RADIO'S EXPANSION

Despite TV, Stations Approach 2,550 Record

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Amid as well as in Hawaii and Puerto TV's growth. AM radio has been quietly staging an uninterrupted climb, with Federal Communications Commission authorizations for AM stations approaching the 2.550 mark for the first time in broadcast history.

The commission has been granting authorizations at an average of more than nine a month since January. Grants have been going to communities ranging from peanut size hamlets such as Needles. Callf., and Swansboro. Ga., to such metropolises as New York and Los Angeles. By December 1, the number of total authorizations had reached 2.515. with only a slight let-up in the pace of authorizations since then. August proved to be the biggest month for authorizations, with 31 handed out by the FCC. In the last year and a half, the commission has issued 139 authorizations.

Bulk of CP's for AM stations this year went to day-timers only. The commission, however, found room for unlimited operations in such diversified areas as Grand Island, Neb.; Cheyenne, Wyo., Runnford, Me., and Wallace, N. New Creativeness and Dual AM, TV Airings NBC Goals

NEW YORK, Dec. 29. — Increased creative activity, marked by the conversion of more AM and TV series for airing in both media, is the 1953 programing outlook at the National Broadcasting Company. This was to be brought out today (Monday) at the programing portlon of the first national sales meeting staged by the network.

first national sales meeting staged by the network.

The meet, running Monday and Tuesday (29 and 30), is being staged for the benefit of the newly - unfitted radio - TV sales force of the network, and features top brass from each department expounding on policy and means of hypoing sales activity.

The programing session was mainly in the hands of Tom McAvity, in the absence of program vecpee Charles (Bud) Barry, who film-recorded a four-minute message which is to tee off the session. McAvity was slated to stress NBC's coming emphasis on new programing creativeness, exemplified by the marriage of creative talent to performing talent, as well as the web's conviction that virtually every situation comedy and dramatic serial can lend itself to both AM and TV, and the good ones from each medium are likely to be transplanted to the other in increasing numbers. numbers.

This will make easier the web's intent to sell both media in a single package, a proposition developed by Sylvester (Pat) Weaver, video veepee, with Barry. Thus, both the AM and TV versions of a single property will be offered to the same sponsor, at a combined rate designed to encourage use of both media, and by the same token, stimulate sales activity. However, it was stressed that there is absolutely no plan to develop a single rate for AM and TV on a general basis.

But Budget Up At Its WJZ-TV

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—A board meeting of the American Broadcasing Company this week decided to reduce drastically the web's TV program budget for the opening period of 1953, while approving new program plans for the local flagship, 'W.IZ-TV. The cutback for the web resulted from the delay in approval of ABC's projected merger with United Paramount Theaters, and will result in temporally maintaining on the air such low-budget stanzas as "All Star News."

The WJZ sked is being expanded with the outlet being used to originate local shows to the web on a spot currier busis rather than as co-ops. Such shows include International Boxing Clublinghts from Ridgewood Grove, 9-10:30 pm. Tuesdays, John Reed King in a quiz-panel stanza, "Why," Mondays, 10-10:30; and Valentino, Thursdays, 10:30. The "Spotlight on Harlem" Negro talent show is being shifted to a better local time slot, from 10-11 Mondays to 11-midnight Saturdays. All changes are effective the first week in January.

Video shows likely to get AM counterparts in the coming year by this blueprint include "Mr. Pecepers," the Waily Cox stanza, and "I Married Joan," the Joan Davis show.

SOUTH AMERICA

Great Potential TV Film Market Seen

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—There is a tremendous potential video film market in South America in the future, according to James Valentine who recently returned after installing equipment at LR3-TV, Buenos Aires. Ite also helped advise on the management of the station during the past year.

Valentine reports that because of exchange difficulties, import restrictions and language differences the market needs eareful cultivation before its full crop of dollars can be harvested. The present market is limited because of the few South American Stations telecasting, but the need for film is obvious, the exce believes. Valentine advises that TV film producers set up affiliations with distributors of the Hollywood product in South American. They are aware of distribution problems there and would naturally be better organized to market the product than outside firms.

Valentine also points out that not all American TV film is acceptable to South American viewers. They like adventure films, Westerns and any other series which accent action.

The American heritage receives The American heritage receives new lustre, and the dramatic heritage of the three stars receives new honor in "John Brown's Body," scheduled to open in New York in March. Like the First Drama Quartet, this is an evening of dramatic reading, yet so varied with choral and sound effects that it appears a likely bet to equal if not exceed the success of its predecessor.

From Stephen Vincent Benet's book-length poem about the Civil War, Charles Laughton has ex-War. Charles Laughton has extracted two hours of stirring entertainment. Under his direction, Raymond Massey, Tyrone Power and Judith Anderson give performances of extraordinary versatility. The language of Benet combined with the music of Walter Schumann, the deeply-felt gestures of the players, the breadth of the theme—for it is nothing less than America itself—make this an evening of high drama.

make this an evening of high drama.

