
From the living nightmare that is course registration to the terrible class schedules students manage to hodgepodge together, the pursuit of an art degree at UTRGV is riddled with tragedies.

These conditions don't promote learning and, especially, don't promote health. Vaqueros deserve their health to be a top priority when it comes to budgeting different departments.

UTRGV will have a \$45 million sports facility and will soon have a beer to generate additional revenue for Athletics to spread our "Vaquero Pride." But art students don't feel that pride. proper facilities and more classes in Brownsville.

It's not fun traveling to another campus at 7:30 a.m. and not getting home until 10 p.m., all because it was the only way the schedule would work.

Log in to ASSIST, go to course registration for Fall 2023 and input "ARTS" and "Brownsville." You'll find 33 classes. Then search for classes in Edinburg, and you'll find 79.

The Visual Arts Complex in Edinburg has its issues as well. Most of the students in that Let's make it clear we are not trying to sound ungrateful for the recent discussion with top administrators.

We want to thank Ed Pogue, director of the School of Art and Design; Jeffrey Ward, dean of the College of Fine Arts; and Janna Arney, executive vice president and provost, for creating a safe space for art students to voice their concerns and experiences earlier this month.

However, this progress, though slow and small, needs to continue. We ask that in the coming semesters, these issues aren't forgotten and that every social media post, flyer and voice raised doesn't go to waste.

To the art students calling for change, we see you, we support you and ask one thing of you: Don't let them forget.

An officer located and detained both individuals, who were entering the U.S. illegally, and released them to the U.S. Border Patrol. The nationality of the individuals was not immediately available.

3:28 p.m.: A male student reported being sexually assaulted by a man in Edcouch. The student does not wish to pursue criminal charges.

10:28 p.m.: Officers met with a staff member who reported a male staff member was following her around campus on multiple occasions in Edinburg. The case is under investigation, but the elements to a criminal offense have not been met. The case will be referred for administrative disciplinary review.

10:40 p.m.: An officer responded to Unity Hall on the Edinburg campus in reference to a female student reporting an unknown man approaching her and asking her concerning questions. The case is under investigation. **April 17**

4:57 p.m.: An employee at the UTHealth Houston, School of Public Health campus in Brownsville reported that a woman entered a secured building without consent and used the shower in the women's restroom. The Student Government newly Association's elected executive officers and senators took the oath of office during inauguration ceremony the last Tuesday in the Performing Complex Arts on the Edinburg campus.

The new executive team is composed of Odalys Anahi Saenz, who will serve as president, alongside Ihssan Omar Al-Qudah and Juana Elena Jimenez L., who were elected as internal and external vice presidents, respectively, for the 2023-2024 term.

The new term will begin at noon May 1.

Saenz thanked everyone who attended the inauguration and who voted for the executive team before directing her speech to the newly elected senators.

"I encourage you to embrace your roles with purpose, passion and dedication, but let's work together to create that bright future for our UTRGV community by leading with example in everything we do," Saenz said. "The student body has elected you to represent them by speaking on issues that affect students' everyday lives. Together, we will create a stronger voice for the student body."

Senate meeting

During the April 14 SGA meeting, Kimberly Escalante, vice president for Internal Affairs, said there are 30 new SGA members who are being ushered in for the upcoming ninth legislative season.

"Currently, we're just working on transitioning the new executives to the new roles, duties and responsibilities," Escalante said in her president's report. Elijah Gonzalez, senator-at-large for Edinburg, announced during the meeting that the Financial Affairs Standing Committee no longer has spring funds but summer funds are still available. The committee is also waiting on approval for its \$3,625 summer fund application.

"There are still opportunities for students to travel during their summer semester," Gonzalez said regarding SGA funds.

Joselyn Rodriguez, senator for the College of Sciences, spoke on behalf of Julianna Castillo, chair of the Campus Life and Community Affairs Standing Committee and senator for the College of Health Professions.

Let trans girls play sports

There is this constant argument of "unfairness" when it comes to allowing transgender girls and women to participate in sports teams that match their gender identity.

