Regular Meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held this
day at 7:30 P.M.

In the absence of President Levi Alderman Blochman was
chosen President pro tem.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was
dispensed with.

Alderman Levi and Alderman Watson were each
granted thirty days' leave of absence.

A Joint Resolution rescinding all proceedings in the
matter of paving "H" Street was read and adopted by the
following vote, to-wit:

Said Joint Resolution as adopted is as follows, viz:

Joint Resolution No. 602.

Be it Resolved, By the Common Council of the City of San
Diego, as follows:

That the proceedings in the matter of Paving and curbing
"H" Street in said City, be and the same are hereby rescinded.

The Joint Street Committee having been instructed by the Board
of Delegates to investigate the condition of the sidewalk at Eighth and
"H" Streets; "H" Street near India; street car tracks on Sixteenth between
"L" and "N" Streets; street car tracks on First above D Street; street car
tracks on Sixth Street; the status of the Children's Home, said to be
abandoned as such; on motion of Alderman Sweeney said
instructions were concurred in.

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The petitions of Johannes Kleiver and Leon Dupont for retail liquor licenses were read and referred to the Committee on Health and Morals.

The Health and Morals Committee having approved the application of Miller & Lee for a retail liquor license, on motion the same was granted.

Petition of contractors and cement dealers asking the Common Council to put an inspector over all cement work done on the streets and sidewalks of the City was read and referred to the Joint Street Committee.

Petition of property owners for roadway through Pound Canon was read and referred to the Joint Street Committee.

Petition of Jacob Price for permission to construct a granite curb on H Street in front of 1/2 lots K and L, Block 174, Horton's Addition, was read and granted.

Petition of Jacob Price for permission to construct an awning supported by posts in front of his property on the northeast corner of Sixth and H Streets was read and referred to the Joint Street Committee.

The Joint Street Committee, to whom was referred the matter of investigating obstructions in certain streets, reported in said matter, which report was adopted and is as follows, viz:
To the Common Council:

The Joint Street Committee, to whom was referred the matter of obstructions upon the streets at 6th St. and University ave. and at 28th street and Grant avenue herewith report that there is no obstruction at 6th Street and University avenue, and we recommend that the Street Superintendent be instructed to remove the obstruction at 28th street & Grant avenue.

The application of Frank Munson, contractor, for permission to construct a cement sidewalk and curb on Seventh Street was read and granted.

Whereupon a joint resolution granting permission to construct said cement sidewalk and curb was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

That permission be, and is hereby granted Frank Munson contractor, to construct a cement sidewalk and curb on Seventh Street in front of north 1/2 of lot 2 and lot 3, block 9, Kearns' Addition in accordance with specifications therefor.

An Ordinance amending Sections 8 and 9, of Ordinance No. 216, was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Said Ordinance as adopted is as follows, viz:

Ordinance No. 216
An Ordinance to amend Section 8, and Section 9, of Ordinance No. 216 of the Ordinance of the City of San Diego, entitled, "An Ordinance establishing a City Pound for Strays, creating the Office of Pound Keeper, and providing for the prevention of certain animals running at large within certain limits of said City of San Diego, and directing the Police to take charge of horses and teams found not to be within the limits of said City," approved June 29th, 1893.
Be it Ordained, By the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:
Section 1. That Section 5 of Ordinance No. 216 of the Ordinance of the City of San Diego, entitled "An Ordinance establishing a City Pound for Strays, creating the Office of Pound Keeper, and providing for the prevention of certain animals running at large within certain limits of said City of San Diego, and directing the Police to take charge of horses and teams found not to be within the limits of said City," approved June 29th, 1893.

authorizing the appointment of deputies, fixing the fee, and providing for the payment of certain animals running at large within certain limits of said City of San Diego, and directing the Police to take charge of horses and teams found not kept within the limits of said City, "approved June 29th, 1893, he, and the same is hereby amended as to read as follows: "Section 5. The following charges and fines are hereby imposed for any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance: For any horse, mule, cow, hog, pig, goat or sheep, taken into custody by the Pound Keeper, or any deputy of his, fifty cents; for driving any such animal to, and placing the same in, the pound, fifty cents, and in addition the sum of fifty cents per day, not including the day in which such animal may be impounded, for keeping any such animal, and the further sum of one dollar for each animal that may be advertised, and 5% commutation of the amount of the sale, if any such animal are sold, all of which is hereby made a lawful charge against the owner or owners of any such animal impounded, and shall be a lien upon such animal for the payment thereof."

Section 2. Section 9 of said Ordinance No. 216 is hereby amended as to read as follows: "Section 9. All fees collected by the Pound Keeper under and in pursuance of the foregoing Section, shall be retained by him, and shall constitute his full and only compensation for all services of every kind and description rendered by him as such Pound-Keeper, his deputies and assistants, under this ordinance. It shall be the duty of such Pound Keeper to make a statement under oath to the Common Council of said City on the first day of every month, which statement shall be filed with the Clerk of said Common Council, and shall contain an itemized statement of the number and kind of animals taken into custody or impounded for the month next preceding the making of such statement, and shall also contain an itemized statement of the fees collected during such month, and from whom collected; the said City of San Diego shall be in no manner liable for any compensation to said Pound Keeper, other than the fees herein provided."

Section 3. The said Sections 8 and 9, by this ordinance amended, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and one publication in the "San Diego Sun" the official newspaper of said City.

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At this time the Board goes into Committee of the Whole for the purpose of meeting with the Board of Delegates in Joint Committee, for the receipt of proposals for the sale to the City of San Diego of water and water distributing system, in accordance with Joint Resolution No. 574.

Upon reconvening the Chairman of the Joint Committee of the Whole reported that proposals had been received from the Mt. DeCarte Land and Water Company and from Jesse R. Grant for the sale to the City of water; checks duly certified in the sum of \$5,000⁰⁰ each being thereto attached; also communications from the Pine Valley Consolidated Water and Land Company, the San Diego Plume and Water Company and Geo. W. Pink, relative to said advertisement, and recommended that said proposals and communications be referred to the Joint Water Committee.

Upon motion of Alderman Spears said report and recommendation was adopted.

An invitation from Washington No. 7, V. O. S. of A., to the Common Council to attend Fourth of July exercises to be held at Hotel del Coronado was accepted and the Clerk instructed to notify the officials of the lodge of the acceptance of said invitation.

The report of the Joint Fire Committee, to whom was referred a communication from the Board of Fire Commissioners in regard to the construction of a Hook and Ladder Truck, was adopted and is as follows, to-wit:

The Joint Fire Committee recommend that the within request to construct a Hook and Ladder Truck be granted, and the City Attorney to prepare an ordinance to carry this recommendation into effect.

The report of the Joint Street Committee, to whom was referred the protest and objections to grading Eleventh Street, was adopted and is as follows, to-wit:

To the Honorable Common Council of the City of San Diego,
Gentlemen:—

The Joint Street Committee, to whom was referred the matter of investigating the written protest and objections to the proposed grading of Eleventh Street from the north line of N Street to the south line of the City Park, as shown by the Resolution of Intention heretofore passed by your honorable body, and now on file in the office of the clerk of the said city of San Diego, respectfully report as follows:

After the above matter had been referred to your committee, a meeting of said committee was duly set for the 20th day of June, 1895, at the hour of 7:30 P.M. and due notice thereof given to all persons interested in the same, of the time and place fixed for the meeting of the said committee and when the said protest and objections would be heard and investigated.

