

#### IMPORTANT CONSTITUTION CHANGES

These changes will better (1) align our governing documents with the NAfME Constitution and (2) reflect intended content of an organization's constitution and bylaws (as identified by Robert's Rules of Order, Cannon's Concise Guide to Rules of Order, and Webster's Dictionary). 

Macon County before heading back to the Triad in 2006. Additionally, Dr. Shotwell has taught Master's level courses and Doctoral level in School Finance at Western Carolina University and UNCG.

Dr. Rodney Shotwell oversees all aspects of the Rockingham County Schools District, which includes 13,400 students, approximately 2,000 employees and a budget of roughly \$125 million. He joined RCS in 2006 as Superintendent of Schools. During his time at RCS, Dr. Shotwell has proven an adamant and enthusiastic supporter of arts education in his district. He provides monetary support for allcounty events in all arts education areas: elementary, middle and high school chorus; middle and high school band; all-county art show; and an allcounty drama festival. ## AMERICAN SPIRITUAL ENSEMBLE TO PERFORM ON MONDAY EVENING GENERAL SESSION

The American Spiritual Ensemble will be performing at the Monday night General Session at 8:00 p.m. in Stevens Center as the Conference's featured ensemble.

**Dr. Everett McCorvey** is the founder and music director of the American Spiritual Ensemble, a group of 24 professional singers who perform spirituals and other compositions by African-American composers. In its 15 year history the group has presented more than 100 concerts, including 14 tours of the United States and 12 tours of Spain. Comprised of some of the finest classically trained singers in the United States, the mission of the Ensemble is to keep the American Negro spiritual alive.

The American Spiritual Ensemble has released four CD's: On My Journey Now: The American Spiritual Ensemble on Tour; Ol' Time Religion; Lily of the Valley; and the most recent The Spirit of the Holidays.

In March 2004 the ensemble was invited by the city of Madrid to present a commemoration concert dedicated to the victims of the March 11 bombing in Madrid. In February 2007 PBS presented a nationwide special on the American Spiritual Ensemble.

Dr. McCorvey is a native of Montgomery, Alabama. He received

degrees from the University of Alabama, including a doctorate of musical arts. He has performed in cities around the world and theaters around the country, including the Metropolitan Opera, the Kennedy Center, Aspen Music Festival, Blossom Music Festival, Whitewater, Opera Company, Radio City Music Hall, Birmingham Opera Theater, Teatro Comunale (Florence, Italy), Queen Elizabeth Hall (London, England), as well as throughout Spain, the Czech and Slovac Republics, Austria, Japan, China, Brazil, Portugal, and Hungary.

He is a tenor soloist on two CD's conducted by **Maestro Julius Williams** – *Symphonic Brotherhood,* featuring the Bohuslave Martinu Philharmonic Orchestra performing the symphonic works of African-American composers, released in 2004, and the other – *The American Soloist,* featuring the Dvorak Symphony in Prague, Czech Republic, highlighting new American works and released in 2004.

Since then, he has returned to the Czech Republic to perform with the Bohuslave Martinu Philharmonic, under the baton of **Maestro Kirk Trevor**, and for performances in the Slovac Republic. Dr. McCorvey has also appeared in television and feature films, including *The Long Walk Home*.

Dr. McCorvey's operatic roles include

Don Jose in *Carmen*, Fernando in *Cosi fan tutte*, Don Ottavio in *Don Giovanni*, Fenton in *Falstaff*, Eisenstein in *Die Fledermaus*, Puck in *La Grande Duchess de Gerolstein*, and many others. Orchestral and oratorio works include Beethoven's *Symphony No.* 9, Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, Mozart's *Requiem*, Verdi's *Requiem*, Handel's *Messiah*, Bach's *Mass in B Minor*, and *St. Matthew Passion*, among others.

As a recitalist, Dr. McCorvey has presented concerts, master classes and workshops throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia, as a soloist and with his wife, soprano Alicia Helm. Dr. McCorvey has presented recital and master classes in Beijing, China, and recently returned from Warsaw, Poland, where he performed with the Warsaw Symphony Orchestra during a commemorative concert for the events of September 11.

Dr. McCorvey is also a teacher and vocal advisor to many students in the profession. He was chosen to receive the 1998 Acorn Award, given by the Kentucky Advocates for Higher Education to one professor in the state of Kentucky who exemplifies excellence, innovation, and creativity in teaching and research. That same year he received an outstanding faculty award from the University of Kentucky Lyman T. Johnson Alumni Association. The following year Dr. McCorvey was selected to receive the Outstanding Alumni Award in the Arts from the Society for the Fine Arts at his alma mater, the University of Alabama.

Dr. McCorvey's long and impressive resume includes vice-chair of the Kentucky Arts Council for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, membership on numerous boards, including the National Association of State Arts Agencies (NASAA) and election to the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees in 2009.

He holds an Endowed Chair in Opera Studies and is Director of Opera and Professor of Voice at the University of Kentucky (Lexington). In September 2010, he served as executive producer of the Opening and Closing Ceremonies for the Alltech 2010 FEI World Equestrian Games held in Lexington, the largest equestrian event ever held in the United States.

Dr. McCorvey and his wife Alicia Helm have three children.



"Young Band Literature"
Appropriate For: Band

**Description:** Clinician will describe, with audio and printed scores, new band literature intended to motivate young band members.

Clinician: Ed Kiefer graduated from Wake Forest University with honors in 1976. He received his Masters in Music Education in 1990 from the University of Greensboro. He served as the Director of Bands at East Davidson High School in Thomasville, NC for 28 years and as Director of Instrumental Music at Pfeiffer University for 6 years.

Kiefer was awarded the Jaycees Young Educator of the Year Award in 1994, has been recognized by his fellow band directors with the Award of Excellence, and is sought after as an adjudicator, clinician and conductor for state and national concert, marching and jazz events.

Ed uses his experience as a middle and high school director to compose music that is playable and fun for the students and audiences alike. Those years in the classroom have allowed him to learn what is easy for the students and what challenges them musically. His publications have been performed worldwide and featured at the Midwest Clinic in Chicago. His works appear on several state music festival lists and are played regularly at festivals and conventions.

Known for her innovative teaching styles, Eaton has presented numerous workshops and clinics for TMEA regions and school districts in Texas and Georgia, and for TCDA and TMEA conventions. She has published SMART (Sight Singing Made Accessible Readable and Teachable) and SMART MINOR sight-reading books.

The 1998 recipient of the Southwestern Bell & University Interscholastic League Coaches & Sponsors Excellence Award and the 2004 Spring High School Teacher of the year, Denise has also been nominated for Who's Who Among American Teachers on numerous occasions. She is a member of ACDA, TMEA, TMAA and TCDA.

In 2007 Lenna was included in the Who's Who Among American Women and has served the MENC as a National Online General Music Mentor.

#### Moore Music: "The Neuroaesthetics of Music" Appropriate For: All

**Description:** For well over 2,500 years, philosophers have been searching for ways to explain why music means so much to us. Much more recently, neuroscientists have engaged in their own quest to understand what goes on in the musical brain. They are even beginning to learn some things about music learning and thus how we might teach music using insights from neuroscience. But what about musical values? Can neuroscience tell philosophers anything about why music is important or why it has value for human beings? Neuroaesthetics is the study of the neural processes that underlie aesthetic behavior, and this is what I will be discussing in this presentation—how philosophers and neuroscientists can work together to help us better understand the powerful role music plays in the human experience.

