Bishop Linda Lee

Linda Lee was born in Cleveland, Ohio on July 9, 1949. She was ordained Deacon by Bishop Dwight E. Loder and was ordained Elder by Bishop Edsel A. Ammons. She was elected to the Episcopacy at the North Central Jurisdictional Conference on July 14, 2000 in Middleton, Wisconsin, and assigned to the Michigan Area. She was assigned as Bishop of the Wisconsin Area at the 2004 North Central Jurisdictional Conference. She was reassigned to the Wisconsin Area at the 2008 North Central Jurisdictional Conference.

A graduate of United Theological Seminary (M.Div-1984 and D.Min-1994), Bishop Lee began her ministerial career as a chaplain intern at Adrian College prior to her graduation from seminary. She was appointed to serve Residence Park UMC, Dayton, Ohio (1982-87), and then served as Assistant to the Dean for Educational Administration at Methodist Theological School in Ohio. She also served as an associate pastor at Central UMC, Detroit, and pastor of Conant Avenue UMC, Detroit, prior to being named to the Detroit Conference cabinet. Bishop Lee served as chair of Black Clergywomen of the UMC (1996-98) and has been a member of many conference committees. She has also served as a speaker for numerous schools, retreats, and conferences, and was elected twice as a delegate to General Conference.

Bishop Lee is married to Rev. Lamarr V. Gibson, and the couple has three children.

Bishop Lee retired from the active Episcopacy at the 2012 North Central Jurisdictional Conference.

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung has been appointed for the next four years as Wisconsin's new United Methodist bishop. Bishop Jung is one of the newly appointed bishops for the North Central Jurisdiction (NCJ). These appointments were announced July 19th at the conference session in Akron, Ohio. Bishop Hee-Soo Jung was most recently the bishop for the Northern Illinois Conference (Chicago Area). Bishop Jung was elected by the North Central Jurisdictional Conference in 2004 and was assigned to the Chicago Episcopal Area. He has been instrumental in inspiring the Harvest 2020 movement in Northern Illinois, which resulted in nearly 30 new faith communities and 2,000 new worshippers since 2009.

He has served on the board of directors for the General Board of Discipleship, the UM National Hispanic Plan, General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, and the General Commission on United Methodist Men. Bishop Jung is currently assigned as a member of the board of directors for the General Board of Global Ministry, JustPeace, and UM Korean National Plan.

Previously, Bishop Jung served as an elder in the Wisconsin Conference, where he was a pastor and a district superintendent. Bishop Jung taught and chaired the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Kangnam University and Seminary in Kyungki-Do, South Korea. He has served as pastor of congregations in California, Texas and South Korea. He was responsible for establishing a new Korean congregation at University United Methodist Church in Madison, Wisconsin. Bishop Jung earned a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison; an M.A. from the Institute of Buddhist Studies in Berkeley, CA; an M.A. from the Dongguk University Graduate School in Seoul, South Korea; and a B.Th. from the Methodist Theological Seminary, in Seoul, South Korea. Bishop Jung's wife, Im-Hyon, is also an elder of the Wisconsin Conference and is currently serving as a regional coordinator of the Academy for Spiritual Formation at the Upper Room/the General Board of Discipleship. They are the parents of two college students, Jae-Hugh and Jae-Joon.

Friday Morning, June 1, 2012

Opening Worship Service

Members and friends of the Conference gathered in the Worship Area at 8:00 a.m. for the opening worship service. The service began with a time of singing led by Grace Cajiua. Songs included “You are Holy” and “This is a Day of New Beginnings.” Bishop Lee offered words of greeting and welcome to this session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. Dan Dick invited everyone present to a time of service and celebration. A Litany of Praise in many languages was shared by the congregation. Bishop Lee led the congregation in a prayer of thanksgiving. “Rejoice in the Lord,” a musical setting of Psalm 98.1 was sung by the congregation. Bishop Lee read the Gospel lesson from John 14.8-14. Rhemadance Company, a dynamic husband and wife dance ministry team from Milwaukee, provided a dance interpretation of “Incredible God.” The congregation expressed its appreciation for this dance ministry with a standing ovation. The congregation sang “For the Troubles and the Suffering.” An offering was taken to support Harbor House Crisis Shelters and the Summer Developers programs, two ministries of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. Following a prayer of dedication led by Dan Dick, Bishop Lee offered words of blessing and benediction. The opening service concluded with the singing of “You are Holy.”

Opening Plenary Session

Bishop Lee called the 43rd Regular Session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference to order in the Plenary Area at 9:07 a.m.

She noted that there are both joys and concerns to share with the members of the Conference. Carrie Wegenast celebrated her birthday yesterday, and a number of others present are celebrating birthdays today. She led the conference in singing “Happy Birthday.”

Bishop Lee then requested prayer for Hanna Joy Certa-Werner, daughter of Barb and Joel Certa-Werner, who fell off her bike today and suffered a severe concussion. She led the conference in a time of prayer.

The Bishop then called upon Kevin Rice Myers, Conference Secretary, to lead the conference through the organizational motions and informational items.

Rice Myers announced that the **Roll Call** for this session of the Annual Conference was being taken at the time of registration.

He noted that “**the bar of the conference**” is the official seating area where members must be when voting on actions that come before the Annual Conference. He moved:

“that the bar of this conference now be established to include all of the tables on the floor of the Wisconsin Dells Center that are within the low blue “pipe and drape” curtains, the platform at the front of the room, and the Conference Secretary’s tables to the right of the platform.”

The motion to set the bar of the conference was **approved**.

He then **moved** that the following persons be given the privilege of sitting in the bar of the conference **WITH VOICE**:

- All clergy members from other Annual Conferences or Denominations who are serving United Methodist Churches or ministries in the Wisconsin Conference
- Conference Speakers
- Our Guests from the Dong Bu Conference of the Korean Methodist Church and the East Angola Conference of The United Methodist Church
- Representative from various General Church Agencies and Programs, United Methodist Colleges and Seminaries, and The United Methodist Publishing House, who have come to make presentations on behalf of their agency or institution
- Guests who will be making presentations or receiving recognitions throughout the conference
- Vice-Chairs and other members of Conference Boards and Agencies who are not members of the Annual Conference, but who are present to facilitate presentations made by those boards and agencies or to provide information to the annual conference related to the work of the boards and agencies
- Michele Virnig, Conference Communications Director

He noted that our conference rules provide that the lay directors and coordinators on the Conference Staff who fall within the guidelines of *The Book of Discipline* are voting members of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. Michele Virnig, our Communications Director, does not fall within those guidelines, and therefore, although we employ her, we must give her permission to sit within the bar.

The motion was **approved**.

Rice Myers moved that the following persons to be given the privilege of sitting in the bar of the Conference **WITHOUT VOICE OR VOTE**:

The motion was **approved**.

The **motion to elect tellers and assistant secretaries** was **approved**.

He noted that Action Item 23 was printed separately and was included in the mailing with the pre-conference workbook, that a one page document with revisions to portions of Action Item 20 was included in the packet conference members received at registration. He also noted that Action Item 24 was received after the workbook was printed. Because this item was received less than 10 days prior to the Annual Conference Session, the conference rules must be suspended in order to allow for its distribution and consideration.

He **moved** that Conference Rule 2.3.4 be suspended in order to allow for the distribution and consideration of Action Item 24. The **motion to suspend the rule** was **approved**.

The secretary shared several other items of information and announcements.

Bishop Lee introduced those seated on the platform: Bill White, Conference Chancellor; Steve Polster, Assistant to the Bishop; Kevin Rice Myers, Conference Secretary, and Amber Wolover, Conference-Secretary-Elect.

Bishop Lee then named the following persons as the Implications Committee for this session of the Annual Conference:

They were **elected**.

Dan Dick, Director of Connectional Ministries, presented the **proposed agenda** for the 43rd Session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. It was **approved**

Dick moved that Action Items 1 through 10 be placed on the **Consent Agenda**. There was one question about Action Item 6, but it was left on the Consent Agenda.

The **Consent Agenda** was **approved as presented**.

Dan Dick requested a moment of personal privilege. He invited Gordon Lind to make a presentation. Lind gave Bishop Lee a bouquet of flowers on behalf of the Cabinet and all of the members of the Conference in gratitude for her eight years of service in the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

Mark Geisthardt, Chairperson of the **Conference Council on Finance and Administration**, and Lisa King, Conference Treasurer, shared information about the 2011 financial results of the Annual Conference, and presented the 2013 Proposed Budget.

Geisthardt moved **Action Item 21: Proposed Deletion of Conference Policy 10.3.0**. This policy requires the conference treasurer to pay General Church apportionments in 12 equal monthly installments. He noted that the Council is proposing deletion of this policy in order to facilitate the cash flow of the annual conference.

Jean Nicholas moved the following **substitute** for Action Item 21:

“That policy 10.3.0 be suspended through the 2013 – 2016 quadrennium.”

The **substitute motion** was approved and became the main motion.

The **motion to suspend** Policy 10.3.0 through the 2013 – 2016 quadrennium was **approved**.

Bishop Lee called for the Order of the Day.

Dan Dick introduced Conference Speaker Peter Block, who spoke about “Abundant Community.”

Following Peter Block’s presentation, the secretary read announcements and the conference recessed for lunch at 11:30 a.m.

Friday Afternoon, June 1, 2012

Members of the Conference gathered in the plenary area at 1:30 p.m. for the second presentation by Peter Block on “Abundant Community.”

The Conference recessed for the afternoon break at 2:30 p.m.

Bishop Lee called the Conference to order for the afternoon plenary session at 2:45 p.m.

Tim Berlew led the members of the conference in singing “And Are We Yet Alive”

Dianne Vielhuber and Sarah Danz, members of the Revitalization Task Force presented a video story narrated by Gary Holmes about Nehemiah and the rebuilding of the temple. They spoke about the purpose of Revitalization Task Force. Inviting people to stand depending upon how long they have been members of The United Methodist Church, they noted that most of those present have been members for more than 33 years, and that The UMC will cease to exist in 33 years unless current trends are reversed. The Revitalization Task Force has taken as its theme – “Rebuilding the Wall” – from Nehemiah 2:17. Their presentation was an invitation to the Conference to begin the hard work of rebuilding the church. They asked those present to engage in a time of small group discussion, and then closed with prayer.

Mark Geisthardt, Chairperson of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, and Lisa King, Conference Treasurer, resumed presentation of the **2013 Proposed Budget**.

King noted several adjustments to the 2013 General Church Apportionment figures in the printed proposed budget. These adjustments were required because of the actions of the 2012 General Conference.

Nancy Deaner **moved**

“that flexibility for the Youth Ministries Apportionment lines be allowed, so that unspent apportionment funds at the end of each fiscal year in these lines be allowed to subsidize any deficits for either or both of the Youth Convos.”

The motion was **approved**

Jack Stubbs moved to amend the 2013 budget by increasing line items for:

Northcott Neighborhood House to: \$76,500

United Methodist Children’s Services to: \$148,000

Harbor House to: \$21,000

The amounts would be funded by increasing the total conference budget.

Because this motion adjusts the proposed budget by more than \$10,000, Conference Rule 3.3.3 requires that it be **referred to the Implications Committee**, which must report back to the Conference before the Conference can take action on the motion.

Richard Strait, Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, presented the following motion on behalf of the Clergy Session of the Annual Conference, which approved this recommendation on Thursday evening:

I move that \$5,000 (\$2,500 in the 2012 and \$2,500 in 2013) be placed in the respective years budgets to fund the “Clergy Covenant Development Team.”

Dawn Jeffers Ramstad **moved to amend** the motion by changing the proposed amount for 2013 from \$2,500 to \$5,000. The **motion to amend** was **defeated**.

The main motion was **approved as presented**.

Bishop Lee noted that the budget will be considered for final approval at the Sunday afternoon plenary session.

Tom Lambrecht asked Bishop Lee the following two **Questions of Church Law**:

In light of the action taken by the clergy session on May 31, 2012, to adopt the “Action Item: An Invitation” presented in response to the trial and sentencing of Rev. Amy DeLong:

1. Does the requirement that a “Clergy Covenant” be developed based on the principle of “ending participation in discrimination (specifically against GLBTQI people)” constitute a violation of provisions of the Book of Discipline which prohibit the candidacy, ordination, or appointment of self-avowed practicing homosexuals (§304.3, 311.2d) and the performing of same-gender unions (§341.6, 2702.1b), and does it constitute a violation of ¶16 of the Constitution, which reserves to the General Conference “full legislative power over all matters distinctively connectional,” including “to define and fix the powers and duties of elders, deacons, supply preachers, local preachers,” and “to define and fix the powers and duties of annual conferences,” and does it constitute a violation of Judicial Council decision 1111 and others, which state, “An annual conference may not negate, ignore, or violate provisions of the Discipline with which they disagree, even when the disagreements are based on conscientious objections to the provisions?”
2. Does the request for an appropriation of \$5,000 from the annual conference budget for the work of the “Conference Clergy Covenant Team” constitute a violation of ¶613.20, which states that “no annual conference board, agency, committee, commission or council shall ... otherwise use [United Methodist] funds ... to promote the acceptance of homosexuality?”

The questions were presented in writing. Bishop Lee received the questions, and indicated that her ruling will be issued following the procedures outlined by the Judicial Council and *The Book of Discipline*. The text of her decision will be printed in the 2012 Conference Journal.

Dorthy Radley, Conference Lay Leader, presented the Report of the Lay Leader and Board of Lay Ministry.

Deanna Shimko, Associate Conference Lay Leader, spoke about the “Lay Servant Ministries” of the Annual Conference.

Radley spoke about the Laity Session which was held on Thursday evening. (A report of the laity session is included elsewhere in these Daily Proceedings.) Radley and Shimko then presented reports about several Lay Ministries of the Conference.

Radley requested a moment of privilege. She thanked Bishop Lee and the members of the cabinet for their partnership in ministry with the Laity of the Annual Conference, and recognized the members of the Board of Laity.

Radley then introduced Deanna Shimko as the new Conference Lay Leader for the 2013 – 2016 quadrennium. Shimko spoke to the conference about possibilities for future ministries in the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

Gordon Lind presented the Report of the Cabinet. He invited representatives from several churches in the conference to speak about the ministries of their congregations.

Gail Burgess, Chairperson of the **Board of Global Ministries**, introduced Gwen and Bill Gibson, who were commissioned as Missionaries from Wisconsin to Senegal at the 2012 General Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Burgess noted that the “Mission Giving Booklet” for the next quadrennium has been completed and is available at the Board of Global Ministries display.

Lamarr Gibson presented information about the partnership between the Wisconsin Annual Conference and the East Angola Annual Conference. He invited members of the East Angola Task Force to stand and be recognized.

Burgess moved **Action Item 16: East Angola Partnership Resolution**. It was **approved**.

Burgess moved **Action Item 17: Native American Partnership Resolution**. It was **approved**.

Burgess introduced Tom Rossmiller, the new Chairperson of the Disaster Response Team, and Laura Markley, Disaster Response Case Manager. Rossmiller spoke about the importance of each congregation developing a “Disaster Response Plan.”

Burgess moved **Action Item 18: Connecting Neighbors Resolution**. It was **approved**.

Burgess introduced Judy Vasby and Patsy Ruppe, who shared background information about the Hmong House of Good News in Milwaukee.

Burgess then called upon David Green, Chairperson of the Health and Welfare Ministries Committee, who introduced the following representatives from several of the Health and Welfare Ministries related to the Wisconsin Annual Conference:

Burgess moved **Action Item 19: Covenant of Affiliation with Hmong House of Good News and the Wisconsin Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church**. It was **approved**.

Burgess expressed her appreciation to Deborah Thompson, who has served as the Missions Coordinator for the Annual Conference for the last four years. Thompson will be appointed as a District Superintendent on July 1. Burgess presented her with a small gift of appreciation. Burgess also presented gifts of appreciation to Michele Virnig, Conference Communications Director, and Kaitlin Hilbo, Communications Assistant, for their work in promoting the mission programs of the Conference.

Leonard Larsen, Chairperson of the **Rules Committee**, moved **Action Item 20: Proposed Changes to Conference Rules and Policies**.

Steve Scott **moved to amend Action Item 20** by adding the following as **Proposed Rules Change #10**:

The Wisconsin Annual Conference directs the appropriate committee(s) to change the Conference rule regarding clergy couples so that churches and/or charges may share the costs of family health insurance plans.

Fran Deaner moved to refer the motion to the Health Insurance Committee. The **motion to refer** was **approved**.

Lamarr Gibson **moved to refer Action Item 20: Proposed Rules Change #9** to the Discipleship Leadership Team. The **motion to refer** was **defeated**.

Action Item 20 was **approved as presented**.

Larsen moved **Action Item 24: New Policy 160.2 - Required Background Checks**. It was **approved**.

The Secretary read announcements.

Bishop Lee recessed the Conference for the evening at 5:50 p.m.

Saturday Morning, June 2, 2012

Members of the Conference gathered in the plenary area at 8:00 a.m. for a time of singing led by Grace Cajjuat.

Bishop Lee called the morning plenary session to order at 8:20 a.m. She introduced Nathan Moenck, the Associate Chancellor of the Annual Conference, who is acting as parliamentarian for this session.

The Revitalization Task Force shared a video presentation based upon Chapter 4 of the Book of Nehemiah about “putting the wall back together.” The video was narrated by Gary Holmes, pastor of Sugar River UMC.

Dianne Vielhuber and Sarah Danz shared information about revitalization, using the imagery of “rebuilding the wall of the temple” from Nehemiah, and asked the members

of the conference to discuss in small groups what is important in helping to rebuild the vitality and influence of their local congregations. These words were written on small blocks, which were then used to symbolically “rebuild the wall.”

Bishop Lee introduced Dr. Phil Amerson, President of Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, who brought greetings from the seminary and shared about the work that has taken place at the seminary. He announced that Bishop Lee will serve as Bishop in Residence at the seminary following her retirement on September 1, 2012.

Fran Deaner presented the report of the Joint Board of Pensions. He shared information about the health insurance and pension programs of the Annual Conference.

Deaner moved **Action Item 11: Resolution on Past Service Annuity Rate**. It was **approved**.

He moved **Action Item 12: Resolution on Minimum Compensation**. It was **approved**.

He moved **adoption of the entire report**. It was **approved**.

Summer Frosland, youth lay member, presented the following motion on behalf of the youth of the annual conference:

Whereas the United Methodist Convo have fixed items that we have to pay, which exceeds our means of intake causing the deficit in funds for convos, and

Whereas in this economy it is difficult for families to pay all the money for convo, which as a result decrease the number of attendees, and

Whereas as a result this may lead to an increase in registration costs, which would decrease attendees.

Therefore be it resolved that the Wisconsin Annual Conference add a line item for Youth Convos to the Youth Ministries budget set at \$15,000 for 2013.

Because the motion would adjust the budget by more than \$10,000 it was **referred to the Implications Committee** in accordance with Conference Rule 3.3.3.

Bishop Lee shared prayer requests for clergy spouse Jeanine Lohr, who is having surgery, and for Bill Busch, a clergy member of the Annual Conference, who is being hospitalized. She offered prayer on their behalf.

The Secretary read announcements.

Bishop Lee recessed the conference for the Memorial Service. She reminded the conference that the afternoon plenary session will begin at 3:00 p.m.

Memorial Service

Members and friends of the conference gathered in the Worship Area at 9:30 a.m. for the Memorial Service. Grace Cajuat, Conference Music Leader, led the congregation in a Time of Centering with the singing of “Nothing Can Trouble.” Bishop Lee offered words of Welcome and Greeting. The opening song was “In the Garden.” Bob Butler offered the opening prayer and words of instruction. There was a time of reflective silence. Kevin Rice Myers, Conference Secretary, read the scripture lesson from Revelation 21:1-7. The Secretary read the names of those Clergy Members, Clergy Spouses and Family Members, and Lay Persons Related to the Conference who have

passed away since the last Annual Conference session. Family members or friends of those who have died were invited to come forward and light a candle as their loved one's name was called. Bishop Lee greeted each family as they came forward. After the names were read, Bishop Lee offered words of Prayer and Dismissal, and the service concluded with the singing of "I Was There to Hear Your Morning Cry."

Retiree Recognition

After the conclusion of the Memorial Service members of the Conference and guests were invited to stay for the Retiree Recognition. Rev. Howard Hintzman introduced the retirees and their spouses. Each retiree was invited to share a few words about their ministry, and pictures from their ministries were displayed on the screens for those present to view.

Following the retirement recognition the conference recessed for lunch. During the lunch break about 175 members of the annual conference volunteered their time to prepare meal packs for the "Kids Against Hunger Mission Project. The volunteers packed more than 50,000 meals, enough to feed 137 kids for a year. The meals will be sent to the Philippines where they will be used to alleviate hunger and malnourishment.

The Retirees Luncheon was held at 12:00 noon in the Grand Ballroom of the Chula Vista Resort.

The Ordination Rehearsal was held at 1:00 p.m. and the Commissioning Service Rehearsal was held at 2:00 p.m.

Saturday Afternoon, June 2, 2012

Bishop Lee called the plenary session of the conference back to order at 3:00 p.m.

Dan Dick, Director of Connectional Ministries, introduced those who are presenting various awards and recognitions.

Markus Wegenast, Chairperson of the Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry, presented the **Francis Asbury Award** presented to Jane Follmer Zekoff. He announced that next year there will also be a Denman award one for youth! This year's Denman award for clergy is given to Rev. Eduardo de la Cruz. The Denman Award for laity is given to Scott and Dawn Bethke.

Diane Quade presented the **Bridge Builder Awards** from the Commission on the Status and Role of Women to Julie Mieke and Mac Weddle.

Gail Burgess announced that this year's **Thelma Gregg Award** will be given to Bonnie Lund of Stevens Point: St. Paul's. The award is given to someone who has demonstrated Christian commitment in tireless promotion of the missionary outreach of the Church.

Burgess then presented the **Love in Action Award** to Vince Ramsden for his work through Volunteers in Mission (VIM). An offering was taken to support the East Angola Partnership and Native American Partnership Ministries. The anthem "Amen, Sing Praises to the Lord" was sung by the

Conference Choir. Bishop Lee celebrated the Sacrament of Holy Communion. The newly commissioned and licensed ministers served communion to the gathered congregation. The Quartzite Brass ensemble played several hymns during the serving of communion. The closing hymn was “Sent Forth by God’s Blessing.”

Young Choe, and Ms. Prisca Choe played “Korean Love Song” and “The Gift of Love” on cello, guitar and violin. Rev. Deborah Thompson, Conference Coordinator of Missions and a representative of the Black Clergywomen of The United Methodist Church, offered words of witness to Bishop Lee’s ministry. Ms. Cindy Churan, Rev. Mary Council-Austin, Rev. Ann Spindt Henschel, and Rev. Sam Royappa led the congregation in a Litany of Appreciation. Retired Bishop Don Ott offered words of witness to Bishop Lee’s ministry. Bishop Lee then shared her appreciation for the opportunity to be in ministry not only in Wisconsin but throughout the United Methodist Connection. Sunday Morning, June 3, 2012

Members of the conference gathered in the plenary area at 7:45 a.m. for a time of singing led by Bob Butler and Justin Lowe.

Bishop Lee called the plenary session of the annual conference to order at 8:03 a.m.

Leigh Roberts, Chairperson of the **Board of Church and Society**, noted that today is “Peace with Justice Sunday,” one of the six Sundays with Special Offerings in The United Methodist Church. The Peace with Justice offering is used to support ministries both through the General Church and through the Annual Conference.

Roberts introduced Mary Laneberger, Conference Peace with Justice Coordinator, who spoke about the importance of the Social Justice Ministries of the Annual Conference.

Roberts presented **Action Item 13: A Resolution on Human Trafficking**. It was **approved**.

Roberts moved **Action Item 14: A Resolution on Voter ID Awareness and Education**. It was **approved**.

Roberts moved **Action Item 15: Resolution on Cyber Bullying**. He noted that this is a particular problem for youth these days. It was **approved**.

Bishop Lee took the opportunity to thank the youth of the annual conference for their presence, participation and leadership that they are offering in their congregations, schools, and the annual conference. She invited them to stand and be recognized. The members of the conference affirmed their appreciation for the ministry of youth in the conference with a round of applause.

Roberts moved adoption of the entire report of the **Board of Church and Society**. It was **approved**.

Bishop Lee welcomed the members of the delegation from the Dongbu Conference of the Korean Methodist Church, which is the Sister Conference to the Wisconsin Annual Conference. The conference greeted them with a round of applause.

Bishop Kim brought greetings from the 650 churches of the Dongbu Conference.

Rev. Moon, Jae-Hwang, General Secretary of the Dongbu Conference, shared a PowerPoint presentation about the ministries of the Dongbu Conference.

Dan Dick introduced the “Think Greater” stewardship campaign, which will start in the fall of 2012. The campaign will focus on the question “what is God calling, expecting, and challenging us to do?”. It will invite churches to ask “How do we look at the answer to that question and ‘think greater’?” Resources will be made available to local congregations in a number of ways.

Lamarr Gibson, Chairperson of the Board of Congregational Development, shared a PowerPoint presentation about the structure, mission and ministries of the Board. He highlighted several changes that will be taking place in the work of the board in the near future.

The Secretary read announcements.

Bishop Lee recessed the conference for the Ordination Service.

Ordination Service

Members and friends of the Wisconsin Annual Conference gathered in the worship area, which was located at the south end of the Wisconsin Dells Center, at 9:30 a.m. for the **Service of Ordination of Elders and Deacons.**

The service began with a Call to Worship in the Native American tradition, led by Rev. Dawn Helton-Anishinaabeqwa. The processional hymn was “Kanisa Litajengua (O, Who Will Build the Church Now?),” an African Folk Hymn sung in English and Swahili. Members of the Rhemadance Company provided a dance interpretation of the hymn during the processional.

Bishop Linda Lee invited all those present to reaffirm the call to ministry that is inherent in our Christian baptism.

Dorothy Radley, Conference Lay Leader, read the scripture lesson from John 14:8-14.

Bishop Lee preached a powerful sermon entitled “Greater Works.”

Rev. Stephen Polster, Assistant to the Bishop, led the reading of “The Social Creed.”

Bishop Lee explained the meaning of ordination to the congregation, and asked the candidates for ordination the questions prescribed by The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church. They all answered the questions appropriately.

Bishop Lee, assisted by Bishops of the Dongbu Conference, Conference Lay Leader Dorthy Radley, the District Superintendents, and other ordained deacons and elders, ordained Susan Angus Haller and Rebekah Schmidt as Deacons in The United Methodist Church, with the laying on of hands and prayer.

She ordained Krystal Goodger, Paul Elwood Gregersen, Dawn Helton-Anishinaabeqwa, TyLacey Sims Hines, Martin Park Hunter, David O. Leistra, and Jane Elizabeth Sommers as Elders in The United Methodist Church, with the laying on of hands and prayer.

An offering was taken to support the Clergy in Transition Fund and the Dong Bu Conference of the Korean Methodist Church. During the offering the conference choir sang "Praise His Holy Name."

Following the ordination service, the congregation greeted the newly ordained elders.

Sunday Afternoon, June 3, 2012

Bishop Lee called the conference to order at 1:00 p.m.

She introduced Rev. Scott Anderson, Executive Director of the Wisconsin Council of Churches. He brought greetings from the members of the Council and shared a PowerPoint presentation about the ministries of the council.

Jean Schmidt and Diane Quade presented the monitoring report from the Commission on Religion and Race and the Commission on the Status and Role of Women regarding participation in the plenary sessions of the Annual Conference.

Lisa King, Conference Treasurer, presented **Action Item 23: Resolution on Episcopal Residence** on behalf of the Conference Episcopacy Committee and the Episcopal Residence Committee. It was **approved**.

Don Amphlett presented the report of the Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries. He introduced several members of the Board who were present on stage.

He introduced this year's Camping Ministry Video, which the conference then viewed.

Cathy Hamblin reported on remodeling and upgrades to the facilities at Lake Lucerne and Pine Lake camps.

Bishop Lee and members of the Cabinet **read the clergy appointments** for the 2012-2013 Conference Year. Bishop Lee declared the appointments set for the coming year.

Gordon Lind, Dean of the Cabinet, expressed appreciation from the cabinet for the collaboration between churches and clergy, and encouraged clergy and laity to continue to work together to provide effective ministry, and to celebrate what covenanting together with each other and with God can do.

Bishop Lee offered a word of gratitude for the work of the cabinet and staff, and especially Steve Polster and Cindy Churan, for their support during her 8 years of service as Bishop of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. The Bishop then thanked Lisa King for her work as Treasurer, and Sherry Malone for her work on the administrative staff. She presented gifts of appreciation to all of them.

There were several requests for moments of personal privilege.

Kevin Dembinski shared information about the "11x15 Campaign" which has a goal of reducing the prison population in the State of Wisconsin from its current level of 22,000 to 11,000 by 2015.

August Grulich, President of the **Conference United Methodist Men**, presented a certificate from General Commission on United Methodist Men to the Wisconsin Annual Conference in recognition of the conference's 100% World Service Apportionment payment for 2011.

Dan Dick recognized the members of the conference staff, and noted changes that are taking place on the conference staff this year. He thanked Ric Olson and Deborah Thompson who are leaving the staff this year to assume other appointments. He introduced Don Greer, who will become the Coordinator of Circuit Ministries, and Grace Cajiua, who will become the Coordinator of Multicultural Ministries for the conference. He thanked Diane Williams, conference administrative assistant and registrar, who will be retiring this year. He noted that the focus of the conference staff for the coming quadrennium will be to "equip, empower and enable churches and circuits to do effective ministry."

Bishop Lee thanked Dan Dick, Director of Connectional Ministries, and Michele Virnig, Director of Communications, for their work, and presented gifts to them.

Bishop Lee thanked Kevin Rice Myers for his 22 years as Conference Secretary, and Amber Wolover for her willingness to take on that responsibility. She thanked Bill White and Nathan Moenck for their work as Conference Chancellors, and Dorthy Radley for her work as Conference Lay Leader. She presented gifts to all of them.

Dan Dick recognized Lynn Lubkemann for her work as Conference Archivist.

Jason Mahnke, Chairperson of the **Discipleship Leadership Council**, reported on the vision for next quadrennium, “Living the Fruit of the Spirit.” He noted that the work of the Discipleship Leadership Council and the Discipleship Leadership Executive Team will be to listen to the needs of the local church and to provide resources that can be used in the local church, and to challenge all of us to continue sharing God’s love and transforming lives in our local communities in the name of Jesus Christ. He invited everyone to consider the question “What would it look like if our churches were centers of love, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, and self-control.”

Warren Waddell, requested a moment of privilege to recognize J.D. McCarty and all the tech support people who help make the annual conference session happen. The conference affirmed their work with a standing ovation.

Debra Benedum, Chairperson of the **Conference Nominations Committee**, presented the report of the nominations committee, noting that the new members of the Board of Ordained Ministry were not included in the printed report, but were displayed on the screens for the conference’s information. She moved the election of all those who need to be elected as listed on the printed report and displayed on the screen. The motion was approved, and they were elected.

Benedum moved that the nominations committee be permitted to make adjustments to the nominations report and to fill vacancies during the coming year as necessary. The motion was approved.

Judy Vasby, President of the **Conference United Methodist Women**, thanked Bishop Lee for her support of the United Methodist Women, and presented a “Special Mission Recognition Pin with Pearl” to the Bishop for her support of the ministries of the United Methodist Women.

Steve Zekoff requested a moment of personal privilege to request for prayers for the Conference’s General and Jurisdictional Conference delegation as they prepare to go to the North Central Jurisdictional Conference, which will be assigning a new bishop to Wisconsin. He noted that there will be changes in other Episcopal areas as well. He asked everyone to pray for all of the North Central Jurisdictional Conference delegates. Bishop Lee offered words of prayer for the delegations and the conferences of the Jurisdiction as we anticipate a variety of changes in the near future.

Craig Conklin moved

“To remove the monetary request from the budget for the funding of the Clergy Covenant Task Group and make it self-funded by the clergy of the Wisconsin Annual Conference.”

Bishop Lee ruled that because the funding for the Clergy Covenant Process had previously been approved on Friday afternoon, this motion would require a motion to reconsider that process before it would be in order.

Terry Dignan moved to reconsider the funding of the Clergy Covenant Process. Bishop Lee ruled that the motion to reconsider did not pass.

There was a request for a standing count vote on the motion to reconsider. The motion to reconsider was approved by a vote of 180 yes, 156 no, with 43 abstentions.

The reconsidered motion before the conference, presented by Richard Strait and approved on Friday afternoon was:

I move that \$5,000 (\$2,500 in the 2012 and \$2,500 in 2013) be placed in the respective years budgets to fund the “Clergy Covenant Development Team.”

Craig Conklin moved the following as a substitute for the original motion:

“To remove the monetary request from the budget for the funding of the Clergy Covenant Task Group and make it self-funded by the clergy of the Wisconsin Annual Conference.”

The substitute motion was **not approved**.

The original motion was back before the conference.

Fran Deaner **moved the previous question**.

Ethan Larsen raised a **point of order**, questioning whether we need to vote on the motion since the substitute was defeated. Bishop Lee ruled that it must be voted on again.

The **motion to close debate** was **approved**.

The **original motion** by Richard Strait that was approved on Friday afternoon was **approved again**.

Larry McGuinn, chairperson of the **Implications Committee**, requested a moment of privilege that the members of the conference share the peace of Christ with one another.

He reported on behalf of the Implications Committee about the proposed changes to the 2013 Conference Budget that were made on Friday afternoon.

Mark Geisthardt, Chairperson of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, and Lisa King, Conference Treasurer, resumed presentation of the **2013 Proposed Budget**.

The following motion made by Jack Stubbs on Friday afternoon was placed before the conference:

I move to amend the 2013 budget by increasing line items for:
Northcott Neighborhood House to: \$76,500
United Methodist Children’s Services to: \$148,000
Harbor House to: \$21,000
The figures would be funded by increasing the total conference budget.

The motion was **approved**.

The following motion presented by Summer Frosland on Saturday morning was placed before the conference:

Therefore be it resolved that the Wisconsin Annual Conference add a line item for Youth Convos to the Youth Ministries budget set at \$15,000 for 2013.

The motion was **approved**.

Lisa King reported that with the changes approved by the Annual Conference, the revised 2013 Budget Totals are:

Gross Apportionments: \$7,829,553

Net Apportionments: \$6,897,836

The **revised 2013 Budget** was **approved**.

Bishop Lee expressed her appreciation for the ministries of the conference and how we are moving forward.

Susan Bresser, Chairperson of the **Program and Arrangements Committee**, thanked the members of the committee for their work. She announced that the 2013 Wisconsin Annual Conference Session will be held June 7 to 10 at the Madison Marriott West Hotel and Conference Center.

Steve Scott requested a moment of privilege to express our thanks to the General and Jurisdictional Conference Delegates for the time that they invested this past year in the work of General Conference. The Bishop invited the delegates to stand, and the conference recognized them with a round of applause.

Bishop Lee shared several prayer requests.

Mark Geisthardt announced that two members of the Appleton: Emmanuel congregation, Bill and Gwen Gibson, have been commissioned by the General Board of Global Ministries to serve a three year term as missionaries to Senegal.

Ethan Larson shared an update on Bill Busch, who is experiencing some major illness issues.

Bill Stimeling, a member of the 2012 General Conference delegation, expressed to the members of the annual conference what a joy it is to see gentle, compassionate, thoughtful people working for God's church – as opposed to the General Conference. Bishop Lee expressed her gratitude for the way that all of the members of the General Conference delegation fulfilled their responsibilities on behalf of the Annual Conference.

Bishop Lee expressed her appreciation to J.D. McCarty for his work facilitating the Annual Conference, and thanked JD with flowers.

The Secretary read several announcements.

Nancy Carmichael Stoner asked for a moment of privilege to thank those persons who went to General Conference to serve as pages and marshals.

Bishop Lee led a "Closing Time" with scripture, music and prayer.

She challenged the members of the conference to "Live, Give and Love Beyond All Expectation."

The conference closed with the singing of "Go Now in Peace."

The 2012 Wisconsin Annual Conference adjourned *sine die* at 3:50 p.m.

Laity Session Report for Annual Conference 2012

Marty Miller from Concert Ministry presented his original music in song, guitar and keyboard as we gathered for Laity Session. During Laity Session Marty led us in familiar songs that filled the air, opened our hearts and moved our souls with the Spirit of God.

Bishop Linda Lee opened our session by greeting and welcoming the laity to the 2012 Annual Conference. What a gift she brought to give us another opportunity to be reminded to Live, Give, Love Beyond all Expectation! Bishop Lee thanked the laity for their ministry and service and for being present at this 2012 Annual Conference. Bishop Lee called for the Holy Spirit to be among us and flow through us as we prepared to celebrate the ministry and do the work of the Annual Conference. Bishop Lee thanked Dorthy Radley for her eight years as Conference Lay Leader during which time D Radley transformed the ministry of the laity in the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

Conference Lay Leader, Dorthy Radley welcomed all to the 2012 Laity Session. D Radley read John 14 and offered a prayer.

D Radley introduced the members of the Conference Board of Laity, Deanna Shimko, Associate Conference Lay Leader and Metro South Lay Leader, Mark Sheets, Metro North District Lay Leader, Marty Chandler, Coulee District Lay Leader, Denise Retzleff, Winnebago District Lay Leader and Associate Dean of Faith Alive!, Ron Vinger, Nicolet District Lay Leader and leader for the Walk to Emmaus, Lisa Gilbert, Capital-Coulee Director of Lay Servant Ministries, Ray Cherney, Chippewa-Heartland Director of Lay Servant Ministries, Rex Nelson, Metro North Director of Lay Servant Ministries, Karen Klatt, Metro South Director of Lay Servant Ministries, Donna Wilkinson, Nicolet District director of Lay Servant Ministries, Curtis Wittwer, Faith Alive! Dean, August Grulich, President of the United Methodist Men, Judy Vasby, President of the United Methodist Women, and Eric Taylor, Young Adult representative. D. Thursday, May 31, 2012, 7:30 p.m.

Bishop Linda Lee called the Clergy Session of the 2012 Wisconsin Annual Conference to order at 7:35 p.m. and offered words of welcome and greeting. She shared information about a number of things that have happened since the 2011 Clergy Session, and invited all those present to be open to and aware of the movement of the Spirit among us. She then led the clergy session in an opening prayer.

Richard Strait, Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, welcomed those present on behalf of the Board. He invited Gordon Lind, Dean of the Cabinet, to present the Cabinet's response to **Question 17**: "Are all the clergy members of the conference blameless in their life and official administration?" Those present in the clergy session read the cabinet's response to Question 17 in unison.

Strait asked Bishop Lee to indicate who is to be present and voting in the Clergy Session.

Bishop Lee responded that all clergy members of the conference – including deacons, elders, provisional members, local pastors and student pastors under full and part-time appointment to a pastoral charge – and lay members of the Board of Ordained Ministry may be present and have voice in the Clergy Session. Only Elders and Deacons in Full Connection who are members of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and lay members of the Board of Ordained Ministry may vote.

Strait **moved** "that all clergy members of other annual conferences or denominations who are appointed to serve Wisconsin United Methodist Churches be granted permission to be present in the Clergy Session with voice." The motion was **approved**.

Strait called upon Dawn Jeffers Ramstad, Chairperson of the Order of Deacons, to present those candidates who are being recommended for **Ordination as Deacons**.

Ramstad spoke about the nature of the work of the Deacon. She presented **Question 31a** and **Question 32a**, and introduced Susan Angus Haller and Rebekah Jo Schmidt.

Ramstad then **moved** "that these two persons be elected as Clergy Members in Full Connection in the Wisconsin Annual Conference and Ordained as Deacons in The United Methodist Church."

Following speeches of affirmation for each candidate, **they were elected** as Members in Full Connection and **approved** for Ordination as Deacons in The United Methodist Church.

Strait called upon Forrest Clark, Chairperson of the Order of Elders, to present those candidates who are recommended for **Ordination as Elders**.

Clark spoke about the nature of the ministry of the Elder.

He presented **Question 31b**: Who are elected as members in full connection? and **Question 33a**: Who are approved for Ordination as Elder? He introduced the following candidates for Full Membership and Ordination as Elder:

Clark then **moved** “that these persons be elected as members in full connection of the Wisconsin Annual Conference, and ordained as Elders in The United Methodist Church.”

Following speeches of affirmation for each candidate, **they were elected** as Members in Full Connection and **approved** for Ordination as Elders in The United Methodist Church.

Clark then presented **Question 38**: Who are transferred in from other Methodist Denominations? He introduced Aaron Alfred, and invited him to come forward to be recognized and welcomed. Alfred is transferring into the conference this year as an Ordained Elder in Full Connection from the Church of South India.

Clark presented **Question 28b(1)**. He introduced the following persons who are recommended for election as Provisional Elders and commissioning to Pastoral Ministry:

Afi Dobbins
G. Wiley Gladney
Ebenezer Insor
Sonja Parr
Daniel Verdegan

Clark **moved** that these persons be elected as Provisional Elders in the Wisconsin Annual Conference, and commissioned to Pastoral Ministry in The United Methodist Church.

They were all **elected and approved** for Commissioning as Provisional Elders.

Following the election of Provisional Members, Bishop Lee invited the Clergy Session to take a short break.

She re-convened the Clergy Session about 10 minutes later.

Bishop Lee called the attention of the Clergy Session to the printed **Report of the Church Trial of Rev. Amy DeLong**. She noted that one part of the Trial Court’s sentence - suspension from the practice of ministry for 20 days beginning July 1, 2011 – will be reported in Question 47 of the Business of the Annual Conference. She also noted that the document which Rev. DeLong was required to write was prepared according to the specifications of the Trial Court, was reviewed by the Board of Ordained Ministry, and was then distributed to the clergy of the Annual Conference prior to the Clergy Session.

Bishop Lee, Richard Strait and Amy DeLong spoke about the document and the process through which it was created. The basic question which the document raises for discussion and decision by the clergy session is this:

Is deepening our understanding of our covenant worth spending money, time and energy on as a central piece of our common life and the life of United Methodism in Wisconsin?

The document also included a section entitled “**Action Item: An Invitation.**” The document and action item are printed in the 2012 Wisconsin Conference Journal separately from these Daily Proceedings. The “Action Item” proposed the creation of a “Conference Clergy Covenant Team,” and included a request for an initial starting fund of \$15,000 to facilitate the work of the Clergy Covenant Team.

Several people spoke about the issues raised in the document, both in favor of and against the question and the action item.

Carly Kuntz **moved** to reduce the initial budget request from \$15,000 to \$5,000, and to add a convener to the list of those included in the Clergy Covenant Team. The motion was **approved**.

Tom Lambrecht **moved to amend** the Action Item by deleting the words “Seek protection of and equality for the vulnerable/minority by ending participation in discrimination (specifically against GLBTQI people)” from the list of criteria upon which the clergy covenant is to be based. The **motion to amend** was **defeated**.

The “**Action Item: An Invitation**” was **approved as amended**.

Steve Zekoff noted that the whole Conference needs to act on the requested increase in the Conference Budget. Richard Strait, Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, will present this request to the plenary session of the Annual Conference at the time the 2013 Budget is brought before the Annual Conference.

Richard Strait introduced Kevin Rice Myers, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Ordained Ministry. He noted that Rice Myers, who has also served as Conference Secretary of the Wisconsin Annual Conference for most of the last 24 years, will assume full-time responsibilities for the Board of Ordained Ministry starting on January 1, 2013. This change will provide additional time for Rice Myers to concentrate on the many tasks related to the work of the Board, including several new aspects of the candidacy process that were established by the 2012 General Conference.

Rice Myers continued with the presentation of the Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Rice Myers presented **Question 18a: Committee on Investigation**. He noted that the 2012 General Conference enacted legislation which will eliminate the Committee on Investigation for Clergy, effective January 1, 2013. However those who are named in the report will be serving in this capacity until December 31, 2012, and there are a number of changes in the list of previously approved members of this committee. They were **elected** for the remainder of this calendar year.

