Seminole hope parallel to '89 continues through bowl season

Florida State takes on Virginia today with ABC televising the showdown that — barring an upset against Wake Forest next week — is for the Atlantic Coast Conference title. That statement would not have been shocking if made before the season based on FSU's seven-year run through the conference, but it did look like a nightmarish visit to NC State.

The Seminoles' rise from the disaster against the Wolfpack, and this young football team's ability to right the ship against a schedule ranked among the 15 toughest by the much-maligned (already!) Bowl Championship Series computer, has truly been a remarkable feat that bears closer scrutiny. In fact, a real parallel can be drawn between this year's team and a squad that would go down as one of the best in Florida State history.

FSU's only other loss to an ACC foe was against Virginia in 1995 and it came too late in the season to leave Seminole fans much of a chance to fret about their chances of winning the conference. Actually, the majority of Florida State's infrequent losses the last 12 years have come late in the year. But this season, a very young football team was faced with as much adversity as any in recent FSU history. Perhaps more than any team since the 1989 Seminoles lost their first two games. It is with that 1989 team that the close parallel can be drawn.

First, let's look at what the teams had to replace coming into the season. Remember back to 1989 — Florida State is coming off a sparkling 11-1 season that featured 10 straight wins, including a 13-7 victory over Auburn in the Sugar Bowl, all after a season-opening loss against Miami. The Seminoles had to replace star running back Sammie Smith, quarterback Chip Ferguson and had just two returning starters on the offensive line. Defensively, the Tribe had to find someone to fill Deion Sanders' legendary shoes, Stan Shiver's role as the big hitter and Steve Gabbard's steady play and leadership.

Now fast forward to this year's preseason publications. The Seminoles are coming off their now customary 11-win season and a big victory over Ohio State in the Sugar Bowl, but they must replace the quarterback who threw for more yards in

one season than any in FSU history in Thad Busby. The Tribe offense must also find a replacement for their most consistent weapon in wide receiver E.G. Green and just two starters return along the offensive front. Defensively, the Seminoles are without all-world defensive end Andre Wadsworth, their best cover man in Samari Rolle and a pair of linebackers in Sam Cowart and Daryl Bush who provided unquestioned leadership.

Mix in one other unfortunate parallel — early losses. In 1989, the Seminoles dropped a shocker in the opener when Brett Favre's Southern Miss team topped FSU 30-26 at the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville. Just a week later the team dropped to 0-2 with a 34-23 loss to Clemson right here in Doak Campbell Stadium. It was a low moment for the '89 team, but provided a challenge that would reveal the character of everyone associated with the program. With Peter Tom Willis at the helm and the Fab Four snagging virtually every pass in sight, the Seminoles tackled a schedule that had them playing away from home in three of their next four games with trips to LSU, Syracuse and Virginia Tech. Then all they had to do to have a respectable year was defeat Auburn, Miami, South Carolina, Memphis State and Florida.

Now look at this season. The Seminoles win a terrific opener, which looks even better every week, against Texas A&M. Then came the shocking loss at NC State. Six interceptions had some Seminole fans mumbling about whether FSU was playing the right quarterback and Wolfpack big plays had them longing for Wadsworth, Greg Spires and the rest of last year's defense.

The Seminoles faced a tough test. Duke was next on the schedule before a rematch with USC, then road games at Maryland and Miami. A home date with Clemson led into a tough stretch with a trip to Georgia Tech before back-to-back home dates with conference front runners North Carolina and Virginia. Wake Forest and Florida still loomed.

Hopefully the similarity with 1989 will continue because that team took one of the worst starts in school history and fashioned one of the most incredible seasons in Florida State annals. FSU hammered LSU (31-21), Syracuse (41-10) and Virginia Tech (41-7), then beat Auburn (22-14) and Miami (24-10). Florida State really began to hit its stride during the stretch run with a 35-10 whipping of the Gamecocks and a 24-17 win at Florida that vaulted the Tribe all the way to fourth in the nation in the Associated Press poll leading into bowl week.

This year's team has a chance to hit its stride at much the same time. The win over Georgia Tech two weeks ago put the Seminoles back into the ACC championship race and was as close to a "must win" as FSU has had since it joined the league. Last week's win over North Carolina set up today's game against Virginia. The Cavaliers are a very good football team and should the 'Noles win, they will have to play great football. It remains to be seen if this team can close out like the '89 team, but if they do, they'll have put themselves back into contention for the national title.

Rolling back time again to '89, remember that this is the team that virtually every expert in college football admitted might have been the very best team in the country by the end of the year. However, the early losses just proved too big of a hill to climb in the polls before the bowls had to select their teams. FSU drew another match-up against Nebraska in the Fiesta Bowl and the subsequent 41-17 win might have been the final piece in the puzzle that established the Tribe as the most dominant program in the '90s.

Here is where the two teams can either diverge or continue similar. The Seminoles have two games left after today to put themselves into position to be considered one of the nation's top teams. Circumstances, particularly a host of undefeated teams in front of them, could prevent the 1998 squad from challenging for the national championship in a bowl just as they did in 1989. But this team still has a chance to make the same argument of playing the best football in the country at the end of the year.

