

Warnings Withheld By FEMA

Trailers provided for Katrina victims linked to toxic gas

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has suppressed warnings from its own Gulf Coast field workers since the middle of 2006 about suspected health problems that may be linked to elevated levels of formaldehyde gas released in FEMA-provided trailers, lawmakers said Thursday.

At a hearing of the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee, investigators released internal e-mails indicating that FEMA lawyers rejected environmental testing out of fear that the agency would then become legally liable if health problems emerged among as many as 120,000 families displaced by Hurricane Katrina who lived in trailers.

FEMA's Office of General Counsel "has advised that we do not do testing," because this "would imply FEMA's ownership of this issue," wrote a FEMA logistics specialist on June 16, 2006, three months after news reports surfaced about the possible effects of the invisible cancer-causing compound and one month after the agency was sued.



House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, the California Democrat who this year became the first woman ever to hold the top spot in the House of Representatives, is writing a memoir, to be released in the summer of 2008 by the Doubleday Broadway Publishing Group. Financial terms were not disclosed. House rules prohibit members from getting book advances. (AP)

Plame's Lawsuit Defeated in Court

Judge says there is no legal grounds for case against Bush officials

WASHINGTON | Former CIA operative Valerie Plame lost a lawsuit Thursday that demanded money from Bush administration officials whom she blamed for leaking her agency identity.

Plame, the wife of former Ambassador Joseph Wilson, had accused Vice President Dick Cheney and others of conspiring to disclose her identity in 2003. Plame said that violated her privacy rights and was illegal retribution for her husband's criticism of the administration.

U.S. District Judge John D. Bates dismissed the case on jurisdictional grounds and said he would not express an opinion on the constitutional arguments.

Bates dismissed the case against all defendants: Cheney, White House

political adviser Karl Rove, former White House aide I. Lewis "Scooter" Libby and former Deputy Secretary of State Richard Armitage.

Plame's lawyers said from the beginning the suit would be a dif-

ficult case to make. Public officials normally are immune from suits filed in connection with their jobs.

Plame and Wilson pledged to appeal the decision.

"This case is not just about what top government officials did to Valerie and me." Wilson said in a statement. "We brought this suit because we strongly believe that politicizing intelligence ultimately serves only to undermine the security of our nation."

Though Bates said the case raised "important questions relating to the propriety of actions undertaken by our highest government officials," he said there was no legal basis for the suit.

Rove's lawyer, Robert Luskin, said Rove was pleased to have the case behind him.

"The risk of being liable for personal damages is not something anybody takes lightly," Luskin said. MATT APUZZO (AP)

Lawmakers Want All Ships Scanned

Bill would require all cargo to be inspected before heading to U.S.

WASHINGTON | Lawmakers agreed Thursday to a goal of scanning all cargo-containing ships before they leave foreign ports as Congress neared a deal on a major security bill to carry out the recommendations of the 9/11 Commission.

In House-Senate negotiations on the bill, House and Senate Democrats pushed through a provision allowing a five-year window for radiation scanning technology to be put in place and giving the Homeland Security secretary authority to make exceptions.

Supporters said the measure was crucial to prevent the catastrophe




Official: Iraqis Are Fearful

Diplomat says troop plan is working, but restoring trust is key

WASHINGTON | The top U.S. diplomat in Iraq said Thursday that Baghdad is making some political progress but faces considerable difficulty in the months to come to try to heal a nation long gripped

"If there is one word, I would use to sum up the atmosphere in Iraq — on the streets, in the countryside, in the neighborhoods and at the national level — that word would be 'fear," Ryan Crocker told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

"For Iraq to move forward at any level, that fear is going to have to be replaced with some level of



Crocker said Bush's troop buildup in Iraq was just now hitting its stride and was showing some gains in tamping down sectarian violence in Baghdad. Crocker also warned

against a withdrawal of U.S. troops contending such a move could increase sectarian attacks and strengthen al-Qaeda.

He also warned lawmakers against relying heavily on a list of benchmarks to measure gains.

"The longer I am here, the more I am persuaded that progress in Iraq cannot be analyzed solely in terms of these discreet, precisely defined benchmarks because, in many cases, these benchmarks do not serve as reliable measures of everything that is important — Iraqi attitudes toward each other and their willingness to work toward political reconciliation," Crocker said. (AP)

West Under Strongest Wildfire Alert

BOISE, IDAHO | The nation's wildfire preparedness was raised to its highest level Thursday as dozens of new fires started in the bone-dry West, including a rapidly growing blaze on the grounds of the Idaho National Laboratory.

The West had been at level four for only a few weeks when officials decided to raise it to level five, effective Thursday. The change allows fire managers to request help from international crews, and National Guard units could be mobilized.

Dry lightning has sparked dozens of new blazes in the West. including more than 1,000 new fires since Monday, said Randy Eardley, a spokesman for the National Interagency Fire Center. (AP)

Speed of Plane's Landing Examined in Deadly Crash

Officials struggled Thursday to determine why a jetliner raced down a runway instead of slowing down before crashing in a fireball that killed 189 people — an accident that set off a fierce debate over whether to shut down Brazil's busiest airport. Security video showed TAM Flight 3054 speeding down the tarmac more than four times as fast as other planes landing around the same time, raising the possibility of pilot or mechanical error instead of a slick and short runway blamed widely as a likely cause. 

Kremlin to Expel 4 British Envoys

Diplomatic tit for tat grows over probe into Litvinenko's poisoning

STARAYA TERIZMORGA, RUSSIA | Russia retaliated against Britain in an escalating diplomatic fight Thursday, but President Vladimir Putin sought to calm what he called a "mini-crisis" over his refusal to extradite a suspect in the murder of a Kremlin critic in London.

Expressing confidence the two nations would overcome their dif-

ferences, Putin appeared intent on keeping the dispute over alleged Russian involvement in former KGB

agent Alexander Litvinenko's slaying from harming trade ties.

Putin spoke after Russia said it would send four British diplomats home in response

to the expulsion of four Russian envoys from Britain because of the Kremlin's decision not to hand over

Putin

suspect Andrei Lugovoi for trial.

"I think Russian-British relations will develop normally. On both the Russian side and the British side, we are interested in the development of these relations," Putin said.

"I'm sure we will overcome this mini-crisis, too," he added.

British Ambassador Anthony Brenton was summoned to the Foreign Ministry in Moscow Thursday and told that four British diplomats would be kicked out in retaliation for London's expulsion order.

Dozens Killed in Pakistan Violence

In deadliest attack, 29 die after car bomber targets foreign workers

KARACHI, PAKISTAN | Pakistan's turmoil spread from the Afghan frontier to the south, where a suicide bomber struck a convoy carrying Chinese workers — one of three suicide attacks that killed at least 51 people Thursday.

President Gen. Pervez Musharraf called for national unity against extremists enraged by an assault on Islamabad's Red Mosque.

Suicide attacks, bombings and shootings and the siege of the mosque, which had mounted a Taliban-style anti-vice campaign challenging the government's authority, have killed about 285 people in Pakistan so far this month.

In the deadliest attack Thursday, a car bomber targeting a minibus carrying about 10 Chinese technicians pulled up to their convoy as it was passing through the main bazaar in Hub, a town near the southern city of Karachi.

It blew up next to a police vehicle escorting the foreign workers, killing 29 people — 22 Pakistani civilians and seven police officers. Thirty other people were wounded, said Hub police chief Ghulam Mohammed Thaib.

The spate of bombings, the deepest security crisis faced by Musharraf since he seized power in 1999, has also begun to weigh on Pakistan's capital markets, suggesting it could soon threaten the strong economic growth that is one of the general's proudest boasts. (AP)

Sunnis End Boycott of Parliament

Return of factions puts power-sharing bills on top of agenda

BAGHDAD | Sunni legislators returned to Iraq's parliament Thursday after a five-week boycott, raising hopes the assembly can make progress on powersharing bills demanded by Washington before the lawmakers take a month's break.

