



MINUTES December 7, 2023 N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission Meeting Raleigh, North Carolina

Chairman Monty Crump called the December 7, 2023 N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. in the Commission Room at the agency's headquarters in Raleigh. Crump reminded everyone that the meeting is being audio streamed live and will be available at www.ncwildlife.org.

Commissioner Ray Clifton led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Commissioner John Alexander gave the invocation.

MANDATORY ETHICS INQUIRY

Chairman Crump advised the Commission of the mandatory ethics inquiry as mandated in NCGS §138A-15. Chairman Crump recused himself from discussion and action on **EXHIBIT D-1**.

MINUTES

On a motion by Landon Zimmer and second by David Hoyle, the Commission approved the Minutes of the following meetings:

OCTOBER 26, 2023 MEETING – The Wildlife Resources Commission Minutes of the October 26, 2023 meeting were approved as presented in **EXHIBIT A**.

NOVEMBER 16, 2023 MEETING – The Wildlife Resources Commission Minutes of the November 16, 2023 meeting were approved as presented in **EXHIBIT B**.

EXHIBIT A & B are incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

ADMINISTRATION

Jason Cottle, *Chief Financial Officer*, presented a status report in **EXHIBIT C** on the Wildlife Resources Commission General Fund, Capital Improvement Fund, and the Endowment Fund.

EXHIBIT C is incorporated into the official record of this meeting.

<u>LAWRENCE G. DIEDRICK SMALL GAME AWARD</u> - Brad Howard, *Wildlife Management Division Chief*, presented the 2023 Lawrence G. Diedrick Small Game Awards to Louis Bacon, Dillon Epp and Theron Terhune, Orton Plantation, and Richard Broadwell and Family

COMMITTEE MEETING REPORTS

Land Acquisition & Property Committee Report – December 6, 2023 – Tom Berry, Chair, reported the Land Acquisition and Property Committee met on December 6, 2023. The Committee reviewed 17 total proposals which included 7 Phase I land acquisition proposals, 5 Phase II land acquisition proposals, and 5 other property matters. In total, the Committee reviewed just over 10,000 acres of land projects ranging from game land additions, establishment of a new boating access area in Pamlico County, as well as a potential boating access area lease in Carteret County. Notably, the Committee opted not to endorse the Falling Waters Phase I proposal. However, they recommended that staff engage in continued discussions with conservation partners, with plans to revisit the Falling Waters Phase I proposal later when more comprehensive information is available. Additionally, the LAP Committee did not endorse the King/Parton Easement request.

Boating Safety Committee Report – December 6, 2023 – *J.C. Cole, Chair*, reported the Boating Safety Committee met on December 6, 2023. *Betsy Haywood, No Wake Zone Coordinator*, reviewed five water safety rulemaking exhibits. She reviewed public comments and requests for final adoptions of four Rules. The Committee endorses final adoption of rule amendments for

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Brunswick County with changes, Rockingham County with changes, Caldwell County, and Town of Rhodhiss. She also reviewed one request for Notice of Text to be submitted to the Office of Administrative Hearings to begin rulemaking for Bladen County. The Committee endorses approval to submit Notice of Text for Bladen County.

Habitat, Nongame, Endangered Species Committee Report – December 6, 2023 – Kelly Davis, Chair, reported the Habitat, Nongame, Endangered Species Committee met on December 6, 2023. Katherine Etchison, Wildlife Diversity biologist, presented an informative presentation on the Virginia Big-eared Bat. Katherine highlighted the monitoring and research she and others are performing to increase our understanding of the species' distribution, abundance, and habitat selection during winter and the summer breeding season. A video on conservation efforts can be found at vimeo.com - Saving the Virginia Big Eared Bats. Dr. Sara Schweitzer, Wildlife Management Division Assistant Chief, followed Katherine's presentation with summary of the Virginia Big-eared Bat Conservation Plan and requested approval to post the plan on WRC's website for a 30-day public review period. The Committee approved this request. Rachael Hoch, Inland Fisheries Division Assistant Chief, presented a proposed amendment to the Reintroduction Proposal for the Spotfin Chub that would include the Snowbird Creek watershed for the reintroduction of the species under our Programmatic Safe Harbor Agreement. The Committee members approved the amendment. Rachael then provided an update on Zebra Mussels and Giant Applesnails, both recently detected in NC waters for the first time. She also provided information on the new WRC Aquatic Nuisance Species Reporting Tool, which was launched in October of 2023 and allows the public and partners to report sightings of possible ANS species and increase WRC's early detection and rapid response capabilities. Next, Rachael provided an update on the reintroduction efforts for the Magnificent Ramshorn and Roanoke Logperch. In October, 94 Roanoke Logperch were stocked into the Mayo River, and 2,800 Magnificent Ramshorn snails have been stocked into WRC owned property in Brunswick County. Monitoring of the snails post stocking, has already revealed successful establishment and egg-laying. This reintroduction highlights the culmination of years of effort and is the first stocking of a federally listed aquatic species under a Programmatic Safe Harbor Agreement. Last, Dr. Schweitzer presented the nomination packet for the expiring terms of Nongame Wildlife Advisory Committee membership, which will be presented for a vote today.

Finance, Audit & Compliance Committee Report – December 6, 2023 – Landon Zimmer, Chair, reported Finance, Audit & Compliance Committee met on December 6, 2023. Jason Cottle, CFO, presented an overview of year-to-date revenues and expenditure by category in both the general and capital improvement funds. An update of the agency's endowment fund was presented, including fund balance and current asset allocation, as well as quarterly rates of return for each of the 3 investment vehicles within the fund. The Finance Committee was in agreement to move the remaining Bond Index Fund balance to the Short Term Investment Fund. Steve Chase, Auditor, presented a summary of the proposed Go Outdoors NC reporting audit effort, this work will assess the Go Outdoors report reliability. A Go Outdoors NC survey is proposed for later this fiscal year to assess the level of satisfaction with the Go Outdoors NC platform. Auditor Chase also provided a briefing on the Purchasing Card Compliance Review program, and a follow up on the WRC internal audit staffing level and the addition of a resource to the WRC Internal Audit Office.

Motion from the Finance, Aduit & Compliance Committee – On a motion by Landon Zimmer and a second by Brad Stanback, the Commission approved a motion to transfer the remaining

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funds from the Bond Index Fund to the Short Term Investment Fund (unless the Bond Index Fund loses more than 5% before the transfer is initiated), maintain at least 5% of the total Endowment Fund Portfolio in the Short Term Investment Fund, and that this action overrides all previous actions related to the Endowment Fund Portfolio.

Rules Committee Report – December 6, 2023 – David Hoyle, Vice Chair, reported the Rules Committee met on December 6, 2023. The Committee first reviewed proposed amendments to the endangered, threatened, and special concern species rule. This rule is required to be readopted as part of the periodic review and the proposed amendments clarify requirements for ES permits and take of species without a permit. Next, proposed changes to the annual rules cycle were presented to help mitigate potential issues created by changes made to the APA in the 2023 legislative session. The option of moving the annual cycle from a 2-year process to a calendar year was presented to better align with the legislative calendar so if any rules receive 10 letters of objection, they will go to the next legislative session. This will move our rules through the process more quickly. Changing the annual cycle will be an adjustment for staff, Commissioners and the public but will allow the Commission to implement changes in a more timely manner than is currently possible. The Rules Committee is supportive of this change.

Ad hoc Agency Supplemental Funding Model Committee – October 26, 2023 – David Hoyle, Chair, reported the Ad Hoc Committee to Assess the Agency Supplemental Funding Model met on October 26, 2023. The Committee reviewed its charge, which is to assess options for generating supplemental revenue from multiple uses of Commission property and develop evidence-based strategies to build support for the Commission's conservation mission among non-licensed users. The Committee discussed priority supplemental revenue options for upcoming assessment. Staff presented a list of potential supplemental revenue options for the Committee's consideration, along with assessment criteria to be used to evaluate each potential revenue stream. The Committee asked staff to proceed with evaluating the feasibility, potential benefits, and potential fees associated with the options presented. Staff will update the Committee on the assessment progress at regular intervals.

Ad hoc Agency Supplemental Funding Model Committee – December 6, 2023 – David Hoyle, Chair, reported the Ad Hoc Committee met on December 6, 2023 to review a list of options for further assessment recommended by WRC staff. The options include changes to vessel registration and permitting, changes to selected licenses, partnership opportunities, and discussing an access pass for unlicensed individuals using WRC properties. The Committee asked staff to proceed with the assessment of options, which will be presented to the Ad Hoc Committee in 2024 for consideration and recommendation to the Committee of the Whole.