He presented **Question 18b: Administrative Review Committee**, and noted that this group is elected for the Quadrennium. There are no changes to the previously approved list. Question 18b was **approved**.

He presented **Questions 19 and 20** for information.

Rice Myers presented **Question 21a**: Who are approved as full time local pastors? and **Question 21b**: Who are approved as part-time local pastors?, adding the names of Juan Francisco Mayorga, Patsy Rowe, and Grace Baldrige to Question 21b. Question 21 was **approved**.

He noted that the numbers in parentheses following each person's name reflect the number of Basic Course of Study Classes completed as reflected in the official transcripts from the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Three persons have completed the Basic Course of Study since the last clergy session. They are:

He invited them to stand and be recognized by the clergy session for this accomplishment.

Rice Myers presented **Question 22**: Who have been discontinued as local pastors? for information.

He presented **Question 24a**: Clergy from other Annual Conferences and **Question 24b**: Clergy from Other Methodist Denominations for information, noting that the following persons are new to these lists this year:

He invited all clergy from other annual conferences and Methodist Denominations who are serving among us to stand and be recognized.

Rice Myers presented **Question 25**: Clergy from Other Christian Denominations, noting that there are no new names on this list this year. He invited all clergy from other Christian Denominations who are serving among us to stand and be recognized.

Question 25 was **approved**.

He presented **Question 26b**: Affiliate members without vote. It was **approved**. He invited Dee Webber to stand and be recognized. He noted that David Joyce, a clergy member of the Western North Carolina Conference who had previously been included in this list, has returned to North Carolina.

Rice Myers presented **Questions 29a, 29b, and 29e**, which list those continued as Provisional Members of the Annual Conference, for information.

He presented **Question 41**: Who have been transferred out to other Annual Conferences? for information, noting that Bener Agtarap is transferring to the California-Nevada Annual Conference.

He presented **Question 43a(2)**: Who are continued on Honorable Location, for information.

He presented **Question 44(a)**: Who have been granted the status of honorable location – retired this year?, noting that Ted Farrar reached the mandatory retirement age of 72 and has retired from his work with Church World Service. His request for the status of honorable location – retired was **approved**.

Rice Myers presented **Question 44(b)**: Who have previously been granted the status of honorable location – retired? for information

Rice Myers noted that we have reached **Question 46** which relates to termination of conference membership, and that there is information that needs to be shared with the Clergy Session.

Bishop Lee reported that at the 2011 Clergy Session, when we reached this point in the Business of the Annual Conference Report, Kaye Glennon, an Elder in Full Connection who was appointed to the Franksville United Methodist Church, asked to speak to the Clergy Session, and surrendered her credentials. Since the last Annual Conference Session a number of things have happened, and additional information has come to light about the circumstances surrounding Kaye's decision to surrender her credentials. The Bishop called upon Marty Williams, who is currently appointed as the pastor at the Franksville United Methodist Church, to share with the clergy session what happened in that congregation before the last Annual Conference Session, and what has happened in the congregation since that time.

Marty Williams offered a brief summary of the past history, current circumstances, and future plans at the Franksville United Methodist Church.

Rice Myers presented **Question 46a**: Who have had their conference membership terminated by withdrawal to unite with another denomination? He reported that Do Bum Huh, an Elder in Full Connection, left The United Methodist Church to join the Korean Methodist Church. He noted that, while there are provisions in the *Book of Discipline* that allow clergy to transfer into The United Methodist Church from other Denominations, there are no provisions in the *Book of Discipline* that allow clergy to transfer out of The United Methodist Church into another denomination. They must be listed as "Withdrawn."

Question 46a was **approved**.

He presented **Questions 45, 48c, 52b, and 84**: Those who have died since the last Annual Conference session. He noted that there is no specific place in the Business of the Annual Conference to record the death of a Clergy Person on Honorable Location, so the death of Melvin Nickel must be reported in Question 45.

After the names of all those who have died were read, there was a time of silent prayer in memory of these colleagues in ministry, and Bishop Lee offered prayer.

Rice Myers presented **Question 47**: Who have been suspended? for information.

He presented **Question 49**: Who have been appointed to other Annual Conferences? for information, noting that the name of Michael Garren should be deleted from the list printed in the report.

He presented **Question 50**: Who are on Leave Of Absence? He noted that the name of Michael Garren should be added to Question 50(a)(3): Transitional Leave, for the period

2012 Wisconsin Conference Journal

July 1 thru July 15, 2012. (He will be starting an Extension Ministry Appointment on July 15, 2012)

Question 50(a) was **approved** by the necessary majorities.

Rice Myers presented **Question 52a**: Who were granted Incapacity Leave since the last conference session? for information.

He presented **Question 52(c)**: Who are granted incapacity leave at this session? noting that Patricia Herdt is the only addition to this list this year.

Question 52(c) was **approved**.

Rice Myers presented **Question 53(a)**: What members in full connection have been retired?, **Question 55(a)**: What provisional members have been retired? and **Question 56(a)**: Who have been recognized as retired local pastors?

He noted that the effective date for Kathleen Nuzzo's retirement should be August 1, 2012, rather than the date indicated in the printed list.

Rice Myers invited the retirees to come to the front of the room to be recognized, and the clergy session affirmed their ministry with a standing ovation.

Questions 53(a), 55(a) and 56(a) were approved.

Rice Myers presented **Questions 53b, 54b, and 56b** (those continued in the retired relationship) for information.

Rice Myers noted that **Questions 57, 58, 59 and 60** are statistical charts and tables which will be completed after the annual conference session because these numbers must match the appointment list, which may still be changed between now and July 1.

Rice Myers noted that **Questions 60 through 65** deal with persons who are certified in specialized areas of ministry, and that there are **no changes in these lists this year**.

He noted that **Questions 66 through 75** deal with Diaconal Ministers, and that there are **no changes in these lists this year**.

He presented **Question 76a**: Who are approved for less than full time service?

He noted that approval of this question requires a two-thirds majority for those who have been approved for less than full time service for eight years or less, and a three-fourths majority for those approved for less than full time service for more than eight years.

The clergy session voted on the list of those who have been appointed less than full time for eight years or less. **It was approved by the necessary two-thirds majority.**

The clergy session then voted on the list of those who have been appointed less than full time for more than eight years. **It was approved by the necessary three-fourths majority.**

Rice Myers presented **Question 76b**: Deacons and provisional deacons approved for less than full time service, noting that no vote required

He presented **Question 78**: Interim Appointment Changes, for information.

He presented **Questions 80(a) & 80(b)** for information.

He presented **Question 80(c)**: Those appointed to other valid Extension Ministries under ¶344.1d, noting that the name of Janis E. Blean Kachigan should be deleted from the printed list.

Question 80(c) was approved.

He presented **Question 81**: Who are appointed as Deacons? for information.

He presented **Question 82**: Who are appointed to attend school? for information.

He presented **Question 83**: Where are the Diaconal Ministers appointed? for information, noting that Richard Whitaker is the only active Diaconal Minister still serving in the Wisconsin Conference.

He presented **Question 84**: Other personal notations, for information.

Rice Myers noted that this concluded the clergy session's action on the Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

He called attention to the new mailing address and contact information for the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Richard Strait announced that the Board of Ordained Ministry had nominated Stan Pegram as the **Chair of the Order of Elders** for the 2013 -2016 Quadrennium. **He was elected** by the Elders in Full Connection present.

Strait announced that the Board of Ordained Ministry had nominated Susan Haller as the **Chair of the Order of Deacons** for the 2013 -2016 Quadrennium. **She was elected** by the Deacons in Full Connection present.

A motion was made to approve the entire report of the Board of Ordained Ministry. The motion was **approved**.

Strait invited Laura Barnard, a seminary student and PhD candidate from the Wisconsin Conference who is doing a research study on Clergy Shame and Burnout, to make a brief presentation to the clergy session. She invited anyone present who is interested to participate in her study by completing a brief survey online or by paper questionnaire.

Strait offered concluding remarks, and thanked all those who help to facilitate the work of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the District Committees on Ordained Ministry throughout the year.

Bishop Lee thanked Strait, who is retiring both from active ministry and as Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, for his leadership of the Board for the last eight years. She thanked the members of the Board and the District Committees on Ordained Ministry for their work, and the members of the Clergy Session for their patience and faithfulness.

She led the Clergy Session in a brief closing litany and prayer.

The Clergy Session adjourned at 10:50 p.m.

[Editor's Note: This action item was presented by Rev. Amy DeLong as a part of the report mandated in the sentence handed down by the Trial Jury at her Church Trial in July, 2011. It was considered by the Clergy Session, and modified slightly as noted below. The modified action item was then approved by the Clergy Session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference on Thursday, May 31, 2012. The original request for a budget of \$15,000 was reduced by the Clergy Session to \$5,000. This was then presented on the floor of the Annual Conference on behalf of the Clergy Session by Rev. Richard Strait, Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry as a motion to amend the 2012 and 2013 Conference Budgets. After discussion, the motion to amend the budget was approved by the Annual Conference. Tom Lambrecht then presented two questions of Church Law in writing to Bishop Lee for her consideration and ruling. Those questions of Church Law [and Bishop Lee's ruling] are printed at the conclusion of this action item.

Action Item: An Invitation

Identifying that discrimination, duplicity and disagreement about the meaning of clergy covenant have contributed to an adversarial spirit is easy. Knowing how to repair the

resulting broken relationships is much more complicated. This document to the Wisconsin Annual Conference cannot adequately set out procedures for the restoration because a broad representation of clergy has not had a part in creating or owning it. Such work must be done collaboratively with clergy who are willing to have a high level of investment both in the process and the outcome.

The Trial Court decision which sentenced me to this work presumed that the church is blinded by current disciplinary language to the extent that it cannot see a way forward. We are in deep need of developing and implementing new ways of living and being together. This, of course, includes the thorny and demanding work of resolving unspoken and deep-seated issues of power, distrust and fear which continue to block our desires to be different than we are.

The Constitution of The United Methodist Church declares that the Annual Conferences “shall have reserved to it the right to vote ... on all matters relating to the character and conference relations of its clergy members” (Section VI, ¶ 33, Article II). To that end, I propose that the clergy of the annual conference enter into deep conversation with one another in order to work toward a clearly articulated clergy covenant. This is not an undertaking that can be accomplished on our behalf, but one which demands the best that the whole body has to bring to it.

It will be crucial to the process to develop relational tools and opportunities among the clergy so that they have a significant base of contact with one another. If there is no personal, relational energy to hold us together, there will be no basis on which to go any further than we have so far come.

The question for the clergy of the Wisconsin Annual Conference becomes: *Is deepening our understanding of our covenant worth spending money, time and energy on as a central piece of our common life and the life of United Methodism in Wisconsin?*

If the answer is “No,” then the policies and procedures we already have will simply need to be followed to their logical conclusion. The United Methodist Church will continue to tear itself apart and become increasingly irrelevant to its members and society, while destroying the souls of the LGBTQI folks and their allies who remain faithful.

If the answer is “Yes,” if there truly is a yearning for a restored and new relationship among clergy – beyond charging one another and having winners and losers, beyond perceived purity and false unity – then a new and intentional process and supporting structure are needed. To this end, I invite the Clergy Session of the 2012 Annual Conference to consider the following:

- Authorize funding for and the development of a Conference Clergy Covenant Team.
- The Conference Clergy Covenant Team will be charged with the task of developing a Clergy Covenant employing the following six itemized points: ~~on~~ Page 8.

As we work to define *our* covenant, we must:

1. Recognize that conflict is not to be avoided, but worked through with grace and honesty.

2. Create a definition – not for everyone, always – but for *us, now*. This requires avoiding generalized or coded religious language which reinforces an individualized interpretation of what covenant means.
 3. Establish a Professional Code of Ethics which includes intentional relationship-building and modes of accountability.
 4. Confront imbalances of power and avoid the perils of majority rule (i.e., the tyranny of the majority).
 5. Seek protection of and equality for the vulnerable/minority by ending participation in discrimination (specifically against GLBTQI people).
 6. Engage external assistance for an internal work of covenant-defining. Just as John Wesley had a variety of mentors from throughout the Christian community (his own Church of England, Roman Catholic, Moravian, etc.), it may be necessary for us to look beyond our own tradition for guidance (including members of the GLBTQI community and possibly the larger inter-faith community).
- The Conference Clergy Covenant Team will be comprised of 12 members and a convener. District Superintendents will discern 2 clergy from each District who have the gifts to aid in the development of a Clergy Covenant for the benefit of clergy solidarity and congregational leadership. One retired clergy will be selected by the Retired Clergy Association. Additional members of the Team will be Rev. Amy DeLong, Rev. Jim Cotter (or another member of the Trial Court), and Rev. Wesley White (from The Collaboration Team).
 - The Conference Clergy Covenant Team will work together at least monthly. Participation in the Team will involve a substantial commitment of time and creative energy and must be regarded as a first priority.
 - Conference-wide communications and regular progress reports will be an essential ingredient in this process as we seek transparency and create feedback loops which elicit participation from the broader clergy community.
 - The Conference Clergy Covenant Team will return to the 2013 Clergy Session for approval of its proposed Clergy Covenant.
 - We request a starting fund of ~~\$15,000~~ \$5,000 (\$2,500 in 2012 and \$2,500 in 2013) to cover travel, meeting costs, and communication expenses. Should more monies be needed, additional funding will be sought from the clergy on whose behalf work is being done, congregations that recognize the benefit a Clergy Covenant would have for them, the Board of Ordained Ministry, and the United Methodist Foundation. An accounting of this money will be made as part of a report to the Clergy Session.
 - There will be accountability regarding the Clergy Covenant that is approved by the 2013 Clergy Session. The Conference Clergy Covenant Team will oversee an evaluation of its implementation and report back to the 2014 Clergy Session regarding any needed changes as a result of lived experience with a Clergy Covenant.
 - A similar evaluation will be made to the 2015 Clergy Session and the 2016 Clergy Session will evaluate whether or not additional Clergy Covenant work is in order.

QUESTIONS OF LAW FOR THE WISCONSIN ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Submitted by Rev. Tom Lambrecht to Bishop Linda Lee in the Plenary Session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference held on Friday morning, June 1, 2012.

In light of the action taken by the clergy session on May 31, 2012, to adopt the “Action Item: An Invitation” presented in response to the trial and sentencing of Rev. Amy DeLong:

1. Does the requirement that a “Clergy Covenant” be developed based on the principle of “ending participation in discrimination (specifically against GLBTQI people)” constitute a violation of provisions of the Book of Discipline which prohibit the candidacy, ordination, or appointment of self-avowed practicing homosexuals (§304.3, 311.2d) and the performing of same-gender unions (§341.6, 2702.1b), and does it constitute a violation of ¶16 of the Constitution, which reserves to the General Conference “full legislative power over all matters distinctively connectional,” including “to define and fix the powers and duties of elders, deacons, supply preachers, local preachers,” and “to define and fix the powers and duties of annual conferences,” and does it constitute a violation of Judicial Council decision 1111 and others, which state, “An annual conference may not negate, ignore, or violate provisions of the Discipline with which they disagree, even when the disagreements are based on conscientious objections to the provisions?”
2. Does the request for an appropriation of \$5,000 from the annual conference budget for the work of the “Conference Clergy Covenant Team” constitute a violation of ¶613.20, which states that “no annual conference board, agency, committee, commission or council shall ... otherwise use [United Methodist] funds ... to promote the acceptance of homosexuality?”

Bishop Linda Lee’s Decision of Church Law on the Questions Posed by Rev. Tom Lambrecht

The Clergy Covenant Invitation adopted by the Clergy Session creates a Conference Clergy Covenant Team, which is composed of twelve members. . . .The Conference Clergy Covenant Team is tasked with creating a Clergy Covenant. The Clergy Covenant prepared by the Conference Clergy Covenant Team is to be submitted to the 2013 Clergy Sessions for approval.

In preparing the Clergy Covenant, the Conference Clergy Covenant Team must "[s]eek protection of and equality for the vulnerable/minority by ending participation in discrimination (specifically against GLBTQJ people)." The Clergy Covenant Invitation correctly notes that *Book of Discipline* encourages inclusiveness and denies discrimination:

Inclusiveness means openness, acceptance, and support that enables all persons to participate in the life of the Church, the community, and the world; therefore, inclusiveness denies every semblance of discrimination.

The Clergy Covenant Invitation simply directs the Conference Clergy Covenant Team to prepare a Clergy Covenant for consideration by the 2013 Clergy Sessions. While the

Clergy Covenant Invitation sets forth six areas that the Conference Clergy Covenant Team must consider, the Clergy Covenant Invitation does not dictate what terms must be included in the Clergy Covenant.

Specific to Question Number 1, while drafting the Clergy Covenant, the Conference Clergy Covenant Team is to "[s]eek protection of and equality for the vulnerable/minority by ending participation in discrimination {specifically against GLBTQI people}." This directive to the Conference Clergy Covenant Team is consistent with the *Book of Discipline*. Nothing in this directive requires the Conference Clergy Covenant Team to enact a covenant that violates the *Book of Discipline*. Instead, this directive and the other directives merely are areas that should be considered when preparing a Clergy Covenant that complies in full with the *Book of Discipline*. Thus, until a Clergy Covenant is approved by the Clergy Session, Question Number 1 presents a hypothetical question. "Moot and hypothetical questions shall not be decided." (Judicial Council Decision 33.)

Specific to Question Number 2, the Clergy Covenant Invitation asked the Wisconsin Annual Conference to provide funding to help defray some of the costs that will be incurred by the Conference Clergy Covenant Team. The Wisconsin Annual Conference approved a motion to provide the Conference Clergy Covenant Team funding of \$5,000.00 per year for the years 2012 and 2013. Question Number 2 asks whether this funding violates the Book of Discipline. As noted above, nothing in the Clergy Covenant Invitation requires the Conference Clergy Covenant Team to enact a covenant that violates the Book of Discipline. Thus, for the same reasons noted above, Question Number 2 presents a hypothetical question. "Moot and hypothetical questions shall not be decided." (Judicial Council Decision 33.)

Judicial Council Ruling Decision No. 1215

In Re: Review of a Bishop's Decision of Law in the Wisconsin Conference Regarding the Relationship between "Clergy Covenant: An Invitation" Adopted by the Annual Conference and ¶¶16, 304, 311, 341, 2702 and Judicial Council Decision 1111

DIGEST OF CASE

The bishop's decision of law is affirmed.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

On May 31, 2012, the Clergy Session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference adopted a document entitled, "Clergy Covenant: An Invitation." The Rev. Amy E. DeLong prepared this document in partial fulfillment of the penalty assessed by a trial court after she was found guilty of conducting a holy union for a same gender couple. She was ordered to outline procedures to help reduce issues that create an adversarial spirit within the clergy covenant. This document proposed a structure by which a formal clergy covenant would be presented to the Clergy Session during the 2013 Annual Conference.

The Clergy Covenant invitation proposes “that the clergy of the annual conference enter into deep conversation with one another in order to work toward a clearly articulated clergy covenant.” The following procedures were approved by the clergy session of the 2012 Wisconsin Annual Conference.

- Authorize funding for and the development of a Conference Clergy Covenant Team.
- The Conference Clergy Covenant Team will be charged with the task of developing a Clergy Covenant. When developing the Clergy Covenant, the Conference Clergy Covenant Team must:
 1. Recognize that conflict is not to be avoided, but worked through with grace and honesty.
 2. Create a definition – not for everyone, always – but for us, now. This requires avoiding generalized or coded religious language which reinforces an individualized interpretation of what covenant means.
 3. Establish a Professional Code of Ethics which includes intentional relationship-building and modes of accountability.
 4. Confront imbalances of power and avoid the perils of majority rule (i.e., the tyranny of the majority).
 5. Seek protection of and equality for the vulnerable/minority by ending participation in discrimination (specifically against GLBTQI people).
 6. Engage external assistance for an internal work of covenant defining. Just as John Wesley had a variety of mentors from throughout the Christian community (his own Church of England, Roman Catholic, Moravian, etc.), it may be necessary for us to look beyond our own tradition for guidance (including members of the GLBTQI community and possibly the larger inter-faith community).

The Covenant Team will be comprised of 12 members who will work together at least monthly providing regular conference wide progress reports. It will return to the 2013 Clergy Session for approval of the proposed Clergy Covenant. A starting fund of \$5,000 was approved in the budget adopted by the Annual Conference. The Covenant Team will oversee the evaluation of the implementation of the Clergy Covenant reporting back to the Clergy Session of the Annual Conference in the following two years.

(Editor’s Note: Judicial Council Decision 1215 quotes here both the questions of law and Bishop Lee’s ruling, noted above.

JURISDICTION

The Judicial Council has jurisdiction under ¶2609.6 of the *2008 Discipline*.

ANALYSIS AND RATIONALE

The questions of law raised by the presenter in this situation assume that the Clergy Covenant to be developed by the Wisconsin Annual Conference will end up violating the *2008 Discipline* and the various paragraphs cited in the questions of law. Although the action passed at the Clergy Session of the Annual Conference provides six directives that the writing team “must” consider, there was no specific mandate to include any of these directives in the final document. There is a difference between “must consider” and “shall include”. When the final document is presented the annual conference will be able to assess if these directives were duly considered. Until the Clergy Covenant is written and

presented at the 2013 Wisconsin Annual Conference for approval, the concerns raised by the questions of law are moot and hypothetical. It is a long-standing fundamental principle of the Judicial Council that we do not deal with moot and hypothetical questions. See Decision 33. The questions of law raised by the presenter assume a document will exist that may violate the *Discipline*. Since there is no document yet before the Annual Conference for action, the Bishop's decisions are affirmed.

DECISION

The Bishop's decision of law is affirmed.

Beth Capen was absent. Sandra Lutz, first lay alternate, participated in this decision.

DISSENT AND CONCURRENCE

We respectfully dissent in part because the twin questions are not hypothetical, contrary to the Bishop's ruling. Judicial Council seminal, oft-cited Decision 33 instructs us that requests for rulings by the Bishop in an Annual Conference should be based upon some action taken or **proposed to be taken** by such conference wherein under the specific facts in each case some **doubt** may have arisen as to the **legality** of the action taken or proposed (emphasis ours). The case at bar satisfies that requisite to rule out the branding of moot and hypothetical questions by ways of conferring jurisdiction to the Judicial Council.

The use of the word must in the six-point directives apparently indicates that they are mandatory, not discretionary or optional. Thus, there are grounds to believe that the discrimination sought to be ended refers to the sanction against clergy members who are self-avowed practicing homosexuals, who conduct homosexual unions or perform same-gender wedding ceremonies (§ 2702), that the stated option of considering non-cooperation with directives they believe to be contradicting to the Gospel (pp. 3-4, Invitation) pertains to the said provision in relation to § 304 on qualifications for ordination, § 311 on candidacy for licensed and ordained ministry and § 341 on unauthorized conduct. Too, the "Clergy Covenant: An Invitation" sounds like an endorsement of those same prohibited acts and chargeable offenses proscribed by the *Discipline* (§ 2702.1) and the Constitution (§ 16).

The brief filed defending the Bishop's ruling, however, argues that the clergy covenant invitation is merely aspirational. The Bishop herself opined that nothing in the assailed fifth directive requires the Conference Clergy Covenant Team to enact a covenant that violates the *Book of Discipline* and further intimated that the covenant to be prepared will comply in full with the *Discipline*. Benefit of the doubt can be accorded in the meantime to this position.

Considering, therefore, that the indications of the violation are not clear and conclusive; that only the actual Clergy Covenant to be developed, presented and approved at the 2013 Annual Conference would undoubtedly reveal if there is any violation, it is the better part of prudence for the Judicial Conference to reserve its final decision. The Wisconsin

Annual Conference ought to report that outcome to this Council next year. Retention of the Judicial Council jurisdiction is in order until final disposition of the matter.

Meantime, since only one of six directives is challenged and the funding with respect to the others is not questioned, we concur that the approved budget of \$5,000 for the purpose this year should be allowed.

Trial Report

The Church Trial of Rev Amy DeLong, an Elder in Full Connection in the Wisconsin Conference, was held at Peace United Methodist Church in Kaukauna, WI on June 21-23, 2011 with Bishop Clay Lee (Retired) presiding.

Rev. De Long was found Not Guilty of the Charge of being a self-avowed practicing homosexual.

Rev. DeLong was found Guilty of performing a same sex marriage.

For Sentencing the Trial Court issued the following:

In response to the guilty verdict, the Trial Court requires the respondent, Rev. Amy DeLong, to be suspended from the exercise of the functions of an ordained elder of the United Methodist Church for a period of 20 days beginning July 1, 2011.

The suspension is to be used for spiritual discernment in preparation for a process seeking to restore the broken clergy covenant relationship. The process shall include:

1. An open and collaborative communication which shall include Rev. Amy DeLong, Bishop Linda Lee, Rev. Jorge Mayorga Solis (Cabinet), Rev. Richard Strait (Chair of Board of Ordained Ministry), and a Wisconsin UMC elder of Rev. Amy DeLong's choosing.
2. Rev. Amy DeLong will initiate a written document outlining procedures for clergy in order to help resolve issues that harm the clergy covenant, create an adversarial spirit, or lead to future clergy trials. The document shall be informed by the Bible, 2008 Book of Discipline, Judicial Council rulings, and other relevant materials.
3. Rev. Amy DeLong will write the first draft in collaboration with the persons named above, and will present it to the Board of Ordained Ministry by January 1, 2012.
4. After review and edit by Rev. Amy DeLong and the persons named in number one, the final document will be completed in time to be distributed

to the clergy of the Wisconsin Annual Conference prior to the 2012 Annual Conference, to be acted upon as an action item at the 2012 Clergy Session.

Failure of Rev. Amy DeLong to comply with the requirements will result in a suspension from the exercise of the functions of an ordained elder of the United Methodist Church for a period of a year beginning June 3, 2012.

A collaboration group was formed consisting of Bishop Linda Lee, Resident Bishop of the Wisconsin Area, Amy DeLong, Respondent, Richard Strait, Chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, Jorge Mayorga, District Superintendent, and Wesley White, Elder chosen by Rev DeLong. The group met for the first time on September 26, 2011. The Group then met three more times on October 25 and December 6, 2011, as well as on March 12, 2012. Each meeting was three hours long.

Amy DeLong was responsible for writing the required document. She completed and submitted it within the parameters required. The document titled, “**Clergy Covenant: An Invitation by Rev. Amy E. DeLong**” was distributed to the clergy members of the Annual Conference and Lay Members of the Board of Ordained Ministry as required by the Trial Court on Thursday, May 17, 2012.

As we have experienced both personal darkness and ministerial failures, O Lamb of God, we come before the throne of Grace for healing and forgiveness.

Because of the amazing grace of God that continues to enable us to be faithful in our Christian living, Christian giving and Christian loving beyond all expectation, we seek forgiveness from God and from one another for breaking our covenant. We invoke the sufficiency of God's grace to move us forward with assurance and confidence.

As John Wesley put it, "Grace in all; Grace for all." Thus, we are not blameless, yet trusting in God's grace we once again humbly offer ourselves to God and to one another for effective ministry through our clergy leadership.

WHEREAS the United Methodist Women is an organization that was established more than 140 years ago by a small group of women in Boston who sent two women to India to minister to the educational and medical needs of women and children there and now has a membership of 800,000 across the United States and supports mission work both nationally and internationally, and

WHEREAS the organization provides opportunities for spiritual growth, affirms the potential of every woman, and offers creative, supportive Christian fellowship, and

WHEREAS United Methodist Women expand concepts of Mission through participation in local meetings with programs that follow our Purpose, district and conference annual gatherings with speakers and workshops about missions and social concerns, the School of Christian Missions annual studies, and our Reading Program which offers books in five categories, and

WHEREAS Wisconsin Conference United Methodist Women has a membership of about 6,000 in more than 300 units that actively serve the local church and participate in mission locally, nationwide, and globally,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that there shall be a United Methodist Women’s Sunday in every local church, the recommended date being the fourth Sunday of September- September 23, 2102- or any other date determined by each local church

Action Item 6: Designation of Earnings from the “New Ministries Fund”

Conference Action: Approved on Consent Agenda

We recommend that the Annual Conference designate the earnings from the undesignated “New Ministries Fund” to provide stewardship programming and resources to local congregations through the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation.

Action Item 7: Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Clergypersons of the Wisconsin Conference

Submitted by: Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance & Equitable Compensation

Conference Action: Approved on Consent Agenda

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the “Church”), of which the Conference is a part, has and in the past functioned and continues to function through ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the Church (“Clergypersons”);

WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and of this Conference was and is to provide active Clergypersons with a parsonage or a rental/housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to active, retired and disabled Clergypersons are considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to active, retired, and disabled Clergypersons in consideration of previous active service; and

WHEREAS the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental/ housing allowance for Clergypersons who are or were members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT an amount equal to 100% of the pension or disability payments received from plans authorized under *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church* (the “*Discipline*”), which includes all such payments from the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits (“GBOPHB”), during the year 2013 by each active, retired, or disabled Clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental/housing allowance for each such Clergyperson; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the pension or disability payments to which this rental/housing allowance applies will be any pension or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds authorized under the *Discipline*, including such payments from the GBOPHB and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a GBOPHB plan, annuity, or fund authorized under the *Discipline*, that result from any service a Clergyperson rendered to this Conference or that an active, a retired, or a disabled Clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the Church, or any other employer that employed the Clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the Church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such active, retired, or disabled Clergyperson’s pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance that may be excluded from a Clergyperson’s gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue

Code Section 107(2) and regulations there under to the least of: (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the Clergy person's employer or other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing resolutions) for such year; (2) the amount actually expended by the Clergy person to rent or provide a home in such year; or (3) the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

Action Item 8: Resolution on 2012 Formal Funding Plan for Pre-1982 Pension Liability

Submitted By: Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance & Equitable Compensation

Conference Action: Approved on Consent Agenda

WHEREAS at General Conference 2000 legislation was approved that requires each conference to annually adopt and publish a formal funding plan addressing its obligation for the pension plan that applies to years of service prior to 1983, and

WHEREAS all conferences are required to fully fund their Pre-1982 pension obligation by the year 2021, and

WHEREAS the intent of this legislation is to help the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits (GBOPHB) determine that all conferences are satisfactorily addressing the funding of this liability,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the following Formal Funding Plan be adopted as the 2012 Formal Funding Plan and be published in the 2012 Conference Yearbook and Journal.

WISCONSIN ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2012 Formal Funding Plan – Pre-1982 Pensions 2012 Past Service Rate (PSR) - \$653.00

PSR Philosophy – Increase PSR for inflation as of December of each year. Target for same Consumer Price Index (CPI) increase that is used for Social Security purposes.

The current PSR is at 1.11% of the Conference Average Compensation (CAC). This percentage is above the original Wisconsin Annual Conference goal of 1.0% of the CAC, as set by the 1969 merging conference. The PSR will no longer be tied to the CAC (other than the various minimum requirements) since we are well above our 1.0% goal and apportionment money is no longer being used to pay for these costs.

The total liability is based on the following key actuarial assumptions:

- Past Service Rate of \$653.00
- 3.0% average increase in the Past Service Rate

Non-plan assets available for retiree benefits: The funds that may be available to supplement pension / retirement funds for the Wisconsin Annual Conference are (values at 12/31/11):

1. Deposit Account at General Board of Pensions - \$3,595,190
2. Other Funds:
 - a. The Wisconsin Annual Conference established the Permanent Pension Fund in 1969. The Permanent Pension Fund has a balance of \$2,168,898.
 - b. The Wisconsin Annual Conference established the Ministerial Pension Memorial Fund in 1983. The Ministerial Pension Memorial Fund has a balance of \$957,174.
 - c. Per trust documents approved by Annual Conference, five percent of the December 31 market value of these funds is available to provide pension and retiree medical benefits for retired ministers and surviving spouses of the Wisconsin Conference.
3. Pre-'82 Pension Plan surplus has been used for the Clergy Retirement Security Program Defined Benefit (CRSP-DB) contribution when available. A similar amount has been collected from Conference churches and has been invested. It is available for pension and retiree medical benefits. This fund has a balance of \$7,099,783.

We will use Pre-82 surplus, when it is available as of the given contribution year, to fund our CRSP-DB contribution. If there is no Pre-82 surplus as of the contribution year or the surplus is less than the CRSP DB contribution, then the amounts collected from Conference churches for CRSP-DB will be used to pay CRSP-DB contributions, rather than their being deposited in a separate account. The conference recognizes that the use of surplus funds increases the likelihood of future Pre-82 contributions.

Amortization Period – 10 years.

Additional Contributions – Any contribution can come from one or more of the accounts listed above.

The contributions to the Ministerial Pension Memorial Fund and the Permanent Pension Fund come from individuals. The contributions come from gifts, primarily from estates. The size and frequency of future contributions is uncertain. The Wisconsin Annual Conference intends to continue to solicit additional contributions to each Fund. The investment return on the Funds is uncertain.

Contingency plans for PSR increases – Any faster increases in the PSR due to higher inflation are expected to be counter-balanced by slower increases at later (or prior) times, due to lower inflation. We use 3.0% as our long-term inflation assumption.

Action Item 9: Resolution on 2012 Formal Funding Plan for Retiree Medical Benefits

Submitted By: Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance & Equitable Compensation

Conference Action: Approved on Consent Agenda

WHEREAS at the 2008 General Conference legislation was approved that requires each conference to annually adopt and publish a formal funding plan addressing its obligation, if any, for medical benefits provided to retired clergy and laity, and

WHEREAS all conferences are required to present a plan for funding their retiree medical benefits, and

WHEREAS the intent of this legislation is to help the General Board of Pension & Health Benefits (GBOPHB) determine that all conferences are satisfactorily addressing the funding of this liability,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the following Formal Funding Plan be adopted as the 2012 Formal Funding Plan – Retiree Medical Benefits and be published in the 2012 Wisconsin Conference Yearbook and Journal.

**WISCONSIN ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2012
Formal Funding Plan – Retiree Medical Benefits**

Premium Subsidy – In 2012 the Conference will pay up to 50% of the premium with a maximum annual benefit of \$3,000 for a retired individual aged 65 or older with 25 or more years of service or who retired on or before December 31, 1998. For all others with less than 25 years of service, who were members or lay employees of the annual conference prior to December 31, 2009, the percentage subsidized is based on years of service. For those retirees under age 65, there is no subsidy.

Benefits – Presently providing medical benefits supplementing Medicare and pharmacy benefits.

Present Value of Expected Future Benefits – 12/31/2010 \$19,315,033*

*Figure provided by Watson Wyatt Worldwide.

The total liability as of December 31, 2010, is \$19,315,033 based on the following key actuarial assumptions:

- 5.5% interest / discount rate
- RP-2000 mortality table
- Health care cost trend of 9% in 2011, grading down to 5% in 2019 and later

The plan benefits are administered by the Wisconsin Conference through its selected health insurance carrier, which is HealthFlex in 2012. HealthFlex is the health insurance program offered by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits. Premiums are paid to HealthFlex, but no other assets are held by HealthFlex on behalf of the Wisconsin Conference or its retirees.

Non-plan assets available for retiree benefits: The funds that may be available to supplement pension / retirement funds for the Wisconsin Annual Conference are (values at 12/31/11):

1. Deposit Account at General Board of Pensions - \$3,595,190
2. Other Funds:
 - a. The Wisconsin Annual Conference established the Permanent Pension Fund in 1969. The Permanent Pension Fund has a balance of \$2,168,898.
 - b. The Wisconsin Annual Conference established the Ministerial Pension Memorial Fund in 1983. The Ministerial Pension Memorial Fund has a balance of \$957,174.
 - c. The Wisconsin Conference established the Ministers Insurance Memorial Fund in 1998. The Ministers Insurance Memorial Fund has a balance of \$162,985.
 - d. Per trust documents approved by Annual Conference, five percent of the December 31 market value of these funds is available to provide pension and retiree medical benefits for retired ministers and surviving spouses of the Wisconsin Conference.
3. Pre-'82 Pension Plan surplus has been used for the Clergy Retirement Security Program-Defined Benefit (CRSP-DB) contribution when available. A similar amount has been collected from Conference churches and has been invested. It is available for pension and retiree medical benefits. This fund has a balance of \$7,099,783.
4. The Group Health Account - This account contains the income and expense related to the medical benefit plans offered by the Wisconsin Conference, both active and retiree. This account has a balance of \$4,076,000.
5. The Conference expects to receive annual payments from several sources in the future for retiree medical benefits, though none of these sources are guaranteed. These sources and their currently estimated annual payment are:

Active premium rates: \$100,000

East Wisconsin Pension Trust: \$100,000

Apportionments: \$400,000

A present value was calculated for these amounts over 17 years, discounted at 7% (the same interest rate used in UMC pension calculations). The following present values were determined:

- Active premium rates: \$976,000
- East Wisconsin Pension Trust: \$976,000
- Apportionments: \$3,905,000

Additional Contributions – Many of the accounts listed above were originally funded to pay for pensions. After the decrease in asset values during 2008, the Wisconsin Conference had some under funded pension plans. If this situation reoccurs, then not all of the above funds will be available for retiree medical benefits. After a period of years the retiree medical benefit will need to be reevaluated, if necessary, since it is unlikely that any additional sources of money can be found. Any changes in the portion of premium paid by retirees will require action by the Annual Conference.

Action Item 10: Resolution on the Return of Historical Documents of the West Wisconsin Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church from the Wisconsin Historical Society

Submitted by: Commission on Archives and History

Conference Action: Approved on Consent Agenda

WHEREAS the 1960 West Wisconsin Conference designated the State Historical Society to be “the central depository of our Conference historical records”, and

WHEREAS said records were placed in trusteeship, but not given outright, and

WHEREAS the Wisconsin Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church controls and maintains its own historical archives,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 2012 session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference respectfully directs the Wisconsin Historical Society to return to our Commission of Archives and History the full deposited body of records from the West Wisconsin Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, hereby terminating our earlier agreement and arrangement.

Action Item 11: Resolution on Past Service Annuity Rate

Submitted By: Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance & Equitable Compensation

Conference Action: Approved

BE IT RESOLVED the Past Service Annuity Rate (PSR) for 2013 shall be \$677.00.

Action Item 12: Resolution on Minimum Compensation

Submitted By: Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance & Equitable Compensation

Conference Action: Approved

WHEREAS the formula for establishing the minimum compensation for ordained clergy, local pastors, and student local pastors appointed to charges in the Wisconsin Annual Conference is the minimum compensation for the previous year for each category, plus the cost of living factor established by the U.S. Government for Social Security purposes, plus 1%;

WHEREAS this formula was approved by the 1996 session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference for implementation starting in January 1998 and is Conference Rule 110.1.0 has not since been changed;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Minimum Compensation for Elders, Provisional Members, and Associate Members serving full time for 2013 shall be \$37,052. The Minimum Compensation for Local Pastors serving full time shall be \$32,611.

Action Item 13: A Resolution on Human Trafficking

Submitted by: Wisconsin Conference Board of Church and Society

Conference Action: Approved

WHEREAS: human trafficking is one of the three largest criminal industries in the world (drug dealing and illegal arms trading are the other two large criminal industries), having a huge effect on our society; and

WHEREAS: traffickers use force, fraud or coercion to achieve exploitation of victims, denying them of basic freedoms of life through forced labor, bonded labor, sex trafficking, debt bondage among migrant laborers, involuntary/domestic servitude, forced child labor, child soldiers and child sex trafficking; and

WHEREAS: human trafficking is a crime fueled by global poverty, inadequate education and opportunity, ethnic discrimination and societal inequity between men and women and by the demand for cheap labor and cheap sex, making it a crime that transcends cultures, class and geography; and

WHEREAS: Resolution 6023 (*Book of Resolutions of the United Methodist Church: The United Methodist Publishing House, p. 735*), “Abolition of Sex Trafficking,” declares, “Therefore, The United Methodist Church, through education, financial resources, publication, lobbying and the use of every relevant gift of God, shall join in the active battle against the modern-day enslavement of humans for commercial sexual exploitation.”;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that each congregation in the Wisconsin Conference is highly encouraged to increase awareness of human trafficking during the 2012-2013 year by studying root causes, discussing the effect of trafficking on individuals and society, and develop plans to work toward the accomplishment of Resolution 6023, inclusive of all forms of trafficking.

Action Item 14: A Resolution on Voter ID Awareness and Education

Submitted by: Wisconsin Conference Board of Church and Society

Conference Action: Approved

Whereas the United Methodist Church has an understanding, based on the gospel message, that all persons are important because they are created and loved by God.

And whereas, our Social Principles call us to “support social climates in which communities are maintained and strengthened for the sake of all persons and their growth”. We, the United Methodist Church, affirm all persons as equally valuable in God’s sight. We reject racism and assert the rights of racial minorities to equal opportunities in voting. We urge social practices that will uphold the rights of young adults, the aging, and disabled persons.

And whereas, the Social Principles call us to “hold governments responsible for the protection of people’s basic freedoms. We believe that neither church nor state should attempt to dominate the other.”

And whereas, we believe the new Wisconsin Voter ID law may deprive some citizens of the right to vote, in particular, poor minorities and seniors because these groups of people are less likely than the general population to have government issued ID's.

Therefore be it resolved that the Wisconsin Annual Conference urge each congregation to raise awareness through education of the required documentation to vote in any election in Wisconsin.

Be it further resolved that United Methodist congregations take action by: publicly distributing the information from the Government Accountability Board, detailing how to obtain a free voter ID and offering transportation to anyone who may need to apply.

Be it further resolved that United Methodist congregations educate and make available information on new districts with voting poll locations, and assist with transportation to the voting locations for those who may need it.

Action Item 15: Resolution on Cyber Bullying

Submitted by: Wisconsin Conference Board of Church and Society

Conference Action: Approved

Whereas the state of Wisconsin enacted a bullying prevention law (Wisconsin Act 309) which took effect in May of 2010.

And whereas many of the provisions of the 2010 bill are gradually being implemented there is one significant weakness in the bill. It does not directly address the issue of cyber bullying, which has become an increasing problem for our youth.

And whereas according to the 2011 Youth Risk Behavior Survey in Wisconsin one in six high school students experienced cyber bullying within the past year.

And whereas cyber bullying occurs when a child or youth is tormented, harassed, humiliated, embarrassed, or otherwise targeted by another child or youth using the Internet, interactive and digital technologies or mobile phones.

And whereas there are two different kinds of cyber bullying, direct attacks through messages sent to children and youth directly or cyber bullying by proxy in which one uses others to help cyber bully the victim with or without the accomplice's knowledge.

Therefore be it resolved that the Wisconsin United Methodist Conference through its churches and agencies will raise consciousness and propose action plans that will address this issue in Wisconsin and in their local communities through the schools, civic organizations, parents' groups, and in churches.

Be it further resolved that this issue be addressed through further Wisconsin state legislation to address cyber bullying that occurs through text messaging and social media.

We instruct the Communications Director of the Wisconsin Annual Conference to distribute this resolution to all churches in the Wisconsin Annual Conference and to send this statement to all of the news outlets in the state so that Wisconsin citizens know the position of the Wisconsin United Methodist Church.

Action Item 16: East Angola Partnership Resolution

Submitted by: Board of Global Ministries

Conference Action: Approved

Whereas, the Wisconsin Conference is committed to providing help and hope to the East Angola Conference;

Whereas, the Wisconsin Conference and the East Angola Conference have been in partnership for four years;

Whereas, during the past four years we have developed relationships with East Angola through visits with Bishop Quipungo and others from their conference, as well as with other conferences who support and provide help to Angola;

Whereas, the Wisconsin Conference Board of Global Ministries and Mission Motivation Committee recommend that we continue to support and build relationship with East Angola,

Therefore be it resolved that the Wisconsin Conference shall remain in partnership with East Angola throughout the 2013 - 2016 quadrennium.