But the return of the Sunnis and a hard-line Shiite faction loyal to anti-U.S. cleric Muqtada al-Sadr could also signal problems for many of the bills, including the oil law, which is a top U.S. priority.

The 44 members of the Iraqi Accordance Front attended Thursday's parliament session after striking a deal to reinstate the Sunni speaker, Mahmoud al-Mashhadani, who was ousted by the Shiite-dominated assembly last month. Under a face-saving formula, al-Mashhadani is expected to resign after presiding over a few sessions.

The Sunnis returned to parliament two days after al-Sadr's 30 law-makers ended their boycott. Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki's government accepted the Sadrists' demands for rebuilding a Shiite shrine damaged by bombings. (AP)


Seeing the Light in Guinea

In a nation lacking in electricity, students go to airport to study

CONAKRY, GUINEA | The sun has set in one of the world's poorest nations and as the floodlights come on at G'bessi International Airport, the parking lot begins filling with chil-

The long stretch of pavement has the feel of a hushed library, each student sitting quietly, some moving their lips as their eyes traverse their French-language notes.

It's exam season in Guinea, ranked 160th out of 177 countries on the United Nations' development index, and schoolchildren flock to the airport every night because it's among the only places where they'll always find the lights

on. Some come from more than an hour's walk away.

Only about a fifth of Guinea's 10 million people have access to electricity, and even those who do experience frequent power cuts.

The lack of electricity is "a geological scandal," says Michael McGovern, a political anthropologist at Yale University, quoting a phrase first used by a colonial administrator to describe Guinea's untapped natural wealth.

Guinea has rivers that, if properly harnessed, could electrify the region, McGovern says. It has gold, diamonds, iron and half the world's reserves of bauxite, the raw material used to make aluminum.

For 23 years, the former French colony has been under the grip of Lansana Conte, a reclusive and temperamental army general who took power in a 1984 coup.

Eighteen-year-old Ousman Conde admits that sitting on the concrete piling is not comfortable but says passing his upcoming exam could open doors.

"It hurts," he says. "But we prefer this hurt to the hurt of not doing well in our exams." RUKMINI CALLIMACHI (AP)

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
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

Dow Closes Above 14,000

Strong profit news sets off buying spree on jittery Wall Street

NEW YORK | Wall Street moved soundly higher Thursday, sending the Dow Jones industrials to their first close above 14,000 as investors kept iitters about the economy at bay and focused on a string of upbeat earnings reports.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index also had a record close.

Profit news from companies like IBM Corp., network equipment maker Juniper Networks Inc. and business software company SAP AG helped lift stocks and boosted investors' appetite for technology issues. However, the momentum could be short-lived, as after the closing bell Thursday, Google Inc. turned in a second-quarter profit that fell short of Wall Street's high expectations.

Concerns about the health of

subprime loans, which are made to borrowers with poor credit history, generally hurt financial stocks. while a report that a would-be suitor for Alcoa Inc. had lost interest kept the Dow Jones industrial average from extending its gains.

Though stocks briefly shed some

gains after newly released minutes from the Federal Reserve's last meeting appeared to confirm that the central bank has no plans to cut rates anytime soon, investors quickly resumed buying. Bonds showed little overall movement. (AP)

RICHMOND, VA. | Chastened by public outrage over the state's costly new fees of the worst Virginia drivers, the Democratic governor and Republican House and Senate leaders promised to fix the law's flaws early next year even as they defended it as a way to make highways safer.

In a rare show of bipartisan unity forged by their mutual support for the 2007 transportation funding bill, Gov. Timothy M. Kaine and House Speaker William J. Howell expressed surprise at the furor but would not call limiting the fees to Virginia residents a mistake.

"This was a storm that I don't

think anyone anticipated," Howell said in a joint news conference with Kaine. "All of us standing here have heard folks loud and clear," Kaine said.

They said administration and legislative advisers will spend the rest of the year studying how to collect from nonresidents fees that run into the thousands for serious traffic infractions and retain the revenue for road maintenance.

They spoke after legislators in both parties called for a special session to repeal the civil remedial fees that took effect on July 1. Some of the widespread alarm over the fees is the result of inaccurate claims on blogs that led people to believe they would pay thousands for traffic violations as minor as improper turn signals. Va. Ranks Low in VA Compensation

WASHINGTON | Injured veterans could be shortchanged in their government disability pay depending on where they live because of wide disparities from state to state, an internal study concludes.

The 1½-year investigation, conducted by the Institute for Defense Analysis, is the first to examine scientifically the reasons behind the

Veterans Affairs' uneven handling of veterans claims for disability compensation. It was launched by the VA following reports in 2005 of wide differences in payments.

Virginia ranked in the bottom five in the nation, with \$7,706 average disability pay awarded to injured veterans in 2005. Only Delaware, Maryland, and Ohio paid less. (AP)





Living With Sin

Gluttony and greed aren't so bad if you give them a chance

IN THE SUNDAY SOURCE | Hot as hell out there, isn't it?

The summer heat amplifies our vices, but we're sinners year-round. It doesn't matter whether you're religious. We harbor scandalous thoughts about our married sunbathing neighbor. We seethe with jealousy over a co-worker's promotion. We allow ourselves to descend into a rut of laziness.


Seven sins in particular have fascinated us for centuries. They're the deadly ones: envy, gluttony, greed, lust, pride, sloth and wrath.

Although grandiose and Dantean in name, the sins are as applicable to us today as they ever were, says Solomon Schimmel, a professor of education and psychology at Hebrew College in Brookline, Mass.

"The purpose of civilization is not to deny human nature," Schimmel says. "But one has to figure out a way to civilize [the sins], so to speak. Not to sublimate them, but to channel them or direct them."

We thought it might be purposeful to indulge the sins without harming ourselves or others. A little redirection, if you will. We tested seven innocent ways to "commit" the seven deadly sins. For today, let's try gluttony and greed. For envy, lust, pride, sloth and wrath, you'll just have to wait until Sunday.

"Discover the winner in you!"

So says the sign outside Rosecroft Raceway in Fort Washington, just off the Capital Beltway in Maryland. Since 1949, people have gambled there on harness racing, where a driver in a cart steers a horse in a mile-long sprint around the track.

"Everybody that comes through the door — though they won't admit it — thinks they're going to come out a winner," track announcer Pete Medhurst says. You need bet only \$1, though Medhurst has seen several wagers in excess of \$150,000 this summer.



Not this day.

That's why Tiger Woods was aiming sideways.

Fearing he might not clear the burn into the 30 mph wind gusts, Woods hit a 2-iron about waist-high toward the opposite fairway and foundshortgrass. Then came another 2-iron whistling under the wind, back toward the 18th fairway. That left him one more 2-iron to the green, but this one drifted just enough to the right to catch a bunker.

It was only a practice round, but

it was an example of how players must use their imaginations to figure out how to get to the green, no matter how unconventional it might be.

And it explains why Woods considers the British Open his favorite major championship.

"I love playing over here because it allows you to be creative," Woods said. "Over here, you can create shots. You get to use the ground as an ally."

The ground was his best friend a year ago at Royal Liverpool.

After a few rounds on the dry fairways, Woods realized he was better off leaving his driver in the bag. He hit it only once over four rounds, opting for irons short of the bunkers and long to mid-irons into the greens. The

strategy worked to perfection, and Woods captured the claret jug for the second straight year.

He arrived at Carnoustie with a chance to win three in a row, a feat accomplished by only four other players at a championship that dates to 1860. The last was Peter Thomson in 1954, 1955 and 1956.

Thomson expects to see Woods posing with the claret jug Sunday.

"He has a chance to win eight in a row," said Thomson. "If I could do it, surely he could."

