




Dancin' The Year Away

Clay Students Serve As Area Ambassadors.





Students Are Instructed, Not Taught.




A lot of times teachers make comments like "I would never do that," and "When I was in school — things were totally different." According to Clay's faculty, things have changed drastically throughout the years.




Junior Class Gives High Priority To Attaining Goals.





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
Freshmen Enjoy Ability To Participate!






Cheerleaders Work To Keep Spirits Alive.

Five hundred years ago, White Buffalo Woman told her people that she would return as a white calf to usher in a new age of harmony between all races of mankind.

resident Clinton, with Republican leader Bob Dole, signs legislation implementing the U.S. role in an expanded **General Agreement on Tariffs** and Trade (GATT), one of the most sweeping trade liberalization pacts in history.
