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Introduction

Cloonmorris Cemetery is a small rural graveyard serving the Catholic Parish of Bornacoola, itself located mainly in County Leitrim but partially also in County Longford. Somewhat surprisingly, despite it being in continuous use as a burial place since at least the 18th Century, no study appears to have been made of the cemetery's history or memorials.

In seeking to address that deficit, this essay will provide an outline of the geography and history of Cloonmorris and its environs, before presenting a more detailed history of the graveyard itself. Analysis of and comment on the memorials found in the cemetery will be followed by some genealogical studies. Finally, full transcriptions and listings of those memorials deemed of genealogical interest will be provided.

Cloonmorris in Context

General




Fig. 1: Overview of Cloonmorris and its environs

Cloonmorris Cemetery is located in the townland of the same name, in the Roman Catholic Parish of Bornacoola and the Civil Parish of Mohill, in County Leitrim. Cloonmorris itself forms something of a peninsula from County Leitrim into the adjacent County Longford, and both the Catholic and Civil Parishes contain a small number of townlands that are in Longford. An overview of the area is provided in Fig. 1 below.

Bornacoola Parish

Bornacoola is the most southerly Roman Catholic Parish in County Leitrim. The origins of its name are unclear. It may derive from *Bár na Coille* (Top of the Wood), or from *Bár na Cúile* (Top of the Recess)¹ but it has also been suggested that the original Gaelic may have meant 'Top of the Hallows'.² This last makes, perhaps, the most sense, as the parish church, in Knockadrinan townland, stands about a half a mile from Cloonmorris townland, within which lies both the cemetery and the remains of a 14th Century Abbey, and thus could be said to be at the top of the hallowed ground (see Fig. 3).

Bornacoola Parish was established around 1780 and its first recorded Parish Priest, Fr. Brady, appointed in 1788. A faded stone on the present church records that it was built, under Fr. Brady's care, in either 1804 or 1809, replacing an existing 'wretched structure'.³

In terms of civil administration, Bornacoola lies in Mohill Civil Parish, Mohill Barony, and Mohill Poor Law Union. In more ancient times, it lay in the heart of the territory of the

MacRaghnall sept, more specifically the *MacRaghnalls* of Mohill. Later, in the time of Landed Estates, most of the parish was held by the notorious Lord Leitrim though the townlands in the vicinity of the church and cemetery were mostly owned by the Earl of Granard.




Fig. 2: Catholic Parishes of south Leitrim

In general, this is an area of small farms, large expanses of bog, and a smattering of woodlands. Lewis wrote of it in 1837: "The climate is very cold and damp, and more variable, perhaps, than that of any other county in Ireland... The soil is also very various... The ordinary varieties of peat, forming the soils of the bogs, moors, and much of the mountain, occupy large tracts. This is by no means an agricultural county, although considerable tracts of land have been brought into cultivation within these few years."⁴

McParland's 1802 *Statistical Survey* stated of the farms: "Their size, in general, very small—and be they ever so small, almost always in common, among a number of tenantry..." More damning perhaps, is his account of the sizes of the typical farmhouse of the time. He quotes a verse:

"At one of th' ends he kept his cows, At th' other end he kept his spouse, On bed of straw, without least grumble, Nay, with delight, did often tumble, Without partition, or a skreen, Or spreading curtain, drawd between..."⁵

McParland goes on to say: "In fact, this account is too often, to this day, not indescriptive of many of the poor cabins." And while he acknowledges some discernible signs of

improvement, his description provides a good indication of the poverty prevailing in Leitrim at the beginning of the 19th Century.⁶ It seems probable that there was some small overall improvement in living standards during the first half of the 19th Century but that poverty remained the norm can be gleaned from many sources, not least among them Kelly's publications on the nearby Kiltubrid Parish, which provide illustration and comment on the situation prevailing from the famine era (1846-49 in particular) onwards.⁷

Certainly, pre-famine, the vast bulk of the parish's population was formed by two groups: small tenant farmers and farm labourers. An examination of Griffith's Valuation for virtually any of the townlands of Bornacoola Parish will show that the farms were mostly small holdings of between 10 and 15 acres.⁸ While the holders may not have been living at subsistence level, they were little above it. Significantly, too, the Valuation for Leitrim was published in 1857, after the 1846-49 famine, by which time a certain amount of consolidation of holdings had taken place, so it is likely that a decade previously there had been more tenants, with smaller average holding. Nonetheless, these holdings would have been much superior to those of the numerous agricultural labourers who generally dwelt in the most basic housing, and held little more than small gardens in which to grow their potatoes. While both of these groups would have been significantly affected by the potato blight that caused the Great Famine, the labourer class was decimated. The consequent deaths and emigration led to a dramatic drop in population numbers. It is beyond the scope of this paper to collate statistics for the entire area, but a look at the census summaries for just a selection of townlands from the general vicinity of Cloonmorris cemetery, from the 1841, 1851 and 1861 censuses readily shows the change in population numbers.

