Motion Picture Relief Fund Association

THE Motion Picture Relief Fund Association Sunday, September 21, broke ground at Woodland Hills for its home for aged, ailing and indigent actors and employees of the movie industry. The home will cost \$225,000, will require a total endowment fund of two million dollars to make it self-perpetuating.

Of the money raised to date—\$800,000—\$780,000 has come from the radio sponsor (Gulf Oil) of the CBS Gulf Stream Guild Theater, which pays \$10,000 weekly to MPRF for a show provided by MPRF, the Screen Guild and associated movie guilds—upon which the guest stars donate their services.

The radio series has raised this three-quarters of a million dollars during its three years on the air. It is now starting its fourth year and if (and there is little question that it will continue to

be sponsored by Gulf Oil or some other high-minded sponsor) it stays on the air another four years after this, its fourth season, the dreams of the MPRF executives will be realized.

For their foresight and unselfish donation of their time and services to this great enterprise of taking care of their own people, MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE applauds Jean Hersholt, Ralph Morgan, Edward Arnold and the many other guild executives and the screen stars who have donated their talents to aid in this project.

It is notable, particularly at this time, to observe that while certain Senators are wasting the taxpayers' moneys in a non-directional investigation of the movie industry, the movie industry itself raises its own moneys to care for its people—and is first to contribute to every worthwhile charity for the relief of others.

AMOS 'N' ANDY recently twisted a portion of their perennial broadcast series into a sermon which, according to the National Safety Council, already has had a noticeable good effect on automobile driving.

This broadcast was so touching that we want to repeat excerpts for the benefit of those who may not have tuned in. The Kingfish was bragging about how he had weaved and sped to Amos 'n' Andy's office, when Van Porter scolded him, telling him that every year in this country one out of every hundred people is either killed or injured in motor-car accidents. Whereupon Amos produced and read a clipping of a letter from a Mr. Riser of Dallas, Texas. He had written:

"Dear Friends: Today my daughter, who is seven years old, started to school . . . As she left home, her cocker spaniel sat on the front porch and whined his belief in the folly of education as his little daughter waved goodbye, and started off to the halls of learning.

"Tonight we, she and I, talked about school—she told me about the girl who sits in front of her, and the boy across the aisle who makes funny faces . . . and about the big girl who doesn't believe in Santa Claus. We talked about a lot of things, tremendously vital, unimportant things; we studied spelling, reading and arithmetic. Then to bed.

"She's back there now in her nursery, with Princess Elizabeth (that's her doll)

cuddled in her right arm. You see—this girl is very dear to me because I am her daddy.

"When her doll is broken, or if she cuts her finger, or if she bumps her head, I can fix it. But when she walks across the street she's in YOUR hands. She's a nice little girl, she can run like a deer and darts about like a chipmunk; she likes dogs, horses, likes to swim, and on Sundays she takes a hike with me.

"But I can't be with her all the time—I have to work and pay for her clothes and education.

"So that's why I'm writing to you. I'm writing you this letter to ask that while you're driving your car, please remember that my little girl may be crossing the street, or obeying the impulse of a child to run for a ball, or she may not be as alert for oncoming cars as I would be.

"So please be careful when you're driving, and don't kill my little girl. Thank you."

HOW *Radio* WILL DEFEND AMERICA

Curtis Mitchell, former editor of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE now serving in the nation's armed forces, is an acknowledged authority on radio. These theories of how radio may serve this country in time of war are naturally his own, but they are based on a wide knowledge of peace-time radio and the problems which this country would face in the event of war.—The Editors.

THE bombers will come first. Make no mistake about it. Modern bombers can fly to the United States, lay their eggs on defenseless cities, and return to their own airports.

They will do it, too, unless radio prevents them. Radio is one of America's first-line defenses.

Suppose the bombers do come. Already our shores are ringed with listening-stations and observers. Some of them are on distant islands, some on vessels at sea, some ride in blimps above the ocean. One of these stations will see them coming and radio will carry the message to military commanders whose duty is the defense of our shores.

Swiftly, naval and military air forces will converge on the approaching enemy. In daylight, their chores will be the simple destruction of the enemy. But what if the approach is made at night, as it almost certainly will be? Then radio again comes to the rescue. For radio is a part of the important

equipment of the night fighter. German pilots have already learned the fury of the British night fighter, and because of radio waves which direct the shells from winged cannon, the air raids on London have almost ceased.

When our own cities are threatened, newly trained young Americans will be in the night sky searching for the enemy. Their eyes will be sharpened by days of training in darkened chambers, but not even their sight can penetrate the clouds that are piled high. Yet they will fly with a vision that is startlingly clear, for they fly by radio, with invisible waves guiding them. Not much can be told of the complex equipment that is man's improvement on his own sight, but it is known that electrical impulses are flung into the air, thrusting and vanishing like rubber balls, disappearing in the distance because they find nothing solid against which to strike.

Those waves, when they do strike, rebound swiftly to the night fighter's instrument. Panel meters give readings—distance, angle, speed. So the oncoming bombers, even though they skulk through midnight darkness, are watched through radio eyes.

The bombers may start but not many will arrive.

But suppose the bombers get through to their objectives, and the parachute troops do effect a landing, and the transport planes come down with the

tanks and field-guns. What then?

Radio must do for America what it failed to do for France; it must tell Americans where to go and by what routes. When areas need to be evacuated, radio must instruct automobilists and truck-drivers to use certain roads and highways. The Army has first claim on the others. Indeed, it may be a part of one's preparedness to keep his radio continuously tuned in. No other means can tell the public so quickly of threatened danger.

