### Hi everyone,

Happy World Thinking Day to you all. As you know Ireland is one of the focus countries for the World Thinking Day theme chosen by WAGGGS. January's Trefoil News had lots of activities for Thinking Day celebrations. This is a good time to have District and Area get togethers. Ceremonies for World Thinking Day take on a whole new meaning when we join with other Units to celebrate. It helps to give the girls an awareness that Guiding is not just what happens in their Unit.

We are delighted to announce that three new part-time members of staff joined the staff team in the New Year.





### Your Unit: Room for One More?

World Thinking Day is just around the corner and each year we normally focus on Guiding around the world, and what it means to each of its 10 million members, and how Guiding has enriched our lives.

Guiding is an important movement for girls, both internationally and locally. Imagine then, if this year we were able to share the Guiding light with even more girls. Across Ireland, more than 500 Units will be celebrating and thinking about our Guiding sisters.

Imagine though, if each of those Units, was able to make space for one more girl! Just one. Not twenty. <u>JUST THE ONE!</u>



That one girl who you know is interested but you think "let her wait until September, we're halfway through the year".

Or that one girl on your waiting list who is already practising her knots in anticipation of joining.

We all know one. We probably know more but might think, "I just don't have the space".

Well why don't we make the space, right now? Why wait?

Imagine if even half our Units were able to take on just one more girl, what a difference we could make to our membership figures in a very short space of time.

Obviously we encourage you to ASK JUST ONE new girl to join your Unit in February but we also understand that you must keep within the ratios laid out in IGG's Handbook so if you are running at maximum capacity then that is okay.

### Ladybirds

The Maximum number of girls in a Ladybird Unit is 24.

At Meetings: 1 Adult to every 8 girls (at least 2 adults present) On Outings: 1 Adult to 4 girls (at least 2 adults with the group)

On Outings: 1 Young Leader to 2 girls (at least 2 adults with the group)

### **Brownies**

There should be a minimum of 2 Sixes and a maximum number of 24 girls in a Pack.

The ratio of adults to children for meetings is 2 adults to 24 girls

On Outings: 1 adult to every 8 girls

Pack Holidays: 1 adult to every 8 girls, minimum 3 leaders Camping: one adult to every 6 Brownies, +2 extra leaders

### Guides

The total number of Guides in a Unit should not exceed 36.

At meetings: 2 adults to 36 girls.

On Outings: 1 adult to every 10 girls (at least 2 adults with the group)

The Handbook of the Irish Girl Guides

"The maximum number of girls in Ladybird Guide and Brownie Guide Units is 24 girls, and the total number of girls in a Guide Unit should not exceed 36. There must be a minimum of two adults present at Unit meetings. Appropriate adult to child ratios should be present at all times" <u>- From IGG Handbook</u>



### **PUBLIC RELATIONS**

This month the PR Committee would like you to focus on A-WEAR-ness Day / World Thinking Day.

A-WEAR-ness Day takes place on Friday 22nd February — same day as World Thinking Day. It is an opportunity for you to be seen out and about in your community, work, school in your uniform.

Being seen in your uniform and being seen to be proud to be in your uniform and be a member of IGG is some of the best PR we can achieve.

Girl Guides worldwide wear a Uniform and the distinctive-ness of being a uniformed youth organisation is something that sets us apart. You can tell from pretty far away that we're all Girl Guides!!!

The uniform unites us across all Branches and ages and makes us instantly recognizable as part of the same organisation.

The uniform is modern, practical and comfortable – so the girls can wear it with ease and show their pride in being a member of IGG. If you are unable to be in uniform, make sure to have IGG signs up around you so that you are visible as members of IGG to the community!

The higher we raise our public profile, the more girls will want to join and the more our organisation will grow.

### **GAT RESOURCE BADGE**

This article is a reminder to those of you who have not used your **GAT Resource Pack**. This is an excellent resource to use around World Thinking Day—you can consult the relevant MDG every year depending on World Thinking Day's Theme. This year it's MDG's 4 and 5 — so remember to take out your GAT Resource Pack and see if there's anything you could use to help you celebrate World Thinking Day and help your girls earn the GAT Badge at the same time.

### Below is a selection of what is available for you to do with your girls:

Please read pages 1-7 of the Resource Pack before you start as an Introduction to the **Millenium Development Goals (MDG's)** At the beginning of each chapter is some extra background information for you, the Leader to read and use as you see fit depending on the age group of your girls.

