



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

FIRST DAY

Tuesday, June 1, 1971

Opening: The 1971 session of the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church convened in the John W. Branscomb Auditorium on the campus at Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Florida, June 1, 1971, at 10:00 A.M., with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. The hymn, "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing," was sung as the ministerial candidates processed. Bishop Henley announced the accidental death of Harold Miller. The Conference stood in silent tribute, and Bishop Henley led in prayer.

Organization: Bishop Henley declared the 129th session of the Conference in session and called on H. Mauriece Felton, Conference Secretary, for the opening organization.

Memorial Roll Call: H. Mauriece Felton, Conference Secretary, read the roll of the deceased of the past year as the Conference stood in silent tribute and memoriam.

Roll Call: Instructions were given by the Conference Secretary, and he moved that the Registration Cards, having been distributed and signed by the members, be the official record of attendance upon this session. The motion was approved. (See Rolls)

Bar of the Conference: H. Mauriece Felton moved that the Bar of the Conference be the ground floor, with the exception of the last three rows in the center section and the east two sections. Voting Lay Delegates will sit in the two west sections, front to rear. Voting Ministerial delegates will sit in the center and the two east sections, front to rear (excepting the last three rows as previously noted); and that Ministers on Probation, Associate

Members, and Lay Pastors be granted the privilege of sitting in the Ministerial section, without the privilege of ballot on the General and Jurisdictional Conference delegations. The last three rows, center and the two east sections rear and the balcony are to be reserved for visitors, or lay delegates not voting at a particular time. Provided, further, that the first eight seats in the front of the extreme east section be reserved for the press and staff members.

Program: H. Mauriece Felton moved that the printed program be accepted as the Conference Program, with the Bishop being given the privilege of making adjustments as necessary. Following discussion of time provisions for discussion of various reports, it was adopted.

Welcome: Charles T. Thrift, Jr., President of Florida Southern College, was recognized by Bishop Henley as host of the Conference, and he greeted and welcomed the Conference.

Holy Communion: After the singing of the hymn, "Holy, Holy," the Conference observed The Lord's Supper, with Bishop Henley, celebrant. Following Communion, the hymn "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know," was sung, and a brief recess followed.

Orientation of Lay Members: Lay Members of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church convened in the Annie Pfieffer Chapel on the campus of Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Florida on June 1, 1971, at 11:30 A.M. with William A. Meadows, presiding for a period of orientation. After the opening prayer led by Mrs. Allen Watson, Conference President of The Women's Society of Christian Service, Mr. Meadows welcomed all the lay delegates to the Annual Conference. Mr. Meadows introduced Gene Zimmerman who presented information of the Minimum Salary. Dr. Richard Pearce gave information about meals and other accommodations for the delegates. Mr. Meadows then introduced the conference and district lay officers. Mrs. Ethel Gray gave a brief presentation of the proposed Constitutional Amendments. Mr. Meadows stressed the importance of the election of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences giving instructions, clarifications and qualifications, after which Mr. Charles Babcock adjourned the meeting with prayer.

Executive Session of Ministers: The ministerial members of the Florida Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The United Methodist Church, convened in the John W. Branscomb Auditorium, Lakeland, Florida, June 1, 1971 at 11:25 A.M., with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. William Compton, Miami District, was recognized and granted personal privilege to read a Miami District ministers' recommendation that consideration should be given in the makeup of the Florida delegation to the General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference to include representation of all inclusive groups within our Conference. Bishop Henley spoke helpfully to the principle that free and open election of delegates cannot be hindered by prescribed formulas or limitations except as already provided by the Discipline. The Executive Session concurred.

Board of Ministry: W. S. Bozeman, chairman of the Conference Board of Ministry, assisted by Pat McBride, Registrar, presented Report No. 1 which was adopted, answering the following Disciplinary questions:

At 12:30 P.M., Bishop Henley adjourned the morning session of the Conference and the Executive Session for Ministers and the Orientation Session of Lay Delegates simultaneously.

Afternoon session—Tuesday, June 1, 1971

Opening: The Conference was convened at 2:30 P.M. with Bishop Henley presiding. The hymn "Rejoice, Ye Pure in Heart" was sung, followed by the singing of "If Thou But Suffer God To Guide Thee." H. T. Heitzenrater, organist.

The Episcopal Address: The Episcopal Address was delivered by Bishop James W. Henley.

Reception of Associate Members: Bishop Henley presented to the Conference the men to be received as Associate Members. The disciplinary

questions were issued simultaneously with the probationers, and they were received.

Reception of Probationers: Bishop Henley presented to the Conference the class to be received on Probation, and they were received.

Reception into Full Connection: Bishop Henley presented the class to be received into Full Connection. He spoke appropriately, propounded the disciplinary questions and received the class.

Question 20: "Are all the ministers blameless in life and official administration?" Bishop Henley called the names of the District Superintendents and the character of each Superintendent, and of each minister in his District was passed, including the ministers under special appointment, student and retired ministers.

Question 38: "Who have been received by transfer?" (See Condensed Minutes).

Question 39: "Who have been transferred out?" (See Condensed Minutes).

Announcement: R. C. Boggs announced that the funeral services for W. Harold Miller would be held at the Manhattan Avenue United Methodist Church in Tampa on Thursday June 3 at 1:00 P.M. Interment will be in Plant City.

Gaylon Howe requested that a telegram be sent to Mrs. A. C. Riviere in Mease Hospital, Dunedin.

Service of Recognition for the Retiring Ministers; Bishop Henley invited the new retirees and their wives to the Chancel and addressed them appropriately on behalf of the Conference. Each retiree spoke briefly, after which Bishop Henley presented a pin and a parchment to each retiree, and an orchid to each wife. The Bishop led in prayer.

Motion: Gordon Craig moved that the Chair appoint a doorkeeper or doorkeepers to see that the doors to the Conference be closed at the opening of each session to insure that proper courtesy be extended to the speakers. It was adopted by the Conference.

Motion: Mauriece Felton, Conference Secretary, moved that the tellers be instructed not to report the names of those receiving nine or less votes. It was approved by the Conference.

First Ballot: The first clerical ballot for General Conference was taken. Bishop Henley requested all to sit properly within the Bar of the Conference (as defined in the morning session) to facilitate voting and business.

Resolution: Dick Cash, President of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, presented the following Resolution which was adopted:

RESOLUTION FROM THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRY

WHEREAS the General Conference and Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church have taken definite steps in the direction of fulfilling the concept that "Youth are FULL Laity" by adding youth to general boards and agencies; by giving control of the Youth Service Fund to the United Methodist Council on Youth Ministry; and by putting youth on local church administrative boards and council on ministries.

And, whereas the Florida Council on Youth Ministry has invited youth from across the conference to witness this session of the annual conference and to show their desire to be full laity by becoming totally involved in church activities.

Be it resolved that twenty (20) youth who attend this conference be seated as observers in the lay delegate section with right to speak but not vote. These youth are to be selected by the youth assembled who have been meeting with members of the Florida Conference United Methodist Council on Youth Ministry.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley led in the singing of "Blest Be The Tie That Binds" and at 5:05 P.M. the afternoon session was declared adjourned.

Tuesday Evening—June 1, 1971

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:45 P.M. with Bishop James W. Henley presiding.

Ordination of Deacons: The following having been duly elected, were called to the Altar by W. S. Bozeman, Chairman of The Board of the Ministry

and ordained Deacons by Bishop Henley.

SECOND DAY

Wednesday Morning—June 2, 1971

Opening: The Conference convened at 9:00 A.M., with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. Dr. John W. Cook, chairman of the Department of Religion of Florida Southern College, gave the opening devotional.

Journal: Robert Gisler reported that the Committee had examined the Minutes and found them to be correct.

Statistician's Report: H. M. DeWese, Conference Statistician, presented the 12 months (Jan. 1-Dec. 31, 1970) and 5 months (Jan. 1-May 25, 1971) statistical reports of the Conference, which were distributed. (See Reports).

Recognition: Bishop Henley recognized the ministers who have served for 25 years: Ashton A. Almand, Ornan Inglesias, Leo F. King, Robert R. Lewis, Ernest W. Newman, William R. Obaugh, Chesley M. Sappington, Eldon Simmons, Claude Stanfield.

Voting Clarification: Bishop Henley made a statement concerning the First Ballot and the failure to distinguish the identity of duplicate names within the Conference, which would have been helpful. One particular problem in the First Ballot was the names of Robert M. Blackburn and Robert F. Blackburn. Robert F. Blackburn moved to concede all 75 votes cast for Robert Blackburn to Robert M. Blackburn, and the Conference

Report of Lay Ballot No. 1, General Conference Delegates: The Conference Secretary reported the results of the First Ballot and Bishop Henley declared the election of William A. Meadows, Richard V. Moore, and P. B. Revels. The second ballot was taken.

Report of the Clerical Ballot No. 1, General Conference Delegates: The Conference Secretary reported the results of the first ballot for clerical delegates, and Bishop Henley declared the election of George A. Foster and Robert M. Blackburn. The second ballot was taken.

Program: Ralph Huston, chairman of the Conference Program Committee, gave guidance concerning the morning program and moved the procedural Standing Rules be adopted, which was approved. (See Reports).

The Church in Mission: An impressive program of representative ministries being performed by The United Methodist Church in Florida was presented to the Conference as follows, with Lee Pearson directing: The Wesley Ringers of Brandon United Methodist Church; The Bethune-Cookman Concert Chorale; Black United Methodism in Florida; the Polk County Spanish-Speaking Migrant Ministries; the Spanish Urban Ministries in Dade County, represented by the work of the Christian Community Service Agency and presentations by two former drug addicts who are residents of Spectrum House sponsored by the Agency; renewal work and community ministries at Bartley-Temple United Methodist Church, Gainesville; the Bartley Temple United Methodist Youth Choir of Gainesville; the work of United Methodist and former EUB urban ministries in the Tampa United Methodist Centers; the involvement of the local church as the fountainhead of all creative Christian ministries was represented by Brandon United Methodist Church, which presented its family involvement program, the Chapel Chimes group, and Mini Ringers, all appearing against a background of banners made by the women of the church; Lay Missionary, Harry Newman, a Florida United Methodist hospital administrator in Bolivia; the Florida Conference Camp Programs; and a closing presentation by the Chapel Chimes Bell ringers from the Brandon church, who were joined by the Bethune-Cookman Concert Chorale and the Conference in the singing of the hymn "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name."

Adjournment: Bishop Henley expressed the appreciation of the entire Conference for the program of the morning, and adjourned the session at 12:50 P.M.

Afternoon Session-Wednesday June 2, 1971

Opening: Bishop Henley reconvened the Conference at 2:30 P.M.

Presentation: Bishop Henley presented Ted Runyon who spoke briefly of Candler School of Theology, paying tribute to Claude Thompson who is seriously ill.

Motion: Upon motion duly seconded, the Conference voted to send greetings to Claude Thompson, who is too ill to attend.

Publishing House: Bishop Henley presented Mr. William Gosey of The Methodist Publishing House, who spoke briefly emphasizing that the Florida Conference is the largest purchaser of books through the Publishing House, before presenting a check to Bishop Henley for \$14,889.36 for retired ministers, and widows.

Report of Lay Ballot No. Two, Delegates to the General Conference: Bishop Henley announced the election of Mrs. Allen Watson, O. B. Fanning, Mrs. Bruce Gray and Charles I. Babcock. The third ballot was taken.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. Two, Delegates to the General Conference: Bishop Henley announced the election of Eugene Zimmerman, Ralph Huston, J. B. F. Williams, and A. A. Hedberg. The third ballot was taken.

Motion: Richard Albury moved, and it was seconded, that the tellers be instructed to report only the names of those receiving 25 or more votes. David Underwood moved to amend the motion to those receiving 50 votes, but the Conference rejected it. The original motion was then carried.

Credit Union: Dr. Richard W. Pearce reported on the progress of the Credit Union. (See Reports).

Feasibility Study: Bishop Henley presented Sam A. Banks who brought the report of the Committee of Nine. (See Reports).

Program Input: With Robert M. Blackburn, Vice-Chairman of the Program Council, leading, the various boards, Commissions, and committees proposed their plans for 1972.

Presentation: Bishop Henley presented a plaque to John J. Rooks in recognition of his outstanding service as the first Program Council Director.

Co-ordinating Committee: Don Mackay presented the work of the coordinating committee after which John Rooks introduced the members of the program staff.

Standing Rules: Robert Blackburn presented the proposed revision of the Standing Rules regarding the Program Council which was referred to the Standing Rules Committee.

Appointments: Bishop Henley announced the following appointments of District Superintendents: Walter B. Rutland to the DeLand District, J. B. F. Williams to the Melbourne District and Harold E. Buell to the Miami District.

Minimum Salary: Eugene Zimmerman, Chairman of the Committee on Minimum Salary, presented the recommendations for 1972.

Amendment: David Woerner moved an amendment which was properly seconded, to the Minimum Salary recommendations and it was referred to the Committee on Reference.

Amendment: Lloyd Knox moved an amendment, which was properly seconded, to the Minimum Salary Recommendations and it was referred to the Committee on Reference.

Resolution: Walter D. Edwards presented a resolution, which after being seconded was referred to the Committee on Reference.

Study of the Ministry: Larry Henize presented the report of the Committee on the Study of the Ministry after which he introduced Jim Dale and William James, the latter speaking on the analysis of the study.

Extension of Time: Ken Crossman moved a fifteen minute extension of time. It was seconded and carried.

Suggestion: Ken Crossman suggested that an effort be made to find a more effective way to tabulate votes at Annual Conference.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 5:15 P.M.

Wednesday Evening—June 2, 1971

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:30 P.M., with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. The Bethune-Cookman Concert Chorale sang several anthems, after which Bishop Henley expressed deep appreciation to them.

Report of Lay Ballot 3, General Conference Delegates: The Conference Secretary announced the results of Lay Ballot No. 3, and Bishop Henley declared Robert T. Mann and Ray Redstone elected to the delegation. The 4th ballot was taken.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 3, General Conference Delegates: The Conference Secretary announced the results of clerical ballot No. 3, and Bishop Henley declared M. C. Cleveland elected to the delegation. The 4th ballot was taken.

Conference Worship Service: The Bethune-Cookman Concert Chorale sang "Praise Ye The Lord, All Ye Nations" as a call to worship, after which George Dettman read the Scriptures and the Conference joined in an affirmation of faith. The hymn "Good Christians, Join to Sing" was sung, and George Dettman led in responsive prayer. The Doxology was sung. Bishop Henley announced worship tomorrow evening via telephone hookup with the Church in Monrovia, Liberia. Roosevelt Dell introduced the speaker of the evening service, Dr. Finas A. Crutchfield, and then led in prayer. Dr. Crutchfield preached on "The Church As A Community of Grace." The offering was received as the Bethune-Cookman Concert Chorale sang the offertory anthem, followed by several other special arrangements at the request of the Bishop and the Conference. The hymn, "All Praise to Our Redeeming Lord" was sung by the Conference as the closing of worship, after which they gave the Bethune-Cookman Chorale a standing ovation.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 4, General Conference Delegates: The Conference Secretary announced the results of lay ballot No. 4, and Bishop Henley declared none elected. The next ballot was taken.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 4, General Conference Delegates: Mauriece Felton, Conference Secretary, announced the results of Clerical Ballot No. 4, and Bishop Henley declared William Obaugh (former EUB) elected. The next ballot was taken.

Closing: Bishop Henley adjourned the session at 9:25 P.M.

THIRD DAY

Morning Session—Thursday June 3, 1971

Opening: The Conference convened for worship at 9:00 A.M. with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. Following the singing of the Hymn "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" Bishop Henley led in prayer and introduced Dr. Finas A. Crutchfield who delivered the morning devotion.

Greeting: Upon motion and second the Conference voted to send greetings to Harry Waller who is ill.

Journal: Bishop Henley called for a report of the Committee on the Journal and Walter D. Edwards, speaking for the committee, reported that the Journal had been examined and found to be correct.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 5 for Delegates to General Conference: Bishop Henley announced the election of W. S. Hughlett, A. B. Blackburn, Jr., Mrs. H. V. Weems and Edd Gentry which concludes the Slate of delegates to General Conference. The first ballot for Jurisdictional Delegates was taken.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 5 for Delegates to General Conference: Bishop Henley announced the election of Lloyd Knox, John J. Rooks, and W. S. Bozeman. The sixth ballot was taken.

Motion: R. B. Chapman moved, and it was seconded, that all persons receiving votes on the first Jurisdictional ballot only be announced. The motion was defeated.

Motion: R. L. Redstone moved that only persons who received 10 or more votes be announced. After being seconded the motion was withdrawn as the Conference is already operating under this rule.

Privilege: R. M. Blackburn called all Chairmen making reports to the platform.

Resolution: Henry Galloway presented a resolution regarding the use of Church School facilities for public schools.

Amendment: Walter D. Edwards presented a resolution amending the resolution so as not to be interpreted as contrary to the Disciplinary requirement regarding race. After being seconded, it was approved and the resolution as amended approved and referred to the Committee on Resolutions.

Program Adoption: With Robert M. Blackburn presiding the following program recommendations and resolutions were presented.

Committee on Publishing Interests: Gordon Craig presented the recommendations and they were adopted. (See Reports).

Adult, Children's And Family Life Departments: Items 2, 3, and 4 of the recommendations were adopted. (See Reports).

Youth Ministries: Dick Cash presented the recommendations of the Council with the deletion of item No. 2, which was then approved by the Conference. (See Reports.)

Christian Social Concerns: Judge P. B. Revels spoke briefly to the report before lifting up the recommendations.

Motion: John Briley moved that UNICEF be accepted as an Advance Mission Special. A. A. Hedberg explained that only exclusively Methodist programs were eligible for such consideration.

Recommendations: Items 1, 2, 3, and 4 of the Recommendations of the Board of Christian Social Concerns were presented individually to the Conference and adopted without debate. (See Reports).

Motion: Mrs. Dorothy Lundy, lay delegate from Coral Way, Miami, moved that all remaining recommendations be voted as printed in the Program Booklet. It was seconded and passed by the Conference. (See Reports).

Motion: David Scoates moved and it was seconded that we proceed to the Resolutions. The Motion carried.

Resolutions: Resolution No. 1 as adopted by the Conference as presented. (See Reports). John White presented an addendum to Resolution No. 2 which after considerable discussion was adopted and then the resolution and the addendum was adopted. (See Reports). Robert M. Jenkins moved to delete certain words in Resolution No. 3. After discussion William G. Mitchell, lay delegate from Orlando, offered an amendment which after considerable discussion, the Conference voted 428 in favor to 310 against to approve the amendment. The Conference then approved the resolution as amended. (See Reports).

Implementation: In response to Kim Porter's question concerning implementation, P. B. Revels indicated that the foregoing resolution would be sent to the appropriate parties under the direction of the Program Council.

Resolution 4: Resolution No. 4 of the Board report was presented for discussion, Arthur Charlesworth moved to add a provision for legal guidance to assure tax exemption of all non-profit properties of the Church. (See Reports). Gene Zimmerman moved to include all "care"-type properties in the exempt delineation. (See Reports). Gaylon Howe moved to amend the original resolution to specify only "profit-making" properties as subject to taxation, and it was carried. (See Reports).

Following discussion, the amendments were voted on in reverse order. Zimmerman's amendment carried. Charlesworth's amendment carried. The original Resolution with amendments carried. (See Reports).

Resolution 5: The Board moved and the Conference adopted Resolution No. 5. (See Reports).

Supplementary Report: A supplementary report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns concerning Project Equality was presented by P. B. Revels, chairman, and it was approved (see Reports).

Resolution: Ken Crossman presented the following Resolution, which following a motion by Hoyt Tatum and favorable vote by the Conference to suspend the Standing Rules and permit an immediate vote, was adopted:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, many low and middle income families in our State are currently

being deprived of decent and adequate housing;

Be it therefore Resolved that the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church urge the Governor and the Legislature of the State of Florida to take the necessary steps to establish a revolving loan fund so that non-profit sponsors of housing would thereby be enabled to find and purchase land on which new housing might be built. (Reference House Bill #1369; Senate Bill #940).

Board of Education Report: Robert M. Blackburn, Vice-chairman of the Conference Program Council, presented Daniel Winter for the presentation of the report. Corrections were made in the wording of the printed report, and Winter moved its adoption. James Crook made a substitute motion that the Conference receive the observations made by the Board of Education concerning church school attendance and refer them to the local churches for implementation, and the substitute motion was defeated. Following considerable discussion concerning reference to Sunday School or Church School in this specialized study and report, Gaylon Howe moved and it carried that action on the Report be tabled temporarily.

Resolution: On motion, the resolution concerning the Georgia Seagle Trust provisions circulated yesterday was carried. (See page 174.)

Presiding: Bishop Henley invited Raymond A. Alley to preside over the Conference.

Privilege: Raymond Alley recognized Dr. Arthur Kale of the Duke University Divinity School and he greeted the Conference.

Higher Education Recommendations: Robert M. Blackburn introduced James Yost, who presented and moved adoption of the remainder of the Board of Education Report. It was approved. (See Reports). The original report was adopted. (See Reports).

Adjournment: Raymond Alley announced the afternoon session for promptly at 2:30 for the Memorial Service and pronounced the benediction at 12:25 P.M.

Afternoon Session-Thursday June 3, 1971

Memorial Service: With George Carlton presiding, the Conference Memorial Service opened with the singing of the Hymn "For All The Saints," after which R. E. Ackenhusen led in prayer. The report of the Committee was made by George Carlton. Roll Call of the Honored Dead was presented by Lee Strother. The Conference Choir then sang "Abide With Me." Harold Thomas read the Scripture after which E. W. Norman delivered the Memorial Address and John Brabham pronounced the benediction.

Presentation: Donald J. Merritt, District Lay Leader of the Melbourne District, assisted by Dolly Crist, District President of the WSCS honored Raymond Alley upon his leaving the District.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 1 for Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced that no one was elected. Ballot No. 2 was taken.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 6 Delegates for General Conference: Bishop Henley announced that no one was elected. Ballot No. 7 was taken.

Commission of Ecumenical Affairs and Delegation to the Florida Council of Courches: Robert Temple presented the report of the Commission of Ecumenical Affairs. Statements by Ruth S. Wedgworth, Delegate from Belle Glade, against and by Frank Smith for the Florida Christian Ministry to Migrants were made.

Recommendations: Paragraphs 1, 2, 3, and 4 were then approved by the Conference. Paragraph 5: Findley Tucker, delegate of First United Methodist Church, Jacksonville, moved to amend by eliminating reference to COCU Sunday in paragraph 5. After being seconded the amendment was defeated, and the paragraph was adopted as presented. Paragraph 6 was adopted. Paragraph 7: Mary Banks, delegate from Bartow, moved deletion of paragraph 7, with actual count being recorded. After discussion the Conference rejected the amendment voting 179 for and 405 against. Paragraph 8 was then approved.

Florida Council of Churches: Robert Temple introduced Dr. William Belk, Executive Secretary of the Florida Council of Churches, who brought greetings from the Council.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 7 for Delegates to General Conference: Bishop Henley announced the election of Walter Rutland and Walter Kalaf.

Privilege: Bishop Henley presented several of the military chaplains who greeted the Conference as follows: Alfred W. Eustes, Jr., USAF, Richard Tidley, USN, Morris Holtzclaw, USAF.

Recognition: Walter Rutland was recognized by Bishop Henley and he moved that the Conference greet Bishop Wesley through greetings from the Conference Secretary. It was approved.

Board of Evangelism Report: Donald M. Mackay, chairman of the Board of Evangelism, made editorial changes in the report of the Board and presented it. He was assisted by W. L. Joyner, who spoke on the recommendations for 1972, O. Dean Martin, who spoke on New Life Missions as the exciting new concept in evangelism at the local church level, and then Mackay moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. George Erickson spoke on the report

of the Advisory Committee on Lay Renewal, moved its adoption, and it was approved. (See Reports).

Board of Missions Report: A. A. Hedberg, Conference Missionary Secretary, recognized the missionaries present and presented the report of the Board of Missions, including the nomination of Marvin Sweat as Conference Missionary Secretary. David Scoates moved to amend the report to request a petition to the General Conference for legislation permitting the Annual Conference to accept, refuse, or further alter its World Service apportionment as it sees fit. The motion will be held for action for 24 hours as required by the Standing Rules. David Scoates further moved to amend the report by requesting a petition to the General Conference for legislation making it possible for the local church to designate specific priorities in the use of its World Service remittances. The motion was held for action for 24 hours as required by the Standing Rules. The basic report was voted on and approved. (See Reports).

Board of Health and Welfare Ministries: Robert M. Blackburn presented the report of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, and it was adopted. Following a motion and favorable vote to extend the time until 5:30 P.M., Blackburn recognized Bascom Carlton of the Florida United Methodist Children's Home, who greeted and commended the Conference for a record year in support, submitted a report of audit to Bishop Henley, and presented Durward McDonell, chairman of the Children's Home Board of Trustees, who submitted to the Conference for action tomorrow a Proposed Amendment to the Articles of Incorporation of The Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc. (See Reports). R. M. Blackburn recognized representatives of Methodist Hospital, Goodwill Industries, Methodist homes for the aged, and then presented proposed Articles of Incorporation of The United Methodist Facilities for the Aging. (See Reports). Following considerable discussion, the provisions of the charter were approved and adopted. (See Reports). On motion, the program recommendations of the Children's Home Trustees were adopted. (See Reports).

Commission on Stewardship: James I. Jones, Conference Director of Stewardship, presented the report of the Commission and moved its adoption. It was approved. (See Reports).

Board of Education Special Report: The Board of Education's special study project report concerning the Sunday School, tabled earlier in the day, was removed from the Table, discussed by Dan Winter, approved and adopted. (See Reports).

Motion: Ralph Huston moved and the Conference approved the addition of a business session at the close of the evening worship.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley declared the session adjourned at 5:30 P.M.

Evening Session—Thursday June 3, 1971

Conference Worship Service: The Conference Worship Service began with The Choirs of First United Methodist Church in Lakeland under the direction of Mr. Moody Chisholm singing "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name." A. A. Hedberg, President of Conference Board of Missions, presided. George Dettman read the Scripture. A. A. Hedberg introduced Dr. Isaac H. Bivins, assistant Secretary General of African Affairs of the General Board of Missions, who delivered the sermon. A. A. Hedberg then led in prayer after which the offering was taken.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 2 for Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of Harry L. Burney, James I. Jones, John Sargeant, Miss Edith Goodwin, Mrs. W. P. Tisdale, Mrs. Donald Crist, Mrs. Patricia Pinesett, R. C. Pearce, and Mrs. Cubell Johnson. The third ballot was taken.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 1 for Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of C. Durward McDonell, W. W. Roughton, Charles Hamilton and Harold Buell. The second ballot was taken.

Board of Publications: R. M. Blackburn introduced Victor Leavengood, chairman of the Board of Publication who presented the report. After dis-

cussion Eugene West, representing the World Service Commission, moved a substitute motion for section "C" of the report, that the Commission continue the study for another year and that the committee make their report at the 1972 Annual Conference. The Conference approved the substitute and then approved the report as amended. (See Reports).

Commission on Public Relations and United Methodist Information: W. S. Echols, Chairman of the Commission, presented the report which was adopted. (See Reports).

Advisory Committee for Church and Community Work: Mrs. Guy Thomas, Chairman of the Committee, presented the report which was adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Commission on Worship: Roosevelt Dell presented the report of the Conference Commission on Worship, which was approved. (See Reports).

Committee on Lay Workers: M. C. Cleveland presented the report of the Committee on Lay Workers, which was adopted. (See Reports).

Commission on Archives and History: Don Richardson presented the report of the Commission on Archives and History, and it was approved with appreciation. (See Reports).

Adoption of Calendar: Don Mackay presented the Conference Calendar, which was amended and approved. (See Reports).

Statement of Purpose and Priorities: The statement of purpose and priorities of the Conference Program Council was adopted. (See Reports).

Adjournment: Appropriate announcements were made amid Bishop Henley adjourned the session at 10:10 P.M.

FOURTH DAY

Morning Session—Friday June 4, 1971

Opening: The Conference was convened for worship at 9:00 A.M. with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. "A Charge To Keep I Have" was sung after which he introduced Dr. Isaac Bivins who brought the morning devotional and closed with prayer.

Privilege: Whitney Dough asked if the Conference would like to share in providing bicycles for our circuit walking pastor brothers in Africa. Dr. Bivins suggested that the project be handled through A. A. Hedberg and the Board of Missions. Gifts should be sent to the Conference treasurer marked "bicycles for Africa."

Journal: Robert Gisler reported that the Journal had been read and had been faithfully kept.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 3 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of John A. Grant, a former EUB, and John E. Morris. The fourth ballot was taken.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 2 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of Lewis Head, Raymond Alley, Gaylon Howe, Donald Mackay, and C. E. West. The third ballot was taken.

Florida Southern College: Charles T. Thrift, Jr., President, introduced Judge Richard Cooper, circuit judge of Orange County, who addressed the Conference. Dr. Thrift introduced Rev. Jack Phillips who has been appointed to the staff of the college and he spoke briefly.

Resolution: John L. Crofts, lay delegate from Venice-Nokomis, presented the following resolution: "Resolved: That this Conference endorses the policy statement of Dr. Charles Thrift in his welcoming address delivered June 1, including the quoted statement of the Trustees," which was adopted by the Conference.

Wesleyan College: Dr. Earl Strickland, President, addressed the Conference relative to the academic program of Wesleyan College.

Privilege: Walter Kalaf asked the privilege of presenting Mrs. Thaxton Springfield in recognition of the outstanding work of her husband, the late Thaxton Springfield. William Rion, Director of the Reitz Student Union,

University of Florida spoke in tribute after which Bishop Henley presented an orchid to Mrs. Springfield.

Presentation: Henry Galloway assisted by Ministers and laymen of the Miami District honored Hoyt Tatum upon his leaving the District.

Bethune-Cookman College: Dr. Richard V. Moore, president of the college, presented the report of the college which was adopted. (See Reports).

Negro Colleges Advance: Clayton Calhoun, spoke briefly of the necessity for undergirding our Negro Colleges.

Presiding Officer: Bishop Henly asked Raymond Alley to preside.

Question 52: "Where Shall the next session of the Annual Conference be held?" Dr. Thrift invited the Conference to return to Florida Southern College and the Conference accepted.

Resolution: R. C. Boggs, Secretary of the Cabinet, presented a resolution from the cabinet which the Conference approved unanimously. The resolution is:

CABINET RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Bishop James W. Henley has served with distinction as the Resident Bishop of the Florida Area of the United Methodist Church since July, 1960, and

Whereas, he will retire as an active Bishop at the 1972 Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, therefore,

Be It Resolved, that the Cabinet of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church call upon each local church, each District, and each institution of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church to take recognition of this fact by setting worthwhile goals of achievement to make this last period of Bishop Henley's leadership the most productive of the twelve years in the growth of every area of God's Kingdom through the church.

Furthermore, that they call upon the Program Council, in co-operation with the Cabinet, to implement this resolution in challenging all concerned to bring this about and to make appropriate plans to this end, and

Furthermore, that this be brought to a climax with proper recognition of Bishop Henley's twelve years of service as our Bishop at the Florida Annual Conference meeting in June, 1972.

Board of Pensions: J. B. F. Williams, Chairman of the Board, presented Eldon Simmons who presented the report. After making the necessary corrections, the Conference voted approval.

Waiver of Rules: The Conference, upon motion and second, voted to waive the Standing Rules to accept the following motion: That Bishop Henley nominate and the Annual Conference elect a pension study commission to work toward full transition to MRFP, constituted in the following manner: 3 members of the Board of Pensions, 2 members of the Cabinet, 2 from World Service (one of whom should be the chairman), 2 from the Board of the Laity (including the chairman), and the Bishop who shall serve as Ex-Officio.

Resolution: Eldon Simmons presented the following resolution which was approved by the Conference.

WHEREAS, Since 1908 The Discipline of The Methodist Church has recognized and stated its responsibility to its ministers, effective and retired, for their comfortable support. To meet this obligation a Conference Claimants Fund was established by annual assessments on the local churches; and

Whereas, The United States Government has recognized in its income tax regulations monies designated as "Allowance for the rental value of a parsonage or home" for a minister as exempt from taxation; and

Whereas, The United States Government has also recognized in its income tax regulations monies paid by a minister for the utilities of such a "parsonage or home" for a minister to be exempt from taxation; therefore, be it

Resolved, that Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, in session duly called, June 2, 1971, Bishop James W. Henley, Presiding, that twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) of the total annuity paid to each retired minister shall constitute a rental allowance paid as a part of the retired minister's compensation for past services, except that such allowance not exceed one-third (½) of the total annuity received from the Florida Annual Conference Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church; and be it further

Resolved, that an additional allowance of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) shall constitute a utility allowance for the minister's said "parsonage or home."

