Candidates woo gay vote

SAN FRANCISCO – Candidates of every political stripe are falling all over themselves bidding for the gay vote and the support of gay leaders – even though the city election isn't until November.

As a result, whether Mayor Joseph Alioto is succeeded by a liberal or conservative, Democrat or Republican, in the officially nonpartisan election, San Francisco is almost guaranteed of having, for the first time, a mayor who is openly friendly to the gay community.

In addition, a promising gay is running for supervisor.

The active wooing of prominent gays has been going on for months and – as usual – the gay community is not united in its support. In contrast, most gays backed Father Eugene Boyle last fail against Assemblyman John Foran, although there were enough defections for Foran to win re-election by 1,600 votes. A chastened Foran, who formerly abstained on gay-related bills, introduced his own gay-rights bill this year in Sacramento.

Of the mayoral candidates, several private polls show the leader to be State Sen. George

Moscone, who has a healthy edge so far.

Among the big names in the gay community who are in Moscourés camp are Frank Fitch and Jim Foster, an active Democrat who called Moscone "a first-class administrator. He has proven his concern for gays and other minorities through progressive legislation."

The other announced candidate is the man who is joint floor leader, with Moscone, for the sodomy-repeal bill currently before the Senate – State Sen. Milton Marks, a liberal Republican.

The two men set strikingly different styles. Moscone finds his strongest appeal is to educated, well-read gays; he works largely with leaders in the community.

In contrast, Marks is folksy and earthy. He prefers to forgo platforms and microphones, campaigning instead by strolling through crow do reperching on a bar stool, drink in hand, eating and drinking with gay voters. In fact, he announed his candidacy at the Round Up, a gay bar near Folsom St., and has sent pictures of himself surrounded by gay men to Vector monthly, the Bay Area Reporter weekly and other gay periodicals.

Marks, whose Senate district covers most of the city, has been courting the gay vote for 2/5 years. He generally brings his wife and children along to gay functions he attends, which include – so far, and the election is six months off – the Empress Ball and the

Senate okay sure in Hartford

HARTFORD, Conn. – Approval of sweeping gay-rights protections looks assured in the Connecticut Senate, according to a gay lobbyist who already has firm assurances of support from a majority – 20 of the 36 senators.

Christine Pattee of New Haven, a Lesbian with a long and rich background in the feminist movement, made that prediction after an orderly, two-hour public hearing on the gay-rights bill April 3.

The Senate vote is expected during the last half of April, said Pattee, who reported that only three senators say they'll definitely vote no. Besides the 20 firm yeses, 13 votes are wavering or undecided.

In the House 63 representatives have already declared firm support. At least 76 are needed to pass, and contacts with the remaining 88 members are continuing.

Pattee attributed the success so far of the Connecticut effort to a successful letter-writing campaign to legislators, important assistance from non-gay organizations, mutual respect and cooperation between gay men and Lesbians, adequate financing, good press coverage and the lack of organized opposition so far.

She also cited the composition of the 1975 Legislature, as more heavily Democratic (70 per cent) and more liberal than the preceding one, and her own statewide experience in the women's movement

state-wide experience in the women's movement. The bill would add "sexual orientation" to the list of protected categories in existing Connecticut anti-discrimination legislation, in jobs, housing, state services and public accommodations. The law provides a maximum \$50 fine. (Consentual adult sex has been legal in the state since 1971.)

Legislative sponsors are State Sens. Betty Hudson, D-Madison, and Lawrence J. DeNardis, R-Hamden; and State Reps. William Ambrogio, Irving J. Stolberg and Albert R. Webber, all D-New Haven; William A. Collins, D-Norwalk, and Margaret E. Morton, D-Bridgeport.

The gay effort took shape in January when Pattee, 33, a Ph.D. candidate in public health at Yale University, found herself with a semester free – a dissertation to write but no funds to finance it with. And so she turned to lobbying, winning quick support from the Women's Political Caucus, in which she was formerly an active state-wide worker, and other feminist groups.

"The women's movement was ready for this," she said. "After the abortion issue and the Equal Rights Amendment, they had a debt to pay to Lesbians."

The group promptly put gay rights on their priority list at Hartford – as did the Young Democrats, who have particular clout in Connecticut and who had already already gone on record favoring just the kind of bill that Pattee had managed to get introduced, drawing on a long list of contacts and acquaintances she picked up through her feminist lobbying.

Reaching Connecticut gay men was a little harder. "We did it through a Massachusetts minister I ran into on a visit to New York," Pattee recounted.

"Then we started a huge letter-writing campaign, working through gay organizations and using the methods I learned in the women's movement. We published two flyers, one with general information and another specifically on gay legislation – 4,000 copies of it, distributed in gay bars and everywhere we could."

The gay campaign produced more mail, legislators said, than any other issue before the 1975 session. "Everyone else is asking the Legislature for money, and they have none this year," Pattee said. "And they realize they have to give us something."

Finances got a shot in the arm from a \$100 cash donation from the Partners in New Haven. Owned by four gay men, it's Connecticut's largest gay bar, with separate entire floors for gay men and Lesbians. The

Partners also threw a benefit night for the legislative push April 1 that netted \$320, plus the salaries and tips from that night donated by employees.

The campaign peaked again two nights later, at a committee hearing that was covered by two daily newspapers, both wire services and a TV station. "There was a 200-seat room packed with people, mostly gay, and they could see we veren't a bunch of freaks," Patter said. "We had two solid hours of testimony, and there wasn't a single voice raised in opposition."

A former high school teacher herself, Pattee was sensitive to concern about gay teachers, and the testimony was carefully arranged to reflect that. "We had several mothers appear to say they had no concern about their children being taught by homoscusuls," she said. "The Connecticut Education Association sent an officer to read the NEA statement on discrimination, which of course specifically includes sexual orientation."

"We saw a lot of legislators who aren't on the Joint Senate-House Human Rights and Opportunities Committee pop their heads through the door during the hearing, to see what was going on.

"The next day they were talking about us, and the hearing, all day long."

Pattee said she has called on most of Connecticut's legislators in person, usually accompanied by a gay man. "His approach is a bit on the emotional side, and I balance that with a strict recitation of facts and cool logic," she said.

"You know, it's amazing how a few of these legislators have opened up to me personally – several of them telling me of their own homosexual experiences as teen-agers. And then there was the fellow who said he was really strugging with the gay issue, how he's usually against discrimination right down the line, but recognize his own strong prejudice against homosexuals, although he added, 'I want my children to grow up more open-minded than I am."

Shortly after the hearing April 3, Pattee was surprised to encounter one of her old pupils from 10 years ago – a woman who lavishly praised Pattee's teaching, and proudly announced she named her daughter after Pattee.

"We started to talk, but we were interrupted by one of my friends who was so excited about how well the hearing had gone," Pattee said. "Up to that point, I don't think my former student had known I was gay."

12 states now have gay legislation

The tide of gay-backed legislation continues to swell, with gay-related bills now pending in the legislatures of 12 states.

Bills to protect employment and other rights have been newly introduced in Oregon, Hawaii and Connecticut. In addition, new bills to legalize sex between consenting adults have been offered in Georgia and Washington.

And committee hearings have been newly converted in Colorado, Minnesota, Oregon, and Connecticut, the last-named state being one in which broad gay-rights protections are headed toward almost-certain passage in the Senate (see story on page 1).

In addition, gay-rights legislation is pending in Massachusetts, California and New York, with consenting-adult bills also offered in Wisconsin and Texas.

Moreover, 24 members of Congress have put their names on the Abzug-Fraser federal gay-rights bill, as gay lobbyists now turn their attention to 14 U.S. senators for their support (see story on page 3).

Here is a state-by-state recap of new developments:

OREGON

The House State and Federal Affairs Committee heard two hours of noisy, conflicting testimony April 4 on a bill to prohibit discrimination on the basis of

"sexual orientation" in jobs, housing, schools and public accommodations.