Clinician: Donald A. Hodges is the Covington Distinguished Professor of Music Education and Director of the Music Research Institute (MRI) at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. His degrees are from the University of Kansas (BME) and the University of Texas (MM and PhD). Previous appointments include the Philadelphia public schools, the University of South Carolina, Southern Methodist University, and the University of Texas at San Antonio. Hodges has authored more than 140 book chapters, papers, and multimedia programs in music education and music psychology, was co-author of Music in the Human Experience: An Introduction to Music Psychology (2011), and contributing editor of the Handbook of Music Psychology and the accompanying

Multimedia Companion (1980, 1996). Recent research efforts have included a series of brain imaging studies of pianists, conductors, and singers using PET and fMRI. Hodges has served on the editorial committees of the Journal of Research in Music Education, Music Educators Journal. Reviews of Research in Human Learning and Music, and Update: Applications of Research in Music Education, and has presented widely across the US and internationally. His biographical sketch will appear in the forthcoming New Grove Dictionary of American Music. Is It Time for A Check-Up? A Booster Shot for Your High and Low Brass Pedagogy Skills University of North Carolina at Wilmington and Western Carolina University Faculty Sunday, November 11 11:00AM, 12:00PM

In the high brass the brass faculty of the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and Western Carolina University will offer helpful tips and practical techniques for teaching high brass playing. This "tune up" session will address topics in trumpet and horn pedagogy including: ergonomics (playing position), air support, tone production, tonguing, articulation, volume, buzzing, mouthpieces, instrument selection, alternative positions/fingerings, and small vs. large ensemble playing. They will also show these ideas in a demonstration performance and offer online and print resources. In the low brass session, clinicians from the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and Western Carolina University will offer helpful tips and practical techniques for teaching low brass playing. This "tune up" session will address topics in trombone, euphonium, baritone, and tuba pedagogy including: ergonomics (playing position), air support, tone production, tonguing, articulation, volume. buzzing, mouthpieces. instrument selection, alternative positions/fingerings, and small vs. large ensemble playing. They will also show these ideas in a demonstration performance and offer online and print resources.

**Dr. John LaCognata** is an Assistant Professor of Trumpet and Director of Bands at the University of North Carolina Wilmington. He holds an undergraduate degree in music education from the University of Illinois, a Master of Music degree in Trumpet Performance from Auburn University, and a PhD in Music Education from the University of Florida. Dr. LaCognata is a former member of the *Cathedral Brass* and a freelance trumpet player.

**Dr. Travis Bennett** is Associate Professor of Horn at Western Carolina University. Prior to joining the faculty at WCU, he taught at Mercer University in Macon, GA. He received the DMA and MM degrees in Performance from the University of Alabama, and holds the Bachelor of Music degree from Florida State University. In addition, Dr. Bennett maintains an active performing schedule, playing more than 50 concerts a year in orchestral, chamber, and recital settings.

Dr. Dan Cherry teaches the Trombone and Euphonium Studio at Western Carolina University. He received his Bachelor's degree in Trombone and Voice Performance from Capital University and both his Master's and Doctoral degrees in Trombone from the University of Cincinnati. His international performing experience includes appearances with ensembles in Mexico, Italy, Germany, Austria, France, and Switzerland.

Chris Brooks started playing drums professionally at age 16. She is a Past President of the National Band Association and American Bandmasters Association. Crider has written numerous articles for The Instrumentalist. will be discussed, as well as criteria to evaluate show designers. Pros and cons of using published arrangements versus creating custom arrangements versus creating original music will be presented as well. He will also demonstrate the use of graphic notation to plot the flow of a field show in terms of duration, points of high and low musical impact, and the use of soloists, small ensembles and section features. Bough will discuss how graphic notation can also be used to fully integrate the color quard, percussion and visual needs of the band from the earliest steps of designing the show.

Dr. Thomas Bough joined the faculty of Northern Illinois University in the fall of 2005 as the Director of Athletic Bands. He also conducts the Wind Symphony and teaches conducting and instrumental arranging. Bough holds MM and DMA degrees in Tuba Performance from Arizona State University, where he was a student of Sam Pilafian and Dan Perantoni. Scott A. Stewart is the Director Wind Studies at Emory University, where he joined the faculty in the fall of 1999. He serves as music director and conductor of the Emory Wind Ensemble and the Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony, and teaches courses in instrumental

conducting, wind band literature, and film music. Stewart is the recipient of the Winship Award for Senior Lecturers in the Emory College of Arts and Sciences for 2011-12 and the Faculty Appreciation Award from the Office of Admission in 2009. He has presented scholarly papers at the Hawaii International Conference on the Arts and Humanities and the Internationale Gesellschaft zur Erforschung und Förderung der Blasmusik in Oberwelz, Austria. He has also published in The Instrumentalist and Music Educators Journal. Tο serve the greater Atlanta community in music education outreach, Stewart facilitates and participates with Emory artist affiliate faculty in bringing students and teachers in contact with great artist/pedagogues throughout the year. Regular events include Saxophone Day, Bassoon Day and the Summer Bassoon Extravaganza, Atlanta Percussion Symposium, International Euphonium Institute, and the Atlanta Trumpet Festival. Stewart founded the Emory Summer Concert Band in 2010 as part of the Emory Pre-College Program and to model an integrated, diverse community ensemble.

With Dr. Laurie Scott at the University of Texas, Stewart is cofounder and director of Bend the Twig, Inc., a non-profit organization that promotes the integration of character education in music classrooms. In this capacity, he has appeared nationally at education and music conferences, presents in-services for teachers and administrators, and frequently writes on topics of character and ethics in the performing arts. An active saxophonist, he is founder and member of the Emory Saxophone Quartet, which has performed at the Rome Symphony

Orchestra, the High Museum, and throughout the city. At Emory University, he is departmental liaison for the PACE advising program and coordinates the undergraduate recruitment initiative for the Department of Music. He served on the Emory Scholars Selection Committee for eleven years, and is currently is a member of the Emory Scholars Advisory Board, Emory College Admission and Scholarship Committee, Pre-College Program Advisory Board, PACE Advisory Board, the Emory College Honor Council, and has been a freshman advisor for twelve years. The Emory University student body recently honored Stewart by being selected to present the annual "Last Lecture." has been a "faculty spotlight speaker" for Family Weekend for the past two years, and was faculty convocation speaker in 2011.

#### Exhibitor Showcase: "Young Band Literature" Ed Kiefer, C. Alan Publications Monday, November 12 – 1:00PM

This clinic features new band literature intended to motivate young band members. Ed Kiefer graduated from Wake Forest University with honors in 1976. He received his Masters in Music Education in 1990 from the University of Greensboro. He served as the Director of Bands at East Davidson High School in Thomasville, NC for twenty-eight years and as Director of Instrumental Music at Pfeiffer University for 6 years. Kiefer was awarded the Jaycees Young Educator of the Year Award in1994, has been recognized by his fellow band directors with the Award of Excellence, and is sought after as an adjudicator, clinician and conductor for state and

national concert, marching and jazz events. Ed uses his experience as a middle and high school director to compose music that is playable and fun for the students and audiences alike. He holds Bachelor of Music (Summa Cum Laude), Master of Music Education in Conducting, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees. Dr. Boonshaft was also awarded a Connecticut General Fellowship for study at the Kodály Musical Training Institute, from which he holds a Certificate. He is currently on the faculty of Hofstra University in Hempstead, New York, where he is Professor of Music and Director of Bands. He is Conductor of the Hofstra University Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Band, professor of conducting and music education, and Director of the graduate wind conducting program. Prior to this appointment, Dr. Boonshaft was on the faculty of Moravian College and the University of Hartford. He was Founder and Music Director of the Pennsylvania Youth Honors Concert Band and the Connecticut Valley Youth Wind Ensemble. In addition, he held the post of Music Director and Conductor of the Metropolitan Wind Symphony of Boston.

