Preamble

In 1970, The Heather Society (founded in 1963) was charged by the International Commission for the Nomenclature of Cultivated Plants to undertake the role of International Cultivar Registration Authority (ICRA) for a denomination class comprising five genera within Ericaceae, namely *Andromeda*, *Bruckenthalia*, *Calluna*, *Daboecia* and *Erica*. These plants are generally called "heathers" or "heaths" in English-speaking regions. The special denomination class was dismantled in 2004 (see *Heathers (Yearbook of The Heather Society)* 1: 65 (2004); the genera *Andromeda*, *Calluna*, *Daboecia* and *Erica* now comprise four separate denomination classes. The role of an ICRA is defined by the *International code of nomenclature for cultivated plants (ICNCP)*, the current edition being that published in 2004.

The first volume of the *International register of heather names* was published in four parts in 2000. It contained all cultivar names and all botanical names that had then been traced within the genera *Andromeda*, *Bruckenthalia* (recently subsumed into *Erica*), *Calluna* and *Daboecia*. All the known names of species and subspecific taxa of *Erica* species indigenous in Europe, Asia Minor, the Atlantic islands (Azores, Madeira and the Canary Islands) and Africa north of the Tropic of Cancer, and of their hybrids and cultivars – the so-called hardy heaths and heathers – were also included.

Scope of volume 2 of the *International register of heather names*

This volume, to be published in four parts during 2004, contains the names employed for *Erica* species and subspecific taxa that are indigenous in Africa (south of the Tropic of Cancer) and adjacent islands of the southern Atlantic and Indian Oceans. The majority of species occur in the Western Cape Province, South Africa, and these have long been referred to as the "Cape heaths", or "Cape Encas". This volume also includes the names of natural and artificial hybrids, "varieties" and cultivars of the Cape heaths.

It should be noted that the mega-genus *Erica* has been refined and now includes all the related "minor" genera of Ericaceae; a list of these genera is included here as Annex 1. Their names, being synonyms of *Erica* taxa, are also in this register.

Origins of the *International register of heather names*

The two volumes had their origins in the work of the late D. C. McClintock (Registrar 1970–1994) whose card indexes of cultivar names, compiled over many decades, provided an invaluable, initial source of information. The Heather Society also acknowledges the contributions, especially regarding hardy heather cultivars, of T. A. Julian, A. W. Jones (Registrar, 1994–1998) and Mrs J. Julian (Registrar 1999–2001), as well as those other individuals named in volume 1.

Compilation of this second volume was initiated by the late A. W. Jones during his term as International Cultivar Registrar. However the majority of the work on it was not started until 2001, after the publication of the first volume. As with volume 1, this register is derived directly from a computerised database that was devised and is managed by D. J. Small. The entries in the database were checked and edited by Dr E. C. Nelson. Mrs Anne Small (Administrator of The Heather Society) provided invaluable assistance at all stages of the editing and production of this checklist.

For research facilities and access to publications in the United Kingdom and Ireland we acknowledge the help of the Linnean Society of London, Lindley Library (Royal Horticultural Society), The Botany Library (The Natural History Museum, London), Society of Antiquaries of London, NIAB (Cambridge), Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, and the National Botanic Gardens, Glasnevin, Dublin.

Arrangement

This volume of the International register of heather names, like the first volume, is intended for use primarily by horticulturists and gardeners. It was generated from a computerised database, and thus the names are arranged in strict alphabetic sequence. When the same name was used on more than one occasion, all known uses of the name are listed, their order being determined by the alphabetic sequence of, first, the genus and then the species to which they belong. When the same name has been used by more than one author, the names are arranged in order of date (year) of publication, the earliest published coming first. When the same name has been used at different ranks within the same species, their order is determined by the names of the ranks, as follows – subspecies, variety, forma, cultivar.

