Reagan Flight Rules Eased

WASHINGTON | In welcome news to Washington-area commuters, airline passengers soon will no longer have to remain seated for the 30 minutes before landing and after takeoff at Reagan National Airport.

The change is part of a sweeping overhaul of the 2-year-old Homeland Security Department announced Wednesday by Secretary Michael Chertoff.

Proclaiming the department "open to change," Chertoff unveiled plans to centralize his agency's terror analysis, put a higher

priority on bioterrorism and step up detection systems in mass transit.

He said it was time for the 30-minute rule to be eliminated because he is confident that other security measures in place, such as hardened cockpit doors and better screening, make it unnecessary. The rule was put in place after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

The elimination of the rule won't happen immediately, Chertoff said, but will begin shortly after the agency issues security directives to airlines. (AP/TWP)

Discovery Lift-Off In Limbo

Faulty gauge delays shuttle's return to space indefinitely

CAPE CANAVERAL, FLA. | A fuel gauge that mistakenly read full instead of empty forced NASA to call off Wednesday's launch of the first shuttle flight in 2½ years, a bitter disappointment to the space agency in its bid to recover from the Columbia tragedy.

The launch was delayed until at least Saturday, and the postponement could last much longer depending on the repairs needed.

Shuttle managers said it was unclear whether Discovery could be fixed at the pad or would need to be returned to the hangar for more extensive repairs. They expected to have a better idea on Thursday.

A similar problem cropped up intermittently during a fueling test of Discovery back in April. The external fuel tank, along with cables and other electronics, were replaced, and even though NASA could not explain the failure, it thought the problem was resolved and pressed ahead with launch.

At a news conference of grim-faced NASA officials, deputy shuttle program manager Wayne Hale defended that decision. "We took no risk," he said. "We're not flying with this."

The seven astronauts had barely climbed aboard for their journey to the international space station when NASA halted the countdown. Until then, the only threat to NASA's first mission since the 2003 Columbia disaster was thunderstorms. (AP)

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

No Direct Defense From Bush for Embattled Rove

WASHINGTON | President Bush passed up a chance Wednesday to express confidence in senior aide Karl Rove in a political fight over a news leak that exposed a CIA officer's identity. The lack of endorsement surprised some White House officials who had been told Bush would back his embattled friend.

Rove's lawyer, Robert Luskin, later asserted that Rove had "cooperated fully" in the federal investigation, had done nothing wrong and was ready to provide additional information to a special prosecutor if needed. "This is a serious investigation," Bush told reporters after a Cabinet meeting, with Rove sitting just behind him. "And it is very important for people not to prejudge the investigation based

Rehnquist Treated for Fever

Retirement questions swirl as chief justice recovers at hospital

WASHINGTON | Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist has been hospitalized with a fever, a setback that fueled more retirement speculation about the 33-year veteran of the Supreme Court.

The 80-year-old Rehnquist was taken by ambulance to Virginia Hospital Center in Arlington, Va., on Tuesday night and was admitted for observation and tests, Supreme Court spokeswoman Kathy Arberg said Wednesday. She would not release other information, includ-

ing his condition.

Despite having thyroid cancer, Rehnquist has maintained a regular work routine and defied expectations that bad health would force him to leave the court.

Rehnquist has a tracheotomy tube that helps him breathe. He has been undergoing chemotherapy and radiation since October for thyroid cancer. The illness led to a five-month absence from the bench, although he continued working at home and at the court during his convalescence.

The chief justice has refused to say if he plans to retire, telling reporters camped outside his house last week: "That's for me to know and you to find out." GINA HOLLAND (AP)

Limited Abuse Found at Guantanamo

WASHINGTON | Military investigators examining alleged abuse of prisoners at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, say they found treatment such as leashing a terror suspect and forcing him to behave like a dog. But they say they found no evidence that there was torture or that senior leaders imposed faulty interrogation policies.

A few individual interrogators are facing punishment, but a recommendation by investigators to admon-

ish the former prison commander because of the treatment of one prisoner was overruled by a general.