To be able to consider the possibility of a run at the national championship or even the league championship for that matter, after that lonely afternoon in Raleigh is a testimony to the courage and desire of these players and this coaching staff. Bobby Bowden made an interesting observation when talking to ESPN's Ron Franklin and Mike Gottfried the week of the Georgia Tech game. He pointed out his feeling that since the loss to NC State earlier in the year, his Seminoles have been chasing the ACC title rather than trying to defend it.

Maybe it would be fun once in a while to win a race after getting off to a slow start instead of beating everyone out of the blocks and trying to look over your shoulder the whole race.

Q&A WITH TONY BRYANT

Senior defensive end Tony Bryant has big shoes to fill. After transferring into the Florida State program last year from junior college, Bryant has stepped into a starting role this year that has produced three All-Americans — Peter Boulware, Reinard Wilson and Andre Wadsworth — over the last two seasons. Jeff Purinton of the FSU sports information office caught up with Bryant to talk about his decision to attend Florida State.

What has been your greatest moment at Florida State?

The interception I returned for a touchdown against Wake Forest last season. It's not very often that a defensive lineman gets an interception, much less returns one for a touchdown.

Was it difficult coming here as a junior?

It was. I really didn't know anybody and I didn't know the system very well so it was tough in the beginning. I was older than everyone, but I was still like a freshman in terms of meeting people, going to classes and being in a new environment. Now, this is more like my home and it seems like I have been here for a while.

What does it mean to play defensive end at FSU?

You have some very big shoes to fill. There have been a lot of great players at Florida State, especially at defensive end. The expectations are very high because of that. It is probably the toughest position to play here because of all the hype and what people expect. The perception is that something is wrong if you don't make plays on almost every down. I was still adjusting in the beginning of the season, but now I feel like I'm playing my game and I'm a lot more comfortable. I feel like I don't have to prove anything and can let the game come to me.

Did you pick up any tips from Andre Wadsworth and Greg Spires before they went to the NFL?

They were like my coaches last year when I first got here. I still keep in contact with both of them and they still give me advice. Greg taught me more of a finesse style, just beating people around the corner with speed. Wadsworth is more of a power player that runs through people. I

try to use both of their styles when I play. They were the first ones I talked to when I got to Tallahassee and they made it easier for me to adjust.

Who is the toughest guy you have ever faced?

Definitely Tra Thomas. On my first day in pads we were doing pass rush drills and the coaches said "Go get 'em" and I thought to myself, "How am I going to do that?" He put me on the ground and all season I wanted to try and get him back. I won some later but he won a lot more.

What is something Florida State fans might not know about Tony Bryant?

I am a really a nice guy (off the field), have a big heart and love kids.

Who has been the most influential person in your life?

My grandmother. She worked hard and raised me so I could have everything I needed. She is really an amazing woman. When I was down or in a difficult situation, she would talk to me and tell me to keep going. She provided inspiration every day. Hopefully I'll be able to take care of her.

What advice would you give a young athlete that aspires to play collegiate sports one day?

Never give up. I would tell them to stay in school, always work hard and listen to your parents. You should never believe that you can't do something. I am from a small town and people told me that I shouldn't go to FSU because they had so many good players. I believed in myself and it has turned out better than anyone could have expected. The best feeling is to prove non-believers wrong. It is all in your heart.

What are your goals after Florida State?

I'd like to play in the NFL and have a good career. Then when that's over, maybe open and own a few day-care centers.

Do you have any interesting game rituals or things you do during games to intimidate opponents?

I like to talk to the guy across the line of scrimmage and tell them what I'm going to do and then do it. I tell him his quarterback is going to be mad at him after the game. I'll also tell the quarterback that it's his lineman's fault.

Q&A WITH DEMETRO STEPHENS

Demetrio Stephens was a part of Florida State's 1994 recruiting class that was signed just six weeks after the Seminoles won their first national championship. He has survived an injury-plagued career, including reconstructive surgery after a knee injury in the 1996 national championship game in the Sugar Bowl, and is thriving as a starter at middle linebacker in his final season. Chris Walker of the Florida State sports information office sat down with the good-natured Stephens to talk about his time as a Seminole.

What made you decide to come to Florida State?

I wanted to be surrounded by great players and a winning tradition. Florida State certainly had that. I also felt comfortable here around everyone when I came on my visit — the coaches, players and academic people. Coach Bowden is a legend and FSU had just won the national championship. I also considered Georgia, Nebraska, Tennessee and Auburn.

Do you have any interesting stories regarding the recruiting process?

It was a crazy process, but I do have a few funny stories. Terry Bowden was at Auburn when I was being recruited and he would always make good-natured jokes about his dad. Coach (Bobby) Bowden would call Terry a little runt.

What is something that most Florida State fans might not know about you?

I love to fish. I don't get much of a chance to do it during the season, but I like to go at least once a week when I am at home during the summer.

Do you have any good fishing stories?