However, I think the same side that argues transgender people bring about this "unfairness' disregard the dangers and harm their uneducated argument has on the transgender community. Lia Catherine Thomas,

former University of Pennsylvania competitive swimmer, for instance, sparked controversy for being the first transgender woman to win an NCAA Division I national championship in March 2022. Critics who targeted her argued the trophy was stolen from the cisgender women who competed in the competition, claiming that her biological sex provided an unfair advantage. However,

her performance during her time on the women's team was not so different from when she had previously competed in the men's category.

The people who argue that transgender athletes have a significant advantage over athletes who identify with their assigned gender at birth forget that different factors contribute to wins. Hormone balances, muscle mass, and strength differs from person to person. Athleticism and

luck also play a big role in an athlete's performance.

Determining that someone will perform better in a competition solely based on their biological sex and physiology ignores the fact that it takes years of training to become successful.

This is why so many transphobic bans are being enacted: to promote the false narrative that transgender women have a clear advantage over cisgender women.

Another argument brought up by those who oppose transgender women playing in women's sports is that their participation will only hurt cisgender women. Yet, this only causes more policing of women's bodies, especially cisgender women. Allowing officials and lawmakers to enact restrictions in women's sports will only allow for gender policing and invasive tests that work to determine whether someone is too "masculine."

This type of policing stems from the racism and stereotype that some minority groups, such as Black women, are inherently more "manly" than women of other races. Just take a look at what happened with Serena Williams, who was constantly body shamed by the media for her physique and mocked by other players for it.

In the case of the transgender ban implemented by World Athletics, this also barred some cisgender women, such as Caster Semenya, a South African middle-distance runner and two-time Olympic gold medalist, from participating in certain races.





BPUB amendments on the ballot

As the May 6 municipal election in Brownsville approaches, two UTRGV political science professors said it might be difficult to find information about the propositions on the ballot.

Early voting for the May 6 General Election begins today and will run until May 2. Eligible voters will cast ballots for a new mayor, three commissioners and six amendments to the city charter, three of which are regarding the Brownsville Public Utilities Board.

Candidates for mayor are Erasmo Castro, a former member of the Brownsville Independent School District Board of Trustees; Jessica Tetreau, the current

District 2 city commissioner; John Cowen Jr., the current city commissioner At-Large "A"; and business owner Jennifer Stanton.

In the Commissioner At-Large "A" race, Susan Ruvalcaba, owner of Nurses at Mesquite Home Health; William A. Garza, a hotel night auditor; and Tino Villarreal, athletic director and head football coach at Saint Joseph Academy, are vying to be elected.

Incumbent District 1 City Commissioner Nurith Galonsky Pizaña is being challenged by Bryan Martinez, chief of staff for District 3 City Commissioner Roy De los Santos.

Running for District 2 City Commissioner is U.S. Army veteran Ernesto Lopez; Realtor Caty Presas-Garcia, and Linda Macias, a licensed professional counselor.

Charter Amendment Proposition A proposes the mayor's annual pay to be set at the rate of \$40,000 and city commissioners annual pay to be set at the rate of \$25,000. Currently, each member of the commission and the mayor receives \$10 per hour when they attend a meeting.

Charter Amendment Proposition B proposes to increase the city manager's maximum contract length from two to three years.

Charter Amendment Proposition C proposes the appointment of a city attorney to define the duties and powers of the office of the city attorney by adding section 21-A to Article V.

Charter Amendment Proposition D would allow a two-thirds supermajority of the city commission to appoint members to the Brownsville Public Utilities Board, having each city commissioner make a nomination to appoint to the board when a vacancy exists by virtue of a term-limit, resignation, death or other incapacity, according to the ballot.

Charter Amendment Proposition E proposes allowing a two-thirds supermajority of the city commission to remove three board members of the Brownsville Public Utilities Board in any 12-month period.

Alvaro Corral, an assistant professor of political science at UTRGV, said he is curious why Proposition E seeks to remove three members of the BPUB board.

"Why three?" Corral said. "... That's close to being almost half of the board, so that's a way to kind of really reshape the composition of the board in a particular way."

Charter Amendment Proposition F proposes to declare a Brownsville Public Board member's Utilities position, other than the mayor, who serves as a voting member of the board, vacant after continuously being absent four times from any regular meeting in a calendar year.

