. No longer can we be content to do what we have always done in the way we have always done it. We cannot be content to do what we have always done in new ways. We must allow the best minds of our times to lead us in new patterns of thought and action.

The General Conference has chosen to structure the Program Council of the United Methodist Church into three major divisions: Coordination, Research, and Planning; Interpretation; Television, Radio, and Film Communication. The Book of *Discipline* (1968) provides for coordinate Committees in the Annual Conferences corresponding to both the Division on Interpretation and the Division on Television, Radio, and Film Communication.

This latter Committee should have as its purpose the serving of the entire Annual Conference by cultivating the principles of good communication and promoting the use of mass-communication methods and materials in local churches. It should be a service agency for the Conference in providing training and resources and materials for the broad scope of the church's mission. It should be a consultative body to aid agencies of the Conference at every level to discover and use the most effective communication media available. It should provide the channel by which the newest and best of expanding technology can be made available to the Conference Boards and agencies.

Briefly stated, in the exploding world of people and technology where the

church must carry out her mission today, nothing but the best is good enough any more. The competition for the minds and loyalties of men is too great to be content with the "old-fashioned." The only old-fashioned luxury the church can afford today is Love, and this must be communicated in some new-fashioned ways. The old clichés are not good enough. Those on the growing edge can turn us off in a snap! "New occasions teach new duties" and this is a new occasion. The future of the United Methodist Church in Florida depends to a large extent on how, or whether, we communicate with each new generation. Problems in a great many of our churches today are basically communication problems. We need not apologize at all if we are willing to set our most skilled and knowledgeable people at work in this area.

To begin, we propose the following for the immediate future:

1) In the Fall of 1969, draw together for the period of at least a full day, all the persons at higher levels of responsibility (Executive Committees of Boards, Commissions, and other agencies) for a presentation and discussion of philosophy, methods, and materials as conceived in today's multi-media approach to programming.

2) Space be provided in the Florida Methodist and/or *Together* supplement for the promotion of the "multi-media" approach to every phase of the church's mission.

3) Affirmation of the Program Council for a go-ahead on an approach similar to that described in the Book of *Discipline* 1968.

4) Co-ordination of agencies such as Methodist Information, and the Publications Committee with this Committee.

5) Development in each District of a catalog of quality equipment and resources that local churches would be willing to place on loan to other churches in that District.

6) For practical purposes, shorten the name of the Committee to "Committee on Communication, TRAFCO." Similarly, members of District Program Councils responsible for this area would be known as "Co-ordinator of Communication."

7) Plans in future years of this Quadrennium would be to advance preaching and teaching skills through the use of electronic memory equipment; basic training for local leaders in use of media; developing both the resources and the use of local church groups in areas of dramatic and choral productions for use on commercial television, educational television, radio, out-of-doors, etc.; use of automatic answering devices, "listening boxes," etc.

8) The Journal is published as both a record of the work of the Boards, Agencies, and Churches of the Conference and as a tool for the busy persons who are involved in the program of the church beyond the local unit.

The United Methodist Church describes herself as a "Connectional Church." In these days when prompt communication is both desirable and needed, the telephone increasingly becomes the vehicle of communication—a real "connector."

Having at his fingertips the telephone numbers of every other congregation and minister in the Conference would save a considerable amount of time in calling the information operators near and far. Multiply this by all who make inter-district calls and a need becomes clear.

It is therefore our recommendation that the cabinet provide the Conference Council office with a mimeographed list of the churches' and parsonages' telephone numbers to be made available to any pastor upon request.

The scope and importance of Communication runs far beyond these words. We do not suggest that we have easy answers to difficult questions. We do propose that the Florida Annual Conference set itself to the task of enlisting our most creative persons (clerical and lay) in the area of Communication, follow it with financial resources commensurate with the importance of the task, and having expected a great thing to be done, to see it happen.

**REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY
MINISTRIES**

This has been for the Commission on Town and Country Ministries, as for all the other Boards and Commissions, a time of reorganization. At the beginning of the year we found ourselves with only two clerical members who had served in an official capacity as members of this Commission before, and eight lay members who had served; all the rest of the Commission were new members.

However, the members quickly gathered together and set themselves about the task of carrying on the work of this Commission. At the first full commission meeting held in Lakeland, we revised the Church of the Year Award Program, changing the manner of selecting the Churches of the Year. We authorized new stationery to be drawn up, we approved financial assistance for three people to attend the Southeastern Jurisdiction Workshop on Town and Country held at the Hinton Rural Life Center in North Carolina.

Probably the greatest thing the Commission has done this year is to lay plans for a Summer Program whereby we would pay scholarships to worthy young people from small churches to enter into a Summer Youth Program. We were hoping hereby to not only interest some of our fine youth in Christian Vocation and possibly full time Christian Service, but also to help them raise some financial assistance for a college education. We had planned to continue to provide a \$25.00 scholarship for at least eight ministers to attend the Workshop at Emory.

In lieu of the above, and the \$25.00 scholarships usually provided for Emory, we feel the need for a comprehensive study of the Rural Areas of our conference; and therefore, are planning to use a portion of our budget as a minimum to underwrite such a study.

This year our Rural Fellowship Banquet will be held on Wednesday, June 4. Instead of presenting the Church of the Year Awards at this time, we are asking that these rewards and recognition be given out by Bishop Henley as a part of our time on the Conference program.

As Chairman, I would like to take this opportunity to personally thank each member of this Commission, who has worked so hard to make this report possible. It is their report, I have simply had the privilege of working with this grand group of clergy and laymen who are interested in the work of The Methodist Church and the ongoing of the Kingdom of God.

1. We recommend that a Conference-wide study of rural areas be conducted as soon as possible to establish the needs of this important ministry.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

REPORT NO. 1

Your Board of Pensions is glad to report that all Conference Claimants have been paid in full at the established annuity rate for the Conference year 1968-69 and that the full amount of our obligation to the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund for the year has been paid. We take this opportunity to express our sincere gratitude to the churches of the Conference for their punctual and generous giving that has made this possible. When I remind you that this exceeds a half million dollars, you will understand the gratitude we express for your faithfulness and the people blessed by it.

We recommend:

In answer to question 11:

1. That the annuity claimants working under a General Board, institute the Fair Share Apportionment fund for the support of our Conference Claimants under the current income program and the pension responsibility for those men under the MRPF program during the period June 1-December 31, 1969, be \$240,244.
2. That the annuity rate for this period be approximately 1.07% of the average salary of the Conference, or \$81.50 per years of approved service for retired ministers who are members of the Conference, and 75% of this amount for widows of ministers who were members of this Conference.
3. That the annuity rate for Approved Supply Pastors meeting the Disciplinary requirements be 1.07% of the average salary of the Conference, or \$81.50 for the fiscal period and that 75% of this amount be provided for widows of Approved Supply Pastors per year of approved service.

In an answer to question 15:

1. That the annuity claimants working under a United Methodist institution or organization and approved for annuity credit shall pay, or his board, agency, or institution shall pay at an annual rate of \$800; \$466.67 for the seven month fiscal period.

THE REPORT OF THE JOINT DISTRIBUTING COMMITTEE OF THE
FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST
CHURCH, FORMERLY THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE
CENTRAL JURISDICTION OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, AND THE
FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST
CHURCH WHICH WAS FORMED BY THE UNION OF THE FLORIDA
ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE FORMER EVANGELICAL UNITED
BRETHREN CHURCH AND THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF
THE SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION OF THE FORMER METHODIST
CHURCH

Pursuant to the call of the General Secretary of the General Board of Pension of The United Methodist Church, as provided in Paragraph 1383 of the 1968 Book of the Discipline of The United Methodist Church, the Joint Distributing Committee met on June 2, 1969 at 7:00 p.m. in the Room assigned in the Polk Science Building, Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Florida.

The committee was convened by Edge W. Gamble, having been author-

ized by Claire C. Hoyt, General Secretary, General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church. The letter of authorization was read and will be filed with the secretary of the committee.

The convener made a brief statement concerning the purpose of the meeting and then D. G. Dieffenwierth read the provisions of Paragraph 1383 of the 1968 Book of the Discipline.

Millard C. Cleveland was elected Chairman of the Joint Distributing Committee. The chairman then called for nominations for a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary. J. B. F. Williams was elected Vice-Chairman. Eldon Simmons was elected Secretary.

I. Organization and Procedure

The following matters pertaining to organization and procedure were presented by the Secretary of the Joint Distributing Committee.

1. The Distributing Committee of each Annual Conference involved in the Joint Distributing Committee meeting shall be entitled to have three of its members and/or alternates participate fully in the proceedings of the Joint Distributing Committee.

2. The Distributing Committee members and/or alternates of the former Florida Annual Conference of The Evangelical United Brethren Church may participate fully in the proceedings of the Joint Distributing Committee.

3. An Annual Conference Distributing Committee may be fully and equally represented by one or more of the three members to which it is entitled, or a Distributing Committee of an Annual Conference may request that the Joint Distributing Committee act for and in the interest of that Distributing Committee.

4. Each Annual Conference, through its Distributing Committee, shall be entitled to one vote.

5. Each Distributing Committee shall designate one of its members who shall have the authority to act for the committee ad interim. The following were named to represent their conferences: C.J.—J. B. F. Williams; E.U.B.—Emerson Iles; S.E.J.—Eldon Simmons.

6. Each Annual Conference will cover the expenses of its own Distributing Committee members.

7. All funds in connection with the distributing program shall be transferred as soon as possible after July 1, 1969.

8. Beginning with the payment due as of July 1, 1969, the treasurer of the merged Florida Annual Conference shall make pension payments to the claimants of the former Florida Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church and to the claimants of the former Florida Annual Conference of The Evangelical United Brethren Church, with the exception of funded Senior Plan benefits and such Ministers Reserve Pension Plan benefits, if any, which will be paid through the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church.

II. Distribution of Assets and Pension Responsibility

1. Pension responsibility on account of service to either of the merging Florida Annual Conferences payable for the Conference year 1969-70 shall be paid through the successor Annual Conference.

2. Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, Partial Reserve Pension Fund, Supply Reserve Pension Fund, The Senior Plan and Ministers Reserve Pension Plan credits related to service in either of the merging Annual Conferences shall be counted as assets and shall be distributed as Service Annuity accounts. Any Service Annuity provided therefrom at the time of the member's retirement may be counted as part of the pension payable on the basis of the successor conference's annuity rate. All pension assets of the merging Annual Conferences shall be distributed to the successor conference in proportion to the pension responsibility received by such conference.

3. All approved service to pastoral charges shall be distributed to the successor within whose geographical boundaries the charge is located.

4. Any approved service which cannot be related to a pastoral charge

shall be allocated to the several Annual Conferences in proportion to the number of years of approved service related to pastoral charges which will be distributed to the Annual Conference concerned.

5. Any claim for supply service or service as a lay pastor which has not been approved and/or is not a part of the total distribution, shall be the responsibility of the conference or conferences in which is located the pastoral charge or charges where such supply or lay pastor service was rendered.

6. Consecutive years of approved supply service and/or service as lay pastor in either of the merging conferences together with service in the successor Conference as a full-time lay pastor shall be counted as consecutive years in *one* conference for the purpose of qualifying such years for a pension claim. (See 1968 *Discipline*, Paragraph 1379.9.)

III. Pension Claimants

All claimants of either of the merging conferences shall be claimants of the merged conference.

IV. Claims and Liens

Any amounts collected by the General Board of Pensions related to claims or liens filed by either of the merging conferences shall be allocated to the successor conference.

V. Authorization

The General Board of Pensions is hereby authorized and directed to put into effect the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee and to distribute the pension assets and responsibilities of the merging conferences in accordance with the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee.

This Life Insurance Plan was started on July 1, 1955. During these years there have been 40 death claims, two of which have not yet been paid, pending completion of proper forms. The claims paid total \$147,500. The two being processed total \$5,000. In addition, we have a net obligation of \$5,800. for two cases where the premiums have been waived due to permanent disability.

During the past year (May 1, 1968 to May 1, 1969) the following claims were paid: Ernest Luttrell, Clare M. Cotton, H. Carter Hardin, J. Wallace Hamilton, and A. F. Eggleston, \$2,500. each; and Henry Kinnard claim of \$5,000. The claims of M. A. Sensenbrenner and Fred L. Martin, in the amount of \$2,500. each, have not yet been processed.

