

One cent for each admission from I to 68 cents, 2 cents from 50 to 89 cents, 3 cents from \$1 to \$1.40, 4 cents from \$1.30 to \$1.90, and 5 per cent tax on all admissions over \$3.

The sponsors of the bill said the act "is designed to tax all forms of amuse-ments and no exemptions are granted to suyers." This tax would be in addition to the 2 per cent sales tax which is now required to be paid on many smusements.

It is planned to raise approximately \$5,000,000 on this tax alone, or more than half of the \$0,000,000 sought in the eight bills.

Examples of its inaccurrance are legion, outnumbered only by examples of false conclusions, misleading deductions, and appaling disregard of the primary tructs of honest scholarship. I wish there were room enough to eite case, but they'd fill an entire issue disfinition to asy that there's not even the start of an adequate bibliography, that each chapter seems to rest on the basis of a single authority, and that much of the constricted space is given over to synopses of a few individual plays—the ones, you suspect that Mr. Cheney has actually read. . .

ones, you empect, thus Mr. Chenzy has actually read. . .

To a reviewer tied by affection as well as necessity to the grimy fields of the Broadway threater, the smugness of legit-actors-turned-ristio-performers is something appating. 





Committees-

Three committees suggested to supply the ideas and the framework for uniting operators' associations in a national program

The progressive Kansas City association and its attorney have outlined a program of services which a national organization or headquarters for State and local associations could and should render to the industry. Four general suggestions are made which agree in most respects with the ideas that have developed in the trade thru the years.

The basis of the suggestions is the recognized need of some central organization or headquarters that would bring together the various isolated associations and groups thruout the trade so there could be an exchange of ideas and also some central source to which calls for information and suggestions could quickly be made.

In the editorial last week (page 58) it was suggested that the foundations already have been laid for national centers or headquarters for all operators' associations in the headquarters which are now maintained by the national manufacturers' associations. The plans which already have been started will provide the most economical and the most efficient services which could ever be made available to operators' associations in the various States and also to operators in those areas where no organization happens to exist. The existing plans will also provide the best means for securing co-operation among the various sections and divisions of the industry. No one expects co-operation ever to be perfect but a large degree of co-operation between all divisions of the industry will be absolutely necessary in order to make any plan succeed.

It may be said that the very first requisite is a plan that will secure co-operation througt the industry rather than division, agitation, and competition. The present developments are so well under way that any agitation for new and separate national organizations would merely bring competition into a situation where no competition is wanted. If a national organization ever succeeds in the industry it must have co-operation and not competition.

First, the Kansas City group suggests a public relations committee as a part of the national set-up or council to build up confidence in the industry and respect for coin-operated machines as such.

It is suggested that much favorable publicity can be secured for the industry by properly organizing the talent already within the industry, giving it due recognition and putting it to work. The trade papers and their staffs are mentioned as being able to take the leadership in this field perhaps, or at least to offer valuable services. The industry learned only a few years ago that it has capable publicity men, writers, and advertising men who can render real services to the industry as a whole.

The manufacturers' associations have also duly considered professional publicity services and will make use of such services when a financial plan or ample funds are available.

It is suggested that State and city associations do much of the job in promoting better publicity for the industry. But publicity ideas are needed, according to the Kansas City group. They suggest that The Billboard editorial staff, with its extensive reporting system, collect and make publicity ideas available to all associations. This is something to work on and more details will be forthcoming about the possibilities for promoting better publicity.

The Billboard now has in preparation two bulletins, giving publicity ideas and suggestions, which will be mailed to operators' associations as soon as ready.

A second committee suggested as part of the national set-up would be known as the National Legislative Committee. This committee would have the job of watching legislation in States and cities and advising associations of the developments. An important job would also be to develop a legislative policy for the industry and try to prevent the passage of unfavorable local legislation which later might spread to other areas. It would offer advice and encouragement to local associations in emergencies.

A legal committee would also be part of the national council it is suggested, which would have the job of arranging for the compiling of existing laws and especially of advising local associations on proper legal steps and co-operating with local attorneys on the best methods of defense. The past history of the trade has shown the great need of a central source of such legal information and advice.

A fourth suggestion is that a monthly bulletin of ideas and suggestions for association executives be mailed to all such officials. This idea was appropriately discussed during the 1941 Coin Machine Show and the need for such a service is well known to all officers and committees in association work.

Accordingly. The Billboard now is planning the issue of a tentative Association Executives' Bulletin which for the time being will serve a good purpose and will most probably prepare the way for something permanent.

In viewing these ideas together, it is evident that they call for office headquarters and office staffs, all of which cost money. At present there are three national associations (two of them manufacturers) maintaining offices and staffs and any practical plans would call for the full co-operation of these organizations and their staffs. It is just such co-operation that has been under consideration for some time.

Also, the actual working of any of these plans calls for a large and rather expensive editorial staff. Many have already realized that The Billboard has a well-trained coin machine editorial staff and also an extensive reporting system which would cost any national organization many thousands of dollars to try to duplicate. This staff is being increased, and undergoes thore training all the time. Its services are being offered to the national organizations in whatever practical ways they can help. One of the first jobs will be to prepare copy for a bulletin by the Automatic Phonograph Manufacturers' Association which gives the best defensive arguments for and in behalf of phonographs.

These are suggestions to consider. Here are reports on some of the actual progress being made and also on the facilities that can be had to keep the industry going ahead.

Proposed Federal Law Rates **Slugging With Counterfeiting**

Five-year prison sentence or \$1,000 fine, or both, faces those who use any substance or device to obtain "things of value" from coin-operated machines

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Persons who have been dropping slugs into vending machines, telephones, and other com-operated mechanisms will not be treated as leniently as they have in the past if new proposed legislation against alugging is passed.

Legislation to be introduced in the House by Congressman Peterson, Democrat from Florids, will place such persons in the same class with counterfeiters and subject them to arrest and prosecution by the government. Experts from the Treasury legal department drafted the law.

The proposed law carries penalties which make slugging a decidedly unprofitable and risky affair. A slug dropped into any type of coin mechanism will start proceedings against the offender which may bring that person into a federal penitentiary for five years and with a \$1,000 time healeded. fine included.

Definite terms of the bill are: "It shall be unlawful to make or use any roin, token, alug, disk, or device in metal or other substance for the purpose of fraudulently procuring anything of value from any vending machine, coin box, telephone, etc." The measure provides a maximum penalty of \$1,008 fine or five years in prison, or both, for persons convicted under the law.

Increasing use of coin machines in merchandising and the consequent increase in sings in circulation has long been a sore spot to federal law enforcement agencies. At present, Secret Service officials state that mil-Hons of dollars of slugs are dropped into telephones, subway turnstiles, and coin machines.

It has long been a federal crime to manufacture or use a facsimile of a United States coin, but a recent federal case raised a fine legal point as to whether or not a sing, which merely approximates the size and weight of a coin, can be called a facsimile.

The Secret Service obtained a conviction in the courts and it was not appealed, but federal lawyers admit they were standing on pretty shaky ground. The proposed legislation is for the purpose of plugging a gap in the counterfeiting laws, which were passed before coin machines came into general use.

To the Buiter:

The action taken by several manufac-turers in placing a separate lock and door in the cashbox is in the right direction. This separate lock and should be on all machines.

As you know, the cashbox has no cover and when an operator opens a machine to check same, considerable ensument is made by the endocker as to the amount of money in the box.