Mark Kaswan, an associate professor of political science at UTRGV, said the task of trying to find further information on the Brownsville charter amendments was impossible, which will most likely result in low voter turnout.

Kaswan said there are videos

of the city commission debating and deciding proposed charter amendments.

"I mean, the city, the Charter Review Commission, videos alone are like 10 hours of videos," he said. "I don't have time to watch that. I don't think the average voter has time to watch that. So it's very, very frustrating in other places, cities and counties and states that do this kind of thing."

Kaswan said the State of Texas produces "thorough and detailed analysis of constitutional amendment proposals along with arguments in favor and against and information about their fiscal impact."

"But the city doesn't do that," he said. "... [The] government [is] just not providing information, basic information, to voters about what they're voting on."

He said it is the responsibility of the state to give voters the basic information they need to make good decisions.

"Unfortunately, there's a lot of misinformation out there, as there seems to be in every election, so be cautious about who you get your information from, and that it is coming from an unbiased source," he said.

Corral said he recommends people to get informed by watching mayoral candidate forums.

Early voting locations will be available throughout the City of Brownsville from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. today until Friday, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. May 1 and 2.

Hidalgo County Drainage District No. 1 proposing a \$195M bond issue

With May 6 elections in local entities less than three weeks away, early voting begins today and ends May 2, with 24 polling sites across Hidalgo County.

The Annex Room located at 317 N. Closner Blvd. in Edinburg is the main early voting location in Hidalgo County.

improvements and expansions of these arteries and channels to mitigate potential threats from catastrophic flooding and protect lives and property, the Hidalgo County Drainage District No. 1 is proposing a bond in the amount of \$195 million for drainage infrastructure improvements in regional main arteries that serve our communities."

This election, the campus in Edinburg will not be used as a voting location.

"For this election, we do have a total of nine local entities elections that we will be administering," said Hilda Salinas, elections administrator for the Hidalgo County Elections Department. "They include McAllen ISD, Progreso ISD, Sharyland ISD, as well as the [cities] of Alton, La Villa, Mercedes, Peñitas, San Juan. and we also have a special election for the Hidalgo County drainage district."

On the ballot, voters will have the opportunity to address drainage issues.

The Proposed 2023 Drainage Bond Program presentation states,"To address critical infrastructure drainage

The proposed countywide projects would positively affect more than 81,095 structures in Hidalgo County, helping to protect more than \$17.8 billion in assessed property values, according to the presentation.

"The District has strategically worked closely with partnering cities within the County to identify and prioritize those projects that would have the greatest impact in expanding capacity drainage and addressing the most critical infrastructure improvements needed in the County's drainage the presentation system." states.

There will be a zero tax rate impact to Hidalgo County taxpayers, according to the presentation.

from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. today, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. May 1 and 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. May 2. On Sunday, the early polling locations are closed.

To request a mail-in ballot,

voters must be 65 years or older, have a disability, be confined in prison or jail with the right to vote, be out of the county during early voting or Election Day or if expected to give birth within three weeks of Election Day.

The deadline to request a mail-in ballot is Tuesday.

The Hidalgo County election website has links to see what is on the ballot before heading to the polls.

Starship despega, explota



El cohete de SpaceX, Starship, se encuentra en la plataforma de lanzamiento el martes pasado. Estaba programado para ser lanzado el día anterior, pero experimentó problemas técnicos. SpaceX lanzó el cohete el jueves por la mañana, pero el vehículo explotó en el aire unos cuatro minutos después del despegue.

El jueves pasado, personas de todo el país acamparon cerca de Texas Highway 48 y la Isla del Padre en previsión del lanzamiento reprogramado de *Starship* de *SpaceX*.

Habiendo cancelado su lanzamiento del 17 de abril debido a un problema de presurización, muchos tenían la esperanza de que este lanzamiento tuviera éxito.

Después del despegue, *Starship* experimentó complicaciones al separarse de los propulsores. La transmisión en vivo de *SpaceX* mostró

que el cohete giraba y luego explotaba después de volar durante unos cuatro minutos.

"El vehículo experimentó varios motores apagados durante la prueba de vuelo, perdió altitud y comenzó a dar vueltas. El sistema de terminación de vuelo se comandó tanto en el propulsor como en el barco", según el sitio web *SpaceX.com*.