Premiums paid to Metropolitan Life during the year amounted to a total of \$30,289.32. Last September (1968), a dividend from Metropolitan Life was received in the amount of \$17,867. Since our claims have been \$10,000 more this year than the year previous, our anticipated dividend in September will be less than \$10,000.

During the past year we have received interest on our reserve in the amount of \$3,701.68. During the fourteen years that we have had this Plan in force, our interest income has totalled \$23,001.59. At the present time we have \$55,000. with the Florida Methodist Foundation, and a loan of \$9,000. to the Melbourne District, the latter being retired at the rate of at least \$500. per quarter.

This Plan has been most helpful in providing low cost insurance to our ministers. While it could continue for several years on the same basis, the increasing build-up of claims by those over 65 spells doom for the Plan. While our present reserve appears to be unusually good, against it we have 70 members who are over 65, and this would constitute a claim against this reserve amounting to \$175,000. A Plan which will give larger coverage in the earlier years of the minister's life, and closing out at the time of compulsory retirement seems to be more feasible, and probably will be presented this year, or as soon as such a suitable Plan can be worked out.

It is a privilege to serve as treasurer of this Plan, knowing that the financial help means so much if tragedy strikes the life of the insured.

The books were not audited for the period closing May 1, because of the possibility of a new Plan being adopted, in which case a final audit would be made. This will be properly taken care of at the recommendation of the Board of Pensions.

PREACHER'S RELIEF BOARD

This has been a good year for the Board except for the passing of five of our fine conference claimants, Mrs. T. R. Adams, The Reverend A. F. Eggleston, Dr. Paul A. Fletcher, Mrs. Fletcher Peeler, and the Rev. Horace L. Boyd, all of whom enjoyed several years of happy living in our conference-owned homes. One is constantly impressed with the value of this service to our faithful servants of the church in their sunset years; those now living in our cottages and apartments have had privacy, independence and security for an average of eight years.

During this year we have received the gift of a three bedroom house in Mayo from The Reverend W. O. McMullen; it is valued at \$12,000. Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Shufflebarger, of Venice, surrendered their equity in their former home in Lakeland, and friends of the late Reverend Henry Kinnard have contributed more than \$5,000 to refurbish this house for the use of claimants of the conference. The claim of our Board to the bequest of the late William Fisher Smethie, of Merritt Island, in the form of a twenty-nine acre grove in that area, has been established this year, and since the recent passing of a life tenant, we are coming into possession of this valuable property at an early date. We have been notified during the year that we are to be the beneficiaries of properties and intangible assets in two additional wills; all of this is evidence of a growing interest in the work of this Board.

Through members of our Board, and the service of our property manager, we have shared in the survey of the Conference Committee on Housing which has pointed up the need for unifying our service to the aging through our present retirement homes and the urgent need for providing additional facilities for ministers and laymen of moderate and low income.

Three additional houses have been purchased in Lakeland, and two have been sold, in Orlando and Brandon respectively. Major improvements have been made on our properties in Miami Beach, Stuart and on one of our houses in Lakeland. Minor repairs have been made in a number of our houses and apartments and one of our duplex units in St. Petersburg has been completely refurbished without expense to the Board. All of our properties have been inspected, and all claimants have been visited at least once during the year.

Four of our claimants have given up their assignments, two have moved to another conference home, and seven additional claimants have been assigned to apartments and homes.

FLORIDA CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

The Florida Conference Brotherhood was organized out of a desire of the ministers of the Florida Conference to become personally involved in a ministry to the widows and families of their deceased colleagues at a time when immediate material assistance would be most helpful.

It is a voluntary organization open to any member of the Florida Conference under forty-five years of age, preacher on probation, full time lay pastor, or evangelist in relationship to the Florida Conference. The initial membership fee is one dollar and the annual dues one dollar. Upon the death of a member the widow or other designated beneficiary is immediately paid \$1,000 and the members are assessed three dollars, except those on Probation who pay one dollar for the first four years after admittance on probation into the Conference.

Those forty-five years of age or older may become members by paying all fees and assessments retroactively to a time corresponding to their forty-fifth birthday.

We have had only five calls this conference year, of which, four fall in this audit period.

We now have 380 participating members and 14 contributing members in the Brotherhood. We are grateful to the contributing members, most of them Laymen, who respond to our calls, but are not eligible for the benefits of full membership. Twenty new members were enrolled this year.

Our reserve fund was increased by \$1,769.55, bringing our total funds on hand to \$16,437.83 as of March 31, 1969.

The 1969 Annual Meeting of the Brotherhood will be held Wednesday A.M., June 4th, at the college cafeteria.

NOTE: In 1962 the Brotherhood established a death benefit of \$1,000 a member. This created a potential obligation of the membership in excess of \$380,000. Currently, members are asked to contribute from \$1 to \$3 upon the death of a member. The records indicate that at March 31, 1969 \$514.99 of these contributions had not been received.

THE FLORIDA METHODIST FOUNDATION NOW IN ITS THIRD YEAR OF SERVICE

Services which reduce the Annual Conference operating budget are among the important contributions of the Florida Methodist Foundation, now in its third year of service.

Monies which the Foundation can earn for Boards and Agencies on their Reserves do not have to be obtained through apportionments.

Financing which the Foundation can arrange, at rates less than Commercial leaders are charging, reduce the expense amounts to be included in the Conference budgets.

The Foundation is promoting the program of —REMEMBER YOUR CHURCH OR SOME INSTITUTION OR AGENCY OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE through Gifts of cash, securities, property, life insurance policies, trusts, gift annuities, and wills.

Reduced-Cost Loans

The Foundation is financing the construction of the New Methodist Building at six per cent interest. Commercial loans are much higher. A Sanitary Sewer System at the Leesburg Camps required by the State Board of Health, will be financed by the Foundation at rates much lower than are available elsewhere.

Above Average Earnings

Funds for loans to the Institutions and Boards are obtained by offering above-average returns to Boards, Institutions and Local Churches on their reserve funds. At present there are twenty-five investors with the Foundation—seven Conference Boards, seven District Boards, eight Local Churches, three Conference Agencies. Their rate of earnings for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1968 was 6.83 per cent.

Seminar on Estate Planning

A Seminar on Estate Planning was held at Florida Southern College last November with more than 150 in attendance. Another Seminar is planned for this year.

One of our GOALS is to have a Committee on Wills and Legacies in every Local Church.

CREDIT UNION

We, the Committee on Credit Union, recommend that The Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church authorize the formation of a Credit Union to benefit the interested ministers of the Florida Annual Conference, any paid lay employees of local Churches, Annual Conference officer's or organizations and corporations listed in the Journal of the Florida Annual Conference and that Bishop James W. Henley appoint a Committee of five with authority to take the necessary legal action to form the Credit Union, which shall be under the continuing supervision of The Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

The General Conference of 1968 gave the above name to this board, replacing the former name of Board of Hospitals and Homes. This board has the responsibilities of promoting the interests of the hospitals and homes, for which the conference has responsibility, within the bounds of the conference. It may aid in planning and developing a religious ministry, wherever practicable, in state and non-United Methodist hospitals and homes needing such ministry. This board, in cooperation with the general board, is expected to help lift spiritual, financial, and scientific standards in Methodist health and welfare ministries in the Annual Conference. It is to seek to strengthen the ties between related hospitals and homes and the Church.

As Florida Methodists, we are grateful for the excellent services of two homes for the care of children: The Florida Methodist Children's Home at Enterprise, and The Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home at Daytona Beach.

The new Methodist Hospital in Jacksonville has shown remarkable progress since its opening less than two years ago. The hospital is filled to capacity most of the time, its financial condition is excellent, and new rooms are soon to be added. We commend Mr. Marcus Drewa and the Board of Directors for the splendid service rendered by this hospital.

The four Methodist Retirement facilities in Florida are administered under local boards of directors with local and district support. Asbury Towers in Bradenton has 152 units. Total units occupied or committed is 144, giving a percentage total of 95%. Biscayne Manor in Miami has 81 units, with total occupation of 81 units, or a percentage total of 100%. Sunny Shores Villas in St. Petersburg continues to operate with great success and full capacity.

Wesley Manor in Jacksonville has 248 units and 230 of them occupied for a percentage total of 93%.

We endorse the work of the special conference Committee on Housing and feel the urgent need for the housing and care of retired persons of moderate means.

The Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded (SEMAR) has been established to help minister to the retarded and their families in the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The Florida Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries is to have a sub-committee of five men to stimulate and give guidance to such a ministry in our own conference.

Recommendations

In consideration of the rapid increase in numbers of retirees and senior citizens in Florida Methodist Churches we recommend that a conference-wide workshop for ministry to these persons through the local church be held April 20-23, 1970.

We recommend that District Workshops in Health and Welfare Ministries be held in each district under the leadership of the District Director in cooperation with the District Superintendent.

We recommend the continuance of the established practice of receiving from all churches of the Conference an offering on each Fifth Sunday and at Christmas for the support of The Florida Methodist Children's Home and The Sarah Hunt Children's Home. We urge pastors and laymen to personally visit the homes and to call to the attention of their congregations the importance of these offerings.

We recommend that steps continue to be made toward uniting the administrative functions of the two homes.

We recommend that the First Sunday in March, 1970 be designated "Health and Welfare Sunday" on the Conference Calendar and be observed in the local churches.

We recommend the approval of plans by First United Methodist Church in Cocoa to build an apartment for retired persons under the FHA 236 plan.

COMMITTEE ON HOUSING
THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, JUNE 6, 1969

The 1968 session of The Florida Annual Conference adopted a resolution calling for the establishment of a committee to study the needs and possibilities of providing suitable housing for retired persons of lower income (see page 237, 1968 Journal). A recommendation was also passed that we secure the assistance of trained personnel from the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, The Preachers' Relief Fund, and the Cabinet of The Florida Annual Conference. A committee was established with nominations coming from the Cabinet.

The committee was organized and met three times during the year. In an effort to determine accurately the opinions of ministers and laymen with the Conference, a Questionnaire was sent to all the active ministers and to the Health and Welfare Representative from each local church, plus other laymen from forty-one local churches. On key questions concerning facilities for the aged the following results were obtained:

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Because of the enthusiastic response to the questionnaire which produced 458 replies from the ministers and 413 from laymen, we believe the Florida Annual Conference has a clear mandate to do something definite in the area of housing and care for retired persons of moderate income. Three of the four Methodist retirement facilities now operating within the bounds of the conference find it necessary to charge fees beyond the financial ability of people with lower incomes. The vast majority who responded to the sur-

vey expressed the opinion that such a facility is needed and should be given some support by the Annual Conference. We believe that Methodists still have the daring, determination and dedication to match needs with resources when they are adequately challenged.

Therefore, be it resolved that The Florida Annual Conference include in its ministry suitable housing and care for the aging of moderate incomes, and that on nomination of the Cabinet, a Board of Directors, including representation from the conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, The Preachers' Relief Fund and the four retirement homes now existing, be elected at the 1969 session to form a corporate body to be known as The United Methodist Facilities For the Aging Of The Florida Annual Conference for the purpose of, (1) unifying Florida Methodism's service to the aging, strengthening the present homes by offering them the opportunity to consolidate efforts, increase the efficiency of their work, and reduce the expenses of purchased goods, and (2) provide the conference an established base for future work with the aging.

The Corporation shall make this a year of study with no action, and report back to the 1970 session of the Annual Conference for further direction.

FLORIDA METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, INC.

The following is a Resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. at its regular meeting held on April 8, 1969, at the Florida Methodist Children's Home at Enterprise, Florida, at which meeting a quorum was present, with Jesse E. Waller, President, presiding:

Upon Motion duly made, seconded and carried the following Resolution was adopted:

"BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. a Florida Corporation, not for profit, deems it advisable and hereby declares it to be advisable that certain Articles of the Articles of Incorporation be amended, changed and altered to enable the merger of the Florida Methodist Children's Home and the Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home, to be administered and governed in its entirety by one Board of Trustees consisting of twenty-one (21) members, the membership of twenty-one members to be achieved by June, 1971, by the deletion of thirteen Trustees in June, 1970, which said Trustees' present terms expire in 1970, five of such Trustees being Trustees of Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home, Inc., and eight of such Trustees being Trustees of Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc.; and seven Trustees in June, 1971, such Trustees to be deleted from the Trustees whose present terms expire in 1971, the deletion of two of the seven Trustees shall be present Trustees of Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home, Inc. and five of the Trustees to be deleted shall be Trustees of the present Trustees of Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. The Trustees to be deleted in June, 1971 shall be designated by the nominating committee."

