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



A Hormone Hunger-Fighter

WASHINGTON | Scientists have discovered a biological brake for a hunger hormone: a competing hormone that seems to counter the urge to eat.

The substance, named obestatin, has been tested just in laboratory rats so far. But if it pans out, the discovery of the dueling hormones could lead not only to a new appetite suppressant, but also help unravel the complex ways that the body regulates weight.

It turns out that the same gene sparks production of the two opposing hormones,

Stanford University researchers say in Friday's edition of the journal *Science*.

Years of research lie ahead to see if obestatin might work as an appetite suppressor. Other weight-related hormones announced to great fanfare, such as leptin, have yet to lead to obesity treatments, and scientists now know that dozens of hormones probably are involved in weight gain and loss. But with one-third of American adults obese and only a few prescription drugs providing modest weight-loss help, every new clue generates intense interest. (AP)

Jordan Outraged By Attack

Arab world sees outpouring of anger after al Qaeda strike

AMMAN, JORDAN | Thousands of Jordanians rallied in the capital and other cities shouting "Burn in hell, Abu Musab al-Zarqawi!" a day after three deadly hotel bombings that killed at least 59 people. Officials suspected Iraqi involvement in the attacks, which were claimed by al Qaeda's Iraq branch.

As protesters in Jordan and elsewhere in the Arab world denounced the Jordanian-born leader of al Qaeda in Iraq, security forces snared a group of Iraqis for questioning and officials said one of the bombers spoke Iraqi-accented Arabic before he exploded his suicide belt in the Grand Hyatt Hotel.

King Abdullah II, a strong U.S. ally, vowed in a nationally televised address to "pursue those criminals and those behind them, and we will get to them wherever they are."

Two Americans were killed and four wounded in the bombings Wednesday evening at the Hyatt, the Radisson SAS and the Days Inn, State Department spokesman Noel Clay said. Significantly, the victims also included some two dozen Palestinians with roots in the West Bank. Many Jordanians and Palestinians have supported the Iraqi insurgency, but the hotel bombings could tip Arab sentiment against al-Zarqawi. PAUL GARWOOD (AP)



ELECTIONS A Candidate With Conviction

The winner of a Romoland, Calif., school board election didn't campaign, attend forums or even go to any school board meetings before the vote—because he was in jail. Randy Logan Hale won 831 votes in Tuesday's election, securing one of three open seats. "This is wild, he'll be glad," said his wife. Hale was returned to prison in September for violating his parole on convictions for spousal abuse and drug possession, officials said, and is due to be released Feb. 15. He declared his candidacy in August. The superintendent said he's consulting lawyers to figure out what to do. (AP)



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

WASHINGTON Scientists Report Discovery Of Prehistoric Crocodile

In the era when dinosaurs ruled the Jurassic earth, a 13-foot oceanic crocodile with a short snout and a mouthful of deadly teeth hunted large creatures in the sea, scientists reported Thursday. The discovery of the creature, nicknamed "Godzilla," but given the scientific name Dakosaurus andiensis, was reported Thursday in ScienceExpress, the online edition of the journal Science. (AP)

NEW ORLEANS Prosecutor Investigating Problems With Levee System

A federal prosecutor said Thursday he's pursuing tips about corruption relating to the building and maintenance of levees that broke during Hurricane Katrina. U.S. Attorney Jim Letten said his office is focused on the political and business relationships of those involved in building the levees, not whether the levees were poorly constructed. Letten declined to say whether he's investigating federal or local officials. (AP)

House Leaders Scuttle Budget Vote

Delay in approving bill comes as moderates assail some provisions

WASHINGTON | House Republican leaders scuttled a vote Thursday on a \$51 billion budget-cut package in the face of a revolt by moderate lawmakers over cuts to Medicaid, food stamp and student loan programs.

The episode marked a setback for Republicans on Capitol Hill. They had hoped to use the budget debate to burnish their deficit-cutting credentials with the public and their

core political supporters, many of whom are disappointed with their party's performance on spending.

The decision by GOP leaders came despite a big concession to moderates Wednesday, when the leaders dropped provisions to open the Arctic National Refuge to oil and gas exploration, as well as a plan letting states lift a moratorium on oil drilling off the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

But moderates countered that the spending cuts in the House budget plan were a separate issue from Arctic drilling. The cuts were too severe, moderates argued, especially

when compared with a significantly milder Senate budget plan that passed last week.

Democrats mounted a furious attack on the GOP budget plan for its cuts to social programs and pounded home the message that the overall GOP plan would increase the deficit when coupled with a subsequent tax cut bill.

Acting Majority Leader Roy Blunt said it was a "disappoint-

ing deadline to miss," but said the leadership was short a "handful" of votes and faced uncertainty about absenteeism as lawmakers looked ahead to a long Veterans Day weekend.

"I think we'll have the votes next week," Blunt said.

Others are not so sure, noting that moderate opponents to the bill seemed unusually resolute.

The overall bill is a Republican priority. The Senate last week passed a milder version to curb the automatic growth of federal spending by \$35 billion through the end of the decade. ANDREW TAYLOR (AP)

Committee to Review Leak on Secret Prisons

House leaders reject calls for renewed look at pre-Iraq War intel

WASHINGTON | The House Intelligence Committee will look into a possible leak of classified information about secret CIA prisons but will not reopen its 2003 inquiry into prewar intelligence on Iraq.

As calls for intelligence-related reviews grow on Capitol Hill, Rep. Peter Hoekstra, R-Mich., said Thursday his committee will study several specific leaks of clas-

sified information, including a Nov. 2 Washington Post story that discussed the existence of secret CIA prisons overseas. The story said the "black sites" were in eight countries, including democracies in Eastern Europe. Hoekstra would not confirm the story's accuracy or whether the prisons exist.

California Rep. Jane Harman, the committee's top Democrat, said the committee should return to its work on the prewar intelligence on Iraq. She was echoing efforts of Senate Democrats to draw attention to the administration's mistakes on the war. KATHERINE SHRADER (AP)

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

Mea Culpa in Sacramento

Schwarzenegger takes blame after rebuke by voters, vows patience

SACRAMENTO | Two days after suffering a stinging election defeat, a conciliatory Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger took responsibility for the failure of his initiatives and said he learned that he needs more patience in seeking government reform.

"The buck stops with me," he told reporters Thursday during a Capitol news conference, referring to the clean sweep against his proposals in Tuesday's special election. "I take full responsibility for this election. I take full responsibility for its failure."



Gov. Schwarzenegger promises greater cooperation with the state legislature.

Voters rejected each of the initiatives Schwarzenegger was pushing on the ballot. He sought to implement a state spending cap and give the governor authority to make mid-year budget cuts, change the way

legislative districts are drawn, lengthen the probationary period for teachers and restrict the ability of public employee unions to raise money for political campaigns.

The governor's statements to reporters came after he had summoned the top legislative leaders from both parties to his office. The Democratic leaders said the governor had promised to work with them on education, transportation and other problems facing California.

"Everybody understands that we've got to put down the boxing gloves and ... get some stuff done," Assembly Speaker Fabian Nunez, D-Los Angeles, said after the 37-minute meeting. JULIET WILLIAMS (AP)

Alleged School Shooter Could Be Charged as Adult

JACKSBORO, TENN. | A 15-year-old accused of shooting an assistant principal to death and wounding two other administrators should be tried as an adult, the district attorney said Wednesday, adding that the victims performed heroically to keep the shootings from becoming even worse.