Committee of the Whole Report – December 6, 2023 – Monty Crump, Chair, reported the Committee of the Whole met yesterday afternoon. Melva Bonner, Regulatory Analyst began the meeting with proposed changes to Hunter Education Course rules and a petition for rulemaking for a no-wake zone on Bradley Creek in New Hanover County. Next, Executive Director Ingram recognized Senior Officer William Boone and Master Officer Richard Becker as recipients of the 2023 Governor's Awards for Excellence for Safety and Heroism, and Gary Gardner recognized staff for receiving the 2023 States Organization for Boating Access' 2023 Outstanding Project Award for work at the Wrightsville Beach Boating Access Area. Gary went on to inform the Committee that we will be hosting the 2024 meeting next August in Wilmington. Then, Brad Howard, Wildlife Management Division Chief, provided an update on CWD testing for this season.

Hunters have submitted over 19,000 tests so far this year which is over 2,000 samples more than the entirety of last year. *Christian Waters, Inland Fisheries Division Chief,* provided an update on striped bass in the Albemarle-Roanoke. The Division of Marine Fisheries has announced that they do not plan to open a season in the Albemarle Sound next year, and, based on our sampling on the spawning grounds, staff recommend not opening a season in the Roanoke as well. Christian then updated the committee on recent actions taken by the Marine Fisheries Commission, including rule changes they are proposing for joint rules. We will prepare and submit comments when the public comment period is open. Lastly, I informed the committee of the status of the changes to the Commission by the legislature, including the addition of two new commissioners. There being no further business, the committee adjourned.

AGENCY SPOTLIGHT – The Status of North Carolina's Crayfish – Michael Perkins, Aquatic Wildlife Diversity Biologist, gave a presentation highlighting recent research in collaboration with Dr. Bronwyn Williams of the NC Museum of Natural History on the biodiversity, conservation, and threats of the State's crayfish fauna. Highlights included the discovery of several native crayfish species new to science and a discussion of invasive crayfish species, particularly the Red Swamp crayfish.

Proposed Amendments to Inland Fisheries Rules for 2024-2025 Annual Cycle Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

Trout

F1. 15A NCAC 10C .0205

Remove the Delayed Harvest Trout Waters section on the Little River in Alleghany County and reclassify the lower 1.2-mile section from Delayed Harvest Trout Waters to Hatchery Supported Trout Waters. The new Hatchery Supported Trout Waters reach will be from 400 yards upstream of the S.R. 1128 bridge (marked by a sign on each bank) to the McCann Dam. This proposal will remove approximately 1.3 miles of water from Public Mountain Trout Waters.

Justification: The upper 1.3-mile section of Delayed Harvest Trout Waters on the Little River is on private property, and angler access and stocking locations have been posted against trespassing. The property owner has formally asked that the section be removed from Public Mountain Trout Waters. The remaining 1.2 miles of the section remain open to public access, so the upper boundary of the existing Hatchery Supported Trout Waters (located directly downstream) is being moved upstream to incorporate the remaining section.

15A NCAC 10C .0205 PUBLIC MOUNTAIN TROUT WATERS (Pg. 7-20)

F2. 15A NCAC 10C .0205

Modify the lower boundary of Delayed Harvest Trout Waters on Helton Creek in Ashe County. The new reach will be 900 yards upstream of S.R. 1372 bridge (marked by a sign on each bank) to a point adjacent to the intersection of N.C. 16 and S.R. 1536. This proposal will remove approximately 0.7 miles of water from Public Mountain Trout Waters.

Justification: This section of Helton Creek is on private property, and most of the angler access and stocking locations have been posted against trespassing.

15A NCAC 10C .0205 PUBLIC MOUNTAIN TROUT WATERS (Pg. 7-20)

F3. 15A NCAC 10C .0205

Clarify that tributaries to the Hatchery Supported Trout Waters section of the West Fork Pigeon River in Haywood County on the Pisgah Game Land are classified as Wild Trout Waters. This proposal will not remove any water from Public Mountain Trout Waters.

Justification: The tributaries to this section of the West Fork Pigeon River have never been stocked and have been misidentified as Hatchery Supported Trout Waters in the North Carolina Administrative Code (NCAC). This proposal clarifies that the tributaries are managed as Wild Trout Waters.

15A NCAC 10C .0205 PUBLIC MOUNTAIN TROUT WATERS (Pg. 7-20)

F4. 15A NCAC 10C .0205

Remove the Wild Trout Waters section from the Avery County line to S.R. 1580 bridge on the Watauga River in Watauga County from Public Mountain Trout Waters. This proposal will remove approximately 4.0 miles of water from Public Mountain Trout Waters.

Justification: This section of the Watauga River is on private property, and most angler access locations have been posted against trespassing.

15A NCAC 10C .0205 PUBLIC MOUNTAIN TROUT WATERS (Pg. 7-20)

F5. 15A NCAC 10C .0205

Modify the lower boundary of Hatchery Supported Trout Waters on East Prong Roaring River in Wilkes County. The new reach will be from the Stone Mountain State Park lower boundary to the Low Meadows Lane bridge. This proposal will remove approximately 0.7 miles of water from Public Mountain Trout Waters.

Justification: This section of the East Prong Roaring River is on private property, and most angler access and stocking locations have been posted against trespassing.

15A NCAC 10C .0205 PUBLIC MOUNTAIN TROUT WATERS (Pg. 7-20)

F6. 15A NCAC 10C .0205, .0316

Reclassify the following waters from Wild Trout Waters/Natural Bait to Wild Trout Waters and remove the Wild Trout Waters/Natural Bait classification from Public Mountain Trout Waters.

- The game land portion of Bald Creek and its tributaries in Cherokee County
- The game land portion of Dockery Creek and its tributaries in Cherokee County
- The game land portion of Long Creek and its tributaries in Graham County
- The game land portion of the Chattooga River and its tributaries in Jackson and Macon counties
- The game land portion of Kimsey Creek and its tributaries in Macon County
- The game land portion of Park Creek and its tributaries in Macon County
- The game land portion of the North Fork French Broad River and its tributaries in Transylvania County
- The game land portion of the Thompson River and its tributaries in Transylvania County This proposal will not remove any water from Public Mountain Trout Waters.

Justification: The Wild Trout/Natural Bait classification was intended to diversify angler opportunity and experience; however, bait anglers rarely use Wild Trout/Natural Bait streams. The classification never expanded regionally beyond District 9, is not requested by anglers, and unnecessarily adds complexity to Public Mountain Trout Waters regulations.

Striped Bass and Hybrid Striped Bass (Bodie Bass)

F7. 15A NCAC 10C .0314

Modify the size limit for Striped Bass and its hybrids at Kerr Reservoir by prohibiting the possession of fish larger than 26 inches from October 1 through May 31. The minimum size limit will remain 20 inches and daily creel limit will remain two fish per day from October 1 through May 31. The daily creel limit of four fish per day and no size limit will remain from June 1 through September 30.

Justification: Per agreement, the Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources (VADWR) is the lead for fisheries management at Kerr Reservoir, and VADWR implemented the proposed change for the Virginia portion of Kerr Reservoir effective January 1, 2023. This proposal would implement the regulation in the North Carolina portion of the reservoir. The proposed change will provide additional protection for larger Striped Bass.

15A NCAC 10C .0314 STRIPED BASS (Pg. 27-28)

F8. 15A NCAC 10C .0314

Establish a 16-inch minimum size limit for Striped Bass and its hybrids at Farmer Lake. The daily creel limit will remain four fish.

Justification: The Commission has recently initiated annual stockings of hybrid Striped Bass at Farmer Lake to create a fishery. This proposed change would make regulations for hybrid Striped Bass at Farmer Lake consistent with other reservoirs across North Carolina that are stocked with hybrid Striped Bass.

15A NCAC 10C .0314 STRIPED BASS (Pg. 27-28)

F9. 15A NCAC 10C .0314

Remove the 16-inch minimum size limit for Striped Bass and its hybrids at Mountain Island Reservoir and Lake Thom-A-Lex. The general statewide regulation of a 20-inch minimum size limit and four fish daily creel will apply.

Justification: Striped Bass are no longer stocked in Mountain Island Reservoir due to poor growth and survival. Hybrid Striped Bass may be present in Mountain Island Reservoir through emigration from Lake Norman, but do not require more protection than what is already provided by the statewide regulation. Hybrid Striped Bass have not been stocked at Lake Thom-A-Lex since 2018 due to their high rate of emigration from the reservoir. Striped Bass are not present in Lake Thom-A-Lex. Removing these reservoir-specific regulations will alleviate angler confusion about species availability and simplify rules for anglers.

