

Clinton Faces Daunting Odds

Texas, Ohio seen as must-wins to halt Obama's momentum

WASHINGTON | She's still fighting, but it's hard to find encouraging news for Hillary Rodham Clinton in the Democratic homestretch. She's behind in money, delegates and momentum. She's selling experience when everyone seems to want change. And all the cheering for the man who could be the first black president is drowning out any excitement for the first female.

Once deemed the nearly inevitable Democratic nominee, Clinton has now lost 10 presidential contests in a row as the battle heads for a March 4 showdown in Texas and Ohio - states she must win. By most measures, the New York senator is on the ropes.

"If she wins in Texas and Ohio, I think she'll be the nominee," former President Clinton said Wednesday during a speech to his wife's supporters in Beaumont, Texas. "If you don't deliver for her, I don't think she can be."

Rival Democrat Barack Obama won primaries in Hawaii and Wisconsin on Tuesday,



extending his winning streak and making him difficult to overtake in the remaining 16 races. Clinton hasn't won a contest since Super Tuesday on Feb. 5.

Helping keep her afloat,

however, is her thin lead among nearly 800 superdelegates, made up largely of party and elected Democratic officials - but some of those who once backed her have recently switched to Obama. (AP)

Lovell gave away some of the withdrawn money and blew some of it on gifts, but lost much of it on bad investments, prosecutors said. (AP)

Strokes Afflicting Younger Women

Study says obesity is to blame for spike in middle-age strokes

NEW ORLEANS | Strokes have tripled in recent years among middle-aged women in the U.S., an alarming trend doctors blame on the obesity epidemic.

Nearly 2 percent of women ages 35 to 54 reported suffering a stroke in the most recent federal health survey, from 1999 to 2004. Only about half a percent did in the previ-

 → The study means "we need to redefine our textbooks about strokes in women," because they may now be more at risk in middle age than men, Gorelick said. ous survey, from 1988 to 1994.

The percentage is small because most strokes occur in older people. But the sudden spike in middle age is ominous, doctors said in research presented Wednesday at a medical conference.

It happened even though more women in the recent survey were on medicines to control their cholesterol and blood pressure — steps that lower the risk of stroke.

Women's waistlines are nearly two inches bigger than they were a decade earlier, and that bulge corresponds with the increase in strokes, researchers said.

In addition, women's average body mass index, a commonly used measure of obesity, rose from 27 in the earlier survey to 29. They also had higher blood sugar levels.

Risk factors like smoking, heart disease or diabetes did not change enough between the surveys to explain the increase in strokes.

The study was led by Dr. Amytis Towfighi, a neurology specialist at the University of Southern California. Marilynn Marchione (AP)

Fighter Pilots Rescued After Planes Vanished

PENSACOLA, FLA. | Two fighter jets went missing during a training exercise over the Gulf of Mexico on Wednesday, but the pilots were later rescued, the Air Force said.

Eglin Air Force Base spokeswoman Shirley Pigott said the pilots were rescued after their single-seat F-15C Eagles disappeared Wednesday afternoon off the Florida Panhandle.

The Air Force has not determined if the planes collided or why they might have crashed. More than 60 Coast Guard personnel had been involved in the search using helicopters, cutters and jets, Coast Guard Petty Officer James Harless said. (AP)

McCain: Torture Bill Deserves Veto


Arizona senator says ban on waterboarding is already on the books

YELLOW SPRINGS, OHIO | Republican presidential candidate John McCain said President Bush should veto a measure that would bar the CIA from using waterboarding and other harsh interrogation methods on terror suspects.

McCain voted against the bill, which would restrict the CIA to using only the 19 interrogation techniques in the Army field manual.

His vote was controversial because the manual prohibits waterboarding — a technique that McCain also opposes — yet McCain doesn't want the CIA bound by the manual and its prohibitions.

"I was on the record as saying that they could use additional techniques as long as they were not cruel, inhumane and degrading treatment," McCain said. "So the vote was in keeping with my clear record of saying that they could have addi-

tional techniques, but those techniques could not violate" international rules against torture.

McCain spokeswoman Jill Hazelbaker noted that McCain believes that waterboarding is already banned by the Detainee Treatment Act of 2005, which includes an amendment he wrote barring inhumane treatment of prisoners. LIBBY QUAID (AP)

Calendar Puts Kink in St. Pat's Day

Some Catholic leaders want festivities moved because of Easter week

COLUMBUS, OHIO | That famous saint named Patrick will have his green-drenched party this year, but it's unclear when the guests are supposed to arrive.



Bishop J. Kevin Boland of the Diocese of Savannah, Ga., wrote to practically every agency in his city, from the Chamber of Commerce to the Board of Education, saying the diocese was changing the date of its celebration this year. In response, the citywide Irish festival was moved to Friday, March 14.

"The city has a very strong Irish Catholic community, a very traditional Irish Catholic community," said Bret Bell, Savannah's public information director. "They attend Mass regularly. And the last thing they want to do is get in the bad graces of the Catholic Church."

Philadelphia has also moved its parade date to avoid giving offense, and Milwaukee is hitting the streets sooner than usual, too.

But in Columbus, the Shamrock Club is going ahead with its March 17 parade, drawing protests from the local bishop. A handful of Irish-American politicians have lined up behind church leaders, breaking with tradition by refusing to march in the parade.

In New York and Boston, with legendary St. Patrick's events planned by the cities' large Irish communities, bishops are taking a hands-off approach, saying the church has no part in planning civic celebrations. MEGHAN BARR (AP)



Monitors: Pakistan Vote Was Fair

Opposition parties win enough votes to form new government



ISLAMABAD, PAKISTAN | Pakistan's opposition parties claimed that the elections would be massively rigged - then they won.

International monitors said Wednesday that the run-up to the vote was biased toward President Pervez Musharraf's allies, but polling day was basically fair.

"A level playing field was not provided for the campaign," said Michael Gahler, chief of the EU monitoring mission, noting that slanted state media coverage, restrictions on rallies and the arrest of hundreds of political activists were among conditions benefiting the ruling party.

"But on election day," he added, "voting on the whole was assessed as positive."

impeach Musharraf.

The result is seen as a major setback for the retired army general, who seized power in a 1999 coup and went on to become a key U.S. ally in the war on terrorism.

But even President Bush said the balloting, considered a key step in the Muslim nation's transition to democracy, appeared to be "fair."

So far, Bhutto and Sharif's parties have garnered 154 of the 268 contested seats – with just six results still to be announced, according to Pakistan's Election Commission.

The various parties already have begun discussions on forming a coalition government, likely to be led by Bhutto's party.

The new government, expected to be installed by mid-March. will determine how to tackle the country's formidable challenges, including rising prices and the threat from Islamic extremism. ROBIN MCDOWELL (AP)

U.S.: Disability **Unproven in Iraqi Women Bombers**

BAGHDAD | The U.S. military said Wednesday that two women used as suicide bombers in attacks earlier this month had undergone psychiatric treatment but there is no indication they had Down syndrome as Iraqi and U.S. officials initially had claimed.

