



World Dadio History

ne of the weird things about hi-fi, a little like the way Merlin (the magician in Arthurian legend) grew ever younger, is that the longer you listen to it, the more impressed you are by quality inexpensive components rather than those which cost mortgage money. There's no doubting a lot of high-end equipment with four and five-figure price tags outperforms the majority of more mortal electronics, but the prices involved give designers huge room for manoeuvre when it comes to vital points like audio-grade parts, oversize transformers and vibration-stifling casework.

It's a completely different world when costs fall to £1000 and below. Squeezing the maximum from every single penny of a comparatively limited design budget separates companies which have a genuine understanding of circuit construction and parts selection from those who merely follow where others have gone and fill their circuit boards with the cheapest capacitors and resistors they can find.

Examples? A friend who has accumulated a system worth around



£20000 recently commented that, if he'd heard Audio Analogue's Puccini SE integrated before he started raiding his bank account, he would never have spent so much on hi-fi. The same goes for Creek's OBH-12 passive pre-amp, Denon's DVD-3000 DVD player, Tannoy's Mercury m2 loudspeakers, Atacama's SE24 stands, Pink Triangle's Tarantella turntable, DNM's Mica cartridge, Lehmann Audio's Black Cube phono stage and the list goes on. Hi-fi doesn't have to be expensive to be very, very good indeed.

Unfortunately, because the cocktail of music and hi-fi can be so addictive, it's possible to lose sight of the wood for the trees and spend

as much on a system as you would on a car or an extension for a house. However esoteric the hi-fi, there's no getting away from the fact that what comes out of the 'speakers is but a shadow of the real thing, and a lifetime of live music is a wiser investment than money-no-object equipment.

In defence of non-budget gear, like the £5000 Accuphase DG-28 digital equaliser on page 13 this month, cutting-edge technology rarely comes cheap. Digital Signal Processing, as embodied in the DG-28 (and B&W's Listening Room Optimiser), requires a lot of computing power, but the Accuphase points to future developments in overcoming problems posed by the weakest link in any system - the listening room. And the past tells us the cost of computing power has a habit of dropping like a stone not long after its release.

What with a successor to CD slowly shaping up (whether it be DVD Audio or Super Audio CD) and the emergence of DSP, the evolution of hi-fi looks to be quickening after the doldrums of Compact Disc.

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

GOING FOR A SONG

Valve amplifiers from the Californiabased Canary Audio are now available in the UK through distributors Music

Connoisseurs. The range is based around the famous 6550, EL34 and 300B valves, and includes both pre and power amps,

The first of two pre-amps is the CA-601 single-box with its four line inputs and a frequency response of 22Hz to 31kHz. The

second is a dual-mono design (CA-801) whose power supply and amplifier circuitry sit in separate boxes to minimise interaction. The claimed frequency response is 10Hz to 64kHz.

Canary offer two monobloc power amps as well, the CA-303, whose four 300Bs in push-pull put out 24watts, and the CA-306, which uses 6550s



to reach 50watts a side. Like the CA-303, the CA-301 uses 300Bs, but fitted onto a stereo rather than monobloc chassis.

All of these Californians boast substantial metalwork (3/8in. anodised-aluminium faceplates, for instance) and include MIT capacitors, 2% metal-film resistors and very short runs of wiring. Prices for the pre-amps are £1595 for the CA-601 and £3750 for

> the CA-801. The CA-303 monoblocs will set you back £3750, the CA-306 £5495, and the CA-301 £3055.

TANNOY'S MERCURIAL ADDITIONS

Tannoy's Mercury m2 loudspeakers, which have been enjoying

great success since their release. form the basis for Tannoy's new budget outing. The m2.5s, as they've been inventively called, benefit from a host of modifications over their cheaper stablemates. For a start, the mid/bass driver has been moved higher up the front baffle to bring its acoustic centre closer to that of the tweeter. The LF unit has been revamped with a lighter, twolayer voice coil to improve transient response too.

Then there are the alterations to

the crossover. The resistor in the m2 which brings tweeter output down level with the mid/bass's has been replaced with the Auto

Transformer used in Tannoy's more expensive models for better tweeter control. Finally, the rear-firing port has been lengthened to tune the bass lower than the m2s'. The premium? Around £30 on the £140 m2s.

FLOATING THE ARK

Ark Loudspeakers' Model 1 stand mounter, which has been on the market for about a year, has now been joined by their new creation, The Ark. This three-way floor stander uses a single piece of 26mm veneered MDF to form the rounded back and straight sides. For maximum rigidity, the front baffle is a slab of 40mm-thick hardwood.

Instead of squeezing skimpy

crossover components together on a PCB, each of the three occupies its own board to reduce interference and 1kg of copper is used in the bass-network inductors! This means the 87dB-sensitive Arks can be tri-wired or tri-amped and fed up to 250watts. Unusually, the price of £2795 (for Ash, Cherry, Mahogany, Oak, Maple and Walnut finishes) includes terminated loudspeaker cable.

SHORT IS BEAUTIFUL

Mordant-Short have unveiled their first line of hi-fi 'speakers to feature moulded, elliptical polypropylene drive units. The MS800 series consists of the MS812, a two-way stand mounter, and two floor standers, the two-way MS814 and the three-way MS815.

MS claim the elliptical design offers reduced coloration and crisper dynamic response while also allowing the use of slim cabinets (for better imaging) without compromising bass. Taking care of the top end is Mordaunt-Short's own anodised gold-dome tweeter. All of the above gives these three 'speakers high sensitivities of 90dB or more.

The 800s can be had in Black Ash with Cherry front baffles and are priced at £200, £300 and £450 per pair respectively.

A new digital-to-analogue convertor has just been developed by Chord Electronics. The DSC 900 joins the DSC 1100 and DSC 1500 in the company's digital line-up. It boasts two digital inputs, one BNC co-axial and one AES/EBU balanced XLR. A lot of effort was apparently put into decoupling digital and analogue sections, hence a 3mm steel plate separates the two. Through this pass the power supply and balanced analogue

signals via nickel-plated brass pillars. The price is expected to be in the region of £1700, which makes it the least expensive convertor in the Chord range.



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

POWER TO THE SPEAKERS

In 1977 Meridian burst onto the hi-fi scene with their M1 active loudspeaker. Since then they've continued to follow the active path with models like the M20 and M30.

They've now come up with a new two-way active design, the M33, whose price has yet to be finalised. Inside each cabinet hide two 55watt power amplifiers which take their signal from an electronic crossover that includes Meridian's Active Bass Alignment for extra bass extension.



The claimed in-room frequency response within 3dB stretches from 55Hz to over 20kHz. And rather than opting for MDF to form the enclosures, Meridian have chosen cast aluminium cabinets with steel back-plates.



The next generation from DENON

THE EQUALISER

Jon Marks glimpses the future of hi-fi with Accuphase's DG-28 Digital



the rising star of digital technology these days. It started out with CD, which letters happily trip off anyone's tongue, but is now moving on into the murkier linguistic waters of SACD (Super Audio Compact Disc) and DSD (Direct Stream Digital), as well as the further delights of DAD (Digital Audio Disc at 24/96). A whole host of minor cast members are waiting in the wings, but the real star of the binary show is DSP, or Digital Signal Processing, which is the heart that beats within Accuphase's £5000 DG-28 Digital Voicing Equaliser (or DVE, I suppose).

PROCESSING POWER

In the pre-digital days of pure analogue, the only processing available was ASP (or Analogue Signal Processing). As anyone who has ever owned a graphic equaliser will know, ASP isn't the most transparent form of signal manipulation; attempting to correct room problems or recording imbalances with 20 bands of cheap buffer op amps, capacitors and variable resistors tended to cause more harm than good, as any frequency-levelling gains were outweighed by the habit of the electronic masses to remove most of the tonal colour, life and subtlety from music.

As the 1970s drew to a close, and a "word" could consist of numbers as well as letters, digital brought with it the promise of signal manipulation without damage. With the cost of computing power falling with every passing day now, it was only a matter of time before DSP

scene (where systems like MLSA/Sigtech are used to produce a very flat response at the monitoring position). Back in July 1997 we examined one box of DSP tricks which showed just what the technology might achieve - B&W's John Bowers Listening Room Optimiser. The good news was that the LRO took less than 15 or 20 minutes of operation to make a very large improvement to sound quality. The bad news was that it was a prototype only, and B&W had (and still have) no plans to put it into production.

B&W might be one of the few companies to build a stand-alone DSP unit for home use, but they aren't the only ones. Now there's another option, the DG-28 from Accuphase, which fits snugly between transport and DAC.

This high-end Japanese company has a reputation for bomb-proof construction, and you can see why in the 13kg DG-28. The front panel is a hefty slab of champagne-coloured aluminium which bears the unit's main interfaces with the outside world. To the left is a back-lit LCD screen which displays response and equalisation curves as well as the selected digital input. Centre-stage sit four buttons, one pair marked 'Frequency', the other 'Level', which allow you to change the DG-28's output when it's being used as an equaliser. To the right, hidden away most of the time behind a removable cover, is the 'Digital' section. Here you'll find the input and mode selector buttons (amongst others) and the XLR socket for the microphone supplied with the Accuphase.

If all the above is about as digestible as this

component's manual (no grin-inducing laplish, only rather dry and uninformative prose), then a quick rundown of the DG-28's raison d'êtres is called for.


GRAPHIC ILLUSTRATION


Another fascia button unmentioned thus far is marked 'Equaliser'. With its accompanying LED unlit, the DG-28's digital filter circuits are switched out of circuit. Light the LED and, with the Level and Frequency buttons, you can use the DG-28 as a graphic equaliser. Most analogue variants never got higher than 20 bands of equalisation per channel; the Accuphase has the option of 32 or 64 per channel (user-selectible), the centre frequencies of said bands stretching from 16Hz up to 22.4kHz.

Acting in this mode, the Accuphase is actually very simple to operate (from either the fascia or the neat little remote control). If your favourite loudspeakers are reticent across the midrange and push vocals to the rear of the sound stage, applying boost from about 500Hz to 2kHz. for instance, is simply a matter of scrolling left or right with the Frequency buttons to the relevant spot, and then hitting Level Up. This control works in 0.5dB steps up to a maximum boost of +12dB (its opposite being a maximum cut of -12dB).

When we tried this through the Jamo Concert 8s, you could hear the difference immediately. Vocals and guitar both moved forward in the sound stage, as indeed did everything else between 500Hz and 2kHz. A word of warning though - don't get over-enthusiastic below 60Hz or so, as applying 10dB of lift to a small stand mounter at 30Hz could be a recipe for catapulting cones across the

Equalisation of this sort is unlikely to be the sole reason for prising £5000 from your bank manager.





Elimination of room effects is, though. **RENEWING YOUR ROOM**

Most audiophiles know only too well the overriding impact their listening room has on the sound of a hi-fi system. The commonest problem, judging from the numerous letters and e-mails we receive on the subject, is bass boom. One partial solution is to move 'speakers away from walls, but in a domestic situation this isn't particularly practical. There's also the 'bung approach', where a foam plug or what is known technically as a 'sock' is inserted into the port of a reflex-loaded loudspeaker to reduce the amount of bass it produces. But what can you do if your room is irregularly shaped, or if you don't want to lose an octave of bass? Cue DSP.

THE PROCESSING PROCESS


When it comes to room measurement and response optimisation, it's time to connect the DG-28's supplied microphone. This should be positioned at ear height at the listening position on a tripod (one for cameramounting would be suitable).

THE FIRST STAGE

Pressing Mode moves you to the first stage, where the level of the warble tone generated by the DG-28 is set individually for each channel with the Level buttons. This tone is picked up by the microphone and fed into the filter circuitry, as was the case with the B&W.

THE SECOND STAGE

You can now choose between four pre-set responses (flat or -1dB, -2dB, or -3dB at 2kHz). A fifth screen allows you to enter a customised response, which the Accuphase will mimic as closely as possible. At this point, the manual comments, "If adjustment is performed so as to achieve

fully flat frequency response at the regular listening position, the audible result will be felt to be very bright". Through the Concert 8s, this turned out not to be the case, and roll-offs as dramatic as -3dB at 2kHz gave a tonal balance which was excessively warm.

THE THIRD STAGE

Adjustment begins next, as the DG-28 carries out three sweeps across the frequency spectrum for each channel and averages the results. This only lasts about six or seven minutes, and is followed by the DSP circuits calculating a digital filter which yields the chosen response (we stuck with fully flat for our listening).

ON THE HOT SPOT

So, switching the Accuphase in and out of circuit, it was time to assess the results. Given the improvements we'd had with the B&W, our hopes were high. With the Jamos in their normal reviewing positions, what we heard was a bit of an anticlimax. The DG-28 brought smoother treble, removed a hint of fizz from the midrange and evened out a number of small peaks in the bass, but the gap separating 'No Accuphase' from 'Full Accuphase' wasn't massive.

There was a rather simple explanation for this. As the DG-28 had shown with its measurement of the sound we were hearing at the listening position, our system's output

was flat +/-2dB from around 300Hz all the way up to 18kHz! The DG-28 was only really crunching numbers below 300Hz, and that was narrow-band correction dialing out some sharp peaks and dips, which have much less affect on the sound than broad humps or troughs.

The Jamos may have a commendably even response, but they're around four feet from the rear wall in our room. Most loudspeakers are more uneven and located far closer to a rear wall, so we wheeled in a pair of less well-mannered transducers and pushed them back up against the wall. One extra obstacle we added was unequal distance from side walls, which would alter the amount of reflected energy reaching the listening position and therefore the overall response.

Once the Accuphase had gone through its paces a second time, its benefits were more evident. Bass honk caused by wall proximity was brought under control, and the naturally forward and slightly harsh midrange of our second guinea pigs was tamed. Imaging was also better balanced between the two enclosures, although image precision itself remained unsharpened.

BOXES NO MORE

If you're lucky enough to have box loudspeakers with a fairly flat response in a room with enough space for their location not to be a problem, Accuphase's DG-28 wouldn't yield the best sonic return on £5000 lavished on your hi-fi. On the other hand, if you're a dedicated user of dipoles (from Magneplanar, Apogee, Quad and others, which can be very difficult to squeeze a balanced response from) and your room isn't ideal, it could be the solution to otherwise intractable problems.

THE WAY FORWARD

Along with the new digital formats, Digital Signal Processing holds out the promise of major advances in sound quality, as presaged by B&W's Listening Room Optimiser and, to a lesser extent, the DG-28.

The LRO's main distinguishing features are its ability to correct the phase anomalies created by passive loudspeaker crossovers and the psycho-acoustic research B&W have embedded in its ICs and patented. This is fiendishly difficult and very costly DSP though, which partly explains why the LRO remains a prototype and why such processing isn't part of the DG-28's arsenal. The Accuphase may not be a total DSP solution for all systems, but it's one of the very few components pointing the way to a technology which will certainly play a huge role in hi-fi to come•

PUNTH CHARMING

Richard White takes a spin with specialist plinths from Classique Sounds and Aphelion for Garrard's 401 motor unit.

Garrard 301 and 401 refuse to lie
down and play dead. Many a feature
article, many an attic trawl, all-too-many audio
jumbles feature these venerated spinners as spoils
from a raid on the Lost Ark, and prices have risen
accordingly.

Unhappily, the condition of some of these has led to disappointment for the unwary; it matters not how good it was when new, 'worn out' is as terminal a condition for turntables as the dreaded 'beyond economic repair' is for cars. For those eager Garrardites who have managed to steer clear of such scrap, happy times beckon, with one or two caveats, the most important of which concerns plinths.

301s and 401s are noisy, unless housed properly. As a consequence, a cottage industry has grown up supplying plinths of various degrees of sophistication and mass. What most have in common is a desire to make a cumbersome chunk of audio history into an ornament for the happy home. As the nomenclature has changed over the years from 'gramophone' and 'motor unit' to 'turntable' or 'record-player', so the æsthetic appreciation has evolved from "Oo!" to "Ugh!" to "Aah!", and any self-respecting Garrard owner requires a plinth to ensure that the "Aah!" response (let alone any frequency response) is maximized. With this in mind we decided to

breed. To ensure an absolutely level playing field, we tested both plinths with the same motor unit, arm and cartridge: Garrard 401, Origin Live modified Rega RB300 and a Reson Mica Moving Magnet.

STYLE AND SUBSTANCE

First off the blocks is Aphelion's £200 Architecture, which has more than a dash of 'Things To Come' about it - the styling suggests a time when fridges looked like furniture. The Architecture is made from the customary inch-thick MDF, but the design philosophy is unusual. Where most plinth designers opt for the monolithic approach, Aphelion have used a system whereby the wood layers are sandwiched with an absorbent foam material to progressively de-couple the motor unit from the base. The detachable armboard (which will be flush-fitting on production samples) is carried on an independent stack at the side and is readily removable. Three models, all with similar construction, cover the Garrard 301 (Foundation), 401 (Architecture) and Thorens 124 (Lucerne).

Once everything had been bolted into place and the Reson carefully aligned, the Aphelion began to show what it was made of with Deivert and Bibb's Hello Stranger from Opus 3. This is an uncompromisingly acoustic record which, although it offers no dynamic extremes, has plenty of 'free air' to show up any of the

Decca's hallowed Best Of Parsifal provided more lynamic elbow-room and more opportunity to catch out a noisy plinth with cartridge mis-tracking. Transmitted notor vibrations can lead to tracking problems, because he stylus tip must continually reverse its lateral direction is it tracks the groove; an additional 'shove' by a coincident vibration will degrade the sound and cause groove damage in the long term.

As far as the Architecture was concerned, there were no serious grounds for complaint here with the Micra ploughing on through the glories of Christa Ludwig and Co with very little evidence of discomfort. The sharp, nigh-frequency spikes of the brass over a continuum of slow string chords were reproduced cleanly, albeit with an occasional touch of sizzle to show how close to the wind the needle was sailing.

Arturo Delmoni's well-modulated solo violin playing offers front ends a lot of opportunity for failure. Misracked violin is one of hi-fi's nastier sounds, and to its credit the Aphelion gave the cartridge no grounds to oosen its grip on the groove, the inherent smoothness of he soloist's Bachian bowings untainted.