This is in accord with paragraph 860: code section 107, regulation paragraph 1:107, IRS.

Florida Methodist Foundation: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference and Robert C. Holmes convened the Foundation. He introduced the officers of the Foundation. R. C. Boggs moved the Foundation elect the following directors: Roy A. Perry, Quillian S. Yancey, M. C. Cleveland, Ralph W. Sedgwick and Charles P. Hamilton.

Recommendations: Moved by R. M. Blackburn, seconded by J. E. Waller that the Directors of the Florida Methodist Foundation, Inc., a charitable corporation not for profit, Lakeland, Florida, be hereby authorized to transact all matters of business pertaining to this Corporation until the next

meeting of the Corporation. The report was adopted. (See Reports). The Foundation was then adjourned and the Conference was reconvened by Bishop Henly.

Lay Ballot No. 4. Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of Glenn Gold, Earl Kelso, and Mrs. Henrine Banks. Ballot No. 5 was then taken.

Clerical Ballot No. 3 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced that no one was elected. Ballot No. 4 was taken.

Presentation: John Simon with the assistance of the ministers and laymen of the DeLand District honored J. Milburn McLeod upon his leaving

Presentation: Gordon Strickland escorted Mr. and Mrs. James Curtis, Missionaries assigned as advisors to Kenya, to the platform and introduced to the Conference.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 12:45 P.M.

Friday Afternoon—June 4, 1971

Opening: Bishop Henley called the Conference to order at 2:30 P.M. with the singing of the hymn "God of Love and God of Power," after which Bishop Henley led in prayer.

Privilege: Bishop Henely requested cooperation on time and procedures so that the agenda can be met.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 5, Jurisdictional Delegates: The Conference Secretary announced the results of Lay Ballot No. 5, and Bishop Henley declared Mrs. Hugh Wilcox elected.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 4, Jurisdictional Delegates: The Conference Secretary announced the results of clerical ballot No. 4, and Bishop Henley declared Melton Ware and Don Steger elected to the Jurisdictional Conference delegation.

Motion: Ralph Huston moved and the Conference adopted that in the balloting for Reserve Delegates to the Southern Jurisdictional Conference, the former E.U.B. member with the highest number of votes and the 4 Methodist members with the highest number of ballots be declared the elected Reserve Delegates from the Florida Conference. It carried after all former E.U.B. members of the Conference lay and clerical were enumerated, and the next ballot was taken.

Resolution: Hector Navas moved the adoption of the following Resolution and it carried:

Whereas, General Conference of 1968 has clearly expressed its will that the church become more inclusive by encouraging greater minority participation, and

Whereas, in order to implement its will the General Conference established the Commission on Religion and Race mandating it to work toward this end, and

Whereas, the Florida Annual Conference is always striving to make its fellowship more inclusive and has done this by electing delegates from the black community as delegates to General Conference, and

Whereas, this great Conference of Methodism has a large and growing Hispanic community, but NO Hispanic delegate to General Conference, and

Whereas, the Hispanic community welcomes the opportunity to participate more fully in the life of this Conference and in the church at large

Therefore, we move that this conference authorize one Hispanic fraternal delegate to accompany our official delegates to both the General and Jurisdictional Conferences to be held in Atlanta and Lake Junaluska respectively. It is further moved that this Hispanic fraternal delegate be the Reverend Ornan Iglesias.

Committee Appointments: Bishop Henley appointed Walter D. Edwards (chmn.), John Bass, Dr. Curtis D. Benton, David Denslow, Henry Galloway, Jiles Kirkland, Larry Henize, Ed Norman, Don Richardson, Walter Rutland, Mrs. R. de Q. Sullivan, John Sanderson, and Don Steger to the Conference Reading Fellowship.

Recognition: Dr. Anderson, President of Scarritt College, was presented and he greeted the Conference.

Committee on Reference: Donald MacKay presented the report of the Committee on Reference, with some referrals to the later World Service presentation. The resolution on the use of church property to alleviate overcrowded public school conditions where practicable was recommended. Two resolutions by David Scoates concerning requests for legislation concerning disposition of apportionments were recommended and referred to World Service and Finance. A resolution by Whitney Dough was referred to the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

Conference Evangelists: Herbert Bowdoin, Frank Seghers, and James Ridgway were nominated and approved as Conference Evangelists. (See Reports).

Minimum Salary Committee: Gene Zimmerman presented the initial report of the Committee on Minimum Salary, with the study being continued on other aspects of the provisions. Zimmerman moved adoption of Rule 1 of the report recommendations and, following discussion, it was adopted, effective January 1, 1972. (See Reports). Rule 2 was moved, and following a lengthy discussion and motion for the previous question by David Shafer which carried, it was adopted. (See Reports). A motion by David Day to reconsider Rule 1 and its wording was defeated. Rule 3 was moved, discussed and a change of wording suggested by David Day carried, after which it was adopted. (See Reports). Rule 4 was presented, and after a statement to the Conference by Roger Rolison about the financial plight of Student Lay Pastors, a motion to call the previous question by Hoyt Tatum carried and Rule 4 (A. and B.) was adopted. (See Reports). Rule 5 was presented, discussed, and adopted. (See Reports). Rule 6 was presented, discussed, and adopted. (See Reports). Rule 7 was presented,

discussed, and adopted. (See Reports). Motion by Gaylon Howe to delete Rule 7 as superfluous was defeated.

Order of the Day: Bishop Henley explained the time problems and conflicts with the Order of the Day. A break in the report of the Minimum Salary Committee was moved and approved in order to receive the report of Mr. John I. Carlson, who had flown in to represent Marts and Lundy in the Feasibility Study Report.

Feasibility Study: Dr. Sam Banks, chairman of the Committee of Nine, presented the report and recommendations of the study on feasibility of a major funds campaign for Florida Southern College and Bethune-Cookman College. (See Reports). He introduced John I. Carlson, Vice-President of Marts and Lundy Consultants, who spoke to the Conference about the results, conclusions, and recommendations of the study, and the Conference expressed its appreciation. Questions and discussion were entertained. Harold Brooks moved a secret written ballot be taken on the question, and the motion was defeated. Paul Hartsfield moved adoption of the report and its recommendations, and it was adopted by a standing vote of 427 For and 133 Aganist. (See Reports).

Closing: Bishop Henley announced worship and evening session promptly at 7:30 P.M. and urged promptness. Ralph Huston moved and the Conference approved a special business session of the Conference following the evening worship service. The session was adjourned.

Friday Evening Session—June 4, 1971

Opening: The Conference worship service under the direction of Wally and Joan West, Directors of education and youth ministries at First United Methodist Church of Clearwater, presented the Chapel Choir in a dramatization "Living in the Spirit, a Parable of Reconciliation in Music" by Dr. Philip Landgrave. George Dettman led the prayer and received the offering.

Report of Lay Ballot No. 1 Reserve Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of EUB delegates Mrs. James Yost, and Methodist delegates Dr. J. M. Marlowe, Mrs. Doris Ware, Mrs. Guy Thomas, and Mrs. Bertha Bankston.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 5 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced that no one was elected. The sixth ballot was taken.

Sermon: George Dettman introduced Dr. Samuel Kamaleson who sang "No One Ever Cared For Me Like Jesus" before delivering the sermon.

Minimum Salary Committee: Eugene Zimmerman, Chairman, presented the salary recommendations for 1972.

Amendment: David Woerner moved to amend the recommendations by increasing each category by \$400.00. After receiving a second, he spoke to the amendment.

Amendment: George Foster moved that each category be raised by \$200.00 giving those on Minimum salary a \$400.00 for 1972 over 1971. It was seconded, and following discussion was adopted by the Conference, which then approved the section and the entire report. (See Reports).

Resolution: Lloyd Knox introduced the following resolution: "Be it resolved that every active full member, associate member and lay pastor voluntarily contribute 1% of his annual salary, on a monthly or quarterly basis, through the Conference treasurer, to the minimum salary fund." It was seconded, and after discussion, rejected by the Conference.

Resolution for a Minimum Salary Foundation: Walter D. Edwards presented the following resolution which was seconded and adopted by the Conference.

WHEREAS, one part of the difficulty in increasing the level of minimum salary support is the lack of available money from the Conference Benevolence Funds, and

Whereas, we believe that some of our ministers and many of our lay people wish to do something personally for this urgent need, and

Whereas, we understand that some other conferences in our jurisdiction (North Georgia, and Western North Carolina) have helped meet this need through a foundation plan,

Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Florida Annual Conference consider a foundation fund to receive gifts from interested persons, to be administered by the Florida Methodist Foundation, with the income to be used to increase minimum salary support in our Conference above the level attainable through the benevolence funds of the Florida Conference, We further request a report by the Minimum Salary Commission concerning this be made directly to the 1972 Annual Conference.

Resolution: Robert T. Standifer presented the following resolution.

RESOLUTION

To the One Hundred Twenty-nineth Session of the Florida Annual Conference

Whereas, The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church uses the term "minimum salary" in Paragraph 924, instead of the "minimum support" as used in the Journal of the Florida Annual Conference, 1970, and in the reports of the Minimum Salary Committee and the Commission on World Service and Finance to this session of the Florida Annual Conference; and

Whereas, the said Book of Discipline in Paragraph 927 states that: "The total of all travel, automobile, and other expenses allowed and paid to a pastor in addition to his salary shall be in a separate column from that of pastor's salary and adjacent thereto"; and

Whereas, the Manual for the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee used in each local church states under "Travel Expenses": "In addition to salary and fringe benefits the pastor should receive an adequate annual travel allowance to help cover the expenses of purchasing a car and traveling within the parish. This travel expense item is not to be considered as salary but it is to be charged to church administrative costs. The committee will be alert to make certain that the travel expense allowance is adequate to cover the very high costs of driving and maintaining a car in the discharge of a minister's parish ministry"; and

Whereas, it is impossible to determine a real or base salary when combined with a variable travel expense under "minimum support" or "minimum salary."

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the term "minimum support" be changed to "minimum salary" in the reports of the Minimum Salary Committee and the Commission on World Service and Finance, which will become a part of the Journal of the Florida Annual Conference, 1971, so as to coincide with the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

Be It Further Resolved, that "minimum salary" be salary only, and not include travel expenses or other expenses, as directed above.

Be It Further Resolved, that travel expense be a negotiable item between a pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee within each local church, subject to annual review.

ROBERT T. STANDIFER

Motion: John Fletcher moved that the resolution be referred to the Minimum Salary Committee for study and reported out at Annual Conference 1972. It was seconded and adopted by the conference.

Resolution: Eugene Parks presented the following resolution which was seconded.

Recognizing that all of the causes presented to the Annual Conference for its endorsement and assistance in funding are worthy but also realizing that it is not possible to fund all requests, and believing that we do not presently have any specific body charged with studying all our needs and recommending financial priorities for the Conference,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Conference request the Bishop and

cabinet to form such a committee, composed of an equal number of lay and clerical members, of the stature of the membership of the Committee of Nine, whose responsibility it will be to recommend to the next Annual Conference short and long range financial priorities for the Florida Annual Conference.

Motion to Suspend the Standing Rules: It was moved, seconded and approved by the Conference to suspend the standing rules in order to discuss the resolution.

Referral: John Rooks asked about costs and proposals for funding for the committee. By common consent, the maker Gene Parks, willingly accepted John Rook's suggestion that the matter be referred to the Commission on Research and Planning of the Program Council.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 6 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of M. McCoy Gibbs, and Henry Galloway. The seventh ballot was taken.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 10:55 P.M.

FIFTH DAY

Saturday Morning Session—June 5, 1971

Opening: The Conference was convened at 9:00 A.M. with Bishop James W. Henley presiding. After singing "Holy, Holy, Holy" Bishop Henley introduced Dr. Samuel Kamaleson who sang "I Traveled on a Lonely Road" and then delivered the morning sermon.

Journal: Walter Edwards, reporting for the committee on the Journal, reported that the minutes had been examined and found to be correct.

Motion: Bob Gisler moved that the Conference grant permission to the Committee to read and approve the minutes of the final session of the Conference.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 7 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of R. C. Boggs. The eighth ballot was taken.

Announcement: Bishop Henley announced that the \$500 scholarship from the Fellowship Class of the Ortega United Methodist Church as been awarded to John Wolfe, student at Candler.

Cabinet Nominations: Robert Boggs for the Cabinet, announced those to be elected by the Annual Conference. All nominations with corrections and additions were approved. (See Conference Officers)

Privilege: John Rooks announced the illness of Miss Eulalie Ginn and requested greetings be sent to her. The brochure of the Negro Colleges Advance was presented.

Insurance: Robert Caviness reported on the Committee on Insurance. Discussion and questions were entertained concerning health insurance portion which was adopted. The life insurance portion was discussed and adopted. Bruce Gannaway reported on the closing of the old group plan.

Privilege: Trall Heitzenrater announced that the Oxnam-Liebman Award for Advancement of Inter-racial Understanding was given to Dr. C. Philip Bosserman. He moved that 1) the secretary send sympathy greetings to Dr. Bossermann concerning the death of his wife, Sue Moyer Bosserman and 2) an indication of this action be sent to both the Bishop and the Secretary of the Kansas Conference. The floor was yielded to Dr. William Hughlett who moved that the Conference send sympathy greetings to Mrs. Piper, widow of Dr. Piper, and to Dr. and Mrs. Hardee.

Report of the Women's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Allen Watson presented Audrey Parveen James from Isabella Thoburn College, Lucknow, U. P. India. The report of the WSCS was presented. (See Reports). The report was adopted.

Privilege: Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Bruce Gray expressed their appreciation to John Rooks for his leadership on the Program Council relative to the WSCS.

Board of Laity: Richard V. Moore nominated William A. Meadows for Conference Lay Leader for this year. Mr. Meadows was elected. Mr. Meadows nominated the district lay leaders and they were elected. He then announced the members of the Board of Laity. The report of the Board of Laity with corrections and supplement was presented and approved (See Reports). The announcement concerning the Leesburg Retreat was made by Mr. Meadows.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 8 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced that no one was elected. The 9th ballot was taken.

World Service and Finance: Eugene West presented the report of the Commission and supplement. The reports were moved, seconded and approved separately by the Conference. (See Reports)

Resolutions: Monroe Hatch presented two petitions by David Scoates made to the World Service Commission. Petition No. 1: "I move that the Florida Conference petition the 1972 General Conference of the United Methodist Church for legislation by which the Annual Conference may accept, increase or decrease its World Service Apportionment." The committee voted concurrence and the Annual Conference approved the petition.

Petition No. 2: "I move that the Florida Conference petition the 1972 General Conference of the United Methodist Church for legislation by which the local church may designate specific priorities for its World Service Apportionment." The Commission voted non-concurrence.

Previous Question: After discussion, Hoyt Tatum moved the previous question. It was seconded and approved by the Conference. The question was then called and the Conference affirmed 413 to 233 the Commission's report of Non-concurrence.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 9 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced that no one was elected. The 10th ballot was taken.

Constitutional Amendments: John Rooks presented the Constitutional Amendments which the Conference approved: Amendment No. 5, 564 for and 13 Against. Amendment No. 6, 531 for and 20 against.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 10 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced that no one was elected. Ballot No. 11 was taken.

Motion: Upon motion and second the Conference voted to suspend the Standing Rules to hear a resolution by Dick Cash.

Resolution: The Florida Conference Council on Youth Ministry concerning Amendment number 6:

"This resolution is subject to the approval of amendment six by \(\frac{7}{3} \) of the annual conferences of the church and the General Conference of 1972.

"As members of the Florida Conference Council on Youth Ministry, we endorse the proposed amendments numbers five and six to the constitution of The United Methodist Church and urge annual conference youth to work to get these two amendments passed.

"Furthermore, we suggest that, should Amendment Six be passed, that the following process be taken in selecting the youth from the districts.

"1) That the Conference Council on Youth Ministry; the Conference Age-Level Coordinator for Young Adults (19-25) or equivalent; and the Conference staff person for Higher Education and Campus Ministry, in consultation with the District Superintendent; District Council on Youth Ministry; and District Age-Level Coordinator for Young Adults (19-25) or equivalent select the two youth per district.

"2) That at least 25% of the total number of youth delegates be from minority-populated groups in the annual conference. (That is, at least one minority person from the six districts which have the largest population of minority persons in the United Methodist church, which are Tampa, Gainesville, Miami, West Palm Beach, DeLand, and Jacksonville)"

Amendment: R. C. Boggs moved, and it was seconded, that the Resolution be referred back to the Youth Council and reported out at the 1972 Conference. After discussion the Conference defeated the amendment.

Previous Question: David Shaver moved the Previous Question which was seconded and approved by the Conference. The Resolution was then Adopted by the Conference.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 11 Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced no one elected. The Twelfth Ballot was taken.

Children's Home: Durward McDonell presented the Children's Home Charter amendment which was approved.

Board of Ministry: W. S. Bozeman and Pat McBride offered corrections and additions to the report of the Board of Ministry all of which were approved.

Resolutions: W. S. Bozeman presented the following resolution,

"Whereas there is an increasing need to assist ministers and their families with personal and professional problems;

And whereas the cabinet, recognizing this need has made available the necessary portion of money to fund this program until January 1, 1972,

And whereas the college has offered to provide this service for an additional \$5,000;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Florida Annual Conference request the World Service and Finance Commission to make available in its 1972 budget \$5,000 annually for a counseling center for ministers and their families:

And be it further resolved, that a Quadrennial Committee of five be appointed from the Board of the Ministry and the cabinet to study and provide guidelines for this program."

The Standing Rules were suspended and the resolution was adopted.

Report of the Standing Rules: Ralph Huston presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee with corrections (See Reports).

Amendment: Robert May moved that paragraph one of the Standing Rules Committee's report be withdrawn. After discussion the amendment was defeated and the Standing Rules report was adopted. (See Reports).

Resolution: The standing rules were suspended, and Ralph Huston moved and the Conference adopted the following Resolution regarding Resolutions to the Annual Conference:

Standing Rule X. 5. All resolutions requiring the action of the Annual Conference must be received not later than 30 days prior to the opening day of Annual Conference.

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 12, Jurisdictional Delegates: Bishop Henley announced the election of Robert Bledsoe and the completion of the regular delegation. The next ballot, for reserve delegates, was taken.

Privilege: Bishop Henley announced moving procedures and obligations and the closing of pastors' salaries for outgoing pastors as May 31.

Moving Day: Robert Boggs moved that the Moving Day for the Conference be Thursday, June 10, 1971, and it was approved.

Study of the Ministry: James P. Dale moved the adoption of the report and recommendations of the Committee on the Study of the Ministry, and it was approved. (See Reports).

Quadrennial Emphasis: William Ferguson moved and the Conference adopted the report of the Quadrennial Emphasis Committee. (See Reports).

Resolution: The Committee on Reference returned with a recommendation of concurrence the following Resolution, which as granting permission but not legislating or promoting was adopted:

but not legislating or promoting, was adopted:
We, the members of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, being aware of the urgent need for public classrooms facilities in our state, and acknowledging with gratitude that many of our churches began with meetings in local public school facilities—as a witness to our Christian faith and concern, offer the following recommendations:

1. That, where possible, United Methodist Church facilities be used to alleviate overcrowding in specific public school zones. Such use may lessen the tax burden of building additional classrooms.

2. That a survey of, and consent to, availability of United Methodist facilities shall be made in each district; and that any necessary financial arrangements be worked out between the local church and the local public school system.

3. That we encourage other denominations to seriously consider a similar plan.

Preachers' Relief Board: Eldon Simmons submitted the report of the Preachers' Relief Board and it was adopted. (See Reports).

Committee on Conference Union: W. W. Roughton presented the report of the Committee on Conference Union, and it was adopted. (See Reports).

Property Resolution: W. W. Roughton presented the following Resolutions, which were adopted:

BURBANK METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH

Whereas, worship services and other church activities were discontinued several years ago at the Burbank Methodist Episcopal Church, South, legally described as follows:

Committee on Resolutions: Dr. Richard Moore recognized Mrs. W. L. Pinesett, who read the report of the Committee on Resolutions and it was approved. (See Reports.)

Resolution: Whitney Dough moved the following resolution, which was adopted:

WHEREAS Holy Scripture says, "Let marriage be held in honor among all . . . for God will judge the immoral and the adulterous" (Hebrew 13:4), and

Whereas Our State, down to the smaller communities, is being flooded with public obscenity and commercialized hard-core pornography being disseminated by so-called "adult book stores," and "mini-adult theaters," and

Whereas such material presents human beings as supremely animalistic, engaged in acts of prostitution and bestiality, thus challenging and contradicting the Christian concept of man as a child of God and thus strongly undermining humanity and civilization:

Be It Therefore Resolved That: The Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church go on record as urging the Florida State Legislature to see that State laws prohibiting public obscenity and commercialized pornography be diligently enforced and that additional legislation be enacted (as necessary) to curb such traffic—and that

Furthermore, The Florida Annual conference of The United Methodist Church urge all family newspapers to follow the constructive example of the "San Francisco Examiner" in refusing to accept advertisements promoting public obscenity and commercialized pornography.

Appreciation: Bishop Henley expressed appreciation of those in attendance at the Conference, the Conference secretarial staff, the Cabinet, the host College, the Press, the Tellers and Ushers, all participants on the program, and the uniquely outstanding preachers of the worship sessions. He then spoke about return home, changes of appointments, and other considerations by the churches and ministers.

Appointments: Bishop Henley presented printed lists of the 1971 Appointments, corrected and amended them, and then read the Special Appointments. The Special Appointments (Section B) were approved by the Conference. (See Reports.)

Report of Clerical Ballot No. 8, Jurisdictional Reserve Delegates: Bishop Henley declared Hector Navas elected to the Jurisdictional Conference as the former E.U.B. Reserve. On motion, the Conference voted to accept the 4 highest Methodist delegates as Reserves whenever the balloting was counted after adjournment, with the names to be published in the Journal. (Seee Delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences.)

Adjournment: Bishop Henley led in the singing of The Doxology and declared the Conference adjourned at 1:35 P.M.

EPISCOPAL MESSAGE

BISHOP JAMES W. HENLEY

The church is called into being for the spiritual cultivation of those within its fellowship, to become the koinonia or the rejoicing, committed, proclaiming body of those who have discovered God in Christ Jesus. The source of its light and hope and love is found in the cross of Christ. Its way of life is delineated in the pattern and example of Jesus, his teachings, his serving ministry, his love to the death. Its unfaltering hope is founded upon the Easter message and the prospect of eternal life. Its standard of ethics—of right and wrong—both personally and in society—are to be found in the teachings of Jesus and in the exposition of those teachings throughout the New Testament. Life Styles (ways of life) which contradict the teaching or example of Christ or the revelation of his spirit through the scriptures are not to be entertained. There are those who seriously question the teachings of Jesus and of the epistles with regard to the sanctity of sex. There are those who are defying the teachings of the New Testament with regard to the sanctity of marriage and the home. There are those among us, who in a day when we are desperately searching for safety on the highway and when we discover that well over half the fatal accidents involve drunken driving, proclaim themselves to be Christians but through public example teach others to drink. Personal morality is never practiced in a vacuum. The Christian life becomes the salt of the earth for the saving of others. The unChristian life becomes a virus which destroys the high and the holy. A Gallup Poll or a Kinsey Report have no relationship to what is good or bad. Their revelations end with their statistics on how much licentiousness and drunkenness there is abroad. This has nothing whatever to do with what is Christian or what is not Christian. Likewise the social practices of society are under the judgement of Christ. Wherever there is injustice or discrimination or callousness or prejudice there is evil. As such it is under the judgement of God and should be under the condemnation of the church.

But let us beware, lest we abandon the indispensable qualities of personal experience, personal spiritual renewal, personal moral discipline to pursue the other tangent of social concerns. The Christian message to the world begins with the Christian rebirth of the individual. Yet the individual who is not deeply concerned socially is a spiritual dwarf.

METHODISM AND ITS PEOPLE

Some years ago, during the period when Methodist union was being deliberated, there came a small volume from the pen of Dr. Paul N. Garber of the Duke Divinity School entitled "The Methodists Are One People." Let us consider this title in a different context from that in which Dr. Garber was writing. British Methodism was in the beginning unified through the dynamic leadership of the Reverend John Wesley. He was the seal and symbol of the Methodist revival. He was the self-proclaimed head of all the societies. He was the author of all articles of discipline, of government, and of rituals of worship. The ministers were appointed to their several stations of service by Mr. Wesley. Still, within the framework of this fellowship there was great liberty and the growth of the English church (which for five decades was spectacular), was attributable to the spiritual dynamics which motivated the ministry and the laity. All England knew about the Methodists and among them there was a cohesiveness and a conscious union in experience and purpose.

This movement which was evangelical, committed to social reform, and closely knit through effective administration had an influence in the

British Isles which far outstripped its numerical power or the prestige of its leadership.

Historically it is significant that the Methodist movement, arising through pentecostal experiences similar to those of the early Apostolic church, found itself almost immediately confronted with the necessity of having an institutional form sufficiently strong to knit together the circuits and congregations of the entire country. So from the beginning of the Wesleyan movement in England one can easily trace the rapid developments of the structure of the institution which was to become the body for its spirit.

The example of Mr. Wesley's administrative leadership in England became basic in the development of American Methodism. But here the vast expanse of this sprawling continent and the fabulous growth of its population and, indeed, of the Methodist Church, required a more complex structure of the institution on these shores was to preserve the character of connectionalism so conspicuous in Wesleyan Methodism in England. Here the General Conference with democratic representation from the ministerial and lay ranks of the annual conferences became the law making body of the church. Here, too, the broad programs of world missions, of Christian education, of social concerns, and many others looked to the General Conference for such legislation and national structure as were necessary to project the general plans of the church. Here the overall budget for the national church is adopted by the delegates from the several annual conferences. Next come the jurisdictional or regional conferences where such programs and institutions are established as are deemed necessary and desirable in the locale of the region and where bishops are elected to serve within the bounds of the regional jurisdiction.

The components of the jurisdiction are the annual conferences. And within the annual conferences are the local congregations. This connectional-ism—this linkage of the entire church through a series of conferences—establishes the unity of Methodism. In a day when all institutions are under scrutiny let us be cautious lest we surrender vital elements in our historic relations. A minister of the United Methodist Church belongs to an annual conference—but his ministerial membership is within the entire church and he is equally a part with any other minister anywhere in the fellowship of its clergy.

According to Miami papers, 7600 employees, many of them highly trained in technical skills, were layed-off recently in Miami alone in the aviation industry; highly trained men with advanced academic degrees and proven ability are without jobs in the area of Cape Kennedy; in certain of the disciplines of university instruction qualified Ph.D. professors by the hundreds are seeking employment. The current surplus of college teachers continues to worsen according to figures released a few weeks ago by the Cooperative College Registry, a non-profit organization which assists college teachers and administrators in finding and filling jobs. The number of registrants seeking teaching jobs has increased 25% in one year while the number of vacancies declined 25%. In the field of chemistry 476 academically qualified candidates were confronted with a total of only 10 vacancies listed. In the field of religion 223 candidates with graduate degrees stood against 8 listed vacancies. In the field of education, science, and industry persons with splendid qualifications are becoming occupied in menial jobs because there are no openings for the employment of their skills.

Yet there is not one single active member of the Florida Conference who is qualified for appointment, who does not have his church. At the same time, there will be no empty pulpits in the United Methodist Church in Florida. This is made possible by the fact that we are a connectional church. Together we are able to accomplish what would never be possible if we were congregational in nature. Having lived as a minister under the appointive system for almost three times as long as I have served as the chairman of the conference cabinet, I am quite persuaded that most ministers have at some time an appointment which they would not have chosen and most churches have at some time a minister whom they

would not have preferred, yet I firmly believe the cabinet system of appointments made by one's peers who can have no personal rewards except through commitment to impartial service, is the most satisfactory structure in Protestantism.

The number of young men preparing for the United Methodist ministry has been increasing steadily for several years. The consolidation of churches into a larger parish system is steadily reducing the number of ministers required. Still, at least for the present, every qualified man has his appointment and receives the salary agreed upon by his church. Alas, perhaps there are some of us who, in a congregational system, where we were not guaranteed an appointment, would be lone and lost, seeking a job without a call or an invitation. It is not yet clear how or how soon a surplus of ministers will make necessary the establishment of greater selectivity of those received and the elimination of the less effective.

Just as a United Methodist minister in Florida is equally recognized throughout the church, being a lay member of a connectional church means, as I like to recall, that a lay person belonging to our smallest church in Florida is just as much a United Methodist whether he is in his own congregation on a Sunday morning or he worships in the First United Methodist Church of Seattle, Washington, or Portland, Maine, or Los Angeles, California.

We are in a period when our priorities do need to be examined periodically and when our structure needs to be revised from time to time more effectively to meet the needs of changing times, but let us beware lest we deal carelessly or iconoclastically with institutions which have proved their worth and which need seriously to be evaluated before being mutilated.

MISSIONS

I am confident that if we will allow ourselves to be God's instruments He will use us and our dollars to build His kingdom in a way that outruns our largest dreams. It is possible to fulfill the Great Commission because it is from God and because the risen Christ is with those who seek to obey it.

The first benevolent responsibility of United Methodists is World Service and Conference Benevolences. This is the very life-blood of Methodism. All of her boards and agencies depend upon it for their continued operation, and much of the program which enables us to be the "body of Christ" in the world is dependent upon World Service gifts. In a vital way this "First Mile" giving offers the local parish an arm which can be extended into all areas of Christian concern.

As Florida United Methodists we feel called to continue enthusiastically "Second Mile" giving through the ADVANCE FOR CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH. The ADVANCE has become for us a primary way in which to express our compassion and concern. Through Advance Special gifts churches, groups and individuals may enter into a more personalized relationship with missionaries, nationals and specific mission programs. Through these gifts we are able to establish partnerships in mission at home and around the world.

A priority for World Advance support is the salaries and needs of the missionary couples who have a special relationship to Florida. However, any United Methodist missionary deserves and will appreciate your support.

Among National Advance Specials our first priority is our Florida Spanish Ministry, \$45,000 is needed each year to maintain the effective program now being offered to Spanish speaking people in our state. In addition we have a great concern for the pastors of our churches in Puerto Rico. Support for them is most urgently needed.

Through your support of the United Methodist Commission for Overseas Relief you participate in a very real way in meeting crisis needs among people around the world. Extending this hand of mercy is a most Christlike ministry.

In addition, there are many needs within the borders of our Conference

that deserve your generous support. In many of these we are able to invest time and talent as well as dollars. All these programs need to be undergirded by our prayers.

OUR MINISTRY IN THE SMALL CHURCH

We have some 350 churches in the Conference with less than 250 members. Nearly 200 of these have less than 100 members. Most of these churches were established in horse and buggy days. The grammar schools serving their children have been consolidated. The roads are good now and children can be transported over greater distances to be educated in better schools than the one room school house. This fact is for the churches, too. The roads on which our church people travel to these smaller churches are now excellent. Most everyone has some means of transportation better than the horse and buggy. The cabinet has been striving over a period of four or five years to get many of these churches together for the purpose of serving the membership better and of having a greater impact in the name of Christ on the country round about.

It is difficult to unite these churches under the Discipline without the cooperation of the people involved. Yet a minister who has one, two or three churches often does not have a full work load. There just aren't enough people (church members or otherwise) for him to serve. I am taking this opportunity to plead with the delegates from our small churches to give their support and encouragement to the members of their congregations in cooperating with the District Superintendents in bringing about these unions of historic church families into larger, more compact, more effective congregations. You ministers and lay people can help in this. If it is not done the Conference will be forced, sooner or later, to take such financial measures as will necessitate that which we should do voluntarily and cooperatively.

A number of mergers of small churches have been affected and without exception they are proving a blessing to everyone involved. The minister is able to serve his people more effectively. The congregation is sufficiently large to create a sense of confidence and security. Church property has been greatly improved in every case. This is the thing that should be done in many, many instances.

