

# Punctuation - 4 Run-On Sentences

Run-on sentences are independent clauses that have not been joined correctly. There are two main types: the comma splice and the fused sentence.

The **comma splice** has two main forms. The first is a run-on sentence joined by a comma alone, and the second is a run-on sentence joined by a comma and a word that is <u>not</u> a coordinating conjunction (the coordinating conjunctions are: and, but, or, nor, for so, yet).

## **Comma Splices**

## Revision

To revise a run-on sentence, you have four choices:

1) Use a comma and a coordinating conjunction.

Gestures are a means of communication for everyone, **but** they are essential for the hearing-impaired.

2) Use a semicolon. If using a semicolon, it can be accompanied by a transitional phrase. Gestures are a means of communication for everyone; they are essential for the hearing-impaired.

Gestures are a means of communication for everyone; **however**, they are essential for the hearing-impaired.

3) Make the clauses into separate sentences.

Gestures are a means of communication for everyone. They are essential for the hearing-impaired.

4) Restructure the sentence.

Although gestures are a means of communication for everyone, they are essential for the hearing-impaired.
