As the South Belt community rebuilds from the devastation caused by Hurricane Harvey, questions still persist about the City of Houston's permitting process.

According to the city's Chapter 19 Code of ordinances, residents will need a Floodplain Development Permit to repair flood damage if:

• They live in a floodplain. · The total cost to repair the house to pre-dam-

age condition is \$10,000 or more. Additional permit requirements apply if a

home is in a floodplain and the Floodplain Management Office determines the residence is "substantially damaged."

A house is considered substantially damaged if the damage to the home is such that the total cost of restoring it to its pre-damage condition equals or exceeds 50 percent of the pre-damage market value of the structure only (i.e., not including the land value).

For example, if a property's total pre-damage value (including both house and land) is \$200,000, but the structure alone is appraised at \$100,000, and repairs cost \$60,000, the house would be substantially damaged since repairs are more than 50 percent of the home value.

Options for obtaining a permit if a house is

· Submit an elevation certificate to show that the house is already in compliance with the Floodplain ordinance.

• Submit a repair plan that includes bringing the property into compliance.

· Appeal the substantially damaged determination with the Floodplain Management Office. The Houston Permitting Center has erected

a temporary satellite location at the Sagemont Church Annex, located at 11600 Hughes Road. This center is for flood repair permits only.

Harris County

There are fewer permitting regulations for South Belt residents living in unincorporat-ed parts of the county, as Harris County has no floodplain ordinance like the city.

Residents, however, are still required to obtain a permit before making any improvements (defined as a new structure, addition, renovation, repair or rehabilitation) to their homes.

Home buyout program continues

The Leader has received multiple inquiries about local home buyouts following the extensive flooding caused by Hurricane Harvey.

According to the Harris County Flood Control District, home buyouts are used by the district to reduce flood damages in areas hopelessly deep in the floodplain where structural projects (i.e. channel modifications or detention basins) to reduce flooding are not cost effective and/or beneficial

These are homes that were simply built in the wrong place, prior to the knowledge we have today of the boundaries of our floodplains and prior to building regulations imposed by the city and county on land development. The Flood Control District's Home Buyout Program does not provide immediate flood recovery assistance - its primary function is to help prevent future flood damages.

Funding

The level of activity in the district's buyout program is influenced heavily by the availability of federal funds to leverage the district's funds that support it.

By pursuing FEMA grants, the district leverages each dollar it spends into as much as two to four dollars to acquire and demolish homes that are at high risk of flooding in the future. Federal funding for home buyout has historically required local matching funds of at least 25 percent, although some grant programs are now paying up to 100 percent of eligible costs. In addition to matching funds, the District also funds certain expenses (such as some relocation costs) that are not covered by the FEMA grants.

It is important to note that, although some grant funds are made available after a disaster declaration, these buyout grants do not provide immediate flood recovery assistance. These programs typically take eight to twelve months after the flood event to even get started, and then may take place over a period of many years following a flood event. Buyouts are intended to prevent future flood damages.

Accomplishments

Since the District's voluntary buyout program began in 1985, more than 2,075 structures have been purchased with Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grants and more than 960 properties (with and without structures; 65 percent with) with district funds. Additionally, over 30 structures have been purchased with Corps of Engineers funds. As a result, more than 1,060 acres have been restored to their natural and beneficial function as a floodplain and millions of dollars in flood damages avoided. The South Belt-Ellington Chamber of Commerce, along with Harris County Commissioner Rodney Ellis' office, recently held a meeting to discuss the highlights of the state's recent Legislative session.

In all, 10,672 bills were filed during the 85th Legislative and special session. Of those, 6,631 were introduced; 1,211 passed; and 50 were vetoed.

Having attended a legislative update in Austin, Harris County Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Jo Ann Delgado discussed the bills that most impact the South Belt community.

House Bill 62 prohibits texting and driving. Prior to the bill's passage, Texas was one of just four states to not have such a law in place. A similar bill passed in 2011 but was vetoed by Gov. Rick Perry. Similar bills were introduced again in 2012 and 2013 but did not pass.

Utilizing a phone's map, listening to music on a device or using a cell to report a crime are all exempt from the law.

Penalties for first-time violators range from \$25 to \$99, while repeat offenders may receive \$200 fines.

Senate Bill 1913 amends the Code of Criminal Procedure and Transportation Code to revise provisions relating to the administrative, civil and criminal consequences, including fines, fees and costs, imposed on persons arrested for, charged with or convicted of certain criminal offenses. The bill provides for alternatives to the payment of those fines, fees and costs, such as waiving the payment, discharging the payment through community service or imposing a combination of the alternatives, due to the defendant's inability to provide the payment.

Senate Bill 1849, also known as the Sandra Bland Act, relates to interactions between law enforcement and individuals detained or arrested on suspicion of the commission of criminal offenses, to the confinement, conviction, or release of those individuals, and to grants supporting populations that are more likely to interact frequently with law enforcement. The bill requires jails to have 24-hour access to a mental health professional either on site or through a tele-mental health service, among other components.

Senate Bill 42 increases security for judges by expanding security reporting requirements and creating a judicial security division, among other measures. The bill is named in honor of state District Judge Julie Kocurek, who survived an attempted assassination outside her home in 2015.

Senate Bill 46 allows judges to use juror identification numbers when polling the jury.

House Bill 3051 relates to the categories used to record the race or ethnicity of persons stopped for, or convicted of, traffic offenses. The bill's passage brings the state up to the national standard.