In all, the findings track what the Bush administration has said, and what military self-investigations have found: The excesses with prisoners were the work of a few mid- or low-level personnel acting beyond their authority, investigators assigned to look into FBI agents' allegations of abuse said in Congressional testimony Wednesday. (AP)


DHS Chief Plans Agency Overhaul

Shake-up to refocus department on terror analysis, detection

WASHINGTON | Proclaiming the Homeland Security Department "open to change," Secretary Michael Chertoff on Wednesday announced plans to centralize his agency's terror analysis, put a higher priority on bioterrorism and step up detection systems in mass transit.

The overhaul aims to spur the sluggish bureaucracy beset by turf wars and growing pains, and to ensure that department resources are directed to the nation's most vulnerable areas.

"We will be straight forward. If something goes wrong, we will not only acknowledge it, we will be the

first to fix the error," Chertoff said.

Pressure on Arroyo Mounts As 40,000 Stage Protests

With coup rumors swirling, as many as 40,000 people staged a "people power" protest Wednesday to demand the resignation of Philippine President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo. A close ally of Arroyo said the president will never resign but admitted the monthlong political crisis over allegations of vote-rigging is potentially explosive. About 700 troops attended the service at Bagram air base. Many of the troops at the memorial cried as a slide projector flashed photos of the 11 on a screen. (AP)

Children Killed in Iraq Bomb Attack

Suicide blast occurs as U.S. troops hand out candy, toys to kids

BAGHDAD, IRAQ | A suicide car bomb exploded next to U.S. troops handing out candy and toys, killing 18 children and teenagers Wednesday. Parents heard the shattering explosion and raced out to the discover the worst — children's mangled, bloodied bodies strewn on the street.

Up to 27 people were killed by the blast in the Shiite Muslim neighborhood, including an American soldier. At least 70 people were injured, a newborn and three U.S. soldiers among them.

Children's slippers lay piled near the blast crater not far from a crumpled child's bicycle as blood pooled in the street.

Twelve of the dead were 13 or younger and six were between 14 and 17, said police Lt. Mohammed Jassim Jabr. Among the wounded

was 4-day-old Miriam Jabber, cut slightly by flying glass and debris. "There were some American troops blocking the highway when a

U.S. Humvee came near a gathering of children," said Karim Shukir, 42. The troops began handing out candy and smiley-face key chains.

"Suddenly, a speeding car bomb...struck both the Humvee and the children," Shukir said.

The slaughter of so many Shiite children is likely to raise tensions further between the majority Shiites and the minority Sunni Arabs, the foundation of the insurgency.

At Kindi hospital, where many victims were taken, a distraught mother sat cross-legged outside the operating room. "May God curse the mujahedeen and their leader," she cried, referring to the insurgents as she pounded her head with her fists in grief. QASSIM ABDUL-ZAHRA (AP)

At Least 71 Die in Kenyan Violence

NAIROBI, KENYA | At least 71 people were killed in two attacks, one by Ethiopian bandits on a village in Kenya and the second an apparent revenge killing by Kenyan tribesmen, police said Wednesday.

Ethiopian bandits attacked villagers in the remote Turbi area, kill-

ing 45 civilians, many of them children, in a reported raid Tuesday.

The attackers were said to have lingered the whole day, killing anyone on sight because security forces were slow to respond, according to the Catholic Information Service. (AP)

Israel Seals Off Part of Gaza Ahead of Pullout

KISSUFIM JUNCTION, GAZA STRIP | Israeli troops on Wednesday sealed off a cluster of Gaza Strip settlements marked for evacuation to stop the influx of hard-line pull-out opponents, in the government's most sweeping measure yet to prepare for next month's pullout from 25 settlements.

Settlers responded defiantly, threatening to block roads throughout Israel and to step up other demonstrations in protest. Several attempts to stop traffic Wednesday afternoon fizzled.

Also Wednesday, Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon ordered a relentless hunt for the leaders of Islamic Jihad, and Israeli troops reoccupied the northern West Bank town of Tulkarem in response to a suicide bombing that killed four Israeli women in the resort town

Pakistan Collision Kills 128

'Gruesome' train crash is country's worst in years

GHOTKI, PAKISTAN | Three trains crashed in a deadly chain-reaction after a train driver misread a signal in southern Pakistan early Wednesday, killing at least 128 people and injuring hundreds more in the country's worst crash in more than a decade, police and railway officials said.

The nighttime accident jolted passengers awake to a horrifying

smash-up that left metal, glass and body parts strewn across a remote railway station near Ghotki. Rescuers frantically cut through twisted metal to reach survivors, as ambulances and buses ferried the injured to nearby hospitals.