Dr. Boonshaft is the author of the

critically acclaimed best-selling books Teaching Music with Passion, Teaching Music with Purpose, and Teaching Music with Promise, as well as his first book for all educators. Teaching with Passion, Purpose and Promise. He is also co-author of Alfred Music Publishing's new beginning method book series, Sound Innovations for Band and Sound Innovations for Strings. In addition, he is the author of Vaclav Nelhybel: His Life and Works, the only authorized biography of the composer, a contributing author of The Music Director's Cookbook: Creative Recipes for a Successful Program, and author of articles for Instrumentalist Magazine, the National Band Association Journal, MENC's Teaching Music, and Band Director's Guide. Dr. Boonshaft holds the post of Band/Wind Ensemble Editor for the School Music News, and has been a consultant or recorded for Boosey & Hawkes Music Publishers. Warner Brothers Publications, G. Schirmer, Southern Music Publishers, Kendor Music Publishers. Daehn Publications and C. Alan Music. Active as a proponent of new literature for concert band, he has commissioned and conducted over forty world premieres by such notable composers as Eric Ewazen, W. Francis McBeth, Johan de Meij, Fisher Tull, H. Owen Reed, Vaclav Nelhybel, David Gillingham, Philip Sparke, Sam Hazo, Andrew Boysen, Robert W. Smith, David Holsinger, Satoshi Yagisawa, Stephen Melillo, Robert Washburn, Elliot Del Borgo, Herbert Deutsch, Kenneth Lampl, Robert Hawkins, Larry Lipkis, lan McDougall, Rossano Galante, Reber Clark, Gregory Sanders, Roland Barrett and Jared Spears. Among the soloists who have appeared in performance with Dr. Boonshaft are John Marcellus, Maynard Ferguson, Harvey Phillips,

The Core Essentials for Wind Band: Teaching Ensemble Fundamentals Within A Musical Context
John Pasquale, Arris Golden, and
Patricia Hughes
assisted by the Cedar Ridge High
School Wind Ensemble
Tuesday, November 13 – 10:00AM

This clinic session will present a codified, systematic approach for the deconstruction of live ensemble sound and teaching ensemble fundamentals within a musical context. Due to time constraints within the public school schedule, maximizing rehearsal time is tantamount to achieving curricular goals for ensemble performance. However, little is codified beyond standard method books. This clinic will provide a clear, detailed system for identifying and manipulating the various approaches to fix ensemble pedagogical issues within the context of the music that your band is currently preparing. This clinic will utilize the Cedar Ridge High School Wind Ensemble as a model group in which the three clinicians will interact with live sound and demonstrate the various concepts and methods that will be discussed.

Dr. John D. Pasquale is a member of the conducting faculty at the University of Michigan serving as the Assistant Director of Bands. In this position, he is the conductor of the University Band, conductor of the Campus "Maize" and "Blue" Bands, guest conductor with the Symphony Band, Symphony Band Chamber Winds and Concert Band. Associate Director of Michigan Marching and Athletic Bands, Director of the Michigan Hockey Band, inaugural conductor of the Alumni Concert Band, teaches conducting and program administration through independent study, and directs the summer program, "Instrumental Music in China: Cross-Cultural Performance and Pedagogy," in Beijing, Shanghai and Xi'an, China. Receiving the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Conducting from the University of Oklahoma at Norman in 2008, Pasquale served as a conducting associate to the Wind Symphony, Opera Orchestra, "The Pride of Oklahoma" Marching Band, New Century Ensemble, Faculty Composer Concert Series, Symphony Band, Concert Band, and the Weitzenhoffer Family Department of Musical Theatre. In addition, he was an adjunct instructor and graduate teaching assistant within the Music Education Department. He holds a Master of Music degree in Instrumental Conducting from the University of Oklahoma and a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Texas.

In the genre of marching and pageantry arts, Dr. Pasquale served as the Associate Brass Caption Manager of the Santa Clara Vangaurd Drum and Bugle Corps from Santa Clara, California, and taught ensemble music as a member of the Brass Staff of the Cavaliers Drum and Bugle Corps from Rosemont, Illinois. During his tenure from 2002-2011, the Cavaliers have been named Drum Corps International World Champions three times and the recipient of two Jim Ott Awards for "ExcellenceinBrassPerformance." Prior to attending graduate school, Dr. Pasquale conducted an internationally recognized and competitive middle school wind ensemble holding the position of Director of Bands at Griffin Middle School in The Colony, Texas, within the Lewisville Independent School District. During his four year assignment, Pasquale was the 2001, 2002 and 2003 recipient of the "Making A Difference Award" given by the student body of Griffin Middle School and received the 2003 nomination for Griffin Middle School "Teacher of the Year." Dr. Pasquale is in demand as a conductor, clinician, pedagogue, and adjudicator in band and orchestra programs throughout the United States and China.

Arris A. Golden is the Director of Bands at Gravelly Hill Middle School in Efland, North Carolina. Ms. Golden received her undergraduate degrees Music Education and Political Science from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1996 and 1991, respectively, and received the Master of Music Education degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (UNCG) in 2004. Currently, Ms. Golden is pursuing the Doctorate in Educational Leadership from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Since the creation of the Gravelly Hill Middle School Band Program in 2006, the Gravelly Hill Bands have grown to a membership of 119 students, featuring band classes for all grade levels, percussion ensemble, jazz ensemble, as well as numerous smaller ensembles that meet throughout the school year.

The Gravelly Hill Concert band has participated in multiple adjudicated festivals in the past four years of the school's existence, receiving only Excellent and Superior Ratings.

As participants in the Central District Music Performance Adjudications each spring, the Gravelly Hill Concert Band has received only Superior Ratings, receiving at Straight Superior rating in March 2010. Student members of the Concert Band have worked with numerous clinicians during its four years of existence, including the premier of a newly commissioned work for band, "Kitsune: The Fox Spirits," written for the Concert Band by Mr. Brian Balmages. In November 2010, the Concert Band was one of two featured middle school bands at the North Carolina Music Educators Annual In-Service Conference held in Winston-Salem, North Carolina; this invitation included a concert performance by the band, as well as a clinic performance under the leadership of Dr. John Pasquale, Assistant Director of Bands, the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

Prior to her appointment as Director of Bands at Gravelly Hill, Ms. Golden held similar positions at Hawfields Middle School in Mebane and West Cary Middle School in Cary. During Ms. Golden's tenure at both schools the band programs increased in overall student membership and overall musical quality. Under Ms. Golden's guidance, the Hawfields and West Cary Bands received only Excellent and Superior ratings at concert band festivals and competitions. Numerous students at each school qualified for the North Carolina All-State Honors Band, the Central District Middle School Honor Bands, and the Alamance and Wake All-County Bands respectively. In 1999, the West Cary Advanced Band was privileged to perform as one of two featured middle school bands at the North Carolina Music Educators' Conference in Winston-Salem, North Carolina; this is the only invitation that has been received by a West Cary band in the school's 41-year history.

