

Clare towns and villages

Each of the towns in County Clare have their own unique characteristics.

Ennis G4 is at the beating heart of Clare. The atmospheric, winding medieval streets of this historic market town reveal intriguing characters and stories that shaped its history and are brought to life by local walking tour companies. Ennis is home to some wonderful attractions such as the Ennis Friary, Ennis Cathedral and Clare Museum. Ennis is also known as the 'Boutique Capital of Ireland', due to the variety of unique retail outlets on offer in the town.

Shannon H4 is Clare's youngest town and its international airport is the gateway to the West of Ireland and the world's first custom free zone.

Killaloe H5 nestled on the banks of Lough Derg, is the ancient capital of Ireland from the time of Brian Boru, and today a charming visitor base for exploring the River Shannon. Killaloe is a great activity hub, offering visitors a range of activities from walking trails to cruising to angling.

Scarriff G5 remains an important market town which offers excellent facilities for the visitor interested in either active pursuits or leisurely sightseeing. The town is a noted angling centre, with wide appeal for both coarse and game anglers in the surrounding East Clare Lakelands comprised of over 40 lakes and rivers.

Lisdoonvarna G3 in the north of the county is a popular town, long famed for its Spa Wells as well as its annual matchmaking festival.

Bunratty H4 Bunratty, Bun Raite in Irish, means the 'bottom' or end of the 'Ratty' river. This river, alongside the castle, flows into the nearby Shannon estuary. When visiting Bunratty one should not miss the opportunity to visit Bunratty Castle and Folk Park which is open all year round. Traditional Irish Nights take place regularly at the castle and are a great way to spend an evening. Great shopping, restaurants & bars are dotted throughout the village.

Kilfenora G3 a mere half hour drive from Ennis is the gateway to the Burren Region. A village steeped in a rich history and culture, Kilfenora is known in ancient manuscripts as the 'City of Crosses'.

Ennistymon G3 has long been a bustling market town for the North Clare area and is renowned for its many attractive traditional shop fronts and neighbours the popular resort of Lahinch.

Lahinch G3 is one of Ireland's most popular resorts, attracting thousands of visitors each year; the town is a world renowned for its surfing.

Kilrush H3 a heritage town has fine attractions; from its marina, the Vandeleur Walled Gardens to the Scattery Island Visitor Centre.

Milltown Malbay G3 situated on the Atlantic Coastline, is famed for its annual Willie Clancy School of Traditional Irish Music in July.

Doolin G3 is renowned for its cosy pubs and their traditional music. Here you will find stores filled with all kinds of traditional Irish crafts and clothing, the little town of Doolin has everything a traveller to Ireland might be looking for.

Aillwee Cave is Ireland's premier show cave. Visitors are guided on a 35 minute

stroll through caverns, over bridged chasms, beneath weird rock formations and alongside a thunderous waterfall. This stunning creation of nature was formed by the melt waters of a prehistoric ice age. 'Burren Birds of Prey Centre', located at Aillwee Cave in County Clare, features the largest display of Falcons, Harris Hawks, Owls, American Kestrels and White Tailed Sea Eagles in the country. Visitors will have the opportunity to see the birds in free flight, be able to handle and photograph rare birds of prey in a purpose built flying arena.

Caherconnell is one of the best-preserved stone forts in the Burren. Unique in

being the only one developed for tourism, it was built about 1500 years ago. Caherconnell incorporates Ireland's first Stone Fort virtual tour: an unprecedented re-creation of life, customs and design of the fort. The visitor centre also provides an audio visual presentation and a graphic display area. There is also a short history of other prominent local monuments including Poulnabrone Dolmen (3800B.C), Poulawack Cairn (3400B.C) and Cahercommaun stone fort, all of which have been excavated. The graphic display provides detailed information on these topics.

Craggaunowen – the Living Past Experience is Ireland's original award winning Pre-historic Park. Situated on

50 acres of wooded grounds, the Park interprets Ireland's pre-historic and early Christian eras. It features a stunning recreation of some of the homesteads, animals and artefacts which existed in Ireland over 1,000 years ago. Explore the Crannog, the Ring Fort, the Medieval Castle and the 'Brendan Boat' – a leather hulled boat built by Tim Severin who sailed across mid-Atlantic re-enacting the voyage of St. Brendan and the early Christian monks reputed to have discovered America centuries before Columbus.

Mooghaun Bronze Age Hillfort H4

Newmarket on Fergus.

Built at the beginning of the Late Bronze Age around 950 BC this site is enclosed by woodland and is a self guided trail up to the Hillfort which is identified as the largest in Ireland. The largest and most spectacular hoard of prehistoric gold in Western Europe was found at Mooghaun Lough 1km north of the hillfort and is on display in the National Museum of Ireland. Free Admission/Free Parking.



A favourite of local people, the nature reserve contains a rich array of flora and fauna as well as historical features such as an old oratory and a fulacht fia. Parking spaces are limited.








Galway

Galway is a county, an experience to be savoured and remembered.

Medieval **Galway City** is a whirlwind of activity. Don't miss the **Galway Arts Festival** – a vibrant visual spectacle and continually innovative.

Outside the city attractions include the **Aran Islands** with the Dún Aonghusa fort and fabled stone wall network. **Connemara** is celebrated for its ethereal beauty and has lots to see. At **Dan O'Hara's Homestead**, the Connemara history and heritage centre provides an insight into this wild and lyrical land, while nearby **Connemara National Park** and the magnificent **Kylemore Abbey** are 'must sees'.

Coole Park & Visitor Centre, once the home of Lady Gregory, is now a nature reserve. **Brigit's Garden** near Oughterard has 11 acres of native woodland and wildflower meadow.

Galway East a quiet, low lying landscape interlaced with stone walls, attractions such as **Athenry Castle & Heritage Centre**, hidden pearls like the pre-Christian **Turoe Stone**, **Clonfert Cathedral**, **Dartfield Horse Museum** and **Portumna Forest Park**.

While the Galway Races, Galway International Oyster Festival and the Clarenbridge Oyster Festival compete as the social events of the season, there's lots more on offer for you to see and do such as medieval banquets at Dunguaire Castle; a visit to the Ocean & Country Visitor Centre, Glengowla Mines or indeed the Ballinasloe Horse Fair, one of the most ancient gatherings in the region.

The first Ironman event in Ireland, Ironman 70.3 Series will take place in Galway, on September 4th 2011.

That's Galway – different, special and never, ever predictable.



Galway towns and villages

Galway's towns and villages are the type of places, those special, magical places that everyone wants to visit; that every visitor wants to return to; and that anyone lucky enough to live in, never, ever wants to leave.

Galway City E4 is the 4th largest City in Ireland (population circa 80,000). It began as a small fishing village centred on the estuary of the River Corrib, a river traditionally called Abhainn Na Gaillimhe (The Galway River) after Galvia, a mythological princess said to have drowned in its waters.

There is vibrancy to the friendly University City, which many delight in, and few forget. Music, festivals, horse racing, pubs, restaurants, shops, theatres and most of all Galway people, combine to create an atmosphere you will want to return to again and again.

Athenry E5 23km east of Galway City, contains some of the finest remaining town walls in Ireland including five towers and a town entrance known as North Gate. The castle, surrounded by its own curtain wall and towers, was constructed in three phases between the 13th and 15th centuries. It fell into ruin, but has recently been restored and each year hosts a medieval festival.

Ballinasloe E6 is a prosperous and expanding town 65km east of Galway City and is the main commercial/industrial centre for east Galway. The angling centre on the River Suck, which is renowned for its pike, bream, perch fishing in its more slow-running sections and trout in its tributaries. The town is famous for its annual horse fair and festival normally held in early October.