Ken Bartley Jr. was being held without bond in a juvenile detention facility in Knoxville and could have an initial court appearance in the next few days.

Authorities said the shooting Tuesday at the 1,400-student school began after Bartley was called to the office because other students had seen him with a gun on campus. (AP)

Remaining World War I Vets Dwindling

WASHINGTON | Lloyd Brown remembers Armistice Day in 1918 as few — ever so few — veterans can.

"For the servicemen, there were lots of hugs and kisses," recalled Brown, now 104, of Charlotte Hall, Md. — a teenage seaman aboard the battleship USS New Hampshire, in port stateside when the fighting stopped.

No one knows exactly how many

of America's World War I veterans will celebrate Veterans Day, which marks the armistice of Nov. 11, 1918, that ended what then was considered the Great War. An estimated 2 million Americans served in Europe after the U.S. entered the war in 1917.


Today, the Veterans Affairs Department estimates that no more than 50 World War I vets remain. (AP)


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

Candidate Poised to Become Africa's First Female Leader

A former finance minister and Harvard graduate claimed victory Thursday in Liberia's presidential election, a win that, if certified, would make her the first elected female leader ever in Africa. With just over 90 percent of the ballots counted, Ellen Johnson-Sirleaf had 59 percent of the vote and former international soccer star George Weah nearly 41 percent, the National Elections Commission said. Weah's camp gave no immediate word on whether he was conceding defeat in the vote. (AP)

Peru Withdraws Ambassador To Japan Over Fujimori Case

Peru's Foreign Ministry said in a terse statement that it was withdrawing its ambassador from Japan in an apparent protest of that country's response to Peruvian attempts to extradite former President Alberto Fujimori. Peru had sought Fujimori, who fled to Japan in 2000, until his capture in Chile Monday. Japan had rebuffed the Peruvian extradition requests. (AP)

U.S. Allies Under Increasing Assault

Attacks on targets in Arab nations could backfire on al Qaeda

AMMAN, JORDAN | America's two key Arab allies have now felt the hard fist of the al Qaeda offshoot the United States is battling in Iraq — first Egypt, and now Jordan.

Amman's hotel bombings proved again that extremists like Abu Musab al-Zarqawi remain determined to expand their deadly threat beyond U.S. troops — to Arabs who oppose their world views.

"There are two elements to his strategy, which is to divide U.S. allies and turn them against America," said Mark Ensalaco, director of International Studies at the University of Dayton, Ohio. "But there's also al Qaeda's fundamental cause, which is to create strict Islamic states in Jordan and Egypt."

Many Palestinians and Jordanians supported the Iraqi insurgency, but Wednesday's attack in Amman could tip Arab sentiment against al-Zarqawi.

Hundreds of Jordanians thronged the streets of the kingdom Thursday to protest the attacks, a move reminiscent of the outrage voiced by thousands of Moroccans last Sunday after al Qaeda threatened to kill two Moroccan diplomats kidnapped in Iraq. JAMAL HALABY (AP)

Al Qaeda Tries to Justify Hotel Blasts

CAIRO, EGYPT | In an apparent response to Jordanians who took to the streets to call for its leader to "burn in hell," al Qaeda in Iraq took the rare step Thursday of trying to justify the triple suicide bombings that killed 56 people, mostly Arabs.

Earlier Thursday, the group posted a Web statement claiming responsibility for Wednesday's attacks.

Then a second al Qaeda statement appeared on the Internet "to explain for Muslims part of the reason holy warriors targeted these dens." That statement appeared after Arab-wide expressions of outrage.

"Let all know that we have struck only after becoming confident that they are centers for launching war on Islam and support the crusaders'

presence in Iraq and the Arab peninsula and the presence of the Jews on the land of Palestine," the group said.

The statement said the hotels that were hit were "favorite places for the work of the intelligence organs, especially those of the Americans, the Israelis and some western European countries" for what the group called "invisible battles in the so-called war on terrorism." (AP)

Chirac Confronts Troubled Suburbs

French leader says social inequalities are 'undeniable problems'

PARIS | President Jacques Chirac for the first time directly addressed the inequalities and discrimination that have fueled two weeks of rioting across France, saying Thursday that the country has "undeniable problems" in its poor suburbs.

Violence continued to slow under state-of-emergency measures and heavy policing, with far fewer skirmishes and fewer cars burned. Chirac had kept largely silent about

France's worst unrest since the 1968 student-worker uprising: In 14 days of violence, he had spoken publicly on the crisis only once.

Once order is restored, Chirac

said Thursday, France will have to "draw the consequences of this crisis, and do so with a lot of courage and lucidity."

The unrest, which started among youths in the northeastern suburban Paris town of Clichy-sous-Bois angry over the accidental electrocution deaths of two teenagers grew into a nationwide wave of arson and nightly clashes between rioters armed with firebombs and police retaliating with tear gas.

The crisis has led to collective soul-searching about France's failure to integrate its African and Muslim minorities. (AP)

N. Korea: U.S. Undermining Nuclear Talks

BEIJING | North Korea criticized the United States for undermining the spirit of cooperation at six-nation talks on the North's nuclear programs, casting a pall over discussions aimed at persuading the regime to disarm, news reports and the U.S. envoy said. North Korea and the United States appear deadlocked on the basics: the former refuses to disarm completely without concessions, while the latter wants to see the weapons programs dismantled before granting rewards. (AP)

ON RELIGION: Iraqi President Jalal Talabani met with Pope Benedict XVI on Thursday, assuring him that the rights of Christians and other religious minorities are guaranteed under Iraq's new constitution. Christians make up 800,000 of Iraq's 26 million people.

Syria Will Allow Interviews in Hariri Case

UNITED NATIONS | Syria will allow U.N. investigators to question six officials about the assassination of Lebanon's former prime minister at any U.N. facility in a third country, Syria's U.N. ambassador said Thursday.

Fayssal Mekdad said he didn't foresee any problems if chief U.N. investigator Detlev Mehlis wanted to interview the six Syrian officials at U.N. offices in Geneva or Vienna, for example. But he said Mehlis

"should be sensitive" to conducting interviews in Beirut following Syria's withdrawal of troops from Lebanon.

Mekdad spoke to a few reporters after Syrian President Bashar Assad said in a speech in Damascus that Mehlis had rejected Syria's terms for interviewing the six

officials. Assad said his government would cooperate with the U.N. investigation that implicated Syrian officials in the killing of Rafik Hariri, but warned the policy would end if Syria were to be harmed.

Asked about the "mixed signals" from Assad's speech and whether there were any limits on Syrian cooperation with the Mehlis investigation, Mekdad replied: "There are no limits, whatsoever, at all."

"We will provide him with the people he needs to investigate, or to ask," the Syrian envoy said. (AP)

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Iraq Blasts Target Police, Military

Attacks at restaurant, recruiting center kill 42 people, wound 38

BAGHDAD, IRAQ | Bombers killed 42 people Thursday at a Baghdad restaurant favored by police and an army recruiting center to the north, while Iraqi troops along the Iranian border found 27 decomposing bodies, unidentified victims of the grisly violence plaguing the country.

In the deadliest bombing in Baghdad since Sept. 19, a suicide bomber blew himself up in a restaurant about 9:45 a.m., when officers usually stop in for breakfast. Police Maj. Falah al-Mohammedawi said 35 officers and civilians died and 25 were wounded.

Al Qaeda in Iraq claimed in an

Internet posting that it staged the attack in retaliation for U.S. and Iraqi operations near the Syrian border. Earlier, it claimed responsibility for Wednesday night's deadly hotel bombings in neighboring Jordan, linking those blasts to the conflict in Iraq.

