

Report on Asia



NDIA has been independent since 1947 when the British departed, but she is only at the beginning of her struggle for freedom. She is torn by internal conflicts, economic and social problems. In the area of higher education, teaching staffs in Indian universities are generally of good quality, but they suffer from a paucity of teachers, and there is resistance to curricular changes.

Japan has reorganized her government and economy, and rejoined the world community as the eightieth member of the United Nations, but she is insecure and uncertain, too much so to give much support to the West in our search for security against Communism.

The economic, political and social conditions in these nations pose grave problems for the United States and the rest of the free world. They are analyzed for *Review* readers in the following articles by three experts on the University's faculty who have studied them at first hand.

India

. . beset with internal conflicts in her struggle for freedom

 $T^{\, {\scriptscriptstyle HE}}$ monsoon season, with its sudden daily downpours and brief intervals of clearing when the cloud-burdened sky is suddenly irradiated with fresh-washed azure and gold, has a dual psychological effect.

The seemingly ceaseless rain, beneficent as it is for India's urgently needed crops, can also wreak havoc as rising rivers flood the countryside and sweep away homes. The immobilization of physical activity encourages, at worst, passivity, and at best, a spirit of contemplation. But when the sun breaks through, spirits rise. The prospect of a good harvest stirs hope. People who had just been taking refuge in doorways or huddling under the huge black umbrellas which give a funereal air to monsoon-swept streets come out to enjoy the respite; and the landscape blooms with the women's colorful saris.

Ten years after independence India is in a monsoon mood. It feels neither the elation of 1947, when with the departure of the British it looked confidently to its future as a free nation; nor the sense of expectation generated by the launching of the First Five-Year Plan in 1951.

A decade of profound change and often painful readjustments has left its imprint on India. It is now clearly realized that independence from foreign rule marked, not the end, but the beginning of the new nation's struggle for freedom. The political revolution which united India against Britain is seen as the first stage of a long and arduous process which must bring an economic and social revolution if India is to garner the fruits of its efforts and not have them swept away in a torrent of internal conflicts.

India's mood today is sober—among some, even somber. There is a sense of pessimism, of frustration, as the myriad problems of building a united nation and modernizing an

in addition some aid and direction from the central government. This situation and some historical factors make for uniformity among universities in India. There are, to be sure, differences in administrative structure, in the curricula available to students, and in several other respects, but the diversity in India is not as great as in the United States.

The quality of the teaching staffs in Indian universities is generally good. A large number of the teachers have received advanced training in Britain or the United States, occasionally in other Western countries, but those whose whole training has been in India are not necessarily inferior to the foreign-educated group. Considering the fact that Indian university teaching staffs are greatly overworked because they are undermanned, one can only admire the extent of their scholarly productivity.

The poverty of India is, of course, the main reason for the paucity of teachers, as it is for many other inadequacies in higher education, such as in library facilities, in scientific laboratories, and in student dormitories. Although Indian educators are very much aware of financial needs, they do not exhibit a defeatist attitude in a situation which would be discouraging to many Westerners. Indeed, there is evidence that the enormity of the tasks confronting Indian educators has the effect of intensifying the dedication of some. For instance, there are scientists who are spurred to employ their own and their students' ingenuity to improvise substitutes for expensive equipment which their laboratories lack. This is, in itself, good education.


There is no doubt, however, that the acquisition of knowledge in India is retarded by too many obstacles. There is, moreover, the bare fact that, again for reasons of economy, the educational span in India from elementary schooling to the bachelor's degree is one or two years shorter than the normal span in the United States. No doubt the best schools in India partly make up for this deficiency by more intensive education, but the Indians have the additional and necessary burden of much more language work than is normally required in the United States. Admittedly, to the extent that more Indian than American university students are bilingual or trilingual, to that extent are they better educated, but the language demands coupled with the shorter educational span make necessary a premature specialization for the Indian student, thus resulting in an educational imbalance. In other words, the price of Indian poverty is a dilution of its whole educational process.

I hesitate to draw the logical conclusion that the average Indian university student is less mature than his American counterpart. The truth or falsity of such a generalization could only be determined by an exhaustive and difficult analysis. Pertinent to such an analysis, however, are a few impressions

which may be noted. I neither saw nor heard of panty raids by Indian students, but manifestations of immaturity in the form of student strikes for frivolous or irrelevant reasons can be more disruptive to scholarly activity. The tendency to rote learning common to many Indian university students has been attributed to the examination system, but the same examination system elicits quite the opposite traits in Britain. Some graduate students I met in India seemed to me to display an intellectual naiveté not to be found among the same group in the United States. On the other hand, there are others among recent graduates of Indian universities who convince me that no one could be more delightful, sparkling, and sophisticated than the best-educated young Indian man or woman.

Thus, to anyone who wishes well for Indian higher education there are both discouraging and encouraging featuresand the difficulties do not all stem from Indian poverty. When, for example, both in higher education and in other aspects of Indian life there is a gap between formal decisions and real implementations, it is legitimate to conclude that, despite conspicuous exceptions among individual Indians, an Indian national weakness is being exposed. On the other hand, there are some difficulties in higher education which are inherent in a complex situation, and are not due to any national failing. The most notable of these is the language problem which is far from having been resolved. For the record, Hindi is to be the national language of India and is to replace English as the chief medium of instruction in the universities. Quite apart, however, from the natural reluctance to put through this change on the part of Indians in the many areas where Hindi is not the native language, there is the inadequacy of Hindi as a medium of communication especially for modern science. The language question is an explosive issue in India, and one on which foreigners, especially Englishspeaking ones, hesitate to pass judgment. I can express admiration, however, for the whole tone of a recent report of a national committee on language to the University Grants Commission.

There are other heartening aspects of Indian higher education. Despite the strength of Indian nationalism today, the Indian universties are not caught in an intellectual lockstep, but are centers of freedom without losing touch with the community. Responsible political leaders and newspaper editors freely criticize the higher educational system. At the same time some of its best critics are among the members of its own teaching staffs. Moreover, some Indian university and college administrators display courage in maintaining standards, and resisting the pressures of nepotism and favoritism. In short, there is enough evidence of intellectual and moral vigor to justify an attitude of qualified hopefulness about Indian universities.





Japan
... vulnerable physically, psychologically, economically

In the thirteen years since the surrender ceremony aboard the USS Missouri, Japan has risen from the ashes, re-built burned cities, reorganized her government and economy, and re-emerged into the world community as the eightieth member of the United Nations.

