Financial Matters

PAYING FOR COLLEGE

Tuition

Tuition and fees must be paid at the time of registration or prior to the end of the drop/add period. A student is not officially enrolled for a course until all tuition and fees have been paid, or all arrangements for financial aid have been processed.

Tuition is currently \$100.00 per credit hour, with a maximum tuition cost of \$1,831.00 per semester.

Note: Tuition and fees are subject to change. Certain programs may have additional costs. Check online for <u>tuition and fee updates</u>.

Financial Aid Tips

- Apply early! You must complete the FAFSA every year. The new Financial Aid year begins on July 1, and now you can apply as early as October for the following year's Fall term.
- Eligibility is based on prior-prior year's info. Example: 2017 income info used for 2019-2020 academic year; 2018 tax information will be used for 2020-2021 academic year.
- Answer every question honestly.
- Open, read, and respond immediately to all correspondence from the Financial Aid Office, especially requests for additional information.
- Keep all Financial Aid information in a safe place!

- Register early for your courses.
- A <u>Change of Program Form</u> must be completed by midterm for degree programs. Forms are available in the Admissions Office or <u>online</u>.

BankMobile - Financial Aid Refunds

- OFTC works with <u>BankMobile</u>, a financial services company, to provide more flexible options for students to receive financial aid refund disbursements.
- Look for a bright GREEN envelope from BankMobile in your mail within the first couple of weeks of the semester, and follow the instructions in the enclosed letter to select your preferred method of refund payment.
- Please note that you won't receive any refund disbursements until you make your choice through BankMobile. Don't miss out on money that's owed to you!

HOPE & Zell Miller Grant

HOPE GRANT

TCSG students currently receive \$76.00 per credit hour for HOPE Grant/Scholarship payment.

ZELL MILLER GRANT

Eligible students may receive Zell Miller Grant for 100% of the tuition amount.

Students who have a 3.5 Cumulative HOPE Grant GPA and who meet all other eligibility requirements are eligible to receive Zell Miller Grant.

HOPE Career Grant

Through the HOPE Career Grant, OFTC offers TUITION-FREE programs in 17 areas.

Formerly known as the Strategic Industries Workforce Development Grant (SIWDG). New name, same grant.

To qualify for this grant, an OFTC student must be fully admitted to the college, enrolled in a designated diploma or certificate in one of the programs listed on the next slide, and receiving the HOPE Grant for the same term. A more specific list of eligible diplomas and certificates can be found online.

The HOPE Career Grant award is a fixed amount for each term of enrollment:

- 9 or more credit hours = \$500/semester
- 3 8 credit hours = \$250/semester
- 1 2 credit hours = \$125/semester
- Commercial Truck Driving = \$1,000 one-time award

Federal Work Study

Federal Work Study (FWS) is a financial aid program that provides a limited number of part-time jobs on campus for students, to help pay education expenses.

Work up to 19.5 hours/week, with a flexible schedule that doesn't interfere with classes.

Eligibility based on current FAFSA; must be eligible for Pell and enrolled in a Pelleligible program of study.

To qualify, must be enrolled in at least 6 credit hours/semester and maintaining Satisfactory Academic Progress.

Criminal background screening required prior to employment.

Note: Positions are filled depending on availability of jobs and money to fund positions, and a position may not be available in your preferred area. Completing the FWS application does not guarantee you will receive a job.

Student I.D.'s

You should have your student ID made on Bookstore Day or on the first day of class. Please don't forget.

You will need your student ID to purchase your books in the bookstore, to check out materials from the library, and for other activities at OFTC.

There is no charge for your first ID, but there is a \$5 fee for a replacement.

Tip: Some local businesses offer discounts to students who present a current ID card. Just ask!

Bookstore

Bookstores on OFTC's North and South Campuses offer textbooks, supplies, and special orders. Students at Jefferson and LOIC will have opportunities to purchase books as needed through the Main Office at each location.

Books are ordered one term before the class is taught.

Bookstore hours of operation and specific policies, including the use of Financial Aid in the bookstore, are <u>available online</u>.

REFUND OF TEXTBOOKS

Refunds will be issued for textbooks during the first two weeks of class, or within 7 days of purchase. Students MUST have a receipt to receive an exchange or refund. Student must not have written on or defaced the books, nor used an access code associated with that book, nor unwrapped or unbundled books sold together as a single unit.