A WORD OF APPRECIATION

In many of our communities we have been able to launch new congregations because of the cooperation of school boards in either granting the church temporary use of limited school facilities on Sunday morning or through rentals of these facilities at very nominal sums. Several of our congregations have realized our indebtedness and have sought to reciprocate somewhat in making available, at least on a temporary basis, the use of certain church school educational facilities for the use of the public schools. I wish simply to take note of this commendable inter-relationship which I believe to be most salutary and appropriate. There are doubtless other situations throughout the conference where the churches can, at least make temporary arrangements for meeting the crisis in public school facilities.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Some of us have been deeply concerned for five years now because of a gradual decline in Sunday School attendance (9:30 Sunday morning) which has become accepted as almost inevitable. At first it was attributed to changing life patterns in society—longer weekends, greater secular concerns, the lure of the mountains and the beaches, etc. Some attributed it to outdated church school curricula with literature that was not commensurate with the quality of materials to which children were accustomed in their public schools. But we changed literature and we had an outcry from teachers that it was either beyond their competency or inappropriate for the needs of youth and adults. The sober fact remains that Sunday school

attendance continued to decline and the people involved in the total church

school program was decreasing as well.

I have personally entertained the conviction that the primary reason for our disappointing statistics with regard to the Sunday school lies in the fact that neither ministers nor Sunday School leaders were making deliberate, sustained, and systematic efforts to reach children, boys and girls, youth and adults for this indispensable area of our program of Christian education.

Early in December I invited 5 District Superintendents serving the territory in or near Lakeland—(Orlando, Lakeland, St. Petersburg, Sarasota, and Tampa). I suggested that they talk with twelve of their ministers in each district, three in churches ranging up to 249 members; three in churches from 250 to 499; three in churches from 500 to 999; three from churches of 1000 upward. The ministers of these churches were to be asked if they would like to cooperate in an effort to see what could be done in reaching the people and enlisting them in their respective Sunday schools. Four or five persons came with their respective ministers from these five districts to Lakeland in two successive months. We explained that we had no formula to give them. There was no conference pattern according to which they would undertake their task. We shared together in our four groups bracketed according to the size of churches, pooling our ideas as to what could be done in our own communities. We were not attempting to do the same thing across the board. We were all seeking for such illumination as would make it possible to do our best in our local situation.

We took inventory on our gains and losses in January, February, March, and April. Our total net gain in the 58 churches for the four months was

1970—not spectacular but significant. It can be done.

Dr. William Osler spoke with profound wisdom when in addressing a class of graduating medical students he said, "young gentlemen, the first requisite in the care of the patient is to care."

CONFERENCE PROGRAM DIRECTOR

This conference should not go by without expressing its appreciation to Dr. John J. Rooks for the leadership he gave in the establishment of the Conference Council. The Florida Conference was in the vanguard of this structure development and preceded the action of the General Conference establishing the Conference Council as an official instrument of the boards and agencies of the conference in the implementation of the conference program. There were many rough places to be made smooth and many dark places which needed light. The entire church seems to have the conviction that the General Conference was well advised in the authorizing of the Conference Council structure. It was new. It had to be explained. It had to be molded and formed to the needs of each annual conference and we are still in the process. It was Dr. Rooks that began with us and has continued with us until this date as our Conference Program Director. I have presented the name of Dr. Melton Ware as a successor to Dr. Rooks who has requested to be returned to the ministry of the local pastorate. The Cabinet and the Conference have given their approval. An additional person will not be added to the staff to fill the numerical vacancy incurred through Dr. Rooks' new appointment.

THE LAITY

Methodism has been made great by the Holy Spirit working through its laity—these unordained and unappointed ambassadors of Christ who, like the first century Christians became witnesses of a new experience. They have been the supporters of the church in its fiscal needs because they love the church and because they believed its message. But the strength of their contribution to the church has been far greater than that of financial support. When Paul was taking up his offering for the poor saints at Jerusalem he told the Corinthians that the most generous Christians he knew were the Macedonians. They gave more than he expected and he was

overwhelmed with their generosity. Then he adds this significant word: "First they gave themselves to the Lord" (II Corinthians 8:5).

Do we have things in the right order? Are we giving some money and

Do we have things in the right order? Are we giving some money and a little time in the hope that this will restore the lost radiance of our lives? The correct order is always the same: First, we give ourselves; and then

comes the power, the joy, the victory.

We in Florida owe a debt that transcends our awareness to the laymen and the lay women and, may I say, the youth, who across the years in an unbroken line of splendor have become known far and wide for their dedication of mind and heart to the fulfillment of the will of Christ. We in Florida have reason to rejoice in the quality of character, mind and heart of the laity of our church. So many have set noble examples of Christian discipline in all of life as to inspire their brethren of other communions and the ministry of the church which they have supported, with their great loyalty.

The Lay Retreats at Leesburg continue their fabulous records of attendance. They send back to the local churches some two thousand newly inspired men anxious to become involved in the enrichment of the spiritual life and ministry of their home congregation. This does not happen without consecrated leadership, arduous planning and earnest preparation. Our hope is that these laymen will also relate themselves to movements in their several communities seeking to interpret the gospel through better human relations and social concerns.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Hail to the ladies of the Women's Society of Christian Service! They do not need our adulation. However, we would be remiss if we did not pay tribute to the outstanding work of the Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild. These ladies are constantly in search of the significance of our Christian faith in a world of disorder. They are not only studying the causes of our dilemmas, they are seeking for Christian answers. I was greatly stirred by the tremendous representation of our local societies at the annual meeting in Daytona Beach and was deeply grateful for the privilege of having a small part in the program there. Blessings on you, Mrs. Allen Watson and Miss Mozelle Silas and all those who labor with you.

YOUTH WORK

Our youth in the United Methodist Church in Florida represent for us a renewed hope for life and growth, for depth and breadth within our church and state. Their dreams of a humane and more inclusive society can give energy to the church, can open her eyes to new vistas of opportunities and cause her to reflect more deeply and earnestly on her purpose for being Christ's church.

Our Florida youth have participated in a variety of program opportunities this year ranging from the informal group meetings to weekends in the study of the role of sex in Christian living and seminars on peace and world order. Our four Bishop's Convocations provided opportunities to experience the oneness which our connectional church provides us all as we come from small and large congregations located in the open country, in towns and urban centers.

I wish to express gratitude to the Council on Youth Ministries. These young people have been faithful and committed to their tasks in their desire to interpret the Youth Service Fund to young people and adults in the local church. They have published a 32-page primer on the Youth Service Fund entitled "Everything You Have Ever Wanted to Know About the Youth Service Fund." This material has been broadly accepted throughout the church. They have adopted several projects such as town and country work, camp, scholarships, and legislative affairs. The young people have published Doorways, a monthly newspaper, in order to realize their desire to communicate with youth in the local church and to keep our

Conference informed concerning the opportunities open to young people. It is my continuing hope that local churches will give additional opportunities for youth representation on policy making boards and agencies in the local congregation. Our young people are the church of today as well as tomorrow. They are a part of its life and should be a part of its planning and decision making in determining its goals and achievements.

MINISTRY TO CHILDREN

Our ministry to children is receiving increased attention year by year. Churches and communities are focusing their concern and study upon the little folk. Children's camping will be offered this summer for the first time as a United Methodist Conference program. Your church should be represented. The Convocation on Confirmation Classes has proved successful in reaching children and in giving them a feeling of the broader nature and ministry of the church. Approximately 900 boys and girls and adults shared a day with me this past February. What is most important about this event, I think, is that it is their day—a chance to learn about their church and to express their feelings. I wish to say a word of gratitude to the members of the Conference Staff, to district workers and pastors, church school teachers and parents who made the Children's Convocation so satisfactory an experience.

THE MIGRANT WORKER

The plight of the migrant worker in Florida has been brought to the attention of the nation. The TV, national periodicals, the public press all have a recurrent note of concern for the people in this area of our society throughout the country. This statement is not designed to lay the blame on any particular person or group of persons nor have I had the opportunity of broadly studying the prevailing conditions. The fact seems to be well established that boys and girls growing up under the circumstances existing among our migrant people have little promise of education, self-development or future accomplishment. Where does hope lie? In the federal government? in the state government? in the counties? in the hands of the growers and farmers? I do not have the answer, but I do know that the church must not be unconcened about God's people wherever they are and under what-ever circumstances they live. Such concern need not be a threat to anyone and it should be a source of hope to many. I trust that sensitive individuals, including farming people and citrus people, will band together in Christian concern and discover such answers as will bring reassurance and encouragement and hope. We have certain ministers working in this area at present. They are diligent and we thank God for the rich contributions they are making. We must not be unaware of the spiritual needs of people as well as their needs for sustenance, for educational opportunities, and for healthful surroundings. This is a great state and within it are great churches and throughout its borders are hosts of Christians. We are summoned to bestir ourselves on behalf of every man and woman who finds himself circumstantially repressed, discouraged, lonely or impoverished.

VIETNAM

We commend the President for his efforts to terminate the war and for the number of men who have already been withdrawn. We deplore the irresponsibility of some demonstrators who have sought to jam the machinery of the entire government in the expression of their indignation. Let us urge that all our forces be withdrawn at the earliest possible moment that will, at the same time, gaurantee the safety and liberation of prisoners of war and the security of our men under arms during the war's termination. I, personally, fervently trust that this can be effected within the present calendar year. The tragedy of the conflict is not in the death of American youth alone, but also in the destruction of an ancient culture and the annihilation of multiplied thousands of people who really know nothing of the issues involved.

HOW THE BISHOPS ARE APPOINTED AND ASSIGNED

The Jurisdictional Conference has a standing Committee on Episcopacy consisting of one ministerial and one lay delegate elected from each annual conference by the annual conference delegation. Obviously, by this formula some areas have more representatives on the Committee on Episcopacy than others. The Atlanta Area, the Jackson (Mississippi) Area, the Birmingham Area, the Nashville Area, the Louisville Area and the South Carolina Area all consist of two or more annual conferences which give them a lay and a ministerial member on the Committee from each of their annual conferences while the Florida Area, the Holston Area, the Raleigh Area, the Charlotte Area and the Richmond Area have only one annual conference and consequently have only one lay and one clerical member on the Committee.

The Committee on Episcopacy assigns the bishops to their respective residences (that is, it recommends the assignment to the Jurisdictional Conference) but no newly elected bishop can be assigned to the Area from

which he was elected during his first quadrennium.

When do the bishops know where they are going? I learned on Saturday night about 10:30 at the close of the session when the Committee on Episcopacy came into the Jursidictional Conference and recommended the assignment. I considered myself the most fortunate bishop among them, but I'm sure I was as surprised as any member of the Florida delegation.

THE FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

On the recommendation of the Conference Council the Annual Conference of 1970 approved a feasibility study which would entail gatherings of Methodist leaders in every district of the conference for the discussion of the advisability of a campaign for Florida Southern College and Bethune-Cookman College. Marts and Lundy, a firm with a nation-wide reputation in fund raising, was employed to make the study. I was grateful for the response of the ministers and the laity, for their candid reactions to the questionnaires, and for the forthright presentation by the representatives of Marts and Lundy, Mr. Carlson and Mr. Dan Collins. We have two United Methodist Colleges in Florida of which we should be unapologetically proud. While Florida Southern College is owned by the Florida Conference, Bethune-Cookman College is owned by the General Board of Education of The United Methodist Church. Studies are being made now with the hope that our twelve Negro colleges, all located in the southeast, may be supported responsibly by the church at large so that the burden of adequately undergirding them will not fall upon the annual conference in which they are located. I commend to you the findings of the feasibility study as they shall be presented in these conference sessions.

A DAY AT BETHUNE-COOKMAN

I am extending an invitation to all ministers serving the churches historically related to the Florida Conference of the former Central Jurisdiction and to all members of these congregations, the cabinet, the president and vice-president of the Women's Society of Christian Service, the president and vice-president of the Board of Laity, the officers of the Boards of Pensions, Missions, Evangelism, the Youth Coordinator and representatives of the Council on Youth Ministries, the chairman and treasurer of the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the wives and husbands of those in attendance. It will be our privilege to see the new buildings at Bethune-Cookman, to worship together and to hear presented some important aspects of the life of our church.

I wish to express appreciation to all the ministers and lay people who have so heartily cooperated in the enrichment of our common fellowship since the merger of our conferences. Merger must be more than the bringing together of two conferences. It must be a merger of districts, communion between congregations, fellowship at assemblies, retreats, etc. We are one people. We will never be truly one unless we all strive so to

become and unless we place ourselves in those associations where we truly know each other and thus come to appreciate and to love each other to the fullest. This requires purposeful, intelligent, devoted cultivation and

fellowship in Christ.

It is my hope that all ministers and members of the black United Methodist communities and other interested friends will plan to be present at Bethune-Cookman College in Daytona Beach, on Saturday, June 12. Our session will begin promptly at ten o'clock in the morning and will conclude promptly at three o'clock in the afternoon. This is to be a day of fellowship. It is not a day of conference business or legislation. We expect to have a fine representation and a delightful occasion.

CONCLUSION

Well, this has been a long treatise on many subjects. But there are many others which I omit with tremendous regret. I would like to point once more to the absolute importance of the improvement of our facilities at the youth camp at Leesburg. We have a magnificent site and the rudiments of one of the finest church camps in the nation. I am eagerly awaiting the time when the Conference will devise plans to make it all that it needs to be.

I would liked to have included commendation of the United Methodist Foundation. It has been an invaluable instrument in the fiscal affairs of this Conference and we remain deeply indebted to Dr. Robert C. Holmes and

his Board of Directors for the leadership they have given.

I would liked to have emphasized again the importance of yoked churches—or instances where two or more churches plan their lives and programs together and seek to be of mutual assistance. This is of inescapable im-

portance and the situations where it is being done commend it.

I would liked to have been able to tell you how the bishops are elected at the jurisdictional conferences, where the five jurisdictional conferences will meet, etc. But time has run out. I leave the thoughts of this message with you for your consideration. I assure you that my heart, my prayers, and my devotion are now and will forever be in the work of United Methodism and most especially, in the Florida Conference.

BOARD OF MINISTRY

REPORT NO. 1

Your Board of the Ministry has tried to fulfill its twofold mission: (1) Guiding men through the Disciplinary requirements, step by step, for the ministry within the Florida Annual Conference; and (2) lending a brotherly hand to all fellow ministers in an ever deepening fellowship. This has been done through its Committees on Recruitment and Nurture, Pastor's School and Continuing Education, Conference Relations, Ministerial Education Fund, etc. Individual members continue to spend many hours in Counseling. Campus visitations have kept us in touch with our Florida men who are away in school.

Contact has been made with all other Boards of Ministry within the Southeastern Jurisdiction in regards to reciprocal agreements for loans from the Ministerial Education Fund. Some common approach to this problem will be found.

We rejoice in the increased participation of churches in accepting and paying the 2% apportionment for ministerial Education. Needs still greatly exceed funds. It is hoped that each one will read carefully the following accounting of these funds.

The real purpose of a credit union is to provide its members with a safe place to save their money, to earn dividends on their savings, and to pro-

vide them with loans when needed at the lowest cost possible.

What is the value of the credit union to you? You, who are ministers, elected lay members of annual and district conferences and institutional boards and employees of United Methodist Churches and Institutions, and members of their immediate families in the Florida United Methodist Credit

Probably foremost in the list of values is the knowledge that you can help a brother obtain a loan and financial counsel when it is desired. We are our

brother's keeper.

A 5% dividend currently is paid on share deposits. Up to \$500 loan on signature only, which may be just what you need to save cashing investments prior to dividend payments or to give you rather immediate cash at a very convenient time.

Insurance on share deposits up to \$2,000 at no additional cost when eligible. Brochures are available with exact details on both share desposits

and loan protection insurance.

Loan protection insurance on any money may borrow against at no ad-

ditional cost when eligible.

We can save you money on nearly any occasion you may desire to borrow. The Credit Union needs to become self-supporting and will need a thousand members and \$250,000 in share deposits. We should be able to do this in two or three more years. A Joint Account.—When a person has a single account, it doubles the share

deposit insurance on the first names.

Multiple Memberships—A separate account for 1) you 2) your wife 3) a child or children still in school. Probate laws and interpretations by different judges sometimes ties up bank accounts if something untoward should happen to you. To be absolutely safe, an account in your mate's name in a bank, savings and loan or preferably in a credit union, gives them immediate money to tide them over until the release of other funds. I know the proper wording on joint accounts should avoid any delay but I have had experience enough to know that widows have suffered unnecessarily.

Members may withdraw their money at any time.

Someone will be at the credit union table at Annual Conference to give you all the attention possible and to answer any questions you may have and, of course, to accept memberships and share deposits.

1971 ANNUAL REPORT FLORIDA CONFERENCE UNITED METHODIST CREDIT UNION

Your Conference Credit Union is now approximately a year and a half old. We have had good growth in the number of members, and share deposits, as well as the number of loans we have been able to service.

Last year we were able to pay a 5% dividend, and we have every indica-

tion that we can again pay 5% this year.

Perhaps a few comparisons will show you the growth the Credit Union has had. Last year at this time we had made 20 loans; as of this date, we have made 110-a four and half-fold increase. Last year at this time we had loaned \$12,618; this year we have loaned \$66,484—more than a five-fold increase. Last year we had 196 members, but as of this moment there are just a few members short of the 400 mark—a doubling of our membership. The share deposits in the Florida Conference United Methodist Credit Union last year at this time were a little over \$13,000. Now there are over 71,000 in share deposits. This is a growth of almost four and a half-fold in one year. We look forward to a continued growth next year; and it is our hope

that when we report to you at the Annual Conference next year, we can report that the goal we have set amongst ourselves for \$200,000 in share deposits has been reached. At that time, we believe we can be completely

self-sustaining and pay a 5% dividend.

We anticipate a measurable increase in loan applications for the next few weeks, and it is our hope that as a result of this Conference, and our lifting this before you, that we can have an increase in our share accounts to compensate for these immediate needs. We need our Conference members -both laymen and ministers-to support the Credit Union, as an investment for themselves and to provide a service for others.

We are grateful for the cooperation we have had from the Program Council and the Conference Treasurer's Office.

I close by saying that of the funds on hand at the Florida Conference United Methodist Credit Union at this date, we are over 93% loaned to our members; and all funds are either loaned to members, or invested in dividend-paying accounts.

FLORIDA CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

The Florida Conference Brotherhood has again, as in the years past, sent help to several families of our deceased brothers in the ministry. Upon notice of the death of one of our members, a check of \$1,000.00 is promptly sent to the beneficiary who is named by the deceased. The widow or the family has often expressed their thanks for this quick response to their need.

Membership is open to all ministers of the conference under 45 years of age. Those eligible are members in full connection, full time lay-pastors, conference evangelists, members serving as missionaries in foreign conferences, and new members on probation. Those on probation are given

special consideration while at school or otherwise during their first four years on probation.

To join, one pays One Dollar membership fee plus One Dollar annual dues. Upon the death of a member, the membership is assessed \$3.00 per call, and the probationary member is assessed \$1.00 per call. Before this is even collected, a check of \$1,000 is sent to the widow or the beneficiary.

Members of the conference who are over 45 years, may join by paying the initial fee and the annual dues plus the assessments for the years from their 45th birthday to the present time of their application. This amount

may be pro-rated over four years.

You may write to our Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. George H. Carlton at 1706 Carr Street, Palatka, Florida 32077 for an application or further information regarding the Brotherhood. However, anyone may attend our Brotherhood Breakfast in the Cafeteria during Annual Conference. This will be at 7:15 A.M. Friday morning, this year.

CONFERENCE PROGRAM COMMITTEE

The Annual Conference Program Committee is grateful to the many persons who have been involved in the year long process of preparing for this Conference, and for all of you whose suggestions have helped refine and polish the format for our procedure. We request that you make notes as the Conference moves along and write your helpful suggestions to the chairman by the first of October.

The time of the Conference itself has been extended this year to allow for the balloting for delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conference in addition to other conference business.

Tuesday calls for the organization of the Conference, an executive session for the ministry and an orientation session for lay members. The rest of the day will be given to all matters pertaining to the ministry, including ordination.

Wednesday morning we will review the work of the Church in Florida for the past year, including some representative ministries which are now being performed across the state. Wednesday afternoon is reserved for an in-put of all program and project proposals, including costs, to come before the Conference, including proposals and amendments from the floor. By Wednesday evening, all such proposals to come before the Conference should be before the house for overnight contemplation and reflection.

Beginning Thursday morning each item will be presented for debate and action. Important reports from Conference Boards and committees will be heard on successive days. World Service and Finance will present the Con-

ference budget, as revised by Conference action, on Friday afternoon.

It should be noted that the worship and devotional life of our Church is emphasized in the opening service of Holy Communion, the ordination service, devotions each morning, the reserving of each evening as a service of preaching and music, and at other moments of spontaneous response throughout the Conference.

Many boards, committees, and individuals request time on the Annual Conference Program. Reports to the Annual Conference often include resolutions, and they are passed in the Committee reports. We are happy to receive these resolutions as requests. Such requests are not binding upon the

Program Committee who has the responsibility for the whole.

All sessions of the Annual Conference, devotional or otherwise, are the business sessions of the Annual Conference, and my be called upon by the presiding officer to transact business items, receive reports, or ballot for delegates. We, therefore, urge all members to be present at all sessions of the Conference.

To preserve the schedule and maintain the order of the Conference, we suggest that delegates be seated in time for the morning devotions or wait outside until they are completed; that speakers conform to the time limitations, and that written reports be referred to in the Program Book while bringing recommendations for action to the attention of the Conference.

Your Program Committee recommends that the printed program become the program for this session of the Annual Conference, with such alterations as may become necessary in the opinion of the Presiding Officer, the Conference Secretary, and the Chairman of this Committee.

We call attention to the Standing Rules, Section I, Paragraph I, and all the sub-paragraphs thereunder, Page 282, 1970 Journal, for the procedure to be observed to expedite the business of the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES

The Committee on Standing Rules submits the following additions and amendments to the Standing Rules:

- 1. To change Standing Rule, Section V, Article 5 to read as follows:
 - "All Candidates for full connection shall serve for a minimum of twentyone months in the Florida Annual Conference under the supervision of a District Superintendent, except that faculty or staff in United Methodist Colleges, Univerities, or Seminaries may be permitted to render this service outside the bounds of the Florida Annual Conference."
- 2. That the following new Standing Rule be added, and designated as Section V, Article 6; and that the present Article 6 become Article 7, and all subsequent articles thereunder renumbered accordingly: "All candidates for Full Connection who have contingencies will meet with the Board of the Ministry annually in the spring meeting after academics until the contingency is satisfied."
- 3. To add sub-article a. and b. under Section V, Article 11, which shall read:
 - a. The District Committee on the Ministry shall include in its examination for License to Preach, vocational and aptitude tests as authorized by the Discipline, Paragraph 310.5: "A Candidate will make himself available for any psychological and aptitude tests required and provided by the District Committee on the Ministry."
 - b. To require all Candidates for Probationary membership from other areas to comply with this requirement of vocational and aptitude tests prior to appearing before a District Committee on the Ministry.
- We recommend Standing Rule IX be replaced by the following:
- 1. The Conference Program Council shall be conducted according to the provisions made in paragraph 841 in the 1968 Discipline.

2. The Conference Council shall be composed of the following:

The resident Bishop

The District Superintendents

The Chairman and one other representative elected by each of the following boards or agencies: Education, Missions, Evangelism,

Social Concerns

The Chairman of each of the following boards or agencies: Health and Human Welfare, Ministry, Pensions, Preacher's Relief, Christian Enlistment, Ecumenical Affairs, Church and Community Work in Town and Country, Public Relations and United Methodist Information, Historical Society, Commission on Stewardship and Finance, Worship, Lay Workers, and Commission on Higher Education Chairman of the following Conference Institutions: Florida Confer-

ence Trustees, Florida Southern College, Florida Methodist Children's Home, Florida Methodist Foundation and a Black Trustee

of Bethune-Cookman College

The Conference Secretary

Two representatives of the Conference Youth Organization Two representatives of the Women's Society of Christian Service, one of whom shall be the President

Conference Lay Leader

One layman from each district nominated by the District Superintendent, electeed by the Annual Conference, who will be eligible to serve a maximum of four consecutive years

The members of each of the Conference Council organizations: Interpretation, Publishing Interests, Trafco, Planning and Research, Coordination, Children's Department, Adult Department, and Family Life Department

Members-at-Large, not to exceed three, may be appointed by the

Cabinet annually

Each Board of Agency may elect a reserve representative to attend

when the regular representative is unable to do so

The following shall be members of the Council without vote: Salaried and volunteer conference staff, the conference treasurer, and two members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, one of whom shall be the chairman.

3. The Conference Council shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer quadrennially. The Council shall meet on the call of the chairman two times a year. The Council shall have an Executive Committee on which the officers of the Council, the Bishop, one District Superintendent, chosen by the Cabinet, the Program Director, the Chairmen of the Conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, and Missions, the Conference Lay Leader, and the Conference President of the Women's Society of Christian Service, President of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, Chairman of the Commission on Stewardship and Finance of the Board of the Laity and four members-at-large, elected by the Council will serve. Ap-proximately one-half of the members of the Executive Committee shall be laymen. The Chairman of Conference World Service and Finance Commission, the Chairman of the following Conference Council Committees-Camp Advisory, Planning and Research, Staff and Personnel, and Coordination, shall serve without vote.

CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL

The Conference Program Council met on June 5, immediately following Annual Conference, and established its agenda of work for the year as

1. Committee on Planning and Research recommend 1972 priorities and goals to Council Fall meeting, Leesburg, October 9.

 Staff disseminate information of these goals and priorities to Conference Boards and Agencies asking that October 10-February 19 be period for preparing program recommendations to meet these goals and priorities.
 Deadline for receiving program recommendations from all sources February 10, 1971.

February 11-17—The staff prepare all the recommendations for study, consideration and coordination by the Coordinating Committee.

February 17-18—Two day meeting of the Council Coordinating Committee with aid of staff for purpose of preparing a proposed 1972 Conference program from all recommendations.

5. March 1—Staff mail copy of Coordinating Committee's recommendations for 1972 program to each member of the Program Council.

6. March 1—Staff mail to each member of World Service Committee the Coordinating Committee's proposed program with financial estimation of its cost—also registering opinion as to the feasibility of the funding of the program.

7. March 18-19—Meeting of the Council to approve recommended 1972

program to Annual Conference.

8. April 20—Mail recommended 1972 program to lay and clerical mem-

bers of 1971 Annual Conference.

 April 26-May 7—District meetings of the members of 1971 Annual Conference to study proposed 1972 program and other recommendations.

10. May 11-Executive Committee meeting to consider changes and un-

foreseen matters which are inevitable.

Also, in this meeting, changes were made in the Committee on Planning and Research, such as adding new personnel to the Committee and electing a new Chairman, the Reverend Rudolph McKinley. This Committee started its work in the summer with a lengthy consultation with Dr. Virgil Sexton, of the General Program Council staff, helping to establish the function of the Committee as a data-gathering agency for the Conference, so that the need of the state of Florida could be determined when our ministry is planned within the Florida Conference.

It was the goal of the Program Council to have its 1972 Priorities for Ministries within the state prepared so that they could be distributed to the Boards and Agencies of the Conference. Dr. Sexton's guidance revealed to us that we were too late for this. To determine Priorities without full supporting data was just impossible! The Council, in its fall meeting, did not attempt to establish any 1972 Priorities, but advised the Boards and Agencies to prepare 1972 Program Recommendations in the best manner possible. It was felt that the Priorities and purpose for the year 1973 would be the earliest we could possibly arrange for, and this was scheduled for the 1971 spring meeting of the Program Council.

The Program Council Staff has endeavored to serve when invited by District and Local Churches for a variety of enterprises relating to the local church program, to the administrative process, leadership development, and resource materials. An impressive list of these engagements is available in

The United Methodist Building to anyone interested.

In relationship to its staff the Council has developed studies and guidelines for enabling each member to know his or her responsibilities and enjoy equitable treatment in his working relationships and compensation. This work has been done principally through two committees—(1) Staff and Personnel and (2) Finance. Through the studies of the first Committee, proposed job descriptions are being designed in consultation with each person involved. The Finance Committee has diligently provided salary scales on an equitable basis in consultation with Committee on Staff and Personnel.

The Council, through its Committee on Publishing Interests, worked dilligently with the plans used by The Methodist Publishing House in conducting the TOGETHER MAGAZINE Campaign in October. The District

Secretaries of publications were of great help.

Full attention by the staff has been given to working with the Cabinet and the Boards and Agencies in carrying out the programs authorized by Annual Conference. Supervision of this work has been given by the Executive Committee in its two meetings held September and December. The Budget, and disbursement of same, for 1970 is listed at the conclusion of this report. Note should be made of the fact that the Program Council has operated substantially below its budget.

Our Service Department has served in printing and mailings whenever called upon. The total gross income from this service has amounted to \$657.00 during the seven months period.

The Council has improved its use of the Annex, Chapel, Assembly Room, and Conference Rooms this year. Over 320 paid guests have used the Annex for overnight accommodations. Over 110 meetings have been held in The United Methodist Building, with over 2,000 persons attending.

Our Committee on Interpretation has regularly met and has been faithful in designing materials for promoting Conference Benevolences and World Service, as well as the Advance. A very impressive booklet distributed in all parts of our Conference entitled "Many Beginnings But No Endings" is the main example.

The editorial functions of the staff have kept up not only with COM/line, published monthly from September through December, FLORIDA UNITED METHODIST, but designed, printed and distributed several significant booklets, among which were "Handbook for the Ministers" and "Our Church In Our Town, The Council on Ministries and the Annual Conference," which gave the Conference Approved Program to the local churches for their use in designing program at the local level.

THE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

The youth members of the 1970-71 Florida Conference Council on Youth Ministry were elected at Officer's Assembly at Leesburg during the summer of 1970. These 12 youth, along with 12 adults from conference boards and agencies formed the council which carried on conference programs in youth ministry throughout the year. The council met four times during the year,

in Lakeland (2), Brandon and New Smyrna Beach.

1. In an effort to reach more youth of the church with information concerning the programs for youth, the council began publishing a newspaper, Doorways, in September. This monthly paper covered all the programs instituted by the Council on Youth Ministry, as well as news of local church youth ministry from the conference. The Legislative Affairs page of the paper dealt with issues and concerns of extreme importance today. It also kept youth from all parts of the conference in touch with the National Legislative Affairs project. The paper also kept an up-to-date report of the giving to the Youth Service Fund, along with ideas for local churches to use in promoting the fund. Coverage was also given to the National United Methodist Council on Youth Ministry in its work with annual conferences.

- 2. a. An Informal Group Training weekend was held in November in Leesburg under the direction of the council. This program gave local church youth and adults a better insight into the informal group setting for ministry with youth.
- b. Four Bishop's Convocations were held in November in Lake City, Orlando, Sarasota, and Hollywood. Bishop Henley met with youth from across the conference at these Convocations in a time of sharing and exchanging of ideas and feelings. Ken Jones of Atlanta and Rogers Fair of Bethune-Cookman College were featured speakers at the convocations.
- c. The annual United Nations-Washington Seminar was held January 29 through February 6 in New York and Wasnington. Thirty-seven youth and seven adults made the trip which included study sessions at the UN and governmental agencies in Washington, along with sightseeing and worshiping in different atmospheres.
- d. Two Sex in Christian Living weekends were held in Leesburg in February and over 500 youth from the conference attended with adults from local churches to study the meaning of sexuality for a Christian in today's world.
- e. The Christianity and the Arts Seminar, an addition to the program this year, enabled 30 youth, young adults and adults to study the arts, (music, art, dance and theatre) in New York City for a week and related them to Christianity.
- 3. Since the General Conference of the Church granted control of the Youth Service Fund to the United Methodist Council on Youth Ministry in April of 1970, one of the emphasis for the year was the promotion and expansion of the Youth Service Fund. A comprehensive booklet, "All You Ever Wanted To Know About Youth Service Fund But Couldn't Find Out!," was produced by members of the council and other concerned youth in January. The booklet went to every local church and has been included in national promotion material for the fund.
- 4. The Council on Youth Ministry adopted the theme "A Time for Risk" for the camping program for the summer of 1971. Five areas of study were also adopted by the council upon the evaluation of campers from the summer of 1970. The areas, Black and White America, The Meaning of Death, Vocations, Sex, and the Church, will be topics for informal groups during the camping program.
- 5. Members of the Council attended the Southeastern Jurisdictional Youth Caucus held in Atlanta in April, at which time workshops on youth ministry were held in conjunction with the election of two youth members to the National Council on Youth Ministry.
- 6. Because the council found it quite frustrating to use a large majority of its time for program implementation rather than work with local and district church groups, a new structure for the coming year has been proposed. This new structure calls for 24 youth, two from each district, to be elected by district youth at rallies or meetings before the Youth Ministry Assembly in July. At least six of the 24 youth are to be from minority groups, with one minority person coming from each of the following districts: West Palm Beach, Miami, Tampa, Gainesville, Jacksonville, and Deland. The Council felt a strong need in *insuring* the right of minority representation on the council. The 12 District Coordinators of Youth Ministry are to be included on the new council, along with the Conference Coordinator of Youth Ministry, the Conference Director of Camps, one representative of the Board of Laity, one representative from the WSCS, and two "at large" adults to be elected by the new council. These 42 people would meet twice a year to coordinate any conference programs, and work on district programs. The teams of three people, two youth and one adult, from each of the districts would be in charge of one specific area, with the program of administration. The President of the Council will be elected by the participants of the Youth Ministry Assembly during the summer from the district's previously elected youth members of the council.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1972

1. That a UN-Washington Seminar on Peace and World Order be held for youth and a limited number of adult counselors. Purpose: To explore the work of the United Nations and the area of legislative affairs in Washington as this specifically relates to the role of the church in peace, world order and legislative affairs. Dates: Jan. 28-Feb. 6, 1972. Cost: Financed by fees.