SO WHILE radio is moving a horde of women and children into safety aisles across an entire state, it is also bringing up the tank-killers. Suppose that, somehow, Germany has landed a typical panzer division. It will advance with motorcycles and scout cars first, feeling for enemy guns or tanks. Behind these cycles and cars will be more tanks, light ones first and then the heavies. Whenever scouts locate batteries or other tanks, the attack pauses just long enough to determine whether or not to strike or to pass around. If the enemy is weak, inter-tank radios crackle and the panzers concentrate on him. If he is strong, radio summons the dive-bombers. In minutes, they roar up, blasting aside all opposition. Such team-work crushes everything.

The other day I saw America's answer to the panzer blitz. It was an

experimental tank-destroyer battalion, and it was unveiled for the first time late in August, when radio commentators were among those who were invited to watch it work.

We stood on a hill at the side of a long valley. Enemy tanks were attacking from the west. The tank destroyers sent out motorcycles and "jeeps" to find the enemy. Contact was made and a radio signal roused the "destroyers." We watched them roll into the valley from the east. First, a score of baby "jeeps"—those little cars which look like hard-boiled baby Austins and run like mountain goats, hurtled across the valley's floor. Each carried a 37-mm. antitank gun sticking beyond its radiator. Close behind were big half-track trucks moving on caterpillar treads as surely as any tank can move and half again as fast, each mounting 75-mm. cannon pointing forward. With incredible speed, without pausing for ditches or obstacles, they spread out fanwise until each had found a favorable place for receiving the tanks.

The tanks roared down from the west and the battle was on. A 75-mm. cannon will destroy almost anything it hits. A driver aims it roughly by turning the truck that forms the gun mount. The jeeps fired and ran, fired and ran again. Their 37-mm. shells will penetrate two and one-half inches of armor plate at 800 yards.

No German tank ever ran up against antitank artillery that hit and ran to a new position. If they had, German tanks would have found themselves just as helpless as the tanks I watched attempting to escape from the ambush of our American destroyer battalion. That battalion went after those tanks like a football team; each player had a job to do and did it. Not a tank escaped.

Radio did that, too. Without radio there would have been no communication, and without communication there would have been no teamwork.

Radio will fight in still another way. It is America's crystal ball.

Would you think, for example, that by listening to what Germans are telling Americans, both in North and South America, you could learn what Germany may do next? Well, you can. Even now German short-wave stations are talking to us at all hours. Each twenty-four hours they are sending us thirty thousand words of trickery and deceit. By following it for month after month we have learned that it assumes a pattern that is visible to experts. Our own Federal Communications Commission hires such experts and many others besides to listen to all foreign-language broadcasts. Stations in Oregon, Texas, Maryland and Puerto Rico hear all broadcasts directed to this country and to South America. They make recordings of

these broadcasts, turn them over to translators, then to analysts, then to psychologists. Result: The American government was warned ahead of time that Japan was going to occupy Indo-China. Germany's attack on Russia was predicted within a few days.

Those same far-flung listening-posts may tell us some day that Hitler will soon make an attack on Bolivia or on Newfoundland or on us. Whatever he contemplates, almost certainly we will be forewarned, for the cleverness of Goebbels' propaganda is like that of the forger whose imitation is perfection itself and thereby reveals itself. So does controlled propaganda reveal many a Nazi secret to the ear of a clever analyst.

Will there still be news on the air? Radio will defend America by telling every citizen just what his Army is doing at the front, just what his Navy is doing on the sea. Plans under consideration now provide for an Army spokesman who will keep the public informed.

HOW else will broadcasting help to defend America? Have you heard your radio station urging people to take civil-service examinations? Seven hundred stations did. Hundreds of spot announcements have summoned an army of workers to aid the Army and Navy. Not many months ago, the National Association of Broadcasters was

told, "We need five hundred thousand workers. Can you get them?"

Radio got them.

The Air Force told the NAB, "We need one hundred and twenty thousand men for our ground crews, ninety thousand flying sergeants, and fifty thousand flying cadets."

Radio is getting them.

The Navy told broadcasters, "In 1942, we will want one hundred and eighty thousand new men in naval aviation and other services."

Radio will get them.

In fifty-two different cities, boom-time production on war orders has brought thousands of workers who cannot find proper homes. Radio stations have been organized in each city to discover and advertise every apartment or residential vacancy.

Day in and day out, radio newscasts serve America. This implies a sobering responsibility. One radio station in the East received a call from a listener who asked its news editor if he knew about an epidemic at a certain camp. The listener insisted that one hundred soldiers were already dead in the camp morgue.

That was big news if true. The station began to check the story. Other listeners called to make the same report. The rumor began to assume ugly proportions. But the Army camp insisted that there were no dead soldiers and there was no epidemic. Reporters

were invited to visit the camp. When they arrived, they were taken to the morgue first of all. Once it had been a morgue but now it was used by a local women's knitting circle. The hospital was empty. Obviously, somebody had attempted a dangerous hoax.

THE fifth column that attempts to operate in America today will be stronger and more dangerous than ever tomorrow. Not long ago a mysterious fire broke out in the short-wave transmitter owned by Station WLW and real damage was done. The short-wave station had been sending news to South America, holding out a great and friendly hand to our neighbors. Someone wanted those friendly messages stopped.

Today, invisible radio fingers clasp all the Americas together. Today, bands of electric energy bind into one cooperative defensive unit all the elements of the U. S. Navy and Army; battleships and bombers and tank killers and night fighters united in impregnable array.

In peace, Americans have used radio better than any other nation. We have more stations, more receivers, more artists, more technicians, more listeners. In war, if it comes, we shall also use radio best—there can be no doubt of that—and employ its multitude of services in order that a complete and glorious victory may quickly be ours.

