

Congratulations to all. They will be inducted and receive their awards at the NHPA party on Sunday, July 31 in Statesville, North Carolina during the World Tournament. Each one was contacted by phone except Mr. Jaskulek who is deceased. We are trying to locate the Jaskulek family. I sent the other three an official letter. Their histories will be published in a later issue of the News Digest by Ruth Hangen, Chairman of the NHPA Hall of Fame. Thanks to Ruth and the entire committee for their efforts in selecting the 1983 inductees.

Over the Memorial Day weekend Donnie Roberts went to Springfield, Missouri and I to Las

Vegas. We both were discussing future tournaments.

Donnie attended a business meeting concerning the 1985 World Tournament and he pitched in the Springfield tourney. Glad to see you back pitching, Donnie. This was his second tournament this year and he tells me he will enter more.

Here are the results on that business meeting. Springfield has on open bid for the 1985 World Tournament in the Sun of \$33,000.00 for the cash prizes and two \$2000.00 scholarships for the Junior Girl and Boys Championship Class. Total of \$37,000.00 bid. FANTASTIC!

With bids of this nature and a Las Vegas tournament coming I can see why Roberts has started

pitching again.

NHPA and Horseshoe are going to Las Vegas, Nevada. As published in the May issue Donnie was contacted by a Dick McNeeley earlier. In April, Donnie went to Vegas for a meeting followed by many phone calls.

During my trip I was involved 5 meetings totaling over 12 hours. I met with Vice President, General Manager of Hacienda Hotel and the Promoters. Topics of discussion were the NHPA, Tournament sites, schedule, type of play, incentive prizes, types of courts, safety, hours of play, court lay out, possible exhibition by players, NHPA members names and State on shirts, all tournament entrees must belong to the NHPA, non-NHPA entrees must qualify, TV and news media exposure, additional prize contest in a separate area for amateurs, charges to tournament entrees for the Las Vegas entire package and prize money.

The Tournament will be held indoors at the Hacienda Hotel December 11 thru the 15th, 1983.

We will pitch on the NHPA approved PORT A COURTS.

In Memoriam

The New Jersey Association was saddened by the sudden, unexpected passing of well-liked and extremely well-known Al Ward on Sunday, May 15, 1983 at the age of 62.

Al was a past president and tournament director of the Clifton Inter-City HPC and a member of the New Rochelle HPC and the Brooklyn (New York) International HPC. He was also a former vice-president and tournament director of the New Jersey State HPA and was also chairman of various committees and served for years in those capacities.

In addition, Al also served as Assistant Regional Director for the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association.

He was a member of our State Association for over 33 years, having joined in 1950, and was the principal organizer of the Northwest Jersey and West Essex HPCs and in that capacity, was vastly instrumental in the buildup of horseshoes in those areas. He gave untiringly of his time and seemed to constantly drive himself where horseshoes were concerned.

All had put more hours than anyone in recent memory towards the building of our youth and demonstrated his love in that direction by conducting horseshoe clinics for juniors and also organized novice tournaments in an effort to interest them in the sport he loved with such a passion.

He signed scoreboards and other scoring methods that are still in use today. He was also responsible for publicity and in that role, performed in an outstanding manner.

Al, a U.S. Army veteran of World War II, had just retured as a teacher from the Carlstadt Board of Education where he had worked for the past 13 years, and was a member of American Legion Post 69 of Carlstadt.

To his loving and devoted wife, Marion and family, relatives and many friends, the deep sympathy of the New Jersey State Association and the NHPA is extended in this sad hour of deep bereavement.

WHEN? NO SMOKING ON THE COURTS

Our great sport deserves the respect of ALL players pertaining to refraining from smoking on the courts. To many pitchers in tournament competition, it is quite aggravating.

The first approach is that NHPA Publicity is requesting that all 1983 World Tournament participants to respect our sport by voluntarily refraining from smoking while on the courts.