The blast was the most deadly since a car bomb ripped through a market in a poor Shiite Muslim neighborhood on the eastern outskirts of Baghdad, killing at least 30 people and wounding 38 on Sept. 19.

Thursday's other big attack came in Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit, 80 miles north of the capital, where a car bomb blew up in the middle of a group of men outside an Iraqi army recruiting center. Seven were killed and 13 wounded, police Capt. Hakim al-Azawi said. (AP)

China Reports New Bird Flu Outbreaks

BEIJING | China reported two new bird flu outbreaks in poultry Thursday and quarantined 116 people, while Kuwait confirmed the first known cases in the Persian Gulf, in an imported peacock and a wild flamingo.

The World Health Organization

said it was sending experts to China to help investigate whether bird flu killed a 12-year-old girl last month.

Chinese authorities quarantined 116 people after the latest outbreaks Sunday of the deadly H5N1 strain of the virus killed 1,100 chickens in the cities of Fuxin and Jinzhou. (AP)

Mont. County to File Drug Lawsuit

FDA blocks prescription imports from Canada

COLLEGE PARK, MD. | The county that is home to the federal Food and Drug Administration plans to take legal action against the agency, seeking to overturn its decision not to grant the county a waiver to import prescription drugs from Canada for public employees.

Montgomery County was notified by the FDA on Tuesday that it would not be granted a waiver to allow county employees to buy

cheaper drugs from Canada, a program approved earlier this month by the county council.

The county appeal of the denied waiver follows the lead of Vermont, which filed a lawsuit against the FDA in 2004 after its request for a similar exemption to import Canadian drugs was refused. A federal judge threw that lawsuit out in September, saying the FDA hadn't broken any laws by denying

the waiver request. The state will not appeal the ruling.

David Weaver, a spokesman for Montgomery County Executive Douglas Duncan, said the FDA's decision to reject Montgomery's request was arbitrary, and that there is a provision under the Medicare Prescription Drug and Improvement Act that would allow the agency to grant a waiver.

An FDA spokeswoman did not immediately respond to an e-mail message seeking comment.

Weaver did not say where or when the appeal would be filed.

The county hopes to save money by allowing employees to import drugs from Canada that are cheaper than those sold at U.S. pharmacies. Several states and jurisdictions have adopted similar programs. But the FDA maintains such drug importation plans are illegal, saying it has little control over the safety and quality of those drugs, many of which are made in other countries. Region to Get More Funds To Stop Spread of Gangs

Forced with increasingly brazen incidents of gang violence, members of Congress from Maryland and Virginia said Thursday that the region can count on more federal help to halt gang encroachment into rural and suburban communities. The Northern Virginia Regional Gang Task Force, for instance, will receive an additional \$2.5 million for its efforts in Fairfax and Loudoun counties and the surrounding area. (AP)

State Commission Pushes Revised Drunk Driving Law

Virginia's state crime commission recommended legislation Thursday to get around a maverick Fairfax County judge's ruling that a key component of the state's drunk driving law is unconstitutional. The district judge, Ian O'Flaherty, ruled in July that current law violates a 1985 U.S. Supreme Court ruling and has been throwing out drunk driving cases. The legislation would limit district court judges from deciding the constitutionality of a law. (AP)

ANNAPOLIS, MD.

Delegate to Reintroduce Bill Banning 'Upskirt' Photos

Bills that would ban taking and distributing so-called "upskirt" and "downblouse" photos without consent will be introduced again during next year's Maryland legislative session, Del. Neil Quinter announced Thursday. The bill would make it illegal to take such covert photos in public. Current state law only makes it illegal to take "upskirt" photos where someone has a reasonable expectation of privacy. (AP)

Major crime in the District has decreased this year except for robbery, Metropolitan Police Chief Charles Ramsey told D.C. Council members on Thursday. Ramsey said that juvenile offenders "may be one of the key factors driving the spike in robberies." (AP)

Md. Man Given Death Penalty by Federal Jury

Capital punishment in state is rare since reinstatement in 1970s

GREENBELT, MD. | A federal jury sentenced a Hillcrest Heights man to death Thursday for kidnapping and shooting the son of a Washington police officer in 2002, only the second time the death penalty has been imposed in a Maryland federal court since the punishment was reinstated in the 1970s.

Kenneth Lighty, 23, leaned back in his chair at the defense table but otherwise showed little emotion as the foreman of the jury of 11 men

and one woman read the verdict. His family and friends in the courtroom let out a loud groan.

Lighty was convicted on Oct. 21 of murder and kidnapping for abducting Eric L. Hayes II from a Southeast Washington street on Jan. 23, 2002. Hayes was driven to Prince George's County, where he was shot execution-style in the head and body.

Another man, James Flood III, 28, of Washington was also convicted of kidnapping and murder but faces a life sentence, not death, when he is sentenced Jan. 11. Two others were also found guilty of lesser charges in the crime.

Metro to Spend \$680K on Bus Signs

WASHINGTON | Metro's budget committee Thursday approved spending \$680,000 to hire a contractor to maintain destination signs on buses.

About 16 percent of Metro's 1,400 buses have at least one destination sign that does not work, said Jack Requa, the chief operating officer for Metrobus. Requa said bus customers should notice significant

improvements by July.

Metro will replace signs on 270 buses, officials said. More than 400 new buses arriving over the next seven months will also have improved signs.

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
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

Yahoo Pulls Out Of AOL Talks

Microsoft, Google still potential investors in evolving Web portal

NEW YORK | Yahoo Inc. has pulled out of discussions over buying a stake in America Online Inc., leaving Microsoft Corp. and Google Inc. as the leading potential suitors.

The decision to abandon the talks came after Yahoo chief executive Terry Semel and chief finance officer Susan Decker met in late October with Time Warner executives in New York, said Yahoo spokeswoman Joanna Stevens.

Stevens said Yahoo had "politely passed" on proposed terms and "walked away from any interest in a

deal." Two people close to the discussions said a key stumbling block was Time Warner Inc.'s insistence that it retain majority ownership in the AOL unit. They spoke on condition of anonymity because public discussions of any private negotiations were contrary to their companies' policies.

The Yahoo withdrawal, reported earlier on the Web site of The Wall Street Journal, leaves Microsoft and Google as the leading contenders, with Google possibly combining with Comcast Corp. in a bid.

The interest in AOL comes as the company transforms itself from a declining "walled garden" focused on providing dial-up access to a provider of free content, tapping the recent boom in online advertising. (AP)

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
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
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

Sellers, Cooley show off their versatility as the Redskins' H-backs

REDSKINS | The diamond earrings scream for attention. But the attitude is more club bouncer than VIP.

Through eight weeks, Mike Sellers has set career-highs in catches, touchdowns and interview requests, judging by the recent crowds he's attracted at Redskins Park. But as iced-out as the behemoth H-back's ears are, his ego seems to easily fit inside the Redskins' offense.

"I'd rather be the guy that does the dirty work and goes about his business," said Sellers, a bruising blocker who also leads the Redskins (5-3) with 19 special teams tackles. "But I don't mind [the attention]."


While Joe Gibbs' tweaked this year's offense, significant parts of the old blueprint are still in play. Namely, Gibbs likes big, versatile guys who can both catch the ball and clear the way in the run game. Sellers and starter Chris Cooley have been two of the best at that in the NFL this season.

"[The difference between tight end and H-back is] you have to know every position on the field," Sellers said. "You have to read certain coverages and make different adjustments on the run."