At the time and place fixed for the meeting of said committee, evidence was heard from J. B. Hooker, S. B. Holland, C. A. Burgoyne, J. P. Preston, Levi Chase and others, relative to the signing of said protest and objections, and of the ownership of property on said street, and thereafter your committee adjourned to the 22nd day of June, 1895, at the hour of 10 o'clock A.M., when further evidence was heard regarding the said signing of the said protest or objections, the ownership of property fronting on said street, and the right of persons to sign said protest or objections, and after said matter had been thoroughly investigated, and said evidence duly considered, your committee conclude, find, and report that said protest, or objections does not represent a majority of all the property fronting upon said street between the points to be graded, as set forth in the Resolution of Intention, filed in the office of the clerk of the said city, in the said matter, and that said protest or objections is not legal, and that said protest or objections has not been legally signed by the owners of a majority of the frontage on said street, between the said points to be graded, as set out in said Resolution of Intention.

Therefore your committee recommends that the said protest or objections be denied and disallowed and that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

Joint Resolution No. 604.

Whereas, The Common Council of the City of San Diego passed and adopted on the 22nd day of May, 1895, a Resolution of Intention to grade Eleventh Street in said City from the north line of "H" Street to the south line of the City Park in said City, to which reference is hereby made for further particulars;

And Whereas, Said Resolution was duly published by two insertions in the San Diego Sun, and posted by the clerk of said City as required by law and said Resolution of Intention, and the notice of the passage of said Resolution has been published for six days as required by law and said Resolution of Intention;

And Whereas, On the sixth day of June, 1895, a written protest or objections to the grading of said Eleventh Street, as set forth in said Resolution of Intention was filed in the office of the clerk of the said City of San Diego, purporting to be signed by the owners of a major frontage of the property fronting on said Eleventh Street on which said proposed work was to be done;

And Whereas, The Common Council has examined and investigated said protest or objections to the grading of said Eleventh Street;

And Whereas, The said Common Council find that said protest or objections has not been legally signed by the owners of a major frontage on said Eleventh Street between the points proposed to be graded as set forth in said Resolution of Intention;

And Whereas, Said Common Council find that said protest or objections is not legal, and is not sufficient to bar the said work for six months, or any other time,

Now Therefore, Be it Resolved, By the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

That the said written protest or objections filed in the office of the clerk of the City of San Diego, on the 6th day of June, 1895, to the grading of Eleventh Street in the City of San Diego, as shown by the Resolution of Intention to grade said street adopted by the said Common Council on the 22nd day of May, 1895, to which reference is hereby made for further particulars be, and the same is hereby found not to have been legally signed by the owners of a majority of the frontage on the said Eleventh Street

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between the north line of "N" Street and the south line of the City Park in said City, being the points between which said Eleventh Street is proposed to be graded as shown by said Resolution of Intention, and not to represent a majority of the frontage on said 11th Street between said north line of "N" Street and the south line of said City Park,

And Be it Further Resolved, That the said written protest or objections be, and the same is hereby denied and disallowed.

The following report of the Joint Street Committee and Joint Resolution providing the manner for signing protests was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Whereas, Your Joint Street Committee has indisputable evidence that illegal signatures have been placed upon certain protests to the grading of streets of the City, thereby endeavoring to throw serious obstacles in the way of street improvements, in view of which your Joint Street Committee recommend that the following Joint Resolution be passed by the Common Council, to-wit:

Joint Resolution No. 599.

Be it Resolved, By the Common Council of the City of San Diego, California:

That hereafter all persons who sign any protests against the grading or paving, the laying of sidewalks or crosswalks, or other street improvement, must present proof that they are the bona fide legal owners, or that they have good legal authority from the owners of all real estate for which they sign protests against street work in front of the property they represent.

That the City Clerk is hereby directed to have this Joint Resolution published in the San Diego Sun for one week so as to give it full publicity.

A Joint Resolution instructing the Board of Public Works to cease sprinkling ungraded streets, heretofore referred to the Joint Street Committee by the Board of Delegates, was on motion of Alderman Bachman laid on the table.

The report of the Joint Street Committee, to whom was referred the Joint Resolution in regard to charging Telegraph, Telephone and other companies ground rental for poles erected in the streets of San Diego, was read and adopted and is as follows, viz:

The Joint Street Committee recommend that the City Attorney be instructed to prepare and present an Ordinance imposing a ground rental of 50¢ per year for each Telegraph, Telephone, Electric Light or Electric Ry. Poles in the streets, and your Committee recommend that such Ordinance be adopted.

A Joint Resolution ordering the San Diego Water Company

to lay pipe in "K" Street, etc., was presented and referred to the Joint Water Committee.

A Joint Resolution instructing the Board of Public Works to investigate the status of City Lands and report to the Common Council every six months, was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Whereas, The City of San Diego owns several thousand acres of land, which are of great value, and

Whereas, There have been in the past and now are persons occupying and cultivating portions of said lands, without the consent of and adversely to the interests of the said City of San Diego, and

Whereas, There may be danger of persons acquiring title to such lands by adverse possession,

Now, Therefore Be it Resolved, By the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows, to-wit:

That the Board of Public Works be and they are hereby instructed to have a complete and thorough examination and investigation made of the lands belonging to said City every six months for the purpose of ascertaining whether there are any persons occupying, cultivating, or using said lands without the consent of the said City of San Diego, and to make and file with the Clerk of said City a report of such examination and investigation.

A protest of property owners to the proposed grading of Front Street between Ivy and Maple Streets was presented and referred to the Joint Street Committee.

A Resolution directing the City Engineer to furnish estimates of the cost of paving "H" Street from Sixth to Sixteenth Streets was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Resolution directing Engineer to furnish estimates.

Be it Resolved By the Common Council of the City of San Diego as follows:

That the City Engineer of the said City of San Diego, County of San Diego, State of California, be, and he is hereby directed to furnish to this Common Council estimates of the cost per front foot of the following street work along each line of H Street in said City, from the east line of Sixth Street to the east line of Sixteenth Street including the cost of intersection work assessable upon said frontage, viz: Paving that portion of "H" Street in said City from the east line of Sixth Street to the east line of Sixteenth Street, including all intersections of streets between said points, (excepting such portions of said street and intersections as are required by law to be kept in order or repair by any person, corporation or company having railroad tracks thereon; and also excepting such portions of said H Street and intersections between said points as are occupied by a wooden bridge; and also excepting such portions ^{of said} H Street and intersections as are already covered with bituminous rock crosswalks laid to the official grade, and excepting that portion of said ~~points~~ "H" Street and intersections between said points already guttered with granite blocks, laid on the official grade of said street), from curb line to curb line with bituminous rock pavement 2 inches thick laid on the natural earth in accordance with Special Specifications No. 5, of Section 6, of Article 1, of Ordinance No. 226 of the Ordinances of said City.

approved August 15th, 1893, as amended by Ordinance No. 279, approved December 26th, 1894.