Woods seemingly has owned other tournaments since turning pro. He won at Bay Hill four straight years, and he has won five times at Firestone and Torrey Pines. He won three straight years at Muirfield Village, and those four green jackets came from Augusta National.



Jean Van de Velde isn't the only golfer to get burned by Carnoustie's Barry Burn — just the most famous. When the British Open was last played here in 1999, more than 100 scorecards read 80 or higher, but Van de Velde had a three-shot lead heading into the final hole. He needed a double-bogey six on the 499-yard par 4 to win the British Open and get his name forever etched on the Claret Jug. What happened next made him even more famous.







SHOT 1 First mistake

Critics say Van de Velde's first mistake was pulling out the driver on the 18th tee. The safe shot would have been an iron off the tee, another iron to stay short of the Barry Burn and a wedge to the green. Playing with flair, Van de Velde smashed a tee shot that sailed so far right that it stayed out of the winding burn and found a good lie in the rough.





SHOT 2 Too good of a lie

His lie was so

good that Van de Velde decided to go for the green in two when, again, the safe play was probably laying up in front of the burn. The ball sailed right again, which should have been no problem. If it had gone into the bleachers, he would have had a free drop.





SHOT 3 'Worst I've seen'

Instead, his ball hit a tiny rail and caromed back across the green

back across the green into rough so deep Van de Velde had no shot. "It was the worst I've ever seen," said Craig Parry, who played the final round with Van de Velde. He decided to hack it out over the burn, but the ball tumbled into the creek.





SHOT 4 Ankle-deep in it

Tragedy turned into comedy when Van de Velde removed his shoes and socks, rolled up his navy blue slacks to his knees and stepped into the chilly water. The tide was coming in, and when he got to his ball, the shot no longer looked possible.





Losing track

The drop put Van de Velde back behind the burn in the rough with a large trap in front of the green. Van de Velde's shot made it over the burn but not over the trap. "It was like I was playing junior golf, trying to count up how many times he hit it, what he was going to make," said Justin Leonard, who was watching, hoping for a playoff.





SHOT 6 'Follow me in'

Parry had also hit into the bunker — with his second shot — and was first to play. A massive roar shook Carnoustie when Parry holed his shot for a birdie. The Australian smiled, looked at Van de Velde and said, "Follow me in." The best Van de Velde could do

was put it to eight feet.

Garcia Takes British Lead With First-Round 65

Tiger is in contention; teenager finishes first round bogey-free

BRITISH OPEN | The British Open wasn't at "Car-Nasty" this time around — especially for Sergio Garcia.

Still trying to remove that unwanted title of best player never to win a major, Garcia took advantage of charitable conditions at Carnoustie to shoot a 6-under-par 65 Thursday in the opening round.

Tiger Woods was right in the thick of things again, sinking an improbable 90-foot putt on his way to a 69 that put him solidly in contention for his third straight Open title. And 18-year-old Rory McIlroy provided a glimpse of the sport's future with a bogey-free 68.

"I'll take a 68," the teenager from

Northern Ireland said, "and I'll take three more to finish." $\,$

This links along the North Sea, considered one of the toughest tests in major championship golf, was toned down after it haunted the world's best in 1999. Falcons Should Get Rid of Vick

DOGFIGHTING IS GROSS. Dogfighting is despicable. Dogfighting is something we must assume Michael Vick is not guilty of unless he is convicted.

Having gotten that out of the way, the Atlanta Falcons would be



wise to sack Vick as their quarterback and start over.

Though he's without a doubt a phenomenal talent — there's a reason he was

the No. 1 overall pick in the 2001 draft — Vick has always been problematic as an NFL quarterback.

There has been some success, including a run to the 2004-05 NFC championship game.

Yet the majority of the evidence suggests Vick is not someone to build an offense around — at least not when he's asked to throw the ball 20 times per game.

Vick has never completed more than 56 percent of his passes in a season, a paltry percentage for an average quarterback, let alone a

Vick's deficiencies in passing are the primary reason he's yet to lead Atlanta to consecutive playoff appearance despite being one of the most dynamic runners in the NFL.

If not for Vick's popularity, the Falcons would probably have already begun their search for a new quarterback.

As it is, the team probably wishes it could take back that Matt Schaubto-Houston trade now.

Given the ensuing distraction this trial will cause, Atlanta needs to be ready for life without its star.

Vick will get a second chance as a quarterback somewhere. In the short term, he has bigger worries.

When he's cleared, Vick can try to prove critics like me wrong.

Defense Not United

D.C. hoped Vanney's experience would aid its young back line

UNITED | Although last month's trade came as a bit of a surprise, the thinking behind sending Facundo Erpen to Colorado for Greg Vanney seemed pretty clear. D.C. United had exchanged a talented but young and unpredictable central defender for an 11-year pro and U.S. national team veteran who would bring stability to an inexperienced and inconsistent back line.

The plan seemed to work at first, as D.C. vielded just one goal in Vanney's first two games. Then, with a 3-0 lead against visiting FC Dallas last weekend, the wheels came off.

Twice goalkeeper Trov Perkins failed to retrieve a cross after coming off his line. In between, midfielder Brian Carroll was left alone to deal with powerful Dallas counterpart Juan Toja, who tore unimpeded through the heart of the D.C. defense. Perkins and his backs appeared slow and confused.

'We played like young kids," United coach Tom Soehn said.

With the Eastern Conference race tightening — five clubs are within four points of each other - and United (7-5-3) heading north for Sunday's

game at New York (7-6-3), now would be an opportune time for Vanney, 33, to prove his worth.

Raised in Arizona, Vanney is with his fourth MLS club. He played for three seasons in France and likely would have figured into the 2002 World Cup had he not suffered a knee injury that spring. He said, "From a professional standpoint, I couldn't be in a better place."

But he acknowledged United has work to do in back, where Perkins and Bobby Boswell are midway through their third season and Josh Gros and Devon McTavish are playing defense for the first time.

'We don't quite trust each other yet. ... It's a matter of leadership, communication, some of those things," he said. "Playing in the back isn't just about talking to each other. It's about understanding and moving together, and covering and trusting each other. We'll get better." BRIAN STRAUS

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A Big League Education

Chico takes his knocks while racking up plenty of innings for the Nats

NATIONALS | Forget stoic. Matt Chico looks almost sleepy when he talks.

But don't mistake the nonchalant appearance for lack of ambition.

"He's more boring than me," said Nationals third baseman Ryan Zimmerman. "When things happen bad for him, he never shows it and when things happen good he never shows it.

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"His level of maturity for what he's going through and what he has to learn up here at such a quick pace ... shows how good he's going to be."

And there are plenty of lessons to be learned, especially for a rookie who never pitched above Double-A before this season.

Chico had given up three runs

But most of those starts came

with little run support.

"He's had some tough luck where he's given a good effort and come out with a no-decision," said Nationals manager Manny Acta, who has seen Chico take six

Acta was impressed early on with how the rookie — who came from Arizona in last year's deal for pitcher Livan Hernandez approaches pitching.

That's what he showed us in spring training: A lefty that can throw inside regardless [of] how hard he throws and has a changeup that will win over here," Acta said.

Those wins may come one day. But for now, Washington is content to watch Chico get an education in the big leagues every fifth day. He still makes plenty of mistakes like failing to hit his spots on three pitches that ended up over the fence in a July 14 loss at Florida.

"That's something I need to work on more: hitting my spots 95 times out of 100." Chico said.

He said you can expect him to learn from his mistakes, not dwell on them. That could prove an especially important trait on a team that's still multiple seasons away from being a playoff contender.

"Once [an outing] is over, it's gone," Chico said. "You try to look ahead. It's something that I learned back in high school. My pitching coach ... was the one guy who said, 'Look ahead, don't look in the past,' and that's what I've done ever since.' ERIC BRANDNER

Slugger breaks 0-21 slump with 2 homers and 6 RBI vs. Cubs

BASEBALL | Barry Bonds hit his 752nd and 753rd home runs Thursday, ending his worst slump in six years with two of his biggest swings this month — and Hank Aaron's record is only two away.

