In the Garden

This spreading, evergreen, perennial grows 1-3 ft tall and spreads through creeping rhizomes. Its spreading habit makes it great for erosion control

A pretty vertical element in a sunny, moist meadow area or at the edge of a water feature in a mountain garden.

Will stay evergreen unless stressed by drought.

Blooms May-October

Sun: Full Sun, Part Shade

Water: Dry, Light, Moderate, High

Soil: Clay, Loam, Sandy

Other: Attracts Butterflies, Deer Resistant, Drought Tolerant, Erosion Control

Can help stabilize stream banks.

Native to California and also found in the western states Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada, and Baja Calif.