I brought Dexter Jackson home with me one time and we went out fishing. We went out in the middle of the night and it was pitch black out. We were standing on land and I caught a huge catfish, something like 15 pounds. I asked Dexter to get a net, but he couldn't see the catfish. When he touched it he thought it was a baby alligator, dropped it and ran the other way.

What has been your best moment at Florida State?

Personally, it was the Sugar Bowl win over Ohio State last year. It marked the

one-year anniversary of my knee injury and it was the first time I really felt completely comfortable playing on my knee.

What did you learn about yourself while rehabbing your knee injury?

I knew I was a tough person and a hard worker but the knee injury was scary. It made me really believe that I could overcome things with hard work. Things happen for a reason and this made me a much stronger person mentally. It made me realize that I am tough mentally and it also brought me closer to God.

Who has made the greatest impact on your life?

I can't just point to one person, it has been a few. My granddad, my stepdad and my uncles. My uncles always encouraged me in sports. My granddad and stepdad taught me a lot about life.

What do you want to do when your football career is over?

I want to become a coach, probably in college. I never would have thought that growing up, but when I got here I

became interested in it. It would be a way to give back to young people. Coach Amato has kind of inspired me. I look up to him. He is a brilliant coach and a great motivator. Just by doing his job, he has had a great effect on me and has really helped me.

What are you going to miss most when your Florida State playing days are over?

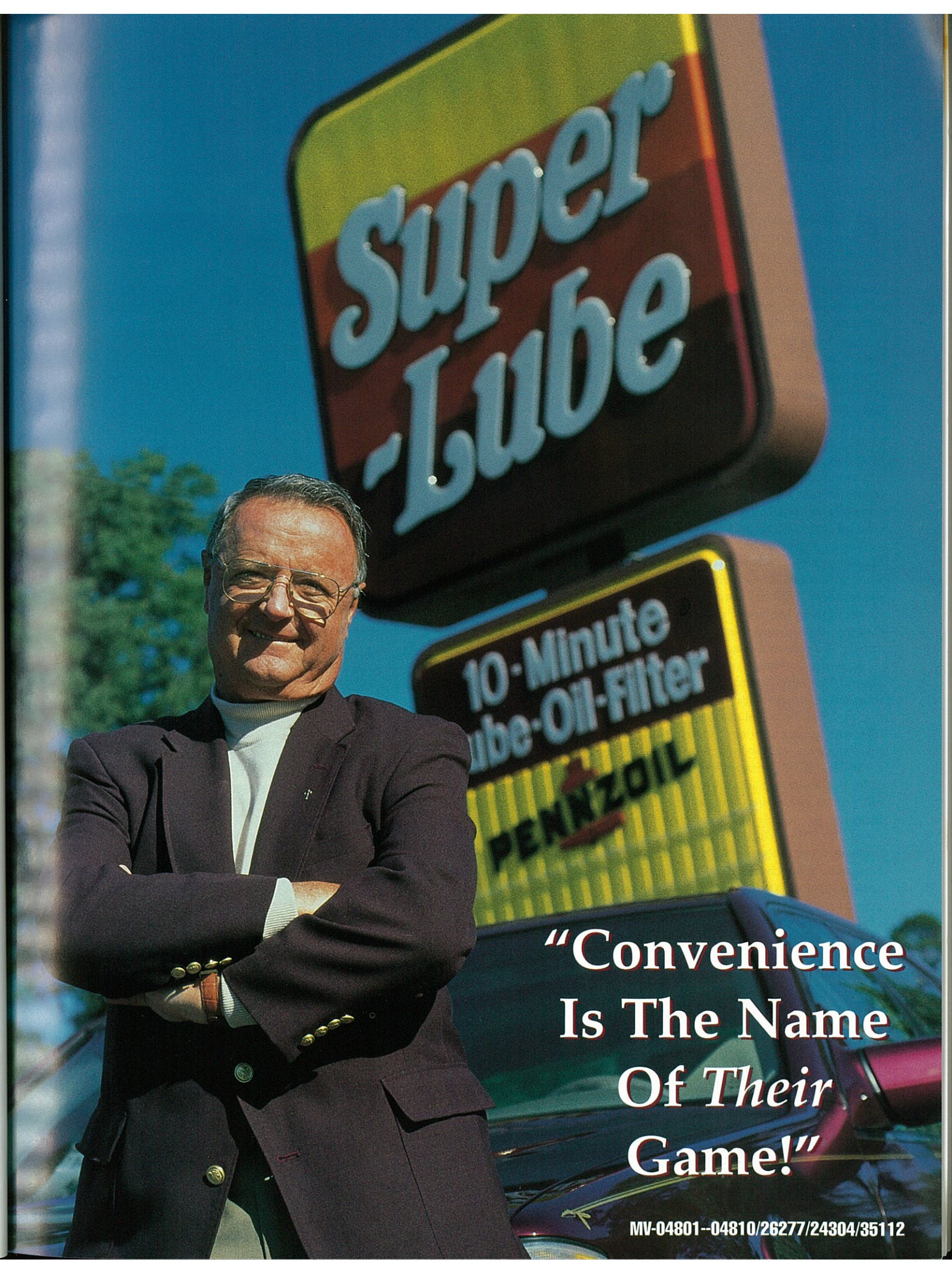
I am going to miss all the winning that we have done on Saturdays. I love to win and hate to lose at anything. I will really miss all of my teammates and the friendships that I have made with people associated with the program, too.