Cleggan D1 on the southern shores of sheltered Cleggan Bay, 9km from Clifden, is both the centre of the north Connemara sea fishing industry and the ferry port for Inishbofin Island Iving 9km out in the Atlantic.

Clifden D1 78km northwest of Galway City, is Connemara's largest town and regarded as its capital. With fine hotels, guesthouses and restaurants, it is the ideal base for the holiday maker whether touring Connemara or engaging in an outdoors holiday, with adventure centres, angling, walking, and stunning scenery and wildlife all on offer.

In Clifden in October 1907, a defining event in world communication took place when the first commercial transatlantic message was transmitted from Guglielmo Marconi's Station in Clifden to his North American complex in Glace Bay, Newfoundland, Canada. This message effectively launched the concept of telecommunication accessibility for all.

Clonbur D3 lies near Cong and the Mayo border and is an ideal centre for the trout angler as it nestles easily between the two great lakes Corrib and Mask. Try your hand at the excellent and exciting fishing on three of Europe's premier trout and salmon lakes, as Lough Carra is also within easy reach.

Gort F4 is located 38km from Galway City. The town was founded on the settlements of former chieftains of the district and is a now a recognised heritage town. Within it's hinterland you will find an amazing richness of historical sites such as the Kilmacduagh monastic settlement.

Headford E4 some 28km north of Galway City is a popular angling centre for the eastern shore of Lough Corrib and is also an area rich in archaeological monuments, ranging from prehistoric burial grounds, Iron Age stone enclosures, early Norman and later castles, to a bewildering array of monastic sites.

Kinvara F4 village is situated at the head of Kinvara Bay with Dunguaire Castle standing guard over its entrance. The village is one of Galway's well-loved tourist spots where medieval banquets are held nightly each summer in an old 16th Century tower house. Kinvara is home to the annual festival Cruinniú Na mBád (the Gathering of the Boats).

Leenane D2 is nestled snugly beneath the Maamturk Mountains on the southern inner shore of Killary Harbour – Ireland's only fjord. The village enjoys wonderfully scenic views of Mayo's Mweelrea Mountains across the dark blue waters of the harbour. The film 'The Field' was shot here and Leenane is also known for its outdoor pursuit's centres.

Letterfrack D1 is a delightful village 13km from Clifden. Today the village's old Victorian school buildings house a number of enterprises that form the nucleus of what is now Connemara National Park. A Furniture College linked to the Galway Mayo Institute of Technology is a thriving centre of activity for local and regional development.

Loughrea F5 sits on the shores of Galway's second largest limestone lake, after Lough Corrib. Loughrea's greatest jewel is its Cathedral, where you can see Irish artisan craftsmanship at its highest level – a treasure house of arts and crafts of Celtic revival.

Newbridge D5 is a small quaint rural village built on the River Shiven located on the N63 Galway City to Roscommon road. Nearby this rural village is an old graveyard that dates back to prehistoric times.

Oughterard E3 the 'Gateway to Connemara', offers the visitor an enjoyable and unforgettable experience. This is Lough Corrib's main angling centre and its hotels, guesthouses and pubs cater for the many anglers who come for the Mayfly dapping season in early summer and for the Daddy and Harry dap in early autumn.

Portumna F6 is a well-known tourist destination for boaters, golfers and anglers thanks to its natural amenities. The town is at the junction of the River Shannon and Lough Derg and so has a number of harbours for cruisers. This historic crossing point over the Shannon River between counties Tipperary and Galway has a long history of bridges and ferry crossings.


Rossaveal F2 village is 36km west of Galway city and the county's main fishing harbour. The village is also the ferry port for the short trip to the Aran Islands.

Roundstone E1 in the heart of Connemara is one of the oldest fishing villages on the west coast, and is an area of much natural beauty, as well as being the birth place and inspiration for much of Ireland's artistic creations. The village has been described many times as a botanist's delight as many of Ireland's rare wild flowers are found in the area known as Errisbeg which rises almost to 1,000ft (west of the village). Roundstone enjoys unparalleled views of the Twelve Bens and the vast Atlantic Ocean.

Spiddal F3 is an area which still manages to value the culture and traditions of Gaeltacht heritage. Its charming stone church, traditional pubs and excellent restaurants combine with a fine sandy beach to make Spiddal a favourite tourist stop.

Tuam D4 lies 32km north of Galway City and is one of the county's largest towns. Its skyline is dominated by two cathedrals – the marvellous chancel arch and windows, together with the restored 14th Century Synod Hall of St Mary's contrasting well with the soaring splendour of the tower and spires of the Cathedral of the Assumption.



CATHEDRALS. CHURCHES & POINTS OF INTEREST

Cathedral of Our Lady Assumed into Heaven and Saint Nicholas E4

Galway City. Tel: 091 563577, www.galwaycathedral.org
The huge octagonal dome of Galway Cathedral towers over Nuns Island and is
more reminiscent of Florence than the west of Ireland. It was the last major stone
church built in Ireland (1957 – 1965) and is located on the site of the Old Galway
Goal. Galway Cathedral boasts an impressive variety of interior art including
statues, mosaics and stained glass. Its architecture and design are truly eclectic.

St. Nicholas Collegiate Church E4

Founded in 1320, this Church remains one of the best-preserved of Ireland's medieval town churches featuring engaging gargoyles and exterior carvings of dragons. The mermaid figure is fitting in a church dedicated to the patron saint of mariners.

Lynch's Castle E4

A 12th Century castle which was extensively altered in 1966 when it was converted into a bank. The exterior preserves some of the few remaining Irish gargoyles and the arms of Henry VII, the Lynch family and the Fitzgerald's of Kildare. The stonework detailing around the windows is of very good quality and on the ground floor, historical material relating to the castle is on display.

Clonfert Cathedral F5

Near Ballinasloe, Co Galway,

In the 6th Century St. Brendan the Navigator founded a monastery in Clonfert. Today, Clonfert Cathedral is world-famous for its finely carved Romanesque style doorway, dating from 1200.

Na Seacht Teampaill (The Seven Churches) F2

Inis Mór, Aran Islands, Co Galway. Tel: 099 61263 (Aran Tourist Office). This is the finest example of a 12th Century monastic settlement. All that remains today is the ruins of two small churches, Teampall Bhreacáin and Teampall an Phoill, and some interesting early grave-stones and cross-inscribed slabs, and the broken pieces of three impressive Celtic crosses.

Church of Ireland Cathedral of St. Mary D2 Tuam, Co Galway.

The chancel and magnificent Hiberno-Romanesque arch, of a previous cathedral that was destroyed, survived and are now incorporated in St. Marys erected for the Church of Ireland between 1861 and 1878.

St. Brendan's Cathedral F5 Loughrea, Co Galway. Tel: 091 841212.

St. Brendan's Cathedral is arguably one of the country's greatest contributions to European art of the twentieth century and is an absolute must for anyone interested in modern Irish stained glass. Its only unusual architectural features are its double transepts but it is the decoration of the church interior that makes a visit such an enriching and spiritual experience.

The Promenade (Walkway) F4 Salthill, Galway City.

This walkway begins at Wolfe Tone Bridge, Galway City and continues for 4km with the fabulous vista of Galway Bay on your left, through Salthill village and on to the terminus of the walk at Blackrock. Local folklore has it, that you have not completed the walk unless you kick the wall at the end of 'The Prom' at Blackrock.

Spanish Arch E4 Galway City.

In front of Spanish Arch is an open quayside area where once French and Spanish galleons docked with cargoes of wines, silks and other cargo. Later this area was a fish market where local boatmen sold their catch in the 19th and early 20th Centuries. Local legend also has it that the Spanish Arch was the last point of land contact for Christopher Columbus prior to discovering America. The Columbus Sculpture was presented to the City of Galway by the City of Genoa on the 500th anniversary of the discovery of America.