Rear Adm. Gregory Smith said the women used in the Feb. 1 pet market bombings had been identified as residents from the northeastern outskirts of Baghdad who were in their late 20s or early 30s.

The two attacks killed nearly 100 people, and Iraqi and U.S. officials said at the time the women appeared to be unwitting attackers.

Lt. Gen. Abboud Qanbar, the chief Iraqi military commander in Baghdad, said soon after the attacks that photos of the women's heads showed they had Down syndrome, but he did not offer any other proof. BRADLEY BROOKS (AP)







Shiite Cleric May Lift Cease-Fire

Al-Sadr's threat not to renew pact sparks fears of more Iraqi violence

BAGHDAD | With deadly attacks against U.S. targets increasing around Baghdad, anti-American Shiite cleric Muqtada al-Sadr raised the possibility Wednesday that he may not renew a six-month cease-fire widely credited for helping slash violence.

The cease-fire is due to expire Saturday, and there were fears, especially among minority Sunni Arabs, that the re-emergence of al-Sadr's Mahdi Army militia could return Iraq to where it was just a year ago — with sectarian death squads prowling the streets of a country on the brink of civil war.

A surge of violence would also make it all the more difficult for Iraq's Shiites, Sunnis and Kurds to reach agreements on sharing power and wealth, and greatly complicate the debate in the United States on whether and how quickly to withdraw troops.

Rear Adm. Gregory Smith, a U.S. military spokesman, blamed Iranian-backed Shiite extremists for a flurry of rocket attacks — including one Monday against an Iraqi housing complex near the country's main U.S. military base that killed at least five people and wounded 16, including two U.S. soldiers.

Smith also said one American civilian was killed and a number of U.S. troops and civilian personnel were wounded in a rocket attack in the southeastern area of Rustamiyah Tuesday night.

On Wednesday, a U.S. soldier was killed and three were wounded in a rocket-propelled grenade attack in Mosul, the military said. In Diyala province, a suicide bomber killed seven people and wounded 17, an official said. PATRICK QUINN (AP)

Bush Visit Raises African Suspicions

In Ghana, president seeks to allay fears about military growth

ACCRA, GHANA | In a country teeming with resources the world covets, President Bush sought Wednesday to soothe African fears about American interests on the continent. He said the U.S. isn't aiming to make Africa into a base for greater military power or a proxy battleground with China.

The desire for Africa's vast raw materials — oil, gold, diamonds, minerals, crops and more — has a long and often violent and exploitative history.

That's especially true in this tropical, resource-rich nation on the shores of West Africa, the first place in sub-Saharan Africa that Europeans arrived to trade, first in gold, then slaves, and now the site of a new offshore oil discovery.

So it came as little surprise that Bush's talk about how U.S. generosity has made strides against disease and poverty encountered some skepticism here about the underlying American agenda. Some of

those questions arose during Bush's appearance at Osu Castle, the seat of Ghana's government.

With no prompting at a news conference, Bush sought to deal with suspicions about the creation of a new U.S. military command dedicated to Africa.

'Awakening' Uprooted to Md. Home Tests on

Gargantuan scultpure set as centerpiece for new National Harbor

After resting in place for nearly 30 years — if that can be said of a figure that eternally struggles to climb from the earth — the cast aluminum sculpture known as "The Awakening" left its home Wednesday from the southernmost tip of Washington's Hains Point.

With the assistance of three trucks, three cranes, one barge and a pair of small front-end loaders, the iconic sculpture was removed from its spot on national parkland in the District to be taken to a white sand beach on the eastern shore of the Potomac River.

The District's loss will be the gain of Prince George's County, where the sculpture now becomes the property of Milton Peterson, who plans to display it at his new National Harbor development.

Peterson bought the large figure last year from the Sculpture Foundation, which has held it at

On Tuesday, work crews arrived at the site to dig through a foot of wood chips and several inches of soil to get to the steel I-beams that anchored each of the five aluminum pieces of sculpture.

Using large 13/16 wrenches, they loosened each bolt by hand, to make sure they could be removed in the frigid temperatures Wednesday morning, when crews returned for the move.

The first crews arrived before 4 a.m., to begin detaching the five body parts from their steel anchors. The heaviest — the knee — weighs about 1,400 pounds, while the giant's right arm, which claws upward toward the sky, weighs slightly less. The hand and arm weigh the least — at about 600 pounds each, while the head is about 1,000 pounds, construction officials said. ANITA HUSLIN (THE WASHINGTON POST)

Tests on Slain Girls Inconclusive

WASHINGTON | The bodies of four young girls found last month in a southeast Washington rowhouse were so badly decomposed that investigators cannot determine exactly how the girls died, D.C. officials said Wednesday.

Mayor Adrian M. Fenty said the girls, ages 5 to 16, have now formally been identified as the daughters of Banita Jacks, who is charged with their murders and remains jailed. He also said officials are officially ruling their deaths homicides.

Chief Medical Examiner Dr. Marie-Lydie Pierre-Louis said investigators could not assign a cause of death for the four sisters because their organs were too decomposed. The oldest girl, Brittany, was identified through dental records. The other three girls — Tatianna Jacks, N'Kiah Fogle, and Aja Fogle, 5 — were identified through DNA comparisons to their mother. The updated forecasts come amid worry by Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke and his colleagues that the economy could continue to weaken, even after their aggressive interest rate cuts, according to minutes of private deliberations released

Probe: French Trader Acted Alone

Investigators say the suspect did not profit from fraudulent deals

PARIS | Investigators of a \$7 billion fraud at French bank Societe Generale say that the only trader implicated in the scandal acted alone.

Investigators also said Wednesday they found no evidence that there were any personal monetary gains made through the allegedly futures trader Jerome Kerviel.

In an interim report, internal investigators at France's secondlargest bank said procedures were followed correctly but they failed

to stop Kerviel,

31, who is accused of carrying out trades that forced the bank to mop up almost \$7.33 billion in losses.

"At this stage of the investigations, there is no evidence of embezzlement or internal or external complicity," according to a report by a committee charged with investigating the losses. "The investigations are continuing ... to cover a wider area than the activities of the author of the fraud."

The report said the bank failed to detect the fraud until January 18 because of a variety of effective concealment tricks allegedly used by Kerviel. Emma vandore (AP)


Dukes Vows to Change His Ways

Nats nix questions about his past on 1st day of spring training

NATIONALS | Elijah Dukes sat there, looked straight ahead, and spoke evenly about being a new man, sounding as earnest as anyone with all sorts of behavioral and legal problems in his past and present possibly could.

Dukes reported to Washington Nationals spring training Wednesday and took questions during a hastily arranged and limited-inscope news conference. The troubled outfielder gave his first public comments since June, when he was dropped off the roster of his previous team, Tampa Bay.