Action Item 17: Native American Partnership Resolution

Submitted by: Board of Global Ministries

Conference Action: Approved

Whereas, the General Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting this spring in Tampa, held an Act of Repentance Service to launch study, dialog and acts of repentance in all annual conferences;

Whereas, in the Wisconsin Conference the Native American Partnership currently serves as the entity that launches study, dialog and acts of repentance in cooperation with CONAM (Committee on Native American Ministries) and the local church in Native American communities;

Whereas, in the Wisconsin Conference the Native American Partnership also serves along with Wisconsin Board of Congregation to revitalize and support new Native American Fellowships or Ministries in the Wisconsin Annual Conference;

Whereas, the Wisconsin Conference Board of Global Ministries and Mission Motivation Committee recommend continuing the work of the Native American Partnership,

Therefore be it resolved that, the Wisconsin Conference shall remain in partnership with Native American Ministries for the 2013 - 2016 quadrennium.

Action Item 18: Connecting Neighbors Resolution

Submitted by: Disaster Response Team and Board of Global Ministries

Conference Action: Approved

WHEREAS all disasters are local and the local church is a major thread in the overall fabric of a community's disaster defenses, and

WHEREAS the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is the humanitarian relief and development arm of the United Methodist Church and UMCOR is committed to the **Connecting Neighbors** program to introduce churches to their potential for congregational, community and conference preparation to lessen the damage caused by disaster and to respond to our neighbors, and

WHEREAS the **Connecting Neighbors** Program is a seven step program that was designed by The United Methodist Committee on Relief to empower United Methodists across the nation to prepare for their own disaster needs and to BE the church in the midst of a crisis.

WHEREAS the goal of the Connecting Neighbors Program is to help local congregations establish and maintain a disaster ministry, and the visible presence of the local church is essential in any type of disaster,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that all local churches shall complete the Connecting Neighbors Program by the end of the quadrennium.

Action Item 19: Covenant of Affiliation with Hmong House of Good News and the Wisconsin Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church

Conference Action: Approved

The primary objective of the Covenant of Affiliation (Covenant) between the Hmong House of Good News and Wisconsin Conference of The United Methodist Church is to identify mutually agreeable expectations for each party. Whereas, leaders in the Wisconsin Conference place a high value on witnessing to our congregations and communities that we are taking every possible step to guarantee that our children's, youth and missions-related ministries reflect our most deeply held values and commitments,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Wisconsin Annual Conference add a new Policy 160.2, as follows

Anyone (18 and older) serving in a leadership or participant capacity on behalf of the Wisconsin Annual Conference who works with children, youth (under the age of 17), the elderly, the incapacitated or those with handicapping conditions, the homeless, mission projects beyond the local church where membership or constituency is held – in state, nationally and/or internationally, or counseling and crisis intervention, in compliance with our commitment to Safe Sanctuaries, is required to have a legally certified federal background check. Currently, the only form of background check that certifies a person's legal identity requires a Social Security number. There are no exceptions to this requirement. Federal background checks are valid for 2 years, then must be updated.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

**NOTE 1 - INFORMATION ABOUT THE ORGANIZATION AND
SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

A. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

The Wisconsin Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church accepts apportionments from United Methodist churches in Wisconsin and distributes monies to General Conference agencies for national and international programs, Wisconsin Annual Conference agencies for local programs, and to other charitable organizations.

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Conference, its accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Resources of various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund.

The Undesignated Fund represents amounts received primarily from apportionments and pass-through donations and is expended for purposes set forth in the annual budget adopted by the Conference or by the donor.

The Designated Fund includes amounts to be used for specified purposes as determined by donors or conference agencies.

The Group Health Benefit Fund records the receipt from local churches and individuals and the Wisconsin Annual Conference payment to the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits of premiums for the Wisconsin Annual Conference Group Health Plan. This plan provides health insurance benefits to eligible active lay employees and clergy of the Wisconsin Annual Conference, participating local churches, certain agencies or institutions of the United Methodist Church, and to eligible retired individuals and surviving spouses of the participating individuals.

The Pension and Benefits Fund records the receipt from local churches and the Wisconsin Annual Conference payment to the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits of contributions to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP), the denominational pension plan and death and disability plan for clergy.

B. INTERFUND ACTIVITY

For financial reporting purposes, interfund receivables and payables, as well as interfund revenues and expenses, have been eliminated.

C. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For the statements of cash flows, the Conference considers cash accounts which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties and highly liquid debt instruments purchased with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

D. DUE FROM LOCAL CHURCHES

Apportionments received between year-end and a specified cut-off date in early to mid-January of the following year that are specifically designated by churches for the previous year are treated as prior year apportionments and as receivables at year-end.

E. INVESTMENTS

Securities are carried at fair value. Gains or losses on the sale of debt and equity securities are computed using the specific identification method.

F. PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Equipment is stated at cost. Real estate, except camps, is carried at cost if purchased, and at fair value at date of receipt if donated. Conference camps are carried at appraised value as of February 26, 1976, the earliest date for which information is available, plus additions since that date at cost. Buildings and improvements are being depreciated over seven to fifty-year periods using the straight-line depreciation method. Equipment is being depreciated over its estimated useful life using the straight-line depreciation method.

G. UNEARNED PREMIUMS/INCOME

Unearned premiums represent premiums collected prior to year end that relate to coverage periods subsequent to year end. Health insurance premiums, Clergy Retirement Security Program contributions, and Comprehensive Protection Plan premiums are billed to participants during the month earned/covered.

H. CLASSIFICATIONS OF NET ASSETS

Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958-205, *Presentation of Financial Statements*, requires the Conference to report its net assets and changes therein in the following categories:

Unrestricted Net Assets -Unrestricted net assets represent resources that are generally available for support of the Conference's activities. Amounts that have been earmarked for a specific purpose by one of the Conference's boards are reported as unrestricted-designated.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets -The Conference reports gifts of cash and other assets as temporarily restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restriction.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets -The Conference reports gifts of cash and other assets as permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit usage to earnings only.

I. INCOME TAXES

Wisconsin Annual Conference is exempt from federal and state income taxation under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).

J. USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

K. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. ASC 820 defines fair value as the price that would be received from selling an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. When determining the fair value measurements for assets and liabilities required to be recorded at fair value, the Conference considers the principal or most advantageous market in which it would transact and considers assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, such as inherent risk, transfer restrictions, and risk of nonperformance.

FASB ASC 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy that requires the Conference to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. A financial instrument's categorization within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. FASB ASC 820 establishes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level One -Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level Two -Inputs other than Level One that are observable, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities.
- Level Three -Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities.

NOTE 2 -INVESTMENTS

The Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation, Inc. and the Conference are affiliated with The United Methodist Church. The Foundation maintains the investments it manages for various United Methodist groups on a pooled basis similar to a mutual fund. Details of the investments underlying the units owned are not available.

NOTE 4 -COMMITMENTS

In 2011, the Conference entered into a contract with a contractor to build a youth lodge at Lake Lucerne. The estimated total cost of the project is \$782,484. As of December 31, 2011, \$70,262 had been expended toward the project.

NOTE 5 -CONTINGENCIES AND CREDIT RISK

Most loans receivable are due from local churches within the Conference. The ability to repay the loans is contingent upon member contributions.

The Conference maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Conference has not experienced any losses in such accounts, and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

The Conference invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of financial position.

NOTE 7 -HEALTH INSURANCE PLAN

The Conference provides health insurance coverage for eligible clergy and lay employees who have retired from the Conference or its local churches and their surviving spouses. The cost to the Conference for its share of the current coverage was \$467,531 and \$554,000 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Generally accepted accounting principles require that expense related to the retirement benefit be recorded over the period of employment of the employee and that a liability be recorded for future coverage related to past service by current and retired employees. The Conference has recorded the liability for future coverage related to past service at \$16,953,852 and \$16,458,074 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, based on the actuarial opinion received. The current portion of the liability is \$847,551 and \$769,592 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

NOTE 8 -CLERGY RETIREMENT SECURITY PROGRAM

The Conference participates in the Clergy Retirement Security Program, a multi-employer, hybrid defined contribution/defined benefit pension plan that is administered by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits. This plan covers substantially all United Methodist clergy for service with the Conference on or after January 1, 2007.

The Clergy Retirement Security Program has two components: the defined contribution portion and the defined benefit portion.

Defined Contribution Component

Contributions to the defined contribution portion of the Clergy Retirement Security Program are based upon a percentage of participants' compensation. Retirement benefits provided are in the form of annuity contracts, which are based upon past contributions plus accumulated earnings. There are no unfunded prior service costs for the defined contribution portion of the plan.

Defined Benefit Component

The legal status of the defined benefit component of the Clergy Retirement Security Program is such that all assets are available to pay all defined benefits, regardless of the annual conference from which benefits came or under which benefits were accrued. The Wisconsin Annual Conference does not control any of the benefit provisions of the plan; these are determined by the General Conference of the United Methodist Church. Retirement benefits provided are in the form of annuity contracts, which are based upon years of service.

The required contributions of \$2,310,382 for December 31, 2011, were paid out of deposits with the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits. The required contributions of \$2,102,334 for December 31, 2010, were paid through a redirection of surplus from Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Program ("Pre-1982 Plan").

NOTE 9 -SUPPLEMENT ONE TO THE CLERGY RETIREMENT SECURITY PROGRAM

The Conference participates in Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Program, which is administered by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits. This plan covers substantially all United Methodist clergy for service with the Conference or its predecessors before January 1, 1982. The legal status of the plan is

such that all assets of the plan are available to pay all benefits of the plan, regardless of the annual conference from which benefits came or under which benefits were accrued. The Wisconsin Annual Conference controls certain benefit provisions of the plan, including the applicable past service rate and the contingent annuitant percentage. The past service rate was \$653 and \$647 as of January 1, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The contingent annuitant percentage has been 100% since January 1, 1999, and cannot be changed.

The Conference assets, Conference liability, Conference funded status, and required contribution are disclosed below. In order to determine the required contribution for each Conference, the total available assets are allocated amongst all the Conferences. The difference between the Conference liability and Conference assets provides the funded status for the Conference. If a negative funded status exists, a contribution is required. Due to investment market performance in 2008, the funded status was negative as of January 1, 2009, and, therefore, a contribution was required to be paid December 31, 2011, in the amount of \$951,513. The funded status was positive as of January 1, 2010, so no contribution will be required on December 31, 2012. The amounts of required contributions for years after December 31, 2012, if any, are not determinable at this time.

The Conference liability for 2012 and 2011 was determined based on a 7.0% interest rate, a 3% past service rate increase, and the RP-2000 Mortality Table.

NOTE 10 -MINISTERIAL PENSION PLAN ANNUITIES

The Conference participates in the Ministerial Pension Plan, a multi-employer, defined contribution pension plan that is administered by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits. This plan covers substantially all United Methodist clergy for service with the Conference from January 1, 1982 through December 31, 2006.

Although as a defined contribution plan, there is no over or underfunding of this plan while participants are active, this changes upon their retirement. At the time of retirement, some or all of the account balance of participants in the plan is converted to an annuity contract, which is based upon past contributions plus accumulated earnings. The annuities are guaranteed by the plan sponsors of the plan, including the Wisconsin Annual Conference. The legal status of the annuities plan is such that all assets of the plan are available to pay all benefits of the plan, regardless of the annual conference from which benefits came or under which benefits were accrued. The Wisconsin Annual Conference does not control any of the provisions of the plan.

Because the funded status of the plan is the same for all annual conferences, the assets, liabilities, and funded status are not allocated among the various annual conferences. Only the required contribution, if one is required due to the existence of a negative funded status, is allocated to each annual conference.

Until the recent past, this annuities plan was always overfunded; however, due to the investment market performance in 2008, the funded status was negative as of January 1, 2009, and, therefore, a contribution of \$569,565 was required to be paid by the Conference on December 31, 2011. The funded status was positive as of January 1, 2010 and 2011, so no contribution will be required on December 31, 2012 or 2013. The amounts of required contributions for years after December 31, 2013, if any, are not determinable at this time.

The plan liability for 2013, 2012, and 2011 was determined based on a 6.25% discount rate and the RP-2000 Mortality Table.

NOTE 12 -ENDOWMENT AND OTHER RESTRICTIONS ON NET ASSETS

The Conference's endowments consist of 24 individual funds, valued at \$7,505,505 and established for a variety of purposes. Its endowments include both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Wisconsin Annual Conference or individual Conference Boards to function as endowments. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Wisconsin Annual Conference or one of its Boards to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

The State of Wisconsin enacted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) in 2009, so this act is followed by the Conference, along with its own governing documents.

The Conference's endowment spending policies vary by individual fund. For \$4,578,759 of these funds, the Conference appropriates for distribution each year 5% of the fair market value of the fund as of December 31 one year prior to the year in which the distribution is planned. For these funds, the Conference expects that, over the long term, this will allow these funds to maintain their purchasing power.

For \$1,805,803 of these funds, only the income earnings are spent each year. Over the long term, this is expected to allow these funds to build their purchasing power.

For \$1,120,943 of these funds, funds are appropriated only as needed and believed to be prudent by the Conference Board that oversees that fund. This spending policy allows the Conference Board more flexibility in the timing of expenditures and ensures that necessary expenditures can be made in accordance with Conference policy.

For donor-restricted funds, total expenditures are limited to the total earnings and investment gains of the funds (i.e., principal is not spent). For board-designated funds, principal may be spent.

To achieve the above objectives, the Conference invests all its endowment funds with the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation in funds that target a diversified asset allocation, including equity and debt securities, to achieve long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints. The Conference relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation and current earnings (interest and dividends).

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Description of the Trust

The following brief description of the East Wisconsin Pension Trust is provided for general information only. Participants should refer to the Trust agreement for more complete information.

General: The East Wisconsin Pension Trust (the Trust) was established in 1969 to assist in the funding of pensions for retired ministers of the then East Wisconsin Conference of the Methodist Church and their surviving spouses and dependent children. It is not subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Benefits: The Trust provides benefits to retired ministers and their surviving spouses and dependent children in an amount each year sufficient to supplement by 25 percent that portion of the established pension rate of the Wisconsin Annual Conference - The United Methodist Church, which is based upon each year of membership in the East Wisconsin Conference prior to January 1, 1970. Benefits are limited to the annual net income of the Trust and the amount in the reserve fund discussed in the following paragraph. In the event the annual net income and reserve fund is insufficient to pay the full amount of benefits, all benefit amounts shall be scaled down pro rata. An amount equal to 100 percent of the supplemental pension payments received by a retired minister shall be designated as a rental/housing allowance.

Reserve Fund: The trustees may designate a reserve fund for the estimated amount of one year's payment of benefits. The amount retained is identified on the accompanying statements of net assets as reserve fund designated by trustees. At its discretion, the Trustees may utilize the reserve fund for other purposes.

Trust Distributions and Termination: When the number of persons eligible to receive benefits are reduced in number to such an extent that it is no longer necessary to retain the full amount of the Trust's assets, the trustees may, from time to time and at their discretion, pay portions of the Trust's assets to the Wisconsin Annual Conference - The United Methodist Church. Furthermore, when the recipients of benefits are reduced in number to such a point that it is impractical or uneconomical to continue this Trust, the trustees may make provisions for such recipients by way of annuities or otherwise to the end that the Trust can be terminated. Upon the death of the last beneficiary of the Trust, all remaining assets of the Trust shall revert to the Wisconsin Annual Conference - The United Methodist Church, and the Trust shall be terminated.

Note 2. Summary of Accounting Policies

The following are the significant accounting policies followed by the Trust:

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the Trust are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at measurement date. See Note 7 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded for on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation/(depreciation) includes the Trust's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Note 2. Summary of Accounting Policies (Continued)

Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the value of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of net assets.

Payment of Benefits: Benefit payments to participants are recorded when paid.

Subsequent Events: The Trust's management has evaluated subsequent events through May 31, 2012, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Reclassification: Certain 2010 amounts have been reclassified to conform to the 2011 presentation on the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Held in Trust with no impact to on the Statement of Net Assets Held in Trust.

Note 3. Investments

Note 4. Obligation to Distribute Any Excess Earnings

The Trust agreement provides that for each year, any excess of interest and dividend income over benefits paid and investment and administrative expenses of the Trust shall be paid to the Wisconsin Annual Conference - The United Methodist Church. Such payments are restricted for the payment by the Wisconsin Annual Conference - The United Methodist Church of certain pension responsibilities and are free of restrictions when the specified pension obligations have been fulfilled. The calculation of the excess for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 is shown below and results in no amount due for either year.

Note 5. Gifts and Commitments and Subsequent Event

In December 2009, the Board of Trustees approved an agreement to make available to the Wisconsin Annual Conference – The United Methodist Church \$100,000 in quarterly installments of \$25,000 in 2011 to be used for health insurance for retired pastors and surviving spouses of the Wisconsin Annual Conference – The United Methodist Church upon their request.

In November 2010, the Board of Trustees approved additional agreements to make available to the Wisconsin Annual Conference – The United Methodist Church \$100,000 in quarterly installments of \$25,000 in 2012, to be used for health insurance for retired pastors and surviving spouses of the Wisconsin Annual Conference – The United Methodist Church upon their request.

In May 2012, the Board of Trustees approved an agreement to make available to the Wisconsin Annual Conference – The United Methodist Church \$100,000 in quarterly installments of \$25,000 in 2013, to be used for health insurance for retired pastors and surviving spouses of the Wisconsin Annual Conference – The United Methodist Church upon their request.

Note 6. Income Taxes

The Trust is exempt from federal and Wisconsin income tax because it is a grantor trust. Accordingly, the grantor, the Wisconsin Annual Conference - The United Methodist Church, is responsible for any taxable income. The Trust's management evaluated the Trust's tax positions and concluded that the Trust had maintained its exempt status and had taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements. Therefore, no provision or liability for income taxes has been included in the financial statements. With few exceptions, the Trust is no longer subject to income tax examinations by the U.S. federal, state or local tax authorities for the years before 2008.

Note 7. Fair Value Measurements

The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) guidance on *Fair Value Measurements* establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of fair value hierarchy under the FASB ASC are described below:

Level 1	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Trust has the ability to access.
Level 2	<p>Inputs to the valuation methodology include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; • Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; • Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; • Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. <p>If the asset or liability has a specific (contractual) term the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.</p>
Level 3	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The assets or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2011 and 2010.

Common Stocks: Common stocks are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

Shares of Registered Investment Companies: Shares of registered investment companies are reported at fair value based on the quoted market price of the fund which represents the net asset value of the shares held by the Trust at year-end.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, the Trust believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date. To assess the appropriate classification of investments within the fair value hierarchy, the availability of market data is monitored. Changes in economic conditions or valuation techniques may require the transfer of investments from one fair value level to another. We evaluate the significance of transfers between levels based upon the nature of the investment and size of the transfer relative to total net assets available for benefits. For the year ended December 31, 2011, there were no significant transfers in or out of Levels 1, 2, or 3.

BOARD OF CAMP AND RETREAT MINISTRIES

2011 was a year of planning and implementing for the Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries (BCRM). With our purpose to “provide camps and retreat centers to enhance the mission of the Wisconsin Annual Conference” and our mission to “provide outdoor settings for Christian education and faith formation in Christian community,” the Board spent time in planning for the future of our programs and how to best meet the needs of the Annual Conference for outdoor Christian Education. We provide summer camp programs to support local church Christian education, and places for churches, as well as Boards and Agencies, to come to provide their own times of spiritual enrichment, education, support, visioning, and work for the common good.

The Conference Vision for 2011 was to “Love Unconditionally,” by reaching out and building connected and engaged faith communities. Deepening and strengthening connections is always a basic goal of the camps, as we work to develop Christian communities. Safety is also a basic goal, both through safe environments and safe sanctuaries. Camp staff and volunteers receive training on ways to provide a safe place for campers, as well as background checks.

The Focus Areas of the United Methodist Church are supported by the camps in many ways. We help to “develop principled spiritual leaders for the church and for the world” through Christian education, our international staff, mission studies at YoMiCa Camp, using a spiritual and values based curriculum, community building, and our Leaders-in-Training Camp. We “engage in ministry with the poor” through our camp scholarships. We “create new places for new people and revitalizing existing congregations” by providing places for family camps and retreats, as well as providing places for Conference or local congregational seminars/retreats/events.

The BCRM used the consulting services of Kaleidoscope, Inc. in 2011 to plan more housing at Lake Lucerne Camp and to study the dining needs at Pine Lake Camp. A Conference-wide survey was also implemented in the fall to study the thoughts and needs of the guests at the two camps who come in the fall, winter, and spring.

2011 was a year of planning and beginning to build a new Youth Lodge at Lake Lucerne Camp. Using the construction services of Gimme Shelter from Amherst, WI and the architectural skills of Tom Brown from Stevens Point, an energy efficient 5,440 square foot building was begun to provide updated retreat space. Twenty-four beds and meeting space will form the core of the building, and as funds are available in the future, two more wings may be built for a total capacity of 48, if space is needed. A Service of Groundbreaking was held August 4, 2011 with current Night Owl campers and many friends of the camp in attendance. Sue Robinson, who attended Camp Lucerne’s first camp was acknowledged. Future camper, Kallie Kafer, came with her parents, Cassie and George Kafer, and enjoyed the beautiful day. Building Task Force members include Brad Sherman, chair; Geoff Arnold, Facilities Committee member; Chip Hutler, Camps Administrator; and Nancy M. Deaner, Camping and Retreat Ministries Coordinator. This project is open for your financial support as we hope to finish the building and open for use in summer 2012.

The Kaleidoscope study at Pine Lake Camp suggested that while a new dining hall may be needed in the future, the greatest current need was to remodel Amphlett Hall to

continue in use for dining. After a new dining hall is built in the future, Amphlett Hall will then be in good shape to use as a central program area in the camp. Plans were made in the fall of 2011, with actual remodeling beginning in the winter of 2012 under the skilled leadership of Ron O’Laire. Building Task Force members include Brad Sherman, chair; Geoff Arnold, Facilities Committee member; Chip Hutler, Camps Administrator; Nick Coenen, Pine Lake Camp Manager; and Nancy M. Deaner, Camping and Retreat Ministries Coordinator.

Camp guests may also be glad to know that the Pine Lake Camp - Rader Retreat Center elevator was completed in February 2012, making the building fully handicapped accessible.

Our Site personnel during 2011 included: Chip Hutler at Lake Lucerne and Pine Lake, Laura Hutler at Lake Lucerne and Pine Lake, Nick Coenen at Pine Lake, and Erin Kruger at Pine Lake and Lake Lucerne.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The essential work of the Board includes:

Creating plans and programs that challenge local UM churches and their members toward personal, social and civic righteousness;

Analyzing the social and justice issues that confront persons, churches, communities, nations and the world; and

Encouraging Christian lines of action that assist humankind to move toward a world where peace and justice are achieved.

The Board meets five times annually at the Wisconsin UMC office. The Board is heavily dependent on the United Methodist **Social Principles** which were adopted by the United Methodist General Conference in 2008 and again in 2012 for guidance on the direction of United Methodist social justice ministries. This document also offers guidance for local churches and their members. The Board is further responsive to the **Four Focus Areas of The United Methodist Church** and the **Vision of the Wisconsin Annual Conference**.

At the 2011 Annual Conference session the Board presented 9 petitions concerning homosexuality language changes in the **Book of Discipline** which were adopted for transmission to the 2012 United Methodist General Conference. Three resolutions on social justice issues are being presented for action to the 2012 session of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. These resolutions deal with Human Trafficking, Wisconsin Voter Identification and Cyber Bullying.

At each Annual Conference session the Board and the Peace with Justice Coordinator host display tables providing information about Church and Society issues and Peace with Justice concerns. The available materials include copies of the United Methodist **Social Principles** in English and Spanish editions and literature provided by the UMC General Board of Church and Society on social issues.

Peace with Justice programs are funded by the annual Peace with Justice general church offerings held in Wisconsin UM local churches. The monies received are divided between the state and national UMC agencies for support of PWJ programs. Each year some of the funding has gone toward specific programs of the Wisconsin Council of Churches and other money has been expended for Peace with Justice programs developed in local UM churches or community agencies. Each Wisconsin local UM church is encouraged to participate in the annual Peace with Justice Sunday offering and name a liaison person who relates the local church to the conference Peace with Justice ministry.

Another area of support has been the Rising Sun Camp for children in a family with an incarcerated parent.

The Board sponsored a 2011 seminar on “Bullies, Victims and Bystanders” directed toward Middle School and High School youth, parents, teachers, counselors and pastors. National leadership enabled a strong program which will be further extended in 2012.

BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The mission of the Board of Congregational Development (BCD) is to provide resources, support, and leadership for congregations in the Wisconsin Annual Conference. BCD’s task of congregational development has been defined through dialogue with the Bishop, Cabinet, and Director of Connectional Ministries as well as by feedback received from the pastors and churches in the Wisconsin Annual Conference. BCD understands the primary emphases of its mission to be:

- a. Training to develop healthy leadership for congregational vitality.
- b. Funding and resources for the development of new faith communities.
- c. Funding and resources for revisioning and redevelopment for existing congregations
- d. Funding and resourcing of mission churches.
- e. Extending loans for capital and emergency congregational development needs
- f. Recommending apportionment reductions that have a missional purpose, to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration (CF&A)

Highlights and accomplishments of the past year

Over the past two years, the Board of Congregational Development has sought to restructure to better enable the realization of its mission. To that end, the BCD has held planning retreats and dialogues with the Cabinet and Director of Connectional Ministries. Out of the retreats and dialogues has come a new direction that has been made firm at our April 2012 retreat.

Three significant directions have come out of our retreats and dialogues:

- a. The Board of Congregation and Circuit Development affirmatively voted to change its name to the Board of Congregational Development to better reflect that the mission of the BCD is the development of congregations and not circuits (this does not rule out extending resources and funding to circuits as a means of developing congregations).
- b. The Board of Congregational Development has initiated the development of a conference-wide education and training initiative that will bring together the various educational and training efforts of Wisconsin Conference congregations (pastors and laity), boards, and agencies in a collaborative and coordinated process/structure that will meet the diverse educational and training needs of our Conference. BCD is working collaboratively with the Director of Connectional Ministries in this regard.
- c. The Board of Congregational Development has requested that the existing relationship with the Coordinator of Parish Ministry be terminated so the BCD can pursue staffing designs that will better fit its structure and the role the BCD must play in collaboration with the Cabinet and Director of Connectional Ministries in developing and sustaining vital congregations in the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

Over the past year, BCD has accomplished the following:

- a. Recommended apportionment reductions for various congregations.
- b. Engaged in loan approvals and restructuring for congregations.
- c. Provided the following funding of churches

1 Merger	\$ 30,000
10 Revisioning Congregations	\$ 88,500
11 Mission Congregations	\$252,000
- d. Explored the possibility of new faith community starts in African American communities of Milwaukee and Madison.
- e. Provided funding for persons to attend training events.
- f. Provided support and emergency financial assistance through a combination of loans, grants, and apportionment reduction recommendations to two churches in crisis.
- g. For the coming year, the Board of Congregation Development plans to move forward with a new structure and staffing design that will better enable our work. BCD will continue to work collaboratively with the Director of Connectional Ministries and provide leadership for the development of a conference-wide education and training program and process. In addition BCD will explore the feasibility of bringing mission churches into revisioning status by encouraging missional partnerships with stronger churches and the consolidation of ministries where appropriate.

It is a privilege and pleasure to serve. Thanks to the Annual Conference and those who have chosen to give of their time to serve on the Board of Congregation Development and engage the work of development.

BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

The 2011 Wisconsin Mission Celebration: Connecting the Church in Mission was observed during the week of October 23rd. After months of planning by the Board of Global Ministries and its Mission Motivation Committee, celebrations in four locations provided the arena for lay and clergy members throughout the conference to learn and share information about a variety of mission opportunities. Mission Coordinator Deborah Thompson and board members worked with regional administrative assistants, District Superintendents, circuits and local churches to bring this event to the various locales.

Thomas Kemper, the General Secretary of the General Board of Global Ministries, was the keynote speaker in Eau Claire, Appleton, Elm Grove (Milwaukee) and Madison. Other special guests at all four locations included Karen Ujerah, the Mission Interpreter in Residence with the North Central Jurisdiction; Nkemba and Mbwizu Ndjungu, missionaries serving in Cameroon; and Ana Ingles, East Angola UMW President. Agencies and ministries represented at the Celebrations included several of our Health and Welfare agencies (Harbor House, United Methodist Children's Services, Northcott, United Methodist Hospital Ministries, Parish Nurses and others; National Volunteers in Mission, International Volunteers in Mission, Individual Volunteers in Mission, Senegal Initiative, Disaster Response and Recovery; Native American and East Angola Partnerships; Midwest Distribution Center, Immigration Task Force, KenyaHelp, Disciple Farm, Community Developers from Solomon Temple, Wisconsin Refugee Settlement and others.

Those attending the Celebration were provided with folders and were invited to collect information from each of the ministries participating. It is hoped that the estimated 300-400 attendees were able to take this information back to local congregations to share and inspire all members.

The Board has endeavored to work within the constraints of decreasing apportionments while attempting to be the hands that reach out in mission throughout our conference. Unfortunately, there will be cutbacks from 2012 in almost all areas in the next budget. Since we did not spend money on seminars in 2011, we will only be able to send persons for training in 2013 if we take that money from elsewhere in our budget. Our support of community and health and welfare ministries/agencies is set at or below the 2011 level while their expenditures increase. Money budgeted to support scholarships and customary committee meetings and activities will be impacted.

As a Board, **our purpose is to inspire, educate, recruit, train, inform and deploy persons and congregations for mission and ministry on the local, national and international levels.** We will continue to implement that purpose as we offer support to those in mission, provide education and information about mission work on every level, and work with others to provide mission-giving and hands-on mission opportunities.

BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES COMMITTEE REPORTS

Conference Secretary of Global Ministries Tony Fuller helped to set up the itinerations of Paul Webster (Zambia) during the summer of 2011 and Mbwizu and Nkemba Ndjungu (Cameroon) in October/November 2011. Working with our Conference Secretary of Global Ministries are the District Mission Secretaries, including Marge Lyford, Capital; Lisa Weaver, Chippewa; Grace Baldrige, Heartland; Tsuchue Vang, Metro North; Judy Bruun, Metro South and Jan Stanko, Nicolet. We have not had mission secretaries from Coulee and Winnebago during 2011-12.

In addition to sitting on the Missionary Personnel Committee that interviewed our newest missionaries, Bill and Gwen Gibson of Appleton, Mr. Fuller also assisted them through preparations for commissioning at the 2012 General Conference in Florida. The Gibsons will be serving in Senegal.

The East Angola Task Force, chaired by Lamarr Gibson, meets every two months in the Sun Prairie Conference Center. Over the past four years, the East Angola Task Force has worked with the Wisconsin Annual Conference to raise funds to purchase school books for orphans in the East Angola Annual Conference. To date over \$12,000.00 has been raised for the books. Funds have also been raised to purchase computer equipment and graduation gowns for the Conference and its theology school.

Members of the East Angola Task Force visited the East Angola Annual Conference in 2010. At the 2011 Annual Conference we had the pleasure of hosting an East Angolan graduate student, Rev. Luis Bernardo. In October 2011, the East Angola Task Force, with the assistance of the Conference United Methodist Women hosted Ana Ingles, the East Angola Women's president for visits to the UMW conference and Mission events. In March, 2012, the East Angola Task Force hosted the visit of Jorge Mucata, a recently graduated East Angolan high school student, one who has benefited from our contributions.

Over the past few years, the East Angola Task Force has worked in partnership with the Florida and Rocky Mountain/Yellowstone episcopal areas for joint ministry in East Angola. A VIM trip is planned for 2012 and the East Angola Task Force invites interested persons to participate. We are also thankful for the assistance of the United Methodist Women who are exploring with the East Angola Task Force, the possibility of establishing Wisconsin/East Angola UMW partnerships. Churches in Wisconsin are also invited to explore with the East Angola Task Force church partnerships with East Angolan congregations.

For the new quadrennium, the East Angola Task Force hopes to raise funds to assist with pastor salaries and college scholarships, in addition to providing support for the Florida Conference and GBGM missionaries who have been assigned to work with the East Angola Conference. We also encourage continued contributions for school books.

Thank you, Wisconsin, for caring!

The Native American Partnership, chaired by Dawn Helton-Anishinaabegwa, is the entity that launches study, dialog, and acts of repentance in the Wisconsin Annual Conference, working in cooperation with CONAM (Committee on Native American Ministries) and the local church in Native American communities. One focus this past

year has been encouraging local congregations to designate one person to represent the need for better awareness of Native American contributions in the local church.

The Hunger Task Force, chaired by Julie McNaughton, provides information for the Hunger Bytes and Citizen Action on hunger concerns for the Conference website. Ms. McNaughton is available to speak to groups on hunger and action to overcome hunger. She was at the 2011 Annual Conference and will be attending the 2012 School of Christian Mission.

The **Immigration Task Force** seeks to provide education and awareness about immigration issues and advocate for comprehensive immigration reform. Members have made presentations at conference and local events to give updates on current legislation and national campaigns, including the DREAM Act, "Eliminating the "I" Word (I=Illegal) and the upcoming invitation to become an "immigrant Welcoming Congregation". Donna Veatch, chair, serves as the conference representative on the Rapid Response Team, our link to the national network coordinated by the General Board of Church & Society, the InterAgency Task Force on Immigration, and other interfaith networks . A new advance special (#7795), the Immigrant Assistance Fund, was created to assist immigrant families in the conference in the event of deportation/detention crises or related needs; two families received assistance in 2011.

The **National Volunteers in Mission** Committee, chaired by Bruce Koch, meets three times annually; in 2011 one of those meetings was held jointly with International Volunteers in Mission. NVIM also plans and implements leader trainings and Chain Saw Workshops. Members from the committee prepared an NVIM Power Point and brochure which was available at the Mission Week celebration. A spread sheet listing 2011 VIM trips, participation, etc is also included in this report.

The **International Volunteers in Mission**, chaired by Susan Gall, has been involved with trips to Chile, Peru and Costa Rica this year. Coming soon is a mission trip to India, and in 2013 a trip to the Dominican Republic is planned. All churches planning mission trips are reminded of the importance of insurance; IVIM and NCJ VIM can help groups to plan.

The **Mission Motivation Committee**, chaired by Michael Adedokun, had a key role in planning the four day Mission Celebration. They have also been responsible for publishing the latest (2012) edition of the Connecting Churches in Mission Booklet. This guide to Mission Giving lists local, conference, national and international mission opportunities. Local church pastors, mission/outreach chairpersons and treasurers can use them to locate a variety of worthy projects which need our support. The information is also available on the Board of Global Ministries page of the Conference website.

All local and conference ministries were encouraged to use the Board of Global Ministries application for endorsement in order to be included in the booklet. The Mission Motivation Committee reviewed those applications and made recommendations for inclusion.

During the past few years **Community Ministries** has offered support to the Interfaith Conference of Greater Milwaukee and Hmong House of Good News, first as an emerging ministry. At the 2012 Conference, a Covenant of Affiliation with Wisconsin Conference through the Health and Welfare Ministries Committee is proposed for acceptance and

signature by the Bishop. The Madison Area Mentoring Connections will be returning as a part of Community Ministries.

The ministry of the **Hmong House of Good News** serving the Milwaukee area, was started in 2008 by the Wisconsin Conference United Methodist Women. Hmong House of Good News is a center where Hmong seniors can come to have fellowship together in a caring and supportive environment that impacts their life and daily living. Our purpose is to help Hmong seniors move from isolation and depression toward an active life and independent living in the community. Hmong House of Good News provides a culturally responsive program for Hmong seniors through contextualized activities; physical and mental exercise; education; personal, social and spiritual support; and services that seek to improve their quality of life and well being. We also partner with other agencies to access current information affecting the elderly, as well as, bring in professionals to speak on issues that are important to our Hmong elderly. Furthermore, we help link the elderly to resources and agencies for health and social services. The Hmong House of Good News provides an average of 15 Hmong elders a light breakfast and noon meal, and various activities three days a week. Operating Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday between 8:30 am and 4:30 pm with two part-time staff and a host of volunteers, Hmong House of Good News offers adult day care services that include transportation to and from the site, field trips, games, crafts and religious studies in a Christian environment.

The **Disaster Response/Recovery Committee**, temporarily chaired by Ellen Rasmussen, has been very involved in updating the Conference Disaster Response Plan. All local congregations are also encouraged to have a response plan. This committee works closely with UMCOR and also includes a representative from Volunteers in Mission.

B. **Purpose of H&WM Committee** – To be the connecting link between the Annual Conference structure and local congregations, and the H&W Ministries serving persons in need on behalf of the Conference.

- C. **Committee membership** – The CEO or designee and a governing body liaison from each Ministry, a liaison from the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries (UMA), and the Conference Coordinator of Missions.
- D. **Statement of relationship** – The relationship between the Annual Conference and each Ministry is defined by a Covenant of Affiliation approved by the Ministry governing body and the Annual Conference Session. The Committee has the responsibility to assist both parties periodically update the Covenant. The 2012 Annual Conference Session will be asked to approve a Covenant with the Hmong House of Good News in Milwaukee as a new H&W Ministry.
- E. **Financial support for Ministries** – The Committee is the channel through which Conference related sources of financial support are provided to the Ministries:
1. **Apportionment funds** – Four of the Ministries are recipients of Apportionment funds provided through the Annual Conference budgeting process to the Board of Global Ministries. Most of the persons served by these Ministries have great needs and few resources:
 - Harbor House Crisis Shelters
 - Northcott Neighborhood House
 - United Methodist Children’s Services
 - United Methodist Hospitals Ministry

While these Ministries raise funds from many sources to support the services provided, the Apportionment funds given by the Conference provide a critical foundation upon which these Ministries can base their appeals to other sources of funds. Donors outside the UMC want to know that the Ministries receiving their assistance have a solid and continuing base of support within the church that assures continuity of service.
 2. **Golden Cross Offering** – All local congregations within the Conference are encouraged to annually take a special Golden Cross Offering which is distributed equally among the Ministries. Golden Cross Offering receipts are used by the Ministries to support persons who are unable to pay the full cost of care and services provided. In 2011, the Golden Cross Offering generated \$22,596 for benevolent work of the Ministries.
 3. **Grants from Lakeside Fund income** – The Lakeside Fund was established in 1976 with a portion of the proceeds from the sale of the Lakeside Hospital in Rice Lake, WI. At the end of 2011, the fund balance was \$145,220. The H&WM Committee may use up to 85% of the annual income for grants to the Ministries. In 2012, grants were awarded to Harbor House Crisis Shelters and UM Hospitals Ministry.
- F. **Relationship strengthening** – In 2006, the H&WM Committee began a long-term effort to strengthen the relationship between the governing bodies of the Ministries and the leadership of the Conference. Following a 2006 meeting of governing body representatives and CEOs from each Ministry with Bishop Lee and Cabinet members, the Assistant to the Bishop and the H&WM Committee Chair met with the governing body of each Ministry. These visits initiated an Annual Bishop’s H&WM Luncheon for a governing body representative and the CEO from each Ministry; the 3rd luncheon was on held on 9/27/11.

- G. **UMA Transformational Summit** – Wisconsin was selected as the site for a 2011 United Methodist Association meeting intended to strengthen the UMA relationship with the United Methodist Church and the Health and Welfare Ministries related to the church. One reason for the decision to have the Summit in Milwaukee was to provide UMA members the opportunity to learn about our unique approach to maintain and strengthen the relationship between the H&W Ministries and the Wisconsin Conference.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND STUDENT MINISTRY (BHESM)

A. Introductory Comments

The Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry seeks to provide for “ministry beyond the local church” by supporting the ministry of United Methodist related campus ministries financially and by providing training opportunities for campus ministers. In addition, we seek to assist young women and men in the United Methodist Church who need financial assistance in obtaining a college degree. We oversee the work of the Wesley Foundations in our conference and hold them accountable to support their student ministries. We are also charged to hold the relationship of our conference with North Central and Wiley College. In all areas we are supporting efforts to reach out to college students and “to make disciples of Jesus Christ” and “spiritual leaders for the church and for the world” for those who journey in the mission field of higher education.

The main focus of our work is to support United Methodist related campus ministries to do their work of reaching college students and equipping them to start and/or grow in their discipleship of Jesus Christ. Discipling students leads to the transformation of a) the students’ lives, b) campus-life and lives of the students’ peers, c) their local church and circuit and ultimately d) the world to become more the way God wants it to be. We are pleased that in past years we have been an agency of our Conference that gave more financial support than most other protestant mainline denomination towards campus ministry and have indeed lived and loved beyond the expectation of some of our campus ministers. By having regular meetings with our campus ministers we hold each other accountable that our living, giving and loving will be directed towards transforming this world into a better place by making disciples of Jesus Christ.

B. Highlights and Accomplishments of the Past Year

- During the 2011 year, our Board used our apportioned dollars to grant eight campus ministries a total of \$ 80,350 including Green Bay, La Crosse, Madison, Menomonie, Milwaukee, Ripon, River Falls, and Whitewater.
- Financially, this year we were able to again support Wiley College.
- We used UM student day offerings to award Merit Awards to students in Wisconsin.

- The Board gathered with campus ministers for the purpose of networking, sharing ideas and talking about how the Board can best be of support to our campus ministries in Wisconsin.
- In addition to financial support our board has worked on the promotion and awareness of UM Student Day Offering.
- We have promoted and raised awareness of our campus ministries, scholarship programs and United Methodist schools. Our webpage provides access to information of scholarship possibilities, helpful links to campus ministries in Wisconsin and to UM schools. The webpage can be found by clicking “education” on our conferences web site (www.wisconsinumc.org) and choosing “higher ed & student ministry.”
- We continued to work towards encouraging campuses with inactive Wesley Foundations and or inactive campus ministries to re-launch a viable student ministry in their communities and have seen success:
- During the 2011 Annual Conference session we presented the re-launch of both the Oshkosh Wesley Foundation and campus ministry program with both a student leader and local church pastor present.

C. How we relate to the United Methodist Church’s mission and the vision of the Wisconsin Conference

1. It is our desire to continue to provide the means of “making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world” on college campuses in order to encourage young men and women to “Live, Give, Love ... Beyond All Expectation.”
2. The same is true when more support is given toward UM Student Day and other scholarships and loans, since it furthers the chance to make disciples and live, give and love beyond all expectation. It is our privilege to support those in need as they seek to become better “disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world”
3. Our conferences vision needs accountability! It is our responsibility to hold Wesley Foundations accountable to use their resources for the purposes they are meant for.
4. Transforming the world does not happen over night! We have to ensure long term solutions. Our board’s role in this is to provide training for campus ministers to find more funding resources that ensure long term financial sustainability to be in the transformation business.
5. “Beyond all expectation” means also to go beyond the borders of our conference. While in times of decreasing financial resources it is tempting to hold on to them we feel called to hold our commitment towards these two out-of-state colleges.

D. How we relate to the four focus areas

Our group is actively involved in the first and second focus area. We are hosting free training events for our campus ministers and thus work towards developing leaders. In years when enough money was available to us we supported campus ministers AND students to go to larger student leadership training events. It is our desire for 2011 to continue this as enough funding is available. We are also involved in places like Oshkosh, Stevens Point and Eau Claire where there is

potential for new and renewed campus ministry programs to emerge and have provided advisory support on how to start a campus ministry and hold the Wesley Foundation there accountable to support them. Most, if not all, campus ministry programs we support engage in ministry with the poor - some locally, some nationally, some internationally. Many campus ministries are great in organizing mission trips that are focusing on ministry with the poor and some even with improving health.

E. Plans for the Coming Year

1. Supporting United Methodist related campus ministries in Wisconsin by generally funding up to 25% of their needs and by providing opportunities for networking and continuing education for campus ministers.
2. Intentionally promote UM Student Day offering with local churches, our Wisconsin Conference Merit Award and other UM student loans and scholarships. Reviewing and granting those awards, loans and scholarships.
3. To work with churches that hold Wesley Foundation funds to be accountable as true stewards of Jesus Christ in pursuing the ministries for which the funds were established.
4. This year we will be able to support both Wiley College and North Central College again.

