

Incorporated: 1848

Origin: Dummer was named for Governor William Dummer of Massachusetts, whose achievements included a peace treaty with the Native people that lasted nearly twenty years. Also named for Governor Dummer were Fort Dummer, near Brattleboro, Vermont; Governor Dummer Academy (now the Governor's Academy) in Byfield, Massachusetts; and the town of Dummerston, Vermont. Although first granted in 1773, Dummer was not incorporated until 1848. Within ten years, there were two sawmills, with access to the Upper Ammonoosuc River providing water power for mills and transportation of timber to the paper mills in Berlin.

Villages and Place Names: Paris

Population, Year of the First Census Taken: 7 residents in 1810

Population Trends: Population change for Dummer totaled 73 over 50 years, from 225 in 1970 to 298 in 2020. The largest decennial percent change was a 73 percent increase from 1970 to 1980; percent change has been negative since then. The town's population declined by two percent from 2010 to 2020. The 2022 Census estimate for Dummer was 310 residents, which ranked 226th among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns, the ninth smallest community.

Population Density and Land Area, 2022 (US Census Bureau): 6.5 persons per square mile of land area. Dummer contains 48.0 square miles of land area and 1.3 square miles of inland water area.