"I know I have to get it together

now," Dukes said.

His long list of misdeeds — including arrests for assault and for marijuana possession, paternity suits, and a threatening phone call to his estranged wife — were deemed inappropriate topics by the team.

Dukes, whose 3-year-old son Elijah Jr. was in the room, vowed that he has changed, thanks in part to the tough love and monitoring provided by the Nationals. That includes phone calls from first baseman Dmitri Young — who overcame his own woes to resuscitate his career last season with Washington — and time spent with special assistant to the general manager Barry Larkin, along with a full-time team employee who has lived with Dukes and speaks to him every day.

"I've been working on myself a long time, and I finally found a breakthrough," the 23-year-old Dukes said. "And from now on, everybody gets a chance to really see [what] the real Elijah Dukes is like."

In December, the Nationals traded promising young pitcher Glenn Gibson for Dukes, who hit .190 with 10 homers and 21 RBIs in 2007. The Nationals' hope is that he can avoid future mistakes away from the field and flourish on it.

"We're going to do everything we can to help Elijah Dukes as a human being and help him do the right thing, both in his personal life and on the baseball field," Bowden said. "He has tremendous potential. There's no reason why he can't be a 30-40 home run hitter." HOWARD FENDRICH (AP)


Yankees slugger knows he and his records will always be questioned

BASEBALL | Alex Rodriguez expects to be questioned repeatedly about drug use as he approaches Barry Bonds' career home-run record.

"Right now, the game is in a very not-trusting situation with our public, with our fans," A-Rod said Wednesday in his first remarks after arriving at spring training. "Some of the things that I've accomplished and potentially some of the things that people think I can accomplish, my name has come up and will probably come up again in the future."

Rodriguez, who signed a record \$275 million, 10-year contract to remain with the New York Yankees, won his third AL MVP award last season after leading the major leagues with 54 home runs and 156 RBI. The 11-time All-Star, who is 32, enters the season 17th on the career list with 518 home runs, 244 behind the record Bonds established last year.

A-Rod stated categorically that he had never taken steroids or human growth hormone. He

said he isn't worried about Jose Canseco, who has hinted without going into detail that he will make allegations against Rodriguez in an upcoming book.

"Last year, I got tested 9-to-10 times," Rodriguez said. "We have a very, very strict policy, and I think the game is making tremendous strides." Rodriguez also denied a claim last week by former Texas teammate John Rocker that doctors from management and the players' association told A-Rod, Rafael Palmeiro, Ivan Rodriguez and Rocker following a spring training meeting how to effectively use steroids.

"That did not happen," A-Rod said. RONALD BLUM (AP)

For Redskins, It's All on the D-Line

Washington will look for strong linemen at this week's combine

REDSKINS | The last time the Redskins selected two defensive linemen within the first three rounds of the draft was 1984. 
ing heavy attention.

Much could change between now and April 26, when the draft begins, with trades and signings. But Blache's preference would be to address concerns at tackle and end through the draft, league and team sources said, as the notorious taskmaster favors players he can bleed into his system and techniques. The Redskins former defensive line coach also traditionally has shunned big-name linemen in free agency.

The Redskins have not used a first-round pick on a defensive lineman since taking end Kenard Lang 17th overall out of Miami in 1997. Lang is the only defensive lineman the club has selected in the first round since 1992, and the last defensive lineman drafted by the Redskins in the top three rounds to actually make a significant impact with the team was Charles Mann in 1983 (third round).

But depth has been available in later rounds in recent years. Anthony Montgomery (fifth round) and Kedric Golston (sixth round) have shown the ability to play at this level since being taken in 2006. 
Maker of American History

Wrestler Josh Glenn has reached all sorts of milestones at AU

AU WRESTLING | While being honored during his last home match earlier this month, American University wrestling phenom Josh Glenn could have been reminiscing about becoming AU's first Division INCAA champion last spring. Or he could have been thinking back to his five years in Tenleytown - or his 102-12 record. Glenn, though, says he was simply thinking of his next match.

Five years ago, Glenn, then the fourth-ranked wrestler in the country, almost went elsewhere. There was tough competition to sign him, but in the end he chose to be an Eagle because of his coach. Mark Cody.

It was a big snag for Cody because Glenn has resurrected a struggling program. Since red-shirting as a freshman, he has won more than 100 matches, and he remains unbeaten in his last 35, heading into Thursday's dual meet at Binghampton (N.Y.), the last dual meet of his career.

Glenn has been the face of the

AU wrestling program for the past four years. Even though his time at AU is not quite over ("I feel I have a real good shot to repeat [at NCAAs]," he says. "That's what I am here to do - win."), he says he would like to continue to help the team off the mat once is career comes to a close.

Jordan called his team's effort against the Knicks "unacceptable." The Wizards already are going to struggle to beat good teams because of their injuries, so a home loss to a bad team really hurt.



Loss in Translation

In the foreign film category, English is a dead language

REGULATIONS | It's become the annual head-scratching rite of Oscar night. Without fail, the nominees for the best foreign language film are announced, and we stare at the TV in befuddlement. What are these movies? And why isn't (fill in the blank with the name of your favorite foreign film from last year) on the list?

If nothing else, a movie has to speak a foreign language to win. That is the rude awakening suffered by the artists behind "The Band's Visit," the understated, critically acclaimed comedy from Israel that was deemed ineligible by the motion picture academy because its characters conversed in English.

According to a clause in the Academy's rules for the best foreign

language film award, "the recording of the original dialogue track as well as the completed film must be in an official language of the country except when the story mandates that an additional non-English language be predominant."

Top among the other snubbed 2007 releases that join "The Band's Visit" in Oscar ignominy are "Four Months, Three Weeks, Two Days," the searing Romanian film that has received some of the best reviews in recent months and Ang Lee's "Lust, Caution" from Taiwan (Lee was purportedly the only Taiwanese national with a primary function in the production).

So how does the Academy arrive at its cockamamie list of five nominees? Each year, every country is invited to submit what it considers its best film, chosen by a jury or organization that "should include artists and/or craftspeople from the field of motion pictures." It is at this stage that "La Vie en Rose" and "The Diving Bell and the Butterfly" were out of the running, since France chose to submit "Persepolis," an animated film about life in revolution-era Iran. The Academy opted to nominate "Persepolis" as an animated film instead, invoking a clause that says foreign language award submissions may also be considered for other categories.

From the various countries' submissions, 63 movies were deemed to be qualified for this year's foreign language film Oscar. These were then screened by a Phase I committee, which consisted of several hundred Los Angeles-based Academy members who then whittled the 63 films down to nine. The short list of nine was cut to the final five by a Phase II committee, made up of 10 randomly selected members of the previous group along with 10 other "specially invited contingents" from New York and L.A. Craig Ferguson dares to get intimate with his night owl viewers


RELATEABLE | The format of CBS' "Late Late Show" is as routine as its name. There's a host at his desk, celebrity guests, the occasional skit, an opening monologue.