"Como si la prueba de vuelo no fuera suficientemente lo emocionante, Starship experimentó desmontaje rápido no programado antes de la separación de la etapa", tuiteó SpaceX. A pesar de la explosión, SpaceX y su fundador, Elon Musk, reaccionaron positivamente, y SpaceX tuiteó, Con una prueba como esta, el éxito proviene de lo que aprendemos, y la prueba de hoy nos ayudará a mejorar la confiabilidad de Starship mientras SpaceX busca hacer que la vida sea multiplanetaria".

Fue el primer vuelo de prueba totalmente integrado con la *Starship* y el propulsor.

Los comentaristas de *SpaceX* consideraron un despegue desde la plataforma como exitoso, afirmando que cualquier información que aprendan ayudará a mejorar las construcciones futuras de *Starship*.

The Rider envió correos electrónicos a las relaciones con los medios de *SpaceX* para solicitar una entrevista, pero hasta el momento de prensa, no han respondido.

SpaceX continuó con un ensayo general húmedo.

Un ensayo general húmedo pone el cohete a través de cada paso de un lanzamiento sin lanzar el cohete.

El lanzamiento se reprogramó para el jueves pasado, y la ventana de lanzamiento de 62 minutos se abrió a las 8:28 a.m.

Ryan Lopez, capitán del equipo de *UTRGV Rocket Launchers*, ha estado siguiendo a *SpaceX* durante unos cuatro o cinco años y dijo que este lanzamiento es diferente de todos los anteriores.

"Este es el primer intento completo de lanzar *Starship*, que es la mitad

superior, y luego el propulsor, que es la separación inferior y más poderosa del cohete", dijo Lopez en una entrevista de Zoom el 18 de abril. "El refuerzo podría llevarte a la órbita de la Tierra, y luego eso volvería a bajar e idealmente podrías reutilizarlo".

Lopez dijo que esta es la primera prueba para el propulsor y *Starship* cuando antes solo había sido *Starship*.

"Para este lanzamiento en particular, quieren priorizar la puesta en órbita", dijo.

El cohete es un sistema de transporte totalmente reutilizable diseñado para transportar

Aprendí mucho para el El 17 de abril, cientos de espectadores y espectadores de transmisión en vivo se sintieron decepcionados después de que *SpaceX* canceló el lanzamiento de *Starship*, que estaba programada para despegar de Boca Chica a partir de las 8 a.m., debido a una válvula de presurización congelada, tuiteó Musk. Environmental consciousness in self-expression

"The Future of Fashion," the annual end-of-semester showcase by the UTRGV House of Fashion Club, explores the past, present and future all with the central theme of sustainability.

In collaboration with the Edinburg Cultural Arts division, the fashion show starts at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Dustin Michael Sekula Memorial Library as part of the *Día de los Niños, Día de los Libros* festival. Admission is free.

HOF is a student-based collective of art, fashion, music and culture for which student leaders organize fashion shows at the end of every semester, according to its website. The club regularly holds thrift sales on campus.

Maria Regina Montemayor, a business administration senior and HOF president, told The Rider the whole concept of "The Future of Fashion" show is about sustainability.

"We want to raise awareness for slow fashion and more sustainable fashion practices," Montemayor said. "We believe that you ... can have a lot of self-expression while still being very conscious about the planet. You don't necessarily have to buy the trendiest, newest thing all the time."

The fashion show is separated into three phases: the past, present and future. Each phase has outfits that depict what the future might look like to people during that time period.

"If you go back in time and if you were to have this conversation with somebody that was raised in the '6os, and you ask them, 'Hey, what does the future look like to you?' They're probably going to say, 'I see flying cars; I see innovative homes and robots and AI and PVC dresses," Montemayor said. "... If you time travel to our present and ... you ask your friends, 'Hey, what does the future look like to you?' [They're] probably gonna say, 'Oh, it looks scary. It looks post-apocalyptic. It looks like gas masks and chemical spills and war and famine.""

She said the present phase of the fashion show is more about what people can do today to help tomorrow.