"When I'm H, I'm always on the move," Cooley said. "I always have some shift. And another big thing

is that no one can tell run or pass from what I do."

Cooley, a second-year H-back from Utah State, is the Redskins' second-leading receiver (35 catches, two touchdowns).

Sellers, meanwhile, has already

set career highs in catches (nine) and touchdowns (he's tied for the team lead with five). His one-yard scoring plunge in Sunday's 17-10 win over Philadelphia was his first rushing attempt in five years.

Cooley caught seven passes for a career-best 85 yards in the victory. His ability to find more seams could be key Sunday against Tampa Bay (5-3), which sports the top-rated defense in the league. The Bucs' Derrick Brooks (47 tackles) — a superior coverage linebacker — and Shelton Quarles (59 tackles) figure to keep a close eye on the H-backs this weekend.

"I think they're going to be tough to get downfield on," Cooley said. "They play a lot of zone though, and I'm more of a zone hole kind of guy. We create schemes to get into zones like that." ERIC BRANDNER

Curse of the Irish

Navy out to snap its 41-year losing streak against Notre Dame

COLLEGE FOOTBALL | It's known simply as "The Streak." It comes up in almost every conversation involving the Navy-Notre Dame game. No need for elaboration.

For 41 years now, the Fighting Irish have beaten the Midshipmen. Through nine presidents, three popes, 23 secretaries of the Navy, seven Notre Dame coaches and 10 Navy coaches, the streak has continued to grow to an NCAA record.

The Midshipmen have lost to the Irish in two countries, eight cities and 10 stadiums during the streak. There have been embarrassing losses — including four of 40 points or more — and heartbreaking defeats — including game-winning field goals in 1984 and 2003.

"There's a reason why you win 41 years in a row, usually," Navy coach Paul Johnson quipped.

That might be true, but the

streak has survived both good Navy teams and bad Irish teams.

"Clearly every year they have a tremendous talent advantage. So it's an uphill battle," Johnson said.

An uphill battle like no other Division I-A team has faced. The second longest such streak ended at 36 games last Saturday when Kansas beat Nebraska 40-15. The

second longest current streak now is Tennessee's 22-game win streak over Vanderbilt.

Players on both Navy and Notre Dame are painfully aware of the streak and agree it will have no bearing on Saturday's game. "It comes down to our team in 2005 against their's in 2005," Notre Dame center Bob Morton. TOM COYNE (AP)




MPC Computers Bowl in Boise all remain options for an Atlantic Coast Conference team on the bubble.

Wizards Fail to Crash Boards

'No excuses' for the lack of rebounding so far

WIZARDS | Though the Wizards' fortunes changed Wednesday night with their first loss of the season, one thing remained the same as the previous three wins — the Wizards still didn't get more rebounds than their opponent.

DOPING | Baseball star Rafael Palmeiro will not be prosecuted on perjury charges after lawmakers said Thursday there isn't enough evidence to prove he lied when he told Congress under oath that he had "never used steroids" — six weeks before failing a steroid test.

The investigation did not conclude whether the slugger had actually ever used performance-enhancing substances prior to his testimony before the House Government Reform Committee.

"We couldn't find any evidence of steroid use prior to his testimony," the panel's chairman Rep. Tom Davis, R-Va., said in releasing a 44-page report. "That's not a finding of innocence, but it's a finding that we could not substantiate perjury."

At issue was Palmeiro's statement at a March 17 hearing: "I have never used steroids. Period."

On May 4, he tested positive for an anabolic steroid.

Davis said the steroid for which Palmeiro tested positive is detectable for three to four weeks, shorter than the gap between his failed test and Capitol Hill appearance, and therefore "could not have been in his system the day he testified."

Shortly after the report's release, Palmeiro issued a statement. "I want to express my gratitude to the committee for the fairness and professionalism with which they conducted their business," he said. "I have never intentionally taken steroids and I strongly oppose the illegal use of steroids by athletes or anyone else."

Carpenter Wins The NL Cy Young

BASEBALL | Chris Carpenter of the St. Louis Cardinals won the NL Cy Young Award on Thursday, capping a satisfying comeback from shoulder surgery that jeopardized his career only a few years ago.

After going 21-5 with a 2.83 ERA, Carpenter received 19 of 32 first-place votes and finished with 132 points in balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. He beat out Florida lefty Dontrelle Willis, becoming the first Cardinals pitcher to claim the honor since Bob Gibson in 1970. Seven-time winner Roger Clemens came in a distant third at age 43. (AP)

Romance And Grit

A new, stripped-down 'Pride & Prejudice' gets real about love

FILM | In "Pride & Prejudice," Keira Knightley has found the perfect role to showcase her various and formidable talents — her beauty, energy, intelligence and poise — in Elizabeth Bennet, the pragmatic, headstrong Jane Austen heroine.


Knightley and Matthew Macfadyen as the seemingly arrogant Mr. Darcy bring a refreshing take to this classic battle of the sexes under the direction of Joe Wright, who has managed to make a film that's lush but never stuffy, technically sophisticated yet accessible, traditional while somehow innovative.

Roman Osin's cinematography sucks you into the rolling hills and glowing parlors of late-18th-century England. You can practi-

cally feel the dirt under your fingernails and the thick moisture of dawn and dew, and you know you're not in Merchant-Ivory country anymore.

Elizabeth (or Lizzie) is one of five Bennet girls and the only one who's not looking for a husband. While her sisters giggle over soldiers, ribbons and dances and their pushy but well-intentioned mother schemes to marry them off, Lizzie is curious about the world and has other interests.

Then the wealthy and single Mr. Bingley (Simon Woods, lovably goofy) moves into a nearby mansion, setting everyone in the vicinity into a tizzy. At a ball that's considered gala by English countryside standards, Bingley connects quickly with classic beauty Jane, while a different kind of sparks fly between his longtime friend — the darkly handsome, no-fun Mr. Darcy — and Lizzie. She overhears him

describing her as "barely tolerable," then throws his words back in his face in front of a group of people and walks away triumphantly.

You know the rest: Their verbal sparring hides an unexpected romance which will eventually blossom into full-blown love,

despite the socio-economic chasm that divides them and the various misunderstandings that compete to keep them apart.

Even the biggest cynic will drop their pride — and their prejudice — and allow their heart to melt. **CHRISTY LEMIRE (AP)**

'Get Rich': Thin Stuff

The biopic of rapper 50 Cent's life is more 'Glitter' than gold

FILM | As Eminem's protege, 50 Cent got the entree to rap superstardom and all the automatic wealth, fame and cred that go along with it.


But apparently he didn't get any acting lessons.

And so "Get Rich or Die Tryin'," the film debut from 50 Cent (real name: Curtis Jackson), plays like a feeble retreat of Eminem's film debut "8 Mile." "Get Rich" proves

once again, as in "Glitter," that portraying a thinly veiled version of yourself is harder than it sounds.

Jackson's character, Marcus, should be the driving force in the midst of all the poverty and drug deals and drive-by shootings that eventually serve as fodder for his music; instead, he feels like a passenger in his own story. He has the same look on his face nearly the entire time — a sort of half-hearted smile with his eyes slight-


ly squinted — and he delivers the film's many voiceovers in the same monotone as his real-life hits like "In Da Club."

Many details from Marcus' life are similar to the now-infamous aspects of 50's past: the absence of his father, the killing of his drug-dealing mother, the drug dealing of his own, the rap sheet and the nine bullets he took.

