Free-Matter Postage

We have been getting a lot of inquiries lately from patrons about whether postal regulations concerning the mailing of **free-matter** have changed. Some of you have even gotten things returned to you with postage due. The free-matter guidelines have **not** changed, but the postal service is watching the mail more closely since the September 11 tragedy and the recent postal attacks.



Only the following material may be mailed free-matter:

- Books, magazines, musical scores, and other reading matter done in Braille, large print, or recorded form.
- Paper, records, tapes, and other matter for the production of reading matter, musical scores, or sound reproductions for eligible persons.
- Equipment and parts for equipment used for writing by eligible persons or for educational purposes.
- Sound playback equipment specially designed or adapted for use by visually handicapped persons, such as Braille watches, white canes, and similar equipment.

Handwritten letters <u>cannot</u> be mailed free-matter and are subject to applicable postage. When sending letters **free-matter** the letters must be left unsealed to allow inspection by postal authorities. Please do not send handwritten notes in talking book containers or include handwritten notes on talking book orders if you wish to send them postage free.

DRIS Conducts Survey

Patrons of Dakota Radio Information Service (DRIS) may have received a phone call from the North Dakota State Library recently. The library conducted a survey of its DRIS patrons to get comments, suggestions, and update the patron database. The input from this survey will be used to improve service.

Patrons were asked questions about their use of the radio, which programs they listen to, and how often they listen. They were able to make comments about the service and suggest changes they would like implemented. Most of the patrons were very happy with their service, but if not were asked to suggest things we could do to improve our broadcast.



The patrons surveyed ranged in ages from 30 to 100.

DRIS is only available in the Western portion of North Dakota including areas in and around Bismarck, Mandan, Dickinson, Williston, Jamestown, Valley City, and Minot. Service is also available within the towns of Hettinger, Bowman, Beach, Crosby, Harvey, and Tioga.

The State Library is presently working on a feasibility study funded by a grant from North Dakota Vocational Rehabilitation to explore options for future broadcasting options. We will provide simple guidelines to volunteers who are interested in providing this service. You must be an active user of the talking book service to volunteer for this position. Volunteers will receive credit for the time spent listening and critiquing these recordings.