BOARD OF LAY MINISTRY

The Conference Board of Laity (“The Board”) enables laity to have full and equal partnerships in collaborative ministry with clergy and throughout the Wisconsin Annual Conference. The Board programs align with

1. the purpose of The Board as defined in The Book of Discipline 2008 (BOD) ¶631
2. the mission of the church to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world (BOD ¶120 The Mission and Ministry of the Church)
3. the purpose of the annual conference to make disciples of Jesus Christ by equipping its local churches for ministry and by providing a connection for ministry beyond the local church, all to the glory of God (BOD ¶601 Purpose of the Annual Conference)

The Board

1. grows lay leadership in the local congregations and the circuits
2. provides collaborative ministries between clergy and lay
3. provides lay opportunities for growth
4. develops principles spiritual leaders for the church and for the world

The Board accomplishes its work via Lay Leadership Development (Catalyst), Faith Alive!, Annual Conference Laity Session, Lay Servant Ministries programs, and Lay

Leader/Lay Member to Annual Conference training, AC 101, United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men and the work of the District Lay Leaders.

The Board meets regularly about six times a year, supplemented with teleconferences on an “as needed” basis, to build relationships among its members, to implement and evaluate programs and events; to develop new opportunities for leadership development and spiritual growth, to identify opportunities for collaboration with other boards and agencies in the Wisconsin Conference, and to vision for effective ministry. The Board members have a growing commitment to the ministry of the laity. Making disciples is a top priority in all events and processes planned by The Board.

Faith Alive!’s course that began September 2010 has 25 students and will complete their 2 year journey in April of 2012. September 2011 class has 17 students. The 2011 class is smaller by design because the larger class had some logistical limitations. There are two courses running concurrently with each course’s weekend being scheduled on the same dates and at the same location. This provides unique opportunities. The second and first year classes are able to spend specific time together and walk this journey together, growing, supporting and mentoring each other.

Faith Alive!’s website provides online registration, information about Faith Alive and a power point presentation which can be downloaded and shown in local congregations, community groups, at board and agency meetings and in small groups. Faith Alive! encourages ecumenical participation, invites community participation and encourages our congregations to identify those who are searching and seeking a deeper relationship with God and developing as a Disciple of Jesus Christ.

Faith Alive! provides a major opportunity for laypersons and clergy to reflect on their role as a spiritual person in their daily lives, not just when serving the church. Students of all ages, men and women, come from all over the state to seek a deeper relationship with God. The group gathers three times a year, giving students time to seek out God and ways to live more faithfully. September 2010 began the first two-year course of six weekends with a second two-year course that began September 2011, prior to this time was a 3 year course with nine weekends. A new two-year course begins every September. Faith Alive! is committed and intentional about providing a safe, supportive, loving, giving and sharing environment for making disciples. The Design Team spends much time evaluating and prayerfully planning for the future of the program. The Faith Alive! Design Team is challenged with how to grow and maintain a strong presence while keeping the core values of the program and how to live as a spiritual person in the WORLD. The Design Team spends many hours preparing with the invited faculty person for each weekend class to help with discernment and reflection on what is core to Faith Alive! and what can be adapted. Core to Faith Alive! are

1. providing the opportunity to study in community with others seeking to develop a deep faith
2. providing an environment away from home and work that is conducive to dedicating one’s time to spiritual development with diverse students and faculty/leaders.

These Faith Alive! core values align with the purposes of both the Conference Board of Laity and the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

The 2011 Laity Session of Wisconsin Annual Conference, Chula Vista Resort and Conference Center, Wisconsin Dells, Wisconsin, comprised inspiring music led by The youth praise band “Sanctify” from New Hope United Methodist Church in DePere opened our session with music some familiar songs and some original music written by the band. The music filled the air, our hearts and souls with the spirit of God. Bishop Linda Lee opened our session by greeting and welcoming the laity to the 2011 Annual Conference. This is the first time a Bishop has addressed Laity Session! What a gift she brought to give us another opportunity to be reminded to be OPEN to how the spirit would move us through the work before us with the Election of General and Jurisdictional delegates. Bishop Lee called for the spirit to be among us and flow through us. Conference Lay Leader, Dorthy Radley continued the session with welcoming all to the 2011 Laity Session, scripture reading and prayer.

The General and Jurisdictional candidates introduced themselves to the laity, either in person or by pre-recorded video and shared the answer to one of two questions. The questions the candidates were asked to choose from are: 1) What gifts and graces will you bring so that ALL in the Wisconsin Annual Conference will be represented at General and Jurisdictional Conferences? 2) What will you do as an ambassador and faithful steward to bring forth the Wisconsin Annual Conference vision and priorities to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences? Thirteen candidates addressed the laity session in person and two videos were viewed. Each candidate had up to two minutes to address the session. Curtis Wittwer, Faith Alive! Dean, August Grulich, President of the United Methodist Men, Judy Vasby, President of the United Methodist Women, Ron Vinger, leader for the Walk to Emmaus, and Diane Schobert participant in the Catalyst process, shared information regarding each of these opportunities that are offered in our conference. All of the members of the Conference Board of Laity were introduced to the session. “Sanctify” continued to fill the air with wonderful music throughout our Laity Session and played as we gathered in the plenary area by regions, where laity were able to meet with the District Leaders. Our emphasis was on education and training available for laity and church members and what opportunities there are to connect and build relationships today, throughout this conference, and into the future. Other education, faith building and training are available through Faith Alive!, Lay Servant Ministry classes, Walk to Emmaus and what potential impact each opportunity might bring to participants and the greater community. A schedule of events and trainings was available. Discussion was led by the district leaders asking questions such as what other training is needed in our churches. How do you need to be equipped and what topics are essential? How are laity benefitting from circuit connections? Participants were invited to discuss these questions with three or four other people near them. All were encouraged to continue the conversation and connections that were made throughout the conference. All were invited to stop by the Conference Board of Laity Booth for additional support/resources/connection and information.

The Conference Board of Laity offered two opportunities to attend the Annual Conference 101, which is training for first time attendees to Annual Conference or for those who want a refresher course on the organization and operation of the Annual Conference. These trainings were offered, one before and one after the Sunday afternoon, June 12, Laity Session, to give opportunity to both clergy and laity to attend.

The Lay Servant Ministries (formerly Lay Speaking Ministries) trains in many and varied topics. Lay Servant Ministries isn’t just for preaching! The Board attempts to make this

better understood among laity and clergy alike and with that in mind designed a new Lay Servant Ministries brochure in spring 2011 which clearly identifies caring ministries, leading ministries and communicating ministries of the Lay Servant Ministries program with examples of names of classes in each category as well as including contact information for District Directors of Lay Servant Ministries, Wisconsin Conference. Some of the many ministries Lay Servants may explore are:

- Lay Servants Are Accountable Disciples
- Lay Servants Interpret to Others Our United Methodist Heritage
- Leading in Prayer
- Ministry Specific Courses
- Lay Pastoral Care Giving
- From Your Heart to Theirs: Delivering an Effective Sermon
- Lay Servants Teach Adults
- Lay Servants Tell Stories
- You Can Lead in Worship
- Lay Servants Lead Bible Study
- Lay Servants Are Servant Leaders
- You Can Lead in Stewardship
- Lay Servants Lead In Mission Outreach
- You Can Preach!
- Lay Servants Create Disciple-Making Faith Communities
- Lay Servants Cultivate Christian Community

The District/Regional Directors of Lay Servant Ministries present basic and advanced classes in all of the eight districts of the Wisconsin Conference. Lay Servant Ministries is evaluating courses and programs sponsored by, e.g. The United Methodist Women (the annual week of School of Christian Mission) and Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation (annual stewardship workshops and seminars) vis-à-vis qualifying for Lay Servant Ministries (LSM) course credit. The School of Christian Mission qualifies for LSM continuing education credit. This is to address two specific needs: 1) to make course opportunities more accessible to laity throughout the large geographic area of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and its districts, 2) and to improve the scope and variety of courses available at a time when The Board is emphasizing the value and need for laity to think in terms of personal, leadership and spiritual growth for their lifetimes. The purpose is to make Disciples of Jesus Christ who will be equipped for ministry within their local church and beyond. Through their work to present quality, basic and advanced courses and as well as to improve and expand access to and variety of courses, the District/Regional Directors of Lay Servant Ministries are blessed to be a blessing beyond their expectations.

The District Lay Leaders conduct workshops each spring and fall throughout the Wisconsin Annual Conference specifically for local church lay leaders, lay members of annual conference and clergy and appropriate for all laity especially those in local church leadership positions and committee members. The purpose is to equip and resource lay leaders and lay members of annual conference for their roles. Slides are devoted to their specific tasks/roles while the remaining foundational, supporting and contextual information is appropriate for all laity. Leadership teams model collaborative ministry of clergy and laity and include the District Superintendent, district lay leaders, Conference

Lay Leader and Associate Lay Leader. The workshop comprises centering/worship time, Biblical and The Book of Discipline foundation for authority of lay leadership and the roles of lay leader and lay member of annual conference, history of The UMC including John Wesley and spiritual disciplines, organization and structure of The UMC, ministry beyond the walls/in the community, engaging conflict well, maintaining a supportive and healthy relationship with his/her pastor, advocating for the laity, liaising between local church and circuit/district/conference, specific printed and online resources, and connecting with and building relationships with the leadership team. These trainings promote an enormous amount of goodwill for the district and Wisconsin Annual Conference, give encouragement to build each other up, put practical resources and information into the attendees' hands and minds to equip them for service, and connect them to their district/regional leaders who will resource them. Each attendee is requested to complete a four-question evaluation at the end of the training. The results of the evaluations are compiled immediately and distributed to all members of the leadership team. Frequent modifications, tweaks and additions are made to the presentation to respond to comments on the evaluations. These trainings included participants representing 104 churches in the past year. Participants representing an additional 125 churches have participated in the training within the past few years.

In summer 2011 The Board developed a web page on the Wisconsin Annual Conference website. The new webpage includes a statement of the purpose of The Board, a downloadable brochure in PDF format with picture and contact information for each member of The Board, and a listing that is kept current of all training and connecting opportunities and events throughout the Wisconsin Annual Conference. We promote the Wisconsin Annual Conference website and The Board's webpage at all our training events and classes as the place for laity to go to get connected, to learn about upcoming opportunities, to know what is going on in the Annual Conference and to get resources to resource themselves and others in their congregations and circuits.

In 2011 The Board tried an idea that proved very popular. Prior to The Board meetings, the District Lay Leaders and District Directors of Lay Servant Ministries met separately to discuss topics and programs specific to each of their ministries. This gave rise to the new Lay Servant Ministries brochure referred to above and provided time for District Lay Leaders to improve and coordinate eight LL/LMAC trainings throughout the Conference in February-March 2012. This time allowed for focused sharing ideas and resources, asking questions, improving coordination and communication, and helping to make more uniform across the Conference.

Nicolet District Lay Leader coordinates the Fox Valley Walk to Emmaus (FVWTE). The website has a new webmaster and a new design. The next FVWTE for men begins April 19, 2012, and for women begins April 26, 2012. A schedule of tentative FVWTE dates through spring 2016 is posted at www.foxvalleyemmaus.com.

Further exemplifying and modeling the collaborative ministry between laity and clergy, The Board includes a District Superintendent Gordon Lind, Cabinet Liaison.

The Board aligns directly with the focus area of The United Methodist Church, specifically, develop principled spiritual leaders for the church and the world. The Board trains, supports, equips, encourages, inspires and sends out laity into their workplaces, churches, communities and into their homes. In this way new places are created for new people and existing congregations are revitalized via these leaders who are developed

through the Lay Servant Ministries classes, Faith Alive!, Leadership Development “Catalyst,” Lay Leader trainings, United Methodist Women programs and missions and United Methodist Men programs. These leaders are equipped to engage in the ministry with the poor and combat the diseases of poverty by improving health globally.

Conference Lay Leader and Associate Lay Leader will attend the annual meeting of Association of Annual Conference Lay Leaders which will be held at Tampa Convention Center, Tampa, Florida, Saturday-Monday, April 21-23, 2012. Keynote speaker will be Rev. Dr. Joy Moore who serves as Associate Dean for Black Church Studies and Church Relations; Visiting Assistant Professor, Homiletics and the Practice of Ministry at Duke University Divinity School. Known as a dynamic and insightful Bible teacher, Dr. Moore’s ability to ground us in the eternal teachings of our God as well as the relevance and energy of the present moment will bless the gathering as we head into the conversations about the General Conference and the future of the church. Many sisters and brothers who have been with us in ministry for a long time will be ending their terms as lay leaders for their annual conferences. While we know we serve a God who is always moving, times of transition are important. It is a time to celebrate what these brothers and sisters have meant to the life of the church and to us.

“Catalyst” was initiated in 2009 at the request of and in collaboration with The Wisconsin Annual Conference Cabinet. Catalyst involves laity and clergy in collaborative ministry in a circuit setting. The process focuses on building strong, healthy relationships and healthy, productive congregational environments by teaching/equipping laity and clergy leaders with tools based in family systems theory, emotional intelligence, navigating controversial and difficult relationships, have deep change – transformation of congregational cultures and worldviews, moving from dysfunction to full function, from corrosive to creative, from resigned to engaged, and from comfortable to productive. With practical learning – processes and information designed for application in a wide variety of settings with simple, clear, hands-on and experiential – anyone who participates in the process will be fully equipped to take what they learn and equip others – self-replicating. This aligns with the vision of the Wisconsin Annual Conference to equip people to live, give, and love more effectively and beyond ordinary expectation and the mission of the United Methodist Church by shifting focus from “tending“ to “leading,” and from shepherding participants to forming disciples. We also kept in mind the four focus areas of the General Conference, specifically “to provide principled spiritual Christian leaders for the church and for the world.”

Catalyst was originally a core group of thirty laity and clergy of a broad spectrum of ages, backgrounds, races, ethnicities (with a balance of women and men) who would study together for nine months, develop together the “core curriculum” for a retreat experience focusing on three main areas:

- Application of helpful concepts from family systems theory in simple, practical, meaningful ways
- Provide practical tools to teach and equip people in the development of emotional intelligence
- Give tools and processes to leaders to navigate difficult and controversial subjects and deal with disagreement in healthy ways

Catalyst retreats – clergy/laity teams will lead retreats for participants. The purpose of each retreat is three-fold:

- To give participants a meaningful personal experience for transformation and growth
- To train and equip participants in the use of the tools and processes with others
- To invite all participants to offer/host/co-lead a Catalyst event of their own in local churches, circuits, with work teams, in districts, etc. This provides a self-replication and helps reinforce learning through teaching.

Several retreats have been offered and led by lay and clergy teams. The Catalyst groups are progressing at significantly different paces and modes of study, activity and development. Catalyst core team tell their stories about how applying family system principles and behavior is changing their lives. The next Catalyst workshop is scheduled Saturday, April 14, 2012 at First UMC, Green Bay. Catalyst will be a part of the Discipleship Leadership Team who will support and continue to develop the Catalyst process with the collaboration of the Board of Laity. Please go to the Catalyst website located at <http://catalyst2.wordpress.com/> for more information.

The Conference Board of Laity has good, strong programs that foster spiritual growth, train leaders and provide new opportunities for church members to be strengthened in their ministries. These are different pathways to the same goal: they all align to revitalize, individually and within a congregation, circuit and conference.

The priorities set by the Board of Laity were initially measured as our culture measures success, by 1) attendance, 2) contact hours, 3) cost per person and 4) feedback. Two programs, Faith Alive! and Lay Leader/Lay Member of Annual Conference trainings, obtain written participant evaluations at the conclusion of each event/weekend. These evaluations are compiled and distributed among the leadership/design teams. In this way, we can measure the effectiveness of these programs beyond numbers. We can get to a better place: the heart of the meaning of these programs for the participants in their lives by their own testimony. What we have learned is the transforming power of the design/relevance of these programs and the ministry/witness of the faculty/leadership teams. God is ever creating and recreating; so, the life of these participants is unfolding spurred by a newfound willingness to respond affirmatively to God's call. We cannot see immediately all that they will become, and we may never know all the fruit of their transformations. We do know already significant changes/decisions some have made. They tell/write their stories and live out their faith in the world.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The Roles and Responsibilities of the Board of Ordained Ministry

The Board of Ordained Ministry is responsible for the recruitment, credentialing and nurture of the clergy of the Annual Conference. The work of the Board is an integral part of the development of principled spiritual leaders for the church and the world. The Board relates to everyone who experiences God's call to professional ministry in the Wisconsin Conference in order to help them clarify that call and understand the opportunities available within The United Methodist Church to respond to that call, and acts on behalf of the church to determine how the church can best affirm each person's call to ministry. These primary responsibilities are defined in the twenty-six specific tasks identified in ¶635.2 a through 635.2z of the 2008 Book of Discipline, as well as the responsibilities of the Registrar of the Board found in ¶635.3a through 635.3e of the 2008 Discipline.

Effective clergy leadership is one of the keys to equipping local churches for ministry. Working together with the District Committees on Ordained Ministry, which by Discipline are sub-committees of the Board, the Board of Ordained Ministry determines on behalf of the annual conference whether those who offer themselves in service as clergypersons meet the qualifications, ethical standards, and high expectations of The United Methodist Church for its clergy, so that the churches of the annual conference may have competent, effective, and skilled clergy leadership. The Board then makes its recommendations to the Clergy Session of the Annual Conference for their consideration.

Highlights of the Past Year

The Board of Ordained Ministry meets twice each year at the Bishop Rader Retreat Center at Pine Lake Camp. The Board interviews candidates for Provisional and Associate Membership in February, and candidates for Full Membership and Ordination in November. Candidates come to Pine Lake overnight to meet with the Board over a two-day period. In addition to three formal interviews, board members get to know candidates informally over meals, in shared worship and communion, and in other unstructured settings. This format for the credentialing process has significantly improved the ability of Board members to get to know candidates and to make better, more informed decisions about their application for commissioning or ordination. One of the consequences of this interview format is that the Board's meetings are lengthened. It takes longer to interview each group of candidates, and candidates are at camp overnight, which increases the costs of the interview process. While the Board does everything it can to hold down costs, we believe that this improved interview process is a long-term investment in the future clergy leadership of the annual conference.

At any given moment the Board is caring for 150 to 200 individuals who are exploring a call to ministry, enrolled in the candidacy certification process, serving as Licensed Local Pastors, moving towards commissioning and Provisional Membership, serving as Provisional Members while moving towards ordination and Full Membership, or seeking to transfer their credentials into the Wisconsin Annual Conference from other Annual Conferences of The United Methodist Church or other Christian denominations. Approximately 90 Licensed Local Pastors are supervised by the eight District Committees on Ordained Ministry. As we prepare for the 2012 Annual Conference

Session, the Board has interviewed more than 20 individuals who have applied for Commissioning and Provisional Membership, Associate Membership, or Ordination and Full Membership.

Candidates for ministry are required to complete a psychological assessment at North Central Ministry Development Center, and the Board conducts background checks on all individuals seeking a clergy relationship with the annual conference. Both of these measures are required by The Book of Discipline.

There are currently 28 Provisional Members of the Annual Conference who are under the direct supervision of the Board of Ordained Ministry. The Provisional Members who have completed all of their basic educational requirements participate in a “Provisional Residency Program” which consists of a summer provisional members gathering/retreat, and two provisional residency seminars - held in October and May. One of these seminars focuses on the practice of ministry, while the other focuses on a theological topic. Participation in the provisional residency program is required by the Book of Discipline. Provisional Members are also expected to participate in a Provisional Mentoring group. There are six of these mentoring groups around the conference, which usually meet monthly.

The Board is responsible for administering the Conference’s portion of the Ministerial Education Fund. Through this fund 11 individuals received Seminary Scholarship assistance, and 35 Licensed Local Pastors received scholarship assistance for their required Course of Study Classes or Licensing School in 2011.

The Board consults with the cabinet when clergy from other Annual Conferences or denominations are being considered for transfer into the conference or appointment to serve Wisconsin United Methodist churches. Whenever clergy members of the Annual Conference request a change in their relationship (retirement, various kinds of leave, honorable location, etc.) with the Annual Conference or approval of an extension ministry setting, the Board of Ordained Ministry has a role in that process.

Each August the Board sponsors a two-day “New Clergy Orientation” program. Beginning in 2010 this program is now held at Pine Lake Camp. In 2011 about 20 clergy persons serving their first appointment in Wisconsin received orientation to the ministries of the Annual Conference and training in ethics and boundaries. The Board, Cabinet, Conference Staff, the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation, and other agencies share information about the work of the Annual Conference with persons who are serving their first appointment in Wisconsin or who are returning to parish ministry from leave or an extension ministry appointment. The retreat also includes intensive training in sexual ethics and the maintenance of proper boundaries.

The work of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the District Committees on Ordained Ministry requires thousands of hours of time each year on the part of the 34 Board members, the 70 District Committee members, and the 4 District Superintendents. These dedicated people willingly give of their time because they believe in the importance of the work of Clergy Leadership Development in the Annual Conference.

The Board of Ordained Ministry depends heavily upon the staff support provided by the Executive Secretary of the Board, who functions as the registrar and maintains the personnel records for the nearly 200 people who are under the care of the Board. He provides guidance for those who are entering ministry, which is an incredibly lengthy and

complex process, as well as training for mentors, District Committees on Ordained Ministry, and District Superintendents. The Executive Secretary prepares materials submitted by candidates for commissioning and ordination for review by the Board, as well as the Board's report to the Clergy Session (also known as "The Business of the Annual Conference.") He also conducts background investigations on all candidates for any clergy position in the Wisconsin Conference, and is responsible for the preliminary evaluation of all psychological assessments for candidates.

Since August, 2006 the Executive Secretary of the Board has been a three-quarter time appointed position. The Executive Secretary has also served one-quarter time as Conference Secretary. The Cabinet has recommended, with the concurrence of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Board of Ordained Ministry, that the Executive Secretary of the Board position become full-time, effective January 1, 2013.

Plans for the Coming Year

The Board of Ordained Ministry will be paying particular attention to the actions of the 2012 General Conference on the recommendations of the Ministry Study Commission, as well as other legislative changes which are being considered by the General Conference. If some of these proposals are approved there will be significant, substantial changes to the ordering of ministry in The United Methodist Church, and they could have a major impact on the work of the Board. Several members of the Board will participate in a variety of training opportunities sponsored by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry in the late summer and early fall to learn about any changes made by the General Conference.

In the coming year the Board will conduct training sessions for the District Committees on Ordained Ministry, the candidacy and clergy mentors, and the members of the Board itself about the responsibilities of these groups as well as any changes in the processes that are supervised by the Board because of the actions of the General Conference.

The Board has identified four ongoing challenges in its ministry:

- a. Recruiting high quality, talented young people (under age 35) into the ministry of The United Methodist Church
- b. Finding ways to reduce the financial costs/burdens that must be assumed by those who do respond to a call to enter United Methodist Ministry
- c. Streamlining the process of entering ministry while at the same time meeting all of the requirements of the Book of Discipline related to the candidacy/ordination process.
- d. Educating current clergy about the importance of continued growth in their knowledge and skills in order to improve the overall effectiveness of the clergy of the Annual Conference.

The Board's goal is to provide the congregations of the Wisconsin Annual Conference with the most qualified, competent and capable clergy leadership possible. As the Board guides candidates through the journey from fitness to readiness to effectiveness in ministry, we are always mindful that the people under our care will have a direct impact upon every United Methodist in Wisconsin for generations to come.

**JOINT BOARD OF PENSIONS,
INSURANCE & EQUITABLE COMPENSATION**

Introductory Comments

The Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance & Equitable Compensation (Joint Board) has administrative, fiduciary and stewardship responsibility for the following:

Pensions, death and disability benefits for 1) active and retired clergy under appointment to the Wisconsin Conference, and 2) active and retired laity employed by the Wisconsin Conference.

Group health insurance for 1) active and retired clergy under appointment to the Wisconsin Conference, 2) active and retired laity employed by the Wisconsin Conference, and 3) active and retired laity employed by Wisconsin United Methodist churches.

Equitable Compensation support is granted to local churches to ensure that pastors under appointment are provided at least minimum salary compensation at churches that may need financial assistance.

Highlights and Accomplishments of the Past Year

The Joint Board met all pension obligations of the Wisconsin Conference by paying the Pre-82 Pension Plan obligation at the rate approved by the Wisconsin Conference. Fourteen congregations were provided Equitable Compensation support. This amount is consistent with the number in the previous year and doubtless echoes the continuation of the economic downturn. The Joint Board continues our attempt to balance premium costs with health insurance benefits through our participation in HealthFlex, the United Methodist denomination's health insurance plan, to active clergy and lay personnel of the Wisconsin Conference. Over the past few years our participants have had to shoulder more of the cost of their medical care through increased deductibles and co-pays in order to reduce the total cost of health insurance. Our retirees, who are age 65 and older, continue to be insured through the HealthFlex Medicare supplemental health insurance plan.

When the West Wisconsin and East Wisconsin Conferences of the Methodist Church merged along with the Wisconsin Conference of the Evangelical United Brethren, the West Wisconsin Pension Trust Fund and the East Wisconsin Pension Trust Fund were established. A separate Board administers the East Wisconsin Pension Trust, and its audited financial statements are provided elsewhere in the Conference Yearbook and Journal. The Joint Board administers the West Wisconsin Pension Trust. Its assets are invested in a separate fund in the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation. Financial information for the West Wisconsin Pension Trust is as follows:

As is customary, the Joint Board sponsored a Retirement Seminar for those clergy planning to retire in the current year.

The Task Force on Future Retiree Health Insurance Benefits made their report to the Joint Board in 2008. The task force used actuarial data to look at how to fund current and future retiree health insurance benefits and reduce a significant projected funding liability in this area. The task force recommended changes in the shared funding of these benefits based on the unfunded liability figure. The Annual Conference of 2008 approved the necessary changes related to these benefit. Our submitted budget to the Council on Finance and Administration for 2013 reflects the action of the Annual Conference and follows the plan approved by the Annual Conference. This amount will remain level into the future. You may recall that the 2011 budget reduced our submitted amount by \$100,000. We are glad that we're back on track to keep our funding level at the amount agreed upon by the Annual Conference in those 2008 changes.

The Joint Board has been diligently working through the Health Insurance Subcommittee to continue to focus on the wellness of our participants. As a result, we have continued to sponsor an incentive program through HealthFlex. We have continued in a walking fitness program through Virgin Health Miles. This program encourages all enrollees in the Conference active health insurance plan (HealthFlex) to participate in the walking program by using a special pedometer. The participant then downloads his/her steps to a website in order to monitor his/her progress. HealthFlex financial incentives are provided to the participants dependent upon various levels achieved. In addition, we continue to highly recommend completion of the WebMD "HealthQuotient" assessment, a health assessment tool. "HealthQuotient" provides a personalized report and a prioritized list of health concerns and recommends actions to help design a wellness plan. There is no cost to the participant to take the "HealthQuotient" assessment. Last year 88% of our participants and spouses took the HealthQuotient. If our participants do not complete the HealthQuotient assessment prior to the end of August of this year their deductible will increase an additional \$250 for the year 2013. Research by HealthFlex shows that those who complete the assessment have fewer claims. Last year 254 of our active participants took advantage of the Quest Diagnostics Screening at the Annual Conference session and we will be offering this again at Annual Conference this year.

Plans for the Coming Year

Our Health Insurance subcommittee will continue to carefully monitor, with assistance from HealthFlex, what changes will be necessary as a result of the new Healthcare Reform Law. As of this report it is still too soon to know all the ramifications of the law for our plans, but most of the significant changes will go into effect in 2014.

The Joint Board will continue our wellness initiative. Eligible enrollees will be strongly encouraged to once again complete the WebMD "HealthQuotient" assessment and also to complete an annual wellness exam. We are also sponsoring a Quest Diagnostics screening at the site of Annual Conference this year for our participants. Group rates with a significant discount are also offered for Weight Watchers participation for eligible enrollees.

We hope to continue our ongoing efforts of monitoring our rates within reasonable percentage increases while offering competitive benefit levels for our actives and retirees. We are, however, aware that this is becoming increasingly more difficult as the cost of

health insurance increases at a rate higher than inflation. Our claims experience for 2011 was better than it has been for the past several years and therefore our recent rate increases have been below average market increases for health insurance. The higher average age of our participants however does increase our costs. We have looked at a more consumer driven model of health insurance through HealthFlex as an option for the future as well as a Market Exchange program for our Medicare Supplement participants.

The significant changes in the stock market and the general economy have continued to affect the holdings of the General Board of Pension & Health Benefits. Fortunately the market has recovered in the past year and the early part of the current year. This has mitigated the previous decrease in the value of funds held by the General Board in the various pension plans. Therefore the additional funds the General Board indicated were necessary to recover from this once every seventy-year economic condition have now been reduced to a lesser amount. Thus we are happy to report once again that we did not increase the percentage charged to the local church for pension obligations this past year. We remain in constant communication with the General Board about this situation.

The Joint Board takes very seriously its fiduciary responsibility to act on behalf of all our participants and will continue to do so in the future.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The responsibility of the Wisconsin Conference Board of Trustees is to oversee the use of conference-owned real and personal property, to review property and liability insurance, to manage some conference investments, and to participate in certain legal matters. *The Book of Discipline*, state statutes, and the Wisconsin Annual Conference rules direct the work of the Trustees.

Highlights and Accomplishments

United Methodist Conference Center, Sun Prairie

The United Methodist Conference Center is located at 750 Windsor Street, Sun Prairie. This building houses various office spaces including, but not limited to, the Capital/Coulee regional office, the Conference Treasurer's office, the Episcopal office, the Camp and Retreat Ministries office, the Ministry and Outreach office, as well as various administrative offices. The building also leases space to multiple tenants, including the WI United Methodist Foundation. During 2011, rental space was vacated by the Moravian Western District offices, but that space has subsequently been rented by the WI Annual Conference Archives for a grant they received. The trustees continue to pursue new tenants to rent current open office space.

The Trustees are keeping a close watch on the roof of the Conference Center. It is clear this roof will need to be replaced in the near future. During 2011, the thermostat control system within the Conference Center was replaced and work was done to paint and repair areas that had been affected by the instillation of the new system. The trustees also reviewed bids for a keyless entry system to be installed in the Conference Center. Security and safety concerns have been raised concerning when the building is open and

how it is locked when meetings have concluded. As of early April 2012, the new keyless entry system has been installed.

A concern was also raised that the conference center did not contain Automatic External Defibrillators (AED), which are used when someone has heart issues within the building. The trustees discussed this concern and voted to install AED machines on each floor of the conference offices and to have the conference center staff trained on the proper use of the AED machines.

Episcopal Residence

The Trustees have a liaison to the Episcopal Residence committee. This committee oversees the maintenance of the Episcopal residence and works for a quick resolution to any issues that arise. The trustees anticipate that in 2012 there will be more attention needed with the Episcopal residence as the time approaches for a new bishop to move to the WI area.

Camps and Retreat Centers

The Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries stays in close contact with the trustees through a trustee's representative that attends the board meetings. The Trustees consider the items that are occurring at the camps and assist with issues that may arise.

Other Property

The Waldwick church closed in August of 2010. At that point the Trustees began to pursue options for selling the property. An auction was held to sell the property in December 2010; however, a fair price was not offered at that time. The Trustees listed the property with a realtor and the property sold, with all issues related to the property resolved completely by December 2011.

As of early April 2012, the former Paris Corners church in western Kenosha County continues to be listed for sale.

The Conference Trustees have been working closely with the Wesley Foundation at the University of Wisconsin-Madison on the dissolution of the Wesley Foundation at UW-Madison that was approved by action during the 2010 Annual Conference session. Though the dissolution has not been completed, progress continues to be made toward that goal.

Annual Conference Action Item

During the 2011 Annual Conference session, a motion was made and approved that "the Board of Trustees of The Wisconsin Annual Conference study the possibility of amending the current housing policy 60.6.0 to include provisions for identifying and remediating mold and other environmental quality issues in parsonages and church facilities. The Trustees shall report their recommendation to the 2012 Wisconsin Annual Conference."

The trustees researched and reviewed the issues associated with this motion and have forwarded a request to the Rules Committee to amend rule 60.3.7 to state "It is recommended that each church have air quality testing completed in a parsonage at the time of a pastoral leadership change and/or when air quality concerns are raised." The Board of Trustees is also recommending an addition to rule 130.1.0 stating "g. Air

quality testing if there is a pastoral leadership change and/or air quality issues are raised."

Investments

The Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation holds investment accounts for the Trustees.

The Parsonage Fund came from the sale of conference staff and district superintendent parsonages. Earnings from the fund help to cover the costs of the annual housing allowances for the district superintendents and conference staff.

The invested bequest from Eva and Alice Stearns in the name of their father, William Stearns, is to provide loans to United Methodist students attending the University of Wisconsin.

The Conference Center Building Fund is an investment that is designated to be used for the upkeep and maintenance of the Conference Center in Sun Prairie. These funds are used for things such as the repair/replacement of the roof and the keyless entry system that need to be completed.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

As we have over the past decade, we continue to work on an overall organization of the Archives, moving toward our eventual goal of compiling a complete inventory of all the materials on hand. Our progress is slow but considerable and is greatly assisted by the help of several volunteers who have been working under the supervision of Archives staff, Lynn Lubkeman and Mary Schroeder. These include, Bob Gruetzmacher, Ed Schroeder, Edward Johnson and Wil Bloy.

In the Archives, we have continued to answer the many research requests and questions that come from local churches and pastors, staff inside the Conference building, and outside researchers. Some are straightforward requests that can be answered quickly others require a great deal of digging.

Of note this year was an inquiry from the foundation overseeing the estate of the Revs. Charles and Lucinda Sanford. Lucinda was one the early women to be received in full connection with our Conference and she and Charles comprised the first clergy couple. The foundation asked the Commission to establish a Sanford Archives at the Conference Center to house the Sanford collection and highlight the Sanford's ministry. The Sanford Archives would also serve as a springboard to encourage other early women in our Conference to donate material to the Archives to honor the Sanfords. The Commission responded with a proposal that resulted in funding to support the Sanford Archives over the next five year and we have begun the task of collecting material from the Sanford house in Neenah. The Commission thanks our Archivist, Lynn Lubkeman for the taking the lead on this project.

In early November, the Archives hosted an overnight Retreat at Pine Lake Center. Programming that included presentations on the history of the Archives, record keeping essentials, local church anniversaries and a special talk by Rev. Dan Dick. The retreat

was well attended by laity. The Commission plans to hold another retreat next fall and will reach out to encourage the involvement of Clergy (0.5 CEU).

The Commission is also pleased to announce that after many years to struggle we have reached an agreement with the State Historical Society for the return of materials deposited with them over the years. These materials, including the first book of handwritten minutes of the Wisconsin ME Conference (starting in 1848), were left with the SHS at a time when it seemed that was the best way to ensure their preservation. Following formal Conference action this May requesting their return, we expect the SHS to move quickly to return the materials to our Archives.

In addition, the Archives mounted a display for Annual Conference and also sold some of the many extra Disciplines we have at the Archives. Commission member Jeff Nicholls read the names of those with significant service anniversaries.

The Commission continues to publish our newsletter Flashbacks to highlight items of historical interest, supervise the Conference Museum in Greenfield and send attendees to the Jurisdictional Meeting. Through the work of the Archives, the Commission continues its Ministry of Memory. The Commission believes that the collection and preservation of the stories that define the communities of the local church and the Conference is a necessary and vital step to Living, Giving and Loving Beyond All Expectation.

- E. Held a Family Day celebration in August with 130 attending.

- F. Sent two delegates to the MARCHA National Assembly.
- G. Held a candlelight youth vigil with 90 youth present!

Black Methodists for Church Renewal

- A. Hosted an evangelism workshop featuring Dr. Kwasi Kena, Director of Evangelism Ministries for the General Board of Discipleship.
- B. Youth and young adults attended the Harambee National Youth event in Little Rock, Arkansas.

- C. 24 members participated in a 2-day Christmas gathering of clergy and families in Kenosha. There Rev. Kyochul Shin was elected new CORR caucus chair.

Hmong Caucus

- A. Celebrated the growth of a new congregation, Agape UMC.

CORR

- A. The Commission itself sponsored a fantastic event on March 18, 2012 celebrating the ministry of Bishop Linda Lee. Over three hundred people gathered at Algoma Boulevard UMC in Oshkosh and each of the caucuses presented gifts as well as dance or music performances. The food was outstanding! We presented Bishop Lee with a check for \$250 to be used for The Rising Sun Camp. We also honored outgoing Metro District Superintendent Jorge Mayorga Solis with a check in his honor to Voces de la Frontera, a Milwaukee-based immigrant rights organization.
- B. CORR continues to monitor the speakers at our Annual Conference, reporting those results at the conclusion of the conference.

ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH CONCERNS COMMITTEE

The Ethnic Local Church Concerns Committee seeks to advocate for, encourage and empower local ethnic ministries and leaders throughout the Wisconsin United Methodist Conference.

We have accomplished our purpose in the following ways:

- We provided training for the Summer Developers last April, 2011, with an excellent attendance and positive feedback.
- We provided funding in 2011 to 16 ethnic churches for Summer Developer ministries. We exceeded our goal.
- We gave scholarships to three ethnic pastors in the seminary Advanced Course of Study and in college in preparation for ministry.

We have identified several challenges in our efforts to live, give, and love beyond all expectation and to accomplish our purpose:

- To get all ethnic congregations, especially Hmong and Korean, to apply for Summer Developer funds and launch outreach ministries in their communities.
- To get information and communication out sooner, better, and in more indigenous languages.
- To find ways to support other ethnic leaders to attend training events instead of the same people.
- To assist with training for Healthy Multi-cultural and Cross-cultural ministries.
- To assist Ethnic Congregations to apply for General Church Grants to expand their ministries.
- To strengthen our relationship with the Ethnic Caucuses in the conference.

In 2013, our funding will enable us to live out our mission in the following ways:

- We are a strong advocate for the 34 Ethnic Local Churches in the conference through our funding.
- We can encourage and empower leadership training and development through scholarships, attendance at national training events, and Summer Developer grants.
- In 2011, we greatly appreciate the donations of \$456 given for the Summer Developers program. If we had an increased level of funding through donations, we could expand the Summer Developer grants to more of the 34 ethnic local churches. Also, we could send additional ethnic pastors and lay leaders to training events.

From the following stories we know that lives have been transformed because of our work on your behalf in the Annual Conference:

- From the 2011 evaluations, we heard many stories of the how the summer developers reached out and found many children in the community to include last summer, how many of the families became involved in the church because of the positive experiences. Many children wanted the program to last longer.

We will continue to ensure the efficient, effective, and wise stewardship of the Conference funding we receive:

- We require an application and an evaluation for every Summer Developer grant. We offer training to help them make an impact on the community.
- We encourage more full participation from the ELCC committee members.
- We make people accountable for the training funds they receive through follow-up reporting after events.

COMMITTEE ON HISPANIC/LATINO MINISTRY

Our purpose/Mission statement for the Committee on Hispanic /Latino Ministry is found the National Plan for Hispanic/Latino Ministry:

1. Interpreting and Advocating for Hispanic/Latino Ministries.
2. Planning, developing and implementing a strategic, comprehensive plan for Hispanic/Latino Ministry.
3. Training Lay and Clergy Leadership for Hispanic/Latino Ministry.
4. Securing and Providing Resources.
5. Monitoring, supporting and evaluating the Wisconsin Annual Conference Hispanic/Latino Ministries.

We have accomplished these purposes in the following ways:

- We continued with the trainings of Congregational Mobilization Process. In which 10 Hispanic ministries were involved with the trainings that included organization, development, outreach, renewing baptismal vows, revising vital signs of the congregation, and a spiritual retreat in which 121 people attended in Delavan, WI.
- We launched 2 new faith communities in Reedsburg and Wautoma. Rev. Rey Diaz was assisting as a volunteer supply pastor to the Reedsburg ministry until Rev. Sebastian Ulloa, was assigned as the new pastor for both ministries (Reedsburg and Wautoma) starting January 1, 2012.
- We launched a new multi-cultural ministry at Mt. Zion United Methodist Church, in Janesville, WI. Rev. Maribel Celiz has been a cross-cultural pastor at Mt. Zion UMC in which the congregation was open and ready to start this new ministry.

Continuing process in these areas:

- As a Hispanic Committee we are dedicated and holding strong on the Great Commission, “Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you” (Mt. 28:19-20a).
- Our objective is to continue to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ throughout the Wisconsin Conference, teaching and making disciples of Jesus Christ in different settings; urban, rural, multi-cultural, cross-cultural and more.

- We have begun the conversation for the possibility of two new faith communities in the Jefferson and Sheboygan counties.
- We are organizing the work on updating the Comprehensive Plan.

As we continue to work with existing Hispanic/Latino ministries we also continue to face the challenges of revitalization and fruitful congregations.

- One of the tools that we will continue to use is the Congregational and Mobilization Process trainings in which allows each ministry to check on the vital signs of the congregation.
- We will continue with congregational retreats to empower the unity of the ministries.

In 2013, our funding will enable us to live out our mission, vision, and purpose. Making disciples; living, giving and loving beyond all expectations; and equipping local churches for ministry and connecting us for the greater ministry of The United Methodist Church.

We are grateful that we are able to expand God's mission among our fastest growing communities in our conference. We will continue to expand the ministry in the following ways:

- Our vision and focus is to continue to train clergy and congregations of the importance of embracing the changing culture in our communities.
- To provide with consultants, trainers, and mentors to develop new Hispanic /Latino ministries and congregations among non-Hispanic congregations in Wisconsin.

We are grateful that we are able to expand God's mission among our fastest growing communities in our conference. We will continue to expand the ministry of The United Methodist Church in the following ways:

These are the ministries we are celebrating for allowing their ministries to have a turnaround church:

- We celebrate the ministry of Whitewater Hispanic for their fast growing ministry. This ministry has demonstrated their dedication on moving forward with their financial giving, Sunday school programs, and a mini bus for children's transportation. Whitewater is working on becoming a charter church next year.
- Another ministry we celebrate is the Henderson Hispanic Ministry in Beloit, (previously The River of Life, Beloit). Pastor Eduardo De La Cruz and his leaders decided to take on the challenge to be an independent ministry from The River of Life due to the need of more space to continue to expand the ministry. At the new place, Henderson UMC the space was given, in which the ministry has taken a much bigger challenge, to become a charter church this coming Annual Conference of 2012. The people at Henderson Hispanic Ministry continue to grow in faith, financial, and spiritual. They have demonstrated their love and passion for the ministry in many different ways in which the ministry continues to grow and expand throughout their community touching many lives. Henderson United Methodist Church will be a multi-cultural ministry connected with the African American group that was already part of Henderson Ave. Ministry. Recently the Hispanic Ministry celebrated their 3rd year anniversary

in which 250 people from the community participated. They had 9 baptisms as part of the celebration. The average worship service attendance is 140, with three Sunday school classes and a praise band that keeps growing. Bibles studies are on Tuesday night with an average attendance of 50-65 people, Thursday night with praise band practice and additional Bible study with an attendance of 40-50 people.

By the grace of God and as a committee, we will continue to sharpen our ministries in an effective way. Our hope and goals are to transform existing congregation to effective ministries that glorifies our Lord Jesus. We will continue to expand God's mission throughout the Wisconsin Conference and throughout the world.

Plans for the Coming Conference Year

The 2012 Wisconsin Annual Conference will again meet at Chula Vista in the Wisconsin Dells on June 1-3, with workshops and the Clergy and Laity Sessions held on May 31.

The scripture chosen for this year is John 14:12: “Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father.”

This year, prior to the opening of Annual Conference, several workshops will be offered including Annual Conference 101, Civil Discourse and Creative Worship. On Friday we will be privileged to have two presentations by Peter Block author of *Community and Abundant Community*. During the retiree’s lunch on Saturday, other members of the Annual Conference as well as UMC churches throughout the state will have the opportunity to participate in packaging nutritious meals for use around the world. This opportunity is held in conjunction with Kids against Hunger. Saturday night will give members the opportunity to celebrate the ministry of Bishop Linda Lee.