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Article One be amended to read as follows:

The name of the Corporation shall be the Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. with its principal office located at the Florida Methodist Children's Home in Enterprise, Volusia County, Florida, and the Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. shall consist of the present Florida Methodist Children's Home located at Enterprise, Florida, and the Children's Home located at Daytona Beach, Florida, presently operating under the name, Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home, under the ownership and jurisdiction of the Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home, Inc., which said home shall be known and designated as the Sarah Hunt Division of the Florida Methodist Children's Home. The Corporation shall have the power to provide Children's

Homes at other locations should it be determined that such are needed in the service of children and youth and in accordance with paragraph 1181 of the 1968 edition of the Book of the Discipline of The United Methodist Church."

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Article Five of the Articles of Incorporation be amended, changed and altered to read as follows:

A Board of Trustees composed of twenty-one members, said Board of Trustees to consist of the District Superintendent of District in which the Home is located, the Conference Chairman of Health and Welfare Ministries, and nineteen elective members, not more than nine of that number being clergy, who shall be elected to serve annually by the Florida Annual Conference of the Methodist Church. The Board of Trustees shall elect from its number the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Assistant Treasurer, and all shall hold office for a period of one year. Other officers may be elected by the Board of Trustees in such manner as the By-Laws may prescribe. The Board of Trustees shall meet and elect officers within thirty days after the election of the Board of Trustees at the Florida Annual Conference."

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the above and foregoing Resolution reflecting the proposed changes in the Articles of Incorporation be recommended to the next Florida Annual Conference of the Methodist Church."

1969

It is always a pleasure to meet with the Board of Trustees and to report to our Annual Conference about our work and to make plans for better ways to serve boys and girls who need a *home* away from their families.

Since our last annual meeting, the Home has been represented at the Houseparents' Workshop at Stetson University, the Florida Group Child Care Association, Daytona Beach (Plaza Hotel) and the Annual Convention of the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries of The United Methodist Church in New Orleans, Louisiana. The Administrator has had the pleasure of visiting and presenting the Sarah Hunt Story to several churches throughout Florida with slides, pictures and brochures.

Our population at the Home is eleven (11). We have served this year fourteen (14) children. Two children have been discharged from the Home since their completion or partial completion of their studies in the Job Corp Centers and are now taking care of themselves. The other child who was in Foster Home Program is no longer with us or under our supervision as of March 15th. Our attention is on the eleven (11) children directly in our care here on the campus. Since our last meeting we have the wife of the Administrator, Mrs. Ida M. Rivers, who served as the assistant to the Administrator. She passed away on December 2nd, 1968. We also mourn the passing of Mrs. Violet Carlton, the wife of my co-worker and friend, the Rev. Bascom W. Carlton. She was not a member of our staff but a lover of children.

Recommendation

That the SARAH HUNT HOME BE MERGED WITH THE FLORIDA METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME maintaining the founder's name (SARAH HUNT CAMPUS) under the one name. A one name institution but two campuses for the benefit of all children who need this service so badly.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF FLORIDA METHODIST
CHILDREN'S HOME TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF
THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH**

June, 1969

The Trustees of The Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. are pleased to report that during this conference year service has been rendered to 199 boys and girls. These children, all of whom required service outside their own homes, received assistance through the on-campus program of group living, through the foster home program, through adoptive services, or Mother's Aid. Professional Casework and Group Work services were provided all children. During the year 169 new applications for service were received.

The 60th Anniversary of the founding of our Home was celebrated on December 1 when Bishop Henley and a large group of other friends gathered on the campus. The great day saw a combination of Home-coming for former residents and staff, the Dedication of one building, and the Consecration of two new buildings. Completed just in time for the celebration was a new staff residence and two children's cottages at a total cost of \$176,000.00; of this amount \$69,000.00 was borrowed in order to make substantial savings through construction of all three buildings at the same time.

A significant study was entered into by the Board during this year under the direction of Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas of The School of Social Work of The University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. All pastors were polled concerning needed services for children and families not now being met. As a result of this study a plan for future expansion of services has been adopted by the Board and from year to year certain steps will be presented to The Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, and through them to the full Annual Conference, for study and implementation.

The Study Committee, now made a permanent part of our program, found that it would be desirable to bring the present program up to standard by providing two additional trained Caseworkers, by employing as many couples as possible as Child Care Workers, by increasing present salaries and improving working conditions so staff could remain with us longer. In the future we look toward the establishment of Group Homes near high schools for older adolescents, and a treatment center for badly disturbed children. It is also hoped to provide family counseling in urban centers, and possibly to establish small local facilities where such need is indicated. All this will have to be done one step at a time, and as the Conference lends its support.

The Trustees have studied the possibility of merging with The Sarah Hunt Methodist Children's Home, bringing under one administration the services rendered children. An enabling Resolution to make merger possible was passed in the April 8, 1969 Board Meeting; and should it be the will of the conference to merge the two Homes, the Resolution and certain proposed Charter changes will be presented for your consideration.

We are very thankful for the financial support of our Conference. It is our request that the financial plan for support of The Children's Homes be continued. Under this plan all the Church School offering and the loose (undesignated) offering from Morning Worship received on each Fifth Sunday and at Christmas is remitted to the Conference Treasurer for The Children's Homes.

We are grateful for the large number of churches and church organizations inviting the Rev. Ben Rider to present a program on The Home. During the year Mr. Rider has spoken to 136 groups away from the campus and to 82 groups on the campus. If you desire a good program or a good visit to the campus, see or write Mr. Ben Rider, Post Office Box 8, Enterprise, Florida 32763.

We express our sorrow upon the loss this year of Mr. Joe Sharples, a faithful Trustee from Live Oak, and always a generous contributor to the Home. We also express our sorrow upon the death of Mrs. Violet Carlton who for 16 years gave unselfishly of her time and talents in meeting the needs of boys and girls. Following major surgery she continued to work full time on the campus for more than a year. Her example of Christian faith will never be forgotten by those who worked with her. We also extend warm sympathy to the Rev. Eddie Rivers, Jr. who lost his wife by death during this year. She too was a faithful and effective worker in this part of God's Kingdom.

We request of Bishop James W. Henley and The District Superintendents that The Rev. Bascom W. Carlton be reappointed as Superintendent of The Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. We express our thanks to the Superintendent and to all the Staff for effective work with so many children.

BOARD OF LAITY

The Board of Laity has attempted, during the past year, to enlarge the opportunity for spiritual enrichment for the men and women of our Church. This has been done through the Leesburg Retreats for Methodist Men, the Bishop's Convocation for the Laity, and District Retreats. Further, we have cooperated with the Board of Evangelism in publicizing the Lay Witness Missions. It is felt that each of these areas of activity have indeed resulted in hundreds of newly committed Christians who will now become a part of the total effort toward Renewal or Revival. Our work is done because of our duty to support the total program of the Church—and, because we feel that the Laity is vitally responsible and needed in the continuing aim to religious awakening.

STEWARDSHIP The Death of Clare Cotton, one of our Lord's great disciples, caused a "slowdown" in this area of our responsibility. Dr. Robert Holmes

and others have stepped in, however, and plans for the future will certainly bring unsurpassed results in this important work.

METHODIST MEN The death of Gus Lyle, who served with the highest degree of efficiency and commitment as Conference Director of Methodist Men, was a great loss in this area of our responsibility. The work did go on, however, under Edd Gentry and others, and many Methodist Men's events had a real impact.

This work must be given more attention. As a guide for this effort, we can do no better than to follow the advice of this great Christian layman in his last letter to me:

" . . . much of the weakness rests in the fact that too much emphasis, not only in Methodist Men, but the church as a whole has been placed on or at least a general expectancy has been built up to look for something new, rather than put to use that which we have and get the job done.

I am convinced that we should place stronger emphasis than ever before on certain "BASICS" which must be the foundation for real success in Methodist Men and for the Church itself, for that matter . . . Jesus Christ should truly occupy the position of highest rank in all our thinking, our planning and our doing . . . The mission of Methodist Men is to serve Christ as a part of His Church and that fact should be loudly proclaimed at all levels of leadership and in all areas of activity . . . The Holy Bible should be held up as "the" primary source of inspirational incentive and spiritual enrichment. It should be the guiding factor in planning and carrying on the affairs of Methodist Men. . . . Christ centered and church related should be more than mere words as they relate to Methodist Men works and affairs . . . First because Methodist Men Fellowships belong to the Church and the Church belongs to Christ, and for that reason they should function in harmony with His teachings and in accord with the guidelines of His church. There should be no compromise here ever—since to do so would be a first step toward drifting away from the true course which Methodist Men, as Christians and as a part of their church, are committed to follow."

CONCLUSION The Laity have responded in a wonderful way, but there is still a great need for more disciples of Christ. This is, therefore, the primary thrust of the Board of Laity Program.

CLARE MARDEN COTTON

The life and influence of Clare Cotton has been plowed deep into the soil of Florida Methodism. For over forty years he gave his best to the Church in terms of dedication, hard work and faithful witness. In his passing, the Conference has lost one of its finest pastors and one of its ablest administrators.

Clare was born in Welsh, Louisiana, March 18, 1901. During his youth, he came to Florida where he received his education and later met Miss Allye M. Giddens who was to become his wife. They were married in Ocala on February 15, 1927. What a great couple they were—Allye with her friendly and gracious spirit and Clare with his loyal devotion and happy disposition! Guests in their home were always treated as royalty. Two sons were born to this union: Clare, Jr. and Frank.

When the Florida Conference met in Jacksonville in June of 1927, Clare was admitted on Trial and appointed to the New Port Richey charge. Future appointments were to include many of the larger and more influential churches of the Conference and two terms as a member of the Bishop's Cabinet. At the time of his death, he was serving as a Program Counselor on the Conference Council staff.

Death came suddenly to Clare. Stricken with a heart attack on Sunday morning, September 15th, he slipped away around 4 o'clock in the afternoon. It had been his request that when death should come, Christ and not Clare Cotton should be praised; therefore, in accordance with his request, his body was laid to rest in the Oak Hill Burial Park, Lakeland, on Wednesday afternoon, September 18th, at 1:30 o'clock. At 4:00 o'clock a memorial service was held in the sanctuary of the First Methodist Church, Lakeland, where he had served as pastor from 1959 to 1963. Participating in the service were: Rev. Walter B. Rutland, Bishop James W. Henley, Dr. John J. Rooks, Dr. Charles M. Laymon and Rev. Lloyd Knox.

The news of Clare's death was received by friends throughout the Church with great shock and sadness. Because of his warm spirit and outgoing love there was a deep sense of personal loss on the part of all who knew him. For one who had lived so vitally, it was difficult to imagine him staying dead for long. . . . "Whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die!"

Many have said, "Clare Cotton was my friend"—and he was. Yet no man had a monopoly on the friendship of Clare Cotton. He was a friend to all. Through the years he touched countless lives of preachers and laymen and all are taller in Christian stature and richer in Christian grace because of his interest and his genuine love. How refreshing he was!

Perhaps the one word that characterized the life of Clare Cotton more than any other was the word Integrity. He was what he was. He never tried to be somebody else. His word was his bond. He had an innate sense of humor and keen wit which often broke forth in some of the most unusual and unique expressions ever heard. Doubtless many of his sayings and stories will be repeated and laughed over for years to come. He always enlivened any gathering with his humorous quips and his keen observations. Imagine the great "Clam Bake" with him there! Hear his laughter! Death is not the end of Clare Cotton! Hallelujah!

JAMES WALLACE HAMILTON

J. Wallace Hamilton had not passed on life's highway the point which marks the highest goal, that is, the three score and ten, but he, being weary for a moment lay down into a dreamless sleep that kissed his eyelids still. While yet in love with life and enraptured with the world, he passed into a silence, and ultimately, from whence he came.

Perhaps the most eloquent eulogy that could be uttered in his behalf was the presence of so many people at his funeral, the prayers we have individually made, and the thoughts and memories that are uppermost in our minds as they pass in review. But there are facts that must be said.

In the life of James Wallace Hamilton we found that rare combination of

true greatness and sincere humility. Blended in his sterling character were those qualities of discipleship described by our Lord in the Beatitudes, and we know that this man whose joy was in the writing and preaching of great sermons was a living example of the precepts of that greatest of all sermons, preached by Christ on the Mount.