Japanese trade has again grown so large that American interests are demanding protection against Japanese competition. A security treaty binds Japan and the U. S. in defense against Communist aggression. The Occupation-imposed constitution of 1947 is being modified by the conservatives who dominate Japaneses politics, but these modifications are being challenged and limited by the Socialist opposition. Many Occupation reforms have now been in force long enough to give some hope that Japan will grow more and more democratic, more and more stable, and friendlier to the West.

But Japan remains far too insecure to lend much support to the West in our search for security against Communism. Physically, psychologically, and economically, Japan is extremely vulnerable. Consequently, neither political stability nor friendliness to the U. S. can be regarded as assured.

Communist regimes rule most of the land areas near Japan. Islands under Russian control can be seen across narrow straits from Hokkaido, the northernmost of Japan's four main islands. China, North Korea, and North Viet-Nam are also under Communist control. These neighboring Communist areas—

As far back as 1940 he participated in a study commission for the Japan Economic Federation, visiting Japan, Manchuria and Occupied China. During World War II, serving with the U. S. Navy, he served as Japan Branch Chief with the State Department, and as chief of the Division of Research for the Far East. In 1955 he spent three months in the Far East as consultant for a business firm in a survey on business prospects for trade with the U.S. He will return to Japan this summer under a research grant for a broad study of Japan's economic relations with this country, and he will be on leave from the University next year to write a book on that subject, working at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York City.

especially China and Russia—are far more important in Japanese thinking than most Americans are aware. There is strong sentiment in Japan for doing business with China. At the same time, Japan is exposed to sudden devastating attack from Communist bases nearby.

The Japanese have never recovered psychologically from the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August, 1945. I was in Japan in 1955 when the tenth anniversary of these tragic events was marked with ceremonies, publicity, and solemn declarations that such terrible attacks must never be repeated. While observing the morbid attention given to details related to the Hiroshima and Nagaski attacks, one could hardly fail to note the apparent lack of concern over the comparably destructive and much more prolonged Tokyo fire raids of March, 1945, and of other lesser but also terrible fire bombings. The explanation for this contrast lies partly in the shock of newness, and the face-saving path to surrender provided by the nuclear weapons. Another part of the explanation seems to me to lie in the world-wide Communist propaganda campaign against A-bombs in the years after 1945. In Asia this propaganda has repeated endlessly the point that the U. S. used atomic bombs only against colored Asians, not against white Germans. (Such propaganda conveniently ignores the fact that the A-weapon was not perfected before Germany surrendered.)

Japan's excitement over nuclear weapons was reinforced by the much publicized fall-out accident in 1954 when the Japanese fishing boat, Lucky Dragon, was covered with radioactive dust in the Eniwetok area following one of our early H-bomb tests. Today Japanese sentiment runs very high against H-bomb testing and against U. S. basing of nuclear weapons in Japan. This sentiment extends to Okinawa, where the greatest U. S. military base in the Western Pacific has been built. Japan is recognized by the San Francisco Peace Treaty as retaining residual sovereignty over Okinawa. But the continuing U. S. military government there is a sore point that transcends the nuclear weapons issue for a very vocal group of Japanese.

Economically, Japan grows more vulnerable each year. The population is far too large to be supported by Japan's agricultural and mineral resources alone. Every year the population grows, although a truly remarkable decline in the birth rate in the past decade gives hope that population growth will continue to slow down, and may in time cease altogether. Still, Japan's farming area cannot grow significantly, and Japanese mines yield their coal, and a few other minerals, only with deeper and deeper digging into progressively smaller seams. Until the non-Communist world's trading system becomes far more dependable and offers resource-poor nations much more opportunity than at present, Japan's economy cannot be very secure.

What has actually happened to Japan's economy since World War II justifies both hope and fear. Hope can be based on the remarkable recovery Japan made in the years 1950-1957, when industrial production trebled and industrial capacity more than doubled. Just as impressive as the actual growth in the economy is the evident and effective will of the Japanese leadership to follow policies that keep the Japanese economy healthy, especially in relation to foreign trade. Twice since the Occupation ended in 1952, the Japanese government has adopted very stringent financial policies to stop inflation and serious losses of foreign exchange. In 1953 and again in 1957, the policies were severe and painful in many ways. But in both cases the measures taken proved effective in turning the foreign exchange deficit into a surplus.

But fear for Japan's economy also has much justification. Despite all the growth that has taken place during the century since Commodore Perry, Japanese incomes are very low by any standards except those of other Asian countries. Per capita income (gross national product) is about \$300 a year, on the basis of official statistics converted at the prevailing exchange rate. Efforts to raise total production and income encounter two limits, one domestic, the other international. The domestic ceiling is determined by Japan's present productive capacity and the limitations on capital available for expanding this capacity. But Japan's past performance makes expansion of facilities seem quite possible except in the very short run.


The more important economic ceiling, therefore, is the foreign one. How much can Japan buy and sell abroad? Japan's imports continue as in the past to exceed exports by a large margin. The gap is now closed mostly by special purchases in Japan made for U. S. military and foreign aid use in Asia. This "special dollar income" has for several years been about as large as total Japanese exports to the U. S., Japan's largest market. The amount of this special income will tend to drop with expected progressive U. S. troop withdrawals from Japan.

Senator Knowland has recently suggested that to counter the present recession such U. S. Government expenditures should be made in the U. S., not in foreign countries. The Senator apparently did not stop to consider that such a reduction in U. S. outlays would cut foreign purchasing power, and U. S. exports would consequently decline unless American aid were increased.

The most difficult and most important economic task facing Japan is to expand exports. Some Japanese and some American observers feel that there is a definite ceiling on what Japan can sell in the U. S. and elsewhere. Certainly the success that protectionist forces have recently been having in the U. S. lends support to this view. In 1956 and 1957 the Japanese adopted quota limitations on exports of cotton textiles to the U. S. These quotas, called "voluntary" despite the lengthy "discussions" which took place beforehand between U. S. and Japanese government representatives, place rigid quantitative limits on products for which Japan was finding a growing market here. Japan faces other export difficulties in the U. S. as a result of the current economic recession, and in Asia because of the very slow pace of economic growth in most non-Communist Asian countries. The pessimists have a strong case.

My own view is that Japan might, with a carefully planned and appropriately administered export drive, gradually expand sales in the United States. I see no necessary reason why our huge economy could not in time absorb several times the present flow of Japanese goods. Present imports from Japan are in the neighborhood of \$600 million a year, a very small volume compared to the \$434 billion of total income (gross national product) of the U. S. in 1957. To be sure, U. S. trade barriers are a great hazard.

Japan, thus, is still seeking its fortune. The quest continues thirteen years after surrender brought an end to the old imperialist approach. This fact should temper any satisfaction we may feel at apparent democratic trends, political stability, and international cooperation from Japan. The temporary character of Japan's economic arrangements may not be fully apparent to all Americans. And few seem to remember that it was the 1930 depression which permitted Japan's militarists to assert the power that sent them to Manchuria, China, Pearl Harbor, Southeast Asia, and after much bitter fighting in the Pacific War, to the surrender aboard the USS Missouri.