MDG 1 – Together we can end extreme poverty and hunger. Example Game for Ladybirds – FIVE FOODS (Page 11 in GAT book)

### **Five Foods**

AIM: To think about what you're eating and why

TIME: 15 minutes

WHAT YOU NEED: Worksheet (found in GAT Pack) per Ladybird and pencils

Ask your Ladybirds to make a list of five foods they ate yesterday on the worksheet. Ask them to consider whether it was because they were hungry or just because they wanted to eat. Ask them how they would feel if they could only have eaten one of those things yesterday.

MDG 2 – Education opens doors for all girls and boys. Example Game for Brownies – WHAT IS NEEDED TO GO TO SCHOOL (Page 27 in GAT Book)

### What is Needed to go to School?

<u>AIM:</u> To make the Brownies think about the basics needed to enable a child, particularly those from less well-off communities or less developed countries, to go to school. TIME: 20/30 minutes

WHAT YOU NEED: Wordsearch (found in GAT Pack)

#### WHAT TO DO:

- Give each Brownie a copy of the Wordsearch to complete.
- The word search could lead to a discussion with the Brownies about school and what they hope to achieve and to a comparison with children in other countries who are less fortunate. Use the stories in the Pack to prompt a discussion while the girls complete their wordsearchs.

MDG 3 – Empowering girls will change our world. Example Game for Guides – RAISE AWARENESS (Page 42 in GAT book)

### **Raise Awareness**

<u>AIM:</u> To raise awareness of the unequal treatment between

boys and girls

TIME: 20/30 minutes

<u>WHAT YOU NEED:</u> Cards with message. Arrange a visit from a successful local woman.

#### WHAT TO DO:

- Make message cards/posters to raise awareness of unequal treatment of girls and boys (by computer or by hand) and give them away – e.g. the message might say 'did you know that "girl children are subjected to oppression, exploitation and discrimination due to their gender?"
- Talk about women in your neighbourhood who have a big influence on other people. School principal, TD, doctor...Why do you think people respect her? Write a list of questions to ask her or invite her to visit the Unit and ask questions.
- Research about International Women's Day or International Day of the Girl. Organise an event or activity to celebrate it.

MDG 7 – We can save our planet. Example Game for Senior Branch – INDIVIDUAL RESPONSIBLITY (Page 89 in GAT Book)

### MDG 7—Individual Responsibility

Calculate your carbon footprint at the following website (the girls could do this at home before they come to the meeting):

http://calc.zerofootprint.net/youth/ As a group discuss the results. Who had the highest/ lowest footprint? Identify areas where you can improve your results. Do you think a girl in a developing country would have the same footprint?

Find out about water usage levels in your area. Compare this to levels in other parts of the country. Compare water usage in Ireland to figures for a developing country. As a group identify 4 reasons why the figures are different. Identify 6 ways that your group could reduce the amount of water you use every day.

# THE GIRL EFFECT FACTSHEET













### **HILD MARRIAGE**

- One in seven girls in the developing world (excluding China) will be married before the age of 15.
- Every year, approximately 10 million teenage girls are wed. That's 25,000 per day, 19 every minute.
- Child brides have a pregnancy death rate double that of women in their 20s.

- One-third of girls in the developing world will be married before the age of 18.
- Girls from poor families are nearly twice as likely to marry before 18 than girls from wealthier families.

### **AGE AT FIRST BIRTH**

- Half of all first births in the developing world are to adolescent girls.
- Medical complications from pregnancy and childbirth are the leading cause of death among girls aged 15-19 worldwide.
- Girls between the ages of 10 and 14 are five times more likely to die in pregnancy or childbirth than women aged 20 to 24.
- If a mother is under the age of 18, her infant's risk of dying in its first year of life is 60 per cent greater than that of an infant born to a mother older than 19.

Use these facts to help your girls to further explore the world thinking day themes AND TO HELP THEM UNDERSTAND THE DIFFERENCE THEY CAN MAKE IN THIS WORLD.



### **ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT**

- Closing the joblessness gap between girls and their male counterparts would yield an increase in GDP of up to 1.2 per cent in a single year.
- An extra year of primary school education boosts girls' eventual wages by 10–20 per cent.