And also the curbing of that portion of H Street from the east line of Twelfth Street to the west line of Sixteenth Street, including all intersections of streets between said points (excepting such portion of said street and intersections between said points, as is already curbed with concrete or natural stone; and also excepting such portion of said H Street and intersections between said points as is occupied by a wooden bridge) with concrete in accordance with General Specifications No. 7 of Ordinance No. 226 of the Ordinances of said city, approved August 15th, 1893.

Said estimates to be thus furnished in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, approved February 27th, 1893, authorizing the issuance of serial bonds to represent the cost of certain street work or improvements for the purpose of enabling this Common Council to determine whether bonds may be issued to represent the cost of the above described work or improvement.

An Ordinance to prevent Drunkenness and Disorderly Conduct, and fixing a Penalty for its Violation.

Be it Ordained, By the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. Every person who shall be found drunk in or upon any public street, sidewalk, highway, square, alley, or other public place within the city of San Diego, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding Thirty Dollars, and in case the fine imposed be not paid, then the person so fined may be imprisoned in the city prison of the city of San Diego, at the rate of one day for every \$2.00 of the fine imposed.

Section 2. Every person who shall be guilty of any offensive or disorderly conduct in or upon any of the streets, sidewalks, or

other public places in said city, or who shall make any loud noise or disturbance, or use any loud, noisy, boisterous, vulgar or indecent language, on any of the streets, sidewalks, or other public places in said city, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding Fifty Dollars, and in case the fine imposed be not paid, then the person so fined may be imprisoned in the city prison of the city of San Diego, at the rate of one day for every two dollars of the fine imposed.

Section 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval, and one publication in the "San Diego Sun" the official newspaper of said city.

An Ordinance to Prevent the carrying of concealed Weapons was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Ayes—Aldermen Beard, Dodson, Sweeney, Spears, Blochman and Bachman.

Absent—Aldermen Prout, Watson and Levi.

Said Ordinance as adopted is as follows, viz:

Ordinance No.

An Ordinance to Prevent the carrying of concealed Weapons Within the city of San Diego, California, and fixing a Penalty for its Violation.

Be it Ordained, By the Common Council of the city of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to wear or carry concealed upon or about his person, in this city, any pistol, slung shot, brass or iron Knuckles, sand club, dirk knife, bowie knife, or other dangerous or deadly weapon. The Police Commissioners of this city may grant a written permission for a period of not exceeding six months, to any peaceable person whose profession or occupation may require him to be out at late hours of the night, to carry deadly weapons upon his person, for his own protection.

Section 2. Every person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars, and in case the fine imposed be not paid, then the person so fined may be imprisoned in the city prison of

the city of San Diego, at the rate of one day for every Two Dollars of the fine imposed; provided, however, if it shall be proved from the testimony on the trial of any such case, that the accused was at the time of carrying any concealed weapon or weapons as aforesaid, a peace officer, or a traveller actually engaged in making a journey, or had a permit granted by the Police Commissioners of said city, as aforesaid, the accused shall be acquitted. Such persons, and no others, shall be deemed "travellers" within the meaning of this Ordinance, as may be actually engaged in making a journey at the time.

Section 3. Section 39, of Ordinance No. 19 of the Ordinances of said city, entitled "An Ordinance for the prevention of offenses against the peace, good order and health of the city of San Diego" approved August 23rd, 1886, and all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and one publication in the "San Diegoan Sun" the official newspaper of said city.

An Ordinance to regulate the closing of saloons and places where intoxicating liquors are sold was read and on motion of Alderman Spears adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Said Ordinance as adopted is as follows, viz:

Ordinance No.

An Ordinance to regulate the closing of saloons and places where intoxicating liquors are kept for sale within the city of San Diego, California, and fixing a penalty for its violation.

Be it Ordained, By the common Council of the city of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. It is hereby made unlawful for any owner, keeper, or proprietor of any saloon, bar, or bar-room, or any owner, keeper, or proprietor of any place where malt, spirituous, or vinous, or any intoxicating liquors, or drinks are kept for sale at retail, within said city of San Diego to keep such saloon, bar, or bar-room, or such place where any malt, spirituous, vinous, or any intoxicating liquors or drinks are kept for sale at retail, open or lighted up between the

hours of twelve o'clock midnight and five o'clock A.M. of any day.

Section 2. It is hereby made unlawful for any owner, keeper, or proprietor of any saloon, bar, or bar-room within said city, or any owner, keeper, or proprietor of any place where malt, spirituous, vinous, or any intoxicating liquors or drinks, are kept for sale at retail, within said city to permit any person, except the members of his own family and his bar-tender, to be or remain in or about any such saloon, bar, or bar-room, or place where malt, spirituous, vinous, or any intoxicating liquors, or drinks are kept for sale at retail between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and five o'clock A.M. of any day.

Section 3. Every person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars, and in case the fine imposed be not paid, then the person so fined may be imprisoned in the City Prison of the City of San Diego, at the rate of one day for every two dollars of the fine imposed.

Section 4. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to Drug Stores.

Section 5. All Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance, are hereby repealed.

 WHEREAS, The water rights under and the water-works through which said water has been and is now being so furnished is owned by a corporation separate and distinct from said city of San Diego; and

WHEREAS, It is the wish of the said inhabitants of the said city of San Diego, and of the Common Council of the said city, that the said city acquire water rights and water works for the purpose of supplying the inhabitants of the city with pure, fresh water, and of obtaining pure fresh water for said city's own use; and

WHEREAS, The Common Council of the said city is desirous of receiving propositions to sell to the said city water rights or water works or water rights and water works; now therefore be it

Resolved, By the Common Council of the City of San Diego as follows, to-wit:

That it be, and is hereby declared and determined that it is necessary that the city of San Diego should acquire its own water rights and water works, and to that end that public notice be given by the Common Council of the city of San Diego, county of San Diego, state of California, through the Clerk of said Common Council, by publication for a period of ten days in the official newspaper of said city, that said Common Council will receive sealed proposals in writing up to the 2nd day of September, 1895, at the hour of eight o'clock p.m. thereof, to sell to the said city of San Diego, water rights or water works, or both water rights and water works, jointly; said propositions to be delivered to the Clerk of the said city of San Diego, at his office, in that building known as the "City Hall," situated on the S. W. corner of Third and D streets in said city of San Diego; that said Common Council desires to receive propositions for the sale to said city of 1,000 miner's inches, more or less, of pure fresh water, continuous and perpetual flow, to be delivered to the said city at an elevation of not less than 475 feet above sea level, at a point to be hereafter agreed upon, within the limits of said city; but propositions will be received for a less amount than 1,000 miner's inches of water, but for an amount not less than 500 miner's inches, said water to be so delivered as follows, to-wit: If said proposition shall be for 500 miner's inches of water and no more, then the full amount shall be so delivered to said city within 18 months from the date of the contract hereafter to be made and entered into by and between the said city of San Diego and the maker of the proposition that is accepted by the said city. But if said proposition shall be for more than 500 miner's inches of water, then 500 miner's inches of water shall be so delivered within 18 months from the date of said contract, and an additional amount of 100 miner's inches of water each year thereafter, until the full amount set forth in any proposition accepted by said city shall have been so

delivered, or the full amount of water set forth in any proposition accepted by said city may be so delivered within 18 months from the date of the contract therefor; or sooner, at the option of the party submitting the proposition. That propositions may also be submitted at said time and place for the sale to said city of any and all rights which any person or company may have to take, appropriate, acquire, or receive water, whether such rights be in the nature of a right to take water from wells in any river or stream, or from the stream itself, or from a dam, reservoir, flume, ditch, conduit or pipe for conducting water, provided, however, that a proposition containing a less amount than 500 inches of water will not be considered.

