Sunday 12 March 2023 The Third Sunday of Lent

Any storyteller would wish to have been the author of this story, the first part of today's Gospel reading; it is one of the best-loved passages in the New Testament. The way in which the woman is led from incomprehension to dawning awareness at a deeper level is splendid. The setting and the imagery (well and water) hold the story together and lead the reader, along with the Samaritan woman, to that deeper level.

The image in the second part is bread. These two images then bread and water - hold the entire scene together. Bread and water are simple realities in themselves, but how essential! Hunger and thirst are able to command our full attention. Every reader of the story soon realises that Jesus is speaking of a deeper hunger and thirst. The emptiness of the heart is an even more painful condition than physical hunger.

We know all about this today, despite (or because of) the many things we fill our lives with. We can imagine - but sometimes scarcely - what a deeply satisfied heart would feel like. The great 19th-century preacher C.H. Spurgeon let loose a torrent of eloquence on this subject. The disciple of Christ, he wrote, "finds in religion such a spring of joy, such a fountain of consolation, that he is content and happy.

Put him in a dungeon and he will find good company; place him in a barren wilderness, he will eat the bread of heaven; drive him away from friendship, he will meet the 'friend that sticketh closer than a brother....' Sap the foundation of his earthly hopes, but his heart will still be fixed, trusting in the Lord. The heart is as insatiable as the grave till Jesus enters it, and then it is a cup full to overflowing. There is such a fullness in Christ that He alone is the believer's all."

It is very heroic language, certainly, pointing to a far horizon, making us aware how close and narrow the horizons we settle down with. Still, it is good to be reminded that hopes, like horizons, keep on expanding forever - provided that we are movina.



Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan

woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give me a drink, you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again; but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. 'Go and call your husband' said Jesus to her 'and come back here.' The woman answered, 'I have no husband.' He said to her, 'You are right to say, "I have no husband"; for although you have had five, the one you have now is not your husband. You spoke the truth there.' 'I see you are a prophet, sir' said the woman. 'Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know; for salvation comes from the Jews. But the hour will come – in fact it is here already – when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth: that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants. God is spirit, and those who worship must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

At this point his disciples returned, and were surprised to find him speaking to a woman, though none of them asked, 'What do you want from her?' or, 'Why are you talking to her?' The woman put down her water jar and hurried back to the town to tell the people, 'Come and see a man who has told me everything I ever did; I wonder if he is the Christ?' This brought people out of the town and they started walking towards him.

Meanwhile, the disciples were urging him, 'Rabbi, do have something to eat;' but he said, 'I have food to eat that you do not know about.' So the disciples asked one another, 'Has someone been bringing him food?' But Jesus said:

'My food is to do the will of the one who sent me, and to complete his work.
Have you not got a saying:
Four months and then the harvest?
Well, I tell you: Look around you, look at the fields; already they are white, ready for harvest!
Already the reaper is being paid his wages, already he is bringing in the grain for eternal life, and thus sower and reaper rejoice together.
For here the proverb holds good: one sows, another reaps; I sent you to reap a harvest you had not worked for.

Others worked for it; and you have come into the rewards of their trouble.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony when she said, 'He told me all I have ever done,' so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world'

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MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

The Word of God is written on two levels: the spiritual and the human, the spiritual sense, and the literal sense. The basic question to ask: when was it written? Who wrote it? For whom did he write it? Why did he write it? What was the cultural and historical situation? What is the deeper, spiritual meaning of the Gospel this weekend? The Jews and the Samaritans were archenemies. The Jews treated them as an inferior race. Women did not count in the culture. A woman could not speak to a man in public. Much like today in some countries. John wrote the Gospel being read this weekend about 60 years after Jesus left this earth. He, more than the other three, is very, very deep. He writes in symbolic language. Instead of miracles, he talks about symbols. A symbol contains what it symbolises. So, we must dig deep to understand. Jesus was a radical teacher. He ruthlessly demolished Jewish customs, laws, and traditions that were at odds with his new teaching. Tired and thirsty he sits by a well. A Samaritan woman shows up alone with her bucket. This tells us something about her because women in that culture came in groups to the well. She must have been shunned by her neighbours perhaps for her lifestyle. Jesus initiates the conversation and risks the anger of the Jews. Loved, accepted, respected, and appreciated for who she is, for the first time, she has a conversion experience. She did nothing to earn or merit Jesus' unconditional love. Nor can we. No condemnation for her lifestyle and no penance! Forgiveness is pure gift. Changed from sinner to missionary, she runs, without the bucket, to share her joy and new life. No teaching. No preaching. She simply relates her encounter with Jesus. The hostile Samaritans believed her and hastened to Jesus.

'Being a Christian' writes Pope Benedict, 'is not the result of an ethical choice, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and decisive direction'.

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