While in jail, Marcus meets the persuasive Bama, who will go on to be his manager. This is the best thing that could have happened to Marcus and to the audience, because Bama is played by Terrence Howard. He's funny, charming, slightly dangerous and desperate but never boring. **CHRISTY LEMIRE (AP)**



Nation has a busy weekend, with punk shows on Friday and Saturday prior to its regular dance extravaganzas. Doors open at 6 p.m. tonight for Detroit ska-punkvets **THE SUICIDE MACHINES**, who eschew the poppy party anthems of their '90s peers for enraged (and surprisingly insightful) political rants. Later that evening, Nation hosts its Friday party, **CUBIK**, which this week features a monster DJ battle.

It's one of the hardest decisions a music lover must make. Pay an obscene amount of cash (\$75 in this case) to see the rhythm section of your favorite band warble through its nostalgic hits, or make a principled stand and avoid the venue. Well, maybe it's not that tough. The Fogerty-less **CREEDENCE CLEARWATER REVISITED** are cashing in at the Birchmere tonight.

MEDESKI, MARTIN & WOOD are too talented to be pigeonholed into the kiss-of-death jam-band label. The Dust Brothers (Beck, Beastie Boys) produced their latest LP, which featured only a single track breaking the five-minute mark. Expect the alt-jazz prodigies to stretch their

tunes out a bit more tonight at the 9:30 Club.

As can be expected, the people-watching scene is just as good as the DJs.

Anyone stumbling into Iota looking for the club's alt-country lineup might be shocked. Willfully unpredictable noise-rockers the **HEROINE SHEIKS**, fronted by the outrageous Shannon Selberg, take the stage with **POWER LLOYD** in support.

SATURDAY

One of the most underrated rock acts around, **BLACK KEYS** get some recognition tonight with a sold-out gig at 9:30 Club. The Ohio duo manage to out-muscle their clos-

est competition, the White Stripes, with a crushing wall of gritty blues and a desperately reckless attitude that translates fantastically to the stage.

Britain's **BROADCAST** rode the crest of the late-'90s electronica explosion while producing a string of beautifully unpeppable singles and EPs that straddled the line between the post-rock of Tortoise and the electronic gurgles of Stereolab. Now pared down to a duo, Broadcast — headlining Black Cat's mainstage tonight — has lost none of its genre-bending charm.

BEENIE MAN, Jamaica's "King of Dancehall," gets the dance floor moving tonight at Crossroads in P.G. County. Expect to hear a steady stream of Beenie's massive hits and club-shaking anthems.

A decade before the boy-band craze of the '90s, New Kids on the Block were responsible for whipping preteen girls into a frenzy. Former NKOTB frontman and "Surreal Life" vet **JORDAN KNIGHT**, at State Theatre, has re-invented himself as an adult contemporary balladeer.

SUNDAY

The 9:30 Club opens at 4 p.m. today for a huge sold-out punk bill fronted by Boston's **DROPKICK MURPHYS**, who avoid punk rock clichés with their boisterous Irish-tinged attack. Big D and the Kids table help warm up the early crowd. Doors re-open at 10 p.m. for country crooner **PAT GREEN**, who has spit-polished his original grassroots sound for Nashville execs. 'Derailed' Off-Track

An adulterous affair, and the movie it's in, goes horribly wrong

FILM | "Derailed" tries to intrigue us with twists so that we never know what's coming next — except we do know, because the twists are pretty obvious, pretty quickly.

Swedish director Mikael Hafstrom is trying hard to be Alfred Hitchcock — or at least Adrian Lyne, the director of "Fatal Attraction," which "Derailed" resembles. The main thing Hafstrom is missing, though, is subtlety. Everything is big, loud and in-your-face; the villain can't even enter a scene without a blast of foreboding music accompanying his arrival.

At the start, though, Owen as ad executive Charles Schine meets Jennifer Aniston's Lucinda Harris, a flirtatious financial analyst, while commuting to work in Chicago.

Both are married, both have young daughters — and Charles' girl is sick with diabetes, which puts further strain on his marriage to schoolteacher Deanna (Melissa George). Soon lunches lead to afterwork drinks, leading

to a tryst at a seedy hotel.

If "Derailed" had been a drama about the affair and its consequences, it would have been fine. But just as they're about to get hot and heavy, in bursts Vincent Cassel as a generically menacing Euro-baddie named LaRoche. He pistol-whips Charles, steals their money, then proceeds to repeatedly rape Lucinda as Charles lies bloody and half-conscious on the carpet.

Charles insists they go to the police; Lucinda refuses because she wants to protect her family. The whole ordeal appears to be over until the phone rings and it's LaRoche, demanding that Charles pay him \$20,000, then \$100,000, or he'll expose the affair and ruin his life.

The predictability of Stuart Beattie's script (based on a novel by James Siegel) might have been more tolerable if everyone in the film hadn't been so distractingly miscast. Owen is stuck playing the scared, victimized shlub, and it's no fun to watch.

Aniston, for all her good looks and charm, is hard to accept as a seductive femme fatale.

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THE ARISTOCRATS (Unrated, 87 minutes)

The joke whose punch line lends this documentary its title isn't especially funny. Filthy, yes, but not a laugh riot, except in the way its structure lends itself to extended riffs of jazz-like improvisation on the part of the 100 or so comedians who line up to tell it. What makes us laugh is the joke's sheer excess. (MO)

CAPOTE (R, 98 minutes) It is a comical image: fey, mincing, piping little Truman Capote in his cashmere scarf tiptoeing around the bleak wheat-field burg of Holcomb, Kan., in the wake of some horrific murders about which he admits he doesn't really care. As Capote, Philip Seymour Hoffman makes you believe in the man: an artist's personality, ruthless and shrewd; a hysteric's delicate grasp of his emotions; a charmer whose wiles could wear down even the wary Kansas lawmen. (SH)

CHICKEN LITTLE (G, 78 minutes) Based on the old tale, and the image of ardent, mythological stupidity — the chicken who thought the sky was falling when an acorn fell on its head — this computer-animated gee-whizzer takes the story one more crank toward the literal. When the thing hits Chicken Little, it turns out it is a piece of the sky: The sky is falling. The movie then wittily finds a way to morph into a fabulous parody of "War of the Worlds," possibly a bit intense in parts for the smallest of beings. The animators are fabulous and full of mischief, weaving enough ironic amusements into the story for the longer of tooth. (SH)

THE CONSTANT GARDENER (R, 123 minutes) Vivid performances drive Brazilian director Fernando Meirelles' fine adaptation of the John Le Carre novel. Justin Quayle (Ralph Fiennes), a mild-mannered junior diplomat in Kenya, is shattered when his wife, Tessa (Rachel Weisz), is violently murdered on a "research trip" far up country. He learns quickly enough that Tessa had acquired a "reputation" in the tight world of British diplomacy. The movie chronicles Justin's growth as he begins to understand what sort of a woman he had married. The quick evocations of diplomatic life and corporate dealings are splendidly done. (SH)

DOMINO (R, 128 minutes) It seems the only true thing about this movie, which begins with the disclaimer that it is based on a true story... "sort of," is the name of its title character, the daughter of actor

Laurence Harvey who embarked on a troubled girlhood and ended up as a bounty hunter. The film pivots around an ill-fated gig that Domino (Keira Knightley) is explaining to an FBI psychologist (Lucy Liu), entailing lots of doubling and tripling back in time. The effect is edgy, tough and sneakily seductive, as Domino plies her trade, using whatever it takes — assault weapons or lap dances — to get her man. There's a manic kind of pleasure in all this, but it turns out to be a tiresome trip. (AH)