He was rested and ready, all right.

Bonds sent the first pitch from Cubs starter Ted Lilly high over the right-field fence leading off the second inning — the first drive out of Wrigley Field to reach Sheffield Avenue all season. Then he homered again in the seventh on a 3-2 pitch from Will Ohman, a threerun shot that stuck in the basket of the center-field wall.

Bonds' first homer pulled the Giants within 4-1 and was San JANIE MCCAULEY (AP)

Francisco's first hit off Lilly, who surrendered his third career homer to Bonds. The next homer got the Giants within 9-8.

The fans both cheered and booed when his second-inning ball sailed out in the direction of a beer bill-board reading "755 BOTTLES OF BEER ON THE WALL." Dave Davidson, a 39-year-old regular at Wrigley, retrieved the specially monogramed ball in the middle of the street after it bounced off someone else's arm.

Hairspray

There was a movie, then a musical, and. now, another movie

FILM | The world probably didn't need another film version of John Waters' 1988 romp "Hairspray" any more than it needed a Broadway musical version of it. The whole cycle reeks of that movie-of-a-stage-production-ofa-movie debacle that has tainted the legacy of "The Producers."

Having said that, this new brand of "Hairspray" is a hybrid of its predecessors: enormously entertaining but with only faint traces of Waters' signature dark, kitschy humor. It is, in a word, safe — one you would ordinarily never use to describe Waters' work.

Director and choreographer Adam Shankman keeps the tone light, the hair high and the pacing snappy, even while delivering the film's segregation-is-bad message, which seems archaic and obvious 45 years after the movie's setting. (Shankman certainly shows a more deft touch here than

he did with "Bringing Down the House" and "The Pacifier.")

But there is something refreshing in the innocence of the film, written by Leslie Dixon and based on both Waters' script and the 2002 Broadway hit. No winking, no mugging — just earnest, wholesome, knock-your-socks-off

fun. You'll probably be tempted to burst into applause at the end of the splashier numbers, as several people in the audience did during a recent screening in Hollywood. (The music comes from Marc Shaiman with lyrics by Shaiman and Scott Wittman, Tony winners for the stage version.)

Much of the movie's charm radiates from 18-year-old newcomer Nikki Blonsky, an absolute delight as the film's plus-sized protagonist, Tracy Turnblad, the role that made a then-unknown Ricki Lake a star 20 years ago. She's just so darn perky, so unflappably sunny as she belts her way through the opening tune, "Good Morning Baltimore," she makes it impossible to resist getting caught up in her enthusiasm.

Meanwhile, sitting at home in her robe, ironing and watching all the plot developments from the safety of her rowhouse with a mixture of apprehension and excitement is Tracy's tubby mother, Edna, played famously by John Travolta in drag. As inhabited by Divine in the original film and Harvey Fierstein on Broadway, the part is intended to be portrayed with high camp.

With Travolta, though, there's no sense of fun. He plays it straight, for lack of a better word, and with a touch of pathos. The joke is completely lost, and you never lose sight of the fact that you're watching the star of "Grease" and "Saturday Night Fever," this time brandishing his trademark dance moves while wearing a fat suit. 

FILM | As you've probably guessed from the TV commercials, or even just the billboards, "I Now Pronounce You Chuck & Larry" is a one-joke movie — and that joke might have seemed edgy back in 1977, when Billy Crystal was playing a gay man on "Soap."

Crystal's fellow "Saturday Night Live" alum Adam Sandler and likable lug Kevin James play Brooklyn firefighters who pretend they're a couple to receive domestic part-

ner benefits. They do this because Larry, a widower, is concerned that his kids won't receive life insurance if he dies in a fire. This sets up a litany of obvious gags and adolescent one-liners, followed by a swift, politically correct embrace of gay culture.

Director Dennis Dugan ("Happy Gilmore," "Big Daddy," say no more) wants to have it both ways but never gets either right. It might seem offensive if it weren't so lame.

Suddenly, their fellow firefighters stop playing pick-up basketball with them and feel nervous about showering around them. And while

a fraud inspector (Steve Buscemi in a weasly, unfunny role) starts snooping around suspiciously, their captain at the fire station (Dan Aykroyd) doesn't want to know the truth.

So, Chuck and Larry enlist the help of attorney Alex McDonough (Jessica Biel) to help them defend their case. Trouble is, Alex is astonishingly hot and Chuck, before turning into a faux-mo, was a ravenous ladies' man. And so he agrees to be her buddy on shopping sprees and girlie wine nights, just to be close to her. Of course, because she trusts him so much, she lets him feel her breasts to prove that they're real — we all do that with our gay pals! FRIDAY

Tonight the FunkDC crew takes over one of the best spots in town for those looking to lounge, converse and listen to creative DJs. Kid Gusto, Sean Haney, Moose and Neil Payne will be in rotation all night at SCIENCE CLUB, selecting from their deep arsenal of rare grooves, funk, dub and Afro-Latin workouts. You won't see them all together again for awhile, as they're about to put some new stamps on their passports, so you'll want to take advantage of an evening with the crew without a cover charge.

Many of us vinyl nuts and working DJs rely on the staff at DJ Hut to feed our addiction for new jams, but with the exception of Sam Burns and Stylus Chris, party people aren't generally aware that those hardworking retailers are all accomplished veteran club jocks. After almost 30 years in the game, DJ Dub - known as James Graham to his mom — doesn't have to grind like he did when he was helping to build the D.C. house scene in the '80s. These days he can pick and choose gigs that allow him to share his musical vision with mature and appreciative audiences. Already holding down Wednesdays and Saturdays at MIE-N-YU, he's adding to his Georgetown portfolio with a new Friday weekly at FETOOSH.

SATURDAY

In a town that isn't exactly lacking for polished, slightly dramatic altrock, the Hard Tomorrows were one of the more dependable peddlers of that genre. After four years that included plenty of local shows, an EP and a strong album, the band is calling it quits. Hey, it happens. There wasn't much to separate the Hard Tomorrows from other bands that were able to break out of their respective hometowns to achieve wider success, but that's how the music biz goes. Maybe they needed a better street team. Say goodbye at THE RED & THE BLACK.

Electronic music trends and subgenres come and go with the tides, but the Planet of the Drums keeps rolling along. Three of the country's top drum 'n' bass DJs — Dara. AK1200 and the all-conquering Dieselboy - and MC Messinian have hit the road for the eighth consecutive summer, including a stop tonight at the 9:30 CLUB. The format this year sounds intense: three turntables and three CD decks, with two of the three DJs spinning at any given time, rotating through a selection of records. Expect anything from dark, thunderous beats to whip-cracking breaks. Tickets are \$22 in advance and \$25 at the door.

We're starting to think Stellastarr* would rather be DJs than rock stars. The New York-based new wave band hasn't released an album since September 2005, but it seems to find time to DJ at DC9 and the Rock and Roll Hotel every few months. (Note to the Garutachi/ Electrotease promoters: How about shaking the schedule up a little and putting DJ gigs by Stellastarr* and VHS or Beta on hiatus, eh?) Stellastarr* is back at the ROCK AND ROLL **HOTEL** tonight, along with the everpopular Ris Richards (it's contractually required to mention he was in Q and Not U) and Garutachi resident DJ Ca\$\$idy. The parties can be fun, and the best part is that admission is free if you RSVP to Garutachi.E vents@gmail.com or just show up before 10 p.m.

