A MOTHER'S DAY REVEALED BY APRIL ALDER



I was driving in my car alone, a rare opportunity, and I began thinking about the last Desperate Housewives' episode that I had watched on television. These precious moments of quiet thought led me to reflect upon my own life. I am a wife and a stay-at-home mother to a four-year-old son and one-year-old daughter. If you were to see me out by myself, I may appear to be similar to the character of Bree Van De Kamp (before

she started drinking.) I try to look "put together" with my hair blown out and in place, clothing pressed, and the matching handbag and shoes. When I am shopping, I might pay close attention to small details, worry too much about being appropriate and go out of my way to be polite and courteous, even when it is not warranted.

However, when I am out with my children, it is a much different story. With my kids in tow, I feel much more like the character Lynette Scavo. I am disheveled, with my hair sticking straight up from a small gooey hand running through it, food smeared somewhere on my clothing (that I am probably unaware of) and an enormous tote filled with baby gear, snacks, toys and activities. I know that on such outings I will be apologizing to a stranger for something a child did, bending over to pick-up thrown objects approximately twenty-five times per minute, and visiting the potty on every stop along the way because my son really just wants to see what every bathroom in America looks like.

I have discovered that people without children do not necessarily understand the drill. For example, the teenage girl working the checkout counter at a Bed Bath & Beyond is completely unaware of the possible consequences from her taking two extra minutes to chat with one of her associates while ringing up our items. These mere extra seconds she is taking could turn our outing into a complete disaster. My son might start to reach for just one of the hundred items that bombard you at the register. This might entail him climbing out of the shopping cart, with a loud tantrum, when I do not agree to the purchase of Floam. This might just happen, well, it has happened time and time again, not always over Floam.

Our neighbors, who are great friends of ours, do not have children of their own. They love our children and invite our family to join them out for dinner. During dinner they do crazy reckless things that we would never attempt while out with the kids. Things like ordering an "appetizer" and "dessert" are just never done with our kids. Dining out for us has become this: Which noisy, kid-friendly restaurant are we going to attempt? The question never is what food they serve, but is it the kind of place that our children will go unnoticed. We will have to know what we are going to order by the time we are seated, or at the very latest when the drink orders are taken. The attempt will be

made to eat an entire entree while it is reasonably warm. Crayons and books with the backup portable DVD player are also likely going to be needed to get us through our dining experience, no matter which restaurant we try.

Our children are not "bad." I have seen wild animals masquerade in restaurants as children and these are not our kids! We happen to have very busy children who behave appropriate to their ages. They have two speeds, on and off. Our son is in constant motion until he falls asleep and our daughter just began to walk, so she never wants to remain in one place.

I was in such a rush to become a mother; I sometimes think about our life before children. I remember what it was like to travel with a small bag on a moments notice. We ate when and where we wanted. We had breakable objects on low tables, doorways without gates, and knobs without rubber bands around them. We slept without monitors; moreover, we actually got to sleep.

To me, every moment of motherhood is not necessarily rewarding. I worry all of the time about my children and question my decisions constantly. I am always running on coffee with too little sleep. But when those special unplanned moments happen with our children, it makes everything else pale by comparison. When I walk into my daughter's room every morning, her face lights up - it is worth it. As I make eye contact with my son when he notices me standing there in the hall of his school waiting to pick him up, he always has the same twinkle in his eyes, as he says, "That's my Mommy." I melt every time.

My favorite time of the day is after they have had their baths and are playing together in the family room. They might be stacking blocks together or running trains across the floor, but as I watch them, they occasionally look up and smile at me. Suddenly I have this overwhelming feeling of fulfillment. They are happy, safe, fed, and feel loved. My son brings his sister her pacifier and pats her on the top of her head as he walks upstairs. I realize that they will always have each other. My job is to give them love, teach them as I learn from them along the way, and give them the best I have to offer. Being a mother of two has its ups and downs and has profoundly changed my life. I, without a doubt, would not trade motherhood for anything.



Our next door neighbor, Judy Hilsmier was the President of the League and my Mom volunteered to head her Provisional Class project to raise awareness about breast cancer. Even though their class was small (15 in all) to this day we still benefit from their numerous contributions and gifts of self. My Mom often credits Junior League and her "Provisional" classmates with affording her some of her closest friends like Liska Langston. And some of the women I grew up admiring such as Debbie Abrams, who has served the League in many positions, (such as Madame President) and Marta Batmasian who continues to be a generous contributing member. Just to name a few. There were lots of League functions taking place right there at home, as well as on the rest of our street of S.W. 21st Lane: between the Hilsmier's and Robin Philpit who still lives across the street and continues to be a vital member albeit a vital sustaining member!