DOOM (R, 95 minutes) A square-jawed, bull-necked leader Sarge (Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson) heads a rapid response team of Marines dispatched to investigate a calamity at a remote scientific facility on Mars. The killer mutants they find there will be familiar to the many fans of Doom, the video game that has been keeping people in the house since 1993. The Rock is an enjoyable presence; Portman (Richard Brake), a funny futuristic griper, is good for a few chuckles. But for the most part, "Doom" is a loud, standard-issue sci-fi action film. (DT)

DREAMER: INSPIRED BY A TRUE STORY (PG, 98 minutes) This horse-race drama, in which young Cale Crane (Dakota Fanning) nurses a wounded horse back to racing shape, harnesses the Rules of Cute and Fuzzy Horse Movies (temporary setbacks, underdog horses, stand-up-and-cheer moments) and rides them all the way to the Breeders' Cup. But will her formerly hobbled horse win, despite the terrible odds, when Cale has staked all her hopes and dreams into that special horse (named Dreamer)? Writer-director John Gatins and his actors also fulfill the engaging-family requirement. (DT)


THE DYING GAUL (R, 101 minutes) This stylish, nervy, neo-noir thriller boasts a cast to die for — Campbell Scott, Patricia Clarkson, Peter Sarsgaard — in a minor-key chamber piece about a Hollywood producer (Scott), his screenwriter wife (Clarkson) and an aspiring young filmmaker (Sarsgaard) who comes into their lives and changes them forever. At first, Sarsgaard's character, still in mourning for a dead lover, is all vulnerability and

artistic integrity, with Scott's sharklike producer demanding a crowd-pleasing rewrite before he agrees to take on the newbie's script. But soon enough, who's zooming — and wooing — whom becomes deliciously ambiguous, as all sorts of sexual and political intrigues ensue. Although their lives are as sunny as a David Hockney painting, there's nearly always a serpent lying at the bottom of the sparkling pool. (AH)

ELIZABETHTOWN (PG-13, 123 minutes) Cameron Crowe's misfired romance features Orlando Bloom as recently fired shoe designer Drew Baylor and Kristen Dunst as life-affirmative flight attendant Claire, who meets him on the plane he has to take to Elizabethtown, Ky. (His father has just died there.) Drew is mopey and despondent and contemplating suicide. Claire gives him directions to Elizabethtown and to her big, home-fried heart. There's not much specialness between Bloom and Dunst, other than the surface appeal of two attractive people making (or almost making) kissy face. Sweet delay before the inevitable coupling is a mainstay in every romance, but Crowe turns that delay into the waiting room from hell. (DT)

FLIGHTPLAN (PG-13, 88 minutes) A small child disappears on a jumbo jet, with all sorts of compartments, bays and hide-holes for a little kid to crawl into, and the movie gives viewers the impression of being on that plane as Jodie Foster — playing the girl's desperate mother, who may or may not be mentally unhinged — tries to lead her fellow passengers in a search. Striking just the right balance between claustrophobia and terrifying emptiness, director Robert Schwentke ratchets up the tension with good taste and quiet, unfussy skill. It all falls apart with the Big Reveal. (AH)

THE 40-YEAR-OLD VIRGIN (R, 111 minutes) Filthy, funny and sweet in equal measure, the feature directorial debut of writer-producer Judd Apatow is a Rob Schneider movie with the soul of a chick flick. That's not actually fair. While it's true that the comedy — revolving around the efforts of three friends (Paul Rudd,

Romany Malco and Seth Rogen) to get their geeky nice-guy co-worker (Steve Carell) deflowered—has a lot of smutty humor, it's also pretty smart. In the end, the organ it's really all about exercising is the human heart. (M)

GOOD NIGHT, AND GOOD LUCK (PG-13, 93 minutes) George Clooney, who directed and co-wrote, retells the story of crusading journalist Ed Murrow, who stood up to braying political bully Joe McCarthy. The stylizations of '50s TV drama, including black-and-white cinematography, are terrific. Clooney casts himself as Murrow's producer, Fred W. Friendly, but hardly registers. Neither do any of the other CBS minions, even though they're played by such names as Jeff Daniels, Robert Downey Jr. and Patricia Clarkson. Only two people register, David Strathairn as Murrow and Joe McCarthy as Joe McCarthy. Strathairn dominates the movie with furious intelligence, guts, will and nobility. (SH)

GOSPEL (PG, 105 minutes) David Taylor (Boris Kodjoe), a successful, egotistical R&B star, returns to his estranged father, Pastor Fred Taylor (Clifton Powell), to find him suffering from a terminal illness. Not only that, David's longtime enemy Frank (Idris Elba) is poised to assume the bishop's duties. Should David return to his music life or deal with more urgent matters? Intended for gospel and faith-appreciating audiences, this is a movie about the struggles for virtuousness in a world of temptation and compromise. Unfortunately, Rob Hardy's writing and directing don't soar quite as high as his spiritual intentions. (DT)

A HISTORY OF VIOLENCE (R, 95 minutes) David Cronenberg's film has a hidden and powerful purpose. Seemingly a mainstream shoot-'em-up flick, in which the soft-spoken Tom Stall (Viggo Mortensen) defends his family against a horde of hoodlums, the movie's really about our Pavlovian conditioning to violence. How did an unassuming diner owner dispatch the gunmen so effortlessly? Why do more gangsters keep coming for him? Ultimately, Cronenberg's drama isn't about Western-style heroism; it's about why we're cheering when Tom plugs them dead. (DT)

IN HER SHOES (PG-13, 131 minutes) In a pedestrian display of opposites, Rose (Toni Colette) has a law firm career, money and smarts but few men. Party girl Maggie (Cameron Diaz) lands the guys but always ends up drunk, penniless and miserable on Rose's sofa. When Maggie casually steals Rose's smooth-

operator boss, Jim (Richard Burgi), sisterly tension becomes official breakup. The women branch off into self-discovery subplots. When the sisters meet again, it's not a harmonic convergence. It's just the end of 131 minutes. (DT)

JARHEAD (R, 120 minutes) Set in 1991 during the first Gulf War, this movie is a kind of lightweight variation on Stanley Kubrick's "Full Metal Jacket," with its evocation of the institution known as the United States Marine Corps, its love of the profane poetry of sergeants and the bond felt by young men locked in a common ordeal. It's a portrait of Swofford and his band of gyrene brothers, wandering haplessly around, looking for action while trying to overcome the soldier's truest enemy, ennui. Jake Gyllenhaal plays "Swoff," as he's called, and what's so good about the movie is Gyllenhaal's refusal to show off; he doesn't seem jealous of the camera's attention when it goes to others and is content, for long stretches, to serve simply as a prism through which other young men can be observed. (SH)

THE LEGEND OF ZORRO (PG, 130 minutes) It's seven years since the original "Mask of Zorro" made Catherine Zeta-Jones a star and Hollywood royalty in the same breath, and nobody connected with this film really wants to revisit the initial triumph. So they don't. They pretend to make a Zorro film, when they're really making what feels like a sequel to the dreadful big-screen version of "The Wild, Wild West." There's just a nonsense plot and too many action sequences of no consequence. What a waste of talent, time and money. And guess what else? It's also really long! (SH)

