Following graduation from Stevens Institute of Technology in 1950, Bob served in the U. S. Army until the close of 1952. He joined Grumman in 1953, where he stayed for the next 40 years.

Bob served in Manufacturing Engineering until 1961, when he transitioned to administration as Assistant Personnel Director. He was promoted to Personnel Director in 1963, Deputy Director of Administration in 1965, Director of Administration the following year, and in 1970, Director of Corporate Services for Grumman Aerospace Corporation.

ROBERT E. WATKINS March 10, 2019

Robert (Bob) Watkins began his is career with Grumman in 1954, after he was discharged from the aviation branch of the United States Navy. He spent 12 years in the Field Service Department, prior to being named Chief of Support for the Grumman Lunar Module Program in 1965, which led to a nine-year assignment at the Kennedy Space Center. The following year, he joined the staff of George Skurla, Director of Grumman Operations at the Kennedy Space Center.

Bob was named Vice President and General Manager of the Grumman Corporation, Stuart Operations, in 1984. He had been with Grumman for 38 years, 17 of which were spent as executive assistant to George M. Skurla, during George's term as Chairman of the Board and President of the Grumman Aerospace Corporation.

In 1973, Bob was transferred to Grumman Corporation, the parent company, as Assistant Secretary and Director of Personnel. In 1973, the Board of Directors of Grumman Corporation elected him Secretary, effective 1974. He also served as Secretary of Grumman Data Systems, Paumanock Insurance Company, and CallData Systems, Inc.

In 1983, he was elected a vice president of Grumman Corporation. He retired in December 1992 as Vice President, Human Resources & Administration, and Corporate Secretary.

Bob was active in many professional organizations: American Society of Tool and Manufacturing Engineers, the Human Resources Council of the Aerospace Industries Association, the Personnel Roundtable, and the American Society of Corporate Secretaries.

Throughout his career at Grumman and within his professional organizations, Bob was a consistent contributor. He was the epitome of a gentleman, he was pleasant, cordial to all, compassionate, and always fair in his dealings with others. He was the perfect fit for the positions he held. The Bradshaw family asked that Bob be remembered by acts of charity: when there is a need . . . look, help, give.

Bob was also active in the community. He served as Vice President of Planning and Manpower for the Suffolk County Council of Boy Scouts and he served as a trustee of Dowling College. He was a Vice President and a member of the Executive Committee of the Martin County (Florida) YMCA; a charter member of the Economic Council of Martin County; and a board member of WXEL, Public Broadcasting, West Palm Beach, Florida.

He was intent on working with the Committee for the Apollo 11 50th Anniversary and enjoyed the planning. Sadly, he will not be with everyone that weekend except in spirit. He was a huge fan of the Grumman Corporation, Grumman employees and products, and proud of the company's accomplishments. He always wanted what was best for Grumman.

As intelligent as Eddie was, so he was humble and principled. He could stand up to any executive who was way out of line but he did it with class – and he always right. He would make the same effort to help everyone, at all levels on the corporate totem pole. To Eddie all were equal. To work with Eddie on anything was to truly enjoy the work. Life was to be enjoyed; he made life around him a joy.

To the end of his career, his talents were known and used by people from coast to coast throughout the Northrop Grumman Corporation. He retired from the company and was brought back as a consultant to delve through the contents of the Grumman History Center and to prepare them for preservation. With his 52 years of knowledge of the company, and the fact that much of what Eddie had produced is in the History Center, who could have been better than Eddie for the task? All who knew Eddie are already missing him terribly.

Tim started his discussion very uniquely: By offering a simple prayer for all the Grumman retirees who literally made LI what it is today. Very nice touch. Tim's addressed the biggest threats facing a senior's assets and what can be done to protect them, namely:

1. Set up a comprehensive Financial Plan, including identifying all assets and all debts, and compute net worth.

2. Choose experienced, knowledgeable, unbiased, and unemotional executors – not necessarily children or family.

3. Have a current Will, a Living Will, a Power of Attorney, etc.

4. Choose the correct financial advisor who works for *you*, not for a bank or financial institution.

5. Diversify investment choices after establishing near-term and long-term financial goals.

6. Update all asset titling and beneficiary selections (deceased beneficiaries will complicate estate settlements).

7. Establish a tax ID number and set up accounts for ease of estate settlement.

8. Be aware of scams by executor and/or caretaker. Watch out for Internet, mail and email scams.

9. Shred all financial paperwork when disposing.

Tim held a brief Q&A and provided informative answers. All retirees were offered a free one-hour consultation with Tim's company. Betty gave Tim and Michael a Thank You gift for their kindness.

To illustrate the scam threat, Betty read from a recent Newsday article that talked about a new scam operation. This starts with a phone call with a fake Police Caller ID. The caller then demands money or outstanding warrants for arrest will be processed against the person. To create awareness of this scam, public forums are being held across LI. Both County Executives have announced that Police will never call your home or business and ask for money. Always be aware that somebody wants your money **Business:** Betty introduced Club VP Cathy Ferro. Cathy reported that the Club has acquired 25 new members (across all chapters) since the beginning of the year. Club member Chuck Gosline has posted an invitation to join the club on a Facebook page.
