COMPONENT ONE

COMPONENT TWO

Community Development and Resilience to Violence

While the security and economic situation in Port-au-Prince neighborhoods creates significant challenges to community development, there remain several pathways, safe spaces, and anchors for peace. HCSP will leverage these opportunities to improve community resilience and create alternatives for those most at-risk by supporting these anchors to deliver community-based services and fostering inclusive dialogue led by peace and dialogue committees. Working with local partners and community leaders, HCSP will support residents working together to make their communities safer and strengthen youth resistance to recruitment into gangs and violent activities through mentoring, training, safe spaces, and increased livelihood opportunities. Most of these activities will be done through subgrants to local organizations and existing community groups in gang-affected areas.

COMPONENT THREE

Provision of Social Services for at-risk Youth and Survivors of Violence

While violence has compelled many service providers to leave Port-au-Prince neighborhoods, there are local organizations still functioning by adapting their service delivery to accommodate shifts in access and security. HCSP will partner with the Government of Haiti's National Committee for Community Violence Reduction/Disarmament, Demobilization, and Reintegration (CNDDR) to strengthen coordination of service delivery, while providing technical assistance and grants to enable existing providers to expand services. HCSP will strengthen CNDDR capacity to coordinate service delivery in targeted areas; provide tailored services to at-risk youth and victims of violence, as well as family members who are part of an individual's network; and expand services for survivors of sexual and gender-based violence and victims of trafficking.