NINE LIVES (R, 115 minutes) Writer-director Rodrigo Garcia's new film finds nine women in extremis, all facing various versions of mortality. In tight, sharply written scenes, each a continuous take lasting between 10 and 14 minutes, they come to terms with death, loss, connection and continuity. The moments that Garcia has chosen to observe are unforgettable, the women indelible, including Robin Wright Penn as a onetime party girl who runs into a former lover at an L.A. supermarket; Sissy Spacek as a wife and mother on the verge of an affair; and a radiant Glenn Close, whose vignette, the movie's final scene, delivers a quietly devastating blow. (AH)

NORTH COUNTRY (R, 130 minutes) Charlize Theron, as a fictionalized version of the first woman to file a sexual harassment lawsuit in the United States, proves her acting chops yet again in an engrossing, well-crafted story of a grave injustice avenged. This drama tells the

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
story of Josey Aimes (Theron), a young woman who flees an abusive marriage with two kids in tow and takes a well-paying job at one of the mines in Minnesota's bleak Mesabi Iron Range, where the women are routinely groped, verbally abused and physically threatened, culminating. (AH)

PARADISE NOW (Unrated, 94 minutes) This movie takes you behind the terrible curtain of terrorism to find, not too surprisingly, that human beings live there. Palestinian director Hany Abu-Assad focuses on the humanity of two likable West Bank auto mechanics, Said (Kais Nashif) and Khaled (Ali Suliman), who are informed, with only 24 hours' notice, that God has chosen them to obliterate themselves and as many bystanders as they can take with them. Their mission is assigned with such religious reverence, the would-be bombers are hard-pressed to think of their fate as anything but glorious. The audience is lured into

discomforting empathy for Said and Khaled, especially when things start going horribly awry. This movie may not change anyone's ideology, but it should convince some that people are pretty much the same on either side of the holy fence. (DT)

PRIME (PG-13, 105 minutes) This romance, starring Meryl Streep, Uma Thurman and Bryan Greenberg, follows a familiar boy-meets-girl scenario, but filmmaker Ben Younger turns the routine into combustible fun. That's why, for instance, the two lovers in our story are the thirtysomething Rafi (Thurman), who can hear the baby clock ticking, and the 23-year-old David (Greenberg), whose idea of a good time is playing Nintendo. It's also why—in the movie's central complication—Rafi talks openly about her romantic issues with a therapist, Lisa (Streep), who happens to be David's very devout Jewish mom. (DT)

ROLL BOUNCE (PG-13, 107 minutes) If you were a junior-higher back in the '70s and early '80s, then your idea of a hot Saturday night was hanging out at the local roller rink, and director Malcolm Lee captures that time, with the insult-

a-thons, the preening and posturing of polyester-clad lotharios and the angst of young love. And for the most part, he got the cast right. What Lee doesn't pull off is the story. (TW)

SAW II (R, 91 minutes) We have eight folks trapped inside a grim house, all raging

at one another as if this is some reality TV show gone criminally insane. They must negotiate their way through deadly booby traps to get out before they succumb to the noxious gas flowing through the vents. Their only escape clues come from pre-recorded tapes made by the

bass-voiced Jigsaw, who gamely suggests they collaborate. Fans of the first "Saw" can look forward to involuntary incineration, wrist and throat slashing, bullets through brains and the bashing of someone's head with a nail-festooned club. (DT)

SEPARATE LIES (R, 85 minutes) In this psycho-emotional thriller, three members of the English upper class behave terribly well when they find themselves in a spot of trouble involving adultery, manslaughter and obstruction of justice. The directorial debut by Julian Fellowes is all about restraint, good taste and discretion. Mendacity and avarice may form the toxic heart of the story, but they're nearly obscured by a civilized polish. (AH)

SHOPGIRL (R, 105 minutes) Deft but slight, the new Steve Martin film is a case of precise observation of nothing. From Martin's own screenplay, based on his own novella and directed by Anand Tucker, the movie watches listlessly as old rich guy Ray Porter (Martin) begins a pointless, clearly doomed affair with shopgirl Mirabelle Buttersfield (Claire Danes), who sells gloves at Saks in *Continued on page 26*

Beverly Hills. Slight age diff: He's fiftysomething, she's twentysomething. Is this harmless or a species of child abuse? On this issue, as on many others, the movie is silent. It's a film concerned with cool surfaces, with getting things right, particularly clothes and fashion accoutrements. (SH)

THE SQUID AND THE WHALE (R, 81 minutes) Set in Brooklyn in 1986, this movie is piercing and forthright. When Bernard (Jeff Daniels) and Joan (Laura Linney) Berkman inform their children, 16-year-old Walt (Jesse Eisenberg) and 12-year-old Frank (Owen Kline), they're getting a divorce, it's the beginning of an emotional whirlwind for four very different people. The movie is so brutally honest

at times, you can almost sense the real Baumbachs squirming, twitching, tut-tutting and maybe even nodding their heads. Whatever their reaction, this story doesn't just belong to them anymore. This richly observed, sometimes heartbreaking movie has become ours, too. (DT)

TIM BURTON'S CORPSE BRIDE (PG, 76 minutes) Sure, she's cute, but she has an eye that pops out at inopportune moments, thanks to the talking maggot renting space in its socket. Not exactly marriage material, as Victor, voiced by Johnny Depp, discovers when he's dragged from the Land of the Living by the Corpse Bride (Helena Bonham Carter). Will true love with a living lass (Emily Watson) prevail over the Corpse Bride's determination? The movie is breathtaking viewing, shot in sumptuous shades of blacks, whites and grays; and wry with kitschy musical numbers. (TW)

USHPIZIN (PG, 90 minutes) Ushpizin is Hebrew for "visitors," specifically friends and strangers who may need shelter and sustenance during the Jewish holiday of Sukkot. That weeklong autumn festival is the setting for this comic drama, about an Orthodox rabbi named Moshe (Shuli Rand) who lives with his wife, Malli (Michal Bat-Sheva Rand), in Jerusalem. The couple is just scraping by while they pray for a son. By twists of fate and faith, their prayers are answered — sort of — in the form of two unexpected visitors. As cozy and inviting as the small booth that Moshe and Malli build to celebrate the Israelites' exodus from Egypt, the film offers a warm, intimate glimpse of Orthodox Jewish life. (AH)

WALLACE & GROMIT: THE CURSE OF THE WERE-RABBIT (G, 85 minutes) Directed by animators Nick Park and Steve Box, the feature film debut of Wallace and Gromit opens with the dotty English inventor and his quietly superior dog working at yet another ingenious business called Anti-Pesto, which humanely removes four-legged creatures from their town's vegetable gardens. Things are just swell until one of Wallace's schemes goes awry, and the gardens are soon being vandalized by the King Kong of rabbits. Gromit, who might be the most expressive silent movie star since Buster Keaton, is pure magic. (AH)

THE WEATHER MAN (R, 100 minutes) Weatherman Dave Spitz (Nicolas Cage) may be an adult, but, existentially speaking, this guy's in diapers. Delivering the forecast in the Windy City means a lot of high-spirited patter about the degrees of misery Chicagoans can expect each day, but in the meantime he's trying to make sense of a disastrous personal life. Then there are his relationships with his recently divorced wife, Noreen (Hope Davis), and two teenage children to round off his failings. The film shines the light on a special kind of heroism — the guts to face up to yourself and make changes. (DT)

WEDDING CRASHERS (R, 119 minutes) Jeremy (Vince Vaughn) and John (Owen Wilson) are scoundrels who crash weddings so they can score with women, in this often-funny caper. But when they attend a big-time Washington wedding party, things change: They each fall for one of the host's daughters (Isla Fisher and Rachel McAdams). Vaughn is definitely the best man in this wedding comedy. (DT)

Televised Salute

Veterans Day on the small screen is filled with momentous feats

HOLIDAY VIEWING | Television commemorates Veterans Day on Friday in its usual manner, which is to say, not much at all. Look for a couple of specials on the History Channel, including "Erme's Vietnam" (8 p.m.), featuring the star of "Full Metal Jacket" in Vietnam interviewing veterans of that conflict. On a similar theme, "Heroes Under Fire" (10 p.m., History) interviews men who repulsed a Viet Cong attack in 1968.