CAPTIVITY (R. 85 minutes) Director Roland Joffe, the Brit who lit up the world in 1984 with "The Killing Fields," seemed to be on the verge of a major career. But now this: hard R-rated S&M porn on a shoestring. The story follows a young New York "it" girl - model, celeb, jetsetter, club Viking princess (played by Elisha Cuthbert) -- kidnapped, imprisoned, tormented, then tormented again and finally tormented. That's it, that's all there is. Her holding tank is some weird basement full of extremely convenient drawers and lockers and windows, but Joffe keeps playing the same game over and over again. Why? Beats me. (SH)

EAGLE VS SHARK (R, 88 minutes) This movie fits into a small niche of films generally unloved by the larger public: "hopeless nerds muddle through" movies. Those tired unto death of 'splosions and big gooey computer-generated monsters might well put some time into this one and remember that there are actual human beings out there in reality. The reality in question is New Zealand, and our love birds are Jarrod (Jemaine Clement) and Lily (Loren Horsley). She works at a fast-food joint; he's the guru of a computer store. The movie isn't slick by any means and in certain ways seems almost childish. And it isn't funny in any big way so much as recognizable in its patterns of dysfunction, delusion and futility. But you believe in it, because you believe in the small but decent lives of its characters. (sh)

EVAN ALMIGHTY (PG, 95 minutes) The frail idea that supports the most expensive comedy ever made is that a freshman congressman (Steve Carell) of good-hearted earnestness but unbelievable naivete is designated by God (Morgan Freeman) as Noah: The Sequel. Director Tom Shadyac doesn't seem to grasp what's special about Carell: the comic actor's thin. wavery voice, earnest mien, awesome repression and fundamental decency to great effect. He seems to think Carell is a physical comedian and wastes almost a half-hour on endless I-hit-my-thumb stuff. Then he diverts to animal humor and overlabored poop jokes. And finally, the flood. Oh, I know it's a fantasy, it's a joke, nobody should take it seriously. But still, the extensive mayhem by tsunami that Shadyac unleashes is portrayed as comic and casualty-free, but of course adults can't help but be dis-

turbed by imagery of a catastrophe that would have cost many thousands of lives being dismissed so casually. (SH)

EVENING (PG-13, 117 minutes) This multigenerational romance, with traces of tragedy, comes garnished with impeccable good taste and literary pretensions. Adapted from the Susan Minot novel, it stars Vanessa Redgrave as Ann Grant Lord, a woman on her deathbed who is reliving her first love while her adult daughters (Toni Collette and Natasha Richardson) look on. Claire Danes plays young Ann, a bohemian woman who, during the wedding weekend of her best friend, falls for the right guy, breaks the heart of the wrong guy and discovers that the rich are different from you and me, if only because the sticks up their posteriors are made of better wood. It is a terribly refined, painstakingly composed study in aristocratic angst that audiences will be hard-pressed to

FANTASTIC FOUR: RISE OF THE SILVER SURFER (PG. 92 minutes) This is surely the dullest of Hollywood's many comicbook-derived summer movies. Sentient humans should stay away; all others may enter confident that their IQs are already in the Chernobyl-fried range and will not be affected, except for downward. So many flaws, so little time. The movie has too much plot, not enough sense. no personality, action sequences that die wheezing and slobbering like an old dog, and nothing that isn't generic, stereotypical or without personality or vitality. (SH)

1408 (PG-13,94 minutes) Listen up, all you "Hostels," "Saws" and other purveyors of bloody terror. Lay down your whips, chain saws and paring knives to watch a truly scarv movie. Granted, this movie, starring John Cusackand based on a Stephen

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

King short story, is a ghost story, technically speaking. But both genres trade in the same black art: the manipulation of the audience's innermost fears. When Mike Enslin (Cusack), a haunted-house guidebook writer, checks into Room 1408 of the Dolphin Hotel, he learns that familiar objects, such as the clock radio, the Bible and the phone can become instruments of alarming menace. Mike has to enter the tortured past that he's trying to forget, and we realize we are entering Mike's soul and, in a way, our own. Every beat of the film is weighted with significance, and our mounting dread becomes almost intolerable. (рт)

GOLDEN DOOR (PG-13, 118 minutes) Set in the early 20th century, the story about a Sicilian peasant named Salvatore who sets off for America to find his brother and the elusive dream of prosperity and personal peace has been told so many times that yet another movie about it may seem redundant at best, a derivative cliche at worst. But Italian director Emanuele Crialese has infused the age-old plot with dazzling visual style, dollops of magical realism and profound emotional truth. As the impoverished but indomitable Salvatore, Vincenzo Amato is a revelation in an almost wordless performance. (AH)

GYPSY CARAVAN (Unrated, 110 minutes) Imagine the "Buena Vista Social Club" of Romany music and you get the idea behind this affectionate portrait of a group of Roma musicians during a 2001 tour of the United States. Comprising five bands from four countries, the Gypsy Caravan tour celebrated the rich, diverse but also eerily consistent musical traditions of the Roma, commonly (and pejoratively) known as Gypsies, who originated in India and began migrating to Europe and North Africa nearly 1,000 years ago. (AH)

HARRY POTTER AND THE ORDER OF THE PHOENIX (PG-13, 138 minutes) This is one of the most pleasurable films in the series, offering a passel of darkly compelling distractions. And in Daniel Radcliffe, Potterphiles can still enjoy the bespectacled, wiry hero, as he contends with the bureaucratic evil of the Ministry of Magic, the prospect of nemesis Lord Voldemort's return and his first romantic kiss -- with Cho (Katie Leung), the demure student who's clearly sweet on him. The fifth Potter film has trimmed


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Rowling's garrulous, character-crowded novel into an urgently paced thriller that modulates adroitly between psychological darkness and cartoonish slapstick, But British director David Yates and screenwriter Michael Goldenberg, both newcomers to the franchise, have not cut away the story's powerful thematic underpinnings. And the predominantly British cast could make an ordinary drama seem as though it dripped directly from the nib of Shakespeare. But this is a ripping good story, and that magnifies the pleasure of watching these great

INTRODUCING THE DWIGHTS (R, 120 minutes) This Australian movie features a feisty and often entertaining Brenda Blethyn as an aspiring stand-up comedian. But it borrows shamelessly from overfamiliar conceits and overshadows her efforts. Essentially, the movie revisits two tropes: the story of the workingclass dreamer and the older-woman comedies of recent years in which the

characters do something outrageous to make ends meet. Blethyn plays the saltytongued Jean, a canteen cook who's desperate to make it as a comic. But while she schemes and dreams about the big time, she keeps tight emotional control over her two sons, 20-year-old Tim (Khan Chittenden) and his mentally retarded teenage brother, Mark (Richard Wilson). Unfortunately, the cast cannot hide the movie's derivative shortcomings, which only remind us that we've seen better and funnier elsewhere, (pt)

JOSHUA (R, 106 minutes) This horror movie presents a disquieting portrait of domestic unease at its most terrifying, which is to say submerged under the veneer of bourgeois contentment. Sam Rockwell and Vera Farmiga play Brad and Abby Cairn, a prosperous Manhattan couple with a 9-year-old son named Joshua (Jacob Kogan, making an impressive screen debut) and, as the movie opens, a newborn daughter, Lily. When they bring the baby home, Joshua is clearly nonplussed. But what soon becomes clear is that it is his parents who are dangerously out of step. Whether the Cairns are unwilling or unable to con-



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nect with their son, the effect is poisonous, with Joshua — who is admittedly an unnervingly strange kid — going to ever more desperate lengths to win their love, Harrowing, controlled and diabolically self-assured, the movie leaves filmgoers teetering on their own emotional precipices, wondering just where pathos ends and pathology begins. (AH)