  An extra year of secondary school adds 15–25 per cent.
- Giving women the same access to non-land resources and services as men could increase yields on women's land by up to 30 per cent, raise total agricultural output in developing countries by up to four per cent and reduce the number of hungry people in the world by 100-150 million.





- When a girl in the developing world receives seven years of education, she marries four years later and has 2.2 fewer children.
- Secondary school completion rates for adolescent girls is below five per cent in 19 sub-Saharan African countries.
- In sub-Saharan Africa, fewer than one in five girls makes it to secondary school.
- Girls who stay in school during adolescence have a later sexual debut, are less likely to be subjected to forced sex and, if sexually active, are more likely to use contraception than their age peers who are out of school.
- On average, only 70 per cent of girls with 28 hours or more per week of household chores attend school. When that chore burden is reduced to less than 14 hours, 90 per cent attend school.



### HEALTH + SAFETY

- Worldwide, nearly 50 per cent of all sexual assaults are against girls aged 15 years or younger.
- Among those whose first experience of sexual intercourse was forced, 31 per cent were less than 15 years old at the time. Another 14 per cent were aged between 15 and 17.
- Worldwide, an estimated five million young people between the ages of 15 and 24 are living with HIV. More than 60 per cent 3.2 million of young people living with HIV are girls.
- Each year, an estimated three million girls experience genital mutilation or cutting.

### ONE MILLION ACTIONS TO CREATE THE WORLD WE WANT FOR GIRLS!

As part of the celebration for the first ever international Day of the Girl, WAGGGS launched a blog called The World We Want for Girls. ### DO

- Treat me like anyone else, don't pussyfoot around me or allow the other girls to "baby" me.
- Use words that I can understand, speak honestly and discourage whispering in my presence in case I think it is about me.
- Always use eye contact when speaking to me.
- Remember that just because I have a learning disability doesn't mean I am "thick".
- Make sure that I am always included at whatever level I can cope with.
- As I grow older give me some appropriate responsibility and authority.

### DO NOT

- Make allowances for behaviour that is unacceptable.
- Finish sentences for me, or talk over me to someone else.
- Exclude me from conversations assuming that I don't understand.
- Keep telling me how to do things or what to say. Encourage me to ask questions and to say if I need more
  instructions or extra time.
- Ask me to read out loud or demonstrate something in public without first warning me and asking me for permission.

### **CRUMLIN HOSPITAL GUIDE UNIT**



### Thursday evenings, from 6.45 – 8.15 pm.

Crumlin Hospital Guide Unit has been in existence for over 4 years providing fun and enjoyment for girls on a weekly basis. The aim of the Unit is to give girls from eight years old upwards a chance to try Guides for an evening, to meet girls from other wards, to have fun, to try out some new activities with a Guiding twist and to offer them a brief distraction during their stay in hospital.

The Leaders work on a rota system with four leaders each week. They visit each ward to invite girls who are well enough, to come along to the Unit for some fun activities. Leader Dilys Lindsay explains "The activities vary from week to week depending on how many girls come along and also what age they are. We adapt to suit to meet the needs of the girls so, if for instance someone has limited mobility, we work around that. No-one is left out. We never know how many girls will be available or the age range, so for the leaders each week is a new and exciting challenge as we get to know the girls, provide them with an interesting programme and perhaps encourage them to join their local Guide Unit when they return home.

"Our programmes usually have a theme - for example events such as Halloween, Christmas, the Olympics, or other themes like camping, a pyjama party, road safety, winter fun, summer holidays! Crafts are always a big hit as well as activity games that can be played by the girls regardless of their abilities. We also tell the girls about Guiding in Ireland and around the world. At the end of the evening we bring the girls back to their wards. We love to see the smiles on their faces, having had a chance to forget for a short while about why they are in hospital. Some of the girls come for a number of weeks; some join us every couple of months when they have to return to hospital; others join us for just one night. Everyone is welcome to come along and join the meeting and parents are also welcome to join in or come along to see what is going on."


All the Leaders are members of Irish Girl Guides (IGG) and Garda vetted through IGG and the hospital. Every girl who goes along to Guides is given a special pink neckerchief to wear and to bring back to the ward with her, and if she remains in hospital for any length of time she will wear it to Guides each week.

