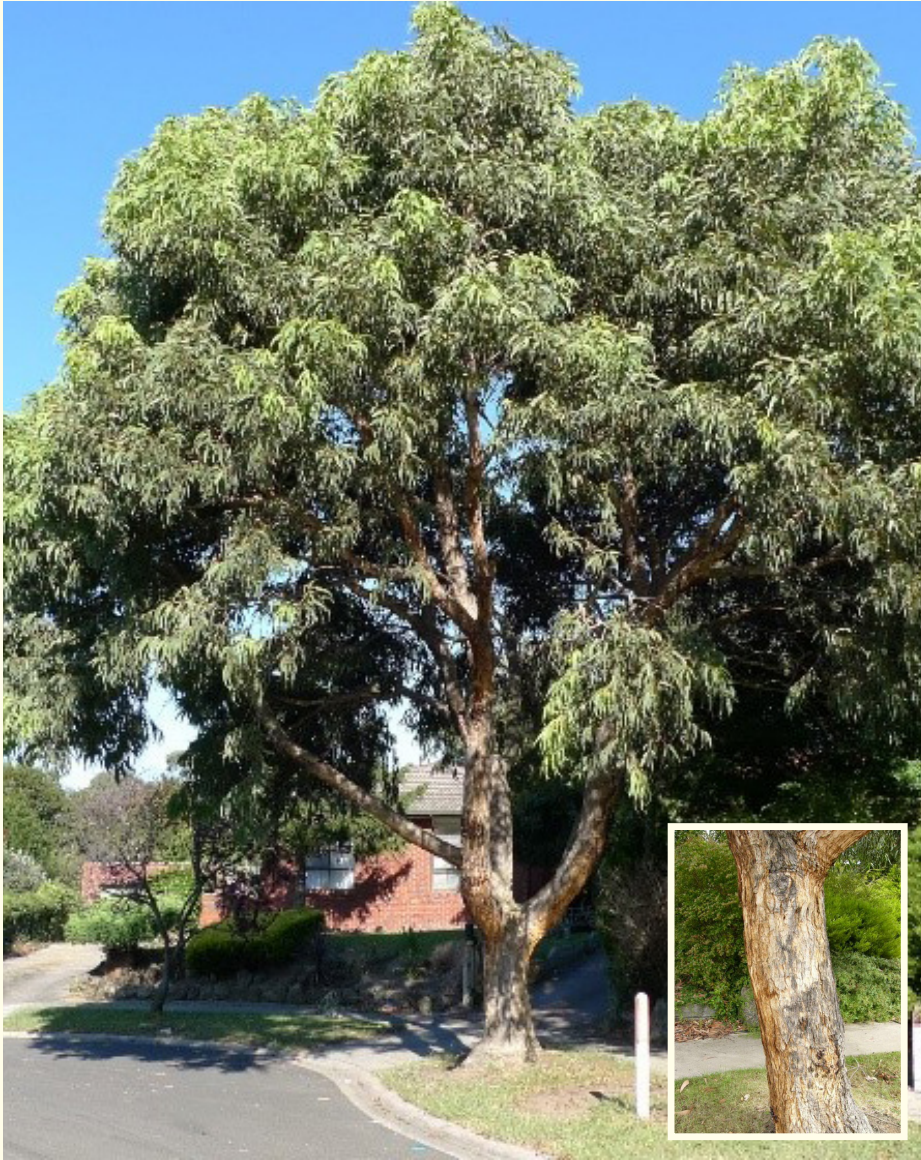


Yellow Bloodwood

Description

Typical height:
6-8 metres

Typical width:
4-8 metres

Growth rate:
Fast

Typical form:
Narrow-domed. Can be gnarled
on exposed sites.

Origin

Central New South Wales, from the Hunter River south to Nowra

Characteristics

Dwarf version of *Corymbia eximia*. Evergreen, moderate sized tree. Flaky, tessellated, patchy yellow-brown rough bark. Thick curved, broad lanceolate leaves. Profuse white terminal flowers for short period in early spring. Fruit are thick and urn shaped.

Tolerances

Tolerant of drought once established. May suffer from frost damage when young.

Facts and Trivia

Flowers prolifically and attracts native birds, bees and bats.

Tree is relatively tidy in appearance, and sheds relatively little debris (bark, leaves or fruits).

The common names are derived from the yellowish colour of bark and the blood red sap that often exudes from the wood.

Specific name from the Latin *eximius*, uncommon, outstanding.
