


In addition the current monthly book club meeting, a new book club focused on Historical Fiction will begin meeting in March.






SAVING YOUR CHECK OUT HISTORY

Library staff are frequently asked "How can I see what I've checked out before?"

Once you opt in to save your check out history, you will be able to view titles checked out when you sign in to your account online. Only you can access your checkout history.

With the recent catalog update, accessing checkout history looks a little different. Here's how to opt in to save your history and access it once you do.

- $\mathbf{1}_{\bullet}$ Click on "My Account" from the library home page, www.hendersoncountync.gov/library. Sign in with your library card number and pin. Select "Preferences", then "Search & History".
- 2. Check the box by "Keep History of Checked out Items", then "Save".
- To view your checkout history select "Items Checked Out", then "Check Out History".
- **4.** If you are searching the catalog while signed into your account online, you will see if you have checked an item out previously under the title.





Northstar Digital Literacy Assessments help adults acquire digital skills needed in today's workplace and for use in daily life. These assessments are now available through the library website. The free set of assessments include self-guided modules on essential computer skills, essential software skills, and

using technology in daily life. Closed-captioning is available and screen readers are supported.

To request access, visit the library website, www.hendersoncountync.gov/ library. Find the *Digital Literacy* page under the *Resources* tab. Click on Request Your Learner Account and fill out the form. You will receive an email with access instructions within 3 days. You can also call the Main Library at 828-697-4725 for more information.

Student Access

Since the StudentAccess program began in 2017, all Henderson County Public School teachers and students have been provided with an automatic library account using their school ID number. In 2019 Fernleaf Community Charter School joined the program, and we are happy to now welcome students and teachers from The Mountain Community School.

This partnership provides access to physical books as well as digital resources to allow teachers and students to use multiple copies of the same book for a classroom read, databases for research projects, and access free online tutoring, practice tests, and much more!

In this column we feature new titles at the library from local authors or books with a focus on Appalachia and the Southeast. Place any of these titles on hold through the online catalog or call the library for assistance.

In mountain novels with a nod to familiar tropes, Victoria Gilbert's Blue Ridge Library Mystery series continues with <u>Renewed for Murder</u>. Or try Ashley Blooms' novel about whether to stay or go, <u>Where I Can't Follow</u>. To flip that narrative on its head, when a Chicago family escapes to a North Carolina mountaintop estate, their affairs continue to unravel in Rea Frey's <u>Secrets of Our House</u>. For a thriller that will keep you up at night, check out the debut novel by Stacy Willingham, <u>A Flicker in the Dark</u>, about a copycat killer preying on women in a Louisiana town. For a contemporary campus literary novel based on politics of the day, try <u>Groundskeeping</u> by Kentucky author Lee Cole.

For books that offer new ways of looking back at life, sometimes told in dual time, try a novel about memory, aging, and a touch of island intrigue with <u>The Stars are Not Yet Bells</u>, by Hannah Lillith Assadi. In <u>The Secret Keepers of Old Depot Grocery</u> by Amanda Cox, our protagonist returns home to save the family grocery and learns much more about the stories we tell ourselves to keep going. For a memoir based on reckoning with the past, Greensboro author Julia Ridley Smith has a new book called <u>The Sum of Trifles</u>, about grief and coping with the loss of her parents through the meaning of objects they left behind.

Find out why North Carolina is called the Tar Heel State in *The Saints of Swallow Hill* by Donna Everhart set in a Depression-era lumber camp. In a town where tobacco is king after World War II, a woman finds herself on the wrong side of a dynasty as seamstress to society women in *The Tobacco Wives* by Adele Myers. Formerly enslaved Black Union Soldiers fight in the Civil War in *Black Cloud Rising* by David Wright Faladé, a novel based on the real history of the African Brigade. For another historical novel based on real North Carolinians, Kianna Alexander's *Carolina Built* is about a self-made woman who dared to dream, a Black real estate magnate during Reconstruction. For nonfiction, trace the rise of UNC and Durham in *To Drink from the Well: The Struggle for Racial Equality at the Nation's Oldest Public University* by law professor Geeta N. Kapur.

For short story collections from local authors, try Heather Newton's <u>McMullen</u> <u>Circle</u>, linked stories all based on a fictionalized boarding school during the 1969-70 school year. Another collection, <u>Now You Know It All</u>, by Joanna Pearson features North Carolinians at decision points between their past and future.


As for what I am looking forward to reading, West Virginia novelist Mesha Maren has an acclaimed new novel about border crossings called <u>Perpetual West</u>. For daring and thrills, look for Southern novelist Taylor Brown's feats of aerial acrobatics in the literary historical novel <u>Wingwalkers</u>. In a forthcoming book in the tradition of coming-of-age magical realism stories set in a swamp, look to *The Crocodile Bride* by Ashleigh Bell Pedersen coming from Hub City Press this spring.