PIECES OF EIGHT

Next plinth on the bill was Classique Sounds' Octavia. Made to order from slabs of inch-thick MDF, Octavia can be had in the raw or cabinet-finished in any veneer of your choice. Certainly nothing has been left to chance as regards mass; although it's not in the Slate Audio weight range, prospective buyers should beware of hernia, otherwise they'll have their hands full in more ways than one. The top board is undrilled, so the choice of tone-arm fixing method lies with the user. One of the styling peculiarities of the Garrard 401 lies in the size of its chassis, which butts into the area where any sensible person would want to mount a 9in. arm. With a bit of applied fiddling and the odd curse though, we got our Rega fitted and Reson aligned.

With the return of Arturo Delmoni performing Bach's solo violin sonatas, I wondered whether things were a bit over-smooth, so I turned the wick up to check. No, everything was fine and dandy, with not an ounce of Arturo's creamy midrange or any of the essential bow-kick

Considering the enormous variety of dynamics and textures which have to be reproduced in Decca's Parsifal, the Octavia retained commendable control and dug deep for the accompanying 'cello and double-bass parts. Layered above was the full range of voices on this Wagnerian feast, the Germanic speech patterns retaining their expressive sibilance while the glories of full-blown operatic soprano floated out of the loudspeakers.

attention to itself, rather to the music.

Turning back to Eric Bibb, I was once again surprised by the sonic differences which separate the Architecture and Octavia. The slap/strum guitar was kicked right into my lap this time, and the slight lack of presence noted with the Aphelion disappeared - the arrival of subtle finger-on-strings sounds meant a much more 'live' sensation to the performance.

A touch of the wild and wonderful was contributed by Santana's Abraxas. Its plethora of odd phase effects enabled me to be certain that what was weird stayed weird, and that the smoothness which was a notable feature of the Garrard/Octavia combination was not an unwanted extra overlying music.

CHALK AND CHEESE

Aphelion's Architecture does a fine job at an attractive price. With its Frank Lloyd Wright looks and the convenient armboard interchangeability, this may well be the goods for vinylphiles who care as much for style as outright sound. On the other hand, the use of non-rigid material between the MDF layers doesn't quite seem to hit the spot. The motor of a Garrard deck has considerable mass, and while 'the sandwich' does damp things fairly effectively, it allows through more vibration than is ideal, particularly if the motor unit happens to be well worn.

Classique's Octavia aims at preventing vibration in the first place, and does a good job of it. In fairness, this plinth is not only bigger and heavier than the Architecture, in its cabinet-finished form it is also dearer. Be that as it may, the Octavia is not unduly expensive and, coupled with a well-kept motor unit and suitable pick-up, would be a welcome, if weighty, companion on life's vinyl odyssey


STAND TALL AND DELIVER

Simon Pope enjoys the company of Aura's LST-627M and Heybrook's Optima floor standers in his search for sub-£300 heavyweights.

s the old saying goes, "A journey of a thousand miles starts with a single step". The direction of that step for many first-time budget hi-fi buyers will be dictated by whether they decide to take the stand-mount or floor-stander route. With the latter you spare your wallet the pain of decent stands and (theoretically) get deeper bass; the former, better imaging and a better aesthetic match with the living room/bedroom/lavatory. Leaving the high road to bookshelf boxes, I took the low road with American Aura's LST-627M and home-grown Heybrook's Optimas.

STATING THE CASE

'LST-627M' might be instantly forgettable, but the Auras are more memorable than most 'speakers in the tweeter area. The company's own 'Line Source' unit is fitted to the LST-627M. This has a thin, flexible diaphragm driven by a voice coil and boasts a low moving mass (although not as low as a ribbon, where the signal flows through the diaphragm itself). The Aura's



woofer (supplied by Danish manufacturer Peerless) breaks fewer traditions with its 6.5in. diameter and polypropylene cone with concave dustcap.

The back of the cabinet houses the basic reflex port (no complex flares here) and a single pair of terminals, which came as a bit of a disappointment on £300 loudspeakers.

On the plus side, as Leo Lam found in his review of Aura's LSB-627M stand mounters in August, the Line Source tweeters are as refreshing sonically as they are visually, especially at the price. The third movement of Mahler's Seventh Symphony with its spiky orchestration and ghostly presence (in the recording by the Cleveland Orchestra under Pierre Boulez) was amazingly transparent through the Auras.

The woodwind section was convincingly natural, with oboes and Cor Anglais sounding appropriately 'reedy' and to the fore within the sound stage. Bass remained firm and solid without erring either to the dry or overenthusiastic. Control of this order meant the Auras pulled off the waltz-like swing of the double-basses and bassoons in a tight, rhythmic fashion which added genuine excitement to the music.

The LST-627Ms confirmed their credentials on Mahler's raspy, muted brass spatterings (which had bite without harshness) and pizzicato notes. One from the double-basses (marked extreme fortissimo) is plucked so hard the strings rebound onto the finger-board and came as quite a shock, even though I was expecting it!

HI-FI WORLD

Only in a bright system would the Auras be out of place. At times solo violin verged on the shrill, and although the overall balance was clean and vibrant with excellent sound staging and space between images, tonally it could have been richer and warmer.

Moving on to very different ground, Radiohead's 'Lucky' from OK Computer displayed the same sense of atmosphere as the Mahler. The drummer and his kit hogged the limelight thanks to the sheer presence and clarity on the ride cymbal which propelled the track along.

When the music became more complex at the soaring chorus, the Auras loosened their grip slightly, leaving Radiohead more cabinet-bound and treble coarser. The LST-627Ms had an easier time with the electronic Dance of DI Cher's 'The Seraphim

Odyssey' pounding hypnotically through their drivers. The tweeters relayed the clinical intricacies of the top-end superbly and persuaded my usually static feet into activity.

OPTIMALLY SPEAKING

Next to the Auras, Heybrook's Optimas are more typical of sub£300, two-way floor standers. The 165mm doped-paper woofer marries up to a small 14mm polymer-dome tweeter with ferrofluid damping. In contrast to the Auras, the reflex port is front firing, which leaves the back panel bare apart from the biwiring terminals.

The sound of the rather staid looking Optimas is a world away from their styling. Paired up with the Audio Analogue Puccini integrated amp (non-SE version), the result was a remarkably polished and smooth rendition with images located within a very open sound stage. The bass these cabinets produced belied their size too, the ascending and descending double-bass runs on the Mahler possessing a rare speed and smack. This, coupled with the Heybrooks' warmth, makes for very involving listening indeed.

The Optimas had little trouble dealing with Classical whatever the instruments. The lower register of violins and violas was whipped-cream rich without compromising on detail or sounding thick and veiled (which is a real bonus at this price) and midrange woodwind glowed with a clarity enhanced by a freedom

from cabinet coloration.

HE SHOW THE

These aren't loudspeakers to shun Pop in favour of Classical alone, though. Radiohead's OK Computer was as depressing as the performers and engineers had intended, Thom Yorke's plaintive vocals fully fleshed out above the powerful bass guitar. For all their low-end grunt, the Optimas never failed to treat treble cleanly and smoothly - there was barely a hint of sibilance on voices. Further evidence of the drivers' pedigree was the complex chorus, where a tangled mix of musical strands was skilfully teased apart by the Heybrooks.

Moving their cones to DJ Cher, the Optimas got into the mood with pumping, club-style bass and crisp treble. The adrenaline began to flow as it had done with the Auras, but

because basslines were slowed slightly by the Heybrooks this time round the experience wasn't quite as uplifting.

A MATTER OF TASTE

Aura's LST-627Ms are, like their small siblings, very competent loudspeakers. They have a taut, if slightly dry, bass and a treble whose speed and precision the competition can't match. Stir in musicality and excitement (especially on Dance music) and that's a recipe for success, but the crispness could dominate the sound in prolonged listening. Ironically, the tweeter is the Auras' weakness as well as their strength its tendency to sibilance could be tiring, if you listen to a lot of bright Rock recordings.

Smoother, more relaxed performers are Heybrook's Optimas. They're happy on a varied musical diet which they never stifle with a boxy sound. They might not have the razor-sharp transient ability of their American counterparts here, but their involving, spacious character will keep you in front of your hi-fi for disc after disc

CD-R BLANK PRICES IN A SPIN

Why do data CD-Recordable discs cost so much less than audio ones? David Price investigates.



D-R (Compact Disc-Recordable) has been with us for several years now, during which time it has become very popular in computing circles, offering as it does the facility to archive large quantities of data. The blank discs themselves have become very cheap to buy, and in bulk cost well under £1 each.

Duly, when Philips launched their first audio CD recorder earlier this year (the CDR 870), some thought it surprising that the new machines would not work with CD-R data discs. Why miss the opportunity to benefit from the discs' universal availability and very low prices, which are cheaper even than low-grade audio cassettes?

Instead, all Philips hi-fi CD recorders require the use of 'audio' CD-Rs - which despite being outwardly identical to data CD-Rs, can cost considerably more (Philips' own advertising specifies prices of between £3.50 and £11 for one audio CD-R blank). So why the huge difference? Philips' CDR 870 press release would seem to have the answer, stating that, "to comply with copyright legislation in various countries, the CDR 870 will only make recordings on discs bearing the 'audio' logo. These discs are subject to levies which are payable to the relevant copyright protection associations."

We contacted Philips to find out how much this copyright fee was. Considering the price differential between data and audio CD-Rs, we had anticipated it to be sizeable. The answer was not what we'd expected, a spokesperson for the company admitting that, "the UK does not have a levy system in place."

What then explains the price difference? Could it be that the discs themselves are different - audio CD-Rs being a kind of premium, low-error version and computer data CD-Rs a poor relation? Philips replied that, "the discs are different - both technically and they include SCMS.

Consequently they cost more to produce." In fact, most of the small cost of the Serial Copyright Management System is in the hardware rather than the discs themselves. This is then reflected in the machine's price.

Philips' advertising cautions, "make sure to buy audio CD-Rs, not the cheaper data variety - players like the CDR 880 will only record onto the audio variety." However, rumour has it that this is not strictly true. Philips CD recorders will in fact work with data CD-Rs if fooled into thinking they're using audio CD-Rs. This is simply a matter of inserting an audio CD-R, selecting Record mode and then gently pulling out the disc drawer. The audio CD-R is then swapped for a data CD-R, and the drawer manually closed. Providing Record mode isn't left while the discs are being swapped, the machine will then record onto the data disc just like an audio CD-R, which will then replay on any normal CD player, as we've found here at World Towers. Quite what affect this will have on the drawer and transport mechanism in the long-term is open to conjecture.

So where does this leave the inflated prices of audio CD-Rs? Philips' claim that they're technically different to data CD-Rs falls short of explaining the price gap between the two formats, while, in Britain at least, the copyright levy is currently a red herring.

In truth, high audio CD-R prices would appear to have more to do with marketing and dealer margins. Cynics would argue that Philips' distinction between audio and data discs is more about profit potential than issues of physical compatibility. Let's hope that blank audio-disc prices drop to data CD-R levels as soon as possible - there's no real reason for them not to, and lower prices can only assure the success of Philips' superb new CD recorders•

David Price, our man in Japan, reports back on the progress of DVD machinery in the Far East.

VD has got off to a slow start in Japan. Since its introduction nearly two years ago sales have been sluggish, not least because of the current economic recession. Nor has the format made the transition from the audio/visual world to hi-fi particularly successfully. Indeed, Japan's hi-fi press has been fairly muted on both DVD's 96kHz, 24-bit audio capability and the practice of using DVD players as high-quality replay devices for existing Compact Discs.

There are several reasons for this. The British press has been particularly interested in the way DVD machines play CDs because



CD players are so

expensive here, and many regard the new DVD machines as a possible way around this; after all, why buy a top CD spinner when the latest DVD deck does things better for £700? In Japan, where prices are often half those of the UK, value for money is less of an issue. You can already buy an extremely capable CD player, such as Denon's DCD-S10 II (winner of a prestigious Stereo Sound magazine award) for around £800.

While 24/96 DVD audio has interested the hi-fi press, the lack of software has meant that most attention has instead gone to Japan's burgeoning number of audiophile CD titles, such as JVC's XRCDs and Blue Note's 2088 series. However, the past few months have seen the launch of some new, second-generation DVD

players which offer full 96kHz, 24-bit DACs. These have done much to stimulate interest in DVD as hi-fi, and several manufacturers - notably Pioneer - have introduced machines which successfully straddle the gulf between AV and high-end audio. Now, for the first time, every major Japanese manufacturer offers a DVD Audiocompatible player. Here's a look at what's available. . .

THE HARDWARE

Launched in January this year, Aiwa's XD-DV500 is a Midi-sized 20/96 design that retails for Y79800 (£350). Akai's full-size DV-P1000 is cheaper still at Y65000 (£285) and also comes with a 20-bit DAC. Ditto Denon's DVD-2000, the precursor of the DVD-3000 that we rate so highly, which retails for Y89000 (£390). Hitachi's DV-P1 is the second oldest DVD machine on sale in Japan, born in December 1996 and fitted with a 20-bit DAC for



Panasonic's tasty DVD-A450 with its wooden end cheeks.

Y83000 (£365).

JVC (known in Japan as Victor) offer two machines, of which the Y115000 (£500) XV-D2000 is the more expensive. With the company's respected K2 DAC running up to 20/96 resolution, separate video and audio

circuits and a low resonance 'Arkbase' chassis, it should prove a good performer. The cheaper XV-1000 seems more AV-oriented, with the lion's share of its Y93000 (£405) price tag going on features such as an elaborate graphical user interface.

Panasonic's new DVD-P10 has only just reached the shops, and is a true state-of-the-art design. The same size and weight as one of the first CD personals, this 910g portable packs in a 24/96 DAC, full CD compatibility and the option of 5.8cm a-Si TFT colour screen for video playback! It costs Y79000 (£345) with standard screen, or Y150000 (£655) when TFT equipped.

Panasonic's full-size, second-generation range was launched in Japan in November 1997, and comprises the DVD-A350 that so impressed us back in July for Y94000 (£410), the DVD-A450 for Y100000 (£435) and the Y110000 (£480) DVD-K500. The '450 is similar to the '350, but gets wooden side cheeks, a champagne-gold metal finish, 'Class AA' output stages and 'Virtual Battery Operation'. Meanwhile, the '500 comes with front-panel microphone inputs and level controls for home karaoke! All feature Matsushita's fine sounding 24/96 DAC. Finally, Panasonic have just announced a stripped-down budget design, the Y69000 (£300) DVD-A150.

The DVS-9 is Pioneer Electronic Corporation's latest DVD machine, a new high-ender which sports Hi-bit Legato Link Conversion S - a Digital Signal Processing DAC and digital filter arrangement which can also be found on their top CD and DAT machines. It gets the full battleship build treatment, with extensive internal copper plating and audiophile components accounting for its 15kg weight. At Y190000 (£830) it's the most expensive and most hi-fi orientated DVD deck on the market.

Also from Pioneer is the DV-505, launched in February 1998 in Japan for Y69000 (£300) and now available in the UK as well for £449.99. Although 'built to a price' and lacking a full 24-bit DAC, it's proved popular in Japan, possibly because it's the cheapest

player offering an unrestricted 96kHz output through its co-axial and optical digital outputs - rival machines downsample to 48kHz.

Pioneer also do two DVD/LD players, the Y128000

(£560) DVL-909 and the Y148000 (£645) DVL-K88, the latter being a Japan-only karaoke machine. Although a flop outside Japan, Laser Disc has been a modest success in its home market, where LDs cost little more than prerecorded VHS videos. Lastly, Pioneer offer a cute little Mini-sized DVD player with a 20/96 Hi-bit Legato Link DAC for Y83000 (£365). Born November 1996, the DV-F21 is one of the oldest surviving DVD machines.

Sharp's DV-S100 is a 270mm Midi-sized unit retailing for Y75000 (£330) and features a 20-bit DAC.

Sony have four DVD machines on sale in Japan, only two of which are designed with DVD Audio in mind. The DVP-S3000 and DVP-S7000 at Y79000 (£345) and Y110000 (£480) respectively, lack high-bit DACs. By contrast, the DVP-S501D (on which the British market's DVP-S715 is based) and DVP-M30 offer the full 24/96



At the other end of Pioneer's size spectrum is the DV-F21.

Monty. These feature Sony's Dual Discrete Pick-ups, said to be fully CD-R compatible, and borrow some ideas from the company's CD player range, such as switchable digital filters and anti-resonance feet. Prices are Y88000 (£385) and Y66000 (£290) respectively.

Toshiba's Y75000 (£330) SD-2100 is a 370mm-wide machine that was launched in June 1997 and uses a 20-bit DAC. The Y77000 (£335) SD-3000 is a first-



in November 1996 and features


a 'meagre' 48kHz oversampling, 20-bit DAC. Should it encounter 24/96 PCM, it has to downsample.

The same company's Y89000 (£390) SDK-310 has a front panel festooned with microphone inputs for use as a home karaoke centre. Yet the most interesting player in Toshiba's range is the SD-P410G, a portable B5-sized design with a mini remote control. Weighing in at 1.1kg, it's impressively compact, albeit not quite as petite as Panasonic's DVD-P10. Y75000 (£330) buys you this dinky 20/96 machine.

Finally, the DVD-1000 is Yamaha's DVD contender in Japan at present, having been on the market for over a year. A sleek gunmetal silver affair, it comes with a 20-bit DAC for Y108000 (£470)

Toshiba's SD-P410G portable breaks out of the black-box mould.

LECTRIFYING

Once cured of the hi-fi bug, Eric Braithwaite feels it bite again thanks to Michell's new Orca pre and Alecto power amps.

control is a small, round fter years of being lectured about its evils,

I can come out at last. Here, in a now terribly trendy part of London, there's a coffee-shop on nearly every corner and even one opposite my flat. Coffee is the new cocaine-addictive, brain-celldestroying, health-ruining drug, but it's out in the open, being freely enjoyed by thousands. I love it.