University TV Shows



Tens of thousands of people in Western New York and beyond feel a warm kinship with the University and a heightened awareness of its many contributions in teaching, research and public service as a result of its highly effective television and radio programs over the past five years.

Under the talented direction of Don W. Lyon, the programs avoid the pitfalls of both over-popularization and of academic constraint. They give viewers and listeners a close look at the University's many activities at the River Campus, the Medical Center, and the Eastman School of Music, and familiarize them with its outstanding teachers, scholars and scientists. Judging from the public response, the programs appeal to people in all walks of life.

Subjects range from the basic origins of the American vocabulary to atomic fission and fusion, from the secrets of winter to the rocks and minerals of New York State, from economic problems to drugs, sleep and new developments in medical research. Among special features have been performances by the Glee Clubs and the Chapel Choir.

Robert F. Hinman of English faculty dicusses basic origins of American vocabulary and unusual changes that occur when foreign words become part of our language. His subject, "Talk about Words," was so successful that a second program was given in response to popular demand from listeners. He appeared on the University Open House Television programs.

A new experiment in daytime educational television was begun this year with three series of lectures for women conducted by University School. A half-hour segment of each class was presented over the air. Here Dr. Frances Hamblin of Philosophy Department is lecturing on "Is It Ethical?" Community standards, religious ethics were among topics.

Win Big Audience

This fall will mark the beginning of the sixth year for the two major TV programs—University Open House and University Commentary, both on Channel 5, WROC-TV, which have been sponsored during the past five years by the Lincoln-Rochester Trust Company. Audience measurements taken by professional national services last fall indicated 55,000 homes in Rochester and Monroe County alone tuned in with an average of 2.3 members per set. It did not include the sizable audience beyond Monroe County. The March audience figures indicated that 100,000 homes were tuned in.

A successful innovation begun last September was a daytime series of weekly classes for women of the community on Channel 10, WHEC-TV. The classes ran from an hour to an hour and a half, one-half hour of each being televised, and were taught by University School. Sponsored by the Alumnae Association, they offered intellectual escape and stimulus for housewives. Three courses were given, one in logic, entitled "Therefore, Ladies," the second on the interrelationships of art and culture, entitled "From Demons to Democracy," and the third in ethics, "Is It Ethical?" The response showed clearly that the women welcomed this chance to broaden their horizons. About 130 were enrolled in the courses, and the mail received, telephone calls and actual ratings on the televised portions were gratifying to both the University and the television station.

Typical of the many letters received were these comments: "It is a very welcome relief from the usual run of inanity spoon-fed to the housewife on TV during the day." "Please send me the list of books and outline of discussions for your ethics course. I am a housewife—twenty-two years old, and peeking out from under piles of dishes, diapers, babies and other tasks. It certainly is refreshing to come upon a better TV program such as yours. Contrary to other mediocre programs presented during the week, it reminds me that I have a mind and am perfectly capable of using it if I so desire."

Plans call for a continuation of the series next fall, featuring Dr. Vera Micheles Dean, Director of the Non-Western Civilizations Program, Dr. Lincoln Canfield, Chairman of the Foreign Languages Department, and a third series yet to be worked out.

Homes Tune in to Programs

THE MEANING of the terms "science" and "proggress" are not universally agreed upon. To avoid possible confusion, we shall here use "science" to mean knowledge, especially that derived from systemized study, and "progress" to mean merely "movement forward, as in time." "Scientific progress," in this sense, is the growth of systematically derived knowledge, with the passing of time.

It has often been written that science is devoid of ethical significance. After all, knowledge, of itself, is neither good nor bad. It is the use to which knowledge is put which involves questions of morality. Perhaps this fine distinction between knowledge and its use is philosophically important and theoretically sound. Certainly, it once was. Practically, however, it is the nature of things today that this distinction is difficult to make and, once made, is of little significance. Scientific progress means an ever-increasing supply of new knowledge, from which it follows that there is also an ever-expanding, ever-changing choice of new uses. While one can draw a distinction between knowledge and its use, it is more difficult to distinguish between growing knowledge and the growing applications which automatically accrue.

It is this capacity for self-growth, then, implicit in the term "scientific progress," which raises questions of morality. And these questions take on special sigitself. In this connection, science has come into conflict with organized religion and theological dogma. This is the conflict between observable "fact" and inspired "revelation." The organized religions of the West have, for the most part, accepted the principles of Evolution, but this is just the beginning. It seems reasonable to presume that with the passing years scientific progress will markedly alter our concepts of the Creator and of man's place in the over-all "scheme of things."

Scientific progress will even alter the "needs of men" which traditional religion has, in large measure, fulfilled. The soon-to-come control of motivation, mood, and mind by drugs and environment raises sticky questions of an ethical character. Traditional religion has always striven to be a good influence on motivation, mood, and mind. What will religion do with absolute control? Will religion inherit this control?

Effects on Social Environment

The remolding of religious concepts is, however, only one consequence to be expected of scientific advance. There is a fundamental interdependence between the social and political order and scientific progress. The organization of society determines, to a large extent, the uses of new knowledge while new

nificance when we examine the growth process itself. The growth of knowledge is autocatalytic, i.e., each new fact begets others. With each new insight comes an awareness of several new vistas hitherto unsuspected. The process is somewhat analogous to a nuclear chain reaction which, if uncontrolled, proceeds at an ever-increasing rate until the whole of the nuclear fuel is consumed in one tremendous explosion. The analogy breaks down in that the "fuel," new undiscovered knowledge, seems to be in limitless supply. The growth of science, though it started rather slowly, is now well on its way to chain-reacting violence. There would be less reason for concern if violent scientific progress were not so all-pervasive, invading as it does all phases of man's environment: spiritual, social, and physical.

Effects on Spiritual Environment

First, let us look at scientific accomplishment in relation to religion. How often we have heard of the analogy of the watch and the watchmaker: "Who can look at a watch and deny the existence of the watchmaker?" And then, "Who can look on the universe and deny the existence of a Creator!" But in studying the watch and its parts one cannot help affecting one's concept of the watchmaker. Similarly, a study of the development of life-forms has placed a severe strain on the literal acceptance of certain chapters in Genesis. Science has extended our basic understanding of the origin of the universe, the nature of the universe, the origin of man and of life

knowledge often renders outmoded the existing social institutions.