The Claddagh Village E4 Galway City.

A visit to Galway City just isn't complete without a stroll through the Claddagh seafront on the bank opposite the Spanish Arch. The thatched cottages which were once home to the city's fisherman and their families are long gone, but the black hulls of currachs, Galway Hookers and Púcáns still contrast with the white swans of the Claddagh Basin. Nearby is the Dominican Church and its treasure, the 17th Century wooden statue known as 'Our Lady of Galway'. The world famous Claddagh ring owes its origins to this area of Galway.





Limerick's towns and villages

Limerick's towns and villages are brimful of warm, witty and welcoming locals – its many historic, cultural and architectural gems are just an added bonus!

Adare 14 with its broad main street lined with thatched houses and colourful doors, Adare has long been a much-admired stopping place for tourists. It is often referred to as 'Ireland's Prettiest Village'. Must see features of Adare are its three medieval abbeys, a 13th century castle and the Adare Heritage Centre, which incorporates some delightful craft and gift shops and an absorbing historic display recounting Adare's heritage.

Askeaton H4 This medieval village of (on the scenic N69 driving route) was once a stronghold of the Anglo-Norman Earls of Desmond. Today, the impressive ruins of Askeaton Castle dominate the town. Askeaton's Hellfire Club dating back to the 17th Century and the ruins of the well preserved 14th Century Franciscan Friary are also special features of the village.

Croom I5 The famous 5 line bawdy rhyme form, known as a limerick, was first devised here by 18th Century Maigue poets as they penned light hearted jibes and drinking songs to amuse themselves.

Foynes H4 Relive the pioneering days of transatlantic aviation in the Foynes Flying Boat Museum. Irish coffee was invented here by barman Joe Sheridan for the cold, weary travellers of the flying boat days.

Bruff I5 See the habitat and artefacts of Neolithic Man in Lough Gur, just outside Bruff one of Ireland's most important archaeological sites.

Kilcornan H4 Here you will find some fantastic family fun activities to keep you and your little ones entertained. Enjoy the great outdoors in the vast Curraghchase Forest Park consisting of some 600 acres of forest. Curraghchase was once the estate of the De Vere family and is known for its nature walks, ornamental gardens, arboretum and camping park.

Kilmallock 15 named after an early 7th Century saint is known as the crossroads of Munster. The Walled Town's rich architectural heritage is evident in its many national monuments, an interesting museum and history trail. The town is close to the Ballyhoura Mountain Biking Trails, the largest trail network of its kind in Ireland and an ideal place to get out biking or walking.

Newcastle West 14 is the County town of County Limerick and well worth a visit. The town is a shopper's delight with some fabulous boutiques and shops and is also home to the Desmond Banqueting Hall, an imposing two storey structure used by the Earls of Desmond for banqueting and entertainment.

Ardagh village 14 near Newcastle West is the site of the discovery of the exquisitely worked 8th century Ardagh Chalice now on display in the National Museum of Ireland

Murroe H5 to the east of the County is home to the Benedictine Monks of Glenstal Abbey, famed for their Gregorian chant.

Castleconnell H5 a picturesque village on the River Shannon and it is home to well stocked fishing waters.





Mayo


Jutting proudly into the Atlantic Ocean, Mayo boasts a stunningly beautiful unspoilt environment with a magical attraction for visitors.

Cosmopolitan towns exude charm and personality, as welcoming as the Mayo people themselves. The standard and availability of accommodation is excellent and the range of visitor attractions and activities expands each year. Unique highlights include climbing **Croagh Patrick**, Ireland's holy mountain with the starkly beautiful **National Famine Memorial** at its foot and spectacular views of **Clew Bay** and its many islands from the summit.

History comes alive at the world famous **Céide Fields** in North Mayo where man's imprint on the land dates back 5,000 years. **Foxford Woollen Mills** offers a glimpse of the county's industrial past while **The National Museum of Ireland – Country Life** just outside **Castlebar**, houses the national folk life collection depicting everyday life in Ireland from the 1850s to the 1950's.

Westport is one of Ireland's most popular towns, a planned town and one of Ireland's tidiest towns as evidenced by its consistent positioning in the National Tidy Towns competition. Westport House & Country Park is a magnet for families while Achill Island, beloved of artists, has Slievemore Deserted Village, a poignant reminder of a darker past. Knock Shrine in the east of the county was the scene of a miraculous apparition in 1879 while charming Cong will forever be associated with Hollywood and 'The Quiet Man' film.

Festivals are a part of life here, particularly in the summer months — will it be adventure sports, beach racing, arts, music or a children's festival? Quite simply, Mayo is amazing!





Mayo towns and villages

Achill Island B1 is Ireland's largest offshore island and connected to the mainland by a bridge over the causeway – Achill Sound. The island has glorious cliff scenery, spectacular drives and walks, beautiful beaches and good sea and shore angling. Early Christian, Famine and related artefacts make a visit to the island a must for the discerning tourist. Achill in recent years has become a hub for all kinds of water based activities – surfing, kayaking, canoeing and kite surfing. The island is also a part of the Irish speaking Gaeltacht area.

Ballina B3 is a busy industrial and commercial town on the estuary of the River Moy and is the cathedral town of the Catholic diocese of Killala. The town, the River Moy and the local area are world renowned in angling circles with tremendous lake, river and sea fishing all on offer. Anglers the world over dream of landing a salmon at the Ridge Pool located in the centre of the town. Ballina is also the birthplace of Mary Robinson who became the President of Ireland in December 1990, the first woman in Ireland to hold the office.

Ballinrobe D3 on the River Robe is at the centre of south Mayo's Lake District, with the angling waters of Loughs Mask, Carra and Corrib all close by. The stained glass windows by the renowned stained glass artist Harry Clarke, in St. Mary's Catholic Church are worthy of perusal while a genealogical service is provided by the South Mayo Family Research Centre based in the town. Ballinrobe has good sports facilities, including an excellent oolf course and a fine racecourse.

Belmullet A1 in the centre of the Barony of Erris and lying between the two bays of Broadhaven to the north, and Blacksod to the south, is the ideal place for a sea angling holiday. Nearby to the west is the renowned championship links golf Course at Carne. The Mullet Peninsula is an area of natural beauty and charisma and is also famous for the exceptional quality of birdlife found there.

Castlebar C3 located in the centre of the county, is the county town and administrative capital. Until the collapse of the 1798 Rising, Castlebar was the capital of the 'Provisional Republic of Connacht' – a memorial now stands at the entrance to the Mall in honour of the French soldiers who died on Irish soil that year. The pleasant tree-lined Mall, once a cricket pitch of Lord Lucan, is now a town park.

Cong D3 is a picturesque village nestled between the two lakes of Corrib and Mask. Whether you are an angler, a walker, a historian, or simply a lover of nature, a visit to this village is something you will always treasure. Cong Abbey, built in the 12th Century, was commissioned at the same time as the Cross of Cong, a masterpiece of religious art. The classic film 'The Quiet Man' was shot on location in the Cong area in 1951. Even today one can retrace John Wayne and Maureen O'Hara's footsteps, by taking a guided tour of the 'Quiet Man' locations.

Foxford B4 is a pleasant town on the River Moy and an angler's paradise. Foxford owes much to the Sisters of Charity who established the famous Foxford Woollen Mills in 1892. Admiral William Brown the founder of the Argentine Navy was born in Foxford. The 86km long Foxford Way, is one of Mayo's finest long distance waymarked walks.

Knock Village C4 is best known for its religious associations. On 21st August 1879 Our Lady, St. Joseph and St. John the Evangelist reportedly appeared at the gable of Knock Parish Church. From this miraculous occurrence Knock has grown to the status of an internationally recognised Marian Shrine. The village also boasts a fine Basilica and Knock Folk Museum which documents the story of the apparition and places it in the context of life at that time.