Pity my other addiction, refuelled recently by Michell Engineering's Orca pre and new Alecto power amplifiers, is still a hole-in-the-corner affair. Where are the hi-fi shops crowded with the cuppies, 20-oddyear-olds in oval shades, designer trainers? Wouldn't it be great if hi-fi

with designer credentials rather than cafe latte (I mean, it's just milky coffee whichever way you stir it) became the new coffee the way football became the new fashion or, in fashion, brown became the new black? The Orca and its attendant power supply with their smoked acrylic, shaped stainless steel and aluminium are as elegant as an

Both Orca and Alecto designs are new ground-up (from the ground up,

maybe we'd better say; blame the caffeine). And, as always, in style and especially quality of engineering, Michell's new components are the Blue Mountain of hi-fi. The knobs on the pre-amplifier - solid, beautifully balanced, fitting within a hair's breadth of the dark acrylic fascia - are as smooth as a finelyroasted, shiny Arabica bean. And the simple remote volume

> disc that fits comfortably into the palm. Made of machined aluminium it has exactly the sensuous feel and weight of a cricket ball.

asked: John Michell was a bowler . . . One way of telling quickly whether hi-fi is just good or superb might appear highly esoteric, but

And yes, I

actually isn't. If you use vinyl the method is to listen to the sound of the groove - it should be completely separate from the music, like an unobtrusive solo instrument. To a lesser extent the trick will work with CDs where there is still residual tape noise or microphone hiss.

In other words, the Orca is extraordinarily quiet, in a way that usually only comes with battery power. That means a surprising amount of recorded ambience and detail come through, including some very low-level outside chatter on a

Nimbus CD (which escaped not only the engineers but me for several years) and a hall ambience on a Klemperer ASD LP that truly and naturally enveloped the orchestra.

More importantly, it also means very pure instrumental tone that made not only strings but all forms of brass a delight. Listening to the excellent Isis recording of Martin Souter showed the George IV harpsichord had every plucked string perfect, plus a clear sense of the room at Kew. The higher notes can sound jangly even on more than competent equipment, but not with the Orca. It didn't soften them, just gave each its perfect interval. The admirably spot-on timing of attack and decay became even clearer when the Alectos were wired into the system in place of a Quad 707.

The second sign of superior equipment is simply discovering that you play a great deal of music of practically every genre, and sit back and enjoy it. Here the Orca suffers a problem - or rather in my ears displays a virtue - that beset the Iso and Argo HR: second-rate recordings will, alas, stay resolutely second-rate.

Neither the Alecto nor the Orca, and especially not the Orca, will cover up the abominable compression and distortion as the bar-graph meter slips up to 0dB on so many current Rock recordings, like Morrissey's, for example. Wellproduced CDs like KD Lang's Drag are not diminished; that's a spacious and well-equalised mix and the Michell equipment gave it studio control-room quality. Nor will either add another half-dozen kiloHertz to the top of some of the classic Columbias in dire need of it.

Normally, individual instruments had what could only be described as a 'luminescence' that hardly appears outside real life. Though the strings on the Rodrigo Concierto de Aranjuez were

detailed down to the warp of the cat-gut, the Orca didn't ameliorate their fierceness in the Philips San Antonio recording (but they weren't so shrill - ie, distorted as to be painful).

The last time Richter's Bach organ recital on a Decca SXL was anywhere near that clean and detailed in its pipework - the sound of the bellows gently breathing in the background, too - was with Chord's SPM 600/CPA 2200 combination. The Alectos have a richer, rounder bass, albeit truer than their predecessors and better in timing. The Harbeth Compact 7s used with them display a minuscule failing: tenor voices have a 'BBC Radio chestiness' which the Alectos either revealed more obviously than usual or added to in a very slight degree.

Too many CDs and LPs fed the Orca and Alectos for me to go into each and every title, but they all had a genuinely high-end timbre on instruments, holographic and precise imagery and, especially on the part of the new Alectos, free and effortless dynamics. Seldom does a recording like Mingus' tortuous The Black Saint And The Sinner Lady attract a non-lazz aficionado, but it fascinated one such visitor with its awesome grasp of the dynamics of tubas, trombones, muted trumpet, piano and delicate, spidery cymbal brushwork.

Differences between old and new? Well, the Orca is not only stunningly quieter than the Argo HR, it's even more finely detailed and it at last has a volume potentiometer from Panasonic which gains remote control and separate L/R balance for precise channel matching down to practically inaudible levels (and the promise it won't drift over time like

the Argo's). The new Alectos? Again, everything is that much cleaner, eleeper (front-to-back, that is), tighter and faster than the original. A quick comparison of two of the recordings used on the originals shows what's what. Item 1 is the extraordinary 'surround-sound' effect of a Chapman Stick, which swings around the listeners' heads. On the new Alectos it described a smaller but utterly seamless circle; that's tighter control for you.

Item 2 is the even greater distance between the shaky background vocalist and the loudspeakers on Lou Reed's 'Power and Glory' from his Magic And Loss CD. Extreme resolution like this puts the Orca on a par with the Chord, and the Chord is one of the top two or three preamplifiers I've ever heard. The Orca, in short, is to the Argo and other preamplifiers what the Orbe is to a Gyrodec. It made my Gyrodec resolve things I only knew of from an Orbe before.

As you may have noticed, I took a twelve-month cure from the heroin of hi-fi. It's failed, Michell's new

Orca and Alecto have readdicted me. If that means I'm put down as a Kaffee-Klatsch Michell partisan, so be it. Just remember: like Mr Lloyd's original invention, some things reappear better than ever•

Playing a role in the Orca's transparency is Panasonic's For Audio potentiometer.

PERFECTLY-CRAFTED PERFORMERS

Chris Beeching discovers Jamo make music easy-PC with their £200 active CS5s.

omputer peripherals have never been one of my favourite acquisitions, and active 'speakers to add even more noise to a PC's hum and whine seem almost to add insult to injury. However, in the case of Jamo's latest loudspeakers, there was a number of pleasant surprises along the way which more than compensated for my initial lack of enthusiasm.

Jamo's CS5 system claims to be a "High Fidelity Multimedia PC" 'speaker. I have to say that with a little reservation about the "high fidelity" bit, that statement is somewhat short of the reality.

The largish box the Jamos arrived in was unusually hefty for transducers aimed at accompanying a computer. Pleasant surprise No1 was the pair of substantial enclosures inside. Heave the CS5s out of their tight polystyrene packing and you'll realise that these are serious contenders.

One of the pair is essentially a 'slave' - the other is fitted with the volume control, mains socket, phono inputs, electronic crossovers and four power amplifiers. There is, thoughtfully, a connection for a mono subwoofer complete with an upper frequency output of 180Hz, and a 'surround' option for connection to 'rear' 'speakers (which need to be active or run from a separate amp) with a 7kHz upper limit. Two adapter leads are also included for use with a variety of other sources.

The CS5s themselves are constructed from MDF and heavyweight chipboard, and are very well finished in a silver-grey and green. The fully-shielded drive units consist of a 5.25in. main driver and 1in. dome tweeter.

The idea of using my computer as a source didn't grab me, so I connected the Jamos straight to the output of my usual pre-amp and set them up as per the instruction book. (This, by the way, covers computers,

surround-sound installations, wall or stand mounting and a plethora of other possibilities.)

Having chosen stand mounting over bookshelf placement, I turned the CS5s on and sat back. Surprise No2 was the way they sounded. Jamo have obviously taken great care in the design of these 'speakers and their 20watt internal power amplifiers. I have to say that their performance utterly confounded me. In hi-fi terms

these actives offer an

impressive presentation which, even after a number of days' continuous listening, still appealed. The same cannot be said for the majority of 'computer' 'speaker systems. In fact, the Jamos have become the 'office reference' as they provide a simple means of listening to music. Although they have frequency and dynamic limitations, and can start to sound rough around the edges as the volume levels rise, they're

nonetheless very engaging, very

musical and deal with all music

types even-handedly.

As with many smaller 'speakers, where the upper bass tends to be one weak area, the CS5s suffered some thickening and chestiness here, most noticeable on male speech. Even when wall or shelf-mounted though, their bass extension was very good, seeming to dip lower than the quoted 50Hz. You could hear the benefits of an active crossover in the

open midrange, crisp imaging and airy treble too. The general balance was a little forward, but I suspect this is aimed at compensating for computer source limitations in the higher frequencies.

I can see the CS5s going down well particularly where students are concerned and space and cash are at a premium. I can't bring to mind another active which gets so close to high fidelity at anywhere near this price.

As a budget alternative to an amp, loudspeakers and their cabling, the Jamos (twinned with either a preamp like Musical Fidelity's X-Pre or just a CD player) have much to recommend them. Even their upperbass chestiness and slightly restricted dynamics can't prevent them ranking as a bit of a bargain at £200•

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Timothy Liu does the time-warp with Lehmann Audio's Black Cube Phono Stage and digs out his ageing vinyl.

n the modern world, fads and fashions come and go. The same could be said of the Long-Playing record, whose days once looked distinctly numbered. Instead, the oldest of formats has surprised many by rising (albeit only slightly) from the digital flames which threatened to consign it to oblivion once and for all.

Lehmann Audio of Germany would rather you didn't abandon your vinyl to a car-boot sale. They have thrown down the gauntlet to the Compact Disc industry by producing the Black Cube phono stage to proclaim their undying love for the black disc.

If attraction is strictly a visual thing for you, then the Black Cube will certainly not set your pulse racing. A basic folded-steel case houses the electronics, fed from an external power supply. Don't be fooled by appearances though. Closer inspection inside reveals the Cube to measure up where it counts. Audiophile touches such as Wima foil capacitors, a screened power-supply lead and passive equalisation make you realise this is a Benz engine in Skoda bodywork.

The flexible Cube is compatible with most cartridges currently available. Input sensitivity is fixed at 250uV and capacitance at 220pF, values chosen to suit both Moving-Magnet and Moving-Coil cartridges. Loading is accomplished by configuring two DIP switches, impedance-matching (which is important for optimum sound quality with low noise) ranging from 80ohm to 47kohm.

Another useful suggestion contained in the manual advises soldering your tone-arm's lead-out wires directly to the Black Cube's input terminals, thereby leap-frogging the gold-plated phono



sockets to avoid signal degradation.
This really makes sense when you
consider the microscopic signal
generated by Moving-Coil cartridges.

A small point worth mentioning is that the Black Cube requires a warm-up time of 10 days before it comes to the boil; in other words, it's best left on all the time. Once warmed through, it was slipped between a Basis Ovation turntable/Airtangent 10b tone-arm/Roksan Shiraz cartridge source and Audio Analogue's Puccini SE amplifier with Sonus Faber Minima Amator loudspeakers.

After the initial thud of the stylus touching down, what confronted me was a wall of black silence; the almost total lack of surface noise gave the impression of waiting for the curtains to rise and the performance to begin. Stevie Wonder's 'Do I Do' emerged from this inky black background complete with a broad palette of tonal colour and lightning fast percussion. Rhythmic, weighty bass with good extension further heightened the listening experience.

The Ramones maintained the pace with their 'I'm Against It'.

Instead of curling up in the nearest corner and wilting like so many audiophile products do when the Ramones appear, the Black Cube changed up into over-drive. Highoctane guitar thrashing was handled effortlessly, with real speed and power. In the midst of this onslaught, rhythm guitars remained tonally distinct from one another, strummed strings portrayed with a subtlety I've not come across on sub-£1000 phono stages before.

Changing back down a gear to Rickie Lee Jones' 'Lucky Guy' demonstrated the chameleon-like nature of the Black Cube. Possessing virtually no character of its own, it could create a wholly convincing sound stage and 3-D imaging, while allowing Rickie Lee Jones' wide vocal range fluidity and lucidity without sibilance.

Lehmann Audio's Black Cube is a genuine audiophile achievement in terms of musicality and neutrality. I can't honestly think of anything near its £395 price tag which even gets within spitting distance. The Cube should keep those vinyl junkies out there misty-eyed and defiantly antidigital for a very long time to come

JAMO LOUDSPEAKERS **AND PHILIPS** CD RECORDER **WORTH £2500** TO BE WON



Two lucky readers could soon be celebrating the arrival of Jamo's Concert 11 floor standers or a Philips CDR 870 CD recorder in their systems.

his month we are giving away two products which depressed us when they left after past reviews. Jamo are represented with a pair of their outstanding £2000 Concert 11 floor standers, bigger brothers to the stand mounted Concert 8 loudspeakers which we use here at World HQ. Philips' contribution is one of their £500 CDR 870 digital recorders, which will burn both CD-Recordable and CD-ReWritable discs. To get compilation-makers rolling, the CDR 870 is being supplied with nine blank CD-Rs and one blank CD-RW.

Jamo's great Danes use cutting-edge driver technology to lift their sound well above the masses'. The 6.5in. woofer has a magnesium frame to support its powerful magnet system and polypropylene diaphragm. Coupled with generous cabinet volume, it produces bass capable of reaching down to 40Hz.

The magnesium-coned unit which handles bass as well

as midrange in the Concert 8s is here employed purely to cover the midrange from 150Hz to 2.5kHz. Taking over at the top end is the same superb tweeter (with its Sonotex fabric dome and silver-wired voice coil) fitted to the Concert 8s.

The Concert 11s are equally at home in the fields of Classical, Rock or Jazz, creating a fast and transparent sound which certainly grabbed the attention of Douglas Floyd-Douglass who reviewed them back in the December '97 issue. On hearing Gorecki's Third Symphony through them, he enthused, "Listening to orchestral music on the Concert 11s is a revelation... Depth of bass was truly impressive, imparting a lovely warmth". And listening to Joni Mitchell he noted, "vocals are handled with aplomb by that superb midband driver".

The Concert 11s are unfussy when it comes to amplification as well as music. They are quite content to



be powered from either low-wattage valve gear or beefier solid-state equipment.

Philips' CDR 870 was one of the first sub-£1000 recorders of its kind aimed at domestic use. It allows you to make CD compilations of your favourite tracks on either CD-Rs, which can only be recorded onto once, or CD-RWs, which can be erased and recorded onto again just like cassettes. While CD-Rs will play back on standard players, whether home, portable or in-car, CD-RWs can only be played on compatible

The CDR 870 is a joy to use when recording. With digital signals, it's just a matter of selecting the appropriate input (optical or co-axial) then pressing Rec and Play. The player even incudes a CD Sync Recording feature which automatically starts recording when the source begins to play.

Analogue recordings will have you reaching for the recording level as you would on an ordinary cassette deck to prevent digital overload, but there are no fiddly bias settings to worry about.

As a conventional playback machine the CDR 870 stands its ground well, Jon Marks commenting in his January 1998 review, "Bjork's idiosyncratic and expressive vocals hung clearly between the 'speakers, and there was sufficient texture and warmth to make for a compelling listen". In spite of the fact it's primarily intended as a digital recording device, the Philips is definitely up there with the best players at around the £300 mark.

To see if this kind of investment can pay real dividends, we put Sennheiser's recently improved HD 580 Precisions to the

Your extra money certainly buys you a very high standard of build quality and comfort. The Precisions' detachable, Kevlar-reinforced lead shows the attention to detail typical of the marque. My sole complaint related to the headband adjustment, which was rather stiff and awkward. Once fitted properly though, the HD 580s turned out to be comfortable for even the longest of listening sessions.

Hidden inside these phones' plastic earpieces are aluminium voice coils and neodymium-ferrous magnets, both of which are par for the price. Sennheiser would no doubt point towards the extensive computer and laser-interferometry research used in developing these headphones to justify the expense.

With the HD 580s plugged into my NAD Monitor pre-amp, first impressions were a little disappointing. On 'Spasm' by Dave's True Story, the overall balance was lightweight and marred by some splash in the treble. Vocals were certainly articulate, but a grey tonality sapped their realism. Imaging, however, was excellent you could almost believe you were listening to a pair of electrostatics, such was the 'out of head' sound the Sennheisers created.

A more appropriate partner for the Precisions was Musical Fidelity's valve X-Cans, with its open, smooth and weighty presentation. Clare Martin's vocals on 'Monk's New Tune' had greater presence and tonal colour than through the NAD. The detail and transparency were excellent too, conveying every subtle acoustic cue making up the live venue. Having said that, the double-bass remained stubbornly insubstantial, and percussion pieces could trip over their own complexity.

The more laid-back tempo of Portishead's 'It Could Be Sweet' posed the Sennheisers fewer problems, its lazy bassline strolling along below finely-etched vocals. Pushing voices out ahead of the rest of the mix was an occasional emphasis on sibilance too, which makes sympathetic cables and sources vital if you're going to get the even-handed best from the

Classical music in the form of Antonio de Almeida's La Giuditta crystallised the good and the bad in these phones. The Precisions lived up to their name by capturing the intimate, close-mic'd ambience perfectly - sound staging and detail were both class-leading. Each instrument had plenty of space to 'breathe', yet the piece as a whole maintained a sense of cohesion and direction.

On the downside, there was a distinct lack of 'body' and substance between the upper midrange and lower treble, a crucial frequency for the realistic portrayal of violins. This became especially obvious when comparing the Sennheisers to a pair of electrostatic phones which suffered no such weakness.

The HD 580 Precisions do display some of the strengths pricier



headphones have which cheaper alternatives lack - build quality and comfort are excellent. The sound staging and insight into the music are also a cut above the rest. But this last trait means the HD 580s can be so analytical and revealing that any recording or equipment deficit is ruthlessly exposed. The bass response isn't the most fluid either, and I have reservations over the reproduction of the upper midrange.

Partner the Precisions with a decent headphone amp and source. and you'll be treated to a true taste of the high-end - you won't find any loudspeakers for the same price which can get anywhere near the levels of transparency offered by these phones. Just beware incompatible component marriages you might end up wondering where all that money wente

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

At the turn of the millennium with 24/96 here, many audiophiles are thinking of buying their last CD player. Leo Lam suggests Creek's CD43.

f you're looking at a change of digital source, you'll realise that we're living in uncertain times. 24-bit 96kHz sampling hardware and software have already arrived (although in a very limited way as far as the discs are concerned), but with Super Audio CD on the horizon and the potential for a format war, should you hang on? After all, Compact Disc is still the world's music carrier. The choice boils down to investing in a 24/96 compatible DVD player or a well-developed CD player.