2. A Youth in Leisure Workshop—an opportunity for a team of one youth and one adult from local churches. Purpose: An opportunity for gaining experience in crafts, folk dancing, leading singing, planning games and other recreational activities for local church youth ministry. Dates: April

14-16, 1972 at the Leesburg Camp. Cost: Financed by fees.

3. A Christianity and Arts Seminar to be held in New York, May 6-13, 1972. An experience for 30 persons (10 adults, 10 college and 10 twelfth graders) in a week of dialogue, viewing, listening, experiencing and creating in the area of the arts. This seminar will study the exploration of Christian faith as it is expressed through painting, sculpture, drama, the theater and other medium. Costs: Financed by fees.

4. A summer camping program for junior, middle and senior high youth to give opportunity for study, fellowship and the experience of camping. Dates: June through August, 1972. This includes five weeks for Junior Highs, one youth assembly, two Middle High assemblies and one Senior

High assembly. Cost: Financed by fees.

5. A church music workshop for youth to be held at Florida Southern College, Lakeland, June 26-July 1, 1972. Cooperating agency, the Fellowship

of United Methodist Musicans. Cost: Financed by fees.

6. Five weeks of rustic camping for rising 7th graders and five weeks of rustic camping for Junior highs. Date: June through August, 1972, at the Leesburg Camp. Cost: Financed by fees.

New Programs:

1. Exploring Film weekend. This weekend will give youth a critical look at film making, the elements of a film, and opportunity to see and discuss the Christian implications of several full length features and shorter con-

temporary films. Dates: November 10-12, 1972 at the Leesburg Camp.

2. A weekend study to be called "The Bible in Contemporary Life." It consists of Bible study relating the great themes of the biblical witness to the challenges and complexities of contemporary living. Date: February 18-

20, 1972 at the Leesburg Camp. Cost: Financed by fees.3. Greater Emphasis in Districts. (A) It is recommended that each district in the Florida Conference consider at least three experiences during the year

which will help meet their needs in the area of youth ministry. (B) That district workshops in Administrative Setting be held so that by December, 1972 one adult and two youth from every local church will have participated.

Other experiences on the district emphasis may consist of: lab school, role of sex, informal group training, purpose of church and priority issues, forms of worship and encounter groups.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

REPORT NO. 1

The Board of Christian Social Concerns held its annual meeting February 12 and 13, 1971, at The United Methodist Building in Lakeland. This Board has been very busy during the past year in the program and work of Christian Social Concerns. The membership of the Board has demonstrated responsible and constructive leadership, energy and enthusiasm.

1. We continue to sponsor, support and promote the Community Service Volunteer Program which is under the sponsorship of the Florida Parole and Probation Commission. Any qualified citizens may become a volunteer probation officer. In many areas of Florida, the probation officers are supervising double the caseload expected of them because of limited funds and limited personnel. Many justifiable cases are being denied probation because of the lack of supervisory care. This program does not cost any money. It is an opportunity for individuals of every United Methodist Church across the conference to assist in the rehabilitation of people who have stumbled into trouble. It is also a Christian opportunity to be concerned with a person in need of a friend.

2. This Board strongly supports the Conference School of Christian Mission. We have contributed personnel and substantial time and effort in the work of the school and feel that it has tremendous potential for good and for spiritual growth in the Florida Conference. Its purpose is: "to provide an opportunity for study and training in the mission of the church with particular emphasis on the current mission study themes and spiritual enrichment as they relate to the task of the several program areas in the local church both separately and as a whole." 916 individuals attended the school in 1970, and it is anticipated a greater number will be in attendance in the weekend and week session which commences July 9 and concludes on the 16th, 1971 at Florida Southern College. Along with Mrs. George Carlton, I am honored to be one of the deans for the 1971 School. I served in the same capacity with Mrs. John Wilson for the 1970 School. You can see I have good reason to be sold on the school. If you will attend one of its sessions, I am sure you will feel the same. We strongly urge every church to send one or more of its members to the school.

3. This Board has established a film library on Alcohol and Drug Abuse at the United Methodist Headquarters in Lakeland. These filmstrips and films can be used at no rental cost but a service charge of \$1 per film will be assessed. They are available to local churches, church schools, and local church groups. Users are responsible for the proper care and safety and must return the films at the designated time.

4. We are enlarging the scope of the work against Alcohol and Drug Abuse in the Orlando Project. We have experts in this program who are experimenting and testing to find new techniques and more effec-

tive ways to combat the evils which beset humanity.

5. Many of the recommendations adopted by the 1970 Annual Conference were directed as guidelines for local churches such as: Study-Action groups in local churches, praying for peace, and the observance of World Order Sunday, United Nations Week, etc. There was extensive involvement in these areas by individuals and local churches across the conference.

6. The Board has the personnel and resource material to sponsor alcohol and drug seminars in the districts in cooperation with the District Superintendents, district officers, and the local churches, as time and circumstance will permit. The desire and motivation for such a pro-

gram must generate from a local sponsoring group.

7. The services of the Board are available to assist in seminars and workshops on reconciliation. We strongly urge that every church make a survey, become conscious and concerned with the problems of Social Concerns within their own church and community. There are so many problems literally begging for Christian concern in your own local community that it would be impossible to properly handle all of them, in this generation, but it is the duty of the church to answer the call and cry of the needy, the distressed, the aged, and the many problems of inequality and discrimination that exist all round us.

We have continued to bring to the attention of our people the importance of peace and world order. We promote a UN-Washington

Seminar each year.

9. The officers and members of this Board have been alert and active throughout the year and bring to the attention of the churches the many great social problems and concerns that are before us. We are regularly advising them of the availability of resources and services available to assist in any Social Concerns program. We recognize that to be successful in the field of Social Concerns the willingness and the desire to do most of the work must be generated and developed within the local churches and the local communities. The Board and its members stand ready to render whatever assistance, material and resources the local churches desire, and to perform it in a way that will fit into local program and local needs. It is not the purpose of this Board to go into the local community or into the local church and

attempt to develop a program unless and until the local group requests it and is ready.

- 10. Our work program is divided into three divisions. The Division of General Welfare, John Fletcher, Chairman, has the responsibility for 23 major programs centering around Christian Social Concerns. The Division of World Peace, Jimmy S. Jones, Chairman, has the responsibility for 14 major programs centering around Social Concerns. The Division of Human Relations, Mr. Cashus Richardson, Chairman, has the responsibility for 18 major programs centering around Christian Social Concerns. We have no special measuring device to tell us statistically the success of our work. We do know that we are touching the lives of more people each conference year.
- 11. The members of this Board are very seldom in agreement on many of the great issues before us. We have developed a fine spirit of working together, and when everyone has expressed himself we abide by a majority vote. The members have developed an excellent working relationship and a deep sense of Christian dedication. I am honored to be a member of this group and count it a high privilege to be the chairman of this Board.

PROGRAM FOR 1972

1. The Drug Abuse Countermeasures Project—phase two. This is an experimental program designed as a model for church and community action. It involves youth leadership in a preventative program regarding drug abuse. A distinctive element in this phase will relate to emphasis on alternatives to drug usage. The program is based in the Orlando District and is financed by the Board of Christian Social Concerns budget.

2. The Drug and Alcohol Abuse Project. The proposal is made that the Board conduct a "drug and alcohol abuse project" in at least six areas of the state in the month of February, 1972. The approach would be flexible, with areas selected determined by interest. Other Christian Social Concerns would be included as developed by planning groups. Cost: \$600—included in CSC budget.

3. A Continuation of the annual UN/Washington Seminar for adults. We recommend that the Adult Department be invited to participate jointly in the seminar and that Charles Penney be named as coordinator. Date: The month of November, 1972 has been set as the date of the seminar. Cost: No budget costs involved.

4. That United Methodist Churches in Florida be urged to observe the following special days: World Order Sunday, Oct. 15, 1972; United Nations Week, October 15-20, 1972; Trick or Treat for UNICEF, October 31, 1972;

World Day of Prayer, March 3, 1972.

- 5. That attention be called to Paragraph 97 in the Book of the Discipline of the United Methodist Church, which recognizes the position of the conscientious objector as a valid option and we encourage: (a) an openness of mind to the concept of the "conscientious objector" materials which offer guidance to the conscientious objector. These materials are available through the Board of Christian Social Concerns, the United Methodist Church, 100 Maryland Ave., Washington, D.C. 20002, and/or P.O. Box 70, Lakeland, Fla. 33802; (b) we urge our ministers to become knowledgeable in this area; (c) we call attention to the fact that the status of conscientious objector should be applied for prior to one's selective service classification. The foregoing is not intended to promote avoidance to the draft, but to provide legal and competent counsel to anyone who requests it.
- 6. We recommend the establishment of committees developed from district and local church work areas on Christian Social Concerns, such committees to tour local areas, discuss and recommend solutions to the problems dealing with housing
- 7. We recommend that panel discussions be held in local communities, in cooperation with other agencies, with representatives of both landlords and

tenants for an overview of both sides of the problems of open housing and possible solutions.

8. We recommend that groups obtain, as a follow-up, information from city and county housing authorities on the need, availability, financing and

increased need for adequate housing.

9. That the Board of Christian Social Concerns provide leadership and resources for district and local church meetings on the Quadrennial Emphasis of reconciliation; such meetings to be held at times and places convenient with the district superintendent and district or local planning groups.

10. That the Board continue its parolee program in cooperation with the

State Parole Board. Cost: \$100—included in CSC budget.

11. In cooperation with the State Emphasis, the Board Support of the "Alcohol Safety Countermeasures Program" whereby the federal government is seeking to isolate problem drinkers and get them off the highway. Problem drinkers cause about 20,000 alcohol-related traffic deaths annually.

12. That during the months of October-November, 1972, study action groups be created in local churches to help develop such settings for study action in the Christian community. Such study-action themes could include: United Nations, Foreign Policy, World Development, Food and Population, the Arms Race, etc.

One of the foundations of a warless world finds its origin within the thinking of individual Christians. When the teachings of Jesus are fully accepted and implemented by vigorous action, war as a means of settling international disputes will die.

RESOLUTIONS

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns approved five resolutions and herewith submits same to this annual conference. They are as follows:

1. We express our appreciation and commend the committee appointed two years ago to investigate and study the United Christian Action and submit its report and recommendations. The committee was composed of Gordon Strickland, chairman, Jimmy S. Jones and Ranston E. Davis.

United Christian Action has established a constructive approach in program planning and stewardship to implement the recommendations which appear on pages 178 and 179, Florida Annual Conference 1970 Journal. We are grateful to that organization for its willingness to set in motion procedures which will create a more favorable relationship with the Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church.

2. WHEREAS, the state prisons and many of our county jails are grossly overcrowded, Whereas, this overcrowding fosters criminal acts, immorality, physical, social and spiritual sickness among the inmates, and, Whereas, the process of justice is unduly delayed and hindered by the retention of the accused in our county jails for long periods of time,

Whereas, in many instances the right of the accused to a fair and speedy

trial is being denied:

Be it therefore resolved that the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church urge the Governor and the Legislature of the State of Florida to take the necessary steps to eliminate and relieve the o ercrowded jails and to afford the accused a fair and speedy trial.

Whereas, there are some eighty prisoners on death row in the Florida State Prison (with some prisoners having been there as long as ten years) and the Supreme Court has not acted on the constitutionality of

the death penalty in the State of Florida;

Be It Therefore Resolved, that the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church urge the Governor to examine the cases of each prisoner sentenced to death in the Florida State Prison, with the intent of commuting to life imprisonment the death sentence as an expression of Christian love and humane treatment of prisoners.

3. With the development of increasingly horrible weapons of mass destruction, mankind stands at the threshold of possible extinction. In the face of this situation, Christians everywhere are confronted with a definite challenge. The Church faces a new urgency to fulfill the ministry of reconciliation. In order to have some concreted guidelines and directions for our efforts as peacemakers we submit the following recommendations:

A. We cannot prescribe all that leaders of government should do but "we believe that Christianity cannot be nationalistic; it must be universal in its outlook and appeal." (Discipline, Paragraph 96E) In the name of the Prince of Peace and of suffering humanity, we ask that our Nation leave no stone unturned in cooperating with all concerned nations and peoples to effect negotiation and reconciliation to bring all the tragic warfare in Southeast Asia to a speedy end.

B. Given our spiritual heritage and the frightening consequences if we fail to build lasting peace, it is our responsibility as churchmen today: (1) to declare that war is contrary to the will of God, (2) to be ready and eager to take calculated risks for peace, (3) and to be diligent and sacrificial in the pursuit of peace as the nations have

been in the prosecution of war.

C. We urge that concerted efforts be made to assure humane treatment of all prisoners of war and that increased efforts be for an immediate exchange of prisoners of war.

- D. We recommend that local churches utilize the resources and numerous services available from the Conference Program Council, P.O. Box 70, Lakeland, Fla. 33802 and the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, Division of Peace and World Order, 100 Maryland Ave., Northeast, Washington, D.C. 20002.
- 4. Whereas the public furor against the abuse by some churches of their tax-free status as non-profit organizations reflect against all churches, and

Whereas we do not view as proper such misuse and abuses of a privileged situation by any church, and,

Whereas to avoid unfair competition with private enterprise tax exempt status on all business and income producing property owned by religious

organizations should be eliminated, We there resolve that The United Methodist Church, the Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church and/or each individual United Methodist Church shall pay taxes on all business and income enterprises which are not directly related to their primary function of religious worship, teaching, extension, care, and Christian Social Action.

5. Whereas we are, as a nation and as its citizens deeply concerned be-

cause of the grave and threatening situation in the Near East, Whereas, we believe the continuance of the cease fire create a more favorable climate for arriving at a permanent settlement of the strife

between the Arab and Jewish peoples,

Therefore, be it resolved that all churches and Christians everywhere be urged to pray for the continuance of the cease fire and for a lasting peace, And further that our nation use its prestige and best efforts in aid of obtaining a peaceful solution to this very dangerous and volatile situation.

We will endeavor to include legal procedure that guides and protects the tax-free status of all property used for religious purposes.

Whereas to avoid unfair competition with private enterprise, tax exempt status on all profit-making businesses and property owned by religious organizations should be eliminated.

We request that copies of the foregoing Resolutions be sent to the appropriate parties.

SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT OF

FLORIDA CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

During the 1970 annual conference, Don Hughes moved that the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, local churches of the

Florida Annual Conference, institutions, boards and agencies of the Florida Annual Conference become participating members of Project Equality.

The matter was discussed at some length whereupon Harold Miller moved that the matter be referred to the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns and the Commission on World Service and Finance for a study and report to the 1971 annual conference. Mr. Miller's motion was approved.

In accordance with the direction of the 1970 Florida Annual Conference the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns, on May 1, 1971, held a public hearing after notice through the Florida United Methodist Magazine and the Conference Coordinating Mail. The Division on Human Relations had been gathering information and preparing for this meeting for approximately three months, also other members of the Board obtained additional information on Project Equality. Several interested parties from across the conference attended and participated in the discussion.

After several hours of discussion and exchange of views based upon the

available information the following action was taken:

"Gordon Strickland made the following motion which was seconded by Tom Hagler: 'We endorse the principle of Project Equality and recommend this principle to the annual conference, its institutions and the local churches, to implement equal employment opportunities in their own way. However, because complete information concerning financial involvement, organizational structure and representation on the board has not been available since January, 1971, the Board of Christian Social Concerns requests the opportunity to secure complete information and to report to the next annual conference.' This motion was passed.

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns and the Commission on World Service and Finance recommends that this matter be returned to the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns and Commission on World Service and Finance to complete the study and report to the 1972 Florida Annual Conference.

PROGRAM

1. A Church Music Workshop for Adults. Date: June 19-23 at Florida Southern College, Lakeland. Cost: Financed by fees.

2. A laboratory and seminar week—consisting of four labs and three seminars for children, youth, and adult. The seminar designed for recertification of lab leaders. Date: June 17-23, Lakeland. Cost: \$2,000—Board of Education Budget.

3. Two Confirmation labs. Dates: January 9-13 and January 23-27, 1972. Cost: \$700—Included in Board of Education Budget.

4. Five weeks of camping for rising fifth and sixth graders. Dates: July-August, Camp Florida, Brandon. Cost: Financed by fees.

5. The re-circulation of the survey questionnaire "Settings and Groupings" prepared in 1970. This to be done through the coordinated mailing of the Program Council. Date: Feb. 7, 1972. Cost: \$50—Board of Education Budget.

6. A laboratory for workers with retarded children. Date: June 18-23, 1972. Cooperating: Health and Welfare ministries. Cost: \$300—Board of Education Budget.

7. That the Board of the Ministry include a periodic emphasis on Christian Education in future session of Pastor's School. In addition, we also ask if afternoon discussion groups on Foundations of Christian Teaching and other educational matters might be included on a voluntary basis in Pastor's School. Date: Oct. 3-6, 1972, the Leesburg Camp. (Referred to Pastor's School Committee).

HIGHER EDUCATION

PROGRAM

1. That district superintendents continue to appoint a district secretary of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to be responsible for keeping before all churches in the district the concerns of its students, its colleges, its Wesley Foundation campus ministry and seminaries.

2. That each local church elect a secretary of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to be responsible for these concerns in the local church and to recommend financial support for this work through the work area on education, work area on missions and work area on stewardship and

finance.

3. That the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church continue as a minimum goal for the 1968-72 quadrennium \$2 per member for colleges and 50ϕ per member for Campus Ministry.

4. That adjusted long-range financial projections be submitted at the beginning of the new quadrennium for all higher education and campus ministry support and reported to local churches through proper channels.

5. That United Methodist campus ministry units in the Florida Conference continue their practice of full cooperation with other communions on their campuses in varying combinations of coordinated or unified ministries as far as personnel and facilities indicate that this strengthens the respective ministry; and that ecumenical ministries be entered into only upon written agreements between communions involved.

6. That the Student-Young Adult Study Projects be continued through this quadrennium and that community junior college strategy and ministry

receive particular attention.

7. That the Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry recommend the continuation of the Advisory Council for Florida Southern College and Bethune-Cookman College, and commend the council for its good work.

8. That the Conference and especially district leadership continue cooperation with Florida Southern in reaching its quadrennium goal of 300 new Florida United Methodist student per year entering Florida Southern College. This is an average of one student for every two congregations.

9. That the Board of the Laity be requested to continue to provide through its several groups and programs such as the Bishop's Convocations for the Laity, the Lay Retreats, the Women's Society of Christian Service annual meeting and district annual meetings, opportunities to present the crucial questions facing the church in its mission in higher education and campus ministry in an effort to secure maximum local church thinking in determining future directions.

10. That the Program Council seek approval from the 1972 Annual Conference Program Committee for a special presentation of higher education and

the crises situation that exists in all higher education.

Whereas, The Board of Education, after due consideration, desires to petition to Circuit Court in and for Alachua County to resign as Trustee of the Trust Under the Last Will and Testament of Georgia Seagle Holland,

Deceased.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that The Board of Education of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, be, and it is hereby authorized to present a petition to the Circuit Court in and for Alachua County, Florida requesting permission to resign as Trustee of the Trust Under the Last Will and Testament of Georgia Seagle Holland, Deceased, and that, upon approval of the resignation by the Court, that it be authorized to do all things necessary to carry out said resignation and to surrender the assets of the Trust to a successor Trustee, as appointed by the Court.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION—FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

I. The Board of Education expressed an interest and concern regarding church school decline in the Annual Conference of 1969. The Board recommended that a survey be conducted by a professional organization and the Annual Conference approved it; however no study followed since there was no provision for funding.

Bishop Henley conducted a three month study and experiment in church school attendance with 60 churches in districts around Lakeland. It was a successful experiment, and with the statistics of this study in hand, the Board of Education can now pursue a program of emphasis on church school attendance.

II. SOME OBSERVATIONS:

1. Adults are the criteria to the entire concern of keeping the church school alive. The study has revealed a direct relationship of adults involved and its ratio of involvement of youth and children, Eastern Conferences are good examples of church school programs which permit their adult education programs to decline and die, thereby affecting not only the children and youth in church school but directly relating to a declining church as a whole.

A new philosophy needs to be established with regard to church school meeting on Sunday morning. The Committee on Settings and Groupings has revealed that many local churches are not aware that study can take place outside the traditional Sunday School hour.

With the busy schedules of the various individuals who make up our church membership, they may not find it possible to be a part of a study group which meets on Sunday morning. These same individuals would be enthusiastic about a class meeting at another time during the week. There is the possibility that "Church School" represents a stereotype among some adults. A week-day adult class would erase this image. Adults will respond to a study course of short duration in preference to being committed to a 9:45 AM Sunday morning class for an indefinite period of time.

The statistics from the Bishop's study on church schools revealed that a pastor's interest in church school and the emphasis he places on it

are both vital to the attendance of a growing church school.

4. Based on the results of the recent study, it seems the enthusiastic concern of one or two individuals within every local church is a key factor to an increase in attendance.

5. The concern of the Board of Education regarding the decline in attendance does not mean that we are any less interested in excellence of Christian Education. This will not, however, be the primary objec-

tive of this study program.

6. The decline in attendance in our church schools may be for several reasons. One could be that while we have been so concerned with a sophisticated and intellectually acceptable education approach, we have missed the beauty and simplicity of the Bible itself and its dramatic stories.

7. The frustration of the local church in having no one person to whom they can specifically relate concerning matters of church school attendance is a matter of great importance. We would like to recommend that the Board of Education make available a representative whose function would be to assist the local churches and districts in such matters.

8. An enthusiastic concern for a declining church school is a good place to begin although enthusiasm alone will not solve the problem. It was discovered in the Bishop's study we have not always shown much excitement and concern for our church school. These simple ingredients alone have made a statistical difference during this three month attendance survey.

9. We have not always conveyed to our people that we care and are interested in their needs. We hope to overcome this image should this be the case. We want to fulfill the parable of "going into the high-

ways" and bringing them in to be cared for and loved.

III. PROPOSALS:

 The Board of Education establish a committee to work toward an increase in Church School attendance with special emphasis on the Sunday morning setting for the conference in the year 1972.

The purpose of this committee will be to stimulate attendance in Sunday school, not for the sake of numbers alone but for the sake of individual Christian Commitment/growth and the future of

the church.

3. A representative from every district in the Conference to be chosen by the District Superintendents. These representatives will create a committee under the Board of Education for the purpose of stimulating Sunday school attendance. Suggested committee members-atlarge with particular skills: President of Directors of Christian Education; Secretary, Board of Education; Committee on Settings and Groupings, Board of Education; Cabinet Representative; Program Council Representative, and such other members as the Board of Education may choose.

4. Each District Superintendent may select a committee to work toward the increase in Church School in their District. The success of this program will depend on an active District Committee and active

District participation.

5. The committee may work toward a quarterly evaluation technique in order to share the results.

6. \$1,000.00 from Conference Budget to fund the programs.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Conference Board is profoundly aware that no narrow limits can circumscribe the work of evangelism. Old stereotypes are rapidly giving way to a wider vision of how the yeast of the Gospel is at work in the world. "New occasions teach new duties. Time makes ancient good uncouth." Experimental forms, unconventional ministries, and new adaptations of old procedures give evidence of a widespread effort to provide new wineskins to contain the ferment of God's Spirit in the land.

Old ideas of a separation between evangelism and social action are being dispelled and it is being demonstrated that either one without the other makes on the one hand for a sterile, self-centered, and increasingly irrelevant pietism or on the other for a type of social engineering in which there is a tragic lack of compassionate concern for individuals in their spiritual dimension. When the two are joined together the gates of hell will not be able to stand against the transforming forces of the followers of Christ.

The arena of action is the local church, placed as it is in the context of its community. And it is there that the healing ministry of Christ must be carried on through individual disciples in whose hearts are kindled that passion of historic evangelism that seeks to call others into discipleship and at the same time responds in compassionate service to the hurts and hungers, the frustrations and fears of those about them.

During 1970, the Board of Evangelism has sought to serve through its involvement in the following programs:

- 1. Assisted in planning and staffing the 1970 Inter-board School of Christian Mission.
- 2. Planned and carried out the Bishop's 1970 Convocation on Evangelism, Aug. 31 and Sept. 1 in Lakeland.
- 3. Conducted overnight Workshop on Evangelism, Sept. 1 and 2, 1970, for Ministers in their first year of service.
- 4. Planned and carried out in cooperation with Conference Council Staff the Bishop's Convocation for Confirmation Classes on March 7, 1970, at Florida Southern College. This was the third such event.
- 5. Planned and carried out the fifth annual Day-Away for Ministers and Wives, March 31 and April 1, 1970, at Orlando, with approximately 200 persons attending.
- 6. Provided training opportunities for District Secretaries of Evangelism and other members of the Executive Committee at the Candler Camp Meeting at Lake Junaluska, N. C., July 26-31, 1970.
 - 7. Maintained liaison with United Methodist Leadership in the field of

evangelism by representation at the Cincinnati meeting of the Council on Evangelism, Jan. 6-8, 1970.

8. Maintained liaison with the Conference Committee on Lay Renewal.
9. Provided leadership through District Secretaries in stimulating creative

programs of evangelism in the local churches of the Conference.

During 1970 Florida United Methodism received 7,246 on Profession of Faith, 15,582 from other denominations and from other United Methodist Churches. Total additions were 22,828, making membership in the churches of the Florida Annual Conference at the end of 1970 a total of 316,056. There were 22,483 removed from the church rolls during 1970 by death, transfer, withdrawal, or action of the Administrative Boards.

PROGRAM

1. Under the guidance of the district superintendent, district secretary of evangelism, and with other qualified leadership, that a 30 minute discussion be held with Pastors on a District basis, on new concepts and new materials for confirmation classes and membership training classes. This discussion is to be held before January 30, 1972 in each district.

2. A seminar and sharing opportunity for ministers in their first and second year of pastoral appointments. Date: January 24-25, 1972 at the United Methodist Building in Lakeland. Cost: \$400, ½ included in Conference budget; ½ at rate of \$10.00 per man to be requested of each district

through district superintendent.

- 3. That each pastor and local chairman of work area on evangelism subscribe, or have church subscribe for them, the "Tidings Subscription Service." Cost: \$7.50 secured from Tidings, 1908 Grand Ave., Nashville, Tenn., 37203.
 - 4. That following suggestions be made to local church:
 - a. Each local church work area on evangelism be encouraged to use "Handbook for Local Church Work Area of Evangelism" and "Guidelines for Evangelism."
 - b. Consider the use of membership training materials "A New Adventure" from Tidings.
 - c. Encourage each pastor to conduct confirmation classes using the materials provided by Cokesbury.

d. Plan local church Administrative Board Retreat.

- e. Consider having a "New Life Mission" in the local church.
- 5. The Bishop's Convocation for Confirmation Classes—a continuing opportunity in cooperation with the Children's Dept. Date: March 11, 1972, FSC, Lakeland.
- 6. A Florida Congress on Evangelism April 27-30, 1972 at the Lake Yale Assembly, Eustis. Planned for ministers (April 27-29) and laymen (April 28-30), the overlapping dates make possible a time together. Cost: \$500, included in the Conference budget, plus fees.

7. That every local church follow the requirements of the Book of Discipline, PPs 127-129, and prepare on the prescribed form the annual "Membership Audit." This audit is to be prepared before the annual charge

conference.

- 8. Membership Recovery Experiment: To train laity from participating churches in plans for membership recovery. The board asks that at least 20 churches (at their request) from two specific geographical areas, (a) Tampa-St. Petersburg and (b) West Palm Beach-Miami, be involved in this endeavor under the direction of Harold Rogers of Nashville, Tenn. Date: Early in 1972.
- 9. A "New Life Mission" in at least 100 churches in Florida in 1972. This involves two training events: (a) Training for New Life missioners (pastors), August 30-September 1, 1971 at the United Methodist Building in Lakeland; (b) followed by training sessions located in five areas of the conference for training local church leadership in January, 1972. Cost: \$300 included in conference budget.
 - 10. That a "Bible Hour" be suggested to the annual conference Program

Committee for 1972. Purpose: To make a meaningful, Biblical-founded, spiritual contribution to the lay and clerical members of the annual conference through an outstanding and inspirational Bible scholar. Participating: Annual Conference Program Committee. Cost: \$300, included in the Conference Budget.

11. Non-resident Information Exchange-information to be brought to Pastor's School, handled similarly to book exchange. Date: October 3-6, 1972. (The Coordinating Committee suggested this item be directed to the

Pastor's School Committee for consideration.)

12. The Board of Evangelism recommends that the following members of the Conference be continued in the appointments as Approved Conference Evangelists: Herbert Bowdoin, James Ridgway and Frank Seghers.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON LAY RENEWAL

The Committee was established by the conference to promote and encourage the renewal of the Church through individuals and congregations with special emphasis on the laity. During the year the Office of Lay Renewal (Melton Ware, Director, Box 70, Lakeland, 33802) has aided in the scheduling of 33 Lay Witness Missions and 3 Christian Growth Conferences. These renewal thrusts have been conducted under the leadership of 17 different laymen serving as coordinators and approximately 250 serving as witnesses or group leaders. The evaluations of these experiences by the pastors of the churches involved have been uniformly positive. Such statements as "superior to or at least favorable to any other attempts at renewal I have tried," have been common. There have also been a few wistful hopes that there could be a little more creativity and freshness expressed in the witness being made. A synthesis of these evaluations indicates that the Lay Witness Mission and Christian Growth week-ends have been a positive and helpful renewal thrust during the past conference year.

The third Lay Renewal Conference was held at Lake Yale Assembly Grounds, with 435 persons registered, April 30-May 2, 1971.

The Advisory Committee on Lay Renewal is composed of two Lay Witness Coordinators, George Erickson of Tampa and Bill Robertson of Sarasota; two representatives of the Board of Laity, John Morris, Ft. Lauderdale and C. I. Babcock, Jr., Coral Gables; two representatives of the Board of Evangelism, W. L. Joyner, Largo, and Hugh Lake, Jr., Maitland; and Melton Ware as Director of Lay Renewal. The members of the Committee will appreciate your ideas, suggestions or criticisms.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

PROGRAM

A week-end Seminar for Young Adults (18-34) for the purpose of studying mission involvement of the United Methodist Church. This Seminar is to be held at Florida Southern College the week follow-

ing the School of Christian Mission 1972, and it will be financed by registration.

 A Seminar on Town and Country Ministries to be held at the Leesburg Camp February 1972 at a cost of \$1,000. Of this amount, \$500 has been placed in the Board of Missions budget.

The following are recommendations made by the committees and accepted

by the Board.

Urban Work:

1. Support be given to men in specialized urban ministries.

- 2. Attention needs to be given to new norms for achievement in urban ministries.
- New ways be sought to train men for specialized urban ministries, especially through our seminaries.
- 4. The Board recommends that ACTS (Association for Christian Training In Service) be supported by the Board of Missions.

5. Maximum use of local church facilities be emphasized.

6. Surveys be made to make us aware of additional fields of need.

It is requested that each urban center conduct a sociological survey in each area at least every ten years.

Spanish Work:

Recommendations have been sent to the Commission on Religion and Race of the Methodist Church.

 To guide the local Spanish churches in a more active work in the life of the Community.

2. To have representation of the hispanics in the boards, commissions and committees of the Annual Conference.

3. That 50% of the members of the Spanish Work Committee of the Conference Board of Missions be hispanics; and that the Committee should meet at least twice a year with the hispanic ministers of the Conference and selected laymen.

Town and Country Work:

- A Seminar on Town and Country Ministries, Leesburg Camp, February 1972.
- Surveys to be conducted by Districts; aided by the Department of Research and Survey of the General Board of Missions. Districts are to bear the costs and determine the time of the survey.

Advance Special Committee:

 Recommendation that Missions be the top priority of the Florida Annual Conference.

2. Recommend that at the 1971 Florida Annual Conference be made aware of the fact that there are 16 Florida Missionaries that need \$68,000, per year in salary support. Further, that these missionaries be personally identified as to home church, etc., so that every Florida Methodist will be personally acquainted with them.

