Your Petitioner, Clark Mills \_\_\_\_\_ of Mashington County De. by this his petition in writing, represents and states, that he is a person loyal to the United States, who, at the time of the passage of the said act of Congress, held a claim to service or labor against Six male and five female persons of African descent of the names of Lettie Howard and her children Tilly Tow, Elick, Jackson, George and Enily; -Levi Thomas, Rachel Thomas, Ann Rofs, and "Thilip Reid", \_\_\_\_ for and during the life of said eleven persons, and that by said act of Congress said eleven persons were discharged and freed of and from all claim of your petitioner to such service or labor; that at the time of said discharge said eleven persons were of the aged of and of the personal description following : " viz: - Lettie Howard, 33 years old, color and of the personal description following: "rez: - Sette Howard, 33 years old, color black; short and thick set healthy : \_ her six children, Tilly, 10 years, Jow, 8 years, - Ellick, 6/2 years, Jackson, 5 years, - George, 3 years, - and Emily, 3 months old, all black color, sound and healthy; Levi Thomas, 59 years old, black color, one six feet high, a large leg sather thiff, but sound and in good healthe; Rachel Thomas, high the fe, they years old, mullatto color, healthy, very large, weight about 200 pounds; Ann Rols, 188 years, mullatto color, about five feet seven inches high, rather shin make, and his good health; - and Thelip Reid, aged 42 years, mullatto color, short in stature, in good health, not preposefing in appearance, but smart in mind, a good workman in a formery, and has been employed in that capacity by the Government, at one dollar and twenty fine cents for day. Now Petitienes is not aware that any of above possefs any noral, wental, a bodily infirmities that infair their value; and does not believe that any such exist; except that mentioned in regard to the stiff legof Levi Thomas.

That your petitioner acquired his claim to the aforesaid service or labor of said eleven in manner following: (2) Lettie Howard and her child Tilly were purchased from Peter Havenue Some Son 9 years for eight hundred dollars, and her five other children were bon strice. - Levi Thomas and his Wife Rachel, he purchased in Baltimore point the same time, and paid mine hundred and fifty dollars for them: - Ann Rofs he acquired by his Alife: - and Philip Reid he purchased in Charleston, S. C. many years ago when he was quite a youth. He bought him because of his evident talent for the forming business in which you Petitioner was engaged, and paid twelve hundred dollars for him. -His paper having been burnt some years ago, he has no record evidence of his title. persons, of his tille. ernment of the United States, and that the has not borne arms against the United States in the present rebellion, nor in any way given aid or comfort thereto.

And your petitioner further states and alleges, that he has not brought said eleven persons \_\_\_\_\_ into the District of Columbia since the passage of said act of Congress; and that, at the time of the passage thereof, said eleven persony were wee held to service or labor therein under and by virtue of your petitioner's claim to such service or labor.

Your petitioner further states and alleges, that his said claim to the service or labor of said eleven persons, does not originate in or by virtue of any transfer heretofore made by any person who has in any manner aided or sustained the present rebellion against the Government of the United States.

And your petitioner prays the said Commissioners to investigate and determine the validity of his said claim to the service or labor of said eleven persons herein above set forth ; and if the same be found to be valid, that they appraise and apportion the value of said claim in money, and report the same to the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, in conformity to the provisions of said act of Congress.