Creek's new £500 CD43 is one of the latter. This machine uses the fast and robust Sony CDM14 transport housed in a minimalist and typically Creek-style case - a black box with green print. The small, round buttons on the fascia take care of essential functions only; the rest, like random track selection and programming, can be accessed with the remote control. The display is a little ergonomically challenged - instead of using text, it relies on symbols whose significance isn't exactly intuitive. It was difficult to read in daylight or at an angle as well.

The CD43 pulls its socks up internally, where a Crystal Semiconductors 24-bit Delta-Sigma D/A convertor and 128-times oversampling filter do the number crunching. These are controlled by a precision crystal-oscillator clock circuit. The analogue filter stage, which has its own regulation, is based around two fairly standard Philips NE5532 op amps chosen for their high linearity. The Creek also sports a proper S/PDIF co-axial digital output.

There are some nice little touches within the circuitry. A tubular shield (a magnet wrapped around the wire) surrounds the interconnecting cable between circuit boards. Back on the exterior, spongy feet absorb a lot of unwanted vibration, thus reducing microphony within electronic components.

The Creek served alongside a Musical Fidelity

Nu-Vista pre and Assemblage's ST-40 valve power amp driving ProAc Studio 150 floor standers. Interconnect was Kimber's PBJ, and for comparison I wheeled in a modified Arcam Alpha One and my habitual Teac T1 transport and DAC-2 combination.

If you're in a position to purchase your last CD player without wanting to spend over £500, the CD43 has got to be in the running. It appealed so much mainly because of its understated musicality - it hid itself, and the normal digital nasties, away and let the music flow. In this respect it came perilously close to the Teac T1/DAC-2 (perilous for the Teac and Assemblage, that is) or Pink Triangle's Numeral.

Musicality needn't come at the expense of accuracy, which the CD43 amply demonstrated with its scale and dynamic range. The Creek's financial peers come up short in this area with the gentle compression they apply to signals, and fall short in subtlety too. Vocals were smooth and airy and so convincing I had a hard time separating this single box from the transport/DAC pair at roughly twice the price.

As the saying goes, there's no such thing as perfection though, and the CD43 was no exception with focus and control, where it struggled at times. But these problems are insignificant next to the purity and delicacy this player offers. Whatever the prevailing musical conditions, the Creek took everything in its stride.

If you listen to music instead of your hi-fi system, the Creek is likely to have you reaching for your wallet. It's emotionally satisfying yet accurate enough to fulfil any of the criteria which qualify a component for mandatory demonstration. Although you owe it to yourself to hear the current crop of DVD machinery, the CD43 shows the best budget non-24/96 players still have a few aces up their sleeves•


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

Will any DAB gear be appearing at the Heathrow show?

We last touched on Digital Audio

Broadcasting in January '97, when Noel Keywood suggested that manufacturers were slow to take to the new system. The only receiver at the time was an in-car device made by Grundig (at that time a part of Philips), who were closely connected with the EU Eureka 147 project which actually developed DAB. The Grundig DCR 1000 was intended for assessment purposes only, and even though it was 'priced' at £2700, it wasn't for sale!

The BBC has been at the forefront of publicity for DAB via radio and television ads, and has actually been test broadcasting in the London region since September 1995. Now approximately 60% of the UK population is covered by DAB transmissions. As Noel mentioned in his feature, the BBC hoped at the time for 40% of British households to own DAB receivers by the year 2006, which means that over five million sets would have to be sold in just over seven years from now. This looks like a mammoth task considering the almost complete lack of DAB equipment, and the price tags swinging from what little is available.

The one factor which could improve the situation might be the emergence of digital television, or Digital Video Broadcasting, which could give a boost to all things

digital. This is somewhat ironic given the way radio lost out to TV when it was first introduced.

The only DAB receivers which look likely to be generally available by the end of the year are in-car units produced either by companies such as Kenwood, Pioneer and Sony (who deal with a wide range of audio products), or in-car specialists like Blaupunkt.

No dedicated hi-fi tuners are available to audiophiles at the moment, although there is a BBC prototype on offer to the press. Manufacturers are unwilling to stick their necks out and release DAB hi-fi receivers until they know someone's ready to buy them. which leaves a Catch 22 situation how can you buy something which hasn't been made yet? Further complicating matters is the fact that, according to a BBC spokesperson, the BBC and potential DAB receiver manufacturers have signed a "confidentiality agreement" to keep quiet whose products might be first to the shops.

Some UK and European companies are apparently planning to launch designs next year, when a greater area of the UK will be receiving broadcasts (and prototypes and review models could appear at future hi-fi shows and press launches). Sharp, for

instance, told us that their domestic units may be on sale some time next year.

Japanese companies such as Denon have attended the relevant European conferences and marketing seminars held by the BBC. Their Japanese engineers came to England at least a year ago and were involved with the initial design process of DAB receivers, but Denon say they will probably be among the "second wave" of manufacturers to produce DAB

The price of hi-fi receivers seems to be a subject on which many sources have conflicting views. A figure as low as £500-£600 has been mooted, but retail prices are

expected to be closer to £1000-£2000. This is obviously considerably more expensive than the majority of quality analogue tuners, and DAB does not automatically mean better sound quality - the age-old argument of compressed digital vs analogue raises its head yet again.

DAB's signal, providing you're in an area with good reception, should cut out hiss and ghosting, but when we recently sampled an in-car unit connected to our reviewing system, we could only pick up enough signal to get the station name and no music, and this was in central London!

DAB is strictly a European affair at the moment. It was designed to overcome

the problems of FM transmission in mountainous regions, so it's very Euro-centric - neither Japan nor America plan to adopt the system. This limited market causes further reluctance on the part of some manufacturers to go into production. SP

LOSING TRACK

hi-fi units.

I have an LP12, Ittok and Audio Technica OC9 MC. Whilst playing certain LPs (like Bizet's Carmen) I get distortion on high frequencies, usually when female voices soar. Is this due to vinyl's own limitations? If CDs don't distort at such high frequencies this must surely be a point in their favour, especially on Classical records. Or is my cartridge not aligned properly?

A lot of unquantified variables make this a very difficult question to answer. Ironically, female voices have less high-frequency content than male, so it's not likely to be purely frequency-related. Although the fundamentals of the female voice are higher than the male (usually!) the higher harmonic content is less; this is why women's voices sound 'purer' than mens'.

So it's likely that sustained amplitude rather than frequency has done the damage. A high-level wave-form such as a solo female voice blasting away can give a stylus tip quite a job simply in terms of the amplitude to be reproduced.

It could be that the tracking weight on your OC9 is a little low.

When this is the case, the tip is liable to plough its own furrow and the finer points of the recording are simply bull-dozed out of the way. Otherwise, as you say, it could be misalignment. You can check this with a cartridge alignment gauge like the one below.

By the way, gauges which only align the cartridge at the outer grooves should be avoided - they can produce poor results on the inner grooves, where misalignment causes maximum wear and distortion.

Once you've sorted out your cartridge, let it loose on an audiophile LP from Vivante.




ALIGNMENT PROTRACTOR to minimize tracking distortion from high topserms

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SINE-ING OFF

However, I was recently talking to a friend who is heavily into all things electrical and he says there is no way a separate power supply would make any real audible difference to the sound my turntable produces and that I'd be wasting my money.

Can you give me some sound arguments that explain the process whereby power supply can affect sound quality?

Over the years I have listened to many loudspeakers as well, but I still have a preference for those a relative had in the Seventies. They were the Sonab OA 1A omnidirectionals.

We first heard them at the Harrogate Hi-Fi Show. They were so natural and life-like many people were amazed - you could sit next to one cabinet and still hear stereo! Unfortunately, I have never seen the Sonabs for sale second-hand (I would love a pair).

Why aren't omni-directional 'speakers more popular? What would a modern equivalent be, and how much should I start saving?

In the days of mono, cabinet designers went to great lengths to get rid of the 'hole-in-thewall' effect inherent in single-'speaker set-ups. Voigt used reflecting horns, which tended to spread the sound, and Decca pointed the driver into a corner so that the

process, most of which takes place in the brain of the listener. There seems to have been some confusion in the Sixties and early Seventies with regard to 'helping' what is fundamentally a psycho-acoustic process by a centrally-placed 'speaker with combined left-and-right output to 'fill' in the middle of the stereo spread; optimising the position of the two main 'speakers does not seem to have been considered!

Coupled with these acrobatics,

Our experience, and that of many readers who have invested in turntable PSUs, confirms that the well-engineered ones can make a very big difference indeed. This comes as no shock when you

the question of finding space for the extra 'speaker for stereo gave rise to experiments with column-type enclosures whose driver's fired upwards onto reflectors. The simpler Sonabs are fairly representative of this type. Having drivers firing in all

directions naturally gave a good spread of sound and therefore positioning for stereo-of-a-sort became uncritical simply because the ears' choice of information source became so wide.

Coupled with this the Sonabs were 'Lifestyle Compatible' and (oh-so-sexy) Swedish to boot!

If we seem a smidge unenthusiastic it's because nowadays audiophiles who appreciate accurate sound staging and imaging position loudspeakers away from

reflective surfaces. I can imagine in a very large room with a dead acoustic the Sonabs and others like them (eg, Goodmans Dimension 8, Wye Electronics 1300, Luxor 835, etc) would perform well, but there are better ways of cracking that particular nut. It is unnervingly easy for the ear to confuse omnidirectional muddle with 'natural stereo spread'! RMW

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FOR THE RECORD

I have been longing for a replacement for the cassette, which should have remained a dictation medium. Anyway, I was musing on MiniDisc, weighing up the pros and cons of yet another medium, when I read your CD Revolution article in the January '98 edition. I had just uprated my ageing 486 computer with a new mother board and a P233 chip. The timing of your article could not have been better. I bought a Hewlett-Packard CD-R/CD-RW drive, which works perfectly, and the Adaptec software is a joy to use.

Nevertheless, there is a learning curve to making good recordings. The software puts a two-second silence between tracks, even if the original tracks flow uninterrupted. There is a way around this using the program Disc-at-Once, but some audio CD players cannot read recordings made in this manner.

I have two versions of the Adaptec software, which control the read speed at two different, set rates. The version bundled with the HP recorder reads audio at between double and triple speed, which produces error-free recordings. The Adaptec Deluxe version (which Hi-Fi World used) allows my drive to read at eight times normal speed and produces recordings with spits and pops, reminiscent of sticky fingers on vinyl!

And the recordings themselves? I have a Marantz CD-63mkll KI-S, Naim 42.5/140 amps and ProAc Tablette 'speakers. The



You'll be much better off going for separates, as long as you don't mind a mix of component styles after your Midi.

I have used several different makes of CD-R blanks and found no audible differences between brands. I've now settled on mid-cost TDK Reflex blanks at about £1.20 each.

As anyone who's bought a computer over the last five years or so will be aware, technology moves on incredibly quickly these days.

DVD-RAM and its re-recordable blank discs will soon be in the shops (see last month's Trade Winds for more details of Hitachi's new DVD-RAM drive). As you say, though, it will be a while before disc and drive prices drop, so for the moment CD-R remains digital recording's strongest contender.

In addition, with most of the software out there in 44.1/16-bit form, what's the point in making digital recordings to a higher-spec disc, especially when DVD-RAM comes in a caddy which current DVD players won't accept? Only once DVD-RAM makes the transition from computer to audio, and 24/96 pre-recordeds are more widely available, might this format really take off. JM

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SOURCE SUPERIORITY

My source is a £600 Arcam Alpha 6 CD player sitting ahead of a Sugden Optima 140 amp (£550) and £150 Mission 731LE 'speakers. I am looking for a logical upgrade to this system. I assume this means replacing the budget Missions. I thought I would try an outboard DAC first, however, as I know from experience the 731LEs are very revealing.

I rang a nearby dealer who recommended the DPA
Little Bit III. I was a little
disappointed to realise this
was only £300, and I didn't
expect much of an
improvement over the
already good sound of my
Arcam. My doubts were
quickly brushed aside by a very dynamic
and powerful presentation.

This shocked me into thinking my Missions have a lot of potential left in them. My question to you then is, how far can I go with the source before I need to change the 'speakers - or amplifier for that matter? Believe me, I've learnt that the source is the most important part of the whole.

CORRUPTED BY POWER?

I've long heard how well the Jamo Concert 8 loudspeakers can sing. I would like to obtain a pair to hook up to my Musical Fidelity X-A200 monoblocs, which can supply 200watts into 8ohms. Can you tell me if the Concert 8s can cope with my power amps, as the maximum power rating for the Jamos is 150watts into 4ohms?

You seem to be a little confused as to amplifier power ratings. The X-A200s quoted rating of 200watts into 80hms means they will deliver a maximum of 200watts into 80hms when required to do so, for example if you were attempting to drive extremely insensitive loudspeakers very loud in a large room. Otherwise, in an

What you'll often find when you already have a decent amplifier is that an upgrade to either source or loudspeakers will boost the system's performance. Driving £150 'speakers from a £600 CD player and £550 amp will certainly give the 731LEs a chance to shine, but they really are the weak link.

Sell your Missions and then track down a pair of the same company's 771 stand mounters at £170, which are far sweeter and

average 16ft. by 12ft. living room at normal listening levels, the X-A200s would be barely ticking over as the

Basically, a power amp like the X-A200 reaches its rated output only when required to do so by a

A more radical solution, which we espoused last month, would be to sell your Sugden, Missions and 'speaker cable and invest in a £200 Creek OBH-12 passive pre-amp and a pair of active 'speakers like Harbeth's Xpression! DPM1 Pro-Actives at £849.

You should be able to get about £400 for your old components, leaving you with a bill of around £650 if your existing interconnects are long enough to allow for

correct positioning of the active Harbeths. This is a hefty bill, but the results would be infinitely more transparent, weighty and musical than a new pair of passive loudspeakers at the same price. I suspect you might be very surprised by what your Arcam is capable of when accompanied by the Creek and Harbeths. JM

Whatever the system you settle on, try out a pair of The Chord Company's Siren interconnects.

particularly nasty loudspeaker load or high volumes.

The Jamos' power handling of 150watts means you shouldn't pump more than 150watts into their voice coils, as you might permanently damage them. However, this amount of power through the Concert 8s would produce painfully high volumes which would be dangerous to listen to without the protection of ear plugs.

Don't worry, the X-A200s work very well indeed with the Concert 8s, as we've found. We actually got the best sound though when we bi-amped the Jamos with two pairs of X-A200s! JM

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
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GRACE UNDER PRESSURE

My system comprises a Linn LP12. Valhalla PSU, Grace G707 tone-arm and an Ortofon MC15 Super 2 vinyl source. Naim amplification (NAC 32/NAP 120)

drives Castle Harlech 'speakers through Cable Talk bi-wire 3.1.1 use a Soundstyle stand and Chord Cobra 2 interconnects, and also have an Arcam Alpha 6 CD player.

I have recently upgraded my 'speakers, equipment stand and CD interconnect. The upgrades were carried out in stages, and both the new equipment stand (previously MFI) and 'speakers (previously Royd Sapphires) gave a noticeable improvement. There was more detail, definition and bass, plus a better midrange and treble. The only downside came with CD, the Cobra 2 cable seeming to change the Arcam's sound from smooth to harsh.

The dealer put this down to the upgrades exposing the shortcomings of the Arcam and recommended I look at upgrading this next. I am not so convinced, and wonder if you could give me your advice on any way of improving the sound of the Arcam, to give it some

'musicality' and smoothness?

Yours is a classic system mismatch, I'm afraid. In a sense your dealer is right - the Arcam is out of its depth somewhat - but the real root of the problem is that you've balanced the system around your Linn, which in its current guise is a long way from being tonally neutral. The Grace arm is extremely soft and warm by modern standards; if you changed to an Akito 2, the Linn would also sound 'harsh' through your system. This is because you have a forward sounding pre/power and 'speakers. The system is fine with your warm

Linn, but with a neutral source it reveals its true, bright self.

There are several ways round the problem. You could replace your amp with a sweeter design

> like a Sonneteer Alabaster, or your could change your CD player for something silkier like a Mission dAD3Q. But first try some strategic tuning - place a set of Foculpods under

the Arcam and get a length of LFD's Spirolink 3 interconnect. The former will bring more bass weight and musicality, the latter a smoother sound with yet more detail and ambience. I'd also recommend you change to Naim NAC-05 'speaker cable (Naim amps work best with Naim cable), and use the Harlechs with the grilles on. If these mods aren't enough, an intermediate step is a new DAC - specifically DPA's Little Bit III, which should improve on your Arcam's bass and warmth. DP

AMPLIFIER UPGRADE

My system is a Marantz PM-57 amplifier and CD-67SE CD player, Mordaunt-Short MS20i Pearl 'speakers on Atacama SE24 stands, and Ixos 604 Custom and Ixos 609 interconnects and bi-wire 'speaker cables respectively.


I've recently completed my set-up with a NAD 412 tuner. Generally, I'm happy with what I'm getting from the system. However, I have a few reservations which hopefully you can lay to rest.

First and foremost, is my current system well-balanced? My main concern is the amplifier. I suspect that it is limiting the abilities of my other components. I'm ready to upgrade it, but only if its replacement brings noticeable improvements. I'm eyeing the Marantz PM-66 KI-Signature and the Audiolab 8000LX. What do you think? Other recommendations would be very welcome.

The next problem is that the bass is, at times, not as tight as I would prefer. This only happens on music with heavy, extended bass. My room is rather small (3.5m. by 3.8m.) and the 'speakers are

placed about 20cms from the rear wall. Could this be the reason, as I believe the Pearls are very capable 'speakers and I thoroughly enjoy their presentation of most types of music?