In effect, from these 10 townlands, chosen for their relative closeness to the cemetery, we can see that about a third of the population disappeared, whether through death or some form of migration. That this was mainly composed of the poorest class can be seen fromTable 2.

The picture emerges therefore of an area that at best can be described as far from prosperous in the 18th and 19th Centuries, and this must be borne in mind when carrying out any analysis of the memorials of Cloonmorris cemetery.

Cloonmorris Church

The ruined church at Cloonmorris long pre-dates the modern one in Knockadrinan. It is thought to have been a subsidiary to the Augustinian monastic church at Mohill, five miles away, and was probably erected in the 13th or 14th Century. Built in an early pointed Gothic style, it measures about 40 feet by 20 feet.¹¹ It has simple lancet windows in the east and south walls while the undecorated door in the north wall is thought to have been a 15th Century addition.¹²

The monks who served Cloonmorris are said to have lived in a house beside the Rinn River, in Knockadrinan,¹³ the ruins of which are still visible in the yard of Reynolds' public house. Legend has it that an underground tunnel ran half-a-mile from this house to the church in Cloonmorris.¹⁴ It is also said that the church was built in one night, and that the stone over the entrance will fall down on anyone entering the church through the doorway.¹⁵

There is no record of when the church fell into disuse.

A History of Cloonmorris Graveyard

While the burial ground is clearly centred on the old church in Cloonmorris, it is likely that the church itself owes its presence to a much older tradition.




Fig. 4: Eoin MacNeill's sketch of marking on Cloonmorris Ogham Stone

The grounds contain the only Ogham stone discovered in counties Leitrim or Longford. Though its presence was undoubtedly known locally, it seems to first have come to public attention in 1892, through a short article in the *Leitrim Advertiser*.¹⁶ The stone was then situated a few yards from the church gable. It attracted wider notice after 1909, when a local man, Thomas Kennedy, drew the attention of the historian and scholar Eoin MacNeill to its presence. MacNeill found the stone still near the church, and learned it was used as a marker for the graves of the Kellagher family. He set about deciphering the stone's inscription and concluded it was a memorial to a Qenuvinagnas, and probably dated from the period 500-700 A.D (see Fig. 4).¹⁷

A Bord Fáilte plaque within the cemetery provides a clearer illustration of the markings. The stone was subsequently moved from near the church to a site just inside the graveyard walls, though not it seems without causing some dispute among two Kellagher families who regarded it as marking the burial places of their ancestors.¹⁸

The presence of the Ogham stone implies that Cloonmorris was established as a burial place long before Christianity came to Leitrim. Indeed, as stated on the Bord Fáilte plaque, much of the damage to the inscription may have been caused by deliberate defacing of this pagan monument by early Christians.

This is clearly the oldest memorial in the graveyard, and surely one of the oldest in any graveyard in Ireland.

Cloonmorris is an example of an abandoned graveyard. There can be little doubt that burials would have taken place in the vicinity of the old church prior to the reformation and the subsequent destruction of the church. Although policy during the Penal era discouraged Catholics from burying their dead other than in the graveyards of the Established Church, the practice of burial in the grounds of the ruined monasteries and churches continued throughout Ireland¹⁹ and there is little reason to believe Cloonmorris would have differed. Certainly, local tradition is that burials around the old church continued almost unabated, and that graves were scattered in quite a wide radius around the ruin.




