Chief Crisp, Always a Fan of the Old West

Almost every morning Chief Tony Crisp starts the day in his back yard beside the pool sipping on a hot cup of coffee and reading the news. There's something about the pool that makes him feel at peace and ready to face the unknowns of the day and all that he may encounter in the next 24 hours.

Tony has been facing the unknown for most of his life, starting with the untimely death of his father when he was 14. In 1969, shortly before he died at the age of 46, his father J.B. Crisp, a WWII veteran had a feeling that he needed to start the process of preparing his wife to raise their four daughters and one son without him. He knew she would not be able to run the General Store that he owned in Friendsville and tend to their five children too, so he found a

running tab of a family's purchases and then settle up at the end of the month. Inevitably, some people were unable to pay, and their tab grew with each passing month. J.B. Crisp didn't have the heart to tell anyone that they would no longer be allowed to charge their purchases, especially those who were only charging food for their family. Following his father's death, Tony stepped into the roll of "man of the house" and began to collect the outstanding

debts from his father's customers. He rode his bike through town, knocked on doors, and confidently asked for payment. Over the years he was able to recoup some of the money owed to his mother, but there were those who would never be able to square things up with the Crisp family. One gentleman looked Tony up years later when he was able to make things right on his long forgotten obligation and ended up handing Tony's mother a stack of ten \$100 bills - much to her surprise.

Tony grew up watching westerns like Gunsmoke and Bonanza on a black and white TV dreaming of the day that he would be just like the heroes of the old west. Adding John Wayne movies to his watch list, his plans for the future were soon set in stone. All these years later, Tony still watches law enforcement shows, but is now tuned in on his 60" full color flat screen TV. To this day he remains

completely captivated by his job; protecting the public and rounding up the bad guys.

During his high school years, Tony worked 35 hours a week as a gas station attendant, pumping gas at the Arco Station on Alcoa highway after school for \$1.25 per hour. He wasn't concerned about the lack of time that schedule left to complete his homework. He was solely focused on only getting through high school so he could join the Police Force. Following graduation in 1973 Tony was hired as an Officer on the Friendsville Police Force. Two years later he married Phyllis, who was 18 and still in High School at the time. Together they raised two daughters, Amy and Joni. They've been married for 41 years and have five grandchildren, two boys and three girls ranging in age from three to twenty-one.

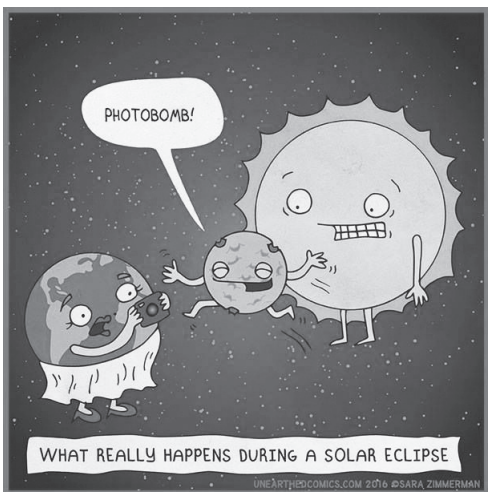
Dear Gary,

Their oldest grandson, Daniel, joins them every Sunday morning for breakfast, a block of time each week that Tony and Phyllis cherish.

In 1977 Tony joined the Maryville Police Department as

an officer. He left 22 years later to work for the Blount County Sheriff's Office as Chief Deputy, then returned to the MPD as Chief in 2002. The additional title of Fire Chief was added to his responsibilities in 2008 and he remains the Director of Public Safety today. The unknowns that Tony faces these days are much different than they were when he was collecting debts at 14. The safety of his force is always at the front of his mind. There are budgets to consider, equipment to buy, and people to hire, yet he still loves being a public servant, and he takes pride in the fact that he and his force can, and do, make a difference. Over the years they've solved many cases with little more than a hunch to go on. They've helped keep the crime rate in Maryville noticeably low, built a state of the art facility for both fire and police, and upgraded an out-of-date radio system. They've locked up hundreds of criminals, protected citizens and their property from fire, and provided medical aid in emergencies on a daily basis.

Chief has lived in the Blount County/Maryville area all his life. He is an avid UT Football fan and when he's not supporting the Vols, he might be watching his favorite TV show; Criminal Minds. His idea of the perfect Sunday afternoon is to play a round or two of golf or take a swim in the pool, followed by a trip to the DQ for a Pecan Cluster Blizzard. He loves to vacation in Cancun, and at the top of his "go-to" list of favorite restaurants are Litton's, Conner's and Lakeside Tavern, Sullivan's, RT Lodge, and Aubrey's. If given a choice, he'd choose to vacuum over cleaning the bathroom, and prefers to clean up the kitchen rather than be the cook. He's pretty fond of a small collection of knives he has, and will never again go deep sea fishing on account of a nasty bout with sea-sickness he suffered through the time he took one of his daughters out on the ocean. (His daughter had a great time and absolutely no problem with motion sickness though). All year long he looks forward to the Christmas morning breakfast that his wife Phyllis cooks for their family, featuring an amazing sausage and egg casserole, even though it means he has clean up detail afterwards. He was also the Mayor of Friendsville for a time, and he even married three couples during his tenure.

Many years ago, when Chief watched Marshal Matt Dillon stroll into the Long Branch Saloon to restore the order, it may have sparked his interest in Law Enforcement. Possibly Festus' words; "Matthew, Dodge City is safer than chitlins on a city folk's supper plate" made him want the same for his hometown. Perhaps it was a certain character in the John Wayne movies he loved, or maybe one of the boys on Bonanza that helped lead him to a career of public service. It doesn't really matter what got Chief interested in keeping the peace, because as it has turned out, he's worked since 1973 to serve and protect Maryville and Blount County citizens, and we know for sure that it is a very good thing.

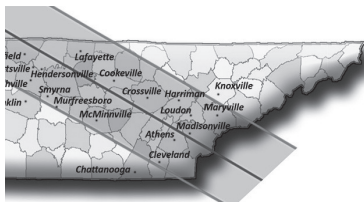

Solar Eclipse Coming to a Location Near You... Grab Your Protective Glasses!

On Monday, August 21, 2017, a solar eclipse will be visible across all of North America and pass right over our area. Around 2:33 p.m. we will experience a total eclipse when the moon blocks the sun for 1 minute in our area.



Employees are encouraged to step outside sometime during the event to catch a glimpse. We will be using the back parking lot of the Municipal Center and the parking lot of the Operations Center as our viewing headquarters. Work with your supervisor to coordinate viewing opportunities. The City is providing safe solar viewing glasses to every employee (glasses will be distributed to administrative assistants). 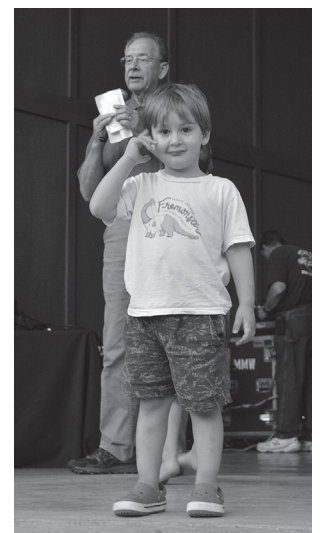