Your system seems pretty well put together, but I'd agree that the


amplifier is the obvious candidate for replacement. For around £500 I'd give both the Marantz and Audiolab a miss. Were it my money, I'd go for either the LFD Mistral Integrated, which has a beautifully sweet, beguiling sound, or the Rose Scion, which has loads of power and poise. Of the two, I'd probably pick the LFD, but seeing as you're suffering from loose bass, and the LFD's isn't famously tight, it would have to be the Scion.

Try Sound-Bytes in your stands to tighten up the lows, as well as moving the MS20s out into the room. If all else fails, the old 'sock in the bass port' trick can work wonders. Or, if you're a perfectionist, an expertly-cut foam bung would be better still. You'll find your boom disappears and the upper bass becomes much more taut. DP

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
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
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


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
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
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t was when I plugged in a pair of gorgeous, old 6L6 valves and they went 'phut' within minutes that I realised we had a problem. My beloved 6L6 amplifier had just disposed of two classic Sylvania valves with peremptory ease; £50 had gone down the pan. In my mind I could see some old gaffer blowing dust from a pair he'd stored round about the time the last dinosaur went belly up. At the flick of a switch our amplifier would vaporise his treasure quicker than Enola Gay and with about as much compassion. I could see a problem on the horizon and was obliged to do something about it.

It was in DIY Supplement No18, banded to our November 1995 issue, that K6L6 first appeared. The idea was to offer a budget valve amplifier with plenty of power. To keep costs down we had to use inexpensive valves and a one-piece chassis of simpler construction than the welded, ground and coated affairs that grace our other amplifiers. Since this model was likely to be popular with first-time constructors, printed circuit boards were also going to be used to reduce wiring errors. It was a great concept, I

degree of Class A working, was increased.

I spent a lot of time honing a 'compound bias' scheme that usefully gave healthy output power, avoided the need for bias adjustment and demanded little power dissipation in the cathode resistors. As a result, small resistors that run cool could be used. These have the advantage of being more suitable for circuit-board mounting than large, ceramic types which stream heat.

To get high power output we had to use 450V-550V. Trouble is, this gets close to the rated maxima for some, but not all, 6L6s. This raises the issue of whether ratings for valves are meaningfully accurate, and I soon found that 6L6s vary enormously. Some were rated right on their limit while others were grossly underrated. So we had a 24watt anode dissipation 6L6, for example, whose anodes started to glow dull cherry-red in places at this power, meaning it needed to be run at no more than 20watts or so. Things were becoming complicated. We would have to catalogue the specifications of 6L6s to ensure the output power quoted could be achieved in practice.

valves are big and later ones small. Later designs also have higher performance.

Knowing this, guess which one of this group went 'phut' in our amp - the big Sylvania 6L6G, placed just left of centre. It is rated to take just 350V HT and I was applying 480V to it at the time. And which gave most power? Yes, the small, stubby one second in from the right, a 6L6WGB.

The Sylvania is rare and expensive, the WGB cheap, so it would seem we were in



thought, and our first prototypes worked perfectly, giving 36watts output, more than enough to give good volume levels with reasonably sensitive loudspeakers (87dB SPL upward).

You don't get something for nothing, however. Our inexpensive Edicron 6L6GT valves, seen in the original 1995 pictures, could only take so much in the way of standing current (degree of Class A working) and HT voltage before showing the strain. This wasn't too much of a problem, because they could be upgraded at little cost to a tougher 6L6 from Edicron, for a little more power and a little less distortion providing the standing current, or

I started phoning around for 6L6s and soon built up quite a collection, as you can see from the picture. This shows six very different looking 6L6s, but all are beam tetrodes based on the original American RCA design. In the centre sits a 6CA7 pentode which we used to overcome the problems of the 6L6.

So why do 6L6s vary to such an extent? Valves started out big, but as electronics grew, size became a problem. As I noted last month, America's first computer, ENIAC, used 19000 of them and weighed 30 tons! So the main development imperative was to reduce size and power consumption. As a generalisation, old

luck. But the valve at far right is a modern Chinese WGB and that went 'phut' too! Worse, people buy valves on appearance and there's plenty of talk about originals sounding best. This is where my innocent old gaffer scenario enters the picture; I started to imagine old classics giving up the ghost all over Britain, at which point I finally called a halt to developing K6L6.

Happily, its successor, the new KEL34, uses the beefiest pentodes I have ever seen. They are massively rated and turn out oodles of power. Now our amplifier produces 40watts with ease. So we got there in the end. My apologies for the three-year delay!

Jon Marks enjoys the silence with Origin Live's battery-powered Oasis-S turntable.

silver tide of Compact Disc which swept the globe in vinyl's wake was unleashed against a background of deathly quiet. For after years of swish, crackle and rumble obscuring the music in LP's grooves, the silence that digital brought with it seemed almost too good to be true. As silver discs multiplied and went forth, black ones disappeared or were turned into plant pots and ashtrays. One small band of dedicated enthusiasts refused to jump ship and leave HMS Vinyl to sink without a trace. They knew only the purest power could sweep all the unwanted noise out of a groove, so they charged their trusty turntables up on battery power.

ON ACID (AND LEAD)

Joining that slowly growing band (alongside long-term members Pink Triangle) is Origin Live with their new £2250 Oasis-S. Like PT, OL match their precision DC motor from Airpax to a battery PSU. Where the Anniversary's was ensconced in its own case though, the OL's 6V Yuasa lead/acid battery (which will keep

The heart of the Oasis-S is three pound coins. These aren't some Special Edition versions which have been silver-plated to boost their sound, they're what you'd expect to find in pockets and wallets anywhere in the UK. Apparently, they were selected because the metal they're made of sounds better than the sort of angle iron used in a lot of decks. Topping off these coins of the realm are three fibre washers, upon which sits the main beam the motor, bearing and arm-mount are bolted onto.

As you'll discover when you try setting up the Oasis-S, the only thing

the sub-chassis falling of its supports is a long Allen bolt (which is tightened during transit and loosened before replay). It can be quite disconcerting to brush against the polycarbonate platter and have it shift dramatically instead of bouncing gently as it would if it were suspended. Still, a solid sub-chassis means there are no springs to drift off level with time.

One of Origin's other preferred methods for reducing background noise is to fit three (three is obviously the lucky number of Mark Baker, the man behind OL) upward-facing spikes to decouple the platter from the sub-platter.

Compared to normally-sprung turntables, the Oasis-S is sensitive to the surface it's located on - you can't place it anywhere and expect it to deliver 100%. We settled on a Sound Organisation mini table below one of Audiophile Furniture's Base platforms. On the wrong foundation (ie, a plain slab of MDF on spikes or cones) bass is woolly and

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lightweight, and the treble and midrange flat.

What else could we choose to arm the OL with than the company's own modified Rega RB300 (which comes with a sleeve to allow easy height adjustment on the S)? At the end of the Rega was an Ortofon MC 25 FL Moving-Coil cartridge.

Downstream came a Sonic Frontiers Phono 1 phono stage, Michell's Orca pre-amp, a pair of Musical Fidelity X-A200 monoblocs and Jamo's Concert 8s. Cables were supplied by Roksan, Purist Audio Design and van den Hul.

HI-FI IS A PACKET OF CRISPS

What sways many listeners in favour of vinyl is the warmth it possesses when replayed on the majority of turntables. Compared to this round, rich prawn-cocktailesque acoustic flavour, the Oasis-S was more salt and vinegar. Its treble and midrange have a clean but bright and incisive character on vocals and strings; bass is dry and tangy, almost balsamic.

Prime example of this crisp balance was a copy of Skunk Anansie's Stoosh. This isn't the warmest of digital recordings anyway, but it actually has a fairly even tonal balance. Spinning on that polycarbonate platter (which rings in a manner eerily reminiscent of aluminium when struck, as does the steel sub-platter), it was as if the mastering engineer had reached for the equaliser and boosted frequencies above about 2kHz. This brought cymbals, sibilants and strings forward

case with loudspeakers like Jamo's Concert 8s though, brightness doesn't automatically equal harsh and spitty, as the Oasis-S has a purity and smoothness across the full span of octaves.

With some duller pressings, the OL's rise in response made a better sonic match. Eric Bibb and Bert Deivert's Hello Stranger LP from Opus 3 has a 'recorded through a sock' quality to it which was perfectly counterbalanced by the Oasis-S. The spaciousness of the hall where the single pair of microphones was set up flowed effortlessly from the Jamos, filling out all round their cabinets in a way many noisier AC-powered alternatives would struggle to match.

That sense of a complete lack of strain continued with rhythms and melodies, the low-noise and minimal cogging of the Airpax DC motor Moving up to 45rpm showed the dry bass also had great speed and control, the massive drum beats on Time Zone's World Destruction missing out on the slam a Garrard 401 is capable of, but making up for that in agility and tunefulness.

With all these bass pyrotechnics going off, many turntables give up the ghost in terms of midrange and treble delicacy, but the Oasis-S scored once more in this area. Triangles, harp, woodwind and strings on Britten's Young Person's Guide To The Orchestra were all portrayed against a near-silent background, each clearly separated from its companions.

Reflecting its unsprung isolation, the Origin really does benefit from an appropriate base and careful dressing of the tone-arm lead outs. Ironically, the Achilles heel of OL's modified RB300 when bolted to the Oasis-S is the arm's thick cabling, which coarsens the midrange and blurs the bass, if it's draped over the top of a rack or platform. Propping up said leads to get them in the air cured the problem, although leaving the RB300's original skinny output wiring in place would be the best solution.

If you prefer to fit and forget hi-fi, and shell out on equipment which doubles as sculpture, it would be worth rounding up alternatives to the Origin Live (like the Gyrodec and QC supply). However, if you enjoy vinyl as a hands-on experience and don't mind spending some time on a deck's set-up, the Oasis-S will reward with a crisp, open presentation and great involvement through a warmish system.

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

s everyone else and his dog in the world of hi-fi seems to have heard 96kHz 24-bit DVD Audio, I ecided it was time for me to do the me. So, one sweltering day in July, I ot-footed it down to a friendly hi-fi egastore in Tokyo's Akihabara district, pan's hi-fi Mecca and self-proclaimed lectric Town'. Having made it to the top por I reclined in a demonstration-room nair and waited to be impressed. At last I io, like everyone else I speak to these ays, could say, "I have heard the future f digital".

Going through my head as one of the w currently-available 24/96 discs was otted into a Pioneer DVS-9 was the ightmare prospect that my precious ollection of black plastic could finally be bsolete.

While I can't deny that I love the size, rel and (I'm sure I'll regret admitting this) mell of LP records, the main reason I've ot a house full of the things is their bund. To my ears, with a decent irritable they walk all over Compact Disc. This is a view that, as the saying oes, I am unanimous in holding. I've had since I first heard a Yamaha CDX-1 layer back in 1984, and I don't wish to e disabused of it too quickly.

Indeed, I must admit to being almost scared' of hearing DVD Audio. The nought of some anonymous black box all of robot-stuffed circuit boards and heapo op-amps usurping my beautiful arntable as a source was too horrible to contemplate. Waiting for the disc tray to close and the laser to lock on target eemed to take a nail-biting eternity.

Having been one of the first to hear Pink Triangle's Cardinal/Da Capo play IDCDs back in 1995, I had an inkling of how high-resolution digital audio might sound. But I wasn't prepared for this. Sweet and detailed, the music (that's right, strange as it might sound, music from digital) flooded out of the big Celestion A3 floor standers. And as for those dynamics - instruments played quiet and then loud, loud and then quiet, just like a live concert - there wasn't even a hint of that squashed up, CD-esque compression here!

What I was hearing was seriously impressive. I sat transfixed, aghast at the digital delectations before me - that power, detail, air, space and imaging were definitely approaching high-end vinyl territory.

Then we went back to CD, in the shape of Pioneer's PD-T07HS - at Y220000 (£950), some Y30000 more expensive than the DVD player I'd just been listening to. It paled by comparison.

Stuck somewhat unceremoniously on his floor was an Immedia turntable fitted with a Wheaton Triplanar tone-arm and Lyra Clavis moving coil. Together, this little lot cost megabucks - far more than the Pioneer DVD player - but I'd wanted a reference so wasn't complaining. With memories of all that digital power, space and transparency still vivid in my mind, I sat back and fatefully waited to be underwhelmed by this prehistoric technology.

From the moment the diamond hit the groove, I realised my records weren't about to be relegated to the attic. The turntable was sublime - no less powerful or dynamic than DVD Audio yet far more musically involving. Music lilted from the 'speakers, rich, resonant acoustic instruments played by real people - something even 24/96 can't do convincingly. Granted, the systems were

Back came the bright upper midrange, wooden, arrhythmic bass, tizzy treble and shut-in, shallow sound stage. This was hardly the stuff of digital dreams.

I returned to DVD and again the music flowed like wine. Interestingly, one of my suspicions had been that the new format would sound very 'showy' and artificial. This proved totally unfounded - thanks to a dynamic range dramatically superior to standard 16-bit, it was relaxed and unforced.

So, it's curtains for vinyl then? Well, I'm not so sure. Despite all the superlatives that have been heaped on 24-bit, 96kHz recently, it still didn't 'do the magic' for me in the same way as a decent turntable. Unfortunately, as my own system was many thousands of miles away back in Blighty, I was in no position to shoot home to make some quick comparisons. So instead, it was over to a friend's place on the other side of the city for a proper listen to a decent disc spinner.

different so the comparison wasn't terribly objective, but I just couldn't help hearing more music from vinyl. By any standards DVD audio is a fine music carrier, but it's still recognisably digital in the sense that an original Beatles LP is dyed-in-the-wool analogue.

I have heard the future and it's good. I'm right behind DVD Audio, and if it's this capable now then its future looks assured. Yet I'm equally certain there's more to come, not least in the form of 24 bits at 192kHz sampling. Factor in some serious players from hi-fi manufacturers like Meridian and Pink Triangle with properly-engineered analogue output stages, and it will run vinyl very close indeed.

But I also believe there'll always be room for analogue, which continues to get better and better, and there's no theoretical ceiling to its development potential. Now, at 40 years of age, perhaps life has really only just begun for the vinyl LP...

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RUBY, RUBY BABY

The Ruby 2s are the jewel in JPW's loudspeaker crown. Timothy Liu signs up as an admirer.

hen you're shopping for a pair of loudspeakers around the £500 mark, you can quite confidently say you're moving in the lower realms of the high-end market - the bog-standard vinyl-wrapped box with cheap drivers won't cut the mustard at this price. With so many near-identical two-way stand mounters at this level though, tracking down the ideal pair can involve a lot of foot work. Which is why JPW have gone to great efforts visually and in the sound department to ensure their Ruby 2s stand out from the crowd.

Lifting the Rubies out of their box, I was greeted by two beautifully-veneered red mahogany cabinets with chamfered edges front and back. The theme of no-nonsense construction continues inside the enclosures with heavy-gauge copper wiring and custom-wound air-core inductors on the crossovers.

Removing the black grilles I discovered a 25mm ferrofluid-cooled metal-dome tweeter and an exotic 180mm red aluminium mid/bass unit. The cones for these are made to order for JPW by Associated Electronics in Sussex. Unlike many other metal diaphragms, the Rubies' are spun rather than pressed, which enables the thickness of the cone to be varied concentrically to help damp out any unwanted resonances.

Turn the 'speakers round and you'll see the four heavy-duty, goldplated binding posts which enable pi-wiring. Above these is the small port which reflex-loads the mid/bass.

I spent three weeks with the Ruby 2s in a system where amplification was supplied by Jeff Rowland on the one hand, and the more modest but magnificent Audio Analogue Puccini SE integrated on the other. These in turn partnered front ends such as a Basis turntable with an ageing Shiraz cartridge, a Wadia 6 CD player, and an antiquated but still lovable Marantz CD-94. Sonus Faber height-adjustable stands served as bases for the JPWs.

When Jeff met Ruby, Stan Getz's 'Always Trust Your Heart' showed all the hallmarks of transmission through a well-engineered monitor. The JPWs ranked high for their realism and three-

dimensionality, both built on sharp imaging, open sound staging and subtle insight.

Tonally, the story wasn't quite as rosy. John Cougar Mellencamp's 'R.O.C.K. In The U.S.A.' had a cooler, leaner presentation, and although the bass had good slam and speed, it lacked warmth and extension. Tilting this balance further was a touch of sibilance on closely-mic'd recordings.

Time for a substitution - off went Rowland, replaced by Puccini. At the same time, I sidelined the Wadia in preference for the Marantz with its warm character. Now the system was pulling together as a team - the Rubies changed from analytical detail retrievers to music makers.

Just a few bars into K.D. Lang's 'Save Me' and the sound coming from the JPWs was more relaxed and vibrant. Bass warmed up and became more extended, allowing music to flow along in an involving



way absent before. The inherently detailed metal drivers had lost none of their lucidity, but the shift away from neutral ancillaries to more complementary equipment avoided an overly clinical, cerebral rendition.

The Ruby 2s need to be matched carefully to exploit their strengths rather than highlight their weaknesses. Sources and amplification should ideally be laid-back, full and well-rounded - Sugden's more powerful solid-state offerings and lusher push-pull valve alternatives would fit the bill.

For their asking price of £395 (or £495 for special finishes), the Ruby 2s are a lot of loudspeaker for the money in terms of construction and audiophile parts. They may not have the smoothest treble or deepest bass, but careful matching can achieve sonic successe

epending on which story you believe, the 'modern' suspended turntable, the ancestor of so many decks (Linn LP12, Ariston RD11, Manticore, Fons, etc) was either the Thorens TD150 or the Acoustic Research XB. Both appeared at about the same time in the early 1960s, so it was a case of either parallel development or piracy. As no law suits went flying (although they surely would today) and I have no wish to upset the status quo, let's assume it was the former!

The AR deck is as rare as rocking-horse droppings in the UK and, frankly, the 1970s version we got over here is not as good as the Thorens nor anywhere near as tweakable. Its arm is very poor indeed, and the suspension is light and bouncy. Good in its day, it's now only a bargain at a carboot sale if it's going for less than a tenner.

Much more common and better are the Thorens TD150/160 range. They remained in production from the early 1960s through to the 1990s, and are very underrated disc spinners. Common to all is an AC motor and metal sub-chassis and top-plate. The platter, sub-platter and main bearing were also reassuringly substantial.