That bill, introduced in Salem in 1973 by the same authors – Portland Democrats Steve Kafoury and Vera Katz – was approved in the House, 29 to 28, that year, but fell short of the required constitutional majority of 31.

Proponents this time included Episcopalian, United Church and Methodist ministers, a pair of doctors and two psychologists. The opponents were the same gaggle of Bible-thumping fundamentalists who inveighed before the Portland City Council in December, as the body enacted job guarantees for gay city employees, 3 to 2.

GEORGIA

A provision repealing consentual sodomy and sodomy solicitation laws was introduced, apparently by accident, in a 10-page reform bill offered by State Reps. Nathan Knight, Newnan, and Elanor Richardson, Alanta. Once the gay-related passages came to light, however, they told the gay monthly Atlanta Barb that they'd take it out, and it was to alranop

Conference set in C

WASHINGTON – Gay Activists Allianco/D.C. is calling a Bicentennial Conference on Gays and the Federal Covernment for Discovery Day weekend Oct. 10-14.

A special appeal is being planned to gay federal employees to attend, as well as other gay women and men and gay organizations, said Coordinator Jim Zais. Panels of experts are planned on topics such as gay civil rights, federal funding of gay services, Civil Service employment, and the military. 10th anniversary and officers' installation of the Society for Individual Rights.

Early in April, Marks won the support of one of the city's most controversial gay men, the Rev. Ray Broshears, a long-time critic of Moscone-backei Foster. Mr. Broshears' personal support came, ironically enough, only a few weeks after the minister organized the new, all-gay Harry S Truman Democratic Club.

In forming the club (along with Harvey Milk, Steve Ginsburg, Harold Call, Charlotte Coleman and others), Mr. Broshears aid it would stay within the Democratic Party – unlike the Toklas club, which he noted has supported in past elections such Republicans as William Bagley and Sen. Milton Marks.

Two other candidates are also ready to announce – Diane Feinstein, head of the city-county Board of Supervisors, and conservative Judge John Ertola of Superior Court.

Feinstein was elected on a pro-gay platform in 1969 and later introduced the "sexual orientation" amendment to the city fair-hiring ordinance which covers firms contracting with the city.

More recently, though, Feinstein has supported budget funds for police helicopters, which sparked additional arrests at Land's End, a beach cruising area; and ahe voted for police control of after-hours gay dance academies. That, and her campaigns against pornography and topless-bottomiese entertainment, causes critics to call her prudish. An admirer mourned "the abandonment by the gay community of a long-time friend."

Judge Ertola, who has scheduled a \$50 announceme dinner for April 22, has been a staunch supporter of former President Nixon, and his campaign for gay support is recent. He has the backing of Thomas M. Edwards, a hard-core conservative gay whose support may be a "kiss of death," according to some. But they're all going after the gay vote in earnest. Mr. Broshears described how it goes:

"Moscone had me over for brunch last December. And then Ertola insisted on a breakfast meeting in February. Marks wanted to too, but I held off. . . until, well, he and Caroline did have me to their home for brunch March 31."

In another development, gay activist Harvey Milk announced that he will run a second time for the Board of Supervisors, the combined city council and county board.

Milk, 43, who owns a camera shop in the heavily gay Castro St.-Eureka Valley area, surprised observers in

1973, when he received 17,002 votes in his first campaign. Although running without major-party support or strong financing, Milk received about 12,000 votes more than usual for minor candidates; it takes about 30,000 votes to win In announcing, Milk

accused most incumbents of being "part-time supervisors who actually devote most of their time to running for higher office."

He proposes to levy taxes on those who work in the city, and thus are benefited by Municipal Railway deficits, police and fire services, but who live elsewhere in the Bay Area and thus escape paying for San Francisco services. Milk also called for radio equipped buses and taxis, for rapid reporting of crimes in progress, modern fire equipment and an end to prosecuting "crimeless crimes" — the San Francisco name for vicitmless crimes, a phrase which recognizes that police create a victim when they arrest for illegal consenting sex, prostitution, smoking grass, etc. to testify at the committee hearings. There were flagging hopes that the provision might be kept alive, according to the *Barb*, which was disappointed by the willingness of the Feminist Action Alliance to drop the sections without a findt.

COLORADO

The first-pay-rights bill was souttled in the House Judiciary Committee, but four broader bills ware headed towards a public hearing early in April. The bill postponed indefinitely was one to forbid judges to consider a parent's "affectional or sexual orientation" in awarding child custody. After a hearing March 18, legislators decided that this question is best resolved in the courts; the Denver bill is the first to deal directly with child custody. Still pending are bills protecting jobs, housing, credit and public accommodations.

MASSACHUSETTS

The Joint Public Service Committee has weakened the gav-rights bill that would protect gays in state jobs, by allowing discrimination if the Civil Service Commission finds that being gay in some way will hinder doing the job well. Lobbying continues at full tile for this and the other gay-rights bills, while sympathetic committee chairmen hold onto the bills until lobbying peaks. A House vote could come by late April.

CALIFORNIA

2: Sen, Miton Marks, R-San Francisco, will share floor leadership duties with Sen. George Moscone, D-San Francisco, for Assemblyman Willie Brown's bill to legalize consentual sex. The Brown bill passed the Assembly March 6 by a vote of 46 to 25, and agv leaders are urging gay voters to write their senators promptly.

The Brown bill and four gay-rights measures got a shot in the arm March 15 when they were endorsed by the 10,000-member California Democratic Council annual convention. The 1,000 delegates included 40 gays, who persuaded the convention also to endorse the Abzug-Fraser bill in Congress and to call for gay appointments in mational Democratic councils.

TEXAS

Gay lobbyists gave up trying to recruit more sponsors for State Rep. Craig Washington's bill to legalize consentual sex, and instead began to focus on recruiting impressive witnesses for the public hearing which is schedulde before the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, which the Houston Democrat heads. The bill is to be heard with close to 10 other bills on mariyana, prostitution and other hot controversies.

MINNESOTA

Gay men have split over a gay job-and housing-rights ill pending in the House, and overage of public accommodations and public services has already been cut out of the bill. Testifying for the bill in the Personal Law subcommittee March 24 were Alderman Keith Ford, a Democratic-Farmer-Laborite, and county prosecutor Gary Flakne, a Republican, both of Minnespolis; one citizen opponent, and a variety of Minnespolis; gay men who took variet positions: Jack Baker said "affectional or sexual preference" is good but "affectional preference" would be better, as the key phrase in the bill; Tin Campbell denounced the bill for failing to cover unanvestites and transsexuals, and Thom Higgins grandly declaimed that passage of the bill would not stop gays such as himself from pressing for even more.

Public accommodations — the section in the Minneapolis gav-rights ordinance under which the Big Brothers chapter is being admonished for not accepting an openly gay Big Brother — was deleted March 31 when State Rep. Bill Lutter, D-Brooklyn Centre, complained privately that a Big Brother in his suburb had recently been accused or selling boy's exual favors to addurt men. Luther was also concerned about gays seeking to adopt children, as Baker is attempting.

WASHINGTON

A comprehensive revision of the state's criminal code is again pending in Olympia, but this time it's being brought out of committee pices by pices. Although Judiciary Committee Chairman Peter Francis is a good ally, gay lobbyists are not optimistic about the prospects for repealing consentual sodomy provisions in with such an approach, in the wake of a committee hearing in March.

HAWAII

A pair of gay-rights bills drafted by the American Civil Liberties Union chapter in Honolulu has been introduced by State Reps. Charles T. Ushijima and Richard Garcia. Neither has been scheduled for a public hearing so far.

24 in Congress back gay bill

WASHINGTON – The federal gay-rights bill was reintroduced March 25 with the announcement that 24 members of Congress have now placed their names among the sponsors.