Ms. Golden has served both the North Carolina Bandmasters Association (NCBA) and the Central District Bandmasters Association (CDBA) in numerous capacities during her years as a member. She has served on the NCBA Board of Directors and currently serves as chair of the NCBA Percussion Committee and CDBA Middle School representative on the Concert Band Music Performance Adjudication (MPA) Committee. She has served as chair of the CDBA Middle School All-District Honor Bands, the CDBA Middle School Concert Band MPA, and has served as Secretary, President-Elect, President, and Past-President of the CDBA.

Ms. Golden was chosen be her peers as the CDBA Award of Excellence recipient in May 2009. In March 2008, Ms. Golden was honored with induction into the prestigious American School Band Directors' Association, and in the 2006-2007 school year. Ms. Golden was named one of the United States "Fifty Directors Who Make a Difference" by School Band and Orchestra Magazine. A Nationally Board Certified Teacher, Ms. Golden was also named the Central District's Band Director of the Year in 2004 and was the recipient of the Cary Chamber of Commerce "Honor a Teacher" Award in Fine Arts, Music, and Performing Arts in the same year.

Also a published author, Ms. Golden has had articles and interviews featured in the Music Educators Journal, the North Carolina Music Educator and School Band and Orchestra Magazine. Ms. Golden is in constant demand as a guest conductor, concert band clinician, marching band instructor, and marching band adjudicator throughout North Carolina and Virginia. Ms. Golden has also served as a quest conductor for the UNCG Summer Music Camp. Cape Fear Wind Symphony, Director of Athletic Bands at Campbell University and is currently co-conductor of the Central Carolina Winds, an adult wind band based in the greater Hillsborough area.

Patricia Hughes is the Director of Bands at Cedar Ridge High School in Hillsborough, North Carolina. A 1990 recipient of the North Carolina Teaching Fellows Scholarship, Ms. Hughes attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, earning the Bachelor of Music Education Degree in 1994 and later attended The University of North Carolina at Greensboro (UNCG) earning the Master of Music Education Degree in 2004. She received certification from the National Board of Professional Teaching Standards

in 2007. Since the foundation of the band program at Cedar Ridge, ensembles have performed concerts and participated in festivals throughout the eastern United States, achieving only excellent and superior ratings at adjudicated festivals.

The Wind Ensemble has received only straight superior ratings at the North Carolina Music Performance Adjudication (MPA) and in 2006, was a featured ensemble at the annual North Carolina Music Educator's Conference in Winston Salem, North Carolina. Student performers in each of the Cedar Ridge Bands have achieved numerous individual accolades and are members of county-wide, districtwide, and state-wide honor bands and ensembles each school year. As a member of the Central District Bandmasters Association (CDBA), Ms. Hughes has served in many capacities throughout her career. She has been chairperson of the Central District High School All-District Band Clinic and has served as the chair and site host of the Central District Middle and High School Concert Band MPA since 2005. Currently, she serves as the Secretary for this organization, a post she has held since 2004.

Hughes was chosen by her colleagues as the North Carolina Central District Award of Excellence recipient in 2006 and was selected as the Central District's Band Director of the Year in 2005. In 2008, Ms. Hughes was the North Carolina Representative featured in School Band and Orchestra Magazine's annual "50 Directors Who Make a Difference" article. Ms. Hughes was also featured in the Conn-Selmer Keynotes Magazine as the "Director of Note" in the spring of 2006 and most recently was elected by her peers to the prestigious American School Band Director's Association. Ms. Hughes is also active as an adjudicator for both concert and marching band and is a member of the UNCG Summer Music Camp conducting staff. Her professional affiliations include Music Educators' National Conference. the North Carolina Music Educators' Association, the American School Band Director's Association, and Sigma Alpha Iota, Women's International Music Fraternity. Ms. Hughes lives in Burlington and enjoys spending her free time running and gardening.

Our repertory includes transcriptions of orchestral classics, original compositions for wind-band, small-ensemble pieces, popular medleys and arrangements, and holiday or patriotic music for special occasions. Now celebrating its twelfth year, Triangle Wind Ensemble calls Cary its home-base, presenting most of its concerts in the new Cary Arts Center, the Koka Booth Ampitheatre, and in Sertoma Amphitheatre at Bond Park. Triangle Wind Ensemble also travels to perform through the Triangle, the state of North Carolina, and beyond, by invitation, and regularly collaborates with other Triangle organizations in joint performances. The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony Atlanta, Georgia Dr. Scott A. Stewart, conductor Sunday, November 11 – 8:00PM The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony

(AYWS) was founded in 1988 as the honor wind ensemble for high school youth in the Atlanta metropolitan area. Its purpose is to provide a positive musical experience in an artistic environment for advanced instrumentalists in wind and percussion performance. The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony rehearses and performs grade five and six (collegiate and professional) original wind band literature composed over a wide span of stylistic compositional periods. As an ensemble, it is one of the most visible ambassadors of culture and youth performance for the city of Atlanta and state of Georgia.

The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony performs four concerts annually on the Emory University campus. Additionally, the group has participated in commissioned compositions, world and regional premieres, professional music conferences, and tours. Guest composers, conductors of national renown are regularly invited to perform with the students, including Joseph Alessi (principal trombone, New York Philharmonic), Richard Stoltzman (international clarinet soloist and recording artist), Jeff Nelsen (hornist with the Canadian Brass and professor at the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University), Susan Rider (cornet soloist, "The President's Own" United States Marine Band), Anthony Maiello (George Mason University),

Scatterday (Eastman School of Music), and composers Frank Ticheli, Bruce Broughton, Ron Nelson, Eric Ewazen, Jonathan Newman, Steven Bryant, John Mackey, Eric Whitacre, James Barnes, Carolyn Bremer, David Holsinger, James Barnes, Stephen Paulus, David Gillingham, Christopher Tucker, William Pitts, and Jonathan Hoffmann.

The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony has appeared on Public Radio International's acclaimed radio program "From the Top" with pianist Christopher O'Riley and has performed at Carnegie Hall (New York, NY), Alice Tully Hall at Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts (New York, NY), the Midwest Clinic (Chicago, IL), the Music **Educators National Conference National** Convention (Milwaukee, WI), the Georgia Music Educators Association State In-Conference (Savannah, GA), the College Band Directors National Association/ National Band Association Souther Division Conference (Atlanta, GA), and in exchange concerts with the Greater Dallas Youth Orchestra Wind Symphony and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Youth Wind Ensemble.

This ensemble is comprised of approximately 80 students in grades 9-12 who share a commitment to excellence in musical performance in these areas: flute/piccolo, oboe/ English horn, bassoon/contrabassoon, clarinet, bass clarinet, saxophone (all), trumpet, horn, trombone, euphonium, tuba, percussion, piano, string bass, and harp.