Scientific research is almost exclusively supported by its would-be users, government and industry. The product of research, knowledge, is bought and paid for in advance. By this arrangement, the use of new knowledge is predetermined by the existing policies of the purchasers, government and industry. This, however, is a narrow view. The use to which new knowledge is put is largely predetermined by the world organization into which this new knowledge is introduced. Thus, the hydrogen bomb, introduced into a world which is polarized into two armed camps of opposed and irreconcilable ideologies, is



almost certain to be used, questions of morality notwithstanding.

The Industrial Revolution, with all its social upheaval, can logically be attributed, in the final analysis, to the application of early science. We are now entering the early phases of what, in later ages, may be termed the Scientific Revolution. The world, already shrunk, is shrinking further and science is now reaching out to shrink the solar system. With technological advance, interdependence has progressed from tribal relations rapidly through state, national and international levels. There seem to be two paths to the future: a continued improvement in material comforts in a setting of strained and outmoded social and political institutions or, alternatively, a new social and political order newly conceived and instituted to adjust to the ever-increasing products of science and technology. Looking to the future, these alternatives lead to frighteningly different ends. On the one extreme, there is global war and the destruction of the civilized world, perhaps, even the end of man. On the other hand, there is man's old dream of Utopia, where, freed from want and privation, man could spend most of his time in creative pursuits, in search of beauty and truth. Between these extremes, the range of possibilities is enormous: from worldwide tyranny, from a world-wide enslavement of man by his own artifices to a world-wide democracy which is basically good but far short of Utopia.

Viewing the future in this way, the discouraging aspect is the disparity between the rate of change of

social and political institutions and the rate of technological advance. Social evolution, always slow and faltering, has quickened its pace, but it is still a snail's pace relative to the mushrooming growth of science and technology. Decisions are reached for us while we are still debating the issues. For example, before this country had fully decided what constructive ends could be served by our atomic monopoly, the monopoly itself had slipped away. The future is now no further away than tomorrow. The explosive growth of science relative to the slow evolution of social and political institutions can be likened to the cancerous growth of an organ system, which, in unchecked expansion, not only fails to perform its necessary service functions but instead goes on to feed on its host.

Effects on Physical Environment

However, it is when we examine science in relation to man's physical environment that we raise really interesting questions of morality. Consider, for example, that man himself is the product of evolution through which life-forms unadaptable to a changing environment died out and the well-adapted forms prospered. The environment was always nature itself, or, as the theists say, "in the hands of God." Today, science is remaking the environment. How we handle nuclear radiation in the next decades will have important consequences in the mutation rate of all life-forms. Medicine, in preserving genetic abnormalities by life-saving operations and chemical procedures, is returning to the human genetic pool mutations which in ages past would have been lethal. Like it or not, in gaining control of his environment, man has gained some measure of control over his own destiny. Already, man has unwittingly meddled with his genes. By war, he has selectively killed off the physically and mentally fit leaving the physically and mentally less fit at home to breed the future generations. Thus far, this has had little effect, but let us look to the future. Even if we optimistically assume that global war will be averted and that the world will enter into an unprecedented era of comfort and plenty, the alarming growth of the world's population will pose some interesting problems. With science whittling away at the causes of death, which have, till now, largely offset man's procreative powers, the world will soon be overrun with people! Someone some day will decide who will breed and when and how often and with whom. These are God-like decisions but they will be forced on mere men

It is well to end our discussion on the theme that mere men must make God-like decisions. Even this superficial consideration of a few specific examples has shown again how inextricably "means" and "ends" are intertwined philosophically. Science may be amoral—a mere means to moral or immoral ends. However, the available means determine, in large measure, the ends that can and will be achieved. It takes God-like vision and wisdom to see today just what ends the ever-growing means (provided by science) will ultimately bring into being. However, we dare not sit back and let it all happen to us. Man's very destiny is at stake. This, any fool can see.

Computing Center "Numbers Game"

. . . A Boon To Research

A SKILLED ENGINEER can solve the complicated problem at the bottom of this page in a week. One of the University's computers can come up with an answer in five minutes.


The problem was put to the Computing Center by a company engaged in research on guided missiles. All parts that go into guided missiles have to be able to take tremendous accelerations. The company had developed an ingenious machine which would produce these accelerations for testing missile parts. However, each machine that is produced must be able to accelerate in a different way. The way it accelerates is determined by a small metal part which must be made differently for each machine. The company wanted to know how this vital part could be designed quickly and economically. A mathematical study of the requirements on the design of the part showed that the cross-sectional area, which is the important factor, would be given by the expression, reprinted below, at each point x.

The staff at the Computing Center determined that the evaluation of this expression by a modern computer could be done in about five minutes. As a result, a machine program was prepared and tested against parts which had already been made. This program proved so successful that almost all these parts are now being designed by automatic computers.

In the two years that have passed since the establishment of the Computing Center, programs have been developed by the staff and the graduate assistants at the Center which keep the high speed IBM 650 and the Burroughs Computer busy almost 200 hours a month. These programs deal with research of concern to many departments, to the University Administration, and to local industry. On campus, the chief users of computing equipment have been faculty members and graduate students in Optics, Physics, Psychology, Chemistry and Biology, working for the most part on sponsored research. But the assistance of programmers and the services of the computers have been made equally available to faculty without special research funds. In the twelve months following July 1, 1956, such "free time" provided a subsidy of more than \$9,000 to otherwise unsponsored research. The Computing Center is able to pro-

Dr. Keenan, who received his Bachelor of Science degree from the University in 1947, was named administrator of the Computing Center when it was established two years ago as a service to the University's own research and teaching programs and to local industry.

Previously he had been an assistant instructor in physics for five years at Purdue University, where he was awarded his Ph.D. degree in theoretical physics in 1955. He is a member of the American Physical Society, the Association for Computing Machines, Sigma Pi Sigma, honorary physics society, and Sigma Xi, national honorary science society.



vide this subsidy because both International Business Machines Corporation and Burroughs Corporation allow substantial reduction in rentals when their machines are used to facilitate research, and especially research from which the Center receives no income.


From the beginning the Center has sought opportunities through seminars and actual demonstrations to illustrate the uses of computing equipment to faculty and students. It has also sponsored or cosponsored such courses as "Introduction to Data Processing," "Numerical Methods and Electronic Computing," and "Digital Computer Programming." Instructors for these courses have been recruited from the Center itself, the University Administration, and the ranks of Eastman Kodak Company. This type of cooperation between the University and industry is equally characteristic of much of the research being done.

The Computing Center has been of service to industry in at least three ways: By providing training opportunities for persons interested in the use of high speed computing equipment, by assisting University departments or faculty members who are working with industry in a consulting capacity, and by making its facilities directly available to concerns engaged in technical and scientific programs.

