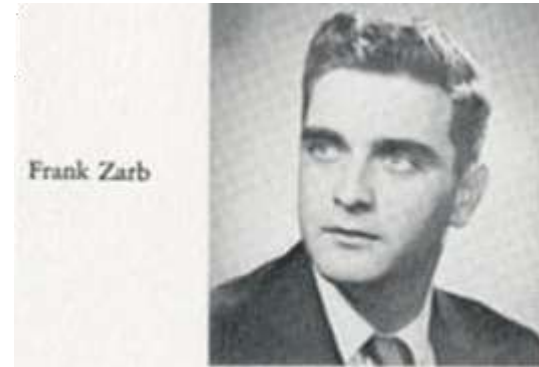



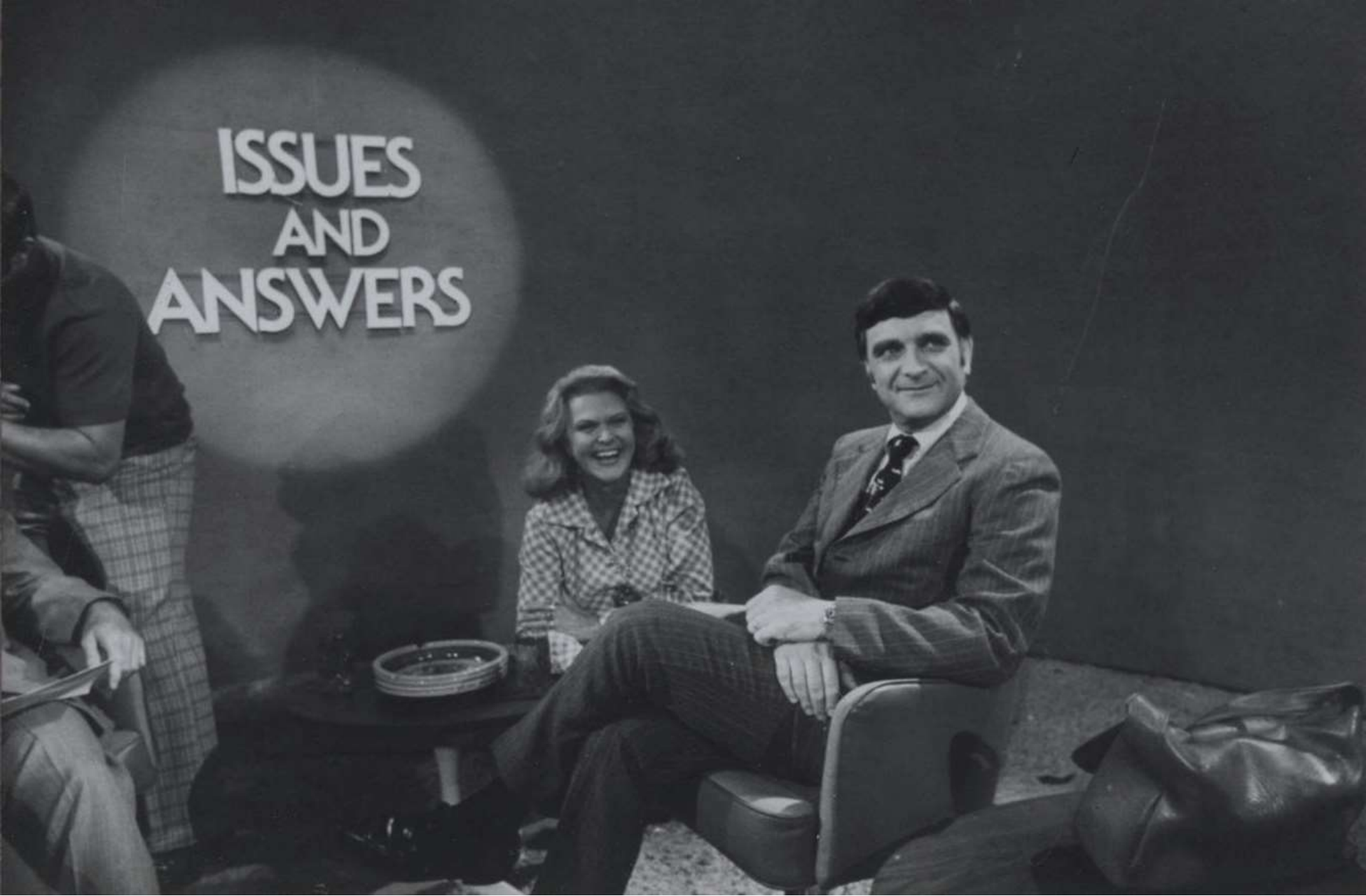

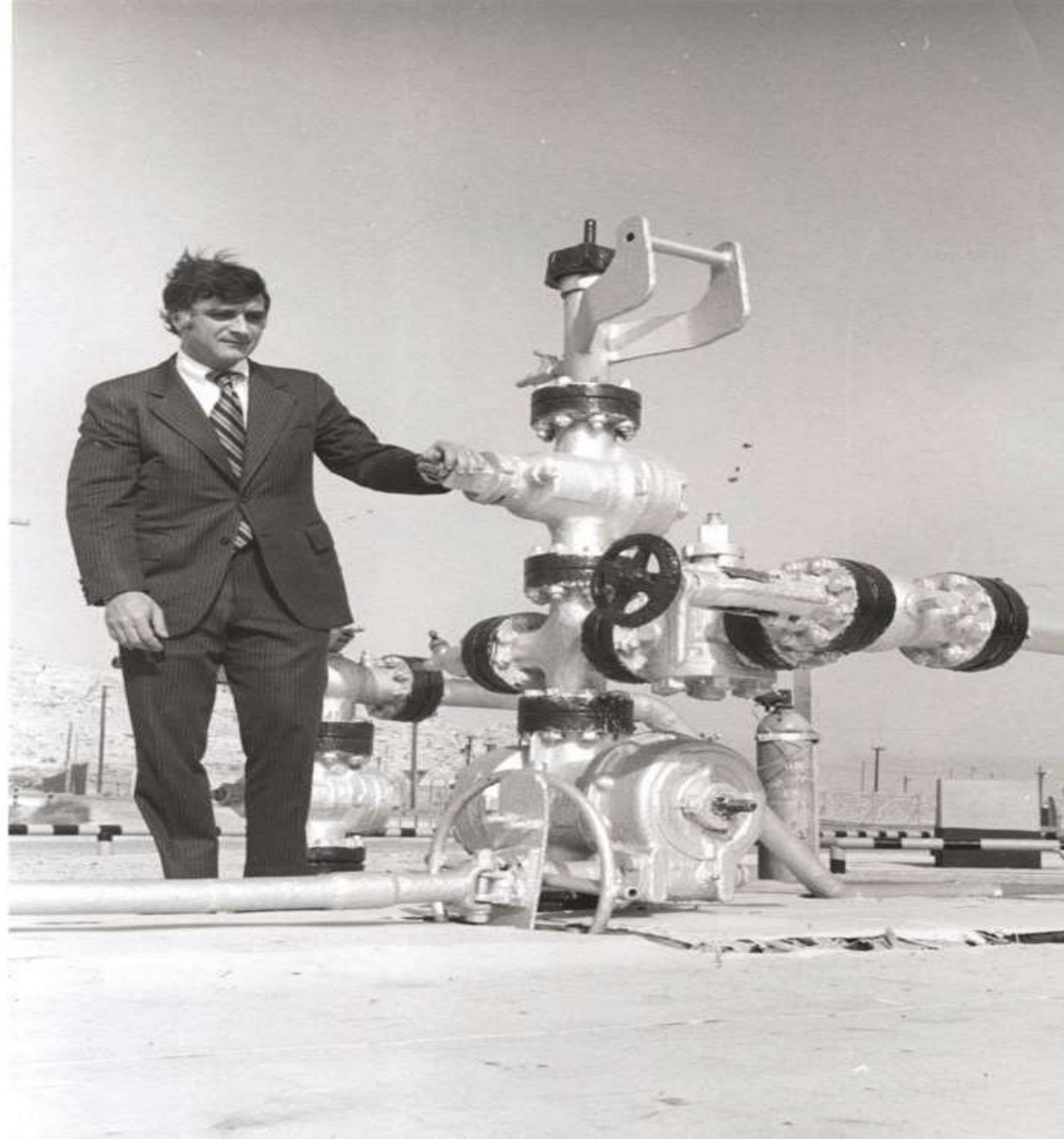

After his White House years, Frank Zarb worked with other presidents as an advisor. In addition to directly serving Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford, he served in an advisory role to Presidents Ronald Reagan, George H. Bush and William Clinton.

He has served as a Director on thirteen public company boards. He served as Chairman of Long Island Power Authority, and Chairman of the Nassau County Interim Finance Authority. In 2003, the Governor of NY named him Chairman of the NYS Commission on education reform and he was also one of the directors of the Lower Manhattan Development Corporation after the September 11th World Trade Center attacks.

In addition, he has served on Hofstra's Board of Trustees since 1978.

Comments by The Honorable John D. Dingell

MR. DINGELL. I'd first like to welcome two very dear and valued friends of long standing here to the room. Mr. Frank Zarb, who has been in this room on many prior occasions for friendly or other kinds of discussions, and I would like to welcome him back. It's a pleasure to see you Mr. Zarb. . .

. . . At the time this committee was dealing with energy in the old days, we had the help and guidance of Mr. Zarb, whose wise counsel we didn't always take. But we did when we considered the nasty problem associated with the failure of Conrail, and the way that enterprise should be sold off. And Mr. Zarb's very wise counsel and assistance pro-bono to this committee meant to the taxpayer a difference of about \$2 1/2 or \$3 billion in terms of net revenue in the way that matter was constructed. I would just observe that his counsel is something which we should listen to with a great deal of respect.

To Frank Zarb a great American + decent man, with the respect admiration + affection of his friend

While serving as an energy advisor, Frank Zarb was able to get both Republicans and Democrats to agree to compromise. In doing so, he and John Dingell became close friends. This bill was passed in 1990 and continued the long struggle to gain energy independence that Zarb began in the 1970's.

Frank became the Chairman and CEO of the National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD), a non-governmental organization that performs financial regulation of member brokerage firms and exchange markets. At this time Mr. Zarb was also head of NASDAQ's stock exchange, the Nasdaq. He resigned from this position in 2001 although he remained a senior adviser to both companies and still held seats on two of Nasdaq's international boards of directors.



Frank G. Zarb is Chairman of Frank Zarb Associates, LLC. He is non-executive Chairman of Promontory Financial Group, LLC and he serves as Senior Advisor to Hellman & Friedman, LLC. He has served as a Director on thirteen public company boards. He continues to teach and advise on financial topics, and to speak on energy policy.