Membership since 1988 has been drawn from approximately 75 different

high schools in Barrow, Cherokee, Clayton, Cobb, Coweta, DeKalb, Douglas, Fayette, Forsyth, Fulton, Gwinnett, Henry, Houston, Oconee, Paulding, Pickens, and Rockdale counties. In addition, students have recently traveled from as far as Athens, Augusta, Rome, Warner-Robins and Birmingham to participate. The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony proudly boasts a wide diversity of gender, race/ethnicity, religious affiliation, and socioeconomic status.

The budget of the Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony is drawn primarily from the membership fee plus support from the Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony Foundation and outside partnerships, sponsorships, grants, and donations. Emory University provides rehearsal and performance space, percussion and large instruments, and some repertoire from the Instrumental Music Library.

The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony is based at Emory University in the heart of Atlanta, Georgia. It benefits from the resources of a world-class university in one of the nation's most rapidly expanding music programs. The Department of Music features a distinguished faculty of full time instructors, scholars, and performers, plus a large staff of artist-teachers, many of whom are regular members of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and other local ensembles. Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony members frequently interact with faculty and artists who visit the campus as quests of the department. The Atlanta Youth Wind Symphony rehearses Monday evenings during the school year from 7:30-9:30 pm, preparing for each of four concerts in approximately six rehearsal periods.

assist him at the middle school! The East Davidson Band also includes Jazz Ensembles I and II, which meet after school year round. In addition to regular concerts, the bands participate in many jazz festivals including those at UNC-Chapel Hill, Elon University, UNC-Charlotte, and UNC-Wilmington. The East Davidson Band's students, parents, administrators, and directors are thankful for the opportunity to perform at the NCMEA conference, and will make every effort to perform a concert worthy of this honor.

David Deese graduated from Page High School in Greensboro and is thankful to have had directors Charles Murph and Kieth Burroughs during Jr. and Sr. High. He then attended Appalachian State University and earned his Bachelor's Degree. Again he was fortunate because he had professors such as Dr. William Gora, Dr. Joe Brashier, and Dr. Scott Meister. Deese served two years as percussion instructor and arranger for the "Marching Mountaineers". Mr. Jon Patton at Wilkes Central High School supervised his student teaching. James C. Burns (Retired) attended Edmonds High School in Sumter, SC. His band director was James Pritchard. He attended Clemson University from 1953 to 1954. He then served in the US Army for two years with Ed Rooker playing in Army Bands. From 1958 to 1962 Mr. Burns attended East Carolina University earning his music education degree. Mr. Burns was the band director for one year each at Southern Alamance High School and Zebulon High School. He became the Cary High School band director from 1964 to 1977. The General Music and Exceptional Children's Commissions have scheduled three sessions.

Marci Houseman will present a session titled, "Linking Literacy to Rhythmic Composition." This session will focus on encouraging teachers to use literature as the inspiration for rhythmic composition and improvisation as well as building ensemble skills. Participants will be actively engaged in a series of literature-based rhythmic and drumming experiences derived from successful lessons Marci implemented with her music classes.

Marci will also present a session titled, "Engaging At-Risk Students through Drumming." This session will focus on using alternative music experiences to engage students regardless of academic abilities. Marci believes that as music educators engage students in drumming experiences, we [music educators] will broaden our interpretation of "exceptional" and discover the impact this type of program may have on students in need of differentiation and inclusion.

Marci Houseman taught music for 13 years at both the elementary and middle school levels. While working for Moore County Schools, she was named Moore County Teacher of the Year twice and served as Sandhills/

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#### 2012 HONORS CHORUS CONDUCTOR

Elena Sharkova is widely recognized as an inspirational and effective conductor, choral clinician, master teacher, adjudicator at music festivals and competitions, and keynote speaker at professional conferences. She has conducted professional, university, youth, and community choirs and orchestras across North America, Europe, Asia, and Middle East, appearing in such prestigious concert halls as New York's Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center, Chicago's Orchestra Hall, Washington's Kennedy Center, San Francisco Davies Symphony Hall, St. Petersburg's Glinka Kapella and Moscow Conservatory's Tchaikovski Hall. An expert on Russian choral music, Ms. Sharkova has lectured extensively on its repertoire and performance practices and conducted several U.S. premiers of Russian contemporary compositions.

Elena Sharkova was born and raised in St. Petersburg, Russia, where she received an undergraduate degree in music education and piano, and the first of her two graduate degrees in conducting from St. Petersburg State Rimski-Korsakov Conservatory. From

1988 to 1993, Ms. Sharkova served as Chair of the Choral Department of the Preparatory Music School at the Conservatory, where she conducted four children's choruses. Ms. Sharkova's academic career continued in the United States, where she received her second graduate degree in conducting from Western Michigan University and later served as adjunct faculty. She joined the music department at San Jose State University in 1998 and then held the position of Director of Choral Studies from 2001 through 2006.

Sharkova has been Artistic Director of Symphony Silicon Valley Chorale (formerly San Jose State University Chorale) since 1998 where she prepares and conducts five programs each season. Under her direction, the Chorale has received critical acclaim for their performances of over 30 major choral-orchestral works such as Ralph Vaughn Williams' Dona Nobis Pacem, Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Requiem, Poulenc's Gloria, Bruckner Te Deum, Brahms's Nanie and German Requiem, Orff's Carmina Burana and many others. Regarded for her passion for non-Western, cross-genre, and multicultural music, Ms. Sharkova and the Chorale delighted San Francisco Bay Area audiences with performances of such folk-inspired compositions as Navidad Nuestra and Missa Criolla by Argentinean composer Ariel Ramirez, Caribbean Mass by contemporary American composer Glen McClure, and jazz-infused Mass in Blue by English composer Will Todd.

Currently In her eighth year as the Artistic Director of the 250-voice strong Cantabile Youth Singers of Silicon Valley, Elena Sharkova conducts CYS's top choirs, Vocalise and Ensemble, and oversees all educational and performance aspects of the program. Under her direction, Cantabile appeared on the legendary stage of Carnegie Hall in 2005 and 2010 and concertized in Estonia, Finland, Russia, and England. As a guest conductor and clinician, Elena Sharkova has had an honor of conducting at the 2011 MEA National Convention in Washington D.C., Kodaly Educators National Conference in 2004, the Golden Gate International Festival in 2005, the American Orff-Schulwerk Association Conference in 2008, and the Association for Music in International Schools Conference in 2009. In 2011. Ms. Sharkova was Artistic Director and conductor at the Somerset International Treble Choir Festival in Sherborne, United Kingdom,

Ms. Sharkova's most recent engagements include Texas, Missouri, Oregon, Kansas, Oklahoma and Nebraska All-State Honor Choirs and the ACDA South West Division Convention Treble Choir.

Elena Sharkova lives in San Jose with her wine-maker husband, Tony Craig, and their 8 year old son, Sasha.

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
#### **Exhibitor Showcase**

#### Donald A. Hodges

Covington Distinguished Professor of Music Education and Director of the Music Research Institute (MRi) at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro



For well over 2,500 years, philosophers have been searching for ways to explain why music means so much to us. Much more recently, neuroscientists have engaged in their own quest to understand what goes on in the musical brain. They are even beginning to learn some things about music learning and thus how we might teach music using insights from neuroscience. But what about musical values? Can neuroscience tell philosophers anything about why music is important or why it has value for human beings? Neuroaesthetics is the study of the neural processes that underlie aesthetic behavior, and this is what I will be discussing in this presentation: how philosophers and neuroscientists can work together to help us better understand the powerful role music plays in the human experience.