Bodies of victims were wrapped in white cloth and piled together. "It is a very gruesome situation," local police chief Agha Mohammed Tahir

said. He said 128 people had died. Abdul Wahab Awan, general manager of Pakistan Railways, blamed the driver of the night-coach Karachi Express for misreading a signal and rear-ending another passenger train.

The initial crash derailed at least three carriages where they were struck by the third train, causing further derailment, said Abdul Aziz, a senior controller at Pakistan Railways. SHAKEEL ADIL (AP)

Police Seek Bomb-Plot Mastermind

British probe widens as officials search for suspected terror leader

LEEDS, ENGLAND | Police pursued what they suspect is a mastermind behind London's terror attacks, raiding a home Wednesday and widening their search to a new area. The top law enforcement official suggested the bombers were "foot soldiers" intent on causing mayhem.

Wednesday night's raid in Aylesbury, some 40 miles northwest of London, resulted in no arrests but police were searching the house, Scotland Yard said.

Details emerged Wednesday about the lives of the suspected bombers, one of whom was only 19 years old. But authorities suspect-

ed the four attackers — including at least three Britons of Pakistani descent — didn't work alone, and that their collaborators or leader were likely still at large.

"These foot soldiers who have done this are only one element of an organization that is bringing about this kind of mayhem in our society," Home Secretary Charles Clarke, the country's top law enforcement official, told the British Broadcasting Corp.

In London, police continued to search through evidence from close-circuit TV footage and the grisly scene where the blasts ripped apart three trains and a bus. In the city of Leeds, home to a large Muslim community, police searched for evidence in sealed-off neighborhoods where three of the four suspects lived. THOMAS WAGNER (AP)

London's Muslim Community Fears Growing Backlash

LONDON | More than 100 alleged revenge attacks — including the killing of a Pakistani immigrant — have been reported since blasts in the heart of London now blamed on four young Muslims from Britain's Pakistani community.

With fears of backlash growing, leaders like Prime Minister Tony Blair urged Britons not to judge all Muslims by the acts of those inspired by a "perverted and poisonous misinterpretation" of Islam. Police increased protection in Muslim communities.

In Nottingham, a man of Pakistani roots was reportedly beaten to death on Sunday.

Among other incidents, anti-Muslim graffiti has been found on mosques and other buildings. (AP)

Ebbers Gets 25 Years in Prison

NEW YORK | Weeping in court as he learned his fate, former WorldCom boss Bernard Ebbers was sentenced to 25 years in prison Wednesday for leading the largest corporate fraud in U.S. history.

It was the toughest sentence imposed on an executive since the fall of Enron in 2001 touched off a record-breaking wave of business scandals.

Even with possible time off for good behavior, Ebbers, 63, would remain locked up until 2027, when he would be 85.

The sentence came four months after Ebbers was convicted of over-seeing the \$11 billion WorldCom fraud — much of it a pattern of chalking up expenses as long-

term capital expenditures, which are classified as assets.

Ebbers leaned forward in his chair and cried, sniffing audibly, after Judge Barbara Jones of U.S. District Court in Manhattan read his penalty. ERIN MCCLAM (AP)

BRAC May Worsen Traffic

Regional study shows Pentagon base plan will add traffic to area

WASHINGTON | A new study released Wednesday projected a 2 percent reduction in public transportation trips if the Pentagon decides to move jobs away from the core of the national capital area as part of its recommendations to the

Base Realignment and Closure Commission.

The study, presented to the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments meeting by George Mason University analysts projects more traffic along I-95 and a slight increase in vehicle traffic across the region if the Defense Department goes forward with the plan.

"A 2 percent decrease in transit trips nationwide is not minor,"

said District of Columbia Council member Phil Mendelson, a member of the regional panel.

The study also examined the employment impact from both the military and contractors who would relocate to the outer suburbs. It estimates central jurisdictions like Arlington, Alexandria and the District would lose more than 30,000 jobs.



Taliban Sympathizer Gets Life Term

ALEXANDRIA, VA. | A prominent Islamic scholar who exhorted his followers after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks to fight with the Taliban against U.S. troops was sentenced Wednesday to life in prison.