Doctor Hamilton, or "Ham" as we affectionately called him, was a pulpit giant, described by a former editor of *The Christian Century*, Doctor Charles Clayton Morrison, as one of the "six topmost representatives of the American pulpit." His sermons were Biblically sound, theologically responsible, passionately devoted to the truth, and typically Methodist. While his colleagues recognized his greatness, "Ham" was apparently unconscious of it. As Doctor Morrison stated it, "His spirit was unmarked by the slightest touch of professionalism."

Always abreast of contemporary theology and steeped in the disciplined memorization of the Biblical text which served as the foundation of his faith and ministry, his mind became the crucible in which was produced a dynamically relevant gospel which fed the hunger of a confused world.

Statements made by his contemporaries testify to his greatness. Norman Vincent Peale called him "one of the greatest preachers who ever gave expression to the gospel in this country," adding, "I do not know that he had any peers at all." Daniel Day Walker said, ". . . he was my generation's Harry Emerson Fosdick—the greatest of American preachers in this day." His bishop at the time of his death, Bishop James W. Henley, stated, "He stood among us like a giant . . . he stood for the things we all treasure most and we wanted to reach up to touch his hand." His publisher, Doctor Frank S. Mead, expressed the feeling of all of Hamilton's friends when he said, "He leaves a great open space against my sky that none can ever fill."

J. Wallace Hamilton was born near Pembroke, Ontario, Canada, the son of John and Elizabeth Anne Hamilton, on May 4, 1900. He was the son of a farmer and his allusions to his youth and the beauty of the earth spoke of his closeness to the soil.

"The Parish Visitor," official publication of Pasadena Community Church, describes his boyhood and its significance in the ministry of Doctor Hamilton: "J. Wallace Hamilton's listeners were touched by the story of his boyish revolt against his father. Only 15, he enlisted in an ambulance corps in the first World War. His worried father had him discharged. Hurt and angry, young Wallace went to town to live with an aunt and work in a munitions factory. Realization of his father's love came, in his own words: 'That is why the most tender thing you can say about God is "Father."' "The publication continued, "When at 18 he heard an evangelist in Pembroke 'liken God to a Father pursuing us, seeking us to love Him . . . ' the world may have lost a lawyer, an actor, or a singer (those were his ambitions), but it gained a great minister."

Doctor Hamilton attended and graduated from Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, in 1925 and was assigned as a supply pastor in Baileyton, Tennessee. He had a fine voice, and he and three other young men toured the South for a year singing for evangelistic meetings. In 1927 he came to Orlando and then to St. Petersburg where evangelistic services were being held in a tent. He was asked by a presiding elder to stay on and help establish a Methodist Church in St. Petersburg. He accepted this invitation and organized the Trinity Methodist Church, which he pastored for five years. During this time he also served the struggling Pasadena Community Church, having been appointed as pastor of the Pasadena congregation at a time marked by the collapse of the Florida real estate boom, the stock market crash of 1929, and the beginning of the great depression. (He was admitted on trial in 1929 and into full connection in 1930. Ordination as Deacon was conferred in 1929, and as Elder, in 1932.)

Working against these odds he built the Pasadena Community Church into one of the finest in the nation. His forty year pastorate there was the longest in the history of the Florida Conference, and one of the most lengthy in the history of American Methodism. The congregation at Pasadena, which grew from 34 in 1929 to 3,419 in 1968, now passes the 3,500 mark. Nationally

known for its unique "drive-in" parking lot, Doctor Hamilton's congregations ranged from 5,000 to 11,000 with the 18 acre parking lot often containing 3,000 cars.

Dr. Hamilton was married June 24, 1930 to Florence Newlan of Ocala, Florida. This union was blessed by three children: John W. Hamilton (a St. Petersburg attorney), James R. Hamilton (a graduate student at the University of Texas), and Joan Elizabeth Hamilton (a librarian of rare books at Tulane University).

In 1940 he received the honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree from Florida Southern College. During that same year he became an American citizen.

He is the author of five well-known books of sermons: *Ride the Wild Horses*, *Horns and Halos in Human Nature*, *Who Goes There?*, *The Thunder of Bare Feet*, *Serendipity*; and he had completed a sixth book, *Where Now Is Thy God*, which has just been published—and was working on a seventh.

He was featured on The Methodist Series of The Protestant Hour January 28, 1968 through April 14, 1968. His radio sermons were published under the title, "Overwhelmed?"

For thirty years the Pasadena Church released their minister for four months each year for special speaking engagements. He preached in many leading churches in America and Canada, including Timothy Eaton United Church of Toronto; Riverside Church in New York; Duke Chapel; First Methodist of Pasadena, California; Lake Chautauqua; the Chicago Sunday Evening Club; and Ocean City, Ocean Grove, New Jersey. He spoke at Lake Junaluska on many occasions and was the platform speaker at forty-three Annual Conferences in the nation from California to New York. He was special speaker at General Conference at Pittsburgh and at Jurisdictional Conference, to which he was elected as a delegate three times.

He was teamed with Doctor Paul Tillich in a Vanderbilt Convocation, delivered the English Lectures at Andover Newton and the Quillian Lectures at Emory University.

Dr. Hamilton was the recipient of the Freedom Award for magazine writing and was given the Civitan Award for "Citizen of the year."

Doctor Hamilton died October 7 in Orlando after suffering a heart attack October 2 at Leesburg, where he was speaking to the annual Pastor's School.

Funeral services were conducted at Pasadena Community Church October 10, 1968, led by Bishop James W. Henley, Bishop Edward J. Pendergrass, Doctor Joe A. Tolle, and the Reverend Mr. Thomas Kelsey. Attended by 1,700 persons, music at the funeral included favorite hymns and songs of the deceased, including "I Walked Today Where Jesus Walked," "The Lord's Prayer," and "O God Our Help in Ages Past." He is buried in Memorial Park Cemetery in St. Petersburg.

At the time of his death, Doctor Hamilton was preparing a series of sermons on the Lord's Prayer, planning to use them in the Spring of 1969, concluding the series on Easter. This concluding sermon was to be entitled "Forever." The great truth of eternity which he so desired to express, he is now experiencing in the presence of a Lord to whom his life was dedicated in faithful service.

We praise and thank God for the life of Henry Love Kinnard, Jr. His tremendous faith gave a great joy in living and made him unafraid to die. His enthusiasm for life made fellowship with him a treasured time.

He chose to live life at its fullest. Although his illness came quickly, he was fully aware of the consequences. He did not sit in a corner, complain

and ask, "Why me, Lord?" He had insights that challenged us, a depth of understanding that made us feel comfortable with him. He was sensitive to the needs of other people. Wherever he served there are people who testify, "My life is different because of Henry Kinnard."

Henry had strong convictions of what he thought and felt was right. There was a wholesome stubbornness about him that made him stand up to be counted for what he believed right. He loved his church and his country.

We thank God for the blessings that have come to us through the life of His steward and our friend. His life shows us it isn't how long but how well you live, not the quantity but the quality of the days that really counts. He had a full life even though he did not live the three-score and ten. There was a quality of life about him that is not achieved by some who live to a ripe old age.

There is a sadness in our hearts over the loss of this our loved one and friend. But our heartache is not one of grief, bitterness, anxiety or regret. We wish he could have lived longer, but we are grateful for the years he lived and shared with. There is no defeat in this. There is only victory. There is no death—only life; no despair—only hope; no regrets—only love and the joy of having lived fully in God's will and compassionate love. Sometimes we wonder "why?" But then we ask, "what?" What can we do to perpetuate his memory and live in a way that would make him as grateful for us as we were for him?

His deep faith in God, tremendous zest for living, his strong convictions and sensitivity for our needs certainly made his life rich and full. Even though it was short, as we count time, his influence has made an indelible mark on our lives.

Henry Love Kinnard, Jr. was born July 23, 1925, in Springhill, Tennessee. One June 19, 1947, he married Sarah Jean Tipps of Tullahoma, Tennessee. From this marriage came Gloria Jean, Linda Faye, and Patricia Ann. He was a graduate of Florida Southern College and Candler School of Theology, Emory University. He joined the Conference in 1952. He served as an enlisted man in the Navy during World War II, and after entering the ministry was a Chaplain in the Naval Reserve. He served the Trinity Church in Plant City; First Zephyrhills; and The Centenary Church, Quincy. He died October 11, 1968. Funeral services were held at Centenary United Methodist Church in Quincy, Florida, on October 14, 1968, with Bishop James W. Henley and Dr. Ford R. Philpot officiating, assisted by William W. Roughton, W. Harold Miller, Clark Thompson, and Trent Howell. His body was laid to rest in Tullahoma, Tennessee, on October 15.

DONALD R. CROCKER

Donald R. Crocker, son of the Reverend Roy Crocker and Helena Rose-yeer Crocker, was born, May 11, 1912 at Esmond, Illinois. He died at Ft. Lauderdale April 16, 1969 following a brief illness. The funeral service was conducted by his District Superintendent, Dr. Lewis N. Head with the Memorial message being delivered by his life-long friend, Dr. Kermit Long, Associate Secretary of the General Board of Evangelism. Assisting in the service were other long time friends; Dr. Wayne Leighty, of the staff of the General Board of Evangelism; Dr. J. Leatherman, pastor of Grace United Methodist Church, Des Moines, Iowa and Dr. Russell Koenig, Methodist serving in the Northern Illinois Conference. These colleagues of the ministry all came from great distances to pay their last respects to one whom they admired and with whom they had worked during their years in the ministry.

Dr. Crocker was married to Miss Geraldine (Gerry) Shuman, on December 25, 1933 at the Winnebago Street Methodist, Rockford, Illinois, where he was serving as pastor. He was at that time a student at Garrett Theological Seminary from which he graduated in 1937. Two children were born to Don and Gerry: David Allen of Ft. Collins, Colorado and John Lawrence

of Cambridge, Massachusetts. These sons, the widow and a brother, Dr. Robert Crocker, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of DeKalb, Illinois, survive.

Dr. Crocker was admitted on trial in the Rock River Conference in 1936 and into full connection in 1938. His appointments in that Conference included: Dolton, Naperville, Oak Park and Cuyler Avenue. In 1948 he transferred to the Illinois Conference as pastor of First church, Champaign, the University Church with over 4000 members. From there, he moved to Kenmore, the largest church in the Genesee Conference. From there he transferred to First Church, Carbondale in the Southern Illinois Conference. Following First Church, Carbondale, he moved to First Church, Mt. Vernon, thus serving the four largest churches in each of four conferences. Last December he was received by transfer into the Florida Conference and was appointed to Coral Springs, West Palm Beach District, to organize a new church. With no organization, nor even a group of people meeting for church services, he began the work with nothing but a tract of land, a great love for the church, and a passion for souls. So thorough and dedicated was his work among the people of this new community that within five weeks he had an earnest group of people meeting in the back room of a restaurant for services, and on Easter Sunday he and the District Superintendent officially organized the newest United Methodist Church of the Florida Conference with 24 charter members. Dr. Crocker was ill and conducted the service while under heavy medication and with a high temperature. His condition gradually worsened and Thursday he was admitted to the hospital, passing away the following Thursday. Thus the organizing service of the new church proved to be his last official service and act in the Ministry of the church, which he loved so much and to which he had given his life.

Many letters from all over the country have been received paying tribute and respect to this "man of God." Perhaps no minister in the United Methodist Church has seen any more young people enter the service of the church under his ministry as has this man. For 20 years he was Dean of Youth Assemblies at both Lake Geneva in Wisconsin and East Bay, Bloomington, Illinois. Here he was the Vesper speaker for this 20 year period and literally scores of young people were led, by him, into full time Christian service, including pastors, directors of Christian education and missionaries. One writes: "His spirit was filled, and helped to fulfill countless lives. His courage and his steadfastness have been a source of profound inspiration and grace to all those fortunate to have known and loved him as he loved them." Another who knew him intimately for many years writes: "Donald Crocker was first of all a preacher. He brought to his profession unusual talents and the gift of hard work and deep devotion. He was deeply concerned about the evils extant in our world and conscientiously and steadily sought to establish those things that make for peace and arrayed himself against such evils as racial prejudice and every form of exploitation of man and nations. His was a life that was fruitful and rewarding to all who knew him." Those of us in the Florida Conference did not get to know him well since we had not even had the opportunity of having a Conference session where he could be introduced. But, those who did come into contact with him are unanimous in saying how good it was that he came our way, even for such a brief time. The Charter members of the new church at Coral Springs feel that they not only lost a beloved Pastor, but a life-time friend, for he seemed to have lived a life time among them. Inspired by his leadership and spirit displayed during the brief 4 months he walked among them, they are determined to carry on and make the church which he began one of the great churches in the Florida Conference. This determination and devotion is shown in the fact that a few days ago they voted unanimously to name the new church in Coral Springs, the "Crocker Memorial United Methodist Church" in honor and in memory of the founding pastor.