Fig. 5: Cloonmorris Cemetery, 1837 OS 6" Map

The graveyard today is clearly divided into two sections - old and new - and the boundary between them is the path that runs parallel with the east wall of the ruined church. Local belief is, however, that the layout of the old cemetery was originally much different than it is today. As can be seen in Fig. 5 the cemetery is bounded to one side by a road. This road

now crosses over the railway, which came through in 1862,²⁰ and it is said to have been built through the cemetery.²¹

There is circumstantial evidence to support this claim. The 1837 Ordnance Survey map of the area (Fig. 5) shows the graveyard with the road alongside it, and the clearly designated layout of the field on the other side, the outline of which seems to match quite closely with that of the graveyard.²² That these are the only clearly designated sites on this portion of the map suggests further that they are linked. This map predates the arrival of the railway by some twenty five years and it is very likely that the road was widened and improved for the railway. Certainly, the 1911 Ordnance Survey map (Fig. 6) shows no trace of any defined field on the far side of the road.²³ This area is now planted in trees.

Whatever the truth of this, the graveyard is now enclosed and all that can be found today are the headstones and markers within the walls. It is unclear when these enclosing walls were erected, other than it was sometime after the 7th of January 1871, when the Chairman of Mohill Union commented on the "propriety of enclosing the Burying Ground at Bornacoola."²⁴

No written records regarding burials prior to the second half of the 20th Century are known to exist. Oral tradition has it that not only are there graves on the far side of the road, there are more under the paths in the cemetery and under the road itself. John G. Reynolds of Knockadrinan (himself interred in Cloonmorris), whose yard included the remnants of the old monks' house, claimed to have seen slabs in the field that is now planted with trees. It should also be noted that there are large expanses of grass in the old section of the cemetery which are said to cover several graves belonging to families that have since died out in the parish.²⁵




Fig. 7: Excerpt from Griffith's Valuation, Cloonmorris townland

Griffith's Primary Valuation for Cloonmorris (Fig. 7) shows the cemetery occupied 3

Roods and 5 Perches around 1856.²⁶ On the accompanying valuation map, the plot does not seem to cross the road but as this valuation map also shows the railway line, which was not opened until 1862, it is not contemporary with the valuation itself and so cannot prove or disprove the contention that the burial ground originally crossed the road.

There are other indications that the cemetery was once larger. At a meeting of Mohill Union on 7th January 1871, the chairman commented that Bornacoola Burying Ground required enlargement.²⁷ At another Mohill Union meeting, in January 1885, it was noted that an expansion, though necessary, could not be undertaken as the ownership of the land in question was in dispute between the Earl of Granard, the Midland Great Western Railway Company (owners of the railway line), and the tenants of the land.²⁸ Clearly the need for extension was driven by demand, implying perhaps that the then boundaries were inadequate and that the space available had once been larger.

Despite the recognised need for expansion, the cemetery remained the same size until 1935 when additional land between the old cemetery and the railway was bought from John Reynolds of Knockadrinan.²⁹ The new part of the cemetery was consecrated in 1935 and Owen Murphy of Clooneen townland was the first interred in it.³⁰

While today Cloonmorris cemetery is very well maintained, this contrasts greatly with the situation of around a century ago. It is perhaps unsurprising that in such a generally poor area little money was available for the upkeep of the cemetery, which as we have seen was the subject of unfavourable comment at Mohill Union meetings.

A letter concerning Cloonmorris in the *Roscommon Herald* of 20th January 1900 (Fig. 8), says:

"At present it is a disgrace in any Christian country – it is covered over with bushes, weeds and loose stones, the gate is seldom closed, but indeed there is not much trespass now, for no beast with the exception of a goat could make their way through the brush... Suffice it to say when an interment takes place there a pass has to be cut through the bushes from the gate to the grave."³¹

Little had changed by February 1905, when the Leitrim Observer noted:

"We often wonder how visitors to the graveside of deceased friends find out the slab which 'marks the spot where earth to earth returns', for the ground is covered with decaying leaves. The general aspect of the place also requires to be considerably improved."³²

That this phenomenon of neglect was not confined to Bornacoola parish is evident from the *Leitrim Observer* report of 15th July that same year which states that Mohill District Council condemned the conditions of Cloone Burial Ground (a few miles east of Bornacoola) as "not in a proper sanitary state." But the same Council meeting acknowledged that some 200 people of Bornacoola parish had gathered and put Cloonmorris cemetery in "thorough order."³³ Elsewhere (Fig. 9), the same paper quoted the Clerk of Mohill Union, Mr. E. Geelan as saying that, as a Bornacoola man he "was proud of the turn out made by the people on the occasion." We will encounter Mr. Geelan again in the case studies section.