HER TOUGHEST PICTURE ASSIGNMENT IS "SKYLARK"

CLAUDETTE COLBERT, now rounding out eight years of stardom in twenty-five pictures, has met and conquered her toughest role, that of the wife of Ray Milland in Paramount's "Skylark." And it was tough going physically. She fell, bumped and was slammed about a tiny, rolling cabin cruiser for nine hours in one day, wound up counting twenty-seven black-and-blue marks on her body!

That was only one of the tough scenes in "Skylark," which called for slapstick from the glamorous lady. In a second, she had to wrestle with Milland and toss him over the back of a chair. In a third, she had to be jammed about in a subway station and then have her toes stepped on in the subway. But the power-boat scene was the lulu.

It shows her descending by short ladder to the cabin to brew coffee for herself and "the other man" (Brian Aherne), who is at the wheel riding out a storm. First Miss Colbert did a tummy slide from the top of the cabin ladder to the floor. She came up groping and hit a wall. Then she found the coffee-pot, which forthwith fell apart.

Trying to get water from the galley pump, she broke it and had to repair it while holding on like a tenderfoot to the saddle-horn. The gasoline-stove blew fire ceiling high when she lit it, the lid stuck to the coffee-can, and when it came off the can was upside down! She wallowed about in the spilled grounds, was thrown on her back into the bunk, then was pitched head first into the sink.

Her crowning, or clowning, glory was to pour a cup of coffee in all the boat-pitching and start up the ladder to the after-deck with it for Aherne. Twice she missed and came hurtling down those steps, hot coffee and all.

When director Mark Sandrich yelled "Cut!" Miss Colbert marched proudly off the set, sore and stiff, bruised and a mess, but not dizzy. "I've never been seasick in my life," she declared. "You see, I got my sea legs from a couple of experiences worse than this. The first was on a freighter. We ran into a typhoon in the China Sea, and the boat carried a cargo of onions—and you know onions!

"Not long ago I chartered a small power boat and took some friends off to San Clemente. I also took my Italian cook. It was the time of year when the channel kicks up quite a bit and I was rather doubtful about the cook. I warned him, but he reassured me with, 'Me? I'm Christopho Columbus!'

"Well, we hadn't been out an hour before 'Columbus' was scuttled. I had to cook for eight people. Nobody else would so much as poke his nose below. So I fixed 'em. I fried fish!"

The picture "Skylark" is Claudette's dressiest for some time. She has fifteen costume-changes, and except for the oilskins she wears in the power boat, they are very glamorous indeed. "Skylark" will provide quite a contrasting Colbert to the actress' part as a schoolmarm of the year 1914 which she is now enacting for 20th Century-Fox in "Remember the Day." In that screen play, Miss Colbert's entire wardrobe cost but \$300.

"But," Miss Colbert concluded, "I don't have to make coffee in a pitching boat!" —E. P.

ONE OF THE TRULY glamorous screen stars of all time, Claudette Colbert really takes a beating in Paramount's "Skylark" as the story unfolds at a zestful pace, accentuating its comic episodes to a high degree. The cooking-scene on the boat may well be the funniest Miss Colbert has ever done. Hardest (for Miss Colbert) part of the assignment is revealed in these candid pictures. While the boat is pitching and rolling, Claudette makes her unorthodox entry into its tiny galley by (1) missing the first rung of ladder, (2) landing with a dignity-losing bump, but still firmly set (3) on making a cup of coffee or dying in the attempt

FOURTEEN years ago, when I first hit the Hollywood limo, I played every position on the team in Paramount's college-story epics—and that ain't easy—but where did it get me? Well, for one thing, it always got me down—get it?—when I was tackled, huh, just had to make a three-thousand-mile run to Europe to escape from them Joe Chicago gridiron robes. When I returned they thought I had been graduated. (Who, me?) Not knowing how else to use me, film execs became so scarce that I'd been glad of any kind of a role, even one with my coffee!

Finally, I matriculated again in college for Darryl F. Zanuck in 20th-Fox "Rise and Shine." I made the team because my name is BOLENCIEWCZ. So they give me a number instead of my name—number 78. Number 77? Had Orange's number. And 89 belonged to Tommy Harmon. So they give me 78 hoping I'd be half as good as either of them guys, just as if I wasn't better! Haven't I been playing college football for fourteen years?

The necessary here are to hit someone that I'll pass my course. Imagine Oakie arriving from college that he couldn't, wouldn't, he's got a system of his own.

Two years ago they made a picture called "Touchdown," when Uncle John Oakie was but a freshman boy. They threw me out because I looked too old to be a college boy and made me a coach instead! So I started growing young. How do you grow young? By unlearning. I looked like I knew something so they threw me out. So I unlearned.

First I unlearned six glamorous girls' phone numbers. My face got full again—full and empty—perfect college material. Then I began unlearning how pictures are made. Finally I got so dumb Fox gave me this part. But I nearly lost it because I looked so young.