The Croatan Vocal Ensemble, under the direction of Mrs. Swigart since 2001, is an active musical group that has distinguished itself by consistently earning Superior Ratings at Music Performance Adjudication in both the Large Choral as well as Solo/Ensemble categories. The group loves to perform locally as well as travel to exciting places where they have been known to sing in the Subway, spontaneously

perform Happy Birthday in four part harmony in restaurants, climb giant trees and perform their most recent a cappella arrangement, perform at St. Peter's at the Vatican, or perform in an Advent Concert Series in The Czech Republic. Each time they traveled they named their group according to the places they were going, for example, The Troubadours, Les Chanteuses, Puma Viagiatorre, and Croatan Celtic Clan. They have traveled and performed from Florida to New York City, Hawaii, England, France, Spain, Austria, Czech Republic, Italy and most recently Ireland.

The musicals at Croatan are open to the entire student body and certainly the students in this group are very actively involved in the productions. Their credits include Give My Regards to Broadway, Fiddler on the Roof, Cinderella, Guys and Dolls, Hello, Dolly, Thoroughly Modern Millie, Aida, Wizard of Oz, Little Women, White Christmas, and Anything Goes. They just completed Yours, Anne in September, based on the Diary of Anne Frank and will perform Seven Brides for Seven Brothers in April.

#### PINECREST HIGH **SCHOOL**

The Pinecrest High School Choral Program is comprised of four ensembles, with over 230 students involved year-round. The program strives to provide students with meaningful musical experiences that contribute to the growth of intellect, responsibility, and excellence, with a focus on music literacy and fostering independent singer/musicians. The choirs regularly perform for the school and the community, and are often sought after to perform for local events. Pinecrest has a long history of superior festival ratings and honors, national performances, and a performance at the NCMEA conference in 2009. Pinecrest choral students frequently participate in ACDA Honors Choirs, National Honors Choirs, the NCMEA Honors Choir, and Governor's School.

In October of 2011, the Pinecrest Choral Program hosted Grammy award-winning composer Whitacre as artist-in-residence for three days at the high school. Eight ensembles - including professional, collegiate, and high school choirs from across three states were invited to join the Pinecrest choirs for three days of workshops, which culminated in a final concert with over 300 singers participating. This November, the program will host the nationally renowned vocal group Cantus for a full day master class with the choral students. Recently, the choirs participated in the 2012 Heritage Festival in Washington D.C., where they received all superior ratings along with numerous other awards including the "most outstanding choral group" distinction. The choirs will be participating in Heritage's "Festival of Gold" in New York City this April. Other recent events include performances at Duke Chapel in Durham, and a newly established masterworks concert series.

Erin Plisco is in her third year of directing the choral music program at Pinecrest High School. Prior to her appointment at Pinecrest, she




graduated from Christopher Newport University in Virginia with both her Master of Arts in Teaching and Bachelor of Music in Choral Music Education and Vocal Performance. She also studied abroad in Oxford. United Kingdom, at the University of Oxford, and in Rome, Italy, with Operafestival di Roma.

Ms. Plisco has spent the last two summers as a choral fellow with the Yale School of Music - Norfolk Chamber Music Festival in Connecticut under the direction of Simon Carrington, attending in 2012 as a conductor and in 2011 as a singer. 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#### MILLBROOK HIGH SCHOOL MADRIGALS

The Millbrook High School Madrigals from Raleigh, NC are a mixed auditioned ensemble that typically ranges from 25-35 members. Represented in this group are sophomores through seniors who dedicate themselves year round to daily rehearsals, and who average twenty to thirty performances a year.

These performances include Duke Chapel, the NC Executive Mansion, State Capitol Building, four ticketed concerts at Millbrook High School, as well as many other school performances. In recent years, they have performed in New York, Atlanta, Washington D.C., Boston, and Chicago, singing for such notable conductors as Simon Carrington (Yale), Z. Randall Stroope (composer), Daniel Bara (UGA), Eric Nelson (Emory University), Ann Howard Jones (Boston University) and many more. The Madrigals receive consistent Superior ratings at NCMEA Large Festival in both performance and literacy. The Madrigals are extremely honored to present at the 2012 NCMEA Conference.

Eddie Adams, a native of Snow Hill, NC, is a graduate of Appalachian State University in Boone, NC where he obtained degrees in Music Education and Music Performance. 
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#### WOLVERINE CONCERT CHOIR - WAKEFIELD HIGH SCHOOL

The Wolverine Concert Choir has been an ensemble that has evolved and grown both in numbers and musicianship over the past seven years under the direction of **John-Philip Mullinax**. During the fall semester, the Concert Choir is a combination of two classes, Men's Ensemble and Women's Chorale, and is comprised primarily of students returning to the choral program.

With the philosophy that "Smart Singers make Great Music", the choral program at Wakefield High School is comprehensive in its approach. Students learn a varied approach to rehearsal techniques, sight singing, ear training, fundamentals of vocal pedagogy, music theory, music history, IPA, use of technical language, and listening assessments. The Wakefield Choral Department, in conjunction with its Booster Organization, performs two independent concerts each year, participates in collaborative performances with Wakefield's Band and Orchestra program, and presents two fundraisers; a Holiday Cabaret and a Spring Soiree. Every other year the program also presents a madrigal dinner. Upper level students perform on an Honor's Voice Recital each spring and every student in the choral program is required to present a voice jury at the

end of each semester. In addition to our own performances, the chorus regularly performs for school and community events.

In February 2011, the Wolverine Concert Choir participated in the UNC-Charlotte Choral Invitational with guest clinician, Dr. Rodney Eichenberger. In the fall of 2011, the Wolverine Concert Choir performed for the first time at North Carolina's American Choral Directors Association Fall Conference in Greensboro, NC. The choir took its first performing tour this spring to Festival Disney in Orlando, Florida performing at Providence Baptist Church in Charlotte, North Carolina and at Pinellas County Center for the Arts in St. Petersburg FL. At Festival, the choir earned a Bronze in their first competitive appearance, only seven tenths of a point from Gold with 24 competing choirs in the category. Choral students also regularly participate in NC Honors Chorus, NC All State Choruses, ACDA's Male Vocal Arts Symposium. NCMEA Large Ensemble Music Adjudication and Solo/ Small Ensemble Adjudication. This will be the first appearance of Wakefield HS Wolverine Concert Choir at a North Carolina Music Educators Fall In-Service Convention.

#### JOHN-PHILIP MULLINAX – DIRECTOR

A graduate of Union Pines High School ('82) in Moore County, John-Philip Mullinax received his formal training at Mars Hill College (B.M.E-'86),

He has performed professionally with Fort Worth Opera, Fort Worth Symphony, and Oklahoma Lyric Theatre. His oratorio solo appearances include Faure Requeim, Handel Messiah, Bach Magnificat, Schubert Mass in G, and Haydn Creation.

Mr. Mullinax has held choral and keyboard teaching positions at the Performing Arts High School in Fort Worth, Texas; Pinellas County Center for the Performing Arts at Gibbs High School in St. Petersburg, Florida; and the Academy for the Visual and Performing Arts at Einstein High School, in Kensington, Maryland. Mr. Mullinax was the 2003 Clinician for the Pinellas All-County Middle School Chorus. He is currently Department Chair and Director of Choral Activities at Wakefield High School in Raleigh NC. From 2010 to 2012, he served as the Co-Staff Development Coordinator for the High School Choral Staff in Wake County, NC. Mr. Mullinax has been a presenter at NCMEA Convention on "Utilizing Technology in the Choral Classroom" and has presented schoolbased staff development workshops on "Incorporating Music into your Curriculum" and "Motivating Students through Instructional Gaming".