15A NCAC 10C .0314 STRIPED BASS (Pg. 27-28)

F10. 15A NCAC 10C .0314

Clarify in the NCAC that the season for taking and possessing Striped Bass and its hybrids is closed year-round in the Inland Fishing Waters of the Central/Southern Management Area. Waters covered include the Inland Fishing Waters of the Tar, Pungo, and Neuse rivers, and their tributaries.

Justification: This closure was initially implemented in March 2019 by proclamation. Maintaining the closure was recommended in Amendment 2 to the North Carolina Estuarine Striped Bass Fishery Management Plan. The closure needs to be codified in the NCAC.

15A NCAC 10C .0314 STRIPED BASS (Pg. 27-28)

Largemouth Bass

F11. 15A NCAC 10C .0305

Establish no minimum size limit except that only two may be less than 14 inches for Largemouth Bass at Shearon Harris Reservoir. The daily creel limit will remain five fish.

Justification: Biological data collected over the past 15 years indicates that the current prohibited size range of 16 - 20 inches for Largemouth Bass has not worked as intended. Harvest of Largemouth Bass is low at Shearon Harris Reservoir and few, if any, Largemouth Bass less than 16-inches are being harvested. Low harvest has resulted in reduced overall average condition of Largemouth Bass. Increasing harvest of Largemouth Bass may help increase overall average condition and growth of fish greater than 16 inches.

15A NCAC 10C .0305 LARGEMOUTH BASS (Pg. 22-23)

American Shad

F12. 15A NCAC 10C .0313

Prohibit harvest of American Shad in the Yadkin-Pee Dee River basin upstream of Blewett Falls Dam and clarify existing language that prohibits harvest in Roanoke River Reservoirs upstream of Roanoke Rapids Dam. The proposal will not prohibit catch-and-release opportunities.

Justification: Duke Energy-Progress is required by its Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) license to provide upstream passage for American Shad at Blewett Falls Dam to help restore American Shad in the Yadkin-Pee Dee River basin. Initial testing of fishway operations is scheduled to begin spring 2024, and full-time operation is anticipated in spring 2025. Harvest restrictions are necessary to protect spawning American Shad passed upstream of the dam. In addition, the existing rule prohibiting harvest of American Shad in Roanoke Rapids Reservoir, Lake Gaston, and John H. Kerr Reservoir is intended to protect American Shad moved upstream of Roanoke Rapids Dam required by Dominion Energy's FERC license. Proposed changes to the current rule will clarify that American Shad shall not be harvested from all public fishing waters upstream of Roanoke Rapids Dam, which was the intent of the original rule. These changes will not prohibit catch-and-release opportunities.

15A NCAC 10C .0313 AMERICAN SHAD AND HICKORY SHAD (Pg. 26)

Crappie

F13. 15A NCAC 10C .0306

Remove the daily creel limit of 20 fish and the minimum size limit of 8-inches for Crappie in Ramseur Lake.

Justification: A 2019 assessment of Crappie in Lake Ramseur indicated slow growth and a stunted population evidenced by the abundance of smaller-sized yet older Crappie. Removing the creel and size limit will promote harvest and help to improve growth and body condition.

15A NCAC 10C .0306 CRAPPIE (Pg. 24)

Muskellunge

F14. 15A NCAC 10C .0208

Prohibit fishing from March 1 through May 31 in the Pleasant Grove floodplain slough connected to the French Broad River, 0.25 miles upstream of S.R. 1205 (Etowah School Road) in Henderson County.

Justification: Closure of the Pleasant Grove slough to fishing during the spring would prevent targeted angling and the potential harvest of Muskellunge during their spawning period. Construction of the Pleasant Grove backwater slough was conducted specifically to restore spawning and nursery areas for adult and juvenile Muskellunge to promote natural reproduction and recruitment of juvenile fish to the population. The French Broad River Muskellunge population currently has extremely limited to no natural reproduction or measurable recruitment. The population has been supported by hatchery produced Muskellunge since 1970.

15A NCAC 10C .0208 SPAWNING AREAS (Pg. 21)

Flounder

F15. 15A NCAC 10C .0307

Reduce the daily creel limit for Flounder from four fish to one fish. The 15-inch minimum size limit and the season for taking and possessing Flounder from September 1 through September 14 will remain.

Justification: According to North Carolina Division of Marine Fisheries data, Flounder are overfished, and overfishing is occurring. The reduction in the daily creel limit from four fish to one fish will reduce harvest and potentially end overfishing of the population. The proposed change is consistent with the daily creel limit established in Coastal Fishing Waters.

15A NCAC 10C .0307 FLOUNDER (Pg. 25)

Fishes in Joint Fishing Waters

F16. 15A NCAC 10C .0801

Reaffirm the Wildlife Resources Commission's authority over certain species designated as inland game fish in all public fishing waters and clarify the size and creel limits which

apply. Additionally, clarify that these species can only be taken with hook and line, that species taken incidental to commercial fishing operations shall be immediately returned to the water unharmed, and that the appearance of species with size and creel limits cannot be altered.

Justification: There has been confusion in the public and government agencies as to the Commission's authority over species designated as inland game fish when found in Joint Fishing Waters. Certain inland game fish are under the authority of the Wildlife Resources Commission in all public fishing waters. The proposed changes clarify the regulations for those species that apply to both recreational and commercial fishing in Joint Fishing Waters.

15A NCAC 10C .0801 INLAND GAME FISHES DESIGNATED IN JOINT FISHING WATERS (Pg. 31)

F17. 15A NCAC 10C .0802

Reaffirm the Wildlife Resources Commission's authority over all fishes taken by hook and line in Joint Fishing Waters and clarify the size and creel limits, seasons, and restrictions on species that may be sold. Also, clarify that the appearance of species with size and creel limits cannot be altered.

Justification: There has been confusion in the public and government agencies as to the Commission's authority over fishes taken by hook and line in Joint Fishing Waters. Per 15A 03Q .0106 and 15A NCAC 10C .0106, the Commission has authority for fish taken by hook and line in Joint Fishing Waters. The proposed rule clarifies that authority including size and creel limits, seasons, and if the species may be sold.

15A NCAC 10C .0802 TAKING AND POSSESSION OF OTHER FISHES BY HOOK AND LINE IN JOINT FISHING WATERS (Pgs. 32-33)

Only artificial lures having only one single hook may be used. No person shall possess natural 31 bait while fishing these waters. Waters with this designation do not include tributaries unless 32 otherwise noted. 33 (7)"Wild Trout Natural Bait Waters" are Public Mountain Trout Waters where artificial lures and 34 natural baits, except live fish, may be used provided they are fished using only one single hook. 35

Proposed Amendments to Land and Water Access Rules for 2024-2025 Annual Cycle Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

Use of Game Lands

G1. 15A NCAC 10D .0103

Update the rule language from "under the influence of alcohol or any narcotic drug" to "under the influence of an impairing substance" as defined by North Carolina General Statue 20-4.01(48b) to allow Law Enforcement to enforce the rule more effectively.

Justification: Wildlife Law Enforcement Officers routinely encounter individuals hunting on game lands that are under the influence of impairing substances other than those categorized as alcohol or narcotic drugs. Officers have encountered numerous subjects impaired due to marijuana use. Under G.S. 90-87, marijuana is not defined as a narcotic drug; therefore, officers are currently unable to charge these individuals for hunting while under the influence. Additionally, many other drugs exist that are not defined per General Statute as narcotic drugs. Changing the language to "under the influence of an impairing substance" will allow officers to enforce this rule more effectively. G.S. 20-4.01(14a) defines an impairing substance as, "Alcohol, controlled substance under Chapter 90 of the General Statutes, any other drug or psychoactive substance capable of impairing a person's physical or mental faculties, or any combination of these substances."

15A NCAC 10D .0103 GENERAL REGULATIONS REGARDING HUNTING ON GAME LANDS (PG. 4-7)

G2. 15A NCAC 10D .0225

Prohibit target shooting on Dover Bay Game Land.

Justification: Opportunities currently exist for target shooting at alternative sites appropriately constructed and monitored to provide a safe environment for participants. Dover Bay Game Land is within 52 miles of the Holly Shelter Shooting Range. This change is consistent with other game lands where target shooting is prohibited within an acceptable radius of shooting ranges. Additionally, target shooting at this game land routinely occurs at or near the parking area, which increases protentional conflict between hunters and target shooters.

15A NCAC 10D .0225 DOVER BAY GAME LAND IN CRAVEN COUNTY (PG. 10)

G3. 15A NCAC 10D .0216, .0233, .0245

Restrict recreational and mountain biking on the Chatham, Harris, and Lee game lands. Hunters engaged in the act of hunting will be permitted to use bicycles on these properties.