This year our Ordination service will be held on Sunday morning. Congregations throughout the state will be able to join us for a live broadcast or hear a pre-recorded version of the Bishop’s message.

RULES COMMITTEE

As a result of extensive work done prior to Annual Conference in 2011, the Conference Rules and Policies were revised and were reprinted. The next desirable step is to have those rules and policies easily accessible on the Conference website.

The Rules Committee received a number inquiries and requests for review of rules and policy changes. Between July 2011 and March 2012 the committee did not meet face to face, but conducted business via email and telephone. Our committee’s task is to assist the Annual Conference in operating smoothly, guided by established rules which are clear and available to all.

One inquiry wanted to change the conference policy 120.1.1 so that each congregation in a multi-point charge would not pay monthly health insurance premiums or congregations served by a clergy couple would not pay monthly health insurance premiums separately. The committee feels that changing this rule is not its job, but any changes should come through the Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance and Equitable Compensation, since it is the body capable of assessing the impact of such change on the Annual Conference. Once that Board recommended a change in policy, the Rules Committee would review it to ensure consistency with The Discipline and other conference policies and rules.

Specific changes were proposed by several conference agencies as will be noted in the Action Items section. The committee continues to look for new members to help review rules and policies as needed.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

Dan heard that adults who work with youth would appreciate regional trainings on practical and useful topics. The three trainings were each successful, and may be repeated in the fall of 2012 with new topics.

Junior and Senior High Convos are a highlight of each year. In 2011 they were each held at the Chula Vista Resort in Wisconsin Dells. A great deal of thanks and appreciation goes out to all the youth and adult leaders who comprise the Design Teams for these events. Rachel Hewitt shepherded both Junior and Senior High Design Teams, with wonderful clergy and laity volunteer support. Of course, these events could not happen as they do without the administrative support of Diane Williams and Karen Lamoree at the Conference office.

It is our hope and intention to strengthen our youth ministry in the coming year by reforming and revitalizing the Conference Council and by recruiting the volunteer Youth Coordinator to work with the Council.

COMMUNICATIONS AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The purpose of the Communications and Technology Committee is to advise and provide support for the Communications and Information Technology Office, whose primary responsibilities are to:

- Provide a connective link between the Conference staff and ministries, the churches, lay leaders and clergy, congregations, other agencies of the General Conference, and future disciples of The United Methodist Church, through an appropriate mix of communications tactics to best reach these audiences.

- Provide a source for information, news, ideas, joys and concerns, tools, training and more for Wisconsin United Methodist clergy, lay leaders and members.
- Encourage on-going dialogue among the different audiences and participation in conversations about topics and events of interest.
- Provide a primary point of access to Wisconsin United Methodists for persons/agencies on the General Conference level.
- Direct, administer and provide maintenance for the Conference's multi-level communications network. Provide technical support and consultation in conjunction with other conference agencies/boards/committees for our Annual Conference sessions and other Conference events, and integration of communication resources throughout the Annual Conference.
- Provide a primary point of access to the workings of the Wisconsin Conference UMC for both secular news and religious media, and other organizations.
- Provide multiple avenues of outreach to the wider Wisconsin community.
- Provide Conference leadership through the Full Cabinet and Discipleship Leadership Executive Team.

In 2011, we ensured the timely communication of the messages, inspiration, tools, and training that support the mission and vision:

- Continued efforts to ensure that Wisconsin Conference UMC communications are executed professionally and consistent in voice and message throughout all media.
- Implemented ongoing communications via a variety of tactics, including our website, ENEWS e-blast publications, Reflections print newsletter and other direct mail, print literature, YouTube and U-Stream sites, Facebook, audio/visual presentations, video conferencing, public relations and other publications.
- Created the video version of Soul Food to complement the written edition, and enable audiences to engage with the Bishop in a different format.
- Developed a variety of print, PowerPoint, and video tools for use by staff and churches as part of their ever-expanding communications "tool kit".
- Helped several boards and agencies upgrade and redefine their messaging and communication efforts, including their website presence and printed materials.
- Generated ongoing publicity for the Wisconsin Conference through United Methodist and other religious and secular media.
- Provided communications planning and training support for important initiatives such as RETHINK CHURCH, Web Ministry and Video Production.
- Helped plan and promote several key Conference events/initiatives, including Mission Day, Change the World 2011 (more than 80 congregations participated), Trip to Holy Land, Bullying Conference, Annual Conference, ongoing Disaster Relief efforts, as well as numerous other ministries and missions for which we provide resources and funding.
- Provided ongoing personal consultation and training for clergy and lay leaders.
- Began creating new Conference website, which will interact/relate to our e-blasts, social media, database, video and other tools, as well as increase utility, effectiveness, efficiency and impact, and reduce redundancies.

- Produced several key videos for the Conference, including Soul Foods, Bishop Greetings, Northcott Neighborhood House and United Methodist Children's Services.
- Provided Crisis Management Planning, media direction and PR.
- Continued efforts to streamline equipment and servers and reduce external reliance on our website and email hosting services. In process of moving website completely off site to improve performance.
- Ensured reliability of software, virus protection, and spam filtering, and backup solutions for network and websites. Set up replication of critical data in multiple places to reduce chance of downtime or data loss. Maintained our own backups.
- Maintained security of internal systems, including the safeguarding of all passwords, procedures and inventory. Launched our own VPN/Firewalls in regional offices and Lake Lucerne.
- Continued to provide audiovisual and live streaming resources for Conference events.
- Continued testing emerging technologies, products, and services to maintain a state-of-the art communications and information technology (IT) system for the Conference.
- Upgraded software and computers to meet standards—migrated all offices to Windows 7 and Office 2010.
- Set up hotline for after-hours/weekend/holiday support needs.
- Ongoing organizing and recycling equipment; sold off old equipment.
- Continued to support Adobe Connect Pro for conferencing.
- Met ongoing needs of internal and external customers for email, web, computers, cell phones, I-pads, and more.
- Set up Exchange email for all offices and camps.
- Continued to monitor relationship with new IT vendor.
- Ongoing work to maintain PCI Compliance (for credit card transactions) and ensure that we have compliant equipment/processes.
- Overall, implemented strategies to reduce complexity of network, address problems prior to downtime, update security and prevent hacking, improve performance through upgrades, and quickly handle daily issues through helpdesk.
- Selected new internet based door lock system; new keyless entry will be implemented soon.
- Developing plans to migrate land-line phones to voice-over IP.

To meet our mission for the greater ministry of The United Methodist Church, we have established many goals and strategies for 2012 and beyond. Many of these began in 2011 and are ongoing as we continue through 2013:

- Develop communication efforts that will support and integrate the 2012-2013 Live, Give Love Beyond All Expectation messaging on both a local and more global level; ensure this ongoing message is woven into our Wisconsin Conference's communications. Develop plans to launch new theme for 2013-2016, Live the Fruit of the Spirit.

- Plan and implement an ongoing communications strategy with supporting tactics to promote our mission and vision, and provide a connective link with the Conference, clergy, lay leaders, congregations and potential disciples.

Tactics will include, but are not limited to:

- Website (launching updated user-friendly version)
- ENEWS
- Reflections newsletter and other direct mail
- Printed literature
- Soul Food blog and other social media
- Public relations (with calendar of press releases to send to media outlet, both secular and non-secular)
- Communication tools/materials for events such as banners, displays
- Audio/visual presentations, YouTube and U-Stream sites
- Face-to-face meetings

These efforts will all work together to ensure that we continually connect in a meaningful way with our churches and ministries, and provide them services, tools and information, and add value to their communities. A major focus of all efforts will be to ensure the voice of the Episcopal leadership can be heard within the Conference, denomination, the ecumenical and secular community, and the media.

- Continue to promote several key events and initiatives for the Wisconsin Conference to ensure their success and support, including Annual Conference, Youth Conferences and Conventions, RETHINK CHURCH and Change the World 2012, East Angola partnership, World Service Fund, Health & Welfare Ministries, disaster relief efforts, as well as the numerous other ministries and missions for which we provide resources and funding.
- Continue to provide research and training as needed for UMC initiatives like Giving Enthusiastically, and RETHINK CHURCH.
- Develop and promote tools (both those created by the Wisconsin Conference and the general church boards and agencies) to help clergy and lay leaders in their ministry.
- Continue to work toward an integrated online solution which will interact with e-blasts, social media, databases, video and other tools.
- Continue to provide Help Desk IT consulting for clergy and lay leaders. We will also continue to recycle computers when possible for use by churches and organizations.
- Maintain appropriate level of computer and IT infrastructure and support for Conference staff and regional offices. Work toward integrating list serves and databases. Improve staff productivity and workplace satisfaction as well as streamline processes and reduce costs by continuing the standardizing of desktop equipment and software and upgrading/replacing necessary servers and systems. We will continue to communicate policies and procedures to ensure centralized purchasing of computers and software. We will also continue to stay abreast of emerging technologies and launch/invest in them as appropriate.

CONFERENCE EPISCOPACY COMMITTEE

The Episcopacy Committee is made up of clergy and lay leadership who work with Bishop Lee at least twice a year on the needs and issues of the annual conference. Primarily the membership are hearing from Bishop Lee her goals, expectations, and challenges and then also share with Bishop Lee what they are being told are responses, needs and challenges within the faith communities of Wisconsin Annual Conference. All perspectives are helpful for the conference leaders to create and then monitor success with goals that are set.

In late 21011, the Episcopacy Committee completed its required work with the North Central Jurisdictional Committee on two surveys: one for the annual conference needs in an Episcopal leader and the second on the needs of the annual conference. Also included in the report to the North Central Jurisdictional Committee is demographic data on the conference. All of this data will be used by the North Central Jurisdictional Committee to assign Episcopal Leaders across the Jurisdiction in July 2012.

PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

Introductory Comments

The Conference Personnel Committee is responsible for establishing and implementing policies and procedures, salary scales and criteria for all Conference staff positions. The Committee provides oversight and delegation of the search process, employment and supervision of most conference staff positions other than District Superintendents. The committee works in consultation with the Bishop (for those positions she supervises), and with appropriate programmatic and administrative groups during a search process, and provides general oversight and coordination for those positions.

Highlights and Accomplishments

The Personnel Committee met three times this past year and held one conference call. During the past year, a part-time position in Communications was eliminated in December of 2011. Nicole Haynes, who was filling that position, worked temporarily in the Finance Office to cover a family leave. Her employment with the Conference ended in late March of 2012. We are grateful for her service in the life of this conference.

The committee provided oversight to and support for the staff of the Wisconsin Annual Conference as staff provided leadership to the conference in implementation of the Vision, "Live, Give, Love ... Beyond All Expectation, and the focus areas of The United Methodist Church.

The committee provided oversight and support to insure there is appropriate and sufficient staff to do the work of ministry and to coordinate lay/clergy leadership in its work through various boards and agencies.

Plans for the Coming Year

The committee will support the vision of the Annual Conference through oversight for appropriate staffing configurations and positions that address established priorities. The

committee will continue to provide input and feedback for proposed adjustments in staffing, and to regularly review all policies/procedures that are our responsibility and continue to monitor the budget.

The committee will periodically review its charter of primary roles/responsibilities and will work with key staff/ leaders to communicate the roles/functions for which Personnel is responsible and insure appropriate avenues exist for addressing specific personnel issues, particularly as new priorities emerge. The committee will work to provide oversight, support and resourcing needed to empower key staff to plan, lead and supervise within their areas of responsibility.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Introductory comments:

The CF&A's purpose "shall be to develop, maintain and administer a comprehensive and coordinated plan of fiscal and administrative policies, procedures and management services for the Annual Conference". (Book of Discipline, paragraph 610)

Highlights and accomplishments of the year 2011:

First and foremost, CF&A would like to thank the following churches for going beyond all expectations to pay more than 100 percent of their 2011 apportionments or for moving toward full apportionment payment by paying a higher percentage of their apportionments in 2011 than in 2010:

(See list printed in the Pre-Conference Workbook.)

CF&A's primary focus has been on reviewing, approving and monitoring the Annual Conference budget. This process includes

1. reviewing Plans for Ministry and Budget Proposals submitted by the Conference boards, agencies and committees;
2. working with the Discipleship Leadership Council and the Cabinet in setting the budget;
3. evaluating current apportionment receipts for the current year along with economic conditions affecting our local churches
4. using all of this input to propose a budget to the Annual Conference.

The process is designed to assure that the budget is aligned with the overall mission and plan for ministry of the Conference. CF&A meets periodically to review financial results against budget and to direct and approve the annual audit and to approve changes in administrative policy. CF&A also reviews financial operations of the Conference to assure adequate internal controls are in place and suggests ways to improve finances both from an efficiency and a control perspective.

As of December 31, 2011, the Wisconsin Annual Conference had indebtedness of \$196,898, incurred to fund improvements to the Sun Prairie Conference Center building.

In 2011, the Wisconsin Annual Conference for the first time in 22 years did not pay our General Conference apportionments in full. We did, however, pay 100 percent of the World Service, Africa University, and Jurisdictional Conference Funds. Other general church apportionment funds were paid at 82 percent, which was 1.5 percent higher than our local church apportionments receipts. In addition to apportionments, Wisconsin United Methodists gave over \$154,000 to the special Sunday offerings and another \$925,000 to Advances and other benevolent giving through the Conference.

Apportionment receipts in 2011 were \$433,471 less than budgeted. At the same time, expenses came in \$460,754 less than budgeted so we were able to add \$27,284 back into our cash reserve. At year end 2011, our cash reserve stood at \$494,511. This is \$178,815 below the Conference goal of having cash reserve equal to 10% of the Annual Conference Budget.

Plans for the coming year:

Our most important task is to continue to monitor apportionment receipts and expenses to mitigate financial deficits and maintain a positive cash flow. We will continue to work with the Cabinet to increase apportionment giving.

In conjunction with the Communications office and the Discipleship Leadership Team, CF&A is working to better tell the story of the ministries of our Wisconsin Annual Conference. We will also be assisting with the creation of a conference-wide stewardship campaign.

We will continue to review various areas of financial operation to assure sound internal controls are in place.

We will continue to oversee the Conference Finance Office to assure that the financial duties of the Conference are carried out in an efficient and effective manner.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Our Purpose: The organized unit of United Methodist Women shall be a community of women whose Purpose is to know God and to experience Freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ, to develop a creative, supportive fellowship, and to expand Concepts of Mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

Highlights of 2011

Love In Action Day was held at Franksville UMC on March 26th. The topic was Infant Mortality in Wisconsin, which is particularly high in the southeastern part of our state. Participants heard about causes and solutions, as well as received suggestions for how individuals and units can help.

A program for **UMW Sunday** was created by our four mission coordinators for use in local churches. UMW Sunday was set for the fourth Sunday in September, or for any Sunday that is convenient for the local church.

Our Wisconsin **School Of Christian Mission** was held in August this year, rather than at its traditional time in late July. It was held at the Ramada Inn and Conference Center in Stevens Point. Gloria Carter served as Dean and Julie Mieke as Assistant Dean. The studies were: *Joy to the World- Mission in the Age of Global Christianity, Haiti, and Coming Out On The Side Of Grace: Forgiveness and Reconciliation*. Drive-In Day was Saturday, August 6th, and a sampling of all three studies was offered. For many years, Drive-In Day had been on Mondays. The change of day was intended to attract more working people. Four-Day School ran from Tuesday to Friday, August 2-5. Several teens were present, doing special activities together, as well as, attending classes with the adults. Advanced Lay Speaker/Servant credit was offered for approved classes, and 29 women received certification. Four pastors also requested Continuing Education Units. The newly ordained were offered scholarships, and one took advantage. Scholarships were also offered to first time attendees and to young women through the help of the Nancy Rivers scholarship fund. As in the past, we offered YOMICA (Youth Mission Camp) at Pine Lake UM Camp the same week as SOCM, so that parents had a safe and interesting place to send their children while they themselves took classes.

A **Charter for Racial Justice** program was created and distributed for use in units. It was based on the Reading Program book, "Let's Talk About Race."

On October 22nd we held **our Conference Annual Gathering** at Black River Falls UMC, with an Evening of Enrichment the night before. The theme was "Our Partnership in God's Mission." 230 people attended, including about 40 Hispanic women, for whom we offered simultaneous translation through the use of head phones. Our guest speaker was Robert Harman who had served as the chief administrative officer for the world mission program of the UMC's General Board of Global Ministries. Our special guest was Ana Ingles, the President of the Methodist Women of East Angola Conference whose language is Portuguese, for whom we provided a translator, Zach Vornholt. Other offerings were focus groups on Harbor House for homeless women and families in Superior, plus Volunteers In Mission trips to Cuba (Mary Rather) and Senegal (Gwen Gibson), and a mission report from the Njungus who are serving in Cameroon.. The afternoon was devoted to a Mission Bowl Parade, featuring special mission outreach activities from a unit in each of our eight districts. Books from our UMW reading list were on sale, and there were many displays to observe. Childcare was provided. During our business meeting, we elected new officers and approved a budget of \$340,000, plus \$132,000 more for Administration and Development of our UMW programs in Wisconsin. We elected officers for 2012, including two women nominees for Women's Division – Julie Prouty and Gail Burgess. We also approved Chelsey Ganzer as our first Young Women's Coordinator. The day ended with communion led by Rev. Kathy Jury.

In November, Spanish Language Coordinator, Iris Hernandez, organized a retreat for Hispanic women that was attended by 60 women plus children.

Hmong Language Coordinator, Pahoua Xiong, worked to promote UMW among Hmong women. There are two active units.

Hmong House Of Good News in Milwaukee continues to operate at Central UMC in Milwaukee where it serves Hmong elders. This mission project, begun by UMW in 2008, receives funding, not just from units, by also from churches across the conference, as well as from grants and from the sale of egg rolls. A new fundraiser was started: Milk Moola in which caps from Kwik Trip milk and juices are saved to be turned in for cash.

Looking Ahead in 2012

We are excited about the theme for **Mission Action Day** held at Tomah on March 24th. The topic, human trafficking, is timely and applies to every county in Wisconsin.

District and Conference Officers as well as members of local units will drive to Des Moines for the last **North Central Jurisdiction gathering** of United Methodist Women, June 19-20. Voting delegates will choose directors for Women's Division. There also will be workshops and mission speakers. The theme will be "Fill My Cup, Lord."

School of Christian Mission will be held at Westwood Conference Center in Wausau during the week of July 31st to August 3rd, with Overview Day on Saturday, August 4th.

The studies will be: *Immigration in the Bible, Poverty, and Haiti* (year two). Again, continuing education units will be offered for clergy and advanced lay servant ministry credits for laity.

During that same week, a team will be sent to a **young women's training event** – "Limitless: Redefine Tomorrow" – at Duke University in Durham, NC. Rachel Dorf and Joy Adedokun will represent our teens, Chelsey Ganzer our young women, and Mary Lainberger will go along as mentor. They will bring back ideas for including teens and young women in unit, district, and conference events, as well as establishing teen and young women's circles.

We look forward to our **Conference Annual Gathering** which will be held at Sun Prairie UMC on October 19-20. Rather than a keynote speaker, there will be a variety of workshops from which to choose.

On November 10 there will be **leadership training** for all conference and district officers at the Mead Inn in Wisconsin Rapids. Representatives from Women's Division will teach about what it means to be a member of United Methodist Women as well as explain the role of each office. There will be time for sharing and for planning for the future of United Methodist Women.

WISCONSIN UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

A. INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS

The Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation is an adjunct ministry of the Wisconsin Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. The Foundation seeks to provide specialized services to the Wisconsin United Methodist Congregations and Institutions, Laity and Clergy, and the ministries and missions of our Church.

1. Accountability

INVESTMENT: The Foundation provides options for church-related entities to pool their funds for the purpose of professionally managed investment. Our investment policies are designed specifically to serve the long-term investment strategies of United Methodist ministries, endowments, trustees' funds and other permanent funds. We seek to provide maximum benefits of investment growth and earnings while maintaining a conservative investment strategy and minimizing risk levels. In addition, our funds investment policy operates under the United Methodist Social Principles. Our primary asset allocation model (50% equity & 50% fixed-income allocation) now has a 34-year performance record with an annual average net return of 8.59%. The Investment Fund net return for this model in 2011 was 1.40%. At the end of 2011 funds under management at the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation totaled \$85,034,275.

During 2011 we provided investment services to the Minnesota United Methodist Foundation. We are grateful that we have an opportunity to provide this collegial service to our neighboring Foundation and believe this provides an ideal program of funds management designed for "church monies" with appropriate risk/return levels for a variety of situations and allows the Minnesota United Methodist Foundation to focus on growth and development of additional services.

PLANNED GIFTS: The Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation provides an on-going educational program available to all church-related groups at no charge. We offer charitable giving seminars and workshops, individual consultation with clergy, laity, and local church groups about charitable giving options and assistance in the technical aspects of completing charitable gifts. Our staff is continuously updated in the specialized areas of charitable giving, related tax matters and current trends. We work with other professionals such as lawyers, accountants, and financial planners to complete charitable gifts to the church and its related ministries. Upon request, we also provide counsel in the area of planned giving to local churches. To assist the Wisconsin Conference in charitable giving goals, we have established and operate a Charitable Gift Annuity Program that is certified by the State of Wisconsin. We also serve as Trustee for individually created Charitable Remainder Trusts. The Foundation has planned giving software to assist individuals in charitable gift planning. Through continuous promotion, education, and awareness, we now see significant gifts being received by Wisconsin United Methodist Churches and related institutions.

STEWARDSHIP: In August 2011, members of the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation staff, Foundation Board Members, along with Dan Dick and Ric Olson from the Ministry and Outreach Staff of the Annual Conference and Lisa King, Conference Treasurer, led the fourth annual Stewardship Retreat at Pine Lake Camp. This event was again co-sponsored by the Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries. We served a total of

48 participants (up from 42 in 2010). Our focus in 2011 continued to emphasize helping participants develop a 3-year stewardship ministry plan for their congregation. This was the first year we provided an expanded version of the retreat with a number of drive-in options. We will continue the drive-in options in 2012.

In October, the Rev. Clif Christopher from Horizons Stewardship, Inc. led our fall stewardship seminars. Over 180 persons attended the three seminars held in Wisconsin and Minnesota. In addition, Foundation staff conducted eight stewardship consultations for individual local congregations facing financial difficulties.

In addition, an increasing number of local church pastors and stewardship team leaders have visited our Stewardship Preview Library. This preview library is available during office hours Monday – Friday, 9 am – 4 pm, and at additional times upon request. Please call ahead (1-888-903-9863) to be sure a stewardship staff member will be available to assist you when you arrive.

Our staff is available to help organize, train and provide resources to Wills, Memorials and Estate Committees in the local church. We also provide guidance in the development of local church Endowment Funds, and encouragement to on-going program efforts at the local level. We meet with Church Councils, Trustees and Finance Committees to explain the investment options we provide local churches through our professionally-managed equity pool, the fixed income fund, and the loan pooled fund. Increasingly we are working with circuit gatherings in Stewardship and Planned Giving educational programs.

The Foundation will again be working with the Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries to sponsor a Stewardship Retreat for clergy and lay leaders at Pine Lake Camp, August 16-18, 2012, with a variety of registration options available to participants. The focus of this retreat will be developing a 3-5 year stewardship ministry plan for their congregations.

CLERGY: We provided our annual “Clergy Tax Seminar” for Wisconsin clergy, at no cost to the Conference. Also, each year at the New Clergy Orientation, we meet with newly appointed clergy serving the Wisconsin Conference to update them on Foundation services. We also provided funding for three clergy Study/Renewal Leaves totaling \$7,200.

GRANTS, SCHOLARSHIPS AND GIFTS: The Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation continues to invite applications and award grants throughout Wisconsin. In 2011 these grants and other gifts totaled \$325,848. We hope to encourage innovative and creative ministries, provide scholarship assistance, provide resources for United Methodist missions, and assist a variety of projects in Wisconsin churches.

In 2011 the Foundation was able to award 30 scholarships worth \$16,700 to promising young United Methodist college students and adults returning for additional education, or persons working towards vocations in church-related fields of ministry. The Foundation was also able to award scholarship grants to Wisconsin UM students attending seminary in preparation for service in the Wisconsin Conference.

Through our Year-End Gifts program, \$437,451 was given to the Bishop’s Relief Fund, Minister’s Insurance Memorial Fund, Scholars Award Program, WUMF Permanent Administration Fund, Samaritan Grant Fund, UMCOR Disaster Relief, The Fid Fund

supporting the UM Hospitals Ministry Endowment Fund, Lake Lucerne Youth Lodge and other ministries.

For the year 2011, we processed 135 stock gifts for a total of \$581,142. Of this total, \$483,512 was passed through to local churches and church ministries per the donor's instruction. Through our special arrangement with our broker, we are able to process gifts of appreciated stock for local churches at no cost, leaving higher net proceeds for the church.

2. Philosophy and Priorities

The Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation wants to serve the "connectional church" and seeks to fulfill its underlying mission of teaching, resourcing, and serving throughout our Wisconsin Annual Conference. The Foundation is a totally self-funded ministry, continually increasing our level of services and grants to the life and ministry of the Wisconsin United Methodist Church. Through careful administration and planning, we strive to provide programming, resources and consultation to all United Methodist individuals and congregations in the state, regardless of their distance from our offices. We have an expanded conference room/display area at the Foundation office. In addition to displaying planned giving materials and brochures that are available through our offices, we also have a display of over 20 current financial "stewardship" programs and resources. This is intended to provide lay and clergy with a hands-on opportunity to review annual campaign programs, video and study materials, and other ideas for revitalizing stewardship in the congregation. A brochure summarizing each of these campaigns, ordering information and cost is also available through our office. We exist to serve the entire church!

As of December 31, 2011, our Church Mortgage Loan Program had 32 active loans for churches, including one for the Wisconsin Annual Conference. Loans total \$9.1million and are often at better interest rates for the congregations, leaving more funds available for programs and other local church expenses. The corresponding Church Loan Pooled Fund is providing other congregations with enhanced investment return over our traditional Fixed Income Fund. Last year, 253 church accounts and 25 Conference accounts took advantage of the enhanced return available with our Church Loan Pooled Fund. This is a wonderful example of churches assisting other churches.

A Pre-Campaign Study was held in November 2011 at Kenosha: Wesley UMC to determine the attitudes and opinions of the members toward a Capital Campaign to remodel and revitalize their sanctuary as it is used as a tool for their mission and ministry.

Charitable Gift Annuities, available through the Foundation to all Wisconsin United Methodists, continue to be the most popular way for donors to make a gift to the church. Donors establishing Charitable Gift Annuities receive an income payment for the remainder of their lifetime. For donors making "life income" gifts exceeding \$50,000, a Charitable Remainder Trust is still the most frequently used gift vehicle. We take seriously the need for our staff to be current in the regulations and opportunities impacting the area of planned giving, for the benefit of our donors and the church.

3. Up-Date Information

a. Total Investment Funds Under Management

The December 31, 2011 market value was \$85,034,275 compared to \$83,730,769 on December 31, 2010. Total earnings in 2011 amounted to \$1,182,789.

b. Charitable Gift Annuities – 119 accounts. Market Value as of 12/31/2011 was \$1,476,899.

c. Charitable Remainder Unitrusts – 18 accounts. Market Value as of 12/31/2011 was \$3,453,775.

CONFERENCE SECRETARY

Introductory Comments

The Office of the Conference Secretary is one of the “Conference Support Ministries.” As “the keeper of the record” the Conference Secretary indirectly supports the work of all other conference agencies, officers and staff by gathering information about their work, processing and disseminating that information to the members of the annual conference, recording the actions of the annual conference, and communicating that information to a variety of agencies, organizations, and of course the local churches of the conference. The conference secretary facilitates the flow of information among the various elements of the conference by providing contact information in the journal, and maintains a historical record that can be used in future years as a reference of previous conference actions. I also serve as a member of the Program and Arrangements Committee, and work with the other leaders of the Annual Conference to plan, organize, and facilitate the Annual Conference session.

My work indirectly benefits all Wisconsin United Methodists by providing information that will enable the members of the Annual Conference to do their work, the boards and agencies of the Annual Conference to communicate about their work, and the clergy and staff of the Annual Conference to be in communication with one another.

Highlights and Challenges of the Past Year

I am sorry to have to report that preparation of the 2011 Wisconsin Conference Journal did not go smoothly. In order to prepare the Journal I depend upon information supplied by other sources. Much of the information needed to produce the Journal was not available until well into the Fall of 2011, which delayed production of the Journal. In 2011 the Conference Journal was produced for general distribution only in electronic form. This method of distribution saved the annual conference about \$12,000 in printing and postage costs. The electronic version of the Journal was not available for distribution and on the website until January, 2012. Printed copies of the Journal were produced for distribution to those General Church agencies that we are required by the Book of Discipline to provide a Journal to, and for use in conference offices. We will continue in 2012 to produce the Conference Journal for general distribution only in electronic form.

During 2011 the Annual Conference elected delegates to the 2012 General and Jurisdictional Conferences. I am grateful to the many people who served as tellers and assistant secretaries during the Annual Conference Session for the time and effort they put into collecting and counting the ballots for the election process. In addition to supervising the election process, I had the additional responsibility of submitting materials related to the election to the Secretary of the General Conference, and preparing Petitions to the General Conference which were approved by vote of the Annual Conference for submission to the General Conference Petitions Secretary.

Ongoing Goals each year:

- To keep the record of the proceedings of the Annual Conference, and to publish that record in the Annual Conference Yearbook and Journal.
- To facilitate the work of the Annual Conference Session through the publication of the Pre-Conference Workbook.

- To improve the accuracy of the Workbook and the Journal, and to produce them in a format which makes them easy to read and use.
- To explore and implement, where appropriate, new methods of recording, storing and publishing the records of the Annual Conference.

Specific Plans for 2012 and 2013

2012 is the last year of the current quadrennium. According to our conference rules, lay members of the annual conference are elected by their charge for the entire quadrennium, and we must “equalize” the number of lay and clergy members of the annual conference prior to the beginning of the next quadrennium. In the summer of 2012 I will be calculating the number of lay members of the annual conference that each pastoral charge is entitled to elect for the 2013-2016 quadrennium, and communicating that to each pastor in time for the annual church conferences in the fall of 2012.

2012 is the twenty-second year that I have served as Conference Secretary of the Wisconsin Annual Conference. I served in this capacity from 1989 through 1996, and was asked to take on this responsibility again beginning January 1, 1999. As many of you are aware, in addition to my work as Conference Secretary, which is a one-quarter time position, I am also appointed three-quarter time as the Executive Secretary of the Board of Ordained Ministry. For many years these positions complemented each other well. In recent years, however, the work of the Executive Secretary of the Board has expanded to such a degree that my two jobs now have a tendency to interfere with one another. The Cabinet has recommended, with the concurrence of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Board of Ordained Ministry, that my position as Executive Secretary of the Board of Ordained Ministry become full-time, effective January 1, 2013. This will therefore be the last year that I will serve as Secretary of the Annual Conference. The Bishop and Cabinet will be recommending someone to take over the responsibilities of this position beginning January 1, 2013.

It has been a joy, as well as a great privilege, to serve as your Conference Secretary for this time, and I thank you for the opportunity to do so.

AFRICA UNIVERSITY

**“When you pass through the waters, I will be with you;
and when you pass through the rivers,
they will not sweep over you.
When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned;
the flames will not set you ablaze.” – Isaiah 43:2**

At its inception, many doubted that the dream could be realized. Yet, in February 2012, Africa University launched a year-long celebration of its 20th anniversary. It has quite a story to tell.

“We serve a faithful God,” says Dr. Fanuel Tagwira, vice chancellor. “As we now celebrate 20 years of existence, we can say ‘Ebenezer’, for this far the Lord has taken us. He will surely take us further because we serve a God who finishes what he starts.”

Recalling the challenges the University faced during Zimbabwe’s economic crisis in 2008-2009, Tagwira noted that “God was on our side...other universities, primary and secondary schools, and hospitals closed, but Africa University students never lost a day of classes.” For this, Tagwira offered his thanks to The United Methodist Church for its responsiveness and unwavering support.

In 2011, twenty-seven annual conferences met 100 percent of their apportionments for the Africa University Fund—up from twenty-one in the previous year. We offer our thanks and profound gratitude to the leadership and local congregations of the Wisconsin Annual Conference for their 151% contribution to the Africa University Fund.

Enrollment at Africa University is at an all-time high. The current total population of 1634 students is 42% higher than it was for the 2010-11 academic year. There are 23 African countries represented in the student body. At Africa University, male and female students are almost evenly balanced—something that bodes well for increasing the participation of women in decision-making and leadership roles in Africa.

New programs are helping Africa University to grow and remain relevant to community needs across the continent. New academic offerings include undergraduate degree programs in Computer Science and Laboratory Science as well as graduate degree programs in Child and Family Studies, and Public Policy and Governance.

The University is preparing to launch online distance learning. Online training options will focus on areas such as practical theology, health, and business. The initial target countries for Africa University’s online distance learning outreach are Angola, Côte d’Ivoire, Democratic Republic of Congo, Liberia, Mozambique, Nigeria, and Sierra Leone.

In June 2011, 349 students from 19 African countries graduated. The graduating class was comprised of 69 graduate students receiving master’s degrees, and 280 undergraduate students receiving bachelor’s degrees. The Class of 2011 swelled the ranks of Africa University graduates to more than 4,000 since first opening its doors in March 1992.

In their home countries, graduates are addressing critical issues of hunger, poverty, disease, lack of knowledge, and conflict, all of which prevent millions of people in Africa from enjoying God's promise of abundance (John 10:10; Jeremiah 29:11).

At 20, Africa University is part of a crucial feeder system for nurturing a new generation of principled leaders in Africa as evidenced by the number of graduates who are evangelists, pastors, lecturers and administrators of schools, seminaries and universities.

“Many believe that Africa University, voted into being by the 1988 General Conference, is the most exciting ministry that The United Methodist Church has ever founded,” says Tagwira. “It is a model of connection; shared responsibility; and best of all; it is a tangible witness to how United Methodists live out the Word of God in a chaotic and self-centered world.”

This year, encourage your church to give 100 percent of its Africa University Fund apportionment. The Africa University Fund supports day-to-day operations. Your support helps young people acquire the tools and skills to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ, heal communities, enable dignified living, and foster hope. CANDLER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Candler School of Theology prepares *real* people to make a *real* difference in the *real* world. Our commitment to authentic discipleship and relevant ministry enables us to develop uniquely well-rounded leaders who are challenged academically, encouraged spiritually, and immersed in Christian service from the first day they arrive on campus.

As one of the 13 official seminaries of The United Methodist Church, Candler is grounded in the Christian faith and shaped by the Wesleyan tradition of evangelical piety, ecumenical openness, and social concern. As one of seven graduate professional schools of Emory University, Candler provides a rich context for learning and formation supported by the extensive resources of a top-tier research university. As a school located in the major metropolitan area of Atlanta, Candler offers students a learning environment that reflects the highly diverse communities of our 21st century world. There is no better place for ministry preparation that addresses our major denominational priorities: developing leaders, starting and growing churches, ministry with the poor, and improving global health.

Candler's student body continues to reflect the diversity and breadth of the Christian faithful. Our enrollment stands at 479, with 372 seeking the Master of Divinity, 64 the Master of Theological Studies, 19 the Master of Theology, 17 the Doctor of Theology, and 7 enrolled as Special, Non-Degree students. The total student population is 22% U.S. ethnic minority, 8% international, and 50% women. Forty-four denominations are

represented, with 52% of MDiv students being United Methodist. The median age of our entering class of MDiv students is 26, with 50% of total enrollment under thirty.

An extraordinary gift of \$15 million from the O. Wayne Rollins Foundation will make possible the construction of the second phase of the school's new building. In recognition of this gift, the first building—a 65,000-square-foot facility completed in 2008—will be named in memory of the late Rita Anne Rollins, the first grandchild of the foundation's namesake. The new building will house the Pitts Theology Library, additional classrooms and offices, group study areas, and the Wesley Teaching Chapel.

Candler and The General Theological Seminary (GTS) in New York have formed an innovative partnership that includes the sharing of library resources, collaborative educational programs, and the exchange of both students and faculty members. The partnership began this fall with the transfer of 90,000 volumes from GTS to Candler's Pitts Theology Library, and will continue to expand this year via student/faculty exchanges and continuing education programs.

Candler has introduced two new ways to make theological education more accessible. First, we launched a Tuesday-Thursday format for core courses for our incoming students in order to lessen the burden of commuting. Second, we began offering certain courses in an online or hybrid format. Two courses were piloted in January term and spring semester. We remain deeply committed to the highest quality education for our clergy and will offer only those hybrid and online courses that meet a gold standard of excellence in teaching and learning outcomes. Faculty members undergo rigorous training in order to translate their courses to an online format.

Candler continues to emphasize preparing our students for leadership in an increasingly global context. We now offer 17 academic exchanges with theology schools across five continents and 15 countries, including many related to The United Methodist Church. In addition to our ongoing summer internship program with the Methodist Church in the Bahamas, this year's travel seminars included the Middle East Travel Seminar in May-June and World Methodist Evangelism Institute evangelism seminars to Colombia, Indonesia, and Israel.

A hallmark of the Candler MDiv experience, the two-year Contextual Education program shapes our students' pastoral identities by interweaving service at ministry sites with academic analysis in the classroom and spiritual reflection in pastor-led small groups. In any given week, Candler deploys more than 250 ConEd students throughout the region to minister to people in congregations, hospitals, and social service agencies. This year we have continued Candler Advantage, a program designed to pay rising third-year MDiv students for summer internships in congregations so they can further hone their pastoral skills beyond the first two years of ConEd.

Candler's Lifelong Learning events strengthen the church by providing opportunities for clergy and lay leaders to learn more about the practice of ministry. Our Fall Conference, "The Art of Preaching in the 21st Century," brought to campus some of the most respected names in preaching, including Otis Moss Jr. and James Howell. The Spring Conference, "The Singing Church," gathered experts to lead an exploration of the best practices and emerging trends of congregational song.

In addition to our Lifelong Learning events, Candler oversees the educational process of more than 900 people each year through the Course of Study regional school and our five extension schools in the Southeast.

Despite today's challenging economic climate, Candler remains steadfastly committed to making theological education financially feasible. Although our operating budget essentially remained flat this year, we dedicated \$4.5 million to financial aid. Seventy-seven percent of eligible students received Candler-based financial aid, with the average award covering more than two-thirds of tuition.

Our widely respected faculty continues to distinguish itself, both in academia and in churches and denominational bodies at local, national, and international levels. This year, faculty members garnered prestigious grants and fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Louisville Institute, among others. Dr. Carol Newsom recently completed a term as president of the Society of Biblical Literature. In Fall 2011 we welcomed two new faculty members: Jennifer Ayres in religious education and Anthony Briggman in the history of early Christianity. In Fall 2012 we welcome Neil Alexander, current bishop of the Episcopal Archdiocese of Atlanta, as director of our Anglican Studies Program and Ted Smith as assistant professor of homiletics and ethics. Our UM faculty presence remains strong, with 36 percent of our full-time faculty being United Methodist.

Candler draws considerable strength and inspiration from its relationship with The United Methodist Church. Our ability to fulfill our mission of *educating faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries in the world* depends upon your support, gifts, and prayers. DREW THEOLOGICAL SCHOOL

Drew Theological School, deeply rooted in its United Methodist heritage, is a place that empowers its students to conceive and implement dynamic ministries. Drew offers the MDiv, MA, MAM, STM, DMin, and PhD degrees, as well as certifications in Camp and Retreat Ministry, and Spiritual Formation. Academically rigorous and spiritually revealing, Drew develops religious leadership prepared for these ever-changing times. Drew offers 100% tuition scholarships to all United Methodists who meet all admissions requirements and have a 3.5 undergraduate GPA or higher.

In the fall semester, I had the honor of welcoming a new class of students to Drew. This new class is composed of 73 masters and 13 PhD students. In addition, we also admitted 58 DMin students who started the program in the various cohorts around the country. We also welcomed another 19 students in the spring semester. We began the new academic year with a new Associate Dean for Academic Affairs in Dr. Morris Davis, Associate Professor of the History of Christianity and Wesleyan/Methodist Studies and welcomed two new faculty members and a post-doctoral fellow. Dr. Kate Ott joined us as Assistant

Professor of Christian Social Ethics, Dr. Elías Ortega-Aponte as Assistant Professor in Afro-Latino/a Religions and Cultural Studies, and Dr. David Evans as a post-doctoral fellow position and Lecturer in the History of Christianity.

As we began a new academic year, I was reminded of Drew's impact and contribution in the global context. I had the privilege of visiting Drew alumni in Hong Kong, Taiwan, Malaysia, Singapore and South Korea. Our alumni spoke with great appreciation of the education they received at Drew and the professors who taught them. Drew's influence in Korea, in particular, is historic. Henry G. Appenzeller, a graduate of Drew in 1885, brought Methodism to Korea. Appenzeller's connection with Drew has brought hundreds of students from Korea to Drew. Today, we have alumni teaching in seminaries and universities and serving churches in Korea.

I have enjoyed teaching a course on the General Conference and will be taking the class to Tampa. We were honored to have leaders such as Jim Winkler, General Secretary of GBCS, Harriett Olson, Deputy General Secretary of the Women's Division, and Erin Hawkins, General Secretary of GCORR, come and speak to the class. Three members of the Drew community are serving as delegates to the General Conference: Mark Miller, Tanya Bennett and myself.

We are living into a "majority minority" faculty, staff and student body at Drew that trains leaders for the church that will be soon serving in a "majority minority" world. Forty-five percent of our faculty is African/African Americans, Asian/Asian Americans, and Latino/a. We have almost an equal number of women and men on the faculty.

We are thrilled to have received a grant of \$75,600 from the GCORR Action Fund for the purpose of widening the ethos of multi-ethnic theological education. The grant will assist us in a thorough curriculum review with the hopes of enhancing every aspect of the multi-lingual, multi-ethnic, and multi-cultural reality at Drew.

Creative, cutting-edge, inclusive, multi-cultural, social justice ministry is part of the legacy of Drew, and I am proud to be associated with it! Below are just a few other ministries that make me proud to be associated with Drew.

Bishops in Residence at Drew

I have enjoyed meeting Bishops and many Boards of Ordained Ministry to convey our desire at Drew to be a resource to the entire denomination. I am particularly pleased that Drew is hosting a January Term class taught by UM Bishops. This past January, Bishop Alfred Johnson taught a class in urban ministry. He recently shared with me some reflections about his experience teaching here at Drew: "I am deeply impressed with the quality, depth and reflective experience of the students in my class. Both their reflection, inquiry and contribution to the field of urban ministry greatly deepened my own theological reflection and praxis."

In January 2013, Bishop Peggy Johnson of the Eastern PA and Peninsula Delaware Conference will teach a class on Ministry with People with Disabilities. In January of 2014, Bishop Jane Middleton of the Central PA Conference will teach a class on Ministry and Health.

United Methodist Liaison at Drew

The Rev. Jeff Markay continues to work with our UM students by introducing them to the leaders and resources within our denomination. He helps them navigate the process toward commissioning and ordination as well as with issues of discernment. We have monthly UM Lunches to meet with bishops, and leaders of the general agencies, conferences and connection. We are grateful for every opportunity to build a UM ethos here at Drew so that the connectionalism is strong when our students graduate to become leaders in their settings of ministry. We are also grateful to have the Rev. Susan Worrell as the Deacon Liaison on campus who shares resources and wisdom with those hearing a call to the Ministry of the Deacon in the UMC.

Center for Clergy and Congregational Health and Wholeness

In the fall of 2011 representatives from GBOPHB of the UMC came to Drew to meet with Dean Samuel and me. The purpose of the visit was to explore developing a partnership between the two institutions to address issues of clergy health. This cooperative partnership will lead to two things in 2012, namely, the launching of a longitudinal study on the health habits of seminary students while in seminary and for five years upon graduation and a conference, bringing together deans and presidents and staff members from the 13 UM seminaries, to be held in June on Clergy Health and Theological Education.