Books must be returned at the end of the semester.

Students must follow the instructions on the application, which is <u>available online</u> and in the Library at the North and South Campuses.

DegreeWorks

DegreeWorks (DGW) is a Web-based tool available through BannerWeb to help students and advisors monitor a student's progress toward program completion.

DegreeWorks combines OFTC's degree requirements and the coursework you have completed into an easy-to-read worksheet that helps you see which courses and requirements you still need to complete.

Transferability of Courses and Programs

All Associate of Applied Science Degree programs offered at Oconee Fall Line Technical College are terminal programs.

Acceptance of transfer credit from OFTC is the decision of the receiving institution.

Students interested in transferring will need to contact the receiving institution to determine transferability of a particular course or program.

OFTC has articulation (transfer) agreements with several four-year colleges that will accept our credits for a smooth transfer with minimal repeating coursework. More information about these agreements is online.

Requesting Accommodations for a Disability

In order to receive and maintain services, a student with a disability must:

- Be otherwise qualified for admission to or participation in a program of study with or without a reasonable accommodation.
- Disclose (notify) and provide the appropriate documentation to the Disability Services staff.
- Appropriate documentation includes medical or psychological evaluations not more than 3 years old which contain intellectual and achievement scores, strengths and weaknesses related to classroom performance, and recommendations for academic accommodations. All costs associated with obtaining appropriate documentation are the responsibility of the student.

Accommodations continued...

- Classroom accommodations must be requested prior to the beginning of each semester by providing a copy of your class schedule to the Disability Services staff on North or South Campus.
- Students must deliver accommodation form and discuss the appropriate accommodations with each instructor.
- Financial Aid and other student services are the responsibility of the student.

Student Right-To-Know (SRTK)

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

OFTC is in compliance with the Student Right-To-Know Act and The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy. In accordance with federal regulations set forth by the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, OFTC makes available a Guide to Student Consumer Information that informs students and prospective students about the availability of specific types of consumer information. This guide is available online and as a printable PDF file, and printed copies of the information are available upon request.

SRTK Graduation Rates

To comply with the disclosure of graduation rates under the Student Right-To-Know Act, a cohort group of first-time, full-time students is established each Fall Semester. The graduation rates for the cohorts are published on the Student Consumer Information page of the OFTC website and in the downloadable OFTC Guide to Student Consumer Information.

The consumer information guide also provides statistics on student body diversity, job placement rates of graduates, retention rates of first-time students, and completion and graduation rates.

SRTK Refund Policy

OFTC's Tuition Refund Policy includes information in regards to receiving a tuition/fee refund prior to classes beginning, after classes start, and after the first three class days of the semester, as well as information about refunds of books and supplies purchased at the OFTC Bookstore. As a student you have a right to review and challenge information in academic files and to have copies of that information.

OFTC must have written and dated consent with signature to send transcripts.

The Records Office requires 3 days to process the request.

Achieving Success in Your Classes

Grading Scale

Grades are issued at the end of each semester using a classic A-F grading system.

Please refer to the <u>Student Handbook and Catalog</u> for more information about the grading scale and grade definitions.

No grades are sent via U.S. Postal Service mail or given over the telephone.

You can obtain grades via BannerWeb.

Work Ethics

To help students develop the personal work habits and characteristics that employers expect in the workplace, every OFTC course includes a Work Ethics grade, on a scale of 0 ("Unacceptable") to 3 ("Exceeds Expectations").

Though not calculated as part of a student's GPA, Work Ethics grades are included on official transcripts.

Academic Probation

The purpose of academic probation is to alert students to the fact that their academic performance is not acceptable and to point out the possible consequences if improvement is not made during the next semester of enrollment.

Students must maintain a minimum of a 2.0 cumulative grade point average to be in satisfactory academic standing.

Students whose semester grade point average falls below a 2.0 will be placed on academic probation for the next semester.

Academic Suspension and Dismissal

Students will be suspended for a minimum of one semester if the semester GPA is less than 2.0 during the semester enrolled on academic probation.

Students who fail to remove themselves from academic probation by attaining a minimum 2.0 GPA the next semester in attendance after being placed on suspension will be academically dismissed for three semesters.

Students who are dismissed from the College may appeal their suspension or dismissal by filing a written appeal with the Vice President of Academic and Student Affairs within 10 calendar days from the first day of class of the following term the suspension or dismissal status was attained.