Mr. Mullinax is an active professional conductor and church musician. He has


album, without a doubt, puts Rex Richardson among the very best trumpet soloists in the world today." (January 2011)


Rex has taught at Virginia Commonwealth University since 2002 and served as Artist-in-Residence and Visiting Professor at Ithaca College and London's Trinity College of Music. Having served as Artist-in-Residence for the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, England in 2012, he has since been named International Visiting Tutor in Trumpet.


In 2009 he was presented with the VCU School of the Arts highest honor, the Award of Excellence, and was awarded the 2011 Theresa Pollack Prize for Excellence in the Arts. The Pollack Prize selectors wrote: "Richardson stands at the vanguard of jazz, classical and contemporary American music. He is an extraordinary musician."

#### **CLINIC SESSION**

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#### CLINICIANS AND CONDUCTORS

Mr. Yiying Qiao has been a music educator for over 34 years and has been teaching at the Cary Academy for the past 11 years as the Director of Orchestra and Music Clubs. He currently directs over 80 orchestra major students in the music program of Cary Academy including Upper School Full Orchestra and String Orchestra, Middle School Orchestra and 6th Grade Orchestra plus 20 orchestra minor students in 6th grade and 42 members in Upper School Share the Music Club.

Mr. Qiao received his undergraduate degree from the Shanghai Conservatory of Music in 1978 and a Masters of Music degree from James Madison University in 1993. His career in music teaching started at a Shanghai Music Conservatory in China where he was an assistant professor of violin and a coach for the ensembles in the Minority Advancement Program. After the completion of his Masters of Music degree in the United States, he continued to teach his love of music to a number of students in New York City and throughout the Carolina. Mr. Qiao is very proud of his students who are now playing in many of the world's leading orchestras, such as the Boston Symphony, the Chicago Symphony and the Detroit Symphony and he is proud of their many achievements which are recognized both nationally and internationally. Under Mr. Qiao's directorship and determination the Cary Academy orchestras have participated in and won superlative awards in many competitions throughout the East. The high standard of their performance criteria has been clearly evident in their local concerts and national festivals such as the Boston Symphony Hall 2005 and the Chicago Symphony Hall

2007. On April 13, 2013, Mr. Qiao will lead the orchestra in a performance at the Kennedy Center in Washington DC during the Heritage National Invitational Band and Orchestra Festival.

Mr. Qiao also played violin and viola in numerous symphony orchestras in the past three decades for Shanghai Philharmonic, James University Symphony Orchestra and Chamber Orchestra. New York Staten Island Philharmonic. Longby Philharmonic in Myrtle Beach, and North Carolina Opera House Philharmonic. Mr. Qiao has received numerous awards recognizing his achievements including "Outstanding Music Educator" recognized by Heritage Music Festivals in 2010, "Cary Academy Recognition for Mission Advancement Award" for 2006 and 2010, "Fei Minyi Young Musician and Educator Award" in 1990 in Shanghai Conservatory of Music in China, and "Excellent Violin Teacher" award from National Young Musician Competition Committee in 1989 in China.

Bill Myers believes that the purpose of music education is to help develop life- long, literate, lovers of music. Since earning degrees at East Carolina University (B.M.E. - 1985) and Arizona State University (M.M. - 1987), Mr. Myers has taught music classes to students from elementary to graduate school. His focus on teaching students to read, write, and "speak" music has resulted in a teaching approach that encourages students to develop improvisation skills from the first year of instruction. Currently Mr. Myers teaches orchestra and quitar classes in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School system at Bailey Middle and Hough High School. At both of these schools Mr. Myers has established ensembles that focus on performing music that encourages students to develop improvisational skills. Bailey Middle School's Blazin' Bows and Hough High School's Electric Blues ensembles each feature 16 string players with a full rhythm section performing music that ranges from rock, blues, and jazz standards to contemporary pop music. Members of these ensembles have been featured in concerts and clinics lead by Mark Wood and Christian Howes.

In 2011 Christian Howes was voted first place in the Downbeat Critics Poll ("rising stars/violin") and nominated by the Jazz Journalists Association for "violinist of the year". At the same time. Christian launched the "Creative Strings Academy" to provide a direct means for teachers to offer improvisation, harmony, and alternative styles online to their students via a comprehensive method and curriculum. Christian served for three years as an Associate Professor at the Berklee College of Music after founding his own annual Creative Strings Workshop and Festival in 2003. The annual weeklong conference provides teen and adult string players an opportunity to experience a rigorous schedule of public performances, jams, rehearsals, clinics, all with a focus on improvisational music. Christian collaborates with string teachers around the world, with the generous sponsorship of Yamaha and D'Addario, to provide workshops and guest performances for K-12 string programs, college, and private studios.

Christian has been invited to present or teach at The New School, Oberlin College, the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, University of New Mexico, University of Southern California, University of Arizona, University of Michigan, Ohio State University, IAJE, ASTA, NAMM, IMEA, OMEA, KASTA, FMEA, AASTA, the Mark O'Connor Fiddle Camp, the Berklee String Fling, Jazz Connections, and hundreds of high schools, middle schools, and private studios throughout the U.S. He has also taught in Hong Kong,

Singapore, Japan, Canada, Spain, Germany, Holland, Italy, and China.

Dr. Kenneth Thompson currently serves as associate professor and assistant dean in the College of Musical Arts at Bowling Green State University in Bowling Green, Ohio. His responsibilities include conducting ensembles in the band area, teaching graduate conducting and repertoire undergraduate and instrumental methods. Additionally, he serves on the conducting staff of both the Detroit Symphony Orchestra where he directs the Detroit Symphony Orchestra Civic Wind Symphony and the DSO Civic Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Toledo Symphony Orchestra, where he serves as Artistic Director of the Toledo Symphony Youth Orchestras and Conductor of the TYO Philharmonic. A graduate of Limestone College (SC) with a double major in music education and trumpet, Thompson received a master's degree in music education and doctorate in conducting from The University of Iowa. Prior to his BGSU appointment, he held the position of associate conductor with the St. Louis Wind Symphony and Chamber Winds, and now serves as Principal Guest Conductor. He has conducted performances for numerous regional conventions, live radio broadcasts multiple CD recordings.

With publications in the Journal of the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles. Journal of Band Research, Journal of the National Association of College Wind and Percussion Instructors. School Band and Orchestra Magazine, Journal of the Australian Band and Association, Orchestra Directors The Instrumentalist, Bandmusic PDF Archives and the BCM International Web Archive, Dr. Thompson maintains a reputation as both a scholar and performer. He has appeared as a guest conductor, lecturer or clinician for the International Society for Music Education, the National Conference of the College Band Directors National Association, the National Conference of the MENC, the North Carolina, South Carolina, Iowa, Ohio and Missouri Music Educators Association conferences, the Missouri Bandmasters conference, the Midwest Composers Symposium and the Iowa Center for New Music. In high demand as a guest conductor and

lecturer, Thompson maintains an active schedule with engagements throughout the United States, Canada, Malaysia, Singapore, Japan and China.