Volunteering with Crumlin Hospital Guide Unit is a rewarding experience for those involved and it's not a large time commitment as it operates on a rota system as mentioned above. You would only do one meeting every month. The Unit is very much in need of some more Leaders.






### **VALENTINE HEARTS**



### INDIA — Elephant, Giraffe and Eagle

Equipment: None

### Instructions:

- Everyone stands in a circle with one Brownie in the middle. This Brownie points at one girl and says either 'Elephant, Giraffe or Eagle'.
- 2. The girl they are pointing at and the people to either side must act out these animals.
- 3. If an individual gets their part wrong or they do it too slow they sit down and the game continues skipping over the girl that is sitting down so the Brownie being pointed at may have a new neighbour to work with.
- The last Brownie standing is the winner. 4.



Elephant – Middle girl with hand long in front of face to be trunk. Side girls with arms making a half circle up to the middle girl's head to be ears.



Giraffe – Middle girl has hands above head to be lona neck.

Side girls have hands and arms pointing down to the ground away from centre girl to be legs.



Eagle – Middle girl makes snapping beak with hands in front of face. Side girls make moving wing motions with both arms away from centre airl.

### INDIA — Hindi Colour Game

*Equipment:* Items in the colours listed below

### Instructions:

- The Leader calls out a colour in Hindi.
- 2. The players must all run to touch something that colour.

- 3. The last one to touch the colour or touches the wrong colour is out or loses a life.
- 4. Sometime the Leader can call out two or three colours all at once and the girls have to find a way of touching all of the colours at once.

### **Hindi Colours**

Lal = Red Narangi = Orange Pila = Yellow Hara = Green = Blue Nila = Pink Gulabi Zambla = Purple Kala = Black Safed = White



### CANADA — Name Zap

Equipment: None

#### Instructions:

- Everyone stands in a circle.
- Each girl gets an invisible magic wizard wand. 2.
- 3. If your name is called you have to duck and the people on either side of you have to try and zap each
- If you get caught in the crossfire you're out. 4.
- 5. If you are one of the zappers and the other girl zaps you first then you're out.
- 6. If someone zaps and it's not their turn to zap they are
- 7. If girls zapping have a tie, then do rock, paper, scissors to find a winner.
- 8. When there are two girls left, have a wizard's shoot
- 9. The two girls stand back to back, take 4 steps out and then when the Leader yells "draw" they turn around and zap. First to zap wins. Then play again.



### GERMANY — Frogs in a Pond

Equipment: Draw and cut out frogs from light paper tissue or greaseproof. one for each Six. Make a circle for each Six with chalk or rope at one end of the room. Give each Six a folded newspaper and a frog.



### Instructions:

- 1. Brownies line up in their Sixes at the opposite end of the room from the circles.
- 2. The first Brownie in each Six, using the folded newspaper, fans her frog from the starting line into her pond.
- 3. When this is done she passes the frog and newspaper to the next Brownie in her Six who fans the frog to the pond and so on until each Brownie in the Six has had a turn.
- 4. The first Six to be finished and sitting down is the winner.

### DENMARK — The Rainmaker (an action song)

### Instructions:

The Rainmaker sits in a circle with Brownies. Each Brownie watches the girl on her left. The Rainmaker makes the first rain sound and passes it on to her right. Second sound starts when all the Brownies have completed the circle of sound.

Read: Have you ever heard of the rainmakers dance

That makes Indians hop all day Well Danish Brownies took a chance

And made the rain their way So close your eyes and listen well You'll hear the sounds of rain The Brownie Pack will make it come

And vanish back again.

#### Actions:

- 1. The little leaves rustle before the rain—*Rub thumbs* against first two fingers.
- 2. First raindrops— *Rub palms together slowly*
- 3. Rain heavier—Rub hand up and down thighs
- 4. Drops getting bigger—Pat knees alternately (fast)
- 5 . Downpour—*Tap your heels on the ground gradually getting faster.*
- 6. Magic the rain away by doing it backwards.

### AUSTRALIA — Brownies Action Song

### Brownies out a walking on a Summer's day

(Tune: Baa Baa Black Sheep)

Along came the wind and blew their hats **away**Brownies in a hurry off to their Pack
Thought they would never get their hats **back** 

#### Instructions:

Brownies in partners, side by side in a circle. Brownies on the outside of the Circle are "hats". While singing line one and two all the Brownies walk around in the same direction. On the word **away** the Brownies on the inside turn and walk in the opposite direction until the word **back**. They then try to find their partner as quickly as possible. The first Brownie and its **hat** up to Brown Owl get a point.