That propositions will also be received at the said time and place, to sell to said city water works for the purpose of distributing water to the said city and its inhabitants, which shall either be in accordance with the present system now in use by the San Diego Water Company, through which water is now being distributed to said city and the inhabitants thereof, or in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor as prepared by Edwin M. Capps and Thomas M. Shaw, Civil Engineers, and the supplementary specifications thereto attached, and on file in the office of the City Engineer of the City of San Diego, to which reference is hereby made for further particulars.

Any proposition to sell water works to said city may include any and all machinery of any and every kind, or pump or pumping plant, or any other means by which water may be pumped, elevated or forced into any reservoir or dam for storing water, or into any conduit, flume or pipe line for conducting water. That if any proposition be made to sell to said city water rights and water works jointly, the said proposition may be to either sell and deliver said water to said city in the quantity and at the place above specified, and to sell a system for distributing water to said city and its inhabitants as above specified; or to sell any water rights to said city, the location of which is distant from said city, together with any reservoir or reservoirs, reservoir site or reservoir sites, dam or dams, dam site or dam sites, rights of way for any flume, ditch, conduit, pipe or pipe line, or any ditch, conduit, pipe or pipe line, or any other means for conducting water from the source of said water rights to the said city, together with a system for distributing said water to said city and inhabitants thereof as above specified.

chase of any water rights or water works, or both water rights and water works, that said contract shall be conditioned upon the city paying therefor in 5 per cent 40-year bonds of said city, payable in gold coin of the United States, provided that two-thirds of the qualified electors of the said city of San Diego shall determine by ballot that the said bonds shall be issued.

Any person or company submitting a proposition hereunder must file with such proposal a check certified by a responsible bank, payable to the order of the Clerk of the city of San Diego, for an amount which shall be not less than Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or a bond in said amount, and so payable, signed by the party making the proposal, and at least two sureties, who shall justify before an officer competent to administer an oath, in double the said amount, and over and above all statutory exemptions; such bond to be approved by the Common Council of the city of San Diego. Such certified check or bond shall be held by the city of San Diego as a guarantee that any such party making a proposition, will enter into a contract with said city to furnish and turn over to said city such water rights or water works, or water rights and water works, within thirty days from the acceptance by said city of any such proposal, and give bond for the carrying out of the provisions of any such contract in the penal sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), such bond to be approved by the Common Council.

Whereas, this Council recognizes that in the passing of the resolution whereby electric lights were placed on the Plaza on the evenings when the open air concerts by the City Guard Band are discoursed, that the patrons of said concerts have been very much benefitted thereby; and

Whereas, there appears to be a great desire on the part of the public to have these lights maintained every night in the week, and the same to be kept burning until a reasonable hour, therefore,

Be it Resolved, That it is the sense of the Common Council, that it is for the best interests of the tax payers that said electric lights should be continued nightly from August 3^d to August 10th, inclusive, in addition to the two night each week, as provided for by Joint Resolution N^o 584, and the Board of Public Works are respectfully requested to take notice thereof.

Ordinance N^o

An Ordinance to regulate the gathering and disposal of the garbage of the City of San Diego, California.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Public Works of this City is hereby authorized and empowered to continue the present arrangement with William James, for the sailing of the garbage scow, temporarily, until January 1st, 1896, provided that said scow shall be taken out to sea and there dumped, at least once in every five days, and provided further that the garbage shall never be thrown overboard, inside the whistling buoy. In case said garbage is thrown overboard inside the said buoy, there shall be deducted from the payment next made to the parties sailing said scow, the sum of five dollars for each and every time such garbage is thrown overboard inside said whistling buoy.

Section 2. The said Board of Public Works is hereby authorized and empowered to procure a canvas, and keep the said scow covered,

and closed with the same, excepting when ^{the} garbage is being dumped into it from wagons.

Section 3. No garbage shall be gathered between the hours of six o'clock A.M. and nine o'clock P.M. of any day, in that portion of ~~Said~~ City having for its northern boundary the north line of "A" Street, for its eastern boundary the east line of Seventh Street, for its southern boundary the Bay of San Diego, and for its western boundary, the west line of Third Street.

Section 4. Every wagon used for gathering garbage shall be kept closely covered, while on any of the streets of said City, and shall be thoroughly washed out each time it is emptied into the sewer, before being used again.

Section 5. All dead animals taken out in the sewer, shall be opened before being thrown into the sea.

Section 6. Every person violating any provision of Section 3 or 4, of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall be in force and take effect immediately after its passage and approval.

An Ordinance, heretofore adopted by the Board of Delegates, imposing a ground rental for the use of the Streets for poles was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Ordinance No

An Ordinance imposing a Ground Rental of fifty cents per annum for each pole for the suspension of electric wires erected or used by Telegraph, Telephone, Electric Light or Electric Railway Companies in the Streets, alleys, or public places in the City of San Diego, California,

and providing for the payment and collection thereof.

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. From and after the first day of October, 1895, every Telegraph, Telephone, Electric Light or Electric Railway Company doing business in the City of San Diego, California, shall pay to said City for the privilege of using the streets, alleys and public places thereof, the sum of fifty cents per annum for each and every pole for the suspension of electric wires, erected or used by it, in the streets, alleys or public places in said City.

Section 2. Every such Telegraph, Telephone, Electric Light or Electric Railway Company shall deposit with the City Auditor of said City, on the first day of October, of each year, beginning with October 1st, 1896, a verified statement showing the number of poles for the suspension of electric wires erected or used by it in the streets, alleys or public places of said City, since the first day of October next prior thereto.

Section 3. The said Auditor shall copy and record said statement in a book kept by him for that purpose, and shall then file the same with the City Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to ascertain the correctness of said statement, or if none be deposited with him, he shall ascertain the facts required by Section 2 hereof, to be contained in such statement. If the statement be correct, the Auditor shall furnish a memorandum of its contents to the City Treasurer of said City. If such statement be incorrect, or if no statement shall be deposited with the Auditor as required by said Section 2, then the Auditor shall furnish the said Treasurer with a memorandum showing the number of poles, as ascertained by himself, required to be contained in the verified statement provided for in said Section 2, The Auditor

shall keep a copy of said last mentioned memorandum on file in his office.

Section 4. If any Telegraph, Telephone, Electric Light or Electric Railway Company shall fail to deposit the statement as required by section 2 hereof, or shall report therein a like number of poles than is required by said section 2, the Auditor shall set forth such facts in the said memorandum, and the Treasurer shall collect from any such Company at the same time with the payment provided for in section 1 hereof, the sum of 25 cents in addition to the fifty cents provided for in said Section 1, for each pole of such Company failing to report, or if reporting, for each pole omitted from its statement.

Section 5. The payments provided for in Section 1 and 4 hereof, shall be made to the City Treasurer of said City between the 20th and 30th day of October of each year, beginning with the month of October, 1896, and such payments when made, shall be by the said Treasurer placed in the Park Improvement Fund of said City. The Treasurer must give a receipt to the Company making any payments hereunder, specifying the amount paid, and the year and number of poles for which payments are made.