Academic Appeals

A student may appeal a final grade and/or work ethics grade by raising the issue with the instructor who awarded the grade or made the academic decision. Absent extraordinary circumstances, the appeal must be filed within ten business days from the date the student learned or reasonably should have learned of the grade.

If consultation with the instructor does not resolve the appeal, a student may appeal in writing to the Dean of Academic Affairs for his/her respective program, and if not satisfied with the decision of the Dean, the student may appeal the decision to the Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Refer to the <u>Student Handbook and Catalog</u> or <u>OFTC website</u> for more information regarding the Academic Appeals process.

Financial Aid Appeals

Students have the right to appeal a finding that they are not making satisfactory progress if they feel that there are extenuating circumstances which have prevented them from meeting the specified requirements. Any student on suspension may file an appeal with the Financial Aid Appeals Committee.

Refer to the <u>Student Handbook and Catalog</u> or <u>OFTC website</u> for detailed policies and procedures regarding the Financial Aid Appeals process.

Student Email

An email account is created for all credit students when they register for classes at OFTC. Your email address will be in the form of *username@student.oftc.edu* and the initial password will be your 6-digit birthday in the format *mmddyy*. (Note: The email prefix is auto-generated by Banner Web and does not necessarily include the full spelling of your last name).

If you forget your password or have other issues your advisor can't resolve, contact the IT Department at its@oftc.edu, or call (478) 240-5141(North Campus) or (478) 275-6506 (South Campus) for assistance.

Online Classes

An increasing number of courses are now offered almost entirely Online, and many other courses, even traditional face-to-face classroom courses, include the use of the Internet as an important component of the course.

TRADITIONAL / WEB-ENHANCED

 Assigned to an instructor and a classroom for every contact hour, but instructors supplement coursework with activities found online.

HYBRID

- Taught partially online and partially in the classroom.
- Not assigned to a classroom for every contact hour of the course.

ONLINE

- 100% of class content, activities, and interactions occur via the Internet.
- At least one proctored event required to complete the course.

Blackboard

All online classes, and the Internet component of other classes, are completed through a web platform called *BLACKBOARD*.

You will receive a welcome email in your OFTC student email account if you are taking online classes with specific instructions on how to log in to and use Blackboard.

You will use the same username and password associated with your student email address to access Blackboard and Banner Web.

If you need assistance with your online courses, you may go to any of the Tutoring Centers.

Expected Classroom Behavior

If a problem arises, please make an appointment with your instructor after class.

Electronic Devices

Unless otherwise permitted by technical college officials, OFTC prohibits use of electronic devices in classrooms, labs, and other affiliated facilities on technical college premises. Such devices include, but are not limited to, cell phones, beepers, push-to-talk devices, cameras, gaming devices, and other electronic devices, which may cause unnecessary disruption to the teaching/learning process on campus. OFTC also prohibits attaching personal electronic devices to college computers under any circumstances.

Tips to avoid being disrespectful or inconsiderate in class:

- Remember to put phone in silent or vibrate mode.
- Please refrain from personal cell phone use while in class.
- Only use device for classwork with instructor's permission.

Classroom Etiquette

Students should always address faculty by courtesy title (Dr., Mr., Ms.) and last name (not first name).

Profanity by faculty or by students is not allowed in the classrooms.

Attendance

Regular and punctual attendance in all classes is the student's responsibility.

Each instructor sets his or her own policy regarding attendance. The attendance policy will be stated in the course syllabus, which is distributed to students at the beginning of the semester in each class.

The instructor has the option of withdrawing students from the course who exceed the maximum number of permitted absences.

Students who anticipate an absence from class should contact their instructor prior to the absence. Students should communicate with instructors following unexpected absences to explain any extenuating circumstances or to discuss opportunities to make up any assignments missed.

Attendance Appeals Procedure

Students should FIRST discuss attendance matters with their instructor.

Students with extenuating circumstances who wish to appeal a violation of the attendance policy must do so in writing within 48 hours of being withdrawn from the course.

Students must attend class or log on to their online classes until the appeal decision is made.

Refer to the <u>Student Handbook and Catalog</u> or the <u>OFTC website</u> for detailed information about the attendance appeals process.

Grievances Procedure

If there is a grievance or complaint, a student should first discuss the issue with the instructor or staff member involved.