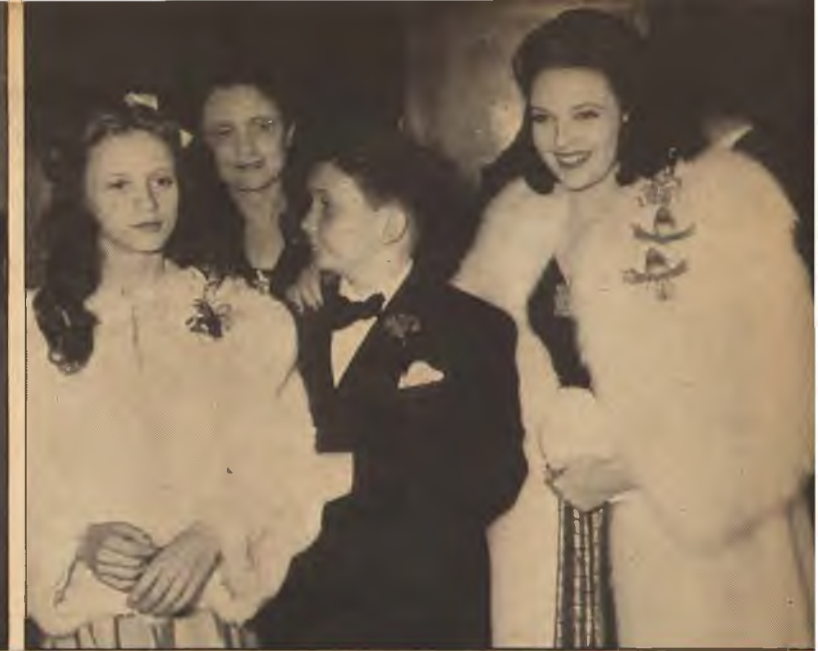
Hedy Lamarr Inventor

"WEEK-END
IN HAVANA"

Cast: Alice Faye, Carmen Miranda, John Payne, Cesar Romero, Cobina Wright, Jr., George Barbier. Directed by Walter Lang; produced by William LeBaron. Original screen play by Karl Tunberg and Darrell Ware. A Twentieth Century-Fox production in Technicolor.

Type of Picture: Here's a musical romance that will perk up any movie-goer. The picture is filmed in exquisite Technicolor; the romance touch is faint pink; the plot is not so much, but the music is in variegated moods of Cuban red that starts out at the boiling-point, keeps getting hotter until Havanized music and gaiety spills all over the place.

This is the Story: Plots in musicals are usually thin. That this one has been on a prolonged diet is true but of little difference. Alice Faye, a Macy's department store girl who has saved her money for years, takes a boat for Havana, where she is determined to crowd a lifetime of thrills and fun and romance into two short weeks. The boat hits a reef, and John Payne, a steamship official, flies to the boat to refund the passengers their money and get waivers from them, absolving the steamship company from damages and future lawsuits. Miss Faye becomes a recalcitrant militant, refuses to sign the waiver. Result: She gets to fly to Havana, spend two weeks there at the company's expense, after which she will sign the waiver. John Payne, in a pedantic role, goes along with her to see that she has a good time. This lust for life in Havana brings Cesar Romero and Carmen Miranda into the vortex and a Cuban holocaust flares up. Alice gets her romance and rumbas. She even gets John Payne.

Verdict: This is Alice Faye's au revoir to pictures for a year (she will be a mother in April), and it will leave her fans with a pleasant taste in their mouths. But it is Carmen Miranda who lifts this musical out of the rut marked "ordinary."

HOW NAZI SUICIDE TROOPS CRACK RED FORTIFICATIONS

Five specialists of destruction are the members of the Nazi DEMOLITION SQUAD pictured below. A squad is usually led by a sergeant, armed with a sub-machine gun and charges of dynamite. The second man is armed with a rifle, hand grenades and loaded down with several light planks, which provide "bridges" over mine fields and patches of barbed wire. The third and fourth members carry flame-throwers and rifles. They spray the face of a blockhouse with their "flammenwerfers," which have a range up to two hundred feet. They blind the enemy inside the fort and make continued resistance unbearable because of the great heat. The fifth man carries a sub-machine gun and the "fishing pole." With this long pole he can lay a charge of high explosive under the gun muzzles of the blockhouse while crouching in a near-by crater. He detonates the charge and spikes the fort's guns. The most hazardous operation for the squad is to maneuver from one crater to another—which they make for themselves with hand grenades if necessary—through the field of fire until they are under the gun muzzles. From there on it is easy to force capitulation of the blockhouse by destroying its firing power, blasting open its rear exits and killing or capturing its occupants. THESE MEN ARE BACKED UP BY

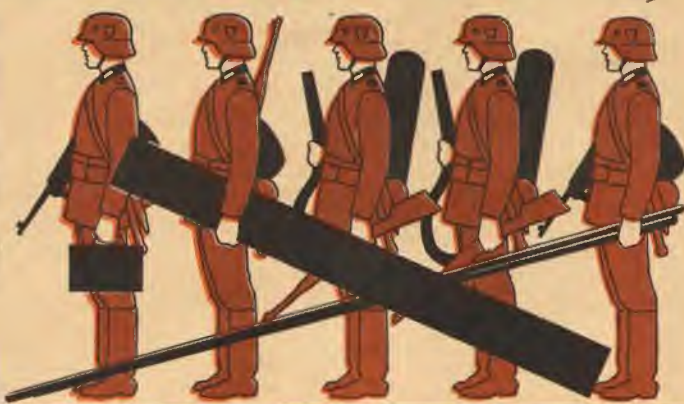

What Makes a German Soldier Tick

The common men of Hitler's armies—what are they fighting for?

By EDWIN HARTRICH

In the August 31, 1939, issue of "Der Wehrmacht," official illustrated weekly magazine of the German War Ministry, an eight-page story, complete with pictures, lifted the curtain to reveal to the tradition-laden war ministries of Europe that the era of mass fortifications was finished. The magazine was issued just as the Nazi blitzkrieg armies rolled into Poland. The feature showed how, after six years of patient study and practise, the Nazis had developed a new technique to break through so-called impregnable fortified zones such as the Maginot, Metaxas, Mannerheim and Stalin Lines. It told how, in quiet corners of Germany, the Nazi Reichswehr had constructed full-scale replicas, accurate in all essential details, of the major fortification systems of all Europe! Here they practised demolition until their technique was perfected. Out of this scientific study of fort destruction, they discovered the basic unit, the five-man demolition squad. Above, the operation of the squad is explained; below, we give you the story of Sergeant Hans

Schmidt, leader of one of those squads and an above-average German soldier. By studying him, we can better understand why the Reichswehr has proved such a formidable army.—The Editors.