KNOCKED UP (R, 125 minutes) Katherine Heigl (TV's "Grey's Anatomy") plays Alison, an up-and-coming TV executive who, celebrating her promotion one night, gets drunk and ends up in bed with a dumpy slacker named Ben, played by Seth Rogen, There's a big misunderstanding about a condom, and, bingo, their one-night stand turns into a nine-month nightmare of facing the music and growing up fast. What a drag, except that in the hands of Judd Apatow ("Freaks and Geeks," "The 40-Year-Old Virgin"), this movie turns out to be not just rude, crude and outrageously funny but a deceptively sophisticated meditation on moral agency - with pot iokes! Heigl and Rogen never generate enough chemistry for the audience to

Lawrence's second version of his story "John Thomas and Lady Jane" is about the sensual education of Constance Chatterley (Marina Hands), whose husband, Lord Clifford Chatterley (Hippolyte Girardot), is wheelchair-bound and imposcenes that ought to be on the cuttingroom floor. But they work. Olivier Dahan's film is both faithful to and freewheeling with the facts of Piaf's life. (PK)

LICENSE TO WED (PG-13, 95 minutes) Robin Williams plays a single minister queasily attracted to a young woman about to get married. He puts her and the beauthrough a kind of ordeal by marriage counseling that seems, for the longest time, calculated to drive them apart. The two kids, Ben and Sadie, are played with a great deal of likability by Mandy Moore and John Krasinski. The movie does a lot of things well. It finds an appropriate spot for, but doesn't vield entirely to, Williams's trademark stream-of-consciousness riffs. It lets him dominateI-95 to Washington while the entire country's transportation, communication and utility systems go blooey. (AH)

MANUFACTURED LANDSCAPES

(Unrated, 90 minutes) Director Jennifer Baichwal focuses on Canadian photographer Edward Burtynsky, who travels the world documenting — artistically rather than journalistically - various man-made blights. Wonders and horrors are pictured; vast drainages coagulated with fiery liquid, looking like World War I warscapes; bleak beaches where chunks of deconstructed ships lie atilt and rotting in the bright Bangladeshi sun, even the interior of a giant Chinese factory that answers the eternal question "Where do irons come from?" Without

LA VIE EN ROSE (PG-13, 103 minutes) This sprawling and passionate film about the miserable life of French singing idol Edith Piaf ought to be a lousy movie. It commits too many of the sins of the hackneyed biopic about an artist, verging on melodrama at times while flirting with the dubious proposition that great pain drives great art. There are awful, silly

for a bit — then moves back to Ben and Sadie. And Ben and Sadie are up to it. But the movie also does strange things. One, it never confronts the darkness of its premise. LIVE FREE OR DIE HARD (PG-13, 130 minutes) An angry webmaster and his hacker minions are busy executing a systemwide monkey wrench that will bring the entire country to its techno-dependent knees. The FBI, on the trail of hacker minion Matt Farrell (Justin Long), asks New York cop John McClane (Bruce Willis) to bring him in for questioning. Thus does Our Man McClane, who began offing terrorists 19 years ago in the very first "Die Hard" (this is the fourth), find himself doing battle with the new cyber-version of the baddies, as he and Matt wend their way down browbeating, hectoring, lecturing or sermonizing, the film makes an inelegant point elegantly: Humanity is altering the landscape drastically and, by implication, irrevocably. It's all the more powerful for being silent in its accusation. (SH)

A MIGHTY HEART (R, 100 minutes) A mournful sense of inevitability pervades this film, in which Angelina Jolie stars as Mariane Pearl, whose husband, Daniel, a Wall Street Journal reporter, was kidnapped in Pakistan and beheaded. The movie, an adaptation of Mariane's memoir, brings that tragedy back with brutally vivid detail as a taut, meticulously crafted police procedural. Director Michael Winterbottom brings all his talents to bear on a densely layered portrait, not just of one woman but of a city. With hand-held cameras and a fearless sense of urgency and spontaneity, he plunges viewers into the impossible beauty of Karachi, conveying both its fascination for foreign

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correspondents like the Pearls, but also the daunting, needle-in-a-haystack task of finding Danny. It is an epic romance, at once doomed and full of hope, about two people in love with the world, even when it didn't love them back. (AH)

OCEAN'S THIRTEEN (PG-13, 118 minutes) This movie, the third in a series of hipster capers, ripped off from the original Sinatra Rat Pack hipster caper in the '60s, returns the usual suspects to their usual positions doing their usual shtick in their usual venue. Abandoning

the Europe of "Twelve," it's once again about a big Vegas casino takedown. The Ocean gang's scam this time is in retaliation for Pacino's Willie Bank muscling poor Reuben Tishkoff (Elliot Gould) out of his property, his legacy and his health And, oh, yeah, you've got both Brad Pitt and George Clooney, but they just sort of stand there, Pitt eating, Clooney looking like he lost the script and hoping nobody notices, until he remembers: Oh, yeah, there wasn't any script. (SH)

ONCE (R, 85 minutes) Glen Hansard, of the Irish band the Frames, makes an improbably electrifying screen debut in this sweet, small musical set in Dublin. Director John Carney puts Hansard and





his lovely co-star, the Czech singer Marketa Irglova, in various settings—an instrument shop, a winey dinner party, the back of a bus — where breaking into song makes a certain amount of sense. PRIVATE FEARS IN PUBLIC PLACES

(Unrated, 120 minutes) Adapted from an Alan Ayckbourn play, this film by 85year-old French director Alain Resnais is a subtle comedy of manners, about six people looking for love, that examines the passing ironies of life, or these peo-

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ple's lives in particular, as they tackle their emotional problems. As with so many of Resnais's films, the movie unfolds with a mysterious mastery. (DT)

RATATOUILLE (G, 110 minutes) A production of Walt Disney and Pixar Animation Studios, this movie has a three-dimensional, so-real-you-can-touch-it quality, with characters that seem more like tactile puppets than two-dimensional beings. And it harks back to Disney's older era, when cartoons seemed part of a more

elegant world with less edgy characters. Remy (voice of Patton Oswalt) is a rat with a gourmet's sense of taste and smell, a skill set that means nothing to his fellow scavengers. When he becomes fixated with the writings of celebrated master chef Gusteau, his heart swells with grand purpose. Through an entertaining series of calamities, Remy literally lands in Gusteau's very kitchen. Observed mostly from Remy's rat's-eye view, Gusteau's kitchen is a memorable world-in-miniature with its vivid old-fashioned stoves, bright, brassy pots and general air of frenzied industry; never did sliced red onions or simmering soup look so fresh and real. (рт)

RESCUE DAWN (PG-13, 126 minutes) There's a sense of austerity underlying Werner Herzog's fictionalized adaptation of his own 1997 documentary, "Little Dieter Needs to Fly." The new movie stars Christian Bale as Dieter Dengler, a Navy pilot who was shot down over Laos in 1966 and then masterminded a brilliant escape from a querrilla prison camp. Fears that Dengler's breathtaking story would be reduced to just another summertime blockbuster were only partially allayed by the fact that Herzog himself would be responsible for the elisions, compressions and necessary compromises involved in shoehorning a complicated true story into a neat, three-act structure. He has succeeded, making a classic wartime thriller on a par with "Stalag 17" and "The Great Escape" while keeping intact the quirks and idiosyncrasies of Dengler's sometimes confounding character. (AH)

SHREK THE THIRD (PG, 93 minutes)
This sequel's humor is all in the business and nowhere in the lame story's two subplots. In one, Shrek (voiced by Mike Myers) becomes king upon the death of the frog king of Far Far Away. He doesn't like it and goes in search of a kid named Arthur who is the real heir to the throne. Meanwhile, the disgruntled Prince Charming (Rupert Everett) is plotting a coup. So, the movie cuts between

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
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
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Shrek's adventures and the revolutionary politics of Far Far Away, which culminate in Princess Fiona (Cameron Diaz) and her court being imprisoned. Shrek and the boy king (Justin Timberlake) return and run a counter-coup, which climaxes in—this is where it gets a little weird—a huge musical comedy number. (sн)