What are you going to miss the least?

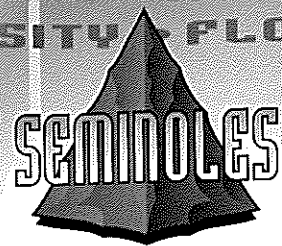
I am not going to miss mat drills one bit (laughing). I hope I don't ever have to get up that early for anything else in my life.

THE SERIES WITH VIRGINIA

Florida State enters today's game with a 5-1 lead in its series with Virginia, which dates back to the 1992 season. The Cavaliers handed FSU its first loss in Atlantic Coast Conference play with a 33-28 setback in 1995. The Seminoles have outscored Virginia by an average of 33.3-18.7 in the series.

JEFFERSON-EPPES TROPHY ON THE LINE

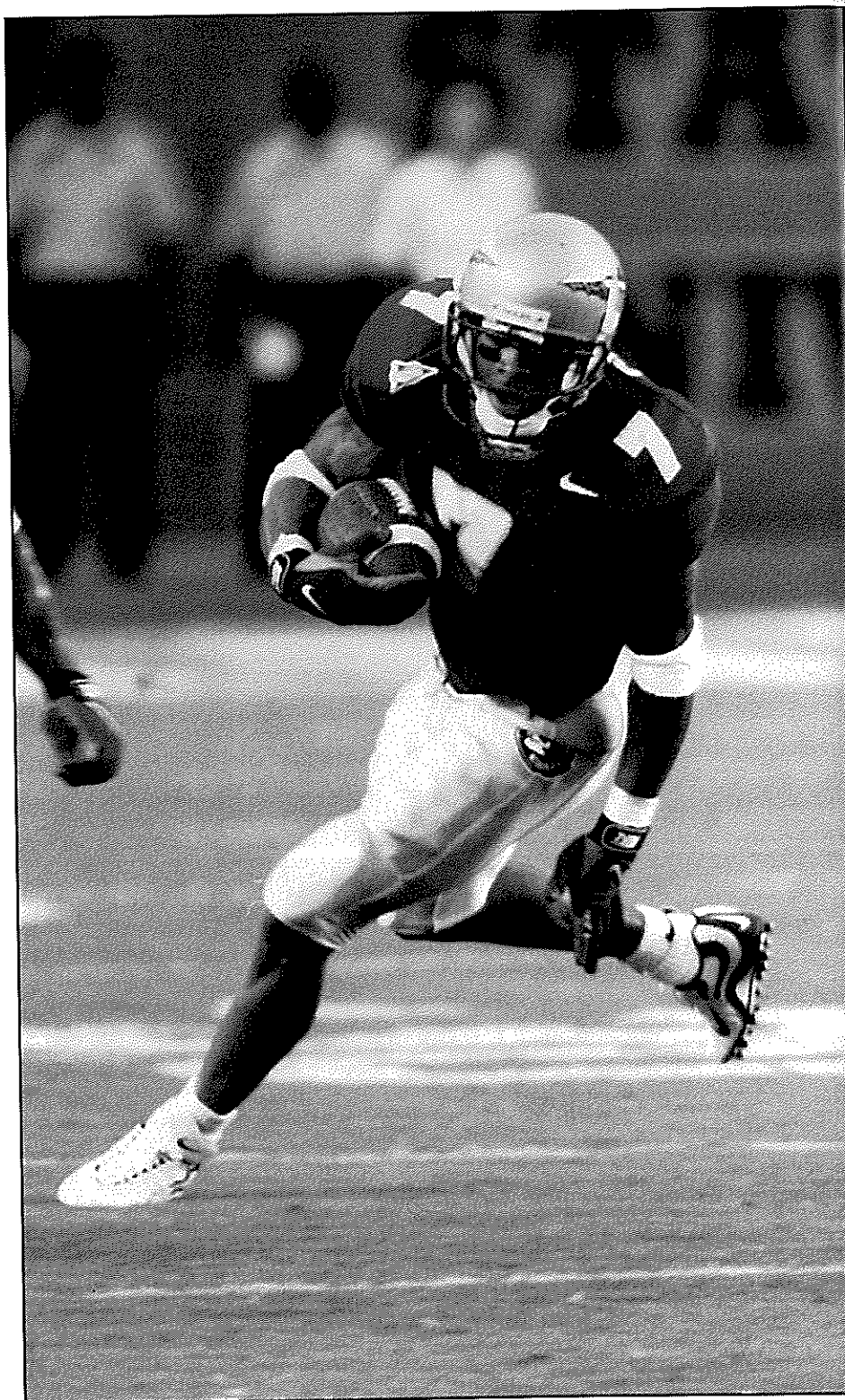
The winner of today's contest will take home the Jefferson-Eppes Trophy for a year. The trophy was inaugurated for the 1995 game between Florida State and Virginia. It is named after Thomas Jefferson, former U.S. President and University of Virginia founder, and his grandson, Francis Eppes VII, three-time mayor of Tallahassee. COLES BREAKS THE CENTURY MARK FOR THE FIRST TIME