Jessica Embry is the orchestra director at Myrtle Grove Middle School and Ashley High School in Wilmington. She obtained her B.M. and M.M. in Double Bass Performance from Ohio University and her M.M. in Music Theory from the Univeristy of Massachusetts-Amherst. Prior to moving to Wilmington, Jessica taught at Lumberton Jr. and Sr. High Schools for three years. Ms. Embry is a member of NCMEA, MENC, ASTA and Sigma Alpha lota. She has served as chair of the Eastern Region MPA for the past two years and is the Chair-Elect for the NCMEA Orchestra Section.

Jim Waddelow, a native of Oklahoma, joined the faculty of Meredith College as Director of Instrumental Activities in 2007 and in 2011 received the Ida H. Friday Award, which was established in honor of Ida H. Friday, a Meredith alumna and wife of former UNC System President William Friday. He conducts the Meredith Sinfonietta and serves as Musical Director for musical theater productions in the Department of Theater and Dance. Jim received his B.M.E. and M.M. from the University of Central Oklahoma and his D.M.A. from Texas Tech University. He is the Interim Music Director and Conductor of the Raleigh Symphony Orchestra and he has been the Orchestra Director of the Inspiration Point Fine Arts Colony Summer Music Camp in Eureka Springs, Arkansas since 1999.

He also conducted the nationally recognized Putnam City North High School orchestra for six years. Principal teachers include Gary Lewis, Ralph Morris, Roger Strong and Lon Dehnert. Jim is a member of the Conductor's Guild, College Orchestra Director's Association, American String Teacher's Association, Music Educators National Conference and The College Music Society. He is an active clinician and adjudicator throughout the South.

Growing up Todd Miller traveled throughout the US and Europe as an Air Force dependent, and went to High School in Fayetteville, North Carolina. He began his guitar studies at thirteen, and began performing during high school. He later moved to Charlotte, NC, where he spent the next twenty years performing, recording, and teaching guitar. He went back to college in 2000 to pursue his music education degree. Patricia Carmelina Sparti, D.M.A. (Conductor), is in her 11th year as Chair of the Music Department and Professor of Music at Gardner-Webb University. In January 2003, she returned to conduct their 25th Anniversary Concert, which featured the American Premiere of Vaclav Nelhybel's Concerto For Viola, with Richard Field, Principal Violist of the Baltimore Symphony, as soloist.

Under her direction the JHMI performed ensembles on **NBC** Televisions four times, won national awards for quality of performance, and in addition to regular Sunday Concert Series performances in Turner Auditorium, performed for President H.W. Numbering approximately 50-80 musicians depending upon repertoire, the orchestra performs several concerts per year, as well as accompanying the opera, musicals, and soloists. orchestra is comprised primarily of GWU students (over 45 GWU students and growing) and faculty, but it also consists of advanced community performers in the region. The orchestra also plays a concerto competition concert each year, featuring GWU students and other university and high school students around the state. The Orchestra often features Premieres of GWU student composer works in the spring. Orchestra enrollment is by audition, though strings may join without audition.

#### Next Gen on the Road – East Carolina University and the Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival

The Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival brings internationally

renowned musicians to eastern North Carolina and beyond for concerts, master classes and interactive community outreach. In residence at the East Carolina University School of Music, the festival is celebrating its 13th season. 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### NORTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION UPDATE

#### NCDPI SESSIONS AT CONFERENCE

Greetings, North Carolina Music Music educators, K-12, please plan to attend the special NCDPI Sessions geared toward specific grade spans, in order to receive critical information regarding music education in our schools. Members of teacher education/higher education and any other interested parties are invited to attend to learn more about how you can support a quality, sequential music education and receive updates on critical issues such as teacher evaluation, assessment, and developing proficiency in music. Updates on policy, legislation, and national standards and initiatives will also be provided.

#### COMPREHENSIVE ARTS EDUCATION

In August 2010, as charged by Senate Bill 66, the State Board of Education appointed a task force to create a Comprehensive Arts Education Development Plan for the

Public Schools of North Carolina. The S66 Task Force identified the following components of a Comprehensive Arts Education Plan:

- Arts Education (arts as core, academic subjects)
- Arts Integration (arts as a catalyst for learning across the curriculum)
- Arts Exposure (exposure to arts experiences)

The Task Force formulated their vision and recommendations into a report and implementation plan, which

were submitted to the General Assembly in December 2010 and March 2011.

#### **ARTS EDUCATION COMMISSION**

In June 2011, House Bill 758 was signed into law. H758 established an Arts Education Commission, which was charged with, among other things, prioritizing the recommendations of the Comprehensive Arts Education Plan. Several proposed bills were filed during the short session of the NC General Assembly during the spring of 2012, based on the findings/recommendations of the Commission.

#### NEW LEGISLATION REQUIRES ARTS INTEGRATION

Senate Bill 724 was signed into law by the Governor on June 26, 2012. This law requires that pre-service elementary teachers and lateral entry teachers are prepared to "integrate arts education across the curriculum," as part of this wide-scale Act to Improve Public Education. It will be important to understand this legislation as it is interpreted in higher education and in the public schools of NC.

#### STANDARDS IMPLEMENTATION

This is the first school year that the Arts Education (2012-13)Essential Standards are required to be implemented in all North Carolina schools. District and charter school teams have been receiving training and are implementing standards for all content areas this school year. #### **Research Sessions for Conference**

The November conference will feature four research sessions focusing on topics of interest to Music Educators, including graduate students, higher education faculty and in-service Join us for the latest in teachers. research, and keep yourself informed with new findings and insights on teaching music.

Dr. Don Hodges will present a session during showcase sponsored by Moore Music, entitled Neuroaesthetics of Music". Hodges sent NCMEA the following description of his presentation:

For well over 2,500 years, philosophers have been searching for ways to explain why music means so much to us. Much more recently, neuroscientists have engaged in their own quest to understand what goes on in the musical brain. They are even beginning to learn some things about music learning and thus how we might teach music using insights from neuroscience.

But what about musical values? Can neuroscience tell philosophers anything about why music is important or why it has value for human beings? Neuroaesthetics is the study of the neural processes that underlie aesthetic behavior, and this is what I will be discussing in this presentation-how philosophers and neuroscientists can work together to help us better understand the powerful role music plays in the human experience.

## Tips to Share with Parents

Parents wield extraordinary influence over local principals, school boards, and other decision makers. Encourage them to become involved in the advocacy process and make a significant difference in the quality of their child's music education program.

Schools that have music programs have significantly higher graduation rates than those without music programs (90.2 percent compared to 72.9 percent).

On average, students in music performance scored 57 points higher on the verbal and 41 points higher on the math section of the SAT than did students with no music participation.

Here are some simple, time-effective ways parents can assist their child's school music educators:

Access the Status Quo:

- Study the ways that music education develops creativity, enhances cooperative learning, instills disciplined work habits, and statistically correlates with gains in standardized test scores.
- Speak with your local school board about your desire to have a strong music education for your child.

#### **Communicate Effectively**

- Be in touch with local music teachers on a regular basis. Offer to help out.
- Ask yourself why your children need high quality music education. Be able to articulate the answers to teachers, administrators, and other parents.
- Take part in your school's music booster organization.