### SOUTH AFRICA — Mice & Mealies

Equipment: A paper plate and dried peas

#### Instructions:

- 1. The Brownies form a circle.
- 2. Place the paper plate with the dried peas (mealies) in the centre.
- 3. Number off the Brownies 1 to 6 around the circle.
- 4. The Leader calls out a number and those with that number take a step back out of the circle and run anticlockwise around the circle and back into the circle entering through their own space.
- 5. They start to pick up the peas with one hand (their other hand behind their backs.)
- 6. The other Brownies count up to 12 at which point the game continues until every Brownie has had at least one turn

### Valentine's Day Card "You Inched Your Way Into My Heart"

What you will need: Pink card, green coloured tissue paper (the kind you use to wrap presents), craft foam shapes or other decorative items, tiny googly eyes, scissors, glue, large paint brush or pencil (about 1 cm wide).



- Draw a large heart on a pink sheet of card and write, "Valentine, you inched your way into my heart." as shown in the picture.
- 2. Cut two slits about one inch long about one inch apart in the middle of the heart.
- 3. To make the tissue paper inchworm, pick out green tissue paper and cut the tissue paper into a 7.5" x 7.5" square.
- 4. Roll the tissue paper around the paint brush or pencil. Wet the exposed edge with a damp sponge and press it to the rolled tissue to secure. Do not make it too wet.
- 5. Scrunch the tissue paper down the paint brush to the end so that it is all scrunched up into about one inch at the bottom of the brush just like you would to get the paper off a drinking straw.
- 6. Glue tiny eyes and a tongue on one end of the worm and stick it between the slits in the heart as pictured above.



### What you will need:


Pink card, glue, and feathers.

#### How to make this valentine card:

- 1. Draw a heart shape on the pink card and cut out.
- 2. Write **You Make My Heart Flutter** in the centre of the heart using silver or gold marker or pen.
- 3. Glue feathers onto the sides of the heart. (*Leader Tip: Feather boas are available in the €2 shops which can be cut up to make the feathers.*)
- 4. Give it to someone special.

### <u>Make Beanbag Pancakes -</u> <u>February 12th</u>

This craft does double duty, because not only will the Guides enjoy making the "stack" of beanbag pancakes, but they can try out our list of Beanbag Challenges afterwards.

Use a plate to trace a circle shape onto two layers of brown or yellow felt/fabric. Use a small saucer/side plate as a guide.

Draw a second circle about 1.5cm (5/8 inch) around the outside of the traced circle, and cut around this outer circle, preferably with pinking shears.

Use running stitch to stitch the two circles together, following the inner traced line, and leaving a gap of about 7cm (3 inches) through which to add a thin layer of small dried beans or rice. Finally, stitch up the gap.

### **Quick Beanbag Challenges**

- Throw a beanbag in the air, turn around, and catch it again.
- Throw the beanbag up and backwards over your head and try to catch it behind your back.
- Throw the beanbag in the air, clap your hands once, and catch it. Now try clapping your hands twice, then three times, and so on. How high can you go?
- Throw the beanbag in the air and clap your hands under your right leg before catching it. Now try with your left leg. Now clap behind your back. Invent some more challenges.
- Throw the beanbag up, jump, and try to catch it. Jump twice. Jump three times!
- Throw it up, kneel down and try to catch it.
  - Throw and catch with just your right hand, then with just your left.
- Try throwing it up and catching it with your eyes closed!
- Balance the beanbag on your right foot, then throw it up and catch it from there. Can you do it with your left foot too?
- Can you throw the beanbag up and catch it on your left foot?
- Can you run with a beanbag balanced on your head?
  Can you jump? Can you kneel down and stand up again,
  or sit down? Can you climb the stairs? Can you do any of
  these things with two beanbags balanced on your head?
  Or three?
- Try balancing a beanbag on each shoulder while you walk, run, jump etc.
- Set up a variety of hoops, containers and targets and have some throwing practice.
- How far can you throw the beanbag? Does it make a difference if you throw over-arm or underarm?