And yet, with Craig Ferguson originating his brand of shrewd silliness, this is an hour unlike other talk shows. Tune in Craig, you get a contact high. Which sure beats just watching TV.

The contact is almost physical at times: At key listen-up moments in his monologue, he moves in close to the camera and gives it a chummy swat, jiggling the picture. The effect is more than funny. It's almost like he's tapping your shoulder, replenishing a tactile connection.

During his show (weeknights at 12:37 a.m.), Ferguson is a kinetic cutup, loose-limbed and quickwitted. While he carries on, his face cycles briskly from wideeyed wonderment to sly knowingness, naughty flirtation with that expansive, charming grin.

The soothing Scottish brogue of his native Glasgow can take flight into an emphatic squawk, or the grand pronouncement that "it's a great day for America, every-


body!" That's how he starts each nightly monologue. Then a wisecrack explains why.

But, seriously, he does believe it's great. Smitten by America since first visiting as a teen, Ferguson was officially sworn in as a U.S. citizen earlier this month. He proudly shared video from the ceremony with his audience.

Most late-night hosts don't have much to say about who they really are. But on the air Ferguson is self-disclosive and deftly unguarded. Last February, he devoted a monologue to mark his 15th year of sobriety. In January 2006, an entire show paid tribute, with laughs and tears, to his dad, who had died the day before.

Of course, he generally dwells on not-so-weighty life issues, such as a recent meditation on moviegoing when he voiced plans to see "The Spiderwick Chronicles."

"I don't really know what a spiderwick is," Ferguson admitted. "I think it's a combination of Spider-Man and Wikipedia: He fights crime and gives you the wrong answer for everything." FRAZIER MOORE (AP)

sion of Johnny Cash's "Ring of Fire"? Well, done by Moorer, it sure does. She turns it into a dirge, making her fall down, down, down sound like an inevitable choice. Moorer's version of Cat Power's "Where Is My Love" is achingly pretty, while her take on her sister Shelby Lynne's "She Knows Where She Goes" is reserved, but triumphant.

But it's Moorer's playful side that really makes "Mockingbird" work. With some help from husband Steve Earle, she makes Ma Rainey's "Daddy Goodbye Blues" into a taunting good time, while Nina Simone's "I Want Some Sugar in My Bowl" becomes a sultry, countrified come-on.







A Vermont folk artist operates a chapel dedicated to dogs

Degas had his ballerinas, Monet his water lilies. For Stephen Huneck, inspiration comes on four legs its teeth dug into a stick, or tugging on a piece of rope, or playing on a beach.

The eclectic Vermont folk artist, who started out whittling wooden sculptures of dogs and now specializes in dog-themed furniture, woodcut paintings and children's books, has carved out a unique niche with his whimsical reproductions of Labrador retrievers and other dogs.

And his Dog Mountain studio and dog chapel - on a picturesque 175-acre hillside farm in rural northern St. Johnsbury, Vt. - have evolved into a kind of doggy Disneyland, drawing animal lovers and their pets from all over, and some to mourn.

To Huneck, dogs are more than man's best friend.

"I really believe they're the great spirit's special gift to mankind," said Huneck, 59. "Dogs teach us more than we teach them."

But his first lessons were tough ones. He was bitten by a German shepherd as a toddler, terrorized by a St. Bernard on his newspaper route as a teenager and left heartbroken once when his father bought a puppy for the family — but took it back to the pound the next day. "Through it all, I just loved dogs," he said.

A longtime antique collector, Huneck turned to art professionally in the early 1980s, using oldfashioned chisels, saws and planes to handcarve his first few canine creations. Much of the basswood, cherry, maple and pine he works with comes from his farm.

His woodcuts - dogs with halos, dogs peeking out from under bedcovers, dogs sniffing each other – brim with the playfulness of a 6-week-old puppy. His sculptures and furniture, meanwhile, range from his Angel Dog statues — a black lab with golden wings - to

look like dogs.

Dog lovers hound him for commissioned works. His client list includes actress Sandra Bullock (a dog sculpture wedding present for her husband) and Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.), whose Washington, D.C., office is decorated with Huneck art.

"I think, to describe his work to someone who has never seen it, you simply say 'You have to see it, I can't describe it to give it the credit it deserves," said R. Scudder Smith, publisher of Antiques and The Arts Weekly, in Newtown, Conn. "It is too full of fun, imagination and talent to put into words."

His books, including "Sally Goes to the Beach" and the new "Sally Gets a Job," feature woodcut prints accompanied by simple, pithy captions that celebrate man's unique relationship with dogs.

"Like a dog, he has no inhibitions," said Rob Hunter, gallery manager for Frog Hollow Vermont State Craft Center. "He goes

all over the place with his work. He has tapped into that playfulness you get with a dog."

The dog chapel grew out of a bit of inspiration after his 1994 hospitalization with Acute Respiratory Distress Syndrome. When he came out of it, he says, he had a vision.

"I kept thinking what a great thing it could be, for people not only to mourn the loss of a dog but to celebrate nature and their relationships with their dogs," he said.

Using wood harvested from his own property, Huneck modeled the one-room chapel after 19th-century Vermont churches. Completed in 2000, it has stained glass windows with images of dogs pieced into them.

The wooden pew-style benches in the main room have one-dimensional dog likenesses at either end that are so realistic. Huneck says. that live dogs sniff their bottoms.

Outside, a sign welcomes all: "Welcome all creeds, all breeds. No dogmas allowed." JOHN CURRAN (AP)

In a city where fashion sense has always played a distant second to staving warm, a cluster of boutiques in Anchorage's budding "SoNo" district, south of Alaska's only Nordstrom store, does a surprisingly brisk business in \$50 body lotions and \$180 designer jeans.

The homage to New York Citv's trendy SoHo district is just one of the many signs that this onceunruly oil-boom town at the edge of the American wilderness has been tamed.

In some respects, Anchorage could even be called sophisticated.

"Anchorage has really changed since I moved here 30 years ago," said Ellen Arvold, owner of the Out of the Closet luxury consignment shop, where leopard-print Prada

ballet flats and Louis Vuitton handbags are big sellers. "People don't think there's a market for us, but there really is."

Strip malls have replaced strip clubs, big-box stores draw more customers than bars, and residential

neighborhoods have supplanted the RV parks that once sprawled across the state's most populous city.

"Anchorage has kind of grown up," said longtime resident Charles Wohlforth, who writes the annual Alaska travel guide for Frommer's.

"It's left its adolescence and is becoming more of a mature city."

The tumultuous years of oil booms and busts in the 1970s and '80s have given way to two decades of steady growth, and Anchorage's economy has expanded to include burgeoning retail, health care and tourism industries.

The influx of non-oil, nonmilitary jobs has altered the city's demographics, making it less like a frontier town.