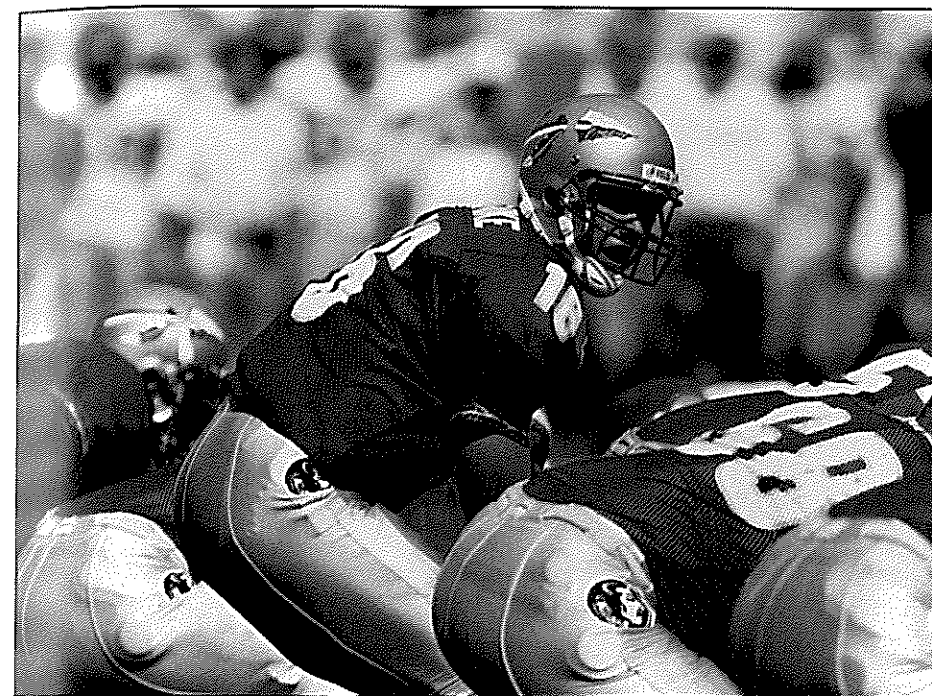
Junior wide receiver Laveranues Coles had the first 100-yard receiving game of his career in last week's 39-13 win over North Carolina. The Jacksonville, Fla., native had 120 yards and a touchdown on a season-high five receptions. Coles has seen time at both wide receiver and tailback — the position he played upon his arrival at Florida State — the last three weeks. He ran for 82 yards, including a 60-yard touchdown, on three carries at Georgia Tech two weeks ago. Coles has become a multi-dimensional threat as he has scored touchdowns three ways this season — rushing, receiving and kickoff return. He is averaging 19.2 yards every time he touches the ball this season.

SOMETHING'S GOT TO GIVE

Today's match-up pits the No. 1 rushing offense in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Virginia, against the No. 1 rushing defense in the league, Florida State. The Cavaliers are gaining 240.3 yards per game on the ground and have scored 23 rushing touchdowns. FSU, meanwhile, is allowing just 91.1 yards per game rushing and has given up just four TDs on the ground. Virginia is averaging 5.5 yards per carry while the Seminoles are allowing just 2.5 yards per attempt. Virginia features

the top rusher in the ACC in Thomas Jones, who has compiled 1,002 yards and is averaging 125.3 yards per game. No back has rushed for 100 yards against Florida State this year.

WEINKE CONTINUES STELLAR PLAY

Sophomore quarterback Chris Weinke had the best game of his young career in last Saturday's win over North Carolina. Weinke completed 15-of-27 passes for 338 yards and a pair of touchdowns. His yardage total was a career high and by not throwing an interception, he has thrown 202 consecutive passes without being picked off.

MORE ON WEINKE

Quarterback Chris Weinke has thrown a touchdown pass in 10 straight games dating back to last season. His nine 200-yard passing games this year has tied a school record held by Gary Huff (1972), Peter Tom Willis (1989) and Charlie Ward (1993). His 18 touchdown throws now ranks 10th on the school's season list and his 2,344 yards ranks 12th. He needs 973 yards in his last three games to break Thad Busby's single-season record of 3,317 passing yards set last year.

THE WINNINGEST PROGRAM OF THE '90s

Nebraska not only lost a game to Texas last Saturday, but also lost the distinction as the winningest college football program in the '90s. Florida State had been the most successful program this decade until last season's Big 12 Championship game, which the Cornhuskers won to give them the edge. The Seminoles are 94-12-1 during the '90s for an .883 winning percentage. Nebraska is 93-13-1 (.874) during the same span.