I grew up with a respect for the Junior League and for the contribution these ladies make in the community. Their successes continue to motivate me daily. I love to hear stories of about the "good old days in the League" and see the legacies of past projects continuing now on their own.



My fondest memories of summer vacation was my Summer Camp. ~ *Anne Morgan*



Unfortunately the Boca Raton Resort & Club will not be hosting their Food & Wine event this year due to other commitments and renovations. However, they said in future years they would love to do it again with a JLBR partnership. The 2005 event ran smooth as silk thanks to Kristen Velasco, Jennifer Ryan and the committee. Their silent auction raised over \$23K with little time to prepare.

Since this is my last article until Fall, I thought I would share with you a darling chapter in *Made in the Shade* from the JL of Ft. Lauderdale (\$22.95). Its focus is on children. All of us have children in our lives, whether it is a child of your own, grandchild, niece, nephew or the child of a friend. Ideas for activities, meals or treats are often hard to come by.



How about a lunch with Cheese Nip Chicken, "Cop-Out" Pizza Pretendo or Taco Cheese Animal Crackers. Dessert could be Cupcakes in a Cone or Sand Pail Pudding. On a slow afternoon you could make Peanut Butter Play Dough or a Papier-Mache Mask

Children can participate in the making of all of these recipes making the anticipation of

eating the finished product more fun.

Cheese Nip Chicken

Cheese cracker or Goldfish crackers 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts halves 2 cups sour cream ½ cup melted butter

Fill a sealable plastic sandwich bag with cheese crackers and seal. Have a child crush the crackers in the bag. Coat the chicken with sour cream. Oh boy, messy fingers. Place the chicken and cracker crumbs in a large sealable plastic bag and shake to coat. Arrange the chicken in a single layer in a greased 9x13-inch baking dish. Drizzle with the butter. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until cooked through. Serves 4

Cop-Out Pizza Pretendo

2 pounds mild or hot sausage

2 14-ounce jars pizza sauce

16 ounces egg noodles, cooked, drained

3 cups or more, shredded mozzarella cheese

2 3-ounce packages sliced pepperoni

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Brown the sausage in a skillet, stirring until crumbly; drain. Combine the sausage, pizza sauce and noodles in a bowl and mix well.

Layer the sausage mixture and mozzarella cheese alternately in a baking pan until all of the ingredients are used. Arrange the pepperoni over the top. Sprinkle with the Parmesan cheese. Bake at 350 degrees fro 30 minutes. Serves 6

Sand Pail Pudding

2 or 3 6 ounce packages vanilla instant pudding mix

1 package vanilla wafers

11/2 to 2 cups confectioners' sugar

1 cup peanut butter

1 medium sand pail, or 6 to 8 (3 ounce) sand pails and shovels Gummy candies

Prepare the pudding mix using the package directions. Chill, covered, in the refrigerator. Process the vanilla wafers in a food processor until crushed. Mix the confectioners' sugar and peanut butter in a bowl until crumbly, adding additional confectioner's sugar as needed for the desired consistency.

Layer the peanut butter mixture and the pudding mixture ½ at a time in the sand pail or pails. Top with the vanilla wafer crumbs. Decorate with gummy candies. Serve with the shovels. Serves 6 to 8

Peanut Butter Play Dough

4 cups quick-cooking oats

2 cups flour

1 cup water

1 1/4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar

1 cup light corn syrup

1 cup peanut butter

Process the oats and flour in a blender for 30 seconds. Combine the oat mixture and water in a bowl and mix well. Knead briefly. Stir in the milk powder, confectioners' sugar, corn syrup and peanut butter. Knead briefly. May add additional milk powder if the dough appears too sticky. Makes enough for 6 to 8 people*

*Do not worry if your children decide to eat the play dough. It is edible!

- Nobin redbreasts only visit Florida in the winter and occasionally make a meal of red berries of the Brazilian pepper. They become so intoxicated that they can sometimes be seen staggering across laws.
- The Florida Everglades is actually a large, extremely shallow river, flowing very slowly from Lake Okeechobee southward to the sea. The Everglades I called "Pa-hay-oke," or "river of grass" by the Indians.

Here are some summer recipes for you to enjoy:

Barbecued Ribs - Serves 8

Ingredients: 1 onion, sliced
5 pounds baby back ribs
salt and pepper to taste
1 (14-ounce) bottle tangy catsup or chili sauce
1/2 (12-ounce) bottle horseradish sauce
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce

Procedures & Notes: Spread the onion slices in a 9x13-inch baking pan. Sprinkle both sides of the ribs with salt and pepper and arrange over the onion. Cover with foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 2 hours. Combine the catsup, horseradish sauce, brown sugar and Worcestershire sauce in a bowl and mix well. Spread over the ribs. Bake, uncovered, for 1 hour longer.

