Bugle hedgenettle is a low perennial growing from 2-3'.

Commonly found in moist places growing in the understory of our oak woodlands.

Both butterflies and hummingbirds will use the flowers for nectar, Checkerspot larvae will use the foliage for food. Use in a cool flower bed that gets some water. Mix with Yerba Buena, Lilies, or Huecheras to add interest to your garden.

Its roots form a dense mat that makes it useful for north or east slope planting. Sun: Part Shade, Shade Water: Light, Moderate, High

Can be cut back pretty hard, as it is a fast grower. Blooms from June to Sept.

Prefers moist conditions. It's roots form a dense mat making it a cute choice for north or east slope planting and erosion control.