SERGEANT Hans Schmidt enjoyed a brief rest by the roadside before moving up into the Leningrad fortified zone. Grouped about him were four tired and dusty technicians of destruction, members of his fortress-cracking squad. In a few hours they would be creeping over a death-strewn field with planks, flame-throwers, dynamite charges and sub-machine guns to the guns of a Red concrete-and-steel blockhouse. What was Schmidt thinking?

Like all soldiers, Hans has tried to sidetrack his fear of death or mutilation. He has crowded his mind with more pleasant pictures of his Annie and his parents in their little home in Dortmund. Annie is blond and fair and said she would wait for Hans to marry him when Germany won peace through victory. Papa and Mama Schmidt are middle-class Germans, tired and nervous from the war and worried about Hans. Hans could tell

that in their letters. Papa ventured to criticize the Luftwaffe (German Air Corps) because the R. A. F. raids into the Rhineland continued.

Hans has too much to live for to be a martyr for Der Fuehrer und Vaterland. He wants to return to Dortmund with his officer's commission. You see, he is ambitious to rise from the ranks into the officer class, for he can do that in Hitler's new army, where ability and merit count for more than wealth, education or family background. Even now, Hans can eat in the same restaurants and go to the same cafes frequented by the officers (which his father and grandfathers couldn't do!). Hans is a good soldier because he can see a good future in the army.

Because he is a valuable, efficient piece of hard-hitting war machinery, Hans is well housed, clothed and fed with the best that there is available in Germany or the occupied countries. He enjoys higher living standards than Annie or Papa and Mama Schmidt.

The Reichswehr does not meddle with Hans' personal relations with the Deity. But, other than that, every

Do the Nazi communiques tell the truth?

ANSWER:

The most reliable reports are issued by the Reichswehr. However, when Hitler personally edits the daily communique he is likely to dream up a few extra "victories" which his more conscientious generals find hard to deliver. The German navy seldom is mentioned, but in their communiques the admirals make up for lost time by considerable padding of their figures of British shipping losses. The Luftwaffe (air force) competes with Propaganda Minister Goebbels for the title of "Biggest Nazi Liar."

The Junger Maennerchor is a prize-winning and pioneer singing society, presented its first program on Washington's birthday in 1852 (MBS) . . . "Sari," with Marion Claire and baritone Igor Gorin singing lead roles, is the operetta to be heard on Mutual's "Chicago Theater of the Air" . . . Madge Evans, beautiful actress who grew from child star to woman star on the screen, will be guest on "Theater of Today" (CBS) . . . The excuse for celebration will be a salute to the great new transmitter of Columbia's key station, WABC. But to listeners the salute program should be highlight entertainment. Numerous CBS personalities will be paraded by the network in an elaborate show marking the transmitter's opening Satur-

day night . . . An actor turned soldier will be a soldier turned actor this Saturday night. Private Don Gallagher, who before induction into the Army was a prominent actor in such Chicago network shows as "Mary Marlin" and "Ma Perkins," and now on leave from Fort Leonard Wood in Missouri, will be heard as a thug named Pete in "Cupid and the Corpse" on "Knickerbocker Playhouse" (NBC).

Sunday, October 19

The "American Radio Warblers," a choral group of ten canaries that put on their own musical show to the accompaniment of an organ, returns to MBS this Sunday, bringing good news to home canaries that listen and sing along with these vocal coaches of the bird world . . . The noted religious program, "Lutheran Hour," returns to MBS, featuring sermons by Dr. Walter A. Maier, Concordia Seminary theologian. The program will be heard at two separate times on Sunday . . . Aspiring operatic and concert singers will again have a chance to sing their way to fame with the return for another season of the "Metropolitan Auditions of the Air" (NBC) . . . A real dramatic highlight for this week will be a "Screen Guild Theater" presentation of "Nothing Sacred," with one of Hollywood's most

popular married couples, Barbara Stanwyck and Robert Taylor, starring in the screamingly funny comedy . . . "Walt Disney's Song Parade" is a new show on Mutual which speaks for itself in the title and which should provide quality musical entertainment . . . Renowned pianist-conductor Jose Iturbi will direct the orchestra on "Ford Sunday Evening Hour" and pianist Josef Hofmann will be guest performer (CBS).

Monday, October 20

During this week the "National Farm and Home Hour" broadcasts will feature highlights of the Future Farmers of America Annual Convention and American Royal Livestock and Horse Show in Kansas City, Mo. (NBC) . . . "Cavalcade of America" (NBC) originates in Hollywood this Monday in order to present Walter Huston, Edward Arnold, Simone Simon, James Craig, Jane Darwell and Anne Shirley in "All That Money Can Buy," from a story by Vincent Benet . . . Frazier Hunt, newsman pal of the Duke of Windsor, is now on the air with a Monday-through-Friday five-minute news program on CBS . . . "Stories America Loves" is a nostalgic new dramatic program, now in its third week, bringing to life on the air novels and plays which America has taken to its heart in the past

(CBS) . . . "Contented Program" now features "Portraits in Music," throwing the spotlight on famous personalities through their favorite tunes or music of their day (NBC).

Wednesday, October 22

"American Melody Hour" is the title of a new commercial program to be launched on NBC this Wednesday night. Beyond the title and the fact that it is to be a musical show, nothing is known of the format or cast of the program at this writing.

Thursday, October 23

After spending part of his vacation in Argentina, Bing Crosby takes up again his duties as singing, gabbing host of "Kraft Music Hall" on NBC . . . Veteran comedian Frank Fay joins the fall parade of new shows this Thursday. On the variety show will be, besides star Fay, Bob Hannon, tenor, the Continentals quartet and Harry Salter's orchestra (NBC).