The uses of the equipment at the Computing Center have ranged over a wide variety of subjects, such as statistical projection of population trends in New York State, designs of many types of optical systems, research studies in theoretical nuclear physics, design of electronic networks, imitation of the reproductive abilities of viruses, research in colored photography, and the design of various mechanical parts such as cams, gears, orifices and metering devices.

Many design tasks could be cited, and they all involve these basic steps: First, a study of the physical problem involved; second, a mathematical analysis of the requirements; third, a preparation of a computer program; fourth, testing the program against known results to make sure that it really works.

The number and variety of jobs under way help to explain the Center's lack of respect for the traditional eight-hour day.

New Deans, Director Appointed; Reorganization Program in Effect Sept. 1

The far-reaching reorganization of the Schools and Colleges on the River Campus, announced in February, with the establishment of three new professional education units, is moving briskly forward with the appointment of two new Deans and a Director.

To the immense satisfaction of faculty, administration, and students, Dr. W. Albert Noyes, Jr., the distinguished educator-scientist who has been Acting Dean for the past two years, has accepted the appointment of Dean of the College of Arts and Science.

It is unanimously agreed that it would be difficult indeed to find anyone more admirably qualified to lead the College in the vital new era on which it is launched under the reorganization plan with the growth in enrollment and strengthening of the educational program and faculties.

Dr. William A. Fullagar, Chairman of the present Division of Education, has been named Dean of the new College of Education, and Dr. John M. Brophy, now Chairman of the Department of Business Administration, will be the Director of the new School of Business Administration. Yet to be chosen is the Dean of the new College of Engineering that will replace the present Division of Engineering when the reorganization goes into effect September 1.

The expansion program has met with wide approbation. The enthusiastic reaction was well summed up in an editorial in the Rochester *Democrat and Chronicle*, which hailed the announcement as marking the University's "dedication to the task of serving more young people better and its confidence in the future."

"The University's expansion plans," the editorial said, "are in line with the determination of non-tax supported universities to meet the needs for trained personnel by relying heavily upon their own resources. A new report to Governor Harriman includes the U. of R. among 110 of such institutions in New York State which plan to spend nearly half a billion dollars on expansion of facilities that will enable them to raise student capacities from 110,000 to 185,000 by 1970.

"The establishment of Colleges of Engineering and Education and a School of Business Administration . . . broadens and deepens the University's capacity to serve. The Colleges of Engineering and Education will emerge at a time when the demand for engineers and better teachers is at a peak. The School of Business Administration . . . is of a more local character; the industrial and business community of Rochester depends in large measure on the U. of R. for executive personnel.

"In the field of education the University aspires, by producing more and better teachers, to improve the scholastic fiber of high school graduates

"The reorganization, in time, will change the profile of the University, physically, as higher enrollments, more facilities dictate expansion. The inner change will be felt even more because it is indicative of the University's resolution to meet the new, titanic challenges of higher education."

As another step in its River Campus program, the University this spring began construction of a new dormitory, adjacent to Lovejoy Hall, in the men's residence hall quadrangle. It will provide additional accommodations for 174 undergraduate students.

The U. S. Community Facilities Administration has approved a \$1,140,000 loan to the University for the new building, a four-story structure of Georgian architecture, Harvard brick and limestone construction harmonizing with the other five men's dormitories. When the dormitory is completed for the 1959-1960 academic year, the University will have dormitory facilities for about 950 undergraduate men on the River Campus. Interest on the forty-year government loan, which is expected to cover construction cost, will be 2½ per cent.

As an educator, researcher and scientist-statesman, Dr. Noyes is a man of national and international stature. He took part in the original drafting of plans for the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and for the past six years he has served on the National Commission for UNESCO. As a member and officer of the International Union of Chemistry, and the International Council of Scientific Unions, and as consultant to government defense and research agencies, he has made over thirty trips to Europe and others to Australia, New Guinea and Panama in the past fifteen years. He has been a guest lecturer at universities in England, Scotland and France.

In an address last year in Chicago, when he received the dinstinguished Willard Gibbs Medal of the Chicago Section of the American Chemical Society, he advocated a U. S. foreign policy in science, and proposed that a top scientist be given cabinet rank (*Rochester Review*, September, 1957). Early this year, the proposal came up again when Senators McLennan and Humphrey announced they would introduce a bill in Congress establishing a U. S. Department of Science and Technology.

Space does not permit listing all of his attainments. He has been Professor of Chemistry at Rochester since 1938. He has held the Charles Frederick Houghton Professorship in Chemistry since 1940, and was department Chairman from 1939-1955, and Dean of the Graduate School from 1952-1956, when he was appointed Acting Dean of the College.

He is a former chairman of the National Research Council's Division of Chemistry and Chemical Technology, and has served with the National Research Committee as chief of the technical division of the Chemical Warfare Service, to mention a few of the important posts he has held.

Dr. Fullagar, the new Dean of the College of Education, came to the University of Rochester in 1956 as Professor and Chairman of the Division of Education. Formerly on the University of Florida faculty, he was prominent as a consultant to public school systems in that state.

Dr. Brophy, Director of the School of Business Administration, has been at Rochester since last September, after having been on the faculty of the School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University since 1947. He is a graduate of Stout Institute, Stout State College, Wis., and holds a master's degree from the University of Minnesota and a Ph.D. from Cornell. He has had wide experience in industrial education and training and has been a consultant to industries.

Annual Costs \$18,715,839; Gifts \$12,941,620. Mainly for Medical Research, Fellowships

THE UNIVERSITY'S annual operating and research costs again rose to a new peak in the 1956-1957 fiscal year, with a total expense of \$18,715,839, an increase of \$829,559 over the 1955-1956 figure, reports Raymond L. Thompson, Senior Vice President and Treasurer of the University.

Gifts and bequests to the University endowment funds during the year also reached an impressive amount, \$12,941,-620. Most of this sum was earmarked by its donors for medical research and fellowships, however, and cannot be used for general University purposes.

From the estate of Ralph Hochstetter of Buffalo came the largest bequest, \$7,024,910, to establish post-doctoral fellowships for medical research. Another was one of \$1,050,000 from the estate of Mrs. Ernest H. Woodward of LeRoy in part payment of her bequest giving 70 per cent of her residuary estate to the University, the income to be used to operate the Edith Hartwell Clinic for cerebral palsy children in LeRoy and Woodward House, her former home, now used as a center for University educational activities.

A payment of \$460,400 was received from the estate of Mrs. Bertha H. Buswell, Mr. Hochstetter's sister, for the fund she and her late husband, Dr. Henry C. Buswell, established for research in the Department of Medicine. This sum brought to a total of \$3,552,855 the amount paid into the fund from her estate.