Memorials of Cloonmorris – An Overview

Listings of the Graves

Documentary records of the burial plots in Cloonmorris cemetery are not known to have been produced until well into the second half of the 20^{th} Century. Previously, knowledge of the layout of the graves and the location of the various family plots was retained orally and locally.³⁴

Therefore Appendix 1, which contains the transcriptions of memorials of genealogical interest, also contains a sketch map and listing of the principle names on each memorial as at February 2009.

Some 487 people are commemorated on the inscribed memorials, with an additional 71 people named as 'erectors'.

Uninscribed 'Markers'

Mention must be made of the significant numbers of stones lying within the old section of the cemetery. These very probably served as markers to graves. It is likely most of them never bore any inscription though some may be remnants of once-inscribed memorials long since vanished. While some of these are dotted around the grounds, several of them have been gathered together and arranged within the walls of the ruined church. While these do not mark actual graves, there is said to be one in the South-East corner of the church.³⁵

The presence of these stones can be argued to provide additional testament that there is a significant volume of burials in Cloonmorris for which no record exists.

18th and Early 19th Century Births and Deaths

The earliest surviving burial records of Bornacoola Parish date from 1833, and the earliest baptisms from 1824.³⁶ Consequently there is a significant deficit of information on 18th and early 19th Century parishioners.

Appendix 5 provides a summary of early birth years, as calculated from the memorials. In all, the possible 18th Century birth years of some 21 people are listed. The earliest birth indicated is that of David Farrell in 1705.

Some Considerations of Time

Although Cloonmorris cemetery has a new section, families who have long-established plots in the old part continue to bury their dead there. This study is therefore of necessity a point-in-time one.

There are, as at March 2009, 156 marked graves in the old part of Cloonmorris. No names can be assigned to seven of these, due to wear, toppling, or in one case, the absence of a memorial,³⁷ leaving therefore 149 memorials available for analysis.

While it seems probable that the cemetery has been in continuous use since the 13th or 14th Century, the oldest date on a memorial is 1765. In all, only 8 inscriptions survive from before 1800. Fifty three of the memorials have their oldest inscriptions dated 1940 or later.

A breakdown by decades makes interesting reading. We can put dates on some 145 of the graves in this part of the cemetery. Table 3 shows the breakdown of burials per double-decade, the percentage of overall burials and the cumulative growth to 100%. This is based on taking the oldest recorded burial in each grave.

It is important to note that these figures capture only burials recorded in surviving memorials. It is virtually certain that very significant numbers were buried over all of the periods covered, but either they were not commemorated with memorials, or those memorials have since disappeared.³⁸




Fig. 10: Numbers Interred over Time, as recorded on Memorials




Fig. 11: Burials over Time, as recorded on memorials

From these illustrations it can be seen that while only 20% of the recorded burials can be dated from before 1880, a further 60% of them are from the period 1880 to 1960, and indeed 50% of all recorded burials in the old cemetery date between 1900 and 1960. While, as seen, the population of the area has decreased since the time of the Famine, it may be taken that the proportional rate of deaths has not. Furthermore, tradition and lore indicate it is probable that the graveyard has been in use for several centuries, and certainly continuously since the 18th Century. Clearly then the 18th and 19th Century numbers represent only a fraction of those buried. This is presumably due to a combination of laws, poverty and practice.

The point has been made that this is a parish of small farms and poor land, one from which few, at least until the 20th Century, would have had the means to pay for inscribed memorials. This undoubtedly was a limiting factor. It also perhaps explains the presence of so many 'marker' stones. The sheer paucity of numbers from before the early 20th Century

is surely indicative of both the poverty in the area and the lack of a tradition of creating inscribed memorials among the poor.

However, even allowing that these factors combined to ensure that the majority of those buried in Cloonmorris before, say 1880, did not have memorials erected to them, there is certainly anecdotal evidence to suggest that once there were more inscribed memorials there from these times, and these have been variously destroyed, decayed or simply rendered unrecognisable by time.

Classes of people

In an ideal study, there would be discernible class differences between those interred in the cemetery. In this location, however, the reality is that those interred were mostly of the one class – that of small farmers. This is born out in many respects by the simplicity of most of the headstones erected.

Names

From a study of the surnames of those interred in Cloonmorris, Bornacoola Parish appears to have its own set of names. For context, let us first look at Mathieson's Report of 1894, which lists the 20 most common surnames in County Leitrim, as determined by registered births in 1890.³⁹

While the maiden names of married women were sometimes included on their memorials, it was more commonplace for just their married names to be recorded. These married names were used in compiling the above table, and some distortion of the figures can therefore be expected.