Since the church was organized in the Victorious service of Easter day, not to the memory of a dead Christ but as a witness to a risen Saviour and Lord and since this triumphant service was the last official act of Donald R. Crocker we can only say,

"WHAT A VICTORIOUS END TO A MOST SUCCESSFUL MINISTRY!"

LOUIS E. STRAUB

Louis Ernst Straub, son of George and Amelia Hagen Straub, was born March 3, 1907, and died June 12, 1968, after an extended illness. He was married to Martha Elser on June 15, 1940, at Penbrook, Pennsylvania. Mrs. Straub and three children survive him. The children are: Matthew, at home; Priscilla (Mrs. Paul) Kochis, of Tallahassee, Fla., and Holly, Converse College, Spartanburg, S. C.

The Rev. Mr. Straub was granted Quarterly Conference license to preach in the Salem Church, United Brethren in Christ, Baltimore, Maryland in 1931. He received his Annual Conference license in 1934 at Hagerstown, Maryland. He was ordained at Hanover, in the Pennsylvania Conference, (U. B.) in 1941.

Mr. Straub was a man of brilliant mind. He was valedictorian of his class in Lebanon Valley College, Annville, Penna. and completed his studies at United Theological Seminary, Dayton, Ohio, with highest honors. However, he was a person of sincere humility, and never referred to his scholastic record in any way.

His record of service includes West Fairview and Mont Alto, Pennsylvania. He served as pastor at Second E. U. B. Church, York, Pennsylvania, 1949-57. He transferred to the Florida Conference (EUB) in 1958. He led in the organization of the St. Andrews congregation in Winter Park, and in the construction of their house of worship. Circumstances beyond his control led to his leaving the active ministry in 1961. He taught in the public schools of Orlando until his final illness. He remained a gifted and faithful teacher in the Church School at St. Andrews as long as he was physically able.

"Louie," as his fellow-pastors called him, was a faithful pastor, a wise counselor, and careful in all his work for God.

Funeral services were held in St. Andrews Church on June 15, 1968 by his pastor, the Rev. Troy R. Brady. Interment was in "The Palms," Winter Park.

One of God's good men, George Morris Glazier, entered into his reward on September 24, 1968 at Bradenton, Florida and interment was made in the Manasota Memorial Park in Oneco, between Bradenton and Sarasota, with services conducted by the Reverend David J. I shall always consider my friendship with him an outstanding experience of my life. He was a devoted Christian, who lived his life as an honest, true, gentleman."

He was at all times self-effacing and humble; and he radiated a spiritual quality that testified to the great depths of his devotion. Truly, he now wears "The crown of righteousness" so confidently described by Paul.

HENRY CARTER HARDIN

Henry Carter Hardin, son of Joe Neely and Rhoda Anna Hardin, was born in Chester County, South Carolina, on July 24, 1887. His parents were devout members and workers in the Capers Chapel Methodist Church. Two of his brothers were Methodist ministers and one sister married a Methodist minister. One of his brothers was Dr. Smith Hardin, a member of the Florida Conference for more than fifty years.

He attended public schools in South Carolina and in Florida. He was a student at Wofford College, and graduated at Southern College at Palm Harbor in 1910. He later studied at Vanderbilt University for a year.

In 1911 he was admitted on trial in the Florida Conference and in the years following served as pastor at these places: Dania-Pompano Circuit, Perry, Sarasota, Winter Haven, Webster-Groveland-Clermont Circuit, Winter Garden, Bartow, Bradenton, Riverside: Miami, Tampa Heights, Seminole Heights, Plant City and Saint Augustine: 1st Church. During World War I, he served as a chaplain. For six years he was District Superintendent of the Gainesville District. At Florida Southern College, Dr. Carter Hardin's name is on the Honor Walk. He was a trustee of the college for several years and worked on a financial campaign for the college after his retirement. Florida Southern granted him the Doctor of Divinity degree.

Carter Hardin and Miss Leila A. Walker, of Camilla, Georgia, were married while he was pastor at Perry, Florida, in 1914, and she was a partner in all his work. They had two children, India Clare (Mrs. Hamilton High), of Orange, Texas, and Dr. Henry Carter Hardin, Jr., of Miami. In 1956 Dr. Hardin retired from the pastorate, for health reasons. He and Mrs. Hardin made their home in Lakeland for ten years, until her death. After that, he lived with his son and then with his daughter and was with the latter when he died on September 22nd, 1968.

For forty-five and a half years, Carter Hardin was a warm-hearted, enthusiastic pastor and preacher of the Gospel in the Florida Conference. He was a tireless worker, and the churches he served and led grew in spiritual life and membership. He gave support to every phase of the church work. He believed in mission specials above the regular budget for benevolences, and was one of the first pastors to advocate the "Four Lanes" of giving to missions; he gave full support to it in all his pastorates. During his long ministry, Dr. Hardin served on many committees and boards of the conference. His last position was chairman of the Conference Historical Society. Also, he was elected as a delegate one or more times to Jurisdictional Conference.

Carter Hardin lived life to the limit. There were no dull moments when he was around. He made many friends who remained close friends as long as he lived. His public prayers and testimonies were a blessing and inspiration to those who heard them. His friends will miss his hearty "Amen" and "Praise the Lord." He served Christ and the church faithfully and now has gone to receive the reward of eternal life from his Master.

Funeral services for Dr. Hardin were held at the Wells Funeral Home in Plant City, Florida, and interment was in the Oak Lawn Cemetery there. These services were conducted by his nephew, the Reverend Harvey M. Hardin, assisted by the Reverend Don A. Walsh, his former pastor, and by the Reverend Dan M. Gill, of First Church, Plant City. Benedictions at the services were pronounced by two of his close friends and fellow pastors of many years, Dr. Paul A. Fletcher and Dr. R. Ira Barnett.

HARVEY M. HARDIN

JOSEPH FRANCIS BELL

Early in the morning of Friday, December 20th, 1968, heaven's chariot swept low and one of Christ's ambassadors, JOSEPH FRANCIS BELL, stepped in to be forever with his Lord. He had, during all his life of 100+ years, been a diligent and faithful servant of Christ and the Methodist Church.

He was born in Alachua County, Florida, on February 5, 1868 a son of Francis Adams Bell and Charlotte Tillman Bell. At the age of 8, he had a religious experience described by him as "falling in love with the Divine Being," and it remained a powerful influence in his life ever after. In 1887, at the age of 19, he accepted God's "call" to preach. On November 12th of that same year, he was granted a License to Preach, and a few weeks later (December 14) the Florida Annual Conference admitted him as a member On Trial.

His first appointment was as Assistant Preacher to the only Methodist Church in Tampa (now First Church), and included mission work in Hyde Park, Ybor City, and North Tampa.

In 1889 he went to Emory College at Oxford, Georgia where he graduated in 1893. He returned to Florida and on December 25, 1894, married his boyhood sweetheart, Miss Orpha May Teeter, who was his devoted wife and loyal helper in the ministry for forty-four years. They had five children: Warren Chandler, Wilbur Fisk, Kenneth Rush, Charlotte Lois, and Francis Emory.

Dr. Bell served the churches of Florida well at the turn of this century, when many of them were just getting started. His appointments covered the length and breadth of the state. He retired in 1939 after his wife had passed away in February of that year.

During his lifetime Dr. Bell earned several distinctions and honors. He was the first minister to Ybor City in Tampa. Twice he was appointed a Presiding Elder; first of the Tampa District and then of the Palatka District. While he was serving First Church in Lakeland, fire destroyed The Methodist College at Sutherland. Dr. Bell was one of the leading figures instrumental in bringing the College to Lakeland—which has now become the Florida Methodist headquarters. In 1935 Florida Southern College conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. The citation for the Degree mentioned Dr. Bell as: "Minister of The Gospel," "Friend of the Young," and "Community Builder." During his retirement (in 1956) while living in Gainesville, First Church built an Education Building which was named in his honor.

Dr. Bell received numerous eloquent tributes of praise for himself and his work. When he retired in 1939 the Board of Stewards of the Monticello Church wrote (in part): "The marked success he has had in the ministry assures us that with his keen mind, his pleasant personality, and his fine education he would have made an equally marked success in any line of secular business in which he might have embarked. . . . Desire of distinction, hunger for fame, love of glory, per se, however, have not been the impelling force in his life. He desires to be remembered as a simple and sincere man and live in the esteem and memory of posterity. . . . A more loveable character has never served this church and we are pleased to believe that a more loveable character has never served any other church."

In 1952 Dr. John Branscomb, who had just been made a Bishop, wrote Dr. Bell: "You are one of the best friends I have ever had. Your dear life has meant more to me than I can tell you. . . . No man has helped me more than you. I thank God for you." Later Bishop Branscomb publicly referred to him as "The saint of the Florida Conference."

On June 5, 1962, on the Seventy-Fifth Anniversary of Dr. Bell's entry into the Methodist ministry, the Florida Annual Conference presented him with a scroll honoring his years of service to the church. The citation closed with this tribute: "A Christian whose sterling integrity has compelled confidence and won admiration. Conscientious in discharge of duty, always dependable under responsibility. A man of Faith—Faith in God

that was contagious, a faith in man that inspired them to do their best. A preacher with a message that was clear, sound, positive, helpful. God's Nobleman. A gentleman of the first order."

Finally, I would like to add my own personal word. It was my privilege to know him intimately during several years while in Gainesville. He was a dear friend, counselor, and helper. He was consecrated, sincere, jovial, cooperative, and wise. I was impressed with his deep personal faith in God and his implicit trust that God would care for us in life and in death. Thus he faced life with optimism and death with anticipation. Death would mean to him reunion with God and his loved ones. In the light of this, let me venture to say that his death five days before Christmas has a certain sentimental significance. At this season we talk about going home for Christmas, or having our children home for Christmas. I think there is joy in heaven today because Joseph Bell is Home for Christmas!

Marylou Terral Jeans has written these appropriate words:

. . . One who loves and is loved never dies;
He lives forever in the mind and heart,
And who can say how high the spirit flies
When life's cocoon allows it to depart?
This much I know: The one we loved is free,
And Home for Christmas, as he wished to be.

FRED LEE MARTIN, JR.

Fred L. Martin came to the Florida Annual Conference in January, 1926 on temporary assignment. He lived always with the realization that his appointment in this world was a transient one. His love of the Florida Conference and of the people of the Florida churches was evidenced in his 42 years of effective service. He received his final appointment in his heavenly Father's Kingdom on Easter Day, April 6, 1969.

Fred was born in Talladega, Alabama on March 9, 1903; however, he spent most of his early years in Gulfport, Mississippi. He was licensed to preach at the First Methodist Church of Gulfport, Miss. He attended Millsaps College and was graduated from Asbury College in 1925. While he was attending Asbury he met and became engaged to Frieda Victoria Petty. Fred and Frieda were married in Clinton, North Carolina on November 24, 1926 and they established their home in the parsonage at Melrose, Fla. The churches he served were the only rivals for his affection and he held that in careful balance.

Fred was survived by his wife and their three children, Murray Anthony of Atlanta, Georgia, David Macy of Smyrna, Georgia, and Mrs. Richard E. Wilson (Jocelyn) of Melbourne, Florida; five grandchildren, Deborah, Richard, Jr., and Mary Victoria Wilson, Michelle and Gabrielle Martin.

Upon retirement from the Florida Conference, Fred accepted assignment in the First United Methodist Church of Colorado Springs, Colo. as the Minister of Evangelism. Fred served there ten months of active and vigorous service. Just prior to his death he had received a large class of new members numbering over 100. He participated in Worship Services on Palm Sunday and received with the Pastor his latest class for membership. The week previous to Holy Week he had held services at the United Methodist Church of Matheson, Colo.

Memorial services were conducted Wednesday, April 9, in Colorado Springs by the Rev. Dr. Lawrence L. Lacour. Bishop James W. Henley was assisted by Dr. John James Rooks, Rev. Mr. Leo King, Rev. Mr. John Sanderson in Memorial Services held in Beymer Memorial United Methodist church in Winter Haven, Florida on April 13, 1969.