Bruce Voeller of New York, director of the National Gay Task Force, said a drive would begin immediately to recruit Senate authors, naming 14 senators who are being approached. Originally introduced Jan. 17 as H.R. 166 by Rep. Bella Abzug, D-N.Y., and four others, the House bill would amend the 1964 Civil Rights Act to forbid discrimination on the basis of "affectional or sexual preference." The new bill is identical, except for its number (H.R. 5452) and the 19 new cosponsors.

Among the new names is that of Rep. Donald M. Fraser, D-Minn., who has introduced a slightly different bill of his own, which would also outlaw discrimination on marital status.

Washington names Kameny

WASHINGTON – He was thrown out of the government 20 years ago for being gay.

He rejoined government March 28 because he learned how to fight back so well. Sporting his "Gay is Good" button, Dr. Franklin

Kameny, 49, appointed March 25 and sworn in three



days later, is the first openly gay person named to any position by Mayor Walter Washington. The mayor, the first elected city chief in Washington history, said he hoped "this breakthrough will sensitize the entire government."

Replied Kameny, "You won't be disappointed."

Besides being a personal victory for Kameny, the appointment is a political coup for the Gay Activists of D.C. The group has been lobbying hard for

included it among their official demands at a meeting with the mayor last November.

A dozen GAA members and other gays attended the swearing-in for Kameny and five other new commissioners, drinking punch and chatting with

assorted city officials. The symbolic impact of Kameny's new job became apparent the next day, when discussion of police anti-gay entrapment and hirring policies came up at a City Council budget hearing.

One Council member pointed out to Police Chief Maurice Cullinane that public attitudes towards gay men and women are changing, and implied that it's time for police to follow suit.

750 meet in P'town

PROVINCETOWN, Mass. — Close to 750 gay women and men braved a, howling "northeaster" blizzard March 15-16 to attend the New England Gay Conference and hear its speakers and panels.

Convened at the P'town Town Hall and bolstered by the presence of many permanent residents of this gay resort city, the event opened Sturday morning with a panel featuring State Rep. Elaine Noble of Boston; Loretta Lotman and Bruce Voeller of New York; Brian McNaught of Detroit and Mark Segal of Philadelphia.

Twenty workshops rounded out the afternoon, on topics ranging from drugs and literature to legislation, the Third World and financing.

Mark Damon, owner of the Owl's Nest inn and one of four coordinators for the event, attributed the large turnout to the 175 press releases mailed to every gay and straight New England publication well in advance, and to 450 invitations to gay groups and gay bars.

City hires Lesbian

SAN FRANCISCO — Jo Daly, a politically active Lesbian, has been hired for an \$8,500 a-year job by the city's Human Rights Commission staff. She will be working to educate employers, landlords and other potential discriminators about gays in the federally-funded position.

Kameny said later that he intends to persuade the commission to crack down on hiring discrimination by all employers, including the police, who so far have ignored the gay anti-discrimination law. The Washington ordinance, perhaps the most inclusive in the nation, also covers transsexuals and transvestites.

Kameny's duties will include serving as a hearing examiner in discrimination cases and overseeing the administration of the city law. Both bills have been referred to the House Judiciary Committee's subcommittee on constitutional rights and civil rights, headed by Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif.

Voeller and Abzug said a flood of letters to Edwards will be necessary to get the bill scheduled for hearings, given the imposing number of other civil-liberties bills before Edwards' panel.

"And we're going to have to rely on local gay people and local gay organizations to carry the ball in recruiting new House sponsors," Voeller said, indicating that a letter campaign will be urged in a major mailing from his New York office to gay groups soon.

The two were joined at the press conference March 25 – Michelangelo's 500th birthday – by two other sponsors, Reps. Edward I. Koch, D-N.Y., and Paul N. McCloskey Jr., R-Calif., along with Nathalie Rockhill of the gay task force, Dr. Franklin Kameny of Washington, an ACLU official and about 75 gay spectators.

Also present was Karen DeCrow, president of the National Organization for Women, who said the bill poses "more than a civil-rights issue. . .Gender should have absolutely no relationship to one's life. . .Anatomy is not destiny."

Dr. Fred Strassburger of the American Psychological Association said, "To the extent we've been responsible for oppression, it's time we make amends by working for passage of this bill."

Herbert Gant of the American Psychiatric Association appeared, to read a letter from President John P. Spiegel, M.D., which said, "Some have færed that homosexual teachers might affect the sexual orientation of their students. There is no evidence to support this thesis, nor is there any evidence to believe that seduction of a student by a homosexual teacher is any more likely to occur than a heterosexual seduction... Jiscrimination is morally wrong (and) results in a tremendous waste of our human resources."

Voeller named the 14 senators being contacted as John Tunney and Alan Cranston, both DCalif.; Edward Kennedy, D, and Edward Brocke, R., both of Massachusetts; Robert McC. Mathias, R-Mid.; Birch Bayh, D-Ind. – all members of the Judiciary Committee – and Adlia Stevenson III, D, and Charles Percy, R, both of Illinois; Mark O. Hatfield and Robert Packwood, both R-Ore; Abraham Ribiodf, D-Conn.; James Abourezk, D-Stoz, Henry Jackson, D-Wash., and Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas.

The 24 House sponsors include 10 New York Democrats – Stephen Solarz, Fred Richmond, Charles Y. Rangel, Herman Badillo, Jonathan Bingham, Benjamin Rosenthal, Shirley Chisholm, Elizabeth Holtzman, Abzug and Koch.

There are six California Democrats on the bill – John Burton, Ronald Dellums, George Brown, Norman Mineta, Fortney Stark, Henry Waxman – and Republican McCloskey. Others are Walter E. Fauntroy, D-D.C.; Michael

Others are Walter E. Fauntroy, D-D.C.; Michael Harrington and Gerry E. Studds, both D-Mass.; Robert Nix, D-Pa.; Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo.; Parren Mitchell, D-Md.; and Fraser.

Lesbian appointed in Colorado

DENVER – Gov. Richard Lamm has appointed an open Lesbian to the Colorado Commission on the Status of Women.

Lamm is not willing, however, to take credit for making the appointment, apparently a first by any governor to a state beard or commission. Press secretary Carl Miller reported that the new Democratic governor had 'no comment' on whether he knew Marge Johnson was gay when he appointed her and 49 other women to the commission in January.

Miller himself wasn't sure whom CONTACT was asking about, but discovered in seconds, after asking coworkers, that it must be Johnson.

There is no question that the staff knows that Johnson is "a prominent spokesman — er, sald, and he insisted that Gov. Lamm made all 50 appointments himself, after reviewing staff recommendations and names submitted by the National Organization for Women, the Colorado Women's Caucus and other women's groups. "It wasn't an accident," he said of Johnson's appointment.

But Miller reported Lamm's 'no comments' response two days later on this, and on Lamm's support for gay-rights bills pending in the Legislature – which Johnson's Sexuality Task Force of NOW has made a high priority this year. Johnson, 32, who lives in the Denver suburb of Littleton and works in a can-making factory, said the Lesbian aspect was not picked up by daily newspapers when they announced Lamm's appointments in January, Johnson was formerly active in the Gay Coalition of

Johnson was tormerly active in the cay coalition of Derver, but moved solvy into the feminist groups last year. It was a NOW task force that began to look into the Commission on the Status of Women and, as in many states, "how removed its members are from the real rank and file of women in the state, and how of course it completely overlooked Lesbins."


The task force's report led to growing support for a new kind of commission, and the creation of a Talent Bank of Women qualified and available for appointment to public positions.

The result is that Lamm's new commission, Johnson said, "is for once a really representative group."

Johnson's early decision was to approach the commission's Legislative Committee for their endorsement for the gay-rights package pending at the Capitol, and approval already given by the Denver and Colorado chapters of NOW.

"We've had excellent relations with the other women in NOW, and real success in raising the level of trust between Lesbians and straight women," Johnson said.

Galveston surf, elegance beckon

GALVESTON - There's an almost audible thundering around Galveston as the first weekend in May approaches, when tens of thousands of people - many of them gay descend on the Island City for the official start of the beach and sun season.