"We're going to have our fashion designers bring out some models with designs that they have created out of unconventional materials," Montemayor said. "So, there's this one dress that's made out of bottle caps. There's another one that's made out of, like, smashed metal. Just, like, all these recycled materials to create these really cool reworked outfits, which is kind of where we're at today."

The show has 37 people helping and more than 20 models will be featured. Most of the models have an outfit in the three phases.

English junior and HOF creative director Zaiah Treviño told The Rider he is excited to show audience members the outfits, theme of the fashion show and also the message that it conveys.

"It's not only about the clothes and the fashion ... but it's also about the message we're trying to, like, put across about sustainability," Treviño said.

Describing the past phase of the fashion show as nostalgic, vintage and colorful and the future phase as melodramatic and neutral colored, Treviño said his favorite is the present phase since he has two outfits featured in it.

Treviño said one of the outfits he designed pulls inspiration from the Disney Channel show "Wizards of Waverly Place."

"The comic book dress that [Selena Gomez] wears, well, I'm doing, like, an interpretation of that but, like, with Vogue magazines," he said.

Joel Angel Garza, a civil engineering junior and model in "The Future of Fashion," is participating in two phases, the past and the future.

"I think [the fashion show] will be fantastic," Garza said. "Everyone [in HOF] has been putting in so much hard work ... and I can tell that the people putting it together are very dedicated."

Taking part in the show for the first time, Garza said he thinks diversifying his experiences is great for growing as a person and encourages students from all kinds of disciplines to do so as well.

"A lot of people think that engineers are unstylish or not good in the arts," he said. "But I want to change that point of view, and [show] that engineers can be stylish and they can be well-invested in the arts."



The UTRGV Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and 5x5 Brewing Co. have unveiled the rendering of the UTRGV Los Vaqueros beer can. 5x5 Brewing Co. will host a tailgate party to introduce the new beer to fans before the UTRGV Baseball Team's final home series May 12-14 against Grand Canyon University at the UTRGV Baseball Stadium on the Edinburg campus.

The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley Department of Intercollegiate Athletics has announced a new UTRGVbranded drink called Los Vaqueros beer.

The drink will be available at the UTRGV baseball final home series starting May 12 and in most Rio Grande Valley H-E-B food stores, Spec's, El Tigre and Total Wine & More locations, according to an Athletics news release issued April 12.

The drink will be served at restaurants and future UTRGV Athletics events where alcohol is sold.

Jonah Goldberg, senior associate athletic director of Communications & Championships, said in an interview April 17 the idea for a college-branded drink had been on their minds for a while.

'There were about 25 universities who had their own branded beer," Goldberg said. "And now it's in the 30 to 40 range. ... There just seemed to be a lot of potential to turn that into both a strong marketing and a strong revenue line."

He said as of right now, there is no projected revenue for the beer sales.

Goldberg said UTRGV is the first school in the University of Texas System to have its own branded beer.

"I like to look at New Mexico State, because they ve been in the western Athletic Conference with us the last few years," He said. "... Their initial sales were actually slow and the beer was only available by keg. That's not going to be an issue here, where we have it available by can as well as it will be on tap at some

restaurants."

Goldberg said such products expand the brand of the university as well as give UTRGV more exposure.

Seth Jones, associate athletic director of Revenue Generation, said they encourage responsible drinking.

"We're going to partner with L&F [Distributors] to provide Uber codes to all that are involved with the launch,' Jones said. "Our messaging throughout will always be to drink responsibly.

He said the drink would allow UTRGV to be present in ways it might not have been without it.

"Let's say we're at Walk On's [Sports Bistreaux] and they see this product and all of a sudden it's like, 'Hey what's going about 18 months ago to thank them for supporting them by having their beer available at their games. That is when the idea for a UTRGV-branded beer was first mentioned between them.

5x5 Brewing Co. is owned by six U.S. military veterans: George Rice (Army), Ray Franklin (Army), Marine Corps veteran and state Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa (D-McAllen), Jorge Gonzalez (Marine Corps), Sean Downey (Marine Corps) and Alex Gelman (Navy).

Rice described the beer as a blood orange Kölsch, saying it is a light beer with a citrus flavor to represent the Valley's history with citrus.