Recommend that any missionaries attending Annual Conference be recognized, and if possible, be given an opportunity to make a "real"

mission presentation.

4. The Study Committee present to the 1971 Annual Conference a dra-

matic presentation for the cause of Advance Specials.

5. Recommend that each month a free Advance Special leaflet (that can be ordered in quantity for local church distribution) and a suggested mission film be included in the COM/line.

6. Recommend that the Conference Council Staff person with responsibility to the Board of Missions bring a team of representatives from the General Board of Missions into each district with an afternoon meeting with ministers to answer specific questions, with an evening meeting for lay persons.

 Recommend that the Florida Annual Conference have a realistic look at the future of Advance Special Program with respect to the amount of apportionments to the local church. Suggest that the World Service Commission study the entire conference financial structure in the light of decreased giving to benevolences.

8. Recommend that annually the District Mission Secretaries and Board of Mission members meet in the 2nd or 3rd week of September for a one and one-half day of orientation and instruction session.

In addition, the District Mission Secretaries rather than going to Conference on Christian Mission at Lake Junaluska, be sent to the General Board of Mission in New York for a study of structure and workings of the Board of Mission. The District Secretaries would be able to interpret mission in the United Methodist Church at the district and local church level.

The trip would be open to all members of the board and others at own expense.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

have given prompt and fair service, and on occasion have gone well beyond

what might have been expected.

I. Health Insurance Program

For five years the ministers and employees of our Florida Conference have received comprehensive major medical coverage through a policy with Time Insurance Company, Milwaukee. As of April 30, 1971 our enrollment in this program was 517. Again this year our claims have been running very high in relation to the premiums we have paid (see summary). It appears we will have a rate increase when the contract is up for renewal in October, 1971. In consideration of the rapidly escalating cost of health care, the recent increases in rate by other health insurance carriers, and the experience of our conference, the Committee on Insurance feels the probable rate increase is reasonable and we are getting very good major medical coverage at a comparably low rate.

II. Life Insurance Program

Last year our Annual Conference approved entering a new group life insurance program for ministers of our conference with Ministers Life and Casualty Union, Minneapolis, to be effective July 1, 1970. The initial enrollment on July 1, 1970 was 381. As of April 30, 1971 our enrollment in this program was 542. This is a group insurance program which is designed to

supplement an individual minister's basic life insurance program, not to supplant or be the only life insurance program for the individual. It appears we may have a rate increase effective October 1, 1971 due to two factors: (1) the average age of the members enrolled in this program was 13% higher than had been anticipated by M.L.C.U. prior to enrollment, and (2) the average age of the members enrolled has advanced a year since the initial enrollment last year. Of course, new enrollments of younger men would help prevent an increase in rate.

The former group life insurance contract with Metropolitan Life Insurance Company was cancelled effective July 1, 1970. The company withheld the final dividend payment for several months to clear up all claims and any other miscellaneous matters. The treasurer of our conference for that program, Bruce F. Gannaway, plans to close out his records and have an audit of the records as soon as he receives the final dividend from Metropolitan. Then he will transfer the reserve funds, \$50,000 plus, that accumulated over the fifteen years of that program, to the Committee on Insurance. These funds will be held as reserve funds for the present life insurance program and will be deposited with the Florida Methodist Foundation. Since these reserve funds were not available to the committee during this past year the share of the quarterly premium paid by the conference to Ministers Life & Casualty Union, \$2.76 for each active member and \$2.25 for each retired member, has been paid with funds that were borrowed from the Florida Methodist Foundation. This debt will be paid when the transfer of funds has been accomplished.

Recommendation:

The Committee on Insurance recommends the Florida Conference continue the group health insurance program with Time Insurance Company, Milwaukee, and the group life insurance program with Ministers Life and Casualty Union, Minneapolis. Further, that a possible rate increase on the group life insurance program with Ministers Life and Casualty Union be paid by the conference from the reserve fund that accumulated during the former life insurance program.

A special Word to New Ministers in the Conference:

All new ministers in the conference are asked to give serious consideration to enrolling in the group health and life insurance programs of the conference. These plans offer extremely good coverage at a comparably low cost. Don't pass up this opportunity and regret it at a later date! Enrollment cards and information about these programs are available at a table near the front entrance to Branscomb Auditorium. A representative from each insurance company is there to assist you with any information you may need to have relative to these conference insurance programs.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries had a busy year in 1970. The activities under the auspices of our Board were as follows:

(1) In the Spring of 1970 we conducted a workshop for all the District Directors of Health and Welfare Ministries. Dr. George Basset of the General Board of H. & W. Ministries came to direct it. The meeting was held at the Florida Methodist Children's Home and was most successful in helping our District Directors implement their work.

in helping our District Directors implement their work.

(2) In April of 1970 we cooperated with the Board of Education in the program for persons of mature age. This adult conference included a workshop on the ministry of the church to the aging. We brought to this meeting Dr. John F. Norwood from the General Board H. & W.

Ministries. He did a splendid job of leading this workshop.

(3) This Board has actively participated in the Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded. John Hires did an excellent work in directing the affairs of this committee. They conducted a workshop for the church's ministry to the retarded in the Fall of 1970. More than 30 persons attended. In the summer of 1970 we sent one delegate to the Southeastern Workshop at Lake Junaluska.

(4) We distributed more than 100,000 attractive brochures describing all the agencies of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Florida Conference. This included The Florida Methodist Children's Home, The Methodist Hospital, and the four retirement homes, Wesley Manor,

Asbury Towers, Sunny Shores Villas and Biscayne Manor.

(5) The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries presented a resolution to the 1970 Annual Conference regarding financial support for the retirement facilities owned by three of our Districts—Sarasota, Jacksonville and Miami. Though the resolution was defeated it did bring before the conference the urgent needs of these institutions. This report was given in conjunction with a report from the Florida Conference Corporation of the Facilities for the Aging.

Fred Stinson to be in charge of this project for Board of Health and Welfare Ministries. Referral: Since the Discipline states that Advance Specials must be administered by the United Methodist Church, the Coordinating Committee has referred this matter to the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs.

4. We recommend that Workshops for workers with Retarded Children be held in Miami on October 26, and in Tampa on October 28. This will include

pastors, teachers and other workers with Retarded Children.

(This is to be financed by the budget of the Florida Conf. Bd. of H & W Ministries)

5. We recommend the approval for Asbury United Methodist Church of Maitland to co-sponsor with First Presbyterian Church of Maitland a low-income retirement housing project under HUD 236,

UNITED METHODIST FACILITIES FOR THE AGING

This agency met twice during the year 1970 and cooperated with the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries in recommending to The Florida

Annual Conference support for Asbury Towers in Bradenton. It has also adopted resolutions during the Florida State Legislature not to impose ad valorem taxes on the four Methodist facilities for rertired people. This group also endeavors to coordinate planning and cooperative enterprises of the four retirement facilities in Florida.

ARTICLES OF INCORORATION

OF

THE UNITED METHODIST FACILITIES FOR THE AGING OF THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, INC.

(A Corporation Not for Profit)

We, the undersigned, with other persons being desirous of forming a corporation for charitable and philanthropic purposes, under the provisions of Chapter 617 of the Florida Statutes, do agree to the following:

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this corporation is The United Methodist Facilities for the Aging of the Florida Annual Conference, Inc.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSES

The general nature of the objects and purposes of this corporation shall be:

1. To unify Florida Methodism's services to the aging.

2. To provide the Florida Annual Conference with an established base for future work for the aging or individuals who have attained the age of sixty-two (62) years or have a resident spouse or parent who has attained the age of sixty-two (62) years.

3. To provide homes and services in a Christian atmosphere for elderly persons and for those who could not otherwise financially provide for their

total housing or personal needs.

4. To provide housing for personnel of the home, medical facilities, dining facilities, laundries, parking lots, auditoriums, administrative offices and other uses essential to the operation of the said home for the aged.

5. To provide an annual report of its operations to the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

ARTICLE III. QUALIFICATION OF MEMBERS

The membership of this corporation shall constitute all persons hereinafter named as subscribers and such other persons as shall be elected by the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

ARTICLE IV. TERM OF EXISTENCE

This corporation is to exist perpetually, unless sooner dissolved according to law.

Section 1. The Board of Directors of this corporation may provide such By-laws for the conduct of its business and the carrying out of its purposes as they may deem necessary from time to time.

Section 2. Upon proper notice, the By-laws may be amended, altered or rescinded by a majority vote of those members of the Board of Directors present at any regular meeting or any special meeting called for that purpose.

ARTICLE IX. AMENDMENTS

These Articles of Incorporation may be amended by the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

ARTICLE X. LOCATION

The location of this corporation shall be at 1140 East McDonald Street, in the City of Lakeland, County of Polk, State of Florida.

ARTICLE XI. NONPROFIT STATUS

Section 1. The corporation shall not issue any shares of stock.

Section 2. The corporation shall pay no dividends.

Section 3. No part of the earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of any individual or corporation, including members, directors or officers, except that reasonable compensation may be paid to members, directors and officers for services.

Section 4. All income of the homes for the aged remaining after payment of the usual and necessary expenses of operation, including the payment of liens and encumbrances upon its property, shall be used exclusively for educational, charitable or scientific purposes, including the maintenance, improvement or expansion of its facilities.

Section 5. The corporation is to be conducted as a benevolent, nonprofit, organization existing and operating for the benefit of its guests or residents and not for private enrichment, profit or gain of any person.

ARTICLE XII. DISTRIBUTION OF ASSETS UPON DISSOLUTION

No person, firm or corporation shall ever receive any dividends or profits from the undertaking of this corporation and any assets remaining after payment of all costs and expenses of such dissolution shall be distributed to any similar organization which has qualified for exemption under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code or to the Federal Government or to a State or local government, for public purposes, and none of the assets will be distributed to any member, resident, officer or director of this corporation.

COMMISSION ON ECUMENCAL AFFAIRS AND DELEGATION TO THE FLORIDA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Ι

The primary concern of the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs this year has been that of encouraging and aiding our local churches in becoming involved in the Consultation on Church Union study, A Plan of Union for the Church of Christ Uniting. Materials for this study were completed in November, 1970. At the same time committees involving denominational executives (bishops and "bishop-types") were set up all over the nation, including Florida, to begin organizing for promotion of the study. Florida was divided into five major metropolitan and geographical areas, each having a Committee of Eighteen (one layman and one clergyman from each of the nine participating denominations) for the purpose of initiating study promotion. Suggestions and aids for the study have been made available through our conference publications and coordinated mailing. Countless United Methodist congregations, pastors, and groups are currently involved in the Plan of Union study.

The Commission has continued to carry on much of its work through its three task force groups. The Task Force Committee on Councils was created to consider any inquiry regarding Councils of Churches, but none has been received this year. The Task Force Committee on Inter-Church Strategy, through cooperation with the Conference Board of Missions, has found new in-roads of ecumenical cooperation in our state, especially as witnessed in the Florida Mission Strategy Development Consultation and the Florida Council of Churches' Commission on Church Planning and Strategy. The Task Force Committee on Local Church Ecumenism has continued to respond to the needs and requests of local church work area chairmen and commissions.

The elected membership of the Commission continues to act as the membership of the United Methodist delegation to the Florida Council of

Churches. We, along with the other eleven denominational members of the Council, rejoice in the installation of The Reverend William M. Belk as the Council's Executive Secretary. Florida United Methodism continues to support the Florida Council not only financially but also personally as 20 of our clergy and 7 of our laity serve on 11 commissions and departments of the Council.

In regard to a program in ecumenical affairs for the forthcoming conference year the Commission makes the following recommendations to the Conference:

- 1. We call upon every pastor and congregation to cooperate with other Consultation churches in initiating studies of the plan of union in their respective communities, and to make appropriate response and reaction to the Conference Commission regarding acceptance of, or proposals for, alteration of the plan by April 1, 1972 (the deadline for a total denominational response is June 1, 1972).
- 2. We recommend that two (rather than one) separate agencies shall serve the Florida Conference as its Commission on Ecumenical Affairs and as its delegation to the Florida Council of Churches beginning in the 1972-76 quadrennium based on the following pattern of membership:

CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON STEWARDSHIP

The Conference Committee met four times as a group to examine our progress and develop new ideas.

Our Goals for the year included:

1. Conference Workshop for District Directors.

- 2. District Workshops for persons responsible for Stewardship program in the local church.
- 3. Each church select one period for concentrated efforts on opportunities of stewardship.

4. Promote tithe as minimum standard of giving.

5. Develop a prayer program in each church where every person is prayed for by name every day.

6. Every church have a book table.

- 7. Consider one class on Stewardship in Christian Enrichment School.
- 8. Be aware of age groups and interest groups as local church programs are planned.

In July 1970 a stewardship program supportive group was formed who pledged themselves to be a witnessing, praying part of the stewardship program of the conference.

Dr. John Rooks and Rev. Charles Penney have given extensive time, effort, and guidance to the committee as have other members of the pro-

gram council.

PROGRAM

1. That a three-phase stewardship program be conducted in every church dealing with (1) commitment, (2) service, (3) and sharing..

2. That each local church continue its studies on Christian Stewardship.

3. That each local church develop a Committee on Wills and Legacies.

4. That Stewardship Emphasis Rallies be held in areas, districts and subdistricts throughout the conference. The rallies would focus on speakers, speaking on the subject "God's Love—Our Response"; small groups studying sections of Theological Perspectives of Christian Stewardship; preparing of persons to hold church conferences on stewardship to establish goals; and further consideration to be given to study of personal devotional life, faithful attendance, visitation, proportionate giving, mission concern, witness, development of membership and study courses; and the use of all resources available in each area.

MINIMUM SALARY COMMITTEE

Recommendations for 1972

The following is recommended for Minimum support for 1972.
Ministers in full connection with B.D. or equivalent
Probationary member with B.D. or equivalent
Ministers in full connection without B.D. or equivalent 6,500

Lay pastors
The following rules are recommended for the use of minimum support
funds:

The maximum amount to be used for any one minister is \$2,400.

2. Minimum salary for any one charge may be drawn for a total of four years. Maximum for the first year \$2,400, for the second \$1,800, for the third \$1,200, for the fourth \$600. If a superintendent desires to draw this total amount in less than four years or in amounts different than stated above, he may present such a resquest to the Minimum Salary Committee.

3. Requests for more than the maximum amount in one year must be made to the Committee on Missionary Appropriation of the Board of Missions for Special Work. Their funds will be allotted on a yearly priority basis.

4. Who is qualified to receive minimum salary funds?

A. All men who are under full time appointment and are not excluded

by Section 5.

- B. Student pastors—All student lay pastors who are serving normally established charges under appointment of the Bishop and meeting disciplinary requirements may receive from minimum salary funds \$1,800 per year.
- 5. Who is not eligible for minimum salary support?
 - A. Retired supplies (lay pastors)
 - B. Part time Lay Pastors
 - C. Supernumerary ministers
 - D. Associate ministers
- 6. To become a claimant a man must live in the bounds of his parish and give full time service to that charge. Studies pursued in an approved college or university are considered part of the work of the ministry if approved by the District Superintendent.

7. The Chairman of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall secure and fill out an application annually for minimum salary and submit it to the District Superintendent.

COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND UNITED METHODIST INFORMATION

This commission was first constituted by action of the 1960 session of the annual conference. The purpose was then clearly stated and responsibilities were outlined including the establishing of an Area Methodist Information office, the supervision of the then "Florida Methodist," and the developing of appropriate means for conference public relations. A director of Methodist Information was subsequently secured and Mr. O. B. Fanning has continued in this position through the intervening years. He now devotes one-fourth of his time serving the conference as a part-time staff member of the Program Council.

Time has brought about changes including the placing of the "Florida Methodist" under the responsibility of the Program Council where it is pub-

lished primarily as a promotional magazine.

During 1970 the work of this commission has centered around three foci: First, four members served on the Study Committee set up by the 1969 annual conference to survey conference publications: This work was completed and appropriate recommendations were received and acted upon by the 1970 session of the annual conference which resulted in the establishing of a Board of Publication looking toward the possible publication of a conference newspaper. Second, through the combined efforts of the Cabinet and Program Council a plan was devised whereby daily reports were dispatched by first class mail to local churches covering pertinent action of the 1970 session of the General Conference. These reports filed by Mr. Fanning from St. Louis were received with great appreciation by pastors throughout the conference. A similar coverage of the 1972 General Conference in Atlanta is anticipated. Third, a very successful "Public Relations Workshop" on the conference level was held in December and more than eighty persons were in attendance.

In the light of its changing role, the commission now looks upon its pur-

pose as follows:

"To make the Florida United Methodist Church more widely and more favorably known and understood; and, to seek to know, evaluate, and influence public opinion so as to broaden the witness of the Church." Toward this end the commission continues to devote itself.

That the signs erected on Interstate and other highways continue to serve the purpose they are presently serving, that four new designs be created through a conference-wide contest to select designs, that each sign be rotated every nine months and be freshly painted every year, or more frequently if needed, and that some changes be made in the present locations. Cost: \$3,600—Included in asking from Conference Budget.

3. A proposal that the conference maintain the present Public Relations and Methodist Information staff person in 1972 as presently set up, looking forward to the time when a full-time Public Relations and Methodist Information person may be employed. Cost: Same as 1971. Included in Pro-

gram Council Budget.

4. That Mr. O. B. Fanning's expenses entailed in his work as Director of United Methodist Information be consolidated with the Program Council Budget, and that he be allowed to do his work where it can best be accomplished. Cost: This Commission feels that Mr. Fanning's expenses should be included in that of the Program Council budget as are other members of the staff.

5. That the 1972 General Conference News be reported to the Florida Conference through a similar type of information distribution as was done at the 1970 General Conference. Cost: Recommended that the cost be included in the budget of the Program Council as was done in 1970.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

At the 1970 Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, the Board of Publication became an agency of the Church. Over a quarter of the Conference Year elapsed before the appointment of its membership was made. At the first meeting on October the 14th the following officers were elected: Mr. Victor Leavengood, Chairman; Clarence Whitley, Vice Chairman; Donald Kokomoor, Secretary. There have been four meetings of the full Board and three working committees have met for special needs.

The Board of Publication requests that the following changes be made in

the enabling legislation of the 1970 Annual Conference:

1. The addition of a representative of the Women's Society of Christian Service and a youth representative from the conference be added to the

committee as was requested from the floor of the 1970 Annual Conference.

2. The deletion of the statement "after consultation with the Program Council director," on line 2 of paragraph 4 of the 1970 report. The reason being that this individual will be ex-officio members of the Board and in consultation already.

The Board of Publication recommends:

a. That the United Florida Methodist continue to be published through 1972 by the staff of the Program Council, but expanded in scope and format to serve more adequately as a Conference newspaper, including information about the official program of the Conference, within the limits of the present (1971 and 1972) budgets of the Program Council.

b. Meanwhile, the Board of Publication and the Program Council staff will cooperate in making a gradual transition from the present format and contents of the United Florida Methodist to a newspaper, and change the name of the publication as soon as a new name is decided.

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ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR CHURCH AND COMMUNITY WORK

The Church and Community Worker, a professionally qualified person, is employed by the Department of Town and Country Ministries, National Division of the Board of Missions. They are appointed annually, in response to requests from annual conferences or districts, usually to a larger parish whereby clusters of small churches and communities may develop leadership and organizational resources capable of meeting real needs of people.

Involving persons in rural communities with social issues and human needs is a part of the program of the Church and Community Worker. To move against injustice, repression and poverty requires personal motivation, individual and group skills, and organizational tools.

The workers see their mission in terms of personal and group engagement with issues and needs, as well as planning and team coordination among community people, clergy and laity.

One of the 86 Church and Community Workers assigned to 40 conferences was appointed to the Leon-Wakulla Larger Parish 1970-1971. The worker, Mrs. Lyon B. Crosby, is an integral part of the Larger Parish staff. For the year 1971-1972, we have requested three additional workers for the Florida Conference, one to serve in the Madison County Larger Parish in the Tallahassee District, and two to be appointed to the developing Larger Parish in the Gainesville District.

This committee is also responsible for the Summer Worker in Town and Country program offering to young adults with one or more years of college an opportunity to serve in teams of two for eight weeks in rural and small town churches. One week of concentrated training in youth activities, use of vacation church school materials, and recreation is provided by members of the Conference staff. An honorarium of \$400.00 is given to each participant.

For the Summer 1971, ten young adults have been selected to participate in the Summer Worker in Town and Country program. Funds provided by the Florida Conference Women's Society of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guild, Council on Youth Ministry, and Fund for Reconciliation make this possible.

PROGRAM

1. A continuation of the Summer Worker in Town and Country program. This program is designed for young adults with one or more years of college, serving in rural and small town churches and in the community. Work is done in teams of two. Young adults working in this program receive one week of training by conference staff members. They serve for a seven-week period working in Vacation Church Schools, Youth Activities Weeks, Day Camps, etc. Cost: \$5,850. Partially funded by WSCS, WSG, Youth Council on Ministries, and Board of Christian Social Concerns. Are requesting additional funds through the Commission on World Service and Finance.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN ENLISTMENT

As a part of its quadrennial program, the Commission on Christian Enlistment for Church Occupations had planned a Christian Vocations Workshop in cooperation with the Youth Ministry Council for the fall of 1970. This workshop was postponed until the spring of 1971. A Guidance Consultation workshop is planned for the fall of 1971.

FLORIDA SOUTHERN COLLEGE

The College opened its academic year on Friday, September 4, 1970. Bishop James W. Henley was the preacher for the opening worship service which was held in Branscomb Memorial Auditorium on Sunday, September 6th. The year concluded on Monday, May 10, 1971 with the Commencement Service.

The College opened with 1,344 full-time students and 124 part-time students. (The figures a year ago were 1,386 and 142.) In addition, five of our students were studying abroad as compared with 11 yast year. A total of 329 students were graduated during the year; 44 received degrees on August 7, 1970 and 285 received degrees on May 10, 1971. (The figures a year ago were 308; 38 in August and 270 in May.)

Losses in the College family during the past year included Dr. John O. Gross, former Vice-President with special responsibilities in the areas of development, personnel and curriculum. Dr. Gross, who had retired at the end of December, passed away February 4, 1971. Justice Campbell Thornal, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, passed away November 4, 1970. Dr. Howard M. Field, a member of our Biology Department since 1954, was

stricken while teaching September 29th, and passed away within a few minutes. Angus Sumner, Trustee Emeritus died May 30th, 1970.

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees February 18th, 1971 Dr. Richard

W. Pearce, Vice-President and Dean of Academic Affairs, was named Dean of the College, and Dr. Branson Thurston, a member of our Religion and Philosophy Department, was elected Assistant Dean for Academic Affairs on a part-time basis for a period of two years. The position of Dean for Academic Affairs is vacant pending the employment of a suitable person for this position.

Enrollment for 1971-1972. Last year 77% of those eligible to pre-register (1,076) actually returned (832). The same percentage this year (77% of 1,049 who are eligible to pre-register) would give us 808 students returning. At this time we now expect 374 new students to enroll. At the same time last year we expected 335. Since applications are down 70 from last year, it is anticipated that this lead will not be able to be maintained, and that three will be no increase in new students, with the possibility existing of a decrease of at least 25. The projected enrollment for the fall of 1971 is 1,300 students.

Growth and Expansion. Despite the increased cost of living which affects the College in all aspects of its operation, by careful management of funds available we were able to avoid an increase in tuition for 1970-71. However, there will be an increase of \$150 per year for resident students and \$40 per year for non-resident students for the academic year 1971-1972.

The Ludd M. Spivey Humanities and Fine Arts Center. The Formal Opening of the Ludd M. Spivey Humanities and Fine Arts Center took place on the Friday of Founders' Week, February 19, 1971. Grateful appreciation is extended to the following donors whose gifts made possible the facilities within the Ludd M. Spivey Humanities and Fine Arts Center and also, the William M. Hollis Room in the Thad Buckner Building: Dr. Harry J. Heeb (Amanda and Harry Heeb Performing Arts Center); the William H. Melvin Family (Melvin Arts Gallery); Lanier Upshaw (Frances Boswell Upshaw Faculty Office Building); Mrs. Jean Ward Barritt and William J. Barritt, Jr. (The Barritt Music Room); Mrs. Iris L. Dean (Dean Music Studios); Mrs. Marjorie M. McKinley (Marjorie M. McKinley Music Building); Hy Sobiloff (Hy Sobiloff Plaza); and William M. Hollis (William M. Hollis Exhibit and Conference Room).

R.O.T.C. Effective with the beginning of the 1971-72 academic year the R.O.T.C. program will become elective to all young men wishing to enroll. Concert-Lecture Series: During 1970-71 the College presented an outstanding series of concerts and lectures under the guidance of Dr. Juliane Jordan. Attendance has been excellent and has attested the fine caliber of these programs. A similar series is planned for 1971-72.

Women's Society of Christian Service Scholarship. Continuing a program begun in 1969-70, the Florida Conference Women's Society of Christian Service awarded a scholarship to Miss Audrey James through an exchange student arrangement with Isabella Thoburn College in Lucknow, India. This has been a beneficial program for all concerned.

College Government. After more than a year of study, the Board of Trustees adopted a new plan of faculty organization at their meeting in February.

Prepayment Plan. A Prepayment Plan has been developed in order to assist students in making monthly payments on their accounts. The Plan becomes effective with the beginning of the 1971-72 academic year.

Financial Aid to Unmarried Children of All Florida Conference Members, Associate Members and Lay Pastors Serving Full-Time Appointments. Beginning with the first semester of the 1971-72 academic year, a tuition discount of \$1,200 a year, \$600 for the fall semester and \$600 for the spring semester, will be available to the unmarried children of all Florida Conference members, associate members and lay pastors serving full-time appointments. No discounts will be available, however, for the summer session.

Service to the Florida Annual Conference. Faculty and Staff members of Florida Southern College are happy to be of assistance within the Conference. During the past year many have preached or spoken in churches of the Conference at the invitation of the host pastor. In addition, the College is well represented in churches in the Lakeland area where its personnel are serving on administrative boards, as Sunday School teachers, members of Chancel Choirs, advisers to youth groups, and in other areas of responsibility.

The students, too, are happy to represent the College to the Conference and have particularly done so through the traveling groups: The Vagabonds with their chancel drama presentations; the Concert Choir which has sung for both morning and evening services; the recently formed Handbell Choir which has presented something quite new and different in most churches; and the Concert Band. Dr. Gene Wetherell has been instrumental in scheduling these groups throughout the Conference. The opportunity presented in such performances for the students and the members of the Conference to meet each other and become acquainted as a privileged one, and it is hoped that even such opportunities can be presented in the future.

REPORT OF BETHUNE-COOKMAN COLLEGE

The entire Bethune-Cookman Family considers it a high privilege to report to the 1971 session of the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church as we conclude the 67th year of successful service.

Our hearts were saddened with the death of Dr. John O. Gross, the first vice chairman of the Board of Trustees of Bethune-Cookman College, on February 4, 1971. The College was well represented at his funeral in Nashville, Tennessee.

The year began on September 1, 1970 with Faculty, Staff and Students Preplanning Conference where three important goals were examined—

1. Improve our academic program,

Find new ways to reach the type of students who desire a Bethune-Cookman College education, and

3. Find additional ways to finance a quality educational program.

We have an outstanding faculty with 44% holding the earned doctorate degree and all others holding the earned Master's degree or above. We have 1,165 students inrolled, which is the largest enrollment of any black institution related to the Board of Education of The United Methodist Church. We were unable to enroll 400 qualified students who applied for admission, due to our limited facilities.

Excellent progress has been made in the past year, especially in five areas.

These are:

- 1. Completion of Self-study, the visit of the Visiting Committee of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and the reaffirmation of accreditation of Bethune-Cookman College.
- 2. Improved communications between faculty, staff, alumni and students working toward the same goals.
- Occupancy of the new \$1,200,000.00 Carl Southwick Swisher Library, debt-free.

4. Participation of the College Concert Chorale in the Jerusalem Festival of American College Choirs in Israel in which they received a certificate of excellence.

5. The construction of the Ja-Flo Davis Dormitory which will house 192 young women and will be ready for occupancy in September, 1971.

This is a great moment in the destiny of church-related colleges. The task today is a difficult one. If they will live through these uncertain times, they must face their responsibilities realistically with optimism and courage, not resting on laurels of past accomplishments or justifying their claims on mere traditions or historical significance, but on the ability to render service that will, in the light of changed conditions, fully justify public confidence and command support.

A the present time, a certain phase of Bethune-Cookman College's mechanics is out of harmony with its dynamics. We need more stable financial support to establish a fair balance. Past accomplishments have been great. Our major responsibility now is to provide adequate financial support in order that the results of the vision, perseverance and accomplishments of the past may be continued. The addition of \$400,000.00 annually above our

present income will enable us to meet this responsibility.

The future will demand more of us. It will require the cooperation and support of the entire Methodist constituency. The College faces one of the greatest years in the history of its development and of its great heritage.

We are most grateful to Bishop James W. Henley, chairman of the Board of Trustees of Bethune-Cookman College; the following members of the Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church who serve with distinction as members of the Board of Trustees: Dr. J. Milburn McLeod, The Honorable P. B. Revels, The Honorable William A. Meadows, The Reverend A. D. Hall, Dr. Jack A. Davis and Mr. Leroy E. Northrup; and to the district superintendents, ministers, laymen and laywomen of the Florida Conference for their leadership, concern and support for this educational enterprise. With your continued cooperation and support, we face the future unafraid.

OTTERBEIN COLLEGE

Board of Trustees

Prior to the first session of the East Ohio Conference, Otterbein's Board of Trustees took action which gave her national publicity by adopting a new college governance and reorganizing the Board of Trustees to include stu-

dents and 3 faculty as full voting members.

The governance plan gives students a voting voice on every decision-making body in the school. The traditional faculty meetings and student senate meetings have been replaced with a College Senate comprised of faculty, key administrators, and an equal number of students. This brings together people from all departments into one responsible body where issues may be

discussed and acted upon.

On January 21, 1971, Dr. Harold Boda, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, announced that Dr. Thomas Jefferson Kerr IV, 37, will be the eighteenth president of Otterbein College. Dr. Kerr was selected from 117 candidates Screened by a trustee-faculty-student committee. He holds degrees from Cornell University and the University of Buffalo, and his Ph.D. is from Syracuse University. He is presently Associate Professor of History at Otterbein where he has taught since 1963 except for seven months in 1970 when he served as acting Academic Dean of the College. Dr. Kerr and family are active members of the United Methodist Church of the Messiah in Westerville.

Library

The cornerstone on the \$2.2 million library was dedicated at the 1970 Fall Homecoming just 100 years after the cornerstone was laid for Towers Hall, our oldest building.

Contributions to the library have come from three principle sources, Members of the United Methodist Church \$818,322.91, Alumni and friends \$403,171.04, and a Federal Government Grant \$657,000. \$300,000 is still needed to complete the financing of the building.

Admissions

The freshman class for September, 1971 will be filled when the Fall Term begins. As of March 31, 1971, we have 37 more acceptances than one year ago and 65 additional initial payments have been made.

125th Anniversary

Plans are being made for our 125th Anniversary which will include a President's Day this fall. Past presidents will be honored and Dr. Kerr will be installed. Appropriate functions for the 125th will be announced at a later date. In connection with 125th Anniversary, a Capital funds campaign will be launched.

Finances

You will be disappointed if something is not said about finances. In 1960-61 it required \$1\% million to operate the college. In 1970-71 it will require \$5 million. By 1980 it is estimated that it will take \$8\% million with no increase in student body.

For this current year, approximately ½ of our income will go for salaries and wages in all categories. To operate the dormitories, dining hall, health center and other student services will require \$1¼ million. This is a sampling of expenditures.

A perilous dilemma faced by all church-related colleges lies in the shifting nature of their financial support. While contributions from the church to our operating budgets have increased considerably since 1950, they have fallen farther and farther behind as a proportion of the total income, while fees charged the students have taken up a larger share of the burden. Ten years ago we could say that the Otterbein student (or his parents) paid three out of every four dollars required to educate him, while church, alumni, community and friends contributed the other dollar. The student now pays \$3.44 of every four dollars, while the contributed part of our income has shrunk to only fourteen percent of the whole. Of this, direct support from the church represents about one-fourth, or about $3\frac{1}{2}\%$ of total income.

We wish to express our appreciation to those of you who make contributions to the colleges through the church, for the church remains, and hopefully will always remain our single largest voluntary contributor.