Taking seriously our shared lot in a global community, theological education is not just interested in “small talk”— we strive for hard talk, demanding friendships and challenges. We at Drew look forward to working with the good and faithful people of the UMC as we forge deeper friendships in the shared ministry of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

GARRETT-EVANGELICAL THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary continues its commitment to its core purpose: to know God in Christ and, through preparing spiritual leaders, to help others know God in Christ. We are faithful to the charge of preparing bold and articulate leaders who share the transforming love of Jesus Christ.

Last fall the seminary welcomed ninety-three new students, raising enrollment to 382, a nine percent increase. More than thirty religious traditions, four continents, twelve countries, and thirty-two states are represented in the student body, including 204 United Methodist students.

The seminary awards more than \$2 million in institutional financial aid. The newly-created Linked in Ministry Scholarship is a 100 percent scholarship awarded to the first student admitted to Garrett-Evangelical from his/her annual conference who is a candidate for United Methodist ministry and maintains a 3.3 GPA.

Loder Hall and Stead Hall (formerly Lesemann Hall) reopened last summer. Loder, a Gold-certified LEED facility, includes a student center, student lounges, a state-of-the-art

classroom, a dining hall, two small chapels, modern residence rooms with private baths, and guest suites. Stead Hall includes a conference room and library offices and houses the Stead Center for Ethics and Values.

The seminary participates in the Green Seminary Initiative, incorporating an ethic of care for creation into the identity and mission of the institution. We are a founding participant in the Blessed Earth Seminary Stewardship Alliance, a collaborative project for the purpose of preparing future church leaders to be catalysts for positive change around issues of environmental sustainability.

A partnership with Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) gives Garrett-Evangelical students the opportunity to obtain a concentration and/or certificate in Peace Studies, and AMBS students can meet United Methodist ordination requirements through a certificate in United Methodist Studies earned through Garrett-Evangelical.

Plus is the first of its kind cooperative executive education program of Garrett-Evangelical and Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management. The three-year leadership certification program for seminary graduates and professionals in ministry includes six seminars led by experts in non-profit leadership.

Intersection, an innovative continuing education opportunity, incorporates readings, online presentations, and reflection on contemporary issues of life and ministry. Continuing education credit is available.

Garrett-Evangelical helps develop bold local pastor leaders through the UMC Course of Study School. This quality education and formational experience, guided by a strong and committed faculty, offers classes in English, Spanish, and Hmong. In addition to the on-campus residential model, Garrett-Evangelical supervises three extension locations: Indiana, Illinois Great Rivers, and Upper Midwest (Iowa).

The seminary continues to raise \$2 million to endow the Rueben P. Job Chair in Spiritual Formation, ensuring that the seminary remains at the forefront of developing and enhancing spiritual formation studies at the certificate, master's and doctoral levels.

The expanded Doctor of Ministry program offers four tracks: Congregational Leadership, African American Congregational Leadership, Spiritual Direction, and Mission in the Contemporary United States. Our D.Min. program is also a portal to the Association of Chicago Theological Schools' D.Min. program in preaching.

We are proud to serve the United Methodist Church, and we ask for your continuing prayers and support as we pursue our mission and our renewed vision.

A. Introductory Comments

As a comprehensive liberal arts college, related to the United Methodist Church, North Central is committed to effective teaching, small classes, and rigorous standards. The College is committed to an education program for the whole person — body, mind, and spirit — that has been part of the North Central College experience since the Evangelical Association founded the College 150 years ago. The College celebrated its Sesquicentennial on November 11, 2011 with a banquet for 2,300.

1. *Accountability*

During 2011, North Central College did not receive any funds from the conference budget. 11 United Methodist students from the Wisconsin Conference received

\$139,475 in institutional scholarship and grant aid. The Northern Illinois Conference provides the compensation for the campus chaplain, Rev. Dr. Lynn Pries.

2. *Philosophy and Priorities*

North Central College is a community of learners dedicated to preparing students to be informed, involved, principled and productive citizens and leaders over a lifetime.

3. *Highlights of 2011 at North Central College*

U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT ranked North Central among top Midwest “Master” colleges for the 16th straight year and ranked the College as a “best value.” In the fall of 2011, a record number of first-year students, 576, and 294 transfer students brought the full-time, degree-seeking undergraduate enrollment to 2,620. 271 students are enrolled in graduate programs.

B. Highlights in Ministry and Service

1. *Campus Life and Spiritual Opportunities*

Chaplain Lynn Pries began his eighteenth year in ministry to North Central this year. Campus Ministry programs include: weekly worship services, Friday evening concerts, Bible studies, retreats, Gospel Choir, and the United Methodist Student Organization. 200 people attended the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Prayer Breakfast... 450 persons attended the 24th Annual Gospel Extravaganza.

2. *Opening the Campus to the World*

Service programs included: ten ongoing projects; and 90 students participated in seven weeklong service trips, including an Appalachian Service Project trip.

3. *Developing Leaders for the Church*

The New Visions Summer Company, composed of five students, directed a weeklong program in one church and led four weeks of camping programs. The New Beginnings Team, composed of six students, led VBS programs in eight churches. These ministries influenced eight students to enroll as first-year students at NCC... Five NCC United Methodist students attended the 2011 Student Forum at Evansville University in Evansville, Ohio.

C. Relationship to the Conference

In the first year of the Albright-Wesley Society, new efforts were begun to encourage more United Methodist students to attend North College, and raise funds for scholarships and leadership programs for United Methodist students. Lauren Wallem '11, a member of Christ UMC, Rockford, enrolled at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary.

2011-2012 Synopsis of Progress at Wiley College

Wondrous things are happening at Wiley. Our students are excelling academically; the A Capella Choir sings with a life-affirming passion that continues to garner accolades wherever it travels; our debate team has improved its ranking; and our athletes, too are hitting their stride and achieving national rankings. In short, Wiley College stands as a strong premier institution affiliated with The United Methodist Church.

In May 2011, the College embarked upon a \$24 million capital transformation project, the Haywood L. Strickland Living Learning Center, a 500-bed resident center. This was made possible by a low-cost loan through the U.S. Department of Education's Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Capital Financing Program. The Living Learning Center will provide the most up-to-date suite style living for Wiley's students, and will include classrooms, multi-use spaces, computer labs and study rooms. This transformation in the College's physical plant encompasses both renovation and expansion which includes the Fred T. Long Student Union Building, roads and pedestrian walkway improvements; all in response to escalating student enrollment. In the last five years, enrollment at the College has increased from 862 students in the 2006-2007 academic years to 1,351 students during the 2010-2011 academic year. With the completion of the building in early 2012, all students can be accommodated in campus housing.

In February of this year, Wiley College celebrated its 12th Annual Religious Emphasis Week with a slate of community worship services and activities inspired by a scripture based theme, "Transforming and Renewing of Your Mind." Speakers included nationally recognized and sought-after preacher and lecturer Reverend Michael W. Waters, who holds a Master of Divinity degree from the Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University.

The *A Cappella Choir of Wiley College* was selected out of thousands of hopeful performers to participate in a special Christmas concert for members of the White House staff, which included the First Family, President and Mrs. Barak Obama, and their two daughters.

Eighteen members of the 70-member choir were selected to participate and there performances included both classical and contemporary melodies.

The institution hosted its sixth *Ethical Student Leadership Conference*, with students from 15 colleges and institutions in attendance. The three-day event consisted of 12 sessions. A host of notable guests, including U.S. Representatives and the nephew of "Roots" author Alex Haley, State Senator David Haley who represents the Fourth District in Topeka, Kansas, served as keynote speakers. During the conference, The Melvin B. Tolson/Denzel Washington Forensics Society of Wiley College hosted an exhibition with the University of Southern California's Trojan Debate Team that was attended by more than 800 persons from throughout the country. The two schools met 77 years ago when they competed for the national championship before an audience of 1,100 people. Since both teams presented keen insights and argumentation, the judges decided that both of the teams were winners.

Four Wiley College seniors and Chaplain Michelle Hall journeyed to Maua, Kenya, to work at Maua Methodist Hospital's ZOE Ministry Orphan Empowerment Project. There they taught orphans life skills so they could care for themselves and their families. They were blessed by the generous support from The Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church and members of local churches in the amount of \$14,000 to embark upon an unparalleled seven-day mission trip.

Tracing its roots back to the early 1940's with an inter-denominational recreation ministry for young people, the Wisconsin Council of Churches (WCC) now encompasses 14 denominations with approximately 2,200 congregations and over one million church members statewide. The Council welcomed the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME) into membership this past year.

2011 Accomplishments

Equipping Leaders - The Council's signature educational event for clergy each summer is the Washington Island Forum, which in 2011 drew 255 pastors and lay leaders from 21 states representing 14 faith traditions to hear Forum Presenter Dr. Marcus Borg. His theme, *Speaking Christian*, focused on understanding traditional Christian terminology in our contemporary context. The Council also hosts regional events throughout the year on a variety of timely topics to equip clergy and lay leaders for effective ministry.

Greening our Faith and our Communities - The Council continues to focus its advocacy efforts at the state and federal levels to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The WCC has also been a partner in the creation of *Wisconsin Interfaith Power and Light*, which is affiliated with a national effort to educate congregations on how to be good stewards of the environment.

Beyond Survival: What is God's Future for the Small Church? - The Council sponsored workshops in Barneveld and Franklin to equip rural congregations for effective ministry in their local communities.

From Tolerance to Empathy - was the theme of a unique event co-sponsored with the Islamic Society of Milwaukee bringing 240 Christians and Muslims together for interfaith dialogue on the 10th anniversary of 9/11.

Looking Ahead to 2012

Washington Island Forum - Sara Miles, founder and director of The Food Pantry and Director of Ministry at St. Gregory of Nyssa Episcopal Church in San Francisco, will be addressing the theme "Being Jesus." Miles is the author of two award winning books and her writing has appeared in the New York Times Magazine. Becoming Welcoming Communities - is a new project in collaboration with *WISDOM*, the church-based community organizing program in Wisconsin, and *Voces de la Frontera*, the largest immigrant rights group in our state. This two-year project has produced a congregational study guide on the history of immigration in Wisconsin and contemporary challenges faced by new immigrants in our state. The study guide is free and available on our website at www.wichurches.org

A Season of Civility - What can the religious community do to help address the polarized political environment in Wisconsin? The Council is producing discussion resources for congregations to help create a Season of Civility during the fall elections in our state.

Approximately 220 full-and part-time employees help fulfill its mission and provide the senior adults who live at Cedar Crest with physical, social, psychological, and spiritual services that contribute to their health, independence, happiness, and security.

Nestled on scenic acres of naturally-wooded grounds adjacent to the Rock River, Cedar Crest offers a full range of living accommodations, including 106 independent-living apartments with RCAC services available, 18 town homes, 44 assisted-living suites (Community-Based Residential Facility), a 12-bed memory care residence, and 95 skilled nursing facility beds.

This friendly and supportive environment fosters camaraderie among the residents. Maintenance-free living, transportation to and from community events as well as personal appointments and shopping, underground parking, restaurant dining, and a full calendar of social events and activities add to the carefree lifestyle at Cedar Crest.

The beautiful natural surroundings of Cedar Crest offer a variety of options for activities, including gardening, bicycling, or walking along the scenic paths beside the river. The Plaza amenities area, covering more than 8,000 square feet, is the ideal location for the wide range of recreational and social opportunities offered to this group of active senior adults. The Plaza includes a multimedia room, wellness center, country store with snacks and sundries, activity room for arts and crafts, fitness center, beauty salon, business center, and solarium.

Highlights of 2011 and Plans for 2012

Construction was completed on a variety of resident and staff areas at Cedar Crest. The completed project has provided a more home-like and user-friendly living spaces for residents and highly functional work areas for staff.

Three residential-type kitchens were added to the health center. The kitchens are used as serving pantries and for light meal preparations. This allows for more flexibility and a more home-like environment for meals served to health center residents.

A new communications/computer room and two new "spa" rooms with resident-accessible whirlpool tubs, a new beauty shop and new nurses' station/workroom were also added. In addition, the entire health center received a face-lift with carpet, wallpaper, handrails, and trim being refurbished or replaced.

Behind-the-scenes, the existing main kitchen was gutted and a small addition added to accommodate walk-in coolers and freezers. The kitchen redesign and equipment update

has allowed the dietary staff to expand the menus available to residents and allow for more flexibility in meal times.

Cedar Crest continues to review its long-term capital improvement program, identifying future needs for major maintenance and replacement of existing equipment and buildings. This planning will allow the community to continue to provide for the needs of current and future residents. Cedar Crest is currently developing plans for renovations of the memory care, assisted living, and chapel and main entrance areas. More recently Cedar Crest has updated their technology in the health center to accommodate a completely electronic medical chart.

As always, Cedar Crest staff focuses time and talent on strengthening the community's financial position, working on programming that embodies resident directed services and quality of care, updating technology, and planning for the future. Staff development is continually a priority. Therefore, Cedar Crest frequently offers significant leadership and staff development programs designed to increase the quality of resident care and services, lower staff turnover, enhance productivity, and develop a greater sense of community.

Harbor House Crisis Shelters is *living, giving and loving beyond all expectation* through our mission to provide hospitable shelter, transitional living and services for homeless women and families. Our goal is to assist guests in attaining housing. Through our mission, we give others the opportunity to experience God's grace and love.

HHCS is the only one of its kind in Douglas County and serves the greater twin ports area. In 2011, HHCS provided shelter for 477 persons, providing over 6,000 shelter nights. Since opening in January 2001, we have served over 3,500 persons in seven bedrooms. Our Transitional Living Center served 90 people since 2008.

Some Highlights from 2011 are:

- We have been blessed by receiving enough donations and grants to pay for staffing, supplies, operational and programming expenses. While income is substantially lower, we continue to look for new funding streams.
- We have conducted a pilot project for "Life-Skill Training" at our Transitional Living Center which will be expanded into all programming.
- We continue with our "Children's Program" to assist children through crisis, anger, stress by providing life skill games, activities, parental hand-outs and off-site adventures.
- Hosted the seventh annual "Homeless Awareness Week," Nov. 13-19, 2011.
- We worked with Wildfire and many mission teams. We thank God and all those that have helped with projects. What a blessing!
- We have installed new flooring and carpet at the shelter sites and will complete this project with the Transitional Living Center in 2012.
- We have continue to administer the Superior Area Ministerium's SAMaritan Fund that combines community congregational money with HHCS as the administrator for the distribution of the resources, i.e. gas vouchers, utility bills, and referrals. We have helped over 300 people with resources and referrals in 2011.
- We received a "Betty Kossak Trust," which was used to pay off the mortgage at Site 2, 19 N. 21st St. East, Superior.
- We collaborate with many local and state agencies. These collaborations help secure funds, fill gaps in services, network, and develop new programming.

Goals for 2012 are:

- Provide shelter for 450 persons and transitional living for 20.
- Develop a "Jail to Transition" program.
- Network with United Methodist circuits to educate and promote HHCS.
- Develop more spiritual resources for participants in our programs.
- Continual visioning and planning for a third/fourth shelter building.

My prayer is that our continued ministry will be a blessing and be blessed.

Hillcrest Family Services celebrates 116 years advocating on behalf of youth, adults and families providing innovative services, driven by client needs and the pressing social concerns of the time.

Hillcrest was founded by Dr. Nancy Hill on February 26, 1896. Dr. Hill, concerned about young, unmarried mothers and their babies.

Today, Hillcrest Family Services works to do everything within our power to provide better outcomes for those less fortunate, in personal crisis or in family turmoil. Hillcrest programs provide an array of services to meet the emotional, physical and spiritual needs of those who enter our doors. We believe everyone should have a chance at a better tomorrow. At our core, we focus on two key areas: health and education. Hillcrest has 39 different programs providing services from birth into adulthood. Last year we served 21,563 people from 68 Iowa Counties and 27 states, including the District of Columbia.

Hillcrest launched a transformation initiative in 2008 based upon the 5 promises of America’s Promise that children and youth from birth to 21 need to build their character and competence both in the present and future. These promises and a few outcomes include:

1. Caring Adults
 - 100% of youth in our Big Brothers Big Sisters Program report good relationship with mentor
 - 80% of clients develop social networks and support at Highland Place
2. Safe Places
 - 96% of adults are free from victimization in Hillcrest’s Supported Living Program
 - 95% of Professional Health Clinic clients feel their need for privacy are met while at the clinic
3. Healthy Starts
 - Developmental milestones achieved in placement environment for 100% of infants
 - 97% of clients attend school full time in our Residential Education and Shelter Programs
4. Effective Education
 - 81% of pregnant/postpartum women achieve folic acid intake in our WIC Program
 - At our Wellness Center 85% of clients report that staff help them become knowledgeable about mental health recovery issues.
5. Opportunities to Serve
 - 100% of adults achieve opportunities to give back to others in the Adult Residential Homes Program
 - 77% of Residential Education and Shelter clients are encouraged to give back to their community

We added a sixth promise: Opportunities for a Spiritual Connection –

- Spiritual Connection plans for 100% of parents seeking adoption
- 60% of youth in our Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Program given the opportunity choose to participate in spiritual activities
- At Highland Place adults clients are given the opportunity to participate in spiritual activities and they have a 81% participation rate

At Hillcrest Family Services we realized a real need to have our chaplain's position expand from a ½ time position to a full-time position on campus. Our Chaplain Maria Wilbin explains it best through a series of stories about the lives that are positively changed through the spiritual work of the chaplain, fully embracing the Wisconsin Annual Conference Vision of "Live, Give, Love...Beyond All Expectations."

As Chaplain I have the privilege to work with angry, hurt, abused, quiet, shy children who are literally the least and the lost. Jesus said " for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.... "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." Matthew 25:35;40. Many of the children and youth that I work with have heard of Christ marginally but they have never walked with him or come to trust him. The work that the Chaplain does gives these youth the opportunity to be taken care of and visited by me. Because of generous private support, I was able to walk to the Juvenile detention Center in Dubuque, IA and offer a listening ear and prayer to a wounded child. I am able to listen as a youth tells me that there can't be a God, because if there was then her friend wouldn't have been killed in a car accident. I sit quietly with a youth who cries over and questions why her two year old nephew has brain cancer. Hearing the prayers of a youth who is struggling with faith, past decisions and the need for forgiveness, or prayers for a parent to finally stay sober, these are only a few of the ways in which lives are touched through the work of a Chaplain like me.

As I began a story called "The Ragman" with a group during our weekly vespers, there was barely the sound of breathing as I read the story of a ragman in the inner city who one by one took on the tear stained handkerchief of a grieving woman, the blood stained bonnet of a battered child, the jacket of a one armed man and finally wrapped himself in the blanket of a drunken homeless man, exchanging each for a clean new rag. As each received the new rag all their pain, grief and sorrow were taken away by the ragman. I continued to read the story that ends with the resurrection of the Ragman to a whole, healthy man who shown in the light of a new day. The story ends with these words " Well, then I lowered my head and trembling for all that I had seen, I myself walked up to the Ragman. I told him my name with shame, for I was a sorry figure next to him. Then I took off all my clothes in that place, and I said to him with dear yearning in my voice: "Dress me."

He dressed me. My Lord, he put new rags on me, and I am a wonder beside him. The Ragman, the Ragman, the Christ!

As I finished the story and asked the question, what are the rags that you need to give to the ragman/to Christ? They began to name their rags, addiction, anger, aggression, abuse and so on. As they finished I asked is there anything that Christ cannot take away and in

return give you a whole new life? They slowly shook their heads “no”. Because of the support from our ministries we are able to receive the youth to very literally give up their old selves and be made whole and clean by the Christ.

The populations we serve are youth age 15-18 who reside in our Adolescent Residential Education Program. These young men and women are dealing with emotional, intellectual, physical and mental health issues which prevent them from being served in their own school. These clients come from the Tri-state area of Dubuque which serves Iowa, Illinois and Wisconsin.

Currently, our 62 bed adolescent residential education program offers weekly bible study for each of our five houses. In the fall of 2012 our Hadley Chapel will be completed. This will be a huge benefit to the Chaplaincy Program as morning prayers can be offered to students (K-12 Special Education and last fiscal year we had 220 youth enrolled at various times in this program). The Chaplaincy Program will offer mediation groups and the ability to celebrate Christian holy days with ease because we will not have to worry about fitting into a church’s busy schedule.

At Hillcrest Family Services we believe community collaboration adds to the success of our programs. We collaborate with United Way and the City of Dubuque on our youth garden project. The produce from this garden is available for sale at the community Farmer’s Market in Dubuque. However, the most important collaboration for Hillcrest is the relationship we have with the United Methodist Ministries in both Wisconsin and Iowa and the Synod of the Lakes and Prairies of the Presbyterian Church, USA. Bishop Julius Trimble from the Iowa Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church also serves on the Hillcrest Board of Trustees.

Also as a part of this expansion our Chaplain has requested that we fund a bible for each client enrolled in the program. Through the leadership of our Chaplain, she is implementing a chimes musical experience for our youth.

The ministry at Hillcrest Family Services believes in the vision of the Wisconsin Annual Conference to “Live, Give, Love....Beyond All Expectations: Live Enthusiastically, Give Wholeheartedly and Love Unconditionally.

The year 2011 was an excellent year in service to our Lord at Morrow Home Community.

Our Home continually experiences changes, yet many of our caregivers have not changed. Our 12 person leadership team coordinates our focus of quality, Christian care. They lead our wonderful team of almost 230 caring, compassionate, and competent caregivers.

Along with our existing care services, BridgePath, our new memory care and advanced assisted living project, began admitting residents in mid-January 2011. BridgePath is the finished product of a 3-year plan to complete our building “Circle of Care”. We now

offer senior living options from Independent with Services, to Assisted Living, to Advanced Assisted Living, to Memory Care Assisted Living, to Skilled Nursing. Our Young at Heart Child Care Center offers quality child care services to community and staff members. Morrow Meals in Motion, our home delivered meal program serves almost 50 home-bound seniors each weekday. Since beginning over 3 years ago, Mary Morrow's Attic, our thrift shop ministry, has donated over \$80,000 toward unbudgeted equipment needs.

The housing component of Morrow Home continues to be a growing focus of our care. All of our housing ministries were consistently over 90% full. Parkview Apartments consists of 22 units of one and two-bedroom apartments for independent senior housing. Homestead consists of 24 one-bedroom assisted living apartments. MaryCrest is our 24 one and two bedroom assisted living housing program.

Our 110-bed skilled nursing home also had a very positive year in providing quality care. Because the need for skilled nursing is decreasing, we are researching downsizing our nursing home. We had a very good State and Federal inspection; with only minor issues. Occupancy was consistently over 90% which is still above the Wisconsin average. Medicare accounted for almost 8% of our resident days.

Financially, Medicaid reimbursement, for our residents who have exhausted private funds, still lags behind our audited costs by over \$25 per day. We hope and pray the current Wisconsin state budget crisis will not affect the most vulnerable people – the oldest and the sickest – those in nursing homes such as Morrow Memorial Home.

The Morrow Home Foundation expensed over \$30,000 in educational scholarships, supplemental care funding, and needed equipment. Again this past year our Golden Cross donations were designated toward uncompensated care. The Foundation's 2011 Christmas appeal was designated electric beds to help both our residents and staff. We are so thankful to the Foundation for its willingness to further and continue the ministries of this growing ministry.

Morrow Memorial Home remains true to our mission of quality Christian care. We continually look toward meeting the needs of our present and future residents. Thank you for your support and prayers through the Wisconsin Conference of The United Methodist Church. We thank the Lord for the blessings He showers upon our Home.

Northcott Neighborhood House has the mission of serving the Harambee neighborhood with a broad diversity of services that enhance aimed at empowering families, developing the skills of youth and families, enhancing the neighborhood with new homes, providing

a safe place and a head start for children and youth, offering job training skills, and providing referrals and resources to families in need.

Within this framework, Northcott provides Head Start to 318 families, offers after-school and summer programming to 800 youth, distributes food to 1000 older adults and families through our pantry and commodity programs, engages youth in constructing homes in the neighborhood and learning construction skills, provides GED training to eligible adults, and provides leadership to Juneteenth Day and the Annual Candlelight Vigil against Violence.

This year we have constructed 5 neighborhood homes, including two that are equipped for residents with physical disabilities. In this process, youth have been trained both in construction skills and in GED skills. We also have provided Driver Training to youth who also engage in community activities as part of the program. Our youth programs include several sports leagues that include self-development, crime avoidance, and anger management components. We participate in ongoing basketball leagues, fall football, and the summer Cal Ripken quick-ball league. Our computer lab and tutoring programs assist with school success.

In the coming year, we anticipate continuing with programs that develop the skills of youth and families, provide emergency assistance and supplemental food, and develop job training skills. In addition, we plan to continue home construction and providing leadership to community events such as Juneteenth Day. Providing a continuous presence in the community for 50 years, we have relationship with several generations of families and can be the first place to turn in times of family crisis.

PARISH NURSE MINISTRIES

Parish Nursing is a unique, specialized practice of professional nursing that focuses on the promotion of wholistic health in a faith community, such as a church, synagogue, or mosque. Parish Nursing ministers to the needs of the individual, the family and the community the church serves. The Parish Nurse serves within the context of the values, beliefs and practices of the faith community and in accord with its mission and ministry. Parish Nursing integrates education, advocacy and referrals with the gift of healing presence, which is the condition of being consciously and compassionately in the present moment with another. Healing presence affirms an individual's potential for wholeness, regardless of their life circumstances. In 2009 Parish Nurse Ministries became a part of the Health and Welfare Ministries with a goal of increasing parish nurses in local churches throughout the conference. A web page is now available under Health & Welfare Committee. An annual parish nurse luncheon is held during Annual Conference. Scholarship monies are available for nurses interested in taking the Basic Preparation Class and for parish nurses to attend workshops and seminars.

We are nestled in a beautiful wooded bowl offering residents and visitors opportunities to enjoy the outdoors. Every room has a great view.

Schmitt Woodland Hills believes in providing older persons with a continuum of quality services which recognizes and encourages their individuality in lifestyle, interest and ability. Our full and part time staff provides family-like support and care to approximately 90 residents and over 100 people in their own community home. Daily interaction with all residents enhances an already strong feeling of home and community. In addition to staff, dedicated volunteers, including area pastors, serve residents. There is an open invitation to express one's commitment to ministry through Schmitt Woodland Hills. Each gift, personal or skill shared, contributes to our Christian environment.

Schmitt Woodland Hills continues to pursue dreams that support our Mission Statement: "Schmitt Woodland Hills and its partners offer a wide range of quality services and facilities through good stewardship and with a Christian philosophy." Our commitment to our mission is affirmed through participation in the Health and Welfare Committee and our "Covenantal Relationship." A part time chaplain is an asset to all of our programs. We strive to make a "Christian Philosophy" real at Schmitt Woodland Hills.

Plans for 2012 and 2013

1. "Dreaming to Action!" SWH has acquired additional licensed beds allowing SWH to replace and expand our skilled care environment. Our Mission driven Board and staff will be designing a quality resident centered living community.
2. The vacated space will allow for the expansion of assisted living capacity. Enhancement of both assisted living and apartments will be assessed and incorporated into development plans.
3. To ensure adequate funds are available, a capital campaign will be initiated. All interested parties will be asked to financially support our ministry.

4. SWH will maintain its membership and commitment to “Quality First and Advancing Excellence”. SWH will strive to utilize “best practice(s)” in all services.
5. SWH will continue to advocate for elderly, residents, family and staff as public policy continues to develop. The uncertainty of Federal policy will affect all we serve.
6. SWH is very proud of our staff and their commitment to our Mission. Staff turnover remains below both State and national data.

United Methodist Children’s Services 2011 in Review

United Methodist Children’s Services (UMCS) is growing in size and in commitment to community. Fourteen more townhomes (for a total of 20) and ten new affordable apartment units (for a total of 34) will be fully occupied by June 2012. These units are available for families qualifying for affordable housing. Up to 14 of these families will come to us by referral from Milwaukee County Housing Division of the Department of Behavioral Health. The transitional living program continues to provide a goal based housing program with comprehensive social services for 16 single women and their children..

Since mental health conditions are often a contributing factor in poverty, UMCS has a long history of working with individuals living with mental illness. With a direct relationship with Milwaukee County Behavioral Health, UMCS has made an intentional

decision to insure that as we confront issues of poverty and homelessness we are also directly in ministry with families for whom mental illness is a major factor.

Pending funding through the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program, UMCS will partner with Hmong American Friendship Association (HAFA) to develop Senior Housing for Hmong senior adults. UMCS would serve as the developer and property manager, while HAFA would oversee day-to-day operations. The funding decision will be announced by the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority (WHEDA) in late spring.

The family resource center (frc) is located on the first floor of the Washington Park Apartment building. The newest frc venture is the Share Mobile Market. This program operates twice a month selling fresh, high quality produce, meat and other grocery items at a very reasonable price. The food pantry is open three afternoons per week. When specialized food resources are available the pantry also operates an extra day specifically for families of Asian descent. The clothing and household items program is open on Thursdays. UMCS continues to distribute United States Department of Agriculture commodities to income eligible senior citizens, post-partum women, and children in the first year after they age out of the Women Infants and Children (WIC) program. In the family resource center UMCS served over 50,000 people in 2011.

Enrollment is up in the Growing Tree Children's Center as the city and state continue to crack down on and close disreputable daycare programs in our neighborhood. The dedicated staff of teachers offer a stimulating and loving environment for babies to pre-teens.

UMCS is the convening organization for the Washington Park Partners (WPP). This sustainable neighborhood initiative adopted a comprehensive plan in 2011 and is now undertaking the important work of implementing the strategies outlined in the plan.

Financial reality

With the cuts in apportionment support over the last four years along with drops in individual donor giving during a difficult economic period our yearly revenue is down \$100,000. While it sounds noble to be doing more with less, the reality is that we have only one social worker when we critically need two. Many of the residents and neighbors with whom we are in ministry need more intense social service support that can be stretched over one social workers time. While one sympathetic supporter suggested that we might need to cut back our level of care to adjust to the current economic reality, we know that the only way to be faithful in the ministry to which we are called is to seek new revenue streams while calling upon our historic source of support, The United Methodist Church and individual United Methodists, to find creative new ways to give generously through apportionment and direct giving.

UNITED METHODIST HOSPITALS MINISTRY

What is this ministry? The United Methodist Hospitals Ministry (UMHM) provides a part time chaplain (0.5 f.t.e.) who visits United Methodists hospitalized in Madison's 3 major hospitals...Meriter, St. Mary's and University Hospitals. The focus is on those coming from beyond the immediate Madison area. This ministry is an approved **ADVANCE** of the Annual Conference and funding is solicited from congregations and individuals as well as through the Health & Welfare Committee of the Conference Board of Global Ministries.

The ministry approach is pastoral and focuses on providing spiritual care. The chaplain provides a healing presence supporting the person's faith in the midst of their health care at the hospital. This ministry fosters and encourages the connections with their pastor and home church. The chaplain communicates with the person's pastor when appropriate and becomes a ministry presence when the pastor is not able to visit because of distance or timeliness. Historically, chaplains serving in this ministry have learned that at least 50% of patients they visit register themselves as Methodists, but no longer are actively connected to a local church or its pastoral resources. The reasons for this disconnect vary greatly. In these situations, the chaplain often has the opportunity to assist persons re-establish those connections. Through conversation, encouragement and personal connections to local pastors, former parishioners have found new support and care from the church and pastor back home.

A UMHM Chaplaincy Committee of lay and clergy persons oversees the work of the chaplain, sets goals and compensation, and assists in fund raising. This ministry is regularly communicated to congregations throughout the Wisconsin Conference by the work of the chaplain and chaplaincy committee through personal appearances and contacts, informational mailing updates and at Annual Conference.

What is the history of this ministry and major accomplishments in recent years?

History: This ministry actually began sometime in the 1950's when the part time Methodist Hospital Chaplain of Madison visited Methodists in the other hospitals on behalf of the Methodist Church. In the late 1960's when the Methodist Hospital chaplain became full time position at the hospital, this ministry was picked up by pastors from two or three congregations in Madison who recognized the need to provide a visitation ministry for Methodists within the other Madison hospitals. It has evolved from parish pastors providing care, to a volunteer chaplain and finally to a paid part time chaplain early in the 1980's and became what it is today, an Annual Conference **ADVANCE** ministry program through the Health & Welfare Committee and the Board of Global Ministries. It continues to be a viable ministry today as persons hospitalized are sicker, stays are shorter and parish pastors are stretched for adequate time to visit parishioners in the distant Madison hospitals. It has provided spiritual care and comfort to many United Methodists hospitalized and has strengthened (sometimes re-established) the connections with local pastors and churches.

Recent History: The chaplaincy continues to be a very vital connection of ministry in these days of short hospital stays, transfers of patients to larger more specialized hospitals many miles from home communities. Pastors are hard pressed visit the hospital when timing is of the essence.

In 2010, the chaplain and chaplaincy committee produced an informational DVD of the UMHM and premiered it at Annual Conference. It was sent to each pastoral charge to be used as an educational and mission option for church support of the ministry.

In September, 2010 our chaplain for 16 years Rev. Fid Sailor resigned due to health concerns. The chaplaincy committee recruited and hired Rev. Jane Follmer Zekoff. Bishop Linda Lee appointed Rev. Jane Follmer Zekoff to this Extension Ministry and she began serving as the UMHM Chaplain October 15, 2010. Jane's skills and experience as a pastor, her specialized training for the chaplaincy and her relationships within the Annual Conference, allowed her to step right into this ministry bringing comfort to many as they receive their health care in Madison hospitals.

Financial Support: The challenge remains high each year to provide the funding to continue to salary this part time chaplaincy. The program is primarily dependent upon giving from churches and individuals. Some funds are also contributed to this mission **ADVANCE** from Golden Cross and BGM Funding through Conference apportionment giving.

In 2002, the United Methodist Hospitals Ministry saw the need to develop a longer term funding source to support the program into the future. An Endowment Fund, administered through the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation (WUMF), was started. Its growth has been slow without a major funding solicitation. In the fall of 2011, with the collaboration of the chaplaincy committee, retired UMHM Chaplain Rev. Fid Sailor and his family, **The Fid Fund** was established to provide additional contributions into the Endowment Fund. The Fid Fund honors the 16 years of ministry Fid gave to visiting hospitalized United Methodists, his passion for this vital ministry and desire to see it continue well into the future. Rev. Fid Sailor died on Thanksgiving Day, November 24, 2011 and The Fid Fund was a designated memorial to which one could contribute. Many did...Fid would be overjoyed!

UM Hospitals Ministry's goals are . . .

1. To visit United Methodists who live beyond the immediate Madison area and are hospitalized in Madison hospitals (Meriter, St. Mary's and University Hospitals).
2. To communicate with the patient's pastor and church when appropriate for continuity of ministry, support and appropriate follow-up when patient returns home.
3. To communicate the mission of the United Methodist Hospitals Ministry to pastors, church leaders and members throughout the Wisconsin Conference and to solicit the prayers of healing and financial support for the program.
4. To continue to develop, and inform pastors, church members and individuals of the long term program financial goals and to solicit giving through the United Methodist Hospitals Ministry's Endowment Fund administered through the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation.

5. To continue publicity of the program by communicating with clergy and congregations through the latest means available, District/Circuit and Conference information channels. A revised UMHM DVD featuring our current chaplain Rev. Jane Follmer Zekoff is being developed.

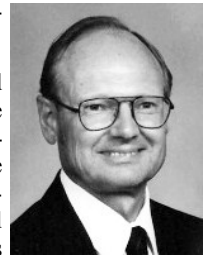

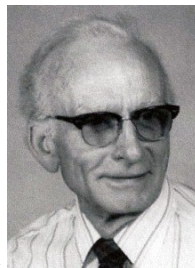
Paul was born on July 9, 1919, in Gratiot, Wisconsin, to Frederick and Blanche (Lund) Doering.

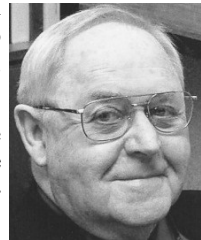

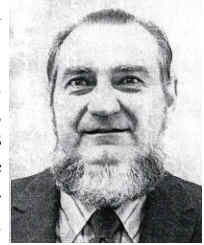

Raymond (Ray) E. Short, a retired clergy member of the Wisconsin Annual Conference, passed away on August 1, 2011.

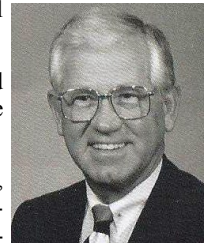

Maury Evans Hamel

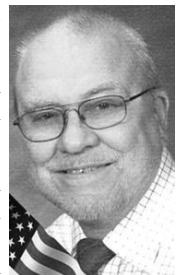
Maury Evans Hamel, a lay member of the Wisconsin Annual Conference, passed away on Monday, February 20, 2012.

1.0.0 *Descriptions*

1.1.0 **Conference Rules**

- 1.1.1 **Purpose.** Conference Rules shall describe the structure and membership of the Annual Conference agencies, and the charge to, and authority of each Conference agency.
- 1.1.2 **Amendment.** Any amendment to these Rules should be presented to the Rules Committee, where possible, so that ramifications can be considered.
- 1.1.3 **Floor Amendments.** Any proposed amendment to these Rules from the floor of the Conference must be presented to the members of the Conference at least twenty-four hours prior to the vote being taken.
- 1.1.4 **Vote Required.** Amendment of the Rules shall require a two-thirds vote of the Conference.
- 1.1.5 **Accountability.** Potential or alleged violations of the Rules shall be referred to the Rules Committee, which shall have the authority to require actions to bring bodies into compliance with the Rules. Disputes over interpretation of the Rules may be appealed to the plenary session of the annual conference.

1.2.0 Conference Policy

- 1.2.1 **Purpose.** Conference Policy consists of Conference legislative action with implied enforceability requirements, which serves as guidelines or directives to churches and agencies of the Conference.
- 1.2.2 **Amendment.** Any proposed amendment to Policies shall be presented to the Rules Committee, where possible, so that ramifications can be considered.
- 1.2.3 **Vote required.** Amendments to Policies require a majority vote of the Conference.
- 1.2.4 **Board and Agency Policies.**
 - a. Boards and agencies of the annual conference are authorized to develop and implement policies governing their work, as long as such policies do not conflict with *The Book of Discipline*, annual conference rules and policies, or government laws and regulations.
 - b. Boards and agencies shall inform the Rules Committee of any adoption or change of its policies. The rules committee has the responsibility to check for any conflict with *The Book of discipline*, annual conference rules and policies, or government laws and regulations. The rules committee shall advise the board / agency of any conflict of any such adopted or changed policy and require actions to bring policies into compliance.
 - c. Board and agency policies shall be posted at one location on the annual conference web site as soon as practicable after adoption or change.

1.3.0 Definitions

- 1.3.1 **Conference.** Where the term “Conference” is used without a further definition or other reference, it shall refer to the Wisconsin Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.
- 1.3.2 **Recommendation.** A statement addressed to the Conference, which needs to be voted on by the Conference.
- 1.3.3 **Resolution.** A formal statement of the opinion or will of the Conference which is to be voted upon by the Conference. A resolution may also be a formal statement of the opinion or will of the General Conference (§510.2). The annual conference may adopt a recommended resolution that is then forwarded to the General Conference for its consideration.
- 1.3.4 **Petition.** A formal request for action by the General Conference, according to ¶507 of *The Discipline*.
- 1.3.5 **Agency.** Shall mean any organization acting as an agent of the Conference: council, board, commissions, committee, and task force.
- 1.3.6 **Board.** An entity authorized to function on behalf of the Conference to offer governance and policy-making for the work of the Conference and relevant departments/agencies of the Conference, fiduciary (asset) management and oversight, and generative development (promoting the mission and vision of the Conference in new/different ways). Members of each board are elected by the Conference.
- 1.3.7 **Council.** A decision-making body formed to develop plans and strategies to be carried out throughout the Conference. Councils do the “big picture” thinking for the Conference, including critical analysis of costs/benefits,

implications both positive and negative in the short- and long-term, and areas for development and improvement.

1.3.8 **Committee.** Group assembled to organize and implement specific areas of focus, and give oversight to individual pieces of the Conference's work. Committees are given both responsibility AND authority to carry out work on behalf of the Conference and can function long-term or project-by-project. Committees can be free-standing or organized as sub-units of other agencies.

1.3.9 **Commission.** A group authorized to perform specific duties on behalf of the Conference – generally record-keeping, governance, book-keeping (archiving), documenting, monitoring, etc. Commissions tend to be established for the long term to attend to important but not urgent work.

1.3.10 **Task Force.** A group designed for a specific purpose to do work outside the normal parameters of the Conference structure. Usually of short-term duration, task forces are given responsibility, but authority to act generally rests with the parent organization.1.3.11 **Team.** A small number of people with complementary skills who are committed to a common purpose, performance goals, and approach, for which they hold themselves mutually accountable. Teams are formed to perform specific tasks and fulfill certain objectives, usually given full authority to do whatever is necessary to perform effectively. Teams tend to function most effectively on projects, where there is a distinct beginning, middle and end.

1.3.12 **Ex-officio members.** Member of an agency by virtue of holding another position, and shall have the right to vote.

1.3.13 **Advisory members.** Shall not have the right to vote.

1.4.0 The Book of Discipline

1.4.1 References in the Rules and Policies are to the *2008 Book of Discipline*.

1.4.2 Since it is the intent of the Rules and Policies to be supplementary to *The Discipline*, no provisions of *The Discipline* are included in the Rules and Policies.

2.0.0 Annual Conference

2.1.0 Membership.

In addition to those persons named in *The Constitution* (§32), the following persons shall be members of the Conference to attain lay equalization:

2.1.1 An Associate Conference Lay Leader, nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee, shall be named.

2.1.2 Lay chairpersons of all agencies directly amenable to the Annual Conference.

2.1.3 General Conference Lay Delegates.

2.1.4 Lay members of General Boards and Agencies

2.1.5 One additional ethnic minority lay member elected by each congregation or mission with an ethnic minority membership in excess of 50% to increase ethnic minority representation in the Conference membership

2.1.6 District directors of Lay Servant Ministry and Dean of Faith Alive

- 2.1.7 Lay directors, coordinators, Conference Treasurer, and Conference benefits officer employed on the annual conference staff who satisfy Disciplinary requirements for Annual Conference membership.
- 2.1.8 Up to 16 additional youth members between 12 and 17 years of age to be chosen by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries in a manner determined by the Office of Ministry and Outreach, with a goal of geographic, ethnic, and gender diversity. Up to three chaperones will be allowed to sit in the bar of the Conference without voice or vote.
- 2.1.9 Two additional young adult members age 18-30 from each district, to be chosen in a manner determined by each district.
- 2.1.10 Additional lay members elected by pastoral charges as needed to attain lay equalization according to the following formula:
- Multi-point charges, provided the member shall be elected from a church not having representation, beginning with the largest combined membership charge.
 - Single point charges, beginning with the largest.
 - Item 2.1.10a and item 2.1.10b above shall be applied in alternating fashion as lay equalization is calculated, continuing until equalization is achieved.
 - No charge shall elect more than two additional lay members because of the application of rule 2.1.10.
- 2.2.0 Membership Tenure**
- 2.2.1 The number of lay and clergy members of the Conference shall be established once every four years for the next quadrennium except as provided in *The Discipline*.
- 2.2.2 The Conference Secretary shall certify to the Bishop the number of lay members of the annual conference for the following quadrennium by September 1 following the regular session of the General Conference.
- 2.2.3 The Conference Secretary shall also communicate to each charge the number of lay members to be elected by that charge for the following quadrennium by September 1 following the regular session of the General Conference.
- 2.2.4 Lay members shall be elected by the local charge for a four-year term to begin service January 1 following the regular session of the General Conference.
- 2.2.5 All members (lay and clergy) of annual conference are expected to attend its sessions (§602.8)
- 2.3.0 Meetings**
- 2.3.1 A member of the Conference has the right to attend and speak at any meeting of any agency of the Conference except for closed sessions as specified in *The Discipline*.
- 2.3.2 The Workbook and the Conference *Yearbook and Journal* are official publications of the Annual Conference. Pre-Conference materials, whether distributed electronically, posted on the Conference web site, or printed in the Annual Conference Workbook or members' information packet, are not to be used for publication, press or news releases.
- 2.3.3 Proposed agenda, arrangements and procedures for the session of the Annual Conference shall be prepared by the Program and Arrangements

Committee, subject to the approval of the Bishop and cabinet. The proposed agenda and consent agenda (routine items acted upon annually) and procedures shall be presented for adoption at the opening plenary of the Annual Conference. Once the proposed consent agenda has been placed before the Annual Conference, opportunity will be given at that time to remove items from the proposed consent agenda. Removal of an item from the proposed consent agenda shall require at least 100 votes. Any items removed from the proposed consent agenda shall be placed on the regular agenda for consideration by the Conference during a later plenary session. The Annual Conference will then vote on the items remaining on the proposed consent agenda during the opening plenary session. The Agenda Committee, through its chairperson, in consultation with the Bishop, is authorized to make adjustments and changes in the agenda, with the approval of the Annual Conference.