Even allowing for this distortion, the surnames from Table 5 allow some interesting comparisons to be made against different 19th Century sources.

Mohill and Kiltoghert were the two Leitrim strongholds of the *MacRaghnall* chieftains of Muintir Eolais, itself part of the ancient kingdom of Breifne. It is hardly surprising then that the anglicised version of their name, Reynolds, is still widespread in the general area, including Bornacoola parish. As can be seen, almost half of Leitrim's Reynolds households could be found in Mohill Civil Parish, and as such it is natural to find Reynolds the most common name in Cloonmorris cemetery.

The names Beirne and O'Beirne probably derive from the OBirn chiefs of *Tir Bhruinn* in nearby County Roscommon.⁴²

Interestingly, of the other most commonly found Cloonmorris surnames (except for Kerrigan) there appears to be signs of clustering in the Bornacoola area.

53% of all of Ireland's mid-19th Century Shanleys were in Leitrim and 53% of those were in the Mohill Civil Parish area. The data further suggests that the name centred on Bornacoola parish. Indeed, MacLysaght tells us the chief of the Shanley Sept was known

as MacShanley of Dromod,⁴³ and, as Dromod is little more than a mile from Cloonmorris, it is hardly surprising to find the name occurring with reasonable frequency in this area.


Similarly, 53% of all of Ireland's Geelans come from Leitrim, and 65% of those from the Mohill area, though the origins of this name are somewhat complicated (see Case Study on Edward Doyle,. McGarry is another name that seems particularly associated with Mohill Civil Parish and, by deduction from Cloonmorris data, particularly with Bornacoola Parish.

And while the surnames McGlynn, Campbell and Fox are not especially associated with either Leitrim or specifically Mohill Civil Parish, they are among the most common in the old cemetery, again suggesting specific clustering in the area.

Appendix 1 – Transcribed Memorials

Sketch Map



The Sketch Map is not drawn to scale but does provide a recognisable guide to the old part of Cloonmorris Cemetery. The entrance to the cemetery is just beyond the arrow on the right hand side of the drawing. Different symbols are used for headstones with surrounds, without surrounds, and toppled. In addition, some of the more significant clusters of what appear to be 'marker' stones are also indicated on this map. Each recognised grave carries a stone number.

Listing of Graves

In this table, the stone number identifies the position of the grave on the sketch map above. A number of inscriptions have been deliberately omitted from the main body of transcriptions below, and these are shown in italics on this table.

Some 487 people are commemorated on the inscribed memorials. An additional 71 people are named as 'erectors' of various memorials. This listing provides the surname(s) of those interred.

Selection of Memorials for Transcription

While memorials are an excellent source of genealogical data, it can be argued that there are more reliable sources, especially the Civil Registers. Civil registration of births, marriages (for Catholics) and deaths came into law in 1864 and it can be argued that all births from after this date should be found among the General Register Office records. Similarly any deaths after this date should also be in the GRO records. This is of course an overly optimistic view, and many births and deaths were not registered, and this will be found to hold true especially for the earlier years of civil registration.

The question then is whether or not to include in this essay transcriptions of all memorials in the old part of the cemetery. On balance, the approach adopted by Eileen Hewson has been chosen. Hewson largely ignored all post-1940 memorials in her series of booklets on County Leitrim graveyards.⁴⁴ It can be argued that virtually all deaths occurring after that year would be of people whose births appear in the civil register, especially as compliance with the civil registration requirements became more commonplace after the earliest years

of the new system. This then is the rationale employed in selecting what memorials are fully transcribed in this essay.

To cover the eventuality of later deaths featuring non-compliant people, Appendix 3 provides an alphabetical listing of those commemorated in the old part of Cloonmorris Cemetery but not included in the transcribed memorials section.

- Number Stone Number. As a broad guide, Numbers 1 to 82 are to be found in the general vicinity of the ruined church, and the remainder between are more clustered around the path dividing the old from the new part of the cemetery. Please see Sketch Map (Page 18)
- Transcription for each memorial deemed to be of genealogical significance (see Selection, Page 18), a full transcription is given. Uncertainty is indicated by question marks. Inability to read words or lines is indicated by '...'
- Notes have been added where relevant.