The \$124,000 received from the church last year has been distributed as follows:

We are likewise glad to report that the United Methodist students attending Otterbein make up above 55% of the student body and they receive from all sources of student aid more than \$380,000.00

Long Range Plan, excerpts from (adopted June 1970):

Otterbein must "lead change" or be a victim of change. The question we face is whether we possess the will and ability to lead. The following ideas, proposals, and projections are based on the assumptions that we do want to invent positive changes and will commit ourselves fully to the process.

The purpose of Otterbein College is to sponsor a program of liberal arts

education in the Christian tradition....
...The "liberal arts" also lays foundations for careers in which one embodies the value commitments relevant to contemporary problems and

issues. . . . We will not train students in routines designed to meet yester-day's problems and needs but will address ourselves to understanding careers, fields of endeavor, institutions and how changes are accomplished.

The "Christian tradition" refers to the value inclination we expect to opt for in place of the neutral bias sought on many campuses and of necessity in many parts of our pluralistic society. . . . There are values in addition to intellectual values which must be sought. Values . . . which emphasize the worth and dignity of persons, the worth of cooperative patterns, the healing function of human relationships, the flexibility of thinking born of breadth of perspective, self-awareness, and openness to renewing experiences. . . . This tradition . . . should lead into creative tensions. . . . Creative tension does not show up in bickering, logrolling, politicking, suspicion, gossip, demonstration or violence, but does manifest itself in commitments to significant alternatives.

Basic policies on structures: (These policies limit decisions which may be made).

- 1. The Board of Trustees is the final legal body.
- 2. As a matter of choice, Otterbein will remain related to, but not controlled by the United Methodist Church.
- 3. . . . will maintain a close and vigorous relationship with its alumni association.
- 4. ... will maintain a residential character and devotion to the liberal arts.
- 5. . . . will seek a qualfified student body not only in academic ability but also in the many other abilities which make viable leaders in the human community.
- 6. The educational values must receive priority with all other values related to these educational values.

Six District Seminars on Estate Planning were held during the year. RECOMMENDATION:

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 1970

1. The December 31, 1969, balance sheet has been restated to reclassify and segregate Trust Fund Assets. The Statement of Income for the period then ended has also been restated to remove \$2,870 from payments to investors and reclassified as accounts receivable at December 31, 1969. This amount consisted of prepayments of income to the Trust Fund beneficiaries.

2. All receipts and disbursements are made through the Central Treasury

of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

3. Loans receivable are from various boards and agencies within the Florida Annual Conference and require no collateral.

4. Accounts receivable consist of prepayment of Trust Fund income to beneficiaries.

5. Loans payable consist of loans from the District Superintendent's Fund and the Florida Methodist Children's Home.

6. Earnings paid to investors fluctuate with the earnings of the Foundation.

7. Reduction from 1969 to 1970 represents use of cash received with property for the upkeep of the property.

LAY PASTOR FELLOWSHIP

The Annual meeting of the Lay Pastor's Association was held at the lunch hour on Thursday, June 3, 1971, at one o'clock p.m., with the president William Limbric, presiding.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NO. 5

Concerning lay members to the Annual Conference having been members of the charge they represent "one year next preceding their election."

The 1970 Special Session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church, held in St. Louis, Missouri, April 20-24, 1970 approved the following amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church and submitted it to the Annual Conferences for vote.

That Paragraph 36, Article I which now reads: "The Annual conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Women's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, and the president of the Conference Youth Organization. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. Except for the president of the Conference Youth Organization, the lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Church."

be amended by deleting from the last sentence the words "shall be at

least twenty-one (21) years of age" and by adding the following words at the end of the Paragraph: "and for one year next preceding their election as a member of the charge they are to represent," so that the

Amended Paragraph 36, Article I will read:

"The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Women's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, the president of the Conference Youth Organization. Concerning the election of two young persons under twenty-five years of age, from each District, to membership in the Annual Conference:

"The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Women's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference was the president of the Conference Wouth Organization and two lay leader, the president of the Conference Youth Organization and two young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age from each district to be selected in such manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. Except for the president of the Conference Youth Organization, the lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Church."

During the year of 1970 there were two worship workshops held, one in the Saint Petersburg District, and one in the Melbourne District. We were responsible for the worship service at the Pastor's School 1970. We have representation on the Youth Council and the School of Mission.

Leadership Development: Opportunity to either send members of Com-

mission to training sites, or bring personnel to us.

Special Worship Experiences: We have the opportunity this year to plan worship experiences for Conference, yet there is no resource on our Commission to draw from, also if we are asked to continue at Pastor's School

in programming.
"Where the Need is": This is to be the new emphasis whereby the Commission will make itself available to local churches, groups of churches in increasing effectiveness in worship, this probably in areas where resources are not always available. We are budgeting this amount so that we can go some places where local funding is not available but there is a real need.

"Sing Out, Speak Out": We want to find ways in reaching our youth and some adults by meetings bringing together youth talent from an area, and having youth from around that area come for song, drama, word, all kinds of expressions of worship that are valid. Somewhat like some groups have "Gospel Sings." Plans are fragmentary.

Jurisdiction or church wide planning meetings: This couldn't even cover travel to such meetings, but we feel it might help make it possible for someone to find other funds to represent us and our Conference in these meetings.

Our Commission spends a great deal of its own members money to carry on programming, because we believe in the possibility of greatly enriching the conference worship experiences, conference wide as well as through the church settings.

COMMITTEE ON THE LAY WORKER

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE & WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

The Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild operated under an administrative committee from June 1969, to May 1970. This committee was composed of nine members from the historically Central Jurisdiction and the historically Southeastern Jurisdiction. This report covers the seven-month period from May 1970, through December 1970. At the May 1970 annual meeting election of officers was held.

During this seven-month period we have been examining every facet of our program in the light of our purpose: "... To help women grow in the knowledge and experience of God as revealed by Jesus Christ; to challenge them to respond to God's redemptive purpose in the world; to unite them in Christian fellowship to make Christ known throughout the world; and to develop a personal responsibility for the whole task of the church." To do this the conference executive committee spent a weekend under the guidance of a team from Women's Division and set up the following goals for 1970-71:

- 1. To provide leadership, enthusiasm, and to be a motivating resource for the local woman as we relate to the total church program. Leadership training workshops were held in each district. Learning opportunities have been provided in the work areas of drug abuse, literacy, operation-know-how, missionary experience days, work training for community projects in which the local church participates, ecumenical projects in the local community, observance of United Nations Day, etc.
- 2. That the merged society continue to be an active channel for Christian development across racial and cultural barriers. In addition to the personal influence each officer can be, district presidents have kept informed of opportunities available to local societies and guilds to experience growth in this area and have worked diligently to promote attendance.

The Jurisdiction Task Group on World Issues conducted a workshop on racism for the conference executive committee. From this experience a committee was set up to train and make available three teams to conduct workshops on this subject in local communities upon request.

3. To interpret the program of the Women's Division; how policy is made;

how pledge money is spent.

District meetings were conducted by the regional secretary and the conference treasurer to help overcome a feeling by some of mistrust in the use of pledge money. Some districts held similar meetings in local areas. We believe these meetings have contributed greatly to the up-swing of pledging and mutual trust.

- 4. To develop more sensitivity to the needs around us as well as world wide needs. Each district has held one or more spiritual growth retreats, day-a-part meetings, and more districts are sending representatives to regional and national meetings.
- 5. To stimulate more enthusiasm and/or involvement in specific action by local women.
- 6. To become informed about district finances. A task group on district cultivation money is functioning to discover how districts with a small membership can be aided in having sufficient money for an adequate program without assessing the membership more than is necessary in larger districts.
- 7. To study the amount of involvement of women in leadership roles in the Florida Conference. A committee making the study find that today's women are not satisfied with helping to provide finances and forming a major portion of the personnel in the local church programs while being denied a part in formulation of policy and of helping make decisions affecting finances.

Instead of each district sending one girl to a four year college we are making a gift of \$1200 annually to each of the following United Methodist Colleges: Paine College, Clark College, Bennett College, Bethune-Cookman College and Florida Southern College; also, \$500 annually to Vashti School and Boylan-Haven-Mather Academy.

We also participate in the support of a student from India to attend Florida Southern College—\$4500—and contribute the same amount toward the foreign student program of Bethune-Cookman College. This

is voted each year.

CONFERENCE SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN MISSION

The 1968 annual conference converted the School of Missions of the Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild into a Conference School of Christian Mission. The purpose was to make it a total conference training and spiritual growth experience for men, women, and older youth.

Its purpose is "to provide an opportunity for study and training in the mission of the church with particular emphasis on the current mission study themes and spiritual enrichment as they relate to the task of the several

program areas in the local church both separately and as a whole."

It is divided into two sessions; one session commences on Friday evening and closes Sunday noon, designed primarily for those who cannot be away from home or work for as much as five days. The same program is given to the weekend session as for the longer session, but it is in a more streamlined form. The week session commences on Monday and concludes at Friday noon. The 1970 school had in attendance for both sessions a total of 916 individuals.

The courses of study for the 1971 school, July 9-11, July 12-16, will be on the book of Matthew, under the leadership of Dr. Charles Laymon; New Machines and the New Humanity, with Melton Ware, Victor L. Rankin, Harry Burney, Charles Brewster, William Tiffin, and J. P. Floyd as teachers; the New Generation in Africa, with Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Hughlett, L. O. Shirley, Mrs. Billie Starnes, Dr. Leslie C. Sayre and Mrs. H. M. Russell, as teachers; a local church leadership training program under the direction of Dr. Richard Nesmith of the National Division, Board of Missions with other

ministers of the Conference; seminars sponsored and staged by the major work areas of the church, including Christian Social Concerns, Ecumenical Affairs, Education, Evangelism, Laity, Missions, Stewardship, and Worship.

REPORT NO. 2

Referring to paragraph 924 in the 1968 Discipline, we concur with the recommendation of the Commission on Minimum Salary for minimum support for 1972: Lay Pastors \$5500; Associate Members \$5900; Ministers in full connection without B.D. or equivalent \$6300; Probationary member with B.D. or equivalent \$6600; Ministers in full connection with B.D. or equivalent \$6600.

- 1. The salaries are to become effective January 1972
 - A. Minimum Salary Fund shall be administered by the Commission on Minimum Salary. This Commission is to be composed of representatives from the Board of Missions, two Cabinet Members and representatives from the Board of Ministry and World Service and Finance.
 - B. The Commission on Minimum Salary shall see that the amounts of Minimum Salaries are collected, and they shall be disbursed by the Cabinet.
 - C. Payments shall be made quarterly, providing funds are available.
 - D. The Commission on World Service and Finance calls the attention of each minister to the Disciplinary requirements concerning ministerial support, pensions and benefit programs as outlined in paragraph 1380.6 and paragraph 921, with special reference to proportional payment and the effect of default of payment in these areas upon pension benefits.
- 2. After study and review of salaries of District Superintendents we recom-

mend that the formula adopted in 1970 be continued. It is based, first on the top two salaries plus expenses in each of the twelve districts. Then, from the Conference at large the top four salaries and expenses not previously used. The average of these twenty-eight salaries and expenses makes up the formula. We further recommend for 1972 in addition to the formula, \$1000 travel expenses plus expenses for Pre-Conference Cabinet Meetings. District Superintendents salaries for 1971 were \$14,003, calculated by the above formula.

3. In compliance with paragraph 885 and approval of the General Conference,

the Episcopal Fund shall be 2% of the Ministers' salaries.

4. We further recommend that the amount of ministerial support be remitted by the treasurer of the local Church to the Conference Treasurer as a part of the Christian Service Fund of that Church. The Conference Treasurer shall distribute each item of ministerial support its prorated share based on budgeted amounts.

5. We recommend that the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund and Ministerial Education Fund be apportioned to each District, using the same formula as used in the Christian Service Fund. The Apportionment to the local Church shall be made by he District Superintendent over and above the Christian Service Fund.

6. We recommend that for 1972 the Christian Service Fund be separated into four categories, as follows:

REPORT NO. 3

Contingency Fund

We recommend setting up the following Contingency Fund from the Conference Reserve Fund:

1. The Conference Contingency Reserve Fund of \$21,700 to be used by the Commission on World Service and Finance for emergency needs of the Conference Boards and Agencies during the year 1972.

REPORT NO. 4

Travel Allowance

We recommend that the car allowance for members of Boards, Commissions, and Committees where allowed, be set at 5ϕ per mile for each member, an additional 3ϕ for one passenger and an additional 2ϕ for two passengers or more, with top mileage of 10¢ per car plus tolls for roads and bridges. Members who choose to travel to Conference Meetings by other than automobile will be reimbursed at the above highway mileage rate. In addition, meals and lodging for Board members shall be paid at the rate of \$6.85 per diem. We further recommend that the Conference facilities at Lakeland and Leesburg be used by the Boards and Agencies.

REPORT NO. 5 Conference Boards

1. We appreciate the use of the Conference Treasurer's office by all Conference Boards and Agencies and urge them to make full use of this office for both the collection and disbursement of their funds.

2. We call attention to paragraph 2 of the Standing Rule III which requires

all Agencies receiving funds through the Commission on World Service

and Finance to give an Annual Report or an audit on all monies received and disbursed; and urge more faithful compliance with this rule. We suggest that the reports in question be in the hands of the Commission Chairman within 60 days after the end of the fiscal year. Unless there is compliance with Standing Rule #3, the Commission on World Service and Finance cannot consider requests for funds for the following year.

REPORT NO. 6

Christian Education Sunday Offering

We recommend that the Conference Council be authorized to use the Christian Education Sunday Offering for the work of the twelve District Councils and that the District Superintendent administer the funds received from the offering within their districts.

REPORT NO. 7

- 1. We recommend the Florida Methodist Foundation for its outstanding work and encourage and urge all Agencies of the Conference to make full use of its advantages and to help the Foundation attain its maximum potential for the Conference.
- 2. We recommend, with the concurrence of the Cabinet, that one half of the surplus earnings, current and future of the Florida Methodist Foundation be retained as a Conference Reserve Fund, up to and including the amount of \$100,000. The Conference Reserve Fund shall be used to meet Conference emergencies including an emergency of the Florida Methodist Foundation, at the discretion of the World Service and Finance Commission. As the Conference Reserve is less than \$100,000, earnings shall be further retained to bring it up to that amount. At any time the Conference Reserve Fund exceeds \$100,000, the excess shall be available to the Conference.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAITY

The program of the Board of Laity must begin with the Leesburg Retreat. As in the past four years, over 2,200 men from every district of the conference attended. Each of the four weekends were led by outstanding minister

and lay personalities. Each was alike in purpose and attitude, but provided variety of approach. Among those who led were: Bishop James Armstrong, Dr. Ford Philpot, The Reverend Sam Coker, Dr. Myron Augsberger, Dr. Bill Bright and Miss Eulalie Ginn. Hundreds of men made a new commitment of themselves to God at the Retreat and many reports have been received indicating continued dedication by the men in their own community. The Leesburg Retreats have been recognized throughout Methodism as the greatest event of their kind for a number of years. This recognition has now spread outside the Methodist Church as one of the best examples of the Spiritual Retreat. All effort has been made to analyze the success of Leesburg, resulting in one clear conclusion: The program includes most of the factors which tend to create an attitude of receptivity by those who attend preaching, singing, praying, study, silence, dialogue, fellowship—timed well, with a proper balance of aggressiveness and top-quality leaders in each area. We recommend the format unhesitatingly because we know that it works. We thank God for all that has happened at Leesburg.

Another successful event this past year in which the Board of Laity played a part was the Bishop's Convocation for the Laity. The evangelistic event, led by Bishop Henley and Bishop Hunt "set the scene" for continuing the efforts to communicate the Christian message meaningfully to the youth and young adults where it is so greatly needed. Again, thank God for His

inspirational direction!

This year's report must also make special reference to the area of stewardship. Under the leadership of Jim Jones, the Conference Director of Stewardship, a new emphasis has begun, aimed at helping the local church program. The highlight of the year was a day-long meeting attended by District Superintendents, Bishop Henley, and lay leadership for Stewardship from all over the Conference. We encourage all lay leadership to get behind this great need, asking God's guidance as to the way of persuading all laymen that tithing of money—as well as service—is a vital part of the Christian's spiritual growth.

There were many other areas of worthwhile activity: Lay leadership of the local church (Methodist Men's Fellowships), participation in Southeastern Jurisdiction programs and cooperation with all other Boards. Others of the Laity who deserve an expression of appreciation for their work are: Mrs. Ethel Gray, Mrs. Allen Watson, Dr. Richard Moore, Charles Babcock, Jr., John Morris, William Furr, John Grant, Ed Boardman, Ray Redstone, John Sargeant and all of our District Lay Leaders.

A special expression of appreciation for the dedicated leadership of Justice Campbell Thornal—His active participation in the program of the Leesburg Retreats and his counsel to me was of inestimable value and we thank God for his life and pray that God will raise up other leaders of his ability and character.

We have not done all that needed doing, but pledge our best effort to do so next year, as we praise, follow, and serve our Lord.

TRUSTEES OF THE PREACHER'S RELIEF FUND

During the year your Trustees of the Preacher's Relief Fund have been able to provide homes for fifty-one of our claimants, and temporary housing for a number of our Methodist Cuban Refugees, and other laymen, in properties that had not been needed for retired ministers and widows of our

preachers.

Our actual and potential assets have been increased this year by the addition of one house which has been deeded to us, and we have knowledge of property valued at \$35,000 that has been put in wills for our Board. Our total assets have been increased from \$432,852 in 1967 to \$605,906 in 1971. We have sold four unused properties during the conference year and we are endeavoring to improve the property which is in use. A number of our claimants are contributing to maintenance and enhancement of their units, and otherwise cooperating with the work of the Board.

A long range planning committee has been appointed to study the changing needs of our claimants, and to recommend amendments that should be

made to the charter and by-laws of our Board.

Our executive secretary and property manager continues to visit the claimants occupying our homes to express interest in and concern for their welfare, and to inspect our property and arrange for its maintenance.

Our greatest need just now is a conference sponsored retirement home and unfirmary where our retired preachers and widows of ministers of modest means might go when they are no longer able to maintain themselves in these houses. A number of the occupants of our units are of advanced age and will not long be ambulatory.

We commend Dr. Henry W. Blackburn for his excellent work as Ex-

ecutive Secretary and Property Manager, and respectfully request that he

continue to be the staff member assigned to this Board.

TRUSTEES OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

After careful preparation of plans on the part of the Camp Committee, and under authorization of the Florida Conference, the contract for the installation of a central sewage disposal system at the Youth Camp in Leesburg has been signed by the proper officers of the Trustees. It is anticipated that construction will be completed in time for use in the summer program at the Youth Camp this summer. The total cost is just under the \$100,000.00 figure which the conference authorized.

At your direction the Trustees have made a study of staff housing for members of the Conference Program Council. As a result of that study, the

Trustees make the following recommendations:

1. That Conference Staff members who are ministerial members of the

Florida Conference be provided with parsonages.

2. That members of the Conference Program Council Staff who are not ministerial members of the Florida Annual Conference be compensated so that they can provide their own housing, said compensation to be determined by the Program Council.

That this policy shall apply uniformly to all future Program Council Staff members, and to any present Staff members who choose to come

under it.

Attached hereto, and a part of this report, is a list of the obligation of the Conference on properties for which the Trustees hold title for you, together with method, amount and date of final payment of the indebtedness.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF FLORIDA METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME

January 1, 1970-December 31, 1970

A report on the work of The Florida Methodist Children's Home could be entitled "Service With Adventure." Various services have been rendered in your name to 209 children and their families. A much larger total would be listed if we included referral services.

New requests for service to 195 children and their families were received in our office this year. From this number we were able to accept 60 children into care for direct service. Nine adoptions for older children were completed and eighteen children placed in pre-adoptive homes, one hundred fifty-three children received care in the institution, twenty-eight lived with licensed foster families, and twenty-six children have been receiving supervision in their own homes. Altogether we have provided 49,995 days of care for children.

How grateful we are to the United Methodist Churches of Florida for sharing \$376,666.85 with us to make this service possible. One hundred eleven churches gave \$1,000.00 or more, and giving by some congregations which totaled less than \$1,000.00 was still remarkable. Other funds necessary to operate our program were obtained from The Endowment Fund, from wills and bequests, and from special gifts by friends who are not Methodists.

While we cannot focus on many outstanding gifts, we feel we must mention that Dr. Frank Reynolds of Bunnell gave \$9,000.00 in dental services. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Carpenter of Sarasota gave \$11,700.00 to provide clothing and recreational facilities. Many members of the Women's Society for Christian Service joined in giving enough trading stamps and coupons to purchase for the Home three 15 passenger club wagons. Thanks to all who shared in any way.

During the year our long-needed group home for high school girls was started. This is a significant part of the program in which older girls live in a program designed to assist them in learning the skills of homemaking and to move toward independence.

Our present program consists of group care in the institution, including the cottage at the former Sarah Hunt Home, foster care with licensed families, foster care in an agency subsidized foster home, the group home for high school girls, a program of adoption for older children, the "outpost" office for family counselling and referral service, and hopefully, before conference meets, the opening of a group home for mentally ill children in Orlando.

The trustees request that the annual conference continue the present policy of financing this program by asking all church schools to remit the offerings received on each Fifth Sunday and at Christmas, and by asking all churches to remit undesignated monies (loose offering) received in morning worship services on the same Sundays.

In order to underwrite the budget we feel is minimal for the operation of this program we are asking that each church set as its goal for giving \$1.50 for each member. All offerings should be sent directly to The Florida

- 1. Continuation of group care programs at Enterprise and Daytona Beach.
- 2. Continuation of the group home for high school girls.
- 3. The opening of the program for mentally ill children (already approved by the annual conference).

- 4. Continuation of program for foster and adoptive placements.
- 5. That the conference continue to share, as previously, through fifth Sunday and Christmas offerings, memorial gifts, gifts through wills and bequests, special gifts from church school classes and other church organizations.
- 6. Strengthening the present approved plan for support of this agency by providing good literature, speakers to interpret the program, and by providing special programs in cooperation with conference officials, district superintendents, and others.

AMENDMENT TO THE ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE FLORIDA METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, INC.

ARTICLE I Name

The name of the Corporation shall be The Florida United Methodist Children's Home, Inc., with its principal office located at The Florida United Methodist Children's Home in Enterprise, Volusia County, Florida, and The Florida Methodist Children's Home, Inc., shall consist of the present Florida Methodist Children's Home located at Enterprise, Florida, and the Children's Home located at Daytona Beach, Florida, presently operating under the name Sarah Hunt Division of The Florida United Methodist Children's Home, Inc., which said home shall be known and designated as the Sarah Hunt Division of The Florida United Methodist Children's Home. The Corporation shall have the power to provide Children's Homes at other locations should it be determined that such are needed in the service of children and youth, in accordance with Paragraph 1181 of the 1968 Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

Article II Objects and Purposes

The general nature or the object of the Corporation is to care for, train and educate orphans and other destitute children admitted under the terms and regulations made by the Board of Trustees of this Corporation: to buy, sell, rent, lease, own and operate lands and buildings and premises and other property, both individually and as Trustees for The Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church for training, care and maintenance of such children, and to provide for the establishment and maintenance of an endowment fund for said Corporation; to provide facilities for operating a licensed child placing agency to investigate, supervise and place suitable children for adoption.

ARTICLE III Non-Profit Status

The Corporation is a non-profit corporation, and no part of the income of the Corporation shall enure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, any private person except reasonable compensation for services rendered.

The Corporation is organized exclusively for religious, educational and charitable purposes and all property acquired by the Corporation whether by gift, grant, purchase or otherwise shall be used predominantly for educational, religious or charitable purposes.

No substantial part of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda (lobbying, electioneering, voter registration drive), or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, nor shall there be participation or intervention in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Nothwithstanding any other provisions in these Articles of Incorporation, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt from Federal and State taxation.

Article IV Qualification of Members

The qualifications of members and the manner of admission shall be all those who are members of the United Methodist Church and all those who are elected annually by The Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

ARTICLE V

Term of Existence

This Corporation shall have perpetual existence unless sooner dissolved according to law.

ARTICLE VI

Board of Trustees

A Board of Trustees composed of twenty-one members, said Board of Trustees to consist of the District Superintendent of District in which the Home is located, the Conference Chairman of Health and Welfare Ministries, and nineteen elective members, not more than nine of that number being clergy, who shall be elected to serve annually by the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. The Board of Trustees shall elect from its number the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Assistant Treasurer, and all shall hold office for a period of one year. Other officers may be elected by The Board of Trustees in such a manner as the By-Laws may prescribe. The Board of Trustees shall meet and elect officers within thirty days after the election of the Board of Trustees at the Florida Annual Conference.

ARTICLE VII

Meetings

The Annual Meeting of the Corporation shall be held at the office of the Corporation at The Florida United Methodist Children's Home in Enterprise, Florida, within two weeks after adjournment of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church each year for the transaction of all proper business. At least one mid-year meeting shall be held at the office of the corporation on the call of the President or Secretary of the Corporation. The time may be changed and special meetings may be provided for in the By-Laws of the Corporation, provided that any such special meetings be called by the President or Secretary at any time for such purposes only as may be specified in the call, ten days notice being given for every such meeting by mailing to each member a notice thereof.

ARTICLE VIII

By-Laws

The By-Laws of the Corporation are to be made, altered or rescinded by a majority vote of the members of the Board of Trustees present at any regular or called meeting.

ARTICLE IX Value of Property and Indebtedness

The amount in value of the real estate which the Corporation may hold shall be limited to the sum of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000). The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the Corporation may at any time subject itself shall never be greater than two-thirds of the value of the property of the Corporation.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

The Charter of this Corporation shall be amended upon recommendation from the Board of Trustees of the Children's Home to the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, and by a majority vote of the Conference.

ARTICLE XI Distribution of Assets Upon Dissolution

No person, firm or corporation shall ever receive any dividends or benefits from the undertaking of this Corporation, and upon dissolution of the Corporation in any manner, or for any reason whatsoever, its assets remaining after payment of all costs and expenses of such dissolution shall be distributable only to organizations which have qualified as tax exempt

organizations under the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, or to the Federal Government or to a State or local government, for a public purpose, and none of the assets shall be distributed to any member, officer, or Trustee of the Corporation.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

As we continue to be thrust into God's new future, we need to remember with appreciation those of the past whose faith in God has laid a foundation for our present work and witness.

We commend Trinity Church, DeLand, for celebrating their 75th Anniversary and submitting an up-to-date history to the curator; and Havana (Salem) Church for a several day celebration of their 100th Anniversary.

We urge churches to plan special celebrations marking each 25-year interval since their founding and to bring their histories up-to-date for these occasions. Since our conference program and reporting year has now been changed to the calendar year, it will be necessary for local churches to submit their histories to the curator, Robert Carr, by December 31, in order for recognition to be included in the Conference Journal for the year in which the celebration was held.

We thank Dr. Charles Thrift and Florida Southern College for space in the Library for the Conference Archives. Mrs. Otye Bly continues to give us valuable service with the Archive Materials.

There will be a special celebration at Lake Junaluska, on Labor Day Week-end, of the Bicentennial of the coming of Francis Asbury to America. We recommend that each local church encourage a delegate or delegation to share in this historic occasion.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE STUDY OF THE MINISTRY

INTRODUCTION

Last year the Committee on the Study of the Ministry expressed many major concerns which are now being considered by the Committees on Minimum Salary and Research and Planning. This year our work has been devoted to conducting dialogue groups for ministers throughout all Districts of our Conference in order to determine the feelings and concerns

of ministers as they related to their profession.

Nearly 300 ministers throughout the Conference participated in these dialogue groups, and twelve district representatives met with Bishop Henley in February to share the results. Bishop Henley approved both the idea and purpose of an Opinion Survey which was sent to all ministers serving in the pastorate of our Annual Conference. This survey included 54 statements, 46 which originated from the dialogue groups and eight which came from discussion of committee members with our consultant.

As a result of Bishop Henley's support, the encouragement of the mem-

bers of the Cabinet, and the interest of ministers, 565 out of 644 surveys

were returned—a response of 88 percent.

Ministers were asked to circle the response which most nearly agreed with their feelings about each statement:

1. Strongly disagree

4. Agree

2. Disagree

5. Strongly agree

3. Neutral

A sixth category, O, was added when the results were compiled to represent refusal to state an opinion on any given statement. A summary of the responses to each question is included in this report.

Our committee is indebted to the Reverened Jim Dale for his assistance in formulating the Opinion Survey and in compiling the massive data received, and to William T. James, Director of Martin Marietta Data Systems, who served as our consultant in the interpretation of data received from the Survey. Mr. James is a member of the Rockledge United Methodist Church where he is presently serving as Chairman of the Administrative Board and Chairman of the Work Area on Evangelism.

The following interpretation does not deal with all of the information received, but it does represent the general feeling of our ministers. The "suggestions" are meant to be used by interested persons as ideas and discussion starters. When we have intelligent discussions about these areas of mutual concern, we are more likely to find effective ways to deal with them.

I. THE MINISTER AND HIS WORK

A. Finding: The majority of ministers do not understand the role of the minister.

B. Evidence:

1. Seven out of ten ministers agree that seniority should be given weight in appointments. One-third of those who agree with this agree strongly. Seniority alone makes no reference to a man's ability, motivation, experience, effectiveness, previous performance, difficulty or ease of previous appointments, emotional stability, intelligence, family situation, or even desire to be of service. Therefore, the minister's response to the statement about seniority would indicate some confusion as to the role of the minister. This could indicate a desire for an automatic promotion with each move regardless of how well one performed previously.

2. Only 25% of the ministers oppose a job description. It is interesting to note that a very specific job description already exists for the Methodist pastor—paragraph 35—of the Discipline. Many ministers may not

be aware of this or feel that it is not adequate.

3. Only 25% agree that the "present method of measuring a minister's effectiveness" is adequate. Although the "present method" was not specifically defined, it could mean the Cabinet's evaluation of a minister's effectiveness, or that of a local church, or even that of the minister himself. The response indicated that most ministers are at best uncertain in their role.

4. It should be noted that a Gallup poll which appeared in the Miami Herald on April 9, 1971, based on a questionnaire sent to 2,517 clergymen was headlined "Clergymen Bewildered Over Roles." The poll pointed out that 40% of the present Protestant and Catholic clergymen have seriously considered leaving the ministry because they are disillusioned

and bewildered over their role in the church and society.

C. Suggestions:

1. A basic program could be initiated to help ministers learn their identity and role in contemporary times. The minister's responses to statements about continuing education indicate that such a program would be well received.

2. Every minister should have some recognizable feed-back about his performance in his role as a minister. Suppressed problems are ultimately

damaging to the minister, his church, or both.

II. THE MINISTER AND HIS IMAGE

A. Finding: Many ministers are having a major problem in relating to the secular world. The critical issue here is not his ecclesiastical relationship to the church, but his occupational identity in the world of work.

B. Evidence:

1. The opinions on the two statements concerning Florida Southern College should correlate highly. The statements were: "Florida Southern College fills a basic need within our Conference" and "I Support a Florida Southern College Financial Campaign." The opinions on the two statements did not correlate. The ministers felt that Florida Southern College fills a basic need, but they would not support a financial campaign for it. In the secular world, how one uses his financial resources is evidence of his value judgments.

2. Most ministers were not decisive in their opinions on the survey. They felt strongly (that is, answered 1 or 5) only 14.2% of the time, while they felt neutral 19.4% of the time. Although most people have the image of the minister as being very decisive, the evidence indicates

3. Many ministers revised the wording of the survey statements, which suggested they were not willing to take them at face value. For instance, many did not like and refused to relate to the word "success." Others insisted that the ministry was not a "profession," but a "calling." Almost all of the secular questions were labeled as "unclear" and "irrelevant" by scores of ministers.

4. Only 27% of the ministers agreed that "An article for sale is worth what people will pay for it." The inclusion of the words "for sale" would indicate that in the secular world, the statement is true. The response of the ministers to this question indicates that they see them-

selves more as technicians than as motivators or managers.

5. The secular questions drew by far the most hostile comments and the greatest number of refusals to answer.
6. In response to the statement, "The image that most people have of the ideal minister is outdated," 68% were in agreement, 18% disagreed, and 14% were neutral. This would indicate that most ministers feel uncomfortable with the image they think people have of them.

7. The previously mentioned Gallup poll also states that among Protestant

ministers, Catholic priests, and Jewish rabbis, the chief reason for their leaving the ministry was an inability to communicate with people.

C. Suggestions:

 Again, a basic program designed to aid ministers in determining their present-day identity would be entirely applicable here. Any number of things could be listed that would relate the minister to the world primarily as a human being rather than only a "minister"—coaching a Little League team, for instance, or some other community related activity. Reflection upon these experiences in light of the demands of the church and the meaning of Christianity could prove invaluable to the minister and to his congregation.