As an official promotion, Splash Day was discontinued several years ago.

That hasn't stopped hotels from scrubbing up, and gay bars from expanding, in plenty of time for the crowds May 2-4 who will observe the ritual celebration of sun, surf and skin.

It's a major event, not just for the 2 million people in the Houston area 50 miles away, but for others anywhere near the Gulf Coast.

Part of the appeal lies in what, for many gay men and women, is a treasured annual pilgrimage past the fine and grand Victorian and Greek Revival mansions that grace the city in opulent serenity.

For Galveston, once the hideout of pirate Jean

Lafitte, boasts a history and tradition that few cities can equal. It was a major commercial center in the late 1800s. Bankers like Sealy, Moody and Jay Gould flourished here - and wholesalers, brokers, cottor factors and auctioneers (the slave trade was vital before the Civil War). The Strand of the 1880s easily deserved its nickname, "Wall Street of the South." That all vanished with the hurricane of 1900 that sent huge waves crashing against the island beach that is no protected by the Seawall. The rich dashed with their money and banks off to Houston, safely inland.

But their wealth left an indelible mark. Their fine homes remain, many of them carefully renovated by gay men who found, with their lovers, a new love in scraping old varnish, restoring sagging gingerbread. In 1975, the city has caught up with the gays' love for antiques, and creating two historical improvement districts - in which exteriors must be historically accurate; all costing \$100 or more must be approved in advance.

Architecture buffs will relish the stroll along the quiet shaded avenues of "the silk-stocking precinct" from The Strand to Broadway, between 10th and 20th Sts., and students of history will be fascinated by the careful commercial rejuvenation of The Strand itself and its buildings by Nicholas Clayton and other storied name Make it a walking tour, for even the pavement is antique.

Stop by the Galveston Arts Center and County Historical Society at the Strand and Kempner for displays by resident artists and local memorabilia, or the old movies every Friday at 7:30 p.m. At the Bicentennial Center (this is a model Bicentennial city, you know), they'll tell you how the building they're in - the 1859 Ashton Villa at Broadway and 24th helped get the whole preservation spirit launched in 1971, as soon as the Shriners announced plans to tear it down. The villa is divine decadence.

There's also the Bishop's Palace at Broadway and 12th, in the sweeping splendor that once characterized the island's ambitions.

But Galveston's big attraction is the beach, 32 miles of it streaching down the Gulf. On the East End, Stewart Beach is the most suitable for swimming and sunning, and Splash Day will find gaggles of gays nestling amidst straight couples and families; the west beach offers more secluded areas. Surfing (boards are on hand for rent) and surfers can be found on the waves near the Flagship Hotel at Seawall and 25th.


Pedestrians and cyclist who take the 11-mile Seawall, the South's longest uninterrupted sidewalk promenade, always find something happening, and there are generous plantings of the colorful bush that makes this "the Oleander Island". One of my favorite Sunday amusements is the Port Bolivar Ferry, a free round-trip across the shipping channel. And there's the Sea-Arama Marineworld, popular for its trained ocean animals.

The gay establishments are preparing in a big way Lafitte's is expanding its dance floor while the Kon-Tiki, perennial favorite of the local crowd, has enlarged its bar and installed quadraphonic sound. The Fruit Jar will greet Splash Weekenders with free hot dogs.

The revamped Paradise sponsors female impersonators every weekend and amateur talent on Wednesdays. The Dolphin Room of the Seawall Hotel plans a professional female impersonator every night, while Dirty Sally's has recently reopened for the season, serving you beer, wine and breakfast too. There is talk of a Miss and Mr. Gay Galveston contest on the big weekend.

But most of all Galveston offers people, and hospitality of the last-century's style. "It's not just a matter of business," said one,"we sure could use some fresh scenery around here."


Ohio court kills anti-drag law

COLUMBUS, Ohio - The Ohio Supreme Court has struck down a Columbus city ordinance and others like it across the state - which forbids cross-dressing.

Such laws are unconstitutional when "considered in the light of contemporary dress habits," the high court ruled in a 7-to-0 decision.

The case was an appeal from the \$25 fine meted out to John Terry Rogers, a pre-operative transsexual, who was arrested on April 21, 1973, for wearing a curly wig, a flowered blouse, pullover sweater, a bra and bellbottoms (which police called palazzo pants). The arresting officer noted that Rogers was "very feminine in speech and movements", which he said influenced his decision to arrest.

Max Kravitz, a Public Defender's office lawyer who now teaches at Capital University Law School, took the case to the Supreme Cou t because he said police.



regularly use such laws to harass male transvestites and transsexuals.

Kravitz won one victory at once. The City Council repealed the ordinance against appearing in public "in a state of nudity or in a dress not belonging to his or her sex. effective Jan. 1, 1974.

But Kravitz pressed on, knowing there were simila ordinances still effective in Mansfield, Cleveland and other Ohio cities. He also wanted to get at least one cross-dressing decision on the law books as a precedent, somewhere in the country. (The U.S. Supreme Court declined to hear a challenge to the Houston cross-dressing ordinance in April 1974.)

The Ohio court declared that the 14th Amendment requirement of due process of law is violated by an ordinance which is so vague that "men of common intelligence must necessarily guess at its meaning and differ as to its application.

"This is of special significance in relation to the ordinance here, which makes criminal, activities which by modern standards are normally innocent."

In his legal brief, Kravitz cited a department-store ad for "men's pantyhose," and the wearing of unisex clothing, hot pants, extreme mini-skirts and skin-tight clothing as examples of apparel which the Columbus law cast into doubt.

Kravitz said he is having some difficulty reaching another pre-operative transsexual whose appeal he is handling - Joesph Zanders, whose doctor told him to dress, act and work as a woman several years ago, as an early stage of sex-change therapy.

Zanders won a municipal judge's decision in 1970 that police cannot arrest a transsexual for cross-dressing, after the judge found Zanders "had a constitutional right to follow the prescription of his doctor, as long as it doesn't infringe on the rights of the community," Kravitz said. "As far as I know, it's the only legal decision on transsexuals in the country.

The police kept harassing him, so Kravitz is seeking to appeal the latest convictions, too

"He's something of a standard-bearer, you know," the lawyer said. "I don't know if he's had silicone breast injections or not, but he's got quite a set. He'll walk down the street topless, or in a really sheer see-through, and - well, it stops quite a few cars. Of course, the police can't arrest him for that because he's a male."

Police, judge ease arrests

WASHINGTON – Both Washington's police and a federal judge have taken steps that portend an end to plainclothes police entrapment of cruising gay men and transsexuals on city streets.

"Gay people have an absolute right to enjoy whatever type of enjoyment they want," Police Chief Maurice Cullinane told five members of the Gay Activists Alliance March 17. He directly indicated an end to the entrapment arrests.

And Judge David Norman of Superior Court dismissed solicitation charges against four pre-operative transsexuals March 12, calling the arrests by plainclothes detectives "so unfair as to shock our universal sense of justice."

On the other hand, the status of both apparent advances was not clear. Ohief Cullinane refused to put his no-entrapment order in writing, and his assistant said the department would deny any charges, if queried by the press. In addition, the police are appealing Judge Norman's dismissal order – just as they are appealing his ruling of last July that female prostitutes are



discriminated against, because police never arrest their male clients, too.

The police meeting was long in the making, and may be related to the fact that now, for the first time, the chief serves at the pleasure of elected, home-rule officials in the nation's capital.

It was at the meeting that Asst. Chief Zanders announced the change in the police arrest policy by saying, "We're not going out looking for homosexuals to entice. We're only going to act on citzens complaints."

The appearance of plainclothes officers at Rock Creek Park, and on 9th and 14th Sts. NW., seeking to strike up conversations with cruising gay males, has been standard procedure for the morals squad.

Both Zanders and Cullinane stressed that the "policy change" is unofficial, unwritten and undated. The chief refused a request by GAA President Cade Ware to write an anti-harassment order, and Zanders said the force would disavow any policy change in public.