Section 6. In case default is made in any payment as provided for by this Ordinance, the City Treasurer shall at once notify the Common Council of that fact, and upon being requested so to do by the Common Council, the City Attorney shall immediately commence and conduct the necessary proceedings in the proper Court in behalf of the City for the collection of all amounts remaining unpaid.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval, and 2 publications in the San Diego Union, the official newspaper of said City.

Resolved, That it is the intention of the Common Council of the City of San Diego, State of California, to change and establish the grade of that portion of Ash Street in said City, between the east line of Seventh Street and the west line of Eighth Street, as follows:

At the northeast corner of said Ash and Seventh Streets the grade shall be 135.00 feet; at the southeast corner of said Ash and Seventh Streets the grade shall be 132.00 feet; at a point on the south line of Ash Street 70 feet due east from the southeast corner of Ash and Seventh Streets 138.00 feet; at a point on the south line of Ash Street 45 feet due east from the last named point 138.40 feet; at a point on the north line of Ash Street 70 feet due east from the northeast corner of Ash and Seventh Streets 140.00 feet; at a point on the north line of Ash Street 45 feet due east from the last named point 140.00 feet; at the southwest corner of Ash and Eighth Streets 132.50 feet; at the northwest corner of Ash and Eighth Streets 133.00 feet; the grade of said Ash Street, between the points fixed by this resolution, shall be of uniform ascent and descent, as shown by the grade map made by the City Engineer, and on file in his office. The south half of Block 11 and the north half of Block 12, both in Carruth's addition to said City of San Diego, as shown by the map thereof on file in the office of the County Recorder of the County of San Diego, State of California.

The City Clerk of said City is hereby directed to cause this Resolution of Intention to be published for ten days in the newspaper in which the official notices of the Common Council of this City are usually printed and published, to-wit: the San Diego Sun, a daily newspaper published and circulated in said City, in every regular issue of said newspaper during said period of ten days, which newspaper is hereby designated as the newspaper in which this Resolution of Intention shall be published, in the manner and by the persons required by law.

The Superintendent of Streets of said City is hereby ordered and directed, within five days after the first publication of this resolution, to cause to be conspicuously posted, in the manner and form required by law, within the district herein above designated as the district to be benefitted by the proposed change of grade, notices of the passage of this resolution.

The Clerk of said City is hereby directed to post this Resolution of Intention conspicuously, for two days, on or near the Council Chamber door of the Common Council of said City of San Diego, and to cause the same to be published by two insertions in the manner required by law, in said daily newspaper.

An Ordinance regulating the use of bicycles and tricycles on the streets and sidewalks of the City of San Diego, imposing a penalty for its violation and repealing Ordinance No. 227 of the Ordinance of the said City approved August 22nd, 1893:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride a bicycle or tricycle after dark in any of the streets of the City of San Diego, without a lighted lantern attached to the front of such bicycle or tricycle, or carried by such rider.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to ride a bicycle or tricycle on any of the public sidewalks of the City of San Diego or to violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than one dollar, nor more than ten dollars.

Section 4. Ordinance No. 227 of the Ordinance of the City of San Diego, entitled "An Ordinance regulating the use of bicycles on the streets of the City of San Diego, California, and imposing a penalty for its violation, approved August 22nd, 1893," is hereby repealed.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval and 10 publications in the San Diego-Bum, the official newspaper of said City.

Whereupon an Ordinance regulating the use of bicycles was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of San Diego as follows:

Section 1. That the Board of Public Works of said City of San Diego is hereby authorized and instructed to advertise for, and purchase, one Chemical Engine and Hose-Wagon combined, for the use of the Fire Department of said City, to be located at the Engine House in the Eighth Ward of said City, Provided, that the same can be purchased at a price not exceeding Twelve Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$1250.00).

The chemical tank or tanks of such Chemical Engine and Hose-Wagon combined, shall have a capacity of not less than fifty (50) gallons in all; the wagon to be for one horse service and the bed of the wagon to have a capacity sufficient to carry not less than one thousand (1000) feet of hose.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval, and one publication in the official newspaper of said City, to-wit, the San Diegoan-Sun.

An Ordinance to regulate the sale of fish on the Streets was read and laid upon the Table.

An Ordinance regulating the sale of Fish, Meat and Game on the Streets and sidewalks of the City, was read and adopted by the following vote, to-wit:

Said Ordinance, as adopted, is as follows, to-wit:

Ordinance No.

An Ordinance regulating the sale of fish, crabs, lobsters, shrimp, clams, meat or game upon the streets, sidewalks or public grounds of the City of San Diego, California, and prohibiting the cleaning, dressing, scaling or washing of fish, meat or game upon such streets, sidewalks or public places, and providing a penalty for its violation.

Be it Ordained, by the Common Council, of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or company, between the hours of nine o'clock A.M. and five o'clock P.M. of any day, to expose for sale, offer for sale, or sell any fish, crabs, lobsters, shrimp, clams, meat or game of any kind, on any of the streets, sidewalks or public grounds in that portion of said City having for its northern boundary the north line of "B" street; for its eastern boundary the east line of Seventh street; for its southern boundary the south line of "D" street; and for its western boundary the west line of Third street; or on that portion of "D" street or the sidewalk thereof, west of the west line of Third street.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or company to clean, dress, scale or wash any fish, meat or game of any kind upon any of the streets, sidewalks or public grounds of said City.

Section 3. That none of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be so construed as to interfere with the use of any of the sidewalks of said City, under the provisions of Ordinance No 126 of the Ordinances of said City, approved September 7th, 1887.

Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding \$25.00, and in case the fine imposed be not paid, then the person or persons so fined, may be imprisoned at the rate of one day for every two dollars of the fine imposed.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and one publication in the City official newspaper of said City, to-wit: The San Diegoan-Sun.

An Ordinance, heretofore adopted by the Board of Delegates, providing for a City Council, creating the office of Councilkeeper, was read and upon motion of Alderman Spears the northern boundary of the excepted territory was amended to the north line of "C" street, instead of the north line of "B" street, thereupon said Ordinance as amended, was adopted, by the following vote, to-wit:

Said Ordinance, as adapted, is as follows, to-wit:

Ordinance No. 325.

An ordinance establishing a City Pound in and for the City of San Diego, California, creating the office of Poundkeeper, fixing his fees, authorizing the appointment of deputies, and providing for the prevention of certain animals running at large within certain prescribed limits of said City of San Diego, and directing the police to take charge of horses and teams found not tied within certain limits of said city.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. That there is hereby established a City Pound for impounding estrays, and the same shall be maintained in said city as a City Pound within the following described lands, viz: Beginning at the northwest corner of block number twenty-four, Bayview Home-stead; thence running east three hundred feet; thence south three hundred feet, thence west three hundred feet; thence north three hundred feet to the place of beginning, being in the City Park of said city, and being the premises heretofore and now used by said city for a City Pound.