If not satisfactorily resolved, then the student should follow the <u>Student</u> <u>Grievances Procedure</u>.

The procedure is posted in the Student Centers, on the OFTC website, and in the <u>Student Handbook and Catalog</u>.

OFTC Dress Code

OFTC strives to ensure that every student has the ability to learn and be free from distractions in the classroom.

Certain clothes are prohibited for this purpose.

Student Code of Conduct

Oconee Fall Line Technical College students assume an obligation to act in a manner compatible with the fulfillment of the mission of the College.

The Technical College community recognizes its responsibility to provide an atmosphere conducive to growth. With these principles in mind, the Oconee Fall Line Technical College Student Government Association in conjunction with the Student Affairs Office established a <u>Student Code of Conduct</u>.

Student Rights and Responsibilities

Oconee Fall Line Technical College promotes a climate of academic honesty, critical investigation, strong work ethic, intellectual freedom and freedom on individual thought and expression consistent with the rights of others. OFTC is a student-centered organization which provides students with a full range of educational opportunities while maximizing their chances of success. Specifically, OFTC strives to provide students with opportunities to pursue educational programs and services that assist them in clarifying and attaining their career goals.

Student Rights

OFTC students have the right to:

- be free of discrimination based on race, color, national origin, gender, disability, religion, or any other applicable legislated category.
- be safe on OFTC's property.
- have the occupational skills, technology, equipment, and resources available to ensure success upon graduation.
- have access to program advisors.
- receive due process when accused of any violations of college regulations or conduct code.
- have adequate access to properly equipped labs.
- have privacy regarding personal information in accordance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act.
- evaluate college facilities and services provided by faculty and staff.

Student Responsibilities

OFTC students are responsible to:

- respect fellow students, faculty, and staff regarding their opinions.
- respect OFTC's equipment, facilities, and persons, as well as the property of others.
- take responsibility for learning and communicate specific learning needs.
- adhere to program requirements and to follow the prescribed curriculum as outlined in the OFTC catalog.
- actively seek out advisors and other support services that are available.
- always work to the best of one's abilities and communicate the need for adequate access to properly equipped labs.
- accept responsibility for one's actions.
- seek evaluation/feedback from instructors and peers.
- adhere to OFTC's policies and procedures.
- participate freely and willingly in learning activities using diverse instructional strategies. (continued...)

Student Responsibilities continued

- adhere to standards and policies as set by the OFTC Board, TCSG, OFTC administration, faculty and staff including general classroom guidelines and protocol.
- take responsibility for attending classes, being prepared for class, and for following other guidelines as prescribed by instructors.

Copyright

OFTC is in compliance with the Copyright Law of the United States (Title 17, U.S. Code) and encourages faculty, staff and administrators to make lawful use of copyrighted works. OFTC recognizes the exclusive rights of the copyright holders, as well as the exceptions to those rights as provided for in:

- The doctrine of Fair Use which is found in in Section 107 of the US Copyright Act
- The T.E.A.C.H Act which is found in Section 110 (2) of the US Copyright Act
- Digital Millennium Copyright Act DMCA.

The Director of Library Services serves as the college coordinator and will investigate or answer questions and/or concerns of the faculty, staff, students and administrators as they arise.

Intellectual Property

Oconee Fall Line Technical College encourages the development, writing, invention, or production of intellectual property designed to improve the productivity of the college or to enhance teaching and learning. An employee or student creating work for OFTC or its use represents and warrants that such work:

- does not violate any law;
- does not violate or infringe any intellectual property right of any person or organization; and
- does not libel, defame, or invade the privacy of any person or organization.

Harassment and Discrimination

As outlined in OFTC's <u>Unlawful Harassment and Discrimination of Students</u> <u>Procedure</u>, sexual harassment of employees and students at Oconee Fall Line Technical College is strictly prohibited.

Sexual harassment is a form of sex discrimination and is a violation of state and federal law as well as of the policy of the Technical College System of Georgia.

Non-compliance with this procedure is grounds for disciplinary measures, including dismissal, as deemed necessary by the college's president.

It is the intent of Oconee Fall Line Technical College to provide an academic and work environment, which is free, of any type of discrimination, including sexual harassment.