Gold Coast Potato Salad - Serves 8-10

Ingredients:

<u>Jalapeno Dressing</u> <u>Salad</u>


2 jalapenos, seeded 3 pounds Yukon Gold potatoes 1 garlic clove 2 cups fresh corn kernels

1/2 cup cilantro leaves 1/4 cup olive oil

salt and pepper to taste 1 red bell pepper, chopped 1 cup olive oil 1 large bunch scallions, julienned 1/4 cup chopped parsley

Procedures & Notes: For the dressing, chop the jalapenos, garlic, cilantro, salt and pepper in the food processor. Add the olive oil gradually, processing until smooth. For the salad, boil the unpeeled potatoes in water to cover in a saucepan until tender. Drain and cool. Cut into quarters. Spread the corn kernels on a baking sheet and drizzle with the olive oil. Roast at 400 degrees until the edges of the kernels begin to brown; cool. Combine with the bell pepper and scallions in a bowl. Add the potatoes and chopped parsley. Add the dressing and toss to coat well.

- * In 1905, the population of Boca Raton consisted of six resident families and in 1923 the number of resident families only increased to twelve.
- * The first elected mayor of Boca Raton was John Brown.
- * Butts Road is named after the Butts Family, who owned one of the largest bean farms in Florida.

The neighborhood of Camino Gardens used to be the home to one of the first animal parks, Africa USA.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND



The Community Support fund completed its budget with awarding the following four grants: The Haven, Inc. is an alternative home for boys aged 11-18 referred by the Department of Children and Family Services and other child welfare agencies. The Haven provides structured daily activities designed to achieve balanced and enriched living, provides individual and group counsel-

ing, tutoring, recreational, spiritual and cultural events, offers mentor programs, and life and work skills development. The Haven was awarded a \$2500 grant to help start a new program entitled, Turning Point Program. This is a transitional program addressing the gaps in service for boys turning 18. The program will be working with Turtle Nest Village and Kids at Home in order to prevent duplication of services. The program will assist young men in securing housing, provide an initial stipend for living expenses, assistance with a bus pass for transportation, pairing with a life coach and require enrollment in vocational school or full time employment.

The Children's Place at Home Safe, Inc., an organization at protects abused children fulltime, has awarded a \$1000 grant to install a white picket fence and entrance walk as part of the final phase of landscaping at the home. Children's Place at Home Safe was a signature JLBR project that now functions independently.

The DeVos-Blum Family YMCA of Boynton Beach was awarded a \$1000 grant to help assist the after school scholarship assistance program. This program provides structured after

care activities in a safe environment. It includes SPARK (Sports Play and Active Recreation for Kids) and SWIM (Safe Water Instruction Module) and is available for children in need.

Last, Spanish River High School was awarded a \$500 grant in support of Project Graduation, a chaperoned, alcohol-free party for graduating seniors.

There were holiday activities for the whole family ranging from Thanksgiving feasts to Valentine's Day dances and interactive "therapy" programs from pet visits to intergenerational visits

The JLBR and CARES committee also provided access to information and resources through the Vegso Community resource library which will continue to house books on aging and caregiver assistance. The committee has been dedicated to increasing local awareness through publicity to get the word out to local caregivers about the centers' activities beyond just those in which the JLBR was directly involved. A special sponsor breakfast preceded the informative lecture and over 2000 attendees enjoyed his presentation promoting a healthcare system that encompasses body, mind and spirit to live better longer.

Seven years later the Junior League of Boca Raton is the last of the original Leagues with this program in place

Together we had some great ideas that made this year exceptional. Thanks to Jennie DeWolff, Assistant Chair, Kirsten Braaten Stanley, Nancy Dockerty, Kim Flittner, Deann Joachim, Carrie Klimczak, Derinda Lewis, Brooke Liberty, Laura McMullen, Jeanne Nolan, Kimberly Presson and Kristen Velasco.

Following our theme "The Junior League Through the Years: A History of Community Service," our April wrap-up celebration meeting highlighted the 1990's to present including the festivities of 2001 when Deborah Brittain, the Association's first African-American President, presided over the Junior League's centennial celebration. Maya Angelou, Nane Annan, and Gloria Steinem, among others, addressed the members at the Association's Annual Conference in New York City, site of the first Junior League. The Membership Development committee also prepared a special *Savor the Moment* feast for the party. What a perfect ending to a fun, productive year of learning and growing.