Viewers in search of Hollywood heroism can watch John Wayne lead an all-star cast on the beaches of Normandy in the 1962 D-Day epic "The Longest Day" (8 p.m., Fox Movie Channel). The Duke also stars in the 1968 Vietnam drama "The Green Berets" (8 p.m., AMC).

It's interesting to note that while Hollywood has a history of presenting veterans as larger-than-life superheroes like John Wayne and Jean-Claude Van Damme, actual veterans come in all shapes and sizes. Even in Hollywood. An ear infection kept John Wayne out of uniform, but "Green Acres" star (and Wayne's "Longest Day" co-star) Eddie Albert saw plenty of

action in the South Pacific and was awarded the Bronze Star for rescuing 70 Marines during bloody fighting on Tarawa. Neither of these performers, who both died this past year, would be typecast as GI Joe, but they served with distinction.

While much has been made of the cinematic gore depicted in the first scenes of "Saving Private Ryan" Fri., (8 p.m., TNT), I was most struck by the scene, late in the film, when Capt. Miller, the

taciturn character played by Tom Hanks, reveals that back home he was an English teacher. In that very moment, we're shown how combat can turn a small-town, bookish guy into a reluctant hero.

That's something to think about when we scan the Honor Roll of the fallen, shown with sad frequency on "The News Hour With Jim Lehrer" (7 p.m., PBS) and other news broadcasts. 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

The bizarre empire of Ripley's Believe It or Not! is expanding

The first thing you'll probably notice is the shark. At 17 feet long, it's the biggest ever caught on rod and reel. What's left of its two terrifying tons now hangs preserved above a dull warehouse floor.

There are also medieval torture devices, human skull drinking glasses, a Coke bottle-shaped coffin and curious mix of embalmed livestock born with too many heads or limbs. These items and many more are stored in a central Florida warehouse — all without an audience.

But their owner, Ripley Entertainment Inc., is doing its best to change that. The Orlando, Fla.-based company of "Believe it or Not!" fame has announced rapid expansion plans over the next year and a half, including at least four new locations from Spain to New York City — where those lonely curiosities might soon find homes.

Ripley has doubled in size every three years for the past 15, and now boasts annual attendance of more than 12 million. Its more than 50 attractions go beyond the standby "Believe it or Not!" museums to include two aquariums, a handful of Guinness World Record and wax museums, haunted houses, a mini-golf course and a theater.

And then there is the globally syndicated TV show and rights to a library of bizarre facts licensed for everything from state lotteries to pinball machines. They even do their own wax and costume work out of the company's Florida headquarters.

It all started from the curious pen of founder and adventurer Robert Ripley, who began drawing the "Believe it or Not!" cartoon for newspapers in 1918.

“The difference today from where we were is the magnitude of the projects we're involved in,” CEO Bob Masterson said. “We went from

doing small attractions — museum-type attractions, which have been our bread and butter for 50 years — to building signature inns.”

The biggest of those is the under-construction Great Wolf Lodge in Niagara Falls, Ontario, which will feature 406 all-suite guest rooms when it opens next spring, and a 76,000-square-foot indoor water park with a tree-house fort. (The Great Wolf Lodge in Niagara is owned by Ripley's Niagara Water Park Resort through a license from Great Wolf Resorts, which operates other Great Wolf lodges


in the U.S.)

“That's so far beyond what we were doing 15 years ago, but it really highlights what's happening in our company,” Masterson said. “Life is good for us.”

Of course, any new attraction wouldn't be Ripley's without the surreal. And they've got it here in spades — all just waiting for a wall to hang on.

The keeper, as it were, of those storied treasures is Edward Meyer, a self-described library science dropout who as vice president of exhibits and archives is Ripley's

For men, symptoms of depression tend to look very different

You might call it melancholy on steroids — a muscular mixture of fast-driving, heavy drinking, hard-charging cussedness. For perhaps 3 million American men yearly, that's the plotline for depression.

For almost 24,000 men yearly, the final scene is suicide. Often, there is no cry for help, no river of tears, no abyss of sadness. Just a violent, tragic bolt from the blue.

In the United States, a man is four times more likely than a woman to commit suicide, according to government statistics. Yet, he is only half as likely to be diagnosed with depression. That stark disconnect underscores a simple fact about depression in men: It often does not look like the mixture of sadness, guilt and withdrawal that dominates diagnostic descriptions and popular perception of the disease. As a result, a man's depression is often missed — by loved ones, by physicians, by the sufferer himself.

The costs are steep: in lives hobbled, jobs lost, relationships ruined. Some professionals even tally the toll in prison terms, substance-abuse statistics and shattered communities.

But today the diagnosis of

depression is in the midst of a long-overdue makeover, as medical and mental health professionals have come to recognize that in at least half of depressed men, the recognizable litany of symptoms don't really fit.

Some depressed men may be plagued by impotence and loss of sexual interest, but others may

become wildly promiscuous. Many complain of depression's physical symptoms — sleep troubles, fatigue, headaches or stomach distress — without ever discerning their psychological source. Compared to women suffering depression, depressed men are more likely to behave recklessly, drink heavily or take drugs, drive fast or seek out

confrontation.

Instead of acting like they are filled with self-doubt, depressed men may bully and bluster and accuse those around them of failing them. For many men, anger — a masculine emotion that one “manages” rather than succumbs to — is a mask for deep mental anguish.

“That's their way of weeping,” said psychologist William Pollack, director of the Centers for Men and Young Men at McLean Hospital in suburban Boston and an expert on depression in men.

Dr. Thomas Insel, director of the National Institute of Mental Health, likens the shift now tak-

ing place among psychologists and psychiatrists to one that is taking hold in other areas of medicine. In the diagnosis of, say, heart disease, physicians have come to recognize that men and women can have the same illness, but their symptoms often look very different.

For almost two decades as an aerospace machinist in San Diego, a coffee-fueled Steve Klepper worked so much overtime that he was able to buy a family home by himself. At work, he said, he was short-tempered and had little patience for his co-workers' blather about friends and family.

At home, he would drink himself numb virtually every night. By his own admission, he “acted very much like a jerk” to women and friends, and suffered constant stomach problems and skin rashes. He thought frequently of suicide.

Today, Klepper manages his condition with medication and leads a San Diego support group for those suffering depression and bipolar disorder.

He finds it hard to fathom why no one ever called his evident depression what it was. But he knows why it's a hard diagnosis for a man to admit to himself.

“It's embarrassing to be sad,” he said. “And the difference between being sad and lazy is hard to distinguish.”

Neither tears nor indolence, it seems, are manly virtues.

“Depression equals vulnerability and shame and lack of functioning. That takes away the man's masculinity — and for men, that takes away the sense of self,” said Pollack, author of “Real Boys: Rescuing Our Sons from the Myths of Boyhood.” In the American ethos, Pollack said, “a man who's vulnerable is not even a man any more ... It's the equivalent of being psychologically castrated.”


Film Steps Over the Line
