

### "STUBBY" KRUGER WINS CASTLE SWIM FROM FAST FIELD

#### Outrigger Club Stages successful Program; Carbis Walker Wins From Duke

Honolulu "Stubby" Kruger carried off the honors in the Castle long distance swim staged under the auspices of the Outrigger Club on Saturday afternoon, winning from Carbis Walker and Duke Kahanamoku by about 50 yards. This race was the feature event of an excellent program.

Members of the Outrigger Club wish with them that their favorite swimmer, Kruger, was not entered, but state that the entry was made in the event of their that the Southern California long distance swim did not compete. Both Kruger and Duke trained for the race against Walker and were much disappointed because the latter swimmer was not on hand.

"Stubby" Was Right  
It is doubtful if any swimmer could have won from Kruger the way the Honolulu star was swimming on Saturday afternoon. Walker would have even given him the world's championship, a great battle and the performance of Saturday means much to local swimmers. Honolulu has been shy on long distance men in the past, but with Kruger continuing his present stroke, should give the best in the business a good run.

The Outrigger Club committee had had everything in an excellent manner, and a large crowd came out to see the feature race. There was much interest in the event as the local boys were again at the California star, as constructive criticism, some one in his fault, it was announced that Walker would compete in this event. If Kruger swam early enough, the committee all fault for not giving this to the public. It is to be hoped that in the future the public will be given the greatest feast. It will be a good thing for the sport.

Duke Leads  
Duke and "Stubby" started off at a fairly fast clip at the beginning of the race, and Walker and Ah Kin Yee followed. At the 4th Duke was leading Kruger by two yards and was swimming a second, while Kruger was some even a faster stroke. Walker was back some 10 yards with Ah Kin Yee trailing.

At the 100 yard mark from the start Kruger began to move up and passed Duke and continued on to the five with a good lead. He increased the lead by yards going to the finish at the diving stand. Walker gained at the last quarter mile and came into the finish ahead of Duke by inches. It was a great race, and Walker made good in the last few yards.

He Was Right  
In fact, as Duke it must be said that he had participated in many races, and after learning that Kruger would not be entered did not take things so seriously. Duke gives all his credit to Kruger for his great race, and refused to claim any title. You have got to hand it to Duke on one point. The long swim isn't his race, but he always is willing to go in to help the sport, and this point is much appreciated by the members of the Outrigger Club.

Miss Josephine Hopkins carried off the swimming honors for the day, who won both the 100 yard swim and the surfboard race. A large crowd was on hand for the event, but owing to the late hour of the long race, many had wandered home. There will be another program next Saturday afternoon.

Paddling canoe, six men, open event for Frank Sheehy cup contest, from Moana pier to stake off Brown's and return. Won by crew captained by David Kahanamoku. Time 5:17. The winning crew was composed of the following: H. Huggins, No. 1; F. Waldron, No. 2; T. Nopgaard, No. 3; C. Lambert, Jr., No. 4; Ernest Cook, No. 5; and Duke Kahanamoku (captain), No. 6. The losing crew was captained by Duke P. Kahanamoku.

Honolulu had better swim—Miss Josephine Hopkins, first, time 1:21; Miss Eleanor Lever, second; and Miss Emma Telford, third. Miss Hopkins won by a yard.

Two hundred yards men's breaststroke, swim-off. Richardson, first, time 3:17; H. Harvey, second; and R. Henderson, third.