Ali Al-Timimi, 41, of Fairfax, was convicted in April of soliciting treason, inducing others to aid the Taliban, and inducing others to use firearms in violation of fed-

eral law. Although prosecutors have portrayed al-Timimi as having "rockstar" status among his followers, he has maintained his innocence throughout his trial.

"I will not admit guilt nor seek the court's mercy. I do this simply because I am innocent," al-Timimi declared in a 10-minute address to the court before his sentencing.

Deal Returns NHL to the Ice Age

Hockey lockout over as the players union accepts a salary cap

HOCKEY | The NHL and the players' association reached an agreement in principle on a six-year labor deal on Wednesday, ending a lockout that wiped out the last ice hockey season.

The sides had been meeting for the past 10 days — continuously since Tuesday — to hammer out the collective bargaining agreement that will return the NHL to the ice on time in the fall. In February, com-

missioner Gary Bettman canceled the season, making the NHL the first North American sports league to lose an entire year because of a labor dispute.

"It's a new day," Philadelphia Flyers coach Ken Hitchcock said. "It's pretty exciting."

Both sides still need to ratify the deal, a pact expected to contain a salary cap — something players' association executive director Bob Goodenow didn't want. Ratification is expected next week, the league and union said.

If all goes according to plan, a scaled-down draft is expected to be

held this month, and training camps will open in September. NHL games will start up on time in October.

Bettman promised "cost certainty" in the form of a hard salary cap to the owners and he has gotten it. The expected salary cap will likely have a ceiling approaching \$40 million and a minimum somewhere between \$20 million and \$25 million. Player salaries will not exceed 54 percent of league-wide revenues.

The first priority after the deal is ratified will be to get a majority of the players signed. The belief is that last season's contracts will be wiped from the books, leaving many players without deals. IRA PODELL (AP)

The Os were first from April 23 to June 24, despite losing Erik Bedard, Javy Lopez, Luis Matos, Larry Bigbie, Sosa and B.J. Surhoff to injury. "You deal with injuries every year, but you don't think it would be that severe," said manager Lee Mazzilli.

But when the Orioles are physically sound, they've got the offense to compete with any team. "Their success is not a surprise," said Boston reliever Mike Timlin. (AP)

Not for Bunker Busters

As always, Thursday's British Open is about leaving the sand intact

GOLF | The names Tiger Woods must master at this British Open are not his rivals he faces at other major championships, such as Vijay Singh or Phil Mickelson or Ernie Els.

It's Sutherland — not Kevin or David, but the tiny pot bunker — that looms large on the fourth fairway at St. Andrews.

There is Cartgate and Coffins, Cat's Trap and Lion's Mouth, Kruger and Mrs. Kruger.

And, of course, there's Hell.

The strongest line of defense at any British Open is the wind that whips across links courses, but make no mistake about the Old Course. It's all about avoiding the brutal bunkers, 112 of them in all, some of which can't be seen until a player gets to the green and looks back.

Woods won five years ago at St. Andrews by failing to hit into a single bunker, which helps explain why he set a major championship record

at 19-under 269 and finished eight shots ahead of anyone else. He'll try to avoid them again when the 134th British Open begins Thursday.

"That's how golf is meant to be played," Woods said. "You have to think about your placement. You have to picture a trajectory and shape and try to hit that shape that trajectory on your spot, and it will be fine."

Even Jack Nicklaus, playing his last Open, marvels at the challenge. "I go through the golf course and I name 15 or 20 bunkers, however they pop out of my head. I would never think of that in any other place," he said. DOUG FERGUSON (AP)

Comcast: Orioles Keep Nats off TV

Second lawsuit filed against Angelos over broadcasting rights

BASEBALL | Comcast claimed that Baltimore Orioles owner Peter Angelos is trying to block the broadcasting of Washington Nationals games Tuesday, in the network's ongoing battle with Angelos about the rights to televise Nationals games.

Comcast filed its lawsuit against the Orioles the same day, saying Angelos and the team "knowingly created a situation where cable carriers predictably would not carry MASN." MASN is the Orioles'

regional sports network that has the rights to televise both Orioles and Nationals games.

"Comcast supported the return of Major League Baseball to Washington, D.C., and offered to broadcast the Nats games on far more favorable terms than is the case with MASN," it said.