Chief Cullinane reaffirmed an existing policy never to arrest for private consentual sex between adults, and said his men have no intention of visiting gay clubs and bars. "As long as we don't get complaints, we're not going in anywhere," he said.

But he refused adamantly to alter the department's policy of never hiring known gays for the force, despite the city ordinance forbidding anyone to deny a job because of sexual orientation. Gay sex is still a felony, he said, and that makes gay men criminals.

Cullinane also refused to consider appointing a gay person to his Citizens Advisory Board, saying the board is already too large. But he did say he'll "look into" a proposal that gays lead gay-sensitivity sessions for police officers.

Attending the meeting were Franklin Kameny, Bob York, Parren Shaffer, Ware, non-gay lawyer Glenn Graves and a gay reporter. Regarding transexuals, Judge Norma issued his dismissal order fully a year after he heard testimony from expert witnesses on the transexual phenomenon.

Paul Walker of the Gender Identity Clinic at Johns Hopkins University Hospital described sex changes as "persons whose gender identity is incompatible with his or her biological makeup."

Walker added that pre-operative transexuals' 'opportunities for sexual engement with other human beings are extremely limited." in that, considering themselves to be of the opposite sex and dressing as such, "their normal sexual desires are met with humiliation, often violence, when their sexual organs are discovered by their partners."

As a result, he said, they often seek a quick, impersonal, "street" encounter "which minimizes the risks of discovery." To place plainclothesmen on the streets leads transsexuals to assume falsely that the men are willing and available for sex.

There was also intense questioning of a Lt. Hershey, who heads the morals division of the police Prositution, Perversion and Obscenity Branch. Hershey fully admitted that his men cruise the streets to make themselves available for solicitation, acknowledging that no arrests had been based on citizen complaint, only by the police officers.

In his ruling March 12, Judge Norman wrote, "If due process of the law means anything, it is that a person may not be deprived of his linkerty by the deceptive governmental exploitation of his inherent, immutable vulnerabilities. Arrests and detentions through such governmental deception constitute cruel and unusual punishment in violation of the 8th Amendment of the Constitution."

Judge Norman, who has been nearly blind since youth, is a former civil-rights chief in the Justice Department. His appointment as a judge was described by Burke Marshall, dean of Yale Law School, as the "best made by President Nixon to any post."

Witches? Not quite

HOUSTON – More than a dozen cows and calves have been found lying in pastures and prairies in recent weeks – dead, their genital organs cut off, their bodies drained of blood. No footprints were to be seen nearby.

No tootprints were to be seen nearby. Press speculation and anonymous phone calls to sheriff's headquarters suggested that the blood and organs were seized for use in worship or witchcraft by satanic cults in the area.

Not so, said sheriff's detectives who found at least two of the cows died of pneumonia. And, after leaving one dead cafi in a field and watching it through binoculars, they identified the shoeless mutilators of the carcasses as buzzards from nearby cemetries.

8 gays jailed in FBI probe

Six gay people in Lexington, Ky., and two in Hartford, Conn., have been jailed for contempt of court in what two defense attorneys describe as a gross abuse of the grand-jury system by the FBI and the U.S. Department of Justice.

The jailings came to light in the wake of reports about local police undercover work, some of it perhaps touching the gay communities of Chicago, Houston or Los Angeles.

The jailings are related to the FBI's investigation of a 1970 bank robbery in Boston, in which a bank guard was killed. The FBI's suspects, who the bureau believes are being hidden and spirited about the country by a Lebsian-feminist underground, are Katherine Power and Susan Saxe, former students at Brandeis University in New York.

The women have been on the FBI's "10 most wanted list" since 1971, and the bureau believes they spent the last year in Lexington, Ky. The fugitive hunt has also extended to Albuquerque, Detroit, Cincinnati and Seattle.

When the six Lexington gays refused to cooperate with the FBI agents, the bureau had them subpoenaed by a local grand jury, where a judge ordered them to testify – to answer the same questions – or be jailed for contempt of court.

A citizen may legally decline to answer an FBI agent's questions, although it's a federal offense to lie to one. A grand jury, however, may compel testimony – which is why lawyers Robert Sedler and Judith Peterson accused the Justice Department of abusing the grand-jury system, in trying to make the jury do the FBI's work.

The Lexington six, all jailed for contempt without bond, are Jill Raymon, 23; Maria Seymour, 22; Gail Cohee, 21; Debbie Hands, 22; Linda Link, 22, and James Carey Junkin, 19.

Similarly jailed in Hartford were Lesbian lovers Ellen Grusse and Marie Theresa Turgeon.

Gay people have complained that the FBI, in pursuing its investigation, has lied to them about the statements of other gays, and has capriciously told parents and employers about their gayness.

Information about local police activities includes accusations in Chicago that the police "red squad" infiltrated a variety of non-criminal community groups which were at odds with City Hall. One such agent was identified as Marcus Salone, who served for two years as president of the Organization for a Better Austin, a neighborhood club. Another joined Jesse Jackson's Operation Push.

Still another was Gino Addams, who infiltrated the Alliance to End Repression. Addams left the alliance, however, before its Gay Task Force was created last year, and Police Supt. Michael Spiotto said the program ended months ago.

In Los Angeles the police took a public rebuke March 24 from the California Supreme Court, which said the use of undercover agents violates the state's 1972 "right to privacy" constitutional amendment. The activities under homophobic Police Chief Edward Davis were described by the high court as "government snooping in the extreme."

In neither Los Angeles nor Houston is it known whether the police files paid attention to gay activists, although the Houston police non-criminal investigations did record information about the sex lives of the "hundreds and hundred" of citizens, many prominent, who were watched. The files, revealed in January by Mayor Fred Hofheinz, remain under study by a blue-fibbon committee of three.

Methodist bishops say no to gays

MINNEAPOLIS — The Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church declared unanimously and without debate April 1 that they "do not advocate or support ordination for practicing homosexuals."

The gay ordination issue is the hottest one going in the 10.3-million-member church. At its quadrennial convention in Portland, Ore., in 1976, the gay ordination question will come up, at the request of the church's Council on Youth Ministry, which supports it.

The Council of Bishops, whose positions do not bind on the convention, said it supports the statement. adopted by the Atlanta convention in 1972 – that gays are people of "sacred worth" entitled to full civil rights, but homosexual acts are "incompatible with Christian teaching."

While the bishops' statement referred to new ordinations, some observers saw in it a reluctance to get into the question of gay men and women who are already ministers.

As Robert Thornburg, associate general secretary of the church's Ordained Ministry Division, put it in March, "There have always been homosexuals in the ministry. The key word in the discussion is 'self-proclaimed."

Thornburg said he has received more mail on this topic than any other, since the division issued an anti-ordination statement Feb. 21 – largely for the purpose, he explained to a reporter, of keeping the church from jumping on either right-wing or left-wing bandwagons.

NEW YORK — Elaine Lafferty, president of the Gay League for Responsible Broadcasting, has called a public meeting for 8 p.m. Thuraday, April 24, at the Laissez Faire Bookstore, 206 Mercer St., to seek support for its crusade against anti-gay and stereotyped broadcasting.







Picking a candidate

The letter from our airman reader in Mississippi, published below, raises an interesting question: is it logical to ask gay women and men to support or vote for a candidate, solely because of that candidate's intelligent position on gay concerns?

It's not a question we expect to see resolved soon; the debate will continue for years perhaps decades, as the number of public officials and candidates who support gay rights continues to grow.

In 1972, for example, virtually all of the presidential aspirants who supported the rights of gay people to justice and equality were also anti-war liberals: Democrats Edward Kennedy, Eugene McCarthy, George McGovern, Shirley Chisholm, Birch Bayh and Fred Harris (as well as Hubert Humphrey) and Republican Paul McCloskey. There was support also from the minor parties: Dr. Benjamin Spock of the People's Party, the candidates of the two Socialist parties and of the conservative Libertarian Party.