SICKO (PG-13, 113 minutes) Michael Moore's investigation into and indictment of the U.S. health-care system turns out to be a fuzzy, toothless collection of anecdotes, a few stunts and a bromide-rich conclusion. The problem: He never goes for the big picture. He has some fun (and gives some fun) with what might be called inciting incidents - metaphorical examples, up-close-and-personals with the aggrieved, some muckraking and the like. But in the end, it's as if he's afraid of losing his audiences with charts, numbers and assessments from neutral sources. Moore never interviews actual veterans of the system: doctors, nurses, administrators — only the victims. Thus we get a bottom-up, not a top-down or a full-frontal view of the creaking system. (sн)

SURF'S UP (PG, 82 minutes) This is a nifty family movie with enough of a new-old look and fresh vocal talent to make it a refreshing break from summer retreads. Shia LaBeouf voices teenage penguin Cody Maverick, who longs to leave his fish-sorting job and ride the tubes with his surfing heroes. When Cody makes the acquaintance of a comely lifeguard (Zooey Deschanel) and a crusty old salt (Jeff Bridges), he finds there are bigger things in life than winning. It's an old story, but directors Ash Brannon and Chris Buck infuse it with terrific wit and energy, structuring it like a mock documentary and doing a remarkable job of approximating vintage film stock. (AH)

TALK TO ME (R, 120 minutes) Presidents come and go, as do parties, issues, wars, crises and even movie critics, but for the longest time, one thing in Washington was as solid as the pillars at Treasury: This was Petey Greene's town. He stayed, he lasted, he endured, and only death moved him along. Ralph Waldo "Petey" Greene, talk-show host, community activist and TV star, had a big, fast, funny mouth, and he rode it a long way, from prison to fame. This movie tells that story, and it makes you feel not only the joy people experienced in the wash of Greene's raucous, truth-saying humor but also his wisdom and calm. The movie re-creates those days when AM radio



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Who Loves the Sun?

HIGH GAS PRICES, the need for alternate energy sources, and even global warming are tiny blips next to the problem encountered in the intriguing but ultimately unsatisfying sci-fi tale "Sunshine," in which our friend Mr. Sun runs out of fuel. From director Danny Boyle and screenwriter Alex Garland, the team behind the horror mini-hit "28 Days Later," "Sunshine" recounts the bleak saga of a spaceship crew on a mission to recharge the sun, whose imminent death has cast Earth into a winter that will soon extinguish humanity. The visually radiant film is wildly different in tone and style from the manic "28 Days Later" yet has a similarly flawed structure: a riveting beginning and middle with a finale that feels shallow and tacked on. DAVID GERMAIN (AP)

was the weapon of mass communication, hair was big, attitudes were screechy and in your face, and the African-American community was searching for a voice of authenticity. The movie is a tribute to a truth, however: Talent and guts can get you far, and you don't even have to sell out to make it. (sн)

TRANSFORMERS (PG-13, 144 minutes) Director Michael Bay has superbly universalized the Transformers franchise, a behemoth of a subculture that includes an animated television series, comic books, a line of toys, a movie and Japanese TV spinoffs. This movie has some of the best action sequences you'll see all summer, but it's about more than explosions and robots. It's also a warmly appealing comedy centered on delightfully jittery teenager Sam Witwicky (Shia LaBeouf), who has to not only save the world but also watch for the facial blemishes and dorky moves that might jeopardize his other pressing project: getting into the good graces of comely new companion Mikaela Banes (Megan Fox).

The movie also underscores how emotionally connected we all have become to technology. What's so crazy, really, about a blitzkrieg action flick that takes that irrational sense of attachment and runs with it? It's just another day in the high-tech neighborhood. (SH)

YOU KILL ME (R, 92 minutes) The Krzeminski crime family is losing its turf, and their hit man, Frank, has more intimate problems, namely the quart of gin he drinks — every half-hour. When he sleeps through a hit, the benevolent Roman Krzeminski (Philip Baker Hall) orders that he be sent to San Francisco to dry out in a 12-step program. That's the black joke at the center of this acerbic. mordant noir tickler from director John Dahl: If AA can restore fallen sinners to sainthood, it can also restore fallen saints to sinnerhood. (SH)

Purchasing medicine could put your name in a tracking system

Detective Brian Lewis returns to his desk after lunch, scanning e-mails he missed.

One catches his eye: It says a suspected member of a methamphetamine ring bought a box of Sudafed at 1:34 p.m. at a CVS pharmacy.

Minutes later. Lewis is in his truck, circling the parking lot, searching for the woman.

Lewis did not find her that day, but the scenario illustrates the way law enforcement is increasingly relying on computerized tracking systems in its fight against meth, an illegal drug that is often brewed in makeshift labs and has become a particular scourge in Appalachia and the Midwest.

Tracking systems are gradually being installed in pharmacies nationwide in response to a federal law that, since March 2006, has regulated purchases of pseudoephedrine, a key ingredient in the manufacture of meth. Pseudoephedrine is found in many over-the-counter cold and allergy medicines.

Then the system notifies detectives via e-mail when a customer has exceeded the purchase limit.

MethCheck will be used at about 7,000 pharmacies in 43 states by next year, said Rick Jones, spokesman for Louisville-based Appriss Inc., which developed Meth-Check.

Consumer privacy watchdogs are troubled by the technology, worrying that people with colds or allergies could come under suspicion for unwittingly exceeding the purchasing limits by stocking up for themselves or family members. That has happened to at least eight people in Kentucky, Lewis said.

"People's health information it's intimate, it's personal, it's something people desperately want to keep private," said Beth Wilson, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union in Kentucky. "For law enforcement to do an investigation, there must be a reasonable suspicion. I'm not sure People's health

CVS is participating in the voluntary Kentucky program and plans to install MethCheck in most of its 6,200 stores across the country.

"We wanted to make sure we were in compliance [with federal law] and have a solution that would be the least time-consuming for our customers and easiest for employees," CVS spokesman Mike DeAngelis said.





Vick Indictment

Washington Post NFL Insider MARK MASKE was online Thursday to discuss the indictment of Atlanta Falcons QB Michael Vick on dogfighting charges.

What is the likelihood that the NFL or the Falcons will throw Vick off the team and/or out of the league? It seems to me he is guilty of moral turpitude, which is, if I'm not mistaken, cause for dismissal.

One thing that was suggested to me yesterday by an executive on another team was that the Falcons possibly could grant Vick a leave of absence to deal with his legal troubles. That way, he's out of the picture for the duration of the case without the team or the league having to make any pronouncement about its views as to his guilt or innocence.

Though most civilized people cringe at the idea of dogfighting being a "sport," the reason dogfights are staged is for betting on the outcome. If Vick were involved only in the gambling side of dogfighting, then shouldn't he be out the door as an NFL player?

The gambling part is one of the many troubling aspects of this entire episode. Another troubling aspect is that dogfighting experts will tell you that it has become a recreational activity for urban gang members and criminals, so you're talking about making some very troublesome associations.

How realistic is Vick's claim that he knew nothing about what was taking place on his property?

Your opinion is every bit as valid as mine or anyone else's at this point. It's hard to say, though, until Vick responds to the allegations and the prosecutors get into a courtroom to try to prove what they've alleged.

■ Kristin Gore, daughter of ex-Vice President Al Gore, grew up in D.C. Now a writer in Los Angeles, she used her inside info on Secret Service guards, Adams Morgan bars and presidential scandals to write the satirical novel "Sammy's House" (\$25, Hyperion). She reads from the tale of a White House staffer's personal and political travails July 20 at 7 p.m. at Politics & Prose (5015 Connecticut Ave. NW).

Did you know a lot of young, eager women like Sammv in D.C.?

There were so many men and women in their 20s and 30s who were like her — idealistic and passionate. There's a stereotype of D.C. being this old, boring, stuffy town, but, really, it has this energy and vitality and all these young people in powerful positions.