Looking back to the March core meeting, we highlighted events of the time and accomplishments the Junior League has made from 1970-1989. The 1970's takes us back to disco, the "Star Wars" movie was released, the first test-tube baby was born, John Paul II became Pope, Arthur Ashe became the first black man to win Wimbledon and the Sears Tower was built. Margaret Thatcher became the first woman Prime Minister of Great Britain, Mother Theresa was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, a nuclear accident at Three Mile Island occurred and Sony introduced the Walkman.

Throughout the 1970s, Junior Leagues expanded their participation in public affairs issues, especially in the areas of child health and juvenile justice. In 1973, almost 200 Leagues worked with the National Commission on Crime and Delinquency and the U.S. Justice Department on a four-year program seeking to improve the criminal justice system. In Canada, the Canadian Federation was formed to promote public issues among the Canadian Leagues. In 1978, the first Junior League outside North America was established in London.

Looking back at the 1800's we remembered that John Lennon was assassinated, Mount St. Helens erupted, the Rubik's Cube was popular, Ted Turner established CNN, AIDS was identified, Pac-Man was all the rage, personal computers (PC) were introduced by IBM, the movie "E.T." was released, Michael Jackson released the album "Thriller," Cabbage Patch Kids were on every kids wish list, Sally Ride Became the first American woman in space, the famine in Ethiopia took center stage, the Challenger Space Shuttle exploded, PanAm Flight 103 was bombed over Lockerbie, the Berlin Wall fell, Exxon Valdez spilled millions of gallons of oil on the coastline and students were massacred in China's Tiananmen Square.


During the 1980's, there were 211 Junior Leagues and the ones in the U.S. gained recognition for advocacy efforts to improve the child welfare system. U.S. Leagues also helped gain passage of the first federal legislation to address domestic violence. More than 100 Leagues develop the "Woman to Woman" campaign that actively and comprehensively tackles the impact of alcohol abuse on women. The Canadian Federation holds its first national conference focusing on violence against women and the negative impact of pornography.

In 1981, Junior League of Phoenix member, Sandra Day O'Connor, became the first woman to be appointed as a Supreme Court Justice of the United States. In 1988, the Association officially became the Association of Junior Leagues International, Inc. (AJLI), better reflecting the international scope of the member Leagues and in 1989, the Association was presented with the prestigious U.S. President's Volunteer Action Award.

SUSTAINER SCOOP BY LOU ANN SUCH





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SMART WOMEN ARE STROKE SMART BY NATIONAL STROKE ASSOCIATION



National Stroke Association's 2006 National Stroke Awareness Month campaign will focus on the "Women in Your Life," because women underestimate their stroke risk, are uniquely affected by stroke, and are more likely to be caregivers to stroke survivors as well as health care decision makers in their household. In addition, men are less susceptible to a health messaging and it is

the goal of the stroke education campaign to engage men by asking them to think about the women in their lives.

At the center of the 2006 National Stroke Awareness Month campaign, we have developed three "stroke awareness" brain bracelets, which you can order below. The slogan of the bracelets is "Smart Women are Stroke Smart" and can be given as gifts to the stroke survivor in your life.

What is Stroke? A stroke is the third leading cause of death in America and the No. 1 cause of adult disability. 80% of strokes are preventable; you can prevent a stroke!

A stroke or "brain attack" occurs when a blood clot blocks an artery (a blood vessel that carries blood from the heart to the body) or a blood vessel (a tube through which the blood moves through the body) breaks, interrupting blood flow to an area of the brain. When either of these things happen, brain cells begin to die and brain damage occurs.

When brain cells die during a stroke, abilities controlled by that area of the brain are lost. These abilities include speech, movement and memory. How a stroke patient is affected depends on where the stroke occurs in the brain and how much the brain is damaged.

For example, someone who has a small stroke may experience only minor problems such as weakness of an arm or leg. People who have larger strokes may be paralyzed on one side or lose their ability to speak. Some people recover completely from strokes, but more than 2/3 of the survivors will have some type of disability.

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within three hours he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke . . . totally. He said the trick was getting a stroke recognized, diagnosed a getting to the patient within three hours which is tough.

Stroke Symptoms include:

- Sudden numbness or weakness of face, arm or leg especially on one side of the body.
- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.
- · Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.
- Sudden severe headache with no known cause.
- If you have experienced any of these symptoms, you may have had a TIA or mini-stroke.

Ask your doctor if you can lower your risk for stroke by taking aspirin, or by other means.

If you think someone may be having a stroke, act F.A.S.T. and do this simple test:

Act F.A.S.T.


- 1. **F**ACE Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?
- 2. **A**RMS Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?
- 3. **S**PEECH Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence. Are the words slurred? Can he or she repeat the sentence correctly?
- 4. TIME If the person shows any of these symptoms, time is important. Call 911 or get to the hospital fast. Brain cells are dying.