As the 1976 sweepstakes approach, we see the base of support broadening. Lloyd Bentsen, a Democrat whose 1970 election to the Senate produced warm greetings from President Nixon and speculation that Bentsen would become a Nixon ally, has written Democratic national headquarters in support of gay pursuits. And National Chairman Robert Strauss, who is hardly identified with the Democratic left, also appears to be realizing that he's going to have to reach an accommodation with the gay community. Henry Jackson, who was burned by a Nixonite "dirty tricks" letter in 1972 that accused him of homosexual relationships, might also be a candidate for a pro-gay statement as he seeks to broaden his base of support for the nomination in 1976.

This is one of the healthiest developments we can imagine, because the gay community is so diverse that we find it inconceivable to expect all, or even a large majority, of gay women and men, to line up behind a candidate solely because of the candidate's gay views - not with a gay community that includes Marxists, right-wingers, anarchists, one-issue ideologues and the rest of us in between.

We've certainly seen no evidence of such a willingness in the past. We remember a friend of ours becoming so incensed at what he considered George McGovern's last-minute wishy-washiness on gay rights in 1972 that he launched an all-out personal campaign to generate a large local "gay protest vote" for Linda Jenness, the Socialist Labor candidate for president; he used newspaper articles, letters to the editor and personal exhortation, an impressive effort. The vote totals in that city showed no percentage difference from the 1968 total for the Socialist Labor nominee: the "gay vote" wasn't responsive to his one-issue appeal.

Nor can gay people prominent in the gay movement be expected to be swayed solely by candidates' gay-rights positions. We cite State Sen. Allan Spear of Minneapolis and the legislative lobbyist of Spear's Committee for Gay Rights, Steve Endean, who in 1974 were prominent in support of the endorsee of their Gay Rights, Steve Endean, who in 1974 were prominent in support of the endorsee of their own Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party for county prosecuting attorney - even though the candidate had taken no public position on gay concerns and was regarded by other liberals and civil-libertarians as having a frightfully poor record on civil liberties. Most prominent gay women and men in Minneapolis, including DFLers, supported Republican Gary Flakne, who was chief legislative sponsor of the 1973 sodomy-repeal bill, who had a consistent gay-rights voting record in the Minnesota House and whose civil-liberties record was fine. (Flakne won.)

We criticize no one's party loyalty. We recognize that party loyalty will influence not only the personal aspirations of the gay individuals involved, but potentially the priority that gay concerns may be given in party councils. That's important.

We do suggest that it's unrealistic to expect either gay men or gay women to line up behind a candidate just because of gay issues.

There will be exceptions, of course, when the gay community is under attack, and when only one candidate offers relief from that attack: Mayor Sam Yorty of Los Angeles was thoroughly disliked for the anti-gay proclamations of his police chief, Ed Davis, and for the unprovoked police raids and arrests at

gay bars. Though Yorty's opponent, Police Capt. Tom Bradley, offered no pre-election statement on gay concerns, Bradley won heavy support within the gay community, and we suspect he owes a significant portion of his victory margin to the gay vote in Hollywood and elsewhere in Los Angeles. In any event, it's nice to be able to call Yorty a former mayor.

But we've seen no evidence to imply that gay people are unconcerned with the questions of pollution, war and defense, crime, taxes, race relations and energy, to the point where they'll forget them when faced with the novelty of a candidate who's pro-gay

For it's not a novelty any more. It's becoming almost commonplace. In fact, we begin to wonder if gay concerns will be any issue at all in 1976; at the rate things are moving, every major candidate could well be pledged to an unshakeable position for liberty and justice for all - including us, for once.

We'd like to see politically-minded gay women and men of every ideological stripe start working toward that end. Where political support for the gay cause began in the radical left five years ago, it has already broadened to include most liberals of both major parties and a small but growing number of moderates. Conservatives who uphold the banner of individual freedom should find no philosophical problem in recognizing the rights to individual choice that gay people seek, as well. Conservative newspaper columnists such as James J. Kilpatrick and Edwin A. Roberts have already done so, and it's about time that conservative senators and members of Congress, both Democrats and Republicans, begin to join them publicly. We earnestly propose this pursuit for the personal agendas of the gay men and women who are active in conservative political ranks.

This could leave the nation's gay community in 1976 facing the happy dilemma that now conservative political ranks.

This could leave the nation's gay community in 1976 facing the happy dilemma that now confronts our gay brothers and sisters in San Francisco - the difficult decision as to which of many candidates, of all ideological stripes, all devoutly courting the gay vote, to support. It's not impossible.

TO THE EDITOR: The enclosed article is one I feel is of extreme importance, to you, as well as all of our brothers and sisters. I thought you might be able to send a copy of it to all gay establishments throughout the United States, so that they might inform the entire gay world of the fact that there is a candidate who has our concerns at heart. I know that this is an unusual

"No offense, but I don't think you're normal." High-school boys never fail to discover the self-affirming way of expressing themselves, especially when there are high-school girls around. I had forgotten how macho a class of juniors and seniors could be until I began the lecture circuit as a speaker on gay life.

'What do you consider normal?" I replied 'The way things were meant to be. . . God made man and woman for each other. Not man and man. "What do you mean 'God made'? Do you



mean he actually took clay and made man and from that man took a rib and made woman? Is that what you really believe? Silence

of all those who believe the Genesis story of creation?

"Could I see the hands of all those who believe in evolution?"

"We don't know," pleaded one girl in the back. "But if you don't know, how can you be so sure in your judgment of what is right and what is normal? The chances are, you see, that they will never discove the remains of the Bible figure Adam. What archeologists will discover is a variety of first persons male and female. Homosexual behavior dates back to our earliest records of human history. It has been normal for man since he first evolved."

"You're not normal because you can't have sex with a woman. You're deficient."

"Oh," I replied to the aggressive youth who was receiving the admiration of his male friend beside him. "Could you have sex with your buddy there?

Laughter. "No."

"Well then, you're deficient too, aren't you? Social scientists suggest that the majority of people are actually bisexual. . .meaning capable of enjoying sexual activity with both genders. If you were normal, by your standards, you would be able to have sex with your friend and enjoy it."

A look of shock!

"I'm not suggesting that you have to enjoy homosexual activity to be well-integrated, but neither can you demand that a homosexual engage in heterosexual activity to be normal."

"But it's against the Law of God," insists another.

"What law?" "God's Law and as a Catholic you must accept that."

'God gave man only 12 laws, to my recollection: The 10 Commandments and the two directives of Jesus. Nowhere in the 10 Commandments do we hear about homosexuality. Later, the Church, not God, added that to the sixth commandment, which forbids adultery, we must include fornication, masturbation, birth control and other sex-related impurities. Jesus never talked about homosexuality in His entire ministry, either. He

commanded us to love. . .love God and love our neighbors as yourself. Who, here, can tell me how homosexuality is a violation of the law of love?" Silence.

"What about Sodom and Gomorrah?"

"Sodom and Gomorrah didn't have a sexual connotation until three centuries after the death of Christ when an historian with hang-ups injected his bias into the account. The Jews never interpreted Genesis 19 as a condemnation of homosexuality."

"What about Leviticus? What about St. Paul?" "The book of Leviticus talks about homosexuality in terms of temple prostitution, not the love-making between two persons of the same gender. St. Paul talked of the effeminate and of pederasty. The Greek word which would express homosexuality as we know it was never used by the saint."

"Maybe you say homosexuality is normal for homosexuals but so is murder normal for killers and robbing normal for thieves. Do you think everyone ought to be allowed to do what is normal for them?

'How can you equate homosexuality with murder? Whom does a homosexual hurt? Laws are made to protect the innocent. Who is being protected by the laws against homosexuals?"

After a while you tire of justifying yourself before groups of high-school and college students, church groups and other heterosexually-dominated gatherings You weary of reciting all the evidence which points to your normalcy and decency. The more you do it, the more your inclination is to tell them where they might stick the story of Sodom and Gomorrah.