The Ford Foundation gave the University \$4,111,500, including \$3,100,000 for the School of Medicine and Dentistry to provide income for instructional purposes, and \$992,500 to help raise faculty salaries in the College of Arts and Science and Eastman School of Music.

Alumni, through the annual Fund campaign, special gifts and bequests, contributed \$157,129 during the year. Gifts from business and industry for unrestricted use totaled \$267,350. Other gifts to endowment came to \$294,810.

Contributions in 1956-1957 raised the University's endowment funds to \$78,043,379, as compared with \$65,101,-759 during the preceding fiscal year.

The total cost of \$18,715,839 for the year included \$12,533,876, or 67 per

cent, for salaries of the University's 3,350 employees, and for contributions to the University's employee retirement, life insurance and health insurance benefits.

Fundamental research sponsored by the U. S. Government, New York State, foundations, and industry, amounted to \$4,339,717.

Income from endowment funds paid only 22.4 per cent of the total operating costs, and tuition and student fees, 15 per cent. Grants-in-aid and sponsored research accounted for 23.8 per cent; hospital patients and Municipal Hospital, 26.3 per cent; dormitories and dining facilities, 5.2 per cent; other gifts, 3.3 per cent; miscellaneous, 4 per cent.

Mr. Thompson again called attention to the need of the College of Arts and Science for additional endowment funds. It required 38 per cent of the income from unrestricted sources to extinguish the College's deficit of \$409,154 for the year.

Total expenditures of the University Medical Center in 1956-1957 were \$10,747,635 for the year, or 57 per cent of the total University operating costs.

Scholarships and loans granted to undergraduate and graduate students amounted to \$672,995, which equalled 21 per cent of the amount received in payment of student tuition and fees.

The University's endowment funds are allocated among its various divisions. The operating results for each of the endowed schools or colleges are determined after allocating to each all of its earned income and the income from its endowment funds for the fiscal year. Income from the University's unrestricted funds is appropriated as far as possible to meet deficits in the individual schools. The endowments are set up as follows:

College of Arts and Science, \$15,758,545; School of Medicine and Dentistry, \$33,657,145; Eastman School of Music, \$11,206,925; University General Fund, \$16,048,950; Strong Memorial Hospital, \$195,763; Memorial Art Gallery, \$678,765; University School, \$497,287.

Market value of the University's endowed assets was 175 per cent of the book value as of June 30, 1957. Income on investments was distributed at the rate of 51/8 per cent figured on the book value of endowment funds.

Dr. Dunkel Succeeds Dr. Koller As English Department Chairman

PROF. WILBUR D. DUNKEL, whose classes in Shakespeare and the drama have enriched the college experience of hundreds of students in the past thirty-three years, is the new Chairman of the Department of English, effective in September.

He succeeds Prof. Kathrine Koller, who was appointed Chairman in 1946, the first woman to head a major department in the University. Professor Koller continues as Joseph H. Gilmore Professor of English, and is resigning her administrative duties after twelve years to devote her full time to teaching, research and writing. She will be on leave for the 1958-1959 academic year to complete her book on "Death and Neo-Stoicism in the English Renaissance."

The change in its administration serves to spotlight the creative activity and vitality of the department under Professor Koller's leadership. The series of conferences which she inaugurated in 1948 has brought many of the leading figures in literature to the River Campus to discuss such subjects as American literature, the novel, poetry and modern writers, and English literature in lectures and informal meetings with students and faculty. Robert Penn Warren, Elizabeth Bowen, E. E. Cummings, James Farrell, Alfred Kazin, and Prof. Louis B. Wright of the Folger Library, are only a few of the noted writers and critics who have taken part.

This year's conference on "Literature

end the Arts in Contemporary Society" on March 7 and 8 was one of the most successful. The speakers were Paul Rudolph, chairman of the department of architecture at Yale University, designer of the much-discussed Wellesley College Art Center and other noted buildings; John Ciardi, poetry editor of The Saturday Review, professor of literature at Rutgers, and author of numerous books of poetry; William Kienbusch, well-known artist; and Prof. Harry Levin, chairman of the department of comparative literature at Harvard, author of many works of criticism and scholarship.

A distinguished newcomer to the English faculty next September will be Prof. George H. Ford of the University of Cincinnati, an authority on Victorian prose and the novel, who has been appointed Professor of English at Rochester. Among his published books are "Dickens and His Readers" (Princeton University Press, 1955), which one reviewer called "the most important work on Dickens published since Johnson's biography" and "one of the genuinely illuminating books on Dickens and on the Victorian novel in general."

Professor Ford was graduated from the University of Manitoba in 1936, and received his Ph.D. degree in 1942 from Yale University, where his doctoral thesis won the John Addison Porter Prize. He taught for several years at the University of Manitoba, going in 1946 to the University of Cincinnati as associate

professor, with promotion to full professor in 1954. At Cincinnati he has conducted courses on the English novel of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, Victorian prose and poetry, and seminars on the novel. In addition to teaching undergraduate courses, he has directed the theses of graduate students.

His other books include "Keats and the Victorians," (Yale University Press) and "The Pickersgill Letters" (Ryerson Press). He is a member of the International Association of Professors of English, the Modern Language Association and its Victorian Committee, the American Council of Learned Societies, and Delta Upsilon fraternity. Dr. Ford was married in 1942 to the former Patricia Murray of Winnipeg. They have two children, a daughter, Leslie, six, and a son, Harry, two.

Another addition to the faculty will be Prof. Raymond L. Brett, who holds the chair of English at the University of Hull, England. Professor Brett will come as Visiting Professor of English under the exchange professorship program supported by the R. T. French Company of Rochester and Reckitt & Colman, Ltd., of Hull. Dr. Dunkel taught at the University of Hull in 1955-1956 under this plan.

Since Professor Koller became chairman, the English Department faculty has been increased from twelve to twenty members and the graduate study program extended to include a Ph.D. degree that offers training in the teaching of English. In addition to full teaching schedules, the faculty has an impressive record of creative work. Besides Dr. Koller, five other members will be on leave in 1958-

1959 to do research and writing. Associate Professor Hyam Plutzik will be away the first semester to work on a long poem, "Elegy for the Six Million," (the victims of Hitler), as well as shorter poems and a play based on the Athenians' attack on Syracuse. Professor Plutzik's book of poems, "Aspects of Proteus," won the 1949 Poetry Society of America award and also the \$1,000 award of the National Institute of Arts and Letters for creative work in the fields of literature.

Associate Professor William H. Gilman will continue his research on Emerson during the first semester under a grant from the American Council of Learned Societies. He has been named visiting professor at Leland Stanford for the second semester.