He said the alcohol content for the beer will range from 5.1% to 6.2%.

Rice said the can was designed by Sara Longoria, their graphics design artist who earned her degree from UTRGV.

"It was helped and assisted by people from UTRGV," he said. "This was a collaborative effort, pretty much everyone that had their hands in it were either alumni or affiliated or worked for UTRGV."

Rice said there are a lot of Easter

eggs in the overall design of the beer. "From the final product of the beer, from the intent of the beer, to the flavor profile, from the color of the beer,

everything was [with] UTRGV in mind," he said

Q: How does UTRGV compare to other track teams that you have run for?

A: "UTRGV compared to the last college I went to, it was a family there, but I feel more welcomed here. I feel like this is such a family and such a unit. We always lift each other up. We always put each other on pedestals. When someone does good, we all do good. We always cheer each other on, and I just love the support and the family behind the team.'



Last Thursday, people from across the country camped out near Texas Highway 48 and South Padre Island in anticipation of the SpaceX Starship's rescheduled launch. Having scrubbed its April 17 launch due to a pressurization

issue, many were hopeful that this launch would succeed.

Starship takeoff, After experienced complications separating from the boosters. The SpaceX livestream showed the rocket spinning and then exploding after flying for about four minutes. "The vehicle experienced multiple engines out during the flight test, lost altitude, and began to tumble. The flight termination system was commanded on both the booster and ship," according to the SpaceX.com website.

"As if the flight test was not exciting enough, Starship experienced a rapid unscheduled disassembly before stage separation," SpaceX tweeted.

explosion, Despite the SpaceX and its founder Elon Musk reacted positively, with SpaceX tweeting, "With a test like this, success comes from what we learn, and today's test will help us improve Starship's reliability as SpaceX seeks to make life multi-planetary."

Musk tweeted, "Congrats @SpaceX team on an exciting launch of Starship! test Learned a lot for the next test launch in a few months.²

It was the first fully integrated test flight with both the Starship and the booster.

SpaceX commentators considered a liftoff from the pad as successful, claiming any information that they learn will help improve future builds of Starship.

The Rider sent emails to SpaceX media relations to request an interview but as of press time, they had not responded.

On April 17, hundreds of spectators and livestream viewers were disappointed after SpaceX scrubbed the Starship launch, which was scheduled to take off from Boca Chica Beach beginning at 8 a.m., due to a frozen pressurization valve, Musk tweeted.

Road improvement plans raise frustrations within city commission

Frustrations surfaced during last Tuesday's city meeting when Brownsville District 1 City Commissioner Galonsky Nurith Pizaña raised concerns about traffic and lane closure in her district during a public hearing presentation from the Multimodal Transportation Department.

Edmund Haas, vice president and transportation manager planning for Freese and Nichols Inc., an engineering, planning and consulting firm, presented on the department's Land Use Assumptions and the city's Road Capital Improvement Plan, both of which require approval from the commission in order to move on with developing Capital Recovery Fees.

This would require onetime payments from new developers to fund the specific capital improvements, such as the construction or widening of roads.

After the presentation, Galonsky Pizaña said she represents a densely populated district, which encompasses the Southmost area, and it is difficult to access Expy. 77/83.

Last Thursday, the commissioner told The Rider that lane closure on Boca Chica Boulevard to extend water lines to the new water tower on Owens Street causes a lot of traffic congestion.

"Repairs in that area will continue for a while because then [the Texas Department of Transportation] is going to put raised medians, the same that you have right now on Boca Chica between Four Corners and the Frontage See BROWNSVILLE, Page 13

Edinburg City Council approves federal fund amendment



a reduction of \$750,000 from the last amended budget of \$1 million on improvements to City Hall, which is a current project. The \$750,000 will be moved to a newly added project, the emergency ambulance service.

Improvements to City Hall include modifications to existing offices to provide more space for additional staff. The timeline for City Hall improvements is April 2024. The timeline for all ARPA projects is 2026. Mayor Ramiro Garza Jr. asked if the projects in the budget list are flexible for allocations.

accessibility for people with disabilities to new city buildings, Mayor Garza called for a task force at the April 4 city council meeting.