III. THE MINISTER AND HIS VALUES

A. Findings:

- 1. Those churches which restrict the minister to a particular image and do not provide flexibility should anticipate problems for themselves and for the minister.
- 2. Response to the statement: "The expenditure of physical, mental, and emotional effort in performing ministerial duties is as natural as at play," indicates that most ministers either do not enjoy their work or believe that they shouldn't enjoy their work, or they are afraid of the word "play." (The response was 41% disagreed, 35% agreed, 24% neutral.) Investigation into the meaning of this statement for the individual minister could reveal the source of many emotional and psychosomatic difficulties.

IV. THE MINISTER AND HIS INCOME

A. Finding:

1. Salaries are a big problem for many ministers. This is the number one financial priority for the church in the mind of the majority of the ministers.

B. Evidence:

- 1. The statements about the relative importance of the benevolent programs of the church and salaries as compared with a similar statement given earlier to ministers in one district (Pilot Survey in the Melbourne District) indicate that most ministers want salaries to be the first priority.
- 2. The other statements about salaries, cost of living increases, etc., got overwhelming approval.
- 3. The comments written on the Survey bear out this finding.

C. Suggestions:

- 1. Deal realistically with salaries at all levels of the church.
- 2. Determine the real expectations ministers have about the material benefits of the ministry.

V. THE MINISTER AND PEOPLE

A. Finding: Many ministers do not trust people.

B. Evidence: This finding is based on a study of the response to the statement: "I feel the ministry is a lonely profession."

The opinions on this statement were:

1. Strongly disagree	68 ministers or 13%
2. Disagree	183 ministers or 34%
3. Neutral	55 ministers or 10%
4. Agree	176 ministers or 33%
5. Strongly agree	45 ministers or 9%
6. Refused to answer	7 ministers or 1%

Only 47% disagreed with the statement. An analysis was then made of the 68 Survey returns that strongly disagreed and the 45 returns that strongly agreed to see how these men responded to the statement, "In the ministry you can only trust friends and relatives."

There is a strong correlation between lack of trust in people and loneliness in the ministry. The logical implication is that those ministers who trust people will not find the ministry to be a lonely profession, while those who do not trust people will find the ministry to be lonely.

C. Suggestions:

1. Determine why many ministers do not trust people. The first step in dealing with this serious problem is finding its cause. Is lack of trust on the part of some ministers a kind of battle wound? That is, did they trust people before entering the ministry, but experiences in the ministry have caused them not to trust now? Do some men enter the ministry looking for trust because they lack it to begin with? These kinds of questions need to be answered.

2. Encourage ministers to participate with one another in some kind of

Encounter Group which would emphasize openness and trust. VI. THE MINISTER AND HIS DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

A. Findings:

1. Most ministers (65%) indicated no difficulty in communication with their District Superintendents. Only 21% said they have a great deal of trouble in this area. Considering the nature of the District Superintendent's job within the connectional system, this difficulty may reveal as much about the minister as a particular District Superintendent. 2. The ministers want more personal contact with their District Superintendents.

VII. THE MINISTER AND CONTINUING EDUCATION

- A. Finding: Ministers want and need continuing education. This reveals a healthy readiness to do something about the needs revealed in this survey.
- B. Evidence: Ministers overwhelmingly agreed with all of the statements about continuing education.

C. Suggestions:

- 1. Determine to what extent ministers are now engaging in continuing
- 2. Institute an extensive program of continuing education in cooperation with the cabinet.
- 3. Recommend more emphasis on Pastor's School as a continuing education experience.
- 4. Make some money available for continuing education where a clear need is indicated.

VIII. THE MINISTER AND THE APPOINTMENT/CONNECTIONAL SYSTEM

A. Finding: Many ministers feel left out of the appointment/connectional system. They want to be consulted, especially about appointments, in a meaningful way. They do not know the meaning of an "effective" min-

- ister in the eyes of the appointive system.

 B. Evidence: Several of the important statements in this group would have been more revealing of ministers' feelings if they had contained different verbs. For instance, the statement, "A general policy about what constitutes 'consultation' concerning appointments should be established by the cabinet," would have been a far more effective indicator of ministers' opinions about consultation if the words "has been" or "has not been" were used instead of the words "should be." With this in mind the following evidence is presented:
 - 1. 83% of the ministers agree with the above statement about establishing

a policy on "consultation."

2. 79% agree that the Bishop and Cabinet should recognize in appointments and other matters that affect the ministers.

3. 87% agree that there should be some consultation between senior and associate ministers before appointment.

4. Only 25% of the ministers agree that "The present method of measur-

ing a minister's effectiveness is adequate.'

C. Suggestions:

1. The Cabinet could arrive at a consensus on the meaning of an "effective" minister. This could be made the subject of extensive debate in the Conference by both clergy and laity. Such open discussion would offer insight and feed-back to both the Cabinet and the ministers.

2. The Cabinet could establish and publish a definite policy about what constitutes "consultation." Dialogue groups could be held in each District with the District Superintendent concerning this definition before and after the Cabinet establishes the policy.

IX. CONCLUSIONS

The results of this Opinion Survey reflect the crisis in the ministry that is being experienced by all denominations all over the United States. The primary aspect of this crisis appears to be that of the minister's role or identity. This is true not only of younger men, but also of older men as well. Many ministers are having difficulty relating to the world of their parishioners. We may deal with part of the crisis in the ministry by considering the following:

1. We have too many professionally trained, ordained ministers for the

present number of viable professional openings.

2. Most ministers have a background of academic education as preparation for the ministry while the role of the minister in the world today demands not only academic education but also training in interpersonal relationships and leadership skills.

3. Ministers in Florida are faced with low pay scales in a time when

society consciously or unconsciously associates worth and value with

remuneration.

4. We are a part of a system whose very foundation is faith and trust in God and Jesus Christ, yet there is evidence that lack of trust in each other is a major problem. Serious discussion of the findings of this report among the ministers of the Conference might do much to help restore trust in each other.

X. THE MINISTERS' RESPONSES TO THE OPINION SURVEY

COMMITTEE ON QUADRENNIAL EMPHASIS

The United Methodist Church in Florida is stronger today because of the quadrennial emphasis. Unique services and opportunities are being offered through the church. Concerned churches and their ministers and laymen are finding increasing numbers of meaningful ways to respond to human needs and improving life styles.

Motivation for this increasing ministry in urban and rural areas is "The Life and Teachings of Jesus," second phase of the Quadrennial Emphasis

Bible Study.

This ministry of reconciliation is being funded through the Fund for

Reconciliation, and efforts of concerned people.

Churches of the Florida Conference contributed \$58,179.15 to this fund from June 1, 1970 through May 4, 1971, one-half being forwarded to projects of the general church and the remaining half being retained in our Conference for projects approved by the 1970 Annual Conference. While funds have not been available to accomplish all we had hoped, tremendous things

are being done for God's children.

With a budget of \$45,900 for use in the Florida Conference this past year, here are brief statements concerning its use. Gainesville District Rural Ministries saw numerous rural churches uniting in a cooperative effort for more effective ministry. The Jacksonville Urban Center Pilot Project is clearly identified with the struggles and needs of low income and minority people within the Jacksonville District. "Seed money" was supplied to each of the twelve districts to assist in launching local projects of reconciliation. Because of early support from the Fund for Reconciliation, Tampa's Intensive Tutorial Project continues to grow, both numerically and financial support from the community to such an extent that surplus budgeted funds from FFR are being redirected to new and urgent pilot projects in Tampa. Five full-time volunteers have served within this Conference, supported by minimal subsistance allowances. Ft. Lauderdale's Specialized Urban Ministries was founded during this year, with already amazing accomplishments in an exciting new missionary outreach through tutor banks, summer training and enrichment programs, programs of housing re-build, drug abuse ministry, community relations, camping, intern program, black church parsonage construction, and with many more developing ministries.

In hearing the numerous requests for funds to help meet the increasing human needs, one of the most difficult tasks confronting your Conference Quadrennial Emphasis Committee came in seeking to determine which of the numerous deserving projects would be supported by the limited available funds. This year's new project recommended for your approval is in the Tallahassee District, known as Tallahassee Urban Ministry (TUM), Leon Wakulla Larger Parish, and Madison County Parish. Embodied within these proposed projects is a director of youth activities, parish director of Christian Education, ministry to senior citizens, combining of ministries of smaller churches, as well as increasing urban problems of Tallahassee.

Recommendations

B. That October 24, 1971 be designated "Fund for Reconciliation Sunday" and that determined efforts be made to secure increased contributions for the Fund in order to increase our conference ministries in areas of urgent human need.

C. That the study of "The Life and Teachings of Jesus" be made in each local church.

D. That local churches evaluate and research area human needs and seek to involve their church in a ministry of reconciliation.

We are equally confident that he will be cordially received by the wonderful people of his district and the entire Florida Conference.

We are genuinely grateful for the excellent progress that has been made in Christian unity. We are confident it shall continue!

RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE "COMMITTEE OF NINE" CONCERNING THE CONFERENCE FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR

FLORIDA UNITED METHODIST HIGHER EDUCATION

Having reviewed the Marts & Lundy report and having shared in our deliberations with the Cabinet of the Annual Conference, the "Committee of Nine" in session on Friday, April 16, 1971, unanimously approved the following motions:

The "Committee of Nine" recommends approval by the Program Council of a special gifts campaign structured as outlined by Marts & Lundy and suggesting the Annual Conference Year 1971-72 as the time for this campaign. We further recommend that the goal be established between \$2,000,000 and \$4,000,000.

The "Committee of Nine" recommends the establishment of a steering committee to be composed of 15 members selected as follows:

5 to be named by the Bishop and the Cabinet

5 to be named by the Chairman of the Board and the President of Florida Southern College

5 to be named by the Chairman of the Board and the President of Bethune-Cookman College.

The recommendations of the Committee of Nine were approved in full by the members of the Program Council and will be directed to the Annual Conference in June 1971 for its consideration and action.

SUMMARY OF THE FUND-RAISING SURVEY REPORT PREPARED BY MARTS & LUNDY, INC. WHICH WAS PRESENTED TO THE PROGRAM COUNCIL ON SATURDAY, APRIL 16, 1971

I. STATISTICS

1,753 ministers and laymen attended 12 district survey meetings.

1,509 completed questionnaires

68 ministers and laymen were personally interviewed

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II. ANALYSIS OF REPLIES TO SURVEY QUESTIONS

We know there are many methods used to raise funds within a group of churches, but in the survey we presented a campaign which has been most successful in our experience, so that those attending the survey meetings or personally interviewed could react to that particular plan. Both the direct replies to the specific questions and the comments received were considered.

Of those who completed questionnaires and were interviewed thirtysix percent approved the campaign plan. This is below the range of

replies in similar surveys.

The comments were nearly evenly divided between the approval of a special gifts campaign and the disapproval of person-to-person visits in each congregation; 101 were favorable toward a special gifts campaign and 116 disapproved the person-to-person plan.

The laymen personally interviewed approved the campaign plan seventy percent which is within the range. This is significant because these were selected individuals with a potential to make a special gift.

There is approval for the special gifts phase even by those who disapproved the total plan; twenty percent of those who disapproved the total plan expressed a desire for a special gifts campaign.

The results from the survey meetings and the personal interviews plus the additional information supplied by the Conference and the two Colleges formed the base for our conclusions and the recommendations for a special gifts campaign.

III. CONCLUSIONS

The conclusions are based on the responses relating to four basic questions:

- 1. Is there a need which is readily recognized by the members as urgent? Do these members feel these needs should be met in order to maintain and improve the institutions and programs?
- 2. Is there a constituency with the giving ability to meet the needs? Are the members ready to give and to work to meet the needs?
 What steps are required to stimulate the maximum interest and

insure the maximum financial return?

1. We conclude that an educational program by the combined efforts of the Conference leaders and the leaders of the two Colleges is first priority. We arrive at this conclusion because of the confusion in the minds of the people to whom the program was presented during the

2. We conclude that there must be more discussion among all concerned

and agreement on the priorities. 3. We conclude that there should be arrangements for designated giving.

4. We conclude that the Conference has the leadership of the ministers of the leading churches, the District Superintendents and laymen of the two Colleges who are willing to lead these Colleges to greater achievement. We conclude the need for the combined involvement of

these leaders. A willingness to give follows involvement and commitment to a program which is well-managed and directed for the insti-

tutions in which these leaders believe.

5. We conclude that The Florida Methodist Conference together with the combined efforts of Bethune-Cookman College and Florida Southern College can raise between \$2,000,000 and \$6,000,000 under the present circumstances. This could probably reach the higher amount if a thorough and well-organized educational program is conducted and a detailed search for and cultivation of special gift prospects followed by an unusually careful special gifts solicitation.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

In making our recommendations we have taken into consideration the following:

The two Colleges have needs in addition to the needs presented during

the survey. That these needs were listed in the resource material which was distributed during the survey. That The Florida Methodist Conference presently includes in its budget annual support for the two Colleges. That the Boards of Trustees, alumni and friends of the two Colleges are prospects for the support of the two Colleges many of whom have contributed generously to the College of their choice. That the districts and local congregations also have needs which must be considered. That this program should attempt to meet the needs of the two Colleges without financial loss to the annual program, and by its example and assistance improve the giving in the local churches and their support of the Conference.

A. CAMPAIGN LEADERSHIP

1. We recommend that a steering committee be formed including representatives from The Florida Methodist Conference and the Board of Trustees from the two Colleges. Representatives from the "Committee of Nine" should also be included on this committee in addition to the other representatives.

a. A leading layman, well-known and respected, should be enlisted to head the committee.

b. Responsibilities would include decisions on needs, campaign promotion, procedures, staffing, etc. covered in this section. Implementation would be after consultation and in cooperation with Conference Boards, Boards of Trustees of the two Colleges, District Superintendents and their Boards or committees.

2. We recommend that each district form a representative committee of the district and the two Colleges with the responsibility for policy decisions and implementation of the program in the district and among the constituencies of the two Colleges within the district.

B. THE NEEDS AND THE OBJECTIVE

1. We recommend that the Steering Committee review the total list of needs of the two Colleges and determine those needs to be included in the specific list totaling \$6,000,000. There are other needs in the lists of the two Colleges, they should be projected as long-term objectives, and the Committee should determine the fundraising method to be used to meet these needs.

a. The Committee should carefully review each need on the lists to be certain it can be documented, justified and supported by the Conference and the other constituencies of the two Colleges. b. We consider \$6,000,000 to be raised by the Conference and the two Colleges a very substantial objective. The degree of success in reaching this total will be determined by the willingness of the three groups-Conference leaders and the leaders of the two Colleges-to work together in a spirit of cooperation and determina-

tion to strengthen and support Bethune-Cookman and Florida Southern. The caliber of leadership willing to assume this responsibility will be a deciding factor in the degree of success. The acceptance of the needs selected by the potential donors naturally follows as a prerequisite for success.

C. EDUCATION AND INTERPRETATION

1. We recommend that a strong educational program be instituted to obtain the maximum understanding of the relevance and urgency of the needs to the future of Christian Higher Education in The Florida Methodist Conference. Not only must the needs be carefully explained in terms of people to be served, but also the best way to fund the work must be understood.

2. We recommend that you plan a series of information meetings for special gift prospects, the ministers of the leading churches, the alumni, parents and friends of the two Colleges and for district

leaders before any request for funds.

3. We recommend that you develop brochures, visual aids, a filmstrip, newsletters and other printed materials to adequately present the needs.

4. We recommend that you make maximum use of existing media within the Conference, publications of the two Colleges, and channels of communications with District Superintendents, district leaders, ministers and laymen.

D. SPECIAL GIFTS

1. We recommend that a state wide special gifts committee be enlisted to seek gifts from a selected few individuals who might be in a position to make very substantial contributions. This committee should be composed of leading Methodists and members of the Boards of Trustees, alumni and friends of the two Colleges. A prominent and influential layman should be enlisted as chairman. He should be requested to add a few committee members who are capable and willing to seek the leadership type gifts.

a. We recommend that this committee together with the two College Presidents initiate discussions with a few close friends of the Conference or the Colleges who are in a position to make very

substantial gifts.

2. We recommend that a special gifts committee be organized in each district and the local communities of each College, similar to the state-wide committee in membership and responsibilities to seek substantial gifts in their districts and communities. The efforts of the state-wide committee and the district and community committees should be coordinated by a campaign staff member.

3. We recommend that all special gifts be credited to the donor's various categories—district, congregation, alumni organization and

class, parent or friend group—unless he wishes otherwise.

To date the number of potentially large donors is relatively small. Seeking such donors must be done with the help of Conference leaders, District Superintendents, members of the Boards, the Presidents and the Development Directors of the two Colleges plus the ministers. All concerned must approve and cooperate in the gathering of names and the solicitation of gifts. This is a slow process, but undoubtedly there are individuals with substantial giving ability who will recognize and respond to the opportunity to provide leadership in giving.

E. COMMUNITY AND ALUMNI

1. We recommend that campaigns be conducted among the alumni, parents and friends of the two Colleges and within their local communities.

F. DESIGNATIONS

1. We recommend that the Steering Committee agree on a policy for designated gifts and the distribution of undesignated receipts.

G. DEFERRED GIFTS AND ESTATE PLANNING

1. We recommend that the Conference, through the Florida Methodist Foundation, Inc., and the two Colleges initiate, as a part of the proposed program, an intensive effort to discover and personally contact individuals for bequests, life income contracts and other deferred giving plans. This would be a continuing program and would provide one way to help meet the immediate need for endowment income and eventually some of the long-range needs.

H. STAFF AND FUND-RAISING COUNSEL

1. We recommend that the Conference designate a director to serve as liaison between the Conference, the two Colleges and the resident campaign director.

2. We recommend the appointment of a director of information.

3. We recommend that Mr. Mead F. Rogers, Jr. and Mr. Harry L.

Burney, Jr. be assigned to give full time to this program.

4. We recommend that you retain fund counsel to supply you with a full-time resident campaign director for a period of about twelve months.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

WHEREAS, our spirits have been renewed by the messages both in word and in music, our minds and hearts challenged by the reports given and recommendations made for the coming year; and

Whereas, the total experience of our conference has been strengthened by guest speakers, choirs, groups from local congregations and others too

THAXTON SPRINGFIELD

Thaxton Springfield was a man with a passionate concern to bring life and faith together. In his mind they could not exist apart so he struggled to put flesh and blood on the bones of creed and doctrine and immerse them in our common life. He had the clear vision to see that the great doctrines of our faith; Creation, Crucifixion, Resurrection, Redemption, spoke to the actual human situation. They were God's gifts to the frailties and failures of our common life. With one hand he held firmly to life as it is, being neither naive nor simplistic. With the other he held strongly to the faith that God could and would bring rich and radical changes to one life or a whole world. He pulled at these two things to bring them together and the strain was often visible in him and audible in his sermons.

His own life was the best evidence of his success. There are also countless numbers of us who learned from him that you do not have to turn away from life to have faith but you turn toward it and embrace it with hope, and life and God will embrace you. It was his kind of piety that convinced

many of us that we, too, could live by faith.

In the biblical sense he was a man who often swore to his own hurt and thus fought with himself or expended himself far past his own self interest. But he had come to the conclusion that the crucifixion was at the heart of the Christian faith and that God was best known to us through a love that expended itself; he therefore choose to do the same.

He was born in Sulligent, Ala. on Nov. 20, 1915 and died on July 22, 1970. He is survived by his wife, Molly, and five sons, Thaxton, Jr., Dempsey, Whitley, Jimmie, and Emory. He is loved and remembered by innumerable friends who found themselves and God through his ministry and friendship.

JOHN MORELAND SIKES

"Let's Get With It!"

It is significant that the cover message of the October 11, 1970 bulletin of First United Methodist Church of Fort Myers bore this title. It was the last such message that John Moreland Sikes wrote for his congregation, and it was typical of his ministry of thirty years in the Florida Conference. Looking inside that bulletin, one found a sermon subject that must have served as a companion message to the one on the cover: "A Backward Look—A Forward Thrust," and it was based on the Scripture Lesson found in Luke 9:57-62. John Sikes was calling his people to action! A great past was something to glorify, to be sure, but First Church's true greatness was yet to be realized. And realization of such a splendid destiny could come about only through total commitment to Jesus Christ.

Throughout his ministry this call had been John's theme song. It was the motivation that drove him to his knees in prayer and impelled him to spend endless hours laboring for the Kingdom of God. Thus his life was characterized by a unique combination of deep piety and social vision, eventuating in the fervent desire to get on with the work to which our Lord has called us. Sometimes this desire assumed the spirit of impatience, when committees failed to act decisively, or when individuals who were slow to catch the vision indulged in a bit of holy foot-dragging. Prayer vigils and committee meetings were no good unless they resulted in the "forward thrust" that

John preached about on the morning of October 11, 1970.

There is no phase of the Christian ministry in which John Sikes did not discharge his responsibilities with excellence. He was an able and persuasive preacher of the Gospel. He was a thorough and competent administrator of the affairs of the Church. He was warmly and effectively evangelistic in every aspect of his ministry. He was an articulate and powerful debater on the conference floor. Most important of all, however, he was a faithful pastor, who loved people, and who never recovered from the wonderment that God had called him to be a preacher.

How does God produce a man like John Moreland Sikes? You have to go back to a little village in Columbia County, Florida, to find an answer to that question. It was there, in Fort White, that John was born on July 16, 1917, the red-haired son of John Moreland and Mary Sikes. Surrounded by all of the influences that can make a growing boy aware of God, he spent his boyhood and youth in that community. A Christian home, godly parents, the fields and streams of God's beautiful out of doors, a tiny country church served by a succession of dedicated pastors, all of those factors left their indelible imprint upon John Sikes' personality. He could speak of a "conversion experience," when he accepted Jesus Christ as his personal Savior; but he could also describe the importance in his life of the way of constant spiritual nurture. Add it all up and you get the inevitable result—a winsome young Christian whom God called into the ministry.

John was graduated from Asbury College and the Candler School of Theology. On November 8, 1941, he was married to Florence Weldon in Hopkinsville, Kentucky. Throughout his ministry Florence created the kind of atmosphere in the parsonage that sharpened John's effectiveness as a minister. Three wonderful children came to make life in the Sikes home happier—John Larry, Walter Moreland, and Virginia Ruth. As a family, the

Sikes gave a commendable witness to the Christian faith.

John and Florence Sikes began their ministry at the Reddick Methodist Church in 1941. Other appointments include Dunnellon, Tarpon Springs, Pompano Beach, and Southside in Jacksonville. Prior to his assignment to First Church, Fort Myers, John provided six years of creative leadership as

Superintendent of the Gainesville District.

John gave faithful and effective service to several Florida Conference Boards. At the time of his death he was vice chairman of the Conference Council. Perhaps he will be remembered best for his remarkable leadership in effecting the historic merger of the Florida Conference, Central Jurisdiction, and the Florida Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction. Loved and respected by the members of both groups, John was chairman of the Advisory Council on Inter-Jurisdictional Affairs, which provided guidance in the merger.

When one tries to analyze the whole spectrum of John Sikes' ministry, there is one quality that seems to account for his greatness. In all things he demonstrated in his daily life the adequacy of the Christian faith. To be in

his presence caused one to desire to be a better person.

John became ill after that eventful Sunday, October 11, at First Church, Fort Myers. He entered into the Father's House early the next afternoon, October 12, 1970. A worship service, conducted by Bishop James W. Henley, was held in the sanctuary of the First United Methodist Church of Fort Myers on October 15, 1970. Bishop Henley was assisted in the service by the Rev. Charles Hamilton, District Superintendent of the Sarasota District, and the Rev. C. Durward McDonell, Pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Miami. Several hundred laymen and pastors filled the sanctuary and later accompanied the family to Memorial Gardens, in Fort Myers, for the graveside service. John's body was laid to rest in the "Garden of Prayer," just a few feet away from a statue of Christ Praying in the Garden.

But, in death as in life, John Sikes would say, "Let's get on with the work

of the Kingdom!"

HOWARD ROSS PORTER

Howard Ross Porter, a Native of Florida, was born in Daytona Beach, October 3, 1914. Late in life, after he had already become successful at his trade as a painter, God laid His hand upon Howard and called him into the special work of the Ministry of the Church.

Feeling this Call and his need to prepare for it, he entered Florida Southern College from which he was graduated. Even while he was a student at Florida Southern, he served the Churches at Lake Placid and Lake Alfred. Upon graduation, he served as Pastor at Cocoa Beach and Zellwood and then became a student at Duke Divinity School as further preparation

for the Ministry. Upon completion of his work there he was appointed to the Livingston Memorial Church in Daytona Beach; then to Bunnell and to Immokalee. He was received on Trial in the Florida Conference in 1957

and into Full Connection in 1959.

In 1968 he was appointed to First Church, Clewiston, where he was serving in a most commendable manner at the time of his death. In November, 1970, after preaching his Thanksgiving sermon, Howard became ill and the next week, went to the hospital in Clewiston. As he gradually grew worse, he was moved from Clewiston to the Good Samaritan Hospital in West Palm Beach, where surgery was performed; and, then to Jackson Memorial, in Miami. But after Surgeons, Doctors and Nurses had done all in their power, death came as the only relief from his suffering. He passed away, December 28 and Memorial Services were held, December 31 in his Church in Clewiston which he had served so faithfully for $2\frac{1}{2}$ years. His District Superintendent, Dr. Lewis N. Head, conducted the service, assisted by a neighboring Pastor, The Rev. Fred Stinson of Belle Glade. His body was taken back to the place of his birth and laid to rest in the Bellevue Memorial Park, Daytona, Beach.

Howard was married to Vivian Bryan at Grand Canyon, Arizona, where they met when he was working there at his trade as a painter and she was attending school nearby. They had two sons, Ross Bryan, who is married and lives in Daytona Beach, and Paul Howard, who is a student at Florida

Southern College. There are two Grandchildren.

During his active Ministry, Howard, in his quiet, unassuming manner, wherever he served, got the job done and done well. Like the Master, whom he tried to serve, he "loved the Church and gave himself for it and to it." He was thoroughly dedicated to his Calling and wherever he was appointed, he did his best to uphold his Christ and advance the Kingdom through his church. His real achievements are not shown in the statistical columns of the Annual Conference Reports, but in the hearts and lives of the people whom he served. He loved people and was a good Pastor to them.

On the Sunday following his death, there appeared in the bulletin of the Church in Clewiston, where he last served, the following tribute to his life and ministry which shows the love and esteem in which he was held by

those who knew him best:

"Reverend Howard Porter—a great servant of the Lord—spent his relatively short ministry with us continually doing his best to convince each of us that the biggest thing we have the opportunity of knowing is the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. He realized how exceedingly casual nearly all of us regard the marvelous, infinite love of our God! Reverend Porter conducted each of his services in a manner that made us conscious of the presence of Christ; that Christ was sitting with us, and was anxious to go home with us. Certainly, we'll miss him, but let us demonstrate by precept and example that his ministry to us was fruitful."

After all, what more could anyone say about a faithful servant of the Lord?

ROBINSON IRA BARNETT

Robinson Ira Barnett, son of the beloved Robert Howren and Sarah Epperson Barnett, was born at Stafford's Pond, near the present town of Williston, Florida, on November 21, 1876, and died at his home in Lakeland on September 23, 1970 after a long, useful and inspiring term of service in the ministry of The Methodist Church.

Reared in a godly parsonage home, and nurtured in the Wesleyan tradition, he united with the Methodist Church at an early age. He answered the call to preach and was licensed to preach at a district conference in Melrose in 1896. In 1900 he graduated from the Florida Conference College (the predecessor to Florida Southern College), and he was among the very few ministers in our Conference in that day to earn the Bachelor of Divinity degree—having graduated from the seminary of Vanderbilt University in 1904. The Doctor of Divinity degree was conferred upon him by Florida

Southern College in 1927. He was admitted on trial in the Florida Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South in 1903, and was received into full connection in 1906.

He was married to Miss Beulah Agnes Wilson at the First Methodist Church of Bartow on November 20, 1907. Three children were born of this union, Vida, Elizabeth and Hoyt. Ill health on the part of Vida made it necessary for Brother Barnett to transfer to the Denver Conference for four years during which time she recovered sufficiently for him to return to his home state and conference.

The appointments served by this son and grandson of Methodist itinerants were: Sutherland Mission, Lake City, West Palm Beach, Colorado Springs, Perry, the Ocala District, Riverside Park, Jacksonville, the Orlando District, the Miami District, and Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, which office he held for twenty-one years. During most of his twenty-one years of retirement he gave effective service throughout the connection, in his conference and in his local church.

His memorial service was held at Temple Methodist Church, Lakeland, on September 25, 1970, with the following persons participating: The Reverend Lee Pearson, his pastor, The Reverend Henry W. Blackburn, Miss Eulalie Ginn and Miss Vivian Postell. Survivors include: his widow Beulah Wilson Barnett, a daughter Elizabeth Adams, a son Hoyt W., a sister Miss Loulie,

two brothers, Doak and Henry, and grandchildren and great grandchildren. Dr. Barnett represented the Methodist itinerancy at its best. He had a pastor's heart so he was a tender and faithful shepherd to all his parishioners, and he carried this fine quality into his ministry as a presiding elder. He was esteemed and respected by his fellow ministers and the adults in his congregations; admired by the many young people whom he befriended and challenged; and beloved by the children who responded to his devoted pastoral care.

He had the enthusiasm and earnestness of an evangelist and this was finely balanced by his knowledge and skill as a teacher, so he was an effective and forthright gospel preacher . . . welcomed in any pulpit in our Conference. He was a natural-born Methodist . . . a true son of John Wesley . . . a superior administrator! It was not by accident that he was chosen to head up the educational program of our Conference for more than two decades, for he had demonstrated his gifts and ability as an educator and leader in the local church school and as a district director of education. His work as an executive secretary of the Board of Education was unexcelled anywhere in American Methodism.

Dr. Barnett was in demand throughout connectional Methodism as an instructor in training schools and as a counselor at educational conferences; he made valuable contributions to our periodicals, and he gave leadership to important boards, commissions and agencies in the field of missions, evangelism, temperance and education. He rendered distinguished service at the Lake Junaluska Assembly, as editor of The Florida Advocate, as a delegate to the General Conference of his denomination, as president of the Executive Secretaries of Education and president of the National Methodist Conference on Education, but perhaps his crowning achievement was the development of Florida Methodism's program for local church and college youth throughout the state, which will reflect his influence for generations to come. He was the dominant force behind the development of the Youth Camp at Leesburg where the main building is very appropriately named for him. I have often said that I believe more good is accomplished with Methodist youth at that camp each summer than in any other place in the world.

In his so-called years of retirement he gave valuable service in setting up Methodism's program for older adults and in the establishing of "Mature Years" as a publication in that field. He was the first person to teach an accredited course in that area, and was influential in proposing the plan to hold conference-wide meetings for senior citizens throughout the denomination

If our Conference has been better prepared for mergers and unions with other denominations and races than some others I believe it is due in part to

the godly example and wise leadership of this ecumenically minded servant of the church. At our youth camps and assemblies years ago our young

people were being prepared for these days.

Dr. Barnett was a happy and a victorious Christian. There was a radiance about his countenance that was unmistakably Christlike. He was the kind of man of whom it could be said "This man's religion is real!" Whatever it is that enables one Christian to recognize genuine Christianity in another . he had it! And whatever it is about a Christian that makes a non-Christian want what he has . . . he had just that! What for so many seems intermittent . . . seemed in him to be quite continuous. We would do well to ponder this man's life, and we should try to bring into the confusion and uncertainties of our day something of the radiance, joy, hopefulness and faith

How do we account for such a useful life? I think Paul gives us the clue in the third chapter of his Epistle to the Colossians when he said "Your life is hid with Christ in God"! There is the secret of his success. Ira Barnett was a surrendered man . . . irretrievably committed to Christ, and to the

very end he was a faithful and effective witness for his Master.

HENRY W. BLACKBURN

ARTHUR COLEMAN RIVIERE

Arthur Coleman Riviere was born in Alachua County, Florida on January 8, 1895, and received his final appointment to the Father's House on October 26, 1970 while a patient in Morton Plant Hospital, Clearwater. He was the son of Godly parents, Henry Lawson and Martha Ann Riviere. His mother's

prayer was that he would be a minister.

The family moved to Sutherland in 1902. At an early age he gave his heart to God and felt the call to preach under the ministry of Rev. R. F. Hodnett, who was the minister at old Southern College at Sutherland (now Palm Harbor) and also pastor of Curlew Methodist Church near by. He attended Southern College, graduating in 1920. While a senior he became a Student Volunteer desiring to be sent to the mission field. But because of some change in the policy of the Mission Board, he was unable to go and became a minister in the Florida Conference.