The second approach will be to ask the 1983 delegates at the convention to give permission to the 1984 Huntsville World Tournament Committee to decide if smoking will be allowed on the World Tournament courts in 1984.

The third approach will be to vote on a By-Laws change to outlaw smoking on the court as of September 1, 1984, in all NHPA sanctioned tournaments.

Your publicity chairman received a letter from Kenneth Nixon of Niagra Falls, N.Y. visitor, and I quote: "What happened in the 1982 World's Championship should never have happened, if, in my opinion, the NHPA had done its homework years ago. The air was heavy with a light breeze, clouds of smoke from Dale Lipovsky smoking kept drifting across in front of Mark Seibold while he was trying to get his alignment. Mark being the gentleman that he is would likely have said that it did not bother him. But I as a witness, am sure that it did and may in fact have determined the outcome of the Championship. This problem has bothered me ever so much since I returned from Huntsville."—end of quote. Another letter in the same vein was also received by your publicity chairman with the same person in mind.

I, as Publicity Director, was very much disappointed when Dale's picture appeared on the front page of the Huntsville Times with a long cigarette in his mouth. To me, it was down-grading our sport. We strive to put on the World Tournament annually to present our sport in its highest form.

Most NHPA members seem to have had it with smoking on the courts. I personally will not rest until smoking is banned from the courts.

"From Out Of The Mail Bag"

Dear Ellis,

Many of us at the World Tournament in Huntsville were amazed at the horseshoe court and scoreboard that George Schummer had on display and also with his many ideas for improving our sport.

I called on George while I was in Florida this past winter. I gave a great deal of thought as to what this man is trying to give to the NHPA and all who would like to be a part of our fine sport. There is no doubt in my mind, he has discovered so many things we could use and I feel that those involved in our game could benefit so much by allowing the system to show what it can do. The whole format provides answers to many of our present controversial problems and it is all easy to understand if we only have the desire to do so. I can only scratch the surface in this letter.

This article consists of several paragraphs, and it is so easy for the average person to read just a few sentences and lay the article aside with the age-old remark, "It's just another gimmick—someone is trying to feather his nest, make a fast buck, etc." Let me make one point very clear at the outset. George Schummer has devoted many years of his life and spent thousands of dollars of his own money in a dedicated all out effort to improve our format for playing horseshoe.

I can assure you that Mr. Schummer has only one thought in mind and that is for the NHPA and the fellow players to have any financial gain or benefits. He wants nothing for himself. He is only asking that the people in the horseshoe world give this system a conscientious, sincere opportunity to prove what it really can do.

Considering the fact that during the past several decades we have tried about everything, but have not totally succeeded in getting our fine sport in the limelight where it so justly deserves to be, I feel we should take a real close look at this system.

The blue clay area is 2 ft. x 2½ ft. (no mis-print). One minute to assemble or dismantle. Any given number of players could bring one end of their court anywhere — indoors or out. I'm sure most cities would assist us in providing bleachers and give us a choice location when they found out what we had to offer. This pwogram, if given a chance, has the potential of attracting many more participatnts, thus improving our chances with the newspapers and T.V. stations. We would also stand a much better chance of getting into the money market for our top players. The family market would be endless for you wherever you live. That is what we need to turn everyone on.

The colorful scoreboard — red, white and blue (8 inches by 4 feet) will give us everything that counts. The amazing new games that can be played with this scoreboard and horseshoe court could turn our whole sport around. Everything in the system is geared to make our sport a team sport as well as an individual one. Boys and girls like to make a team. It has the makings to become a leading participating team sport from the State team level down to the local Junior team. We could offer Family Team tournaments and that would sell the courts and scoreboard for the family back yard. What other sport can do that. Remember the saying, "The family that plays together — stays together." That's what the world needs more of. Here is our chance to do something about it and improve our NHPA income in the process.

The Pro-Am Rated (PAR) classfinder policy could be what our sport needs as much as anything. It is simple to understand and will place each player in the class they belong and assure contests of equals with more fun and encouragement for all.