A hearing is scheduled for later this month. Comcast previously sued the Orioles in April, seeking to block them from moving their own games to MASN in 2007. Comcast has television rights to Orioles games through 2006. As the dispute continues, Comcast is refusing to air Nationals games produced by MASN. (AP)

Lance Still the Leader

Vinokourov goes all out to win the stretch, but still 5 minutes out

CYCLING | Alexandre Vinokourov won Wednesday's second Alpine stage of the Tour de France with a solo ascent over the race's highest climb, but Lance Armstrong's overall lead remained unchanged.

The win in the 11th stage, a 107.5-mile route from Courchevel, was Vinokourov's second in five Tours. His first was in 2003.

The T-Mobile rider rebounded from a disastrous ride Tuesday on the first Alpine stage, when Armstrong surged ahead of his

rivals to retake the overall lead.

Vinokourov took the lead on an 8,677-foot climb, the highest on this year's Tour. Armstrong made the ascent more than two minutes later, but made a speedy descent, finishing 1:15 behind Vinokourov in sixth place.

Armstrong's overall lead over second-place Mickael Rasmussen of Denmark stayed at 38 seconds.

Vinokourov picked up a time bonus for winning Wednesday's stage, and cut his deficit to Armstrong to 4:47. That places him 12th overall.

"We can't chase down everybody that is at five, six, seven minutes," Armstrong said. (AP)



Unfortunately, the show unfolds without commentary or any attempt to put the Internet dating scene in any social, economic or historical context. Shot entirely in high-definition video, "Hooking Up" often projects the on-the-fly visual sensibility of a home video. 

Bog mummies give glimpses into ancient lives —and deaths

The seven mummies on display at the Carnegie Museum of Natural History in Pittsburgh are nowhere near as famous as King Tut, but they're just as intriguing.

Take the 2,000-year-old body of a teenager, found in the Netherlands. Who was she? Who killed her and why? Was the killing punishment, or ritual?

The exhibit, "The Mysterious Bog People," makes the case for ritualistic sacrifice as it delves into the early history of northwestern European life around bogs through archaeology and forensic sleuthing befitting a "CSI" episode.

In fact, part of the exhibit allows visitors to investigate four hypothetical bog bodies. Visitors can examine bones, skulls and teeth (don't worry, they're fake) to determine

the gender and likely age, the manner of death, the era in which the person lived and even if the victim was a hunter-gatherer or a farmer through examination of the stomach contents.

Peat bogs are marshy areas of dead vegetation and moss. The water's high iron content, tannic acid and lack of oxygen act as a preservative. Remarkably well-preserved bodies have been found

in bogs, many by bog cutters who harvest peat bog for fuel, although now machines are used more often and bodies are sometimes damaged, said Sandra Olsen, the museum's curator of anthropology.

A picture of one mummy, not on display, shows perhaps the best preserved body. "Tollund man," named for the place he was found in Denmark 55 years ago, has sil-

ver-gray skin. Stubble sprouts from his chin.

The bodies on display are among several dozen known specimens. They are dried out because proper steps weren't taken to keep them preserved, so they look leathery.

But they still intrigue.

"I think that maybe people are only interested in the grisly aspect, but I hope that people will have a

better understanding of ancient Europeans," Olsen said.

Scientists have determined diet and health of bog people from stomach contents and soft tissue analysis — far more than can be learned from skeletal remains.

Though some bog people were likely murder victims or criminals, the exhibit argues that other items found buried in bogs makes it likely that many were sacrificed. More than 300 such items, including coins and weaponry, are on display.

Ancient Europeans made offerings to their gods in natural settings, Olsen said. Watery places such as rivers, lakes and bogs were seen as conduits to the gods, she said.

"The bogs are considered special places because there's an aura of danger there," Olsen said. It's easy to imagine getting lost or drowning in dark, fog-covered bogs, which were believed to be inhabited by the gods.

Offerings would have been made to appease gods so livestock and crops would thrive, Olsen said. They would also be made to keep gods from becoming angry and delivering famine or other devastation.

The exhibit will run at the Carnegie until Jan. 23, 2006, and later travel to Los Angeles.



Young Japanese workers using temp jobs to fund dreams

A generation ago, Makoto Baba would have been just another job-hopping loser. But the 26-year-old aspiring musician represents a new breed of Japanese who are defying past standards of success by working temporary jobs to finance their dreams—becoming a dancer, poet or even a farmer.