At one time, men far outnumbered women in Alaska. But in 2006, the city of 270,000 had 102 men for every 100 women, state demographer Eddie Hunsinger said. The ratio for the rest of Alaska was 108 to 100.

Leese Lloyd and Ashley Brusven, young baristas who grew up in Anchorage, said the notion that the city has an overabundance of men is an outdated stereotype.

'Where are they?" Brusven joked as customers in the adjacent New Sagaya City Market surveyed stuffed grape leaves, caprese, baklava and other un-Alaskan foods.

The city is also reshaping its modest skyline with a \$100 million museum expansion, a \$93 million convention center and a parking garage with room for 830 vehicles. Companies are putting up new hotels and glass-plated office buildings.

Development has its critics. Many Alaskans see Anchorage as increasingly out of sync with the rest of the state, prone to sprawl, traffic, crime and the other usual urban ills.

"Rural Alaskans have a lovehate relationship with Anchorage," said Stephen Haycox, a history professor at the University of Alaska Anchorage.

What they hate is that people in Anchorage don't have a good understanding of rural Alaska, which is a truly different world. But they love that Anchorage has neat things to buy and neat things to do." JEANNETTE J. LEE (AP)

With a new designer, Gap is determined to stage a comeback

Can the Gap be saved? The brand that helped lead America into a casual-clothing revolution has been foundering soullessly for years, beset by competition from stores such as Target and H&M, where people buy cheap chic as well as basics, and a denim market that's so saturated, there's no regaining the stronghold Gap once held.

Now Gap has a new head of design — Patrick Robinson, former artistic director for Paco Rabanne — and the company took the unusual step of presenting Robinson's first full collection during New York Fashion Week. Of course, the Gap has made previous forays into serious fashion, followed by a scurrying retreat to basic khakis and sweaters, something Robinson is all too aware of.

Before the presentation he said that Gap "had been pulled from side to side for different reasons" and suffered from "different leadership and different messages." Brian Tunick, a retail analyst with J.P. Morgan, said the Gap's sheer size (1,278 stores in the U.S. and Canada), and its attempt to be all things to all people didn't help either.

"They became so big while everyone else was becoming so

specialized," Tunick said. "And now they're trying to walk away from the teen customer ... and really go after that 25- to 35-year-old customer, which is what is in the stores right now. Although what's there is very basic, boring and safe."

Keeping those basics but banishing the boring and safe is what Gap hopes Robinson, who joined the label in May, can do. It is a balancing act that his predecessor from the fashion world — Pina Ferlisi, formerly with Marc by Marc Jacobs wasn't able to achieve: Gap's North American stores saw sales decline in all but two years since fiscal 2000; this year, sales are down 5 percent from the same period last year.

Robinson said the goal behind his fall/winter collection of layered classic pieces "was to take the classic, iconic heritage of the company and make it relevant by doing things [such as] slimming down the cargo pants, taking a peacoat and making it oversized or taking a Chesterfield jacket and shortening it into a bomber."

The collection has a ragamuffin-military vibe that squarely hits several of the season's trends. On the women's side were flared corduroy and denim pants that looked straight out of a Lenny Kravitz video, and slimmed-down and cropped cargo pants.

Tops and dresses were loose, with cute drop-waist dresses in faded plaids and airy, almost gauzy blouses. Outerwear included washed leather jackets and a short khaki trench.

For the men, in addition to khaki pants (slimmer-fitting, flat-front), there were suiting gray trousers, plaidaccented puffer vests, plaid button-front shirts, waffleweave cardigans and a jersey sweater hoodie.

For now, the tough economic conditions could give the Gap a boost, as more customers are looking to stretch their wardrobe dollar by buying spiffy basics. And that black shearling jacket with an empire line has just enough style to fit the bill. ADAM TSCHORN (THE LOS ANGELES TIMES)

TWO OF EARLEY'S previous books, "Family of Spies" and "Confessions of a Spy," focused on the John Walker spy ring and Aldrich Ames, respectively, American traitors who sold information to the Soviets. But for his latest book, subtitled "The Untold Secrets of Russia's Master Spy in America After the End of the Cold War," Earley sat down with Sergei Tretyakov, a former double agent who in 2000 defected to the States, becoming the biggest feather in the cap of U.S. intelligence since the fall of the Soviet Union.

Tretyakov approached you about this book, and he received no payment for telling his story. What was his motivation?

Hatred toward the Yeltsin and Putin administrations. And, I think, every person who changes countries wants

to explain his actions.

He arrived at your first meeting with a joint escort from the CIA and the FBI. What's in it for them?

I think they wanted to keep him happy, and I also think that, in Washington, one way you get promotions and recognition is by getting in the media ... particularly the people who worked in intelligence wanted the public aware that Russia is still spying on us, because all the emphasis now is on terrorism.

Tretyakov had been working as a double agent for several years. What was the last straw for him?

What was the last straw for him? The SVR, which replaced the KGB, planted a colonel inside the U.N. Oil-for-Food program. He helped steal \$500 million, and ... much of it went to the Yeltsin and Putin administrations. Sergei was trained as an intelligence officer, and although it's kind of funny to

think of some kind of moral outrage among spies, the idea of stealing \$500 million for people's personal benefit greatly offended him.

Tretyakov fingers Russian spies your book. Has there been any fallout in the intelligence community? I think there's been more fallout in the diplomatic community. ... He names names of people who

you still see on Russian television. He names people who are current officials at the U.N. and in the U.N. agencies.

The question is: Will anybody do anything about that? It's tough, because oftentimes it's Sergei's word against somebody who he says is a spy, because when you recruit somebody it's not done with a lot of documentation.

With all this Russian skullduggery, how do U.S. espionage efforts measure up?

Sergei claims that the KGB and the SVR are better than any other intelligence service, even today. And the reason he claims that is because he said that they are so cruel — that's his word — about mistakes. ... I think you'd have to be very naïve to think that there's not another Walker, Ames or [Robert] Hanssen right now, dealing with the SVR. GLENN DIXON


Tales From the 'Southside' HotTickets

DreamCity Theater tells a tragic story that hits close to home

STAGE | Thanks to gentrification and crowds of urbanites flocking to the Washington area, the D.C. police department seems to have a renewed interest in its job - you know, protecting and serving. Unfortunately, confusing drivers while following them closely with those non-emergency flashing lights isn't getting to the root of the problem.

Here's where John Muller, DreamCity Theatre Group founder and author of its latest offering, "Southside," thinks a little more digging and a lot less surface-scratching can help.

"A lot of the times we see on the news somebody got shot som-

perspective as opposed to the outside-in," explained Muller. In the play, 17 vear-old Rondell is confronted with the reality of spending the rest of his life in jail after killing the neighborhood bully.

Via interactions with a colorful range of characters — including a candy-pushing peer and a cellmate eager to teach him the ropes - Rondell and the audience must trudge through Rondell's past and present to contemplate what led him to violence.