- 2.3.4 All resolutions and petitions to be considered at an Annual Conference session must be submitted no later than ten (10) days before the opening of Annual Conference.
- 2.3.5 Except as provided otherwise in these Rules, *Robert's Rules of Order* shall govern all parliamentary procedures.
- 2.3.6 In order to save time of the Annual Conference, no report shall be read to the house without first securing the consent of the Annual Conference. The presentation of reports shall highlight matters relating to policy and recommendations for action.
- 2.3.7 All substantive motions are to be presented to the Conference Secretary in writing before the motion can be amended and action can be taken by the house.
- 2.3.8 There shall be with any proposal not included in pre-Conference materials a clearly stated rationale for the establishment of any new group or program which shall include:
- a. assurance that no other body is presently responsible for that task or concern;
 - b. a time line including starting and ending dates;
 - c. anticipated expenses for the period of time the group or program will exist, as well as identification of the intended funding source.
- 2.3.9 Members and non-members of the Annual Conference will have the following rights to the Annual Conference floor.
- a. Members: without consent of the Annual Conference, no person shall speak longer than three (3) minutes, nor more than once on any motion, except to answer questions. Whenever possible, a speaker on one side of an issue shall be followed by a speaker on the other side of the issue being debated by the Annual Conference.
 - b. Non-members may speak only with consent of the Annual Conference; however, a professional employee of the Conference or a Conference agency or the chairperson of a Conference agency (who is not a member of the Annual Conference) shall be entitled to the floor of Annual Conference not only for presenting a report, but shall also have the right

to speak to it. A lay chairperson of the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation shall be entitled to the floor to report and to speak to the Annual Conference. These persons shall be bound by the same rules and limitations applicable to Annual Conference members.

2.4.0 Organization of Conference Agencies.

2.4.1 Each Conference agency shall organize itself, consistent with the Book of Discipline and Conference rules and policies (see also Rule 4.2.0). Each Conference agency shall elect its officers at its first meeting after July 1 in the year in which the regular session of the General Conference is held, using its own procedures. Care shall be taken to provide for the inclusion of lay/clergy, male/female, and racial/ethnic diversity in electing leadership.

2.4.2 Non-Agency Members. Each agency shall have the opportunity to include non-agency members in any standing committees and/or task forces.

2.5.0 The Conference Year.

The Conference year shall begin on January 1 and end on December 31.

3.0.0 Nominations

3.1.0 Nominations Committee (§610)

3.1.1 **Membership.** There shall be a Nominations Committee of no fewer than 14 and no more than 22 members, consisting of the following:

- a. One clergy and/or one lay person from each District
- b. One staff person nominated by the Director of Connectional Ministries
- c. One District Superintendent named by the Cabinet
- d. The Conference Lay Leader
- e. Recording Secretary
- f. One youth elected by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries (age 12-17)
- g. One young adult (age 18-30)

3.1.2 The membership of the Nominations Committee shall be balanced between clergy and laity as close to 50-50% as possible and will work to ensure racial, ethnic, age and gender inclusiveness.

3.1.3 **Purpose.** The Conference Nominations Committee shall be the nominating agency for all of the Conference agencies whose nomination is not prescribed elsewhere in *The Discipline*, or specifically prescribed for in the Rules.

3.1.4 **Procedure.** The Conference Nominations Committee will work with all Conference agencies to find appropriate and effective leadership. Whenever possible, the chairperson of the agency, or a designated representative should make contact with all potential nominees to ensure that they possess the necessary knowledge, skills, experience and/or abilities to serve effectively.

3.2.0 Guidelines for Nominations

3.2.1 **Size.** The membership of the agencies of the Conference shall be kept as near as possible to the minimum number required by *The Discipline*.

3.2.2 **Eligibility.** Lay members of Conference agencies must be professing members of The United Methodist Church, except when the Conference Rules or *The Book of Discipline* provide for ecumenical representation. Baptized members 18 years of age and under are eligible to serve on

Conference agencies. *The Book of Discipline* establishes eligibility provisions for clergy and local pastors serving on Conference agencies.

- 3.2.3 **Tenure.** Nominations not otherwise specified shall be for the current quadrennium. All Conference nominating agencies shall limit the term for members to two consecutive quadrenniums. The lay leader shall also be limited to two consecutive terms.
- a. Ex-Officio Exception – One quadrennium served in an ex-officio relationship shall not count toward tenure.
 - b. Partial terms. Service of two or more years in filling an unexpired term or vacated position shall be considered as a full quadrennial term.
 - c. Reinstatement period. A person who is no longer eligible by reason of tenure to serve an agency may be considered for nomination and election after four years have elapsed.
- 3.2.4 **Term of Office.** Terms for members of Conference agencies begin on July 1 following election. Officers from the previous quadrennium continue until replaced.
- 3.2.5 **Limit on Service on Multiple Agencies.** A clergy or lay person shall accept nomination and election to no more than two of the following Conference agencies regardless of who nominates them:
- a. Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries
 - b. Board of Church and Society
 - c. Board of Congregation and Circuit Development
 - d. Discipleship Leadership Council
 - e. Board of Global Ministries
 - f. Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry
- A clergy or lay person shall accept nomination and election to no more than one of the following, and shall serve on no other Conference boards and agencies, except as an ex-officio member.
- g. Board of Ordained Ministry
 - h. Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance and Equitable Compensation
 - i. Board of Trustees
 - j. Council on Finance and Administration
- 3.2.6 **Ex-Officio Exception.** A person may be an ex-officio member of more than one agency listed in 3.2.5 by virtue of an office held or as a representative of one agency to another.
- 3.2.7 **Inactive Members.** Elected members are expected to fully participate in the work of their agency for the full quadrennium. A member will be considered “inactive” if they miss 25% or more of the scheduled meetings of the agency. Once a member misses 50% of the agency’s meetings in a given Conference year, the Nominations Committee in collaboration with the agency will replace the “inactive” member for the remainder of the quadrennium. Agency chairs may make exceptions for extenuating circumstances.
- 3.2.8 **Retired Clergy.** A retired clergy person is eligible to serve on any Conference agency (or position) unless prohibited by *The Discipline*.

- 3.2.9 **General Agency Staff and Members.** Any person of the Conference who is employed on the staff of any General Agency or is a member of any General Agency shall be an Advisory member of the corresponding Conference agency except when *The Discipline* provides otherwise.
- 3.2.10 **Maximum Replacement.** So far as it is possible, no more than one-half of the membership of any agency shall be replaced in any given election.
- 3.3.0 Membership Stipulations**
- 3.3.1 **Lay Leaders**
- a. **Conference Lay Leader (§603.9a, 607).** Upon nomination by the Bishop and Cabinet (including all persons who normally meet with the superintendents in non-appointive Cabinet session), the annual conference shall elect a Conference Lay Leader to a four-year term beginning July 1 after the regular session of the General Conference. The Conference Lay Leader shall be limited to two four-year terms.
- b. **Conference Associate Lay Leader (§631.3).** Upon nomination by the Bishop and Cabinet (including all persons who normally meet with the superintendents in non-appointive Cabinet session and the Conference Lay Leader), the annual conference shall elect a Conference Associate Lay Leader to a four-year term beginning July 1 after the regular session of the General Conference. The Conference Associate Lay Leader shall be limited to two four-year terms in that office. The Associate Lay Leader shall assist the Conference Lay Leader in the fulfillment of the prescribed duties and may be designated by the Lay Leader to represent the Lay Leader as a member of Conference boards and agencies of which the Lay Leader is a member.
- c. **District Lay Leaders (§659).** Upon nomination by the appropriate District Superintendent, the annual conference shall elect a District Lay Leader for each district to a four-year term beginning July 1 after the regular session of the General Conference. The District Lay Leaders shall be limited to two four-year terms.
- 3.3.2 **Program Boards. (§609.2)** Membership of the program boards shall be determined as follows:
- a. **Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries (§630.1c):** Sixteen members, including four at large and one secretary nominated by the Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries and eleven nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee to include the chair of the BCRM Personnel Committee, the chair of the Camping Committee, the chair of the Facilities Committee, the chair of the Fundraising Committee, the Sites Retreat Promoter, the BCRM communications officer, and five at-large members including at least one youth, and one young adult, working to ensure clergy, laity, racial, ethnic, age, and gender inclusiveness. Camp Leadership Team members (such as Camps Administrator, Pine Lake Camp Manager, and Program Director) and Camping and Retreat Ministries Coordinator shall serve as Advisory members.
- b. **Board of Church and Society (§629):** Members shall include six members-at-large to be selected by the Board; six members nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee; representative of the Conference United Methodist Women (as specified by *The Discipline*);

- one youth; one young adult; one member from the Board of Global Ministries. Advisory members may include the Director of Connectional Ministries and the Director of Communications, a representative of the Wisconsin Council of Churches, and a representative from the Commission on Religion and Race. The Board of Church and Society will elect from within a Peace & Justice Coordinator and a representative to the Wisconsin Council of Churches.
- c. **Board of Congregation and Circuit Development:** Members shall include one member selected by each ethnic caucus; eight members named by the Board with experience in missional and developing congregations, re-visioning congregations and regional ministries; eight at-large nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee. Advisory: one District Superintendent, and the Coordinator of Congregation and Circuit Development.
 - d. **Discipleship Leadership Executive Team:** Members shall include the Director of Connectional Ministries, Director of Communications, Conference Lay Leader, Representative of the Appointive Cabinet, six sub-team co-chairs – two each, one laity, one clergy for Spiritual Formation and Leadership Development, Worship and Witness, and Outreach and Service (nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee); one youth (12-17), and one young adult (18-30). The Executive Team shall elect its own officers from within the Executive Team. The Discipleship Leadership Executive Team shall relate to all Conference boards and agencies to help coordinate and plan program ministries for the Wisconsin Annual Conference.
 - e. **The Discipleship Leadership Council (DLC)** shall serve the function of Conference Council on Ministries or Connectional Table. All Conference program boards and agencies shall designate representatives to the DLC, and at-large members may be added to include members of racial and ethnic constituencies not otherwise present. The DLC shall include the members of the Discipleship Leadership Executive Team and be chaired by the Executive Team chairperson. Representatives of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, Joint Board of Pensions and Health Benefits, and Trustees shall participate as members of the plenary DLC, while not serving as members of the sub-teams. The three main bodies of the DLC are Spiritual Formation and Leadership Development, Worship and Witness, and Outreach and Service.

 - Spiritual Formation Team

Advisory: One Staff Liaison

- f. **Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry (§634):** Four at-large members nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee, four at-large members selected by the Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry, two representatives from Ministries to Students in Secondary Education (biennial rotation), two students involved in campus ministry, one member named by United Methodist Women and one named by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries. Advisory members shall be named by The Crossing (U.W. Madison), North Central College, Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, the Director of Connectional Ministries, the Conference Board of Trustees, Board of Lay Ministry, and Board of Ordained Ministry.
- g. **Board of Global Ministries (§633):** one representative from each district; the Conference Secretary of Global Ministries; two members at-large nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee; the Missions Coordinator for Education and Interpretation named by the Conference UMW; eight members selected by the Board of Global

Ministries to chair the following committees: Health and Welfare, Mission Motivation, Mission Personnel, Community Ministry, Disaster Preparedness, Conference Partnership, National Volunteers in Mission, International Volunteers in Mission; four members at-large selected by the Board; and two youth named by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries. Advisory: representative of Program Staff.

- 3.3.3 **Implications Committee (§610.2).** During the opening business of an Annual Conference, an Ad Hoc Committee composed of seven shall be designated as the Implications Committee for that session. The seven are to be the Chair or designate of: the Cabinet, Council on Finance and Administration, and Discipleship Leadership Council; the Conference Lay Leader; one United Methodist youth; and two members at large (one lay and one clergy). The Conference Treasurer shall serve as an advisory member. The Bishop will select the youth and members at large, with their selection to be ratified by the Annual Conference. The Bishop will designate the chairperson of the committee.

The purpose of the Implications Committee is to review any proposal made during the session of the Annual Conference that would change the budget by \$10,000 or more, and to report back to the session the implications of the enactment of said proposal.

The Implications Committee will provide a written summary of its conclusions to the author/mover of the proposal prior to reporting to the Annual Conference. The author/mover will be given an opportunity to respond following the report of the Implications Committee to the Annual Conference.

- 3.3.4 **Commission on Archives and History (§641).** Membership shall consist of:
- a. One representative from each District
 - b. Up to four persons at-large, elected for their expertise, nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee in consultation with the Commission on Archives and History.
 - c. The following as ex-officio members:
 1. Conference Treasurer
 2. Conference Historian
 3. Conference Archivist and Historical Librarian
 4. Conference United Methodist Women's Historian
 5. Cabinet Representative
 6. Director of Connectional Ministries or designated representative
 7. President of the Conference Historical Society
 8. Pastor of Greenfield Memorial United Methodist Church

- 3.3.5 **Commission on Christian Unity and Inter-Religious Concerns (§642)** Membership of the Commission on Christian Unity and Inter-Religious concerns shall include:
- a. Three persons appointed by the Bishop to represent the Wisconsin Annual Conference on ecumenical bodies.
 - b. Three persons appointed by the Bishop to represent the Wisconsin Annual Conference on inter-religious bodies.

- c. Up to four Wisconsin United Methodist members at large chosen for their interest/expertise in ecumenical relationships.
- d. Up to four Wisconsin United Methodist members-at-large chosen for their interest/expertise in inter-religious relationships.
- e. One Wisconsin United Methodist lay or clergy member who is involved in an ecumenical shared ministry.
- f. One person who is a participant in ecumenical youth ministry, nominated by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries.
- g. Up to four additional persons representing other judicatories with whom the Wisconsin Annual Conference is involved in dialogue, to assure broader ecumenical perspective.
- h. The Executive Director of the Wisconsin Council of Churches, or designate (Advisory).
- i. The Bishop, as chief ecumenical officer, or designate.
- j. Other ex-officio members as required in ¶642.2 of *The Book of Discipline*.

3.3.6 **Commission on Religion and Race** (¶643). Membership shall consist of twenty-three members including one member from each district, the chair or designate of each Ethnic Caucus, a member of the Executive Committee of the Conference United Methodist Women, a representative of the Conference Board of Global Ministries and seven at-large members nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee, including three specifically selected with expertise in and commitment to the Cross-Cultural Ministry work of the Commission.

3.3.7 **Commission on Status and Role of Women** (¶644) Membership shall consist of twelve persons, at least two of whom shall be under thirty years of age, and two shall be ethnic minorities;

- a. Three clergy women
- b. Two clergy men
- c. Three lay women
- d. Two lay men
- e. One persons named by the Conference United Methodist Women
- f. One youth named by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries
- g. The Director of Connectional Ministries or designated representative will serve ex officio.

3.3.8 **Board of Trustees** (¶640, 2512) At each Annual Conference a slate of trustees equal in number to the pending vacancies shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee to replace the class whose terms expire.

Vacancies will be filled according to ¶2512.2 of the *Book of Discipline*.

There shall be four classes of three members each, serving four-year terms. Though terms may overlap Conference quadrennia, the eight year (two-term) limit still applies.

The names of the nominees will be submitted to the cabinet for advisement.

3.3.9 **Program and Arrangements Committee** (¶610.2)

- a. The Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate one member of the Conference from each of the four regions: Capital/Coulee, Chippewa/Heartland, Metro North/South, and Nicolet/Winnebago.

There shall be one youth representative from the Conference Council on Youth Ministries.

There shall be twelve members-at-large selected by the Program and Arrangements committee who shall have responsibility for the following areas:

- Hospitality
- Worship
- Displays/Exhibits
- Childcare
- Emergency Medical Technicians
- Special Meals
- Agenda
- Registrar
- Local Arrangements
- Technology
- Awards/Recognitions
- Pre-Conference Briefings

The ex-officio members of the Committee shall be:

- The Bishop
- Director of Connectional Ministries
- Director of Communications
- Conference Youth Coordinator (elected by CCYM)
- Conference Lay Leader
- Conference Secretary

Advisory: Conference Center Service Department Manager.

- b. Proposed agenda, consent agenda, arrangements and procedures for the session of the Annual Conference shall be prepared by the Program and Arrangements Committee subject to the approval of the bishop and cabinet. The proposed agenda, consent agenda, and procedures shall be presented for consideration at the opening session of the Annual Conference.

The Agenda Committee, through its chairperson, in consultation with the bishop, is authorized to make adjustments and changes in the agenda, and to arrange for those changes with the appropriate chairperson or speakers during the sessions of the Annual Conference.

- c. The Program and Arrangements Committee shall provide all clergy and lay members of the Annual Conference, local church Administrative Board/Church Council chairpersons, and chairpersons of Annual Conference agencies with procedures for the preparation and submission of resolutions to Annual Conference.

3.3.10 **Rules Committee** (§610.2)

- a. The Rules Committee shall be composed of nine members at large.
- b. The Committee shall review and process all proposals for changes in Conference rules and forward such proposals to the Annual Conference for action.

- c. All changes enacted by the Annual Conference shall be codified by the Rules Committee for publication in the Yearbook and Journal, as well as online.

3.3.11 **Board of Ordained Ministry (§635)**

The Board of Ordained Ministry shall consist of thirty-five members, constituted in compliance with the current *Discipline*.

3.3.12 **Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance and Equitable Compensation (§610.2, 625, 639)**

- a. The Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance, and Equitable Compensation shall consist of six lay members and six clergy, of which at least one lay and one clergy persons shall be from churches under 200 members. The members shall be elected for the quadrennium. One member of the Appointive Cabinet named by that group shall also be a member.
- b. It shall administer Conference-supplemented pastors' salaries except for new church starts, mission congregations, and developing congregations, which shall be the responsibility of the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development.

3.3.13 **Committee on Petitions**

- a. The Committee on Petitions shall consist of seven to ten members, balancing lay and clergy as closely as possible, with at least one member of the previous General Conference delegation or a reserve.
- b. It shall be the function of this committee to provide all clergy and lay members of the Annual Conference, local church Administrative Board/Council chairpersons, and chairpersons of Annual Conference agencies with procedures for the preparation and submission of petitions for General Conference as to subject matter; evaluate each petition for form, content, and implications and report them to the Annual Conference.
- c. The committee shall provide educational information on issue identification and the petitioning process at the annual conference session two years prior to General Conference.

3.3.14 **Board of Lay Ministry (§631)** There shall be a Conference Board of Lay Ministry whose purpose is to foster an awareness of the laity's role in achieving the mission of the church, and enable and support lay participation in the planning and decision-making processes in the local church, circuits, district and Conference. The Board of Lay Ministry relates to the Discipleship Leadership Executive Team and cooperates in a mutual ministry vision with pastors, district superintendents and the Bishop. The Board of Lay Ministry shall consist of the following members:

- Conference Lay Leader (who shall be chairperson)
- Associate Conference Lay Leader
- District Lay Leaders
- Conference Director of Lay Servant Ministries
- District Directors of Lay Servant Ministries
- Immediate past Conference Lay Leader
- Conference President of United Methodist Women
- Conference President of United Methodist Men
- Conference Council on Youth Ministries Representative
- Young Adult Representative

Dean of Faith Alive

Associate Dean of Faith Alive

- 3.3.15 **Moving Director** There shall be a Conference Moving Director named by the Cabinet. The Moving Director shall appoint assistants as deemed necessary.
- 3.3.16 **UM Center Committee** (§610.2) The Committee to oversee the UM Center shall consist of three Trustees named by the Conference Board of Trustees, one of whom shall be chairperson; the Director of Connectional Ministries; and the Bishop or a representative named by the Bishop. The Building Manager and Conference Treasurer or designee shall be Advisory to it.
- 3.3.17 **Conference Personnel Committee** The Conference Personnel Committee shall be responsible for establishing and implementing policies and procedures, salary scales and criteria for all Conference staff positions. The Committee shall oversee personnel searches for all Conference staff positions other than District Superintendents and Assistant to the Bishop, work in consultation with appropriate program and administrative groups during the search process, and provide general oversight and coordination for those positions.

In the case of a vacancy in the position of Conference Treasurer, the Chair of the Council on Finance and Administration (CF&A) will join the Conference Personnel Committee as a voting member for the duration of the search, and a recommendation for a new Treasurer will be made to the CF&A for nomination to and subsequent election by the Annual Conference.

The Conference Personnel Committee shall consist of the following ten persons. All except the Bishop will serve in three classes with four-year terms per class, and shall serve no more than two (2) consecutive four-year terms: six nominated by the Conference Nominations Committee, three designated by the Bishop, and the Bishop (ex officio)

- 3.3.18 **Conference Communications Committee** (§610.2): The Conference Nominations Committee shall nominate up to nine members, including one member of the Conference from each of the four regions and including members nominated for their particular expertise in areas of communications, such as print media, electronic media and telecommunications. Ex-officio: Conference Secretary. Advisory: Director of Communications.
- 3.3.19 **Conference Council on Youth Ministries** (§649). The Conference Council on Youth Ministries (CCYM) shall consist of up to 24 youth members and adult advisors nominated by and from local church youth groups in each district through the Conference Nominations Committee, with attention being placed on gifts and graces for leadership on the Conference level as well as efforts being made to ensure diversity (geographically, age, gender & ethnicity) on the council. No more than two (2) CCYM members may come from a single church or charge. The youth Convo Design Team leaders shall be ex-officio members of CCYM. Adult advisors, adult Convo Design Team advisors, and the Conference Youth Coordinator shall serve as advisory members of CCYM. One-fourth (1/4) of the membership of the council shall be adults, one of whom may be the Conference lay leader or

his/her representative. The CCYM shall attempt to adhere to the disciplinary recommendation to compose the council of 50 percent racial and ethnic members. The CCYM shall establish a working structure that represents all eight districts of the Wisconsin Annual Conference, and shall nominate a Conference Youth Coordinator each year. The Conference Youth Coordinator may serve up to two full quadrennial terms (eight years).

3.3.20 **Ethnic Local Church Concerns Committee (§632)** The Ethnic Local Church Concerns Committee may consist of one representative each from the Cabinet, United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, Conference Council on Youth Ministries, Commission on the Status and Role of Women, Board of Congregation and Circuit Development, Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry, Board of Church and Society and the Commission on Religion and Race. Each of the following caucuses shall name two representatives: Asian, Korean, Hmong, Hispanic/Latino, Native American, and Black United Methodists for Church Renewal. The Committee shall select seven at-large members representing ethnic local churches in consultation with the Conference Nominations Committee. Advisory: the Conference Shalom Zone coordinator. Ex officio: the Coordinator of Congregation and Circuit Development or designate.

3.3.21 **Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministry**

- a. The Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministry may consist of one representative each from the Cabinet, Board of Congregation and Circuit Development, Board of Global Ministries, and Board of Ordained Ministry. Each of the following caucuses shall name a representative: African American, Asian American, Hmong, Korean, Hispanic/Latino, and Native American. The Committee shall select five representatives from local Hispanic/Latino Ministries, one representative from each Region of the Conference, and in consultation with the Conference Nominations Committee shall nominate three at-large members. A conference staff liaison will be an advisory member.
- b. It shall be the function of this committee to implement the National Plan for Hispanic/Latino Ministries in the conference.

3.3.22 **Conference Council on Finance and Administration (§611-619).** The Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall be composed of eleven (11) voting members, with at least one layperson more than clergy included on the council, and including at least two lay young adults (age 18-30). The following shall serve without vote: the Conference Treasurer, the Bishop, one district superintendent named by the Cabinet, the Director of Connectional Ministries, the Director of Communications, the Director of the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation and the Conference Benefits Officer. Any person of the Conference employed on the staff of the General Council on Finance and Administration shall be an advisory member. Any member of the General Council on Finance and Administration residing within the bounds of the Conference shall serve ex-officio.

4.0.0 *Program Boards*

4.1.0 **The Six Conference Program Boards:**

Discipleship Leadership Council, Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries, Board of Global Ministries, Board of Church and Society, Board of

Congregation and Circuit Development, and Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry shall be formed and function according to the following provisions.

4.2.0 Organization:

4.2.1 **Membership.** Each board shall elect a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary, and such other officers as it shall determine.

4.2.2 **Organization.** Each board shall determine its own internal organization with reference to standing committees and task forces, subject to the requirements of the Discipline (§610). Chairpersons of standing committees and task forces of the program boards shall be selected from the membership of the boards.

4.2.3 **Executive Committee:**

- a. Shall include the officers of the board, the chairpersons of the standing committees, the Program Staff representative to the board, and such other persons as shall be determined by the board.
- b. Shall have responsibility and authority (subject to later approval of the board) for coordination, assignment of responsibilities, and creation of task forces (but not of standing committees) in response to needs and requests from districts, circuits, and local churches.

4.3.0 Meetings:

4.3.1. Each board shall meet at least twice annually and more as it deems necessary, as well as sending representatives to meet with the Discipleship Leadership Council twice a year for coordination, planning, budgetary discussions, and leadership development.

4.3.2. The Executive Committee of each board shall meet as needed.

4.3.3. A special meeting of a board, its executive committee, or any of its organizational units may be called by the bishop, its chairperson, or one-third of its members.

4.3.4. At the beginning of each quadrennium, staff members of the Ministry and Outreach Team shall provide board orientation, with a comprehensive understanding of the role and function of a board and the relation of each Conference board with the General Boards and Agencies of The United Methodist Church.

4.4.0 Responsibilities:

4.4.1. To determine its goals and priorities and to evaluate its work in light of goals and priorities adopted by the Conference, in coordination with the Discipleship Leadership Council.

4.4.2. To develop, plan, and implement, in cooperation with the Discipleship Leadership Council, programs in response to and on the basis of needs and requests of the districts, circuits, and local churches.

- a. Local churches or any person may communicate directly with a board.
- b. The boards may seek information for their work from any source.
- c. The boards may communicate and promote the need for a program emphasis to the Discipleship Leadership Council; but, in such cases, the boards shall develop and implement such program activities in

collaboration and cooperation with the other boards and agencies of the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

- 4.4.3. To fulfill the responsibilities outlined by *The Discipline* or assigned to it by Conference.
- 4.4.4. To be the connecting link between the Conference and the corresponding agencies of the General Conference. By sub-division of its responsibilities, to accept the administrative responsibilities of its work, except as is otherwise provided in these Rules.
- 4.4.5. To develop and implement policies governing the work of that board. Such policies will have the force of the Annual Conference policies after review by the Conference Rules Committee for consistency with other Conference policies, the Discipline, and state and federal laws.

10.0.0 *Finance Policies*

10.1.0 **Apportionment Formula**

10.1.1 The apportionment of the Conference Budget to the local churches shall be determined by a formula based on one-third professing membership and two-thirds local expenses.

Local church expenses are defined as all pastor's salaries and travel, utilities, current expenses and local church program expenses.

10.1.2 Each church will be discounted 25 members before this formula is computed.

10.1.3 Newly chartered congregations shall be apportioned beginning on January 1 following chartering.

10.2.0 **Travel and Per-diem Reimbursement**

10.2.1 Reimbursement at the current rate for miles driven in service of charitable organizations established by the United States Congress shall be paid for authorized travel to all members of Conference agencies, said mileage reimbursement to be paid to drivers only.

10.2.2 Mileage reimbursement for employees of the Conference shall be at the standard business mileage rate established by the Internal Revenue Service.

10.2.3 Local churches shall pay their pastor(s) a vouchered travel expense for all local parish ministry, with mileage reimbursed at the current IRS business mileage rate.

10.3.0 **General Conference Apportionments**

The Conference Treasurer shall pay General Conference Apportionments in twelve monthly installments of equal amount on or about the last day of the

month. *[By action of the 2012 Annual Conference, Policy 10.3.0 is suspended throughout the 2013 – 2016 Quadrennium.]*

10.4.0 Conference Budget

- 10.4.1 The Conference budget, presented to the Conference by the Council on Finance and Administration, shall not increase over the previous year's budget in any given year more than the percentage increase in the Conference total of local church expenses for the previous year (i.e. the most recent previous year for which complete figures are available).
- 10.4.2 The budget shall be presented in line items and graphic form and shall be distributed with pre-Conference materials.
- 10.4.3 The budget shall indicate the percent of the total budget represented by each of the five major expense categories.
- 10.4.4 Should the Council on Finance and Administration determine that receipts will be inadequate to meet emerging needs or unforeseen circumstances (§612.7), the Council will consult with agencies receiving budgeted funds before adjusting payment appropriations or schedules. Adjustments that are made will be reported to the next session of the annual conference for ratification.

10.5.0 Line of Credit

- 10.5.1 The Council on Finance and Administration is authorized to borrow up to a cumulative total of \$500,000 to pay current budget expense.
- 10.5.2 Determination of the schedule of borrowing will be made by the Conference Treasurer, as authorized by the Council on Finance and Administration.
- 10.5.3 The Council shall report annually on the maximum amount borrowed, interest rates, the total interest paid on borrowed funds, and the lending institution.

10.6.0 Cash Reserve

The Council shall establish a goal of 10% of the Conference budget as the cash reserve.

10.7.0 District Superintendents' Compensation

- 10.7.1 District Superintendents' salaries shall be set at 126% of the Conference Average Compensation, rounded upward to the next \$100.
- 10.7.2 The Base Housing Allowance, which is to be paid in addition to salary, shall be set at 35% of the Conference Average Compensation.
- 10.7.3 The net sale proceeds and future income from the sale of district parsonages sold July 1, 1997 and after will be held in escrow for use in providing District Superintendents' housing allowances.
- 10.7.4 The annual conference contribution to the health insurance premium costs for district superintendents will be provided at the same percentage as that established by the Conference Personnel Committee for the annual conference staff.

10.8.0 Overexpenditure

All expenditures above and beyond the pre-approved Council on Finance and Administration spending plan will be charged against the Conference agency's following year's budget, unless approved for inclusion in the current year by the Council on Finance and Administration. The Council on

Finance and Administration has the authority to require compliance with the spending plan.

10.9.0 Solicitation of Funds

- 10.9.1 No solicitation of funds from local churches or members thereof shall be made by any agency, organization, church, or individual related to the Conference without the program having been examined and recommended by the Council on Finance and Administration then approved by the Annual Conference.
- 10.9.2 The request of the following agencies to solicit funds has been approved: Conference Board of Trustees; Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance and Equitable Compensation; Commission on Archives and History; Board of Camp and Retreat Ministries; and the Board of Global Ministries for Conference institutions.
- 10.9.3 The Conference has granted permission to local campus ministries to solicit funds from local United Methodist churches under the supervision of the Board of Higher Education and Student Ministry.
- 10.9.4 The Conference has granted permission to the Conference Council on Youth Ministries to solicit support for the Youth Service Fund from local church youth groups.
- 10.9.5 The Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation has been approved to solicit funds within the Conference.
- 10.9.6 When a project is an Advance Special approved by the Conference, the Committee on Mission Motivation of the Board of Global Ministries is given and assumes responsibility for the solicitation of funds.
- 10.9.7 When an Advance Special project desires to solicit funds directly, i.e., other than through the policies and procedures of the Committee on Mission Motivation of the Board of Global Ministries, the request for permission to solicit funds shall be submitted to the Committee on Mission Motivation of the Board of Global Ministries for recommendation to the Council on Finance and Administration.
- 10.9.8 In the case of program agencies, requests for permission to solicit funds shall go first to the Discipleship Leadership Council for recommendation to the Council on Finance and Administration, and the Conference for approval.
- 10.9.9 No more than one Capital Fund Campaign shall be promoted or carried out by the Wisconsin Conference during any one calendar year. (Campaign is defined here as fund raising efforts where a general solicitation is expected and churches are assigned a “fair share goal.”)

10.10.0 Apportionment Adjustment

- 10.10.1 **Purpose-**The goal of the Wisconsin Conference is to have every church participate fully in the mission of The United Methodist Church by paying 100 percent of its apportionment asking.

The purpose of the Apportionment Adjustment procedure is to assist churches which have not paid their apportionments in full to develop a plan for full apportionment payment in the future.

- 10.10.2 **Applicants-**A church becomes a potential recipient of an Apportionment Adjustment when the church did not pay its apportionment in full during the

past year or anticipates its inability to pay its apportionment in full for the current or coming year.

- 10.10.3 **Process-** The full policy is available from the Conference Board of Congregation and Circuit Development (BCCD). The first step for the local church in the process of obtaining an Apportionment Adjustment is completion of the Apportionment Adjustment request form (obtained from the BCCD or District Superintendent). Following approval by the Finance Committee and the Administrative Board/Council, the form and supporting paperwork are submitted to the District Superintendent.
- a. The District Superintendent will initiate a process with the local church to assist them in developing a plan to return to full apportionment payment. (Apportionment Adjustments will not normally be granted for a period exceeding four years.)
 - b. The Apportionment Adjustment Request is reviewed and a revised apportionment is established by the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development and approved by the chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration. Actions taken on the Apportionment Adjustment request shall be communicated by the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development to the Conference Treasurer, the District Superintendent, and the local church.
- 10.10.4 **Follow up-**A yearly report reflecting the progress made by the local church toward returning to full involvement in the mission of the church, including financial support through full apportionment payments, shall be presented at the annual church/charge conference and forwarded to the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development.
- Approved Apportionment Adjustments shall be indicated on the local church budget.
- 10.10.5 **Apportionment Adjustment for New Faith Communities Development**
- a. A “New Faith Community” may be a new church start intended to eventually be a stand-alone ministry or it may be a second site ministry or multi-cultural new faith community within the parent church not intended as a stand-alone ministry.
 - b. Eligibility: All established local churches (whether as an individual congregation, a collaborative of local churches, or a circuit) that have approved an intentional new faith start-up plan of either a new church start, or a second site ministry or multi-cultural new faith community within the parent church, through their Church Conference, the Wisconsin Cabinet, and the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development, are eligible for an apportionment adjustment under this policy.
 - c. New funds expended for all parent church budget line items directly pertaining to new faith community development, including staff salaries, will be included on a graduated rate over the first eight years in the conference apportionment formula calculations.
 - d. Staff salaries affecting apportionment adjustments will be calculated on the percentage of time spent with the new faith community development.

- e. New members electing to join the parent church while fully and directly participating or leading in the new faith community will be included on a graduated rate over the first eight years in the church's membership for apportionment calculation.
- f. Evaluation: Apportionment adjustment requests from parent churches new faith community start-ups will be evaluated and approved annually by the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development.
- g. Apportionments of new faith communities and parenting churches will be phased into full apportionments over eight years.

10.11.0 Budgeting for Multi Year Programs

- 10.11.1 When a Conference agency budgets using apportionment funds for programs that are multi-year in nature, they shall choose either of the following two methods of budgeting for those programs and use that method consistently throughout the program's life.
- 10.11.2 Like all other Conference programs, a separate budget is established each calendar year, and any and all apportionment funds and participant fees not spent at the end of that year are transferred to the Conference's cash reserve.
- 10.11.3 A separate budget is established for the period of the program. The balance of revenues (including apportionments provided for the program and participant fees) over expenses (or expenses over revenues) is carried forward (through the use of a balance sheet account) to each subsequent year until the end of the program period. At the end of that period, any and all apportionment funds and participant fees from all the years not spent are transferred to the Conference's cash reserve.

10.12.0 Participant Fees

- 10.12.1 When participant fees are charged as part of a Conference agency program, participant fees are required to be used in full before any apportionment funds are available for the program.
- 10.12.2 Participant fees collected that are in excess of the cost of a program are available for the sponsoring Conference agency to spend as it determines is in the best interest of its mission. Such funds can be carried over to the following calendar year (through the use of balance sheet accounts).
- 10.12.3 In the case of multi-year programs budgeting on a multi-year basis, the participant fees are treated according to policy 10.11.3 and may be carried over until the end of the program.

10.13.0 Church Closings (§2548)

- 10.13.1 When a church is discontinued or abandoned, proceeds from sale of its property shall first be applied to maintenance, legal and other closing-related costs incurred by the Conference Trustees.
- 10.13.2 Assets and/or net sale proceeds from closed churches shall then next be applied toward any unpaid apportionments of the former congregation from the current and previous year.

Remaining net proceeds from the sale of discontinued church property will be administered by the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development. Forty-Five percent (45%) of the net sale proceeds from the property sale shall be deposited into a New Faith Endowment account, with

earnings/capital gains to be administered by Board of Congregation and Circuit Development for starting new faith communities in the Wisconsin Annual Conference. Any remaining assets of the discontinued congregation along with 50% of the net sale proceeds shall be deposited with the New Faith Immediate Use Fund administered by the Board of Congregation and Circuit Development for development of new faith communities in the Wisconsin Annual Conference.

- 10.13.3 Five percent (5%) of the net proceeds from the sale of discontinued church property shall be deposited into the Discontinued Church Disposal Reserve. The Discontinued Church Disposal Reserve will be available to the Conference Trustees. It may be used to cover any excess expenses over receipts which are incurred for maintenance and closing costs related to the disposal of abandoned and discontinued churches, which are not otherwise included in the Conference budget. Assets in the reserve that exceed \$100,000 will be added to the New Faith Immediate Use Fund.

20.0.0 *Conference Moving Policy*

20.1.0 **General Guidelines**

- 20.1.1 Only insured carriers shall be employed.
- 20.1.2 All intra-Conference moves shall be with a firm listed with Project Equality, if possible.
- 20.1.3 All intra-Conference moves shall be scheduled in consultation with the Cabinet.
- 20.1.4 The Moving Director shall rule on requests for “do-it-yourself” equipment.
- 20.1.5 The Moving Director shall give assistance to clergy in making claims against moving firms.
- 20.1.6 The expenses of the director’s office shall be paid from the moving expense fund.

20.2.0 **The Moving Expense Fund**

The Moving Expense Fund will be part of the Conference Budget. The moving expense of a pastor appointed to a local church in Wisconsin or to a ¶ 344.1a extension ministry with pension paid by the Wisconsin Conference, lay person on the Conference program staff and any lay person employed by the Conference shall be paid from the Moving Expense Fund according to these rules:

- 20.2.1 The pastor shall pay costs for weight over 12,000 pounds. Note: This assumes the pastor shall sort and discard many items of questionable value before moving.
- 20.2.2 Each pastor is responsible for his/her own packing. A \$200 packing allowance is available to each pastor. Unused packing allowance may apply to overweight costs.
- 20.2.3 All moves will be limited as follows:
- a. Transportation for household goods from origin to destination.
 - b. Payment for the following items will not be authorized by the Conference:
 1. Altering or cleaning of rugs and drapes.
 2. Moving of boats, trailers, second automobiles, motorcycles, etc.
 3. Dismantling and installation of television antenna, swing sets, etc.

4. Moving fireplace wood, lumber, patio blocks and bricks.
 5. Moving animals of any type.
 6. Moving unusually bulky collections of extensive personal items.
 7. Maid service.
 8. Piano tuning.
- c. Where there are two pastors in the same household an extra 3,000 pounds of weight and the pick-up of a second office contents should be covered by the Conference Moving Fund.
 - d. Pick-ups at both the pastor's home and office are standard.
 - e. In addition to the "carriers limited coverage" provided without cost which insures each item at 60 cents per pound, the Conference shall purchase for each pastor the "Extended Coverage." This coverage values the total load at \$1.25 per pound and costs 50 cents per \$100 valuation. Interested parties should communicate with the committee concerning possible changes in the insurance coverage of Conference moves.
 - f. Pastors will be billed by the Conference Treasurer for costs of exceeding limits and will pay the same to the Conference Treasurer.
 - g. The Moving Director shall furnish an evaluation form to each family moving to be returned to the Moving Director after a move. This would be in addition to the form the moving company furnishes.
 - h. Exceptions to the Conference Moving Policy may be made by the vote of the Cabinet.
 - i. Reimbursement for out-of-state moves must be approved by the cabinet.

20.3.0 Other Moving Expenses

The church the pastor is currently serving will cover the following expenses:
Phone calls necessary to deal directly with the move, primarily conversation with the Moving Director, District Superintendent and key leadership in the new appointment

The moving pastor will be responsible for the following expenses:
Personal long distance calls related to the move (e.g. checking on schools, summer recreational programs, housing, etc.)
Food, travel, and lodging expenses to the new community to visit, seek housing, if necessary, and finally, to relocate
These moving expenses covered by the pastor may be claimed as moving expenses for income tax purposes if allowed by IRS guidelines
Further details regarding change of pastor are covered in P50.0.0 for salary and Sabbatical Sunday policies and P60.0.0 for clergy housing policies.

30.0.0 Maternity/Paternity Leave Policy (§356)

- 30.1.1 Upon approval by the Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee and the District Superintendent, maternity/paternity leave may begin prior to the birth or arrival of the new child when time is needed for preparation or to accommodate physical complications. The entire leave, however, may still not exceed thirteen weeks.
- 30.1.2 During the maternity/paternity leave, all normal pastoral responsibilities shall be cared for by an interim pastor or other person designated by the

Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee in consultation with the district superintendent.

The pastor-on-leave may care for emergencies in the church(es) during the leave, if she or he chooses, in consultation with the interim pastor.

It shall be understood that the pastor-on-leave remains the one under appointment to the charge.

- 30.1.3 It is recommended that the pastor-on-leave, the district superintendent, the interim pastor and a representative of the Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee meet at least once during the course of the maternity/paternity leave to evaluate the effectiveness of the leave and make any adjustments necessary.
- 30.1.4 During a maternity/paternity leave, the local church(es) shall either:
- a. Maintain the salary of the pastor-on-leave throughout the maternity/paternity leave; or
 - b. Maintain the salary of the pastor-on-leave for no less than the first eight weeks of the leave and utilize some budgeted salary and travel funds from weeks nine to thirteen (if these weeks are part of the leave) to pay for interim pastoral services.
 - c. In either case, all other benefits shall be maintained throughout the leave.
- 30.1.5 Church(es) may request that the Conference Council on Finance and Administration appropriate Conference funds to cover expenses of interim pastoral care, up to a maximum equal to 10% of the current minimum salary for Conference members. Any request for such funds must be made in writing by the Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee and be approved by the Cabinet. Any charge which receives Conference funds for extra expenses of pastoral care during a maternity/paternity leave shall file a written financial record of the leave with the district superintendent and the Conference Council on Finance and Administration following the completion of the leave.

40.0.0 Diaconal Ministers' Employment Policy

40.1.0 Guidelines for Employment

40.1.1 Job Description

A job description and conditions of employment are essential and shall be in writing and agreed to by both employer and employee.

40.1.2 Base Salary

- a. The base salary for a diaconal minister should be equivalent to the minimum salary for ordained ministers with similar experience and training.
- b. Salary should be negotiated at a higher or lower level depending on level of experience and training.
- c. There should be an annual review of salary by the Staff-Parish Relations Committee or by the employing agency.
- d. The Diaconal Minister should receive an increase that is at least equal in percentage to that granted to the clergy of the Conference as set forth in the report of the Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance and Equitable Compensation.

40.1.3 **Pension**

- a. The diaconal minister shall be enrolled in a pension plan.
- b. The United Methodist Personal Investment Plan is recommended.

40.1.4 **Health Plan**

If a health plan is needed, the church should supply major medical and health coverage for the individual or family.