Assistant Professor R. James Kaufmann will spend the year on his book, "The Tragic Tone," a study on tragic experiences in the drama from Marlow to Dryden. Associate Professor Joseph Frank will be on leave for the year to complete his book on the beginnings of the English newspaper in the seventeenth century.

William D. Snodgrass, instructor, won a \$4,000 poetry fellowship in February from the *Hudson Review*, literary publication, in which many of his poems have appeared.

Professor Dunkel, who holds the endowed Roswell S. Burrows chair of English and has been a member of the Rochester faculty since 1925, is at work on a book, "Bernard Shaw's Playwrighting," and is the author of a critical biography of Sir Arthur Pinero.

Dr. Robert Hutchins to Give Address; Receive Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree

As PRESIDENT of the University of Chicago from 1929 to 1945 and chancellor from 1945-1951, Robert Maynard Hutchins introduced many changes, often of a controversial nature, that caused American higher education to re-examine traditional teaching methods. A staunch and eloquent champion of academic freedom, he opposed the loyalty oath for university faculty members, insisting that membership on a faculty should be determined by the competence and integrity of the individual.

Now president of the Fund for the Republic, an independent organization of the Ford Foundation, he directs its activities to eliminate restrictions on freedom of thought, inquiry and expression in the United States and to develop a policy to protect those rights.

Mr. Hutchins will be the speaker at the University of Rochester's 108th Commencement on Sunday, June 8, and will receive an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

Among the innnovations during his twenty-two year regime at Chicago were "The Chicago Plan," the "Great Books Program" and the minimizing of intercollegiate athletics with the abolishing of intercollegiate football in 1939. He devised the plan for a four-year liberal arts program, beginning in the junior year of high school, which was adopted in 1937 at Chicago. He instituted adult courses in great books in 1946, and was editorin-chief of "Great Books of the Western World."

Some of his colleagues regarded him as a fanatical liberal, others as reactionary, and still others as the apostle of a new and better era in higher education. He was opposed to "uneducated specialists," and advocated a system where students of the biological, physical, social sciences and the humanities could obtain their degrees as soon as they passed the Board of Examiners' achievement tests.

During his colorful era as president of Chicago, the first controlled nuclear chain reaction experiment at Stagg Field took place, on December 2, 1942, which led to the development of the U. S. atomic bomb program. Mr. Hutchins built up the science departments at Chicago, and instituted a \$12 million peacetime nuclear and metals research program, adding two Nobel Prize winners to the faculty, Harold C. Urey and the late Enrico Fermi.

Before going to Chicago, Mr. Hutchins was Dean of Yale Law School. He is a graduate of Yale, and holds many honorary degrees.

When he went to Chicago, Mr. Hutchins, then thirty, was the youngest man ever to be chosen president of a major university. He resigned as president in 1945 and became chancellor, and also chairman of the Board of Editors of the Encyclopedia Britannica. After the war he abandoned his former isolationist position, and in 1945 became president of the Committee to Frame a World Constitution. In 1948, under his prompting, the University of Chicago organized a two-year project to help re-establish cooperation between higher education in Germany and the United States, with exchange professorships between Chicago and Frankfurt.

Rochester Nuclear Physics Parley Moves to Europe Research Center

FOUR MEMBERS of the Physics Department will take part in the sessions of the annual Rochester Conference on High Energy Physics June 27—July 5, to be held this year in Geneva, Switzerland, after having been at the River Campus for the past seven years.

Dr. Robert E. Marshak, Chairman of the department and "father" of the conference, which he first organized in 1950, representing the department's theoretical group, will be chairman of one of the meetings, and Dr. Sidney W. Barnes and Dr. Arthur Roberts, of the cyclotron group, will report on research with the University's 240-million volt synchrocyclotron. Dr. Morton F. Kaplon, head of the cosmic ray group, will report on

work in that field at Rochester.

The 1958 international conference will be held at the European Center for Nuclear Research (CERN) in Geneva. During the conference, the first meeting of the Commission on High Energy Physics will be held. It was created by the International Union of Pure and Applied Physics in Rome, Italy, last October. Dr. Marshak, one of five American scientists chosen as official U. S. State Department delegates to the Rome meeting, is secretary of the commission, which includes two Soviet members.

It was established to handle all future arrangements for the Rochester conference, because of the important international status the conference has attained.


Another of the commission's responsibilities is to foster greater cooperation between physicists of the East and West. One of its major decisions in Geneva will be to determine whether next year's conference will be held at the University of Rochester or in Moscow. In the event that Moscow is chosen, Rochester will be the scene of the 1960 conference.

Before going to Geneva, Dr. Marshak will lecture at the Nordic Institute for Theoretical Physics in Copenhagen, Denmark, June 22-26. President of the institute is the famed Niels Bohr, winner of the first \$75,000 Atoms for Peace Award.

Dr. Marshak also is one of sixty-two nationally prominent physicists, including four Nobel Prize winners, chosen by the American Institute of Physics to help improve the teaching of physics in high schools and colleges by visiting and lecturing at 100 colleges and universities throughout the country. He has been visiting lecturer under this program at the University of Minnesota and at Hope College, Holland, Mich., and also met with students and assisted faculty members with curriculum and research problems in physics.

New Polarizing Microscope Bares Secrets of Living Cells

Dr. Shinya Inoue, research scholar in biology, with his polarizing microscope, a powerful new research tool which gives scientists the clearest look now possible at living cells. It is 20 times more sensitive than previous devices and permits photographs of muscle fiber structure.



The conquest of cancer, muscular dystrophy and other diseases of the muscles, including the heart, may be a long step closer as a result of a new microscope developed by a brilliant young University of Rochester biologist, Dr. Shinya Inoue, in collaboration with Dr. W. Lewis Hyde of the American Optical Company.

The powerful new research tool gives scientists the closest look now possible at living cells, both normal and abnormal. It permits photographs of muscle fiber structure never seen before and gives a much clearer idea of the organization of chemicals in the fibers than was heretofore possible. It is twenty times more sensitive than previous instruments.

Dr. Inoue (pronounced In-ou-way), Research Scholar and Assistant Professor of Biology, describes the apparatus as a "high resolution, high sensitivity polarizing microscope." It depends on the fact that arrangements of molecules influence the speed and direction of beams of polarized light passing through them. This principle is called birefringence, and because of it, orderly groups of molecules can be detected even though their size is too small for the resolving power of the best conventional microscopes. Electron microscopes can distinguish smaller detail than is possible with a polarizing microscope, but the special requirements limit subject matter of the electron microscope to tissue that is not alive.

The first application of Dr. Inoue's microscope was the observation of division of living cells. This is now being combined with biochemical studies in which some proteins are extracted and then put back, and the fibers stimulated to contract, giving more complete understanding of the role of each protein in muscle contraction.