Louisburgh C2 at the mouth of the Bunowen River is the focal point of a region of innate beauty and is endowed with a large number of fine Blue Flag beaches. The area is notable for angling, surfing, swimming and nature trails and is the starting point of the famous Doolough Drive going from Louisburgh along by Doolough Lake, passing by Aasleagh Falls and ending up in Leenane, County Galway. This drive is both enchanting and thought provoking.

Westport C2 is a popular tourist destination and has won the Irish Tidy Towns Competition three times in recent years. Planned and designed by Richard Cassells and nestling in inner Clew Bay, this delightfully laid out town boasts elegant Georgian streetscapes and effortlessly friendly character making it an authentic but lively holiday base. The Westport area offers a wide range of sporting and outdoor activities including golf, sailing, angling, walking, cycling and horse riding. In nearby Murrisk Croagh Patrick provides an arresting backdrop to the town and has its pilgrim climb on the last Sunday of July each year.





The museum is housed in the beautifully-restored pre-penal church in the village of Straide. Michael Davitt was born and is buried in Straide and was evicted from his home here. Davitt was known as the "Father of the Land League" as a result of his work with the League and its success in getting Ireland's land returned to the people of Ireland.

The National Museum of Ireland – Country Life C3 Tel: 094 9031773. Located in the spectacular grounds of Turlough Park, near Castlebar amid magnificent gardens and an artificial lake. The modern museum building is located alongside the restored Turlough Park House and its adjoining courtyards.

The schoolhouse, which dates from 1929, recaptures the atmosphere of a classroom during the embryonic period of the Irish state and reflects a period in Irish education which straddled two centuries.

8km north west of Westport from 1879 to 1921 the station originally housed 12 coastguard families after which the buildings were handed over to the Free State government. The present owner, is restoring the buildings and researching the life and times of the coastguard in Ireland.

Touring Routes

We have chosen some great driving routes which will introduce you to many of the region's most famous sights and attractions and also to lesser known gems.

Please note that the length and recommended time of drives are approximate, depending on number of sites visited along routes and time spent there. Routes can be travelled in any direction and from any starting point, map illustrations are intended as a guide only, and routes should be used in conjunction with reference to a good road map of Ireland.



Route 1: Galway » Spiddal » Clifden

Distance: 123km (77 miles)

Explore the coastal area between Galway City and Clifden, a scenic landscape of granite rock and countless sea inlets.

Leaving Galway drive west on the **R336** towards **An Spidéal (Spiddal)** home to the Spiddal Craft village. Travel

onwards and turn left on to the R372 to Ros an Míl (Rossaveal) the ferry port for departures to the Aran Islands.

Return to the R336 northwards to Casla (Costelloe) then turn right onto the R374 and continue on to Béal an Daingin (Bealadangan) and enter the world of na hOileáin (the Islands). Drive to Lettermore and Gorumna Islands and onto Lettermullen on a series of bridges and causeways.

Back in **Casla** drive north on the **R336** until you arrive at a T-junction at **Scríb** (**Screeb**). Turn left onto **R340** and take the second turn left which will take you to the holiday cottage of **Padraig Pearce** at **Ros Muc (Rosmuck)**. Back on the **R340** follow the road around Kilkieran Bay and down to the little village of **Cill**





CONNEMARA - NORTH WEST COASTAL TOUR

of Connemara, comes into view.

Gurteen and Dog's Bay.

Route 2: Clifden » Renvyle » Letterfrack » Clifden

Distance: 98km (61 miles)

A coastal drive between **Clifden** and **Leenane**. Depart **Clifden** on the scenic Sky Road from where you can view the islands of Inishturk and Turbot. Continue on the Sky Road Loop to the



head of Streamstown Bay to join the **N59** north and then follow the signpost left to the village of **Claddaghduff**. Drive around the coast to **Cleggan** from where you can see the islands of Inishark and Inishboffin out in the Atlantic Ocean. Drive east on the **R341** rejoining the **N59** and on to **Letterfrack**. There you can visit the **Connemara National Park** 1,540 ha park and climb Diamond Hill (445m). Turning left in **Letterfrack** and crossing the Dawros river turn left again for **Renvyle** and the ruins of Renvyle Castle. Taking the narrow coast road to the left at **Tullycross** and keeping left you will reach a T-junction at **Salrock**. Turning left here will bring you to **Killary Harbour** and **Rosroe**, a tiny hamlet at the mouth of **Killary Harbour**, Ireland's only fjord. Return to the **N59** passing the lovely Lough Fee on your right. On reaching the **N59** a left turn will bring you to **Leenane** village (7km), while a right turn will bring you back to **Letterfrack** via **Kylemore Abbey**, once the castle of Mitchell Henry, M.P., with its beautiful woodland, Victorian Walled Garden, picturesque lake and since a Benedictine Monastery. From **Kylemore** it's just 5 km to **Letterfrack** before returning to **Clifden**.

Chiaráin (Kilkieran). A short journey of 8km brings you to **Carna**, the main town of the peninsula. Off the coast lies **MacDara Island** and **Mason Island**. As you travel along the road winding north by **Bertraghboy Bay** turn left on to the **R342**

with the **Twelve Bens** mountain range on your right. Passing through the village of **Caiseal (Cashel)** turn left onto **R341** at **Tuaim Beola (Toombeola)** and enjoy

the views of the Atlantic Ocean as you continue to **Cloch na Ros (Roundstone)**.

Connemara's most picturesque seaside village with its two magnificent sandy beaches

Continue westwards for 14 km to the little village of **Ballyconneely** with the ruins

of **Bunowen Castle**. Heading north on the **R341** you will soon pass the beautiful coral beach at **Mannin Bay** and **Derrigimlagh Bog** to the right. Nearby on the left is a large stone monument commemorating **Alcock and Brown's** landing in 1919.

Continue on the R341 until your final destination An Clochan (Clifden), the capital

CONNEMARA -THE VALLEY TOUR

Route 3: Clifden » Inagh Valley » Killary Harbour » Maam Valley

Distance: 100km (62 miles)

Take the **N59** Galway road from **Clifden** and drive eastwards for about 9 km until the wooded lake of Ballinahinch appears to the right. To the left are the Beanna Beola **Mountains**. Turning left onto



the **R344** to the **Inagh Valley**. To the right here are the **Maamturk Mountains** - Maam Tuirc (the pass of the Boar) - as the road winds around Derryclare **Lough** and **Lough Inagh**. The road leads us to the **N59** Clifden-Leenane road. Turn right and enjoy the panoramic views of **Killary Harbour** on the left before reaching the village of Leenane. From Leenane take the R336 and drive down the famous Maam Valley through Joyce Country to Maam. Turn right here (R336) continuing south across the Joyce river and Failmore Rivers as Kirkogue mountain. the eastern end of the Maamturks, rise to our right. On the right is Leckavrea mountain and Loughanielaun Lake. Arriving at Maam Cross turn right following the N59 westwards and back to Clifden through the small hamlet of Recess. A small detour to the left will bring you to **Ballinahinch Castle** and wonderful lake views. Return to the N59 and back to Clifden.

