

After Royle Safaris November 2022 group tour Martin headed further north in Madagascar to scout out an itinerary for future trips. The idea was to visit Cape Masaola, Marojejy, Dariana, Ankarana and Nosy Be. The trip was only short (9 days to cover a huge amount of ground), so it was all go and left no room for problems. Which was a problem as Madagascan roads can be a nightmare.

As a result in the end we had to skip Marojejy, it was just not possible to get from Masoala to Marojejy without losing at least 2 full days and with these days better spent in Dariana and Ankarana the decision was made to adjust the itinerary.

It worked out that the only lemur we would be forsaking (with good chances of seeing) was the silky sifaka (you always need a reason to go back to a country) and in the end we saw 38 species of mammals, including 24 species of lemur (meaning that across the two trips Martin participated in back to back a total of 74 species of mammals were seen of which 47 species were lemurs. Martin has now seen 52 species of lemur – nearly half way there to all the lemur species!

Highlights included a great **aye-aye** in Dariana, very close and engaging **Tattersall's sifakas** as well as **red-ruffed lemur** and all of the endemic lemurs to Cape Masoala. As well as lemurs we had 2 sightings of **fanaloka** and several bat species in the caves of the Ankara tsingy.

Below is our sighting log of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians and fishes. Doing this trip during the end of the dry season meant that some of the hibernating lemurs were not awake in big numbers, and tenrecs were not as abundant as they are during the wet season. The reason for this trip being at this time of year was the scheduling of the group tour that proceeded this one and for why we picked November for the group tour you can read that trip report.

The rain started to pick up a little on the trip, and particularly when in Cape Masoala where we had a couple of storms and this resulted in poorer views of the **red-ruffed lemurs** than we hoped for and was a large reason for the change in plan and leaving out Marojejy. To make it from Masoala to Marojejy requires a long boat journey around the cape and then 2 days on a bike (in good road conditions) but with the rain washing out the roads this could have extended the bike journey to several more days and so the plan was rightfully scrapped.

Other than the silky sifaka all other targeted species (and several others) were seen and we will be looking to include this route as part of a new itinerary in future and also can include this whole itinerary or parts of it as an extension to our existing Madagascar tours.

The plan we took was as follows; flying from Tana to Maroanotsetra and then heading straight to Nosy Mangabe for the night (a great little island with some nice wildlife which breaks up the journey from Tana to Masoala), then on to Masoala for 2 nights (Masoala being the largest intact forest in the country and whilst most is very dense and without trails, there are many trails accessible from the accommodation along the southern coast of the peninsula and also some great multi-day hiking to the interior of the forest). Then came the change of plan and we went back to Maroanotsetra for 2 nights as we waited for the flight back to Tana, whilst here we headed out around the town and found some nice mammals before flying to Antsiranana via Antananarivo and then we drove to Dariana for 2 nights, then back to Ankarana for 2 nights and then Nosy Be for 1 night before flying back to Tana before returning home.

The **aye-aye** was particularly good, as Jon Hall had done a few days earlier we went with local guides into the forest (the location of my **aye-aye** was not as aesthetically pleasing as Jon's was – it was in the middle of a make shift village / gold mine – which added something extra to walking around at night looking up at the trees and trying not to fall down the claustrophobia inducing holes and tunnels dotted all over the place) and waited until just after sunset. Then out of a huge tangle of vegetation emerged the amazing animal, it stopped and groomed itself for ages before heading out into the forest. It is great that the local people are now looking at the **aye-aye** as a positive and not an example of fady (a Malagasy superstition) and persecute it. Long may this continue and hopefully spread to other forests around the country.

We also had a near miss (kind of) with another aye-aye in Masoala. When looking for the endemic **Masoala sportive lemur** and **Masoala woolly lemur** (both of which we found) my guide was also looking on the ground and around fallen trees as he had seen aye-ayes on the ground looking for food in the rotting wood. We then found some eye-shine, the right size and shape on the ground. We made our way quietly forward and lost it....then right next to us popped up a **fanaloka!** Amazing, it trotted past us and into the forest without a care in the world. So not an aye-aye, but another one of Madagascar's rarely seen species; however we did find another **fanaloka** a couple of days later in Anakarana and with this being the 4th one I had seen on the trip, I was beginning to think they were not that rare at all \bigcirc !

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