The ranks of such “freeters”—a combination of the English “free” and “arbeiter,” the German word for “worker”—have ballooned in recent years, surpassing 4 million, more than double the number in 1990, according to Japanese government research.

Like Baba, whose first love is traditional taiko drums, freeters

symbolize a changing Japan, where younger people are more assertive and seek out spiritual fulfillment rather than the material comforts and social status sought by their parents and grandparents.

At one time, the Japanese dream was to land a job at a respectable corporation that promised lifetime employment. Instead, Baba has tutored students, fielded telephone calls, helped families move and swept rooftops, all to earn a living so that he can pursue his dream: performing as a taiko drummer.

“I’ve chosen the path of taiko and being a freeter is part of that endeavor,” said Baba. “Taiko mirrors who you are. I beat, express and create myself.”

As their numbers grow, a cottage industry has sprung up helping freeters find jobs, internships and interesting opportunities.

Yasuyuki Nambu, head of job-referral company Pasona Inc., who claims to be “the original freeter,”

has made this a new branch of his booming business. One program allows freeters to try out farming.

Toshihiro Sakuma, 29, is seriously considering becoming a farmer after taking part in a Pasona internship. He has also worked part-time at a movie theater and an archaeological site.

“Some jobs were hard but it was all fun,” he recalled. “I don’t regret any of it. And every job was worth it.” But in true freeter fashion, he says he isn’t quite sure what he’ll be doing next year.

Kanon Nakadozono, 27, took a more unusual route. She worked while she was young as a geisha and a maiko, a geisha’s apprentice—against her parents’ wishes. Now, living off investments from her earnings, she hopes to become a writer or actress.

“I’m so lucky to be a freeter,” said Nakadozono. “A lot of people are working at jobs they hate, but I get to do what I truly want.”

Are you excited about the Open?

Every Open is a little different, but having the Open at St. Andrews, the home of golf, with Jack Nicklaus about to play in his final major championship at the age of 65 really does get the juices flowing.

Why is Tiger Woods always the big story the first day?

He is the number one ranked player in the world, the most visible golfer on the planet, and I truly believe most golf fans want to know how and what he did in the first round, whether he shoots 85 or 65.

Any word yet on the weather?

The weather is horrible, at least to have a thrilling British Open. At the moment, it's in the low 80s, with a slight breeze off the North Sea. You want the wind to blow and the sky to spit rain in an Open and if the current benign conditions continue, these guys will probably destroy the Open scoring record set here five years ago by Tiger Woods at 19-under 269. The tournament was played in similar conditions that year and Tiger took full advantage, winning by eight shots.

What is one of the most unique characteristics of the Old Course that no one can observe simply by

watching the Open on TV?

Until you walk down some of the fairways, you can't fathom the humps and bumps that can turn a drive down the middle into a second shot off a lie that's sidehill, uphill or downhill. And until you've been in one of those nasty pot bunkers, many of them with dry land above a player's hand, you don't appreciate these guys' skills in extricating themselves from shots that would be totally unplayable from hackers like me.

I assume that players do not complain about the course as they do about the U.S. Open. I would guess this is because there is some reverence for St. Andrews and its history. But if the players were vocal, what would be their biggest complaint?

Believe it or not, some are criticizing the changes in the course. About 165 yards were added and tee boxes on five holes set back. The 14th is now a 618-yard brute, pocked with evil bunkers affecting the drive, second and even third shots. Vijay Singh has been critical; Tiger Woods asked "why" and several others also have been very public in their comments.

NAME: Hollis Gillespie **GIG:** Alt-weekly columnist, public radio commentator and flight attendant

HER FIRST MEMOIR of boho life, "Bleachy-Haired Honky Bitch," became a cult hit, landed her on Leno and is being developed for a TV series. In the sequel, "Confessions of a Recovering Slut & Other Love Stories," Atlanta's Hollis Gillespie further explores urban life and reflects on single motherhood. Her best friends — acid-eating lighting designer Lary, out-of-the-closet-at-age-42 bartender and faux-folk artist Grant, and comparatively well-adjusted artist Daniel — serve as cracked navigators of that rocky terrain.

Remember when NPR's Southern commentators were genteel schoolmams like Bailey White? The times they are a-changin'.