Sec. 2. That there is hereby created the office of Poundkeeper. Before entering upon the discharge of his duties the said Poundkeeper shall give good and sufficient bond in the sum of one thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful discharge of his duties and said Poundkeeper shall receive for his services such fees as are hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. It shall be unlawful for any horse, mule, donkey, burro, ox, bull, cow, hog, pig, sheep or goat to run at large within the following described limits of the City of San Diego, California, to-wit: All that portion of said city known as Pacific Beach; all that portion of said city known as Reed & Hubbell's addition; all that portion of said city known as Whitney's addition; all lands lying within the exterior boundaries of the city cemeteries, whether improved or unimproved; all that territory described as follows: Beginning at the northwest corner of pueblo lot 255, and running thence southeasterly to a point where the south line of pueblo lot 1182 intersects the northeast line of pueblo lot 255; thence east to the southeast corner of pueblo lot 1192; thence north to the northeast corner of pueblo lot 1223; thence west to the southwest corner of pueblo lot 1227; thence north to the northwest corner of pueblo lot 1227; thence east to the east line of the pueblo of San Diego; thence northwesterly following said east line of the pueblo of San Diego to a point where the north line of pueblo lot 1245 intersects the east line of the pueblo of San Diego; thence southwesterly following the south line of pueblo lots 1275, 1274, 1273, 1272, 1270, 1268, 1267, 1266, 1265, 1264, 1263 and 1262 to a point where the south line of said pueblo lot 1262 intersects the east line of pueblo lot 1259; thence southwesterly to a point where the projected south line of pueblo lot 1262 intersects the shore of the Pacific ocean; thence running southerly following the shore line of the said Pacific ocean to the entrance of False bay; thence following the shore of said False bay to the point of beginning; all that territory described as follows: Beginning at a point made by the intersection of the bay shore with Noel street; thence along said Noel street to California street; thence along said California street to Henry street; thence along Henry street continued in a straight line to the brow of the hill on the south side of Mission valley; thence eastward along the brow of the hill to Utah street extended northward; thence in a direct line southward along Utah street continued to the bay shore; thence northwesterly along the bay shore to the place of beginning, excepting that this ordinance shall not apply to horses and teams found within the territory bounded on the north by the north line of "C" street, on the east by the west line of Eighth street, on the south by the south line of "L" street, and on the west by the west line of Fourth street.

Sec. 4. That the police of said city shall and they are hereby required to look after and take charge of any and all horses or teams found running at large within the limits of the excepted territory described in section 3 of this ordinance, and turn the same over to the Poundkeeper if not claimed by the owner within two hours.

Sec. 5. That the Poundkeeper in and for the City of San Diego be and he is hereby authorized to appoint two deputy poundkeepers, subject to the approval of the Board of Delegates.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person owning or having the control of any of the above mentioned animals to graze or pasture the same, or cause the same to be grazed or pastured within the limits of said city hereinbefore described, unless such animals are securely fastened so that the same shall not run at large within the meaning of this ordinance, provided that no such animal shall be picketed or staked out in such a manner as to permit it to cross or trespass upon any traveled street or sidewalk within the limits of said city hereinbefore described.

Sec. 7. Whenever the Poundkeeper of the City of San Diego shall discover or be notified by any person, that any animal or animals above enumerated are grazing, pasturing or running at large, or picketed or staked out so as to permit it to cross or trespass upon any traveled street or sidewalk, in violation of this ordinance, it shall be his duty and he is hereby directed to immediately take them in charge and put them in the city pound, and within twenty-four hours thereafter have three notices posted in three conspicuous places and one published in the official paper of the city for ten days, describing such animals or animal so impounded giving the marks or brand or other distinguishing points with the date of the posting of such notices, and unless the owner or owners thereof come and claim said animals so impounded within ten days from and after the date of said notices, and prove the ownership of said property, and pay all lawful charges thereon as hereinafter provided, said poundkeeper is hereby authorized and it is made his duty to expose said animal or animals for sale at public auction to the highest bidder for cash, and the proceeds of said sale, together with all fines, charges, fees and other expenses chargeable against said animal or animals, according to the schedule of charges hereinafter specified, shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Auditing Committee, together with a full description of the animal or animals sold as aforesaid, and the said Poundkeeper shall deliver to the purchaser of any animal or animals sold as aforesaid a bill of sale thereof, which shall vest the title of said property in the purchaser.

Sec. 8. The following charges and fines are hereby imposed for any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance: For any horse, mule, donkey, burro, ox, bull, cow, hog, pig, goat or sheep taken into custody by the Poundkeeper or any deputy of his, fifty cents; for driving any such animal to and placing the same in the pound, one dollar, and in addition the sum of fifty cents per day, not including the day in which such animal may be impounded, for keeping any such animal, and the further sum of one dollar for each animal that may be advertised, and 5 per cent commission on the amount of the sale, if any such animals are sold, all of which is hereby made a lawful charge against the owner or owners of any such animals impounded, and shall be a lien upon such animals for the payment thereof.

Sec. 9. All fees collected by the Poundkeeper under and in pursuance of the foregoing section, shall be retained by him, and shall constitute his full and only compensation for all services of every kind and description rendered by him as such Poundkeeper, his deputies and assistants, under this ordinance. It shall be the duty of such Poundkeeper to make a statement under oath to the Common Council of said city on the first day of every month, which statement shall be filed with the Clerk of said Common Council, and shall contain an itemized statement of the number and kind of animals taken into custody or impounded for the month next preceding the making of such statement, and shall also contain an itemized statement of the fees collected during such month, and from whom collected; the said city of San Diego shall be in no manner liable for any compensation to said poundkeeper, other than the fees herein provided.

Sec. 10. Should any amount remain in the custody of the city after deducting all expenses and charges herein provided for, the same shall be placed in the treasury of said city, to be paid to the owner or owners of said animals so sold on proper proof of ownership of said animals, but if not called for within one year from the date of sale by the owner of said animal or animals, the same shall be placed to the credit of the general fund of the city.

Sec. 11. That ordinance No. 216, approved June 29th, 1893, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 12. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and one publication in the San Diegan-Sun, the official newspaper of said city.

No. 226 of the Ordinances of said City, approved August 15th, 1873, as amended by Ordinance No. 279, approved December 27th, 1874.

And also that that portion of said "H" Street from the east line of Twelfth Street to the west line of Sixteenth Street, including all intersections of streets between said points (excepting such portions of said street and intersections as are already curbed with concrete or natural stone, and also excepting such portions of said street and intersections between said points as is occupied by a wooden bridge) be curbed with concrete in accordance with specifications therefor as contained in General Specification No. 7 of Ordinance No. 226 of the ordinances of said City, approved August 15th, 1873.

The City Engineer of said City having estimated that the total cost of said improvement will be greater than One Dollar per front foot along each line of said portion of said street so proposed to be improved as aforesaid, including the cost of intersection work assessable upon said frontage, It is hereby Determined and Declared, in pursuance of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, approved February 27th, 1873, that serial bonds shall be issued to represent the expense of said proposed improvement. Said bonds shall be extending for a period of ten years from their date, and shall be issued in the manner and form provided by said Act, approved February 27th, 1873; an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupons on the 2nd day of January of each year after their date, until the whole is paid, and said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal sum and interest are paid. Said interest shall be payable semi-annually on the 2nd days of January and July, respectively, of each and every year. The San Diegoan-Sun, a daily newspaper published and circulated in said City, is hereby designated as the newspaper in which this Resolution Ordering Work, and the Notice of said work, inviting sealed proposals for doing the same, shall be published in the manner and form, and by the persons, required by law.