According to Muller, "It's not always as easy as someone shot someone for a pair of shoes. Guilty." DARONA WILLIAMS (EXPRESS)





Reclusive cult figure Daniel Johnston is ready to get onstage

MUSIC | Satan seems to pop up a lot in the songs and drawings of Daniel Johnston. Perhaps that's not surprising, given the artist-musician's Christian upbringing and his years of sometimes debilitating mental illness. But it raises the question: Where's God?

"God's a bit harder to draw, you know?" answers Johnston.

Johnston has gone from smalltown Texas eccentric to renowned artist and revered musican over the course of his 47 years. His watercolors and felt-marker drawings are pointed, primitive and highly collectible. (Like, Whitney Biennial collectible.) And these works finance his pop-song habit, now in its third decade.

On Saturday, he'll bring his musical oeuvre to the Black Cat in a rare D.C. show.

It's hard to say whether Johnston's talent thrives because of his illness or in spite of it. It's easy to romanticize the myth of the "mad genius." Nevertheless, the off-kilter subjects and idiosyncratic observations that first took attentive indie types by storm with 1983's "Hi How Are You," released on a proper label in 1989, are not the work of a methodical mind.

When he first appeared on MTV in 1985, Johnston was hawking homemade cassettes on the streets of Austin. The low-fi treatment only heightened the poignance of songs addressed to crushes, superheroes, Casper the Friendly ghost, Satan, the Beatles and Marilyn Monroe.

So many objects of affection, but what would they say if they could sing back? Johnston has an answer: "They'd say, 'Danny, your dumb, stupid songs. Your songs are so stupid, but we love you.' I don't know. All those superstars were kind to us."

In musical circles, Johnston's a bit of a superstar himself. Kurt Cobain loved his music. Sonic Youth collaborated with him. Beck, Tom Waits and Conor Oberst covered his songs. And since the 2005 documentary, "The Devil and Daniel Johnston," they finally know him in Waller, Texas, where he lives with his parents: "Girls will say, 'There's that guy from the movie.' They recognize me in my hometown."


The film documents Johnston's long struggle with mental illness, his obsessions and the time he tossed a plane's keys out the window mid-flight.

Now, with good pharmaceuticals and his family's help, Johnston is stable and living off his creativity. BOB MASSEY

The Price of Sacrifice

Silver Spring trio the Jet Age poses provocative questions

LOCAL HEROES | Despite its inquisitive, somewhat accusatory title, the new album from the Silver Springbased group the Jet Age is not protest rock.

Instead, the 11 intelligently written, energetically performed songs on "What Did You Do During the War, Daddy?" tell the tragic story of a regular American husband and father who becomes a suicide bomber, along the way posing some difficult questions about political outrage, public indifference and personal sacrifice.

These are heady issues for a power-pop trio, especially one that hasn't been together very long. Following the break-up of local indie heroes the Hurricane Lamps, singer/songwriter/guitarist Eric Tischler and bass player Greg Bennett founded the Jet Age with Pete Newayser, a drummer of Her-

Daddy?" represents a great leap forward for the band: a dynamic combination of Bennett's melodic

bass lines, Newayser's thunderous drumming and Tischler's own spidery guitar work.

"I felt like I could write whatever I wanted to write and the band could handle it," says Tischler, describing the result as "a rock musical." Still. he notes, "I didn't want to make it heavy-handed. I think the songs, with very few exceptions, stand on their own completely."

The album was inspired by the singer's own frustrations with the current administration. Tischler, a husband and father himself, makes it clear that he does not condone the extreme measures taken by the album's protagonist, a loving family man transformed by his own outrage into a killer. "It's not advocating violence," he says. "That's just what happens in the story."

According to Tischler, the album simply encourages discussion, participation, and, as the title implies, a great deal of questioning.

"Some people do protest, and God bless them for trying. But I have the sense that it doesn't work anymore," he says. "So what do we do next? What do I owe my family to make the world better?"

A spirited album like this one sounds like a good start. STEPHEN M. DEUSNER

Who Am I This Time?

Sex, lies and identity collide in Alan Ball's 'All That I Will Ever Be'

STAGE | Some relationships are destined to be complicated.

For example, it rarely ends well when a duo's first encounter involves one paying for the other's services and, during the act, calling the self-dubbed Arabian prostitute "Osama" and other unmentionable epithets.

So it begins for the central pair in Alan Ball's "All That I Will Ever Be," currently taking up residence at Studio Theatre's Stage 4.

Omar (Carlos Candelario) sells phones during the day, but at night becomes Farouk, the Arabian Stallion, or Demetrius, the Greek God, or any other persona his male clients seem to want. With rich boy

slacker Dwight (Parker Dixon), it becomes different - after the initial awkwardness - and soon the pair find themselves bonding over their supposed shared loss and their common lack of identity.

As Dwight inveighs against consumerism, it's hard not to agree with Omar's assessment: "Sometimes ... it's like you're just farting words." Ball's script is filled with such clever one-liners and social commentary, despite its own propensity for navel-gazing.

Much of the play's energy focuses on Omar, and discovering the person beneath the half-dozen different nationalities and pasts he claims to his clients. Ultimately, Omar is a black hole of need who doesn't seek money so much as connection.

Unfortunately for him, it's as one older client says: "People don't pay your kind for sex. They pay you to leave." ERIN TROMPETER

The brights are on for III. indie-poppers Headlights' future

MUSIC | The tuneful Illinois indie trio Headlights is proving that indie inspiration can be made when heifers, not hipsters, are your main company. The group's just-released second full-length CD, "Some Racing, Some Stopping," shimmers with sparkling pop effervescence. It's all echoed guitars, zinging bells, breathy vocals and heady atmospherics.

That's the music. The lyrics, which deal with hardships like bad weather, leaking roofs and isolation, seem the product of good ol' country livin'.

"We live in a really old farmhouse that's not been up kept very well," explains singer-guitarist Tristan Wraight when asked about the discordant imagery in his otherwise rockin' new song "Market Girl." "When it rains heavily our ceiling leaks profusely."

But don't expect overalls and bare feet when the band plays Iota. Headlights has serious college crowd cred, since the band formed in the co-ed-friendly town of Urbana out of the late-1990s dream-pop

group Absinthe Blind. Back then, Urbana was an indie paradise, teeming with beloved bands like Hum, Braid and the Poster Children. When that scene dissolved, Wraight, keyboardist Erin Fein and drummer Brett Sanderson retreated to the cornfields, where their rural digs double as a studio.

"[We don't have] big studio compressors and all that fancy gear," Wraight says. "We just threw up some mikes in our house and tried to focus on what each song was supposed to be."

The band built some buzz by placing an early song, "Everybody Needs a Fence to Lean On," on an episode of TV's "Grey's Anatomy." But more recognition has come from hitting the road time and time again, says Wraight.

"The 'Grey's Anatomy' thing really didn't impact our show attendance."