CORRIB -CORRIB COUNTRY TOUR

Route 4: Galway » Oughterard » Maam Cross » Cong » Headford » Galway

Distance: 106km (66 miles)

Take the **N59** northwest from Galway City. Passing through the village of Moycullen and the scenic Ross Lake on the right. The village of **Oughterard** comes into



view and on the right is **Aughnanure Castle**. on the shores of **Lough Corrib** once the finest fortified dwelling of the O'Flaherty Clan - open to the public during the summer. Returning to the main road continue to the delightful village of **Oughterard**. If time allows turn right in the village square and enjoy a 13km journey along the picturesque shoreline of **Lough Corrib**. Returning to Oughterard, turn on to the "scenic route" driving west on the N59 towards Maam Cross home to the replica of 'The Quiet Man' thatched cottage. At Maam Cross turn right on to the **R336** to **Maam** and **Maam Bridge**. Turn right here on to the R345 along the arm of Lough Corrib and views of Castlekirk Island with its 13th

Century castle. Drive on through **Cornamona**, then **Clonbur** and the beautiful village of **Cong** (Co Mayo), home to a 13th Century Augustinian Abbey, setting for the film 'The Quiet Man' and Ashford Castle. From Cong journey back to Galway on the R334 through Cross and into the town of Headford home of the Ross Errilly, a 14th Century house of the Franciscans, Heading towards **Galway** on the **N84**, a detour to the right will bring you to **Annaghdown** and its lovely bay on Lough Corrib and also a series of ecclesiastical ruins. Return to the N84 and continue back to Galway.

COUNTY GALWAY -THE NORTHERN TOUR

Route 5: Galway » Claregalway » Tuam » Mountbellew » Lackagh » Galway

Distance: 123km (77 miles)

Start on the N17 from Galway City to Claregalway, a village where you can see a Franciscan Friary and Burke Castle, Continuing on the N17 cross the Clare River



Century Catholic Cathedral and Tuam Mill Museum. Driving north on the N83 towards **Dunmore** with the now roofless Norman Castle of the De Berminghams and nearby a 14th Century Augustinian Abbey. From **Dunmore** travel southeast on the R328 to Movlough village. Take the N63 southeast to Mountbellew. a delightful village on the river Shiven. Returning to Galway on the N63 via **Abbeyknockmoy** where you can visit a 13th Century abbey built for the Cistercian Order, Leaving **Abbeyknockmov** on the **N63** you can stop off at Lackagh Museum before joining the N17 at **Knockdoe** and returning to **Galway**.

COUNTY GALWAY – THE EASTERN TOUR

Route 6: Galway » Oranmore » Athenry » Ballinasloe » Portumna » Galway

Distance: 150km (94 miles)

An interest in the past will certainly be rekindled by this tour through the heart of east Galway. From **Galway City** take the **R446** to **Oranmore**. Continue on the



R446 and turn left on to the R348 for Athenry which proudly claims to be the finest surviving medieval town in Ireland with the Bermingham castle and a Dominican Priory. Athenry is a bustling town with a number of charming cafés and shops. Driving around the Priory turn left for Kilconnell (R348). This journey brings you through the countryside to New Inn and on to Kilconnell, where lies an impressive 14th Century Franciscan Friary. Drive east to Ballinasloe, famous for its annual October Horse Fair. Take some time to explore this ancient town and its many fine stone buildings before driving back towards Galway on the R446. Turn left on to the R355 for Portumna, a Georgian town, whose attractions include Portumna Castle & Gardens, Portumna Forest Park, and Portumna Dominican Friary. Leaving Portumna take the N65 to Loughrea, where you can visit Loughrea Cathedral and a Carmelite Abbey. 5km north of Loughrea lies the Turoe Stone. Driving back on the R446 you will pass through the villages of Craughwell and Oranmore on the journey back to Galway City.

COUNTY GALWAY – A SOUTHERN TOUR

Route 7: Galway » Kinvara » Ardrahan » Gort » Galway

Distance: 80km (50 miles)

This short tour explores south Galway, the region between Gort and Kinvara. Depart **Galway** on the **R446** and follow the coast road through **Oranmore** village. Turn right on to the **N18** passing



Clarenbridge, famous for its Oyster Festival and into Kilcolgan. Turn right on to the N67 for Kinvara, a quaint seaside village dominated by Dunguaire Castle and Drumacoo monastic site. Heading east on the R347 on to a charming village of Ardrahan with a wide market square and cross, you can still view the gable of a medieval church standing in the churchyard. From here travel south on the N18 to the town of Gort rich in history such as the ancient monastic site of Kilmacduagh, Coole Park, Thoor Ballylee, the Kiltartan Gregory Museum and Gort Heritage Centre. From Gort take the N18 north back to Galway.

NORTH MAYO TOUR

Route 8: Ballina » Killala » Belmullet » Crossmolina » Ballina

Distance: 140km (87 miles), excluding the Mullet Peninsula.

This tour explores the northern coastline of Mayo taking in **Céide Fields** the most extensive Stone Age site in the world, the **Mullet Peninsula** and some of the most superb cliff scenery in Ireland.



Leaving **Ballina** take the **R314** to the well known angling town of **Killala**. From there journey on to the village of **Ballycastle**. There you may divert to the right to **Downpatrick Head** and **Benwee Head** which includes some of the most dramatic sea cliffs in the country. Continuing west you arrive at **Céide Fields** and the pyramid-shaped Visitor Centre. Near the centre, the road runs parallel to the spectacular cliffs of **Céide** - 112m at the highest point. These cliffs are dangerous especially for children. Back in the car continue westward passing **Belderg** prehistoric farm on the left and blanket bog on the right. Continue on to **Belmullet** and the **Mullet Peninsula** an area of uspoilt natural beauty. **Carne** the renowned 18-hole golf links is located here. Leaving **Belmullet** take the **R313** to **Bangor** before joining the **N59** to **Crossmolina** and back to **Ballina**.

NORTH-EAST MAYO TOUR

Route 9: Ballina » Crossmolina » Foxford » Swinford » Ballina

Distance: 135km (84 miles), excluding detours

Journey through the scenic 'lake district' of northeast Mayo, the Moy Valley and the Ox Mountains.

Leaving **Ballina** take the **N59** to **Crossmolina**, Turn left on to the



R315 and visit the North Mayo Family Heritage Centre at Enniscoe House.
Return to the R315, and continue to Pontoon, renowned for its angling. Take the R310 through the beautiful 'lake district' with Lough Conn to the left and Lough Cullin to the right. Continue on the R318 to Foxford, where a visit to the award winning Foxford Woollen Mills is a must. Leaving Foxford take the N58 to Straide, with its Friary and the Michael Davitt Museum. Then on to Ballyvary and take the N5 eastward to Swinford and then the N26 to Foxford. Enroute you may divert right and visit the unforgettable Hennigan's Heritage Centre. Returning to the N26 driving north takes you back to Ballina via Foxford.

EAST MAYO TOUR

Route 10: Castlebar » Claremorris » Knock » Swinford » Castlebar

Distance: 116km (72miles), excluding detours

This tour takes in the undulating plains of east Mayo, with many interesting places to visit on the way.

Depart Castlebar on the N60 for

Claremorris passing through Breaffy, Manulla, and Balla where you can take a detour to Mayo Abbey and the site of the illustrious monastery from which the county got its name. Returning to the N60 continue to Claremorris and then take the N17 to Knock. After a visit to Knock Shrine and Folk Museum take the R323 to Ballyhaunis with its Augustinian friary. From here travel north on the N83 rejoining the N17. Continue north passing by Ireland West Airport Knock, turn left on to the N5 to explore the town of Swinford and village of Bohola. A detour on the way back to Castlebar to visit the Museum of Ireland - Country Life at Turlough Park is a "must see". This is where visitors can develop an understanding of life in Ireland during the 19th and 20th Centuries. Depart Turlough, rejoin the N5 and return to Castlebar.




Route 11: Castlebar »
Ballintubber » Ballinrobe »
Cong » Headford » Castlebar

Distance: 100km (62miles), excluding detours

A journey through south Mayo's interesting and scenic 'lake district'.