A Service of Committal was held at the Lakeside in that lovely setting in Winter Haven where Fred had watched almost every stone of the beautiful church put in its place. The Memorial Service was a testimony of the faithful witness of the life of Fred L. Martin, Jr. Fred had long held a

great affection for the Oratorio of Handel's *Messiah*. He often suggested that he wanted The Hallelujah Chorus to be sung as a witness to faith at his memorial services. It was included in both the service in Colorado Springs and in Winter Haven. We sang of the faith which he lived, in which he died as faithful servant and in which he now lives with our Heavenly Father.

After serving for a few years as a Supply Pastor, he was admitted on trial into the Florida Annual Conference in 1915. He was received into full connection in 1918, ordained a deacon in 1918, and an Elder in 1920.

He served pastorates at Havana, Greensboro, Bronson, Cocoa, Live Oak, Leesburg, Nebraska Avenue in Tampa, Plant City, Sanford, Clearwater, Ocala, Broadway of Orlando, and also as district superintendent of the Tallahassee and Orlando Districts.

The Bishops under whom he served had a great appreciation of him. Bishop Moore called him an Abraham Lincoln type of a man who presented a situation just as it was without any coloring whatsoever. Bishop Short frequently called on him to offer prayer in his cabinet meetings. After leaving the Florida area, he told someone that he had wished for Paul Fletcher to pray for him.

Paul retired in 1952. In his statement to the Conference at that time, he said something like this: "If I had my life to live over again, I would join the Methodist Church and the Florida Conference, and marry the same wife."

On his retirement, he went to live in Plant City, where he had been the pastor at one time. Only one house separated him from his daughter, Mrs. Ruby House. There, with his daughter and her family near at hand, and among friends made in other years, he spent the remainder of his life.

I have known Paul since we met at old Southern College in 1910. We have been very close friends all these intervening years. I have known many great and good men, but I have never known anyone who surpassed his honor and integrity.

The funeral was held in the First United Methodist Church in Plant City, with his pastor, the Rev. Dan Gill, in charge, being assisted by the Rev. R. C. Holmes, the Rev. Robert C. Boggs, and the Rev. J. H. Daniel. His body was laid to rest in the beautiful Oak Lawn cemetery.

ERNEST BLISS LUTTRELL

The Rev. Ernest Bliss Luttrell was born February 7, 1902 in Winchester, Virginia and died June 18, 1968 in Belle Glade, Florida. Brother Ernie, as he was affectionately known, had just been released from the hospital in Ocala, Florida, where he had been taken as a result of a heart ailment in late May. The funeral service was conducted in the Reddick Methodist Church, June 21, 1968, by Rev. John M. Sikes, District Superintendent of the Gainesville District; Rev. Henry Galloway, Pastor of the Belle Glade Methodist Church, and Rev. Logan Whalen, Pastor of the Reddick Methodist Church. Brother Ernie had just retired at the 1968 Annual Conference as pastor of the Reddick Methodist Church. Interment was in Millwood Cemetery near Reddick along side of his wife, Charlotte, who had preceded him in death by two years.

He is survived by a stepdaughter, Mrs. Margaret Blakesley of Towson, Maryland and two brothers, Rev. Wilbur O. Luttrell of Winchester, Virginia and Lee W. Luttrell of St. Petersburg, Florida and a sister, Mrs. Netta Bartosh of Los Angeles, California.

Brother Ernie was reared in a Christian home. He attended Shenandoah College in Virginia, majoring in dramatics. He was a salesman first, last and always. He was living in Orlando in the early 40's when his life was profoundly influenced and drawn to Christ and the Church under the ministry of the late Bishop John W. Branscomb, who at that time was pastor of First Methodist Church of Orlando. He and Mrs. Luttrell united with the Church and became workers in it. In the mid '40's, he and Mrs. Luttrell moved to Lake City, where he had his own real estate business. While a member of First Methodist Church of Lake City he gave devoted leadership as lay leader of the Church and demonstrated outstanding civic leadership in serving the community. It was here he yielded to the call

to the ministry which he had known from his youth, was licensed to preach and became an approved supply pastor. He served the Columbia Charge, a circuit of four churches, for eight years. In 1961 he organized and became the pastor of Wesley Memorial Church in Lake City, and led this congregation in building its first unit. In 1964 he became the pastor of the Reddick Charge, serving for four years. It was at the end of the fourth year when the announcement of his marriage to Mrs. Ruth Wedgeworth of Belle Glade in late May had already been announced and while he was anticipating retirement at the session of the Annual Conference that he became ill and never fully recovered. His death came in mid-June.

Many honors came to him as a pastor. Among these was the award in 1958 as the Rural Pastor of the Year in Florida by the PROGRESSIVE FARMER magazine and the award in 1968 as the Approved Supply Pastor of the Year by the Florida Annual Conference. This was the first time this latter award had been given by the Annual Conference.

Brother Ernie was one of those rare gems from whose personality came a genuineness that evoked a response of love and appreciation from everyone. Little children loved him, youth responded to his leadership, and adults were drawn to his ministry. Though he was not professionally prepared as a minister, he possessed natural graces and gifts that made him effective in his preaching and a natural in pastoral care and responsibilities. Men listened when he spoke and were drawn in affection to the Christ whom he always endeavored to lift. He was constantly in demand for evangelistic services, youth meetings and special occasions in civic and school activities. His life reflected the spirit of God in a most extraordinary manner.

His presence is missed. We are saddened and lonely, but heaven is enriched and we follow in his train, faithfully and hopefully to give our witness for Christ as effectively as he did.

ALBERT F. EGGLESTON

Albert F. Eggleston was a faithful and effective churchman, a good minister of Jesus Christ. His good life and his many accomplishments inspires one to say of him: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant." His life was one of strong faith and deep trust in God. He was always interested in people, and he preached to win people to Christ. He had strong convictions concerning Christian conduct, and always wanted events to be done properly.

He was born December 13, 1889, at Hamlin, West Virginia. Mrs. Eggleston preceded him into the Father House, having passed away September 27, 1953. Ordained an Elder in 1924, he was active in the ministry, serving in Kentucky from 1924-1934; and, in West Virginia 1934-1950. He transferred to the Florida Conference in 1950, serving the churches at Coleman, Chiefland, and as the Chaplain at the Florida State Prison at Raiford, retiring in 1959.

After a short while in West Virginia, after his retirement, he returned to Florida again, and resided at Melrose, in 1963. Early in January, 1968, he returned to West Virginia for an eye operation. A serious illness ensued and he passed away in Huntington, West Virginia on January 24, 1969.

Because of his sincere interest in the prisoners at Raiford, while he was the chaplain, one of the men wrote this in tribute to him:

Our chaplain is a man of God
To this we will all agree!
Throughout his entire lifetime,
He's preached: "Faith is the Victory!"

He lives the Bible day by day,
 In his own simple, Christian way;
 He is the epitome of true Christianity.
 To know this servant of the King,
 Is to all a joy and a pride;
 And after just one short chat with him,
 One feels touched deep down inside.

He never lectures, nor berates,
 But teaches God's love predominates;
 This to my grave with me will go.

He kept a keen interest in the Ministers and the events of the Churches of the Conference. He always wanted to see progress, and labored with his own hands to build and improve the Church. During his long illness his strength of spirit prevailed many times over the infirmity of the body, and to the end he was determined to rise up and serve. His life was true devotion to the will of God.

Servant of God, well done!
 Thy glorious warfare's past;
 The battle's fought, the race is won,
 And thou art crowned at last."

The funeral service was conducted at the First United Methodist Church Barboursville, West Virginia, January 26, with the Rev. W. M. Byrd and the Rev. John B. F. Yoak, his former District Superintendent, officiating. Burial was in Ridgeland Memorial Park, Huntington, West Virginia.

It was while in this capacity that the call to the Saviour's service came, which he unreservedly answered. . . . He was licensed to preach in Hyde Park Methodist Church in Tampa. He was ordained an Elder in 1923."

During the fifteen years of Brother Gardner's active ministry, he and Mrs. Gardner served the following appointments: Waldo-Melrose, Webster-Centerhill, Missionary to the Everglades, Palatka-Carr Street, Pompano, Key West-Fleming Street, High Springs, St. Petersburg-Central, Port Tampa-Interbay, Interbay, Zolfo Springs, New Port Richey, Coleman, and Riverview. He retired on account of ill health in 1938.

Brother Gardner died on November 22, 1954, and several years later, on Oct. 12, 1957, Mrs. Gardner married Mr. Frank Selig. The wedding took place in the Hyde Park Methodist Church, Tampa, with Dr. Laurie G.

Ray, officiating. She and Mr. Selig enjoyed a happy marriage until her death on Nov. 1, 1968, only two days before her 77th birthday.

The funeral service was conducted by the Reverend Caxton Doggett, pastor of the Hyde Park United Methodist Church, on November 4, 1968, in Tampa.

Dr. Turner served as General Secretary of the Tampa Y.M.C.A. for a number of years, but in 1924, he joined the Florida Annual Conference and began taking appointments, which moved them from place to place. Soon his wife learned what it meant to itinerate, and she became a gracious parsonage wife. One thing about living in a parsonage concerned her greatly, that was to leave the parsonage clean and orderly after she left it for the preacher family to follow. Dr. and Mrs. Turner served at Riverside Park, Jacksonville; First Church, Tampa; and First Church, Orlando. Their last appointment was to the Jacksonville District. There she came to know the pastors and their families more intimately. She was always glad to see them and she asked about members of the families.

Six children came to bless the home of Dr. and Mrs. Turner, two of them passing on as little ones. Four of the children survive Mrs. Turner, namely: Mrs. George (Lois) Burke, Tampa; Miss Kathleen Turner, Tampa; Dr. A. Fred Turner, Jr., Orlando; and Mrs. C. D. (Frances) Price, Winter Park. Each of these children has attained character and distinction in their field of work. All of them are Members of the Methodist church and have served in various capacities. Truly they were nurtured at their mother's knee and are fulfilling her cherished dreams for them. Six grandchildren and two great grandchildren have every reason to rejoice in their heritage. "To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die."

Mrs. Annie Turner was never a leader, but chose rather to live in the background and support others. She was primarily a mother and a companion to her husband. Something of what she meant to him can be gathered from lines written by him and published in an Orlando paper. "She is a tower of strength and help to me in my ministry. She makes friends readily and is capable of doing most any task among the women of the church."

Though content to live and move and have her being in the background of things, she was a most attractive, petite, and dainty little lady, who fitted into every situation with poise and dignity. She gave a warm welcome to everyone who came to the parsonage. She was thoughtful, kind, and always avoided giving offense to anyone. She simply would not speak ill of anyone. She was usually cheerful and imparted hope to others. She came to love her husband's work, and gloried in the honors which came to him, both in the pastorate and in the councils of the conference. She got to where she loved going to Annual Conference. After his retirement and while serving as the pastor of the Lakewood Methodist Church in Jacksonville, she had the misfortune to break her hip. But when Conference time came she insisted on going even though she had to have a wheel-chair to get around. She loved the Methodist Brotherhood. Indicative of the warmth of her feeling, I remember calling on her in the Nursing Home shortly after being moved back from the hospital. She had suffered a stroke, and we did not know how much of a comeback she would make. The first real sign which she gave of getting better was when she took her hand out from under the cover and extended it to me for a hand-shake.

After the death of her husband in 1956, Mrs. Turner and Kathleen moved from Jacksonville to Tampa. They shared a beautiful life together, learning Christ's Way and maturing in Christian love. They were inseparable, except when Kathleen had to be away doing her teaching. They each did for the other. On the back page of her Bible was a clipping with these lines on it:

"Teach me to profit by the suffering that comes to me
 Help me to use it that it may mellow me—
 not harden nor embitter me;
 that it may make me patient, not irritable;
 that it may make me broad in my forgiveness;
 kindly sympathetic, and be helpful."

She became what she aspired to. Mrs. Annie Turner was first, last and always a Mother. The Church was important but her family was even more important. She was regular in her worship at the church and always loyal to it. She was a lovely Christian and gave a constant witness.

