


#### What is NWSChat?

- A powerful situational awareness and coordination tool allowing instant messaging communication between NOAA's National Weather Service (NWS) and our core domestic and international partners.
- By simply going to a website, you access a chat room where you can communicate with NOAA/NWS offices such as the Washington Volcanic Ash Advisory Center (VAAC), and monitor NOAA/NWS products such as Volcanic Ash Advisories (VAAs), in real time, all in one place!






#### **Example: Forecast Collaboration in NWSChat**



#### 3. Common Name on Account

This is the name that your account will appear to others as in their Buddy List. You should enter something descriptive of you and your organization. (Nothing greater than 36 characters)

- Include your call letters, if you are media (Ex: kxyz-chief.meteorologist or KPXTV-Jane.Doe)
- Include your geography, if you are an ema (Ex: fulton-ga-ema-lastname)
- Include your agency and office, if you are government (Ex: faa-memphis-lastname)
- If fire or law/dispatch, include your jurisdiction and at least your last name
- If amateur radio, include your callsign (Ex: ARES-Smith-County-WD0TWU-Johnson

4. Contact Email Address

Your current work email address is required for account validation, resetting your password, and so we can contact you with NWSChat password expiration reminders and notices. This should be your official/work email address. Your email address will not be shared with anyone outside of NWSChat local and national administrators.

**Common Name Format:** 

(all lowercase)
mwo-location-last name
facility-location-last name

**Examples:** 






<u>IMPORTANT</u>: Enter your WORK email address, NOT a personal email address, if at all possible! We use this as a additional means of employment verification.





Iome > Mandatory Training **NWSChat Mandatory Training** 2. NWSChat Account Setup Access to the NWSChat system requires a valid account on the server. All users will have individual accounts. A valid account will consist of the users' affiliation and full name (e.g. nwswendy day@nwschat.weather.gov, or ham-john doe@nwschat.weather.gov). Although users must have an individual account using their name, NWSChat allows users the ability to operate under a 'handle' while using the system\*. Other chatroom users only see the 'handle' name, but the actual user named account is used for access and that information is maintained in internal (non-public) logs. This ensures individual accountability by the system while providing a level of anonymity, if the user chooses \*Note: The displaying of a personal name while using NWSChat is entirely at the discretion of the individual and their office/organization. NWS employees cannot be mandated to use their names as any part of an As an individual participant you are responsible for any activity that occurs under your account or user name You are responsible for maintaining the confidentiality of any and all passwords used for access to NWSChat. Your password is for your use only and that you may not give your password to any other person or cause the password to be distributed to other person(s). 