Begin in **Castlebar** and take the **N84** towards Ballinrobe. Approx. 11km from **Castlebar** follow the



signs to the left and visit the restored **Ballintubber Abbey**. Rejoin the **N84** and follow the signs for **Moore Hall**. After visiting Moore Hall and taking in the beauty of Lough Carra travel on to **Ballinrobe**. Carrying on take the **R334** and then the **R345** to Cong where you can visit the ruins of Cong Abbey, Ashford Castle and some of the scenes immortalised in the film 'The Quiet Man'. Take the **R334** to **Headford**, a popular angling centre for Lough Corrib. Then taking the **N84** north, through **Ballinrobe** to **Partry** where you may consider a detour on the **R330** to explore **Tourmakeady**, a Gaeltacht (Irish Speaking) area in beautiful surroundings on the western shore of **Lough Mask**. Returning to the **N84** continue the journey back to **Castlebar**.



SOUTH-WEST MAYO TOUR

Route 12: Westport » Murrisk » Louisburgh » Leenane » Westport

Distance: 75km (47miles)

Experience the scenic mountainous peninsula that lies between Clew Bay and Killary Harbour, one of the most beautiful parts of Ireland.

Leaving **Westport** follow the signs for Westport Quay where it's worth

visiting **Westport House** and the **Clew Bay Heritage Centre** if time allows. Continue on the **R335** to **Louisburgh** enjoying wonderful views of Clew Bay with its numerous islands which are actually submerged drumlins! At **Murrisk**, **Croagh Patrick**, Ireland's 'holy mountain' is to our left and on the right are **Murrisk Abbey** and the **National Famine Monument**. Follow the **R335** to **Louisburgh** and the **Granuaile Centre**. Turn left on the **R335** signposted **Leenane** passing through **Doo Lough Valley** and **Delphi Valley**. This drive is exquisite at any time of year. After crossing the Burdorragha River, **Delphi Adventure Centre** on the right caters for residential and day-visitors. It's worth noting that much of the film 'The Field' was shot in Delphi Valley and the Leenane area. Continue past the famous **Aasleagh Falls** waterfall on the Erriff River and at the innermost point of Killary Harbour turn right to **Leenane**. From **Leenane** take the **N59** back to **Westport** via **Errif** with the Partry Mountains on your right.

WEST MAYO TOUR

Route 13: Westport » Newport » Achill Island » Westport

Distance: 86km (54miles)

This tour takes in from Westport to Achill Island along the east and north shores of Clew Bay.

From **Westport** take the **N59** to **Newport**. Before crossing the **Newport River** at the entrance to the town, the details of one



of Ireland's finest walking trails from **Newport** to **Bangor** (48km) are displayed. There are a number of walking trails in this region which you should explore if time allows. On the right is the abandoned seven arch viaduct bridge erected in 1892 to carry the **Westport** to **Achill** railway line. Driving through **Newport** you will see signposts for the **'Nephin Drive'** - one of the most beautiful drives in Ireland. Returning to the **N59** about 3km further on you will find a sign to the left for **Burrishoole Abbey** and a few miles further along the main road we have **Carrigahowley Castle** (alias Rockfleet), one of the homes of the legendary Pirate Queen, **Granuaile (Grace O'Malley)**. Back on **N59** we head towards **Mulranny** where we can explore the **Corraun Peninsula** (a Gaeltacht area) which is the entrance to **Achill Island**. After visiting **Achill**, as you return to **Westport**, driving through **Mulranny**, you may turn left on the **N59** in order to explore the Ballycroy region and the **Ballycroy National Park** before returning to **Westport**.

THE LIMERICK DRIVE

Route 14: Limerick City » Adare » Newcastle West » Dromcollogher » Rath Luirc » Kilmallock » Hospital » Limerick City

Distance: 134km (83 miles)

This drive begins in the bustling city of **Limerick** and brings you through a green and fertile land where livestock graze and visitors



take their time. Take a south westerly route out of the city on the **N21** Limerick to Tralee/Killarney road and head for the beautiful village of Adare where the streets are lined with Tudor style thatched cottages. Enjoy 5 star luxury in **Adare Manor** hotel and explore a unique cluster of mediaeval religious houses. Follow the signposts to the woodland estate and lakes around the shell of 18th century **Curraghchase House**, once home of the poet Aubrey de Vere, now a State forest and park. Continuing on, the **N11** will bring you to the busy market town

of **Rathkeale** and south to the attractive riverside town of **Newcastle West**. Turning southeast on the Cork Road **R522** and head to **Dromcollogher** home of the National Dairy Co-Op Museum and hand crafted Irish Dresden. Travelling east through **Rath Luirc (Charleville)** on the **R515** you come to **Kilmallock** with its important mediaeval past and a great base from which to explore the Ballyhoura Mountains. Continue eastwards and watch out for the **R513** left turn for **Limerick**. This road brings you to **Hospital**, a village named for the Knights Hospitallers of Crusader times and where you will find remnants of their great church and a splendid effigy of a knight in armour. A short trip north brings you to see the habitat and artefacts of Neolithic Man in **Lough Gur**, one of Ireland's most important archaeological sites. And finally you return northwards to **Limerick City**.

ESTUARY DRIVE

Route 15: Limerick City » Foynes » Tarbert » Killimer » Labasheeda » Killydysert » Clarecastle » Bunratty » Limerick City Distance: 207km (135 Miles)

The scenic drive along the **N69** takes you from Limerick City to North Kerry following the southern coastline of the **Shannon Estuary**.



a magnificent stretch of tidal water. Here you'll find delightful towns and villages and world famous **shore fishing** sites. Relive the pioneering days of transatlantic aviation in the **Flying Boat Museum** in **Foynes**, home of the **Irish Coffee** drink which in the past warmed the cockles of one's heart while en route to North America and Europe. Further west, just over the Kerry border in Tarbert, you can journey across the Shannon Estuary to **County Clare** by ferry. While crossing, watch out for the bottlenose dolphins that live in the Shannon Estuary.

Disembark in **Killimer** and you can make a short diversion west to the maritime town of **Kilrush** before heading east along the shoreline to the pretty waterside villages of **Labasheeda** and **Kildysart**. The drive north eastwards will bring you to **Clarecastle** where you can divert a few kilometres north to the very attractive town of **Ennis**, the capital town of County Clare. Turning south your return journey to Limerick City brings you past **Shannon Airport** and one of Ireland's favourite tourist destinations, **Bunratty** village. **Bunratty Folk Park** recreates rural and urban life in 19th century Victorian Ireland while 15th century **Bunratty Castle** reveals the power struggles in Clare's past. Here too you will find excellent shopping and dining opportunities. And finally a short drive south brings you to **Cratloe Woods** where you can stretch your legs and admire the view before returning to **Limerick City**.

LOOP HEAD PENINSULA

Route 16: Kilrush » Carrigaholt » Kilbaha » Loop Head » Cross » Kilkee » Kilrush

Distance: 81km (50 Miles)

One of Clare's most scenic drives takes you around **Loop Head Peninsula**, the county's most south-westerly point. The cliff girdled peninsula with the Atlantic



on one side and the Shannon Estuary on the other is one of Ireland's best kept secrets. Heading southwest of **Ennis** on the N68 you come to the maritime town of **Kilrush** on the Shannon Estuary. Follow the coast road to the small fishing village of **Carrigaholt** where you can buy freshly caught fish from Clare's Atlantic fishermen. Stop a while in **Kilbaha**, the last parish before America, before heading west to the very tip of Loop Head. The lighthouse that stands at the tip of Loop Head has been flashing its warning signal for 300 years. On the journey north park at the **Bridges of Ross** for sightings of rare seabirds. Continue on to the very popular seaside resort of **Kilkee** with its fabulous crescent beach and marvellous Victorian streetscape. On your return to **Kilrush** do make time to include a 20 minute ferry trip to the monastic ruins of **Scattery Island**.