The City Clerk of this City is hereby directed to post conspicuously for five days, on or near the chamber door of said Common Council, a notice with specifications, inviting sealed proposals or bids for doing said work, and said Clerk is also hereby directed to publish for two days, in the manner and form required by law, in the said newspaper designated for that

purpose as aforesaid, a notice of said work inviting sealed proposals or bids for doing the same, and referring to the specifications posted or on file. Said notices posted and published, shall describe said bonds and shall specify the rate of interest which they shall bear, in the manner required by law in such cases, and shall require that all proposals or bids offered shall be accompanied by a check payable to the order of the Mayor of said City certified by a responsible bank, for an amount which shall not be less than ten per cent. of the aggregate of the proposal, or by a bond for the said amount, and so payable, signed by the bidder and by two sureties who shall justify before any officer competent to administer an oath in double the said amount and over and above all statutory exemptions. Said Clerk is also hereby directed to publish this Resolution Ordering Work for two days, in the manner required by law, in said newspaper designated for that purpose as aforesaid.

An Ordinance to Prevent the Carrying of Concealed Weapons Within the City of San Diego, California, and Fixing a Penalty for its Violation.

Be it Ordained, By the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to wear or carry concealed upon or about his person, in this city, any pistol, slug shot, brass or iron knuckles, sand club, dirk knife, bowie knife, or other dangerous or deadly weapon. The Police Commissioners of this city may grant a written permission for a period of not exceeding six months, to any peaceable person whose profession or occupation may require him to be out at late hours of the night, to carry concealed deadly weapons upon his person, for his own protection.

Section 2. Every person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars, and in case the fine imposed be not paid, then the person so fined may be imprisoned in the City Prison of the City of San Diego, at the rate of one day for every Two Dollars of the fine imposed; provided, however, if it shall be proved from the testimony on the trial of any such case, that the accused was at the time of carrying any concealed weapon or weapons as aforesaid, a peace officer, or a traveller actually engaged in making a journey, or had a permit granted by the Police Commissioners of said city, as aforesaid, the accused shall be acquitted. Such persons, and no others, shall be deemed "travellers" within the meaning of this Ordinance, as may be actually engaged in making a journey at the time.

Section 3. Section 39, of Ordinance No. 19 of the Ordinances of said city, entitled "An Ordinance for the prevention of offenses against the peace, good order and health of the City of San Diego," approved August 23rd, 1876, and all Ordinances or parts of

Section 1. The Board of Public Works of said City, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to continue the present arrangement with William Gorres for the sailing of the garbage scow temporarily, until January 1st, 1895, Provided that such scow shall be taken out to sea and there dumped at least once every five days; And Provided Further that the garbage shall never be thrown overboard inside the whistling buoy. In case such garbage is thrown overboard inside the said buoy, there shall be deducted from the payment next made, to the parties entitled thereto, for the sailing of said scow, the sum of Forty Dollars for each and every time such garbage is thrown overboard inside said whistling buoy.

Section 2. The said Board of Public Works is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to procure a canvass for the use of the party or parties in charge of such garbage scow, and the said scow shall be kept covered and closed with such canvass, excepting when the garbage is being dumped into it from wagons.

Section 3. No person shall take out or dump, or cause to be taken out or dumped, the garbage scow used for conveying the garbage of this City, out to sea during the period on any day between sunset and sunrise.

Section 4. No person or company shall gather any garbage between the hours of 6 o'clock A.M. and 9 o'clock P.M. of any day, in that portion of said City having for its northern boundary the north line of "A" Street, for its southern boundary the Bay of San

Diego, and for its western boundary the west line of Third Street.

Section 5. Every person or company gathering garbage, shall keep the wagon used for that purpose closely covered while on any of the streets of said city, and shall thoroughly wash out the inside of the bed of such wagon immediately after the garbage is unloaded from the same into the scow, and before such wagon is brought from the place where unloaded.

Section 6. All dead animals taken out in the scow shall be opened, before being thrown into the sea.

Section 7. Every person violating any of the provisions of Sections 2, 3 or 4 of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding \$30.00, and in case the fine imposed be not paid, then the person so fine may be imprisoned at the rate of one day for every Two Dollars of the fine remaining unpaid.

The numbers used above, where their meaning is not shown to be otherwise by their immediate context, mean the number of feet which the points designated in the proposed new grade, shall be above the city datum line of levels, as fixed by ordinance No. 3 of the ordinances of said city, entitled "An ordinance establishing a datum line for the grading of streets in the City of San Diego, State of California, and providing for the manner of establishing grades by ordinance," approved June 30th, 1886.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and approval and one publication in the city official newspaper of said city, to-wit: The San Diego Sun.

Dare, and the San Diego Cable Railway Company, certain franchises for the purpose of constructing, laying down and maintaining a cable street railway in certain streets of said City, and along and upon Sixth Street from the north line of "L" Street to the center of "C" Street, and along and upon "C" Street from the center of Sixth Street to the center of Fourth Street, and along and upon Fourth Street to University Avenue, and along and upon University Avenue to the Park Boulevard in University Heights, thence along said Park Boulevard and Carolina Street to the north line of Adams Avenue in University Heights, being the streets along which the road and tracks of the San Diego Cable Railway Company are now laid; and by said ordinances required that the cars upon said cable Railway be propelled by wire ropes running under the surface of the streets and moved by stationary engines;

And Whereas, the said George B. Kerper purchased at Commis-

sioner's sale, on the 6th day of February, 1875, and is now the owner of the said Cable Railway and franchises granted to it and said David D. Dare, and said Electric Rapid Transit Street Car Company as aforesaid;

And Whereas, the said George B. Kerper desires to change the motive power of said Cable Railway and propel cars thereon by electricity, therefore,

Be it Ordained, by the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. The said George B. Kerper and his assigns are hereby authorized and permitted to propel street cars upon said railway by electricity conducted, carried or transmitted by wires or conductors over or under-ground, and may use the tunnel of said railroad for the purpose of operating with an under ground system for conveying the electric current, should it be found desirable to adopt such system.

Section 2. That the provisions of Ordinance No. 174 of the Ordinances of said City, approved August 3rd, 1872, shall control the manner of the erection of wires for conveying the electric current, except that where the track is laid on one side of the center of the street, poles with brackets may be used, set on one side of the street only.

Section 3. The said George B. Kerper and his assigns, are also authorized and permitted to lengthen any or all of the turnouts of said line, should it be found desirable to do so for the better operation of the line.

Section 4. That the work of changing the motive power of said railway from cable to electricity, shall commence within thirty days, and be completed and in operation within six months after the decision of the case now pending in the Supreme Court of this State, relative to the ownership of the Pavilion Grounds in University Heights at the Northern terminus of said railway.

Section 5. That none of the provisions of said Ordinances Nos. 34, 55, 92, 95, and 337, shall be affected by this Ordinance, except so far as the same are modified by the terms hereof.

Section 6. That the Common Council reserves the right to repeal, amend or modify this ordinance.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and approval, and one publication in the City Official Newspaper of said City, to-wit, the San Diego Sun.