Visually, the TD150 has it for me. The 'mini' LP12 look (just remember the LP12 was the copy, and not the '150) is just right. The later '160s may be heavier in plinth build, but they really don't look as handsome. Some TD160 variants are finished in typical Seventies plastic wrap, and the later Eighties versions come in real wood veneer, but this doesn't prevent them appearing a little clumsy by comparison.

The TD150 MkI is just as good as the MkII, except for the terrible arm which hamstrings the deck's performance. The MkII's arm looks just as unappealing, but is actually better than a Rega RB300. When cashstrapped a few years ago, I popped an Ortofon MC 10 Super in a MkII and was staggered by what emerged from the groove. This partnership shouldn't have worked, but it did - with a vengeance. I had just parted with a monster high-end combo, costing many thousands of pounds, and here was this £50 turntable with a £60 cartridge that blew it away.

Sadly, the later TD160s suffered badly with useless arms too. There are some real horrors here, with strange plastic spacing devices instead of proper arm-height adjustment, and oh-so-flexible bearings. The last versions were available with a UK-fitted RB250, which was a fatal

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mistake - this arm does not work on these little decks. For similar reasons it failed to gel on the LP12.

Actually, one of the best options is to find an old Linn arm. The Basik LVVs and LVXs sound as if they were made to work hand-in-glove with the Thorens, and can be bought for as little as £50. One of the finest record players I heard was a Naim Aro/Koetsu cartridge on a tweaked TD150. Crazy combo, but it sang.

As far as tweaks go, they are many and varied. Simple stuff consists of throwing away the appalling platter mat and, on all TD150s and earlier TD160s, removing the crummy cardboard plinth base. This reaps massive rewards for very little outlay.

Another common modification is to fit Linn LP12 springs in the place of Thorens' own; the results can be mixed though, and you will have to know a friendly Linn dealer who will sell you the parts. Linn Valhalla power supply boards also boost the deck's sound massively, so while you are in the dealer's shop, see if they have any second-hand Valhallas lurking about. Chances are they will want lots of dosh for them, so you might find going through our Classifieds more cost-effective. Those seeking the highest order of upgrade should invest in something more specialised. One to try is Martin Bastin's PSU. It costs £400 and will drive any turntable AC motors, including those found on Garrards 401s and 301s. He can be contacted at 225 Tettenhall Road, Wolverhampton WV6 0DE.

The TD150 is somewhat more flexible as regards fitting new arms. The arm board style was copied by Linn, and its large dimensions make it simple to put on any reasonable arm (beware anything too heavy - stick with arms known to work well on the LP12). Technical And General (tel: 01892 654534) will supply ready-cut boards for a modest amount. It's not hard to cut your own either, as long as you have enough knowledge about arm length and correct alignment.


The deck shown in our photos reveals an upgraded plinth system fitted around a TD150. This particular example started life as a chassis model and was fitted into the ubiquitous 'radiogram' cabinet. Its original arm was removed, and a pilot light placed in the arm-lift control hole. It's an easy formula to copy, and the little '150 does benefit from a heavier plinth.

In some ways, this plinth was the major advantage of the '160 over the '150, especially the later units where heavy, high-density particle board was the chosen material. The other step forward was the quality of the main bearing.

The TD150s are physically smaller than the TD160s. However, extended listening reveals very little difference between the two models, with, if anything, the slightly lighter sound of the '150 pipping the '160 at the post. The difference is marginal, and depends a great deal on how the decks are set up.

Replacement belts are required about every three to five years depending on use. Again, it's down to your local Linn dealer for an LP12 belt! Make sure you fit the belt the right way round - get your dealer to point out the polished side.

These decks offer a great deal for very little. Some



friends of mine, who owned a Gyrodec, recently set up a TD160 as an interim measure while a new arm was fitted to the Michell. Result? The Thorens stayed and the Gyrodec was passed on - they really are that good. Don't bother with the lesser TD166, or even the TD147; stick with the '150 and '160.

An early MkI or MkII TD150 will fetch anything between £50 and £75 in standard trim; a TD160 from

£50 for an early MkI, to £200 for a late 'S' deck. If you just want to 'plug and play', get either a MkII TD150 or a late spec. TD160. If you don't mind tinkering about and searching out a better arm, any variant will do. They offer sure-fire sound quality for pin money, and a lot of fun in the tweaking department•

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

s much as it pains me to admit it, sales of vinyl have been in decline over the last decade.

Despite a resurgence several years ago due to the Dance and Rave culture, which encouraged mixing the music as

many people still think a CD player is going to give faultless service for year after year. Unfortunately, the plain fact of the matter is that it won't, lasers usually only lasting between two and eight years with average usage. Their replacement cost of anything between £60 and £160 makes changing a budget stylus every year or so look very reasonable.

Even so, despite similar running costs, CD remains a vastly more convenient medium than vinyl. But hang on a minute, what about sound quality? Surely when listening to music this is of crucial importance, and far more important than mere convenience? Despite the introduction of HDCD (High Definition Compatible Digital) CD players, equivalently-priced turntables still sound superior to their CD counterparts. A contentious point? Possibly, but I've heard many an ardent CD supporter agree as they point out that you simply can't

much as dancing to it, CD is the undisputed market leader. And it's not hard to see why that format also knocked Compact Cassette off its podium - dubious durability, slow access times and sound quality that was never intended to be of high fidelity in the first place have seen to the demise of cassette. It looks as though Minidisc will firmly drive home the final nail in cassette's coffin.

You might have thought that the arguments for buyers' preference of CD over vinyl would be similar. After all, the LP is undoubtedly less user-friendly, much bulkier, more scratch-prone and there are no in-car units (can you imagine the size a car's central console would have to be to accommodate one!) The players themselves also require care and attention, what with levelling, cartridge alignment, stylus replacement and so on.

Having said that, it's surprising how

buy a lot of recordings on vinyl.

These arguments have all been well documented, but what has received less attention is an area concerned with vinyl's demise in terms of sound quality, where the blame lies not at the door of the record industry but amplifier manufacturers.

The difference a decent phono stage can make to an integrated amp's sound quality is astounding, although it's frequently dismissed as an irrelevance by the bulk of the hi-fi industry. This is a point which has recently been brought home to me after testing a couple of highly capable phono stages at two price extremes (NAD's £40 PP1 and Anthem's £900 Pre 1P).

In the past I've found that a good phono stage at £300-£800 can make a far greater improvement to a given system than spending the equivalent amount on any other component. In

particular I remember a combination of the original Pioneer A-400 (£230 at the time) with a Kinshaw phono stage (£550) which proved so devastatingly effective with vinyl that I really couldn't think of any vinyl-compatible integrated amplifier which could compete at twice the price. And if that sounds like a typical case of journalistic hype (heaven forbid!), I should mention that it was an opinion also held by many others in the hi-fi industry (but not the press) at the time


Seeing as the quality of a phono stage plays such a large part in the final reckoning of a turntable's sound quality, it comes as quite a shock to see how few designers take it seriously. Of those that even bother to fit one as standard in the first place (including some of the most prestigious manufacturers), many resort to the cheapest components - paying £1000 for an amplifier with a phono stage is no guarantee of sweet sounding LP reproduction.

I suspect that the manufacturers' view is that, for anyone serious about vinyl, there is always the option of an external equaliser. This is fine as far as it goes. Rotel can provide one such device for as little as £130 in their RO-970BX. The main stumbling block is that, by and large, none but the most serious hi-fi addicts want yet another box and set of interconnects clogging up their racks. And why should they? We've seen in recent years the demise of budget DACs, as the standards of integrated machines have reached a level which makes them unnecessary. Now if manufacturers were to add phono stages of the quality of the Rotel RQ-970BX or Musical Fidelity X-LP to their amplifiers, it might make them £100 or so more expensive but the results would be far more impressive.

Of course, manufacturers will never do this as it would turn a £300 amplifier into a £400 one, leaving it at the mercy of higher-priced line-level-only competitors. In any case, the damage has already been done, and it would be a mistake to look back and think

"what if. . ." But when pondering the demise of vinyl, do spare a thought for the fact that what happened wasn't entirely the format's own fault - integrated amps' phono stages weren't perhaps the best they could have been. But then I don't suppose this did the very same manufacturers' sales of CD players any

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
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
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
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THE ART OF CONDUCTING

Jon Marks interviews DNM's Denis Morecroft in our continuing journey into cable technology.

ast month, Andrew Lord, QED's cable designer, revealed some of the secrets which go into successful cable construction. But as anyone who's tried to track down the right cables for their equipment knows, there's more than one way to go. So after the multi-strand methodology of QED, we examine the merits of solid-core with DNM's Denis Morecroft.

JM What factors do you consider in designing your cables?

DNM When design decisions are made they are invariably influenced by preconceived ideas as to the function of the item in question. Conclusions reached on cable parameters like skin effect. capacitance, resistance and inductance have all been based on assumptions about the required bandwidth and power transmission necessary for the highest possible fidelity. There is no evidence at all that these assumptions are valid for the best listening experience and most significantly, the blind pursuit of some of these specifications can seriously damage amplifier performance and the sound that can then be achieved in the home

The fact that skin effect causes cable resistance to increase gradually at higher audio frequencies is thought to be a problem by some audio engineers. However, another interpretation can throw a completely different light on the problems, so that certain skin effect and

resistance characteristics become advantages rather than problems!

Even before the first DNM solid-core cables appeared in 1984, we were convinced that most sonic differences attributed to cables originated in the high-frequency interface between the amplifiers, cables and loads.

Engineers have been reluctant to admit to serious problems at very high frequencies. After all, such effects could never be heard directly (the frequencies involved extend into the Radio region between 50kHz and 10MHz), so it requires a twist of the imagination to see how such problems at RF could have any audible consequences.

Amplifiers are generally viewed as straightforward devices with every aspect of their performance under the control of the designer. In an ideal world this would be the case and indeed, in the future such design control may become available. Right now though, it's not like that at all. All real-world amplifiers are designed to handle audio frequencies, but they selfcorrect and therefore really operate at very high frequencies. Many high-frequency self-correcting (feedback) circuits operating together will inevitably produce lower-frequency audible effects through intermodulation. Any change (however slight) made to such a system will produce an audible change.

The real problem is that highfrequency control in audio amplifiers is not precise enough, and there are too many external factors which can interfere with the internal operation of this delicately-balanced system. Cables connected to the amplifier input, output, ground and power supply all form part of a complex interaction. A change to the impedance of any one port in such a system will alter the way it works, so every time a cable is changed the amplifier sound will alter.

The problem is therefore complex, apparently hopelessly so. However, even without having to completely redesign the amplifier to tackle these difficulties at source, it is possible to arrange the cable parameters to isolate the amplifier from the outside world at frequencies that approach its correction frequency.

The typical correction frequency is in the MHz region, so a combination of high inductance, low capacitance and moderate resistance can help to improve the amplifier's overall performance.

When considering these factors it is vital to remember the intended application. For domestic audio the power levels are rarely high and this can be exploited to increase the system resolution, which has the interesting effect of enhancing perceived system power. At interconnect level the power is even lower, so cable parameters should ideally be scaled down to further improve resolution.

JM Which parameters (capacitance, resistance, inductance) do you think it's

most important to optimise?

DNM The three main cable parameters can be optimised for an audio feedback amplifier as follows:-

Capacitance presents a short circuit to the amplifier output at feedback correction frequencies and so should be minimised. The only reason for increasing capacitance might be to attempt to control cable impedance with a view to stopping RF reflections, but if it worsens amplifier performance it would be futile. Reducing the cable capacitance will generally increase its inductance.

Higher inductance will prevent the highest frequencies being transmitted at full level to the load, so inductance cannot be increased indefinitely. In reality, the limit is much higher than any conventional cables would reach over domestic distances. However, the amplifier really likes to see a load that increases with frequency, and this is dominant among the factors which increase sound quality,

Pure resistance causes loss of power transmission in a non-frequency-selective way. The only factor affecting frequency response is the speaker impedance curve, which will cause the cable's resistive loss to change with frequency.

As with inductance, amplifiers are content to drive resistive loads - from the amplifier's point of view, cable resistance is no bad thing. Any requirement for ultralow cable resistance to allow the amplifier to damp unwanted loudspeaker cone movement amounts to bad loudspeaker design and cannot be condoned under any circumstances. Such a system would require a dedicated set of amplifier, cables and loudspeakers and would be difficult to optimise.

JM Do you think non-metallic conductors, such as the carbon fibres van den Hul use, have any advantages over more traditional materials?

DNM The carbon-based designs which have tested to date have not shown specific advantages over well-designed metal cables, and as the material is inherently more resistive, there do not appear to be any real advantages worthy of future development.

IM Some of our readers have reported good results using co-axial cable between amp and loudspeakers. Do you think this is a direction manufacturers might head in?

DNM Co-axial cables could be used to advantage with an amplifier purposedesigned to drive a medium-to-high capacitance, low-inductance load in an impedance-matched, RF-non-reflective situation. They would not make a good general-purpose solution though.

JM What do you see as the drawbacks of conventional thick, multi-strand cables when compared to the solid-core topology you prefer?

DNM Ultra-low-resistance multistranded cables are usually capacitive, which creates a low-resistance path into a short circuit at high frequencies, thus ensuring that the amplifier loses control of its own feedback circuit. Long before instability sets in, amplifier sound quality suffers badly.

The most important aspect of largesection multi-stranding is magnetic rather than diodic effects. It is impossible for any large-section cable to handle rapidly changing AC signal without generating eddy currents. This, more than any other effect, damages the delicate audio signal.

The modern preoccupation with cable resistance has resulted in some extraordinary design decisions in the world of audio cables. Cable diameters routinely reach 10mm-15mm and resistance is many times lower than necessary.

Ironically, these large-section cables are often terminated with relatively high-resistance 'pigtails' and spade terminals, which offer poor connection quality in long-term use. The audio signal also runs through much smaller diameter conductors of various kinds at both ends of the heavy cable.

The amplifier-to-cable interface is usually thin cable or PCB track with perhaps 1/1000 of the area of the main cable. At the 'speaker end a poor quality link through a connector panel is perhaps followed by thinner cable inside the box. The crossover itself normally consists of relatively thin wire inductors followed by even thinner wire in the drivers' voice coils.

These 'weaknesses' left in the system are probably the only thing preventing a complete collapse in system performance. An amplifier connected directly to cable with 150sq mm cross section might well become completely unstable as the

circulating eddy currents (formed by transient signals in the cable) create transient capacitance of enormous magnitude in a completely non-signal-related way. A brief explanation on why this can happen is as follows.

In audio there is a tendency to ignore important effects which are well known and understood in other areas of engineering. One example of this comes under the general heading of 'magnetic effects'. A basic understanding of these in audio equipment results in design disciplines new to audio which affect all parts of the system, including cables.

The magnetic field generated around an audio cable is as complex as the current in the cable. When examining magnetic effects in audio, the rate of change of the signal is arguably the most important consideration, and by definition, rates of change are high and complex in music. The faster the rate of current change, the stronger the induced magnetic effects will be.

In addition to the desired signal current, another type of current can flow in a conductor. It is called eddy current. The best way to visualise it is to think of a rapidly flowing mass of water and recall the small swirls of current that are frequently seen in the main flow.

The causes of such swirls in the two different media are very different, but the end result is similar. In the world of electrical engineering, eddy currents are understood at least to the point where they can be exploited. For example, eddy currents drive the mechanism used in your domestic electricity meter, and large trucks crossing mountain passes are slowed by eddy-current braking systems to reduce wear on their normal brakes.

In the simplest terms, a large cross section of conductor material (a fat cable) will suffer from eddy current problems when handling audio signal. In fact, it is true to say that all cables generate some eddy currents, but they rapidly worsen as the cable cross section increases.

I mentioned the design disciplines resulting from awareness of magnetic effects. Imagine the implications for amplifier design, where there are so many areas in which magnetic interference can occur - for instance, power transistors tightly bolted to heavy aluminium heat sinks, heavy metal cases close to signal processing circuits, transformer effects on metal casework, etc. But all that is another story!

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

THE SMASHING PUMPKINS

ADORE CDHUT 51

The Pumpkins have always sounded like a low-budget slasher movie and dealt in schlock horror, but this time the censors have had their say. It seems nobody told Billy Corgan and his cronies that Bela Lugosi and all things Gothic lost their appeal around the time The Cure made Love Cats and The Mission landed in Leeds. But Pastiche is the new art and The Smashing Pumpkins milk it for every penny's worth.

Their last album, Mellon Collie And The Infinite Sadness (based almost entirely on personal encounters with drugs, death and separation) was a phenomenal success world-wide. A witches' brew of dramatic proportions, it appealed to the media and led to almost instant fame.

Adore is the crucial followup and is already on the way to scoring another commercial triumph, this time, however, for quite different reasons.

With caterwauling guitar replaced by penitent piano, and Corgan's usual growl calmed to a hush, Adore is the sound of a contrite band healing itself. With the last track, 'Blank Page', sounding irresistibly like John Lennon's

'Imagine', the transformation is complete. Indeed, but for one song, the semi-acoustic 'For Martha', guitars as we know them have been locked away in the store cabinet.

Adore succeeds with timeless melodies set to piano, as well as drum machines, symphonics, samples, synths and treated guitar. These computergenerated rhythms and subtle guitar figures are innovations for the band, but the strength of the resulting songs, particularly 'Daphne Descends', 'Crestfallen' and 'Pug', pays dividends.

The angst and brooding Gothic allure are still there, but this time they're in the background and don't bludgeon you. On the tender 'Once Upon A Time', for instance, Corgan sings to his recently-deceased mother over some delicate chiming. So yes, for the audience who prefer it dark, the sentiments of loss, death and alienation continue, but in a sedated form rather than a squall. The trio of ballads in the second half of Adore ('Annie-Dog', 'For Martha' and 'Blank Page') are signs also that Billy is showing himself to be a writer of some calibre.