Justification: Duke Energy, the landowner, requested the prohibition of recreational cycling on these properties. They have experienced a substantial increase in mountain biking and the associated unauthorized trail making, bridge building, creek crossing, and cycling obstacle infrastructure creation in recent years on these properties. Mountain biking has led to ecological damage and potential liabilities on the Harris Game Land.

15A NCAC 10D .0216 CHATHAM GAME LAND IN CHATHAM COUNTY (PG. 9) 15A NCAC 10D .0233 HARRIS GAME LAND IN CHATHAM, HARNETT, AND WAKE COUNTIES (PG. 11) 15A NCAC 10D .0245 LEE GAME LAND IN LEE COUNTY (PG. 12)

G4. 15A NCAC 10D .0256

Establish a "Scouting-only Zone" on North River Game Land for waterfowl impoundments to limit the disturbance to migrating and wintering waterfowl, shorebirds, and wading birds.

Justification: A "Scouting-only Zone" is a tool used to manage non-hunting and trapping activities on waterfowl impoundments to decrease disturbances during the migration and wintering periods. The North River Game Land posted waterfowl impoundments have significant human disturbances including people walking the dikes of the impoundments and interfering with permitted hunts during the migration and wintering periods. Human presence is a disturbance that most waterfowl species do not tolerate, and they will flee the area. To mitigate this issue, an observation tower adjacent to the parking area near the impoundments will be installed, to provide opportunities to view the posted waterfowl impoundments, while limiting the disturbance. The Scouting-only Zone will be limited to the observation tower from November 1 through March 15. Outside of these dates, the area will be open to public use. This Scouting-only Zone will reduce the amount of disturbance to waterfowl, provide a higher quality hunt for permitted waterfowl hunters, and better align management of the posted waterfowl impoundments with the guidelines of the Federal grant used to create the site.

15A NCAC 10D .0256 NORTH RIVER GAME LAND IN CAMDEN AND CURRITUCK COUNTIES (PG. 13)

G5. 15A NCAC 10D .0283

Restrict camping at designated camping areas on Thurmond-Chatham Game Land to September 1 through the last day of February and March 31 through May 14.

Justification: The use of camping areas by non-licensed individuals has increased substantially over the years, both during and outside the hunting seasons. Law Enforcement routinely encounter violations including illegal drugs, littering, indecent exposure, and extended camping. Trash, tents, drug paraphernalia, and human waste pose a safety issue for staff and other users. Restricting camping to dates within the hunting seasons will limit use and undesirable activity, decrease the required maintenance at these areas, and make camping on this game land consistent with other game lands.

15A NCAC 10D .0283 THURMOND CHATHAM GAME LAND IN ALLEGHANY AND WILKES COUNTIES (PG. 14)

Hunting Season Changes

G6. 15A NCAC 10D .0293

Change the Gun Antlered or Antlerless Season in the Montgomery County portions of the Yadkin River Game Land from moderate to maximum.

Justification: This change aligns the Montgomery County portion of the Yadkin River Game Land with the rest of the game land and aligns Antlered or Antlerless Season dates with surrounding private land seasons.

15A NCAC 10D .0293 YADKIN RIVER GAME LAND IN DAVIDSON, DAVIE, MONTGOMERY, ROWAN, AND STANLY COUNTIES (PG. 15)

Establishment of Game Lands

G7. 15A NCAC 10D .0215

Define the 4,830-acre portion of the R. Wayne Bailey-Caswell Game Land, as the Caswell Small Game Focal Area (CSGFA). The CSGFA will be a draw permit only for all quail and woodcock hunting and point-of-sale permit only for rabbit and squirrel hunting outside the normal three days per week framework. Hunting for big game and small game will still be allowed during the regular hunt days (Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays) without a permit, except for quail and woodcock hunting.

Justification: It is imperative that the boundaries of the new CSGFA be conspicuously posted on the ground and the geographic area be defined in rule. This designation will inform constituents of hunting opportunities and allow Law Enforcement to enforce the rules.

15A NCAC 10D .0215 WAYNE BAILEY-CASWELL GAME LAND IN CASWELL COUNTY (PG. 8)

G8. 15A NCAC 10D .0294

Add the North Bend Game Land to the Northern Mountain Region Game Land Program as a hunting by permit only game land.

Justification: The Commission acquired 1,225 acres from Duke Energy below Lake James in Burke County. The North Bend Game Land has proximity to multiple residences, portions of the Overmountain National Historic and Fonta Flora Trails, and is a hunting by permit only acquisition. North Bend will provide unique, quality opportunities, and serve user groups from surrounding municipalities such as Marion and Morganton.

Raccoon and opossum hunting may continue until 7:00 a.m. on Tuesdays, until 7:00 a.m. on Thursdays, and until midnight on Saturdays.
- (3) For purposes of this Subchapter, "Six Days per Week Area" refers to a Game Land on which game may be taken on the open days of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday during the open seasons. Falconry may be practiced on Sundays.
- (4) For purposes of this Subchapter, "Seven Days per Week Area" refers to a Game Land on which game may be taken during the open season on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays.
- (5) For purposes of this Subchapter, "Four Days per Week Area" refers to a Game Land on which game may be taken during the open seasons and hunting is limited to Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, Sundays, Labor Day, Veterans Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, and Martin Luther King Day. Raccoon and opossum hunting may continue until 7:00 a.m. on Wednesdays, 7:00 a.m. on Fridays, and 7:00 a.m. on Mondays.
- (6) For purposes of this Subchapter, "Permit" means a written authorization from the Commission required for take or other activities listed on the permit during open seasons, if applicable, in a specified area and subject to annual limitations imposed by the Commission to meet wildlife, hunter, or land management objectives, unless otherwise specified. Individuals may apply for available permits online at newildlife.org, by phone, or in person at a wildlife service agent location. The Commission shall issue permits to applicants selected at random by computer in accordance with G.S. 113-264. Permits shall be non-transferrable. The laws and rules regarding the species or activity shall apply.
- (7) For the purposes of this Subchapter, "Either-Sex" means antlered or antlerless.
- (k) Deer shall not be taken with the use of dogs on game lands in counties or parts of counties where taking deer with

Proposed Amendments to Wildlife Management Rules for 2024-2025 Annual Cycle Recommended by Agency Staff for Adoption

Deer

H1. 15A NCAC 10B .0203

Shift the western blackpowder and gun seasons so that blackpowder season begins two Saturdays before Thanksgiving and runs two weeks until gun season, which will begin the Saturday after Thanksgiving and run through January 1, and shift the timing of the 1-week and 1-day blackpowder antlerless seasons to begin the second Saturday of the season.

Justification: Most antlered buck harvest in the western deer seasons occurs before peak breeding which negatively affects breeding synchrony and thus fawn recruitment and hunter satisfaction. Shifting blackpowder and gun seasons later in the year will reduce vulnerability of yearling bucks during dispersal, reduce harvest of bucks prior to breeding, and provide more hunting opportunities during the rut. Shifting the 1-week and 1-day blackpowder antlerless deer seasons to Thanksgiving week will provide more antlerless hunting opportunities during the holiday.

H2. 15A NCAC 10B .0203

Introduce 1-day antlerless gun season on private lands and increase antlerless blackpowder season from 1-day to 1-week on all lands in Cherokee, Clay, Jackson, Macon, and Swain counties.

Increase antlerless gun season from 1-day to 1-week on private lands and increase antlerless blackpowder season from 1-week to 2-weeks on all lands in Buncombe and Henderson counties. This change does not apply to the portions of Buncombe and Henderson counties where the harvest of antlerless deer is currently allowed during the entire gun season.

Justification: The harvest objective of at least one antlered buck per square mile is being met on private lands in these counties and continued herd growth is expected. Additional antlerless harvest is sustainable and will provide hunters with additional opportunities as well as help balance the buck to doe ratio.

H3. 15A NCAC 10B .0203

Remove specific youth deer hunts on Belews Creek Steam Station, Mountain Island State Forest, and W. Kerr Scott Reservoir.

Justification: The agency is able to allow special organized hunts to promote Recruitment, Retention and Reactivation (R3) efforts via 15A NCAC 10B .0126. The provision in the deer rule is unnecessarily restrictive, as these hunts are only for youth. Participation in these three hunts has declined over the years, but because they are specifically for youth, the agency is unable to offer unused permits to anyone other than individuals under 18. Removing this language will clarify regulations, give the agency, and hunt organizers flexibility to use these opportunities for youth, individuals with disabilities, novice hunters, or lapsed hunters.

Bear

H4. 15A NCAC 10B .0202

Amend the bear rule to incorporate the following changes:

- Update rule text to be consistent with the use of "designated bear management areas" terminology that is used in 15A NCAC 10D .0106.
- Shift the start date of the bear hunting season in the Mountain Bear Management Unit to add nine days and create Saturday openers for each of the two segments.
- Remove the prohibition on hunting bears with the aid of unprocessed bait during the second segment of the Mountain bear season.
- Correct rule text to clarify that dogs can be used to hunt bears in Franklin County.