Friday, October 24

The distinctive dramatic show, "Grand Central Station," is being heard again this season in a series which began two weeks ago on NBC. It adheres to its policy of presenting top-name stars in original radio plays written chiefly by established authors.

What Makes a German Soldier Tick

phase of Schmidt's existence and his thinking is carefully and scientifically supervised. (The Reichswehr even protects the girl friends and wives of soldiers at the front, punishing with heavy fines and stiff prison sentences any men trying to alienate their affections.)

Since he joined the Hitler Youth in 1933 as a lad of sixteen, Hans has been trained to the belief that he is part of a great crusade to make a better and brighter world, albeit a Germanic world. To rid Europe of "Jews, the bloodthirsty Kultur Bolschvismus, and the decadent, corrupt capitalistic democracies" is, he thinks, a task worthy of a good German. The world outside really looks like this to Hans.

In 1935, Hans was spiritually converted to Nazism when he joined the Labor Corps. For two years he lived in open-air camps in the Black Forest, digging ditches, building bridges and learning simple military tactics. The stout, lusty comradeship of the Labor

Service appealed to Hans. As he sat around the campfires at night, participating in the artfully staged propaganda shows, he was excited by promises of the glorious future of the Third Reich, which he was helping to build by his unquestioning "obedience and faith" in Hitler and his representatives. The credo of Nazism was something mystical, half-understood by him but to be venerated like the Holy Bible.

He was called into the army after his labor service, and with regret abandoned his hopes of going to a university. (Hans has spent so much of his young life serving the Fuehrer that he has acquired only a high-school education.)

JOINING the army was a rude awakening to him. Army sergeants, like their kind the world over, are not given to poetical rhetoric about Hitler's "New Order in Europe" but are concerned only with pounding the fundamentals of drill and tactics into the heads of *dummkopf* rookies.

Hans became one of 300,000 soldiers trained as a specialist in assaulting and cracking fortifications.

In this new army of specialists, Hans has learned that personal initiative outweighed the rule books when the battle starts. He was told that he must depend not on a succession of orders but on his own personal judgment in the thick of any engagement.

Late in June, Hans had his first taste of blitz warfare in a frontal assault of the Maginot Line below Saaralben. It was not a real test of the "fortress crackers," because some of the forts were emptied of their defenders; others surrendered with only a taste of the flame-throwers, and only a few of the French positions really challenged the skill of Hans and his comrades. Hans didn't know that Hitler had ordered a "prestige offensive" against a crippled and surrounded Maginot Line just to humiliate the French further. But Hans was rewarded with promotion to sergeant and a trip to Paris. He sent his Annie cosmetics and her first pair of silk stockings from Paris.

All last winter and through the spring, Hans was in Poland, training to assault the Russian types of pill-boxes and blockhouses later to be encountered in the Stalin Line. And,

as he thinks of his work in the next few hours, he is comforted by his working knowledge of the enemy's positions and its weak points.

Hans has a secret complaint against those "desk warriors" in Berlin who have led him to believe that the war would be short and easy to win. He still has complete faith in his field officers and in Field Marshal Ritter von Leeb and Col. General Busch, who are directing the siege of Leningrad. And, isn't it true, he asks himself, that one German soldier is the equal of five of any other army? But Hans has been surprised to find that the "Red beasts" can also fight like men and, dying, still feebly press the triggers of their guns. They can kill, too, he has seen.

But now, as he picks up his equipment, Hans is more concerned with the every-day problems of a soldier's life, such as getting a winter coat, cigarettes, or a letter from Dortmund. These are vital distractions, necessary to men who face the perils of blitz warfare. Achtung, vorwart!

IN THE first letter received from the Netherlands East Indies (commonly known as the Dutch East Indies) since the mother country was invaded by Nazis, J. J. Kollbonso of Batavia, Java, gives the following interesting facts concerning broadcast activities in those islands. All local reception is by short wave, since static renders ordinary broadcast reception impossible. The following network of low-power stations furnishes domestic reception for the native population: YDA2 (2.475), YDA3 (1.64), YDA4 (1.55), YDA5 (2.415), YDA6 (2.335), YDA7 (2.38), YDB2 (2.45), YDB3 (1.66), YDB4 (1.615), YDB5 (1.595), YDB6 (1.57), YDB7 (1.53), YDB8 (1.68). In addition, the Netherlands East Indies boasts six international transmitters—power ranges

from 1,000 to 80,000 watts for each station—for broadcasts to the outside world. They are YDA (3.04 and 7.25), YDB (9.55 and 15.31), YDC (15.15), PLP (11.00), PLS (10.365) and PMA (19.345). These stations usually operate in a network, and the approximate schedule of operation is 4:40 to 10:40 a.m., 5:40 to 7:40 p.m. and 9:10 p.m. to 2:10 a.m. EST. PMA (19.345), Bandoeng, Java, broadcasts a special program to North America daily from 7:25 to 8:25 a.m. EST.

He is now Soviet Vice-Commissar for Foreign Affairs. Lozovsky used to be a blacksmith; is a tall, handsome fellow of about sixty; possesses a keen sense of humor of a rather grim type.

When Hitler was boasting that he would be in Moscow like Napoleon, Lozovsky said: "The difference between Hitler and Napoleon is that Napoleon reached Moscow, but Hitler must content himself with photographs of the Kremlin." Lozovsky plays tricks with Berlin. The Russian interrupter of German broadcasts is the finest radio joke of all time.