The healing process sounds as if it's been influenced by the likes of Massive Attack and Radiohead in its stylish crafting and technological bent, soaring arrangements inspired more by the DJ and Techno culture than by the Sisters Of Mercy.

Thoroughly modern it may be, and a long way ahead of their 1993 break-through album Siamese Twins, but Adore is by the same token decadent and preposterous, with an inability to pose any serious questions.

OK for some, The Smashing Pumpkins are Grunge gone Trip-Hop, Grunge gone Classical or simply Post-Grunge on Ice - nice trimmings, no substance. However you read them, the simple answer is that this uncohesive, dysfunctional band of Generation Xers may just have discovered how the Millennium will sound.



SIMPLE MINDS

NEAPOLIS CHRYSALIS CDCHRDJS 001

Jim Kerr was once the epitome of cool, and his band Simple Minds stood at the cuttingedge of British Rock. These days, sadly his only link to current fashions is through exwife Patsy Kensit. It's fame by proxy for Jim in '98 and his new album does little to challenge that judgement.

In the late Eighties Simple Minds were stuck in the arena anthem rut and set to implode. While their last album, Good News From The Next World, managed to capture some of the spirit of their earlier Sparkle In The Rain period, it too got bogged down. Neapolis is equally regressive in trying boldly to resurrect the

futuristic sounds they produced in the early Eighties on albums like Sons And Fascination and Sister Feelings Call. Underpinned by heavy synth grooves and Blade-Runner visions, back then the music represented the starry heights of the band (unless, of course, it was the PVC trousers and the straight leather ties that did it for you).

The enduring slogan in Blade Runner, if you remember, was, "Do androids dream of electric sheep?" Sadly, Neapolis will only lull listeners into a dreamless sleep.

The tracks on this album earnestly display the familiar thicket of synthesisers, sequencers, drum machines, processor swirls and Jim Kerr's crooning. The hissing drums come straight from Gary Numan, the poppy rhythms from the Human League. The end product is inescapably early Eighties and lim Kerr, Charlie Burchill and Derek Forbes - the nucleus of the original band - seem clearly haunted by the ghosts of the past. There is nothing here on a par with their best tracks, 'Theme For Great Cities' or 'Love Song'. Instead we have to suffer a succession of torpid tracks with grandiose names like 'Superman v. Supersoul' (?!)

The best track, 'Androgyny' (which brings up the rear) is almost an afterthought, as if the band had suddenly been reminded that they are capable of better but quickly refuted the idea.

Simple Minds once sang, "Don't You Forget About Me". These days they're tempting

fate, and it's not hard to imagine that the Frank-Bruno road to Pantoland is beckoning.



SLAYER
DIABOLUS IN MUSICA

Slayer are one of those bands you can rely on for a good Thrash, one of the bands who, along with Pantera and Machinehead, trailed in the wake of stadium-bound Metallica and who have been forever vainly trying to achieve the same status.

Diabolus In Musica is this LA band's seventh studio album and their first for eight years and shows no signs of a musical softening; hell, even Metallica have mellowed a little and reinvented themselves so completely that Marianne Faithful duetted with them. Not so Slayer, who still glory in lyrics as startling as, "Initiate blood purge coalition in massacre" ('Bitter Peace') and these are just the opening lines of a song that goes into murderous overdrive.

1986's blockbusting Reign In Blood said it all. It was a statement of vile fury, driven with a nose-bleed velocity beyond any band that . preceded them. But that was then; now Diabolus In Musica is merely par for the course, remixing the ingredients of a decade ago - song titles like 'Scrum', 'Overt Enemy' and 'Perversions Of Pain' just don't inspire as they once did.

As walls of sound go, Diabolus is unremitting and could drop Godzilla at 20 paces. A solid headcrush, and we wouldn't have expected different.



DEF SQUAD EL NINO DEF JAM 558343-2

The new dream team on the block is, if you haven't heard, Def Squad, the wild bunch which is EPMD legend Erick Sermon, Redman and Keith Murray. El Niño ('the kid' for those who never got as far a GCSE Spanish) is, I suppose, the mark of an album that returns Hip-Hop to its halcyon youth.

Every MC these days is back on the Old-Skool trail, and Def Squad are right up there with the others. Their world-wide smash remake of 'Rapper's Delight', (the Sugarhill Gang song) proved the incentive to record El Niño, although the group have been collaborating in various guises since Sermon first parted company with Parrish Smith

This LP oozes a classic and authentic ghetto vibe from

start to finish, but then again these are true Rap scholars. Erick Sermon was the man behind classics like LL Cool J's '4,3,2,1' and Method Man's 'How High' can never be diverted from the master plan.

El Niño starts with a weak skit ('Shower'), which involves a dose of slap, tickle and postcoital homicide, but very shortly fulfils the promise of these mic wreckers. From 'Check N' Me Out' with its pummelling bassline to the deranged 'The Game' and the lyrical joust of 'Rhymin' Wit' Biz', El Niño flows with a vengeance. 'Ya'll Niggas Ain't Ready' is excellent and then they throw in 'Def Squad Delite', the revamp of the Sugarhill Gang classic, to keep customers fully satisfied.

For all the threadbare 'legendary' samples Def Squad use, there still remains an unhealthy interest in uzis, unfaithful girlfriends, bitches and muthaf*****s, which is childish and tedious from such able Rappers. Apart from that though, Def Squad do no wrong.



BLONDIE ATOMIC BLONDIE EMI 7243 4 94996 2 1

Time was when Debbie Harry was Queen, before her place

was usurped by up-start Madonna. Chronologically speaking, the coordination of their respective rise and fall was impeccable. However, in presidential terms, Debbie Harry is, and always will be, Pop's First Blonde.

Blondie were among the first of the American new-wave bands spawned by NYC's CBGB club. Less arty than Talking Heads or Television, less Rock 'n' Roll than the Ramones, Blondie were a more successful hybrid of them all.

Surprisingly given this backdrop, Punk's down-beat themes were never fully explored by Blondie. Rather, the overarching desire of the band was to blur genres and create high-class entertainment. The early singles 'Rip Her To Shreds' and 'X-Offender' were never the X-rated S&M enticements they seemed. They bore a far closer resemblance to Robbie Williams, all selfmocking and fun.

Atomic Blondie sure enough covers all the styles, helped immeasurably by the limited lifespan of the group itself. The early days were typified as much by conventional Rock 'n' Roll as by a taste for Sixties Phil Spector and Shangri-La 'girl meets boy' narratives. 'X-Offender' and '(I'm Always Touched By Your) Presence, Dear' are as emotive as, say, the Ramones' equally derivative 'Baby I Love You'.

By 1978, Blondie's style had crossed over to more mainstream Power Pop and Disco, their Parallel Lines album perhaps the summit of their achievement. The tracks around this time are irresistible and read like an inventory of

HELLO NASTY CAPITOL 7243 4 95723 2 4

It's rare to hear lines as good as, "I don't mean to brag, I don't mean to boast, but I'm intercontinental when I eat French toast", but that's the beauty of the Beastie Boys. Tongue-in-cheek, funky and still damn cool, the former brats of Rap keep 'em coming 10 years on.

Music is a contrary beast, and while bands like Duran Duran and Simple Minds look as dated today as Dralon drapes, the Beastie Boys have managed to stay up with the times. It's been four years since the US trio's last (and wicked) outing, III Communication, and by rights fashion should have dictated their demise. But a band who spent their formative teen years in NYC at Hip-Hop all-nighters and

hard-core Punk shows at CBGBs were never just going to roll over and die.

So it's hello again Adrock, Mike D and MCA, the Brooklyn miscreants who almost got banned from Britain years ago when they tried to erect a 30ft. hydraulic penis at the back of their live shows. It's hiya to the sleazeball homeboys who fought for your right to party, and it's yo to the grebos who spent their spare time skateboarding and taking drugs.

Having lived and recorded in Los Angeles and NYC over the last three years and worked on various solo projects - including a clothing business - the boys seem to have nurtured the 22 tracks on Hello Nasty mainly in Manhattan, their current home of choice.

Reassuringly, Hello Nasty finds the Beasties on song. The opener, 'Super Disco Breakin', despite plundering Gary Numan's 'Are Friends Electric', finds them back on familiar Old-Skool territory, right down to the dated Breakdance beat. That's how they mean to start, and that's how things stay, even if they do branch off into the realms of Easy Listening, Dub and

Electronica at times.

Of course, the appeal lies in the Beasties' inimitable style, and once again we are served up a delicious plate of all things weird and wacky, stuff that made the boys famous with Licensed To Ill: silly lyrics, infantile 'Rock the mic' routines, fits of braggadocio, boombastic drum-machine beats and odd-ball samples.

The temptation, however, to include live instrumentation (which featured in 1992's Check Your Head and the Byzantine word-plays evident on 1989's massively-underrated Paul's Boutique) have been resisted. That's not to say there's no invention - there's plenty, even though it's usually confined to the cut-and-paste variety. 'The Move' is a prime example; looped breakbeats, scratching and samples from a Spanish Pop song - the surefire wit is a guaranteed winner. Similarly, you'll find generous helpings of Electro Funk, cheesy vocoders and strings (on 'Intergalactic'), mutant Jazz (on 'Can't, Won't, Don't Stop'), distorted vocals, and even steel drums (on the brilliant 'Body Movin').

Then there are the forays

away from Rap. The loungy, Latin 'Song For The Man' and Santana-like 'Song For Junior' have an intriguing, wilfully Psychedelic character. But it's the collaborations which really shine. Lee 'Scratch' Perry's impressive freeflowing rhymes, chatting about money and Jesus among other things before checking his hosts as The Beastly Brothers, is superb.

Also recruited to the fold is Mixmaster Mike, the alienobsessed DJ of the obscure Invisbl Skratch Piklz, who comes armed with over 300 scratches to add to the skills displayed on Three MCs And One DJ.

This is all good stuff, and as long as those Beastly Boys can be restrained from delivering soul-searching solo efforts, then so much the better; Ad-rock's 'Instant Death' for one is dreadful and almost lives up to its name.

Hello Nasty finds the Beasties in generous and resurgent form, despite having disappeared for four years. They might not have grown up, but in this case that is all the better. "Mom said rock it to the break of dawn," and we will respectfully oblige them.

Pop's treasures - 'Hanging On The Telephone', 'Atomic', 'Heart Of Glass' and 'Rapture' (best remembered for one of the first ever Rap sequences). Sexy and invigorating stuff, with nary an empty dancefloor around. But then again, if 'Call Me' made a gigolo out of Richard Gere, then that's good enough for me.

It peters out badly after this point, unfortunately. 'War Child' and 'The Island Of Lost Souls' two singles from their last album, The Hunter, sadly meander in and out like bad hosts boring their guests stupid. Indeed, by late 1982 the party had been gracefully

but appropriately brought to an end.

To the uninitiated, this is one of the Best Ofs you really will find difficult to better.
Only the most contrary teenager would disagree that Blondie do indeed dump from a great height on bands like Kenickie, Sleeper or Garbage.

And as for Transvision Vamp, those interminable late-Eighties Blondie copyists. . .

Sometimes you've got to come back to what you know, and sinking into the clear, unmuddied waters of Blondie makes total sense. That's Blondie: faded but forever radiating

this album consists of remixes like

This said, there are two very good reasons to poach a copy of this album. One is Union Jack's Trance remix of Simple Minds' 'Waterfront' for kooky novelty value, and the other is Pob's reworking of an unreleased Raze number, 'Break for Love', which blends the crucial Platipus ingredients into a saucy House tune

with progressive Techno beats.

Collaborators Chris Barter (New Ground) and Andrew Phillips (Recon/Mortal) are well-recognised for their experimental Ambient vibe, and have worked on a number of similar projects that you may have come across on the Conemelt and Spiky labels. If this is what you're into, then you can't go wrong here - Serious Earth provides gentle, laid-back washes of rising Ambient layers spiced with spatterings of plink-plonk melody.

The press people say this slice of Ambient Electronica is, "perfect for post-club crash", but they're talking about a Sunday lunch-time stage of chillin' out - you know, dregs of the party, pillow and duvet time. Not only is Serious Earth so slowed down it's going backwards, but most of the tracks are six or seven-minute epics that take at least half that time to get going.

There are Trancy elements to a few of the tracks. 'Skin' opens with an Ambient 'lost in a dark cave' atmosphere but builds into a stampeding, beat-orientated pounder. 'The Quickening' (last track on the disc) takes similar haunting elements and slaps a monster mish-mash of thrashy bits on top. Where chill-outs are concerned, this final track should kick in just as everyone's falling asleep, so 10 out of 10 for entertainment value.



As the title suggests, this could be the shape of things to come. 'Days And Nights' is another case in point; it takes that 'needle jumping' effect and makes it tuneful.

It's going to be interesting to see what the audience reaction on the dancefloor to this one will be. Most will probably pull faces at each other and exchange those "DJ's losing it" looks, whilst the rare breed of dancers who got da real moves will just lap up the challenge•

MEET ME IN LONDON NAIM NAIMCD021

The latest from the acousticguitar maestro is already a firm favourite on Jazz FM, where his 1996 Dedicato set spent several months on the station's charts. This time Forcione has teamed up with German-born 20-something vocalist Sciubba. Between them, they sprinkle a shimmer of fairy dust over an eclectic selection, ranging from Al Jarreau's stirring 'Could You Believe' to Paul Desmond's 'Take Five', a brave and successful version of Stevie Wonder's 'Visions' and several Latin-flavoured originals.

Born in Italy in 1960, since signing to Naim Audio's inhouse label Forcione has made it his mission to capture on disc the sheer vitality of his live performances. The warmth and purity of the recording (engineered by Peter Williams) and the dynamic range preserved in the mix do his sparkling tone full justice, without overshadowing the up-and-coming Sciubba, who depped at Ronnie's in June

and won a bunch of new friends

Sciubba's Pop-influenced and sultry vocal colours have made a world of difference to Forcione's always-attractive playing. This might just be the start of something big.



These early 1998 recordings proved to be the very last from much-missed British composer Nick Webb and his fellow-Alchemists, guitarists Greg Carmichael and John Parsons. Without the Penguin Cafe Orchestra's elliptical Classical Jazz, and Acoustic Alchemy's beguiling synthesis of Folk, Jazz and Classical (underpinning melodies tough enough to dodge being tagged 'chocolate-box'), it's been a bad couple of years for fans of new musical hybrids.

Webb lost his struggle against pancreatic cancer in February this year, but in the 11 years and 10 albums since he formed the Alchemy with Carmichael, the band have sold close to a million records around the world. If you

haven't heard them strum their stuff before then, sadly, this is your last chance.

Positive Thinking is a delicate, illuminating and quietly uplifting tribute which deserves wider exposure. It's also nice to think that a composer whose muse worked in such a lyrical, gentle way has bequeathed us a last, rather lovely memorial.



THE LEGENDS OF CUBAN MUSIC
TUMI MUSIC TMG BOX I

You get box sets with everything these days, and most of them just seem to have been designed to please dustyeared archivists with rampant completist's syndrome. However, this superb collection is designed to capture - before they fade away forever - the creators of a style that swept the world around the Second World War. Putting this line-up together is a little like making a couple of calls and being able to record Glenn Miller's original band today.

Latin music specialists
Tumi have assembled the very

best of 'roots' Cuban musicians (backed by the Forties-formed Orquestra) to revive ace Cuban rhythms the bolero, cha-cha-cha, danzon and guaracha. Major stars like Celina Gonzalez, Chucho Valdez and Felix Reina join the current generation of Orquestra America players no Cuban chickens themselves - to recreate the sound of the hottest dancefloors ever, the Forties Havana ballrooms. If you enjoyed World Circuit's recent releases centred on the equally legendary octogenarian pianist Ruben Gonzalez, you'll enjoy these 49 tracks as well.

But don't expect slick, Big-Band sophistication. Cuban music has always revolved around natural feel and call-and-response playing from musicians who watch the crowd to spot what works best. Tumi's mixture of cost-effective recording and the band's decades of familiarity with the base rhythms lets a single flute sound like a wind section, and a couple of fiddles outline string lines with confidence.

Divided by rhythms, individual discs act as primers for a style, each with its history and character comprehensively annotated in the accompanying 20-page booklet. And unlike so much modern Salsoul-derived Latin music, this is music for lovers as well as dancers - sultry, romantic and seductive.


PLURAMON

RENDER BANDITS MILLE PLATEAUX MP51

Pluramon is the latest project given birth by eccentric German Ambient composer and soundscaper Marcus Schmickler, who's created a lush tapestry of highly filmic music from fragments of sampled sound and the contributions of the musicians who have joined him on this particular journey: tape-op Frank Demerit, Jochen Rueckert (who is helpfully credited on baguettes), Anouk Azar on glockenspiel, Steve Bohn on, er, pedals, and drummer Jaki Liebezeit.

Now Liebezeit is, of course, quite rightly a legend. His contribution to music since his days with Can has been immense, his combination of organic Swing and metronomic time-keeping giving essential pointers to our own times of machine-made rhythms. He certainly elevates Render Bandits from finelycrafted Ambience to some of the most superb post-Can, groove-based collage-music I've heard in a long, long time. Compare Talk Talk, ORang,

The Necks and, of course, Can. Easily one of the albums of the year.



DEREK AND THE RUINS

TOHJINBO PARATACTILE PLE1101-2

Derek And The Ruins, just for the record, are British improvising guitarist Derek Bailey and Japanese neo-Prog duo Ruins. As far as this writer knows, they've recorded together once before as D&TR, on the rather wonderful Saisoro. This album was recorded last year in London, while they were here to play a gig at the Purcell Rooms.

That gig was an extraordinary night. Ruins - drummer and singer Yoshida Tatsuya and (at the time, though the line-up has changed since, apparently) bassist Sasaki Hisashi - played a set on their own, the highlight of which was a hilarious, inspired three-minute Prog-Rock medley.

The set they performed with Bailey, however, went for the jugular, with Bailey on ferocious (and loud!) form; one sad individual walked out after two songs, yelling abuse at the

stage! So Tohjinbo is as ballsy as you'd expect. On their own, Ruins already make their own world, a world fashioned by virtuosically-inclined Japanese King Crimson and Magma fans, a world (like Magma's) with its own language of heartstopping weirdo rhythms and white-noise psych-outs. When Bailey joins them, they defer to the older man, dropping their more rhythmic, riffing style for something altogether more fractured, more elastic: energy music through and through.