In it, Power plays Tom Elliott and Clay Wingate, two opposing soldiers in the Civil War: Massey depicts John Brown, Lincoln and Cudjo, a slave; Miss Anderson presents all the female characters. They do a host of others too varying in line, movement and stress. By the time they have finished their episodic fragments they have gone all the way from Harpers' Ferry to the present. Walter Schumann's chorus is an integral part of their performance, with sounds of bugles, marching feet, cannon, distant cries and melodies, martial and plaintive.

plaintive.

The elements of the Civil War form a more distinct dramatic pattern as Laughton has arranged them, than does the inspired conversation of "Don Juan In Hell." Power does the best work of his career, ranging from the fury of the battle of Gettysburg to the mysticism of a young man in love. Massey returning to his characterization of Lincoln. creates some wonderfully moving characterization of Lincoln, creates some wonderfully moving moments while Miss Anderson has all the timing and emotional power of a distinguished career at her hand.

at her hand.

It adds up to another success for producer Paul Gregory, but a greater one for Laughton. The latter has transitioned the written word to an eloquent and patriotic theater form that speaks to all America.

Money for Mars

TELEVISION—Reviewed Monday (8), 8-8:30 p.m., EST, First of a series of educational programs over WLW-T, Cincinnati, in co-operation with Uberto T. Neely, head of the Cincinnati College of Music's TV Department, by the Allied University Council (University of Cincinnati, Xavier University, Indiana University, Ohio University, Mami University, University of Kentucky, University and Cincinnati College of Music), Producer, Charles Vaughn assisted by Jack Leverenze, Director, Manelle Weaver, Script, Fred Smith, Technician, William Augenbaugh, Narrator, George Brengel, Cast: James Dixon, Gfenn Ryle, Bruce Straight, Jack Gifford, Mary Louise Howard and William Myers.

In "Money for Mars," a dra-matic program on the subjects of sound money and inflation, the Allied University Council con-ducted an experiment in adult education by TV WLW-T fur-nished the time and facilities for this show, the first of a series of educational presentations to be offered over the station by the council

The council deserves a big

council

The council deserves a big bouquet for the manner in which it puts ideas across. The dull format that has characterized many educational shows in the past—a wooden-faced prof drlving home facts. regardless of the viewers, inclinations—was tossed out the window. As a substitute the council offered some bright and entertaining dramatic sketches that pointed up beautifully the ideas it wished to impress on the audience. The acting, by a cast of professionals, and direction of Charles Vaughn in these sketches were uniformly good.

Two points were brought out

Two points were brought out with impact in the sketches: Money is good as long as people believe in it, and the damage that can be wrought by inflation.

One sketch illustrated the fact that Confederate money represented a broker promise. Another scene, showing a man who was unable to sell good money at bargain rates, illustrated what happens when people lose confidence in their money. The scene then shifted to Rome at the time when the empire was beginning to disintegrate. Spending by a profligate government had driven taxes sky high and gold into hiding. Scurious money and inflation followed until only land and property had any value. As a clincher, George Brengel, narrator, who performed ably thruout the show, posed this question: Can the same thing happen in the United States?

Script writer, Fred Smith, of

thing happen in the United States?

Seript writer, Fred Smith, of the Cincinnati College of Music, who, incidentally originated the whole idea for the show and did a fine over-all job, set one scene on the planet Mars (from which the show took its name). The Martian sketch lent a bit of unreality to proceedings but nevertheless served as an adequate vehicle in illustrating some of the crackpot economic theories with which the U.S. has been plagued in the past. This epsiode involved the arrival on Mars, via space ship, of a nutty U.S. professor of economics with some pet financial theories for the Martians, who had oeen suffering from hardening of the business arteries. Despite the pleadings of a U.S. businessman (a stowaway), the Martians adopted defleit spending policies, confiscation of gold, singling of international currence; values, etc. The results, the viewer assumed, would be catastrophic.

Educators have been quite vocal in expressing their desire for a place in the TV pleture, but slow in putting their words and money into action. The fine job done on this show should give them some encouragement. Al Schneider.

58 Chicago Clubs And Performers on AGVA Unfair List

ARA Refuses to Book Any Act On List; Plans Boycott of Clubs

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—All the 58 Chleago Clubs plus the performers who have kept working in them have been placed on the national unfair list by the American Guild of Variety Artists, according to Jack Irving, AGVA topper.

Such places of the control of those usually closed for Christman.

topper.