40.1.5 **Continuing Education**

- a. A program of continuing education throughout his/her career is required by the Wisconsin Conference Board of Ordained Ministry of the person wishing to continue in the office of Diaconal Minister.
- b. In most cases the Diaconal Minister's continuing education program should allow for leaves of absence for study at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each quadrennium.
- c. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the diaconal minister's vacation.
- d. A sum of 1% of the annual salary or \$200.00, whichever is greater, should be provided annually by the employing agency for continuing education.

40.1.6 **Travel Allowance**

Provision for travel allowance should depend upon the job description and should be a part of the original agreement.

40.1.7 **Housing**

Housing or housing allowance if provided for the Diaconal Minister should be reported to the IRS as salary and should be an addition to the base salary.

40.1.8 **Vacation**

Yearly vacation time with pay should be four weeks.

40.1.9 **Leaves of Absence**

Leaves for sickness, emergency and maternity/paternity should be a part of the original agreement.

40.2.0 **Connectional Privileges**

- a. The privilege of working with the larger church in Connectional relationship should be given as needed and requested.
- b. If the demand becomes exceptional, the Diaconal Minister should account for and explain his/her Connectional responsibilities on an annual basis and help the local church understand the need for such activities.
- c. Concern felt by the employing agency relative to time spent in Connectional activities should be a part of discussion at the time of employment and annual evaluation.

40.3.0 **Evaluation**

- a. There shall be an annual evaluation of job performance and of conditions of employment when a Diaconal Minister is employed.
- b. The Diaconal Minister should be involved in the process of evaluation.

- c. In a local church evaluation should be done by the Staff-Parish Relations Committee using the process developed for ordained ministers.

50.0.0 Pastoral Compensation

50.1.0 **Support categories** shall include:

- 1. Cash salary (see P110.1.0)
- 2. Parsonage, parsonage allowance, or housing allowance (see P60 and P60.14)
- 3. Utilities
- 4. Vouchered travel expense, (see P10.2.3)
- 5. Health and disability insurance (see P120.0.0)
- 6. Pension (see P100.0.0)
- 7. Vacation (see P80.0.0)
- 8. Continuing Education (see P150.0.0)

50.2.0 **Salary Termination** - The last Sunday in June will be the final Sunday served by a pastor in his/her current appointment. June 30 shall be the concluding date for the pastor's compensation in the charge currently being served. The first Sunday in July shall be a "Sabbatical Sunday" for all pastors and charges in transition. The affected congregations shall be responsible for securing pulpit supply for that day. The second Sunday in July shall be the first Sunday in the pulpit for incoming pastors. It shall be the responsibility of the charge to pay the compensation of the returning or in-coming pastor beginning July 1 of each year. The District Superintendent in consultation with the pastor and the charge involved shall determine termination date for payment of compensation of pastors moving into or out of the Conference.

In the event of a mid-year appointment, one Sunday between termination and commencement of the appointment shall be considered a "Sabbatical Sunday." "Sabbatical Sunday" shall not be counted as part of the pastor's vacation.

60.0.0 Clergy Housing Policy

60.1.0 General

- 60.1.1 Whether building a new parsonage, purchasing existing housing for a parsonage, or correcting an existing parsonage, the parsonage should provide attractive and comfortable living space for an average-sized family.
- 60.1.2 Energy efficiency and minimum maintenance should be high priorities in parsonages.
- 60.1.3 In new parsonages, as well as existing ones, energy saving installations should be considered.
- 60.1.4 Parsonages should provide a model in values consistent with Christian stewardship.

60.2.0 Minimum Requirements

- 60.2.1 Living room at least 200 square feet.
- 60.2.2 Three bedrooms at least 11 feet by 11 feet.
- 60.2.3 Modern kitchen with ample built in cupboards and work area for food preparation.

- 60.2.4 Utility area with water conditioning as needed, stationary tubs, hookup for automatic washer-dryer, space for interior and exterior clothes lines.
 - 60.2.5 Dining area sufficient to seat at least eight persons.
 - 60.2.6 Adequate closet space in each bedroom, near front and rear exits, and for general cleaning equipment such as vacuum cleaners.
 - 60.2.7 Adequate heating for each room and adequate cooling, especially in bedroom areas. Zoning for areas should be considered to save energy.
 - 60.2.8 Two car garage with adequate storage for lawn and garden equipment.
 - 60.2.9 Recently inspected wiring, plumbing and heating and, if necessary, brought up to current code.
 - 60.2.10 One and one-half bathrooms.
- 60.3.0 Other considerations**
- 60.3.1 Parsonages are provided for living space for pastoral families and not for the purpose of church activities.
 - 60.3.2 Wherever possible, parsonages should be handicap accessible and in the planning or purchasing of a parsonage, serious consideration should be given to a bedroom and bathroom on the first floor.
 - 60.3.3 In no case should bedroom space be planned or utilized in below ground areas unless windows of such size as to provide safe and easy egress to the outside are provided adjacent to bedroom areas.
 - 60.3.4 Fire walls shall be installed around the furnace when bedrooms are near heating units.
 - 60.3.5 An office shall be provided in the church building unless specific exemption is granted by the cabinet.
 - 60.3.6 Each charge shall have a telephone line independent from the parsonage telephone line.
 - 60.3.7: It is recommended that each church have air quality testing completed in a parsonage at the time of a pastoral leadership change and/or when air quality concerns are raised.
- 60.4.0 Minimum Parsonage Equipment**
- Stove
 - Refrigerator
 - Drapes
 - Carpeting or Rugs
 - Hardware for over-sized windows
 - Television antenna, cable or satellite hook-up, and internet installation (The clergyperson pays monthly bills.)
 - Telephone which is unique to the parsonage
 - Washer and dryer
 - Carbon monoxide detectors
 - Smoke detector
- 60.5.0 Annual Equipment Inspection**
- Parsonage equipment owned by the local church should be inspected annually by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and Trustee chairpersons and repaired or replaced before deterioration affects operation.

60.6.0 Inspection at Moving

Upon moving, the out-going pastor shall have the condition of the parsonage inspected by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee chairperson and the Trustee chairperson. The condition of the parsonage for the in-coming pastor shall be the responsibility of the congregation.

60.7.0 Parsonage Care

60.7.1 Responsibility

- a. The charge and pastor share a common goal of maintaining adequate, comfortable, well-kept residential surroundings.
- b. Each party assumes certain responsibilities and tasks to meet this goal.
- c. Each person involved as a resident should recognize that we hold parsonages in trust and that certain tensions can be expected when individuals or families live in homes that are not their own, or when they have responsibility for the care of people in homes that belong to someone else.
- d. Experience has shown that consideration and communication can make such tension work for rather than against churches and pastors.
- e. These guidelines are designed to assist in clarifying responsibilities and in encouraging communication.

60.7.2 Parsonage Maintenance - Multiple Point Charges

- a. The charge shall have a joint parsonage committee. The committee shall be made up of representation from all churches in the charge. The committee's duties, at a minimum, will be:
 1. To do an annual inspection of the parsonage, as per Policy 60.5.0.
 2. To meet as necessary to review, and as needed, plan maintenance for the parsonage.
- b. Expenses for maintenance shall be shared by the churches in the charge.

60.7.3 Communication Plan

- a. The resident is expected to share in initiation of actions when parsonage maintenance needs emerge and in follow-through of such actions.
- b. The resident, however, has limited power to act.
- c. Parsonage Committee members, or Trustees, or members of the Staff/Parish Relations Committee should be assigned to care for parsonage property.
- d. The designated person or persons should be the individual(s) to whom the pastor turns regarding maintenance needs.
- e. When such designated persons do not act within a reasonable period of time, the pastor shall report maintenance concerns to one or more of the following bodies: the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the Trustees, the Administrative Council.

60.7.4 Occupancy

- a. The parsonage is provided for the pastor and his/her family.
- b. It is expected that they shall have the same options of having guests and entertaining that would be inherent in the occupancy of any family home.
- c. Residents shall not sublet or make the home, or parts thereof available for an extended period without the approval of the Administrative Council.

- d. Because of the tax exempt status of parsonages, partisan political signs, etc., may not be displayed publicly thereon. Pastors and families are encouraged to find other appropriate ways to express their values and convictions in the electoral process.

60.8.0 Parsonage Damage

- 60.8.1 When damage or destruction beyond normal wear and tear occurs to the parsonage or equipment, the Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee shall call such a matter to the attention of the pastor and negotiate the means by which refurbishing or restoration shall be done.
- 60.8.2 When damage or uncleanness beyond normal wear and tear results from pets, the Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee shall follow the same process as in 60.80.1.
- 60.8.3 For any damage beyond normal wear and tear, an agreement for payment of expense shall be worked out and put in writing. (See also P60.9.3)
- 60.8.4 If a dispute over charges occurs or if payment is not made as per the agreement, the District Superintendent shall intervene.
- 60.8.5 If it is evident that no change occurs in patterns of damage to the parsonage or equipment, or if a pastor leaves an appointment where persons or pets have abused the property, a report shall be filed immediately with the District Superintendent.
- 60.8.6 That report shall be shared with the pastor with the recommendation that a security deposit of no less than \$250 shall be required upon the receipt of a new appointment.
- 60.8.7 The security deposit shall be kept in the local church treasury, to be returned when that pastor moves and has provided evidence that the parsonage has been properly cared for.

60.9.0 Procedure for Approval of Repairs and Maintenance

60.9.1 Emergencies

- a. The pastor determines the nature of the emergency (leaks, water heater failure, safety hazard such as electric shorts, flooding, etc.)
- b. The pastor calls the chairperson of the appropriate committee or the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee chairperson immediately.
- c. The pastor proceeds on his/her own initiative when the situation demands and advises appropriate persons as soon as possible of the emergency.
- d. A list of electricians, plumbers, etc. acceptable to the church should be provided to the pastor for purposes of emergency contact and be delivered to the new pastor on the day of arrival in the parsonage by the Trustee chairperson or another delegated by the chair.

60.9.2 Routine

- a. Requests for repair may be initiated by the pastor, by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and Trustee chairpersons on their annual inspection, or by the parsonage committee or others designated to care for the parsonage.
- b. The local church may provide the pastor the right to have or make repairs up to a designated dollar amount.

- c. Major repairs or improvements are to be made in consultation with all appropriate bodies.

60.9.3 Damage caused by the parsonage family's negligence shall be paid for by the pastor.

60.10.0 Local Church Responsibilities

The Local Church will be responsible for:

- a. Cleaning of drapes and carpets at the time of occupancy or one time during occupancy.
- b. Painting and general upkeep of all buildings, storms, doors, and screens that are part of the parsonage.
- c. Repair to all buildings on the parsonage property.
- d. Upkeep and repair of appliances, plumbing, heating units, fireplaces, and fixtures that are a part of the building or are furnished by the appropriate body.
- e. Maintenance and installation of all walks, drives, steps, gutters, and grades to provide drainage, convenience, and safety.
- f. Replacement, major pruning or treatment of shrubs and trees on the property.
- g. Care and inspection when house is unoccupied between moves of pastors. Pastors will be expected to care for the property when they are on vacation.
- h. Inspection of the property on an annual basis by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and Trustee chairpersons as per *The Discipline*.
- i. Radon testing and appropriate remediation

60.11.0 Pastor Responsibilities

The Pastor will be responsible for:

- a. Normal cleaning, polishing, and maintenance of all interior surfaces, including cleaning of drapes and carpeting with steam vacuum, where possible.
- b. Prompt reporting of emergencies or unusual circumstances and needs.
- c. Semi-annual cleaning of downspout and gutters (spring and fall).
- d. Regular cleaning and replacement of furnace filters (recommended monthly cleaning of filters and quarterly replacement is recommended on most units), and oiling of bearings as prescribed.
- e. Regular routine pruning and watering of shrubs.
- f. Keeping grounds presentable and provide for trash and waste disposal consistent with the area. Mowing and other normal outdoor care consistent with good appearance and safety including the furnishing of necessary equipment.
- g. Pastors will not make permanent attachments to walls, shelf surfaces, appliances, etc., without consultation with the assigned appropriate body.
- h. Pastors will not add permanent structures to the ground without prior approval of the appropriate body.
- i. Maintenance of smoke alarms and fire extinguisher.

60.12.0 Accessory Items Provided by the Local Church

In each parsonage the following appliances and conveniences will be supplied:

- a. Drapes (to be chosen and changed in consultation between pastors and the appropriate church body).
- b. Shades in all windows where needed.
- c. Storm doors, windows and screens in good repair.
- d. Range and refrigerator (with freezer compartment).
- e. Wiring for all regular appliances.
- f. Power lawnmower and power snowblower in special cases only.
- g. Television antenna or the installation of cable or satellite TV.
- h. Smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors, and fire extinguisher.

60.13.0 Pastors are expected to provide the following

- a. Humidifiers and dehumidifiers, and other accessories for reasons of health and convenience, unless required because of some unusual circumstances connected with the location or type of building.
- b. Fuses, light bulbs, and other small items connected with day-to-day comfort and convenience.
- c. If desired, subscription service for cable or satellite TV.

60.14.0 Guidelines For Housing Allowances

- 60.14.1 All pastors serving full-time in local churches, and all Conference clergy staff members and district superintendents shall be provided either a parsonage or housing allowance. Pastors living in a parsonage may, with the consent of the congregation, designate a portion of their compensation as a parsonage allowance for IRS tax purposes.
- 60.14.2 A housing or rental allowance shall be negotiated between the pastor and congregation in consultation with the district superintendent (where applicable), or in the case of a Conference clergy staff person or district superintendent, with the approval of the appointee, the Personnel Committee, the Council on Finance and Administration, and the cabinet. Full-time clergy serving on the Conference staff shall receive the same Base Housing Allowance as the District Superintendents.
- 60.14.3 It shall be understood that this agreement shall not be a primary factor in consideration for future appointments for either party.
- 60.14.4 In setting the housing allowance the following shall be included:
 - a. An amount to cover the utilities in an average three bedroom home in good condition in that community. The term “average” will vary with communities and shall be open to negotiation.
 - b. An amount to cover, at least, the principal and interest that would be required for an average three bedroom home in good condition in the community after a down payment of no less than 15% and a twenty-five year mortgage.
 - c. For persons desiring rental living, the allowance shall be cost of rental, plus utilities, or:
 - 1. The rental value of the type of a home in the community the ordained person is expected to live in.
 - 2. Plus, the actual cost of utilities
 - 3. Plus, the amount of incidental home costs related to home for business purposes.

The total housing allowance may not exceed the smaller of the two methods of determining housing allowance.

- 60.14.5 If a local church provides a housing loan for a pastor, provision shall be made by the pastor involved to guarantee repayment of that loan in full prior to moving to a different charge.
- a. Such guarantee (as a second mortgage or other collateral) shall be made in writing upon receipt of the loan and shall be agreed upon by the church or charge Conference in consultation with the district superintendent.
 - b. A pastor shall be responsible for securing mortgage insurance payable to the church equal to the amount of the church provided loan.
- 60.14.6 If the existing parsonage is sold by a local church intending to provide a housing allowance, the proceeds from that sale shall be invested (except where legal restrictions prevent it) until such time that a church Conference and the district superintendent shall decide a parsonage is no longer necessary on that charge.
- The interest from that investment may be used to underwrite the housing allowance.
- 60.14.7 The charge shall allow the pastor who receives a housing allowance to live where he/she chooses. If the pastor chooses to live outside of the communities served, he/she must receive the consent of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee and the district superintendent.
- 60.14.8 A housing allowance shall be subject to annual approval of the Charge Conference.
- 60.14.9 The Charge Conference shall not have the authority to reduce the housing allowance without negotiation with and the consent of the pastor and district superintendent.
- 60.14.10 Expenses of searching for a home are the responsibility of the pastor unless otherwise negotiated.

70.0.0 *Policy and Procedures Regarding Sexual Misconduct*

I. Purpose

The Wisconsin Annual Conference stands against all unacceptable behaviors as identified in ¶12702 as chargeable offenses, particularly noting sexual abuse, sexual harassment, and sexual immorality as unacceptable behaviors.

II. Scope

This Policy and Procedures shall apply to ordained and licensed clergy, diaconal ministers, lay employees, volunteers, and church members of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and its churches. It shall be distributed to all local churches.

III. Theological Affirmations

A. Children of God

All human beings are children of God and deserve respectful, non-violating relationships. No one should be exploited in any way, including sexually.

B. Nature of the church

The church is to be a place of safety and encouragement for all its participants. Sexually exploitative and disrespectful behavior violates this basic principle.

IV. Chargeable Offenses for sexual misconduct (§2702)

- A. Sexual harassment
- B. Sexual misconduct
- C. Sexual abuse
- D. Child abuse

V. Judicial Proceedings (§2701)

All chargeable offenses are entered initially as judicial complaints, which will be taken seriously and may lead to a change of Conference relationship. (§2702)

VI. Responsibilities of the Conference

- A. Officers of the Conference will follow The Book of Discipline in working on every complaint. Both the complainant (the accuser) and the respondent (the accused) will be treated respectfully.
- B. Should a complainant or respondent so desire, s/he has the right to select a support person and/or advocate who may or may not be from the advocates trained by the church (§ 362.1b and §2701.3)
- C. The Conference will assist as necessary all parties to set up systems of care giving to provide support during the complaint process.
- D. The Conference shall protect the confidentiality of all parties throughout the process.

VII. Misunderstandings and False Accusations

There is some fear concerning the issues of misunderstandings and false accusations; therefore, care shall be taken by those involved in the process to determine the validity of a complaint and the appropriate response.

VIII. Covenant Responsibility

- A. A single person beginning or continuing a romantic relationship with a single person with whom she or he has a pastoral relationship bears the full burden of demonstrating there is no exploitation in that relationship.
- B. All church professionals, like other professionals such as therapists and counselors, should avoid a romantic relationship with a counselee past or present.
- C. God's forgiveness is available to all who have sinned and who repent of their sin. Church leaders involved in sexual misconduct may receive this forgiveness like anyone else. Forgiveness does not mean that one can avoid the consequences of actions which follow professional misconduct.
- D. Sexual misconduct has a dramatic effect on its victims. Perpetrators who think their behavior can go unnoticed or who use threats or inappropriate authority to silence their victims are in serious error.

Procedures

I. Procedures for Response to Sexual Misconduct

- A. If You Believe Misconduct has Happened to You
 - 1. Seek immediate medical care if necessary and report the event to the proper authorities.

2. Write down (or report to someone who will write down) exactly when, where, and what happened. Documentation of the allegation must show the merit of the grievance.
 3. Sign and have the report sent immediately to the District Superintendent or, if s/he is the accused, to the Bishop. If the Bishop is the accused the report should be sent to the President of the Jurisdictional College of Bishops.
 4. Whatever level of violation has occurred, you have the right to seek out a support person and/or advocate to help you understand the complaint process. You have the right to have your advocate with you at any time during the process.
 5. Confidentiality is extremely important. Respect for all parties involved assists one to avoid retaliation and liability from defamation charges.
 6. Avoid contact with the accused to protect yourself from future violations.
 7. Be assured that the District Superintendent and the Bishop will take you seriously. The Book of Discipline directs their role to make certain that church law is followed (§362). Questions about the process are always in order.
 8. You are encouraged not to give up on the church or your faith in God even though both may be difficult or seemingly impossible to you at this time.
- B. If You are the Accused
1. No matter what allegation is made, treat it seriously.
 2. Avoid contact with the complainant.
 3. When a complaint has been alleged, you are encouraged to seek out a support person and/or advocate to help you understand the complaint process. You have the right to have your advocate with you at any time during the process.
 4. Confidentiality is extremely important. Respect for all parties involved assists one to avoid retaliation and liability from defamation charges.
 5. You may request up to thirty (30) days to prepare a response to the allegations, and do have thirty (30) days to prepare for a hearing on the complaint (§2704).
 6. Request the written complaint and all supporting materials. Gather all your own materials, such as; correspondence, calendars, notes, names of witnesses, to assist you in preparing your response.
 7. The Bishop and Superintendent will presume innocence (unless you acknowledge the complaint is accurate) until the conclusion of all processes (§362). The Book of Discipline directs their role to assure that church law is followed (§404). Questions about the process are always in order.
 8. Fair Process under §362 and §2701 begins when a complaint is signed. No action may be taken to change a person's Conference relationship unless a complaint is signed.
 9. You are encouraged not to give up on the church or your faith in God even though both may be difficult or seemingly impossible to you at this time.
- C. If Specific Behavior is Reported to You

1. By law, child abuse including sexual misconduct with a minor is to be reported to the proper civil and church authorities.
 2. Help the one making an allegation to determine if a response to this incident through the church complaint process would be appropriate. Alert the complainant to this Policy and Procedures.
 3. If the allegation is a criminal or civil law violation, assist the person to report it to the proper civil and church authorities.
- D. If You Observe Inappropriate Behavior
1. Write down or report to someone who will write down exactly when, where, and what happened.
 2. Follow the guidelines above (see Procedures I.A).

II. Responding to the Complaint

- A. Confidentiality is critical to protect both the complainant and respondent from further harm. Both parties must be protected from retaliation and false accusation.
- B. The complaint must contain the date, time, place, and events alleged to have taken place.
- C. Witnesses and potential witnesses noted by the complainant may be interviewed. Facts must be obtained and be specific (when, where, and what happened).
- D. The complainant reviews the complaint and investigative material. The complainant may withdraw the complaint at this point or sign the complaint and send it to the District Superintendent/Bishop/President of the Jurisdictional College of Bishops (hereafter known as Recipient).
1. If the Recipient finds the complaint and supporting materials not in order or inappropriate, the complainant will be contacted for clarification or additional materials or ask the complainant to consider withdrawing the complaint.
 2. If the Recipient finds the complaint and its supporting materials in order, a copy is sent to the Bishop, the respondent is contacted stating there is a complaint, informs him/her about Fair Process rights and the right to have a support person and/or advocate, encourages him/her to gather a support group, and negotiates a time and place to present the materials. No action may be taken to change the Conference relationship of the respondent without these materials.
- E. Investigation may be undertaken by the respondent. Whatever evidence is necessary to respond to the complaint and its supporting material will be obtained. Witnesses and potential witnesses noted by the respondent may be interviewed.
- F. The respondent reviews the evidence gathered and determines his/her response to the complaint which is given to the Recipient. The Book of Discipline ¶362 and ¶2701, protects the rights of the respondent.
1. If the respondent acknowledges guilt, then s/he may look at various options such as: entering into voluntary negotiations with the Recipient seeking mediation, remedial actions, withdrawal from ministry, or church trial.
 2. If the respondent denies the complaint, the Recipient has the responsibility to: end the matter, refer it to the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee

and/or to mediation by trained neutral third parties who are not members of the supervisory structure of the Conference for mediation, or forward the complaint (§362.1d).

- G. If the Recipient is unable to obtain a voluntary resolution satisfactory to all parties and a complaint is sent to the appropriate body, the administrative or judicial process of the church as set forth in The Book of Discipline will proceed. (§362 and 2701).

III. Policy and Procedure Review

A. General Conditions

1. This Policy and Procedures Document becomes the Policy and Procedures of the Wisconsin Annual Conference when adopted by the Conference.
2. This Policy and Procedures will be superseded by The Book of Discipline at any points where they are in conflict with it.
3. When action is taken that appears to be in conflict with The Book of Discipline, clarification may be requested of the District Superintendent with appeal to the Bishop.

B. Review

1. This Policy and Procedures Document is open to annual review for improvement for effectiveness and to meet Conference needs as they continue to evolve in this area.
2. Suggestions for improvement are to be addressed to the Bishop who will direct them to the appropriate body for consideration and presentation to the succeeding Conference Session.
3. New interpretations of church law by the Judicial Council or changes by the General Conference will immediately be enforced by the Bishop, with notification to the Conference through normal channels. Those changes will be sent to the appropriate body for integration into this Policy and Procedures Document. (Updated 2002)

80.0.0 Policy for Clergy Time Away [§258.2(16)]

- 80.1.1 All persons under appointment to local churches and agencies of the Conference are to have a minimum of one-month (4 Sundays) vacation, including those in part-time appointments.
- 80.1.2 All clergy are to have at least one full day (24 hours) a week for time off.
- 80.1.3 The time which the clergyperson spends in continuing education, the conference camping program, mission projects or youth/young adult ministry programs shall not be counted against vacation time.

90.0.0 Child Care Guidelines

Each Conference agency has the responsibility to provide dependent care reimbursement as needed for all meetings and activities.

100.0.0 Pension Policy

100.1.0 Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), as adopted by the 2004 General Conference of the United Methodist Church

- 100.1.1 **Contribution Base** shall be the Participant's Plan Compensation, as defined by CRSP.
- 100.1.2 **Church contribution rate for the Defined Contribution** component of CRSP shall be 3% of the Participant's Plan Compensation.

- 100.1.3 **Church contribution rate for the Defined Benefit component** of CRSP shall be an additional percentage of the Participant's Plan Compensation, set annually by the Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance, and Equitable Compensation, to meet the annual amount billed to the Wisconsin Annual Conference by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits to fund the Defined Benefit component.
- 100.1.4 **Funding for CRSP** is by direct payment by each charge to the Wisconsin Annual Conference.
- 100.1.5 **Hardship Cases.** The Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance, and Equitable Compensation will review needed financial assistance in the event of financial hardships.
- 100.2.0 Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)** administered by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits of the United Methodist Church and found in The Conference "Comprehensive Protection Plan Adoption Agreement."
- 100.2.1 Funding for CPP is by direct payment from each charge to the Wisconsin Annual Conference.
- 100.2.2 All Full and Associate Members appointed to Sabbatical will be enrolled in CPP for a maximum of one year with the premium paid by the Conference.
- 100.2.3 All Full, Provisional, and Associate Members appointed to Attend School after having previously served under appointment by the Conference to a local church may be enrolled in CPP if the Member pays the premium.
- 100.2.4 Student Local Pastors are not eligible to participate in CPP.
- 100.2.5 Clergy on Leave of Absence are not eligible to participate in CPP.
- 100.2.6 Clergy from other denominations who are appointed full time to a local church may choose to participate in a death and disability benefit plan sponsored by their denomination. The local church will contribute to this other denominational plan, with the amount paid not to exceed the CPP premium amount.
- 100.2.7 Full Members serving in Extension Ministries may participate in CPP at the employer's expense but only if the employer signs a CPP Adoption Agreement with the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits.
- 110.0.0 Equitable Compensation Policy (§342)**
- 110.1.0 Formula.**
The recommended minimum salary each year shall be based on one of two factors or combination of the two: 1) the Minimum Salary for the previous year, plus the Cost of Living Factor determined by the Federal Government for Social Security purposes, plus up to 1%; or, 2) the percentage change in the Conference Average Compensation for the previous year. The recommendation shall include the basis used, along with the rationale for the recommendation.
- 110.2.0 Eligibility**
- 110.2.1 In situations where a less than full-time appointment is made, the Joint Board will, under the provisions of ¶342.2 of *The Book of Discipline*, consider a claim for salary support, provided the other requirements for such support are met. Part-time and student appointments will be supported using the same criteria as regular full-time appointments.
-

110.2.2 Churches/charges served by retired members of Conference who are appointed as supply pastors are not eligible for Equitable Salary support.

110.3.0 Equitable Compensation Level

110.3.1 The maximum amount of Equitable Compensation Support shall be 20% of the base salary of the pastor under appointment to that charge.

110.3.2 In extraordinary situations where the Bishop and Cabinet find it advisable to make an appointment requiring Equitable Salary Compensation beyond the 20% maximum this may be granted upon request of the Cabinet and approval of the Joint Board.

110.3.3 All requests made for Equitable Compensation Support will be tied to the amount of apportionments paid by the charge. If all other circumstances of the request are in order, the following rules will apply:

- a. Charges that have paid 100% of their previous year's apportionments before the cut-off date set by the treasurer's office will receive 100% of their Equitable Compensation request for both salary and pension.
- b. Charges who have paid less than 100% of their previous year's apportionments before the cut-off date set by the treasurer's office will receive a reduced amount:
 1. Support paid for January-June: Amount paid will equal the amount approved multiplied by the percent of the previous year's apportionments paid by the cut-off date.
 2. Support paid for July-December: If a local church paid 100 percent of their apportionments in the previous year, they shall be paid 100 percent of the approved equitable compensation amount for July-December. If a local church did not pay 100 percent of their apportionments in the previous year and has not paid at least 50 percent for the current year by June 30, the equitable compensation amount paid shall equal the amount paid for January-June. If a local church did not pay 100 percent of their apportionments in the previous year, but does pay 50 percent for the current year by June 30, they shall receive the full amount approved. In addition, a catch-up payment shall be made to bring the total annual amount paid equal to the total amount approved for equitable compensation.

These rules will apply to all charges requesting Equitable Compensation. However, the Committee on Equitable Compensation reserves the right to grant exceptions to these rules when special circumstances arise.

110.4.0 Continuation of Equitable Compensation

110.4.1 A charge may normally receive Equitable Compensation support for no more than five consecutive years, with an annual reduction of 20% of the original request each year.

110.4.2 If the Bishop and Cabinet find it advisable to continue an appointment requiring Equitable Compensation beyond the normal schedule of five consecutive years, this may be granted upon request of the Cabinet and approval by the Joint Board, for a maximum of three (3) additional years at a level determined by Bishop and Cabinet as approved by the Joint Board.

120.0.0 Group Health Insurance Policy

- 120.1.1 **Participation.** All three-quarter and full-time pastoral charges and pastors are required to participate in the health insurance plan.
- 120.1.2 **Church Contributions.** Churches shall contribute at least 72% of monthly universal premium for every person under appointment that is serving at least three-quarter time in the local church. All participating pastoral charges will pay the same premium for every pastor, regardless of single or married status, or number of dependents.
- 120.1.3 **Premium Changes.** The Joint Board of Pensions, Insurance and Equitable Compensation shall adjust the premium rates when financially necessary.
- 120.1.4 **Lay employees** of the Conference and the local churches may be enrolled into the Conference Group Insurance Program. Such employees must work 30 hours per week or more. Local churches will be billed for 100% of applicable premium per employee. Enrollment must be within 30 days of employment.
- 120.1.5 **Surviving spouse of an Active Clergy Person.** In the event of the death of a fulltime, active (not retired), clergy member under appointment serving a local charge in the Wisconsin Conference and enrolled in the Conference Health Insurance Plan at the time of death, at the request of the District Superintendent the Joint Board will pay from the Emergency Hardship Account the total health insurance premiums in full for three months and will pay 50% of the premiums for nine additional months for surviving spouse and dependent children. Following this twelve-month period, the surviving spouse is eligible to participate in the Conference Health Insurance Plan, and shall receive a subsidy equal to the amount that a surviving spouse would receive if the clergy had died during retirement after age 65 provided that the clergy was a member of the Annual Conference prior to December 31, 2009. Such payment shall come from the Emergency Hardship account.
- 120.1.6 The Wisconsin Annual Conference will fund **retiree health insurance premiums** for participating pastors and lay employees of the Wisconsin Annual Conference who formally retired after December 31, 1998, based on years of service in the United Methodist or other Methodist denominations as outlined below. (Those who retired on or before December 31, 1998 will be treated as having at least 25 years of service.)
- a. Beginning January 1, 2009 the Wisconsin Annual Conference will subsidize the Medicare Supplemental Health Insurance premium for 1) those clergy members of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and their spouses who were members prior to December 31, 2009, based on their years of service; and 2) Wisconsin Conference lay employees for whom the Wisconsin Conference was the salary-paying unit and were employees prior to December 31, 2009, based on their years of service.
 - b. Beginning January 1, 2010, the Wisconsin Conference will subsidize 55% of the Medicare Supplemental Health Insurance premium for eligible retirees and their spouses who are 65 years of age and older and the retiree entered the retired relationship with at least 25 years of service. The retiree must be 65 years of age or older for the spouse's

coverage to be subsidized. Beginning January 1, 2011, the subsidy will be 50%.

- c. Beginning January 1, 2009, the maximum subsidy amount the Wisconsin Conference will pay for the Medicare Supplemental Health Insurance premium for eligible retirees and their spouses who are 65 years of age and older will be \$3,000 per year per participant.
- d. Beginning January 1, 2010 the Wisconsin Conference will subsidize 18% of the active premium for eligible retirees and their spouses who are less than 65 years of age and the retiree entered the retired relationship prior to January 1, 2002 with at least 25 years of service. e. For eligible retirees with fewer than 25 years of participation, the percentage subsidized by the Wisconsin Conference for eligible retirees and their spouses will be as presented in the tables (below), rounded to the nearest whole percent.

- 120.1.7 For clergy or lay employees of the Wisconsin Annual Conference retiring after December 31, 2001, the Conference will not provide any funding of health insurance premiums for retirees or their spouses until the retiree is eligible for Medicare.
- 120.1.8 Retirees must have a minimum 5 consecutive years of qualified participation with the Wisconsin Conference group health insurance plan immediately prior to retirement to be eligible for retiree coverage.

130.0.0 Church Facilities Policy

130.1.0 Minimum Standards

Local churches in the Wisconsin Conference will meet the following recommended minimum standards:

- a. Indoor plumbing/restroom, running water with at least one flush toilet
- b. Electricity which meets building code
- c. A heating system with thermostat
- d. Handicap accessibility to building code
- e. Carbon monoxide detectors to meet building code or Life Safety Code
- f. Smoke detector to meeting building code or Life Safety Code
- g. Air quality testing if there is a pastoral leadership change and/or air quality issues are raised.
- h. Lighted exit signs
- i. Radon testing and appropriate remediation

130.2.0 Remedial Funding

Local churches which do not meet these standards may apply to the Conference Trustees for supplemental financial assistance to correct deficiencies. A church requesting assistance must participate in the cost through a minimum 1/3 matching funds, or equivalent labor and materials. Churches requesting assistance with improvements in excess of \$500.00 will be required to submit the results of a structural inspection by a Wisconsin certified inspector to verify the soundness of the building, along with a copy of their treasurer's report and audit. The Wisconsin Annual Conference Board of Trustees will evaluate each request on a case by case basis.

140.0.0 General and Jurisdictional Conference Delegations

140.1.0 Nominations and Elections:

- 140.1.1 Lay and clergy United Methodists of Wisconsin who are interested in election as General and Jurisdictional Conference Delegates may submit brief biographical sketches of themselves which will be distributed by the Conference Secretary in the pre-Conference materials. The Conference Secretary shall present the balloting procedures during the opening plenary of an election year session for adoption by the Annual Conference. In addition to the delegates elected to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, there shall be four clergy and four lay reserve delegates elected to the Jurisdictional Conference. 140.2.0 Organization of Delegation:

140.2.0 Organization of the Delegation:

- 140.2.1 Following election of the General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates, the Bishop or a person designated by him/her shall convene such delegation, including the reserve delegates to Jurisdictional Conference, at a time and

place set by the convener. The convener shall preside at this delegation organizational meeting until a secretary pro tem of the delegation is elected, who shall call the next meeting of the delegation. At that next meeting of the delegation, the chair and other officers shall be elected from among the delegation membership, as well as election of the members of the Jurisdictional Committee on the Episcopacy for the following quadrennium. The chair of the delegation shall be elected alternating quadrenniums between the clergy and lay members.

- 140.2.2 Travel expenses for delegation meetings shall be paid from the Annual Conference delegation budget. The General Council on Finance and Administration (GCFA) pays travel expenses and per diem relating to the General Conference attendance directly to delegates. Expenses of the first lay and clergy reserve delegates will be paid from the delegation budget, following the same policies as followed by GCFA for delegates. The North Central Jurisdiction (NCJ) pays travel expenses and per diem relating to Jurisdictional Conference attendance directly to delegates. Expenses of the first clergy and lay reserve delegates will be paid from the Annual Conference delegation budget, following the same policies as followed by the NCJ for delegates.

150.0.0 *Guidelines for Continuing Theological Education*

150.1.0 Statement of Purpose

The Board of Ordained Ministry is committed to providing support services to the clergy of The Wisconsin Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church in continuing education and formation for ministry

150.2.0 Interpreting The Spirit Of The Discipline

The 2008 Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church states, “Throughout their careers, clergy shall engage in continuing education for ministry, personal development, and spiritual formation and growth in order to lead the church in fulfilling the mission of making disciples for Jesus Christ. This shall include carefully developed personal programs of study augmented periodically by involvement in organized education and spiritual growth activities.” (§351.1) The spirit of this policy is to motivate clergy to participate in educational opportunities and events throughout their time in professional ministry and the intent is to enable life-long learning leading to growth in competence and effectiveness throughout a clergy person’s career.

150.3.0 Minimum Standard for Continuing Education

- 150.3.1 The basic unit of measurement for continuing education shall be called a CEU (Continuing Education Unit).

- 150.3.2 A CEU is defined as ten contact hours (instructional session or its equivalent) under qualified leadership.

- a. The session is designed with specific educational objectives for equipping the clergy person to do ministry. Distinction is made between continuing education versus spiritual growth that is a component of our covenant of clergy orders and fellowship for continued growth in the Spirit. For example, learning techniques of spiritual discipline can earn CEU’s; practice of spiritual disciplines as in a house of prayer or in a retreat does not earn CEU’s – it is part of the practice of ministry.

- b. The session is designed to train a member of the clergy to lead/teach/preach, for example, Bible Study, Stephen Ministries, leadership training events, preaching classes, etc. When the clergy is preparing material in order to be the leader/teacher/preacher with the expertise and qualifications for leading/teaching/preaching a class, this time does not earn CEU's; the students who are being equipped to lead/teach/preach through participation in the event earn CEU's.
- c. If the mission trip or event does not offer a CEU, the person asking for CE credit will report the content, leader, and number of contact hours of participation to the Chair of the Nurture and Formation of Clergy Team of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

150.3.3 It is assumed that programs sponsored by an agency of the General Conference, Jurisdiction, Annual Conference, or District-sponsored events as well as programs offered through accredited ecumenical or community service institutions will have qualified leadership and thus qualify for CEU credit.

150.4.0 Requirements

150.4.1 The following persons are required to receive a minimum of one CEU per year and at least four CEU's per quadrennium:

- Local pastors who have completed the Course of Study
- Elders in full connection under appointment
- Deacons in full connection under appointment
- Diaconal ministers under appointment
- Associate Members under appointment

For persons serving less than full time under appointment, the number of CEU's will be determined on a prorated basis. For example, a person serving half time under appointment would be required to receive a minimum of .5 CEU per year and at least two CEU's per quadrennium.

150.4.2 Minimum Continuing Education Allowance

The minimum continuing education allowance for every clergy person under appointment to a local church or the Conference staff shall be 2% of the minimum salary for ordained clergy persons in full connection in any given year, rounded up to the next \$100.

150.5.0 Exemptions from Continuing Education Requirements

150.5.1 Persons under appointment who are involved in academic study such as D. Min. and Ph. D. programs, Course of Study School, college degree and seminary degree programs

150.5.2 Clergy enrolled in an accredited Clinical Pastoral Education program

150.5.3 Clergy on Leave of Absence

150.5.4 Clergy serving as chaplains in a war zone

150.6.0 Earning the Required Number Of CEUs

150.6.1 **Seminar/Conference/Workshop Participation:** attending programs that list the total CEU credits available in their registration material.

150.6.2 **Study Travel:** traveling, with the number of contact hours of lecture and discussion under qualified leadership counting. NOTE: Repeat trips to the

same place will not qualify. Ten contact hours of lecture and discussion equals one CEU.

150.6.3 **Distance Learning, including online classes:** participating electronically or by telephone under qualified leadership. Ten contact hours of instruction or its equivalent equals one CEU. No more than one CEU per year may be earned in this manner.

150.6.4 **Professional Reading:** reading related to the knowledge and competency areas of scripture, theology, church history, church polity, pastoral care, or other skill areas essential to the practice of ministry are acceptable. **NOTE:** Daily Bible reading, devotional materials, normal reading for sermon preparation and leisure reading are encouraged but are **NOT** considered continuing education. Twenty hours of reading and reflection is equivalent to one CEU. No more than one CEU per year may be earned in this manner. The books read shall be reported on the Continuing Education Report Form.

150.6.5 **Mission Trips:** experiencing a mission trip under qualified leadership and appropriate accountability. The nature of the trip, the number of contact hours, and a listing of the qualified leadership shall be included on the Continuing Education Report Form.

150.7.0 Accountability

150.7.1 The Clergy Continuing Education Report is the instrument of accountability and shall be submitted annually with the charge conference reports each year. The Regional Offices will then forward the report of each clergy person to the Chairperson of the Nurture and Formation of Clergy Team of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

150.7.2 The report form shall be made available on the Conference website.

150.7.3 The Clergy Continuing Education Report will be reviewed by the Chairperson of the Nurture and Formation of Clergy Team and a report will be given to the Bishop and Cabinet for those clergy who do not meet the established guidelines for Continuing Education. The Bishop, Cabinet, and/or Conference Board of Ordained Ministry may take appropriate action for persistent failure to comply with these Continuing Education Guidelines.

160.0.0 Policies about the Annual Conference

160.1.0 General Policies

160.1.1 The Program and Arrangements Committee of the Wisconsin Annual Conference shall be authorized to establish the location of the Wisconsin Annual Conference sessions for the years 2010 through 2012.

160.1.2 Conference agencies are encouraged to voluntarily post their approved meeting minutes on the Wisconsin Annual Conference web site.

160.1.3 Congregations shall pay the expenses of their clergy and lay members to attend sessions of the Annual Conference to the extent that those expenses are not covered by the Conference.

160.2.0 Required Background Checks

160.2.1 Anyone (18 and older) serving in a leadership or participant capacity on behalf of the Wisconsin Annual Conference who works with children, youth (under the age of 17), the elderly, the incapacitated or those with handicapping conditions, the homeless, mission projects beyond the local church where membership or constituency is held – in-state, nationally

and/or internationally, or counseling and crisis intervention, in compliance with our commitment to Safe Sanctuaries, is required to have a legally certified federal background check. Currently, the only form of background check that certifies a person's legal identity requires a Social Security number. There are no exceptions to this requirement. Federal background checks are valid for 2 years, then must be updated.

Denman Evangelism Award for Work in Evangelism

Denman Awards are given to lay and clergy persons who are nominated by United Methodists in Wisconsin for their outstanding ministry in the area of evangelism. Harry Denman, in whose memory the awards are named, was a lay United Methodist whose personal witness and invitations may have brought more people to Christ and His Church than any other person in the last century. The awards are made possible by the Foundation of Evangelism, which was founded in 1949 by Dr. Denman.

The Denman Awards – named for evangelist Harry Denman – were first awarded in 1981 to clergy and laity displaying exceptional commitment to, and practice of, Christian Evangelism. Recently, the award has been expanded to include youth. This year's Denman award for clergy is given to Rev. Eduardo de la Cruz. The Denman Award for laity is given to Scott and Dawn Bethke.

Francis Asbury Award

The **Francis Asbury Award** is given to persons who have been instrumental in helping young people in secondary or continuing education and campus ministry. This year the award is presented to Jane Follmer Zekoff.

Bridge Builder Award

The **Bridge Builder Award** is given by the Commission on the Status and Role of Women for outstanding efforts to build bridges between the ministries of the Wisconsin Annual Conference and social and community needs. Bridge Builders strive to create harmony, cooperation and understanding in both the church and the world. This year's awards are given to Julie Mieke and Mac Weddle.

Thelma Gregg Award

The **Thelma W. Gregg Award** is given to someone who has demonstrated Christian commitment in tireless promotion of the missionary outreach of the Church. The award includes a financial gift to be designated to an Advance project by the recipient. This year's award is given to Bonnie Lund of Stevens Point: St. Paul's United Methodist Church.

Love in Action Award

The **Love in Action Award** is presented by the Disaster Response Committee to recognize outstanding commitment and passion to God's mission through disaster response and relief. This year's award is presented to Vince Ramsden for his work through Volunteers in Mission (VIM). Vince has been a member of the Wisconsin Conference National VIM committee since its beginning 26 years ago, and has participated in and/or organized more than 100 mission trips over 25 years.

Perry Saito Award