The last of Lozovsky's tricks is to drop communique in German, Hungarian, Slovak and Roumanian over

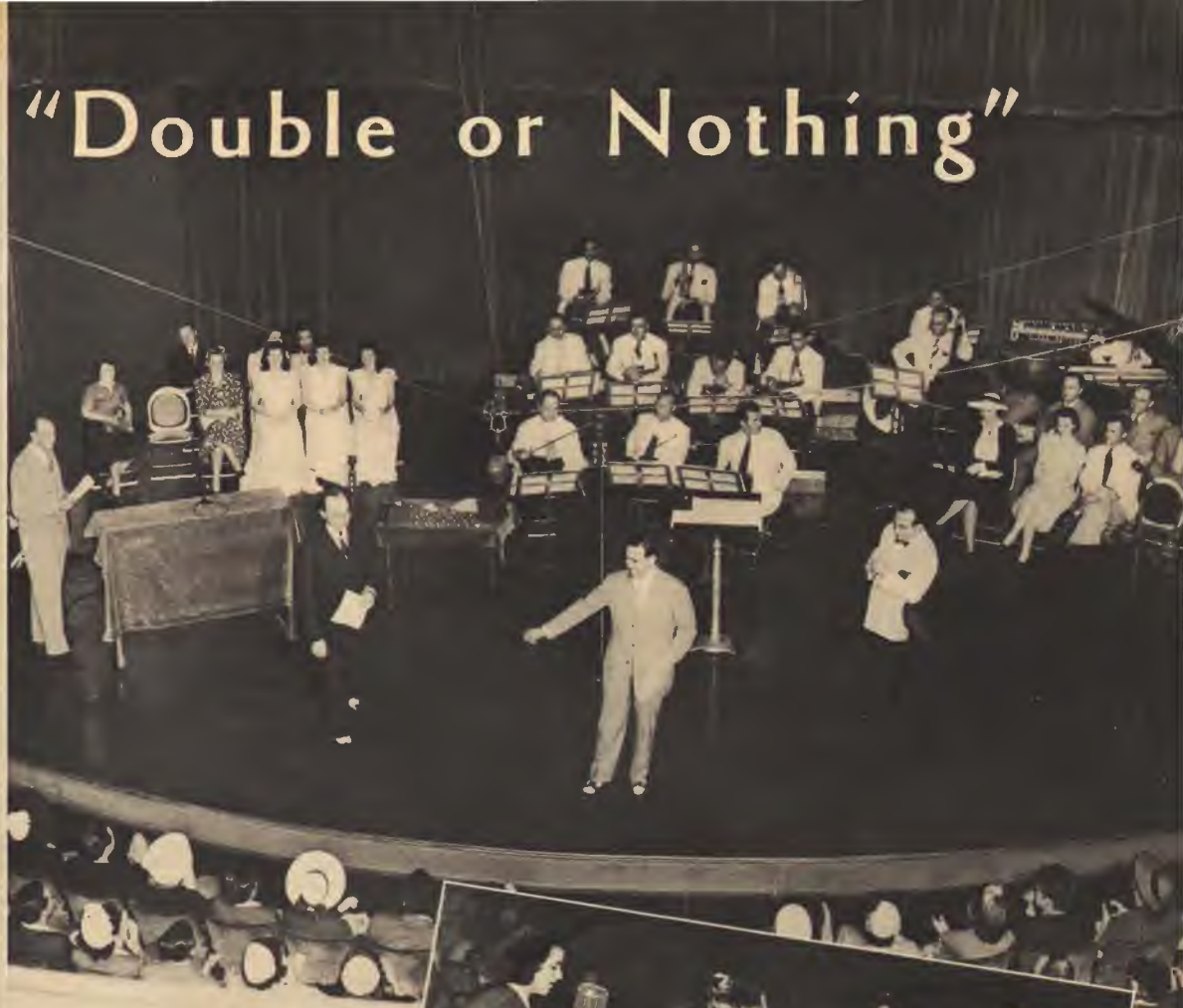
"Double or Nothing"

"THIS IS LONDON"

Edward R. Murrow, CBS correspondent, becomes a new kind of reporter for a new kind of war

WHEN the Nazi mechanized legions smashed into Poland, the act ushered in World War II. It also ushered in a new kind of war reporting to match the new kind of war. In this total war private citizens—ununiformed, unarmed, virtually unprotected—were to suffer, more than many of the organized armies of the past had suffered. And war correspondents, along with everybody else, were to run the ever present risks of war violence as never before.

One of the foremost of these new-style reporters is Edward R. Murrow. Since the war began radio listeners in America and elsewhere have learned to listen intently for his calm salutation, "This is

London," confident they would hear meaningful news and sidelight accounts, graphically but straightforwardly reported. It is hard, however, for Americans sitting peacefully by their radios to grasp the full fearsome picture behind those simple words. It isn't easy to comprehend clearly that "This is London" means "This is a plane-battered city. This is a city standing between world slavery and peaceful freedom. This is humanity fighting with its back to the wall."

The news accounts and word-pictures that go with Ed Murrow's commonplace greeting have come as near as is possible to giving listeners a true idea of the war scene abroad, for Murrow himself has not only wit-

nessed the scene. He has been a part of it. Three times his headquarters was severely bombed. Still he continued his practice of going up on a roof to watch the action or driving around town to see the results during an air raid.

DESPITE his frequent brushes with death, Murrow has given listeners many vivid stories of the nature and effects of an air raid. He explained how freakish as well as horrible the explosion of a bomb can be. He told how a bomb can explode at an intersection and send a destructive blast down two streets, shattering windows for a considerable distance, but often leaving the big windows within a few yards of the bomb crater intact. He could explain this phenomenon, because he had seen it happen. He could tell listeners from first-hand observation that glass generally falls out into the street, rather than being blown inward—just as a boxer usually falls forward when hit with a knockout blow. He was able to note that when bombs fall near one, it is automatic to assume very undignified positions, because he had quite frequently caught himself doing just that! Personal experience enabled him to reveal the peculiar fact that the sense of danger, death and disaster comes most forcefully when the familiar incidents occur—the things one has associated with tragedy since childhood. In one of his broadcasts he reported that the sight of a half-dozen ambulances weighted down with an unseen cargo of human wreckage affected him more deeply than all the battle fury from the skies.