Such placing on the unfair list will immediately be followed by action by the Artists Representatives Association, who under their agreement with AGVA, will not book any act or permit any of the acts belonging to their members to work in a club or establishment that is marked unfair.

Jack Katz, attorney for ARA, which has among its members the Morris office, Music Corporation of America, General Artists Corporation and the more important independent agents said Corporation and the more important independent agents, said that under ARA's agreement with AGVA, all performers working in the variety field must be members in good standing of that union. If the union disciplines its members are regularly employed, ARA will go along with the union, said Katz. "Insofar as the new performers' union formed in Chicago is concerned," said Katz. "we have nothing to do with them—we have no deal with them—we have no deal with them. Our deal is with AGVA."

Katz was asked about the Chicago agents who pulled away from ARA and what ARA insended doing about it. Would ARA members continue to do business with them?

Danny Graham Retires at 55

CHICAGO, Dec. 25. — Danny Graham, head of Music Corporation of America's act department here for the past 10 years, is retiring under the provisions of MCA's profit-sharing trust January 27 when he reaches his 55th birthday.

birthday.

One of the veteran agents here, Graham has been in show business since 1917 when he broke in as a performer in Boyle Woolfolk's "Sunny Side of Broadway." In 1928 he began booking in the Sam Roberts office. Four years later to opened his own office and in 1942 joined MCA. He is a past president of the Entertainment Managers' Association.

Upon retirement, Graham plans to take it easy for a while and develop his flair for comedy writing.

EMA SETS UP WELFARE FUND

CHICAGO, Dec. 27. — The Entertainment Managers' Association, revived by Midwest bookers, has come up with a welfare fund for its agent members. According to Vie Brown, secretary, the organization isn't asking for contributions from performers or anyone else.

EMA is setting up a death benefit of \$500 and has a committee working on other sick

mittee working on other sick benefits. The fund will be fi-nanced soley thru dues, Brown said.

Jack Irving was scheduled to appear before grievance board of the Chicago Federation of Labor, Monday (22) to seek help against the Chi clubs. But with Chicago closed up by bad weather that day, Irving was unable to make it.

Inving said he had no objection to appearing before the Chi AFL, but hinted that its off the record suggestions would make such an appearance futile.

"We were asked to call off the strike and negotiate," said Irving. "What is there to negotiate? If the clubs agree to pay the \$2.50 retroactive we will call off the strike. We can't settle for less than that."

strike. We can't settle for less than that."

Irving also 'implied that if it came to a showdown, it might be necessary to black out Chicago entirely. "Traveling acts may decide not to play-Chicago at all. They have other work in other cities."

Showbiz Off In Detroit

DETROIT, Dec. 27.—With show business way below par here, in contrast to optimistic reports from other major cities, immediate opportunities for talent to pick up club dates appear slim. Television may be one factor. Another, one booker said, is that buyers are wasting money on shows for New Year's Eve and Christmas parties, since the guests pay little attention to the show after starting to drink.

No resume of the year's new talent would be complete without mentioning two most unusual new artists who cracked thru in strong style on what once would have been called freak hits. One was Johnny Standley, whose Capitol Record of "It's in the Book," became the No. 1 novelty hit of 1952, passing the 500.00d mark saleswise in nbout eight weeks. This lisk was originally recorded by Horace Heidt on the Magnolia label, and was sold to Capitol late last summer. It was the only talking type of record of the year that made the big time, and it established Johnny Standley as another strong name in the Capitol novelty artist fold.

The other left field talent find was a young lad named Don Howard, who came into prominence with a recording of a rather melancholy love tune "Oh Happy Day," on the Essex label, Howard, who penned the tune, cut the record for the Triple A label in Cleveland, where the disk stirred un a lot of noise when spun by one of the jocks in town.

Altho most publishers and many record men were somewhat aghast and puzzled when they first heard the disk, they swallowed their astonishment and actively went after the tune and the record when they found out that the public liked it.

Bregman, Vocco and Conn grabbed the tune and Essex Records leased the master. A number of talent agencies were after the word, it is understood, has many other songs he has penned avaiting publication, so it is possible that there will be more happy days.

In addition, there may be at least four other bands performing at the inaugural ball which will be held in two locations on the night of January 20—in the cavernous National Armory and in Uline Arena.

Armed Forces March Contest is Announced

NEW YORK, Dec. 27. — An Armed Forces March competition, with \$4,000 in cash awards for scrvicemen and women whose compositions are judged best in four contests to be held by the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Forces, has been set by the Department of Defense.

It is specified that each entry will consist of a March conposed for bands; and entries will be suitable for parade purposes. Entries will include an introduction, first and second strains, and a break-up strain. A preliminary contest will be conducted at in stallations, then sermi-finals at major continuand levels, and grand finals at departmental levels.