Is this a reflection of the New South or the new NPR?

The New South. And I think it's a pretty good reflection of NPR, because, you know, I'm not exactly boring.

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

OUT & ABOUT | Pop quiz!

Hip-hop 1) equals rap 2) is urban music 3) is gangsta music 4) has to rhyme 5) but isn't poetry 6) is limited to those videos with the bling and the hoochies and the Navigators.

If you checked any of the above answers, you need to check out the Hip-Hop Theater Festival, happening all over the city through Saturday.

The influence of modern hip-hop extends far across the globe and has planted roots deep in various sources of artistic and intellectual nourishment. The artists whose performances and panels take place this weekend — all for free, all on a first-come, first-served basis — are from South Asia, New York City and the District; are poets, playwrights, musicians, performance artists and community activists; are urbanites and suburbanites.

Most importantly, all have something to say, whether it's about the social climate of America in a post-9/11 world (a performance of "September 12th" by Pakistani immigrant poet Fouad Pervez on Thursday night) or the impact of D.C.'s encroaching gentrification on a local housing project (Capers, also on Thursday), activism and social responsibility in hip-hop (a Saturday panel led by George Mason University Professor and editor-in-chief of *The Journal of Hip-Hop* Dru Ryan) or hip-hop in suburbia (Red, White and Blue performing its play on Friday).

And always, our homegrown street poets and stage prophets are well represented. The witty and literate Poemcees, fiery activist Head-Roc, local playwrights Huelman Prophets, Hip-Hop Theater's Psalmayene 24 and rabble-rouser

and drug-rehab graduate Quique Avilés will all get their say.

This kaleidoscope of voices isn't just for the choir, who know something about these sermons even if they haven't heard them. It's a chance for hip-hop to stretch its boundaries and engage fully — with the community, with young people who want to make a difference, with anyone who has anything to say to the world and with eggheads for whom something like the hip-hop rendition of Dante's "Inferno" is a conduit into another way of telling timeless, necessary stories.

The festival wraps up with an open-mic poetry slam with a payoff — the winner gets a slot at the upcoming Crafty Bastards Arts Festival.





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

The Self-Made Despot's Fate

STAGE | Poe's telltale heart has nothing on the drum in "The Emperor Jones." Incessant pounding haunts the titular character and his audience, creating a frantic atmosphere onstage and in the seats.

Fortunately, the American Century Theater's production of "The Emperor Jones" is fairly short, so audience members will only experience the percussion equivalent of water torture for a little more than an hour.

Currently playing at the Gunston Arts Center, "The Emperor Jones" is one of Eugene O'Neill's lesser-known plays, which is precisely why it was chosen. Controversial because of its portrayal of a black man as a despot and a murderer, the play appealed to ACT because of the

complexity of its tragic hero.

This "hero," Brutus Jones (Bus Howard), is a porter-turned-convicted murderer who escapes the United States and takes over a Caribbean island. He rules not with brutality but with plenty of corruption, using his wits to bamboozle the natives into strengthening his power.

Unfortunately for Jones, the natives revolt, so he must flee into the woods. There the risen masses, along with the ghosts of Jones' past, hunt him, and he slips into madness.

And, well, the beat goes on.

None but The Bravery

Despite gossip and backlash, New York's Bravery brazenly it out

MUSIC | It's been just four months since the Bravery released its self-titled debut album on the Island label. In that time, the New York City electro-rock act has made its mark with the brazen hit single "An Honest Mistake."

But its highest profile, perhaps, has been in music gossip circles.

First there was the backlash triggered by the Bravery's massive overseas popularity, which seemed to pick up steam before the group had even finished paying dues in its own country. Then came a near-comic war of words with the Killers, the chart-topping Las Vegas who also record for Island.

Hate it or love it, the Bravery looks like it's here to stay. Along with its sold-out headlining show here at the 9:30 Club on Friday, the group is playing the prestigious Lollapalooza festival in Chicago next weekend.

With its neon glow and angst-ridden drive, "An Honest Mistake" is an undeniable dance-rock gem. Throughout the album, frontman (and D.C. native) Sam Endicott's wistful melodies match his youthful tales of lust and betrayal.