But there is always the realization that somewhere out there in that sea of faces there are some very frightened and confused homosexuals who need to hear the answers to the questions they have kept penned up for years.

High school had to be the loneliest time of my life. "You tell me that you have shacked up with some broad and I'll talk to you," warned the school guidance counselor to our senior honors class. "but you tell me you're queer and I'll kick you right out of the office.

For that reason, I look forward to sharing with high school and college classes. For that reason, I open e session with the warning

"I am not here to win your approval of my life style. What you think of me and my homosexuality makes no difference to me. But what you think about yourself and your homosexuality or the homosexuality of your best friend, your brother, sister, mother or father does matter. At least 50 per cent of you will or have had homosexual fantasies. Thirty-seven per cent of you have or will have homosexual experiences to the point of orgasm and, at the very least, 10 per cent of you are homosexual.

By the end of the discussion, the macho numbers who were originally most aggressive in challenging my normalcy leave seriously questioning their own. And those who arrived doubting their healthiness, leave affirming it.

Can I see the hands of those who would have it any other way?

Gay bookstore buys TV ads

WASHINGTON - Lambda Rising, Washington's gay bookstore, has become the first gay commercial enterprise to advertise on a network television station two of them, in fact,

Owned by Deacon Maccubbin, the store aired a 30-second commercial Feb. 25 on WRC-TV, an NBC affiliate, between segments of a showon gay marriage.

Lambda Rising also bought a 30-second spot on WMAL-TV, the ABC affiliate, during the Feb. 27 "Wide World of Entertainment" special on gay liberation, hosted by David Frost.

The commercial, designed by Mark Straka, consisted of narration over a series of slides. The words:

"Lambda - the 11th letter of the Greek alphabet. Lambda is now the international symbol of Gay Liberation. It's being worn with pride by gay men and women, Lesbians and homosexuals who want to celebrate the gay experience. And now the gay community has a bookstore that celebrates the gay experience, Lambda Rising. Lambda Rising is for everyone - everyone who wants to grow and understand. Lambda Rising, at 1724 20th St. in northwest Washington.

The first slide was a lambda symbol in lavender and yellow, followed by a lambda earring worn by a woman, while another woman looked on. Next viewers saw a photo of a lambda on a chain on a man's chest, with another man's arm on his shoulder.

The final slide showed the name and address, with a butterfly in the corner.

WRC, which ran the entire commercial, at first wanted the phrase "for everyone" changed to "for adults" - until the gays approached the National Association of Broadcasters, which advised the station that it would lose any court battle over the phrase.

WMAL objected to "too much nudity" in the photo of the men, and when it refused to yield, Maccubbin and Manager Thomas Trowbridge filed a complaint with the Washington Office of Human Rights. The men's photo did not run.

Still, the following Saturday brought the store its heaviest business since it opened in June 1974. "I've seen a lot of new faces in here," Trowbridge said.

The bookstore, located in a Victorian home overlooking the Dupont Circle gay ghetto, carries over 500 different publications, novels, non-fiction books, poetry, pamphlets and journals, along with artwork, jewelry and gay buttons. It calls itself the largest gay-liberation bookstore in the country, and it has become an unofficial gay community center; its bulletin board overflows with clippings, posters and messages.

Maccubbin, a youthful bearded gay activist who also runs a "head shop" next door, says he's trying "to balance the anti-gay viewpoint of works that have long been available in (other) bookstores and libraries.

He provides a mailing address for several gay organizations and sinks part of his profits into the Gay Switchboard, located upstairs. The house has held readings for gay poets, including Thomas Meyer and Jonathan Williams, and Gay Youth once used the front lawn for a bake sale.

Austin elects liberal

AUSTIN, Texas - City Councilman Jeffery M. Friedman, who last January moved to add gay people to an ill-fated city fair-employment ordinance, was elected mayor April 5

Friedman, 31, defeated Councilman Bud Dryden by over 7,000 votes, winning 54 per cent of a record turnout to become Austin's youngest mayor ever the nation's youngest mayor in any city of Austin's population (252,000).

Dryden had voted against covering gay people, and against the whole ordinance. Both failed by 3 to 2, with two members absent

The election was billed as a test of the voting strength of the 42,000 University of Texas students, and voter turnout campaigns were strenuous. Besides Friedman, two other liberals were elected.

The city's Human Rights Commission had already planned to bring the bill back before the council when the new members take office in May.

Streisand is always appealing, not for her roles, but because of the way she handles them. She can cross her eyes, crack a joke in Yiddish dialect, or run out a sentence and her breath at the same time and she'll always draw a tremendous audience response.

Streisand remains the most bankable female star of the day. Faye Dunaway, Julie Christie, Ellen Burstyn asure good reviews, as does Streisand, but they don't guarantee box-office success. Even "For Pete's Sake," which drew the worst reviews of any of the seven Streisand pictures, was big at the B.O.

Streisand is a star in the truest sense of the word. It's a totally absorbing experience to watch and hear Streisand hold a note, while twisting and curving her hands and svelte fingers in the air. Streisand is appealing, she is stunning, she is talented.

From the piercing steel of her eyes to the tips of her elegant fingers, Streisand possesses golden talents, just as "If a Girl Isn't Pretty" claims in "Funny Girl."

But it's impossible to compare "Funny Lady" to "Funny Girl." Two products from two different directors are bound to be different.

Remember those old musical biographies — "Love Me or Leave Me," "With a Song in My Heart," "The Joison Story," even "Lady Sings the Blues" — those great Hollywood extraveganzas that wind up on the late show? Well, that's just the kind of picture that Herbert Ross created in "Pumy Lady."



Streisand belted out "Great Day" in the traditional grand style of the Thirties' musical from Hollywood,

Ross, who also directed Streisand in "Owl and the Pussycat," and who choreographed "Fumy Girl" under William Wyler's direction, has made a sparkling, brand-new cliche of a movie. But in these times of disaster movies, com-man movies, political corruption movies, a cliche is a kind of catharsis. Back to those good old days, the days of Depression and pre-World War II.

"Funny Lady" traces the life style of Fanny Brice from the time Nicky Arnstein divorces her through her next marriage with theatrical entrepreneur Billy Rose, played by James Caan. Poor Fanny, a success on the stage and a failure in the bedroom.

Streisand is the fuse of the movie. Her seemingly candid yet well planned shtick pulls her through sluggish dialogue, which is credited to Jay Allen ("Cabaret") and Arnold Schulman.

The most pleasant surprise is Caan's perfect performance. This the first time he has been teamed with a superstar, and he holds his own very well, even upstaging Streisand in the sleeping-coach scene on their honeymoon.

The score includes old Billy Rote songs – "Me and My Shadow," "Paper Moon," and "More Than You Know" – and some new ones by John Kander and Fred Ebb ("Cabaret"). Much as "Funny Lady" tries not to parallel "Funny Girl, it twakens at some musical points, substituting "I'm the Greatest Star" with "How Lucky Can You Get," and "Don't Rain on My Parade" with "Let's Hear I tor Me."

Ray Agahayan and Bob Mackie ("Applause," "Lady Sings the Blues," "Halleujah Hollywood") have dressed Streisand in some of the most striking costumes on the screen in some time, and the production design by George Jankins lends some frills to the sparingly produced production numbers.

"Funny Lady" might be a cliche after all, because it is simple and old-fashioned. But unlike those other muscial biographies, it has Streisand for a pulse-beat. No wonder it became the nation's No. 1 grosser only days after its release.



3 judges hear MCC prison suit

SAN FRANCISCO – A three-judge federal panel has taken under advisement a suit by the Metropolitan Community Church and 26 prisoners to allow MCC ministers to conduct worship services in Califronia prisons.

During oral arguments Feb. 27 the judges heard the state attorney general's office contend that gay worship would lead to violence in the prisons. MCC lawyers replied that MCC preaches against violence, and cited the worship for gays held without incident at Atascadero State Hospital.