### **Leading Games**

The best games are fun and spontaneous, but they don't happen by themselves! They require a Leader who is prepared and who wants every girl to feel safe and comfortable. Fortunately, there are guidelines to help us be that Leader. Why not use your Young Leaders or Unit Helpers to plan some games. Give them these guidelines to help plan the activities.

### Be prepared!

#### Know:

- Who is playing, their knowledge of the game and their skill levels.
- Where you are playing, the size of the area and any obstacles.
- What resources you have access to (e.g., equipment including game pieces, boundary markers, goals and so on).
- What games you are playing, including their rules, objectives, age/skill ranges and so on.
- What might be difficult to play, assemble or explain.
- What problems you might encounter.
- Be inclusive at all times.

### Ensure that:

- Everyone is involved.
- Helpers are randomly chosen and there aren't any "favourites."
- Time outs are only for a short period of time and not the entire game.
- The rules are fair.
- Everyone can play these games.
- Everyone will feel challenged by the game and satisfied when it is over.
- Be enthusiastic.

#### Be sure to:


- Start game play with energy. Be open, welcoming and a good role model.
- Allow girls to participate in their own way.
- Play all the games with the girls.
- Play simple games, especially with a new group.
- Allow the girls to build up their confidence.
- Ensure that everyone knows the objectives of the game.
- Give easy explanations, use simple equipment and a short time frame.
- Begin with a general description of the game: its object, the type of game it is and a general time frame.
- Give clear, concise instructions followed immediately by a demonstration.
- f necessary, practice any special moves or phrases that are integral to game play.

### Build up an array of cooperative games:

- Focus on team building and having fun.
- Avoid games that focus on winners and losers or involve physical contact.
- Be flexible.
- Keep a sense of humour.
- Encourage the girls to take over the leadership of the games.
- Be prepared to modify any game.
- Don't overplay any game.
- Apply the same rules during game time as at any other time.
- Be clear with the girls about your expectations for behaviour.
- Be a good facilitator.
- Make sure everyone can hear and see you.
- Give choices about who plays what.
- Put safety first.
- Encourage players.
- Let the girls take on a leadership role.
- Recognize when a game isn't working and stop it.
- Pay attention to time.











Here are some games that were created by Pathfinders from Canada....

### **Socceyminton**

Purpose/Objective: Score the most goals

Time Frame: 15 minutes





**Equipment:** Racquets for each player (you could use newspaper rolls), one foam soccer ball, 4 goals (2 on each side - could use 8 pylons to mark the goals)

#### Rules:

- Each team has a goalie (called the "puck" who must defend both goals) and
   3 players (called the "birdies") on the field during play
- One player from each team goes to the middle of the field to thumb wrestle to see who starts with the ball
- You cannot touch the ball with hands or feet only with the raquet
- If you have the ball, you have 10 seconds to pass it to another player with the object to move the ball with the raquet to the opponent's net
- Stay within the lines of the playing field or the ball goes to the other team
- You cannot hit the ball when in the air
- And NO CONTACT!

### Vootball

Purpose/Objective: Score the most goals

Time Frame: 20 minutes - 2 periods, 10 minutes each - game might be extended for 5

minute overtime or until someone scores

Equipment: Ball and 2 goals

#### Rules:

- 2 teams of 6 players per team ( you could have a challenge match between patrols)
- When the ball is in the air, you may only bump, volley or serve (no spikes)
- When the ball is on the ground, you may only use your feet
- Play rock, paper, scissors to determine which team serves first
- You earn one point when the ball goes into the goal
- Holding the ball will give you a one minute penalty
- If there is intentional contact with other players, you will get a 2 minute penalty
- The team that scores the most goals is the winner











### Crafty Gifts &

### gift CARD

You will need: Paints & Brush, Scissors, Pencil, different size plastic lids or a compass (for drawing circles) -- or draw them by hand, one split pin for each flower, hole punch, A4 sheet for painting on, A4 sheet of stronger paper for card



#### What to do:

- Fold the card in half.
- Completely cover the A4 sheet of paper in a mixture of colours, stripes, lines, or just one colour. Leave to dry.
- Cut 5 or 6 circles (from 1 inch to 3.5 inches) from the painted paper. To make circles, use a compass, old plastic lids, or any circular objects you have on hand. Or draw them by hand!
- Punch a hole in the centre of each circle. Lay down the circles with the biggest on the bottom and insert a split pin through the circles to hold the flower in place
- Fold the other A4 card in half. Place the flower head on it and push the pin through the card, draw a stem and leaves underneath.