The R.O.P. (Record of Performance) control card that every player would carry, makes it all work. It is 100% accurate and foolproof without anyone keeping any records or books. This R.O.P. card also produces a perpetual 100% accurate handicap for everyone that all other sports will envy. This will afford us the much needed handicap tournaments that work without any confusion.

The Five Star system rounds out the format and will play a very impressive part in presenting

our sport. It is easy to understand.

The whole world is hungry for the health ingredients that playing horseshoe will provide. I mention "whole world" because we can go world wide when we talk in terms of METERS instead of feet. Don't forget, we enhance our position in getting into the Olympics with our sport when we relate to meter measurements.

We have introduced this system to families in lowa that have never played horseshoe previously, and they are really enthused. This system has the potential of bringing thousands of players

into the horseshoe fold.

With NHPA approval, we will travel to meet with any sizable group in the United States or Canada, to assist them in gatting this fine system into operation, which will put our sport where it deserves to be. FREE literature will also be available upon request.

To all the players and their families who will be traveling to the beautiful state of North Carolina, I extend my very best wishes. I told Mr. Schummer when I was in Florida that I would take a court and scoreboard to Statesville for all the players and their families to see.

I hope that I will have the opportunity to visit with you in Statesville and that everyone will give this system a real close look. Remember, it could mean a great deal to all of us in our wonderful sport AND IT IS ABSOLUTELY FREE FOR THE ASKING.



PROMOTION REVIEW

By Sol Berman

The following is a review of promotion over the past 35 years. The purpose is to see if we can learn from our past mistakes.

I recently videotaped an interview with Arlo Harris NHPA President in 1949. In 1949 he had a commitment from General Motors for \$10,000 to sponsor the 1950 World Championship in Indianapolis Fairgrounds. He was unable to get the approval of the executive council and the deal fell thru, as did the sponsorship of the 1951 tournament by Sears.

The following is from a letter from Bob Pence, NHPA Secretary-Treasurer dated June 8, 1964. "The NHPA has just signed an agreement with Royal Crown Cola for 1965 Championship

trophy sponsorship for the World Tournament, all state tournaments, and other big open events. plus additional aid.

This will replace the current agreement with the Miller Brewing Co. which in many ways has been unsatisfactory. With most of our events held in public parks and for other obvious reasons

the Miller Brewing Co. deal could not be properly exploited and developed."

The 1971 World Championship was held in Middlesex, N.J. Schaefer Beer sponsored the tournament. Beer was sold at the tournament. It was the most successful tournament ever, financially and in the number of spectators. News coverage and television coverage was excellent. Middlesex tried three times to get the tournament back, but was unsuccessful. We lost an excellent sponsor and an excellent club.

In 1976 I was successful in interesting Mike O'Hara Management Enterprises, Inc. in promoting our sport. He ran into two major obstacles. One, that we didn't have any plans to run tournaments where admission could be charged or beer sold and secondly our old farmer backyard image.

For three years (1976-77-78) the NHPA had professional publicity coverage. The media became well aware of our existence. Joe Goldstein Public Relations. He had Wide World of Sports and several sponsors interested in 1978 but he was not rehired and that ended that.

In 1979 I received an offer of \$1,000 from ESPN-TV to cover our 1980 World Tournament. My advice to sign immediately was ignored by the executive council (I wasn't invited to the meeting). After five months the offer was withdrawn.

In 1980 Joe Goldstein became Public Relations man for ESPN-TV. He rekindled ESPN-TV's interest in covering our tournament but again the deal fell thru. So instead of being one of the first sports to appear on ESPN-TV, we are one of the few sports that never appeared.

In 1980 Budweiser Beer and St. Pierre Mfg. Co. set up a promotional relationship. Mr. O'Donnell who represented Budweiser liked my promotional ideas and invited me to St. Louis. I was informed by our President that only the Pres. and Sec.-Treas. would represent the NHPA.