DOAK CAMPBELL NOW THE TOUGHEST PLACE TO PLAY

Nebraska's loss to Texas also ended its 47-game home winning streak. Florida State now owns the nation's longest unbeaten streak at home with 38 consecutive games without a loss. FSU's last home loss was to Miami, 17-16, in 1991. The streak was kept alive with an NCAA record 28-point fourth quarter comeback by the Seminoles for a 31-31 tie with Florida in 1994.

JANIKOWSKI CLOSING IN ON FIELD GOAL MARK

Sophomore place-kicker Sebastian Janikowski booted four more field goals in last week's 39-13 win over North Carolina. Janikowski is now 22-of-26 on field goals

this year and needs just two more to break Derek Schmidt's 1987 school record for three-pointers in a season. He did miss his first extra point of the year against the Tar Heels, breaking his string of 49 consecutive PATs made.

QB NOT THE ONLY SEMINOLE CAREFUL WITH THE BALL

While Chris Weinke's seven straight games without an interception grabs the headlines, the rest of the offense has been doing its part to keep the turnovers down. Florida State has not turned the ball over in four games this season. The Seminoles were fumble and interception free against Duke, Southern California and its last two contests against Georgia Tech and North Carolina.

GREEN MAY RETURN

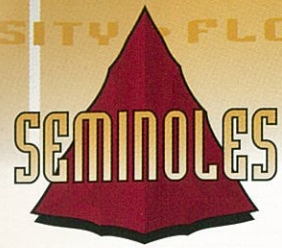
Senior linebacker Lamont Green could return to the Florida State lineup today after sitting out the last four weeks with an injured elbow. He suffered the injury on the first play from scrimmage against Miami on Oct. 10. Green was the Seminoles' leading tackler at the time of his injury with 53 and seven for loss in just five full games.

GETTING IN ON THE "D"

With Lamont Green being out, the Seminoles have spread the load around their defense. Florida State has 21 players on its defense who have totaled at least 20 tackles this season.

MINOR PLAYED MAJOR ROLE IN LAST YEAR'S WIN OVER VIRGINIA

Sophomore tailback Travis Minor has fought through an injury-plagued sophomore campaign. He returned to Florida State's starting lineup last week against North Carolina for the first time since Sept. 26 versus USC. Minor responded with a 76-yard effort and regained the team lead in rushing yards from Jeff Chaney. Minor now has 498 to Chaney's 496. Minor made the first start of his career last season in FSU's 47-21 win at Virginia. The Baton Rouge, La., native came through with a career-best 155 yards on 17 carries and scored three TDs. He took the game's first play from scrimmage 87 yards for a score that started an offensive barrage by the Seminoles. FSU scored touchdowns on three of its first five plays from scrimmage.

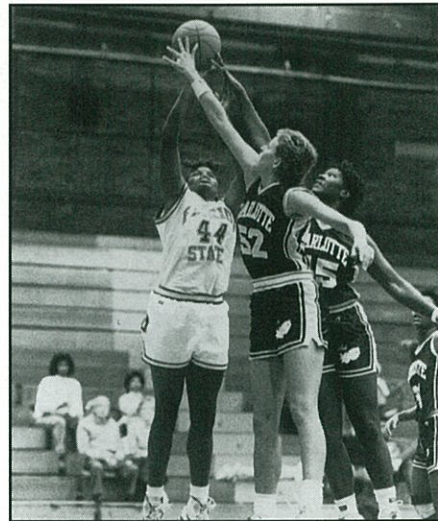

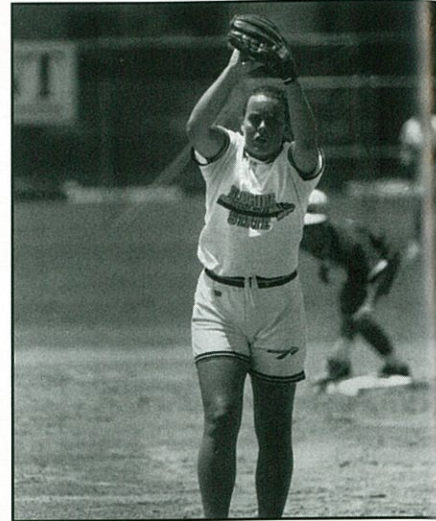

Volleyball's Gabrielle Reece returned to Tallahassee in July to unveil the 30th anniversary logo.