"In towns like Buffalo, New York or Missoula, Montana, a lot of the development comes from being put on a bill that has local bands with a decent following. When you get that happening the first couple of times you go, you can then build on that pretty easily." TONY SCLAFANI

Out of Sight, On Gallery Walls

Chris Jordan captures the unsettling beauty of U.S. consumption

GALLERY | Chris Jordan's photography subjects sound like a gradeschool math problem: How many pennies would you need to stack to reach the moon?

Or how many plastic bags do Americans use in five seconds? Jordan shows a jumbled pile of 60,000. How many soda cans do we use in half a minute? More than 100,000, or enough to re-create Georges Seurat's "La Grande Jatte" using cans instead of paint.

Visualizing statistics is what Jordan's been doing since 2006, when he began his series "Running the Numbers: An American Self-Portrait." Walk up to one of Jordan's large-scale prints to see Pepsi bot-

tles or cigarette boxes. Step back and the image turns to visual mush an expanse of, say, white (15 million sheets off office paper, or five

minutes of consumption), or fleshy pink (Barbies, for the 32,000 breast augmentation surgeries performed monthly). "The kind of standard response is, "There's so many plastic bottles out there, if I use one, it doesn't matter," says Jordan. "And if I save one it doesn't matter, and my vote doesn't matter,' and so on. ... What I'm trying to do is reinforce this notion that every individual matters."

Jordan creates his images in Photoshop after shooting a small number of objects that represent whatever statistic he's working on. A single image takes from five days to a month and a half.


Yet the digital manipulation isn't the hard part. "The attitude I'm battling against in my work," Jordan says, "is that someone else is doing the consuming." RACHEL KAUFMAN

Artists in Exile

Spend an evening among the black expats in '20s Paris

OUT & ABOUT | Ever fantasized about kicking it with Langston Hughes in Paris during the height of the Harlem Renaissance? Or shimmying with Josephine Baker at some Left Bank bôite?

Well, this Saturday at the L'Alliance Française, you can act out those caprices as "L'Alliance and Lil SoSo Productions present "When Harlem Came to Paris," a swank cabaret that showcases some of the city's top talents channeling five Harlem Renaissance figures.

Dancer and writer Holly Bass will portray Baker; R&B singer Ne'a Posey will channel Billie Holiday; writer Jade Foster will play Zora Neale Hurston; singer and keyboardist W. Ellington Felton will depict Langston Hughes; while Dr. William E. Smith will play the part of Duke Ellington.

Dorothy Tene Redmond will host the soiree by representing Harlem socialite Mamie Manson, a character from Chester Himes' novel, "Pinktoes."

The cabaret is the brainchild of events producer Risikat Okedeyi, who first got the idea last June while browsing through L'Alliance Française's library. "They had a whole section on African-American cul-

ture," Okedeyi remembers. "We all know that the French colonized parts of Africa, so the African history books didn't surprise me. But I was really impressed by the African-American section."

Barely scripted, most of the lines from the characters will be improvised. Also, partygoers — who are encouraged to dress in '20s and '30s attire — will intermingle, dine and drink cocktails with these historic figures. "The actors have a great deal of license. They'll all be tasked to do research and find their inner person. It's not a 'Sit down and watch people perform' type of thing," Okedeyi explains. "The idea is for it to be a party and for people to have a good time."

Still, there are some erudite intentions. "I want people also to understand that it wasn't always fun to be black in Paris. While it was a lot better than being in America, there were still some challenging elements in Paris that black artists had to deal with," Okedeyi says.

She also wants to connect the Harlem Renaissance with what she sees as a new artistic renaissance in today's black Washington community. "[When Harlem Came to Paris] is my way of saying, 'This renaissance that we're mimicking is happening here right now." JOHN MURPH

But the shiny pop collective famously assembled by Simon Cowell in his mad scientist mode had, if not an off switch, at least a dimmer. Sure, no one in the group could sing but Mels C (a lot) and B (a little), but ballads such as "Too Much" and "Viva Forever" are tightly

constructed and tenderhearted, and the ladies really sold their vulnerability — well, except for Posh — to their questing tween fanbase.

Which is no slam on frothy pop, which, luckily for the Spice Girls, has timeless appeal. Musical trends come and go, but even when Death Cab for Cutie becomes oldies radio fodder, the timeless sparkly pop of "Say You'll Be There" and "Wannabe" won't have aged a bit.

As for Baby, Posh, Mel C, Ginger and Mel B: As long as they can squeeze into those little outfits, we'll be there. Arion berger (express)

The Art of Dreaming

'The Cinema Effect' at the Hirshhorn brings sleep to waking life

MUSEUM | Surrealism took a fair stab at the iconography of sleep. But "Dreams," part one of the Hirshhorn's "The Cinema Effect: Illusion, Reality, and the Moving Image," puts the curio-cabinet pictures of Dalí and Magritte to shame.


Dalí knew motionlessness hamstrings dreamworld explorers — hence his contribution to Hitchcock's "Spellbound." Translating the tropes of paintings into a cinema set piece did not, however, take full advantage of what's already an oneiric medium.

Blackening its second-floor spaces and indicating the path

with arrows projected on the floor, the Hirshhorn takes us from the banal yet captivating voyeurism of John Giorno snoozing through Andy Warhol's "Sleep" all the way to Michael Bell-Smith's unsettling "Up and Away," which slips flat video game backgrounds vertically past one another, sucking the eye endlessly into depths that don't exist.

A number of projected pieces insert the viewer into the picture. Entry to the show is through the backlit blood-orange curtain of Douglas Gordon's "Off-Screen," an elegant piece of low-tech theatrical magic that makes a show of the shadows of people who have gone before.

Shadow becomes sculpture as bodies carve the haze-filled space between projector and image in Anthony McCall's "You and I

Horizontal." It's an Apollonian laser show, with still frames of hardedged geometric plots intersecting the figures passing through.

Dreams normally evaporate on awakening because the brain's memory-making processes don't convert the workings of the nighttime imagination into anything you can keep. In other words, dreams are real, they just don't last. The piece that best walks the tightrope between experience and evanescence is Stan Douglas' "Overture," a looping trip along a mountain railway that reinforces itself with the next frame as the last slips from view.

It's been almost four years since the 'horn invited visitors to forgo a decent night's rest with its tribute to Gordon's "24 Hour Psycho." Although "Dreams" doesn't require sleep deprivation, you could do worse than to go when your head is light and your stomach's in freefall.

Two hours should do it. You can dream as long as you like. Glenn dixon

Slow and Steady Stars

Art-rock veterans the Chinese Stars stay the course

MUSIC | The road to success is a bumpy one for most indie bands, and sometimes even the best are left penniless along the way. But for singer Eric Paul and his bandmates in the Chinese Stars, going for broke has become a lifelong pursuit.

The Providence, R.I.-based spazz-punk outfit originally featured ex-members of Arab on Radar and Six Finger Satellite bands whose uphill trajectories won them significant art-rock status but fleeting fame.