LOUGH DERG DRIVE

Route 17: Ballina/Killaloe » Ogonelloe » Mountshannon » Portumna » Terryglass » Dromineer » Nenagh » Portroe » Ballina/Killaloe

Distance: 125km (78 Miles)

Lough Derg is the largest and one of the most beautiful of the lakes on the **River Shannon**. There are many ways of enjoying the beauty



of Lough Derg. Sailing, cruising or canoeing along its magnificent 40kms/25mls or travelling the roads that hug the shoreline. The picturesque twin towns of **Ballina/Killaloe**, sited at the southern tip of the lake provide the perfect starting point. Travelling clockwise around the lake you'll find one of the best viewing spots of the entire drive near the village of **Ogonelloe**. A little further north, the pretty village of **Mountshannon** is one of the busiest cruising and yachting centres on Lough Derg and a great place to stop and eat. **Portumna**, the town at the head of the lake, is another busy cruising centre with a delightful **Forest Park** to ramble in and a restored Castle to visit. Heading south along the eastern shore you come

to the charming village of **Terryglass**. You can continue to hug the shoreline to **Dromineer**, a great centre for fishing and boating, or head to the busy market town of **Nenagh**. Travel back to the lakeside through Newtown and drink in the views from **Portroe**. Your journey ends back at the southern tip in **Ballina/Killaloe** where excellent food and drink will complete an idvllic journey.

BURREN BEAUTY

Route 18: Kilfenora » Lisdoonvarna » Fanore » Black Head » Ballyvaughan » Carran » Kilfenora

Distance: 68km (42 Miles)

The **Burren** region of Clare extends over 160 sq kilometres/100 sq miles. Mostly made up of bare, grey limestone rock, the weather has cracked and creviced the rock



over time to produce amazing patterns on the land. Bordered by the Atlantic Ocean and the quieter waters of Galway Bay, the Burren is a rock garden of extraordinary proportions. The drive will bring you through mountainous terrain, beautiful sea views and unspoilt valleys. Your route encircles the Burren, beginning at the ancient cathedral town of **Kilfenora** with its excellent Burren Interpretive Centre.

The road westward leads through the spa town of **Lisdoonvarna**. Signposts for **Fanore** and **Black Head** show the way to the coast. Stop anywhere and enjoy the Atlantic air and amazing landscape. When travelling around **Black Head** watch out for the little lighthouse below the road and the distant hills of Connemara across Galway Bay. A few kilometres westward lies the charming coastal village of **Ballyvaughan**, a perfect spot to break your journey and to explore the **Ailwee Cave**. From Ailwee the road south will bring you past the ancient monuments of **The Poulnabrone Dolmen** and **Caherconnell Stone Fort**.

In **Carran** you could also visit the delightful **Burren Perfumery** for an extra sensory experience or learn about the founder of the greatest amateur sporting organisation in the world in **The Michael Cusack Centre**. To the south of Poulnabrone the ruins of **Lemaneh Castle** stand by the roadside. A right turn there would bring you back to **Kilfenora** completing the circuit. But the left turn sets you on the way to **Ennis**. Passing the beautiful **Lough Inchiquin** you come to **Corofin** where the **Clare Heritage Centre** offers a genealogical research service. Round off your trip in **Ennis** where you'll have your choice of accommodation and fine dining.


THE ATLANTIC DRIVE

Route 19: Ennis » Lisdoonvarna » Ballyvaughan » Blackhead » Doolin » Cliffs of Moher » Lahinch » Spanish Point » Kilkee » Ennis Distance: 204km (127 Miles)

A north to south route along Clare's Atlantic coastline is a memorable journey. Travel south along the spectacular road that hugs the



coastline around **Black Head** and watch the Atlantic rollers break on the beach in **Fanore**. Take time to enjoy the cream of Irish traditional music in **Doolin** village or to visit the dramatic Doolin Cave. Stand on the **Cliffs of Moher** world renowned for their scale and beauty and gaze at the ocean below. Enjoy the panoramic views of the Aran Islands and the Atlantic Coast. Continue south to eat ice cream on the sheltered golden sands of **Lahinch** and **Spanish Point**, named in memory of the wreck of Spanish Armada ships in 1588 and finish your journey in the lively seaside town of **Kilkee**. This route can also begin and end in Ennis heading first for **Ballyvaughan** and returning from **Kilkee**.

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

Angling

Pristine waters, a wealth of fish and hundreds of miles of coastline, riverbank and lakeshore, it's a dream holiday for devotees of rod and line! The West is home to some of the finest game, coarse and sea angling the country has to offer.

- > Trout Fishing The Western Lakes are recognised as some of the greatest wild brown trout fisheries in the world and regularly produce specimen fish. Lough Corrib is the most famous. Lough Mask and Lough Conn are exceptional trout fisheries, while the Moy Estuary is the ideal location for sea trout.
- > **Salmon Fishing** The River Moy is one of the most prolific salmon rivers in Europe. The famous Ridge Pool draws thousands of anglers each year. Castleconnell Salmon Fishery on the River Shannon is another renowned fishery. There are dozens more rivers to choose from in the West also offering superb salmon fishing, all in spectacular countryside.
- > Coarse Fishing Anglers favouring coarse fishing should head for the inland rivers and lakes of Galway East and Clare. Numerous rivers and streams flow into the River Shannon offering some of the best pike and coarse fish stocks in Ireland.
- > Sea Fishing The waters off the west coast are warmed by the Gulf Stream, ensuring a longer season and an unusual variety of warmwater fish. There is excellent shore fishing to be had at numerous locations along the coast.

Do I need a licence to fish in Ireland?

In Ireland you do not need a license to fish for trout, coarse species or in the sea. However, if you intend to fish for salmon or sea trout you must have a State Salmon & Sea Trout Fishing License (both available as a National License or a District License). Permits are required for private fisheries. For information about the regulations for fishing in Ireland, visit www.fishinginireland.ie

Gardens

The gardens of the West of Ireland are well-known for their beauty, variety and uniqueness. Rain, soft sunshine and the warmth of the Gulf Stream combine to make ideal conditions for the creation of magnificent and magical gardens.

The general landscape varies greatly throughout the region, from the stone walled farmlands to rolling hills and fresh waters of Lough Corrib and the River Shannon, to the wild mountains and valleys. Within this landscape lie garden treasures that have been laid out by a variety of local people.

The coastal location means that plants are adapted to a moist maritime climate, but the Gulf Stream ensures that the region does not suffer from the extremes of temperature experienced by many other countries on the same latitude. This proximity to the Atlantic can also cause problems as salt and storm can be a challenge to every plant and tree. The soil is acidic and shallow in many places and much needed nutrients must then be added to make it fertile. This is a challenging environment for gardeners, but they ensure that the flora and fauna follow the weather patterns of the West. Hydrangeas, rhododendrons and heather are common features in gardens here as are azaleas and camellias - and even the odd palm tree!

The gardens here range in size and style, from formal to wild. Many feature exotic plants which were imported at the turn of the 20th Century and others have concentrated on the discovery and preservation of gardens which are over 300 years old. Each garden has its own story which we hope you will explore and enjoy.



Islands of the West of Ireland

Looking out over the Atlantic Ocean, tasting the salt on your lips and feeling the sea breeze on your face, nothing invigorates like a visit to the islands off the West coast of Ireland. These islands embody the soul of Ireland and this is predominately where the Irish language and culture is still vibrant.

Wild and beautiful the islands have captured the imagination for thousands of years and provided stimulus for artists and writers such as J.M. Synge, Paul Henry, Heinrich Boll and Graham Greene. The perception that the islands were remote has changed dramatically in recent years and now almost all are easily accessible by boat, plane or by road as in the case of Achill Island.