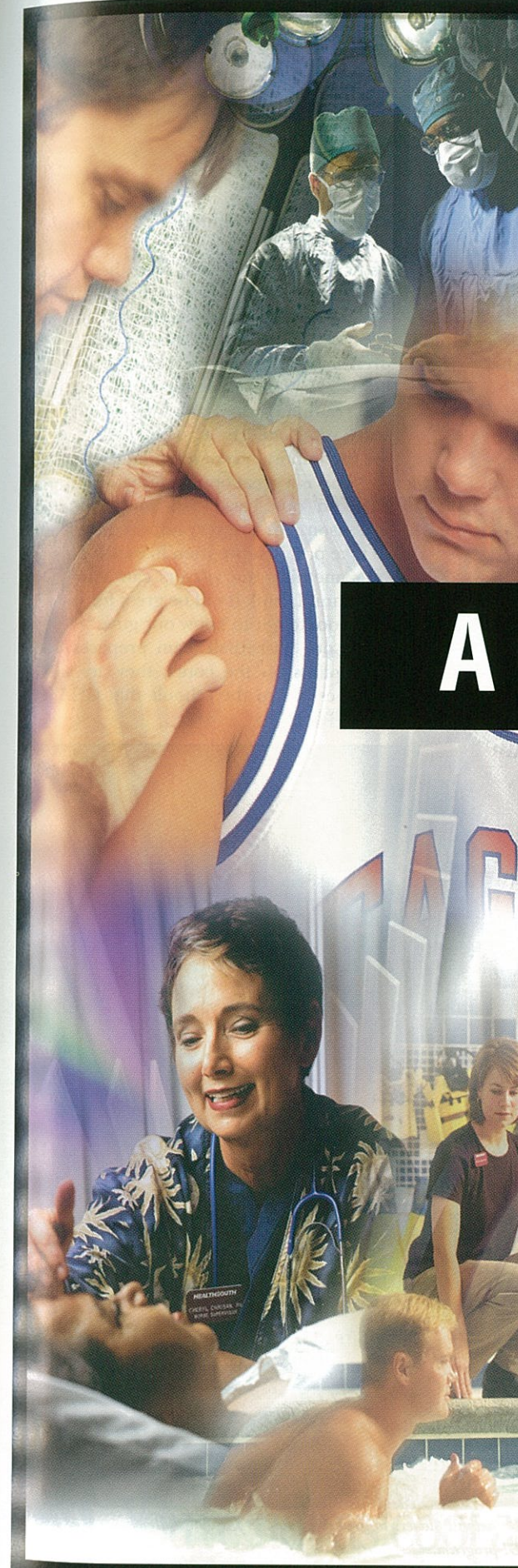

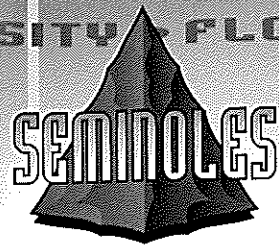

Seminole set sights on NAAs

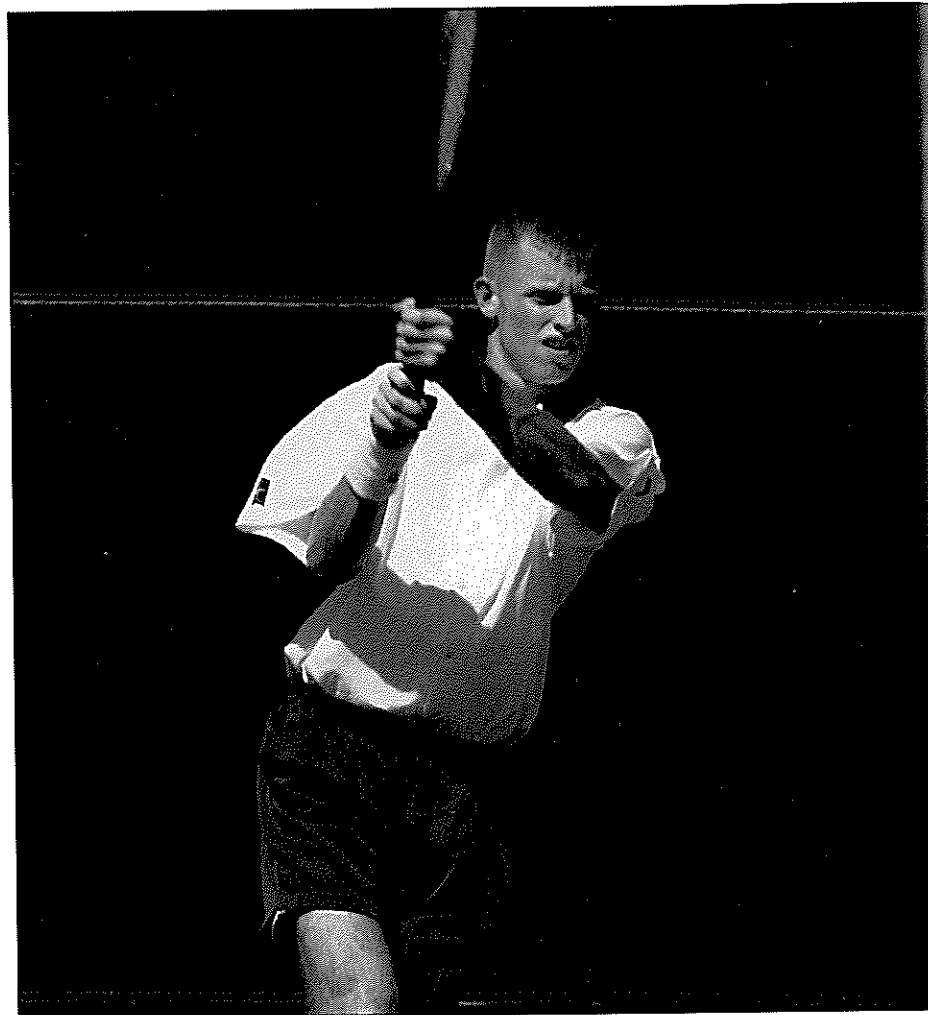

Niks mounted a team-high 28 victories for the Seminoles in 1998 at the No. 2 and No. 3 slots in the lineup, his third straight 20-win season. Niks is looking forward to another big season on the court and definitely will be a force to be reckoned with in the spring.