### Fancy storage containers

### You will need:

1 litre plastic milk or juice jugs, fabric or scrapbook paper scraps, felt in coordinating colours, scissors or a craft knife, white craft glue, water, bowl, paintbrush, potted flower



### What to do:

- Cut the top off of the plastic jug, just under the handle
- Cut fabric or tear paper into 1" squares
- Mix 2 parts glue and 1 part water in a bowl.
- Paint glue mixture onto one side of the outside of the jug.
- Decoupage the fabric or paper all over the sides of the jug, applying glue onto the jug first, then over the fabric or paper to adhere.
- Cut 1.5" wide strips from felt, enough to go around the opening of the pot.
- Glue the strip onto the lip of the pot, overlapping both sides, inside and out.

### Yogurt Cup Pin Cushion

### You will need:

Small yogurt container, cleaned and dried, fabric, thread and needle, fibrefill, glue, decorative supplies (scrap fabric, paper, stickers, buttons, etc), pins



### What to do:

- Cut a piece of fabric three inches larger than the circumference of the yogurt cup rim.
- Sew a running stitch one-half inch from the edge of the fabric
- Gently gather the thread and pull to make this fabric into a "cushion" shape.
- Stuff the inside of the cushion with fibrefill until firm.
- Apply glue just inside the rim of the cup and place the cushion inside.
- To decorate the outside, choose fabric, paper, or decorated adhesive paper. Glue in place and decorate
- Allow to dry and place a few brightly coloured sewing pins into the pincushion.

### Paper Flowers


### You will need:

Crepe Paper/Tissue, Floral Wire/Pipe Cleaners



### What to do:

- Stack eight 20-by-30-inch sheets of tissue.
- Make 1 1/2-inch-wide accordion folds, creasing with each fold.
- Fold an 18-inch piece of floral wire in half, and slip over centre of folded tissue; twist. (or use pipe-cleaners as the stems if they are easier to get)
- With scissors, trim ends of tissue into rounded or pointy shapes
- Separate layers, pulling away from centre one at a time.





### **5 TIPS AND TRICKS FOR BETTER PHOTOS**

### Beginning Photography Tip # 1: Move in Closer

Each time you spot a subject, snap a shot and then move in closer for a better shot. Having your subject almost fill the frame helps your viewer understand and appreciate your photo. Also, details are often more interesting than an overall view.

### Beginning Photography Tip # 2: Be Quick

If it is at all possible that your subject may move, bolt, fly away, stop smiling, or just get tired of waiting for you to take the picture, shoot once right away.

Practice getting quicker and quicker to the draw.

Do not worry about taking too many pictures and do not wait until you're absolutely certain all the knobs and buttons are in their correct position. "Shoot First, Ask Questions Later."

### Beginning Photography Tip # 3: Compose Your Picture with Care

Strive to lead the eye along an interesting path through the photo, with the use of strong lines or patterns.

- Keep the horizon level;
- Crop out extra elements that you are not interested in (more on this in the next tip);
- Consciously place your subject where you think it most belongs rather than just accepting it wherever it happens to land in the photo;
- Play with perspective so that all lines show a pattern or lead the eye to your main subject.

### Beginning Photography Tip # 4: Be Selective

Discern what you are really interested in and centre your efforts on getting the best photo of this subject, whether it's a still life, your funny cat, your dog, a friend, a family matter, a mood, a place or culture.

Then be sure to keep anything that would distract out of the picture. The easiest way to do this is to watch your borders - the edges of the view you see through the camera's viewfinder. Then recompose if anything - such as an unattractive telephone wire, an old drinks can, a distracting sign, your finger, or your camera strap - hangs into your picture.

### Beginning Photography Tip # 5: Look at the Light

It is good to see what kind of light you are working with. Which way are the shadows falling? Unless you want a silhouette effect, where your subject is black against an interesting background, it's generally best to shoot with the sun behind you.

How is the light affecting your subject? Is the subject squinting?

Is the light blazing directly and brightly upon your whole subject? This works well if you are in love with the bold colors of your subject.

Side lighting, on the other hand, can add drama but can also cause extreme, hard-to-print contrasts.

Lastly, indirect light can be used to make your subject glow soft and pretty.