Justification: Additional hunting opportunity in early October is necessary to meet population management objectives for the Mountain Bear Management Unit. The Mountain bear population is increasing annually, and current levels of harvest are not meeting the objective established in the Black Bear Management Plan, which is to stabilize the population. Opening the Mountain bear season nine days earlier will serve to change the composition of the Mountain bear harvest, slow down bear population growth, and help meet the population objective, while providing additional bear hunting opportunities.

Removing the prohibition on the use of unprocessed bait during the second segment will reduce regulation complexity without any biological impacts.

Per G.S. 113-291.5 and since the Piedmont bear seasons were created in 2014, the intention has been to allow hunters to use dogs to hunt bears in Franklin County. However, this county was unintentionally included in the rule prohibiting the use of dogs to take bear. The amendments will correct this error in the rule.

Pheasant

Bring the ring-necked pheasant season into alignment with overall conservation goals.

Justification: Conservation goals for ring-necked pheasants differ greatly between self-sustaining populations that occur on the outer banks and domestically raised pheasants that are released in other parts of the State. This proposed change will clarify regulations, continue to safeguard wild pheasants on the outer banks, and provide additional opportunities for hunting pheasants concurrent with other traditional small game hunting seasons.

Feral Swine

Justification: Feral swine hunting with dogs is a tradition in the far western counties of the State and feral swine populations have been established in the National Forest for more than 100 years. Feral swine are a non-desirable species that are legal to hunt during this time period. The proposed change expands opportunities to hunt feral swine with dogs.



Background

The wildlife resources of the State belong to the people of the State as a whole, including the enjoyment of these resources (G.S. 113-131(a)). The Wildlife Resources Commission (WRC) is tasked with the conservation of wildlife resources of the State (G.S. 143-239). This responsibility includes managing as equitably as possible the various competing interests regarding these resources, including the use and take of such resources (G.S. 113-131.1(a)). The statutes governing wildlife resources are found in Chapter 113, Subchapter IV of the General Statutes, and the WRC has been granted rulemaking authority to implement the provisions of these statutes (G.S. 113-134).

As part of its mission, the WRC adopts and publishes an endangered species list, a threatened species list, and a list of special concern species, as required by G.S. 113-333. These lists are amended from time to time, in response to public proposals, federal listing changes, or as the Commission deems necessary. The WRC conducts investigations of its wild animals, as defined in G.S. 113-331, to determine whether the state listings need to be adjusted to accomplish the objectives of managing wildlife resources through sound conservation. The WRC also adopts and implements conservation programs for endangered, threatened, and special concern species to limit, regulate, or prevent the taking, collection, or sale of protected species (G.S. 113-333).

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The management goal with any state listing is to ensure the stability of a species for long term viability.

The process for updating the state listing involves a multi-year, transparent process defined by science-based decision making. As detailed in G.S. 113 Article 25, the Nongame Wildlife Advisory Committee (NWAC) identifies and assembles a group of experts from multiple disciplines and other fields to serve as Scientific Councils for taxa groups. Scientific Councils review scientific evidence and provide state listing recommendations to NWAC which advises the Commission on matters related to the conservation of nongame wildlife including the protected animals lists. The Commission is required by G.S. 113-334 to consider the recommendations while examining relevant data and factual information. The proposed changes to the state listings are based on best available data and the status of each species' population as proposed by the North Carolina Species Assessment Tool and detailed in the Wildlife Action Plan (http://www.ncwildlife.org/plan).

A summary of the proposed rule amendments and potential impacts is below, with the full rule text included in Appendix A.

I. Introduction and Purpose of Rule Change

The endangered, threatened, and special concern species lists (hereinafter, referred to as the protected species list or state list) identify nongame wild animals to be protected and conserved, so conservation techniques and actions can be implemented, and their population numbers enhanced. An endangered species is one whose continued existence has been determined to be in jeopardy in the state. A threatened species is one that is likely to become endangered within the foreseeable future throughout all, or a significant portion of its range. And a special concern species has been determined to need monitoring. All species on the protected species list are native or once-native species of North Carolina.

The proposed changes to the list are necessary to ensure the continued viability of North Carolina's nongame wildlife diversity by promoting conservation priorities. After review of 10 species in a report from the Scientific Councils on Birds and on Freshwater Mollusks approved by NWAC, the WRC recommends adding three species, removing one species (for a net addition of two species), changing the status of four species, and updating the taxonomic names of 20 species on the protected species list. The proposed list highlights species that meet the definition of endangered, threatened, or special concern.

Proposed changes to the state list include one additional species to be listed as endangered, four species to be listed as threatened, and two species to be listed as special concern. Overall, there will be 28 changes to the state list due to additions, removals, changes in listing status, and taxonomic name corrections. The goal of these changes is to provide active and appropriate conservation for these species including research, land conservation, monitoring, and habitat restoration. When a species is experiencing a threat to and/or decline in population status, the state listing status can provide additional funding opportunities and research priority to assist in the recovery and population viability.

Adding a species to the protected species list establishes protection from direct take, encourages partners to request funding for species-specific projects, assists in identifying quality habitat that the agency would like to conserve, and informs partners of ecologically significant habitats so they can work to minimize impacts and focus their conservation efforts. Additionally, this information plays a large role in identifying and prioritizing multi-state and regional conservation needs, as well as long-term monitoring programs, and minimizes the likelihood of federal listing for that species.

II. Fiscal Impacts - Costs¹

State Impact

The proposed amendments to the 10I Rules are anticipated to have a minimal economic impact to the state.

It is unlawful, unless granted specific authorization, for an individual to take, possess, transport, sell, barter, trade, exchange, export or give away any species listed in 15A NCAC 10I .0103 - .0105.² To enforce this law, the WRC requires all new wildlife enforcement officers to participate in an agency training that includes a one-day review of regulations and field identification for nongame and state listed species. This training includes eight hours of information on the illegal pet trade, collection, and food market, and teaches officers accurate species identification. Additionally, routine refresher trainings are offered to officers, which include information on nongame species with increased unlawful activities, and any changes that have been made to the protected species lists. Though new training materials will need to be developed to incorporate the proposed changes to the 10I Rules, the materials are produced inhouse, and staff time anticipated for completion of this task is at most, two hours, resulting in a one-time cost to the agency of \$122 (\$61/hr³ x 2 hrs = \$122).

In the field, enforcement officers track their time spent patrolling for unlawful activity involving nongame species, including listed species. Based on officer activity logs from fiscal year (FY) 22 and FY23, less than one percent of each officer's time is spent on nongame specific activities.⁴ These activities include routine patrols for violations, responding to human-wildlife interactions and complaints, assisting biologists with complaints, following leads from citizens, and investigating actual crimes. Over the past two fiscal years, this activity accounted for an average of 4,793 hours per year. There are over 1,000 nongame species in NC and 256 nongame species that are state listed as of FY23. To estimate additional costs to the agency from the three newly listed species, it is assumed that about one-fourth of the 4,793 hours, 1,198.25 hours (4,793 hrs/4 = 1,198.25 hours), spent patrolling in the last two fiscal years was specific to listed species. While it is not anticipated that the addition of 3 new species to the protected species list will have much impact on officer time because many of the new species reside in habitats that are already patrolled, the potential exists for increased illegal activity involving these species. Currently, patrol time, mileage, materials and supplies, and time spent addressing any illegal activity, are

estimated to cost the agency an average of \$49,118/FY (from FY22 and FY23 data; \$41/hr⁵ x 1,198 hrs/FY). If there is an increase in illegal activity, this cost could increase. However, it is not possible to predict a potential change at this time.

Additionally, each person convicted of unlawful activities associated with a species on the protected species list is guilty of a Class I misdemeanor. A typical court case for a listed species requires approximately 11 hours of officer time. The number of these cases per year is typically less than five. Based on the available data, the agency incurs a cost of \$451 per court case (\$41/hr x 11 hrs/case = \$451/case). However, the agency is not able to predict the number of instances involving illegal take that will go to court because of changes to the protected species list.

Once a species is added to the protected species list, a conservation plan must be developed (G.S. 113-333(b)). These plans detail the restoration and management actions that the agency recommends to secure recovery of the species. Many of these species co-exist in the same habitat and as such, will benefit from the conservation efforts of other species. With this in mind, the species added to the state list may not be additive work per se but will be absorbed into current conservation efforts. For those species not cohabitating with currently listed species, new management plans will be developed. Based on the proposed listings, three species will require new management plans, at an estimated one-time cost to the agency of \$21,960 (\$61/hr x 120 hrs/plan = \$7,320/plan; \$7,320/plan x 3 plans = \$21,960).