In 1980 Richard Moore, V.P. International Management Group tried to interest his client Wrangler Apparel into sponsoring horseshoes. They also felt that our image was the old farmer

In 1982 Richard Preimesberger, a Calif. T.V. producer called me and invited me to join him in producing a 13-week, 1/2 hour show series — a health angle. All plans are now complete except

for a sponsor. He had many interested but in the end it came down to the 'Old Farmer Backyard Image.'

In 1983 Donnie Roberts met with a group in Las Vegas that have a major hotel interested in sponsoring a money tournament. This golden opportunity for publicity and promotion should receive top priority. The NHPA should tap the top NHPA personnel to work with the group in Las Vegas to produce a tournament with the best chance for spectator interest. It might be worth our while to hire professional help to promote and publicize the event. The event should be videotaped for future showing to sponsors, etc.

What can we learn from our past failures?

1. We must do all we can to change our image.

2. We must sponsor and encourage youth participation.

3. We must spend money on promotion and publicity to attract sponsors.

- 4. We must support projects like Heritage Recreation, Preimesberger Arena, Whispering Oaks, Courtsite of former World Championships.
- 5. We must support books like Gary Kline's and Ottie Reno's book, and products like the NHPA ring.6. Supply clubs and charters, etc. with movies and videotapes. (I received a call from ABC-TV
- Professional Bowling Tour for videotapes of Walter Ray Williams, Jr.)
- 7. Photos and information of top pitchers should be available for publicity and promotion. (This was being prepared by my information officer, but she was fired by our president.)

8. Lastly, we must all work togethre for success.

TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS INAGURATES NEW HORSESHOE FACILITY IN SPRINGFIELD, MISSOURI — A SUCCESS STORY

The 21st annual Ron Frakes Tournament of Champions was held at the state's most modern horseshoe pitching courts in Springfield, Missouri on May 27-30. The 12-court facility was built by owner Bob Martin at the rear of his Repair Shop Lounge at 2435 S. Campbell in the city.

This year's tournament was the largest ever held in the city, with more than 170 participants from Missouri and 11 other states, some coming from as far away as Florida and California. The tournament was originated by Ron Frakes 21 years ago when he lived in St. Joseph, Missouri; he brought it with him when he moved to Springfield about four years later.

Until this spring the players had completed in Phelps Grove Park. Bob Martin finished his new courts, built in anticipation of the Missouri State Tournament coming to Springfield, Sept. 2-5, in time for a grand opening celebration held in conjunction with the Frakes tournament. Total cost of the new facility was more than \$100,000.

This year's sponsor was the Bass Pro Shops, one of the nation's largest sports equipment suppliers, which has its national headquarters in Springfield. Prize money amounting to \$4,200 was shared by winners in Men's Classes A through P, Women's Classes A through D, and Junior Boys, which includes boys age 17 and under.

World champions at the meet included Phyllis Negaard, 1982 Women's World Champion, and Alan Francis, current Junior Boys World Champion. Vicki Winston, a nine-time Women's World Champion, was secretary-treasurer of the tournament; her husband Earl was president, and Ron Frakes was tournament vice-president. Lee Elbe was in charge of public relations for the event.

Other notables at the tournament were Charles Killgore, president of the Missouri Horseshoe Pitchers Association, Bob Booe, regional director of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association for Kansas and Missouri, and Jim Davis, a member of the National Hall of Fame, to which only 58 members have been elected since its inception in 1956.

Donnie Roberts, who is secretary-treasurer of the national association and director of the world tournament, was very complimentary about Springfield as a site for future horseshoe pitching tournaments. He noted that the city is centrally located, has unusually fine motel and restaurant facilities, and that the surrounding Ozark Mountain Country is very attractive to competitors who like to combine attendance at a tournament with visits to area attractions.

The Springfield Convention and Visitors Bureau, according to director Barbara Morgan, hailed this tournament as the first of many that would put the city on the map for horseshoe pitching competitors from all over the country. The city is bidding for the World Tournament in 1985, for which an even larger facility will be constructed on a tract of land 12 miles outside Springfield on I-44.