The judges posed sharp questions to both sides during the arguments.

The case stems from a 1972 order by Raymond Procunier, former head of the Corrections Department, depuine all reliaious services aimed primarily at pays

deving all religious services aimed primarily at gays. As a result, San Quentin Warden L.S. Nelson denied a request from prisoner Herbert L. Lipp to be visited by ministers of his own choosing. Lipp and the MCC then went to court for an injunction under the Civil Rights Act of 1893.

Originally the state contended that federal courts have no jurisdiction in such a question, and that ministers have no constitutional right to enter prisons to lead worship.

The MCC retorted that to deny gay prisoners the right to religious services violates the 1st and 14th Amendments, and amounts to a "cruel and unusual

punishment" forbidden by the 8th Amendment. On Feb. 27, however, Deputy District Atty. Sanford

Svetcov focused on the violence that he said gay worship was likely to create. MCC attorney John Eshelman Wahl replies by asking the court to apply the "clear and present danger"

the court to apply the "clear and present danger" standard of measuring the likelihood of violence. He said the state cannot "establish any reasonable probability" of an outbreak. Repied Svetcov, "When groups of inmates gather,


Replied Svetcov, "When groups of inmates gather, violence occurs," Svetcov said.

There is plenty of violence in gay relationships outside of prison, he alleged, adding, "You don't have to wait until the knife is poised before we reach the brink." An MCC brief noted that Black Muslims worship in

An MCC brief noted that Black Muslims worship in state prisons, but Svetcov replied to Judge William East's question that the separationist group has "become more business-minded and capitalistic."

Svetcov was unable to cite any violence that has occurred, and acknowledged that Muslim worship has not been curtailed.







ABC-TV to look at sex

Narrated by Frank Reynolds, they will focus on the Program in Human Sexuality of the University of Minnesota Medical School, and support for the program by the 2.4-million-member American Lutheran Church.

Texans support Cyr

HOUSTON - The coordinating committee of the Texas Gay Task Force voted unanimous support April 5 for gay activist Ken Cyr's class-action law suit against the Fort Worth police chief.

Cyr sued in February in U.S. District Court, asking an end to police harassment of gay leaders and damages for car-stopping and license-plate recording by officers during the Texas Gay Conference last June

The state-wide committee, attended by over 20 persons for an all-day meeting, also voiced support for the Ken Cyr Assistance Fund, formed after Cyr lost his clerical job at Texas Christian University when the suit was publicized.

Sahl exposes his homophobia

LOS ANGELES - Mort Sahl, the acrid iconoclast of a comedian from the late 1950s who had been making a comeback, revealed himself as a virulent fag-hater in a television broadcast taped March 19.

Before the reaction was over, Sahl's employers at KCOP-TV, where he cohosts a talk show, had to undergo a 24-hour sit-in, apologize profusely and schedule one, perhaps two, gay rebuttals.

It was Sahl himself who jumped on the gay topic March 19, during a sagging discussion with three women guests on the show. When one of the women mentioned gays, Sahl cried, "They're scavengers!. Beneath the . .They're your enemy. . .a destructive force. They despise you (women) because you have the real thing.

Parries by Sahl's guests and cohost Pamela Mason did no good, and Sahl continued his attack for the rest of the show.

Later a tape of the show was screened by 20 gays and KCOP management, who agreed to invite Lesbians Sally Stewart and Sharon Cornelison; the Rev. Robert Sirico of Metropolitan Community Church and Morris Kight of the Gay Community Services Center to a March 25 taping with Sahl and a new cohost, who warmly welcomed the gay guests.

Sahl was sullen during the gays' discussion, kept changing the subject and finally stormed off the set. proclaiming: "I won't have this kind of bullshit on my show!"

That show was aired - a day late, and with apologies from KCOP broadcast both before and after the Sahl show. Winning that concession took a 24-hour sit-in, on Sahl's sound stage, by a group of 30 that dwindled to 13 before it was over. KCOP also agreed to discuss a separate broadcast on Lesbian/feminism in the future

North Dakota leaves sex alone

BISMARCK, N.D. – The North Dakota Legislature adjourned in March without making changes in sex-related provisions of the comprehensive revision of the state's criminal code that was approved in 1973.

As a result, on July 1 North Dakota will become the nation's eighth state not to outlaw same-gender sexual relations between consenting adults.

The 1973 revision was made effective in mid-1975 because it is the first full-scale redrafting of criminal laws since statehood in 1889, and legislators wanted to allow plenty of time for second thoughts.

There were amendments introduced this year, including one to change the age limit for cigarette smoking. It failed.

Thus, smoking tobacco continues to be illegal until age 18 – the same age at which gay sex becomes legal. The drinking age remains at 21.



The legislature is overwhelmingly Republican, and the separate votes on the sex provisions in 1973 were 46 to 4 (Senate) and 87 to 9 (House).

Sex between same-gender miroors is punished by a maximum 30-day sentence under the new code; sexual acts in a public place, and adult sex with a minor, will carry a 1-year maximum. Loitering and soliciting has a 1-year maximum, while forcible sex (heterosexual or homosexual) is punished by up to 20 years or life, depending on the circumstances.

John Graham, 34, the lawyer who is assistant director of the Legislative Council and who spent 18 months drafting the new code, said he knew of no voter reprisals at last November's elections, and only one candidate who used the sex provisions in his campaign.

"The fellow was running against one of the members of the interim committee which in 1972 proposed the code to the Judiciary Committees," Graham told CONTACT. "He charged that this was the man who was going to let homoexcubs run rampany in North Dakota. Of course he was soundly defeated by the incumbent — but it did have an effect on the incumbent."

In enacting the changes, Graham said, "One of the repeated problems we had was that legislators did not like a law, and did not like having to define an offense, but were afraid to take it off the books entirely. They were afraid it would look like they were condoning or encouraging it."

Penny leaves CHE

MANCHESTER, England – Howarth Penny resigned Dec. 20 as general secretary of the Campaign for Homosexual Equality, citing a disagreement with the Executive Committee over how he was to devote his time.

Gay News, the London biweekly, praised Penny's improvements in public relations for the gay-liberation group and the more active gay rights program Penny pursued during his 14 months in the job. Leaders on the Executive Committee, however, preferred more attention to running the office.

SAN ANTONIO - Three gay men sued an astronomy instructor for \$50,000 April 2 for damages caused by a homophobic letter to the editor in the San Antonio College campus newspaper

The gay men are Francis Thorne-Coley and brothers Roy and Michael Butler.


In his published letter instructor Michael Stewart quoted Leviticus against the men - in response to a news article announcing their lecture before the campus Psychology Club - and wondered why the club didn't also invite rapists, "syndicate" members and prostitutes to speak: "There is no difference in their "alternative life styles"

The lecture, the fifth by the gay trio at the college, broke attendance records and sparked two more invitations to speak on campus.

But Michael, who has since enrolled at San Antonio College, has been denied the use of the campus Catholic Student Union and finds himself shunned, the law suit alleges. Roy, a teen-ager who is former president of his DeMolay chapter, has been refused futher advancement in the Masonic order according to suit, drawn by lawyer Patsy Chevney,





50 protest slayings

SAN FRANCISCO - Close to 50 people, mostly transvestites and transsexuals attended a rally April 4 to protest police inaction over the slayings of four men in drag during the past four weeks and the stabbing of seven others in the city's Tenderloin district.

The deaths took place in the men's apartments, all in a 3-block radius. The non-fatal stabbings occurred in bars.

The protest group denounced police reports that there is no pattern to the assaults; police fears that organized protest would "drive the killer underground"; and police racism, in their hints that the slain men - two blacks and two Latinos - were drug users.

The group agreed on weekly meetings until the cases are closed, the meetings to be led jointly by Shannon O'Hare of the Gender Identity Clinic and Carol Lynn and the Rey, Ray Broshears, both of the Helping Hands Center around the corner, where the meeting took place.