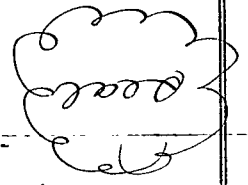

Ordinance No. —

An ordinance imposing a Ground Rental of fifty cents per annum for each pole for the suspension of electric wires erected or used by any person, corporation, or company in the streets, alleys, or public places in the City of San Diego, California, and providing for the payment and collection thereof.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. From and after the first day of January, 1896, every person, corporation, or company doing business in the City of San Diego, California, shall pay to said City for the privilege of using the streets, alleys, and public places thereof, the sum of fifty cents per annum for each and every pole for the suspension of electric wires, erected or used by any such person, corporation or company, in the streets, alleys, or public places in said City.

Section 2. Every such person, corporation, or company shall deposit with the City Auditor of said City, on the first day of January of each year, beginning with January 1st 1897, a verified statement showing the number of poles for the suspension of electric wires erected or used by such person, corporation, or company in the streets, alleys, or public places of said City, since the first day of January next prior thereto.

Section 3. The said Auditor shall copy and record said statement in a book kept by him for that purpose, and shall then file the same with the City Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to ascertain the correctness of said statement, or if none be deposited with him, he shall ascertain the facts, required by section 2 hereof, to be contained in such statement.

if the statement be correct, the Auditor shall furnish a memorandum of its contents to the City Treasurer of said City. If such statement be incorrect, or if no statement shall be deposited with the Auditor as required by said section 2. then the Auditor shall furnish the said treasurer with a memorandum showing the number of poles, as ascertained by himself, required to be contained in the verified statement provided for in said Section 2. The Auditor shall keep a copy of said last mentioned memorandum on file in his office.

Section 4. If any person, corporation, or company shall fail to deposit the statement as required by Section 2 hereof, or shall report therein a less number of poles than is required by said Section 2. the Auditor shall set forth such facts in the said memorandum, and the Treasurer shall collect from such person, corporation, or company at the same time with the payment provided for in Section 1 hereof, the sum of 25 cents in addition to the fifty cents provided for in said Section 1, for each pole of such person, corporation, or company failing to report, or if reporting, for each pole omitted from its statement.

Section 5. The payments provided for in Sections 1 and 4 hereof, shall be made to the City Treasurer of said City between the 20th and 30th day of January of each year, beginning with the month of January, 1897, and such payments when made shall be by the said Treasurer placed in the Park Improvement Fund of said City. The Treasurer must give a receipt to the person, corporation, or company making any payments hereunder, specifying the amount paid, and the year and number of poles for which payments are made.

Section 6. In case default is made in any payment as provided for by this Ordinance, the City Treasurer shall at once notify the Common Council of that fact, and upon being requested so to do by the Common Council, the City Attorney shall immediately commence and conduct the necessary proceedings in the proper court in behalf of the City for the collection of all amounts remaining unpaid.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval, and 2 publications in the *Dau Deegan-Sun*, the Official newspaper of said City.

After giving due notice. President Levi did in

open session sign an Ordinance giving George B. Kerper authority to use electricity as the motive power on the Cable railway franchise.

That the supplemental report of the Joint Water Committee recommending the making of a counter proposition to the Southern California Water Company for water and water works and also

That a Joint resolution rejecting the bids heretofore made and ordering the return of the certified checks accompanying the same, and also

That a Joint Resolution offering the San Diego Water Company \$500,000. for its city distributing system and pumping plant be adopted.

The report of the Joint water Committee as recommended by the Joint Committee of the Whole was read and adopted as follows, to wit:

San Diego Cal Oct 11 1895.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of San Diego

Gentlemen:- Your joint water committee, to whom was referred the bids of the Southern California Mountain Water Company and the San Diego Flume and Water Companies bego leave to report as follows:

We have thoroughly sifted all the propositions, and fail to find any one of them suitable to the requirements of or obtainable by the City, and therefore recommend

that all be rejected. He has now endeavored to arrive at a satisfactory solution by means of negotiations and counter propositions, but nothing tangible has yet been reached, and no report can be made on that point. It would be of value, in the meantime we recommend the adoption of the accompanying form resolution offering \$500,000 in city bonds for the purchase of a distributing system. We make them our reasons for recommending this offer it is necessary to refer to a few matters arising since the committee has had under consideration the bids of the Bauwages Water Company and Bauwages of the Southern California Mountain Water Company. The proposition of the Southern California Mountain Water Company was held in abeyance pending the report of the engineer on the estimate cost of the system under the proposition, and the proposition of the Southern and Water Companies were immediately taken up. The committee met with a request for delay, on the ground that the purchase of the Bauwages system by the Southern Company was recent that the officers of the latter company had no time to make a survey of the proposed conduit from Pine Valley to connect with the Plume. One day time was asked, but the committee granted two weeks, and the company took three weeks. At the end of that time, the committee not to receive the additional information requested from the officers of the Plume Company. He was met with a request for still further delay, for the purpose of allowing the Plume Company to place a pump at Pine Valley dam to handle the water while recreating for better. One day time was again asked for, and your committee granted two weeks, working to give the Plume company every opportunity to make good its proposition.

Your committee met again on the evening of Oct 9 to hear the result of the negotiations at Pine Valley. At that time a modified proposition was handed in, offering to sell to the city the Pine Valley reservoir and water rights with a 60-foot masonry storage dam, conduit from Pine Valley to the Plume line at Chocolate creek and the city distributing system for \$1,175,000 and \$15,000 annual rental delivered at Plume. Your committee recommended that this proposition be also rejected for the following reasons: Under the offer the city would receive less than 200 inches of water per foot per year; not counting loss by evaporation or otherwise; there is admitted to be threatened litigation regarding the water rights, with the prospect that the system would be damaged.

 right of way between Pine Valley and Chocolate creek. In brief, the
 proposition contemplated a system of utility, water, gas and meat
 factory that we cannot believe that the same company expected that
 it would receive serious consideration.

For the purpose of saving time during these days, your com-
 mitee on Oct 11th adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, that the committee agrees to recommend to the
 council the purchase of the plant of the San Diego Water Company for
 the sum of \$500,000 in 5 per cent. forty year bonds at par. Be it fur-
 ther resolved, that the committee make the offer to the San Diego
 Water Company, and that said company be requested to give notice
 of the acceptance or rejection of the offer by Wednesday Oct 9, 1895.
 at which time the committee will meet.

In pursuance of that resolution, the committee made
 such an offer to John D. Weeks as President of the San Diego
 Water Company and a copy of the resolution was incorporated in
 the letter to him for the express purpose of indicating that the committee
 intended to submit the matter to the Council.

At the meeting of the committee Oct 9, John D. Weeks handed
 his reply to the clerk, and the answer of the Water Company through
 its president was found to be an evasion of a direct reply, on the
 ground that the committee was not authorized to make such an offer.

Your committee recommends that the San Diego Water
 Company be given another opportunity to reply to a proposition
 from the city to purchase the distributing system. We recommend
 that the accompanying joint resolution be adopted, and that
 no proposition other than that contained in the resolution
 be made to or accepted from the San Diego Water Company
 or the San Diego Water Company, so any change will tend
 to delay the settlement of the water question.

Sec 1 That the City Treasurer of the City of San Diego, California, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to sell at public auction, to the highest bidder for cash, all that certain real property heretofore sold and struck off to the City of San Diego as the purchaser at the delinquent tax sale held in said city in the year 1894 for the delinquent city taxes thereon for the fiscal year 1893,