Recovery efforts for a species in decline may be implemented by the agency regardless of listing status. However, these management techniques will be included in a management plan (required if listed) and could range from monitoring to population augmentation. If a species requires monitoring and data collection, insignificant costs for staff time and supplies may be incurred at an estimated cost of \$200 to \$1,000 per species. Monitoring costs would be low because, depending on the species, sampling efforts are not typically exclusive, and minimal time, effort, and supplies would be needed for collection of additional data. On the other hand, if a more intensive management effort were required, like for the head-start restoration effort currently being implemented for the gopher frog, estimated costs could be close to \$850,000 over a 10year period. However, we must note that these conservation actions would likely occur even if the species were not on the protected species lists. These species are species of greatest conservation need (SGCN) within the NCWRC Wildlife Action Plan; therefore, habitat enhancement and restoration, monitoring, augmentation actions, and research would be conducted to benefit these SGCN and others that occur in the same habitats Although the Wildlife Action Plan summarizes recovery techniques for priority species, the conservation plans will provide more specific details by species.⁷

Any individual who wishes to collect a nongame species for research purposes is required to obtain a collection license. Collection of a listed species, also requires an endangered species permit. Staff review endangered species permit applications before they are issued. This review requires approximately two hours to complete, at a cost to the agency of \$122 per permit (\$61/hr x 2 hrs/permit = \$122/permit). Listing or uplisting a species typically increases the research

interest in those species, but the agency is not able to predict how many new permits will be requested.

Agency staff currently review development projects from other state and local agencies to determine the effects of those projects on state-listed species. Though three new species will be listed in Rule, no additional costs to the WRC or any other agencies are anticipated, as neither process, review protocol, nor staffing, will be changed. However, because new species are being added, agency staff will be asked for scientific expertise on proposed projects during the permit review process to assist in understanding any anticipated impacts the project could have on these newly listed species. There is no way for the agency to predict which projects will be affected, but this review requires approximately four hours of staff time per project and would cost an estimated \$244 per project (\$61/hr x 4 hrs/project = \$244/project).

The WRC jointly administers the Wildlife Conservation Lands Program (WCLP) with local County Tax Assessors. This program is a property tax deferral program for private landowners who manage their property as wildlife reserve land or to conserve identified priority wildlife habitats and listed species. Established in 2008, the program has provided the opportunity for 400 landowners in 68 counties across the state to conserve and manage 25,000 acres of land for the benefit of North Carolina's wildlife species. Landowners who participate may voluntarily enter into a Wildlife Habitat Conservation Agreement with the WRC, provided that they have a minimum of 20 contiguous acres of qualifying habitat and have owned the property for a minimum of four years. The WRC provides free technical guidance and develops the required management agreement free of charge for interested landowners to submit to their county offices. Additionally, the WRC is available to assist the County with on-site audits for those currently enrolled and answer questions. While the agency cannot accurately estimate the number of new landowners who will be eligible and want to participate in the program because of the three newly listed species, the estimated cost to the agency is \$600 per project (\$50/hr 11 x 12 hrs/project = \$600/project).

Private Impact

The proposed amendments to the 10I Rules are expected to have minimal economic impacts to individuals.

Any individual who wishes to collect or study a species on the protected animal list is required to apply for and obtain a collection license and an endangered species permit. There is a \$10 fee for each. The project scope must be submitted by the applicant and approved by agency staff and requires that the applicant supply the following information: project description, dates for the project, list of expertise, and names of any individuals who will be assisting in collection. Depending on the species, restrictions are often placed on the project to minimize stress to a listed species. Additionally, individuals operating under endangered species permits are required to submit their project data annually if they wish to renew any of their collection permit(s). These data are valuable to the agency and assist in minimizing additional stresses on the species.

Of the species being added to the protected species list, all three may be of scientific research interest, thus requiring an endangered species permit and a collection license for study. However,

it is important to note that the agency has not received any wildlife collectors permit request for these particular species to date. There is no way for the agency to estimate the potential cost without knowing what research will be conducted on these newly listed species.

The proposed listing changes will uplist one species to endangered from a lower listing level, which will impact the access to their habitat and potential for data collection. Once a species has been identified as having significant population declines or other threats, the agency works hard to limit the number of disturbances in and around their habitat, which often results in limiting the number of collection permits issued and thus, the opportunities for studies to be performed on these species.

Though three new species will be added to the protected species list, these additions cannot affect the use or development of any private property per G.S. 113-333(c). However, developers will be required to assess projects for any potential impacts to listed species as part of the permit application process for development. All currently available species data are available from the Natural Heritage website for a fee of \$100 per project or \$600 for unlimited use. ¹² Data are currently available for all three of these newly listed species. The developer is responsible for the cost of obtaining data.

In cases where there are intended (illegal take) and/or unintended (environmental) impacts to wildlife, individuals may be cited for the disturbance and charged a replacement cost for the species lost. The replacement cost for an endangered, threatened, or special concern mammal, bird or reptile species is \$4,960, \$4,313, and \$3,000 respectively. The replacement cost for an endangered, threatened, or special concern mussel is \$50.54/each, crayfish is \$50/each, and finfish is \$157.54 each. The penalty issued by the court could also include the cost of investigations and court fees. The agency has no way to estimate these costs because they vary by case and are uncommon.

III. Fiscal Impacts - Benefits

State Impact

With a mission of wildlife conservation, WRC biologists often work to predict decline of a species, as it is much easier to put restoration and recovery management in place proactively than it is to do so when the species is close to extinction. Additionally, wildlife species have diverse life histories which can heavily influence recovery efforts. As such, efforts made in year one may not be apparent until several years later. Due to these factors, early recognition of a species in decline and tiered state listing can provide for proactive, biologically sound management that ensures the conservation and wise use of nongame resources, minimizes risk of federal listing, which can put restrictions on private land, and fosters partnerships with local, state, and federal entities to manage wildlife resources.

The protected animal list is the list for nongame species that need the highest level of conservation attention and is used to guide research priorities and prioritize grant awards. In most cases, individuals must obtain a collection license and endangered species permit for listed species. While the purchase of these items does minimally benefit the state (190 permits/year x

\$20/license and permit = \$3,800/year), the greater benefit is that individuals with an endangered species permit for scientific collection are required to submit their data to the agency before they can apply for any additional permits. This requirement that all NC projects benefit from data collected for species that need the highest level of conservation can guide conservation and decision-making. As such, all logged data are guaranteed to be accessible by the public for planning purposes.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) routinely receives petitions from the public to initiate a 90-day finding to consider a species for federal listing. If there is a positive finding, then a 12-month process is initiated by USFWS, which can solicit state agency input. USFWS relies on state agencies to provide state-specific information on these species. Oftentimes, these species have already been considered or are on the protected species list. Because North Carolina's state listing process involves the collection of data, surveys, and monitoring, the information is readily available to USFWS for their federal species status review, saving the state time and money when requested by the USFWS.

There can be significant economic benefits to avoiding federal listing of a species. The conservation value of North Carolina's state listing status may preclude the need for the species to become federally listed, which saves the state, local and private sectors both time and money. Based on FY22 endangered species state expenditure data for conservation projects specific to federally listed species, this could be a savings of anywhere from \$800 per year (piping plover) to \$18,500 per year (yellow lance mussel) in state funds. ¹⁴ Additionally, avoided federal listing may preclude the delay or cancellation of major construction projects. Any project with the potential to jeopardize the existence of a federally listed species must undergo a Section 7 consultation with the USFWS that could take anywhere from one to 10 years and cost a significant amount of money. ¹⁵ For example, the research study required for a NCDOT highway maintenance project with potential impacts to the northern long-eared bat in the eastern USFWS region (60 NC counties) cost the state a total of \$4 million over five years. Data were collected to help understand the species and its use of habitat to guide future conservation decisions. Currently, NCDOT is expending \$70,000 - \$100,000 per year for monitoring northern long-eared bats' response to construction activities. ¹⁶

Finally, research shows that wildlife watching benefits the economy. According to a 2023 NCWRC study, over 2.9 million NC residents spent over 63 million days watching wildlife in the State in 2022. This activity resulted in an estimated combined \$4.92 billion in trip expenditures and equipment-related expenditures, resulting in a total economic impact of \$7.52 billion. Thus, the conservation and preservation of species can be assumed to yield substantial annual benefits to the state and local economies.

Private Impact

North Carolina residents value the opportunity to view and interact with nongame state-listed species. Individuals also value protecting these species for present and future generations, even if

they will never interact with them. ¹⁸ Together, the value of wildlife viewing and related recreation and the value of maintaining biodiversity are the "non-consumptive" benefits of the species protection.