After graduating from Southern College he attended Emory University and received his Bachelor of Divinity Degree in 1923. His first full-time ap-

pointment was at Pierson.

of this mature Christian.

While attending Emory University, he met Miss Minnie Womack, a teacher in the Atlanta Public Schools whom he married September 8, 1925, in the Emory Theological Chapel. She served faithfully beside her husband through his entire ministry as a homemaker and companion. She was devoted to him, his church and his Lord. She and two adopted children, Herbert Riviere and Edith R. Johnson survive him. Mrs. Riviere now resides

at Dunedin where they have had a home for some years.

His second appointment was to Bonita Springs-Naples. At Naples he was instrumental in building a church, the first ever built in that area. Other churches he served were: New Port Richey, Stuart, Largo, Tarboux Memorial in Miami and Key West. At Key West (1940-44) he served well the needs of his congregation as well as a large contingent of service personnel at the Navy Base. From Key West he moved to Madison and to Cocoa in 1946. While at Cocoa his health was not good and during the conference year 1949-50 he took Sabbatical leave. The next year, 1950-51, he served at Euclid Avenue Church in St. Petersburg, and in 1951-52 he held a supernumerary relationship. Brother Arthur retired in 1952 because of health reasons. During the years from 1952-1967 he underwent four major operations. However, he was able to serve as a retired supply for some years. He served the Spring Lake church 1952-54 and at Oldsmar 1954-56. The next four years he served the Dunedin Methodist Church as a part-time visiting minister. In 1960 he organized Union Street Methodist Church of Dunedin and served as interim pastor for a short time. In July 1967 Brother Riviere's health began to fail and continued deteriorating until he

sustained a fall on August 31, 1970. He remained hospitalized until his death October 26, 1970.

Funeral services were held in the beautiful new Curlew United Methodist Church October 28, 1970, conducted by Dr. Gaylon Howe, Superintendent of the St. Petersburg District, assisted by Rev. Edison Russell and Rev. R. J. Sharp. His body was tenderly laid to rest in Curlew Cemetery on the morning of October 28, 1970, beside those of his mother, father and brother.

Arthur Riviere was a Christian gentleman of the highest order. He stood up bravely for what he thought was right. He served well the churches to which he was appointed and in almost every instance left behind him improvements to the physical property as well as a deep spiritual enrichment in the lives of his members. His prayers were a blessing and inspiration to those who heard. He considered it a great privilege to serve as a Methodist minister and preached in the tradition of the Wesleys to the best of his sability. There is so much about the life of Brother Riviere that could be said and yet is so difficult to put into words. How can you express how deeply you have appreciated friendship and constructive advice which has come your way over the major portion of your adult life? You feel the deep devotion of friend to friend and yet the inability to express it adequately to another. It is sort of like trying to explain the presence of God, you can't see it but you know it is there and are grateful. Brother Riviere was the pastor under whose ministry I was called to preach. For the last twenty-five years I have counted him as a very close friend. I feel that Florida Methodism has lost one of its truly great men of God, one who lived his faith as expressed in a life of service within the doctrines and discipline of the Methodist Church.

To my mind come two verses of scripture when I think of Arthur Riviere: Joshua 24:15, "Choose ye this day whom ye will serve . . . as for me and my house we will serve the Lord." This he did faithfully and well during his 47 years as a Methodist minister. And Matthew 25:23, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." I feel our Lord welcomed him to his final appointment with these

words.

With the words of John Wesley at the funeral service of George Wake-field, may we take leave of our Brother, Arthur Coleman Riviere, holding dear in memory the friendship and love of this man of God:

"Servant of God well done,
Thy glorious warfare's past
The battle's fought, the race won,
And thou are crowned at last.
Of all thy heart's desire,
Triumphantly possessed,
Lodged by the great angelic Choir,
In thy Redeemer's breast."

Whose very life was an inspiration to one and all across the nation, She made me feel that Jesus was very near, If I should pray, He would be here!

Her life, her actions were more than a gift, When I felt depressed she gave me a lift!

I feel I'm a better person today, all because she came my way!"

The life and labors of such a lady as Edith Webb Touchton are certainly a rich heritage—the world is better because of her efforts and service, and her godly influence will never be forgotten by those many lives she touched in her journey of life.

Edna Hazel Morrow Elder was born September 19, 1884 in Mercer County, Pennsylvania. She was one of ten children born to the Morrows. She and Reverend J. H. Elder were married, December 25, 1905 in Warren, Ohio.

They were blessed with two daughters, Mrs. Frances Ruth Gibbons and Miss Elma Elder. She had one granddaughter, Hazel Ruth Ziers.

Reverend and Mrs. Elder served at Mount Dora from 1925 to 1931; at Hialeah from 1932 to 1933; and at South Miami from 1934 to 1940, after which they retired. After retirement they served Davie for six years and then organized and worked in the Opa Locka Church for two years. They received into membership one hundred people. The Elders did a fine work at Opa Locka in organizing that splendid congregation by visiting from house to house. Frances, their daughter played the organ in that church. This was the first church building to be built in Opa Locka. During their stay at Davie, the end of the war came and she rejoiced by ringing the church bell, that our men were coming home. While they were at the Hialeah Church, water got into the parsonage, so they had to move to Miami Springs. Mrs. Elder worked in the church and was a big help to her husband by playing the piano and teaching Sunday School Classes.

One of the first memories I have of the Elders was during my pastorate at South Miami. It was during the days of the Ladies Aid, in which she served

and organized groups. They came for a covered dish dinner, which the Ladies

Aid was having, followed by sewing.

Mrs. Elder had a good sense of humor and got a lot out of life. To her, religious work was not dull. One of her friends said of her, that she was loyal to the Methodist Church and loved all phases of it and wanted it to prosper. She gave her life in service to it, seeing that her money went in every Sunday, as well as supporting the women's work in the church and helping people when they were sick. She and her husband were especially interested in two women in Eustis, whom they helped to sell their house. These ladies remembered the Elders in their will and with this they purchased the home that she lived in and enjoyed so much. She loved to do her housework and cooking. She and her daughter, Elma, enjoyed doing things for each other. She liked to do her wash and was disappointed when she could not do it before going to the hospital.

She was a Greater Miami resident for 39 years and a member of the Tamiami Temple at the time of death. She was very proud, when the Tamiami Temple was remodeled and a pew was given in her honor by her daughters. She wanted to be there that day. She donated money for the erection of the Education Building at Tamiami and gave many helpful sug-

gestions to help the church run more smoothly.

After a long illness, she died in South Miami Hospital on June 29, 1970. Funeral Services were held at Combs Funeral Home in Miami, and interment was at Woodlawn Cemetery. The pall bearers were pastors of churches the Elders had served; Reverend Ralph Jones, of the Opa Locka Church; Reverend Leo King, of the South Miami Church; Reverend Lee Rustin, of the Hialeah Church; and Doctor Hoyt Tatum, District Superintendent of the Miami District. Conducting the services was John A. Briley, a friend of the family for twenty-six years. At the end when she was in the hospital, she didn't want to be any trouble to anyone. Once she thought she saw Brother Elder waiting for her and another time she had a vision of a street lined with fruit trees in bloom. She was ready and expectant to the end. Death was not something to fear, but to be received of God.

George Bourn and the Rev. Ezra Hall assisted in the service. Members of Trinity Church, and a host of friends, gathered at the church to express their love and sympathy to the bereaved family. Interment was at Hillcrest Memorial Gardens, Ft.

Pierce, with the Rev. Harold Thomas officiating.

Her patience during her long illness, and her strength through her suffering, gave to all of us who knew her an unforgettable witness of her Christian faith. Margaret possessed an inner peace and assurance which seemed even more evident when her waning physical strength made her days more difficult. Her life expressed the truth of her favorite Biblical promise:

"... You are my servant, I have chosen you and not cast you off; fear not, for I am with you, be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will

strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand." (Isa. 41:9b and 10)

Her love for Christ and participation in the church began in her youth. This interest in the church never faltered. In 1963, at which time the Reverend Louis E. Patmore became a member of the Florida Conference, her own personal dream of even greater service for Christ found fuller opportunity for expression. The earthly pilgrimage of Mrs. Mildred Sutton Hughes lay between Fairchance, Pennsylvania where she was born July 30, 1918, and Lebanon Cemetery, Alabama, the final resting place of the "earthen vessel" in which she lived for 52 years. The daughter of Milton Sutton and Eve Hughes of Fairchance, "Dot" (as she was affectionately known) married Joe Bon Hughes on February 22, 1942. Until her death March 27, 1971, she was a devoted housewife and co-worker with her husband. She dated her real birth from December 2, 1910, when Christ touched her life, and for twenty years she lived for Him and His Church. She became a tower of faith and a witness for Christ in times of joy and in times of suffering.

She backed her husband fully in his response to the call to preach the

Gospel. Tampa, Florida, was a spiritual center of their lives, for it was from what is now Branscomb Memorial Church that they set forth to serve. Following pastorates in Alabama, Dot and Joe served Hernando from 1965-69, Grace-Knights (Plant City) 1969-70, and then moved to Good Shepherd in Tampa in 1970 to be nearer the medical aid now so necessary. In each of these churches Mrs. Hughes was loved and respected, and lives were touched and lifted by her witness to Christ.

Several times Dot experienced a dramatic "healing" of the cancer in her body, but each time the disease returned to plague her anew. This dread enemy could not dim her soul nor quench the radiance of her faith, and she used every hospital experience as a time of witness to the Father's love. She was ready for the Heavenly Home when at dawn on March 27

the Angel of Death slipped into her hospital room.

Ministers and laity of the Tampa District gathered at Branscomb Memorial United Methodist Church March 29 to say goodbye. PART VIII

HISTORICAL



ONG before the Pilgrims landed, there came to Florida another devout people seeking religious freedom. In June of 1564, French Huguenots established a colony at the mouth of the St. John's River. This colony, known as Ft. Caroline, was destroyed in September of 1565 by the Spanish. At the same time the city of St. Augustine

was founded. From that date until 1821, when the United States took possession of Florida, it was closed to the work of the Protestant Church except during the years of English control 1763 to 1783.

Florida was purchased from Spain in 1819, but it was not until July 1821 that it was transferred into the hands of the United States. It is possible that William Hankins, the minister of St. Marys, Georgia, crossed over and preached in Florida as early as 1819 in Nassau and Duval Counties to Methodist families. It is also quite possible that John Triggs, who was appointed in 1821 to the "Lappahee" circuit, crossed over into Florida that year. The Mississippi Conference assigned Alexander Talley as a missionary to Pensacola, Mobile, Blakley, and the adjoining country in December 1821. In February 1822, the South Carolina Conference appointed Elijah Sinclair to St. Marys and Amelia Island.

John Slade, who has been called the "Father of Florida Methodism," was appointed as a Junior preacher with John Triggs to the Chattahoochee Mission in 1823. He located in 1830, but stayed active in Thomas County, Ga. working as a local Preacher. He was 55 when he was readmitted to the Florida Conference at its organizing session. The other men were in their 20's and 30's and since Slade was so much older than they were and had been in the beginning work, he was reverently called "Father Slade."

Methodism was taking root in the State of Florida in 1821 and 1822; by 1825 the work was so successful that a District called "Tallahassee"—named after the newly established capital of the Florida Territory—was created in the South Carolina Conference.

In 1830 the South Carolina Conference was divided, and the work in Florida became a part of the newly founded Georgia Conference. In 1844, at perhaps the most memorable General Conference since the Methodist Church was organized in 1784, the Florida Conference of the Methodist Church was created. The first Conference session was held in Tallahassee on February 6, 1845. This new Conference became a part of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the first General Conference after the Civil War, in 1866, it was decided to establish the South Georgia Conference, and all the work in Georgia was given up and the present boundaries of the Florida Conference were fixed.

The Methodist Episcopal Church started a Conference in Florida in 1873. This Conference because of racial differences was divided in 1886 into the Florida Conference and the St. Johns River Conference. The first Conference session of the St. Johns River Conference met in Jacksonville on January 25, 1886.

The Methodist Protestant Church organized a Florida Conference in 1889, but the work of this organization did not develop extensively.

In 1939, with unification, these different bodies were drawn together to establish the Florida Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

Since 1939, Florida has known fabulous growth. The Florida Annual Conference in 1939 was 51st in size according to its membership, in 1964 it was fifth, and in 1968 it had grown to 3rd place according to membership with other conferences.

In the thirty year period from 1939 to 1969, the number of preaching appointments had grown from 269 to 635. The number of full connection members of the Conference has increased from 291 to 725.

The unification of the former E.U.B. Conference and the former C.J. Florida Conference had taken place at the end of this period.

The first E.U.B. Church was organized in Tampa in 1895 by the Rev. I. W. Bearss, who had moved to Florida a year earlier from Missouri. This church and the other early work was placed under the care of the Tennessee Conference. In 1900 a Georgia Conference was organized, of which Florida was a part. In 1913 the name was changed to the Georgia Florida Conference.

In 1941 the churches in the Florida Conference were organized into a Conference under the supervision of the Home Mission and Church Erection Society. The work never became large, but as E.U.B. people came to Florida in the 50's and 60's, it was expanded until at the time of unification on September 5, 1968 (the first E.U.B. Conference to unite with a Methodist Conference) there were twenty-eight elders as members of the Conference with seventeen under appointment. It had twelve charges, a total property value of \$1,701.537.00 and a membership of 3,543.

The Florida Conference (former C.J.) dates back to 1873; until 1886 it was a both negro and white Conference. When the St. John's River Conference came into being the Florida Conference of the M.E. Church continued to be a Conference for the Negro people. In 1921, because of the distance and expense of travel, the work was divided into two Conferences.

In 1952 these two Conferences were united. In 1969 there were 81 churches served by 52 pastors in full connection. The total member-

ship at the 1968 session was 8,352.

At the 1968 Florida Annual Conference (S.E.J.) session, it was voted to merge the two Florida Conferences in 1969. On September 21, 1968 at a special session of the Florida Conference (former C.J.) it was also voted to merge; and thus the first item of business in 1969 was this merger.

PART IX

STANDING RULES OF THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

I. ORGANIZATION OF THE CONFERENCE

1. The following rules of procedure shall be observed to expedite the business of the Conference:

a. All reports and resolutions shall be typed for submission to the Annual

Conference, and shall be submitted to the Secretary in duplicate.

b. No report or resolution shall be acted upon until it has been before the Conference 24 hours, and a copy has been furnished the Conference Secretary, except a resolution extending a vote of thanks. Publication of a report in the Conference Report Book shall be deemed to have fulfilled this requirement.

c. Any resolution not coming from an established board, commission, or committee, shall be referred to the Committee on Reference before dis-

cussion on the floor of the Conference.

d. Any report or resolution presented by a regular Committee or Board of the Conference, in accordance with the provisions above, shall be properly before the body of the Conference, when it is presented without a motion or a second.

e. A member of the Conference who wishes to be recognized by the Chairman for a question, point of order, or discussion of a motion, shall address the Chairman and wait for recognition. When he is recognized by the Chairman, he will give his name, whether he is a lay or clerical member; and, if a lay member, he will give the name of his local Church.

f. Debate and discussion of motions will be limited to three minutes per speech, and the speeches will alternate between those for and those against. g. A member of the Conference will be permitted to speak only one time in behalf of, or in opposition to, any motion before the Conference with the following exception: if no one wishes to speak opposite to the preceding speech, a member who has spoken on the motion may speak one more time. It is understood that this rule shall not be construed to debar the maker of a motion from concluding the debate.

h. A motion to call for the previous question may be made at any time. if no one desires to speak. However, as long as there are those desiring to speak, a motion for the call of the previous question may not be made until there have been two speeches for and two speeches against the pending

motion.

- 2. The Secretary shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference, assuming office on January 1 of the ensuing year, and shall be eligible to serve no more than two consecutive quadrennia. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.
 - a. The Secretary shall have such assistants as he may desire, elected by the Conference on his nomination.

b. The Secretary shall edit and publish the Conference Minutes.

c. He shall be the custodian of the books and archives of the Conference and shall annually report where they are kept. He shall cooperate with the Committee on Archives and History in the discharge of this responsibility and shall be an ex officio member of that Committee.
d. The Secretary shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Pensions,

and of the Service Years Committee of that Board.

e. A committee on Journal shall be elected at the beginning of each annual session upon nomination of the Secretary, and shall consist of three members of the conference session. Such committee shall examine the daily journal, make any needed corrections, and report back to the next meeting, and the adoption of their report shall be the approval of the minutes.

- 3. The Conference Statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference, assuming office on January 1 of the ensuing year, and shall be eligible to serve no more than two consecutive quadrennia. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.
 - a. The Conference Statistician shall collect the statistics of the Conference, and shall edit the Statistical Tables in the annual Journal.
 - b. He shall employ such help as is necessary to do the work accurately and expeditiously, any expense to be paid by the Secretary out of the apportionment for "Minutes and Statistics."
 - c. The cabinet shall determine the date each year after which the Statistician shall accept no reports.
 - d. Fractions shall not be used in making statistical reports.
 - e. The Statistician shall see that every report made by a charge or a church agrees with the record of the Conference Treasurer.
- 4. The Conference Treasurer shall be elected by the Annual Conference and supervised by the Conference Commission on World Service as provided in the Discipline.
 - a. The Conference Treasurer shall make monthly distributions to the treasurers of the several Annual Conference boards and causes for all Conference work and to the treasurers of the several General Conference Boards and causes for all general work according to the percentage of the apportionments for general and conference work adopted by the Annual Conference. All amounts paid in on all causes beyond the apportioned amounts, other than the percentage for General World Service, shall be placed in the various Conference Reserve Funds at the end of each fiscal year, as stipulated by the Commission on World Service and Finance.
 - b. The treasurer shall procure from the Conference Statistician or from the district superintendents a report of the apportionments accepted by the several charges within the Conference and shall settle with those charges by that report. He shall have no power to waive or change this rule.
 - c. He shall regularly furnish each district superintendent a statement of the amounts of monies received by him for all causes from each pastoral charge within that district; each such statement to include all monies received from the closing of the Annual Conference to the date issued.
 - d. All special day funds shall be remitted through the Conference Treasurer.
 - e. The Conference Treasurer shall close his books for the year on the date approved by the World Service Commission and the Cabinet.
 - f. The Conference fiscal year shall be the calendar year.

II. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. The District Superintendents are a standing committee to nominate the officers, boards and committees of the Conference and to nominate persons to fill vacancies thereon, except as otherwise provided by the Discipline, or by these rules.
- 2. An appointment to the District Superintendency shall vacate membership in any Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee of the Conference, except Trustees, unless the General or Annual Conference provides otherwise.
- 3. Each District Superintendent shall, at the earliest possible date, file with the Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, with the Conference Treasurer, and with the Statistical Secretary an accurate statement of the amounts of apportionments accepted by the various Charge Conferences within his district.

III. BOARDS, STANDING COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

1. Each Board, Commission, or Committee of the Conference shall give advance notice of its regular meeting place and time, through the Conference publications, and shall receive any person(s) who may desire to discuss and/or offer program suggestions related to the work of such Board, Commission or Committee.

2. Each board or committee of the Conference shall cause to be printed in the Conference Journal an exact statement of the salaries and expenses paid on account of any person employed by the said board or committee.

- 3. Each board, committee or institution of the Conference shall make an exact annual report to the Conference of monies it has received and what disposition has been made of them, and each shall file annually with the Bishop and Cabinet and the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance a complete statement of its financial condition, showing all assets and liabilities.
- 4. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall contract with the Conference Treasurer, subject to the Conference, for his service and the manner in which he shall manage the funds of the Conference; shall take from him an indemnity bond in such amount as shall cover whatever amount may be deposited in the bank, and shall annually have his books and accounts audited by a certified public accountant, and print the report of the same.

5. Unless otherwise ordered by the Conference, the Commission on World Service and Finance shall distribute the apportionments to the districts on

a basis agreed upon with the cabinet.

6. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine annually what amount shall be necessary to print and publish the Minutes and shall assess the same upon the Conference along with the other apportionments.

7. The Conference Trustees shall have the responsibility for the administra-

tion of the Conference Center.

- 8. When a Board, Commission, Agency, or individual member recommends to the Conference that a Committee be appointed, or that a task be performed by an existing Board, Commission, Agency, or individual that they either have the financial cost of such project covered in an existing budget asking, or present to the Conference the estimated cost, before final action is taken.
- 9. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall designate the depository or depositories for Conference funds.
- 10. No Board or Agency of the Conference shall be allowed to obligate itself beyond its anticipated annual income, except by ¾ vote of both the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the Cabinet; provided this restriction does not apply to Florida Southern College and the Florida Methodist Children's Home.

11. No person shall be a member of any Conference commission, board, committee or trustee, if in his private business he has conflict of interest with the purposes or business of such commission, board, committee or

trustee, or does or proposes to do business with the same.

- 12. Membership on a Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years for both clerical and lay members. Membership on Boards of Trustees of Conference institutions shall be limited to nine (9) consecutive years for clerical members. Members rotating off any board, commission or committee under these provisions shall become eligible for re-election to such Board after a period of two (2) years. Membership shall not be held in more than one of the quadrennial boards, commissions or committees, provided, however, that this rule does not apply to trustees, to members of the Conference Committee of investigation, or ex-officio members, or to others established by the Discipline or the Standing Rules of the Conference. Beginning in 1970 no man shall serve longer than four years as chairman of the same quadrennial board, commission or committee.
- 13. Offices in the Annual Conference and membership on the Boards, Committees or Commissions shall be held only by effective clerical members

of the Conference, and by laymen who have not reached their 72nd birthday, except ex-officio members. It is recommended that these provisions also apply to the election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

14. District Lay Leaders and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendent and the Conference Lay Leader where no District Board of the Laity is constituted.

15. It shall be the duty of every board or commission holding property to provide the district superintendent with a complete list of its holdings within the district. The list shall include the title under which the property is held, a description of the land, and whether or not the property is exempt from taxes. The secretary of the Board or Commission shall report any changes in the list promptly.

16. The Charter and By Laws of each incorporated Conference Board or Institution shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, who shall print each year in the Conference Journal a notation of where said charter may be found in prior Journals. The Conference Secretary shall be notified immedi-

ately of any proposed changes in said charter or by-laws.

17. Members of General Boards or Commissions who are members of the Florida Conference or are members of any Church in the Florida Conference shall be Ex-Officio members of the corresponding Board or Commission in the Florida Conference.

IV. THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE

1. Lay membership in the District Conference when existent, shall consist of those lay members from each pastoral charge named in the Discipline.

2. In addition to the above, the Charge Conference shall have the privilege of electing two additional delegates and two reserve delegates.

V. BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

1. The Board of the Ministry shall present to the Conference to be filed among its papers a complete biographical sketch of all persons admitted into full connection and of all persons received by transfer; and of the latter, a sketch of the ministry up to date when received by transfer.

2. The Board of the Ministry shall require each applicant, including those being admitted from other churches, to present a certificate of good health from a practicing physician and an itemized statement of his financial obliga-

tions

3. Any graduate of a seminary not approved by the University Senate desiring to enter the Florida Conference on trial under the Seminary Rule, must have completed one additional full academic year of study in a Seminary approved by the University Senate.

4. All candidates for Probationary Membership, Associate Membership, and Full Connection status shall appear in person before the Board for inter-

viewing.

5. All Candidates for Full Connection shall serve for a minimum of twenty-one months in the Florida Annual Conference under the supervision of a District Superintendent, except that faculty or staff in United Methodist Colleges, Universities, or Seminaries may be permitted to render this service outside the bounds of the Florida Annual Conference.

6. All candidates for Full Connection who have contingenies will meet with the Board of the Ministry annually in the spring meeting after aca-

demics until the contingency is satisfied.

7. Candidates from other denominations shall remain On Probation not less than two years.

8. Beginning June 1964 candidates under thirty years of age are required to complete the B.D., or an equivalent degree, before admission into Full Connection.

- 9. Candidates for Admission on Probation from other conferences shall also be recommended by a District Committee on Ministry of the Florida Conference.
- 10. Candidates for Admission On Probation shall have satisfactorily completed the Psychological Guidance Program of the Conference; candidates transferred in On Probation shall comply with the Standing Rules of the Florida Conference for candidates for Admission On Probation, including the Psychological Guidance Program.

11. Candidates for readmission from location, except those being readmitted for the purpose of retirement or transfer, shall have completed satisfactorily, immediately prior to being readmitted, the Psychological Guidance Program of the Conference.

a. The District Committee on the Ministry shall include in its examination for License to Preach, vocational and aptitude tests as authorized by the Discipline, Paragraph 310.5: "A Candidate will make himself available for any psychological and aptitude tests required and provided by the District Committee on the Ministry."

b. All Candidates for Probationary membership from other areas are to comply with this requirement of vocational and aptitude tests prior to appearing before a District Committee on the Ministry.

12. Candidates for License to Preach under the Course of Study shall do so under supervision of the Department of Ministerial Education, P. O. Box 871, Nashville, Tennessee 37202. All recommendations for License to Preach shall be valid for one year only from date of initial recommendation.

13. All ministerial candidates for conference membership or full-time Lay Pastors, who are beyond the Introductory Studies, shall attend a Summer School for Courses of Study; and that work by correspondence shall be permitted only "in a case of emergency or unusual circumstance" in which the District Superintendent has certified in writing to the nature of the health problem or the financial hardship and his recommendation has been approved by the Board in each case.

14. Target Dates listed herein are requisite to the Board's fulfilling its responsibilities to the candidates and to the Conference. Requested adjustments may be made in exceptional cases if they fall under the Board's juris-

VI. CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

- 1. The Annual Conference shall meet upon invitation at such places as may be selected by the conference, or by the Bishop and Cabinet, if so directed by the Conference.
- 2. Entertainment for pastors with minimum income, retired preachers, Lay Pastors, and men applying for Probationary Membership shall be provided or supplemented as may from time to time be determined by the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Cabinet, and the host Church or Institution.
- 3. All other preachers and lay delegates shall provide for their own entertainment, but it is recommended to all churches, where possible, that they make provision for such expenses, at least in part.

VII. FINANCIAL APPEALS

1. No financial appeal or fund-raising effort whatsoever shall be made beyond the local charge unless first authorized by action of the Annual Conference, or if in a District, by the District Conference.

2. Authorization of the Conference shall be secured by presenting, prior to the Annual Conference session, the purpose and plan of the appeal to the Board involved, to the Commission on World Service and Finance, and to the Cabinet.

3. Upon authorization of the Annual Conference, the Cabinet shall assign

the appeal to a place on the calendar of the Conference.

4. Emergency appeals between sessions of the Conference may be authorized in clearly unusual circumstances of great emergency, only after the combined approval of the Bishop and Cabinet, the Boards involved, and the Commission on World Service and Finance.

VIII. YEARS OF SERVICE FOR ANNUITY CREDIT

A. Ministers on Special Appointment

Special Appointments shall be made in the following classifications:
 I. With Annuity claim:

a. Upon this Annual Conference:

- As full-time employees of the Conference, the Conference assuming annuity responsibility:
- As an employee of a Conference approved agency or institution, the individual or institution assuming annuity responsibility;
- b. Upon a General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of The Methodist Church.

II. Without Annuity Claim Upon this Annual Conference.

2) The Conference Treasurer shall keep a record of each special appointee, showing the amount paid by this member or his institution to the Conference Board of Pensions. The individual or institution shall complete payment to the Conference Treasurer by April 15 each year, and the Conference Treasurer shall make a report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions by April 25 each year.

3) The Conference Board of Pensions shall review annually the status of each special appointee and a record of the amount remitted for annuity responsibility during each year shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Annual Conference for publication in the Conference Journal and such information shall be forwarded to the General Board of

Pensions.

4) Beginning with the Conference year 1967-68, all members of the Conference under special appointment in Section I a 2) shall be required to pay, or the institution they represent required to pay, an amount to be fixed annually by the Annual Conference for annuity responsibility.

5) Beginning with the Conference year 1968-69, conference annuity responsibility shall be assumed for all members of the Annual Conference in special appointments in Section I a 1), except those on sabbatical leave. The Commission on World Service shall be requested to provide from the Conference budget the apportionment for ministerial members of the Conference staff.

6) The primary appointment controls liability for annuity payments, with part-time employment disregarded in assuming annuity responsibility.

B. Ministers as Approved Supply Pastors or Lay Pastors

1. In determining eligibility for annuity credit for years of service as an approved supply pastor prior to 1952, applicant must prove full-time service in accordance with disciplinary requirements.

2. No approved supply credit shall be given for years in which the applicant is appointed as a student supply, while preparing for admission on

3. To be eligible for annuity credit as an approved supply, one must be

receiving minimum salary support or the equivalent.

4. A Conference committee on service years shall investigate all cases in which the Cabinet, Conference Secretary, Board of Pension, or other authority questions the eligibility of the applicant for claimed years of service. Said committee shall be composed of one member of the Cabinet appointed by the District Superintendents, one member of the Board of Pensions appointed by said board, and the Conference Secretary. All applicants shall have the right of appeal to the floor of the Annual Conference from the decision of said committee, but lacking such appeal, the decision of the committee is considered final.

5. Nothing in this article shall be construed to interfere in any way with the full supervision over the granting of pension claims by the Board of Pensions when a man has entered the retired relationship. Nor shall this article prevent the Cabinet in clearly unusual cases granting a year of

annuity credit under the proper disciplinary question.

6. It shall be the business of each approved supply pastor to ascertain that the Secretary's record of his annuity years is properly carried in the Conference Journal, and that he has been given annuity credit year by year under the proper disciplinary question. After June, 1962, an approved supply minister eligible for annuity credit for a year of service, whose name has not been included in answer to the Disciplinary question, shall be responsible for bringing this matter to the attention of the Conference Secretary, and shall secure a statement from the District Superintendent under whom he served, or his successor, that he is entitled to such year. Failure to do so by the next session of the Annual Conference shall negate any future claim for this year.

IX. CONFERENCE COUNCIL

1. The Conference Program Council shall be conducted according to the provisions made in paragraph 841 in the 1968 Discipline.

2. The Conference Council shall be composed of the following:

The resident Bishop

The District Superintendents

The Chairman and one other representative elected by each of the following boards or agencies: Education, Missions, Evangelism, Social Concerns

The Chairman of each of the following boards or agencies: Health and Human Welfare, Ministry, Pensions, Preacher's Relief, Christian Enlistment, Ecumenical Affairs, Church and Community Work in Town and Country, Public Relations and United Methodist Information, Historical Society, Commission on Stewardship and Finance, Worship, Lay Workers, and Commission on Higher Education

Chairman of the following Conference Institutions: Florida Conference Trustees, Florida Southern College, Florida Methodist Children's Home, Florida Methodist Foundation and a Black Trustee of Bethune-Cookman

College

The Conference Secretary

Two representatives of the Conference Youth Organization

Two representatives of the Women's Society of Christian Service, one of whom shall be the President

Conference Lay Leader

One layman from each district nominated by the District Superintendent, elected by the Annual Conference, who will be eligible to serve a maximum of four consecutive years

The members of each of the Conference Council organizations: Interpretation, Publishing Interests, Trafco, Planning and Research, Coordination, Children's Department, Adult Department, and Family Life Department Members-at-Large, not to exceed three, may be appointed by the Cabinet annually

Each Board or Agency may elect a reserve representative to attend when the regular representative is unable to do so

The following shall be members of the Council without vote: Salaried and volunteer conference staff, the conference treasurer, and two members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, one of whom shall be the chairman.

3. The Conference Council shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer quadrennially. The Council shall meet on the call of the chairman two times a year. The Council shall have an Executive Committee on which the officers of the Council, the Bishop, one District Superintendent, chosen by the Cabinet, the Program Director, the Chairmen of the Conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, and Missions, the Conference Lay Leader, and the Conference President of the Women's Society of Christian Service, President of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, Chairman of the Commission on Stewardship and Finance of the Board of the Laity and four members-atlarge, elected by the Council will serve. Approximately one-half of the members of the Executive Committee shall be laymen. The Chairman of Conference World Service and Finance Commission, the Chairman of the following Conference Council Committees—Camp Advisory, Planning and Research, Staff and Personnel, and Coordination, shall serve without vote.

X. AMENDMENTS AND SUSPENSIONS

1. A Committee on Standing Rules shall be nominated annually by the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Conference.

2. Proposed amendments or changes to the Standing Rules shall be referred to the Committee on Standing Rules for consideration and presentation to the Conference for action.

3. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a majority (counted) of the members present and voting.

4. A two-thirds vote of the members present and voting is necessary to amend or change the Standing Rules.

5. All resolutions requiring the action of the Annual Conference must be received not later than 30 days prior to the opening day of Annual Conference.