Conference Room At Medical Center Named In Honor of Dr. McCann

FITTINGLY NAMED in honor of Dr. William S. McCann, Emeritus Professor of Medicine and one of the men of vision who helped guide American medical education to its present world leadership, the Department of Medicine has a new conference room and library that already is filling an important place as a center of communications.

A handsome room with cherry paneling and attractive furnishings, the McCann Room was dedicated on March 23. It was made possible by contributions from many of Dr. McCann's students, professional associates and friends. When used to capacity, it seats approximately sixty persons. A small kitchenette off the main area permits weekly departmental luncheons after staff conferences. A folding door divides the large room into two small classrooms when needed.

At the presentation, President de Kiewiet recalled that when Dr. McCann was

Aids Cancer Research

Dr. Inoue's research on muscle fibers was done in collaboration with Dr. Andrew G. Szent-Gyorgyi, a biologist at the Institute for Muscle Research at the Marine Biological Labortory, Woods Hole, Mass. His photographs revealed transformations never before seen taking place as the muscle fiber contracts. These involve the bands or striations which make up each muscle fiber and which never have been fully understood. He noted through the polarizing microscope that the bands, which are of different composition, change position and size and even merge during muscle contraction. This opens up a new direction of research into how muscles function.

Studies of parts of living cells previously invisible also are made possible with the new microscope, permitting scientists to see how molecules are lined up and to find clues to the forces active within the cells. The factors which control growth and reproduction, of importance also in studies of cancer, may now be observed.

A particular cell structure which scientists can observe through Dr. Inoue's microscope is the mitotic spindle, by which the hereditary particles of the cell are separated into two groups when the cell divides. In some cancerous cells the spindle is abnormal, and in such cases, the new cells formed also are abnormal.

It has long been known that the spindles exist and have a role in the separation of chromosomes, but whether or not the spindles have any interior structure of their own has been disputed among biologists for over seventy years. With his uniquely sensitive microscopes Dr. Inoue has provided clear evidence that the spindles do have interior fibrous structure. This knowledge is intrinsically important, but it has added significance for cancer researchers because the mitotic spindle is one of the few things that go demonstrably wrong in some, though not all, cancer cells.


As a result of the advances made possible by the new instrument, the Department of Biology is planning a training program for post-doctoral and visiting scientists, on the physical and optical analysis of fine structures of living protoplasm, under Dr. Inoue's direction.

Dr. Inoue's research is supported by grants from the American Cancer Society, which did him the rare honor of naming him a Scholar of the Society, and by the U. S. Public Health Service.

The newest model of his microscope was financed by the American Optical Company, which is considering duplicating the instrument on a special request basis for the use of research laboratories throughout the world. It was built by Rudolf Hamberger, instrument maker in the Institute of Optics.

His colleagues regard Dr. Inoue as a remarkable scientist who has a commanding knowledge not only of biology but also of the science of optics. His background is unusual: The son of a Japanese diplomat, he was born in London in 1921, brought up in Portland, Ore., and Sydney, Australia, and trained in Tokyo and the United States. He attended high school in Japan, and was graduated from Tokyo University with a major in zoology. After the war he went to Princeton University where he developed his first microscope, reporting on it as his Ph.D. thesis in 1951. His second model was developed at the University of Washington, where he was an instructor in anatomy, and where he married the former Sylvia McCandless. They now have four children, Heather, nine, Jonathan, fourteen, Christopher, three, and Stephen, one.

Dr. Inoue came to the University of Rochester in 1955.



Interfaith Chapel at Medical Center

THE BOND between the healing arts and the power of prayer will be closer at the University Medical Center with the completion of a new interfaith chapel to be started this spring. It will be for the use of patients, staff and visitors.

The interior of the chapel, which will seat sixty persons, will be of comb-grained oak paneling, and the wall of the semicircular nave will be of vertically-laid brick. The altar will be a white marble block on a dark base. Behind it will be an illuminated mosaic of the Twenty-third Psalm in red and blue lettering on a gold field. Light will be admitted from the surrounding court through windows high on the side and rear walls. Walter V. Wiard, '22, is the architect.

Financed by contributions from people of all faiths, among them doctors on the staff of the School of Medicine and Dentistry, it will be available to all faiths for religious services or ministering to patients, and there also will be retiring rooms for families of acutely ill patients.

Funds now in hand are sufficient to complete the basic structure, but further contributions are still needed for furnishings and equipment. Gilbert J. Mc-Curdy, chairman of the building committee and a University Trustee, said that it is hoped the necessary amount will be obtained in time to open the chapel this year.

The chapel, to be located in the court just behind the main lobby of Strong Memorial Hospital, will have movable chairs in place of fixed pews to permit accommodation of wheel chairs and bedridden patients.

Serving with Mr. McCurdy on the building committee are Raymond L. Thompson, Senior Vice President and Treasurer of the University, Dean Donald G. Anderson, J. Milo Anderson, Administrator of Strong Memorial Hospital, and Dr. Lawrence A. Kohn, Associate Professor of Medicine, who has been working for many years on the chapel project.

"The faculty and staff of the hospital have long recognized the need for a chapel," said Dean Anderson. "We are grateful to Mr. McCurdy and his associates, and to members of our own staff who are working to make this possible."





iece Comes to Gallery

Confiscated by the Nazis and recovered after the war, this rare and impressive 14th century Florentine altarpiece has been purchased by the University's Memorial Art Gallery. The work of Nardo di Cione, it was cited by America's leading art magazine, "Art News," as one of two important old master acquisitions made by an American museum in 1957. Still boasting its hand-carved, gold-tooled and arcaded frame, the polyptych features a compact yet graceful Madonna and Child in its center panel with strongly-painted, half-length figures of St. Francis, St. John Baptist, St. Peter and St. Dominic in flanking niches on either side. Painted in tempera in warm tones of reds, yellows, greys, and greens, with striking accents of black and white, the panel glows with rich color against a patterned gold background. The Gallery purchased the work from the gallery of Dr. Paul Drey, who obtained it from the famed von Nemes Collection in Germany.





Conductor Becomes III, Quick-witted Violinist Leads 'Met' Orchestra

W HEN Conductor Pietro Cimara was suddenly taken ill during the first act of a Metropolitan Opera presentation, during the Met's winter season, of Verdi's "La Forza del Destino," the performance was carried on without interruption because the orchestra's quickwitted second violinist stepped from the pit to the podium and took over for the ailing conductor for the remainder of the scene.

The violinist-turned-conductor was Walter Hagen, '42E, who said he conducted from memory and by ear. Noting that Cimara was ill, Hagen began beating time for the orchestra, and then, at the request of several of the players, got up on the podium to conduct. 