The Seminoles' final returning senior is Steve Weinstein, from North Miami Beach, Fla. Despite Weinstein's battle with lower-back pain this fall, he will be a major contributor to the Seminoles' success in the spring. Florida State's other upperclass returnee is junior Mike Ingham. Ingham won the flight five singles championship at the Seminole Fall Classic last month, and paired with Chad Mooney to capture the flight B doubles title.

The final two members of the FSU team are freshmen Noah Schnell and Jeff Scarella. Schnell hails from Jupiter, Fla., while Scarella is a native of New Smyrna Beach, Fla. Both have had tremendous high school and junior tennis careers.

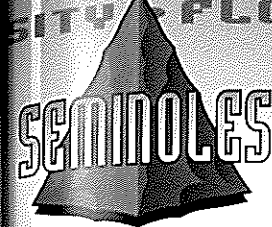
Barron will lead the Seminoles for the ninth consecutive season and his eighth with John Vinson as his assistant. Barron

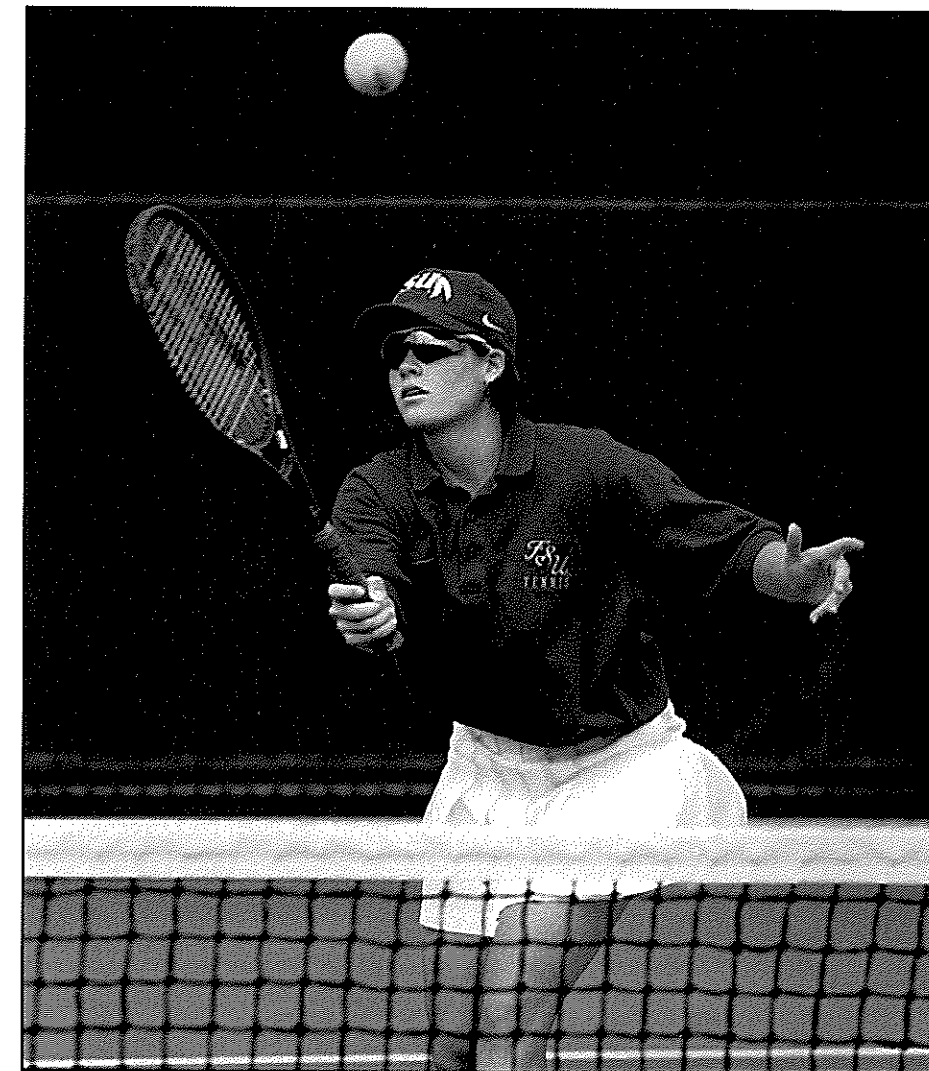

FSU's 1998-99 roster has a lot of depth from its returning players which have played in the No. 1 through No. 6 positions on the team.

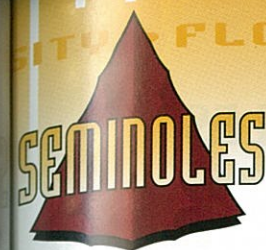