Botanical names

Botanical epithets are included in this checklist because, in many instances, especially in the nineteenth centuries, "Cape heath" that would now be regarded as cultivars were described and named as species or primary hybrids or at some infra-specific rank – generally the botanical variety (*varietas*) – or were given trinomials, even polynomials, without any indication of rank. Some were even deemed to be new species. As the vast majority of these are no longer known in cultivation, no attempt has been made to reclassify them as cultivars, nor to amend their Latin names into cultivar names although this is permitted under the *International code of nomenclature for cultivated plants* 2004 (Art. 19.6 and 19.7).

However, botanical names including the names of species and their hybrids, subspecies, varieties and forms, are not governed or regulated by the *International code of nomenclature for cultivated plants*. These names, in Latin form, must be published in accord with the current edition of the *International code of botanical nomenclature (ICBN)*, and while every effort has been made to ensure that any botanical synonymy given in this checklist is correct under the *ICBN*, we would welcome corrections, amendments and additions. Furthermore, because of the large number of botanical names, and the exceedingly complex tasks involved in checking each one, the editors acknowledge that in some cases up-to-date synonymy is lacking, and that the authorities for some names may not be correct, or may not be complete.

Botanical names printed in **bold** are considered valid. In determining validity we have been advised and guided especially by Dr E. G. H. Oliver. For southern African species we have followed the listing by E. G. H. Oliver and I. M. Oliver published in *Strelitzia* 14: 424–451 (2003).

Cultivar names

Cultivar names printed in **bold** accord with the *International code of nomenclature for cultivated plants* (2004) and thus are accepted by The Heather Society acting as International Cultivar Registration Authority.

Cultivar names *not* printed in bold either are of uncertain status or do *not* comply with the articles of the *International code of nomenclature for cultivated plants* (2004), and thus are deemed to be rejected. The reasons for rejecting these names are stated (see below). When an accepted synonym is available for a rejected name, the synonym that should be used will be given in **bold**.

The following name, for example, is accepted.

'African Fanfare' — *Erica* 'African Fanfare'

N Registered on 2 November 2002 by D. J. Small. Registration No. 180

* Flowers in dense cylindrical clusters; 5–8 flowers per shoot; corolla c. 2cm long, tubular, translucent, white at base shading to rich beetroot-purple (H13) at lobes, paler on shaded side; ovary densely hirsute; July–November (in cultivation in northern hemisphere).

◆ Hybrid of uncertain and unknown origin, grown in Europe and Australasia under various names including *E. linnaeoides*, *E. doliformis*, and probably also (see *Botanica*) *E. persoluta*.

*'Dawn' — *Erica 'Dawn'**

- N Rejected because of its prior use for a cultivar of *E. x watsonii*; correct name: none published.
- A plant with magenta flowers is currently (2004) grown under this name in Japan; it was introduced from Coehaven, New Zealand. It is a very poor grower (Satoshi Miwa to ECN, 26 October 2004). The plant's identity needs investigation.

Notes: It is necessary to add that in the 1930s to 1950s an *Erica* named 'Dawn' was in cultivation and the trade in New Zealand and Australia. The earliest published record described it as "A novelty of recent introduction ... New ... It is described by the raiser as being likely to become the finest cutting and decorative variety in cultivation." Subsequently what was evidently the same cultivar was noted as "Another hybrid of mediterranea"** (i.e. from the European species, *E. erigena*) (*Trees and shrubs [Catalogue]*, Duncan & Davies (New Plymouth, New Zealand), 38 (not dated [c. 1930])**; *Catalogue*, Nairn & Sons, Christchurch (New Zealand), 49 (c. 1940); *E.E. Lord, Shrubs and trees for Australian gardens*, 317** (1956, 3rd edn)). This is not the plant now grown in Japan.

*'Daybreak' — *Erica 'Daybreak'**

A series of photographs of these colchicine-induced plants (which proved to have $2n=24$) are in The Heather Society slide library, but the labels on the slides are incomplete and erroneous; the parent clones are not indicated.