The non-consumptive values of wildlife species can be estimated by measuring residents' willingness to pay for wildlife protection. Although economists and biologists have conducted many studies over the past 30 years to estimate the value of protecting threatened and endangered species, it is difficult to estimate the impact of the agency's proposed listings because benefits are species-specific and location specific. The agency is unaware of any value studies involving the species that are the subject of this rulemaking. Given the species-specific nature of the value individuals place on wildlife protection, the agency is not able to quantify the total social benefit of the proposed listing. However, the benefits are discussed below:

Science and Land Conservation

- A variety of funding opportunities exist for conserving state listed species. These include
 but are not limited to, the Land and Water Conservation Trust Fund and Natural
 Resources Conservation Service grants. If an animal is added to the protected species list,
 projects that incorporate and/or provide benefit to those species receive preferential
 consideration for funding. Projects can be submitted by state and local governments,
 private organizations, and nonprofits, but overall, the implementation of these projects
 are a conservation benefit to North Carolina residents.
- Due to priorities set by funding sources, many projects are proposed to benefit listed species, state or federal, to qualify the project for funding. Because federally listed species often cohabitate with state listed species, the entire ecosystem benefits from these types of projects and the conservation actions that listing may provoke.
- Federally listed species are protected from "taking", which includes habitat alteration resulting in harm to the species. Approximately two-thirds of all federally listed species have at least some of their habitat on private land, and some species have most of their habitat on private land. ¹⁹ Restrictions and special management considerations that may be costly to landowners are required if it is believed that a proposed development project could impact a listed species. Avoided federal listing may preclude the necessity of costly management.

Ecotourism

• Research shows that society enjoys biodiversity and there are many physical and mental benefits associated with spending time outdoors. ²⁰ Although the WRC does not actively collect data specific to ecotourism, the agency does partner and participate in surveys on willingness to pay. ²¹ These surveys request participants to answer questions regarding their willingness to travel to see wildlife. Also, the NCWRC 2023 report indicated that North Carolina had 2,928,309 resident wildlife viewers ages 18 years and older in 2022.

- To the average recreationist, a more diverse and abundant wildlife population may increase recreation in an area. Not only may it increase experiences but also the quality of those experiences. There is no simple mechanism to estimate this benefit.
- Typically, when a species has been state listed it indicates rarity and difficulty for wildlife viewers to spot it. To wildlife enthusiasts, like birders, this situation may excite challenge and increase interest in any opportunity to seek the species. The result may in turn be enhanced ecotourism to an area that has known habitat for the species.

Tax Benefit

• The proposed addition of 3 species to the protected species list may create opportunities for landowners to participate in the Wildlife Conservation Lands Program for property tax deferral. This additional opportunity would only be available to individuals who own property where these protected species currently live. These landowners would receive a property tax deferral from their county of residence if they enter into an agreement with the WRC to implement land management efforts to protect and enhance habitat for these protected species on their property.

This program is driven by property owners' financial situations, which vary from county to county and from landowner to landowner. Typically, participation in the Program is requested when a property's tax value is reassessed. The Program largely serves as a back-up plan for property owners looking for a tax break on property taxes. Additionally, only 1,700 (approximately 6.8%) of the 25,000 acres registered in the program are species-specific. Participation is usually based on the management of a priority habitat or qualification as Wildlife Reserve Land.

Ecological Benefit

• Although unquantifiable, the overall value added by maintaining a functional food chain cannot be overstated. Many of these species also provide natural resource benefits such as improved water quality or invasive species curtailment. When the cycle of life gets interrupted, there are ecological concerns which result in management expenses. All living things need food to survive. If their food source is limited or no longer present, they may become unhealthy or may not survive. Unhealthy wildlife can be more susceptible to disease, illness, erratic behavior, and unsafe human and wildlife interactions. All these results weigh on agency resources and time. By listing species of concern, the agency is proactively managing wildlife needs and potentially mitigating more serious negative impacts.

IV. Uncertainties

State Impact

If staff are asked to review a project with the potential to impact a listed species that has limited historical and habitat range data, staff may recommend a species survey before commenting on that project. The cost of data collection is different for each species, and without knowing potential projects that will be proposed in the coming years, the agency has no way to estimate the costs to other agencies or individuals for data collection. However, the agency can mitigate

those costs by sharing all data collected both in-house and through state endangered species permits via the Natural Heritage natural resource database (www.ncnhp.org/data).

Local Impact

The proposed changes to the protected species list have the potential to increase the number of landowners who are eligible to participate in the Wildlife Conservation Lands Program. Because this is a county property tax deferral program, the landowners submit applications to the County for enrollment. The County determines the applicant's eligibility and acceptance into the program and participation is renewed annually. The proposed changes to the protected species list have the potential to increase the number of landowners who are eligible to participate in the program, thus increasing a participating county's deferred taxes if they decide to accept a new landowner's management efforts. Counties may also incur a slight increase to the cost of program auditing to ensure the landowner is in compliance with their management plan. Unfortunately, there is no way for the agency to quantify costs, as property taxes vary by county.

The agency also assumes that there could be an increase in the number of court cases dealing with illegal take of three species being added to the protected species list. This would minimally impact the county court systems.

Private Impact

Lack of species-specific studies on North Carolina residents' willingness to pay for protection of listed species prevents WRC from estimating the total benefits of the proposed rules. However, a 2008 meta-analysis of studies valuing endangered, threatened, and rare species found that individuals value fish, marine mammals, and birds more highly than mammals and reptiles, as a group, and wildlife with consumption benefits are more highly valued than those with nonconsumptive benefits alone.²² The total benefits are dependent upon the consumptive uses (i.e., hunting or fishing) or non-consumptive uses (i.e., viewing) of the wildlife, the relative "charisma" of each species, the level of species endangerment, and participation in the Wildlife Conservation Lands program.

It is also important to note that the values of the benefits created by listing three new species and uplisting two species may be offset to some degree by the one delisted and two downlisted species. In their meta-analysis, Richardson and Loomis (2008) found that individuals are generally more willing to pay to prevent a species' extinction than they are to increase the population above the minimum viable level.²³ This finding suggests protecting the most-threatened species could provide greater benefits than equivalent protections for less-threatened species, all else being equal. Downlisting or delisting species could indicate to North Carolina residents that the species is less threatened, therefore reducing the value of protection measures and their associated benefits. However, downlisting or delisting a species may also reduce development restrictions and state staff time costs.

The recreational and consumptive value of a listed species reflects only the economic, not the ecological, benefits of the species. The value that North Carolina residents place on species protection is limited by our incomplete understanding of the species' ecological role.²⁴

V. Economic Impact Summary

Each species is different, as are the reasons attributing to their decline. However, WRC expects the public awareness, research, and conservation efforts associated with placing a species on the protected species list to bring about awareness and management efforts that will spur the public and private cooperation necessary to reverse the decline.

Private individuals will benefit from the proposed listings and associated conservation efforts because of the non-consumptive value of wildlife recreation opportunities and preserving biodiversity. Conservation efforts at a state level also reduce the probability of a species being federally listed, which could place restrictions on private land use and development. Private landowners may be eligible for the Wildlife Conservation Lands program due to the newly listed species, which would make them eligible for county tax deferment. And researchers may be eligible for additional funding opportunities for these species.

Wildlife recreation benefits our state's economy. In addition, listing or uplisting a species draws additional research funding, which benefits the state in both fees collected for collection licenses necessary to study the species and scientific data from those individuals with collection licenses and endangered species permits. Data collected by the state on listed species also saves time and money associated with the required data collection for federally listed species and the potential avoidance of federal listing of state listed species. These benefits are also realized by local governments.

Although these benefits are not quantifiable with available data, the agency expects the benefits of the proposed species listings to outweigh the costs.

In estimating the economic impact of the proposed amendments to the protected species list, the agency was able to estimate and quantify several identified costs, which are expected to include:

State

- Officer training materials: \$122 per year
- Officer patrol time, mileage, and materials and supplies for newly listed species: \$49,118 per year
- Officer court time for newly listed species cases: \$2,255 per year (\$451 per court case assuming max five cases per year)
- Development of three Species Conservation Plans: \$21,960 total one-time cost

- Development project reviews: \$1,220 per year (\$244 per project assuming five project reviews per year)
- WCLP technical guidance: \$600 per project (\$50/hr x 12 hrs/project = \$600/project)
- Endangered species permit reviews: \$23,180 per year (\$122 per permit averaging 190 permit reviews per year)
- Monitoring for three newly listed species: \$1,800 per fiscal year (\$200 \$1,000 per species assuming an average of \$600 per species)

The cumulative State impact is estimated to be approximately \$77,695 per year, depending on number of court cases, development project reviews, and endangered species permit reviews during a fiscal year. Additionally, a one-time cost of \$21,960 will be incurred to complete 3 species conservation plans.