Endicott also produced "The

Bravery," which pays worthy tribute to recent N.Y.C. cultural lightning-rods the Strokes and electroclash. He's not the most original voice in rock, and give or take Ryan Cabrera, he has the most ridiculous hair in all of music.

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Jane's Late Take-Off

Jane Seymour strips down for comedy in 'Wedding Crashers'

CHOICES | To most of the world she is known as Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman, the nurturing Old West physician she played on CBS for six seasons. But Jane Seymour is looking to shatter that squeaky-clean image by portraying an amorous older woman who tries to seduce her daughter's suitor in the comedy "Wedding Crashers."

At 54, Seymour is doing her first nude scene. The veteran actress says going au naturel wasn't an

invite themselves to weddings where they pick up women.

When it came to shooting their seduction scene, Seymour said Wilson was more nervous than she was. She recalled how she and Dobkin had to encourage the actor to touch her breasts. "His hands came out like little ferret hands," she said, mimicking Wilson's tentative hand movements during rehearsal.

Wilson agreed: "It was a little bit of a hiccup for me to be all of a sudden doing a scene where I'm supposed to be putting my hands on her in a slightly inappropriate way. But I got used to it. By the end, I was calling for more takes because we really needed to get the scene right."

As for Seymour, she's planning to follow the path laid out for her by "The Wedding Crashers."

"If I had a choice, I think I'd do more comedy right now," she said. "But I'm very open to roles. I think women my age have fascinating stories to tell." ANGELA DAWSON (ENTERTAINMENT NEWS WIRE)

**A trumpet prodigy
leaves New Orleans for
a blast of jazztronica**

MUSIC | Two years ago, Nicholas Payton shocked the jazz community. Just when everyone was getting comfortable with the idea of him being the heir apparent of the great New Orleans trumpet legacy, he switched up his game.

Honing a stout tone and virtuosity to waste, he was often compared to Louis Armstrong. Hell, he even looks like Pops with those sleepy eyes, portly physique and ducky smile. And although his mid-'90s material was more in the vein of modern jazz, his improvisations sizzled with explicit Dippermouth flavor.

But after his desultory "Dear Louis" (2001), a record so frictionless it sounded as if the record company had pointed a shotgun to his head demanding an Armstrong tribute album, Payton unleashed the ballsy "Sonic Trance."

Influenced, in part, by underground hip-hop guru Madlib, but greatly informed by Miles Davis' mid-'70s electric period, "Sonic Trance" marked a new chapter in Payton's still mushrooming career

as he attached his trumpet to wah-wah pedal and blasted his way to the outer reaches of jazztronica.

At the time, Payton hadn't completely mastered the new gadgetry. But sometimes the thrill of jazz is not so much listening to graceful virtuosity; it comes from observing an artist wrestle with a new sound,

trying to come up with something personal and lasting.

This weekend, Blues Alley becomes Payton's sonic lab as he attempts to extend another eminent legacy. JOHN MURPH


His Father's Son

Femi Kuti keeps the family Afrobeat tradition alive and well

MUSIC | Filling Daddy's shoes is always tough, especially when your father is a near-mythical figure. In the case of Femi Kuti, his late father, Fela Anikulapo-Kuti, is internationally known as the "Black President."

Blending James Brown's syncopated funk and free-jazz's unbridled ecstasy with the propulsive music of his native country, Nigeria, Fela concocted an intoxicating music, called Afrobeat, in which he infused visceral socio-political commentary, much of which was fired directly at the Nigerian government.

Femi's songs like "Blackman Know Yourself" and "What Will Tomorrow Bring" are quite genial in comparison to Fela's songs like "Zombie" and "Water No Get Enemy." And when it comes to playing the saxophone, Femi lacks the melodic ingenuity — such as it was, considering that Fela wasn't exactly a sax virtuoso — of his father.

Slowly but surely, Femi, who'll take the 9:30 Club stage this Friday, is finding his own voice underneath the towering influence of his father. Five years ago, he nailed an international dance-floor hit with "Beng, Beng, Beng" a randy celebration of carnal love that was world's apart from his father's political diatribes.

Since then, Femi has absorb elements of deep house, broken beat and hip-hop, refashioning Afrobeat for the Information Age, resulting in an even more heart-racing, ass-spanking, sweat-inducing sensation that'll surely make Daddy proud. **JOHN MURPH**


sweat.)

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