Service bands are to be encouraged to play winning marches when practicable. A board of judges who are not members of the armed forces are to be designated by each service to select the winners of the grand finals. Members of ASCAP will not be judges at any level of the competition.

Details, as closing dates, entry forms etc., will be announced by the different services, or by the Department of the Army. The latter has been requested by the Secretary of Defense to co-ordinate the four contests.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Factors working toward a changed royalty rate for tunes on transcriptions were pointed up during the tlast several weeks when one tham band leader made a series of wax and tried to negotiate a transcription. The way series which was to be

of wax and tried to negotiate a 2-cents-per-tune deal.

The wax series, which was to be sold outright, contained disks ranging in length from 30 seconds to two minutes. They were intended for outright sale to stations for use on deciay programs. The usual transcription series is leased, with the publisher's royalty rate being \$10 per tune per year. It is understood that for the proposed series, some 22 disks were cut. Some of these were cleared at the usual royalty rate of \$10, according to pubbers' reps. One batch of tunes, however, were being negotiated for at the aforementioned rate of 2 cents por tune. These latter tunes were copyrights hald by Music Publishers' Holding Corporation. The Warners' music firms admitted there had been some negotiations for such a rate, but said that nothing had been worked out.

CAB Awaits Court Ruling





Inventory Time

The year 1952 is now all but wrapped up. The actual selling has just about come to an end, and now all that's left are the usual year-end headaches and chores: bills, taxes, working out return privileges, etc. Not the least among them is inventory adjustment for the coming year. They know that making sure that these items are in stock means money in the bank. They know that by letting zeros show up in the "in stock" column of an inventory control card means lost sales. This doesn't apply just to the classical dealer who has many "runner" items. The the "runner" records will vary by type of dealer, every dealer has them, whether they be spirituals with an r.&b. dealer or an old Glean Miller or Dorsey record with a pop dealer.



This all-Teha kovsky disking, another in the Decca "4000" series, is a first-rate set. The Stadium Concerts Symphony Orchestra, made up of members of the New York Philharmonic, does an excellent job with these well known selections, under the direction of Alexander Smallens. There are many waxings of these works on the market, but the quality of the waxing from both an artistic and recording standpoint (and the low price) should help sales here.

This is another fine coupling in the new Decca low price series. The familiar selections are brightly performed by the Stadium Concerts Symphony Orchestra under Alexander Smallens. Reason for the controversy is the fact that lyrically the work projects the official Russian propaganda line, calling the U.S.S.R. the country that desires peace. The oratorio, which was made from Russian tapes, is sung in Russian, but the liner notes and the titles of the movements give some indication of the meaning of the lyrics. Musically it is not up to Prokofiev's best work, the it is worth attention. At times plodding and bombastic, especially in the last movement, it contains many sections of lyric tenderness and haunting beauty, including "Tot Those Who Are Ten Years Old," and "Doves of Peace." The work is a mixture of colorful effects, in which the composer uses the chorus as additional instrumental timbre, and speaking passages are used with the same effect. It is really a large tome poem with voices. The story tells of rebuilding Russia after the war, and the desire of the people for peace. Mezzo-soprano Zara Dolkhanove is superb as the lead singer, and boy alto. E. Talanov, does an effective Job. The choirs are uniformly good, and the orchestra work is capable. Recording is also good.

Tobacco Profits Up

The tobacco industry enjoyed a comfortable profit during the second quarter of 1952, both before and after taxes, according to an estimate recently released by the Federal Trade Commission and the Securities and Exchange Commission jointly.

Tobacco corporations recorded a \$28,000,000 profit after taxes for the quarter compared to \$25,000,000 for the first quarter, a 12 per cent gain. Profits before taxes rose from \$61,000,000 during the first quarter to \$69,000,000 in the second quarter, a 13 per cent gain.

Popcorn Production.

Growers in 11 commercial pop-corn-producing States produced 253,089,000 pounds of popcorn this year, topping by 23 per cent the 205,149,000 pounds harvested in 1951 and by 18 per cent the 10-year 213,634,000 pound average, the Agriculture Department an-nounced this week. Popcorn pro-duction in the Corn Belt States generally was larger than in 1951. offsetting diminished crops in other areas adversely affected by the summer drought, with Okla-homa production down more than 50 per cent from the 1951 level. Indiana with a production of

50 per cent from the 1951 level.

Indiana with a production of 51,975,000 pounds led all other States in popeora production during 1952, replacing Illinois which alipped to second place with a crop of 47,500,000 pounds.

Growers planted nearly 183,000 seres of popeorn in 1952, nearly a fifth more than the 154,000 acres planted the previous year. Almost 90 per cent of the crop had been harvested by November 1, growers reported. Seventy-nine per cent of the current production is of the yellow variety and 21 per cent, white.



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
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
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