"The purpose ... is to advise the city of different methods to appropriately address accessibility issues and recommend changes to provide accessibility to people with disabilities who live, work and visit the city," City Manager Myra L. Ayala said during the last city council meeting. City Secretary Clarice Yvette Balderas will be reaching out to local stakeholders, such as disability related organizations and self-advocates, UTRGV, Hidalgo County and school districts for recommendations on how to address the accessibility issues. Ayala said the city has already reached out to some stakeholders. The city will also have a task force to conduct a Utilities Rate Study in which the community will be able to provide their input in its process. "The task force was created with the purpose of being transparent and allow the community to have input in the process of developing and implementing any proposed utility rates," Ayala said. "The ... study is to assist in all operating costs in any projected future growth and See EDINBURG, Page 13

The Edinburg City Council has approved a resolution amending a proposed budget in the American Rescue Plan Act Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds program of 2021, which granted the city \$27 million.

The April 18 city council agenda

packet states that the city received the funds in two allocations of \$13 million, one in September 2021 and the second in August 2022. At the April 4 city council meeting, the budget list was tabled for further review.

Marissa Garza, director of the Grants Administration department, provided a presentation explaining the two budget changes. The first was

"Since we already have the funds, we do have to report on a quarterly basis," Assistant City Manager Tom Reyna said. "We have one coming up this month that we do have to show each expenditure [to the U.S. Treasury Department] expended.'

Marissa Garza clarified that if there is a project, which the city is not able to do on time, the expenses can be reallocated to or for another project as long as it is recorded in the budget list.

'Let's say we want to apply for a grant related to any of these projects, are we able to use some of these funds as a match?" Mayor Garza asked.

Marissa Garza replied yes. In response to a call for greater

of gender non-conforming people and those who are intersex, and poses a threat to women and minorities who are deemed not "feminine" enough.

I believe these attacks on transgender girls and women are used to disregard the discrimination and violence they continue to face.

On top of this, those who claim to be "protecting women's sports" do not work to stop the sexual harassment and abuse within women's sports teams and to close the gender pay gap. Trans athletes make up a very small percentage of the total number of student and professional athletes, so why come after a vulnerable group while ignoring an already vulnerable one?

acceptable forms of photo ID to present at the polling location: a Texas driver's license, Texas ID, Texas election ID certificate, Texas handgun license, U.S. citizenship certificate with photo, U.S. military ID card with photo and U.S. passport. For the full list of early voting locations and more information on the election, visit www. hidalgocounty.us.

"Now, if they don't have one of the seven approved IDs in the state of Texas, like if they do not possess or they cannot reasonably obtain one of these photo IDs ... people still can vote," Salinas said. "They will just simply fill out a reasonable impediment declaration. And they do need to show a copy or original ... of the following IDs: It could be the

certified domestic birth certificate or court admissible birth document."

It could also be the current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or it could be a government document with your name and address, including your voter registration certificate, she said.

To be eligible to register in Texas, voters must be U.S. citizens, be a resident of the county, be 18 years old, not a convicted felon and not be declared mentally incapacitated by a court of law.

Mark Kaswan, an associate professor in the UTRGV Political Science department, said voting is important.

"If we don't vote, then we have a political system that is controlled by the few," Kaswan said. "And the people who do vote, generally are people who are more privileged in our society. And they will vote in a way that defends their

At 8:11 a.m., Musk tweeted, "A pressurant valve appears to be frozen, so unless it starts operating soon, no launch today." After the scrub, SpaceX continued with a wet dress rehearsal.

A wet dress rehearsal puts the rocket through each step of a launch without launching the rocket.

The launch was rescheduled for last Thursday, with the 62-minute launch window opening at 8:28 a.m.

Ryan Lopez, team captain for the UTRGV Rocket Launchers has been following SpaceX for around four or five years and said this launch is different from all the others before it.

"This is the first full attempt at launching the Starship, which is the upper half, and then the booster, which is the lower, more powerful separation of the rocket," Lopez said in an April 18 Zoom interview. "The booster would

Kaswan encourages voters to do their research before voting.

be able to take you out into Earth's orbit, and then that would come back down and ideally you would be able to reuse it."

Lopez said this is the first test for the booster and Starship when before it had just been the Starship.