Preventing Sexual Violence

As part of our comprehensive sexual violence prevention efforts for students, OFTC and TCSG have partnered with EverFi to provide education in critical life skills. EverFi's Sexual Assault Prevention for Undergrads (SAPU) online course focuses on the prevention of sexual assault and relationship violence, and is a required component of the COLL1060 course.

SAPU was formerly known as "Haven," until Fall 2018.

EverFi's SAPU course is also available to any OFTC student online through the OFTC website.

Students may also access the sexual assault prevention course through the EverFi website. Use registration code *2dea1801*.

Drug-Free Campus Program

In accordance with the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989, Oconee Fall Line Technical College provides information to provide a campus environment free of illicit drug use and alcohol abuse and to prevent the abuse of alcohol and drugs by students and employees. AlcoholEdu

The use of alcohol is a significant problem among college students. The problem is not necessarily the drinking itself, but the negative consequences that result from excessive drinking.

To inspire students to reflect on and consider changing their patterns of alcohol use, OFTC and TCSG have partnered with EverFi to provide access to an online alcohol abuse prevention course, called AlcoholEdu.

Students may access the AlcoholEdu course through the <u>EverFi website</u>, and use registration code <u>2dea1801</u>.

Safety and Security

Protecting our Community

Safety and Security Personnel

We have law enforcement officers from several different agencies on our primary campuses during the day and evening. These officers are here to enforce state laws as well as school rules to protect our campuses.

In addition to uniformed law enforcement officers, certain directors and coordinators are Administrators in Charge (AICs) and serve as Campus Security Officers.

Security officers' directions are to be followed explicitly by all visitors, students, and employees, who should not interfere with the officers in the performance of duty.

Please let officers know if you need their assistance or have any concerns while on campus.

Safety Plans

We work to meet or exceed state and federal regulations and guidelines with regard to your safety and the safety of our staff, including areas like fire safety, electricity, spills, procedures, etc. Some of you will have to take safety training specific to your program of study.

We also maintain <u>emergency plans</u> for situations that are not under our control, such as severe weather, earthquakes, hazardous material incidents, and pandemics/illnesses.

The <u>Emergency Preparedness Guide</u> is posted in all rooms at all campuses of OFTC, to serve as a quick reference for OFTC employees and students to prevent injury or damage to persons or property.

In critical situations, dial 911 and speak to a public safety official.

Security Plans

Like safety, we also maintain emergency plans for security situations that are not under our control, such as assaults and intruders on campus.

Detailed information about <u>safety</u>, <u>security</u>, <u>and emergency procedures</u> can be found online, as well as in the <u>Student Handbook and Catalog</u>.

Campus Security Act (Clery Act)

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1990 requires that all colleges keep and disclose information, on an annual basis, about crime on and near their respective campuses, and campus safety policies and procedures.

In accordance with this requirement, the annual OFTC Campus Safety and Security Report is available on the OFTC website.

Mass Emergency Notification System

OFTC uses a mass emergency notification system to provide timely communication to students and staff on matters such as campus and local emergencies. These messages can be sent to your cell phone, home phone, or computer via calls, texts, and e-mails. Please check your OFTC e-mail after classes begin for more information from OFTC's IT department on setting up your account.

Weapons Policy

The Technical College System of Georgia is committed to providing all employees, students, volunteers, visitors, vendors and contractors a safe and secure workplace and/or academic setting. The possession, carrying, or transportation of a firearm, weapon, or explosive compound/material in or on college buildings or property shall be governed by Georgia state law. Behavioral Intervention Team

OFTC has established a Behavioral Intervention Team to assist in addressing situation where students, faculty, or staff are displaying behaviors that are disruptive, threatening, or concerning in nature that potentially affect their own or others' ability to function successfully or safely.

It is the responsibility of faculty, staff, and students to immediately report any troubling person or situation that could possibly result in harm to anyone at the college.

In non-emergency situations, you may fill out an <u>online concern report form</u>, or contact a member of the <u>Behavioral Intervention Team</u> directly. The team will coordinate a response to the issue and keep you informed.

In crisis situations where a person may pose an active or immediate risk of violence to self or others, you should immediately contact one of the law enforcement officers providing security on campus, or contact 911 if you have an emergency.

Student Assistance Program

OFTC has contracted with <u>ESPYR</u> to provide you with a Student Assistance Program (SAP), which gives students 24/7 access to no-cost, confidential personal counseling, a help line, and other benefits designed to help you succeed.
