

Eucalyptus globoidea

(White Stringybark)

Description

An evergreen, long trunked medium sized tree, with fibrous stringy bark.

Flower and Foliage

Creamy white flowers from January to June. Dark green glossy foliage.

Occurs

Throughout the Kurrajong, Bilpin and Sydney area. Prefers moist sandstone valley slopes, hillsides and plateaus. On sandy loams and shale capped sandstone soils.

Maintenance

Prune to remove dead wood. Prune to a single leader or allow multiple trunks that are well spaced for future growth.

Uses

Known for its versatile timber use for poles, posts and framing construction. Used for honey production, shade for stock & revegetation purposes. Attracts nectar feeding fauna such as birds, bats & small possums. Supplementary food plant for koalas.