"For this launch, in particular, they want to prioritize going into orbit," he said.

The rocket is a fully reusable transportation system designed to carry crew and cargo to Earth orbit, return to the moon, and travel to Mars and beyond, according to the SpaceX website.

"Starship will be the world's most powerful launch vehicle ever developed and will be able to carry up to 10 people on long-duration, interplanetary flights," according to SpaceX.com. "Starship will also help enable satellite delivery, the development of a Moon base, and point-to-point transport on Earth."

Road. Pretty soon, they're going to start and put one in also from the Four Corners to the airport," Galonsky Pizaña said.

During the meeting, she said she did not see anything in the Thoroughfares Plan that would help alleviate traffic.

"The only thing you're adding there, in terms of the new capacity or the widening, expansion, is in Boca Chica towards the east to benefit SpaceX,' Galonsky Pizaña said during the public hearing's discussion period. "Yeah, they're important and stuff, but what about all of the residents who have lived here for a very long time?"

City Manager Helen Ramirez replied to the commissioner's concerns, saying that the plan in question is in response to new construction and capacity. Ramirez said the Mobility Plan will look at improving existing conditions.

However, Galonsky Pizaña replied that District 1 has "new subdivisions popping up" and that nothing is being addressed.

"How are we ever going to plan for

this density that's coming because we already see it coming," she said.

Ramirez and Mayor Trey Mendez asked that officials from the Multimodal Transportation Department meet with Galonsky Pizaña to discuss density and the Mobility Plan, which would accommodate not only thoroughfares, or streets, but pedestrians, cyclists and transit as well.

To ensure that future commissions use the money as intended, City Commissioner At-Large "B" Rose Gowen said it should be written down that funds should be used not only for roads, but for bike lanes and sidewalks as well.

"I like that we're talking about what the future growth is going to look like but one of the things that concerns me is it looks like we're still using the old maps," said Roy De Los Santos, District 3 city commissioner. "I know there are areas we already annexed ... but it doesn't look like we're showing that as inside the city limits yet.'

Haas agreed, saying the department should show the "latest" set of city limits.

The commission voted to approve the Land Use Assumptions and Road Capital Improvement Plan for the city. Galonksy Pizaña cast the sole "nay" vote. She said a more comprehensive outlook is required, after which De Los Santos said he believes the plan does take into account the "historic growth we've seen in these areas.'

"I don't think we've made any missteps here," he said. "I think we're right on track."

In other business, residents spoke during public comment in support of Rebekah Hinojosa, who was arrested Feb. 16, 2022, and charged with a class B misdemeanor for allegedly spray painting "gentrified" and "stop SpaceX" on the BTX mural downtown, which was paid for by Elon Musk, the company's founder.

"Once again, your constituents are here urging you to write a letter to [Cameron County] District Attorney [Luis V.] Saenz to drop the class B misdemeanor against me," Hinojosa said. "To make it easier, we have a draft letter for the city commissioners to review-not Trey Mendez-to review, sign your names and email it to the district attorney's office to drop the charge."

As previously reported by The Rider, Hinojosa said Mendez "publicly attacked" her by publishing her mugshot and employment information on his official Facebook page.

On Feb. 7, residents in support of Hinojosa delivered over 1,700 petitions asking for the city to immediately drop the charges against her and to investigate the mayor for abuse of power. At the April 4 meeting, over 200 additional petitions were delivered.

Mendez and the rest of the commission watched silently as Hinojosa handed the letter to City Attorney Will Treviño.

The commission does not take action or respond during meetings to public comments, so no response was given during the meeting.

The Rider called Mendez for a statement regarding the draft letter, but he declined to give a statement.

"I'm not interested in talking anything about that," he said. "There's way better stories to tell than that." --Rider Editor-in-Chief Verilu Infante contributed to this report.

In other city news, Daniel Vera, director of Information Technology, said the city began providing public high-speed internet access last Wednesday in the Dustin Michael Sekula Memorial Library, Janet Vackar Park, Sergeant Jacob De La Garza North Park and South Park.

In an interview with The Rider last Thursday, Vera said the city library already provides internet; however, there will now be broader coverage extending to the parking lot so visitors can access the internet in their cars.







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