When Radar disbanded, it never occurred to Paul not to pick up and start all over again. "I don't know what else to do with my life but write songs and make records," Paul says.

The Chinese Stars grouped,

then regrouped, losing bassist Richard Ivan Pelletier but gaining keyboardist V. Von Riici, who augments the group's spirited rock sound with electronic low-end and sweeping synthesizers.

The re-org may be to blame for why the Stars haven't set sail in a while. The group is only now touring in support of "Listen to Your Left Brain," released way back in March 2007.

But overall, Chinese Stars are

content with their place — literally. "[Providence] is a very supportive community," Paul says. "But it doesn't have a lot of music industry, so touring is the only way to make things to fall into place. Still, it has ruined me financially. ... And a few phone companies may still be after me." Haunted Kingdom

The Danish cult TV series rises from the dead on a new DVD

DVD | Something is afoot at the Kingdom, the largest and most technologically advanced hospital in Denmark. Every night, an ambulance pulls up to the ER, then vanishes. A patient hears a girl crying in the elevator shaft. A phantom hound roams the basement. Blood runs from pipes and walls. An old woman holds séances in the neurosurgery ward.

These goings-on add an air of

creepiness to "The Kingdom," the Danish television series directed by Lars Von Trier, who would go on to make "Dancer in the Dark" and "Dogville."

The series, which aired in 1994, has gained a sizable cult following in the United States, despite the epically bad 2004 remake written by Stephen King. The second series aired in 1997, but is only now being made widely available on DVD, in a twodisc set with commentary tracks and a fascinating documentary.

Owing a great deal to the films of David Lynch, "The Kingdom" turns an average hospital into a sinister

haunted house. The grainy film stock and bad lighting give the halls and offices an ominous atmosphere, washing out all the actors so they appear profoundly fatigued.

At times, "The Kingdom" appears to be shot in black and white, although the main color is a dark reddish brown that looks like dried blood. The second series cleans this up a bit, with a sharper picture and a slightly wider color palette, but the shaky handheld camera remains.

What comes through in "The Kingdom" more than in most of Von Trier's films is his sense of humor, which ranges from the slapstick to the grotesque (in the form of a disturbing man-baby). Then there is Dr. Stig Helmer (Ernst-Hugo Järegård), a Swedish doctor with a withering disdain for Denmark and a baroque sarcasm for anyone who dares to question him.

Sadly, Järegård's death in 1998 meant the third installment of the trilogy would never be filmed, leaving the story eerily open-ended. STEPHEN M. DEUSNER

The Endless Party

After 20 years, Cashmere Jungle Lords still raise roofs

MUSIC | "When we were starting out," says Dominic Carpin of Richmond's Cashmere Jungle Lords, "we used to do every opening gig with the mentality that we're gonna blow the headliner off the stage." Early victims included the Fleshtones, who were billed as "the world's greatest party band."

This Saturday, after 20 years, both bands reconnect for another showdown. But the Jungle Lords come armed with "Oodjie-Boodjie Night-Night," a CD reissue of their early vinyl. It captures the Jungle Lords in their original configuration — young, hungry, wild and weird.

"We were just driven," says Carpin. "We were convinced that if we put our noses to the grindstone and gigged a lot that we could get signed and make it big in music. We had the passion to create coupled with the sheer enjoyment of the live performance. It was energizing, exciting."

And not to be. The band scored college radio hits and scorched a path through the punk and party circuit. But its singular mashups of punk, exotica, surf and swamp befuddled the money men.

We were convinced that if we put our noses to the grindstone ... we could get signed and make it big."

"My whole career, A&R guys said, 'You don't have a specific trip so we can't market you.' But I was never gonna go write 15 songs that all sound the same," says Carpin. Now that stubborn eclecticism has paid off. "The whole new realm I've gone into is licensing and publishing. I've got three different co-publishing deals on the table." Cashmere Jungle Lords songs have been placed in shows on MTV and Oxygen, and in NBC's "Friday Night Lights."

And finally Carpin can afford to memorialize the work of Sean Sumner, the band's original drummer. "He hung himself in a jail cell in Cambridge, Mass., 12 years ago," says Carpin. "He got arrested trying to go see Sparklehorse. Mark Linkous was a friend of ours when we were all living close to the bone. He'd come by and hang out, drink whiskey and have fun."

Which is the spirit Carpin plans for Saturday. "The Cashmere Jungle Lords promise a raucous dancehall party. It's gonna be a lot of fun." BOB MASSEY





Popping at Cork

The wine is flowing at Logan Circle's new tribute to the grape

NEIGHBORLY | That sound echoes all evening at Cork, Logan Circle's new wine bistro worthy of celebratory bottle opening. It is also a refreshing change of pace to hear wine being uncorked the old-fashioned way amid the current crop of establishments that employ the latest in Enomatic decanting and gadget-enhanced services.

Co-owners Diane Gross and Khalid Pitts have taken great pains to ensure that the experience at Cork is entirely va de vi ("all about the wine").

Their addition to the scene is focused entirely on the on the old. Look for old world wines (from France, Italy and Spain) as well as old-school pours. Over the course of the process, they've come up with a true novelty for today's contemporary oenophile: tradition.

"We spent a lot of time in Paris a while back and fell in love with the wine bars," said Gross. "We wanted to bring that atmosphere back with us and make it a part of our neighborhood. We also want to demystify wine, especially wines from the countries that they originated."

Cork is a neighborhood bar where everybody knows your name, a romantic hideaway and a chic hotspot where meeting people is part of the exploration of wines. The bar is designed for conversation, with wine serving as the jumping off point.

"Walking into our bistro should be inviting," said Pitts. "You'll see people in three piece suits, people in jeans, and everone feels welcome."

It also offers a drinking tour of Europe at a modest price. For budding aficionados who want to get better acquainted with each region, Gross and Pitts offer instructional flights: trios of wines served atop sheets of paper with little biographies under each glass.

A chenin blanc flight ascends from notes of citrus and apple to a tangy astringency. The cab franc flight transitions from ripe and tannin-rich to round and grassy.

Chef Ron Tonaka, former sous chef of CityZen and Citronelle, brings a warm sensibility to the menu. Pan-crisped brioche sandwich of prosciutto and fontina, topped with a Path Valley egg is ideal for sharing. And the cheese and charcuterie selections are carved at a country kitchenstyle wood cart.


The dining room feels like a converted factory space that has been softened with cottage-style furniture and amber lighting. Upstairs, you'll find a quiet loft, appointed with a handful of small tables and exposed brick walls. Around the back, the "chef's room" features an enormous bay window that overlooks the kitchen.

"We want to create a community here," said Gross. "We also want to bring old, classic service back." Look for wine tastings in the upcoming months, as well.

Also, a series of wine classes wil be offered to further educate Washingtonians in the varieties, the intricacies and the communities that are released with the pop of a cork.

Added Pitts, "It's that level of detail that makes everyone feel at home." Christopher Correa