LOREN MAZZACANE CONNORS

A POSSIBLE DAWN HATNOIR 801

Loren Mazzacane Connors is, without doubt, one of the most consistently interesting guitarists on the planet; he is also one of the most perplexing. A tiny resume of his life and career does nothing to prepare one for his music.

Born in 1949 into a musical family, as a child he played violin, trombone and bass before settling on the guitar. He performed on the underground scene in the Sixties as Guitar Roberts. He

has been effectively 'rediscovered' in the Nineties as part of the burgeoning Post-Rock scene, his music bearing superficial similarities to the lo-fi experimentalism and psychedelia of, among others, Bardo Pond, the Dead C, Roy Montgomery, Windy and Carl, Gate and so on. Yet his artistic intention has remained the same throughout this period: to unite the pained and painful intimacy of rural Blues with the open-endedness of improvisation and the energy of psychedelic Rock.

Previous recordings have seen him both solo and in the company of such out-Rock luminaries as Keiji Haino. The solo work's special hallmarks have been intimacy, introspection and reserve, with single Blues lines decontextualized and often slowed down to the point of near-stasis.

The music on A Possible Dream is, again, minimal, but rather different in tone, with long, sustained, distorted and echoing guitar drones replacing the more front-room sound of previous records. The mood is exemplified by the marathon 33minute-plus group guitar improvisation 'MMC/M/M Trio' with Sonic Youth's Thurston Moore and one-time Fred Frith collaborator Jean-Marc Montera. This piece alone is worth the price of the CD and is as out-there a piece of Psych-Improv as any you'll hear this year

France take on Brazil once more, with the winning score in this encounter coming from Darius Milhaud, and there's a virtuoso performance on the Naim label that's nothing short of diabolical.



DARIUS MILHAUD

Music for piano duet: Scaramouche, Op165b/Kentuckiana, Op287, et al Stephen Coombs, Artur Pizarro, pianos HYPERION CDA67014 (DDD/62,20)

Darius Milhaud defies easy categorization. Born in 1892 in Aix-en-Provence, his musical education at the Paris Conservatoire followed strictly conventional lines, Paul Dukas and Charles-Marie Widor being among his tutors. He went on to become a member, along with the likes of Poulenc and Honegger, of the group of composers known as Les Six. They adopted as their spiritual leader the arch-eccentric Eric Satie, and some of Satie's sense of the absurd appears to have rubbed off on Milhaud. His musical sensibilities, however, were predominantly conditioned by a mixture of Latin and Mediterranean cultures, and Milhaud was not alone among French musicians in developing a profound aversion to all things German, principally Wagner.

If there was a moment when Milhaud saw his musical light, so to speak, then it came in 1917 in Rio de Janeiro, where he was working at the French embassy. The impact of Brazilian, and of South American music in general, was immediate and shaped the remainder of what was to prove a long and fertile creative life.

One early product of exposure to Brazilian popular music was Le Boeuf Sur Le Toit (The Ox On The Roof), in which Milhaud transcribed tangos, sambas and other dance rhythms, linking them with an irrepressibly cheerful theme of his own, rondo-fashion. The composer described the piece as a cinema fantasie (he believed it would make an ideal accompaniment to a Chaplin film) but the nearest it came to visual realisation was through a choreographic scenario devised by Jean Cocteau, which was set in an American bar during the Prohibition period.

Le Boeuf Sur Le Toit exists in several versions, including that for piano duet, played here with panache and evident good humour by Stephen Coombs and the Portuguese pianist Artur Pizarro.

Following his sojourn in Brazil, Milhaud visited the United States and there enjoyed another revelation - Jazz as played in the clubs of Harlem in New York. Again, he readily absorbed the idiom, as he did the Creole, Latin-


American and negro traditions of Louisiana which he encountered while visiting New Orleans.

This heady and eclectic musical brew was deftly put to use in the delightful Carnaval à la Nouvelle-Orléans, while Milhaud found further inspiration elsewhere among the southern states. The wickedly tongue-in-cheek Kentuckiana is described as a, "divertissement on 20 Kentucky airs for two pianos" but sounds for all the world like a pair of decidedly inebriated bar-room barnstormers somewhat out of sync as they rattle off a sequence of Bluegrass favourites! This, one suspects, is exactly the effect Milhaud was seeking, and Messrs Coombs and Pizarro convey it to giddy perfection. They are equally engaging in the other pieces here, including the suite of dances La Libertadora, which was an offshoot of Milhaud's opera Bolivar, itself based on the life of the eponymous South American revolutionary leader.

By 20th-century standards, Milhaud was an extraordinarily prolific composer (443 works with opus numbers alone), and his keen musical intelligence and broad appreciation enabled him to work with confidence and facility in just about any genre he chose. He wrote with great speed, and the unevenness of his inspiration is undeniable: he did not inherit the rigorous self-criticism of his tutor, Paul

Dukas.

Alongside the music of other cultures, Milhaud was also attracted by the technical possibilities of music, most significantly the device of bi or poly-tonality, where two or more different keys are used simultaneously. It has the potential to be purely cacophonous, but it is a measure of the playing here that the effect merely contributes to the entertainment. Milhaud never intended this music to be taken too seriously, and that is how it comes across in the hands of Stephen Coombs and Artur Pizarro. They have been well recorded, too, (interestingly playing Bosendorfer pianos) in the mellow acoustic of London's Henry Wood Hall.



Christine Schafer's debut recording for Deutsche Grammophon confirms this young German soprano as one of the outstanding voices of her generation. As she has proved in concert, most notably in the title role in Alban Berg's Lulu, her tone is particularly suited to 20th-century repertoire, but also has what it takes to succeed in Baroque and Classical. A combination of Mozart arias and of orchestral songs by Richard Strauss provides the perfect showcase for her considerable talents.

Though a century and more separates the working lives of Mozart and Strauss, much unites them. One of the strongest of those ties was an ability to write supremely well for the soprano voice, in Strauss's case specifically that of Pauline de Ahna, who was to become his wife. Mozart, too, was enchanted by a highly-gifted singer, Aloysia Weber and, although his amorous approaches were not reciprocated, he still produced a string of wonderful arias for her to perform.

The considerable technical demands of these pieces suggest that Aloysia Weber must have had a formidable vocal technique and range, and 200 years on, that also proves true of Christine Schäfer, who scales the stratospheric heights of Vorrei Spiegarvi, Oh Dio and Mia

Speranza Adorata with style and assurance. She is equally poised in the ravishing motet Exsultate, Jubilate, which Mozart wrote for the celebrated Italian male soprano Venanzio Rauzzini.

In the five orchestral songs by Richard Strauss, Christine Schäfer finds a pleasing balance between creaminess and clarity. Each one is warmly characterised without the voice becoming over-opulent, and even the most familiar of the group, Morgen!, emerges with unexpected freshness. The genuine emotion evident in these interpretations prompts the hope that Christine Schäfer will go on to record the greatest of all Strauss cycles, the valedictory Four Last Songs, ideally also with Claudio Abbado who, with his Berlin orchestra, proves such a sympathetic and stylish accompanist here. The recording, made in DG's tried and trusted acoustic of Berlin's Jesus Christus Kirche, has a pleasing airiness and achieves an admirable balance and focus.

Marrying fabulous technique to refined musical sensibilities, the Israel-born violinist Yuval Yaron performs an imaginative selection of mainly Baroque pieces in this recital for the Naim label. The most famous work, and the one from which the recording takes its title, is Giuseppe Tartini's Sonata in G minor, the so-called Devil's Trill sonata.

The story goes that Tartini dreamt of the Devil playing the piece at the foot of his bed, the experience becoming especially nightmarish as Old Nick fiddled his diabolical way through the eerie trill which distinguishes the sonata's last movement. The work was only published after Tartini's death, earning its notoriety in the hands of another virtuoso, Nicolo Paganini, who spiced up his performances of the sonata by wearing a swirling black cloak.

Its satanic associations aside, the sonata is a scintillating example of the work of one of the leading virtuosi from the 'golden age' of Italian string music. Italy was a magnet for musicians from all over Europe during the Seventeenth and Eighteenth centuries. The Frenchman, Jean-Marie

Leclair, arrived there as a dancer and ballet master and returned to Paris as a celebrated violinist, becoming an important figure in the development of sonata form and making a central contribution to the literature and technique of the violin.

Yuval Yaron plays two of Leclair's finest pieces, the sonata in D major which became a favourite of loachim, the dedicatee of Brahms's Violin Concerto, and one in C minor, the sixth of Leclair's Troisième Livre de Sonates of 1733.

The work owes its nickname of Le Tombeau (The Tomb) to its minor-key gravity and to its drum-like rumbles in the left-hand accompaniment, sounding for all the world like a passing cortege. The sonata ends on a brighter note with a jig-like allegro, which Yaron dashes off with terrific élan.

Yaron concludes with two transcriptions, one by Ottorino Respighi of a lively sonata from Vivaldi's Opus 2 set, and an arrangement by Fritz Kreisler of a lovely melody from Gluck's Orfeo Ed Euridice. He plays the latter guite beautifully, but without a hint of schmaltz, and this is characteristic of the recital: a strong musical personality at work, one always at the service of the music.

Both Yaron, and his excellent accompanist Jeremy Denk, have been cleanly and crisply recorded in the Auer Hall of Indiana University in Bloomington (where Yaron is professor of violin). Lovers of violin pyrotechnics will enjoy every minute of this recital. It's a pity, though, that there are under 50 of those minutes.

These are wide-bandwidth, highpower monoblocs capable of
producing 128watts into 8ohms and
no less than 196watts into 4ohms.
That's plenty enough to get high
levels from loudspeakers able to
accept such power and deliver it.
The Alectos handle low loads well
too, with some small rise in
distortion to 0.028% from the
0.005% achieved into 8ohms.

Not that distortion is a problem with these monoblocs. It measured a minimal 0.005% at all frequencies and output levels - an impressive result. It is unusual for an amplifier


to measure well at full output at 10kHz but the Alectos were just as good here as lower down the frequency scale. Our analysis shows little sign of any harmonics at 10kHz, 1watt output.

Input sensitivity was very high at 125mV for full output, through the Orca pre-amplifier. That's enough to work with the lowest output sources, mostly from yesteryear.

Much as before, these Michell amplifiers measure very well in all areas. N**K**

The Creek refused to reproduce short-term impulses for our frequency-response analysis, so we used a sweep tone instead to measure frequency response. This gives the same amplitude resolution, if not the same frequency-scale resolution.

If this failing has any consequence at all on the sound, it would be to soften and possibly warm the presentation. Otherwise, frequency response was very flat, with just a small -0.3dB loss at 16kHz, seen at far right in our analysis.

Distortion was very low on both channels, measuring 0.02% at -30dB. Our analysis shows this is simply a summation of noise, not distortion harmonics, seen as spikes. The Creek was linear at low levels too, one reason for its high dynamic range figure.

The CD 43 measured well in all areas. It's inability to reproduce an impulse is rare among players, however, but the impact of this can only be judged through listening tests. NK



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

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PHONO STAGE

LEHMANN AUDIO

The Lehmann Black Box was quiet on MM, and good on MC, but not exceptional. It was around 5dB hissier than the quietest MC preamps, from the likes of Linn for example, but it will still do a reasonably good job on low-output MCs.

There was a useful gain of x1000 available on MC, and x100 on MM, both about what is needed.

Frequency response on MM and MC was identical, unlike some Japanese amplifiers. Not unsurprisingly an IEC subsonic warp

filter has been fitted and this rolls off bass below 40Hz. Invariably, this produces a bass-light sound. There was also a slight lift in treble, +0.5dB at 20kHz. This is likely to add a little brightness and detail.

Overload ceilings were as expected, being a function of gain and maximum output swing between the op amp power supply lines. At least Lehmann managed a decent 9V output swing, the least I would expect. This resulted in normal 9mV (MC) and 90mV input overload values.

This pre-amp measures well but will have a brightish sound and may

well be a little light in the bass. NK

LOUDSPEAKERS



The small drive units of this active loudspeaker integrate well, giving a comparatively smooth upper midrange over a wide band of frequencies. Our measured response, shown here, held well when listening on tweeter axis, above it or below it, like any well-designed miniature loudspeaker.

There is, however, a peculiar peak at 1.25kHz that will improve vocal intelligibility, may help

projection, but could also give a 'thin' sound. There are some bass peaks too, common in small 'speakers where, to get any bass at all, the woofer must be allowed to resonate in a relatively controlled fashion compared with the sort of behaviour expected from a large cabinet.

The Jamos will sound clear, detailed and possibly precise. They may also sound thin, perhaps sharp and a bit boomy in the bass. NK




HEYBROOK OPTIMA


Tests showed the Optima was very sensitive, producing 90dB from 2.8V of input (one nominal watt). At 5.7ohms overall impedance (with minima at 40hms) this really is a 40hm loudspeaker and some of its sensitivity is due to the extra current draw of a low load working with a constant-current source (solid-state amplifier) rather than high energy conversion efficiency.

The Optima will take a little more driving than 80hm loudspeakers, and as a result may well highlight sonic differences between different amplifiers.

Overall tonal balance shows a



slow tilt down as frequency rises. A small amount of plateau bass boost will add body to the sound, plus some warmth, generally a good thing. With flat bass output down to



63Hz, below which the port takes over, the Optima goes as low as most rivals. With little sign of bass peaking I would expect a well-controlled performance in the lower octave.

The Optima is well engineered, but drive amplifier choice is likely to be important. **NK**

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


With a raised midband and smoothly falling treble, the Ruby 2 will have fine vocal clarity and projection, plus smooth treble. The drivers were well integrated, absence of a crossover suck-out ensuring good detailing.

Bass output falls away slowly, suggesting a well-damped alignment that may sound best with the 'speakers close to a rear wall and given some power. There's little sign of bass peaking and the boominess that arises from it.

JPW nave engineered in an unusually flat impedance curve,



except for the usual twin peaks of reflex loading. Since it sits almost exactly at 80hms the Ruby 2 represents a near-ideal load in some senses. It certainly suits valve amps.



which must be load matched. It will give solid-state amps an easy time too. The only disappointment is a mediocre sensitivity of 86dB from a nominal watt (2.8V) of input.

The Ruby 2 has been neatly engineered and should offer a tidy, smooth sound. NK



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

MAGGIES' RETURN

on Marks waxes lyrical over Magneplanar's popular SMGa panel loudspeakers.

ike politics, loudspeakers tend to polarise followers. Most people are members of the box camp, but the nany other transducer technologies each ave their own adherents. Some of the nost vociferous support electrostatics, but here is another way to skin the i<mark>ghtweight, flat-diaphragm cat - panel</mark> oudspeakers. One of the best known examples of this approach is Magneplanar's SMGa.

First introduced almost a decade ago (and updated to 'b' and then 'c' suffix versions), the SMGas sold for about £650 a pair. Resembling the doors off a small wardrobe, these Magneplanars use two 0.0005in.-thick Mylar sheets with grids of aluminium wire (working against a perforated steel sheet carrying permanent bar magnets) bonded to them to shift air. A single-wire, first-order crossover (consisting of a capacitor and inductor) links the large mid/bass and smaller treble

Apart from the fact that they looked like upright tabletops on cheap, bent-steel feet and ideally needed a lot of space to breathe freely (as do all dipoles), the common perception of Maggies as current-hungry meant many British buyers were wary of these American imports. However, while the feet really don't do the SMGas any favours stability and rigidity-wise, if they're properly set-up they can work surprisingly well in small rooms on the end of sub-megawatt amplification.

One very effective system we found them working in had the 'speakers positioned just a foot or so from the rear wall in a room 14ft. on a side and powered by an Orelle 50watt directcoupled transistor amplifier. Another candidate which suits the SMGas is the little Cyrus 1 integrated, which squeezes a mere 25watts out of its power supply but sounds much more powerful than that might suggest.

What makes these combinations work is the high quoted 90dB sensitivity and very, very even 40hm impedance, which

only deviates from a straight line above the crossover point. Where low-current amps do run into difficulty, though, is in controlling the bass panel at higher volumes when there's a lot going on in the bottom couple of octaves. Stick to typical living-room levels and you're assured a refreshing change from the box loudspeaker sound though.

You can hear the absence of an

enclosure in the SMGas' clarity and lack of the assorted honks and quacks which plague box designs. They have a


tonal purity which no cone-anddome confections under about £1500 get anywhere near. Ply them with a string quartet, for instance, and they're capable of producing extremely life-like results. Heavier fare such as Dance, Ambient and even a spot of Metal may not have quite the impact and bass punch it enjoys through a good box, but it's not far behind, if the positioning is

One of the strengths of the Magneplanar panel is its lightness, which gives a speed to dynamics which borders on the electrostatic (without the need for dangerous polarising voltages or step-up transformers, along with the attendant costs).

I've lived with a second-hand pair of SMGas (which were purchased for £300) for a while now, and I have to say they've made a convert of me in spite of their foibles, which include a rather dry bass. Mind you, hooked up to Musical Fidelity's X-A200 monoblocs with their grip and control, this wouldn't be a stumbling block unless Dub Reggae was your main genre. Slightly larger-than-life imaging is another acquired taste, aithough once

again, careful placement goes a long way to sorting things out here.

A few tweaks worth trying are removing the 'sock' which covers the wooden frame, and turning the 'speakers around so their input terminals face



forward. The driver panels are mounted on the back of the frame, and rumour has it that this causes treble diffraction and slightly diffuse imaging, which a 180degree spin apparently cures.

If head-banging to Metallica at 120dB is not your cup of tea, then the SMGas have a lot to offer for very little outlay. The sound from these Maggies, a used Cyrus 1 (about £100) and a Pioneer DV-505 DVD player (£450) will get you closer to the high-end than almost anything else for similar money

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
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It has been clear for some time now, from the phone

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

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
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
