## DARLING PLUM

Reynosia septentrionalis Urban

Field Description: A large shrub to small tree with reddish bark usually growing 10 to 15 feet high. Leaves are 1 to 1½ inches long, leathery, with entire margins rolled inward and a distinctive emarginate tip. Flowers are small with 5 pointed, yellowish-green sepals, and are borne in small clusters. Fruits are black drupes.

Similar Species: None

Related Rare Species: None.

Habitat: Hammocks and mangrove margins.

Best Survey Season: Spring-summer.

Range-wide Distribution: South Florida and the West Indies.

**Conservation Status:** Restricted to the Florida Keys, but ranging through the West Indies, Cuba and Bahamas. Found in common dry habitats although global abundance not known.

**Protection and Management:** Protect remaining hammocks and mangrove margins in the Keys. Control exotic pest plants.