Yet it wasn't for bravery that Murrow was awarded the prize of a typewriter with an engraved inscription by the Overseas Press Club. It was

for consistently excellent foreign news reporting. This despite the fact that Murrow is not a trained reporter in the traditional sense. He never went to a school of journalism and never worked for a newspaper.

Edward R. Murrow was born in Greensboro, N. C., thirty-seven years ago, moving with his parents to the state of Washington in 1920. He attended Stanford, the University of Washington and Washington State College, majoring in political science, speech and international relations, and earning his master's degree with honors.

Immediately following his graduation from Washington State in 1930, Murrow became president of the National Student Federation, in which capacity he visited hundreds of American campuses and traveled extensively in Europe. He joined the Institute of International Education as assistant director in 1932. He was in charge of foreign offices in five foreign capitals, gained more valuable information and experience in European affairs. He joined CBS as Director of Talks in 1935. In this position he learned the three essentials he considers necessary in order for a person to do an effective job at a microphone. The first essential is for the speaker to be able to talk well. Second, the speaker must be intimately acquainted with the subject he intends to discuss. Third, the speaker must know the United States so that he may know his audience. Murrow not only demonstrates in his own broadcasting that he is well grounded in all three essentials but he has also presented regularly guest speakers and interviewees who measured up to those standards.

In 1937 he went to London to become head of CBS' European Bureau. He distinguished himself in 1938 by

chartering a twenty-three-passenger plane and flying to Vienna as sole passenger in time to describe the Anschluss.

Murrow became most successful in developing the new kind of reporting for a war that brought everybody into the front line. During the days when the blitz was at its zenith, he spent every available moment talking to the people of England—clerks, shop-girls, air-raid wardens, dockyard workers, housewives. He knew that for these people death was closer much of the time than to the men actually under arms. It was the experiences of these people facing the constant danger of death that Murrow wanted to get, because he knew that through their reactions American listeners could learn the truest picture of this monstrous modern war. To get their experiences and views he, as they, often risked his own life.

MMURROW'S recently published book, "This Is London," is a collection of his most important broadcasts to this country, telling the news story and the human story of the war in Britain. There are many other stories which he can undoubtedly tell now that he could not broadcast before, for Murrow and his wife of a few months have just returned to the United States for a heroically earned vacation.

Coming home will be sweet relief to Ed Murrow. Life here probably will appear almost strange without the nightly blackout, the cataclysmic air raid, the pathetic sights in the wake of war. But he'll undoubtedly be ready and willing when the time comes to go back and continue his great job of seeing history through the eyes of the millions of proud private citizens who are real soldiers in World War II.

ELEANOR ROOSEVELT'S Pictorial Life Story

Part 3 — CAREER WOMAN

MOST controversial—and most interesting—phase of Eleanor Roosevelt's life as First Lady has been her professional work. Besides raising five children and being Franklin Roosevelt's wife—with all that implies—Eleanor Roosevelt has found time not only for one career but for many. Among them: Author, newspaper columnist, editor, lecturer, school-teacher, furniture manufacturer, politician, defense official. It hardly need be added that, unlike the proverbial Jack, Mrs. Roosevelt has mastered all of her trades.

In pre-Washington days it was the interesting business of making fine furniture and teaching at Todhunter School for Girls. Americans didn't know much about Mrs. Roosevelt then, and didn't care. Before she was well settled at the White House, however, they were shocked to see mild Mrs. Hoover's successor making headlines as a lecturer, magazine writer and columnist. Soon she was earning twice as much as her husband. But the money went to charity and accusations against a profiteering First Lady—except from die-hard political enemies—have long since died down. Here, as in her personal life, Eleanor Roosevelt has overcome prejudice with friendship, jealousy with generosity. And such are the qualities of greatness which draw millions of American listeners to Eleanor Roosevelt for her Sunday series over NBC.—J. C.

The "V" Campaign

Dear Sirs:
As a matter of current interest I should like to bring to your notice the following:

On Monday, July 15, 1940—over a year ago—the dots and dashes of the Morse code caught the ear of radio listeners as they spelled out over the air the word "Victory." A voice then asked, "Could you translate that code message? It said, 'Victory, victory!' as it said yesterday and will say tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow—until it becomes fact in history and the triumphant foundation of all our tomorrows." The next day there followed, "You have heard again that coded word 'Victory,' as one day a million wires will carry it and a million wireless sets receive it, and the whole world shall echo to it."

"Victory" was the key word of "Thought Barrage," a fifteen-minute radio program filled with inspiring comments, sponsored by the Marconi Co. and emanating from station CFCF and short-wave station CFCX in Montreal.

The idea was to stimulate the morale of the civilian population of Canada and provide a focal point for massed thinking during a period when news of the progress of the war was at its most discouraging stage.

James Shaw, manager of station CFCF, conceived the program and was the narrator. He collaborated with Leslie Crombie, who wrote the scripts daily for six months, bringing to listeners in beautiful language messages of high hope, courage and faith.

Letters from England and Canada expressed appreciation of the importance and merit of the broadcasts.

In reflection the thought occurs to me that, perhaps, here lay the nucleus from which grew the present worldwide "V for Victory" campaign of the British against the Nazis.

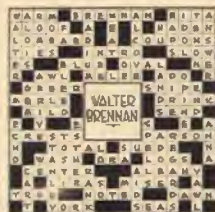