Be sure to plan carefully for your visit to the islands - some are very busy in high season (especially July & August) and very few have ATM banking facilities.

We ask that you please leave the islands as you find them. Respect the environment and dispose of litter in bins or take it away with you. Take care; a visit to the islands is a unique experience but always be aware that these landscapes are exposed to the elements, island terrain is mainly rugged and the Atlantic Ocean can sometimes be wild and unpredictable.

COUNTY GALWAY

Oileáin Arainn (Aran Islands)

The three Aran Islands Inis Mór (Inishmore), Inis Meáin (Inishmaan) and Inis Óirr (Inisheer) are situated in a north westerly, south easterly direction at the mouth of Galway Bay. These islands are famous for their geological formation, historical monuments and cultural heritage. Irish is the first language of the islanders and is still spoken in everyday life. The islands are rich with flora and fauna and have wonderful clean beaches.

Inis Mór

Inis Mór is the biggest of the Aran Islands and one of Ireland's most popular tourist destinations.

"Next parish Boston" one can truthfully say when gazing down on the sparkling clear Atlantic Ocean from the UNESCO Heritage Site Dún Aonghasa cliff face. Also scattered throughout the island are the remnants of 12th century high crosses and churches.

Here you can still see the Aran Jumper being knitted and experience other local crafts such as basket weaving.

The island is not all about history, it is guite common to stumble across a traditional music or dance session which have been known to continue into the early hours. While Kilmurvey is the island's Blue Flag Beach, there are many others to choose from where you can relax, stroll, swim, dive or surf.

Inis Meáin

Meaning 'middle island', is the least visited of the three Aran Islands and allows the visitor to immerse themselves in Irish culture and traditions. The unique and traditional Inismeáin Knitwear is produced here and exported to the fashion capitals of the world.

Inisméain too has many sites of historical interest, e.g. Church of the King's Seven Sons, a number of holy wells and the prehistoric stone fort of Dún Chonchúir which is very well preserved and from its high point you can enjoy breathtaking panoramic views.

While spending time here the famous writer, John Millington Synge got inspiration for his plays. Synge's Cottage is now a museum and is open during the tourist season.

Inis Óirr

You may not know it but you're probably already familiar with Inis Óirr! The opening credits of the Father Ted television series feature one of the island's shipwrecks – the cargo vessel 'Plassy'.

Inis Óirr, meaning "south island", is the smallest of the three islands and is a tranquil place, perfect for quiet contemplation and relaxed walks. The island is small enough to see entirely on foot.

Ancient monuments worth a visit include the ruins of Teampall Chaomhain (St Kevin's Church), O'Brien's Castle - a 15th Century tower house which stands within a stone fort, St. Gobnait's Church and the Holy Well of St. Enda. At Áras Éanna Arts Centre, you can attend workshops, see exhibitions and learn about the island's traditional culture.

As you'd expect there are superb beaches ideal for swimming or surfing, walking routes and magnificent views across to the mainland and Connemara. **Festivals include:** Inis Óirr Currach Races; 13th & 14th August 2011.

Inishbofin Island

Is located off the west coast of Connemara and is renowned for its impromptu music sessions featuring wonderful local and visiting musicians. Visitors here are captivated by the island's allure and magnificent scenery. Inishbofin is an ecologist's joy with its array of flora and fauna and boasts excellent loop walks, two Green Coast beaches and crystal clear waters ideal for scuba diving enthusiasts. The island's stunning natural harbour makes it an ideal sailing base.



COUNTY CLARE

Scattery Island

Scattery Island is a small uninhabited island at the mouth of the River Shannon near Kilrush, in south west Clare.

The island has a rich and unusual history associated with it, most of which centres around the life of St. Senan, the founder of the monastery on the island, in the sixth century. Scattery Island was an ecclesiastical centre in early times. St. Senan's monastery suffered severely as a consequence of the Viking raids of the ninth and tenth centuries, an attack from Brian Boru and later it was almost demolished in Tudor times during the reign of Queen Elizabeth when she suppressed all monasteries in Ireland. Scattery has also served as a place of safe harbour for the Spanish Armada and as a defence outpost for the English government, from which time the 18th century battery built to defend against a French invasion dates.

Today the island contains the ruins of the old monastic site featuring a round tower damaged by lightening, a primitive stone cathedral, an oratory, Teampall Senain and St Senan's Bed, and the church of Ard na nAingeal, where the Archangel Michael is said to have appeared to St. Senan. Along with these monastic ruins, the island is adorned with beautiful semi-natural grassland which is of great interest to ecologists who visit here.

Holy Island

Holy Island on Lough Derg and the river Shannon is one of the most famous monastic sites in Ireland. Its many attractions include a well-preserved Round Tower, the ruins of six churches, a Holy Well, a unique graveyard with slabs dating from the eight century, Bullaun Stones, a cell like structure, which is one of the most extraordinary buildings in Ireland and a 'bargaining' stone where many a marriage was brokered. Their secluded position has enabled them to survive in a wonderful state of preservation.

The Island is chiefly associated with St. Caiman who died in 653 AD. In his time it was a great center of learning.

Like all monasteries it suffered badly from Viking attacks, the first recorded being in 836 AD. Brian Boru rebuilt the monastery and his brother Marcan was abbot there.



Walking & Cycling

It's easy to see why walking and cycling are such popular pursuits for visitors to the West of Ireland. The options are so diverse. Get off the beaten path and enjoy the scenery, the tranquillity and the solitude.

You'll find signposted walks in and around most of the larger towns and cities. Enquire at your nearest Tourist Offices for more details.

Outside of the towns there are longer waymarked trails which typically include a combination of on and off road walking. Hill walkers will find their Mecca in Connemara, on the cliffs of Clare or on the mountains of Mayo and on Achill Island where the choice of challenging peaks is exceptional and the vista unsurpassed. Shorter looped walks are always coming on stream — visit your nearest Tourist Office for more information.

The Burren National Park in Co. Clare or the Connemara National Park located near Letterfrack in Co. Galway and Ballycroy National Park in Co. Mayo offer walks and trails suitable for all levels of fitness and interests.

Ireland has a great network of rural roads and we are adamant that the most picturesque are here in the West! Most of the roads are minor routes where traffic is often likely to consist of sheep and tractors.


Guided cycling tours and bicycle hire are readily available.

The World Class Great Western Greenway between Newport and Mulranny (Co Mayo) is an 18km traffic free cycling and walking facility following the route of the famous Newport/Mulranny Railway. This is the longest off road cycling facility in Ireland and forms part of the National Cycle Network.



- > Horse Racing takes place in Galway, Mayo (Ballinrobe) and Limerick. The renowned Galway Racing Festival, one of Ireland's premier race meetings, takes place from Monday 25th Sunday 31st July 2011.
- > Arts Festivals include such events as The Galway Arts Festival the foremost arts festival in Ireland, the Clifden Community Arts Festival, the Iniscealtra Festival of Arts, Mountshannon, Cuisle Limerick International Poetry Festival and the Westport Arts Festival.
- > Music & Dance festivals provide much variety for the social enthusiast. Traditional examples include Scoil Acla Music & Dance Festival (Achill Island), the Galway Sessions (Galway City), the Willie Clancy Summer School (Miltown Malbay), the Summer Music on the Shannon (Limerick), the Fleadh by the Feale (Abbeyfeale) while other varieties include the Castlebar Blues Festival and the Westport Folk & Bluegrass Festival.
- > Children's Festivals The Baboró International Arts Festival in Galway City and the Roola Boola Children's Arts Festival in Castlebar, Co. Mayo, both taking place in October 2011, are the primary children's events in the West of Ireland.
- > Maritime Festivals Include the Cruinniú na mBád Festival, celebrating the living tradition of sailing the beautiful Galway hookers and the Doonbeg Seafood festival.