You have lots of little details about working in the White House in here. What's true?

I wanted to sprinkle in real things, like that they sedate the Thanksgiving turkey. But I also felt liberated to create a cast of characters and then ground them in a world I knew. What happens there can be stranger than fiction.

How do you know when enough satire is enough?

There are definitely parts of this book I could've made darker, but I really was more interested in giving readers sort of a warm feeling.

Any fave D.C. books or movies?

I haven't sampled many myself. I never watched "The West Wing," because it seemed too close to home. I read "Thank You for Smoking," and that it's very funny.

I like how the book really feels like it's set here — it doesn't just rely on scenes in postcard locations.

Yeah, I wanted to show what happens beyond the political world at bars and restaurants. But I also wanted things about the basic lay-

out of Capitol Hill and the White House, things like details of a state dinner. I thought of D.C. as a character in and of itself.

Do you miss anything about D.C.?

I love Rock Creek Park. And I used to spend a lot of time in at the Uptown Theater and in Dupont Circle at Kramerbooks & Afterwords.

How do you like L.A.?

In a lot of ways, L.A. feels like an alien planet. It's such a big city.

What's your writing space like in your L.A. place?

I've had an exciting recent development at home — I have my own office! Before, I was always in the corner of the bedroom or the kitchen. My office has bright orange

walls. I get a visual jolt every time I look up from the computer.

Has living in California changed how you dress?

Area beauty companies are looking to treat body and soul

Buying local is great for the environment and the economy. But can it be good for your skin, too? Three local companies are producing skin care and cosmetic lines that should put D.C. on the beauty map.

"You have the right to enjoy a product that was made [just] for you," says Cecelia Gordian of the Bowie-based Just Peachy Organics (justpeachyorganics.com). Gordian has been mixing small batches of her own line of lotions and potions by hand from her own home since 2005.

Customers can choose existing scents and products from the Web site — Peppermint Foot and Body Cream (\$14) and citrus mint shower gel (\$14.50) were among our favorites. Or, they can have Gordian

whip them up a custom lotion, body oil, foot scrub or shower gel from a list of organic and natural ingredients like bergamot, ginger spice and hemp seed oil.

"Peach is my passion," says
Gordian, but she admits that
it's not everyone's favorite
smell. "Sometimes customers love the formula but want
a different scent. I make it.
Whatever you want, you can
have it." The lotions are incredibly moisturizing and will leave you
stroking your elbows in wonder.

In 2001, Utokia Langley started BeHold Me LLC (beholdme.com) by standing on the corner of 16th and K streets NW with nothing but a sample of her signature perfume in one hand and a bunch of tester strips in the other. As women passed by, she'd offer them samples of the sexy blend of tangerine, mandarin, musk and jasmine.

Her aim with the scent, as well as with a skincare line and products like sugar scrubs and fruit-scented soaps, is to boost women's self-

esteem. If you use her products, she says, "you feel better about yourself — you feel confident and get a glow about you."

A victim of domestic abuse, Langley gives a portion of the company's proceeds to charities that help other women escape it.

"Women have come so far," she says. "We're corporate executives,

we're business owners. A lot of that comes from self-confidence, but you don't lose your feminine side." After all, she says, "If you look good and smell good, you feel good."

And, sure enough, we felt great after trying the Mango Melt Soy Body Butter Creme (\$14), which was lightweight and not greasy. It absorbed easily and smelled like a delicious fruit smoothie. Other treats from the line include beauty bars (\$6.50) and massage candles (\$12) in blends like "Lemon Love" and "Kiwi Strawberry Hug."

Debra Clair grew up in an organic household in the San Francisco Bay area. She had no idea what went into most ordinary cosmetics until she became a makeup artist on the East Coast. Looking at the labels on various cosmetic products, "I was completely horrified," she says. "I didn't realize how many synthetics were in commercial products."

In 2003 she founded Perfect Organics (perfectorganics.com) in Merrifield, Va. "We are green from start to finish," she says. "There is no long-term health or beauty without clean air, soil and water."

With that motto in mind, her company turns out an extensive line of earth-friendly, face and body beautifying products. Clean-smelling, crisply packaged stuff includes shea butter lip balms and body washes to vegan lip and cheek shimmer sticks.

Sold via the Internet as well as at Whole Foods and other stores, the company's profile became even bigger this year — it was invited to be exhibited at this year's Sundance Film Festival this year and to provide gifts to attendees. Celebs and the makeup artists who make them pretty are fans.

We tried Perfect Organics' Lip and Cheek Shimmer — in the earthy, pink-brown D.C. shade, naturally (\$19, Whole Foods). It looked subtly iridescent and blended smoothly.

Grapefruit Lavender Coconut Body Glow (\$23) is so rich and super-concentrated that it's best used in small amounts. It can go on the face, body and hair and gives a whopping dose of moisture.

And though it was made just outside the Beltway, the stuff smelled like some island paradise. No one ever said local products couldn't make you feel like you were far, far away. L. WEHRMEYER




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

Pursuits of Happiness

Hobbies from beer making to topiary cutting will fill your pad

There's nothing more chilling than visiting someone's house to find that it looks just like the Pottery Barn catalog, down to the nicely placed eucalyptus candles pictured on Page 11. But people who cram their schedules (and homes) with passionate, extracurricular pursuits (topiary trimming, ice-sculpture carving, taxidermy) never run the risk of having their pads — or their cocktail party banter — seem dull.

In her new book "Get a Hobby: 101 All-Consuming Diversions for Any Lifestyle" (\$20, Collins), ReadyMade contributing editor Tina Barseghian lays out the details about taking up dozens of soul-enriching, house-decorating, time-passing amusements, from ant farming to wood whittling. We caught up with her in between her own fave distractions: flea-marketing and gardening.

Which hobbies in here will surprise people?

Well, I found lots of things that weren't so familiar in the U.S., things that thrive in the U.K., where they take hobbies very seriously. Like falconry, which is teaching falcons how to hunt for prey. Or doing gravestone

rubbings, where you take a huge piece of paper and do a rubbing of a tombstone with charcoal.

The book has a quiz showing how to chose a pursuit based on your personality. Why did you decide to do that?

I think it's overwhelming to look at a long list of hobbies and think, "Where am I going to start?" The quiz gives clues as to what you might like. Say you're a doodler - you might want to look for something artistic. Or if you're into computers, you might like robot-building.

What can hobbies do for people, besides taking their money and filling their houses with stuff?

I think people have dull jobs, like they're accountants. But then they go home and build model trains or they fly kites, and it gives them immense pleasure. I think it can be meditative getting lost in something you love doing.

Do you think people with DIY tendencies have nicer-looking houses or better parties?

Yeah — all those food hobbies, like canning, coffee roasting and candy making, a lot of it's about pride in getting what you're making just right and sharing it with friends.

And lots of hobbies do have a physical by-product. Like furniture restoration — it's something where you love the process and then you end up with an immaculate piece of furniture. And if you do watercolor or some other form of art, then you're accumulating things that are in your own style. You're building a home you want to look at.

Several of the hobbies you mention involve collecting something. What's behind the urge to accumulate stuff?

Each person has their own reason. For some people, it's therapy. I collect tea tins, and I just love the way they look. And I think people who collect stamps like the sense of adventure they represent.

Why have crafty hobbies like knitting, batiking and woodworking come back into style?

There's been such a revival in interest. You see all these books at the store now, and they aren't targeted at our grandparents. There are so many 35-year-old women in knitting groups. I really think it's about putting a stamp on your own objects rather than buying them.

So, which hobbies won't you be taking up anytime soon?

Well, the whole taxidermy culture is interesting, but I find it disgusting. But they really take a lot of pride in making these dead animals look good. It's kind of an existential thing. Jennifer Barger (Express)

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




