Field Description: Orchid with pear-shaped, somewhat flattened stem (pseudobulb) attached to tree trunks and branches by numerous white aerial roots. Leaves to 12 inches long, strap-like. Flowering stem to 16 inches long, with up to 10 flowers. Flower with drooping, narrow, twisted, yellow-green sepals to 1.4 inches long, 2 petals similar to sepals, and an erect, purplebrown, shell-like **lip** marked with yellow. **Fruit** with 3 wings.

Similar Species: No other species resembles clamshell orchid, with its purple, erect lip and flattened pseudobulb.

Habitat: Trunks and branches of pond apple, cypress, live oak, and buttonwood trees in swamps and hammocks.

Best Survey Season: Flowers fall through spring.

Range-wide Distribution: FL, West Indies, Mexico, Central and South America.

Conservation Status: This orchid has been decimated by plant poachers and by destruction of habitat. A few populations are known from inaccessible areas of several parks and preserves.

Protection & Management: Enforce plant protection laws and prosecute plant poachers. Protect wetlands from logging and draining.
