

With the exception of a period from 1933 to 1939, the Police Department has been controlled by a Board of Police Commissioners since its 1874 inception.

Board members are appointed by the Governor of Missouri and must be Kansas City residents.

Commissioners serve four-year terms.

The fifth member of the Board is the Mayor of Kansas City, by virtue of elected office.

The Secretary/Attorney is appointed by the Board.



A Comeback Story

Officer Tyler Moss, who survived being shot in the head in July of 2020, served as the honoree for the Going The Distance For Brain Injury Run at Loose Park.

The run traditionally honored a person affected by a brain injury who exemplified courage and determination, qualities fully displayed by Moss.

Moss was shot near his right eye and was in a coma for more than two weeks, suffering from a fractured skull, pneumonia, and blood clots. At that time, doctors gave Moss a **10**% chance to live and less than a **1**% chance to be fully functional. He returned to KCPD after a long and grueling rehabilitation. Honor

Women of KCPD

Signing on to the 30x30 Initiative, KCPD announced it would attempt to significantly increase its number of female officers by the end of the decade.

The **nationwide** initiative calls for **30**% of a department's officers to be **women** by the year **2030**. At the time of the announcement, nearly **15**% of **KCPD's officers** were **females**, on par with the national average. **Women**, at the time, made up **15**% **of KCPD's command staff** which was **much higher** than the national average of **3%**.

"We hope to gain some insight into the challenges preventing women from joining the force and create policy to improve their experiences and help us improve how we recruit them," said Deputy Chief Karen True, program manager for the 30 x 30 Pledge.

Solved

Deoina Mitchell's mom, Gwendolyn Robinson disappeared in **1983**. But it was the summer of **2022** when Mitchell filed a missing person report because she needed answers.

Working **12-hour days** on a case older than him, **Detective Nathan Kinate** requested assistance from **Intelligence Analyst Darin Lee**. The two continued a relentless investigation to find the truth.

Mitchell provided a picture of Robinson that registered with Lee. He remembered a composite he received in 2017 by a Clay County Sheriff's detective working a **1985** cold case. Given the time frame and similarities, Lee sensed a match. Kinate explained that Williams and the composite shared distinct eyes and the same unique jawline.

Kinate and the Sheriff's Office ran DNA tests that resulted in a match. It took Kinate and Lee less than **30 days** to find Mitchell's mother.

The Thunderbirds selected King to honor her heroics when she arrested a murder suspect while off-duty in October of 2021.

Association of Chiefs of Police for its Risk-Based Policing (RBP) strategy.

The newer approach of RBP, implemented citywide in 2019, helps reverse policing's tendency to over-rely on enforcement and instead seeks a balance between prevention and response.

KCPD became the new owner of an electronic bicycle (e-bike) courtesy of a local business owner who wanted to help officers strengthen community bonds.

Pedego Kansas City gifted one of two e-bikes that KCPD's Downtown Bike Patrol had been testing for **SiX months**. Owner Dan Cain hoped the bicycles would help officers on many levels, including responding to calls and increased interactions.

Testing showed that the bicycles helped make officers more **approachable**, serving as **conversation starters**. Often, residents had a curiosity about the bicycles and their questions initiated talks with officers.

The e-bikes also allowed officers to travel greater distances and respond to more calls than riding the mountain bicycles in KCPD's fleet. Given the **10-12** year age of the current fleet, KCPD will look for grants and other funding sources to purchase more e-bikes in the future.

King was working at an area high school when she came across a woman who had been on a day-long violent crime spree. King pursued the suspect on foot, was injured, but still arrested the suspect.

Officer Richard DuChaine and Officer Charles Owen rescued an infant's life that was caught on bodycam video.


The partners responded to a call for a 1-month-old girl who wasn't breathing. Arriving before EMS, they sprinted into the house, where the father handed the baby over to DuChaine.

DuChaine began infant chest compressions followed by back thrusts. Thankfully, the baby started breathing again. DuChaine turned the baby on her side, and Officer Owen checked for obstructions. Later, the officers visited her in the hospital. Doctors would say the infant was suffering from RSV.

When two officers saved the life of a 1-monthold girl who wasn't breathing, it was **Dispatcher Denise Jones** who dispatched them.

"I put myself in the parents' shoes, and what if that was me?" Jones asked. "What kind of response would you like? What kind of help would you want? You handle every call knowing that."

History Made

Concluding a nationwide search that spanned eight months, on December 15, the Board of Police Commissioners appointed KCPD **Acting Deputy Chief Stacey Graves** as **Chief of Police**.

Graves became the first woman in KCPD's **148-year history** to become permanent police chief.

Graves, a **25-year** veteran of the department, began her career as a records clerk in 1997. More recently, Graves oversaw the Patrol Bureau which oversees all six patrol stations, as well as traffic and special operations divisions.

As a major, Graves managed the Shoal Creek Patrol Division and led the Human Resources Division during KCPD's pandemic response. Graves' other assignments included the Drug Enforcement Unit, Media Unit, and Internal Affairs.
