radio in the twentieth century

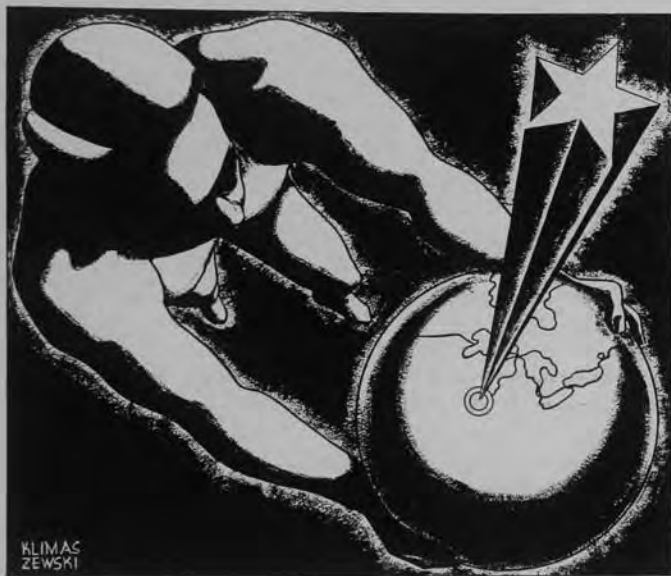
The tremendous progress made by radio, in the last quarter of a century, has amazed the world with its rapidity. Many scientists and inventors had been experimenting with the sending of electric waves through the ether, when Marconi, in 1899, was successful in sending and receiving a wireless message across the English Channel, a distance of thirty-two miles. This established the practical value of radio, but there were many people who did not believe in it. Marconi however, in 1901, proved the value of the radio to the world by sending a wireless message across the Atlantic Ocean.

While Marconi was experimenting with the wireless, many scientists were finding new and important facts, which later aided in the development of the radio. The imagination of the people was aroused by a shipwreck, in which the wireless saved the lives of a great number of people. Then the General Electric Company met with success in long-range transmission and designed new instruments which were far superior to the apparatus formerly used.

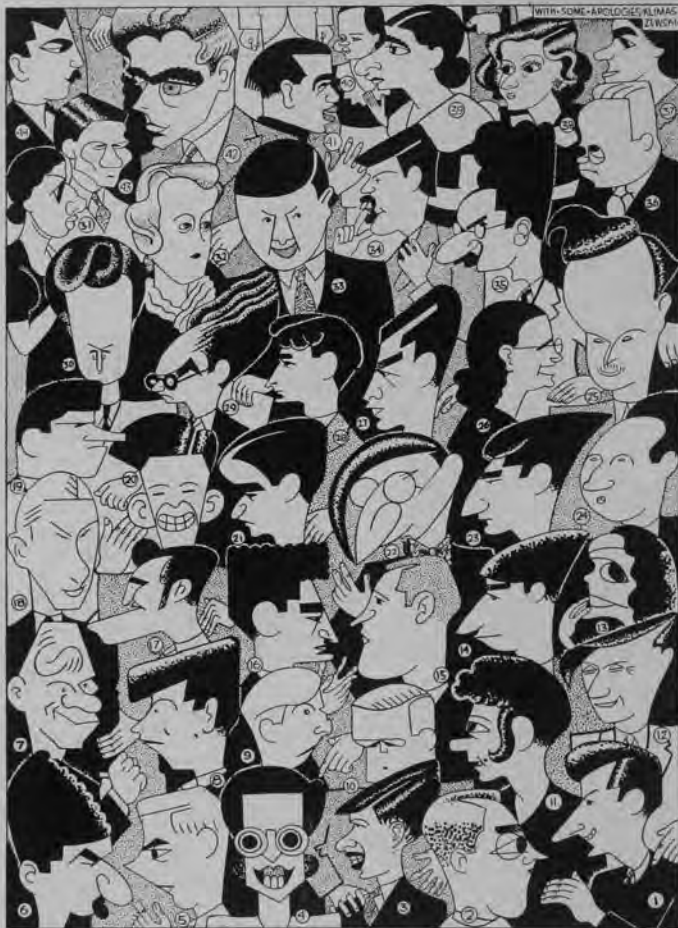
The first attempt proved that it was possible to send the human voice through the air for thousands of miles, and was an important step in preparing for nation-wide broadcasting, which took the country by storm in 1921. The first popular broadcasting, such as we now have, was carried out by the Westinghouse Electric Company, which sent out the 1920 presidential election returns from their station, and continued daily to give lectures and concerts to those who had the apparatus to listen in.

In a few years figures showed an amazing growth in the radio industry, and the radio became a part of the home. The types of radio sets improved as the years passed and now we have sets which receive and transmit music, speeches, and even drama, in a clear and even tone.

The remarkable rise of radio in the early part of the twentieth century shows how fast our civilization is progressing. The radio has become a necessity with which we could now not easily dispense. Because of its tremendous progress and increasing usefulness, radio is classed as one of the most important factors in our development in the last century.

Making Hi-De-Ho In Boopa-Doopa

ON June 1, the famous Arcarese expedition to the unknown island of Boopa-Doopa, near New Guatemazela, took off from the LeRoy air-port in the plane "Birth of a Notion." 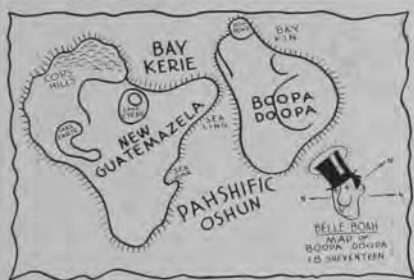