Funeral Services for Mrs. Annie Turner were conducted in the sanctuary of the new First United Methodist Church of Tampa on January 31, 1969. The Rev. Thomas Glenn Mitchell, pastor, presided. The Rev. Robert C. Boggs, District Superintendent, gave the prayer; and Dr. J. Withers Blake delivered the eulogy and offered Words of Comfort. She was tenderly laid to rest in Myrtle Hill Memorial Park beside her beloved husband and the two children lost in infancy.

Ida Mae Gates Rivers, the conscientious and devoted wife of Rev. Eddie J. Rivers, was born in Birmingham, Alabama.

She came, in 1953, to Arcadia, Florida, the vibrant helpmeet of her husband who served as Pastor of the Pleasant Hill Methodist Church in this community, having the privilege of bringing into Methodism an ardent Baptist Church member who now accepted the challenge of being the wife of a Methodist minister.

In 1956, she came with him to the pastorate of Stewart Memorial Methodist Church now the United Methodist Church of Daytona Beach, Florida.

For six full and active years she became involved with the Daytona Beach community in intimate and fruitful encounters. In the Church itself she worked as counselor to the youth, member of the choir, leader in the Woman's Society of Christian Service and associated in the vitality of the outreach of the Church to civic and social organizations in the community.

During the two years of her illness she was the growing tower of spiritual strength interpreting the Christian faith in her cheerful attitude toward the illness which had overtaken her.

There was sadness at the memorial funeral service, but there was rich spiritual understanding as well, for though the life before us was cut short in its early maturing, she had lived it fully and beautifully. She had come to the parting with profound awareness and made preparation for her leaving, as "one who wraps the drapery of her couch about her and lies down to pleasant dreams." Violet Aldridge Carlton, wife of the Reverend Bascom W. Carlton, was born in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, January 11, 1920, where her father was serving as the Pastor of a Methodist Church. She was the younger daughter of the Reverend Wilfred G. Aldridge and Nellie Tubbs Aldridge. On March 11, 1969 she entered the life immortal from the hospital in Winter Park, Florida.

In 1938 Violet came to Florida with her parents and enrolled as a student at Florida Southern College. It was during her student years at Florida Southern that she met her future husband, Bascom W. Carlton, who was a student in the same institution preparing for the ministry. She participated actively in campus student activities and made an enviable record for herself academically and in student activities. She was voted most outstanding graduate of the class of 1941.

On August 20, 1942 Violet Aldridge and Bascom Carlton were united in marriage in the First Methodist Church, Hialeah, Florida, where her father

was the Pastor. Her husband was the Pastor at Interbay-Port Tampa, and so that Methodist parsonage became their first home.

Always she had time, energy and ability to invest in the things her church did as a servant of Christ and of people. For three years she was chosen and served with effectiveness as City Chairman for the Florida Chain of Missionary Assemblies in DeLand.

The year and a half of her illness was a time of Christian faith maturing ever more perfectly. Patience, courage, gentleness, cheerfulness and quiet determination were in her ways. PART VIII

HISTORICAL



LONG before the Pilgrims landed, there came to Florida another devout people seeking religious freedom. In June of 1564, French Huguenots established a colony at the mouth of the St. John's River. This colony, known as Ft. Caroline, was destroyed in September of 1565 by the Spanish. At the same time the city of St. Augustine was founded. From that date until 1821, when the United States took possession of Florida, it was closed to the work of the Protestant Church except during the years of English control 1763 to 1783.

Florida was purchased from Spain in 1819, but it was not until July 1821 that it was transferred into the hands of the United States. It is possible that William Hankins, the minister of St. Marys, Georgia, crossed over and preached in Florida as early as 1819 in Nassau and Duval Counties to Methodist families. It is also quite possible that John Triggs, who was appointed in 1821 to the "Lappahee" circuit, crossed over into Florida that year. The Mississippi Conference assigned Alexander Talley as a missionary to Pensacola, Mobile, Blakley, and the adjoining country in December 1821. In February 1822, the South Carolina Conference appointed Elijah Sinclair to St. Marys and Amelia Island.

John Slade, who has been called the "Father of Florida Methodism," was appointed as a Junior preacher with John Triggs to the Chattahoochee Mission in 1823. He located in 1830, but stayed active in Thomas County, Ga. working as a local Preacher. He was 55 when he was readmitted to the Florida Conference at its organizing session. The other men were in their 20's and 30's and since Slade was so much older than they were and had been in the beginning work, he was reverently called "Father Slade."

Methodism was taking root in the State of Florida in 1821 and 1822; by 1825 the work was so successful that a District called "Tallahassee"—named after the newly established capital of the Florida Territory—was created in the South Carolina Conference.

In 1830 the South Carolina Conference was divided, and the work in Florida became a part of the newly founded Georgia Conference. In 1844, at perhaps the most memorable General Conference since the Methodist Church was organized in 1784, the Florida Conference of the Methodist Church was created. The first Conference session was held in Tallahassee on February 6, 1845. This new Conference became a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the first General Conference after the Civil War, in 1866, it was decided to establish the South Georgia Conference, and all the work in Georgia was given up and the present boundaries of the Florida Conference were fixed.

The Methodist Episcopal Church started a Conference in Florida in 1873. This Conference because of racial differences was divided in 1886 into the Florida Conference and the St. Johns River Conference. The first Conference session of the St. Johns River Conference met in Jacksonville on January 25, 1886.

The Methodist Protestant Church organized a Florida Conference in 1889, but the work of this organization did not develop extensively.

In 1939, with unification, these different bodies were drawn to-

gether to establish the Florida Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

Since 1939, Florida has known fabulous growth. The Florida Annual Conference in 1939 was 51st in size according to its membership, in 1964 it was fifth, and in 1968 it had grown to 3rd place according to membership with other conferences.

In the thirty year period from 1939 to 1969, the number of preaching appointments had grown from 269 to 635. The number of full connection members of the Conference has increased from 291 to 725.

The unification of the former E.U.B. Conference and the former C.J. Florida Conference had taken place at the end of this period.

The first E.U.B. Church was organized in Tampa in 1895 by the Rev. I. W. Bearss, who had moved to Florida a year earlier from Missouri. This church and the other early work was placed under the care of the Tennessee Conference. In 1900 a Georgia Conference was organized, of which Florida was a part. In 1913 the name was changed to the Georgia Florida Conference.

In 1941 the churches in the Florida Conference were organized into a Conference under the supervision of the Home Mission and Church Erection Society. The work never became large, but as E.U.B. people came to Florida in the 50's and 60's, it was expanded until at the time of unification on September 5, 1968 (the first E.U.B. Conference to unite with a Methodist Conference) there were twenty-eight elders as members of the Conference with seventeen under appointment. It had twelve charges, a total property value of \$1,701,537.00 and a membership of \$3,543.

The Florida Conference (former C.J.) dates back to 1873; until 1886 it was a both negro and white Conference. When the St. John's River Conference came into being the Florida Conference of the M.E. Church continued to be a Conference for the Negro people. In 1921, because of the distance and expense of travel, the work was divided into two Conferences.

In 1952 these two Conferences were united. In 1969 there were 81 churches served by 52 pastors in full connection. The total membership at the 1968 session was 8,352.

At the 1968 Florida Annual Conference (S.E.J.) session, it was voted to merge the two Florida Conferences in 1969. On September 21, 1968 at a special session of the Florida Conference (former C.J.) it was also voted to merge; and thus the first item of business in 1969 was this merger.

PART IX

STANDING RULES OF THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

I. ORGANIZATION OF THE CONFERENCE

1. The following rules of procedure shall be observed to expedite the business of the Conference:
 - a. All reports and resolutions shall be typed for submission to the Annual Conference, and shall be submitted to the Secretary in duplicate.
 - b. No report or resolution shall be acted upon until it has been before the Conference 24 hours, and a copy has been furnished the Conference Secretary, except a resolution extending a vote of thanks. Publication of a report in the Conference Report Book shall be deemed to have fulfilled this requirement.
 - c. Any resolution not coming from an established board, commission, or committee, shall be referred to the Committee on Reference before discussion on the floor of the Conference.
 - d. Any report or resolution presented by a regular Committee or Board of the Conference, in accordance with the provisions above, shall be properly before the body of the Conference, when it is presented without a motion or a second.
 - e. A member of the Conference who wishes to be recognized by the Chairman for a question, point of order, or discussion of a motion, shall address the Chairman and wait for recognition. When he is recognized by the Chairman, he will give his name, whether he is a lay or clerical member; and, if a lay member, he will give the name of his local Church.
 - f. Debate and discussion of motions will be limited to three minutes per speech, and the speeches will alternate between those for and those against.
 - g. A member of the Conference will be permitted to speak only one time in behalf of, or in opposition to, any motion before the Conference with the following exception: if no one wishes to speak opposite to the preceding speech, a member who has spoken on the motion may speak one more time. It is understood that this rule shall not be construed to debar the maker of a motion from concluding the debate.
 - h. A motion to call for the previous question may be made at any time, if no one desires to speak. However, as long as there are those desiring to speak, a motion for the call of the previous question may not be made until there have been two speeches for and two speeches against the pending motion.
2. The Secretary shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference, assuming office on January 1 of the ensuing year, and shall be eligible to serve no more than two consecutive quadrennia. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.
 - a. The Secretary shall have such assistants as he may desire, elected by the Conference on his nomination.
 - b. The Secretary shall edit and publish the Conference Minutes.
 - c. He shall be the custodian of the books and archives of the Conference and shall annually report where they are kept. He shall cooperate with the Committee on Archives and History in the discharge of this responsibility and shall be an ex officio member of that Committee.
 - d. The Secretary shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Pensions, and of the Service Years Committee of that Board.
 - e. A committee on Journal shall be elected at the beginning of each annual session upon nomination of the Secretary, and shall consist of three members of the conference session. Such committee shall examine the daily journal, make any needed corrections, and report back to the next meeting, and the adoption of their report shall be the approval of the minutes.

3. The Conference Statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference, assuming office on January 1 of the ensuing year, and shall be eligible to serve no more than two consecutive quadrennia. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.

a. The Conference Statistician shall collect the statistics of the Conference, and shall edit the Statistical Tables in the annual Journal.

b. He shall employ such help as is necessary to do the work accurately and expeditiously, any expense to be paid by the Secretary out of the apportionment for "Minutes and Statistics."

c. The cabinet shall determine the date each year after which the Statistician shall accept no reports.

d. Fractions shall not be used in making statistical reports.

e. The Statistician shall see that every report made by a charge or a church agrees with the record of the Conference Treasurer.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall be elected by the Annual Conference and supervised by the Conference Commission on World Service as provided in the Discipline.

a. The Conference Treasurer shall make monthly distributions to the treasurers of the several Annual Conference boards and causes for all Conference work and to the treasurers of the several General Conference Boards and causes for all general work according to the percentage of the apportionments for general and conference work adopted by the Annual Conference. All amounts paid in on all causes beyond the apportioned amounts, other than the percentage for General World Service, shall be placed in the various Conference Reserve Funds at the end of each fiscal year, as stipulated by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

b. The treasurer shall procure from the Conference Statistician or from the district superintendents a report of the apportionments accepted by the several charges within the Conference and shall settle with those charges by that report. He shall have no power to waive or change this rule.

c. He shall regularly furnish each district superintendent a statement of the amounts of monies received by him for all causes from each pastoral charge within that district; each such statement to include all monies received from the closing of the Annual Conference to the date issued.

d. All special day funds shall be remitted through the Conference Treasurer.

e. The Conference Treasurer shall close his books for the year on the date approved by the World Service Commission and the Cabinet.

f. The Conference fiscal year shall be the calendar year.

II. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

1. The District Superintendents are a standing committee to nominate the officers, boards and committees of the Conference and to nominate persons to fill vacancies thereon, except as otherwise provided by the *Discipline*, or by these rules.

2. An appointment to the District Superintendency shall vacate membership in any Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee of the Conference, except Trustees, unless the General or Annual Conference provides otherwise.

3. Each District Superintendent shall, at the earliest possible date, file with the Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, with the Conference Treasurer, and with the Statistical Secretary an accurate statement of the amounts of apportionments accepted by the various Charge Conferences within his district.

III. BOARDS, STANDING COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

1. Each board or committee of the Conference shall cause to be printed in the Conference Journal an exact statement of the salaries and expenses paid on account of any person employed by the said board or committee.

2. Each board, committee or institution of the Conference shall make an exact annual report to the Conference of monies it has received and what disposition has been made of them, and each shall file annually with the Bishop and Cabinet and the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance a complete statement of its financial condition, showing all assets and liabilities.

3. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall contract with the Conference Treasurer, subject to the Conference, for his service and the manner in which he shall manage the funds of the Conference; shall take from him an indemnity bond in such amount as shall cover whatever amount may be deposited in the bank, and shall annually have his books and accounts audited by a certified public accountant, and print the report of the same.

4. Unless otherwise ordered by the Conference, the Commission on World Service and Finance shall distribute the apportionments to the districts on a basis agreed upon with the cabinet.

5. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine annually what amount shall be necessary to print and publish the Minutes and shall assess the same upon the Conference along with the other apportionments.

6. The Conference Trustees shall have the responsibility for the administration of the Conference Center.

7. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall designate the depository or depositories for Conference funds.

8. No Board or Agency of the Conference shall be allowed to obligate itself beyond its anticipated annual income, except by $\frac{3}{4}$ vote of both the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the Cabinet; provided this restriction does not apply to Florida Southern College and the Florida Methodist Children's Home.

9. No person shall be a member of any Conference commission, board, committee or trustee, if in his private business he has conflict of interest with the purposes or business of such commission, board, committee or trustee, or does or proposes to do business with the same.

10. Membership on a Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years for both clerical and lay members. Membership on Boards of Trustees of Conference institutions shall be limited to nine (9) consecutive years for clerical members. Members rotating off any board, commission or committee under these provisions shall become eligible for re-election to such Board after a period of two (2) years. Membership shall not be held in more than one of the quadrennial boards, commissions or committees, provided, however, that this rule does not apply to trustees, to members of the Conference Committee of investigation, or ex-officio members, or to others established by the Discipline or the Standing Rules of the Conference. Beginning in 1970 no man shall serve longer than four years as chairman of the same quadrennial board, commission or committee.

11. Offices in the Annual Conference and membership on the Boards, Committees or Commissions shall be held only by effective clerical members of the Conference, and by laymen who have not reached their 72nd birthday, except ex-officio members. It is recommended that these provisions also apply to the election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

12. District Lay Leaders and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendent and the Conference Lay Leader where no District Board of the Laity is constituted.

13. It shall be the duty of every board or commission holding property to provide the district superintendent with a complete list of its holdings within the district. The list shall include the title under which the property is held, a description of the land, and whether or not the property is exempt

from taxes. The secretary of the Board or Commission shall report any changes in the list promptly.

14. The Charter and By Laws of each incorporated Conference Board or Institution shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, who shall print each year in the Conference Journal a notation of where said charter may be found in prior Journals. The Conference Secretary shall be notified immediately of any proposed changes in said charter or by-laws.

15. Members of General Boards or Commissions who are members of the Florida Conference or are members of any Church in the Florida Conference shall be Ex-Officio members of the corresponding Board or Commission in the Florida Conference.

IV. THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE

1. Lay membership in the District Conference shall consist of those lay members from each pastoral charge named in the Discipline.

2. In addition to the above, the Charge Conference shall have the privilege of electing two additional delegates and two reserve delegates.

V. BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

1. The Board of the Ministry shall present to the Conference to be filed among its papers a complete biographical sketch of all persons admitted into full connection and of all persons received by transfer; and of the latter, a sketch of the ministry up to date when received by transfer.

2. The Board of the Ministry shall require each applicant, including those being admitted from other churches, to present a certificate of good health from a practicing physician and an itemized statement of his financial obligations.

3. Any graduate of a seminary not approved by the University Senate desiring to enter the Florida Conference on trial under the Seminary Rule, must have completed one additional full academic year of study in a Seminary approved by the University Senate.

4. All candidates for Probationary Membership, Associate Membership, and Full Connection status shall appear in person before the Board for interviewing.

5. All candidates for Full Connection shall spend one appointive year in the Florida Conference under a District Superintendent, except faculty or staff in Methodist colleges, universities, or seminaries.

6. Candidates from other denominations shall remain On Probation not less than two years.

7. Beginning June 1964 candidates under thirty years of age are required to complete the B.D., or an equivalent degree, before admission into Full Connection.

8. Candidates for Admission on Probation from other conferences shall also be recommended by a District Committee on Ministry of the Florida Conference.

9. Candidates for Admission On Probation shall have satisfactorily completed the Psychological Guidance Program of the Conference; candidates transferred in On Probation shall comply with the Standing Rules of the Florida Conference for candidates for Admission On Probation, including the Psychological Guidance Program.

10. Candidates for License to Preach under the Course of Study shall do so under supervision of the Department of Ministerial Education, P. O. Box 871, Nashville, Tennessee 37202. All recommendations for License to Preach shall be valid for one year only from date of initial recommendation.

11. All ministerial candidates for conference membership or full-time Lay Pastors, who are beyond the Introductory Studies, shall attend a Summer School for Courses of Study; and that work by correspondence shall be permitted only "in a case of emergency or unusual circumstance" in

which the District Superintendent has certified in writing to the nature of the health problem or the financial hardship and his recommendation has been approved by the Board in each case.

12. Target Dates listed herein are requisite to the Board's fulfilling its responsibilities to the candidates and to the Conference. Requested adjustments may be made in exceptional cases if they fall under the Board's jurisdiction.

2. March 1: Master Report of the District Superintendent (Manual p. 189)
3. March 1: Application for Probationary and Associate Membership, and any other Conference relationships. (Manual p. 26)
4. May 1: Departmental Deadline for Accepting Correspondence Work (Manual p. 73)
5. March 15: Lay Pastor's Annual Progress Report (Manual p. 32)
6. May 15: Application for Enrollment in Course of Study Summer School (Manual p. 118)
7. May 15: Target Date for Application for Service Loan from One Per cent Fund (Manual p. 23)

VI. CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

1. The Annual Conference shall meet upon invitation at such places as may be selected by the conference, or by the Bishop and Cabinet, if so directed by the Conference.

2. Entertainment for pastors with minimum income, retired preachers, Lay Pastors, and men applying for Probationary Membership shall be provided or supplemented as may from time to time be determined by the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Cabinet, and the host Church or Institution.

3. All other preachers and lay delegates shall provide for their own entertainment, but it is recommended to all churches, where possible, that they make provision for such expenses, at least in part.

VII. FINANCIAL APPEALS

1. No financial appeal or fund-raising effort whatsoever shall be made beyond the local charge unless first authorized by action of the Annual Conference, or if in a District, by the District Conference.

2. Authorization of the Conference shall be secured by presenting, prior to the Annual Conference session, the purpose and plan of the appeal to the Board involved, to the Commission on World Service and Finance, and to the Cabinet.

3. Upon authorization of the Annual Conference, the Cabinet shall assign the appeal to a place on the calendar of the Conference.

4. Emergency appeals between sessions of the Conference may be authorized in clearly unusual circumstances of great emergency, only after the combined approval of the Bishop and Cabinet, the Boards involved, and the Commission on World Service and Finance.

VIII. YEARS OF SERVICE FOR ANNUITY CREDIT

A. Ministers on Special Appointment

1) Special Appointments shall be made in the following classifications:

I. With Annuity claim:

a. Upon this Annual Conference:

- 1) As full-time employees of the Conference, the Conference assuming annuity responsibility;
- 2) As an employee of a Conference approved agency or institution, the individual or institution assuming annuity responsibility;

b. Upon a General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of The Methodist Church.

II. Without Annuity Claim Upon this Annual Conference.

- 2) The Conference Treasurer shall keep a record of each special appointee, showing the amount paid by this member or his institution to the Conference Board of Pensions. The individual or institution shall complete payment to the Conference Treasurer by April 15 each year, and the Conference Treasurer shall make a report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions by April 25 each year.
- 3) The Conference Board of Pensions shall review annually the status of each special appointee and a record of the amount remitted for annuity responsibility during each year shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Annual Conference for publication in the Conference Journal and such information shall be forwarded to the General Board of Pensions.
- 4) Beginning with the Conference year 1967-68, all members of the Conference under special appointment in Section I a 2) shall be required to pay, or the institution they represent required to pay, an amount to be fixed annually by the Annual Conference for annuity responsibility.
- 5) Beginning with the Conference year 1968-69, conference annuity responsibility shall be assumed for all members of the Annual Conference in special appointments in Section I a 1), except those on sabbatical leave. The Commission on World Service shall be requested to provide from the Conference budget the apportionment for ministerial members of the Conference staff.
- 6) The primary appointment controls liability for annuity payments, with part-time employment disregarded in assuming annuity responsibility.

B. Ministers as Approved Supply Pastors or Lay Pastors

1. In determining eligibility for annuity credit for years of service as an approved supply pastor prior to 1952, applicant must prove full-time service in accordance with disciplinary requirements.

2. No approved supply credit shall be given for years in which the applicant is appointed as a student supply, while preparing for admission on Probation.

3. To be eligible for annuity credit as an approved supply, one must be receiving minimum salary support or the equivalent.

4. A Conference committee on service years shall investigate all cases in which the Cabinet, Conference Secretary, Board of Pension, or other authority questions the eligibility of the applicant for claimed years of service. Said committee shall be composed of one member of the Cabinet appointed by the District Superintendents, one member of the Board of Pensions appointed by said board, and the Conference Secretary. All applicants shall have the right of appeal to the floor of the Annual Conference from the decision of said committee, but lacking such appeal, the decision of the committee is considered final.

5. Nothing in this article shall be construed to interfere in any way with the full supervision over the granting of pension claims by the Board of Pensions when a man has entered the retired relationship. Nor shall this article prevent the Cabinet in clearly unusual cases granting a year of annuity credit under the proper disciplinary question.

6. It shall be the business of each approved supply pastor to ascertain that the Secretary's record of his annuity years is properly carried in the Conference Journal, and that he has been given annuity credit year by year under the proper disciplinary question. After June, 1962, an approved supply minister eligible for annuity credit for a year of service, whose name has not been included in answer to the Disciplinary question, shall be responsible for bringing this matter to the attention of the Conference Secretary, and shall secure a statement from the District Superintendent under whom he served, or his successor, that he is entitled to such year. Failure to do so by the next session of the Annual Conference shall negate any future claim for this year.

IX. CONFERENCE COUNCIL

1. The Conference Program Council shall be composed of the following:
 - The resident Bishop
 - The District Superintendents
 - The Chairman and one other representative elected by each of the following Boards or agencies: Education, Missions, Evangelism, Social Concerns
 - The Chairman of each of the following Boards or agencies: Health and Human Welfare, Ministry, Pensions, Preacher's Relief, Christian Enlistment, Town and Country, Public Relations and Methodist Information, Historical Society, Worship, Florida Methodist Foundation, Trustees of the Children's Home, Trustees of Florida Southern College, and Trustees of the Florida Annual Conference
 - The Conference Secretary
 - Two representatives of the Conference Youth organization
 - Two representatives of the Women's Society of Christian Service, one of whom shall be the president
 - One layman from each district nominated by the District Superintendent, elected by the Annual Conference, and eligible to serve a maximum of four consecutive years
 - Members at large, not to exceed three, may be appointed by the Cabinet, annually
 - Each Board or agency may elect a reserve representative to attend when the regular representative is unable to do so
 - The following shall be members of the Council without vote: salaried and volunteer Conference staff, the Conference Treasurer, and two members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, one of whom shall be the chairman.
2. Program shall continue to originate in the local churches, the district agencies, the Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Program Councils, and shall be correlated in the Conference Council for Annual Conference presentation.
3. When adopted by the Annual Conference, the program shall become Conference program and be implemented, in consultation with the Conference Agencies involved and the District Superintendents, by a Council Staff who shall be employed (in accordance with the current Methodist Discipline), directed and supervised by the Conference Council.
4. The Conference Council shall elect a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer, quadrennially. The Council shall meet on the call of the chairman two times a year. The Council shall have an executive committee on which the officers of the Council, the Bishop, one district superintendent, chosen by the Cabinet, the Program Director, the Chairman of the Conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, and Missions, the Conference Lay Leader, and the Conference President of Women's society of Christian Service, and four members at large, elected by the Council, will serve. Approximately one-half of the members of the Executive Committee, shall be laymen.

X. AMENDMENTS AND SUSPENSIONS

1. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a majority (counted) of those present and voting.
2. The Standing Rules may be amended or changed by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting; provided the proposed amendment or change has been read in open conference and/or circulated in printed form signed by not less than seven members of the Annual Conference at least one day before the vote is taken.