Local

- Tax deferment for landowners in WCLP is unquantifiable.
- Court fees for illegal take of newly listed species is unquantifiable.

Private

- Collection license fee for newly listed species is unquantifiable.
- Data collection before development projects is unquantifiable.
- Replacement costs for illegal take of newly listed species: endangered species is \$4,960, a threatened species is \$4,313, and a special concern species is \$3,000.
- Court fees for illegal take of newly listed species is unquantifiable.

Although most of the costs are uncertain or unquantifiable with available data, the agency was able to quantify several State and private costs. However, the agency expects the benefits of the proposed species listings to outweigh the costs.

15A NCAC 10I .0102 PROTECTION OF ENDANGERED/THREATENED/SPECIAL ENDANGERED, THREATENED, AND SPECIAL CONCERN SPECIES

- (a) No Open Season. There is no open season for taking any of the species listed as endangered in Rule .0103, or threatened in Rule .0104 of this Section, except for the American alligator (Alligator mississipiensis) as set forth in the rules of this Chapter. Unless otherwise provided in North Carolina General Statutes or the rules of this Chapter, Except as provided in Paragraphs (b) and (d) of this rule, there is no open season for taking any of the species listed as special concern in Rule in Rules .0103, .0104, or .0105 of this Section. Except as provided in Paragraphs (b), (c) and (e) of this Rule, it is unlawful to take or possess any animal listed in Rules .0103, .0104, or .0105 of this Section at any time.
- (b) Permits. The Executive Director or his or her designee may issue permits to take or possess an take, possess, sell, propagate, transport, import, export, transfer, barter, trade, or stock endangered, threatened, or special concern species:
 - (1) to an individual or institution with experience and training in handling, and caring for the wildlife and in-conducting a scientific study, investigation for the purpose of scientific investigation relevant to perpetuation or restoration of said species or as a part of a scientifically valid study or restoration effort; perpetuation, restoration, or management of a species;
 - to a public or private educator or exhibitor who demonstrates that he or she has lawfully obtained the specimen or specimens in his or her possession, possesses the requisite equipment and expertise to care for such specimen or the specimens, and abides by the applicable caging requirements for the species set forth in 15A NCAC 10H .0302; .1404;
 - (3) to a person who lawfully possessed any such the species for more than 90 days immediately prior to the date that such the species was listed and who abides by the applicable caging requirements for the species set forth in 15A NCAC 10H .1404; .0302, provided however, that no permit shall be issued more than 90 days after the effective date of the initial listing for that species; or
 - (4) to a person with demonstrable depredation from a Special Concern Species, or the American alligator (Alligator mississipiensis). mississippiensis);
 - (5) to a licensed falconer;
 - (6) <u>to a retail or wholesale establishment whose primary function is providing scientific</u> supplies, provided that:
 - (A) the specimens were lawfully obtained from captive populations or wild populations outside of North Carolina;
 - (B) the specimens are possessed in indoor facilities; and
 - (C) safeguards are provided during transportation to prevent accidental escape of the specimens.
 - (7) to state and federal government agencies, corporate research entities, and research institutions within North Carolina provided that:
 - (A) the specimens are possessed in indoor facilities;
 - (B) safeguards are provided during transportation to prevent accidental escape of the specimens;
 - (C) the agency's or institution's Animal Care and Use Committee has approved the research protocol for the species;

- (D) no specimens shall be stocked or released in the public or private waters or lands of North Carolina; and
- (E) specimens shall not be transferred to any private individual.
- (c) An individual may apply for an endangered species permit online at www.gooutdoorsnorthcarolina.com by providing the following information:
 - (1) name, address, phone number, and email;
 - (2) species name and quantity;
 - (3) proposed activities;
 - (4) map with specific location of activities identified, if applicable;
 - (5) the source of the specimens and documentation of lawful acquisition;
 - (6) caging or confinement plans for specimens, if applicable;
 - (7) applicant's qualifications and explanation of experience;
 - (8) research proposal, if applicable;
 - (9) acknowledgement that additional federal permits may be required;
 - (10) plans for care of specimens and copy of Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee permit, if applicable; and
 - (11) plans for final disposition of specimens.
- (e)(d) Taking Without a Permit: The species listed in Rules .0103, .0104, and .0105 of this Section may be taken or possessed without a permit when:
 - (1) An an individual may take an endangered, threatened, or special concern takes the species in defense of his or her own life or the lives of others.
 - (2) an individual has obtained a permit to take an American alligator in accordance with 15A NCAC 10B .0224.
 - an individual possesses meat or other parts of American alligators that have been lawfully taken, possessed, or bought in a state where there is an open season for harvesting alligators and the products are marketed in packages or containers that are labeled to indicate the state in which the animals were taken and the identity, address, and lawful authority of the processor or distributor.
 - (4) an individual is taking or harassing a red wolf (Canis rufus) pursuant to the conditions in 50 CFR 17.84(c), hereby incorporated by reference, including subsequent amendments and editions, available free of charge at www.ecfr.gov.
 - (2)(5) A state or federal conservation officer or employee an individual who is designated by his agency to do so may, meets the requirements of G.S. 113-261, who, when acting in the course of his or her official duties, take, possess, and transport takes, possesses, or transports endangered, threatened, or special concern species if the action is necessary to:
 - (A) aid a sick, injured, diseased, or orphaned specimen;
 - (B) dispose of a dead specimen;
 - (C) salvage a dead specimen that may be useful for scientific study; or
 - (D) remove specimens that constitute a demonstrable but nonimmediate threat to human <u>safety</u> <u>safety</u>, <u>provided the taking is done in a humane and noninjurious manner. The taking may involve injuring or killing endangered, threatened, or <u>special concern species only if it is not possible to eliminate the threat by live-capturing</u> and <u>releasing release</u> the specimen unharmed, in a habitat that is suitable for <u>the survival of that species</u>. <u>survival</u>.</u>

(d)(e) Reporting. Any taking or possession of an Take, possession, sale, propagation, transportation, importation, exportation, transfer, barter, trade, or stocking of endangered, threatened, or special concern species under Paragraphs (b) and (e)(d) of this Rule is subject to applicable federal reporting requirements, requirements of federal law and regulations, and the reporting requirements of the permit issued by the Executive Director or permit, and applicable requirements of 15A NCAC 10B .0106(e).

(e) Exceptions.

- (1) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Rule, processed meat and other parts of American alligators that have been lawfully taken in a state in which there is an open season for harvesting alligators may be possessed, bought, and sold when such products are marketed in packages or containers that are labeled to indicate the state in which they were taken and the identity, address, and lawful authority of the processor or distributor.
- Raptors listed as special concern species in Rule .0105 of this Section may be taken from the wild for falconry purposes and for falconry propagation, provided that a valid North Carolina endangered species permit has been obtained as required in Paragraph (b) of this Rule.
- (3) Captive bred raptors listed as special concern species may be bought, sold, bartered, or traded as provided in 50 CFR 21.85 when marked as required under those regulations. 50 CFR 21.85 is incorporated by reference, including subsequent amendments and editions. This document may be accessed at www.eefr.gov at no cost.
- (5) Importation, possession, sales, transportation, and exportation of species listed as special concern species in Rule .0105 of this Section shall be allowed under permit by retail and wholesale establishments whose primary function is providing scientific supplies for research, provided that:
 - (A) the specimens were lawfully obtained from captive or wild populations outside of North Carolina;
 - (B) they are possessed in indoor facilities;
 - (C) all transportation of specimens provides safeguards adequate to prevent accidental escape; and
 - (D) importation, possession, and sale or transfer is permitted only as listed in Parts (e)(4)(A) and (B) of this Rule.
- (f) A written application to the Commission shall be required for a permit to authorize importation, and possession for the purpose of retail or wholesale sale. The application shall identify the source of the specimens and provide documentation of lawful acquisition. Applications for permits shall include plans for holding, transportation, advertisement, and sale in such detail as to allow a determination of the safeguards provided against accidental escape and sales to unauthorized individuals.
- (g) Purchase, importation, and possession of special concern species within North Carolina is allowed under permit to state and federal governmental agencies, corporate research entities, and research institutions, provided that:
 - (1) sales are permitted to out of state consumers;
 - (2) the specimens will be possessed in indoor facilities and safeguards adequate to prevent accidental escape are provided during all transportation of the specimens;
 - (3) the agency's or institution's Animal Use and Care Committee has approved the research protocol for this species; and

(4) no specimens may be stocked or released in the public or private waters or lands of North Carolina and specimens may not be transferred to any private individual.