Harris County in recovery mode

Harris County Commissioner Jack Morman introduced Judge Emmett who immediately declared, "What is the state of Harris County? It's recovery and return to normalcy. That's what

we're about, and we're going to be about that for some time to come."

Emmett noted that Harris County is different than any other county. There are almost two million people living in unincorporated areas, with no municipal government and no ordinance making power. He said, "When an event like this happens, the county can only do what the state allows it to do, because it is an arm of the state. If we're not going to make any fundamental annexation changes for the City of Houston, if we're not going to allow other cities to grow or incorporate, then the county has to have more tools to work with."

A success story by James Muecke

Many of you that have been around for many years know that each time there was a heavy rain event in Houston/Harris county. the first word was EDGEBROOK is flooded and then here came the Channel 11 van for reporting. This was happening for up to 50 years. During one rain event, then Mayor White reported at seven AM. Edgebrook was flooded. The flood waters lgebrook damaged vehicles for dumb

where, for a detention pond? This was fol-lowed by 8 more meetings and each time we made a little progress.

We had ditches de-silted, areas repaired and cleaned. A detention pond of about 26 acres was located at Richey and Hwy 3, then across the street from the HL&P facility on Shaver at Hwy. 3, about 23 acres. Both now completed. HCFCD has 95 acres on the south west side of Hwy 3 and Shaver street that is now under development. Berry Bayou had been concrete lined to The Gilpin street area and the C-106-08 was concrete lined from Shaver north up to South Houston. The trouble ditch. the BAS-TARD ditch, C-106-03 was the last ditch and Phase 2 was started in 2005, but due to circumstances, has not yet been completed. Phase 3 will begin once Phase 2 is complete.

Now the good news. Harvey dumped right at 45 inches on this area and yes many of us got flooded. That is a known. What then happened, how fast the wa-ter ran off. True, Sims Bayou received its share of flood water but Berry Bayou was able to easily drain into it. Monday morning the streets were sort of passable, but with additional rain they again filled up. Tuesday afternoon I did a drive around over the entire Freeway Manor subdivision and all streets were dry and the ditches may have had about 1/3 full but flowing. I asked home owners, how much water? 2", 29" and 4 feet on Avenell/Elton street. This was a hard hit area. So many homes flooded and this time, like mine, flooded. I have been in my house for 57 1/2 years. Around 2003/2004 the streets in the old section of Freeway Manor were rebuilt, lower, to act as a detention pond and this really helped.

So as devastated that this area is, the home owners were able to almost immediately get back to their homes to salvage what they could and clean up.

We still have two problem areas that have been discussed but no action taken. That is C-106-09, the boxed ditch between the city of Houston and South Houston. This ditch connects to Berry Bayou, next to Hwy 3 with a 90 degree connection. Water in Berry Bayou flows heavy not allowing this water to enter. There is a pipeline valve stetting at this location. Now what is important is that the City of Houston Rebuild Program is now designing new streets, drains, side walks water and sewer lines, again Avenell/Elton streets. Unless this location is redesigned homes will just continue to flood. The next location is where Berry Bayou meets C-106-10 by Gilpin street. Water in C-106-10 backed up and caused serious flooding along Gilpin/Hinds streets. This needs to be redesigned also.

So in closing, we feel this is a success story. We the community were persistent on getting this done and yes it took years. But working with all the various agencies working together, we can say we did good. In closing we do want to say a big THANK YOU to everyone over these many years that were involved and contributed. I have also sent this correspondence to all those over the 12 years that were involved in any way to make this happen. Others may want to follow our plan. These wonderful accomplishments do not come without a cost. This district has increased the dual credit opportunities for students, opened Early College High Schools at each Comprehensive High School and four years ago opened the Kirk Lewis Career and Technical High School. We begin with a rigorous curriculum at PK and are gradually converting our half day PK classrooms into full day so that our students are fully ready to start Kindergarten prepared to work on grade level. While these programs are challenging for a budget that has not been increased from the state in over 10 years and arguably has been decreased when considering inflation, the results of the Pasadena School System cannot be debated. When we look back on our careers, each of us is proud of our association with Dobie High School and Pasadena ISD. We look on with pride as each new principal of the Dobie campus has implemented new programs to provide a top quality education for our students. It seems each new generation of young people has greater opportunities from which to choose. We support strongly the direction in which Dobie High School and Pasadena ISD are heading.

That's why each of us also supports the upcoming Pasadena ISD election for its \$135 million "no tax rate increase" bond and its 13-cent tax ratification election.

To qualify for grants through FEMA, the following eligibility requirements apply · The property must be located in a community that participates and is in good standing in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and has a FEMA-approved Hazard Mitigation Action Plan.

The property's purchase

must be cost beneficial. A property is considered cost beneficial if the cost of acquiring and demolishing the property is less than the cost of the estimated future flood damages to the property.

 The property must have a current flood insurance policy to meet the requirements for certain types of FEMA grants, such as the Flood Mitigation Assistance grant program.

It is important to note that, although some grant funds are made available after a disaster declaration, these buyout grants do not provide immediate flood recovery assistance.

These programs typically take eight to twelve months after the flood event to even get started, and then may take place over a period of many years following a flood event. Buyouts are intended to prevent future flood damages

Home recently flooded? If a resident's home was recently flooded, they should do the following:

1) Submit a flood insurance claim (1-800-427-4661). A homeowner's insurance claim may also be necessary for damages not related to flood water.

2) Register for disaster as sistance (when available) with FEMA (1-800-621-3362) for any uncovered or underinsured items






